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### THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE.

*To the inhabitants of the Town of Amherst in the County of Hillsborough in said state, qualified to vote in town affairs.*

You are hereby notified to meet in the town house in said Amherst on Tuesday, the thirteenth day of March next, at nine o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects :

- 1 To choose all necessary town officers for the year ensuing.
- 2 To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year, and make appropriations for the same.
- 3 To raise such sums of money as may be necessary for repairing highways and bridges.
- 4 To raise such sums of money as may be necessary for school purposes.
- 5 To raise such sums of money as may be necessary for the maintenance of town poor.
- 6 To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for Memorial Day.
- 7 To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the public library.
- 8 To see if the town will authorize the purchase of a lowering device for burials, and appropriate money for the same.
- 9 To hear the reports of all town officers, agents and committees, and pass any vote relating thereto.

10 To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

# REPORT OF BOARD OF EDUCATION.

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The annual District meeting occurred March 16th, 1905, at 2 o'clock P. M.

W. W. Sloan, who had filled the position for five successive terms of three years each, was selected a member of the Board of Education. He was also elected its Treasurer.

The Board organized in the evening of the same day and made the usual assignment of offices. A generous sum for the defraying of the expenses of the school was asked for, and it was generously granted.

It has been the desire and purpose of the Board to make the school year for all schools except the High school at least thirty-three weeks, but at the end it has repeatedly been found necessary to shorten the year a week or more. This year is no exception. The schools have been in session thirty-two weeks only. The only exception is in the case of No. 9, which on account of previous shortages has been allowed to go several weeks beyond the limit. In order that the full limit of thirty-three weeks be realized a little wider margin must be provided for in the annual appropriation. On the whole, the year in the judgment of the Board has been a prosperous one, nearly all the schools measuring up in efficiency to that of previous years and of some it might possibly be said there has been a noticeable gain.

Changes have occurred here and there, which in the management of schools are always inevitable, but which in many instances are more or less detrimental to the general result.

There have been perhaps an unusual number of changes the present year, though several of the teachers have held their places throughout.

If there has been a failure in any instance the fault has been due to a combination of circumstances, and is not to be laid entirely at the door of the teacher in charge.

The suburban schools, with one exception, have been in

session throughout the year. The exception is No. 7. What was said in last year's report concerning the protracted closing of this school is substantially true today.

Of the suburban school it ought to be said that it holds an important place among the educational institutions of the town. It is possible that a considerable number will go no farther in their educational pursuit. How important, then, that they be provided for as fully as possible! The traditional three R's are not sufficient. The scholars in these schools should be made masters of their own language so that they can speak, write, read, and spell, it correctly. What the Grammar school calls and provides for should be open to every scholar here.

Let the teacher in these schools remember—no matter how small the number that comes to her day by day—that she is engaged in a work than which none can be more noble. If she will insist on what is recommended in this paragraph she may be sure that she is contributing not a little toward the making of those whom she instructs a success in the world.

The Village schools open to all comers are a trio of which Amherst may justly be proud. The two lower schools aim to cover in what in more closely graded schools, is included from the first to the ninth grade, and they succeed fairly well in accomplishing their aim. If, when the scholars reach the Grammar school, however, which is Intermediate and Grammar school combined, they would linger six instead of four years they would be much better prepared for the studies of the High school, which call emphatically for higher scholarship and greater maturity of mind than scholars usually presenting themselves possess.

Miss Moor, who has been in charge of the Primary school for many successive terms, fulfills all that at first she promised and grows noticeably more efficient year after year. This school for a long time has been a delight. The Grammar school has had as its head this year one who came to it highly recommended by an expert. We are sure that Miss Bachelor's work in this important and somewhat difficult grade, shows that she measures up fully to all that was expected of her. If this school is not a model one eventually, it will not be because the Board of Education has not endeavored to give it a trend in the right direction.

The High school no one can fail to be interested in, for to its numbers all parts of the town contribute.



From what it has already accomplished it has proven beyond question its right to be. After somewhat unusually critical inspection by the Superintendent of Public Instruction, and with some changes in its curriculum it was reapproved at the beginning of the school year and admitted to the published list of High schools. At the close of her third year, Miss Park, much to the regret of all, resigned. She had come to be recognized by all who knew her as a teacher in every way highly equipped for her work, as well as a person worthy of universal esteem. To choose her successor and do it well, was a difficult task.

It was early taken in hand—a young lady of much promise it was thought had been secured. But she at length declined, having received an appointment which was pending, more to her liking. Miss Horne, the assistant teacher, who was much liked by the scholars and who by her efficiency had won the confidence of the Board was offered the position, and after giving the matter extended consideration, accepted. The appointment was considered a fitting one by all, and Miss Horne entered upon her duties with the best prospects of success. She was assisted by Miss Gertrude Norcross, a graduate of Mt. Holyoke College, class of 1905. The teaching instinct belongs to Miss Norcross by inheritance, but she is to be credited with not a little personal merit. It was evident from the first that Miss Horne had an efficient helper. The school never promised better than when beset by some conscienceless school authorities from without, Miss Horne was persuaded to resign. We have forgiven her, but we have not yet forgiven the relentless authorities, who in the middle of the first semester enticed her from us.

We were compelled to accept the situation, and necessity was laid upon the Board of Education at once to fill the vacancy. After the entire membership of the Board had interviewed her and others in Boston, the lot fell upon Miss E. Elizabeth Allen, a graduate of Boston University, class of 1904, who maintained throughout her college course scholarship which won for her Greek letter standing. There can be but little doubt when Miss Allen has accustomed herself to the situation that she will prove a worthy successor to Miss Horne, which will be greatly to her credit.

There is nothing which menaces the well-being of the High school so much as want of numbers. So long as the membership can be kept to thirty, it will have a right to continue.

That this number may be preserved, it is the duty of every one in town who aspires to a High school education to attend the home school.

The last graduating class numbered only three. But the quality was good. One is a teacher of promise in one of our schools, and the remaining two having pursued post-graduate studies at home, and elsewhere, next year will enter college. Already several of our boys are pursuing the higher education and their entrance to, and success thus far in college are due largely to the preliminary work done in our own High school. May interest in this school, so long as the prospect remains as good as it now is, not be allowed to wane.

#### **District Supervision.**

This is a matter worthy of careful consideration. It is not to be set aside until it has received intelligent discussion. "The Superintendent of Public Instruction" ought to be given an opportunity to set forth its merits and to answer objections before a convocation of our citizens. It is unquestionably a move in the right direction. District supervision, there can be little doubt, has come to stay.

Amherst is progressive. It wants to adopt the best things along educational lines, and along all other lines.

Amherst and not Antrim ought to be associated with Milford and Wilton in district supervision.

It is Amherst's right by geographical position, and Amherst ought, without hesitancy, to swing into line. The cost of supervision will be but little larger. The quality of supervision will be improved beyond estimate.

The Chairman of the Board's last word is—and the other members of the Board are with him—Let there be District Supervision.

## ATTENDANCE.

The whole number of scholars found enrolled upon the school registers during the year, between the ages of five and fifteen years, is 152. Above fifteen, 20; less than five, 2.
