## Order of the Knights of the Golden Horseshoe, 1716-1916

(The object of this Order, as reorganized, is to perpetuate the memory of an important historical event. It, therefore, extends the privilege of membership not only to descendants of the original "Knights," but also to others of worthy lineage.)

THE Order of the "Knights of the Horseshoe," instituted in 1716 by the Colonial Governor Alexander Spotswood, of Virginia, was revived in the City of Washington on April 15, 1916.

It was just 200 years before that Governor Spotswood, man of vision as well as action, dreamed of crossing the Appalachian Mountains and was the first to successfully achieve his purpose. John Fontaine, who accompanied the expedition, wrote of the adventure: Hugh Jones, A. M., chaplain of the "Honorable Assembly" and minister at Jamestown, Va., retold the picturesque narrative in 1724; Howe the historian, Edward Ingle of Baltimore, and many others to whom the adventure made appeal, told the story, each in his own way. From these painters of past events is glimpsed a picture of Governor Spotswood and John Fontaine setting gavly out, on August 20, 1716, to attempt that which had hitherto been deemed impossible. They were joined en route between Williamsburg and Germanna by several gentlemen, 14 rangers and 4 Meherrin Indians. They carried ample provisions and did not lack liquid refreshment, for their scribe enumerates "white and red wine, asquebaugh, brandy shrub, two kinds of rum, champagne, canary, cherry punch and cider."

Before beginning the ascent, the well-mounted, well-armed company had their horses shod, horses being accustomed to traverse the low country, where there were few stones, without shoes, and then camping and eating and drinking by night and pressing sturdily on by day the party finally reached the mountain's summit, where they cut his Majesty's name upon the rock

of the highest peak, naming it Mount George, in honor of the sovereign, King George I, and the next highest peak Mount Alexander, in honor of Governor Spotswood. Finally the descended to the Valley of the Shenandoah, loaded their muske and feasted. They drank the health of the King in champage and fired a volley; the health of the Princess in burgundy an fired a volley; the health of all other members of the roys family in claret and fired a volley, and wound up by drinking the health of the energetic Governor who had led them to the promised land—not forgetting the volley.

And then they rode homeward as cheerily as they had set ou reaching Williamsburg on September 17, and having traveled 43 miles. To commemorate the event and encourage new ente prises and settlements westward, Governor Spotswood gave t each of the company a miniature golden horseshoe, set wit garnets to represent nail heads. Upon each was the inscription "Sic juvat transcendere montes" (Thus it is delightful to cro the mountains) and on the reverse side was inscribed The Tramo tane Order. Thus the members of the expedition were know as the "Knights of the Horseshoe" and any gentleman w entitled to wear this golden horseshoe that could prove he ha drunk his Majesty's health upon the summit of Mount Georg The golden emblem was handed down from year to year, but is believed that all have now disappeared. Among the last upon whom the honor was bestowed was an Indian. On September 12, 1722, Governor Spotswood ended the conference with the Five Nations by giving to the Indian speaking for the tribes th horseshoe which he wore upon his breast. He bade the inte preter tell the Indian the badge would help him cross th mountains and could be carried as a "pass" when his people can back to Virginia. Edward Ingle wrote in the Magazine American History in 1887: "As the middle figure in the field Western discovery between Christopher Columbus kissing th ground of San Salvador in 1492 and the explorers Lewis an Clarke making their way in 1803-1806 to the Pacific Coast, stand Alexander Spotswood, drinking on the summit of the Blue Ridge Mountains a health to his English sovereign."

Following a preliminary meeting held at the residence St. George Tucker Brooke, father of Francis J. Taliafer

rooke and a descendant of one of the original Knights, the rder of the Knights of the Golden Horseshoe was revived and a constitution adopted April 15, 1916, at the Octavia, the esidence of Dr. Joseph G. B. Bulloch, on Columbia Road, ashington, D. C. Its purpose is historical. Only those are igible whose ancestors performed service, military or civic, of the highest degree in the Colonies. The personal qualifications the eligible descendants must also measure up to standards pecified in the constitution. The following persons were elected ficers of the Order at the reorganization:

# Constitution of the National Order of the Knights of the Golden Horseshoe

#### PREAMBLE

Whereas, The history of a country may be defective by reason of imperfect research, and facts formerly well known may, through lapse of time, be questioned with respect to their uthenticity, we, therefore, desiring to revive the memories of the past and to keep a record of the historical events relating to this land of our forefathers, as well as to preserve to posterity the lineage of those who are numbered among the founders of the American commonwealth, do hereby revive and reorganize that historic Order instituted by Governor Alexander Spotswood, of Virginia, and known as the Knights of the Horseshoe.

#### ARTICLE I

#### Name

This Order shall be designated as the National Order of the Knights of the Golden Horseshoe, and the male members thereof shall be known as "Knights." The female members of the Order shall be known as Ladies of the Golden Horseshoe.

## ARTICLE II

#### Location

The headquarters of the Order shall be located in the City of Washington, District of Columbia, or wherever the President-General of the Order may maintain his legal residence.

## ARTICLE III

## Meetings

The seventeenth day of September, the day of Governor Spotswood's return to Williamsburg, Va., with his band of gentlemen from their westward journey of exploration and discovery, shall be designated as the Anniversary Meeting of this Order.

It shall be required to call meetings of the Order only when the Council deems it advisable or appropriate so to do, inasmuch as this organization shall be regarded rather according to the pattern of such foreign orders as the Knights of the Garter, the Knights of the Bath, etc., and therefore not subject to the necessity of regular stated meetings.

The City of Washington, or the locality where the President-General of the Order may be residing, shall be the place of meeting of the National Society.

# ARTICLE IV Object

To unite all members of the Order or their descendants to the end that a continuous record may be preserved of the only noble Order of Knights formed in Colonial days who, by their initiative and prowess, annexed to Virginia a vast territory, and that authentic genealogical lines of descent therefrom be kept so that future generations shall know who were the descendants of this illustrious band of original Knights, and to extend the right of admission to other desirable individuals whose ancestors achieved distinction in the Colonial period of American history.

## ARTICLE V

## Qualifications

All descendants, both male and female, of that band of gentlemen organized by Governor Spotswood and by him designated Knights of the Horseshoe, are eligible to this Order.

And, in addition to the aforesaid, the male and female descendants of Colonial military or naval officers in any of the Colonies from the earliest settlement and prior to the fourth of July, 1776; as also of all royal Governors, Lieutenant-Governors or Deputy Governors, Acting Governors, Speakers and Chaplains of any or all of the Colonial General Assemblies, and of the Virginia House of Burgesses, members of the Royal Governor's Council in each Colony or Province, all Secretaries of State, Auditors-General, Receivers-General, Treasurers, Attorneys-General, Secretaries of the Council, Judges of the Provincial Courts, Justices and Sheriffs of the counties, or any of similar status who held

sitions of separate individual function; also members of the and Assembly who, on October 10, 1649, proclaimed Charles as King of Virginia.

Membership in the Colonial General Assemblies, or the Virnia House of Burgesses, does not constitute an eligible claim, less such ancestor occupied in addition thereto one or more the offices or positions aforementioned.

#### ARTICLE VII

#### Covernment

There shall be a Supreme Council composed of the foregoing eneral Officers of the Order, and three members of the Council all constitute a quorum for the transaction of business, the tendment of the Constitution, the creation of offices and the extion and appointment of officers.

## ARTICLE VIII

General Duties of Officers

The duties of the officers of this Order shall be those ordinarily rformed by such officers in similar organizations.

## ARTICLE IX

Special Duties of Officers

The Provost-General shall appoint such officers of the several ates as may be deemed expedient, and there shall be for each ate an officer, not of the Council, who shall be the chief officer of the State in which he resides, and officially known as Knigh Commander of the State of \_\_\_\_\_\_ in America.

The Chancellor-General shall issue all certificates of member ship, and the said certificates shall bear the countersign of the Provost-General.

## ARTICLE X

## Membership

Membership shall be by invitation only, and the first fifty members to be elected shall be designated as "Original Members."

The Order may also admit to honorary membership certain dignituries of official position with the approval of the President-General and the Provost-General.

#### ARTICLE XI

#### Dues

The only fee required is ten (\$10) dollars, covering initiation fee and life membership.

## ARTICLE XII

#### Seal

The seal of this Order (heraldically blazoned) shall be as follows: Arms—Quarterly, 1 and 4, Argent, a chevron gule between three oak trees eradicated vert, (for Spotswood); 2 and 3, Or, a sword and an Indian arrow in saltire sable; in the distance mountains azure with the sun setting in the west.

Crest: An eagle displayed gules, looking to the sun in its splendor.

Supporters: Two cat-a-mountains proper.

Motto: Ad astra per aspera.

## ARTICLE XIII

## Insignia

The insignia shall consist of a golden horseshoe, studded with seven garnets and bearing on its reverse side the motto, Sic juvat transcendere montes, which shall be suspended from a ribbon of white silk charged with the red cross of St. George; the ribbon,

in turn, depending from a gold bar inscribed with the letters and figures 1716 KGH 1916, and surmounted by a plumed helmet of gold or silver. This design of insignia shall be limited to original members only, and may be worn only upon ceremonial or full-dress occasions.

The design of insignia which may be worn by all members of this Order shall be as follows:

QUARTERLY: 1 and 4, Argent a cross gules: 2, Or a mountain azure with the sun setting in the west: 3, Azure a knight armed cap-à-pie argent, all environed by a horseshoe with ends upward or, studded with seven garnets. A plumed helmet affronté argent, suspended by a ribbon of white silk, charged with a St. George's cross, and attached to a gold clasp ribbon bearing the legend KNIGHTS OF THE GOLDEN HORSE-SHOE, 1716-1916.

## ARTICLE XIV

#### Rosette

A rosette of red silk, with a golden horseshoe in the center, which may be worn only upon ordinary occasions in the upper button hole of the left lapel of the coat (not overcoat), and shall not be used at the same time with the other insignia of the Order.

#### ARTICLE XV

## Amendments

Any amendment may be proposed by a member of the Council and acted upon by a majority of those present.

We, the undersigned citizens of the United States of America, a majority being citizens of the District of Columbia, desiring to associate ourselves for historical and genealogical purposes pursuant to the provisions of Sub-Chapter 3, of Chapter 18, of the Code of Law for the District of Columbia, do certify as follows:

FIRST-The name of the Order shall be known in law as the

Knights of the Golden Horseshoe.

SECOND—The term for which it is organized shall be perpetual.

THIRD-The particular business and objects of the Orde

shall be for historical and genealogical purposes.

FOURTH—The number of its Trustees, Directors or Manager for the first year of its existence shall be five.
