TEMPEST OF HOLMESIDE, CO. DURHAM.

THE historians of Durham have given so scanty an account of the founder of the once rich and powerful branch of the Tempest family settled in their county, that one feels there is some excuse for offering the following notes.

That Roland Tempest, the first of Holmeside, was a natural son, appears to have escaped the notice or knowledge of Surtees, Hutchinson, &c., but we believe we shall prove, that though undoubtedly the son of Sir William Tempest, knight, of Studley and Hertford, co. York, of Hetton, co. Northumberland, and Trefford, co. Durham, he cannot have been a lawful child.

Sir William Tempest was the second, though eldest surviving, son of Sir Richard Tempest, of Studley, &c. (who was the younger son of Sir John Tempest, of Bracewell-in-Craven), by his second wife, Isabel, the daughter and heir of Sir Thomas de Bourne, and granddaughter and heir of Sir John le Gras, of Studley.¹

Sir Richard died between August 1375, when he ceased to be Sheriff of Roxburgh,² and 25th July, 1379, when Isabel as his widow, with John Tempest their son and heir, answered a plea against the Abbot of Fountains, of unjust disseisin of tenements in Eneston³; and on the 8th October, 1379, she was pardoned by the Bishop of Durham for receiving, without licence, the manor of Trefford from the trustees, whom she and her husband had enfeoffed of it.⁴

Although Sir William Tempest is stated to have been aged 30 years and upwards, when his mother died on the 13th August, 1421,⁵ it is evident that the "upwards" (*et amplius*) must represent at least twelve years, if his father was dead by July, 1379. Further, he was already a knight by 1401,⁶ and taking an important position in the county.

Owing to the death of his elder brother John, who was aged 27 years in July, 1387,⁷ but died before 20th May, 1405,⁸ Sir William

succeeded to his father's estates at Hertford, co. York—had by settlement on Sir Richard at his first marriage with Johanna de Hertford, 1343¹; at Hetton—had by the gift of Lord Henry de Percy (afterwards 3rd Lord Percy of Alnwick), 10th April, 1351, *pro bono servitio mihi impenso*:² also land in Thornton-le-Street, had of the gift of Richard de Otrington and others in 1349³; as also to those of his mother at Studley and Trefford.

Sir William married about 1403, Alianore, the daughter and co-heir of Sir William de Washington, Kt., by which marriage he acquired the manor of Washington, co. Durham, and land at Helton co. Westmoreland.⁴ On the 20th October, 1409, the Archbishop of York granted to Sir William a dispensation sanctioning his marriage with Alianore, which had already taken place and issue born, although they were related in the 3rd and 4th degrees.⁵

Sir William was thus a wealthy and powerful man in his county, and well able to procure a good marriage for his bastard son Roland, which he did, by marrying him to one of the Umfraville coheireses.

On the 4th October, 1349, Richard de Otrington assigned to Sir Richard Tempest, Kt., a rent of 100 shillings out of his lands in "Thornton-in-the-Strete,"* which lands the 16th December, 1350, he conveyed absolutely to the same Sir Richard.* On the 8th May, 1375, the same knight acquired further lands in Thornton-le-Street of John de Gerdon, of York, who had them of the gift of Peter le Thorpe, late of York, Draper.* By a deed dated at Thornton-in-the-Strete, 12th May, 1440, Sir William Tempest, Kt., Lord of Studley, gave to Roland Tempest, all his lands, tenements, rents, services, &c., with appurtenances in Thornton-in-the-Strete and Northallerton, to hold to the said Roland and the heirs of his body lawfully begotten.⁶ This deed is sealed with the Tempest arms impaling those of Washington—two bars, in chief 3 mullets, with a man's head for crest, and Roland is not described as son, or any relation. Sir William died about July, 1441, the writ *diem clausit*

extremum being dated 7 August, 4 Neville—¹ the Inquisition *post mortem* is lost—and livery of his lands was granted to William Tempest, Esq., his son and heir, the 29th September, 1441; who did homage at Aukland, 9th May, 1443.²

By a deed dated at Studley, the 20th May, 1443, William Tempest, son and heir of Sir William Tempest, Kt., Lord of Studley, declares that he has examined and inspected a certain charter of the aforesaid William Tempest, "my father," made to Roland Tempest, "my brother" (*Quandam cartam per prefatum Will'um Tempest patrem meum Rolando Tempest fratri meo, &c.*) the tenor of which is as follows, and recites in full the grant made by Sir William to Roland Tempest at Thornton, the 12th May, 18 Hen. VI.; now, by the present charter, William, the son, confirms this grant made by his father to Roland Tempest "my brother," so far as in him lies, of the lands, &c., in Thornton-le-Street and Northallerton, and further gives and confirms to the same Roland all the lands, tenements, rents, and services whatsoever which formerly belonged to Sir Richard Tempest, "my grandfather, or my aforesaid father," in the towns of Thirsk and Otryngton. The witnesses are Sir Roger Warde, Kt., Ralph Pygot, William Malorie, Richard Weldon, and William Clerk.³ The seal used by William Tempest to this deed is a very fine one, 1½ inch in diameter, the arms being quarterly, 1st and 4th Tempest, a bend between six martlets; 2nd and 3rd, Washington, two bars, in chief three mullets. The crest is a man's head and shoulders, a crest used by his grandfather, Sir Richard Tempest, the Governor of Berwick in 1352. On a scroll running round this seal is the legend, "S. Willelmi Tempest, Armigeri."

William Tempest survived his father a little over three years, dying the 4th January, 1443-4. An inquisition after his death was held at York Castle, 24th April, 1444, when, *inter alia*, it was found that by charter dated at Hertford (co. York), 3rd March, 1439-40, Sir William Tempest, Kt., had granted to the said William, his son, and Elizabeth, wife of the said William the son (a daughter of Sir John Moungomery, Kt.) his manor of Hertford and Staynton, co. York, and to the heirs of the said William and Elizabeth, with remainder on failure of such issue to Sir William and his heirs. William Tempest and Elizabeth his wife, therefore, held the same during his father's lifetime. On the death of Sir William, the said

William further succeeded to the manors of Studley, Lynton-in-Craven, and Little Appylton, co. York, with land in those places and in Sallay, Catton, Granteley, Hundegate, Enestone, Gokebuske, Wynkesley, Gilling, and Ripon, all which the said William Tempest, Esq., by deed dated 21st May, 1443 (21 Hen. VI.), granted to Richard, Earl of Salisbury, Ralph, Lord of Sudeley, Sir John Montgomery, Kt., Sir John Constable, Kt., Thomas Greene, Christopher Boynton, Robert Danby, Roland Tempest, and William Clerke, to hold in trust.¹

In another inquisition taken at Newcastle-on-Tyne, the 21st April, 1444 (22 Hen. VI.), he is declared to have held the manor of Hetton in Northumberland, and to have granted it to the same trustees by the same charter.² By another taken at Sadberg, the 10th October, 1444, William Tempest was further found to hold the manor of Trefford, co. Durham, of the Bishop.³ William Tempest is stated to have died the 4th January, 1443-4 (except in the inquisition, 22 Hen. VI., No. 29, where the date is given as the Eve of St. Thomas the Apostle, 1443), and in all the inquests his heir is declared to be his son John, aged two years and upwards.

Thus we see that William Tempest, the brother of Roland, married about 1440, Elizabeth Montgomery (possibly the daughter of the Sir John, who, with Elizabeth, Lady Say his wife, were granted in 1444, a tun of Gascon Wine for their lives each Christmas)⁴ and had by the marriage one son John, born about 1441. This infant was in April, 1444, committed to the guardianship of Richard Raket,⁵ but died before April, 1450, when his heir was not Roland Tempest, his father's "brother," as would have been the case had Roland been legitimate, but his father's sisters, Dionisia and Isabel.

On the 9th April, 28 Hen. VI. (1450), an indenture was executed between John Norton, Esq., son and heir of Isabel Norton, one of the daughters and heirs of William Tempest, Kt., and one of the cousins and heirs of William Tempest, the son and heir of Sir William, as well as heir of John, son and heir of the said William, son of Sir William of the one part, and William Maillore, Esq., and

Dionisia his wife, as other heir of Sir William Tempest, Kt., also sister and heir of William Tempest the son, and cousin, and other heir of John Tempest, of the other part; as to a partition of Sir William Tempest's estates, by which indenture the manors of Hertford, Staynton, Appilton, Foston, Hetton, and Sallay near Ripon, with their appurtenances, and land there and in Catton, Gokebuske, Hungate, Enestone, Resplethe, Richmond, Tunstall, Gilling, Nafferton, and Ripon, were assigned to John Norton and his heirs, while the manors of Studley, Lynton, and Trefford, with their appurtenances and all lands, &c. in Brompton near Northallerton, Copthewick, Aldefelde, Wynkesley, Woodhouse, and Grantley, on the north side of the water Skell, with the mill of Grantley, and three messuages in Westgate, Ripon, were allotted to Dionisia and her husband. Dionisia acknowledged and agreed to the division both in her own name and for her husband, who was unable to appear, having recently broken his shin bone.¹ The fine was levied at Westminster 27th October, 1450, and the post fine, the 11th June, 1454.²

On the 10th January, 1451-2, the writ *diem clausit extremum* on the death of Alianore, the widow of Sir William Tempest, was issued at Durham, and by inquisition held in that city, the 24th January, it was declared that she held in fee the manor of Wessington, with appurtenances of the Bishop *in capite*, and that in the manor is a site with hall, chambers, and other houses built upon it, comprising about 200 acres, with various rights; also that she held land in Medomesley of the heirs of Sir John Felton. She died on Sunday, the 2nd day of the present month (January), and her heirs were John Norton, son and heir of Richard Norton, Esq. and Isabel his wife, one of the daughters of the said Sir William Tempest and Dame Alianore his wife, aged 26 years and more; with Dionisia, the wife of William Maillore, Esq., the other daughter of Sir William and his wife, aged 36 years and more.³ By another inquest held the same day before Geoffrey Middleton, Esq., Escheator, Dame Alianore was found to have held in fee of the Earl of Westmoreland, eight tofts, 160 acres of land, and two of meadow in Denton, and also the manor of Trefford, which latter she had for dower by virtue of an endowment made by her husband, and an assignment dated 17th

May, 1443, made by her son William. The reversion of all which on her death was to John, son and heir of Isabel and Richard Norton, and Dionisia, wife of William Mallory.¹

Thus we find that Roland was no more heir to Dame Alianore Tempest than he was to Sir William, to William "his brother," or to John Tempest.

By a deed dated 4th September, 1452, John Lound, clerk, Robert Danby, Ralph Pygot, William Heron, Robert Ingleton, and Richard Weltdon, surrendered to Dionisia the wife of William Mallori, Esq., sister and one of the heirs of William Tempest, Esq., son and heir of Sir William Tempest, Kt., all their manors of Studley, Linton, and Trefford, with the other possessions named in the deed of partition of April, 1450, as the Mallorys' share, to hold the same to the said Dionisia and her heirs. On failure, the estates were settled upon John, son and heir of Isabel and Richard Norton, and his heirs, in default on Roland Tempest in tail male, with remainder over to Sir John Tempest, Kt. (of Bracewell), and the right heirs of the said William Tempest.²

Thus is Roland mentioned in an entail of the family estates, but after both Sir William's daughters and their heirs.

Roland was however by no means neglected, for (besides the estate in land his father gave him) on May 2nd, 1442, a lease of three years, commencing November, 1440 (19 Hen. VI.) was confirmed to him and to John Bere, by the Crown, of the customs of the wool and wine fees of the port of Newcastle-on-Tyne,³ which was renewed to him and William Lawson the 5th November, 1445;⁴ and he farmed all the customs of that port from March, 1445-6 to April, 1449.⁵ Perhaps some irregularity required the pardon which was granted him as "Rolandus Tempest de Epātu Dunolm̃, gentelman," the 12th November, 1446.⁶ He also evidently owned land at Aldeburgh in Richmondshire, as one John Aneslee, of Newcastle, labourer, was accused of stealing therefrom, the 26th August, 1443, fifty of his wethers valued at £10.⁷ The bride selected for Roland Tempest was Isabel, the third daughter and co-heir of Sir William Elmeden, Kt., by his wife Elizabeth, eldest sister and co-heir of Sir Gilbert

Umfraville, Kt., a lady as will be seen who brought both lineage and lands with her. The exact date of the marriage has not been ascertained, but it was after the 16th April, 1437, when at the inquisition *post mortem* of Sir Robert Umfraville, held at Lincoln that day, *Isabel Elmeden*, third daughter of Elizabeth, late wife of Sir William de Elmeden, was found to be one of the co-heirs of Sir Robert, who died the 25th January, 1436-7—and aged 27 years, being his great niece.¹

It is probable however, that the marriage took place soon after, perhaps in May, 1440, when Sir William Tempest gave the estate in Thornton-le-Street to Roland. In August, 1441, we find Roland Tempest with William Heron, acting as executor to the will of Dame Isabel, the widow of the before named Sir Robert Umfraville, K.G., who died the beginning of May, 1440.²

By an inquest made before the Bishop's Escheator, in 1421, it was proved that Agnes, the widow of Sir Thomas Umfraville, mother to Elizabeth Elmeden, died seized in fee of the town of Holmesite with appurtenances, 10 acres of land called Hamwelburne, and of the manor of Whetley, which estates owing to the death of her only son and heir Gilbert without issue in 1420, descended to her five daughters as co-heirs, namely:—Elizabeth, wife of Sir William Elmeden, Kt.; Matilda, wife of Sir William Rither, Kt.; Joan, wife of Sir Thomas Lambert, Kt.; Margaret, wife of William Constable, Esq., and Agnes, wife of Thomas Hagerstone, Esq.³ Holmeside, therefore, never belonged to Sir Robert Umfraville, K.G. At the inquisition *post mortem* of Sir Gilbert Umfraville, taken at Hesyll, co. York, 18th June, 1421, the same five ladies, as his sisters, are found to be his heirs, and their ages are given as 30, 28, 26, 24, and 22 years,⁴ which is manifestly incorrect, as their father, Sir Thomas, died 12th February, 1390-1.

Another inquest taken in 1446, declares that one-fifth of the said manors of Holmesete, Whetley, &c., and 10 acres in Hamwelburne, are in the Bishop's hands through the death of Dame Elizabeth Elmeden, and that her heirs are her daughters, Agnes, Elizabeth, Isabel, and Joan, all married. By a writ dated 3rd May, 1447, the Bishop directs that fealty having been taken of Thomas Claxton, Thomas Dalton, Roland Tempest, and Robert (elsewhere Thomas)

Forster, and the homage of Claxton, Tempest, and Forster (who all have issue by their respective wives, Agnes, Isabel, and Joan), respited, for a fine of ten shillings, to Michaelmas next—partition of this fifth part is to be made into four equal shares, and seisin given to Thomas Claxton and Agnes, John Dalton and Elizabeth, Roland Tempest and Isabel, and Robert Forster and Joan. The partition when made to be sent to Chancery for enrolment.¹

The manors of Holmeside and Whitley were thus not only divided into five shares, but one of those was again sub-divided into four; so we are not surprised to find the business-like Roland Tempest taking steps to acquire the whole.

On the 20th October, 1452 (14 Neville), the Bishop, in consideration of a fine of £10, pardons Roland Tempest, John Lound, clerk, and William Heron, Esq., the trespass made by them in acquiring, without licence, from Sir William Ryther, Kt. (son and heir of Matilda Umfraville and Sir William Ryther, Kt.), one-fifth of the manors of Wheteley and Holmesete, with various land, and of 10 acres of land in Hamwelburne. Also a like trespass in acquiring of John Constable, Esq. (son and heir of Margaret Umfraville and Sir John Constable), another fifth of the same. Also the like for obtaining another fifth from Joan (Umfraville), the widow of Sir John Lambert; which last fifth, Roland had acquired in his own name alone, and now wished to include in the other lands held by his trustees, Lound and Heron. The whole three-fifths of the manors, &c., were to be settled upon Roland Tempest and Isabel his wife, to hold to them and the heirs of their bodies begotten. On failure of such issue, each one-fifth was to revert to the grantors Ryther, Constable, and Joan Lambert respectively, with remainder over to the right heirs of Sir Gilbert Umfraville.²

Roland Tempest, thus by inheritance through his wife, became possessor of one-fourth of one-fifth of Holmeside, &c., and by purchase (or perhaps exchange) from other co-heirs of three whole fifths before 1452; so there seems no foundation for Surtees' statement that Sir Robert Umfraville, K.G. (who died in January, 1436-7, and never owned Holmeside), could have "selected Roland Tempest from amongst this multitude of co-heirs, and by will or deed estated him in the manors of Holmeside and Whitley."³

By a deed dated at Thornton-le-Street, 4th November, 1447, Roland Tempest, Esq., grants to John Lound and Stephen Austyn, clerks William Heron, Esq. and Wm. Lauerok, yeoman, all his lands in Thornton-le-Street and Northallerton, evidently part of the settlement of his estates; and appointed Robert Archer to deliver seisin.¹

In 1448, he was on the Commission of Array for the Chester ward, co. Durham,² and on the 18th October, 1451, he obtained from the Crown a lease for 20 years of a piece of land in Thirsk, called Calfhouse, which was once Peter Tempest's, at a yearly rent of twenty-eight shillings and fourpence.³

Up to the present, we have been unable to ascertain the date of Roland's death, or that of his wife, so that the latest we know of him is when he obtained the licence to settle Holmeside in October, 1452, but we conclude he was dead before 18th January, 1467-8, as on that date, his only son and heir, Robert Tempest of Holmesett, granted to Wm. Haggerston, Esq., all his lands, &c. in Thornton-le-Street, in trust; the deed being witnessed by Sir John Norton, Kt., Wm. and Christopher Mallory, Esquires, and Wm. Archer, and sealed by Robert Tempest with a martlet standing on a crescent. These lands, William Haggerston by deed dated at Thornton-le-Street, 1st August, 1470 (10 Edw. IV.), re-conveyed to Robert Tempest and Anne his wife, to hold to them and the heirs of their bodies.⁴ This Robert, though living in 1497, was dead before 17th December, 1506, as on that day Roland Tempest of Holmesette, Esq. (the eldest son and heir), covenanted with Sir Edward Radcliffe, of Cartington, to marry the said Sir Edward's daughter Anne, and was to receive on the wedding day £100. In 1510, the marriage having taken place, Roland sued Sir Edward for the money.⁵

The 28th December, 1516, Roland Tempest, "of Holmsett," conveyed to Sir Will. Bulmer, Sir Richard Tempest (of Bracewell), Sir Edward Radcliffe, Sir Thomas Conyers, knights; Thomas Tempest of Lambton, Cuthbert Radcliffe, Robert Lambert, Nicholas Tempest of Lanchestre, John Swynbourne, and Robert Spragham clerks, his manor of Thornton-in-the-Street, with his lands there, and at Calfeowe in Thirsk, for the use of Anne Tempest, "my

mother," for her life. Also his lands, &c. in Green Shipley, East and West Shipley, Denton, and Hunwick, co. Durham, and Estwyk, co. Northumberland, which were for the use of "Anne, my wife," in full recompense and satisfaction of her dower, "iff she so liste to accept it."¹

This Robert having only daughters, the Holmeside estates passed to his brother Sir Thomas, the eminent northern lawyer, who also dying without a son, the property descended to the next brother, George, whose only son Robert lost it for himself and family, by joining the rebellion of 1569, and being with his son Michael Tempest, of Broughton Magna in Cleveland—not at Broughton-in-Craven, as Surtees surprisingly suggests²—attainted for their treason. It is probable the old Heralds were aware of the illegitimacy of the first Roland, of Holmeside, and therefore gave the bend engrailed as difference from the true line.

Haltwhistle, deceased, by Mary, his wife, also deceased, one of the sisters of the full blood of John Ridley, father of said John Ridley, formerly of West Side, and late of Wagerhouse, deceased, and Mary Armstrong, of Glenwhelt, widow, and Ann, wife of Edward Dawson, of Haltwhistle, who are daughters and co-heirs of John Stephenson, late of Haltwhistle, deceased, who was son and heir of Christ. Stephenson, deceased, by Eleanor, his wife, also deceased, the other sister of the full blood of said John Ridley, father of said John Ridley, formerly of West Side, and late of Wagerhouse, deceased, which said Thos. Currey, Mary Armstrong, and Ann Dawson are next heirs of the said last named John Ridley, and are of full age, and they are admitted accordingly.

Charles, his infant child, aged 5 weeks, sleeps with him in his coffin, and Rosetta Ann and Ellen Elizabeth, his daughters, are buried by his side: all of them waiting here in peace for the great day of the Lord Jesus Christ. John Carr, his eldest son, was drowned in the Nerbuddah River near Jubblepore in India, on the 24th Dec. 1839, in the 23d year of his age.

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SIR EDMOND COOPER,
ROYALIST LORD MAYOR OF YORK.

ACCORDING to Drake's Eboracum, this gentleman was Lord Mayor in 1630, 1642, 1643, and 1644. When York was taken by the Parliamentarians, he was displaced from the Mayoralty for his loyalty to the King, and Thomas Hough, Alderman, was put in his place. Hough hanged himself on the 30th of January, the anniversary of King Charles' martyrdom, but none of the historians of York seem to have known what became of Sir Edmond Cooper.

We are now enabled, by the courtesy of Canon Charles Nevile, to supply this deficiency; for in the chancel of the little village church of Wickenby, in Lincolnshire, lies a large light-coloured stone with an inscription to the memory of Sir Edmond Cooper, four times Lord Mayor of York, and in the parish register is the subjoined entry, which tells its own tale. At the restoration of the church about 14 or 15 years ago, this stone was broken, and on Canon Nevile's enquiring after it, he was informed that it was probably now covered by the stall seats.

The Register entry is as follows:—

“1650. Sir Edmond Cooper, Kt., uncle to Grace Reresby, wife of William Reresby, rector of Whickenby, was borne in Knowstropp, in the parish of Leeds, co. York, buried in Whickenby church, in the upper end of the Quire, neare unto the north wall, 18th April, 1650.”

Wm. Reresby, M.A., of St. John's College, Cambridge, was instituted to the Rectory of Wickenby, March 21, 1645, on the presentation of William Blundeston, of West Keale, gent., in succession to Thomas Philips, last rector.

His Will is as follows:—

William Reresby, of Whickenby, D.D. 15 Aug., 1670.
To be decently buried. To my kinsman Reresby Routh, £10 a year out of my lands at Whickenby. Residue to my wife Grace, executrix. (Seal of arms:—On a bend, three cross-crosslets; on a canton, ? a mullet.) Witnesses, Robert Mapletoft, Richard Cracroft, William Harvey, and Anne × Robinson.

Codicil of same date. To Mr. William Turner, of Willingham-by-Stow, and his wife, 40/- each, and each of their children £3. To my niece Wilson, of Pontefract, co. York, 40/-, and her three eldest children £3, and her son Reresby Wilson, £5. To Sir John Reresby, of Thriburgh, co. York, 10 guineas, and his son William, 5 guineas. To my nieces Ellenor and Susanna Routh, £10 and £5 respectively. (Seal of arms:—Quarterly, with an escutcheon of pretence, defaced, except the 3rd quarter—a bend between three crosses, ? Lake's.) Witnesses, Anne Jackson, Edw. Lake, and John Harmston.*

Codicil Aug. 17, 1670. To my nephew John Routh, 10/-.

Codicil Aug. 18, 1670. To the poor of Whickenby and Holton, £20. (Seal of arms: On a bend, three cross-crosslets; a different seal from that on the Will.) Witnesses, Jo. Harmston, and Fra. Cartwright.

Proved August, 1670, at Lincoln.

William Reresby was buried in Lincoln Cathedral, where his tombstone still lies in the floor of the Morning Chapel. (Arms:—On a bend, three cross-crosslets; in the sinister chief a mullet of five points; impaling, a chevron between three escallops.)

A ROKEBY NOTE FROM RUTLAND.

THE parish register of Little Casterton, Rutland (which commences in 1559), records the marriage of "William Rookesbie and Marie Rookesbie, gentlewoman, 25 May, 1567." I think this William was a son of Ralph Rokeby, of Skiers, Serjeant-at-Law, and Dorothy, his wife, daughter of Thomas Danby, Esq. He was also of Skiers, J.P., and married Mary, daughter and heiress of John Rokeby, of Kirk Sandall, but why the marriage took place in a village so secluded and remote from their Yorkshire home, seems strange. I think the solution is to be found in the fact, that at Empingham, another village in the same county, were long seated the Mackworths, a family whose pedigree is entered in the Rutland Visitations of 1618 and 1681. George Mackworth, Esq. (æ. 16, in 1557), married as his first wife, Grace, eldest daughter of the Serjeant-at-Law; she died s. p., and was buried at Empingham, 1 Nov., 1569. Her husband married (2) Anne, daughter of Edmund Hall, of Gretford, co. Lincoln, Esq.

Thomas Mackworth, their son, High-Sheriff of Rutland (41 Eliz. and 7 Jas.), was created a Baronet. 1619, and died in March, 1625-6. Burke's Extinct Baronetage says, "William Rokeby, of Hotham (æ. 28, in 1584), married Dorothy, daughter of William Rokeby, of Skiers, and had four sons and one daughter. Thomas Rokeby, 3rd son, of Barnby, slain at Dunbar, in 1650, married Elizabeth, sister of Sir Wm. Bury, of Grantham, Lincolnshire, Knt."

In my extracts from the parish register of Grantham, I have the following:—

1675. Thomas, son of Mr. Nathl. Rookesbe, bapt. Dec. 12.

1684. Mr. Nathl. Rooksby, buried March 31.

1719-20. Jan. 14. Mr. Richd. Close, of Richmond, Yorks., buried.

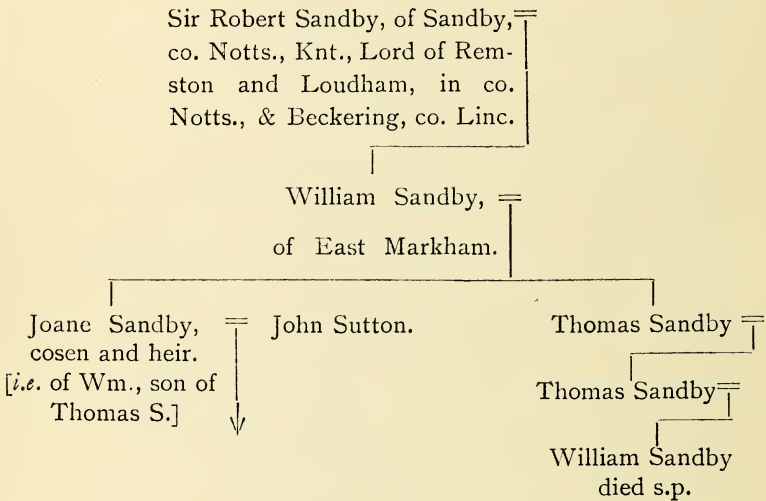

SAUNDBY OF SAUNDBY, CO NOTTS.

IN *The Genealogist* (Vol. v., p. 49), is a pedigree of the family of Topcliffe, of Somerby, Lincolnshire, showing the following descent of the Saundby or Sandby family:—



It appears from the pedigree that Joan was contemporary with an ancestor of the Topcliffe family, living in 1352; and it will be noticed that the male issue of William Sandby had become extinct.

It is evident, however, from the notes I have collected, that there was a family of Saundby, at Saundby, until quite modern times, and I give the result of my search among the Will Registers at York, in the hope that some "Northern Genealogist" may feel inclined to follow up the search, and give us the result of his labours.

First, I may mention, that *The Encyclopædia Britannica* describes Paul Sandby (1725-1809), founder of the English School of Water-Colour Painting, as "descended from a branch of the Sandby's, of Babworth," and "born at Nottingham," a description which I have not been able to follow up.

My search for Saundby, Sandby, &c., Wills at York, began with Wills, Calendar L. (1668-9); then Wills, Calendars LIII—XCIII. (1671—1749, excluding ? 1685—8, 1690—98, 1699—1705, for which periods I understood that Calendars were wanting); then Indexes of Wills and Admons., 1745—1770.

The first Will I came to was that of Henry Saunbey, in Calendar LV. (1672—4). Testator, who mentions no place of residence, bequeaths to "My eldest, William, £30, *until* [sic] he reaches the age of twenty-one; younger son Henry, £30. If they both die, half of their portions to go to "my Cozen," Nicholas Saunbey, of Kirton, in the County of Lincoln, and the other half to my wife. My brother, Henry Marples, and my sisters, Mary and Brigget, 5s. a peice; Ann Saumple, 1s. To each of my sons, a seale chest. Residue to my wife, Executrix. Supervisor, my father-in-law, Henry Marples. Witnesses—Steph. Masters, Henry + Marples.

Dated 29th November, 1673.

The next Will (Calendar LXXII., 1717-18) is that of John Sandby, of Nottingham; the third being that of John Sansby, of Bishop Burton (Calendar LXXVI., 1721—3), and the fourth that of Ralph Sanby, of Ripley (Calendar LXXVII., 1723-4). These last three I have not examined.

The fifth Will (Calendar LXXVIII., 1724-5) is that of Henry Saundby, of Saundby, in the County of Nottingham, yeoman.

Testator leaves to children, Anthony S., Thomas S., Anne S., Jane S., £100 a piece, as they attain their respective ages of 21. To Anne, my loving wife, all my lands and tenements at Bole, co. Nottingham, being freehold, for life, and then to such (one or more) of my children as she may, by writing or will, appoint. My copyhold lands at Bole and Wheatley, to my heir-at-law, immediately after my decease. My three sons-in-law, William, Joseph, and John Staveley. Residue to my wife, and she Executrix. Witnesses—Wm. Sampson, Junr., Wm. Stacy, Mercy + Tyers.

Dated 16 Oct., 1721. Proved 7 May, 1725.

The sixth Will (Calendar LXXXV., 1736—9) is that of Sarah Sandby, of Nottingham, not examined.

The seventh Will is that of Henry Saundby, of Saundby, co. Notts, grasier (Calendar LXXXIX., 1744-5).

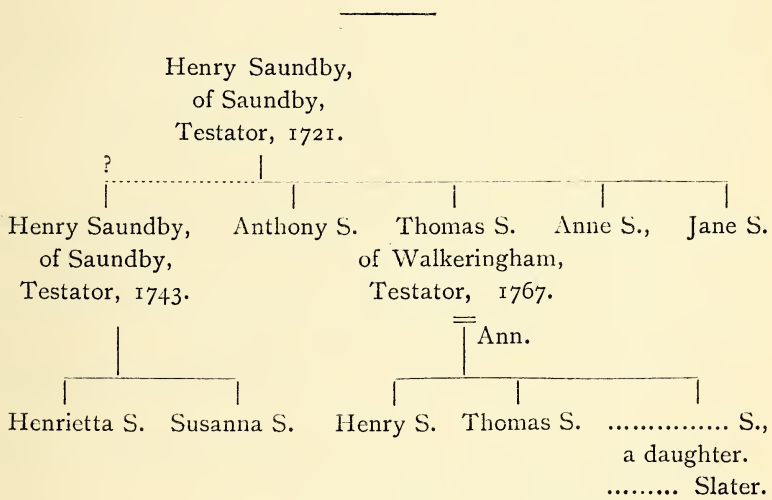

It may, I think, be assumed, that the Testators of the fifth, seventh and eighth Wills were related to one another, and I expect that the second Henry Saundby was the son and "heir-at-law" of the first, perhaps by another wife than Anne. "William, Joseph, and John Staveley," were, no doubt, step-sons of the first Henry Saundby, that being the sense in which the word "son-in-law" was frequently used.

The mention of property at Bole makes it probable that Thomas Saundby, of Walkeringham (which is not far from Saundby), was the son of Thomas mentioned in the Will of the first Henry, and I, therefore, have little doubt, that the tentative pedigree given below is correct.

As descendants of the modern Saundbys, of Saundby, are still to be found, it would be very interesting to know whether there is any evidence in existence tending to connect the ancient Saundby family with that now remaining, and I should be grateful for any information on the subject.

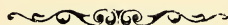

My servantes in liverie at my funerall to have black liverie coates. Mr. Wattes, preacher at Middlewicke, to preach at my funerall and to have a blacke gowne and 40s., and any others preaching at my funerall a blacke gowne and 20s. Bequests to poor of Middlewicke, Eccleston, Hawley, Wilton, Marscton, and Winningham, altogether £19 6 8. All my "gould, silver plate, and other chattells," to my executors; also a third of the lands which descended to me from my late father Sir Thomas Venables, knight, decd., and all my purchased lands, upon trust for payment of £1000 to my daughter Egerton under my covenant with Sir Thomas Egerton, knt., now Lord Chancellor of England, and of £500 to Sir Richard Ashton, knt., for which Sir Peter Leigh, knt. standeth bounde with me, being the last parte of my dau. Marie Ashton's marriage money; also of £1000 to my dau. Marie Venables by Anne now my wife, towards her preferment in marriage. I give also to my said dau. Marie Venables £1000 which my ladie Gargrave and Sir Rd. Gargrave, knt. do owe unto me. To my unborn child £1000. To my dau. Egerton £100 besides the said £1000 which I owe unto her; and if she do not inherit my ancient lands, I give to her 3 children, Elizth., Marie, and Vee (?) Egerton £100 each. To Anne now my wife a third of all my goodes, and 200 markes yearlie out of my lands for her life. To my ladie Gargrave my best ambling gelding. To my cosin Hughe Mainewaring £20, and to his sisters Marie and Elenor M. £40 each towards their marriages. To my cosin Roberte Venables a blacke cloake and 5 marks. Bequests to my wife and daurs.' waiting women and chambermaids. To my servant Wm. Franckland and his wife 5 markes each. To my servant Roger

Wilcockson for his ffaithfull service, an annuitie of 20 nobles for life. Every yeoman in livery in my house 5 markes, except Thos. Hope to whom I give a year's wages. To my cooke a year's wages besides the wages due to him. Every hinde servant, woman servant, and boy, a year's wages besides what shall be due. Dau. Marie Venables' nurse, Allice Pollard 20 nobles. To Ellen wife of Randle (?) Bostock 20s. a year for life. To everie of my reteyners that weareth my livery and shall come to my funerall 40s. Residue of goods, and rents of my lands, to my executors till my sonne Peter shall attain 21. In default of male issue, lands to go to my 3 daughters, the ladie Elizth. Egerton, Marie Ashtonn, and Marie Venables. Executors, Sir Peter Leigh, knt.; Sir Richard Gargrave, knt., and Henry Mainwaring, esquire. Witnesses, Roberte Venables, Wm. Franckland, Wm. Croxton, John Hatton, Humfrey Royle, Thos. Hope, Hugh Walley, and Roger Wilcocksonn. Proved in the Prerogative Court of York, 22 Feb., 1605, by the executors. [Vol. xxix., fol. 811.]

There is an immense amount of material relating to this family amongst the Welsh Records at the Public Record Office, calendared and indexed in the Deputy Keeper's Reports, especially Reports xxv. —xxx. and xxxvi. In the Registry of the Archbishop of York, in the bundle of Consistory Court Papers for 1680—1690, are some voluminous Depositions in a suit between Viscount Kilmorey and William Venables, going fully into the pedigree of Venables of Kinderton, which is set out, apparently from the College of Arms.

NOTES AND CORRESPONDENCE.

The recently issued volume of the Surtees Society, (Yorkshire Chantry Certificates,) though nearly three years late, is one of the most interesting of the many volumes the Society has brought out. The name of its editor, Mr. William Page, F.S.A., is a sufficient guarantee of the correctness of the transcription, but we hope that in compiling the index notice will be taken of the many obvious errors made by the original scribes in the local names and surnames. Such, for example, as Cawdekeke for Cawdebeke at page 64, Boland Water for Roland Water at page 74, (he was the father of Sir Robert Watter, Lord Mayor of York 1591 and 1603,) Dyfforth for Dishforth at page 88, Pikrynge lyeng for Pickering Lythe at page 94, Suthergill for Futhergill at page 101, Globber for Glover at page 111, Cibbon for Gibbon at page 121.

It seems like presumption, amounting almost to the impiety of Phaëton, even to whisper a criticism on the Surtees Society, but we are far from being singular in thinking that readable volumes like the Chantry Certificates would be more widely useful than the general run of the Society's publications. Chartularies, and so forth, in the original tongue, are of course invaluable to the learned few—the very few—, but it is well known amongst booksellers that, outside the Society itself, only a few of the Society's publications (such as Canon Raine's *Testamenta Eboracensia* and similar "readable" books) ever have any sale at all.

It is hoped to print in our succeeding Parts a series of Register Entries, Wills, &c., met with in apparently unlikely places, or where they would not naturally be sought for—waifs and strays, which are often very valuable for genealogical purposes. Any item of this kind which our readers can send, will be especially welcome.

We are also endeavouring to compile a table or summary, showing roughly the present places of deposit of the old Wills for each County, alphabetically arranged under Counties. This seems to be a want which Dr. Marshall's admirable *Handbook to Ancient Courts of Probate* does not supply readily enough to the generality of readers, for we are often asked where the Wills for a particular county or district are to be found. An account of the contents of some of the Diocesan Registries will also be given.

With the greatest reluctance, and with none but the kindest feelings towards the Author of a very interesting parish history,* we feel bound, in self-defence, to draw attention to the way in which the List of Institutions to the living is printed in it. The list was compiled for the work by Mr. Gibbons (who has compiled similar lists for many scores of the clergy of the Diocese of Lincoln), and he is duly credited with it in the preface, and will therefore naturally be held responsible for its inaccuracies. Now, when Mr. Gibbons was recently presented by the Author with a copy, he was simply charmed with the book, and read it with the greatest interest; but happening, in an idle moment, to compare the List of Institutions as printed with that supplied by him for the purpose, he found *every single Institution, with three exceptions, wrong!* It seemed, therefore, that the only possible course was to place the circumstances on record here, and we have accordingly printed the real Institutions at page 108 of this Part. Mr. Gibbons' discovery of this formidable array of errors was purely an accident, but they would of course, if discovered by others, have been laid at his door, and would to any reasonable mind have utterly destroyed his reputation for accuracy. The book contains an excellent account of the Norman family of D'Isney, whose history in the main line is a history of the manor, to which they gave their name, and which they held in almost unbroken descent from the time of Edward I., when "William D'Isney claimed to have gallows there which his father had set up," (Hundred Rolls,) to the time of James the Second, when, by a strange irony of fate, another and the last William Disney in the main line, being involved in the Duke of Monmouth's Rebellion, was, as the pedigree quaintly expresses it, "suspensus per collum anno 1685."

We are glad to be able to announce that the Rev. W. O. Massingberd is preparing for our pages an article dealing with the landed possessions of the Dymokes, hereditary Champions of England—not, as is too often the case, a mere stereotyped repetition of the old printed histories of the family, but the result of original research. Mr. Massingberd seems to have inherited the accuracy and literary talents of his father, the late Chancellor, and is already well and most favourably known as the Author of the History of Ormsby.

Lieut.-Colonel John Pilkington is to be congratulated on the handsome volume* which he has produced. The illustrations, printing, and "get-up" of the work are much above the average family history, and so far as we are able to judge, the editorial part is equally well done, the Author having apparently spared no pains in obtaining original matter from the Public Record Office and other sources. One could have wished, indeed, for more of the "Old Wills, selected from three MS. volumes of Wills in the writer's possession," but no doubt Col. Pilkington knew best how to make his book interesting to the majority. We remember hearing an ecclesiastical dignitary, (now lost to us,) who in his day was a generous supporter of antiquarian pursuits, say that he knew no more stupid reading than dead people's wills! At any rate, Colonel Pilkington has known, better than most family historians, how to interest those of his own name, for the List of Subscribers discloses the extraordinary fact that no less than sixty-five copies were subscribed for by members of various branches of the family.

Another excellent specimen of a Family History is the series of Beresford Notes† which is being issued in parts, under the editorship of the Rev. E. A. Beresford, of Lenton, Notts.; Mr. S. B. Beresford, of London; and the Rev. Wm. Beresford, Vicar of Leek, Staffordshire. The work is perhaps rather a preparation for a Family History to be presently published, than a Family History itself, but it contains articles of great value on various branches of the family, illustrated by several reproductions from old family portraits, &c.

Nephew, James Nevill, first son of Wm. Nevill, of Hull, yeoman, £30 a year for life.

Nephews, John and Joseph Fox, both minors, sons of Joseph Fox, of Hull, grocer, my lands at Fosham, purchased of Mr. Geo. Wright, and Mary his wife, and land in Etherwick Lane, par. Aldbro'.

Nephews, James Bean Lee, and Thos. Lee, both minors, sons of Mr. Thos. Lee, the second, of Hull, shott caster, a house and land in Aldbro' (boundaries described).

Niece, Sarah, wife of said Thomas Lee, the second, a house at Hull.

Reversion of said lands, on determination of life estates, to said nephews.

Small bequests to other brothers and sisters of nephews.

Real and personal estate near Lucea in Hanover, Jamaica.

I make free a Mulatto girl, named Nance, daughter of a negro wench of mine, called Cuba; and she is to have a house and a genteel allowance in Jamaica.

To James Bean Benevas, grandson of my wife Sarah Bean, decd., and son of Mr. David Benevas, cooper, of Hanover, my land there, purchased of Mr. William Clark, and Mary his wife, and land there "patent by me for 212 acres," bounded by Mr. William Banwell, and Mr. Oliver Badrow, both decd., and 100 acres that I took a patent for bounded by David Dehany, esq., and my house, plantation, sugar works, &c., except the said Mulatto girl, and all my negroes, slaves, and personal estate, in tenancy of Edward Knowles, esq.

Land that I purchased of Mr. Peter Christian, and Gertrude, his wife, and patent by Cornelius Christian, about three miles up the Eastermour River of Lucea Harbour, in Hanover.

Mrs. Elizth. Holeston, of St. James', Jamaica, granddaughter to my said wife Sarah Bean; nephews James Bean Lee, and John Fox, exors.; Christ. Scott, of Hull, merchant, exor., but only to prove this Will at York.

Codicil. £50 for a marble monument over my grave, "behind the door of the West window" of Aldbro' Church.

John Hoo, of Bradley, co. Stafford, esq., Sergeant-at-law, the said Geo. Gatacre, my nephew Thos. Whitby, of Gt. Haywood, esq.,

and the said Rd. Ames, an annuity of £26 out of my copyholds at Bilston, within the manor of Stow Heath, upon trust for certain charities.

Nephew Wm. Robbins.

Long entail of lands in favour of nephews John Addenbrooke, Wm. Green, junr., and niece Jane Whitbey.

Wife Margaret.

Lands purchased from Edwd. Hungerford, esq., for £1,900 to be conveyed to Elizth., Dowager Duchess of Hamilton and Brandon, if she will pay the same sum for them.

Mary Williams, widow (who now lives in or near Salisbury Court, London), £5.

If it please God I have any children, &c.

To be buried in Chancel of St. Mary's Church, Stafford, near my late dear wives, and the stone over my first wife to be taken down, and a handsome monument of white stone erected, at a cost not exceeding £40.

Residue to said Thos. Whitbey, John Addenbrooke, Wm. Greene, and Wm. Robbins.

Witnesses, J. Tombes, Thos. Dickinson, Walter Heaton.

NEVILLE OF THORNEY, CO NOTTS.

A family of Nevile, long resident in Nottinghamshire, claim descent from Sir Robert of Eldon, 2nd s. of Ralph, Lord Nevile of Raby, by Alice, d. of Sir Hugh de Audley, sister to Hugh, Earl of Gloucester.

His brothers were John, Lord Nevile, who married first a d. of Henry Lord Percy, and second, Elizth. d. of Wm., Lord Latimer, from whom descend the elder branches of the Neviles; Sir Ralph of Condall, from whom the Nevile's of Thornton Bridge; Alexander, Archbishop of York; Thomas, elected Bishop of Ely, and Sir William.

Sir Robert is said, by Surtees, to have married Margaret, widow of Sir Thos. Grey, and to have died without issue.

I can find no evidence in support of this statement. On the contrary, an old pedigree in the possession of the Neviles of Thorney commencing with Waltheof, Earl of Northumberland, and Gilbert, Lord Nevile, Admiral to William the Conqueror, straight down to 1599, makes this Robert Nevile, of Eldon, marry Clara, d. of Sir Francis Pinckney, and brings down his line to 1599.

There is a duplicate of this pedigree of the same date in possession of Sir Hickman Bacon of Thonock, derived doubtless from the Neviles of Mattersey, descended from Robert of Eldon, whose heiress married a Hickman.

The heading of these pedigrees is as follows:—

In an ould pedigree of the Nevills, in parchment, of very great reconing, as it appeared, were these fower antiquities, [achievements of Raby, Nevile, Bulmer, and Middleham,] set downe in colors at the beginninge in such order as they are here presented. The pedigree itself was found among the recordes and monuments of Sir John Nevill, late Lord Latimer of Snape, in the Countie of York, and so came to the hands of Sir John Davers, knt., who married one of the daughters and heirs of the said Lord Latimer.

Here follow "the fower antiquities," and then :—

The noble familie of the Nevills descended from the ancient Earls of Northumberland, before the Norman Conquest, spred into manie brances, for thereout are issued, not onlie the late famous Earles of Westmoreland, Sarisburie, Kent, Warwick, the Duke of Bedford, the Marquis Montacute, with manie other noble Lords and Barones to wit the Lord Latimer, Lord Aburgavennie, Lord Ffurnivall, Lord Ffawconbridge, Lord Oversley, Lord St. Amore, &c., but also sundrie honorable and ancient howses besides as Neville of Rolston, Eldon, Condall, Hornbie, Pickhall, Thornton Brig, Cheat, Liversedge, Raskelf, Leverton, Ragnell, and Grove, with lineall and particular deducement from the originall to the persones of Alexander Nevile, Esq., and Thos. Nevile, only brother to the said Alexander, Dean of Canterburie, now living in the year one thousand five hundred ninety and nine.

The branches interested in the above pedigree are those of Eldon, Leverton, Ragnall, and Grove, with those of Mattersey, Thorney, and in Lincolnshire, Auburn and Wellingore. The Neviles of Rolleston, in Notts., are a distinct branch.

I can give the descent from Robert Nevile of Eldon, and some interesting old wills, &c. The Neviles of Mattersey and Grove are extinct.

It would be interesting to find the will or any evidence about Robert Nevile of Eldon. The duplicate pedigrees deduced from him seem authoritative.

GARGRAVE OF NOSTELL.

Will of Sir Cottom Gargrave of Nostell, par. Wragby, co. York, Knight, 31 Jan., 1585.

Whereas I made my Will dated 25 Oct., 1582, and thereby appointed my eldest son, Thomas Gargrave, exor., but at this instant, understanding by his most intollerable and monstrous pride that therby he is drowned into the forgetfullnes of his duety to Almightye God, and is fallen to a most loose, licentious, blasphemous, prowde, wastfull and contentious lief, to the destruction of his owne estate, bodie, and soule, not excusable but most shamefully to be suspected of unnaturall and shamefull attemptes against father, mother, brethren and sisters, contrived in his most wicked and prowde mind, as the buying of the stuffe of a Pottecary in London, the practise and proof of it betwene him and one Jacome de Boironure seignour de Lestang, a frenchman, geven to a dogg in a mease of pottage in his lodging as Thomas Gargrave could not denye when he was chardged with it in the presense of Mr. Gervas Nevile, esquier, Mr. Robert Bradford, esquier, Mr. John West, esquier, Edward Beckwith, and Anthonie Reynold, but y^t he bought and practised wth the same to kill the said dogg; he rewarded my cooke and butler at that time more than he did in all his lief before; he quarrelled wth my trustiest frindes and servants, &c. &c. I finding him geven over unto all these divelish practises..... I renounce the said Will, and will leave it cancelled and defaced, the seales pulled off, and my name subscribed erased.

To be buried in Wragby Church, with some memory in brasse of my father, myself, Anne Gargrave my wife, and all our children, upon the tomb which I made for my father.

The Will of my late father, Sir Thos. Gargrave, knight, to be performed.

Daughters Anne, Mary, Elizth., and Precilla Gargrave, 100 marks each at 18 or marriage; and the like to the child my wife is with, if a daughter.

Wife Lady Anne Gargrave, extrix., and let her beware in anie case she give no trust to Thomas Gargrave, my eldest sonne, ffor that he hath so much forgotten his duetie towards me, that hath forgot all the great care I had of his bringing up in learning the space of 8 yeres to my extreme chardges. That when I had but fower skore pounds yerely from my father for me and my whole familie to live upon, I bestowed upon him yerely, fourtie, fiftie, and thre-skore pounds, at Cambridge, &c.

Supervisors, my very good Lord, Gilbert, Lord Talbot; Mr. Robt. Watterhous, of Shipden; and Mr. Raufe Rokeby, junr., counsailour at the law; John West, of Burghwalles; Thos. Pilkington, of Bradley, and Edward Waterton, of Walton.

Sealed with the seal of my Armes.

Witnesses, John West, Edward Beckwith, and Ralph Gargrave.

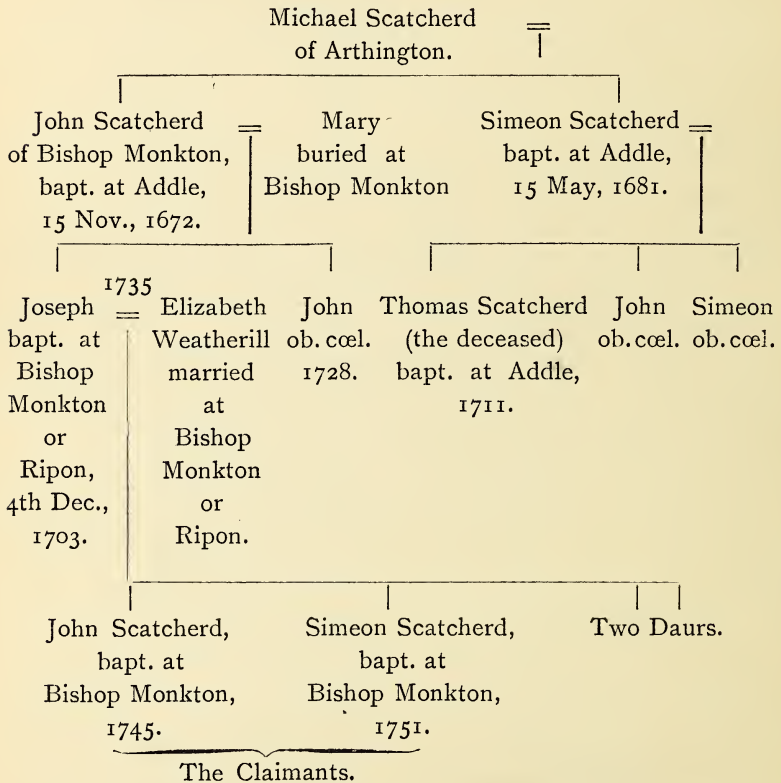

LINCOLNSHIRE CHANTRIES.

Among those Cottonian MSS. in the British Museum which suffered from a disastrous conflagration, there is a 16th century MS., on paper, which formerly consisted of 186 leaves, and is known as "Tiberius, E. iii." It is (or was) a latin '*Register and Valuation* of all Lands and Goods belonging to the *Chantries, Gilds, and Colleges*, in the County of Lincoln,' and it belonged formerly to William Cecil, Lord Burghley.

Browne Willis made some use of it for his account of the Minster ; but (if it has not been done already), a summary, at least, ought to be culled from it for the sake of the information which it gives as to the county in general. I have no opportunity for much research in London, either respecting this fragment, or for enquiring after vestiges of Lincolnshire Chantry Returns in the Public Record Office, where (for aught I know) there may be Chantry Certificates and Valuations of the Augmentation and Land Revenue Office, sufficient to supply the defects of the Cottonian Fragment.* I was able to devote only a few minutes to that portion of the Register which (unluckily for my purpose) has suffered the most, viz., the account of Chantries in the City and the Minster itself. But what I noted I may here make public.

After mention of Tatteshall Chantry, founded by Roger Tatteshal in the Church of St. Benet, we have a record of a few of those in the Cathedral Church :

I must leave it to those who have the opportunity, to transcribe or to summarize the numerous leaves which follow, relating to many Lincolnshire parishes. The pages have been carefully mounted and rebound, and they are kept in a suitable case among the manuscripts in the British Museum.

Seeing what has been done by the Somersetshire Record Society, in their 2nd volume for that western county, and by the Surtees Society, in two volumes, of Yorkshire Chantry Surveys, edited by Mr. W. Page, 1893-5; for another nearer home, it is to be wished that any remains of the history of Lincoln and Lincolnshire Chantries might find a student to investigate them. I have done something towards collecting lists of earlier and later obits connected with the Cathedral Church, and these would be at his service.

CHR. WORDSWORTH.

Any one who has time to spare at the British Museum, might do well to look up an account of a Tour made by three Officers, starting from Norwich, in 1634, and spending their Sundays in various Cathedral cities, Lincoln (I think) among them. Lansdowne MS., 213.



WAIFS AND STRAYS.

It is proposed under this head to note any stray entries which may from time to time be met with in places where they would not usually be sought for or be expected to be found, such as marriages celebrated at a distance from the residences of the parties, wills proved in courts other than those apparently having jurisdiction over the testators, and so forth. Such entries are often very valuable to genealogists, and any contributions of the kind from our readers will be gratefully received. The following are merely a few notes, taken almost at random, from the Editor's own collections, to shew the nature of the thing aimed at. HARRISON OF SEDBERGH & STAMFORD,

“Mr. Reginald Harrison was buried the x of Januarye, 1597-8.” [St. Michael’s, Stamford.] He was a mercer, who on payment of 20s., the fine for strangers, became a freeman of Stamford, 21 Feb., 1560-1, and was elected a member of the second Twelve or common councilman, Sept. 30, (1562), subsequently of the first Twelve, Sept. 30, 7 Eliz. (1565), and served the office of Alderman or Chief Magistrate in 1569 and 1581. He was evidently, from the fine he paid, a stranger, and apparently came from Yorkshire, his will being as follows:—

The 27 June, 1594, I, Reynold Harryson, of Stamford, co. Lincoln, gent.; my body to be buried in St. Michael’s Church, in Stamford, in the same grave where my “wife was buried, which is neare the chauncell dore in the middle alley of the church.”* To the repairs of the said church of St. Michael, 20s. To the poor people of the Beadhouse (Browne’s Hospital) in Stamford, 20s. To the poor of Stamford, 5*l.* 13*s.* 4*d.* To the poor of St. Martin’s parish in Stamford Baron, 20s. To the school of Sedberghe in Yorks., 20*l.*, to be disposed and bestowed by the discretion of the schoolmaster and feoffees of the said school so long as it will last and continue towards the relief of two poor scholars learning in the said school, wherein my Will is that the poorest of my name and kindred, if any there be, shall have the preference as at this present there is one Henry Harryson’s son, of Sawrethaite, dwelling with Mr. Hampton, whom I would have preferred. To the schoolmaster of Sedberghe, 10*s.* Towards the mending and repair of Sawrethaite Bridge, which is the highway to the church from Sawrethaite, 4*l.*, to be bestowed yearly as often as need shall require at the discretion of Mr. Fras. Cowper, of Sedberge, co. York, gent., and William Harryson, of Sawrethaite, my brother, so long as any part of the said 4*l.* shall remain unbestowed. To the poor people of Sedberghe, 5*l.*, where most need is, by Mr. Fras. Cowper, and my brother Willm. H. To

my brother-in-law Willm. Sauer, 40s., and Margaret his wife, my sister, 20s. To my sister-in-law, wife to my brother Willm. H., 20s. To my nieces Agnes Faucette, of the Knott, 20s., and Eliz. Ward, 20s. To my cousins Willm. Harryson, of the Bowse Keale, 20s.; James H., of the Fell Yale, whose ground doth adjoin to my brother's ground, 20s.; Henry H., of Sauer, 20s.; to Wid. Sawer, of Swine Ridding, late wife to Thos. S., if she be alive, 20s., or if she be dead to one of her children, whom Mr. Fras. Cowper and brother Wm. H. shall think best. To Mabell H., my brother's daughter, 100*l.* at 5 years after my dec., on condition that she marries with her father's consent, if he be living; otherwise, if she marries against his liking and contrary to his mind, I give her only 20s. To Mary Dayesborough, my cousin, 5*l.*, to be paid to her immediately after my dec. To Christopher, Robert, and Edith Dayesborough, 20s. each. To Agnes Selbie, 20s. To the poor of Oundle, 4*l.*, and to the poor of Glapthorne, 6*s.* 8*d.* To Thos. Corney, of London, upholsterer, 3*l.* To Mr. Peter Routh, of the Beadhouse, 40s. To Mr. Thos. Short-hous, 20s. To my sister Stoyte, 20s. To my brother Barth. Allen* 30s., and to brother John Allen, 30s. To Margaret Thompson, my maid, 6*l.* 13*s.* 4*d.* and various furniture. To Edm. Furniss, my little boy who turneth the spit, 40s., to be put forth for his use by my supervisors. To Sibella Marshall, of Oundle, who was my servant, 40s., to be delivered to her secretly for the use of her children; and whereas, her husband, John M., doth owe me certain money, I do release him. To Lawrence Stanton, clk. parson of Uffington, 3*l.* 6*s.* 8*d.* A dinner to be kept at the "Bull," because my house is too little to entertain Mr. Alderman and his brethren, and other my friends who shall be present at my burial. To one of my fellow's (James Harryson, of Oundle), children, 13*s.* 4*d.* To Robt. Fawcett, my servant and cousin, 6*l.* 13*s.* 4*d.* Residue to my brother Will. Harryson, of Sedberghe, co. York, exor.

Supervisors, my brother Wm. Allen, of Stamford, gent., and Nich. Dayesborough, of Deene, co. Northampton, gent., 10*l.* each. Proved, P.C.C., 4 Feb., 1597-8. [Register Lewyn, fo. 14.]

GENEALOGICAL LITERATURE, &c.

Strangways. We have received from Mr. T. E. Strangways the first part of his privately printed "Materials for a Genealogical History of the House of Strangways, sometime of Strangways Hall, co. Lancaster." It seems, so far, to be simply a compilation from the printed volumes of the Chetham Society, but, no doubt the succeeding parts will give the result of original investigations, so as to make the volume worthy of so interesting a name.

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Craven, of Appletreewick. In this pamphlet, reprinted from the *Yorkshire Archaeological Journal*, Mr. Stavert gives us a pedigree calculated to gladden the heart of the genealogist, for after the narrative part, every page of which shows research at the fountain-heads, he adds his authorities, in the shape of Wills, Parish Registers, &c., in full. Work of this kind is of real and permanent value.

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Lee, of Pocklington. It is always an ungracious task to pull other people's pedigrees to pieces, and we ought to be grateful to those who are public-spirited enough to do it when it is necessary; for without them our genealogical literature would be practically as worthless a hundred years hence as the "bogus" pedigrees of the Elizabethan Heralds. The pedigree dealt with by Mr. J. H. Lea in the *Genealogist* for April, 1895, and now reprinted in pamphlet form, is a case in point; for it comes forth into the world with authority, compiled by a clergyman of high reputation, and "judicially dealt with" by the College of Arms. We do not for a moment suppose that it is a bogus pedigree in the ordinary sense of the word, or that its statements were other than perfectly *bonâ fide*,—in fact, it is impossible to conceive that an educated man would derive any more pleasure from a pedigree which he knew to be false, than he would from wearing false jewellery,—but, all the same, the pedigree cried loudly for the process to which Mr. Lea has submitted it.

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Mr. James Clegg, of Rochdale, has issued a very useful little "Directory of Secondhand Booksellers, and Bibliophile's Manual," which gives also, in a handy form, lists of the Public Libraries, Learned Societies, and Literary and Antiquarian Periodicals of the world.

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We observe that several of the MSS. from Sir Thomas Phillipps' sale in March are now in the second-hand catalogues of Mr. Reader, 1, Orange Street, W.C., and Mr. Henry Gray, 47, Leicester Square, for sale separately.

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Wills are not quite always "stupid reading," and if it were consistent with received notions for a Genealogical Magazine to have a column for Testamentary Jokes, it would not be difficult to find material for it. One of the longest Wills registered at York, is that of John Smith, of Heath, esq., dated May 8, 1729. He left large charities to the town of Wakefield, but the poor children there little know what would have been done to them, had not the testator fortunately discovered, before too late, a scribe's error in his Will. His codicil runs as follows:—"Whereas it is in my said Will "express for the Vicar of Wakefield for the time being to chastise "the poor children in his Parish Church; I do hereby declare that "it was and now is my will and mind that he catechise the poor "children there, and not chastise them."

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An interesting dispute is going on between the Corporation of Oxford and Oriel College, as to St. Bartholomew's Hospital, Oxford. The Hospital was founded for infirm lepers by Henry I., about 1128, and some ordinances of Edward II. provided that there should be six infirm brethren (not necessarily lepers), and two hale ones, and a resident Priest-Master. The brethren were to have 9d. a week each, and the Priest six marcs a year. The Hospital property now brings in over £200 a year, but no service is performed in the chapel, which is used for other purposes; there is no paid chaplain, and there are only four almsmen (still at 9d. a week), none of whom reside in the hospital,—one being in the Oxford Workhouse, and the others begging their bread. The question in dispute—apart from that of the number and lodging of almsmen, and the chaplain,

—seems to be whether Oriel College is bound to supply the almsmen with “sustenance” out of the Hospital Funds, or only to pay them the *qd.* a week, fixed by the ordinances of Edward the Second.

Haig, of Bemersyde. A magazine, devoted to the history of this family, by Mrs. A. Stuart, 19, Regent Terrace, Edinburgh.

Hallen. Pedigrees illustrating the descent of the English family from that of Brabant. (*Scottish Antiquary*.)

Hertfordshire. Mr. William Brigg's *Herts Genealogist and Antiquary* is far and away the best periodical of its kind that we have seen, for it seems to be literally in a fair way of exhausting the sources of all Hertfordshire Genealogy,—Wills, Marriage Licences, Transcripts of Parish Registers, Subsidy Rolls, Inquisitions *post mortem*, Feet of Fines, Church Terriers. Happy Hertfordshire! If only there were such a periodical for each other county, we should indeed have that Royal Road to the Science of Genealogy which so many people, innocent of genealogical research, seem to expect as their right. It is not at all unusual for our American cousins to write for their pedigree,—say from the Conquest down to the embarkation of their first American ancestor, in 1630, for which they are willing to pay perhaps two or three dollars. With such materials as Mr. Brigg supplies, the dream of such "gentlemen in search of a pedigree" might almost be realized.

Musgrave. Perhaps some of your correspondents can answer the following query :—

Who was the father of Edward Musgrave, esq., of Ashby, Westmorland? His Will was proved in P.C.C., 17 June, 1700. He leaves his only son Richard all his demesne lands, tenements (Knipe Hall?), in Westmorland, and all his tythes with Tyth Barnes at Allonby, and West Newton, in the p'sh of Brumfield, co. Cumberland. Mentions his daughter Katherine, and leaves Poor of Ashby and St. Lawrence in Appleby 40/-. Mentions his honoured and most faithful friends Sir Christopher, and Sir Richd. Musgrave, of Hayton, bart.

Thomas Musgrave, gent., of Antigua, West Indies. Will proved 20 Dec. 1700. Mentions his dear brother Edward Musgrave, esq., of Westmorland; his niece Mrs. Hartley, of London; and his loving sister Mrs. Anne Winder. Edward Musgrave does not appear in any of the printed pedigrees of Musgrave of Westmorland and Cumberland.

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Pelham, of Brocklesby, co. Lincoln. Where is to be found a pedigree of this family, other than that in "Playfair," vol. ii., 400-2? I am particularly desirous of ascertaining some particulars of Henry Pelham, M.P. for Grantham in the Long Parliament, and *pro tem.* Speaker of the House of Commons between July 30—Aug. 9, 1647. He was third son of Sir William Pelham, of Brocklesby, who died in 1629, and brother to Sir William, who died about 1642. His nephew Edward Pelham, of Brocklesby, was fined for delinquency in no less a sum than £2,250, so that while he himself was a

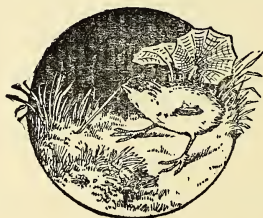
supporter of the Parliament, it is clear that others of his family were on the Royalist side. He was one of the members secluded in Dec., 1648, and did not again sit in Parliament, although he seems to have survived the Restoration. When did he die?

DYMOKE ESTATES IN LINCOLNSHIRE

BEFORE 1650.

By the Rev. W. O. Massingberd, M.A.

I hope it will be understood that in compiling these notes, I have had no opportunity of making long or extensive researches; they are merely the result of a wish to obtain a rough notion of what estates the Dymokes held in Lincolnshire in early times. I could find no printed book that gave the desired information, so had recourse to the original records which were most easy of access. I have taken notes of nearly all the Dymoke Inquisitions *post mortem*, besides the Royalist Composition Papers, and two or three Wills, but have been unable to find time to search such records as the Feet of Fines, with one exception, or the Assize Rolls, which would probably give further information on some points.

It is well known that the Dymokes came into Lincolnshire after the marriage of Sir John Dymoke with Margaret Ludlow. This Margaret was daughter and heir of Thomas Ludlow, son and heir of ¹Joan Marmion, daughter and co-heir of Philip Marmion, by Thomas Ludlow, her first husband. A document in Banks' "Family of Marmyun," proves that Sir John Dymoke and Margaret his wife became seised of the manor of Scrivelsby in 23 Ed. III., 1349, upon the death of Sir Henry Hillary, who held it for life "by the Law of England." The Inquisition *post mortem* of Sir John Dymoke follows, and shows the tenure upon which the manor was held. Later Inquisitions prove that the appurtenances of the manor were in Coningsby, Thornton, Haltham, Dalderby, Roughton, Wilksby, Langton next Wragby, and Strubby next Hatton. One might have expected that the manor would have had appurtenances in Langton near Horncastle, but the records are quite clear to the contrary.²

CHANCERY INQUISITION *post mortem* 4 RICH. II., 1380. No. 20.

JOHN DYMMOK, OF SCRYVELBY, CHIVALER.

Inquisition taken at Horncastr', on Tuesday, the Feast of S. Barnabas the Apostle, 4 Rich. ii., before Wm. Skipwith, junr., escheator. The jurors say on their oath, "That John Dymmok died seised on the 16th of April, in the year above, of the manor of Scryvelby, with appurtenances, and of the advowsons of the Churches, viz.: Scryvelby, Holtham, Rugton, Conyngsby, and Wilkesby, which are parcel of the said manor, as of the right of Margaret his wife, which same Margaret was daughter and heir of Thomas de Lodelowe, deceased, which same Thomas de Lodelowe was son and heir of Joan Marmion, deceased, lady of the said manor of Scryvelby, and the said Margaret is of the age of 50 years and more. And they say that the said manor of Scryvelby, with appurtenances as is aforesaid, is held of the Lord the King in chief, by grand serjeanty, viz.: That whenever any King of England happens to be crowned, the Lord of the said manor for the time being, or any true man in his name, if the same Lord of that time shall be impotent, shall come well armed for war upon the best horse of the Lord the King, one excepted, which he shall wish to choose, and shall so come in the presence of the Lord the King on the day of his coronation, and there shall cause proclamation to be made, that if any wish to say that the Lord the King has not right to his Kingdom of England, or to his crown, he shall be ready and immediately prepared to maintain the right of the said Lord the King, and of his kingdom and the dignity of his crown, by his body against him and others whomsoever. And they say that he held the advowson of the Church of Dalderby as in fee purchased of John Solers; and that Thomas Dymmok is his son and next heir, and of the age of 30 years and more."

Thus we find Sir John Dymoke¹ and Margaret his wife in possession of the manor of Scrivelsby, and a large portion of the

Lincolnshire estates held by the Marmions. It may be worth while to notice that in the 17th century, mention is made of the manors of Dalderby, Haltham, Roughton, Thornton, and Coningsby, as being appurtenances of the manor of Scrivelsby.

Sir Thomas Dymoke, son and heir of Sir John and Margaret, only enjoyed the great Marmion inheritance for a few years, for his mother, who held for life, did not die until 2 Hen. V., and he died himself 8 years later. But his marriage with Elizabeth, daughter and co-heir of Sir Nicholas Hebden, brought another considerable estate into the family. Sir Nicholas had married Katherine de Wyhum, daughter and heir of William de Wyhum and Beatrice his wife, daughter and co-heir of Sir Edmund de Rye. Sir Nicholas died in 1416, and his widow in 1427, and probably Sir Thomas Dymoke and his wife became seised of the moiety of the Hebden estates after the death of the latter. I find a description of her inheritance in the Inquisition *post mortem* of Elizabeth, widow of Sir Thomas.

CHANCERY INQUISITION *post mortem*, 31 HEN. VI. No 30.

Inquisition taken at Horncastre, on Monday next after the close of Easter, 31 Hen. VI. (A.D. 1453). The jurors say, "That Elizabeth who was the wife of Thomas Dymmok, knt., deceased, held in dower, of the inheritance of John Dymmok, knt., the third part of the manor of Screvelby, with its appurtenances in Screvelby, Conyngesby, Thornton by Horncastre, Holtham, Dalderby, Roughton, Langton by Wragby, Strubby by Hatton, Wilkesby, held, &c. The said Elizabeth was seised, on the day she died, of the manors of Howell, Claypole, and Gunwardby, and also of the moiety of the manor of Iwardby and Ousthorp, and of 10 messuages, 40 acres of arable land, and 20 acres of meadow in the vill of Donyngton, and of one messuage and 11 acres in the vill of Quadryng. The said Elizabeth died on the 7th of Feb., last past. Philip Dymmok is her son and next heir, and also son and next heir of the abovesaid Thomas Dymmok her husband, and is 48 years old and more."

The inheritance of Elizabeth (Hebden), wife of Sir Thomas Dymoke, was then the manors of Howell, Claypole, and Gonerby;

the moiety of the manor of Ewerby and Ousthorp, and certain lands in Donington and Quadring. We shall find that Sir Robert Dymoke purchased the other moiety of the manor of Ewerby and Ousthorp of Richard and Thomas Tempest, knts., and settled the whole of this property on Edward his son and heir, and Anne, daughter of Sir George Taylboys, and the heirs of their bodies. On the death of Sir Edward Dymoke, in 1566, his second son Charles acquired the manors of Ewerby, Howell, and Ousthorp, for his life, no mention being made of the manors of Claypole and Gonerby. I can find no proof of any Dymoke being in possession of any of these manors after the death of Sir Charles Dymoke, of Howell, in 1611.¹

Sir Philip Dymoke² died 23rd Sept., 33 Hen. VI., seised of the manor of Scrivelsby, with the appurtenances, and of his mother's property, and Thomas Dymoke was found to be his son and heir, and of the age of 27 years and more. Sir Thomas Dymoke was beheaded 12 March, 1470,³ and the manor of Scrivelsby and his lands in Donington and Quadring were "taken into the hands of the King," but the manors of Howell, Claypole, and Gunwardby, and the moiety of the manor of Iwardby and Ousthorp, and of the advowsons of the Churches of Howell and Claypole were in the hands of trustees to the use of Thomas Dymoke, knt., and Margaret his wife, and the heirs of Thomas; and "Margaret has possession with reversion to 'Robert Dymmok, esq., son and heir,'" who was 9 years of age. Margaret was daughter and eventually co-heir of Lionel Lord Welles, and brought another large property into the Dymoke family, of which we find her son in possession upon his death.

Haltham, Enderby, Wylceby, Roughton, and Conyngesby; and of the third part of the manors of Bradeley, Graynsby, Conysholm, Manby, Wethern, Sutton, Trusthorp, Cumberworth, Skendelby, and Wyberton; and of the 3rd part of lands in same places; and of the moiety of the manor of Iwardby, called Iwardby manor and Ousthorp, lately bought of ¹Richard and Thomas Tempest, knts.; and of the advowson of the Church of Howell, and one other manor of Howell, called Sketes Manor.

By charter, 1 Oct., 14 Hen. VIII., the manors of Howell, Iwarby, Ousthorp, Gunwarby, Cleypole, and Donyngton, with lands, &c., were conveyed to the use of Edward Dymmok, son and heir of Sir Robert Dymmok, knt., and of Anne, now the wife of the said Edward, one of the daughters of Sir George Taylboys, knt., according to covenants of marriage, 10 Feb., 13 Hen. VIII., and to the heirs of the body of the said Edward; but, if the said Anne decease before consummation of the marriage, and Edward take to wife Margrett, another of the daughters of the said Sir George Taylboys, then to the use of the said Edward and Margrett, and the heirs of the body of the said Edward. They say that Sir Robert Dymmok died, 13 April last, and that Edward Dymmok, esq., is his son and heir, and of the age of 36 years and more."

The Dymokes therefore acquired through Margaret Welles a share in the manors of Bradley, Grainsby, Conisholme, Manby, Witherne, Sutton, Trusthorpe, Cumberworth, Skendleby, and Wyberton.² The Dymoke share in these manors was used to provide for younger sons, and had been parted with before 1625. By his Will, 8 June, 1566,³ Sir Edward Dymoke provided that Charles and Edward, his younger sons, should have immediately after his decease, his portion of these manors until they should have

levied to their own uses from the yearly rents, &c., 1000 marks, to be equally divided, and then the property is to wholly remain to Robert his son and heir. And the Inquisition of Robert Dymoke, esq., will show how he settled his property in these manors on his younger sons.

I must now come to the most valuable of all the great estates the Dymokes acquired by marriage—the manor of Kyme and its appurtenances. It has hitherto been somewhat naturally¹ concluded that the Kyme property was brought into the family by the daughter and co-heiress of Sir George Talboys, but the records prove that this was not so. Kyme was settled in 1546 by Thomas Wimbish and ²Elizabeth his wife, upon Elizabeth's half-sister Bridget, eldest daughter of Edward Lord Clinton and Saye, and the heirs of her body, with reversion in default of such heirs to Katherine and Margaret her sisters.

COURT OF WARDS INQUISITIONS. VOL. 20, p. 175.

Inquisition taken at Hornecastell, 11 Jan., 23 Eliz. (A.D. 1580-1), before John Copledike, Stephen Themylby, and Wm. Hennedge, esqs., commissioners, after the death of Robert Dymocke, late of Screvelsbie, esq., deceased. The jurors say, "That he was seised in the right of the Lady Bridgett his wife, of the manor of Southkyme, and of 120 messuages, 10 cottages, 1 windmill, 4 dovecotes, 120 gardens, 100 orchards, 40 acres of land, 5,000 acres of meadow, 10,000 acres of pasture, 1,000 acres of wood, 50 acres of marsh, 100 acres of gorze, &c., and 5^{li} of rent, &c., in Southkyme, Northkyme, Dogdike, Billingaye, Walcott, Swynneshead, Bicker, Austroppe, Skirbecke, Ewerby, Askerby, Aunewicke, Methringham, and Coningesby, and of the advowson of the Church of Southkyme; and the said Robert and Bridgett were seised, and levied a fine (4 Eliz.) between Thomas Morgan, esq. and Edwd. Hawteyn, gent., plaintiffs and Robert Dymocke, esq. and Bridgett his wife, deforciants of the manor of S. Kyme, &c., and for this remise, &c., the same Thomas and Edward granted to the said Robert and Bridgett the said manor, &c., to have &c. for life, and after their decease to the heirs of their bodies.

Also, they say he was seised of the manor or Barony of Screvelsbye, and of lands, &c., to the said manor belonging in the villis of Screvelsby, Haltham, Dalderby, Moreby, Roughton and Coningesbie, and of the rectory of Billingaye. And being seised of the manor of Coningesbie, the said Robert Dymocke and Edward Dymocke his son and heir assured the said manor to the use of said Robert and Bridget for life, then to use of right heirs of the said Edward, 20 May, 20 Eliz.

Also, he was seised of the manor of Whilemore, *alias* Wyldmore and Armetree, and of lands there; and of four parts in nine of the manors of Bornethorpe, Hoggesthorpe, Manby, Saltfletby, Cumberworth, Willoughbie, Slouthbie, Bradley, Sutton, Thursthorpe *alias* Thoresthorpe, and of lands, &c. Charter, 20 March, 13 Eliz.—Know that I, Robert Dymocke, senior, have granted to Charles Dymocke, Robert Carre, esqs. (and others), all those portions of manors to the use of Lady Anne Dymocke my mother, for life, then to the use of me the said Robert Dymocke, senior, for life. After my decease, my portions of the manors of Cumberworth, Burnethorpe,

Willoughbie, Slouthbie, and Hoggesthorpe, to the use of John Dymocke, one of my sons, during his life, and after his decease to the use of Edward Dymocke my son and heir, and his heirs for ever: and my portions of the manors of Manby, Saltfletby, and Bradley, to the use of Nicholas Dymocke, my 5th son, during his life, and after his decease to the use of the said Edward Dymocke and his heirs for ever; and my portions of the manors of Sutton and Thursthorpe to the use of me the said Robert Dymocke for life, and then to the use of Robert Dymocke my 4th son, for life, and then to the use of said Edward Dymocke and his heirs for ever.

Also, he was seised in his demesne, &c., and in reversion of the manors of Howell, Eorby, Austrophe, and ¹Boughton; and of lands in Howell, Ewrby, Austrophe, and Boughton, which Charles Dymocke and Margaret his wife hold for life, and of the reversion of the manor of Thornton which Edward Dymocke, gent., son of Edward Dymocke, knt., deceased, holds for life.

Also, he was seised of the 4th part of the manor of Skendelsby, and 11th Sept. last, died seised, and Bridgett survives at Kyme, and Robert, John, and Nicholas, still survive at Kyme, and Edward Dymocke is his son and next heir, and was of the age of 23 years and more at the time of the taking of this Inquisition."

From this Inquisition of Robt. Dymoke, esq., and that of Sir Ed. Dymoke, knt., which follows, it appears that Robert Dymoke and Bridget his wife, had at least five sons—Edward, ²Tailboys, John, Robert, and Nicholas. Of these, Tailboys died young, unmarried, but all the rest had male issue; yet it was the 2nd son of the 5th son who eventually succeeded to the estates. The Inquisition of Sir Edward is most interesting, and clears up several difficulties. It proves that the Charles, who succeeded, was the son of Mary³ Poultney,

Sir Edward's 3rd wife, and that he was only 12 years old in 1625, so could not possibly have acted as Champion at the coronation of King Charles I. It is certain that in consequence of the plague the banquet in Westminster Hall was omitted, it seems therefore reasonable to conclude that it was not considered necessary for a Deputy to be appointed to act as Champion. It is clear too, that Nicholas Dymoke never succeeded to the estates or to the championship, but died a plain esquire before his brother and long before his nephew. Much information too is given us concerning the settlements of the family estates.

COURT OF WARDS INQUISITIONS, BUNDLE 41. NO. 102.

Inquisition taken at Sleaford, 25 April, 1 Charles (A.D. 1625), before Richard Kinge, Nicholas Cressey, Edward Skipwith, esqs. (and others), by virtue of a Commission, &c. The jurors say, "That Edward Dymocke, knt., was seised of the manor of Kyme (N. & S.), and of lands, &c., and of the rectories of S. Kyme, and Billingay, and Walcot, and of the advowsons of the vicarages of S. Kyme and Billingay, and of the barony and manor of Screvelsbie *alias* Scrilsbie, and of 70 messuages, 30 cottages, 2 mills, 40 gardens, 40 orchards, 1,200 acres land, 600 acres meadow, 1,200 acres pasture, 500 acres wood, 1,000 acres of furze and heath, 100 acres moor, and 10^{li} rent in Screvelsbie, Haltham, Dalderbie, Roughton, Thornton, Langton, Morebie, Wilkesbie, and Strubbie; and of the advowsons of the Churches of Screvelsbie, Haltham, Dalderbie, Wilkesbie, and Roughton, and of the manor of Coningsbie, &c.; and of 1 messuage, 30 acres of land, and 2 cottages in Tatteshall Thorpe, purchased by the same, &c.; and of the manor of Billingay and land, &c. which said manor and premises in Billingay and Walcotte the same Edward bought of Richard and Edward Northau.

Also, seised of fee and right to himself and his heirs in reversion of the manor of Thornton upon the death of Edward Dymocke who holds for life. And so being seised, 10 Nov., 8 James, in consideration of a marriage between the said Edward Dymocke and Mary Poultney, sister of John Poultney, knt., he levied a fine of the capital messuage in South Kyme, and lands, &c., in North and South Kyme, Billingay, and Walcott, and lands in Thornton, and in Screvelsbie,

Halham, Dalderbie, Morebie, Thornton, and Wilkesbie, to the use of the said Edward Dymocke and the said Mary, and their issue male, in default to the heirs of the body of Edward, in default to his right heirs. The marriage was solemnized.

10 James, another fine was levied. Manors of Kyme (N. & S.), and lands, &c., to Edward and Mary for life, after their decease to the heirs male of said Edward. Settlement of manor of Billington bought of, &c.

Also, they say, That Nicholas Cressey, gent., was seised of lands in Dalderbie, and 18 August, 11 James, enfeoffed the said Edward and Mary. Also, that one Henry Aiscoughe, esq., was seised of a wood, called Sawnbie Wood, in Wood Enderbie; and 30 Sept., 10 James, enfeoffed Edward and Mary to the use of Mary for life, then to the use of Edward and his heirs for ever.

By an Indenture made 17 June, 17 James, in consideration of a marriage between him and Dame Mary, now his wife, and for the love he bears her, and Charles Dymocke, esq., son and heir-apparent of the said Sir Edward and Dame Mary, and John Dymocke, esq., brother of the said Sir Edward, and Edward Dymocke, esq., son of the said John Dymocke, and Robert Dymocke, Charles Dymocke, and Edward Dymocke, three of the sons of Robert Dymocke, esq., deceased, late also brother of the said Sir Edward, and Charles Dymocke, and Edward Dymocke, sons of Nicholas Dymocke, esq., deceased, another of the brothers of the said Sir Edward, and for their "livelyhood" and maintenance, and to keep the manors, &c. hereafter mentioned in the names, blood, and kindred, of the said Sir Edward and his children, and in the names, &c., of his said brethren, so long as it shall please Almighty God, Sir Ed. Dymocke doth by these presents grant, &c., that he the said Sir Edward and his heirs shall be seised of the manor of Kyme, &c., to the use of the said Sir Edward and Dame Mary his wife, and after their decease to the use of the said Charles Dymocke and his issue male, in default to the issue male of Sir Edward, in default to the heirs of the body of Charles, in default to the heirs begotten of the bodies of Sir Edward and Mary, in default to the use of the above named John Dymocke brother of Sir Edward, and his issue male, in default to the use of Edward Dymocke, son of John Dymocke, and issue male, and so in each case,—to Robert Dymocke, one of the sons of Robert Dymocke,

deceased, brother of Sir Edward—to Charles Dymocke his brother—to Edward Dymocke his brother—to Charles Dymocke, one of the sons of Nicholas Dymocke, deceased, another brother of Sir Edward—to Edward Dymocke, son of Nicholas—to right heirs of Sir Edward.

15 Feb. 1619-20, Sir Edward Dymocke agrees to be seised of the manor of Scrivelsby, with appurtenances in the manors of Dalderby, Haltham, Roughton, Thornton, and Conisbie, and lands, &c., to him and wife for life—to Charles Dymocke and issue male—to heirs of the body of Sir Edward and Mary—to John Dymocke, brother of Sir Edward, and issue male—to Edward Dymocke, son of the said John and issue male—to Robert Dymocke, one of the sons of Robert Dymocke, esq. deceased, brother of Sir Edward, and issue male—to Charles Dymocke, brother of the said Robert—to Edward Dymocke another brother—to Charles Dymocke, son of Nicholas.

They say that Charles Dymocke, esq., is son and next heir of the said Sir Edward, and son and next heir of the bodies of the said Sir Edward and Lady Mary his wife, and within the age of 21 years, namely, 12 years, 3 weeks, and 6 days, and that Lady Mary and Edward Dymocke, esq. are alive."

Charles Dymoke, son and heir of Sir Edward, died at Oxford in 1643, and it was for his estates that his cousin Edward, surviving son of Nicholas Dymoke, compounded, a small estate of his own being, however, also included.

The value of the estates was considerable. The Scrivelsby estates were worth £1,300 19s. a year, the Kyme estates £2,226 15s., besides his own little estate worth £62 yearly. Few gentlemen in Lincolnshire can have had so large an income before the civil wars as Charles Dymoke. Edward Dymoke's offence against Parliament in going to Oxford to inquire after his deeds seems a small one, but it must be remembered that the former owner was at Oxford with the King fighting against Parliament, so that probably the Parliamentary authorities did not consider a fine amounting to two years income excessive. Moreover, in consideration of certain annuities, &c., and of his settling £200 a year on the parsonages of Billingay and Kyme, they reduced the fine to £4,073, which, however, in consequence of the settlements he found great difficulty in raising during the minority of his son.

Also of an estate for life, expectant upon a lease for 80 years, made by the said Charles Dymocke unto Sir John Walpole, to discharge debts and divers annuities, &c., amounting unto 3,600^{li} in debts and 666^{li} per annum, the annuities during the lives of the grantees, and devised to them by the Will of the said Charles Dymocke, of and in the manors of South and North Kyme, Doggdike, Billingay, and Walcott, and divers other lands, &c., in South and North Kyme, Doggdike, Billingay, and Walcott, of the yearly value before these troubles of 2,226^{li} 15^s. The said estate for 80 years was settled by the said Charles Dymocke by his last Will, 12 Oct., 1642.

Also seised of a ffrancktenement for life, remainder to his first son in tail and to his heirs male, and so to all sons in tail, remainder to him and his heirs, of and in certain lands in Leaverton, Bennington, Leake, Mumby, Cumberworth, Mungay, North Kyme, and Rushington, of the yearly value before these troubles of 62^{li}.

XXI. 527.—Mr. Dymocke's fine was set to 7,133^{li}; but if he shall settle 200^{li} per annum out of the two impropriations of Billingay and Kyme, then his fine is to be but 5,133^{li}. Out of which he is to be allowed abatements 1,060^{li} (for annuities, &c.), which being taken out of 5,133^{li}, then his fine remains, he assuring the parsonages, 4,073^{li}. All which is left for consideration. 19 Jan., 1646.

P. 529. Mr. Dymocke is but tenant for life, remainder to first son in tail and the heirs male of his body, and his eldest son is an infant within age, and Mr. Dymocke without him cannot sell any of the estate to raise this fine, his fine being so great the State cannot come to be satisfied thereof in the ordinary way.

P. 532.—He has paid one moiety of the fine in money, and settled 200^{li} per annum on the Ministers of Kyme and Billingay, so that there is but a small remainder of his fine due. 1647.”

Francis Fytton, of Gawsworth, co. Chester, Esq., 31 Mch., 1608.

I forgive to my servant John Luce, the father, who hath served me since Xmas., 1597, and was brought up as a boye in my sister Englefeild's house at Englefeild, and his now wief hath served my said sister as her waiting gentlewoman sundry yeares past, the sum of £10 lent to him sundry years past towards the storing of a farm he then had in Ashamstead, co. Berks. I also forgive him £60 which I lent him about 10 years past towards the buying of a copyhold in Mortimer, being the lands of the lord Marques of Winchester; and I give him £5 more to buy two milch kine for his wife's dairy there. I forgive to my servant John Cotton, who hath served me since Hallowtide, 1600, £30, which I lent him when he took his lease of Smith's house in Bosley, and £15 further which he owes me. My servant Hughe Stanley, who hath served me as my horseman since Newyearestyde 1599, £20, and some of my apparel fit for his wearing. Servant Thos. Salle, who hath served me since May 1605, £10, and a suit of my apparel. My sister Mrs. Margaret Englefeild, widow, the cloudy lowpe Saffer which I used to kepe as medicinable for eyes; also the use of a downe bed in my chamber at Holleshotte, and a feather bed whereon two of my servants used to lie; also of the hangings at Holleshotte as I left them when I went thence to dwell at Gawsworth; and the use of the furniture, tapestrie, virginals, &c. at Holleshotte, as long as she shall dwell there, or if (as God forbid) her son Fras. Englefeild should die in her lifetime, and she go elsewhere to dwell. After her death I give the said furniture, &c. to her son, my nephew Fras. E., esq.; also all such armour of mine as is now at Holleshotte, viz., one horseman's armour, with a placket and furniture, one new corslett, blacke, with his furniture and sleeves of maile. I forgive to my sister Mrs. Anne Welles, widow and extrix. of my brother Thos. Fitton, decd. £120 which he owed me ever since the death of Henry, Earl of Northumberland, in 1585. I forgive to my brother Geo. and compounding of my said brother's debts whereby he might quietly execute and possess his office as Secondary of the Counter in the Poultre in London. Niece lady Anne Newdegate, eldest dau. of Sir Edward Fitton, knt., my late nephew, decd., my new and best Mawdlen Cupp of Silver, plaine white with his cover, which is now in my lodging at London; also my little case of white plate being plaine and of silver, wherein is couched and conteyned only foure small cuppes called shelles, a saltte and a pepper boxe, being the cover to the same cuppes or shelles, and also sixe foulding spoones with joyntes, all being couched within the same cuppes or shelles and case, and the same enclosed in a little round case of leather used by me commonly in my travaile for easie cariage; also my bedd of downe now in my bedchamber at London, with a canopy of yallowe velvet and curtaines of yellow double taffaty and a yellow silke quilte, &c., as I used same when I did lye and lodge there, being now in the house of Mr. Thos. Phillips, chandlour, nere the Savoy in the Strand. Cousin Edmund Fyton, son and heir to my late nephew Wm. Fitton, £20, and £10 which I lent him at his going into Spaine with Sir Richard Leveson, in consideration of a sett of violles de la gamba of his late father's, and also a sett of Recorders, and a syterne, a lute, and a paire of virginalles which were all his said late father's and by him left in my keeping which said sett of vialles I did lend to Sir John Davers, knt., decd., and were sithence in the hands of Dame Elizth. Davers his late widow, and since then also in the hands of Sir Charles Davers, knt., her sonne attained by whose fall the said vialles may fortune to be loste, but the virginalles and lute are ready for him my said nephew Edmund Friton, and the great zitherne in my own lodging in the Strand, the Red Cocke nere the Savoy; if he receive back the said instruments safe and sound, the said legacy of £10 to lapse.

I forgive to my kinsman now Sir Wm. Slingsby, knt., a debt of £10 which I lent him long since as Wm. Slingsby, gent. To Mrs. Elizth. Luce, now wife of my said servant John L. the father, various linen, &c. for her house at Mortimer, now in her keeping in a great chest of mine at Holleshotte. Servant Wm. Bosson, one of my hackney geldings, to be a good gelding, but not my best. Dame Alice Fytton, widow of my nephew Sir Edward F., knt., £17, which she borrowed of me at London in winter 1597, her said late husband being in the country. To my said nephew Sir Edward, exor., all

that he owed me. Kinsman Edward Fyton, son of my nephew Richard F., who deceased in Ireland, which said Edward doth now attend upon Sir Geo. Carewe, lord Carewe of Claxton, now Vice-Chamberlain to the Queen £60, for that I do credibly understand he serveth his lord diligently, &c. Kinsman Richard Fitton, brother of the last named Edward, £40, in respect of his good and honest cariage when he served my nephew Sir Edward Fitton, decd. Said brother Geo. Fitton, £40; and if anie seme to marvaile that I do give to him, being my brother, no more but this somme here mentioned, I wishe it may be knowne that this somme is not the only benefitte in money that I have done for him, &c. I forgive to Henry Hearshe, an 'old servant of mine dwelling in Bath, and who heretofore served my honorable lady and wief Katherine, countesse of Northumberland, decd., as a groome of hir chamber, £10, which I lent him on bond of himself and his father-in-law, old Perman of Bath. Cousin Richd. Fitton, younger brother of my cousin and nephew Edward F. of Gawsworth, esq., and son to Sir Rd. F., knt., late decd., my lease of the house called the New Barne, nere unto Molles Crosse, in Gawsworth, and the lands there demised to me by his late father Sir Edward F., and the lease of the ground (parcel of the old parke) which I bought of my cousin Mr. Richard Warren, of Sutton; but if he be content to give up the same to his now eldest brother Edward F., esq., then I give him instead my lease for 7 years, or thereabouts, of Hartridge Farme, co. Berks., let to Thomas Curtes at £50 a year, and subject to a rent of £8 a year to Sir Thos. Neale, knt., one of the King's auditors, he having lately purchased the inheritance. Nephew Mr. Wm. Pollewheele who married my niece Mrs. Marie Fitton, younger dau. of my nephew Sir Edward F., decd., my usual riding sword, being damasked, commonly called a fauchin, and my best horse or gelding; and to his said wife my sugar boxe of silver, plaine white and round, and my silver grater, both which I use to carry with me when I travaile.

I demise to my nephew Edward Fitton. of Gawsworth, esq., my leases from Sir Urian Leighe, knt., of the tithes of the manor of Bosley, and the townships of Northrode, Sutton, Wincle, Maxfeild, Old Withington, Chelford, and the Millhous, which is the inheritance of John Henshawe, gent., all in the parish of Presbury, co. Chester, —to hold to my said nephew for the residue of my terms saving two

days if he shall so long live, and upon his decease, I give same to his eldest son Edward Fitton, gent., with remainder, if he die before his father, to the heir of my brother Sir Edward Fitton, knt., decd., late Treasurer of Ireland, and grandfather of my said nephew now Edward F., of Gawsworth, esq. To my said nephew Edwd. F., esq., for life, my leather case of gilded plate and the plate therein, viz., a bason and yewer, 4 drinking cuppes like unto lowe goblettes, 6 spoones, 6 trencher plates, 2 sawcers, 2 forkes, a salte, and a wache or horaloge, gilded and enamelled, and on his death to remain as heirlooms to the Fittons of Gawsworth; also my jewell of diamondes and gold like unto a starre which I do usually weare in my hatte. I forgive to my said nephew Edward F., esq., all that he owes me, being about £300; and I give him that little store of plate which usually is lying at my lodginge at London, viz., 2 silver dishes, 2 silver trencher plates, 6 spoons, one large colledge jugge or pott with his cover, one silver canne or tankerd with tibbes and covered, one tinn cupp. one trencher salte, one old slender Maudline cuppe with his cover, being in my study at Gawsworth, and not at London; also a sum of [blank] as heire to the Fittons of the house of Gawsworth, in which I and manie of my anncestors were borne, and for his better help to live in the like countenance as his auncestors have done, &c. To my now servant James Walkden who is but newly come to my service, yet brought up by me in his youth, £10 and a suit of my apparel. Poor of Gawsworth, Siddington, Maxfeild, and Congleton, £20.

My body to be buried in Gawsworth Church, and a faire large stone of alabaster to be laid upon my grave, with an inscription graved in brasse, viz., Here lieth Ffrancis Ffitton, esquire, which married Katherine, Countes Dowger of Northumberland, and third brother to Sir Edward Ffitton, of Gawsworth, knight, deceased, Lord President of Connagh and Treasurer of Ireland. To some poor persons and prisoners, such as I have declared my meaning therein to mine exors., £50. Exors. my said kinsmen Edward Fitton and Fras. Englefeild, esqs. Supervisor Fras. Moore, of the Middle Temple, esq., and councillor-at-law, mine ancient acquaintance, and alwaies my dere friend. To said Fras. Englefeild and Fras. Moore, a bason and yewer of silver each, value £30, with mine armes graved thereon, with the difference perteyning to a third brother.

My friends in trust not to intermeddle with the deeds and evidences in my custody which do not concern their own affairs, but same to be left to my exors. and supervisor, viz., certain writings between Dame Mary Leveson my late sister, and Geo. Curson, esq., now knight, her son-in-law, and his father upon agreement of marriage had with Mary Leveson dau. to my said sister the Lady Leveson; and also certain writings between Sir Edward Harberte, knt., decd., Wm. Harberte his son and heir now knt., and Dame Harberte widow of the said Sir Edward, and Henry Earl of Northumberland, Sir Thos. Cecill, knt., now Earl of Exeter, and Wm. Percy, esq., and others, upon agreement of marriage had with the lady Ellinor Percy dau. to Henry, late Earl of Northumberland, decd.; and also certain writings and books made by Sir Wm. Cornwallis, knt., concerning his wife's jointure, being one of the four daurs. and co-heirs of Sir John Nevell, knt., Lord Latymer, decd.; and certain writings and conveyances made up in two several boxes lately perteyning to Barnerd Dakins and to his auncestours for the lands therein mentioned and by him conveyed absolutely to myself by the means and procurement of my kinsman Mr. Wm. Polwhelle, but meant only in trust for the behoof of my said cousin Wm. Polwhell, therefore I give same to him and his heirs for ever. I have lately settled all my lands after my death upon my said nephew Edward Fitton, of Gawsworth, esq.; the said settlement to be produced upon inquisition taken after my death. Res. of goods to my said nephew Edward Fitton, of Gawsworth, esq., having manie children, he being my next heire in blood, and the heire and lord of the house of Gawsworth, where myself and manie of mine ancestors were borne, lived, and continued many yeares and descentes. Sir Wm. Fleming, of Rydall, co. Westmoreland, bart., 7 Nov., 1734.

In as good health as I can hope for at my age. To be buried in the Quire of the parish church of Grasmere, near my mother's grave, but not too soon, and according to the order of the Buriall of the Dead in the present Book of Common Prayer, and the Preface to the book called, "The Whole Duty of Man," to be read instead of a sermon. Daurs. Dorothy, Barbara, and Catherine, who are yet my heirs at law, to be brought up at Rydall Hall, "which hath been the seat of my ancestors, and of my father and me, and very much beloved by me, and hoping they are likeliar to be brought up there, so as to be agreeable companions, comforts, and assistants to such as they shall happen to be married unto, than by being brought up in some town amongst vain, shallow, and little knowing companions, except in their own opinions, or at Boarding Schools according to the humors of too many in this age, where they are as like to gett ill as good or usefull qualities and in more danger to be made preys to little worth fellows, than if prudently brought up at places remote from such nursaryes for intreague and vainaty." Dau. Dorothy, £3,000. Dau. Barbara, £2,500. Dau. Catherine, £2,500; all at 21 or marriage with their mother's consent.

The mansion and manor house of Rydall Hall with the demesne lands, and the customary tenants' rents and free rents in Loughrigg, and the Miln and Kiln, waters and fishings in Grasmere, to my wife Dorothy in lieu of a rent charge of £100 a year settled on her by deed of 1 Aug., 1723—but upon condition that she keep house at Rydall Hall and live there unmarried again, and bring up my daurs. until they are disposed of in marriage or dead, and for a year longer to enable her to dispose of the effects upon the premises, with remainder to my next heir male in the line from my father, if I have no son. Wife Dorothy, to assist her to keep house as aforesaid, the rents of my manor house and lands of Coniston Hall, co. Lancaster, and all services relating to my sheep from my customary tenants, and also the 43 or 44 Boon Hens due to be paid yearly from my tenants in Conistone, and the rent of Conistone mill and kiln, the fishing for Charrs or other fish in Conistone, *alias* Thurstone Water. If any of my said heirs shall desire to live at Coniston Hall which my grandmother farmed of my father till her death and then two of my uncles farmed of my father and me till their death, they shall pay my wife £45 a year rent for same during said term.

Thinking it doubtfull whether I shall leave any heir or heirs male of my own body and having no very pleasing to me prospect of my apparent male heir in the line from my father Sir Daniel Fleming, my next brother Geo. Fleming now left living (the Dean of Carlisle) being but a few years younger then my selfe, and by his seldom visiting the parish church of Grasmere, in which parish I was born and have lived the most part of my time, and which I freely presented him to be parson, reckoned worth £100 a year, without asking or reserving any thing to my selfe, yea, even so much as my prescription money of 20s. a year, a thing not very usuall for wary patrons; cannot but think it very unlikely he will leave the formality of a Cathedrall way of living and ease of a city life to come after my death to live at any of the four houses I am likely to dye possessed of and where our ancestors lived with credit, if he had liberty so to do, and I do not knowing well what judgment to form of his only son who I have but very seldom seen untill of late, and that I last new year's day gave him very freely a presentation to be parson of Grasmere upon his ffather's resigning of it, tho it was farr from being acceptable to me never to hear from him all the last time he continued at Oxford, and to hear of the rejoyceing bouts he made there

upon hearing of the births of some of my daughters, for their being daughters, and to hear of the Air's he gave himselfe there and at other places thereupon. And I being at this time very farr from having hopefull prospect from my next nephew William the only son of my Brother Michall Fleming deceased, who I took very young in charity upon his father's death and leaving him nothing to maintain him, and did all I could to get him made a good schollar, and when that would not do, took him to Rydall to me with some hopes of getting him trained up so that he might be some way helpfull to me, as some of my Brothers had been to my father, and have induced me to have provided well for him. But he was so farr from endeavouring at that, as to run a way twice from me, besides his late Ramble into Ireland without telling me of it, and obstinately to be fond of, and follow the worst Company the neighbourhood and country produces, which I often chide him for but to no purpose. He having now for more than two years by past, more especially since last Easter gone two years lived a very unaccountable and very disagreeable to me life, with little or no hope of mending unless age or experience or want bring him to wiser thinking, I now seldome seeing him, often but once a week, and severall weeks not at all, and I cannot discover all the ways he Rambles. And as to my next in the line now left living, my Brother Roger F Fleming he had not lived so regularly as to give much hopes of his being a long liver. And as to his only son Daniel next in the line who hath been by many thought Hopefull, it may be feared that his marrying too soon and but Indifferently may doe him damage. And as to my nephew F Fletcher, the only son of my youngest Brother F Fletcher Fleming, he is yet too young for any Judgment to be formed what his conduct will be or what ill company may not bring him unto in regard of his as yet seeming temper. But I having known many instances of young men (or young Masters as many call them) being made more extravagant and wastfull by dropping into Estates too easily before they know the care required either to keep or improve them, I think that it well deserves my care to endeavour to arme in some measure against such Ills and remember what happened at Conistone upon the death of my uncle Roger Fleming who was only my farmer of that house and demesne, considering that some of my male heirs may goe about to frustrate my Will upon a pretense that a sort of Intaile mentioned in the last Will of Sir Daniel Fleming my

father, dated July 6, 1697, should be of force, I think it proper and convenient to let them know that my father had no power to make that or any Intaile, as any Lawyer with a proper stock of Law will tell them, he my father having before his marrying Barbara the daughter of Sir Henry Fletcher, barronet, my mother, that is by lease and re-lease dated Aug. 12 and 13, 1655, settled all his lands upon the heirs of their two bodies, and I being eldest son and heir did by deed of April 24, 1705, and enrolled in Chancery, and by two Common Recoveries in Easter Term, 1705, made myself tenant in fee of the said lands in Westmoreland and Cumberland, and afterwards by deed enrolled at the Assizes at Lancaster, of the manor of Conistone and land in co. Lancaster, and I being desirous that all the antient lands should remain in my sirname, some of them having been in my name and family since King William the Conqueror, with whom my first Ancestors in England came in with a Body of men for his assistance, and who had an estate I yet enjoy granted from him.

Lands (specified) to the heirs male of my body, with remainder to my next brother George Fleming now left living (the Dean of Carlisle) for 99 years, if he shall so long live, with remainder to the Hon. Anthony Lowther, of Lowther, esq., Sir Thos. Lowther, of Holker, bart., my nephew Daniel Wilson, of Dallam Tower, esq., and Mr. Wm. Rowlandson brother of my wife, upon trust to preserve contingent remainders, with remainder to my nephew William son of said Geo. Fleming, with remainders to nephew Wm. son of Michall Fleming, my brother Roger Fleming, my nephew Daniel F. son of Roger, my nephew Roger F. son of said Daniel, my nephew Fletcher F. son of my brother Fletcher F. decd., successively, with remainder to the issue male of such of my three daughters Dorothy, Barbara, and Catherine, as shall happen to be married to the man that hath a more valuable estate than any of her sisters upon condition that he take my sirname of Fleming upon him and his posterity. To trustees for my daughters, my estate at Nibthwait Grange in Furness, co. Lanc., part of which came to me by the death of my uncle Wm. Fleming, gent., and part I purchased of my uncle Roger Fleming's exors., and part of Daniel Abraham, gent.; also my estate of Bainsbank and Cuthbert in Middleton, co. Westmoreland, purchased of Roger Moor, gent.; also my estate in Middleton, purchased of Thos. Jackson; also at Milnhouse in

Middleton, purchased of Chrstr. Preston, Mary his wife, and Ann Bowskill, spinster; also at Applegarth in Middleton, purchased of Wm. and John Redding; also at Cowperthwaite in Firbank and in Grayrigg, purchased of Mr. Wm. Bowman; also free rents in Old Hutton and Holmscales, purchased of Thos. Rowlandson, of Kendall, gent.; Manor house and lands of New Hall in Staveley, co. Westmoreland, purchased of Thos. Shepherd, of Kendall, gent. Exors., Wife Dorothy (during widowhood only), said nephew Daniel Wilson, nephew Robt. Tatham of Stainforth in Yorkshire, gent., Mr. John Moore son of Mr. Giles Moore of Grimeshill in Middleton, Mr. Thos. Dennison of Lathwait in Strickland, Mr. Wm. Williamson of Gill in Applethwait, and Michael Knott, my at this time Steward at Rydall. Witnesses, Thos. Knott, John Cookson, Gawen Brathwait, Robt. Newton, Lawrence Harrison.

Codicil. To Brother Roger Fleming, now parson of Brigham, co. Cumberland, and Margaret his wife, a rent charge of £20 a year for life. Niece Susannah Fleming, whom I took very young in Charity with her Brother when their ffather dyed at Hull and left them nothing to support them with, £400, with some tho' but small Hopes she will be more gratefull than her Brother hath been. Isabell and Catherine, daurs. of my brother Rd. Fleming, decd., £100 each, their eldest sister Barbara being, by the death of their brother and his only daughter an infant, to be intituled to so much of his estate as to render noe occasion to give charity to her. Niece Alice Fleming, dau. of my brother Roger, £200. Mrs. Elizth., dau. of Mr. Wm. Bateman, with whom I was left in trust by her father, and who lived with me a considerable number of years, now wife of Mr. Geo. Hide, £50. Mary, formerly Cookson, but now wife of Mr. Bragg, who was my servant above 7 years, £20; and to her sister Elizth. Cookson, £10. Dr. Anthony Askew, 5 guineas, if he cure an ailment in said Elizth. Cookson's arm. Shall not have much plate to divide, never affecting to strive for much, what I bought being most of it as good and pretty in its kind as I could get in London: these to go as heirlooms:--A pritty large wrought gilt silver bowl with the Fleming's Coat of Arms upon it, given by my Great Great Grandmother (a most extrordinary woman) to the heirs male of the family to be kept as an heir loom, and a luckey piece of plate as I have reason to believe it hath been to all those that have had the keeping of it since her death; also a large Silver Bason with Fleming's

Arms upon it, given by a near Relation to the family as Ingraven and mentioned on the side of it will shew to that purpose. Eldest dau. Dorothy my new gold watch and chain, a large silver salver imbossed of curious raised German work with the Dudley and Fleming's Arms upon it, with a large silver cup with two ears and a lidd thereunto of like curious work belonging, which was given me at London by my aunt Dudley when I was about 6 or 7 years old, and sent me by John Banckes, my father's then steward, and at the like time that she made me the large picture of me in the parlour at Rydall be taken; which silver cup and cover my mother kept very carefully for me as long as she lived, but upon her and my father's death his executors seized the said silver cup and cover because of John Banckes being dead who was my witness to the gift; also 2 of my 6 silver salvers, and one never used silver full pint cann, and also 2 very pritty silver tumblers, all which have my Paternall Coat of Arms well cutt upon them, a curious stone seal set in gold which I had from a deservedly much to be valued female friend. Various plate, pictures, MSS., books, "diverting story books," Bible with births and ages of my children entered in my own hand, &c., to the other daurs. Nephew Wm. my brother Nicholas' [? Michael] son, and such of his councillors and advisors as have not killed themselves with irregular living, will make much noise at my leaving him so little, &c. (a great deal more about his delinquencies, going to Portugal in a Man of war, &c., &c.) Proved at York, 10 Dec., 1736. [lxxxiv., 383.]
