

In the first speech that Lincoln ever made, on the Sth of March, seventy-seven years ago, he began in this way:

Readers, Lincoln was sincere when he said that. Every one of you will be a success if you can traly repeat those words. Lincoln wanted TO BE EXPERIMENT BY HIS FELLOW MEX. That means that he intended from the very start TO SERVE HIS FELLOW MEN. He did it, and he will not be forgotten.

Still young and boyish, on January 27, 1837, Lincoln talked to the Young Men's Lyceum in Springfield, II]. He was exalting the greatness, power and fighting ability of this country, and he said:
