



You Make Me Feel Like (Peace & Love & Happiness)

"People always sing along to this. 'Peace. . . ' Is an anthem for feeling good, man. There's far too much doom and gloom In this world, so it's good to hear Latin grooves once in a while. Naomi N'Sembi is definitely her own singer but there are echoes of Roberta Flack and Sade in her voice. We wrote this after some weed and a couple of bottles of wine."

What You Feel In Your Heart

"Dubtribe Sound System are from San Francisco. I saw them perform live and was drawn to their Buddhist-style beliefs. Sure, they sit on the floor and yell 'peace and love', but I definitely feel it. I put this on for the bassline - it's got an amazing disco vibe. A bump and hustle boogie tune!"

Funky Friday

"This is a great disco sample tune. The vocals are really munchkin-like but they still work well with the track. It's also got a fantastic interlude and outro. Blueboy had a hit with 'Remember Me' and this is from the same 12-inch."

Wind On Water

*Fresh And Low are a Glasgow collective I once worked with so this tune is very dear to me. 'Wind On Water' is a seriously deep old skool tune. I'm really into the lower end of things, too much tech-house is devoid of basslines - if a song doesn't have one, it's hard for me to get into it."

The Cimmerian

"Boston-based Callisto makes incredibly meiancholic, Instrumental music; there's an awful lot of emotion flowing through it. He uses big chords in his music, a lot like my Abacus stuff, I also have to give props to the amazing artwork. One of his records used a weird picture of a family dressed as Mormons. . . well, that's what it looked like."

Stay The Night

"Everything on this mix is in my box and 'Stay The Night' is no exception. A nice little analogue track that always does the job on open-minded dancefloors, it's very much in the Toko vein. A cool house tune with chords that stab in all g the right places."

Circe (Jazzanova Mix)

"I don't know a lot about spoken word, but I do know that Ursula Rucker is true to the game, a poet from Philadelphia. Her work with 4 Hero was astounding and 'Circe' is right up there. And Jazzanova? They're on some big willie shit, man - their vibe is amazing. I hear everything from Latin and disco to techno elements in their music sometimes all on the same tune!"

I'll Be Right There

"Another Glasgow bod and another great track: Paul's productions are so true that I find it hard to figure out how he actually does it ali. This is like Northern soul or an old Seventies record and sounds totally live. I've heard he's become a bit of a recluse, though!"

Callin' U (Bonus Beats)

"Hove those bonus beats, man! I played with them to make it sound live. Basically, I'm trying to maintain the Latin vibe of the mix. It also blends perfectly into the next number. . ."

Colors Of My Mind

"This reminds me of 'Callin' U' - very samba, very atmospheric and very, very sexy. It's also incredibly long - 10 minutes in, the record's still rolling. I play this a lot at Ciao Edie's in Toronto. If you're ever in the city, come here."

11. GLENN UNDERGROUND

Fly With Me (UBQ Vinyl Soul Mix)

"I don't always flip records over but I did with this one. This is a great vocal house tune with disco overtones - but it's still typical Glenn Underground. I've met him a few times and he always comes across as a complete American. In the best possible sense, of coursel"

When I Fall

"This is a really great cover of a cool Nat King Cole record, even if I do say so myself! Bratticus is actually a Toronto-based artist called Esthero. She came in, sung the track in 10 minutes and left. I'd never made a vocal track before - I'd always struggled to get the song out. And chicks love it!"



Layo and Bushwacka traded Tenaglia-style missiles in The Lounge, Harvey had the electro-heads nodding and Mr C made sure the main

floor rumbled with electricity.

Sister Bliss, for one, was impressed by Muzik's array of talent. The Faithless star walked into AKA to the sound of 'Love Action' by The Human League. "One of the best records ever," she beamed over the balcony. "Tall Paul and I are making notes as to which basslines to steal!"

But who was behind the Eighties revival? None other than Dave Seaman, who rinsed out loads of old school-disco

classics like FSOL's 'Papua New Guinea' and The Clash's 'London Calling', bringing a nostalgic tear to every eye in the house. "I had a really, really good time," Dave enthused. Erick Morillo's peak-time set was equally messy. "The vibe was great," said the Subliminal superstar. "There were some amazing people at that party. I even met some people I'd hooked up with in Portugal the week before!" Three words, then: it's all good.

CREAM RAIDED



IN A SURPRISE MOVE, Liverpool superclub Cream was raided by over 140 police officers on Saturday 6th May.

The raid comes as a shock, given that Cream is widely recognised as having some of the most stringent anti-drug measures in the country and has a well documented history of liaison with the local force. Each punter is issued with a plastic bag into which to deposit their belongings, and every wallet and cigarette packet is rigorously searched by one of the many security staff. In addition, the premises are equipped with 66 security cameras which feed directly into Liverpool Constabulary viewing rooms, a direct result of Cream's close work with the police to eliminate drug dealing on the premises.

Interestingly, even with so many officers, there were only five arrests made on the night, and drugs with a (police estimated) value of £1,000 were seized, working out at approximately 33 pence worth of drugs per person. Police nonetheless claim that 'substantial' seizures were made.

Motives for such a heavy-handed operation remain unclear, though it is believed that Liverpool Constabulary will be objecting to the renewal of Cream's license. Check www.muzikweekly.com for updates on this story.





OUT THERE AND BACK (AGAIN)!

IN A FOLLOW UP to a story we ran exclusively in Muzik three issues ago, a court in Berlin has just ruled in favour of Paul Van Dyk against his former label MFS. As a result, Van Dyk's new album 'Out There And Back' will be released in june on Deviant Recordings in the UK and Universal worldwide. The judge has ruled that Reeder and MFS have no option on the album.

As previously reported, Van Dyk joined the label ran by Mark Reeder and Torsten Jurk in 1992. He released two albums for them before departing alongside Jurk in 1998. The bone of contention was MFS' claim that Van Dyk's contract stipulated they had an option on his third album. Reeder was offered an album by Van Dyk's

lawyers but refused to listen to it on the grounds that it was a collection of demos. It was this that prompted Van Dyk to take Reeder and MFS to court to clarify.

Reeder is understandably disappointed with the outcome. "Paul cancelled his contract in advance of knowing what the outcome of the court case was going to be," he explained. "Consequently that album - which turned out to be 'Out There And Back'-was then given to Universal. This meant that we didn't have an album we could release."

It is believed that Reeder and MFS are considering an appeal against the verdict. Both Paul Van Dyk and his spokesperson refused to make any comment to Muzik about the case.
















LONDON'S HEADSTART are to celebrate a year in business with the launch of a tech-house label by resident DJ Carl Clarke and A&R man Danny Newman.


Home have yet to announce a successor, although industry rumours suggest that Sasha has been approached as a replacement. Darren Hughes was unavailable for comment.





S-EXPRESSTRESS HITS THE BIG TIME

WE'RE IN the Round Room at London's Portobello Hotel. Kate Moss slept here and it's said the Croydon seductress filled the bath with pink champagne for then-lover Johnny Depp. DJ Sonique, however, isn't impressed.

"Champagne? I can't stand the stuff," she spits, ordering an alternative tipple from room service. "Give me brandy any day. It does wonders for my vocal chords.

Sonique is the biggest-selling Brit dance act in the world and this is not the type of voice care advice likely to curry favour with Mariah Carey or Whitney Houston. But a quick listen to 'It Feels So Good' is enough to illustrate that the lady is indeed talking sense.

A joyous, feelgood pop song, its current sales Stateside are astounding. With 400,000 singles sold since Christmas, Sonique is now bigger than Oasis across the pond. Oakey talks about 'taking America for all of us', but Sonique has done it without even trying. What's her secret?

"I have no idea," she shrugs. "I can honestly say there was no plan to conquer the States. I haven't even done any promotion yet. I've been in Britain the whole time!"

The Manumission deck mistress has come a long way since her early days of 'Intercourse' with S-Express. After a brief stint with the Cooltempo imprint, Sonique pushed ahead with a DJ career. Honing her skills at her pad in Crouch End, the former sprinter emerged with a single trick up her sleeve - she could sing her lungs out. Ambitious and fit as fuck, it was inevitable that she would wind up playing Ibiza's notorious sleazepit.

"The most shocking thing I saw was a guy sucking himself off on stage," she pants, ordering another double shot of brandy. "He was pretty flexible, to say the least. Funnily enough, my Mum was there and watched it all!"

With six months of flesh-pressing ahead, Sonique has had to calm down considerably. Her hedonistic days, she says, are long gone. "I have a thing about lemon bon bons," she grins. "I eat bundles of sweets. They're my only drug now."

I've had a month of flight nightmares. Firstly, Easyjet to Belfast to play at Thompsons Garage on a Sunday night. The flight lasts a grand total of 22 minutes, but they managed to delay it for five hours, and on my girlfriend's birthday too. Then I had a terrible flight to Ibiza the week after when they managed to re-route our flight via Gatwick, so they could pick up some more passengers. We sat on the tarmac for two hours and arrived in Ibiza four hours later to be told none of our luggage had turned up. It was fascinating being at Pacha off-season, with only the locals around - it doesn't really get going until 3 or 4 in the morning, but it's still incredible. I took a few days to chill out in lbiza, just to see all the parts I usually miss when I'm over DJing in the summer - it's amazing how different it is from the height of the season. I reckon I'll go back there this winter too.



Philip Quenum is a tall Frenchman who hosted a show on Swiss radio and was involved in the Montreaux Jazz Festival for some years before coming to Britain, and Paulo Nascimento is a classically trained Portugese musician who learnt his engineering skills under the auspices of producer Luis Jardim. With this kind of pedigree their output should be a little more interesting than the average looped groove, and it is. Access 58 have made it their business to infuse their material with everything from smooth house suss though hard-arsed throbbing to the serious eclecticification of their involvement in the 'Millennium Jazz' albums.

"Before four years ago you had the Detroit vibe," explains Philip in heavily accented English, "but now people want something different. I respect Robert Hood and Juan Atkins but now it's time for new flavours. Just like when everyone was making minimal tracks

"When we hooked up with the Pacific label in 1997 we had 40 tracks already and wanted to release one every six weeks," adds Paulo. "But they couldn't do that so the only person we could turn to was [DJ and behind-the-scenes legend] Brenda Russell, who said we should start our own label."

Russell helped the pair put out a series of singles on the Access 58 imprint and manages their career to this day, although they're now signed to Billy Nasty's Theremin stable for live gigs. Other projects include soundtracking Nothing-Nothing's catwalk show during Fashion Week and a forthcoming "secret jazz album with a singer".

Other than that it's techno as usual, but don't expect anything less than the finest sensual tech and sex-funk. (THG)



Keeping their heads down while all around them were losing theirs in a four-to-the-floor chemical stampede, Skidoo filtered the unique brand of raw funk intensity, ethnographic percussion and electronic jiggery-pokery they'd forged in the early Eighties into their Ronin label. They released pioneering breakbeat house in the early Nineties and more recently unleashed the mad skillz of UK hip hop talent like Deckwrecka, Skitz and Roots Manuva. Inhaling deeply throughout, no doubt.

"Because of the trance aspect to our music, a lot of people assumed Skidoo were real house heads," Alex continues. "But it's not really true. We're all much more into funk, r&b and hip hop – it's much more soulful and rhythmic." In the past this penchant for organic, percussive sounds has involved recreating traditional Balinese music on beer barrels and gas cylinders and basing live performances on Tibetan rituals (on early Eighties albums 'Urban Gamelan' and 'The Culling Is Coming' respectively). Now, though, with production expertise honed by remix work for, among others, Stevie Wonder, Ice T and Public Enemy, theirs is a much smoother, though no less eclectic, concoction.

23 Skidoo's new single 'Dawning', already championed by more open-minded DJs like Gilles Peterson, Ross Allen and Ashley Beedle, features jazz heavyweight Pharoah Sanders improvising an exalted saxophone solo over melancholy, moon-lit hip hop. "The challenge was to do something which was predominantly instrumental but didn't subscribe to any of the accepted formats of instrumental dance music," Johnny elaborates. Consequently, elsewhere on the forthcoming '23 Skidoo' album you'll find gruff verbiage from Roots Manuva alongside edgy soundtracks, ska influences brought by the former Aswad horn section and the trademark eight-limbed Skidoo rhythm section. "It's a melting pot of different influences," Alex stresses. "There are a lot of reference points people can take from it."

Speaking of reference points, at the risk of descending to Theakston-like depths of fatuous questioning, what exactly does '23 Skidoo' mean? The ancient alchemical formula of the Illuminati? A Chicago gangland term for 'leg it, it's the cops'? Alex: "It means different things to different people, but for me 23 Skidoo is change, evolution – how you live your life and how your music should progress." (TM)

HOW DID YOU FIRST GET INTO PROMOTING?

"I started promoting around 1985 simply because I was bored. There was nothing going on, so I decided to hold a night of my own. I got some mates to play, named it The Kremlin Goes To Pieces and went on from there really."

TELL US ABOUT VENUS.

"I did Venus in Nottingham from around 1990 to 1993. At the time there was a north/south divide, so it was the first club north of London to have guest DJs. Everyone played there – Weatherall, Todd Terry, Roger Sanchez, Fabio Paras, Sasha. . ."

YOU USED TO MANAGE SASHA, DIDN'T YOU?

"Yeah, he played at Venus and totally blew me away. He needed someone to look after him, so I managed him for a couple of years. 7pm then took over which was inevitable, but suited the both of us. We had a good time though. I've got a lot of respect for him."

WHO ARE YOUR FAVOURITE DJs?

"My all time favourite is Andy Weatherall. Others are Derrick Carter, Craig Richards and our resident Dave Congrave, who is mind-blowing!"

WHAT DO THINK OF RENAISSANCE?

"It caters for a market that Nottingham badly needed. It's filled the gap that was missing for so long. The Bomb and Renaissance are totally different clubs and to be honest, although it's not my cup of tea, fair play to them."

HAVE YOU BEEN THERE?

"Yeah, I've checked it out, but I prefer smaller, more intimate venues."

WHAT'S THE LONGEST CANING SESSION YOU'VE EVER HAD?

"Dean Thatcher's wedding. It started on Saturday in London and I woke up on Tuesday in a garden in Birmingham, with a pot bellied pig running around me. I didn't know where I was and I'd left the wife in London!"

TELL US SOMETHING ABOUT YOU THAT NOT A LOT OF PEOPLE KNOW.

"I used to be a first aider at football matches and as a kid I used to be a Highland Dancer."







1) DEAD CAN DANCE

Yolunga – The Spirit Dance (4AD)

Dead Can Dance are so dramatic; they've got that power. This was the key track in Baraka which is my all time favourite film and a timely reminder that we're just a virus on this planet.



When I first moved to London I was just 18 and I'd go out every single night. Harvey always played this on a Monday at The Velvet Underground. People still scream their heads off whenever it's dropped.

10) BOBBY MCFERRIN Circle Song Six (Sony)

People only seem to remember Bobby for 'Don't Worry, Be Happy' – hardly his most profound moment! I've got all his albums and 'Circle Songs' is my favourte. He's got such a unique sound.

16) RENEGADE SOUNDWAVE The Phantom (Mute)

This always gets people jerking around! A simple tune with wicked tribal beats, 'The Phantom' reminds me of my raving days. Sasha used to play this at Tribal Gathering parties in places like Warminster.

20) ARVO PÄRT Centus (ECM)

Avo's a contemporary composer from Estonia. The classical world is so stuffy but this is guy is a real breath of fresh air. Hove deep, minimal music and this one's perfect to listen to by the beach, the ideal end-of-tape track, in fact.



6) JEDI KNIGHTS Solina (Universal Language)

The Jedi Knights album had a massive influence on my sound. I wanted to mix that West Coast breakbeat vice with drum & bass-influenced technology. Deep, percussive electro fusing tribal beats to an 808 was exactly where my head was at.

11) GYOTO MONKS Freedom Chant (Rykodisc)

I'm fascinated by the sound that monks create when they chant. They sing with seven different harmonies at the same time, a sound that only enlightened people can make, so I'm told. To me, a lot of acid sounds in dance music have the same resonance.





2) DJ KRUSH Meiso (Mo' Wax)

A record with real atmosphere and ambition, 'Meiso' is one seriously moody track. I did a live tour with Krush in Australia a couple of years ago and he just blew me away. At the time this was called trip hop, but it's really just deep, instrumental hip hop.

7) NAT KING COLE Calypso Blues (Blue Moon)

I first heard 'Calypso Blues' last summer while I was sitting on a cliff in Greece with my uncle. It's all about lounging about by the ccean, so the song just clicked – such a simple, primitive, likeable groove.

12) NU YORICAN SOUL

The Nervous Track (Nervous)

Another classic Masters At Work moment and a track that transcends genres. It does crazy things to people, possibly because it's really a breakbeat-orientated groove. People dance like Tom and Jerry to this!

17) EDGE ONE

Powered by a massive synth riff, 'Edge One' was a Saturday night anthem at The Astoria. At the time, this was called hardcore. We used to go and see Top Buzz and Rat Pack there every week with Coxy and Grooverider. Totally off the hook!

8) HASHIM Al Naayfish - The Soul (Cutting)

Everyone plays this tune – it's the most awesome electro record ever. It's about 16 years old but the production still rocks. When Friction was at Bar Rhumba, a DJ would play this every week. A reminder of how far music hasn't advanced!

13) BOBBY KONDERS Nervous Acid (Nu Groove)

A recent purchase on a trip to America. New York house with a vicious acid line, 'Nervous Acid' is responsible for more fake gurning expressions than any record other Ihan Hardfloor's 'Acperience'.

18) FRANÇOIS KEVORKIAN FKEP(Wave)

I'm an avid fan of François K's trippier stuff. Although he's a very mature producer, this is pure madness. I heard this at Twilo and can assure all doubters that on a big sound system it swallows you up completely.

Plans for 2000?

Encouraging my boys IIs, Apex, Beber, Evil 9 and finishing off the Tsunami One album, plus continuing my residencies at Twilo, Fabric and Bugged Out.

Adam Freeland's 'Tectonics' mix CD is out now on Marine Parade

3) JOHN MARTYN Big Muff (Island)

This record was recommended by a friend and is a real inspiration when I'm in the studio. Produced in 1977, 'Big Muff' is actually John, a guitar and a rack of effect boxes: folk-hop, if you like. There are no beats to it but it's still got that deep, trippy almosphere.

9) RELOAD Le Soleil Et La Mer (Dedicated)

An end-of-night anthem from Tom Middleton and Mark Pritchard – a lush blend of rolling beats and cheeky bass. I've watched the sun come up to this many, many times. The perfect comedown cure.

14) GIL SCOTT HERON The Bottle (full length bootleg mix)

Everyone knows 'The Bottle', but Ashley Beedle was the first person to turn me on to this bootleg, a 10-minute barrage of tibal beats and percussion. Musically and lyrically, Gil Scott Heron is a revolutionary.

19) LAMB

Cotton Wool (Fila Brazillia Mix) (Fontana)

I'm a massive Lamb fan and it kills me that they're not bigger. Louise Rhodes has the best voice in breakbeat and their production is fantastic. I'm a'so fully into Fila Brazilla and this fusion of styles is phenomenal. A beautiful track to wind down with.





Super on a park bench and our lan drops knuckles and swings into action. Back from the ashes of the willed Roses and fresh from the top-selling 'Golden Greats' long-player, he's on a roll. A roll that has rocked a whole new audience with a whole new funky monkey sound.

There are still unbelievers, but Brownie is the don and doyen of the summer daze, 2000 style. Forget Roses old-timers in Stone Island who were at Spike Island, these punters aren't a gurn over 25. And they're sent as high by the beats and breaks of his 90 minute set as their ancestors were by 15 minute John Squire gee-tar wanks.

Take the reaction to 'Golden Gaze', a six minute, jogging-on-the spot workout punctuated by MDMA roars from the crowd. Or the vocal sweeps of 'Love Like A Fountain', which sends the throngs into a sing-a-long madness like blue rinsers round the pub piano. And what about 'Gettin' High'? Already in unabashed, don't-worry-ma-l'm-only-puking northern mode, this elegy to self-upliftment pushes the 4,000 off the end of the pier and into the abyss of sweaty, air punching groove. Fuck me, if this wasn't a concert you'd think it was a rave. Remember them, kids?

But Brown's greatest achievement is surely this: in a place where getting your city-branded rock sucked is as easy as chips, fights and gravy, he's still the biggest draw in town. Easy.

"But is it dance music?" those back-in-the-day

THERE'S A SECRET mutual appreciation society only found in the more intimate clubs. Maybe it's because there's a smaller crowd, or because the DJs are more in tune with the punters. Whatever the reasons, it's in full effect here. Slam boys Stuart McMillan and Orde Meikle are fronting this clique and we're all being initiated.

Freelance Science is just one of many nights where you can find the pair, but this is the place where they're truly themselves. Dropping a feast of trademark tunes – including the obligatory 'Positive Education' – the boys are cooking. Or is that the lack of air conditioning?

"It's a chance for us to get back to basics," raves McMillan.
"We get a one-to-one vibe off the punters, so we get deeper and more experimental with them."

Judging by the flying hands and insane chanting, it's an approach that works. The crowd are not indulging in empty worship, as you find so often elsewhere. They're immersing themselves in the music. There's no pretension and no god-like DJ egos, just a sheer undiluted passion for the music. When Orde slams (excuse the pun) on their remix of Death In Vegas' 'Dirge', it's clear that they get as much out of this night as the punters do.

Stuart and Orde have been DJing together for 12 years and it shows. Their seamless mixing (until a photographer knocks the decks) of deep, funky Detroit techno creates the typical Slam session and the crowd lap it up.

Intimate venue. Deep, dirty tunes. Hot, sweaty crowd. It's pure filth. And we fucking love it. **(KY)**



PECKHAM blue-rinser Kaye Smith is a true clubland angel. Every weekend, this affable tea lady offers hot beverages to queuing punters outside The End. "Someone called me Mother Theresa last week," she smiles, handing out another cuppa.

Like Kaye's rapid rise to fame, Sugarcandy's ascent has been remarkable. In less than four years, this open-minded club has established itself as one of the busiest nights in London. Not surprising, really, when a typical bash involves Dimitri From Paris stroking his chin alongside Groove Armada and an ever-cheeky Mr C.

"Sugarcandy was born out of frustration," reckons promoter Richard Newport. "We were fed up with the lack of quality: there just weren't enough good nights out in the capital. Of course, in the early days, we just booked our friends."

Needless to say, things have changed, 1999 proved to be a pivotal year for Newport and

co-promoter Matt Lawes. After two years at The Cross, the club decamped to The End at the end of last summer. The eclectic music policy moved with them. "Tall Paul and Adam Freeland played back to back at our third birthday party," notes Newport, "Incredibly, it worked."

Sugarcandy's revolving roster is as varied and vibrant as you'd expect. In the main room, everyone from Sister Bliss to Smokin' Jo spin delicious house grooves for a thirsty, groove-deprived audience. They've even pulled back Tall Paul a couple of times, an unusual London occurrence for a (New)man with his own club down the road.

But it's The End's lounge area which really simmers. Amid a sea of glam girls in tight-fitting bodices, Tummy Toucher Tim 'Love' Lee holds court in the back room, alongside Jools Butterfield and Faze Action from the achingly hip Nuphonic imprint. Like Kaye's sugary tea, Candy never tasted so sweet. (RM)



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






REINVENTING THE WHALE





MOBY'S ALBUM 'PLAY' HAS FINALLY PROMOTED HIM TO DANCE MUSIC'S PREMIER LEAGUE. WE CAUGHT UP WITH THE ENIGMATIC SLAPHEAD ON TOUR

THE FOLIAGE is rustling at California State University in Fresno. It's four hours before showtime and two girls – aged around 15, armed with cameras and dental braces – are lurking in the trees, aiming to catch sight of the stars on the final date of MTV's bullishly titled Campus Invasion Tour. If they are caught by security, they will be ejected from the open air amphitheatre with extreme prejudice. If they are spotted by Brit-rockers Bush's lecherous road crew, they may well wish that security had got to them first.

But instead, it's Moby who sees them.

Dressed in scruffy track pants and an mtv.com
T-shirt, nursing a sprained ankle from last night's
show in Santa Barbara, he glides towards them
on a silver scotler, says hi, asks their names,
and promptly zooms off to get them backstage
passes. It's a pure Mohy moment

passes. It's a pure Moby moment.

34 year-old Richard 'Moby' Hall has been on this "extremely strange" tour with Bush for six weeks, playing everywhere from Arkansas to Florida, plugging the phenomenally successful 'Play' album (his fourth, excluding various collections of rarities) to his native land. This is just about the only nation which hasn't yet clutched 'Play' to its collective heart; it's loitering around the Number 40 mark here, whereas it's been sitting pretty at Number One in many countries, including the UK.

With sales at 2.5 million and counting, 'Play' is the epitome of a 'sleeper' album. Upon its release last May, the response was committed disregard, underlining Moby's pariah status with the critics in the wake of the punk rock disaster zone of his 'Animal Rights' album. The popular

perception of him as a bothersome vegan, Christian and sanctimonious windbag didn't help. Gradually, however, word got around of the florid techno blues on tracks like 'Honey', 'Body Rock', 'Why Does My Heart Feel So Bad?' and 'Find My Baby', Vitally, Pete Tong proclaimed that everyone should own this overlooked masterpiece. Then came the soundtrack contracts: every track on 'Play' has been used in either a commercial or film, including Thomton's chocolate clips and The Beach. Not an unambiquous hoorah, but. . . Come 2000, an album started in Moby's bedroom in early 1998 is selling like crazy, connecting with everyone from clubbers and indie kids to housewives and solicitors. A man whose career had appeared to flatline was suddenly back to life.

"I have no idea why it's been so successful," he muses, relaxing on his well-appointed tourbus, having e-mailed a bunch of friends on his orange i-Book. "All I was aiming for was a record that I loved and that perhaps some of my friends would love. I guess I wanted to make it good value for money, something that people would want in their homes."

As a sound bed for ordinary goings-on?
"Yeah. A lot of people tell me it's nice to have

sex to. Though,I couldn't imagine being naked while my voice was playing in the background. Too creepy."

It took Moby four years to view his Twin Peaks-sampling breakthrough single 'Go' as excellent rather than mediocre. Moby already likes 'Play'. But back in October 1998, he did consider scrapping it. He was pleased with the

field recording samples which he was using (recordings of early blues singers in America's deep south by 1930s sound archivist Alan Lomax). But a spectre called 'Fat Of The Land' – by fellow survivors of long-gone rave days, The Prodigy – was casting a shadow over his project.

"I wanted my album to be as slick as theirs," he recalls. "It got very distressing, going into expensive recording studios and continually coming out with results I hated. In the end I went back to my bedroom and made an album full of flaws, quirks and brilliant idiosyncrasies."

An album which has made you dance music's biggest star?

"Oh no," he replies, positively aghast at the suggestion. "The Prodigy still come first, The Chemical Brothers come second, so... um... I guess I'm third."

The slow but inexorable rise of 'Play' has kept Moby on the road since March 1999, forever discovering that there are new people who, having bought his album, would like to see his frantic, energised on-stage performance. A matter of days after the end of this tour, he'll be off on his own international tour once more and he won't leave it until December.

Surprisingly, then, Moby has never looked fresher. He says he's in his element, that he has "nothing better to do" back home in Manhattan. And besides, the time-honoured, on the road experience really can be fun rather than soulsapping, if you do it in the right company.

"My band and crew are wonderful. I'm a kindhearted idiot who doesn't take himself seriously and thankfully they're also like that," smiles Moby.

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

Previously renowned for his strict abstinence from drink and drugs, the palpably happier new Moby cheerfully admits he's had the odd night out on magic mushrooms of late and that alcohol is back on the agenda, too.

"We've invented these really healthy cocktails," he grins. "Like organic carrot juice with vodka. The theory being that though your liver is suffering, other body parts improve."

Moby will nonetheless be pleased when this tour ends. While the last few days have seen him in relatively dance-savvy towns on America's west coast, the Campus Invasion Tour has also taken in places where, the more that Bush have been perceived as testosterone-fuelled rawk champs, Moby has been viewed as, 'like, totally gay'. Take Jonesboro, Arkansas. The rednecks in attendance took a dislike to him, and Moby wasn't overly keen on them, either.

"I can't do dance routines or sing"

"It was real God, guns and glory country," he explains, patently delighted to have caused a fuss. "When I played 'Feeling So Real', I introduced it as a beautiful disco song which would bring out the club queens in the frat boys. I suggested they make out with their buddles back at the frat house. You can imagine how well that went down!" (So to speak.)

At 7pm, as the sun sets on another blazing day in San Joaquin Valley, Moby hits the stage in front of 7,000 Fresno-ites - aged 12 to 50; almost all dressed in foolishly capacious shorts and bad sneakers. His band are in place: percussionist Duard Kleyn, drummer Scott Frassetto, DJ Spinbad and former member of girl-punk shouters L7, Greta Brinkman. His pate is newly shaven, there is toilet paper stuffed in

his ears and he's bouncing around like a flyweight boxer. Soon enough he's clambering onto his keyboard, leaping towards the drum kit, running a lap of the stage then completing this routine again and again with exacting dynamism. As he explained earlier: "I can't do choreographed dance routines or sing melodies. Instead it liberates me to run around like a crazy person."

His set is a miraculous slew of stonking beats, pummelling riffs, bongo thumping, jumping, pugnacious shouting, lunatic rave chords and more jumping. It naturally encompasses some careerspanning musical highlights, from his Guinness Book Of Records-bothering 'Thousand' to the melancholic chill out of his new single, 'Porcelain'. Out front, the guys crowd surf, while the girls hand him gifts. He collects an inflatable shark, a plastic duck, 12 bracelets and 17 amorous notes this evening.

Later, relaxing on a monitor case as Bush do excruciating things with the ghost of grunge, Moby comments: "I apologise if this sounds arrogant, but I look at the contrast between my fans and Bush's and mine seem smarter and more open-minded. It must be awful to not like your fans - like if they're a bunch of misogynous meatheads. Personally, I love my fans and would do anything for them."

Moby pauses to reflect a moment on this possibly excessive statement.

"Well, I wouldn't be willing to undergo bone marrow transplant for everyone who's bought one of my records, but almost anything." As it's the last night of the tour, Moby is invited to join Bush on stage at the end of their set. Politely, he demurs.

15 minutes after Bush leave the stage, Moby says he has something to show us, though he warns us it's "pretty gross". He leads us to the side of the

stage where Bush roadies (some of whom used to work for hair-metal monsters Motley Crüe) have formed a makeshift 'holding pen' containing Fresno's finest looking wannabe groupies. And Bush are there pressing flesh - mainly in the fashion of pens to boobies, as they sign numerous firm, pouting young breasts.

"There's a darker side to touring debauchery," Moby grimaces. "I don't want to sound wimpy, but if I have an affair on tour it's usually for nice reasons. I watch other bands and road crew and they have sex indiscriminately - they'll find these really young girls and coerce them into having sex. We're not monks, but the idea of taking a naive 14 year-old girl to the back of the bus for sex is a big turn off."


Moby prefers to lug a huge crate of beer off his tour bus, to share it among his fans and listen as they tell tales of just how boring life is in Fresno - its sole distinction, believe it or not, is that all the fast food outlets test new products here. Which would explain why the air permanently smells of rancid bun and burger.

Moby's harmless little party is soon broken up by a member of the University's security team. Demanding that all the girls hand over their beers, the guard hollers: "This is a dry campus!"


Behind his back, meanwhile, Bush blithely

continue to sign knockers.

Time, finally, for Moby to kick off just about the cutest bit of on-the-road behaviour you're likely to see. "We have a stellar disco party on our bus each night," he grins. "Let's go!" Soon, an incredible 35 people (all but five of them female) are crammed on Moby's tourbus, dancing to a disco mix tape provided by Moby's English







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lighting man, Dan, who's a regular at the Carwash night at Reading's Matrix club. The bus is rocking like a cross-Channel ferry. Bush vocalist Gavin Rossdale is on board, canoodling with some girls and seemingly not pining excessively for former girlfriend, No Doubt's Gwen Stefani. Moby divides his time between dancing with his beer pointed ceiling-wards, and intently switching the lights on and off. It's the smallest, happiest, most crowded club you could ever imagine.

"The more of a public figure I've become, the more selective I am in the kind of people I'm attracted to," Moby ruminates over the sound of Deee-Lite's 'Groove Is In The Heart'. Previously Moby has talked of threesomes and bisexual encounters, gamering the unlikely reputation of a ladies' man. Or man's man. Whatever.

"Four or five years ago I was promiscuous, reacting against my very poor sex life as a teenager, but I'm over that now."

After two hours of top notch partying, the amp on Moby's tourbus finally blows. Everyone is advised to move to Bush's tourbus. Except, when everyone gets there, only the women are allowed on board. "It's getting horrible on there," recounts one girl, who's making a hasty retreat from this inner sanctum of rock cliché. Moby heads back to his bus and prepares for the journey ahead. We're driving to Los Angeles and will be there by daybreak.

Seated pool-side at the fun 'n' fashionable Standard Hotel on Sunset Boulevard, Moby takes in the smog-tinged vista of Los Angeles and recalls a troubled childhood. His father, a chemistry professor, died in a car crash when Moby was two, meaning he was raised by his mother Betsy, and grandparents, in prosperous, conservative Darien, Connecticut. All of Moby's

school chums were good at sports, whereas he was not. All of them came from rich families who played golf and drank G&T, whereas his mother played piano in rock bands and smoked grass.

"This made me unhappy," he admits. "I used to lie a lot. About being wealthy, about going on exotic vacations. I was ashamed of myself."

He was having paranormal experiences, too.

"The house we lived in was clearly haunted. I'd hear my name being whispered and things would fly off tables. The really weird thing was I never felt scared, even though I was frightened by most other things."

Did the movie Sixth Sense have any resonance for you, then?

"Yeah, because [Oscar-nominated brat] Haley Joel Osment was playing the only child of a single parent. The difference is I don't see dead people. Unless you died five years ago. I don't know." Moby looks uncomfortably at the ground, as if he wishes he hadn't said that.

"At about 14, my life got better," he adds quickly. "I realised that my circumstances were in fact terrific. It became apparent that my friends' parents were distasteful people and that my mother was cool and open-minded. She turned me on to Rimbaud, Bukowski and Public Image Limited, after all. I was still small and still shitty at sport, but I wasn't ashamed anymore."

Moby's mother died in 1996 from cancer, aged just 52. "I miss her as a dear friend," he offers. "But I'm used to being alone."

Moby doesn't want to give the impression of morbidity – he enthuses on a range of subjects. Having been sent a copy of Ali G's video, Moby – already a Simpsons fanatic – is "obsessively" into Britain's most celebrated comic turn. "You've gotta be a genius to pretend to be that stupid." Kelis, who will be recording vocals for his next single,

'Honey', is deemed to have an "unparalleled approach to r&b". He says he's relieved that he turned down the frankly ridiculous (though worth several million dollars) offer to produce Guns 'N' Roses' new album: "They have a very sober working environment, with no drink or drugs. It wouldn't have been anywhere near as interesting as producing a Guns 'N' Roses record in 1990." He claims that he doesn't think he'll ever be too old for clubbing: "I hear that Kraftwerk still go out and they must be at least 50. I love dancing. It's dark, the lights are flashing in your eyes and really loud, phenomenal music is pounding in your ears. It's really sexy and transcendent and I like it as much now as at 17." Even the UK music scene, which, after initial praise, had given Moby such a hard time, before 'Play', gets the thumbs up.

"It's nice to have a hit record in any country, but it's thrilling to have one in the UK. It's hands down the most interesting musical market in the world."

You don't feel like showing two fingers to the people who wrote you off?

"No, it's nice that we're getting along now. People have said terrible things about me for the last five years, but I can't resent them, because a lot of their criticism was justified. I didn't mean to antagonise but I understand now that I did."

Now favouring a softly-softly approach to eclecticism, he reckons he was wrong to switch erratically from underground techno ('Next Is The E') to commercial rave anthems ('I Feel It') to punk rock (his cover of 'That's When I Reach For My Revolver'). "I was selfish and petulant," he shrugs.

Though still believing in the causes, he concedes that his hardline views on Christianity, drink and drug-taking, animal rights and the environment were often over-baked. "I used to be a rigid, uptight moralist who thought he was always right. Thing was, I was proven wrong so many times that





I had to relax a little."

The new Moby avoids quarrels at all times. "One of my goals is to always back down in an argument. Now and then I get angry and prima donna-ish, but 10 minutes later I feel ashamed."

There's nothing wrong with getting angry every now and then, is there?

"Maybe not, so long as you don't get too involved in it. So long as you're not like Puff Daddy, beating people over the head with champagne bottles."

Moby's feeling about fame are mixed. Although Christina Ricci, Beck and Madonna are just a few of his celebrity friends, he treats the faintly arty, star-studded party scene with extreme ambivalence. Though routinely slating it, barely a week goes by without him turning up for some fancy pants launch party or other.

"It's kinda exciting to be surrounded by stars like Dustin Hoffman and Robert De Niro. But it's kinda gross, too. It's funny, celebrities are usually driven by their insecurity. It's like we have to go out to parties, because if we don't go out people will think we're not famous any more."

Moby was delighted to learn that the gifted and frequently unclothed Ewan McGregor was into his music when he met him in Sydney. Consequently, the two decided to celebrate their mutual affection with a big night out.

"Me and Ewan were walking round with our pants round our ankles. Obi Wan Kenobi! Drunk and naked! What a sweetheart."

Have any celebs proved disappointing?

"Russell Crowe was a real nasty prick," he says flatly. "He was saying really snide, belligerent things about America. I mean, I'm not patriotic or anything, but I have a problem with people who dismiss things in an unintelligent way."

Would you like to become more famous? "Ask me in six months' time, because my fame

is building all the time. It'd be pathetic to base your life on fame, but it is nice to walk into a restaurant and experience the thrill of people whispering and pointing at you."

Is it empowering?

"It makes it hard for me to justify my aggressively low self-esteem. Now women are attracted to me and people are buying my records, it's hard to look in the mirror and go, 'You pathetic loser'."

Moby pauses, to consider the situation in greater depth.

"Of course, this is a problem in so much as I'd become quite attached to my low self-esteem."

Tonight Moby will meet up with his band and road crew for an end-of-tour meal. Tomorrow, they will meet again to play on the hugely influential Tonight TV show. Waiting for a taxi to take him from the Standard hotel, Moby discusses what kind of album has a hope of following up 'Play'.

"It's a dumb thing to say maybe, but it's sounding good in my head," he laughs. "It's gonna to be very melodic and romantic, influenced by Al Green and Bill Withers songs."

A soul album?

"That would be nice." The taxi pulls up. "I can't imagine the next record being even half as successful as 'Play', though. By the time it comes out (it's scheduled for 2002), the Top 10 will probably be full of Kurdish ballads. You just can't tell."

The man with the severe case of wanderlust, the best mobile disco parties, the half-geek half-assured persona, madly penetrating eyes and the sound of sublime contemporary blues in his possession waves goodbye. We'll see him again in around two years' time, cutting a swathe through those Kurdish ballads like it was the easiest thing in the world.

DEFINITELY MOBY

1981: Aged 14, inspired by The Clash and PiL Richard Hall forms a 'straight edgir' punk band called Vatican Commandos

1984: Drops out of university, adopts the name Moby (his great-great-uncle was Herman Melville, author of Moby Dick) and hangs out on the New York club scene, picking up accessional DI work

1986: Hears house music for the first time and, metaphorically speaking, spends the next five years in an anorak. "I've probably got every house and techno record made before 1992."

1989: Starts fiddling with samplers and drum machines. Upcoming pseudonyms for single releases will include Voodoo Child and DJ Cake.

1991: Sporting a magical Twin Peaks sample, 'Go' becomes a premier rave anthein. Ever modest, it takes Moby four years before he agrees that it's a great record.

1992: Releases a self titled album bundling together his early singles. Plays at the Royal Albert Hall-busting his keyboard into tiny piece

1993: Goes hardcore crazy, with singles like the Essex rave-primed 'I Feel II'

1994: He's p regular performer at huge raves throughout Europe. Grows partial to standing on his keyboard and adopting crucilix poses

1995: Releases his Everything is Wrong' album, a demented hotch-potch of pop, trance ambient and industrial. The public response is as mixed as the music.

1996: Releases an ambient album called The End Of Everything' as Voodoo Child It's universally slated, commencing Moby's 'difficult period' with the cress.

1997: Puts out 'I Like To Score', a dull album of soundtrack covers. Follows it up with 'Animal Rights', the sound of Moby returning to his rock roots with disastrous results. Not a good year

1998: Admits at the New York CMJ Music Conference that going rock-wards was a bad move. Starts work on 'Play'

1999: From Bible-basher to post-rave Jesus figure, the use of 'Play' sees Moby zoom back into the spotlight. Posing for Calvin Klein and a soft porn mag and hanging with a brace of celet chums helps the cause, too.

2000: Moby gets offered a lilm score commission about once a week. If turn them all down because there's nothing more satisfying than making music for myself. My manager tells me off, though "






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newly opened Tate Modern. As well he might, for the triple-headed, monolithic commentary on differing attitudes towards motherhood is so huge that it dominates the cavernous interior of the converted power station in which the Tate Modern is housed. "It's like the Guggenheim in New York," he enthuses. "When you come here, you realise the most amazing piece of art is the building itself."

David Holmes knows a lot about persuading folk to re-examine their perspective. After all, he's the guy who made his name as a techno DJ, and then reverted to playing funky, back room Northern soul just as he was about to break into the million-air-miles a year, jet-setting big time. He's the cheeky Sixties and Seventies soundtrack sampler who went on to score a Hollywood blockbuster. But, most importantly, he's the man who was behind the warm, funk-fuelled tech-hop grooves of 1997's superlative 'Let's Get Killed', and whose comeback album is the best rock 'n' roll fired chunk of sensorial psychedelia to emerge this year, Confused?

The first sign that changes were afoot came in the form of his much celebrated Radio 1 Essential Mix. Recorded a year after 'Let's Get Killed', "it gave people the clue as to where my next work was headed". A rollercoaster ride through lysergic soul classics and obscurities alike, it was neither the Heavenly Social style Weekender bender, nor the straight edged percussive techno funk that many were expecting. But then, that's one of Holmes' most precious qualities - you can never tell what he's going to come out with next. As he

Killed', Holmes took his core band - including longtime friend and ex-Sabres Of Paradise and Aloof man Jagz Kooner - to a New York studio space with a long-term lease. Spending the first few months throwing ideas around, David would DJ in the back room of a club called Sticky every Sunday night. "It was so small, it was like DJing in your living room. Everyone in the room was just completely twatted!" he chuckles: "It didn't matter what you played - anything from The Stooges to Aphex Twin. I was trying to create a particular mood, and that became the sound of the album."

Listening incessantly to legendary voodoo blues-meister Dr John - the tracks 'GrisGris' and 'Walk On Gilded Splinters' in particular - David and his crew slowly but surely pieced together "that seedy, swampy, New Orleans feeling", The result is 'Bow Down To The Exit Sign', and it's simply one of the best albums of the year so far. Drawing on a rotating cast of vocalists, the grimy textures and fully-fleshed gospel blues are nothing. short of transcendental. Although tipping its hat to its rich musical heritage, the album is nonetheless infused with an irresistible sense of now. It also sounds like nothing he's ever recorded before.

"Well, I don't really want to be in this just for one thing," he explains, safely ensconced in his rooftop hotel room and sparking up the first of many cigarettes. "I mean, I love house music, but there just came a period when I felt bored with it it wasn't in my heart. When you're in the studio. you learn and constantly absorb information. You get a real education, From there, it was about developing what I do, while being true to how I feel about music. I think that to make music that's going to stand up and say something, you've got


comparison. "It's like with the stuff in the Tate earlier on. I don't really judge anything on whether it's modern or classical - if I like it, I like it. I just appreciate things that are unique and have a timeless quality about them,

Of course, one of the great things about this album is the fact that his dance music background will get people who would never normally listen to this kind of music expanding their horizons. Was that deliberate?

Well, I think that's part of the point of making music: reaching new people," he shrugs. "I could make another 'Let's Get Killed' in a couple of weeks, but that's not where I'm at right now. I'm really proud of it and I still love it, but I think that it's so important to challenge yourself as a producer. Want to make music that people can listen to, and if you turn this music up, and you can dance to it, well, great, but I really want to keep pushing the boat out. If I don't do that I'll feel that I'm just sitting still,"

True to his word, the Holmester's activities have not been restricted to his recorded output. For 'Bow Down To The Exit Sign' arrives as a full-on, multi-media package. "I see an album as a centre cog in a big wheel," David says. "That's what makes everything else come around. It's a statement about what you're about, and where you're going to, and where you're coming from.'

Only this time around, the statement comes complete with a fully fledged film script, called Living Room and written by long time friend, Lisa Barross D'Sa. Although Holmes admits that it is something that is "either going to fail





miserably or work brilliantly," he has sufficient confidence in the the concept that they're already pitching the script to independent companies in a bid to get the film off the ground. Forget the old cliché of 'music for a film that hasn't been made' - that's been done umpteen times and is far too unambitious. This one's actually going to happen, as David reiterates more than once. "The film is Lisa's vision. I'm just gonna hand it over to her and a director, but I'm gonna have total control over the music. Hopefully it'll be something that captures many facets of human existence."

That's not to say that Living Room is intended as a cradle-to-grave vanity project. Rather, it is intended to reflect Holmes' fascination with the deeper reaches of the human psyche. This theme is discernible in both the surreal vibe of this record and, more particularly, the LSDfuelled near psychosis of 'Let's Get Killed'. Some of the field recordings on that record were famously done while under the influence.

"That was back then," sighs a clearly unenthusiastic Holmes. "To tell you the truth, I find talking about drugs very boring. Everybody's done them, everybody has different stories. Acid was an important aspect of 'Let's Get Killed', but it really has nothing to do with this

album. This one was more inspired by great music and great experiences."

Drugs may be boring, but you surely can't deny that 'Bow Down To The Exit Sign' is awash with psychedelic triggers?

"The word 'psychedelic' is relevant," he admits. "To me it means colourful, hallucinogenic, distorted, tripped out. But you don't need to take acid to make psychedelic music - you just have to have a good imagination."

So drugs are still an important consideration? "It's really important on a certain level," he considers. "Some people need it to give them an extra kick up the ass, to open that little door in the brain that's closed unless they've had a couple of joints, but I certainly don't rely on it. Everyone has different experiences. I know people who've never taken drugs and still make really good music; I also know people who can't make music without having a few joints. But the whole thing in New York when we were doing that record had nothing to do with music, it was do with the experience of me and my friends running around New York recording people. Acid just added intensity to the whole experience and made it a much more enjoyable one, and it's something I'll never forget. It wasn't big, and it wasn't clever, but I'm here to tell the tale to you, and we made a really good record out of it."

Yet whereas 'Let's Get Killed' was almost cheery, and certainly imbued with its own sense of intrepid adventure, the psychedelia of 'Bow Down To The Exit Sign' is more Charles Manson than Sergeant Pepper - the sound of events spiralling out of control. "Well, when we were recording the album in New York, it was a pretty intense trip. We went through every level of emotion - new city, new people. Sometimes, you'd be having the best time of your life, other times, you'd get really homesick. When you're out partying, these things are highlighted a lot more - the ups and the downs. There's definitely a feeling on there that if you don't learn from it, then you're in trouble."

So is it safe to say that this a darker, moodier album than any you've produced before? "A lot of the darkness was brought to the album by the other lyricists," he points out. "But they'll get over it - everything's going to be alright! I don't go into it too deeply. I'm a very happy individual, I couldn't be happier, but when I make an album I try and get across every single mood - dark, deep, beautiful, sad. . . Just the normal things

that everyone experiences in life. If anyone tells me that they don't experience all these different moods, and they're just constantly happy, 24 hours a day, well then, good luck to them, but I think it's very rare in this day and age."

"Life is not an easy ride, and everyone has their ups and everyone has their downs," he says, in full flow now. "Everyone at some point experiences some kind of loss. I mean, I lost my mother about two tracks into 'Let's Get Killed', yet that's a very optimistic record, even though I was just completely gutted. She was my best friend, she was my mother, she was someone I could talk to and supported me in whatever I wanted to do. I'll never forget her, I want to talk to her every day. But, you know, 'Let's Get Killed' was a dark album in some respects because of the dialogue, and whatever you bring to the table as a listener, but it was almost like I was rebelling against that. I wanted to be positive, because I do feel she's still with me."

So you're saying that, conversely, this album is a dark album made by a happy man?

He considers, lighting up another cigarette. 'First and foremost, 'Bow Down To The Exit Sign' is an album. And even though all these lyricists brought something to the table that had a dark edge to it, it's a movie, it's fantasy. I want whoever is going to listen to this album to take what they want from it, but don't take it all too deeply. It's music - it's there to express all different kinds of emotion."

Wherever his generic experimentation may lead him, this is the constant thread that weaves through Holmes' work. There's always that sense of emotional exploration; a sense of storytelling that paints a picture as effectively as any photograph or painting. Whether that's sufficient to elevate him from the position of producer into that of (whisper it) an artist is for you to decide. It certainly seems a natural aspiration for David.

"I think most artists, whether they make movies, or make songs, or make paintings, are very emotional people," he concludes. "They're people who don't just do the same thing over and over and over again. If you are a true artist you're not thinking about units, you're not thinking about how much money you're going to make. You're portraying what's true to you, from your heart and soul." (M)

"I went to New York in search of a poet.

I found him on a web site, and went to see him. Carl got up and gave this performance that was like nothing else I've ever seen in my life – it really did blow my mind. His heart was drenched in soul! Carl is a one-off; he writes novels, he plays in a band, he writes poems. He's going to be huge."

BOBBY GILLESPIE

"I'd done some production work on the Scream album, and Bob and Innes came over for the weekend. We hung

out, and had a really great laugh. We had this great bassline - really PiL, Jah Wobble - and they took it away and made 'Sick City'.

MARTINA

"I was looking to get a female lead to get a bit of balance. Martina was number one on our wish list. She was having a break from the Tricky stuff to do a solo album, so we recorded this track in Belfast and sent it to her. She got a really strong vibe about it, and

wanted to get involved."

SEAN GULLETTE

"The guy who owns the studio we used in New York actually produced the film Pi. He got me over to the Sundance festival to DJ, and I met Sean there. He's a really great bloke, really articulate and open-minded, and he appreciates art on all different levels. It was weird having him in my living room, acting stuff out with no camera, but we just had a few beers, sat back and had fun."



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TYRANT ARE the success story of 2000. Raw, dark and uncompromising, Lee Burridge and Craig Richards offer a unique take on the tech-house template. Their current 'Tyrant' album is a deep mix of grinding electro breaks and arse-quaking sub-bass.

Alongside the globe-trotting institution known as Sasha they're the closest Britain can claim to its own Danny Tenaglia, and with epochal residencies at Fabric and The Bomb in the bag and Ibiza in their sights, it doesn't look like there'll be any let up.

Born and raised in Bournemouth, Lee and Craig actually met in a seedy Hong Kong bar called Joe Bananas. Lee was resident DJ while Craig was a visiting jock with glam-housers Malibu Stacey. Disillusioned by the narrow-minded souls around

them, Lee returned to England in 1997 to launch Tyrant, rapidly earning plaudits for their epic, eclectic back-to-back antics.

Muzik caught up with Lee and Craig during a recent break in Miami Beach. Wandering into the district's back streets, we found a striking alternative to the hustle and bustle of the city. A Golden Girls paradise where throngs of pensioners play poker and watch the world fly by. They may not have heard about house music, but drawn by the sight of two Englishmen abroad, they take to Lee and Craig immediately. "Miami is like an American version of Eastbourne," reckons Craig. "To be honest, I have more of an affinity with these people than the ones I met at the Winter Music Conference."

LEE: "I feel really fortunate and excited that I'm being accepted musically. It's all about timing. That said, this is a very fickle industry and it could all collapse tomorrow!"

CRAIG: "I'm on top of the world. In my opinion music has never been better and Fabric has given me so much confidence. It hasn't exactly been easy making it this far. I'm hardly the newest kid on the block, if you know what I mean!"

MUZIK: How was Miami?

LEE: 'I loved the beach but I didn't like the conference – far too many English people. The massive influx led to a lot of attitude from bouncers. It was a really intense time – too many people and not enough clubs."

MUZIK: You're both DJ veterans. When was your first spinning experience?

LEE: "Somewhere towards the end of school, when I realised my friends weren't really my friends. I was bored, so I started playing records in the back of my dad's pub."

CRAIG: "I was 16. It just seemed like the right thing to do. I had loads of records and wanted to play them in an attempt to sleep with girls. This was pre-DJ culture. No one had any opinions about DJing, it was a job for someone with lot of music. So I became a DJ."

MUZIK: You met in Hong Kong. How did that come about?


LEE: "When I lived in Dorset, the idea of moving to London was quite intimidating, whereas the thought of DJing in Hong Kong and being given somewhere to live was a little easier. I was offered a job spinning in a bar and took the easy option – I was just as lazy then as I am nowl Loads of people had bailed out of England to earn money, but they'd all go out raving after work. They were 6,000 miles from home and could do whatever they wanted. The police were laughable and Hong Kong had a 24-hour party atmosphere."

CRAIG: "What was that expression? 'Failed In London, Try Hong Kong'? F.I.L.T.H – they were all called filth."

LEE [nodding]: "It was fairly filthy. When I arrived, there weren't really any dance parties happening, so we started doing them. At the time, ecstasy was legal. It was classed as a poison, not a drug, so everyone had easy access to pills. People would finish work between six in the evening and six in the morning, creating a constant influx of fresh people into the different bars. On one side of the road, you had suits with gold cards drinking Long Island iced teas; on the other side there were horrible clubs full of drugs and prostitutes, with people refusing to go home at three in the afternoon. Nothing was taboo."

MUZIK: Were you ever party to much taboobreaking yourselves? When in Rome...
LEE: "Of course. There was one incident in 1995 involving me mixing, a lady crouched in the DJ booth and an ice cube. Despite everything, I managed to keep the mix in! It's very difficult trying to fend off people's requests when you're trying to have an orgasm."

MUZIK: What was your musical style? LEE: "I'd play breakbeat with house, trance and techno. I've always been into a mixture of styles." CRAIG: "We've always played breakbeat and



different types of house. We're sometimes described as 'deep', but the word has been bandied about so much that everyone's wondering what it means. Things become deeper and harder and slower or quicker. That's just evolution."

MUZIK: Tell us about your relationship with Sasha. LEE: "Craig had known him for years, through parties like Chuff Chuff. He obviously loves music – he once DJed with me to about 11 people! We went out for dinner the next day and I signed him up for the team."

MUZIK: What's the secret of Tyrant's success? CRAIG: "We're as close as you can be. We work together and we're friends. Our playing together came about because we were both booked to DJ but couldn't fit our individual sets into the available time. So we decided to share it. If you take away the ego aspect of a back-to-back set, you stop having a battle. It's not about my record being better than his. It's about the mix between styles. And two little bald blokes behind the decks instead of one!

MUZIK: Describe your sound in five words. LEE AND CRAIG: "Purity. Honesty. Humility. Ecstasy. . ." LEE [laughing]: "Bribery!"

MUZIK: What do you think of the recent 'techno' explosion?

LÉE: "No one's got anything against people being successful, but our premier league friends are too worried about looking cool. People have to own up to what they play. Cari Lekebusch plays techno, not Seb Fontainel Using buzz phrases like 'deep' and 'techno-infused' is incredibly misleading. If DJs say they're playing 'deep' now, it's usually bullshit. A year ago they were probably playing trance."

MUZIK: How would you define trance? CRAIG: "Over-dramatic, white-boy music with too many chord changes and too much going on. There's no soul in it. That's why everyone's now running from that particular sinking ship."

LEE: "Accessible and popular. Makes me think of Seb Fontaine and Paul Oakenfold."

MUZIK: Do you think Oakenfold is flying the flag for us all in America?

LEE: "I don't think he is. That remark is just another typically grand Oakenfold statement." CRAIG: "It's bullshit. Oakenfold isn't flying the flag. If anyone is, it's Sasha and John Digweed. It's terribly British to go around putting flags in things – we've been doing it for centuries!"

MUZIK: Do you think DJs are paid too much? CRAIG: "I'm not, of course, but some of them definitely are paid silly money. The bottom line is whether the queue you put around the block is worth what you're paid."

MUZIK: Do you care about the dosh? CRAIG: "That's the whole fuck-up about it. DJs are jumping genres to make more money. If you buy and play the records you love, then you're winning. And at the moment, we're winning, but I'm not buying records for other people." LEE: "Honesty is the way forward. If you play at Area in Watford, you're not playing techno, are you? Too many DJs are masquerading." CRAIG: "You know all those monkeys won't risk being taken off. We will. The difference is, we're playing music; they're just crowd pleasers. You can't throw the word techno around. Jeff Mills and Richie Hawtin playing to 150 people on a Monday night in Detroit - that's techno. Jan Driver and Timo Maas are not techno. It's the difference between Glenn Miller and Miles Davis."

MUZIK: When you were younger, did you ever think you'd be doing this?

LEE: "When I was younger, I didn't really think at all. There was no grand plan."

CRAIG: "There still isn't. I honestly believe there are certain people who embrace adult life early on and there are other people who continue to push back the whole responsibility thing. We do that, but not actively so. There are many routes you can take to avoid wearing the white shirt and tie. Do as little for as much money as possible. . . that's the dream, isn't it?"






Bow Down To The Exit Sign (Go Beat)

The cheeky Belfast boy demonstrates with panache that he's as dark as he wants to be

A WEDNESDAY evening, roughly two months ago, Time, joy of joys, for another drivel-heavy episode of the Jo Whiley Show. Here's guest muppet Billie Piper, smiling brightly, admiring the glossy videos and giving the thumbs up to Whitney, Britney, Shitney, et al. Although 'Acperience 1' was a techno-trance classic and Ramon Zenker & Oliver Bondzio made a mint reproducing it on endless remixes, both this and their previous, underrated

'Homebase' album have been treading new waters.

FAR REMOVED from the jazz-inflected drum & bass of his earlier records, David Harrow's fourth abum as James Hardway comes from a Havana-good-time conversion to the Cuban party vibe. Together with Mezcla bandleader Pablo Menedez, he melds traditional Cuban sounds – marimbas, flutes, soaring homs and supercharged percussion – with a dub sensibility, using the skills of legendary DJs Tirrity and Lisa Danger. Such an ambitious blend could fall horribly flat, but Harrow manages to pull all the strings into a joyous, upiffing celebration of multi-culturalism.

If anything, the Hill's stoner rhymes sound even better in their native longue, giving previously over-exposed numbers a new lease of life, making you wonder why they didn't try this before. The smoke-filled vistas of "Yo Quiero Fumar" and "No Entiernes La Onda' sound so alien yet naggingly familiar, it's enough to send you "Loco En El Coco".

IT'S been a good year from Tresor so far, with complations from Daniel Bell and Thomas Schumacher, and albums from Pacou, Ternece Dixon, and now O'Connor and Sutton. As you'd expect, this longplayer is pretty much a Hell-forleather, Dave Clarke-style peak time techno hard-hitter. And when the beats are as taut and enervating as they are here, that's no bad thing. Ambent interfudes such as 'Paralyzing' and 'Under Skin' prevent nosebleed overload tedium, but otherwise this is pure adrenaline all the way. Expect to hear it rockin' an underground dancefloor near you soon.





and only a couple of weak tracks. Any cop then? There's much to recommend here, and as the Space Travellers helpfully point out, "fuck the ravers — this is for the real motherfuckers". (WA)



STREET ANGELS – A BENEFIT ALBUM FOR THE STREET CHILDREN OF BRAZIL (Mr Bongo)

What's it all about? The Mr Bongo label gets together with the hottest Brazilian and Latino jazz-influenced artists around to produce this benefit album. What's on it? From the laid back 'Jazz Café' sound of 'Porangaba' by Jose Carlos Ramos to a more upbeat disco-Latino fusion in Clave de Soul and Black Ro's 'Think About The Children', topped off with the transatlante' Where Are We Gonna Go' from Bille Godfrey Featuring Mr Hermano. Any cop then? Amust this

summer for any cultured Muziklover who appreciates Latin beats and jazzy grooves. (FK)

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HOUSE @ SLIP'N'SLIDE.COM (Slip'n'Slide)

What's it all about? One of the UK's finest purist house and garage labels with some new mixes and unreleased cuts. What's on it? Lots of odes to the power of the screaming diva vocal. Witness the histrionics of Michelle Weeks, gasp at the tonsil-stretches of MAS Collective, and wonder how Latanza Waters manages to preserve the family crystal. The real treats are Robbie Rivera on the storming, jazz-blastin' disco tip and the well-named Anthem Vocal Mix of Lenny Fontana's 'Come & Go With Me'.

Any cop then? Concentrates more on the true-to-roots inner garage circle than usual, but if that means no Madison Avenue, that's no bad thing. (CB)

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IN THE BAG (DP Recordings)

What's it all about? Renowned hard house stamp DP makes its debut in the compilation market with a collection of recent dancefloor destroyers, mixed by Superfast Oz from Brighton bombs, OD404.

What's on it? Some of the best hard house productions of recent times, from the fikes of Mark NRG, Friction Burns, Cunaro & Dean, Karim and Madame Friction. Not to mention six stunning remixes from OD404 themselves, including their awesome version of 'Hocked', Any cop then? Opening with the monstrous, full-threttle 'Bad Motherfucker', this relentlessly pounding mix piledrives your senses from start to finish. And the mixing is as good as the choice of tunes. (MIKO)

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DISCO JUICE (Counterpoint)

What's It All About? Infamous trainspotter Nick The Record delves into the back catalogue of Hartem's P&P label for some serious disco pressure.

What's On It? A shedload of superb Patrick Adams productions, basically, including Chain Reaction's ruffnecked 'Dance Freak', Cloud One's storming title cut, Paper Doll's subterranean 'Get Down Boy' and Licky's roots 'n' roller, 'African Rock'.

Any Cop Then? If disco does it to ya—and it darn well should when it rocks like P&P did—you'll be wanting to spill some 'Disco Juice' all over your face, and then some. (CG)

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DAVE PEARCE PRESENTS... 3 (Manifesto)

What's it all about? The baby-faced man in the baseball cap picks out today's dance anthems and yesterday's glory moments on two CDs. What's on it? Of the new stuff,

what sonit? Or the new sturt, you may, if you are of a species that lives on oxygen, just have heard of Chicane's 'Don't Give Up', Raiph Fridge's 'Angel' and Lock 'N' Loed's 'Blow Ya Mind' of late, while the classics include Felix's 'Don't You Want Me', N-Joi's ravetastic 'Anthem' and the ever-bouncing 'Beachbali' by Nalin & Kane.

Any cop then? So he's about as dangerous as carpet fluff, but when it comes to 40 large ones, Pearce's latest collection pulls no punches. (CB)

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HOME - THE ALBUM (INCredible)

What's it all about? London's über-club Home ropes in the Friday night resident Steve Lawler to show the world that there's more to Leicester Square than the Hippodrome and dodgy street performers.

What's on it? There's two CDs, one representing the softer-edged, house end of the Home spectrum, while the other shows Home at its hardest with a selection of progressive sounds. Highlights include Lawler's own 'Rising'. Simon's 'Free At Last' and the mighty Sasha rework of the Chems' 'Out Of Control'.

Any cop then? Lawler proves Home's critics so, so wrong with his superby blended mix, that makes one want to leave home

and go to, er, Home. (BM)



PEOPLE... MAKE THE WORLD GO ROUND (People)

What's it all about? Three years of highlights from the People label, demonstrating that there can be life after filter disco for house music.

What's on it? Well appointed deepness spread thickly across two CDs, including the Carl Craig-like 'Je Me Souviens' by Electric Soul (aka Phil Asher), mawenck chiming and twanging on lan O'Brien's 'The Funky Apocalypse' and a whole slew of impressively striking cuts from ascendant producer IG Culture.

Any cop then? House music which pays its dues to past masters, but never fears looking ahead. Stylish, inventive, and close to unmissable. (AC)

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DAWN OF ELECTRONICA (Uncut)

What's it all about? From a time when young men were glad to be fey, the seeds of electronic dance were sown. Sort of.
Who's on it? High grade
Teutonic disco (Giorgio Moroder), poor mixes of classic tracks
(Cabaret Voltaire's 'Yashar', Soft Cell's 'Memorabilia'), dated clunking (Yello, Art Of Noise) proto-techno classics (DAF, Fad Gadget), pomp nonsense
(Ultravox, A Flock Of Seaguills) and very bad Bowie impressions (everybody else).

Any cop then? Does what it says on the tin, but frankly some of the choices are a bit peculiar. Not definitive, then, but still worth having, and demonstrates that electronic music didn't start with Derrick May. (NG)


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

A9 (Automatic/Essential)

THE South American king of eclectic hard house finally receives the major label thumbs-up for his rather-more-caned-than-we-anticipated 'A9'. As well as the original's rattling drum rolls and pre-Lock 'N' Load's mplicity there's a chunky 'Mobile Bitch Mix' from Floorplay and a gurners' heaven off beat batterer from DBSK. It's all in the descending minor key synth riff.

Porcelain (Mute)

AS Muzik cover star Moby's album reaches the apex of its popularity. Mute quite rightly cash in with a set of three 12-inches. On the second, Futureshock contribute a rolling dub and Force Mass Motion attempt some sub-Peace Division moves, and on the third Torsten Stenzel turns it all into affable trance-pop.

TRIPLE pack from the man who, last time round, was subject to a fair degree of suspicion that he didn't actually create his own tunes. This drastic step away from his previous electro-big beat output adds to the confusion — a housey P-Funk song belted out by the high-pitched Austin Cole. Roger Sanchez delivers two adequate S-Man takes, Le Primp strip down to component parts, and there's a plethora of other, workmanike re-rubs.

Artful Dodger: "The vocals leave a lot to be desired. Not sure about Sanchez – he's very hit and miss and this is another miss. Punk-Roc's going to need his own aisle at HMV to cope with all these mixes – presumably they're just hoping someone will pick up on one of them."

THE TT-COLLECTIVE Burnin' (Primal)

SIMPLE DJ fare from the two T's of the title - Terry Francis and Tony Hewitt. No surprises for anyone who's familiar with Wiggie or Surreal, just a plan ming tool for the tech-house community to hold the floor while they have a crafty tag.

Artful Dodger: "Serves a purpose, though quite what purpose I'm not sure. It's all over in the first minute then they just decide to loop it for the following 10. Perhaps they had to go and feed their dog or something. It's completely nulled my brain."

AMBER Sexual (Substance)

DEEP Dish have presumably been brought in by the latest Ministry Of Sound sub-label to repeat the magic they worked on Gabrielle's 'Rise' (and any number of other records for that matter) but their form is, on this occasion, iffy rather than exquisite. Alternatively, the 'Plasma Remix' brings out the herpes-contagious sung chord structure. Either loads of fun or a load of shit—we can't figure it...

...

Artful Dodger: "For me, Deep Dish doesn't get any better than their mix of DJ Rap's 'Good To Be Alive'. This is in a similar vein but lacks all the essential elements – they seem to have got stuck in a rut. As for the 'Plasma Remix', I don't understand how such a thing made it onto vinyl."

GAETANO PARISIO Bendigo Terminal 1 (Conform)

AH, we're in true techno territory here. When tracks are called '1', '2', '3' and '4', it's a fair bet the stuff in the grooves ain't gonna be Miamil disco frolics. No, Instead this is an Italian mate of Adam Beyer's Scandinavian mafia and the four pieces on

offer are thudding, minimal hard-phunk for the likes of Dave Clarke and Billy Nasty.

Artful Dodger: "We went to see Dave Angel at the Ministry a couple of months ago and it was my first proper outing into techno – really enjoyed it. It's one of those things, though, where if you're not familiar with it, it drives you mad after half an hour. This is full of energy and loads of effort has gone into it – cool."

THE INVADERZ Resonance EP (Invaderz)

AN average slice of drum & bass which makes its point without battering your head in. The best track is 'Sustain'/Resonance' which mangles all softs of bleepy effects in with snippets of a woman breathing and yelping, possibly in the throes of something other than gardening.

Artful Dodger: "like drum & bass but this

is weak. It's just a drum beat with samples cut up from a porn film or something. Lacks imagination and creativity."

OLMECHEADS Magic Man (Neo)

THIS is the O-Heads' last offering as Andy Perring and the excellently named West Coggle have now gone their separate ways. It's acid madness time in their corner of the party allthough they never forget that da laydeez like a little melody too. Basically they're dance music professionals, menwho-can remixers, and this works fine on that level. Alaska on the remix.

Artful Dodger: "My initial reaction was that it reminded me very much of driving past roadworks on the M25, pneumatic drills, 303 in excelsis. Builds well to the breakdown but then doesn't kick in and grabyou. It's energetic but doesn't soar."

Higher (Azuli)

THIS couldn't shout "PARTYI" any louder if its creators, David Morales and Albert Cabrerra, strapped on plastic breasts and rushed naked around your local niteclub juggling hamsters. An enormous funk beat and diva vocal combine with a stuttering breakdown to mash up all comers. Two white label double packs, no clues as to who the remixers are yet...

OLIMOS

The Night (Goes On) (Undiscovered)

A SLOW builder from Italy which borrows from Roach Motel's old JBO number but creates its own vibe along the way. The Barry White-esque talking vocal walks you through an evening on the beach with bongos a-go-go and Hispanic guitar dripping from the palm trees. Kevin Yost rumbles away on the flip taking the gultar to extended depths. Big, big summer tune.

Artful Dodger: "Very Balearic, and I don't mean that in a Saturday night in Ibiza Town kind of way, I mean the true feeling. The guy who's written this has obviously sat down and thought long and hard about what he's doing. The chorus and ad-libs are fantastic - a very deserving record. As for the Yost mix, he's phenomenal, but he still can't quite match the beauty of the original."

THE BOTELLA PROJECT Sensual Confessions EP (Subliminal)

SUBLIMINAL picked up this from one of the leading lights of Luxembourg's prestigious dance scene. This isn't one of their essential cuts though, and treads disco water rather than thrashing the opposition.

Artful Dodger: "I'm a great Subliminal lover but this doesn't have the hooks or hit potential of a Jose Nunez number. I don't think they want a hit every time, though, as it might make them look a bit cheesy.

ZICKY

She Wanna (Nukleuz)

LATEST cut from the Nukleuz production line. Zicky may be some Johnny-comelately MC on the Rimini rave scene, but that doesn't matter too much because these boys rock. The 'Giullare Mix' is a generic hard trancer and the 'Jocker Mix' comes on like Picotto's industrial side but, boy, does this shit work where it counts.

Artful Dodger: "I don't understand records like this because where we're from music comes from the heart, it's got to have soul in it. This is just loads of samples thrown together, some mad noises and a token vocal that means nothing."

MEPHISTO ODYSSEY The Lift (Remixes) (Primal Trax)

CALIFORNIAN funking - there's even a track called 'Califunkya'. Doc Martin is on hand to tear the tune to pieces and turn it into a slow, throbbing dose of hypnosis. Elsewhere on the double pack 'Orpheos' Superfly Funk Mix' hauls out the wah-wah guitars and gets happy, though 'Orpheos' Shaky Mix' is unfortunately just that.

Artful Dodger: "Too laid back - just loop the backing track and put a vocal over it. No, I'm not feeling this, it's not going anywhere."

FUSION GROOVE ORCHESTRA If Only I Could (Curious)

YES, it is that old Sydney Youngblood song, but given a soulful house reconstruction bathed in jazz guitar and featuring the swooping vocal talents of one Steve Lucas at its core. There's also a piano-laden 'Bloated's Chuga Dub', the scat-singing 'FGO's Guitar Dub' and an acapella.

Artful Dodger: "Avery inoffensive reworking of an Eighties classic. You never know whether records like this will chart, because they've been there once so who

knows. Lovely live bass guitar, a very happy track, full of energy."

FEATURE CAST Composing Blind EP (Catskills)

A CHOPPED up scratch 'n' paste bundle of b-boy fun from a 21 year-old Southampton DJ. The tracks on board range from the jolly, Hammond-led 'Recipe For The Perfect Afro' to the grand sweep and slow beats of the string-swept, film-score-like title track.

Artful Dodger: "Everything sounds like De La Soul today for some reason, you just need O-Tip [He was in A Tribe Called Quest -Pedantry Ed] to come in. A wicked little EPwhich doesn't fit any bill, though I'm sure Gilles Peterson would slip it in somewhere. It's good this lot are making music that matters to them.

WEIRD SCIENCE Feel The Need (NuLife)

MONSTROUSLY large, tub-thumping disco house with vast gospel vocals. The man behind it, Warren Clarke, recently gave us Onephatdeeva's 'In And Out Of My Life', which gives you an idea of what to expect. Mixes come from The Lab Rats and Joey Negro but the whole thing's larger than life.

Artful Dodger: "Avery nice disco-meetsjazz affair. You can see why he's called Dave 'Disco' Lee, can't you? Very hooky, it's got the legs to be a hit... maybe."

KING KOOBA

NuFoundFunk/Sans Filter (Second Skin)

LIMITED edition so keep your eyes peeled if you're a fan of the rather wonderful, though underrated, Second Skin. As usual with this label, what you get is leftfield beats informed by drum & bass and all manner of wackiness. Tastily odd freak-funk.

Artful Dodger: "The live drums are wicked. It's all done really well but, in the nicest possible way, it's electronic supermarket funk and doesn't really go anywhere."

LOVE TKO

Tribe Of Love (Fudge/Chocolate Boy)

A SONG with a bit of history receives a resurrection with additional Ashley Beedle mixes. Love TKO originally released this, with Loretta Heywood on vocals, in 1989. Now she's re-recorded it as a slow jazzy live band number. Beedle doesn't mess too much with a good thing.

Artful Dodger: "The vocal's phenomenalto die for. Ashley Beedle brings a bit more energy to the whole affair but I don't think it's needed. Certainly not a club track, more a piece of music to put on in your car or a chill outroom - awesome."

KERBCRAWLER 16/Sidewalk Slam (Spot On)

OLD Uncle Seb's label drops two sides of bouncing bumptiousness that make no mark on the brain whatsoever but will certainly affect those whose motor neurone functions are under the influence. One side starts off curiously like an '88 acid tune but soon heads off to 21st century hands-inthe-air-ville.

Artful Dodger: "If Seb Fontaine was ever caught kerb-crawling they should lock him up, make him listen to this for 10 years, and then tell us why he released it. That's all I have to say on the matter.

JAMELIA Call Me (Parlophone)


CHART r&b's latest female face appears in two floor-friendly styles. Least interesting are the two Messy Boys mixes which go for straightforward filter-disco antics and don't push anywhere in particular, while Capital T captivates mildly with three two-step outings of which the dubby 'Club Mix' is most entertaining.

Artful Dodger: "The 'Club Mix' is very good with a lovely little piano riff, definitely the side of UK garage we're more into. So many people try and over-complicate their music when things like this prove it's all about keeping its imple - the hardest thing to do. The Messy Boys, on the other hand, are really quite lame."

SKOL Bon Marche (Split Screen)

What sort of name is Skol for an artist? Anyone for DUs Hofmeister, Harp, or even Oranjeboom? That aside, 'Bon Marche' is a romping, unequivocal hard house smasher which plays to the kids and succeeds despite its rough 'n' ready makeup. You may not like it but it'll be stomping all over your back yard before you can say Billy 'Daniel' Bunter.

Artful Dodger: "I've got the record where this riff comes from, an old '91 hardcore tune. This is happy hardcore gone round full circle, slowed down. Tused to DJ hard house clubs and this would have been right up my street. You could see Tripoli Trax signing it - it's definitely got something to it."


THE ALOOF

GENE FARRIS

The Spirit (Farris Wheel) Up steps the man called Sneak who twists, fucks with, and generally gives a right hander to a big underground track from Gene's 1999 EP. Relentless grooves looped in that old school Chicago style - trackheads' delight. (TF)

PARANOID JACK Soldiers Of The Underground/ Fly/ III Street Blues (Stickman) Speaking of trackhead shit, this really is old school east coast jump up. This is jacking gear in its most minimal form, pure grooves - essential pill music. (TF)

Doin' It (white label) If you must sample, do it properly, like these cats out of Germany. SOVEREIGN

There You Go (All Good) Without beating round the bush, I LOVE THIS. Not sure if it's one of 'them remixes (if you get my meaning), but what I do know is that it rocks EVERY crowd, every club, at least once a night. Trainspotters among you will recognise the vocal, but the beats are new, and a perfect foil for the sassy song. But for Battle', my tune of the month, (8)

EN-CORE FEATURING STEVEN EMMANUEL AND ESKA

Coochy-Koo (Ice Cream) Being a lover of quirky vocals (Björk, Macy Gray etc), this is right up my street! The abstract, futuristic production and Eska's voice give this track a vibe that would fit on the soundtrack for The Matrix, were it not full of heavy metal. DJ Johnny J., now flying the X-Men flag, has proved that there is life after Wookie. turning in an absolute blinder of a debut mix. For all of you with bad memories, this is the team that gave us 'What You Do For Me'. (8)

MC GODSGIFT MC Tribute (United Grooves)
Rhythm Division Records in East London. give a massive 'bocyakasha' namecheck to all the big MCs (except Ranking) representing the circuit. This serves as an overdue reminder that the MCs have developed their craft to become our vocalists. Nothing over-complicated on the production, but sometimes less is more, leaving the main feature as Godsgift giving examples of all the MCs' catchphrases. Very cleverly done, it would have got 5, but it left out Dreem Teem's MC Ranking. (8)

UNION JACK Will Survive (Silva Quest)

In a great month for UK garage music comes a suitably firing rendition from Johnny Blaze. Out of the same stable as The Wide Boys, Union Jack are building a

reputation for consistent quality. Not using all of the original vocal, Mr Blaze has the clubs in mind with a sharp set of snare drums, and a round bassline to rock Ali G's Renault 5 on Staines High Street. Available on white label at the mo, with full commercial release due any time soon, (8)

DREEM TEAM Beautiful (Groove Control) Getting loads of plays on Sunday morning - and not because we did it, but because it is one of our most requested tracks, honest. Originally remixed by Tuff Jam in '97, and a favourite of mine, the Y2K flava has been delivered semi 4/4 style, uptempo, with a happy vibe. One for the summer. (8)

MOCA

Higher (Definity/Azuli) Produced by David Morales and Albert Cabrera, this is the best work that Morales has done in a long while. Head straight to the 'Eve Of Souls Mix', which is simply divine. Reminiscent of previous Red Zone mixes, it really does take you on, dare I say, a 'journey'. Deep pads and a pounding bassline are gloriously layered with a very sultry, female vocal that is essential! (8H)

COLOURFUL KARMA FEATURING TERRA DIVA For The Music (Peppermint Jam, Germany) Licensed from Stephan Madrax's Boombastic label, this now features some very tasteful mixes by Sounds Of Life, who give the candy-coated female vocal a distinct jazz slant and a Steely Dan, 'Peg'-style bassline. ATFC supplies some darker, Tori Amos-type mixes which also rock. Check it! (SH)

MOJOLATORS Drifting (Moody, USA)
This label, out of Chicago, has been churning out some top quality gear of late and this is no exception. Produced by Justin Nichols and Drew Robustell, this is a slightly dark and jazzy affair that has been rocking many a floor, and is a very promising sign of things to come from this duo. (SH)

AWA BAND Timba (Defected) Released a few years ago and produced by Full Intention, who have now totally reworked it for Defected, making this Latin vocal track ideal for the coming summer in Ibiza. Very Afro Medusa/ Negro Khan with class mixes by Germany's Tiefschwarz and Switzerland's up and coming Dimitri & Tom. (SH)

JAZZ 'N' GROOVE Midnight Sky (Soulfuric, US) Brian Tappert and Marc Pomeroy take a heavy dose of an Al Jarreau classic to make this club stomper. You know summer's here when everyone's cutting their latest Latin track, but this is one of the better ones, and was debuted by Louie Vega in Mam: at the WMC Magic Sessions, Which is nice. (SH)

CLEPTOMANIACS

Time Out For Love (Fluential) Brian Tappert and John 'Julius' Knight team up with Marc Pomeroy to produce this semi-vocal monster featuring Donna Allen for Defected's new Fluential imprint. A snippet taken from the Salsoul Orchestra classic completely re-worked and pumped up for the dancefloor. (SH)

MICHELLE WEEKS Follow Your Dreams (Z) Sounds Of Life on the remix tip again, this time on a record that's popular with the sculful garage fraternity. The German production duo maintain the

original groove on their 'Vocal Mix' but the 'Fusion Dub' is better, and should keep the Latin heads happy. (SH)



So Who The Hell Is. . . Zed Bias?

So who's this then, just another UK garage producer? Actually, no. From first fiddling around in the studio making "drum & bass, and very jazzy, rare groovin' trip hop," Zed (Dave to his mum) was persuaded by some mates in his native Northampton to try something different. "My coming into two-step was through DJ Principle and MC Juiceman dragging me into the studio saying 'let's make one of these tracks'," he chuckles.

So why should we be interested? In a word, 'Neighbourhood'. The

forthcoming single on Locked On looks set to be one of the biggest tracks of the summer ironic, considering it started life as a dub plate Zed made for his DJ mate Glenn Woods, "It was amazing," he says, "When Glenn played it, it was getting a better reaction than tracks by the biggest name producers.

Sounds good. Where can we get some more Zed Bias action? Well, an early Zed Bias track, 'Thinkin' About You', has been rejigged for release later in 2000, and he's been remixing everyone from Tuff Jam to Whitney Houston. The usually studio-bound chap has also been spreading the word through DJing. Following recent sets in Miami and Germany, he has a gig set for New York on July 4th. "I'm interested in taking it to a wider audience," he explains.

So, where does he see this UK garage thing headed?

There's been a few of us outside London who have been pushing the boundaries a bit," he enthuses. "It's definitely not just a London thing any more.

FREDI KRUGA Feel Our Flow (Kai/Wu-Tang International) Kai and Wu-Tang launch their UK collaboration with the slightly-ragga Fredi Kruga on a skippy, dancehall beat. The album apparently features Meth and GFK, but for now Kruga makes do with someone called Creamo. It's alright, but doesn't yet suggest any breakthrough for hip hop from over here, over there. . .

UGLY DUCKLING I Did It Like This (Bad Magic) More personable, good-natured, beautifully paced and slightly inconsequential hip hop from the LA trio. They use their samples really nicely (even if they're not all of the freshest mode) and rhyme in a beguiling, faux-lazy way, but what is this really saying? They've been into hip hop for ages and love it? Gold star, then, but no prize.

TASKFORCE Voice Of The Great Outdoors (Lowlife) Despite keeping the battling elements in place, this six-tracker shows Taskforce taking real risks in their attempts to further expand what they can do. 'Butterfly Concerto' is like two bad bwoy William Blakes tripping at a Hampstead Heath bug ball. A remarkable achievement, and it also gets in a rare

bigging up of the faerie massive.

MASS HYSTERIA Exclusive (Wild Onion, USA) More of the Chi-Town underground sound. Mass Hysteria mix up funky, azzy, fairly mellow beats with a syllabilistic attack that constantly takes their flow a line further than you're expecting. "I Get A Rush" is more off-centre and is probably the pick of an excellent bunch.

PROCRYPTIX Break In A 950's Shadow

(Buff) Production veteran Sparkli and lyricist Naba are joined by the likes of the En4cers and Ty for an EP of hard beats, abstract gultar licks and floor-shaking bass. Naba hits the freestyle trail to suitably unsettling effect and the whole record generates a mood of dislocation and experiment. Excellent,

OBSERVATORY SWIVEL It's All There In Black And White (Observatory Swivel) This Californian/Aberdonian collective mix up odd (and oddly effective) sounds with a fairly harsh lyrical attack. It's sparse, simple and actually very good. The cover may be enough to make you think twice but it's definitely worth checking.

THE 2AMIGOS

Versus The Mighty Dust Mites (Hombre) Jamie Hombre (label boss and Binary

Brov) and Jay LeSurgeon (Numskullz) offer a 10-inch of smooth instrumentals are both tasteful and tasty. Not rucking up too many carpets, but keeping it coming like you know they should.

MIXMASTER MIKE Eye Of The Cyklops

(Asphodel, USA) Mike Shwartz returns with more wiggerydiggery, this time cutting back on the straight-up cuts in favour of a frugging, sonically-challenging journey into sound. Anyone who thought Tommy Lee might have turned his head can rest assured that this is thoroughly and utterly nasty.

ANTI-POP CONSORTIUM What Am I? (75Ark)

The Consortium continue to promote their album with this, their team-up with sleeping giant Pharoahe Monch. If the original version is spiky techno-funk, Mikeone remakes it as distracted torch song. Both work beautifully, not least for the Galaxian sample. Sheer intelligence.

KARL HINDS Don Gramma (III Flava) Rather beautiful, UK take on Big L's 'Ebonics'. Karl Hinds draws on the legacy of Blak Twang while talking us through London slang over a squelchy little riff and bouncy beat. The whole thing is surprisingly fresh, not least because Hinds has an infectious enthusiasm about his rhyming.

....

MICRODISIACS

The Wise (Dominant 3rd) Manchester socialists who manage to combine their hip hop with a little social consciousness. Their flows are a bit predictable at times, but the beals are good (including a Mark B remix). Overall, it's a promising debut.

SAIAN SUPA CREW Raz De Maree (Wordplay) The French six piece do their mass lineflinging, chanting, singing thing as nicely as you'd like, with the added pleasure of a mix from man like Skitz. In the absence of any English it's the interchange between the vocalists that carries it. Très bien, innit?

THE 57TH DYNASTY Return To Boro 6 (Fast Fwd) The Dynasty continue to walk their own path, glorying in their borough origins and generally not giving a flying fuck about who knows it. New tune, 'Dirty South' shows how the lyricists are still improving (not surprising when you consider that their youngest member is still only 14). And the legend can only grow. .

VARIOUS Heavy Loungin' EP (Fat City) Double vinyl pack to promote Fat City's forthcoming hip hop comp and featuring The Aboriginals, Frankenstein and All Natural with Lone Catalyst. Goodnatured, jazz-sampling East Coast hip hop is the order of the day and it's great to have Aboriginals back.

Albums

THE A-TEAM

Who Framed The A-Team? (A-Team Kult LA Klassics, US) One of the great vocal combinations, Aceyalone and Abstract Rude, return as Acey The Faceman and A.B. Baracus for a short LP of new and classic material. As you'd expect, there's post-future soul, intelligence, jokes and seriousness. Plus an addition to the awesome 'Heavyweights' series of posse cuts (recorded in 1994 but still hotl).

LOST ISLAND Forbidden Ground (Son) First full-length artist album on the estimable Son comes from Nottingham's answer to Black

Sheep, Lost Island. Although Stylee Cee takes the opportunity to expand his palette, the music remains tight and funky throughout and this is definitely the greatest strength of the package. People should remember Lost Island when they're nattering on about their favourite UK producers. especially when they keep the rhyming in house, too, and make a genuine, heartfelt album like this.

GUNSHOT

International Rescue (Words Of Warning) Gunshot are back once again, 10 years on and still with a fanatical international following. International Rescue' justifies their continuing popularity, a skanking, sometimes epic collection of tunes of a quality which leaves some of our younger UK pretenders looking decidedly shoddy.

"TIGHT production and cut choruses - that's very much the trademark of what we do.


"We tried to bring through MCs who were unknown in most cases. We wanted it to fit together well and not sound like a compilation. It's an album you can sit down and listen to in its entirety, and it tells a bit of a story. It's very positive and it's an international record - not just American and not just English. I like 'We Got' for that reason, because it's got Ty and Red Cloud on it, an English and an American MC.

"I really like all the Soulson tracks - he's probably my favourite MC on the album. Ed who runs Scenario met him in a

record store in Philadelphia and Soulson was playing a tape of a tune he made called 'Clarity' which ended up on our album. On the original he'd used a break from the Freakniks, which Ed is a member of. We thought the tape was incredible and ended up doing it as one of the tracks, cos that rhyme's such a mammoth.

"He's a pretty crazy dude he's a house DJ! When he was over recording 'Amongst The Madness' last summer he came and DJed with us and he was playing house. It was mad!"

Notice Board (Eukahouse) Terry Francis finally manages to capture the power, intensity and sneer danceability of his best DJ sets on vinyl. This is the sound of tech-house's top boy coming of age as a producer. The arrangement, the bassline, the acid - it's all pure Francis. Essential. (DM)

DANO & MELANIE

Magnificent (Get Groovy) This starts off well enough with some of Dano's trademark beats, but totally goes off the boil half way through. Not all is lost, though because over on the flips de. Richard Summerhayes and Timmy S save the day with some snappy tech-house grooves. (DM)

TIN TIN OUT

Anybody's Guess (VC) There's something quite satisfying about getting a really good mix of some ghastly pop record. The work of Colin McBean. the 'Mr G Out Dub' takes two snippets of the original's vocal and twists them around ts deep, dark, dirty beats. (DIVI)

ERIC BORGO & DANI KONIG

Premiers EP (Good Life, France)

The last ccuple of Good Life singles have been blinding and although this isn't in quite the same league it won't do the label any harm. The title track features a looped up breakbeat, while 'Konetic' comes over all early Nineties with Todd Terry drums and fierce reverse strings. For best results, though, check the flip, 'Transmission'. It's well dark. (DIVI)

S.L.S. VERSUS SIMS

Loops & Dubs (Hardgroove) A remix EP with four Samuel L reworks of tracks taken from the first two Hardgroove releases. All the cuts are typical minimal Samuel L productions and as such they're bound to do well, but it would be nice to hear the Cycle man do something different. (DM)

BOLZ BOLZ

Establishment EP (World Electric, Germany) Sounding like a cross between Gary Numan and France's original daft punks Psyche, this is the record we wished I-F had made after 'Space Invaders. Sick, we'rd and ultra-catchy. (DM)

DAFE

Xeia EP (Tactical) The first release on a new label run by Stimulus' Pau Mac. Dancefloor heads will go for Mark Broom's tribal mix of 'Reverse', but those who are more horizontally inclined should check the electro rhythms, dub effects and trenchdeep bass on the title track. (DM)

VARIOUS ARTISTS

Product 4 (Product) Hard techno from deepest Kent with four artists doing a track each. Simon Stoke gets really banging but keeps it funky, Mark Broom drops a finely looped groove, Kevin McAnulty goes minimal and Simon K takes a 'eaf out of Ben Sims' book. Promising. (DM)

IGNITION TECHNICIAN

Worq It (Wedafuqawi) Not only do these guys have this month's stupidest name, but they've also come up with the world's most unpronounceable label name. Still, the music is bloody good and if you like big rolling beats and Sms-style loop grooves this definitely won't disappoint. (DM)

STEVE RACHMAD

Tir Na Nog (Rotation) 'Divide & Conquer' on the flipsice is the one to go for here. It weaves a highpitched sound through a rhythm similar to Rachmad's spine-tingling Greylock remix. It's not the classic we might have hoped for, but it's still a respectable follow up to one of this year's best records. (DM)

SWAYZAK Din (Swayzak)

Most techno artists fall in to one of two camps: the ones who concentrate on getting the maddest sounds and the ones who ust think about the beats. The realy good ones, like Swayzak, expend an

equal amount of effort on both. (DM)

YENNAH

Dydadic Shift (Freerange) More contemporary ambient techno-Yennah uses elements of house, trip hop and jazz to shape his blissful soundscapes. This package has an added bonus in the form of a fantastically funky Kirk Deglorgio remix. Techno for lazy summer days. (DIM)

SCORP

Crashed At The End (Scorp 3) Yes it's that man Rachmad in dancefloor mood yet again, with an absolute humdinger in the Beltram/Planetary Assault vein. With kick-arse tuff beats. anthemic chords and the funkiest riff in Christendom, the Black Scorpion unleashes another fiery sting. (JS)

DJZANK

Virans (U7) Hailing from Japan's Subvoice camp, Hideo plies two limited tracks of DJfriendly, looped percussion frenzy in a jump-up stylee. Of course, being Japanese, his concept is based not around nuclear physics but the mangaesque capers of the Thunderbirds-like 'Ultramen', making for a whole lotta on-the-floor fun. (JS)

OKA & YAMAZAKI Tapping EP (Dark House



With the Milisian stabs of 'Deadline' and the Black Dog-meets-Like A Tim sound of 'Mantra' following up you know you're eventually onto another certified winner. Pure heaven. (J8)

CARL COX'S IN-TEC HAS BEEN GETTING MAJOR PROPS OVER THE LAST YEAR. WE ASKED THEIR A&R MANAGER DJ C1 HOW THEY DO IT

What's your role in the label?

"I'm the A&R manager. It's up to me to do my damnedest to track down incredibly good music - that's our obsession. It's priority one, two and three. It's heavy A&R work, working very closely with all the artists."

Which artists have you released records by?

"Smith & Selway, Destination which is Christian Smith and Trevor Rockliffe - Mistress Barbara, Detron, Chris Liebing. and Brian Zentz. We do feel there's an In-Tec vibe, in the music and the attitude of the people involved."

What's been your most successful record?

"The first Smith & Selway release, the 'Metropolitan' EP. It's sold over 8,000 copies. Everyone played it, from Jeff Mills to Seb Fontaine to Danny Tenaglia to DJ Sneak. And of course Sasha, who used it for his 'Global Underground' CD. It's still selling hundreds every month."

What makes In-Tec different to other labels?

"It's techno with basslines. I think techno lost the plot for a while, it all got too hard and we're trying to bring the funk

Why do you think In-Tec has been more successful than Carl's other labels?

"I think it has a stronger direction, but essentially it's because we're totally independent and there's no one interfering in what we do."

What else have you got coming up?

"There's a new Destination release coming. We've got some deep house coming from Dano, some wicked percussive stuff from Oxia and a new Smith & Selway. The big one is going to be the remix package of Trevor Rockliffe and Blake Baxter's 'Visions Of You'. We're really excited about it, Carl's done a mix and there's a wicked Samuel L Sessions version on there as well."

houser, with a vocalist uncannily like Eartha Kitt, was one of last year's Balearic sleepers. Rich adds pumping UK rhythms to the continental flavours to great effect.





Pedigree?

Jeff and Spar grew up alongside Andy C in suburban Homchurch and were tempted into making music by schoolmate, Shimon. "We were intrigued by it all," Jeff remembers, "and when Shimon started doing well with 'Quest', it made us think 'God, we could do this'." So they went from following the man around the country to providing the dub plates in his bag.

The big tunes?

Last year's dark side anthem 'Turbulence' blew away dancefloors from here to Tokyo – you couldn't have gone to a drum & bass night in the second half of last year and not heard it. But the follow up, the 'Atlantis' double pack, was an even harder hitting, adrenalinguzzling classic, chock full of old skool sounds spliced-up and reassembled with some very new skool science.


The philosophy?

Anthemic and unashamed.
"As soon as we started making music we decided we had to be noticed," Jeff explains, and the best way of doing that was by making the biggest tunes we could. We're not going to apologise for that." 'Atlantis' is in the shops now – and still on dancefloors everywhere – and the pair have also been in the studio with Shimon, collaborating on tracks for Ram's forthcoming series. The strangled female vocal, pad sounds, doomy bass and progressive synth snarls do sound suspiciously like stablemates Hybrid. Speculation aside, a breakbeat podium moment par excellence.

MEAT KATIE

Bring Yourself (Kingsize) Surrey's finest returns for another slice of technoid funk. Riding a groove not entirely dissimilar to Sasha and BT's classic 'Ride' track, Mark Pember allows a twisted analogue groove to weave in and out of the mix for five minutes with little variation. Sounds boring? It's actually far from it. Serve loud.

AQUASKY VERSUS MASTER BLASTERS Sure Shot (Botchit Breaks)

A coup for Botchit & Scarper's new dancefloor division, as Bournemouth drum & bass heroes Aquasky drop the tempo to a toe-tapping 130bpm with immediate

results. The tille track puts the obligatory Botchit bassline over a housey breakbeat that will keep Matthew B happy. The real gem, though, is the old school/nu skool flavour of 'Hyperspace'. A smoking release.

DJ DEE KLINE Don't Smoke The Reefer (East West)

This children-friendly two-step moment will have charted by the time you read this, but not because of the far more impressive remix on show here. Dee Kine (geddit?) summons the spirit of old school hardcore and follows his friends Stanton Warriors Into more breakbeatfriendly territory.

DEEJAY PUNK ROC One More Bump

(Airdog/Independiente)
Fair play to Punk Roc for carrying on as if big beat never died. At least he does it with humour and not a little guile, amid the rather obvious beats. 'One More Bump' involves a male, swingbeat-esque vocal (a good thing round this way), and a P-Funk shuffle on most of the mixes, and will get the hips swinging to the superior Drumattic Twins offering. Just.

GIZMO

Silken (Functional Breaks) Release three from the Exeter breakbeat fraternity, and another groove that looks to the future. Even with the multi talented General Mid on the remix, as well as previous Single Of The Month winner Spoon Wizard slowing things down a notch, the original shines through, A label and single that demand your full attention.

....

VARIOUS

Adam Freeland Presents Tectonics (Marine Parade) The second sampler from the blonde boy wonder's third mix opus. Makesome Breaksome's arrazing 'Pig Chase' from

last year is given a welcome dusting down, while the surprise track on the album is the rave-influenced house track, 'Freak Frequency' from Vigi & Flip. Save your pennies and snap up the limited edition triple vinyl if you can.

ELEKTRONAUGHTS

Bumper (Lacerba) Notable principally for the awesome Plump DJs reworking. After lulling you into a false sense of security with a gentle opening, the beat saunters in like it was the toughest kid in the playground, grabs the track by the lapels and gives it a good nuttin' with its phasers, hi-hats and bassline. As subtle as a gerilla hiding behind a lamp-post, but a crowd winner every single time.


SCRATCH D VERSUS H-BOMB

The Red Pill (Freakin' Music) Having stood back and watched the best breakbeat music happening across the Atlantic, the Americans are fighting back. From their traditional stronghold in Florida comes this pearl from DJ Storm. Clever use of samples from The Matrix, and the electro thunk of the 'Infinity Mix' make for far more dancefloor pleasure than the prog-house breaks on the original. Another name to keep an eye on.

HYBRID FEATURING CHRISSIE HYNDE

Kid 2000 (Distinctive Breaks) Taken from the Kevin And Perry movie, and otherwise known as 'Finished Symphony Part Two', the Welsh wizards disappear into chart territory, aided by the vocals of ex-Pretender, Ms Hynde. Epic strings, MDMA synths, and trademark Hybrid beats will have the purists running for cover, but with Sonique's similar yet inferior breakbeat effort carrying on up the charts, this should give the chaps the huge success they deserve.





Their first album was nothing short of stunning and now, a couple of years on, we have the follow up. Elsewhere, though, it's pretty standard fare with tracks from Swzz Beatz, Mobb Deep and Jamie Foxx, among others.

BEENIE MAN Art & Life (Virgin)

Like previous Beene Man albums, a real mixed bag both in terms of quality and style. There's some real cheese on here, like the first single 'Love Me Now' that features Wyclef, but also a few true quality moments. The Neptunes produce a couple of tracks but to no great effect, instead the album's standout has to be '9 To 5'', a twisted basement track from the dancehall main man Dave Kelly. It's Kelly

that also provides the older but still great 'Haters And Fools'. Also check 'Some Tonight' produced by the Shockin' Vibes production feam.

LUCY PEARL Lucy Pearl (Pookie/Virgin)

Lucy Pearl are the highly touted r&b/ hip hop super group comprising Raphael Saadig (ex-Tony Toni Tone), Dawn Robinson (ex-En Vogue) and All Shaheed Muhammad (ex-Tribe Called Quest). The album as whole doesn't quite manage to live up to its hype but that said there are some real cracking tracks on it. Particular favourities are the first single 'Dance Tonight', the absolutely infectious 'Don't Mess With My Man' and 'You' winch features Q-Tip and Snoop Dog. Also, you can bet that they'll be great live.

Muzik cover star Moby in obscure seveninch side-project shocker! Lissy's has brought us low-key releases by, among others, Stereolab, Arab Strap and The Sea & Cake, but "Schaumgumm" is a rubbery, kiddie-techno anthem dedicated to, um, marshmallows. "Ich lebe schaumgummi/I Ike marshmallow" it reveals, and who doesn't? Toasty.

KID 606

Straight Outta Compton (V/Vm)

Yes, it's that 'Straight Outla Compton', as self-styled wigger with attitude Kid 606 pays homage to NWA by feeding their signature tune through the digital shredder. It would probably have Dr Dre reaching for his glock quicker than you can say "punk-ass weirdo white boy muthafucka", but if that description also fits you, you'll probably love it. Be-yatch.

CASSETTEBOY Di & Doci Do Die (Barry's Bootlegs/9000)

Another tribute, this time to the late Queen of Hearts and the erstwhile heir to the Al-Fayed fortune. Cut & pasted from media reports of the couple's demise, 'Di & Dodi. .' is scurrilous, obscere, treachercus filth. String them up—it's the only language they understand.

....

PEACHES

Lovertits (Kitty-Yo, Germany)

Canadian primary school mistress turned rubber hot pants-sporting Berfin recording artiste Peaches provides us with four slices of sleazy amyl house and harsh, Missy Eliott-meets-Suicide beats. "Some people say I keep my self-respect hidden in my cervix" she observes, moistly. Education, education, education, as Tony Blair might say.

• • • •

POLE VERSUS FOUR TET Four Tet Versus Pole (Leaf)

Mutual admiration society remix swap between Pole's Stefan Betke and Kieran Hebden of the shudderingly boring Four Tet/Fridge. The latter ditches Pole's original 'Heim' entirely in favour of stopstart Timbaland beats and looped piano, while Betke clubs Four Tet's 'Cload' round the head and feeds it to the fishes.

. ...

MINIT Bootleg (Tonschacht, Germany)

Australian duo making "minimalist music for microbiologists", which translates as Mille Plateaux-style grainy, lo-fi loops and Super-8 ambience, though it's mercifully free of the ubiquitous CD-skipping sounds which are rapidly becoming the avant-garde's answer to the epic trance breakdown. Find out more at laudanum.net

HANIN ELIAS In Flames EP (DHR Fatal)

The antagonistic stance of Alec Empre and his scary Digital Hardcore comrades is all too often undermined by the comedy value of their records – on 'In Flames', Ms Elias' distorted yelp is about as subversive as Pamela Anderson's shower scene in Barb Wire. The bubblegum pop mix of 'Gif Serial Killer', on the other hand, rocks.

Albums

CUTTERBLADE Cutterblade (Process)

Cutterblade have their roots in 'Artificial Intelligence' but favour long, spacious compositions over the regimented structures of, f'rinstance, Autechre, employing a looser and warmer sound occasionally complemented by acoustic guitar. 





WASHINGTON-based Iranian duo Ali 'Dubfire' Shirazinia and Sharam Tayebi - Deep Dish - are two of the brightest stars in the pantheon of dance. In the mid-Nineties they pushed the boundaries of deep house, broadening its appeal from the realm of the brooding spotter to the spangly world of the goggle-eyed podium peacock. Now they're bigger than ever.

In 1992, a year after initially hooking up, they launched Deep Dish Records alongside collaborators John Selway and Brian 'BT' Transeau. The first release was the introspective, Larry Heard-influenced 'A Feeling' with Dubfire, Sharam and Selway under the guise of Moods. But it was the duo's work on the label's next two releases, Transeau's 'The Moment Of Truth' and 'Relativity', that started to gain them recognition. Both 12-inches came with Carl Craig remixes and his 'Urban Affair Dub' on the latter became an essential purchase. Deep Dish returned the favour the following year with a superb remix of Naomi Daniel's 'Feel The Fire' on Innerzone/Planet E which was picked up in Europe by Dutch label Outland. Also in 1994 came the sublime 'Lonely Winter' by Dubfire and Sharam as Watergate.

A year later they went from strength to strength as the wonderfully jazz-tinged 'Love Songs' by Chocolate City (aka Dubfire and Sharam) again rocked dancefloors. Since 1995 only three more releases have followed from the boys on the label, all under that familiar Deep Dish guise. Those were 'Stranded', 'Summer's Over', and 'Mohammed Is Jesus', of which different mixes also appeared on on Deconstruction. For a full rundown of early Deep Dish releases, track down the 'Penetrate Deeper' compilation released by Tribal in 1995.

In 1994 Deep Dish launched a subsidiary label called Yoshitoshi, the first release being the single 'Submarine'. Although the initial intention was to promote DC-based artists – which it has succeeded in doing - Yoshiloshi has also found room for producers such as Sasha, Terry Francis and Oliver Lieb. Deep Dish's contributions were early releases as DC Depressed and Dished Out Burns. Yoshitoshi classics to track down include Deep Sensation's 'Better Love' (YR008), Dished Out Bums' 'Sector One' EP (YR0101), Heiko Lux' 'Dedicated To All Believers' (YR021), 2 Phat Cunts' 'Ride' (YR027) and Latino Circus' 'In Your Soul' (YRO31). There are also two mixed CD compilations – 'In House We Trust' (Tribal 1996) and 'One Nation Under A House – Sessions One & Two' (Twisted, 1998) – plus their own tribute to Yoshitoshi, 'Yoshiesque' (React, 1999). Between 1994 and 1995 Deep Dish hooked up with Tribal

Records to produce a steady stream of classics which have stood

the test of time. Check out Quench's 'High Frequency' and Quench De's 'Sexy Dance' as well as Prana's 'The Dream'. Then there were remixes of Elastic Reality's 'Cassa De X' and, under the name NYDC, came 'Up In This House'. Two quite limited one-sided remix 12-inches of 'Chocolate City' and 'Wear The Hat' were also promoted under the Deep Dish moniker as samplers for 'This Is The Sound Of Tribal UK' (CD/LP/MC).

In 1996 the pair teamed up with UK dance label Deconstruction for the critically acclaimed 'Junk Science' album which eventually appeared in 1998. Prior to this they put out 12-inches such as 'Stay Gold' in 1996, which was re-released in 1998 as 'Future Of The Future' featuring Everything But The Girl with David Morales mixes. There was also a 1997 release, 'Stranded' with the promo carrying remixes from BT, Danny Tenaglia and Brother Brown. Of all their remixes, Deep Dish will be eternally remembered by most for their massive reworking of De' Lacy's 'Hideaway' in 1995, a track which appeared initially on Slip 'N' Slide before its

Top 10 success through Deconstruction.

Rarity hunters should look for the Parlophone promo only 12-inch of their mixes of Tina Turner & Barry White's 'In Your Wildest Dreams' (1996) and the DMC only mix of Swing 52's 'Colour Of My Skin' (1995). Time to dig deep

Buried Treasure

BARRY WHITE AND THE LOVE UNLIMITED ORCHESTRA - 'RHAPSODY IN WHITE' (PYE International, 1974)



"CERTAIN THINGS turn me on/Like the way you might say a word/The way you wear your hair/Or the way you're standing there right now."

Barry White. The name is synonymous with fine wines, the most expensive hotels and the manly arts of seduction and love-making, "Angel please," he growls over the introductory swell of Don't Take It Away From Me'. Ooh, sir. Ooh.

White was the Prince Rogers Nelson of his time. A chain-smoking superstar with piano, production and arrangement skills, he emerged in the early Seventies with a slew of million-selling albums. 'Rhapsody In White' was his fourth set of essays on high class bedroom manoeuvres.

The cover shows the well-girthed Lothario at the height of his powers. Surrounded by three sultry laydeez in the heat of San Francisco, it's an image that speaks eloquently of love standing proud and erect, sheep-skin rug encounters and making your laydee feel like 'a natural woman'.

Euphoric and melodic, the Walrus and his musical playmates The Love Unlimited Orchestra are unstoppable. 'Baby Blues' offers sartorial suggestions for potential lady friends ("I love the way you stand/In your baby blue panties") while 'Don't Take It Away From Me' oozes deep, masculine longings. The album builds to a shuddering climax with 'Love's Theme', before the bearded love machine finally detumesces, leaving us fully satisfied. . . (RM)

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WHEN YOU BUY your first DJ mixer all you really need is two channels (so you can hook up a couple of decks or CD players), channel faders (so you can set the relative volume of each track), a cue system and headphone output (so you can get a record ready to mix in without the rest of the world being able to hear you do it) and a crossfader so you can blend two tracks together.

These days there's no need to pay much more than £70 for a dinky little mixer which will allow you to do precisely that. As you progress you realise that there's one more extremely useful tool that can make complex mixes considerably easier. Equalisation (EQ) allows you to cut out bass, mid or treble frequencies, usually from the incoming

track. When you can cut the kick drum (or hi-hats or snares or whatever) out of your incoming track, there are less elements to clash. The result is easier blending of tracks.

It's no surprise, then, that the format of most second time buyers' mixers is a three channel (so you can do three deck mixing) mixer with an input gain control, input selection switches, three way EQ and/or kill switches, channel faders, a crossfader, a decent level metering and cue system. You can also throw in some handy creative tools like an effects send system, or more traditional tools like punch buttons. But how do you choose, when there are so many mixers on the market that fit the bill? It all comes down to looks, feel, sound quality and layout.

What we have here is a selection of nine models, one from each of the major manufacturers. Obviously, there are hundreds of models to choose from, but the manufacturers tend to put together a whole range of products based on similar design principles, but with variations in the range of facilities on offer. From the models we've looked at here you can get a pretty good idea about the relative merits of the vast majority of the mixers on the market.

To complete this arduous task, we roped in the incredibly patient and polite DJing giant Terry Francis to offer his expert opinion. So with coffee and sandwiches aplenty, we decamped to the salubrious and sonically impeccable venue

TERRY: "I LIKE IT. It's a cool, shiny silver colour. It's got a nice crossfader, with a good action that mixes nicely. It's not too floppy, not too long. The knobs on the EQ are a little bit too close together though. I like the fact that it's got an effects send/return on it and it's quite handy to have the balance control on the channels, so that you can knock it about between the speakers. The cue system is cool, the headphones seem nice and loud. The overall sound is nice and clear and the EQ cuts well.

"They've just released a new model with little silver kill switches beside the knobs. I like kill switches, they're handy if you get into trouble with a mix, which of course I never do. It's got quite a lot of control for the price. Overall, quite easy to use, and it wouldn't be too bad at all in a club."

"PRETTY CLASSIC LOOKS with all that black and silver, but a bit plasticky at first sight. The feel of the crossfader is smooth enough, but the music continues right to the very end and then just cuts out. I really like this sprung action on the kill switches. You can just flick the switch one way and it springs back to nothing or you can push it the other way and it stays where you put it. There's a lack of status lights, though, and they could do more to help you distinguish between the different knobs.

"Overall, although the sound quality is fine, given that it's almost double the money of some of the cheaper mixers it should be better. It still has issues like the sharp drop off with the crossfader and a few other little niggles. I'm a little disappointed really, I thought it'd be better." 6.5/10

"IT LOOKS GOOD, it's nice and simple. That said, there's a lot of room on here, so they could have done with spacing the knobs out a bit more and they're a little stiff too. That's probably not such a bad thing, because they're bound to loosen up a bit with time. The crossfader is a little long for me. Its action feels good and it crossfades very nicely and everything but it is long. The toggle switches feel good, but again I think they're better off being at the top of the channel. It's very easy to use, the headphones are louder than usual. The sound quality is wicked, very good - it would make all the difference if it was turned up loud. Noticeably better straight away. The bass doesn't cut right out with the EQ, but the EQ does sound good. Yeah, good looks, great sound but a bit fiddly." 7/10

"FOR SOME REASON this one looks a bit cheap at first sight but it works really well. The overall sound quality is pretty good, with a nice warm feel to it, and the headphones are fairly loud. The EQ sounds alright, but there's no little catch when you turn the knobs to let you know when you're at zero. It just sweeps through, which I don't like. The kill buttons are very nice, though. Personally I'm not too sure about having the toggle switches on the channel strip, because you might knock them when you're twiddling the EQ. Having a switch so that you can assign different combinations of channels to the crossfader when you're working with three decks is a good idea. The transform buttons work well.

"Overall, I'd say there's quite a lot on there for the price and it's pretty good, all round." 8/10

"IT LOOKS DISGUSTING. I suppose it'd be okay if it happened to colour co-ordinate with your bedroom but... The EQ is very nice, it's got a good warm sound, it's got plenty of space between the knobs. It's nice to have a DJ booth level. I'm not really using the punch buttons, because I'm not a scratch DJ, but they're pretty direct and work well. The crossfader is good, much better than the old Citronic crossfaders that used to be really long. The headphones are loud. The cue system is easy, it's got nice, illuminating buttons so you can see what's what in the dark.

"It's just a pretty simple DJ mixer really. I don't like the look but that doesn't really count for much while you're actually using it. Quality sound, good EQ, easy to use. Cool – I like it."

"NOT TOO KEEN on the look of it again, but I suppose it's nice and bright, particularly with the orange bits on the channel faders letting you know when you're getting near the top in the dark, which could be useful. In a similar vein I like all the lights to tell you what's on and what's not. It's all spaced out quite well. It feels a bit cheap though; the crossfader and channel faders rattle around, and the tops come off a bit too easily so you might get a bit of flying knob syndrome with it. The overall sound of the mixer isn't very warm, and it's a bit of a muddy sound, but the EQ is really good. If you switch all of the kill switches out there's no sound whatsoever, so they are proper kills. The bass kill, in particular, is wicked.

The knobs all feel nice, there's plenty of space between them, and there are lights on the cue indicators so you can see in the dark. There's a pleasant overall sound to it: it's quite clear so you can hear everything. The EQ works well, and the midrange in particular with this one is rather good. The headphones are loud enough. The crossfader feels good. I like the way that you get one channel on one side of the meter and the other channel on the other side of the meter because it makes it easier to get your levels matched.

"I LIKE THE LOOK of it. Nice and plain, with plenty of room between the controls. The headphones were quite loud but not particularly brilliant sound quality, but the overall sound quality was much better. There's a decent cut out to the EQ, it removes things totally, which is good. I'm sure scratchers will like the crossfader reverse. The crossfader cuts out a little too sharply, though – it runs along right to the end and then suddenly disappears. You can switch between quick and normal curve, but it doesn't alleviate the problem, because there's not enough difference between them. You can always use the channel faders to compensate, but you shouldn't really have to.

"Really, the only thing I don't like is the crossfader. At the price, this one is easily the best value of the ones I've seen today."

"IT'S REALLY HARSH looking. Let's face it — you wouldn't wear a pair of trousers and a jumper in those colours would you? I had one of these 14 years ago and it hasn't changed at all, except it was black and now it's horrible colours. The crossfader is very rough, kind of scrapey along the edges, and very loose too. The sound of the EO was fine, but the overall sound is pretty rough. In terms of spacing, the room between the EO is so tight you can barely get the tips of your fingers in there. It's got a booth control but I can't ever imagine this being used in a club. In terms of quality it really is terrible, but if you're starting out, it's great value for the price.

"Personally I'd spend more and get something a little better, but if you're stretched, it's great for \$115 – what can you get for that these days?" 6/10

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ELECTRIX may be a relatively unfamiliar brand name but while putting this range together, the company behind it, IVL, have consulted with some of the biggest and best names in the business and listened carefully to what they wanted. And it shows.

The whole range is built into seriously rugged, trapezoidal metal boxes, which either screw snugly into a standard rack or sit on a desktop with their face plate angled invitingly up at you. All the knobs are ridged metal and have that smooth, solid action. They feature a dual punch button system that allows you to punch effects in and out.

They come equipped with both turntable-ready RCA connections (with grounding posts) and 1/4" jack studio-friendly connections. For the studio-oriented among you, all of the knobs and buttons transmit and receive MIDI controller information so they can be fully automated using a sequencer.

The Electrix boxes are all slathered in flashing lights and look fantastic, but crucially, Electrix have also managed to get the most important factor of all spot on: they sound superb.

WHEN YOU FIRST set eyes on the CMX5000, it comes across as all gleaming silver, flashing lights and jiggery pokery. As you get to know it, you realise that it is in fact a very well balanced combination of powerful technology, clever design and simplicity of use. The CMX5000 follows the established twin player format, but deviates from the norm with a crop of features aimed at one simple concept: it can be used without the aid of a DJ mixer, or even any DJing experience. In short, it can mix your music for you.

Old school

Before we set off on what's new about the CMX5000 it's important to point out that all of the traditional stuff we've come to expect from twin CD players is all present, correct and in a well-specified form. The layout of the controller is excellent and makes full use

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of an additional rack unit of height in comparison to most players. It's built to a high standard, so all the controls feel smooth and reassuring to use. There are also plenty of self-illuminating buttons and clear markings, so visibility in low light conditions is excellent.

The cueing facilities are fairly standard, but with nice touches, like the extra large jog ring which is cleverly placed around the outside of the screen. This can be used in conjunction with the search or skip buttons to give you super-fast searching.

Master tempo is extremely impressive and in many ways, is what makes the automix facilities as effective as they are. The Pioneer looping system, with out point editing and reloop for jumping back into the loop from continuous play, is also superb, as ever.

Physical additions

Besides the crop of automix controls, the CMX5000 also sports a couple of facilities that enable it to work as a stand alone product. Pioneer have very sensibly included an analogue mix out which carries the sound from both players and they've squeezed in a headphone output with a level control and cue selection buttons. They've also included a couple of disc lights to let you know when you have one slotted.


The automix controls

These are housed within the black central area on the controller. The strip starts at the top with a big button for switching in and out of automix mode; just below this is a crop of six buttons used to select whether you want it to mix individual tracks or simply from one disc to the next and for programming a custom track order from a single disc.

Underneath these is a red LED screen with an accompanying knob and button. This screen is either used to show the actual tempo that your music is running at (the idea is to automatically pitch up or down the music on either disc to match the tempo set here) or to show the next track due to be played. The knob alters the value shown on the screen and the button toggles the function. Also lurking is a bpm sync button, which allows you to use the automated pitch adjustment without the actual automix feature.

Moving still further down the strip you get another little crop of controls: a row of four buttons determines whether the CMX5000 is to attempt a 'cut in' (stops one track dead and starts the other); a 'zip' (performs a slightly sonically suspect emulation of hitting the stop button on a turntable and starts the next track); an 'echo' (stops the music dead adding an echo to the last fragment of sound, leaving that to trail away before starting the next track); or the much more ambitious 'cross fade', which attempts a beat mix.

These buttons are accompanied by a knob that sets the length of time over which the transition is to occur and two more controls: a small black button marked 'instant change'

and a much larger, self-illuminating button marked 'short time'. It might be better if the functions of these two controls were swapped, because the instant change button could do with being easier to find in a panic. This would make it more useful for the DJ who is manually mixing but gets themselves into a pickle and would like the machine to take over for a minute. The short time button simply tells the CMX to reduce the amount of time it lets each track run for while in continuous, automix mode.

Can it mix?

Central to getting any two bits of music to mix together is getting them running at the same tempo. For a machine to mix automatically, it's pretty vital that it can correctly figure out the original tempo of each track.

As usual with beat counters, the CMX is fine with regular, four-to-the-floor kick drum oriented music, but not so great with more irregular beats. So it does a fairly decent job with house or techno but isn't all that much cop with drum & bass. It does better – but still often misses the program – with hip hop, UK garage or r&b. So perhaps a more pertinent question would be 'what can it mix?'

Yes, but can it mix?

If it calculates the tempo correctly and that tempo is within +/-16% of the running track, it will attempt a beat mix. If it can't meet these conditions, it still has a crack at running a mix anyway (with the incoming track at its original tempo), which is pretty brave of it, really. Most human DJs wouldn't dare try and beat mix two tracks that obviously weren't going to go together.


As things stand, I'd say that the CMX5000 manages to make a remarkably high proportion of mixes sound a good few steps away from bloody awful. That's much better than a human would manage, although unlike a human, it gets its off beats and down beats mixed up occasionally. It can't really go wrong with cut ins, zips or echoes though, as they're more or less foolproof.

Will it catch on?

Having gone to all the time and trouble of developing a completely new approach to CD mixing with their top-loading, desktop-style CDJ series, you'd think Pioneer wouldn't really be all that bothered with producing a traditional rack style twin player. But Pioneer know their onions.

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Combined with its great looks, the fact that it can make a passable attempt at taking over mixing duties could mean the CMX5000 becomes a familiar sight and sound in our bars and clubs.

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


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
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

Kids today think they're pretty

What was it like being in the Rolling Stones?

"It was - and is - fantastic actually - but it was a lot of work. The Rolling Stones have never shirked work. When we used to go on the road it was nearly every single night for a year. I was reading today that one of the Gallaghers is fed up with being on tour, and is coming home. They haven't been on the road for five minutes!"

Were you really the baddest of bad boys?

"We were very good, actually, when you hear what some of them got up to - from the stories you hear, people like Led Zeppelin were much worse than us."

hedonistic. Could you show them a thing or two? "There's always been a lot of drinking and drugs and clubs, going right back to the

Twenties and Thirties. The only thing that's different now is that there's a lot of weird drugs with chemicals in them that aren't that good for you. Well, no drugs are exactly good for you, but with benzedrine and amphetamines, if you haven't got a really bad heart, you know you're going to be alright. I've never taken ecstasy, but I imagine it must be great fun when you're on it. It's when you're using over a long time that your body collapses - but then, that's drugs.

"Well they're not, are they! What is there to admire in putting a record on, then putting the other side on? It's not James Brown or Marvin Gaye, is it? What do they do, just put some records on and 'do some scratching'? I'm bored with that."

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Coldcut have remixed some of your tracks. Are we gonna see you down the Ministry on the ones and twos?

"This is my first venture into the world of sampling. It's very useful, but where's the fun in looking at a machine playing a solo? Clubbing's not meant for me. They play it a wee bit too loud forme now. There's so much more technology,

the decibels are so much louder! Hike some rap music, but it's difficult to judge. I can't even judge this record I've just made, because it's so outside anything I've done before."

What about down in Ibiza?

"Ibiza to me is me and Mick and our wives at the end of the Sixties, and me with black socks on because my feet got burnt! There was only one hotel there, I remember, Now, it looks a bit Essex to me. I never liked that, and I don't think I ever will."
