











## ADVERTISEMENT.

On presenting the third volume of the National Calendar to the public, the publishers feel much satisfaction, in being able

to state, that the two former have been well received.

No labour has been spared in endeavoring to render this more useful than the others. All the lists of Officers of the Government have been carefully corrected, and compared with official copies; all changes in each Department noted; the Army and Navy Lists, are given as they actually stood, on the first day of the present year; including all the promotions made during the year preceding; with the new organization of the Army, and the Lineal Rank of the Officers, &c.

It has been found that "National Calendar" did not sufficiently designate the nature and contents of the work; to effect this, "Annals of the United States," as more expressive, has been

added, and will hereafter be continued.

Several new heads have been added to the work in the present volume; among the most important, perhaps, are—

# 1. The State of the Treasury.

In which is given a complete statement of the Receipts and Expenditures; the Imports and Exports; a full view of the state of the public Debt, for the year 1821, compared with the same subjects in 1820; and the estimates for 1822.

# 2. A Statement of the Foreign Commerce of the United States, in 1821.

This Statement exhibits the value of Imports and Exports to each foreign country during the year; showing, also, the amount of American and Foreign tonnage, with the total tonnage each Foreign country employed in their trade with the United States; with the averaged balance of trade.

It is made by the Register of the Treasury, (see pp. 28, 29,) in compliance with an Act of Congress, originally introduced in

the Senate, by Mr. Sanford, of New-York.

# 3. A Synopsis of the Laws of the United States, passed at the last Session of Congress.

The heads of the Laws are alphabetically arranged; the titles of each Act is given in full; with the substance and date of every law.

# 4. The several Appropriations for the year 1821.

The Appropriations for every branch of public expenditure, are given in full, according to the several Laws by which they are authorized.

# 5. The Census of 1820.

Showing the correct aggregate amount of each description of persons in each of the several States; with various comparative views.

The first four heads abovementioned will be continued from year to year; and will, it is presumed, be found highly useful.

Accuracy, has always been the first object in this work: and it is confidently believed that all the statements it contains may be fully relied on. To ensure accuracy, however, it has been found necessary to defer the publication this year, to a period beyond that originally contemplated. Yet this delay has been an advantage; for, upon examination, it will be seen that the difference in value, will more than compensate for the difference in time.

At page 247, a comparative view of the number of Representatives, at different periods is given; but as the ratio, under the Census of 1320, had not been determined on when the work went to press, the column where that should be placed is left blank; and, by those who wish to perfect the Table, the numbers may be added with a pen.

The Representative numbers, in page 141, are incorrect;—the correct numbers will be found in the General Table, at the end of the volume, and in page 245.

In page 78, 1st Lieutenant should be opposite Ben. A. Boynton, and 2d Lieutenant opposite Henry Smith, in the 2d infantry.

# EXECUTIVE.

PRESIDENT OF THE UNITED STATES.

JAMES MONROE, of Virginia, \$25,000 per annum.

The President must be hirty-five years of age, fourteen years a resident of the United States, a natural born citizen, or a citizen at the time of the adoption of the Constitution. case of his removal, death, resignation, or inability, the duties of his office devolve on the Vice President: and, by act of the 1st March, 1792, in case of removal, death, resignation, or inability, both of President and Vice President, the President of the Senate pro tempore; and in case there shall be no President of the Senate, then the Speaker of the House of Representatives, for the time being, is to act as President. The legal title of this officer is The President of the United States; and he is, by the Constitution, Commander in Chief of the Army and Navy of the United States, and of the Militia of the several States, when called into the service of the United States. He receives ambassadors and other public ministers; and it is his duty to take care that the laws are faithfully executed. He is empowered, with the advice and consent of two-thirds of the Senators present, to make treaties; and, by and with the advice of a majority of the Senate, he appoints ambassadors, other public ministers, and consuls, judges of the Supreme Court, and all other officers established by law, whose appointments are not otherwise provided for in the Constitution, and the appointment of whom, when of an inferior nature, is not vested by Congress. in the President alone, in the courts of law, or in the heads of departments. He commissions all officers of the United States; and may grant reprieves and pardons, except in cases of impeachment. The compensation of the President is 25,000 dollars per annum, which cannot be increased or diminished during the term for which he is elected, His salary was fixed by act of 18th February, 1793. He, as well as the Vice President, is elected by Electors in the respective States, who are chosen as the Legislatures of the several States may provide. According to an act of Congress, of the 1st of March, 1792, the choice of these Electors must be

made within thirty-four days preceding the first Wednesday of December, of the year in which an election of President and Vice President takes place; and they must be equal in number to all the Senators and Representatives in Congress: but no Senator or Representative, or person holding an office of trust or profit under the United States, can be appointed an Elector. The votes for President and Vice President are given by the Electors on the first Wednesday of December, in every fourth year, throughout the Union. The period of service is four years: but there is no restriction as to reelection. There is, however, no instance of any President's having served for a longer time than eight years. If the offices of President and Vice President should both become vacant, it then becomes the duty of the Secretary of State to communicate information thereof to the Executive of each State, and to cause the same to be published in at least one newspaper of every State, giving two months previous notice that Electors of President shall be appointed or chosen in the several States, within thirty-four days next preceding the first Wednesday in December ensuing; when the choice of President must proceed as usual.]

### VICE-PRESIDENT OF THE UNITED STATES.

# DANIEL D. TOMPKINS, of New-York, \$5,000 per annum.

The Vice-President is, ex-officio, President of the Senate; and as President of the Senate, in virtue of an act of the 3th of May, 1792, one of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund. His salary, of 5,000 dollars per annum, is fixed by the act of 18th of February, 1793. The Vice President is not a member of the Cabinet. The ordinary duties of this officer is, to preside in the Senate of the United States. When he does not officiate in that station, his place is supplied by a President of the Senate pro tempore, who is chosen from the body of Senators by ballot, and receives additional compensation for his services.]

# DEPARTMENT OF STATE.

The Department of State was created by the act of 15th September, 1789. Previously to that period, by Act of 27th July, 1789, it was denominated the Department of Foreign Affairs.

## Secretary and Clerks.

The Secretary is, ex-officio, a Commissioner of the Sinking Fund, and, by usage, a member of the Cabinet. He corresponds officially with the Public Ministers of the United States at Foreign Courts, and with the Ministers of Foreign Powers resident in the United States. He performs the main duties of what, in other Governments, is called the Home Department; has the control of the office which issues Patents for useful Inventions, and preserves the evidence of Copy-Rights. He holds his office at the will of the President.]

The king having re-established his court in Portugal, the future residence of any Public Minister accredited to that sovereign, will be at Lisbon, the ancient seat of the Portuguese monarchy.]

[Consuls to Barbary are more of Diplomatic than Commercial Agents; not only as it regards their vocation, but also as it respects their compensation. They receive regular annual salaries; and their pay does not, in the least, depend on fees of any kind. There has been no change in this branch of the public service, during 1821.]

#### CONSULS AND COMMERCIAL AGENTS OF THE UNITED STATES.

Consuls of the United States, generally so called, are, in effect, Agents for Commerce and Seamen; which latter denomination, for particular reasons, is given to some of this class of public officers. They receive no yearly salaries; and their compensation is derived from the fees which are allowed by law. The amount of these fees depends, of course, upon the state of foreign trade, which is perpetually fluctuating. Consuls of the United States, for commercial purposes, are regularly admitted and recognised, as to their official functions, in the ports of Christian Europe; but in the colonies of the European nations, lagents for commerce and seamen mostly exercise the duties of their stations under courtesy, without any formal recognition; and, in some instances, from the jealousy of colonial policy, they have not been permitted to exercise them at all. In their public capacity, Consuls and Agents for Commerce and Seamen, are principally occupied in verifying, in different forms, the legality of the trade of the United States with foreign nations, and in relieving and sending home American seamen, who, by accident or misfortune, are left destitute within the jurisdiction of their several consulates and agencies.]

## TREASURY DEPARTMENT.

The office of Secretary of the Treasury was created by Act of the 2nd of September, 1789. He superintends all the fiscal concerns of the government, and, upon his own responsibility, recommends to Congress measures for improving the condition of the revenue. He holds his office at the will of the President; is, by usage, a member of the Cabinet: and, exofficio, one of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund. an act of Congress, of the 15th of May, 1820, the Treasury Department has been invested with extraordinary powers for the recovery of public moneys not accounted for or withheld by officers receiving them prior to such moneys being paid Warrants of distress, in the nature of into the Treasury. executions upon judgments, are authorized upon certificates of balances from the first Comptroller, against principals and sureties in default; and the judges of the United States are, by the same law, clothed with extensive chancery jurisdiction, with a view of ameliorating any undue severity to individuals, which may possibly occur under the warrants in question. Accounts of the government are finally settled at the Treasury Department; for which purpose it is divided into the office of the Secretary, (who superintends the whole, but who is not, therefore, absolute, with respect to the power of adjusting claims or of paying money;) into two Comptrollers, five Auditors, a Register, and a Treasurer. Auditors of the public accounts are empowered to administer oaths or affirmations to witnesses in any case in which they may deem it necessary for the due examination of the accounts with which they are charged. Besides the disbursement of moneys for the great objects of government, there are contingent funds appropriated yearly by Congress. These

are expended for such objects as could not well be foreseen, by some one of the clerks or other officer belonging to each of the departments, who is especially entrusted with that business, to whom the accounts of such contingencies must be presented. He takes a receipt in his own name, and at the end of each quarter of a year is brought to a settlement himself, for all his disbursements, at the Treasury Department.]

#### FIRST COMPTROLLER'S OFFICE.

The first Comptroller examines all accounts settled by the First and Fifth Auditors, and certifies the balances arising thereon to the Register; countersigns all warrants drawn by the Secretary of the Treasury, if warranted by law; reports to the Secretary the official forms to be used in the different offices for collecting the public revenue; and the manner and form of keeping and stating the accounts of the several persons employed therein. He superintends the preservation of the public accounts subject to his revision, and provides for the regular payment of all moneys which may be collected.—

It is the duty of the First Comptroller to superintend the recovery of all debts due to the United States; to direct suits and legal proceedings, and to take all measures, authorized by law, to enforce prompt payment of all debts due to the United States.

### SECOND COMPTROLLER'S OFFICE.

[The Second Comptroller examines all accounts settled by the Second, Third, and Fourth Auditors, certifies the balances to the Secretary of the Department in which the expenditure has been incurred; countersigns all warrants drawn by the Secretaries of the War and Navy Departments, warranted by law; reports to the Secretaries the official forms to be used in the different offices for disbursing the public money in those Departments, and the manner and form of keeping and stating the accounts of the persons employed therein. It is also his duty to superintend the preservation of the public accounts subject to his revision.]

The Fifth Auditor receives all accounts accruing in, or relative to, the Department of State, the General Post Office, and those erising out of Indian Trade, examines them, certifies the balances, and transmits the accounts with the vouchers and certificate, to the First Comptroller, for his decision upon them. To the Fifth Auditor, also, has been assigned the duties of Commissioner of the Revenue, in relation to the final adjustment of the accounts concerning the Direct Tax, and Internal Duties, according to the Act of 23d December, 1817. It is understood that the superintendency of this branch of the public revenue is drawing to a close, and that, during the present year, it will have been so diminished as to require but a comparatively small space of official attention. The Fifth Auditor has, in the course of the past year, been designated by the President, under the provisions of the Act of the 15th of May, 1820, as agent of the Treasury, for enforcing the payment of moneys due to the United States.]

### REGISTER'S OFFICE.

[The Register of the Treasury keeps all accounts of the receipts and expenditures of the public money, and of all debts due to or from the United States; he keeps the District Tonnage Accounts of the United States; he receives from the Comtrollers the accounts which have been finally adjusted, and, with their vouchers and certificates, preserves them; he records all warrants for the receipt or payment of moneys at the Treasury, certifies the same thereon, and transmits to the Secretary of the Treasury copies of the certificates of balances of accounts adjusted. By an Act of the 10th of February, 1820, it is made the duty of the Register of the Treasury to prepare Statistical Accounts of the Commerce of the United States, to be laid before the Congress. These accounts are made up from the quarterly returns of the Collectors of the Customs, and exhibit, in a very accurate manner, the

foreign commerce of the United States. The Act went into operation on the 30th of September, 1820, and the result of the first report under its provisions, made at the first session of the seventeenth Congress, will be found in this volume.]

officer is at once an aid and a check. The Surveyor superintends and directs the inferior officers of the Customs; and all three are appointed by the President and Senate.— They, formerly, held their offices for an indefinite period; but, by an Act of 15th May, 1820, their appointment is now limited to four years. Weighers, Gaugers Measurers, and Inspectors, are appointed by the Collector, with the approbation of the principal officer of the Treasury Department. For the duties of these several officers, see the Act of Congress of the 2d of March, 1799. Public Appraisers are authorized by an Act of the 20th of April, 1818. Their business is to appraise imported goods subject to duty ad valorem, when they are suspected to have been invoiced below the true value. They are appointed by the President and Senate.

The order of arrangement of officers of the Customs, this year, differs from the preceding. They are now given by States and Districts; showing, at one view, all employed, (including the Superintendents and Keepers of Light Houses,) in each District

of each State, separately.]

#### COLLECTORS OF INTERNAL REVENUE.

The business of the Internal Revenue has been drawn much towards a close during the present year, under the provisions of the Act of the 23d of December, 1817; and by the year 1823 it will occupy but a very small share of official attention. Those Collectors who have entirely adjusted their accounts can be considered as only nominally in office, if regarded in that light at all; although there may, and probably will, be questions, in which their knowledge must be extremely useful, both to Government and individuals. Hence most of the offices have been continued, but, of course, without current emolument to the officers, even after their accounts have been finally settled. Where no sum appears opposite a name, the accounts may be viewed in general as wholly closed." In several cases districts have been united, forming now but one; the authority to do which the President has in virtue of the provisions of the Act of the 23d of December, 1817. The subjoined list has been newly made out, for the purpose of present publication.]

#### MILITARY ESTABLISHMENT.

[A great change has taken place in the Military Establishment during the past year. By an Act of Congress of the 2d of March, 1821, it was ordained that the Military Peace Establishment of the United States should be composed as follows—

4 regiments of Artillery.

7 regiments of infantry.

The corps of Engineers, Bombardiers excepted.

An Adjutant General and two Inspectors General.

A Quarter Master General.

A Commissary General of Subsistence.

A Paymaster General.

A Commissary of Purchases.

A Surgeon General.

The Army to be commanded by one Major General and two Brigadier Generals.

The Ordnance Department merged in the Artillery.

By this new organization the Army has been reduced from ten to six thousand men. The Law took effect on the 1st of June, 1821.

Under this arrangement several important regulations have taken place. The Major General's Head Quarters have been fixed at Washington; and the Pay Department has been so remodelled as to secure a more strict accountability in the disbursement of public moneys under its superintendence.

At the same time a System of General Regulations, compiled by Gen. Scott, was adopted for the Army, and for the Militia when in the service of the United States.

The Topographical Engineers and their Assistants, as previous-

ly organized, were retained in service.

The President of the United States is, ex-officio, commander in chief of the Army, and directs its operations by orders issued through the Department of War.]

#### MILITARY ACADEMY.

The Military Academy consists of the corps of Engineers, of one Professor and Assistant Professor of Natural and Experimental Philosophy, one Professor and Assistant Professor of Mathematics, one Professor and Assistant Professor of the Art of Engineering in all its branches, a Chaplain and Professor of Ethics, a Teacher of Drawing, a Surgeon and a Sword Master. The Cadets are limited to two hundred and fifty in number: They may be attached, at the discretion of the President of the United States, as students to the Military Academy, and become subject to its regulations: They are arranged into companies of non-commissioned officers and privates, for the purposes of military instruction: there are four musicians to each company; and the corps is trained and taught all the duties of a private, non-commissioned officer, and officer; is encamped at least three months of each year, and instructed in all the duties incident to a regular camp. Candidates for Cadets must not be under fourteen, nor above twenty-one years of age; and each Cadet, previously to his appointment by the President, must be versed in reading, writing, and arithmetic, and must sign articles, with the consent of his parent or guardian, thereby engaging to serve five years, unless sooner discharged. The pay of a Cadet is sixteen dollars per month and two rations per When any Cadet has received a regular degree from the Academic Staff, after going through all the classes, he is considered as among the candidates for a commission in any corps, according to the duties he may be judged competent to perform; and if there is not, at the time, a vacancy in such corps, he may be attached to it at the discretion of the President, by brevet of the lowest grade, until a vacancy shall happen. The Military Academy is seated at West Point, in the State of New-York, on the river Hudson.]

#### INDIAN TRADE AND INDIAN AFFAIRS.

The act of the 7th of August, 1789, enjoins on the Secretary of War to execute such duties relative to Indian Affairs as may be confided to him; and, under this authority, he superintends the negotiation of Indian Treaties, and other matters connected with Indian Agencies and Trade, which, from the necessary association between the subjection and civilization of the aborigines, within the territorial limits of the United States, intermingle themselves with the Military Establishment. Trade with the Indians is regulated by the act of the 2d of March, 1811, which, however, is limited in its duration to the 3d of June, 1822; when it will expire, unless renewed by an act of the first session of the 17th Congress. The whole system is conducted by a superintendent, factors, and agents, and agents for Indian Affairs; all of whom are appointed according to the act of the 16th of April, 1818, and are obliged to give bond with securities for the faithful performance of their duties. The pecuniary accountability of this branch of the public service is to the Treasury Department, through the Fifth Auditor.]

#### NAVY DEPARTMENT.

The office of Secretary of the Navy was created by Act of the 30th of April, 1798. He issues all orders to the Navy of the United States, and superintends the concerns of the Naval Establishment generally. A Board of Navy Commissioners was instituted by Act of 7th February, 1815, to aid him in the discharge of his duties. The Secretary of the Navy is, by usage, a Member of the Cabinet; and holds his office at the will of the President.

#### Navy List-Secretary, &c... Captains.

The only change that has taken place in relation to the progress of the Naval Establishment since the publication of the 2d volume of the National Calendar, (1821,) is a reduction in the annual appropriation for the increase of the Navy of half a million of dollars a year. The sum total, originally intended for this object, however, has not been diminished, but only extended through a greater length of time. By the Act of 3d of March, 1821, there stand appropriated for this purpose 500,000 dollars per annum for six years.

#### MARINE CORPS.

The Peace Establishment of this corps is fixed by Act of 3d March, 1817. It consists of a Lieutenant Colonel Commandant, 9 Captains, 24 First Lieutenants, 16 Second Lieutenants, one Adjutant and Inspector, one Paymaster, one Quartermaster, 73 Corporals, 42 Drums and Fifes, and 750 privates. By an accidental omission in the Act fixing the Establishment, Sergeants are not mentioned: But as this was understood to be a mere mistake in transcribing the law, they have been retained as indispensable to such a corps. The Head Quarters are at the City of Washington, where drafts are made from time to time, to supply the demands of the Naval Service.





#### Compensation and Privileges.

#### THE CONGRESS.

The Congress of the United States consists of the Senate and House of Representatives; the former composed of 48 in num-

ber, the latter of 189, of whom two are Delegates.

In the same column with the Senators, in this Register, opposite the name of each, is stated the year in which, according to their present classes, they will vacate their seats. There are two Senators from each State. They were originally divided into three classes; and one-third of them are rechosen every second year, for the term of six years. They are chosen by the legislatures of the States. When a new State is admitted into the Union, the Secretary of the Senate puts into the ballot-box two numbers, upon paper of equal size, one of which is drawn out by each of the two Senators from the new State; the Senate having determined, by a previous order, to which class each Senator so drawing the one or the other number shall belong.

The Senate have, upon all the principal nominations by the President of the United States, a voice of advice and consent, or otherwise; in which case it sits with closed doors. The journal of its proceedings is then secret. They have also a vote in the ratification of treaties; in which case it is indispensable that two-thirds of them should consent. The Senate is also a court for the trial of high crimes and misdemeanours, upon im-

peachments by the House of Representatives.

The President of the Senate has a casting vote only in case of an equal division of the votes of the Senators. The Vice-President of the United States, when he acts as President of the Senate, receives no addition to his pay as Vice-President, which is \$5000 per annum. The President pro tempore, during the period of his services, receives \$16 per diem for every day he attends.

The Senate is the only perpetual body in the federal government. The perpetuity, however, belongs to it only in its character of Senate; the individual members being renewed, as stated, by successive thirds, biennially.

The House of Representatives is composed of a fixed number of members from each State in the Union, each of whom is

elected every two years by the people.

The Speaker of the House of Representatives is chosen by a majority of the members of the House, for the term of the Congress to which he belongs as a member of the House. His privileges are the same as those of any other member; and his compensation is \$16 per diem.

Each Senator and Representative receives, for his services, \$8 per diem, during the period of his attendance in the Senate

or House; and, in case of sickness, this compensation is continued. The same allowance is made to each, for every 20 miles of the usual road in going to and returning from the seat of

government.

The Congress must assemble, at least, once in every year, on the first Monday in December, if not otherwise provided by law. The President of the United States may convene them at any time, upon giving forty days notice. Neither House can adjourn for more than three days, without the consent of the other, nor to any other place than that in which the two houses shall be sitting. In case of disagreement about the time, the President of the United States may adjourn them to such time as he thinks proper. The Senate and House each form their own rules; and are, respectively, judges of their own elections.

Both Senators and Representatives are, in all cases, except treason, felony, and breach of the peace, privileged from arrest during their attendance at the session of their respective Houses, and in going to, or returning from, the same; and for any speech or debate in either House, they cannot be questioned in any other place. They cannot hold offices under the federal government while acting as members. Bills for raising revenue must originate in the House; and the House, solely, has the power of impeachment.

Members of Congress are prohibited by law, either directly or indirectly, from undertaking, in whole or in part, any contract,

&c. with the United States.

Each Senator and Representative has the privilege of franking packets and letters, not exceeding two ounces in weight each, during the session, and for thirty days before and afterwards. The Secretary of the Senate and Clerk of the House have the same privilege. In case of larger documents, a special law exempts them from postage.

As there is no periodical renewal of the Senate, the officers of that body are not appointed for any stated time. In the House of Representatives, which is renewed every second year, all the

officers are elected at the first Session of each Congress.

#### COMMITTEES OF CONGRESS.

The Committees of the Senate are elected by ballot. Those

of the House are appointed by the Speaker.

To these committees, in either House, is confided the initiation of business. They report to the Senate or the house, by bill or otherwise; and, upon such report, the Senate or House go in committee of the whole; in which form of proceeding the whole body of members is regarded as one committee; the president or speaker quits his chair, and some one member is called to preside as the chairman. In this committee a wide latitude of discussion is allowed, and having made progress, or come to some determination on the subject under consideration, it rises and reports progress, asks leave to sit again, or to be discharged from that business, or reports in a conclusive manner, affirmatively or negatively; and the Senate or House grant or refuse the leave or discharge, or confirm or reject the report of the committee. This form of procedure is eminently calculated to prevent precipitation in measures of importance; and it is only in committee of the whole that the president and speaker can take part in the debate.

## Pay of Members, &c.

## PAY OF MEMBERS OF CONGRESS.

From the first Congress, in 1739, inclusive, until the 4th of March, 1795, Senators and Representatives received each six dollars per diem, and six dollars for every twenty miles travel. From the 4th of March, 1795, to the 4th March, 1796, Senators received \$7 per diem and \$7 for every twenty miles travel, and Representatives only \$6. From the 4th March, 1796, until the 4th December, 1815, the per diem was \$6, and the mileage \$6 to Senators and Representatives. From the 4th of December, 1815, until the 4th March, 1817, each Senator and Representative received \$1500 per annum, with a proportional deduction for absence from any cause but sickness. The President of the Senate pro tempore, and Speaker of the House, \$3000 per annum each. From the 4th of March, 1817, the compensation to members of both branches of Congress has been \$8 per diem, and \$8 for every twenty miles travel.

#### Judicial Powers, &c.

#### JUDICIARY.

The judicial power of the United States is vested in one Supreme Court, and in such inferior Courts as Congress, from time to time, establish. The present judicial establishment of the United States, consists of a Supreme Court, of twentyeight District Courts, and seven Circuit Courts; which are thus organized; the Supreme Court is composed of one Chief I Justice and six Associate Justices, who hold a Court in the City of Washington annually: besides which, each of these Justices attends in a certain Circuit, comprising two or more Districts, appropriated to each, and, together with the Judge of the District, compose a Circuit Court, which is holden in each District of the Circuit. The District Courts are held, respectively, by the District Judge alone. Appeals are allowed from the District to the Circuit Courts, and from the Circuit to the Supreme Court: and, in some cases, where the inconvenience of attending the Court by a Justice of the Supreme Court is very great, the District Courts are invested with Circuit Court powers. Each State is one District, for the purpose of holding District and Circuit Courts therein, with the exception of New-York, Pennsylvania, Virginia, and Tennessee, each of which is divided into two Districts .-There are, besides, Territorial Courts, which are temporary, and lose that character whenever a Territory becomes a State. In addition to the District Court for the District of Columbia, there is a Circuit Court for that District, which exercises, under the authority of Congress, similar common law and equity jurisdiction as the County Courts of Maryland and Virginia. Each Court has a Clerk, a Public Attorney or Prosecutor, and a Marshal; all of whom are appointed by the Executive of the United States, with the exception of the Clerks, who are appointed by the Courts. The compensation of the Judges is fixed by law; that of the Clerks, Attorneys, and Marshals, consists of fees, and, in a few instances, as it regards Attorneys and Marshals, of a yearly salary of about 200 dollars. It is very difficult to ascertain the amount per annum of the fees received in each case, as the payment of them, is frequently procrastinated, and in some cases they are entirely lost.

To the following list of judicial officers have been affixed the dates of their respective commissions. These dates have reference to their first appointments when confirmed by the advice and consent of the Senate, except in one or two instances,

#### Supreme and District Courts.

where the appointments, having been made during the past year in the recess of the Senate, are temporary, and remain for confirmation. By an Act of Congress of the 15th of May, 1820, District Attorneys are to be appointed for four years only, removeable at pleasure. Marshals have always held their offices for four years, removeable at pleasure, in pursuance of the 27th section of the Act of the 24th of September, 1789; so that the Marshals who have held their places from an early date, have been recommissioned many times. The Judges hold their offices during good behaviour, and can only be removed on impeachment. Missouri having become a State, will, as has been customary in similar cases, be erected into a Judicial District at the first Session of the Seventeenth Congress, in which case the officers will be announced in the Calendar for 1823.]

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Places and Times of Holding the Supreme, District, and Circuit Courts of the United States.

## SUPREME COURT:

The Supreme Court of the United States must be holden at the City of Washington, and have one session every year, to commence on the first Monday in February.

## DISTRICT COURTS.

For Maine, to be holden at Wiscasset, on the last Tuesday of February, and second Tuesday of September annually; and

at Portland, on the first Tuesday of June, annually.

For New-Hampshire, to be holden at Exeter and Portsmouth alternately, on the third Tuesday of December, 1789, and three other sessions, progressively, on the like Tuesday of every third calendar month thereafter.

For Massachusetts, at Boston, on the third Tuesday in March, the fourth Tuesday in June, the second Tuesday in September,

and the first Tuesday in December, annually.

For Rhodé-Island, at Newport, on the second Tuesday in May, and third Tuesday in October; at Providence the first Tuesday in August, and first Tuesday in February, annually.

For Connecticut, at Hartford and New-Haven alternately, on the fourth Tuesdays of February, May, August, and No-

vember, annually.

For New-York, at the city of New-York for the southern district, on the first Tuesday of November, 1789, and three other sessions on the first Tuesday of every third calendar month in

each year thereafter; and, for the northern district, at Albany, on the last Tuesday of January, and at Utica, on the last Tuesday of August.

For Vermont, at Rutland, on the tenth day of October, and

at Windsor, on the 27th day of May, annually.

For New-Jersey, at New-Brunswick and Burlington, alternately, on the first Tuesday of November, 1789, and three other sessions, progressively, on the like Tuesday of every third calendar month thereafter.

For the eastern district of Pennsylvania, at Philadelphia, on the third Mondays in February, May, August, and November, annually; and for the western district, at Pittsburg, on the first Monday of May, and second Monday of October, annually.

For Delaware, at Newcastle and Dover alternately, on the fourth Tuesday of November, 1789, and three other sessions, progressively, on the fourth Tuesday of every third calendar

month thereafter.

For Maryland, at Baltimore, on the first Tuesday of December, 1789, and, progressively, on the first Tuesday of every third calendar month thereafter.

For the eastern district of Virginia, at Richmond, on the second day of April, and fifteenth day of October; and at Norfolk, on the first day of May and first day of November, annually, and, for the western district, at Wythe court-house, on the first Mondays of May and October; at Lewisburg, on the second Mondays of May and October; and at Clarksburg, on the fourth Mondays of May and October.

For Kentucky, at Frankfort, on the second Monday in May,

and first Monday in December.

For Ohio, at Columbus, on the second Monday in January

and September, annually.

For North-Carolina, at Edenton, in and for the district of Albemarle, on the third Monday of April and third Monday of October; at Newbern, in and for the district of Pamptico, on the first Monday after the third Monday of April and third Monday of October; at Wilmington, in and for the district of Cape Fear, on the second Monday after the third Monday of April, and third Monday of October, annually.

For South-Carolina, at Charleston, on the third Monday in March and September, and the first Monday in July, and se-

cond Monday in December, annually.

For Tennessee, at Knoxville, for East Tennessee, on the third Monday in April and second Monday in October; and, at Nashville, for West Tennessee, on the fourth Mondays in May and November.

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# Places and Times of Holding District and Circuit Courts.

For Georgia, in the city of Savannah, on the second Tuesdays in February, May, and August; and in Augusta, on the second

Tuesday in November.

For Louisiana, four stated sessions, to be held at the city of New-Orleans; the first was to commence on the third Monday of July, 1812, and the three other sessions, progressively, on the third Monday of every third calendar month thereafter.

For Indiana, at Corydon, on the first Mondays in May and

November annually.

For Mississippi, at Natchez, two sessions annually, on the first Mondays in January and July.

For Illinois, at Vandalia, two sessions annually, on the first

Mondays of May and December.

For Alabama, at Mobile, on the first Mondays of January and June; and at Cahawba, on the first Mondays of April and November, annually.

#### CIRCUIT COURTS.

In the district of Maine, at Portland, on the eighth of May, and at Wiscasset, on the eighth day of October, annually.

In the district of New-Hampshire, at Portsmouth and Exeter, alternately, on the nineteenth day of May and the second day of November, annually.

These are all the changes which, in the course of the year 1821, have taken place in the foreign legations near the government of the United States.]

## PATENTS:

The general law concerning the issuing of Patents, provides for citizens only; but a subsequent one provides also for aliens who have resided two years, or upwards, in the United States,

In applying for a patent it is necessary to observe every legal

form. The following is the mode of application.

Every inventor, before he presents his petition, shall pay into the Treasury of the United States, thirty dollars, in specie, or notes of the bank of the United States, for which he will be furnished with duplicate receipts, one of which he shall present to the Secretary of State, when he presents his petition; and the money thus paid shall be in full for the sundry services to be performed in the office of the Secretary of State, consequent to such petition. That your petitioner has invented a new and useful improvement or art, machine, manufacture or composition of matter, [or any new and useful improvement in any art, machine, manufacture, or composition of matter] in \_\_\_\_\_\_, not known or used before his application, the advantages of which, he is desirous of securing to himself and his legal representatives; he therefore prays that letters patent of the United States, may be issued, granting unto your petitioner, his heirs, administrators or assigns, the full and exclusive right of making, constructing, using, and vending to others to be used, his said improvement, (art, invention, machine, manufacture, or composition of matter, &c.) agreeably to the acts of Congress in such case made and provided; your petitioner having paid thirty dollars into the Treasury of the United States, and complied with all other provisions of the said acts.

The specification or description of the machine, art, discovery, or invention, must be given in clear and specific terms, designating it from all other inventions; and describing the whole in such a manner, as to comprehend not only the form and construction, if a machine, but also the mode of using the same; and if it be only an improvement on a certain machine, it ought to be so described; and, as this specification enters into, and forms part of the patent, it must be without any references to a model or drawing, and must be signed by the applicant or applicants, before two witnesses. It is material that this be in

good language, and correctly written.

The following, or a similar oath or affirmation, taken before any person qualified to administer an oath, by the applicant or applicants, must be subjoined to the specification, if a citizen of the United States:

#### Laws Relative to Patents.

If not a citizen, the following addition must be made to the declaration, that he verily believes himself to be the true and original inventor or discoverer of the art, &c.: "And that the same hath not, to the best of his knowledge or belief, been known or used, either in this or any foreign country. ——." "Also that he hath resided in the United States for two years and upwards."

It is not necessary that the time of residence should immedi-

ately precede the application.

If any inventor or discoverer should die intestate, before an application be made for a patent, his legal representatives may apply for a patent, in trust for the heirs at law, otherwise in trust for the devisees.

The specification must be accompanied by a good drawing, in perspective, of the whole machine, or apparatus, where the nature of the case admits of drawings; or with specimens of the ingredients, and of the composition of matter, sufficient in quantity for the purpose of experiment, where the invention is of a composition of matter. And such inventor shall, moreover, deliver a model of this machine, provided the Secretary shall deem such model to be necessary. It is requisite in giving a drawing of the machine, to give also sectional drawings of the interior when the machine is complex; and every drawing should be accompanied with explanatory references. If the machine be complex, a model will likewise be necessary, not only to explain and render it comprehensible to a common capacity, but also to prevent infringements of rights.

The drawings ought not to exceed a quarto size, and if confined to octavo, they would be still better, where it can be done

conveniently and distinct'y.

The papers must all be directed to the superintendent of the Patent Office, under cover to the Secretary of State, which, of course, renders them free of postage; but if models be sent, their freight or carriage hither must be paid, and before packing them, the name or names of the inventor or inventors should be written thereon, with the name of the machine, and the date.

The Congress, being impressed with a high sense of the value of the inventions of our citizens, have purchased an elegant and extensive building, wherein preparations are made for the accommodation of a very numerous collection of the machines illustrative of American genius; and this MUSEUM OF THE ARTS, it is presumed, will stimulate inventors to send models of the productions of their ingenuity in a style that will rather honour than discredit themselves and our country.

#### METHOD OF SECURING COPY-RIGHTS.

To secure the copy-rights of books, maps, charts, engravings, prints, &c. it is necessary to comply with the following provisions, contained in the acts of Congress of May 31st, 1790, and April 29th, 1802.

1. Before the publication of any book, map, or thart, a printed title thereof must be deposited in the office of the Clerk of the District Court where the author or proprietor shall reside.

It is the duty of the Clerk of such Court to record such title, in a book to be kept by him for that purpose, in the words following:—

"District of ——, to wit: Be it remembered, that on the —— day of ——, in the —— year of the Independence of the United States of America, ———, of the said District, —— deposited in this office, the title of a book, the right whereof —— claim as ———, in the words following, to wit:

[Here insert the title of the book.]

"In conformity to an act of the Congress of the United States, entitled, 'An act for the encouragement of learning, by securing the copies of maps, charts, and books, to the authors and proprietors of such copies, during the times therein mentioned,' and also to the act, entitled, 'An act supplementary to the act entitled, an act for the encouragement of learning, by securing the copies of maps, charts, and books, to the authors and proprietors of such copies, during the times therein mentioned; and extending the benefits thereof to the arts of designing, etching, and engraving historical and other prints.'

Clerk of the District of ——,"

And the said Clerk shall give a copy thereof to the said author or proprietor, if required to do so.

For recording the aforesaid title and certificate, the Clerk shall be entitled to receive sixty cents from the said author or proprietor, and sixty cents for every copy under seal, actually

given to such author or proprietor, as aforesaid.

2. The author or proprietor shall, within two months from the date of the above certificate, cause a copy thereof to be published in one or more of the newspapers printed in the United States, for the space of four weeks. And he shall, in addition (if a book or books,) cause a copy of the said record to be in-

serted at full length, in the title page, or in the page immediately following the title; and if a map, chart, engraving, historical or other print, he shall cause the following words to be impressed on the face thereof: " Entered, according to act of Congress, the — day of —, 18—, by —, of the State of —," which must be printed on every such map, chart, or print.

3. The proprietor or author, to be entitled to such copy right,

must be a citizen or resident of the United States.

4. He must, also, within six months from the publication of such book, &c. deliver, or cause to be delivered to the Secretary

of State, a copy thereof, to be preserved in his office.

5. The author or proprietor, or their executors, administrators, or assigns, shall, on complying with all the requisitions of the law, be entitled to the sole right and liberty of printing, publishing, or vending, such book, map, &c. for the space of fourteen years after recording the title thereof in the Clerk's office, as aforesaid. And if, at the expiration of said term, the author be living, and a citizen of the United States, or a resident therein, the same exclusive right shall be continued to him, in the same manner, for the further term of fourteen years. In the latter case the title must be a second time recorded and published as before directed; and that within six months before the expiration of the first term of fourteen years.

If any other person shall, (after the recording and publishing of any book, map, &c. as aforesaid, and within the times prescribed by law,) print, publish, or import from any foreign kingdom or state, or cause the same to be done; or knowing any book, &c. to be so printed, published, or imported, shall sell, expose to sale, or cause to be sold, any book, &c. (without first obtaining from the proprietor thereof, permission in writing, to be signed in presence of two credible witnesses,) any copy thereof, such offender shall forfeit every copy thereof, and every sheet, being part of the same, to the author or proprietor of such book, map. or chart, who shall forthwith destroy the same. And every such offender shall forfeit and pay fifty cents for every sheet found in his possession, printed, &c. contrary to the true intent and meaning of the law: Provided action shall be commenced against him within one year after the offence shall have been committed. One half of the forfeiture goes to the prosecutor, and the other to the United States.

Any person who shall print or publish any manuscript, with. out the consent of the author or proprietor, (he being a citizen or resident of the U. States,) given as above, shall be liable to suffer and pay to the said author or proprietor, all damages oc-15

casioned by such injury.

# Newspapers authorized to Publish the Laws.

The law is the same with regard to historical and other prints; with this exception, that offenders forfeit one dollar for every sheet printed, published, imported, or sold, contrary to law.

Any person not legally entitled to the right of any book, map, chart, historical or other print, who shall insert therein, or impress thereon, that the same has been entered according to act of Congress, or words purporting the same, or that the copyright thereof has been obtained, shall forfeit and pay one hundred dollars; one half of which shall go to the prosecutor, and the other half to the United States.

# PUBLIC LANDS.

[The National Domain, or Public Lands of the United States, consist of large bodies of territory ceded by the States which, in virtue of their several charters, laid claim to the jurisdiction; of all the lands held by France under the name of Louisiana, which was purchased from that government, according to the treaty of session of the 30th of April, 1803; and and of all the lands, owned by the Spanish government, in the Floridas, which was ceded by Spain to the United States, by the treaty of amity, settlement, and limits, of Feb. 22, 1819.

### Public Lands.

The usual process of sale of these lands, is, 1st. The extinguishment of the Indian title, which is effected by paying an equivalent in money and goods: 2d. The laying off the territory to which the Indian title has been thus extinguished into land districts, and the establishment of land offices therein. The duties of these land offices are discharged, in each instance, by a register and a receiver of public moneys.

The lands are surveyed before they are offered for sale. They are divided into townships six miles square, which are subdivided into thirty-six sections one mile square, containing each 640 acres; and sold in sections, half sections, quarter

sections, and half-quarter sections.

Prior to the 1st of July, 1820, sales were made upon credit. But indulgences of this kind having been abused to a very great extent, as well by public officers as by individuals, a debt to the government from the latter having accumulated to the amount of twenty-two millions of dollars, and a defalcation of payments from the receivers of public moneys to the sum of six hundred and seventy-eight thousand dollars, an act was passed on the 24th of April, 1820, which put an end to the system of credit. By that act, all sales after the 1st of July, 1820, are to be made for cash. Complete payment must be made on the day of purchase. Purchasers at private sale must produce a receipt for the money before entry; and the highest bidder at public sale failing to pay, the tract is to be again offered, and the failing bidder is rendered incapable of purchasing at such sales. By the same act the minimum price of lands is fixed at one dollar and twenty-five cents per acre, below which they cannot be disposed of. Lands forfeited for nonpayment must be offered at public before private sale. In case of different applications at private sale, for the same tract, the highest bidder is to have the preference.

Due notice is given by the Commissioner of the General Land Office, of the times and places at which the sales of the public lands are to take place; and all patents for lands sold or granted by the United States are issued by that officer, upon certificates from the several land officers or military land warrants, in pursuance of various laws of the United States.

The different titles by which lands are held under the authority

of the United States, are,

1. Public and private purchases,

2. Virginia military bounties, for services in the Virginia line on continental establishment during the revolutionary war.

3. Grant to Connecticut of the Western Reserve.

5. Purchases under grant to the Ohio Company of Associates.

6. Purchases under grant to the United Brethren.

7. Revolutionary military bounties.

3. Military bounties of the war of 1812.

9. Bounty to refugees from Canada and Nova-Scotia during the revolutionary war.

10. Bounty to Canadian volunteers in the war of 1812.

11. Confirmation of British, French, and Spanish grants, as adjusted by Boards of Commissioners appointed for the purpose.

12. Special grants, by particular acts of Congress.

The President of the United States may remove, by force, un-

authorized settlers on the public lands.

Salt springs and lead mines are reserved from sale; but may be leased by the President: and one section of 640 acres, in each township, is given as a fund for the perpetual support of schools in the township. Besides which, large donations of land have been made in the new States generally, for the maintenance of seminaries of learning.

Warrants for Virginia military bounties issue from the Land Office of the State of Virginia, and are checked at the General Land Office of the United States, before the issuing of patents

on them.

Warrants for military bounties, both for revolutionary services and services in the war of 1812, issue from the Department of War.

Those warrants are in the nature of certificates, verifying the claim of the party to a patent for the specified number of acres. The location of the two latter classes of warrants is

determined by lot.

By an Act passed on the 2d of March, 1821, lands purchased prior to the 1st of July, 1820, and not wholly paid for, may be relinquished, by the legal holder of the certificate filing a notice, &c.; and the sums paid on account of the part relinquished, will be applied to discharge instalments due on lands not relinquished. For the provisions of this Act, see the Synopsis of the Acts passed at the 2d session of the 16th Congress, in this volume of the National Calendar, under the head, Lands, p. 211. There has been hitherto no official report on this subject, showing the quantity and value of the lands relinquished by the public debtors; and there will probably be none until the 2d session of the 17th Congress.]

### COINS AND CURRENCY.

Denuminations and Intrinsic Value of the Coins of the U. States.

The money of account of the United States is directed by law to be expressed in dollars, or units; dimes, or tenths; cents, or hundredths; and mills, or thousandths: a dime being the tenth part of a dollar; a cent, the hundredth part of a dollar; and a mill the thousandth part of a dollar.

All accounts in the public offices, and all proceedings in the courts of the United Stares, must be kept in conformity to this regulation. The alloy of the gold coins is silver; that of silver

coins, copper.

### Rates of Postage, &c.

This establishment is under the superintendence of a Post Master General, who is aided in the discharge of its duties by two Assistants. He has the sole appointment of all deputy postmasters throughout the United States; the making of all contracts for carrying the mails; and, in brief, the control, according to law, of every thing relating to the institution. The revenue arising from the General Post Office has, for the most part, been expended upon the extension and improvement of the establishment, by which means the accommodation of the mail conveyance for letters, newspapers, pamphlets, &c. has, in a most extraordinary degree, been extended to the inhabitants of every part of the Union, even to the most remote territorial settlements.

During the year, the improvements authorized by the City, have more than kept pace with those of a private nature: a considerable number of the streets have been graduated and gravelled, and brick foot-ways extended in various directions: a new bridge has been erected across the Tyber, at 14th street, west, leading direct to the Potomac bridge, to the south, and to the New College to the north: the fountain of water on K street. north, is now brought down to G street, and affords upwards of 60 gallons per minute, instead of 40, as formerly stated, and has a head above Pennsylvania Avenue of, at least, 50 feet. The City Hall, which was commenced last year, is now completely covered in with slate, and the windows in; it presents a front of 251 feet, is 2 stories high at the wings, above the basement, and in the centre I story; a part of the building will be ready for the Corporation officers in June, next. The New Theatre has been finished, and the Old Theatre rebuilt for Assembly Rooms. The New Presbyterian Meeting-House, begun dast year, is completed : a neat and loftysteeple has been erected upon St. John's Church, being the first and only one, within the City. Ground immediately west of the Capitol has been enclosed by the Columbian Institute, for a Botanical Garden,

and promises to be both useful and ornamental to the City. The Centre Market-House has been enlarged and improved; but is not yet sufficiently spacious to accommodate the venders of meat and produce. West of the City-Hall an Unitarian Church has been erected. A call was made, by the House of Representatives, on the Commissioner of the Public Buildings, for a statement of the unimproved property in Washington, with its cash value; in answer to which, he states that, "Of the building lots, there remains unsold about 5,150: the reservations, together, contain 541 acres, 1 rood and 29 perches, or 23,584,845 square feet, equal to 4479 1-2 standard lots." And he estimates the value at 1,733,310 dollars.

In the vicinity of the City, several handsome country-houses have been erected. The Columbian College, adjoining the City, on a commanding eminence, is now finished, and ready for the reception of students: there have also been built two handsome dwellings, for the Professors, with the necessary out-

houses for the establishment.

## COLUMBIAN COLLEGE.

The Columbian College was incorporated by Congress, February 9, 1821. See page 205, of this volume. The College Edifice is 117 feet in front, by 47 feet in depth; it was begun in 1820, and finished in 1821.

The President's House is entirely covered with copper, but the Architect reports that some finishing will be necessary to be done next season, requiring about \$300. Thus the whole will be completed for about \$1100 less than the appropriation. The old Executive offices have been stated in the best manner, for the sum above stated, being \$4,263 33 less than the estimate and appropriation.

The whole of the stone work of the western projection is complete, except the chimneys, and some carved decoration in the cornice, and some pannels. The roofs are all raised, and covered with copper, except a small portion over the library. The east wall is raised within one course of what was expected,

and the walls of the rotunda are of the same level.

Considerable progress has been made in graduating the square, and regulating the grounds.





State and War Departments ... First Floor.



## THE FLORIDAS.

The Treaty ceding the Floridas to the United States, of the 22nd of February, 1819, having been ratified by the king of Spain, with the consent of the Cortes, on the 24th of October, 1820, and the ratification accepted by the President of the United States, by and with the advice and consent of the Senate, on the 22nd of February, 1821, Congress enacted a law, on the 3rd of March, 1821, for carrying it into execu-In virtue of this law, the President proceeded to organize a government in these Territories, and gave to Gen. Andrew Jackson three Commissions, to wit: 1. As Commissioner, to receive possession of the Floridas: 2. As Governor of the whole Territories taken possession of: 3. As Commissioner vested with special and extraordinary powers, conformably to the stipulations of the Treaty, and to the Act of Congress for carrying the same into execution. Some delay arose on the part of the Captain General of Cuba, in furnishing the necessary orders to the Spanish Governors at Pensacola and St. Augustine; but the Provinces were finally surrendered, within the time limited by the Treaty, East Florida on the 10th, and West Florida on the 17th of July, 1821. Governor Jackson remained a sufficient length of time at Pensacola to organize a temporary territorial government in both. On the 13th of November, 1821, however, he resigned his commission; which resignation having been accepted, the executive Governments are now in the hands of George Walton, the Secretary for West, and William D. G. Worthington, the Secretary for East, Florida. A bill has been reported in the House of Representatives, for the establishment of a regular territorial system, which, some time in the year 1822, will no doubt supersede the one at present in operation.]
