NASHVILLE—Tennessee prison authorities said they have denied James Earl Ray's request to live out the rest of his life with his brother.

Ray made his request for a medical furlough last month, and prison policy requires that the inmate be in danger of "imminent death" to qualify. Ray, 69, has been ill with liver disease for months and has been near death from organ failure several times.

Jerry Ray said he was unaware that the furlough had been denied but was not surprised.
