And in amazingly good condition for something that is more than 200 years old and has been passed down from generation to generation by family members, only finding its way to a museum in recent

The only known portrait of General Isaac Brock created during his lifetime has arrived at RiverBrink Art Museum, on loan from a British gallery.

It is a small pastel, believed to be from about 1806 while Brock was stationed in Canada, likely done when he was in Quebec, says curator David Aurandt.

Brock would have been in his late 30s or early 40s at the time. And although he doesn't look it in the pastel, Aurandt says, he was a man of imposing stature-about six-foot three inches tall, which was unusual 200 years ago, and solidly built.

It was a "moment of celebration" for the Shaw Festival, and a welcome announcement, said artistic director Jackie Maxwell as she introduced MP Rob Nicholson to a gathering in the Shaw Festival Theatre lohhy.

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Councillors says no to over-sized sign

Vineyard owner Kevan O'Connor asks for reconsideration of committee

Councillors made it clear to developer Kevan O'Connor that asking for forgiveness rather than permission doesn't always sit well. At Monday's committee-

of-the-whole meeting. O'Connor asked for a sign variance for Trek Vineyards, but councillors turned him

About a year and a half ago, Kevan O'Connor purchased his 92-acre vineyard of Pinot Noir grapes, and erected the sign on the corner of his Concession 6 and Line 5 property.

He says he was notified by e-mail in January that his sign would need a variance because it does not meet the criteria of the Town's sign bylaw, but after applying, the sign variance committee turned down his request. The sign is 3.2 metres high

with an area of 3.72 square metres and it is a minor vanance, O'Connor told councillors, Based on Town staff's recommendations, O'Connor could remove a portion of the sign from the top or the bottom to meet the requirements of an area of three square metres and a height of three

O'Connor explained to councillors that his property is a large one -larger than what would be found in the Old Town - and he hoped the sign would attract a new market. He hopes to develop a "high-quality reputation for his pinot noir grapes.

O'Connor said he has a three-year contract to sell his grapes to Diamond Estate Winery but that contract expires in two years and he is looking for other interested

The professionally developed sign is an important feature in the vinevard's plan to develop a brand name for the grapes, O'Connor told

councillors. "If my sign was nine inches narrower there wouldn't have been any other problem. But if it was smaller, it

would look ridiculous." Lord Mayor David Eke said he could support the

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variance because it is minor. "I'm going to support this applicant. He knows very well the rules and regulations. It's

too bad he didn't apply for a permit to begin with Councillor Andrea Kaiser said the sign was erected on the property before O'Connor applied for a variance and she asked what the purpose

were going to overturn their decision. "The delegate is aware of the bylaws. He has done this before and pleaded ignorance of the bylaw after the

Kaiser said minimal changes could be made to

the sign to make it fit the "The bottom part of the sign could be removed. The

committee felt that the sign wouldn't be harmed by it." Councillor Terry Flynn agreed with Kaiser that the sign could be easily changed to meet Town

requirements. "This gentleman is no stranger to the Town's bylaws. He knows the rules."

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
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
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B&B owner hopes to convince councillors to reverse their decision

Zuhair Kashmeri says he missed his opportunity to speak about

to speak about his bed and breakfast at public meeting

Zuhair Kashmeri intended to address questions about an amendment to his King Street bed and break-

fast.

But he missed his chance.

After listening to speakers at a public planning meeting Monday, counciliors voted against an amendment that would allow the bed and breakfast owner to add a fourth guest room and two additional parking spaces to his establishment.

Kashmeri attended the meeting with his planner, Daniel Romanko, of Quartek Group, but both men misunderstood the protocol for the

Kashmeri says his planner is new to the job and both men thought they

Zuhair Kashmeri would be called to the podisays he missed um after the public portion of the meeting.

Kashmeri realized too late that he was expected to speak when Councillor Jamie King, who chaired the meeting, asked for anyone to speak in favour of the development to step forward—neither Kashmeri or his planner stepped forward.

Kashmeri says he has since been told by the town clerk that he will not be given another opportunity to speak about this issue again He's concerned that he

He's concerned that he wasn't able to answer questions, and that if he had, the outcome might have been different.

Kashmeri and his wife, Carlotta Cattani, would like to expand their B&B La Toscana di Carlotta with another bedroom on the first floor of the house to accommodate guests who have trouble travelling up and down stairs.

"In the last two years, we've had to cancel 15 requests because the guests couldn't manage the stairs."

Councillor Maria Bau-Coote was concerned that the home owners have already renovated a fourth bedroom and added a new

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Kashmeri told the Advance that an existing room has been renovated and a new bathroom has been added on the first floor of the bed and breakfast.

"All of these have been done with the proper permits."

The owner says he and his wife plan to use the newly renovated bedroom on the first floor and shut down another bedroom on the second floor of the home until a permit has been issued for it to be used for guest accommodations.

Councillor Dennis Dlck was concerned there wouldn't be enough space on the property to add more parking, but Kashmeri says although he originally only wanted one new parking space, Town staff recommended two for the addition

of one new bedroom.

"We worked very closely

with the NOTL planning department to meet all their demands and the reason for that was to make sure that everything is resolved at the local level to the satisfaction of everyone involved," he told the Advance, adding town staff recommended

approving the extra room.

Kashmeri added that his
B&B is one of the oldest
homes in Niagara-on-the-Lake dating back to the early
1800s, and he has worked

with heritage contractor Jim Alexander to restore parts of the exterior —including replacing window pane glass with period glass similar to what would have been used in the 1800s.

The B&B owner hopes to be allowed to speak during Monday's council meeting before the decision is rati-

"Short of that, I don't know what else to do," Kashmeri

Do many Niagara-on-the-Lake residents realize that for the price of two lots on Regent Street, the majority of town councillors have voted to sell off the very historic lawn bowling site?

This is a one-time only money-maker and while lots in the centre of the Old Town don't come cheap, neither does green space that comes with a very long and important history.

Our council was offered an opportunity by the Niagara Foundation, which had hoped for a peace garden that would keep the former lawn bowling property green and public. It would have cost the Town only the price of forfeiting those

was being handed to them on a plate. And she is not alone. She is in the early stages of getting signatures on a petition urging councillors

But in this case, judging by the reaction we've heard, they have an opportunity to do what is both right and popular. After all, how much would each resident be paying in taxes to finance this green space? Nothing - it wouldn't require an increase in taxes. Selling the lots would just provide a little bit of revenue to offset other costs, whereas a decision to allow that property to remain as green space

would be one that residents could appreciate for generations to come. This year, more than ever, we have heard our local politicians talk about the

Time to take care of clematis-cutting back and fertilizing

Yes, it seems we finally have spring weather - a bit of everything - and haven't the daffodils lasted well. Remember you can dead-

head them but do not cut back for six weeks - this allows the nutrients to go back to the bulb and make next year's even better. If you planted them in among grass make sure you do not put any lawn fertilizer in with the daffs - it will increase the leaves but not flowers

Have you taken care of your clematis? I cut mine back to the new growth, give it some fertilizer and then

replace the rocks at the base remember the rule for clematis: "Feet in the shade, head in the sun

Now we have to pay attention to our trees - they are our air purifiers and we are losing too many.

We are fortunate that there are many local people who have noticed what is hapnening. Our council seems to be of the opinion that our trees are protected under a

ruling by the Escarpment Commission - all I can say is that friends living on the escarpment have been shocked at the way trees have been cut down there quite indiscriminately So enough is enough if

you want to help to get a bylaw put in place protecting the trees. let your councillors know that they are not paying enough attention to our environment.

divided into three time periods, off-peak, which is the lowest rate, mid-peak and on-

Off-neak rates of 6.5 cents a kiloWatt hour are charged weekdays from 7 p.m. to 7 a.m. all year long.

Mid-peak, when demand is moderate, changes this week to 7 a.m. to 11 a.m. and from 5 p.m. to 7 p.m., when electricity is 10 cents a kilo-Watt hour

On-peak rates, when demand is greatest and electricity is most expensive, are now in effect weekdays from 11 a.m. to 5 p.m., when electricity is 11.7 cents a kiloWatt

Weekends and holidays are considered off-peak, and the lowest rate applies.

Time-of-use rates are a provincial initiative developed to give customers an incentive to reduce energy

use at peak times of the day. With Time-of-Use rates and the new Smart Meters, consumers have the power to better control their energy costs by using less electricity during peak periods. The price periods change every

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Needed: palliative care volunteers, especially men

People who are dving need good listeners, but it isn't always just to talk about their illness or the issues they face. Sometimes, they just want conversation.

If that person is a man, especially a senior, he might want to talk about his experiences in the war, a golf game he remembers, or share a car story-conversations he might feel more comfortable having with another man.

That's why it's important NOTL Community Palliative Care to have male volunteers. Although the majority of their clients are women, some are men, who often say they would prefer a male volunteer

Sadly, two of the local male Palliative Care volunteers died in the last year: Ken Goodwin and Ed Hardison played vital roles in the group of about 25 volunteers, and

are missed, says program co-ordinator Terry Mactaggart.

Tom Marian has been volunteering with palliative care for almost 20 year, and currently visits clients in their own homes and in long-term care. He says when he chats with male clients, they enjoy having another man to talk to-they are more likely to

have shared experiences or something in common to talk about, "Women tend to be more social. Men are gene ally more solitary, less social," he said

Many of the men he has visited have adopted the "macho' persona, but are anxious about what they are facing. Having someone to talk to can be calming.

"To some, it's important to believe they did the best they could in their lives, that their lives had some value to their families and to society. Providing an ear to listen

to their stories gives comfort. "You just listen, and pick up on what the person wants to talk about."

Marian says he was encouraged to volunteer with palliative care while he was volunteering with the Canadian Cancer Society as a driver.

"Everybody has to do something. Everyone has a role to play and a contribution to make. I like to help, and this was something I could do

To anyone who might be considering volunteering, he would say, "come to a meeting, listen to what we do, and talk to someone with experi-

If there is one skill necessary for those who volunteer in palliative care, it's being able to communicate-to be a good listener while protecting confidentiality, and to speak sensitively, having the right words to say at the right time, and sometimes, not being afraid to say them, says

Palliative care is also about helping a family member or caregiver cope, and for about a year after a client dies, volunteers follow up with phone calls on a regular basis to family members to see how they're coping in their hereavement

But while good volunteers are essential, community partnerships are also impor tant. The theme for the 2012 National Hospice Palliative Care Week, is 'Let's Work Together," and NOTI Community Palliative Care couldn't operate without corporate partnerships in the

The Palliative Care office lends equipment such as lift/ recliner chairs, special mattresses, wheelchairs, walkers TV/DVD players CDs and DVDs, and helpful books.

Wall's Furniture not only stores the chairs but delivers them and picks them up again when they are no longer The chairs, which can take

a person from standing up to a reclining position, allow patients to stay in their homes longer, and relieve some of the burden for caregivers, says Mactaggart.

Wall's has been a great community partner, she says, as has Morgan's Funeral Home, partnering with group bereavement support for those who have lost their spouses. The sessions are held twice a year at the Palliative Care office behind the hospital, with Morgan's providing the counselling to

Care Week, which begins May 6, is a one-week campaign that focuses on raising awareness about hospice palliative care. In NOTL, the annual memorial service to celebrate the lives of clients who have died during the year will be held May 6, at 2 p.m. at Upper Canada Lodge.

His impressive figure was likely part of the reason he commanded the lovalty of his troops, says Aurandt, although the general received some criticism from other leaders because he tended to make decisions quickly and act impulsively.

"He was a leader who led from the front. He felt he had to be in the vanguard of his troops, shouting them on and forward, leading them in the charge, unlike some of his contemporaries," said

Aurandt. "He seemed to believe you lead men by being first on the battlefield, not behind strategizing as the battle went along.

It appears he was killed by a sniper or sharpshooter, from above, and died immediately or at least very quickly, said Aurandt-stories indicate he turned to the officer closest to him, grabbed his chest and died, before knowing the successful outcome of the battle that October day at Queenston

Although he had already





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Learn about stroke and discover a network of specialists

This month's InfoHealth session features

a specialist talking about stroke

Think you might have some of the symptoms of a stroke?

It's important to act quickly, and it's helpful to understand how the region deals with stroke

patients, says Dr. Bill Hospital in Niagara Falls Brown of the popular InfoHealth series.

He has spoken about stroke symptoms before at the NOTL Library, but next week he will present Dr. Wes Oczkowski, a professor of neurology at McMaster University and head of the regional stroke program, at the Hamilton General Hospital-a region which includes Kitchener-Waterloo,

Hamilton and Niagara. That program orchestrates care for stroke victims, and is available 24/7-while locally the Greater Niagara General

is the destination for stroke victims, if needed. the experts in Hamilton

are available for consultation at any hour, and will advise if a transfer is in the best interest of the patient. The protocol for managing stroke is regional, says Brown.

"It's helpful for the public to realize that should they have worrisome symptoms that might indicate stroke. they should call 911, understanding there is a system in place that networks with a Hamilton

That should provide some reassurance and confidence in the local health system, he says.

In addition to information about how to recognize and manage strokes, this InfoHealth session is important because it marks the start of a new relationship with specialists from Hamilton hospitals, at the top of their fields, says Brown, who is

also a professor of neurol-

ogy at McMaster. While this time it's the head doctor on stroke coming to speak in Niagara-on-the-Lake. Brown considers it a template for future sessions. June's InfoHealth session will deal with end-

of-life issues, and after a summer break. September's discussion will be about living wills.

The InfoHealth session on stroke is at the NOTL Public Library Wednesday, May 9 at 2

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Don't miss tale of the 3.000-year-old mummy

Ramses spent most of last century unidentified in Niagara

Falls museum By Laura Ranieri Special to the Advance

You may remember the original story from back in the late 90s . . . the Pharaoh Ramses I, a military powerhouse and grandfather of Ramses the Great, arrived in Niagara some decades after 1812, through a shady antiquities purchase made in Egypt.

He spent the better part of the last century lying unidentified, a mysterious royal mummy across from the two-headed calf and other curiosities in the old Niagara Falls museum.

Now, for the first time since his return to Egypt. Gavle Gibson. an Egyptologist at the Royal Ontario Museum and one of his key identifiers, is coming back to Niagara to tell her Ramses discovery tale, and engage the community with

other museum secrets and ancient Egypt fascinations. She will speak at the Niagara Historical Society and Museum Friday, May 4 at 7 p.m. - free for members,

\$5 for the public But who was this Ramses? And how did he get all the way here and back home

again? "Don't be deceived by the fact that he was king for just two years," said Gibson, Prior to claiming the throne, he was the vizier of Egypt,

the equivalent of a prime minister today. Ramses had an illustrious military career, and claimed the throne in middle age not

by blood, but through skill, and as a trusted advisor to King Horemheb.

"Tutankhamen's father, Akhenaten, created horrible suffering and economic dislocation; the country was a real mess," said Gibson.
"Horemheb and Ramses were instrumental in getting the country back into a position where future kings could start building beauti-

ful monuments and fighting wars to successfully defend or expand their borders." Reunification achievements aside. Ramses I leaves us a number of important firsts: He moved the capital up north to the Delta (where he was born), establishing the great city of Pi Ramesses. And he even advanced roval women's rights, by having his own wife Sitre become

the first to be buried in the Valley of the Queens. When Ramses passed away in 1290 BC, he was buried in an ornate tomb in the Valley of the Kings. There, he surely anticipated nothing more than a journey to the afterlife, hardly expecting it would take more than 3000 years, via an overseas detour to Niagara Falls. But that is indeed where his

came, remained, for more than a The story of Ramses journey to Canada began in the 1860s with the transaction of an "excellent mummy in double cases" from an unscrupulous antiquities

Like most New Kingdom tombs, Ramses' final resting place had been robbed, and his mummy was long ago stripped of its jewels and moved by priests to a special hiding spot on the west bank

of Luxor The son of Thomas Barnett, owner of the Niagara Falls Museum and Daredevil Hall of Fame had been sent overseas to pick up some exotic gimmicks. A good Egyptian mummy more than fit the bill as ancient Egypt was a hot a topic in the 1800s, And so Ramses crossed the ocean, and resided in the museum until the 1990s.Gayle Gibson, a respected mummy and coffin expert, was one of the first Egyptologists who had the knowledge to put all the

"I used to always stop off at the museum to look at the interesting mummies and coffins. It was really intriguing that one mummy looked like a Ramesside - a member of Ramses the Great's family. And he had been found in a coffin that was exactly the kind of coffin he should have been found in to be such a person.

How to make the bedroom a happier place

Major differences in treating men and women

"How is your sex life?" I often ask patients.

It's amazing how often I get the response, "Finally, someone I can trust will discuss this mattor with me

So what can be done to make the bedroom a happier place? It's important, even though good sex may be only five percent of a relationship. But I stress to patients that it's the first five percent. Besides, it can also affect physical health.

Dr. Leonard DeRogatis, Director of Sexual Medicine at Johns Hopkins University, emphasizes a major difference between men and women. He says that men have the desire. but as they age can't be aroused. Still, they're the lucky sex. Erectile dysfunction (ED) drugs solve their problem in most cases by increasing blood flow to the "you know what". (If I use the anatomical word, many newspapers block this col-

Women are less fortunate. Some suffer from what's called the Hypoactive Sexual Desire Disorder (HSDD), In effect, sex may never have been high on their list of priorities. So would ED drugs help to start sexual desire for women too?

In one study 202 women were given Viagra. As expected

it increased blood flow to the genitals, improved sexual satisfaction for some women who had arousal problems, and provided the stimulus to engage in sex. But it had no effect on those who suffered from

So, as has been pointed out many times, there's a major difference between men and women. For males all that's needed is an engorged organ for a happy bedroom. Their brains are always primed for sex. But for women, ED drugs will not turn those who have HSDD into raving sexual mani-

Is there anything that will do it? Many experts believe that the male hormone testosterone will also govern a woman's sexual desire. At 50 years of age women produce 50 percent less testosterone than those in their

That's one reason why sexual desire gradually diminishes. Boosting testosterone levels, they say, will also boost their

The International Journal of Impotence Research analyzed 12 studies and concluded it does help. The North American Menopausal Society reached the same conclusion and

endorsed its use. But getting testosterone is easier said than done in this country. Like the controversy surrounding the use of estrogen for menopause, there is an underlying worry that testosterone might increase the risk of breast cancer. But according to Dr. Jerald Bain, a prominent Toronto endocrinologist, some doctors are using small amounts of testosterone to treat sexual problems in women.

Dr. DeRogatis believes it unlikely testosterone increases the risk of breast cancer and that the greater possibility is growth of facial hair and transient acne. This can occur if too. much testosterone is prescribed. Non-hormonal treatments

are also available. For instance, Wellbutrin has been available for many years to treat depressed patients. But it has also been shown to increase sexual desire in women who are not depressed.

But for women there's more to sex than hormones. They don't enjoy a happy bedroom if there's discontent in a marriage, financial problems, lack of communication or no love.

A woman recently said to me, "I'm bored with my husband and wish I'd never married him." It would take the coming of a Messiah to solve this problem.

But not all sexual problems confronting women are in the head. All too often the reason postmenopausal women shy away from sex is medical. But the diagnosis is missed by doctors who neglect the pelvic examination

Lack of estrogen in menonausal women results in thinning of the vaginal lining. Some women with this condition have been unable to have sex for years. It's tragic when they could have been cured within a few weeks by Premarin cream or Vagifem pills.

I remind these patients that if Engelbert Humperdinck is unable to sing with a sore throat, neither can they be expected to enjoy sex with an inflamed vagi-See the web site www.docgiff.


