I would like to take this opportunity to welcome Mr Peter Jess to our game and I wish him a long and successful journey through Planet Football.

It was also great that he fronted up at a press conference prior to our 3-1 loss at home to Sydney United recently.

Now lets get a few things straight first. I think its great that the club has got a new owner, who, as I understand it, is able to put money into the club to help it grow. I also think that its important to get away from Optus Oval, its not a ground that is conducive to a typical soccer atmosphere, and it's a positive thing that this has happened, although possibly a bit too swift for some peoples liking.

However there were a few worrying things mentioned in the press conference that I would like to discuss here. I would suggest caution by both parties (Peter Jess and the supporters) if he thinks owning a football club is a way to make money, something that he alluded to. My experience in England would suggest that yes you can make money owning a football club, indeed clubs like Arsenal, Manchester United. Liverpool and Newcastle seem to print the stuff. However for each of these there are plenty of badly managed clubs, who struggle to survive because their owners have treated them as a source of income rather than a sporting club. For this read Sheffield United. Oxford United. Bournemouth, Portsmouth, Nottingham Forest, Norwich, in fact the list is rather long and tiresome.

To be successful, in a growing market place is going to take a long term financial commitment, and will only happen if we are clever in how we market ourselves and more importantly successful on the pitch. To this end there is no doubt in my mind that we must consider changing our name. The reason is quite simple, I've a number of AFL supporting friends that won't come near a club called Carlton. even if they don't play at Optus Oval. AFL is tribal, like Football in England, and as an Arsenal supporter. I would never, ever, ever, watch a team called Tottenham Hotspur, play Rugby or Cricket, which is what we are asking Geelona. Essendon. Richmond Collingwood and Hawthorn fans to do.

Traditional rivalries, be it AFL or football matter, and the fact that we are considering Bob Jane Stadium as a home is also a concern. It's again similar to Arsenal ground sharing with Tottenham, it just won't happen. So it shouldn't be considered on the grounds that we basically need our own identity. Again the list here is long, Charlton struggled to pull crowds of 5,000 during their ground sharing days at Selhurst Park and Upton Park, yet now they are back on their own patch at The Valley, they regularly get close to 4 times that amount. Brighton are also having a terrible time, with their fans having to travel to Gillingham (Over

150kms round trip) and crowds are a fraction of what they were. Share a ground, particularly with your local rivals, and you lose your identity, exactly what we need to be working hard to establish at this moment. Olympic Park seems to be the natural home of football in Melbourne and therefore our natural home as Melbourne's leading and most forward looking team.

Finally Peter, one word of advice, if

you are going to be late for the press, yeah blame the traffic by all means, but don't mention that you'd been surfing, that was an important day for a lot of people, and whilst I admire your honesty, it did stick in a number of peoples throats.

Good luck Peter, and heres to a long and hopefully successful future at Carlton.

LIFE AFTER SPORT

"Recently, while addressing a school presentation night, I was asked by a parent what I did before becoming a fulltime professional soccer player.

This parent was obviously concerned that her kids could become full-time players at a very young age, and end up leaving the sport, with the majority of their lives still to live, with no qualifications or work experience. In my case I was lucky and replied that I had completed University before "turning pro". A nod and a smile of satisfaction showed me that the parent had won a silent battle with her son/daughter – "Finish your schooling first!!".

Sadly, at the moment, many young kids are entering into a life of soccer with no plans for "life after sport". So, the Australian Professional Footballers Association have decided to try addressing this problem by introducing the Athlete Career and Education (ACE) Program, first piloting the scheme in Victorian Ericsson Cup clubs, then with plans to take it nationwide.

The ACE Program is a program of

the Australian Institute of Sport and the network of state institutes and academies of sport. It provides all eligible athletes with career, educational, and professional development services. The challenge confronting many athletes, however, is how to maintain the balance between their sporting and vocational aspirations. The ACE Advisor's role is to assist athletes to more effectively combine these areas without compromising their sporting objectives. With all costs from the program being met by the Association, it is a great opportunity for all players to further develop their careers outside soccer, and for new or young players to be confident that life will not stop at 30 when choosing to pursue a full-time soccer career.

So, the next time a parent asks me a similar question I will be able to confidently reply that soccer is a professional and caring sport that looks after the "outside" needs of it's participants as well as looking after their sporting needs."

EVERYONE LOVES' A HOME GROWN HERO

Home grown heroes have an extra special meaning for fans of any club. The local lad made good, having come up through the youth teams and in our case from feeder clubs, makes the player extra special in the eyes of the fan. Maybe it's because fans can identify with someone who has made the big time they themselves have always dreamt of. Or maybe it's just that local pride and success is worth more than something bought.

The other great benefit of home grown talent is of course it saves a fortune in transfer fees and provides a healthy income by selling on players who don't make our first team but may do elsewhere. A successful youth structure can lead to great empire building. English clubs such as Manchester United and Liverpool (to name the two most famous) have won countless honours with home grown talent.

So for Carlton it's great that we have a healthy youth academy and network of feeder clubs and scouts, which is already bearing rich fruit. At the time of writing Jeff Olver's Academy team went three points clear at the top of the Southern Youth League table after defeating South Melbourne 2-1 and Albury-Wodonga (the Carlton feeder association) had their first win for the season defeating the highly-fancied Melbourne Knights 2-1. On top of that the success of the Colts this season with their championship win is something we should be proud of and also augurs well for the future.

However before I race off dreaming of Busbyite successes for Carlton it must be remembered that there's a stark difference here. When our youth players become successful they'll be sold on. It's the inescapable fact of the N.S.L. Any fan should want their players to have a successful career in the topflight and this naturally means European football.

This year we are likely to lose two of our very promising young players in Bresciano and Colosimo, having already seen Vlahos go to Panathinaikos and Grella to Empoli. No doubt Bresciano and Colosimo will be snapped up by European football scouts in Holland whilst training for the World Youth Cup. While we can admire their success and be proud that they played for Carlton, we have to rebuild and will constantly have to do so. The more successful our young talents are the higher the turnover.

So two things seem important for the long-term success of Carlton. The maintenance and improvement of the youth system, pumping out a rich flow of talented youngsters to take the place of those leaving, and instilling such a Carlton 'spirit' in the players we produce that at the end of their careers they return to Carlton to grace our team once more. There has been a lot of talk of getting an overseas star next season but imagine in 10 or 11 years time Andy Vlahos returning home to Carlton after a hugely successful European career to use his exquisitely honed skills for the Blues benefit once again.



MY BLUE SENSE WORTH

"What's in a name? A rose by any other name would smell as sweet"

Yes, granted. But it just doesn't sound the same to say "Mmmm, this gherkin sure smells lovely".

So why do I have a problem with Carlton?

Now don't get me wrong. I love Carlton Soccer Club. I was there at the first game at Bob Jane Stadium for the Tynan-Eyre Cup. There were only a few of us, but we loved Carlton back then as much as we do now. And that's a familiar story. Carlton fans love Carlton Soccer Club.

But, I kept asking myself - and have done for the past two seasons - why doesn't everybody love Carlton? We're professional, we wear the best uniforms in the league, we play attractive football and we're multi-cultural. What more could you ask for?

Sure, we played on a footy ground with a cricket pitch in the middle. Sure, we didn't have 60 second ads on prime time TV, and sure, even the soccer media gave us no favours.

But people did know about us and people still stayed away.

Thousands of soccer players in leagues across the state who are all dying for a healthy league and local National League clubs to support are still staying away. They all know where we are. Yet they still decide not to come.

Let me hypothesise:

Carlton is a suburb of Melbourne in the state of Victoria. I do not live in Carlton. I don't support Carlton Football Club. I don't even work in Carlton. How many people do?

What allegiance can we possibly have to Carlton? It's a bit like admitting Bulleen or Thomastown to the National League. I don't live anywhere near those places, why should I support them?

What's more, Carlton has the additional burden of sharing a name with

one of the AFL's most hated clubs. AFL teams have transcended traditional geographic borders - but soccer is not that strong yet.

I thought changing the name of the club to Melbourne or Victoria (and I'm still not convinced The Blues is the right nickname either) would give us the opportunity to appeal to a wider crosssection of the Melbourne sporting public.

I live in Melbourne. I was born in Melbourne. I work in Melbourne. Who else does? About 4 million people, that's who! Despite the fact that Melbourne is also the name of an AFL club and there is already a host of other "Melbourne" clubs in other sports (eg Knights, Tigers, Demons, Storm) it's still a name I can relate to. I have an affinity with Melbourne. We all do.

And that's what the "Carlton" spirit is all about, isn't it? Being inclusive, rather than divisive. Welcoming everybody, not just those who live in the 3053 postcode.

I will still love the Carlton Soccer Club, because I believe it shares my vision for what a soccer club should be. I only wish our name reflected that inclusive spirit so more people would be encouraged to share that vision.

Footnote:

My idea for the perfect name: the Victoria Cross.

Victoria includes us all, even our feeder clubs (except maybe Alburyl). The Victoria Cross is a real "thing". That "real thing" is a famous medal of honour, awarded for great courage and bravery. "Cross" is a soccer term (like Strikers). You could use the Southern Cross as a visual identity. You could keep the navy blue and white as the colours without damaging the image. In fact navy blue and white are traditional Victorian colours. You do not alienate any Victorian footy fans from any club. You avoid a clash with the Melbourne Knights over the name.



I think it strikes me as a "Banana Republic" attempt at arousing nationalism, rent-a-crowds waving placards of dictators, or a bit like the Red Square parades showing a false sense of national togetherness.

Obviously the majority of the crowd at Carlton games don't agree with me as there seems to be a positive response to the playing of the anthem. I guess at the very least it does offer ritual to mark the entrance of the players as the banner-run at AFL games does. I will stand and observe this ritual, but I save the unadulterated nationalism for special occasions.
