


Any information you can forward to me would be appreciated as our church is a small one and cannot afford to be separated.



WHY I AM LEAVING THE PROTESTANT EPIS-COPAL CHURCH TO WORK WITH OTHERS WHO DESIRE TO RECAPTURE THE FAITH OF OUR FATHERS AND THE WITNESS OF THE HISTORIC CHURCH

I am a clergyman of the Episcopal Church. I have been in the ministry now here in North Carolina for more than fourteen years. I have served as priest in charge of one mission and as rector of two parishes. In times past it has been my privilege to serve my Church in many responsible positions. I was for several years a member of the Executive Council of the Diocese in which I was located, and was Secretary of the Diocesan Convention, Chairman of the Department of Youth, a member of the Department of Christian Education, and a member of the Department of Camps and Conferences, to mention some of the positions I have held.

But the time has come when I can no longer support the Protestant Episcopal Church and what it stands for, and I am now coming out of it. To say that I am leaving my Church is not quite the whole truth, for I feel that the Protestant Episcopal Church, for reasons to be enumerated, has already left me. I am separating myself from what the Church has become. I am involve out of

ences have now reached into Church publications including Church School literature for our young people.

So ends the "Belief and Declaration of Purpose" of the Committee of Christian Laymen.

It is olivious, it seems to me, that much of the programs of the National Council of Churches and of the international Communist conspiracy are being promoted within the framework of the Episcopal Church. A new clergyman in the diocese some time ago quoted a hishon as indicating to him that "the plums" - that is, preferred positions - in the Diocese went to the men who promoted the program of the National Council of Churches. It seems obvious. The Church, in my opinion, is so oriented toward a program of political and social action, that it practically has lost its true mission. We have committees in the Church that tell us how the Church can be effective in getting legislation passed, such legislation as Analition of capital punishment, civil rights (soc. When I support the Church, I am supporting agencies of the Church doing these kinds of things. I find that I cannot endure it any lunger. It appears that the Church has degenerated into the role of a political and social action committee trying to remake the world, by the use of force and persuasion, into the image that the people in authority in it think it ought to be made into, rather than, through preaching the Gospel, letting the Holy Spirit of God move men to do His will freely.

I feel that in the Protestant Episcopal Church I'am supporting a political and social action program committed to things that I disagree with and that are displacing the Church's primary function of proclaiming the saving grace offered to sinners through faith in the Divine Saviour. I am afraid that I have had about all that I can stand.

FIRST CONCERN IS THE FAITH

he mes are times of grave concern. My first consister the historic Christian Faith. Christianity is founded on God the Father's revelation of Himself to the world through His divinely appointed Son, knowledge of whom has been committed truthfully to us through the Scriptures and through the Holy Spirit and through a faithful ministry. My secund concern is for my country, which is hased on the Federal Constitution as it is plainly worded and plainly intended by its authors and hased on the basic economic factor of private property, and on concern for the preservation of our national sovereignty and individual freedom. Thirdly in order comes my concern for the Episcopal Church. I cannot accommodate myself to rationally and willfully serving both good and evil. When the Episcopal Church serves

causes that I consider to be evil and contrary to the best interests of the Biblical faith and of my country, then something has to give somewhere, and my personal integrity under God a more important to me than my remaining a priest of the Episcopal Church.

I feel therefore, that the Church and I must separate, cover left for a long time that I should so, with the Church and fight for also I believe in, from within the Church, and I have done so. But I think now that the time has come when I may be able to give a more adequate witness to God's Truth outside the Episcopal Church.

the Virgin Bitth of our Lord as historical fact,

the Divinity of our lard,



I have had all that I can stand of its social, economic, and political program of socialism; of its pseudo-hrotherhood; of its appearement of the Communists; of its so-called civil rights; and of its rejection of much that I consider to be fundamental to the Biblical faith.

AN EPISCOPALIAN HERITAGE

Let me preface what I have to say further by saying that I am an Episcopalian of many generations. Episcopal clergy are among my forebears. I loved the Church of my childhood and the Church that I felt was handed down to me as "the Church of our Fathers." I loved the comforting faith and gracious manners manifested in the lives of my early spiritual mentors, whose lives and teachings revealed that they were indwelt by the Spirit of a Sasiour, whom they taught as the Bible plainly result is an account to the creeds and the heritage of its architecture, its hymns, and many things besides.

But the Church has changed; or, at least, the Church seems to be no longer as it used to appear. The spiritual and intellectual climate is no longer as in days gone by, and I feel that it has changed for the worse, and the faith of the clergy has been sorely watered down with liberal doctrine.

The root of my unrest is found, I believe, in the fact that the bent of my nature is primarily toward the Divine Revelation recorded for us in the Bible, which, I believe, has been imparted by the grace of the Holy Spirit. As I interpret the situation, my faith is basically Biblical faith; and I think that the faith of the Church also should be Biblical faith; and that its worship and practices should conform plainly to God's Word which is found in His Holy Book.

YEARS OF REFLECTION

observations gleaned from many sources. I have come to the conclusion, however, that there is a wide discrepancy between what the Bible teaches and what many of the clergy, both of the priesthood and of the episcopate, believe. There are many who do not believe that the Virgin Birth of Christ was an historical fact. They call it a myth. It is my conviction that there are many who do not believe that the tomb in which our Lord was buried on Good Friday was empty on Easter morning and that He had risen from the dead in a transformed, quickened, glorified body. They say this also is only myth. It is my personal observation that there are many in the

Church who do not believe in the roly Trinity, in its historic relevance and significance. One hishop says that it is out of date. There are many who do not believe in the plain Bible statements that salvation is offered through Christ alone, through His atoning sacrifice, to be appropriated through faith in Him.

CHURCHMEN REJECT THE BIBLE

As samples of current thinking, let me give you a few quotes from certain leaders of the Anglican Communion. Here are some attributed to His Grace, the most Rev. Arthur Michael Ramsey, Archbishop of Canterbury, who is recognized generally as the titular head of the worldwide Anglican Communion. It is reported that in the London Daily Mail of October 2, 1961, he said, "Fleaven is also not a place to which we humans go in our present hodily state, nor is it a place for Christians only. Those who have led a good life on earth but found themselves unable to believe in God will not be debarred from heaven. I expect to meet some present-day atheists there." He reportedly is quoted in the Oakland Tribune of February 3. 1956 in an AP dispatch from Durham, England, as follows: "The theology of 'Christ hore your punishment: believe and he saved," when accompanied by the fundamentalist's cliché 'The Bible savs' is a very distorted view of the apostolic gospel." Further questionable theology of the Archbishop is reprted in the same dispatch, where the Archbishop is said to have "attacked the Protestant, movement which insists upon the infallibility of the scriptures and such biblical miracles as the virgin birth and the physical resurrection of Christ." Of Dr. Hewlett Johnson, the "Red Dean" of Canterbury, it reportedly is stated in a UPI dispatch of January 26, 1959: He "was quoted as saving he believes Stalin's in heaven . . . 'Stalin was a rough and stern man. He had to be because he had a dirty job to do. But God's eye is a big eye and sees everything, good and had. To know all is to forgive all, so I think that from heaven's point of view, Stalin is safe'." These statements speak for themselves and are hardly deserving of comment among people who believe the plain statements of Scripture.

The Rt. Rev. Richard S. M. Emrich of the Episcopal Diocese of Michigan is quoted in the Detroit News of December 30, 1961 as saying: "You see, God knows His own, and the one thing He wants is love. That is why a good Moslem, who loves God and his neighbor, has a better chance at heaven than a lazy, selfish Christian." I wonder what prompted the bishop to engage in this sophistry. I wonder also, does he consider the doctrine in the third chapter of the Gospel of St. John to be false doctrine? Apparently, he does.

I did not vote to get into it, and I cannot vote to get out of it, and I have no way of making my will or views of any effect in regard to it. I am advised that among many of the things that the Na-

tional Council of Churches advocates are disarmament, co-existence with Russia, the abolition of loyalty security laws, recognition of Red China, forced racial integration, to mention but a few. One study of the National Council of Churches by a congregation of the Protestant Episcopal Church states that the Council has "exceeded its rightful role in speaking out, as the official voice of Protestantism in America, on such controversial issues as federal aid to education, the right-to-work laws, the ethical considerations of the steel dispute, the seating of Red China in the United Nations, etc.," and that it, "as presently constituted and operated, is a harmful and highly dangerous institution" (St. Mark's Vestry Committee Report on the NCC). I am advised that in 1960 the Episcopal Church gave the NCC "over \$500,000" which "does not include private gifts, but is represented in the general hudget of the Episcopal Church, pp. 47, 48, 49, 50, 51" (The National Council of Churches of Christ - Activities Revealed, published by the States Rights Council of Georgia). When I support the Protestant Episcopal Church, my financial contributions and my moral and spiritual support are funneled in part into the support of the National Council of Churches. There is no way that I can avoid this happening as long as I am supprting the Protestant Episcopal Church in any way whatsoever, whether it be in giving t and local needs, toward huilding funds, or anything else. I am opposed to my supporting, even indirectly, an organization that is aligned with forces that are destroying America. It sorely tries my spirit.


Someone has sent me a copy of the "Belief and Declaration of Purpose" of the Committee of Christian Laymen, Inc., Box 285. Woodland Hills, California. The statement to which I heartily subsessibe reads as follows:

- 1. We believe in an unchanging God "the same yesterday, to day and for ever," hence the Gospel of Jesus Christ, rather than the Social Gospel, should be preached from the pulpit.
- 2. We believe that as individuals we are fully capable of making our own political decisions. So we oppose the political activities of the National Council of Churches in seeking, as an organization, to influence legislation in the name of Protestantism.
- 3. We oppose the One World, One Church idea whereby this nation surrenders its sovereignty to the United Nations as promoted by our Church leaders.
- 4. We support the American Free Enterprise System and our Constitutional Republican form of Government as a necessary adjunct to the survival of Christianity.
- 5. We seek to inform lay people of influence in our Seminaries and Churches which downgrade the Bible and picture Jesus Christ as just another man. These influ-

Summer church conferences and camps should be a time for racial experiences for high school youth, all the way from simple Negro-white associa-tion to participation in "dem-enstrations," according to some maticipal Protestant youth

This was one of the major suggestions at the closing ser-ion of the Youth Ministry Consultation on Race Wednes-day afternoon at the Method-ist Boar dof Education building. 19th & Grand. Sponsor was the Emergency Commission on Religion and Race of the National Council of Churches of Christ in the L.a.u

The meeting was a consultation for discussion and exchange of ideas, not a voting matter; results were in the form of suggestions and representatives of some of the 15 denomiations present were clearly not in sympathy with many of the ideas presented, although the entire atmosphere was friendly and profes-

Many of the ideas were plainly only those of the person making the suggestion, members of the group of 40 were either staffers for the National Council of Churches or denominational youth leaders and editors:

The only outside resources leaders were from the Student Non-Violent Coordinating Committee and its northern counterpart, the Northern Student Movement.

Summer youth conferences Jay Moore, Associate director suggested the use of people who have been directly in-volved in racial demonstra-tions as leaders in the camps to acquaint church young peo-ple-10th, 11th and 12th graders for this consultationwhat is going on the American race revolution. "Last year we took a group on a speaking tour of the Midwest to stir up tour of the midwest to sur up votes on civil rights and to influence congressmen in some of the swing (doubtful) areas—got three of them out of jail for the trip just in time to catch the hus."

Pointing out that he is on a phone-call basis with leaders the racial organizations, John Wood, chairman of the consultation and on the NCC youth department staff in New York City, told the leaders to refer requests for such speakers to his office.

Then Miss Joan Hemenway. associate editor of "Youth" magazine of the United Church of Christ, Philadelphia, suggested that instead of bringing in the demonstrators that the entire camp or conference should be "blooded"—taken to the demonstrations for par-ticipation. "The kids owe it to the church to march, to picket? in the South, and more so in the North."

"Which is important," he said, "for the youth to work at developing his own identity or to become militant in social action? I think it is asking too much, and I am familiar with. what Negro 11th and 12th graders have done in filling.

Richard Rice, Rev. The editor of a Methodist publica-tion for senior high, differed. Because of over-protection, youth should be interested in getting freedom, he said. They acquiesce in their alayery, as it were. I like the idea of giving them contact with SNCC, voter registration and such things."

John Newman, a college student taking a year out to work with the national Methodist youth organization here, de-clared there is not enough conflict in the church. He suggented that NCC help trigger sympathetic youth demonstra-tions all ever the U.S. when

eral Conference" (starting April 26 in Pittsburgh).

Marvin Dirks of the Mennonite Church, Newton, Kansas, thought the youth had more freedom than at any other age, pointing out that youth, particularly in college towns, can get away with al-most anything. They expect children to do things. Aren't they the easiest mobilized and the most volatile? The average tree-ager has his family on his side in any shenanigans."

Miss Hemenway pointed out that "all over the nation

parents have restrictive infinences. Summer camp is the first time for the youth to Fri away, free to do as they like."

(At several points in the discussions, it had been said that parental pressure is one of the major reasons the high schoolers have not been taking a more active part in the racial demonstrations. Negro representatives at the consultation had little to say during the dircussions of how to get the youth out from under parental control, unless asked a direct question. In conversation after the close of the consultation, several, although deeply concerned over church participa-tion in the campaign for equal rights and civil justice, were as appalled as some of the white representatives at the ideas for subverting parental control of youth.)

Discussion developed the pos-

sibility of quietly arranging with one of the racial organizations to be staged in connection with church youth conferences, so that the youth could be involved, yet organizers of the conference would

not be responsible.
"If I'd done my homework, we should have had CORE (Committee on Racial Equality) organize a picket line when the National Conference of Methodist Youth met," Wood told Newman.

One committee was bothered by commissicating with youth in the southeast — earlier in the consultation one editor told of having copies of an

Efforts to get racial matters into 1964 summer conferences may be stymied because many denominational leaders have already sent out their informa-tion. Boyd Hughes of Chris-tian Church (Disciples of tian Church (Disciples of Christ), Indianapolis, said his denomination's 1965 program calls for youth conferences to get off the usual conference sites and go where something is happening. Some Illinois conferences have already arranged to switch from their usual rural camps to the heart of Chicago this summer, he told the group.

When the question of in-troducing racial matters into Boys State and Girls State programs came up, Lanier Hunt of the NCC staff sug-gested that an attempt be made to find students who

were going to such camps and train them ahead of time.

"There's always the possibl-My of getting CORE to stage a demonstration at the same time," pointed out Newman.

Throughout the three days, the comments of the NCC leaders were to encourage brushes with "the system" in an effort to get young people involved in the racial revolu-tion as it was continually tion as it was continually termed. For young people to be stopped by police was termed an excellent way to wake them up to what is going on in the world around them.

In his lengthy talk Tues-day, Ir. Williams had pointed out that NCC staffers and most church board staffers are not in any danger of their jobs because of racial activi-ties, and had asked bow they might "use this freedom in the battle for human dignity."

I have received the letter of March 25th from your wife and you, with enclosures, and can understand the concern prompting your communication.

Assistant Director William C. Sullivan, formerly Chief Inspector of the FHI, did receive a telephone call from Bishop Paul Hardin, Jr., and discussed communism and the churches in response to Bishop Hardin's questions. Both agreed that churches and religious organizations have been and will remain targets for communist infiltration as are all segments of our society. Bishop Hardin asked whether the National Council of Churches had ever been cited as a subversive organization by the Attorney General. Mr. Sullivan told him that the National Council of Churches had not been so designated under the provisions of Executive Order 10450. For your, additional information, it is also noted that it has not been cited by the House Committee on Un-American Activities.



Notes From The Bishop's Study ...

It was six-thirty in the morning when the desk clerk at the motel in Jesup, Ga. told me that I was wanted on long distance . . . Dr. Francis Cunningham was calling to tell me that the main building at Columbia College had burned to the ground a few hours earlier He assured me at once that no one had been injured and that the girls had been magnificent in their behavior when disaster struck Like everyone else, Dot and I were shocked at the thought of the loss of an historic building, with records and other valuables, but grateful to God that no lives had been lost Since returning to Columbia I have been cheered by the fine spirit and determination I all who are connected with the college President L. Wright Spears and other administrative officials, the aculty and student body, the Board of Trustees and the Board of Visitors, the pastor and members of College Place Church and the people of Columbia and South Carolina have all cooperated in laying plans to recover as quickly as possible from this devastating blow Of course the alumnae and friends everywhere are lending their full support and I predict that Columbia College will meet the challenge of its recent catastrophe by making greater advances more quickly than otherwise would have been the case....Let us lend our every effort in this direction....Mr. DeHon Clarkson, our able and amiable conference treasurer, tells me that the South Carolina Conference is at the sixty per cent point in the payment of Conference and World Service Benevolences for this conference year Incidentally, I trust that each church and each pastor is giving serious attention to the ADVOCATE campaign A number of people have written to me recently, expressing concern over the unfounded rumors that Communism is invading the Church and the National Council of Churches So I picked up the phone on Tuesday, February 25th, and called the Chief Inspector of the F.B.I. in Washington and asked him about it He said flatly that it was not so And he is in charge of F.B.l. investigations of Communism Some good news comes along occasionally, news that thrills me Down in Elba, Ala-

bama, the Methodist church was asked to pay \$840.00 on World Service and Conference Benevolences Without any pressure from anyone the church voluntarily accepted \$1600.00.... Things like that strengthen our faith in our Methodist people.... David Carter is the highly esteemed pastor there.... Responses to a recent printing of these NOTES have been interesting....I am referring to the NOTES in which I wondered if anybody loved anybody else any more and in which I said that I was fed right up to the neck with hostility A lot of people seem to feel as I do.... One of the more interesting letters came from my old friend Ben Ray in Birmingham He said that sometimes when he feels discouraged and is inclined to think that things have never been so bad he rereads the following quotation:

"It is a gloomy moment in history. Not in the lifetime of any man who reads this paper has there been so much grave and deep apprehension; never has the future seemed so dark and incalculable.

"In France the political cauldron seethes and

bubbles with uncertainty.

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"England and the British Empire are being sorely tried and exhausted in a social and economic struggle, with turmoil at home and uprising of her teeming millions in her far-flung empire.

"The United States is beset with racial, industrial and commercial chaos, drifting we know not where.

"Russia hangs like a storm cloud on the horizon of

Europe — dark, menacing and foreboding.

"It is a solemn moment, and no man can feel indifferent, which haply, no man pretends to feel in the issue of events.
"Of our own trouble, no man can see the end...."

This was an editorial in Harper's Magazine, October 10, 1847.

The Communists have demonstrated time and again their mastery of deception in injecting their slogans and propaganda into Christian groups on the themes of "peace," "democracy," "aid to the poor" and "civil liberties." They are just as facile in dealing with Jewish groups in passing the lie that there is no "anti-Semitism in Russia." To the Jew they say that Palestine is the natural home of the Jews, and to the Mohammedan they deplore Jewish encroachment upon the Arabs. Selling and pandering the hellish hates of Communism, they represent themselves as all things to all people.

Individuals who, if they are not Communists, have followed every twist of the Party's line have defended themselves on the basis of their self-declared nominal affiliation with the Church. When the Catholic War Veterans asked a group of Communists to declare themselves, as laymen in any church have a right to ask a brother, they replied variously from "none of your business" to "the suffering of an individual as a result of such attacks is small compared to the sufferings of Christ."

TO SECURE OF THE PERSON OF THE

Many Communist fronts have operated under the guise of some church commission or religious body. It is ghastly to see the monster atheism being nourished in the churches which it seeks to destroy. Church leaders can stop this nefarious infiltration by taking vigorous action in the boards and commissions under church supervision. Individual ministers and church members can avoid being hoodwinked if they will stay close to the fundamentals of their faith. Any minister who cannot find in his Bible sufficient argument for the cause of liberty and social justice—who has to borrow the double-talk of the Communists—is in the wrong profession and should be carefully watched by his official superiors and his congregation.

Religion is the only force that can save our civilization. Only in religion can men learn to live at peace with one another, because only religion puts total emphasis on serving others rather than self. In the twilight of despair which is settling on so many areas of the earth, we must turn to the Fatherhood of God.

The zeal of early Christians stamped out paganism in Rome and conquered the savage gods of the northern barbarians. That same zeal could convert godless Communism. It is up to the churches of America to recapture the militant spirit of Paul and to fulfill the magnificent prophecy of John:

"And ye shall know the truth, and the truth shall make you free."

I shall appreciate any information you may have on this subject. Please let me hear from you concerning this matter at your earliest convenience.



Bramlett Urges Stand Against It

Terming the endorsement and firming of the Mississippi Delta Project by the National Council of Churches an "open call to law violation in the name of non-violent protest" and "a gullible acceptance of a foreign program for weakening the American nation through racial agitation under the guise of religious activity." Coahoma County planter Leon C. Bramlett Jr. yesterday asked the Clarksdale Rotary Club to recognize the inherent dangers in the project and be prepared through knowledge to "cope with it with foresight, calmness, patience and intelligence."

A member of the Citizens Committee, appointed by the Coahoma County Bar Association last summer when the initial NCC activity began in Clarksdale. Bramlett last week gave the same report to Cooper Yerger Post of the American Legion and is scheduled to address other clubs and civic groups in the near future.

His written address-included detailed documentation of sources, including frequent direct quotations from the reports of Fedgar Hoover, director of the Federal Bureau of Investigation, the resolution of the RCC General Board at its Baltimore meeting Feb. 26, when the so-called Delta project was first publicized, and comparisons of the platform of the Communist Party of the United States with the details of the 1964 program as announced.

Bramlett emphasized that while the "invasion and activity of these ministers, along with recruited student aides, will prove exasperating and annoying" to both the Negro and white residents of the 15 Delta gounties involved, "it is the duty and responsibility of each of us to leave the handling of any problems that may arise entirely within the discretion of our expanded and improving law enforcement expanded assistant of the elected begins of our government."



With respect to your inquiries, I would like to point out that the FBI does not issue clearances or nonclearances of any type and that our files are confidential and available for official use only, pursuant to regulations of the Department of Justice. I can, however, assure you that the FBI has not investigated state-supported schools and colleges in North Carolina. For this reason, it would obviously be impossible for this Bureau to make any authoritative blanket statement regarding the existence of communists or communist sympathizers in these educational institutions. With regard to the National Council of Churches, 'a representative of the FBI did talk to the group mentioned in your clipping; however, they were not given any information from our files to substantiate their conclusion. - Charges that the National Council of Churches (NCC) harbors communist sympathizers are false, says the Joint Commission on Feumenical Relations of the Episcopal Church after a 2-year investigation of the NCC.

The Episcopal commission reported that it had met with "personnel of the House Committee on Un-American Activities and the Federal Bureau of Investigation" but was "not able to discover any fact of record" that would support charges of communist sympathies in the NCC.

"The allegation that the NCC has given intellectual comfort to the communists by following certain economic and social lines is based on the erroneous assumption that people who attack the same economic and social problems must share the same principles," the report stated, adding:

"The NCC has shown in its literature, its pronouncements, its action, in the lives of its leaders, and in many other ways that its forces are enlisted in the fight for free men in a free world."

In its report, however, the Episcopal commission noted that the NCC had exposed itself to valid criticism of its pronouncements on controversial economic, social, and political issues by failing to make clear that "dedicated Christians may be standing on either side of a particular issue."

In conclusion the report recommended that the Episcopal Church increase its participation in the NCC.

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Your letter of March 21st, with enclosure, has been received and I certainly appreciate your kind comments regarding the FBI and my administration of it. The sentiment you expressed and your confidence in this Bureau mean a great deal to my associates and me. We regret that there has been 11 to my associates and me. As I indicated in my letter to you of March 2nd, the FBI does not make evaluations as to the character or integrity of any organization, application or individual. This is true in connection with the National Council of Churches.

Assistant Director William C. Bullivan did receive a telephone cali from Bishop Paul Hardin, Jr., and discussed communism and the churches in response to Bishop liardin's questions. Both agreed that churches and religious organizations have been and will remain targets for communist infiltration as are all segments of our society. Bishop Hardin stated he was empletely and vigorously opposed to communism and that he would have nothing whatsoever to do with any organization that was connected with continuism. He asked whether the National Council of Churches had ever been consider as a subversive organization by the Attorney General. Mr. Bullivan to do that the National Council of Churches had not been so designated under the provisions of Executive Order 10450. For your additional information, it is also noted that it has not been cited by the House Committee on Un-American Activities.

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In response to another question regarding churches and clergymen in Leneral, Mr. Sullivan explained that because of the investigations of the FBI and rising public opposition to this evil philosophy, communist efforts to infiltrate religious institutions have been largely thwarted and the overwhelming majority of our clergymen are completely loyal to this Nation.

You were previously furnished a copy of "Let's Fight Communism Sanely!" which makes note of this same fact in the last paragraph. The literature I sent you also emphasized my concern over anticommunist activities which confuse, divide and tend to weaken us as a people at a time when we must be clear-thinking, united and strong in the face of world communism.

Regrettably, there has been a tendency on the part of some to make exaggerated charges as to the extent of communist success in gaining influence within legitimate organizations in our society, such as our religious institutions. We must continually be alert to communist attempts to penetrate and influence; however, our efforts must be rational and objective, and kept which the due process of law.

I hope the foregoing will be of assistance to you in understanding the background of this situation. You will note that these facts do not constitute an evaluation of the National Council of Churches.

To say the least, Mr. Hoover, I am confused. The reason for this is rather simple, I think. In you letter to me of March 2, 1964, you made the statement "You may be sure, however, that this Bureau has not investigated The National Council of Churches." Yet Bishop Paul Hardin, Jr., says that this Chief Inspector of the F.B.I. gave him a clean slate as far as the National Council Churches is concerned.

Also, in your letter to me of March 2, 1964, you made the following statement: With respect to your inquiries, the FEI being an investigative agancy of the Federal Government niether makes evaluations nor draws conclusions as to the character or integrity of any organization, publication or individual." Yet Bishop Paul Eardin's statement of March 3, 1964, would lead me to believe that this Chief inspector of the F.B.I. did just this in relation to the question the Bishop asked him.

And, Mr. Hoover, in concluding the second paragraph of the March 2, 1964, letter to me, you made this statement: "Therefore, I trust you will understand why I am not in a position to comment along the lines you have suggested." As I recall, Mr. Hoover, one of "the lines" I "surgested" comment was as to whether Communism had any of its forces acting within the boundaries of the National Council of Churches. Now the following statement was made by you in an April 17, 1962, publication entitled "INTERNAL SECURITY":

^{7.} The FBI is as near as your telephone. The first page of telephone directories shows the number of the nearest FBI field office. Each office is open 24 hours a day, including Saturdays. Sundays, and holidays. You may furnish us information either by telephone, letter, or in person. Data in FBI files is held confidential; hence, WE CANNOT INFORM YOU REGARDING THE RESULTS OF ANY INCUIRY WE HAY MAKE BASED ON INFORMATION YOU SUPPLY. NEITHER CAN WE CONFIRM OR REFUTE YOUR SUSPICIONS RELATIVE TO SUBVERSIVE ACTIVITIES, HOR CAN WE SUPPLY CHARACTERIZATIONS OR EVALUATIONS OF INDIVIDUALS, ORGANIZATIONS, OR PUBLICATIONS.

Again, It appears to me that this is just what this Chief Inspector of the FBI did in the telephone call supposedly made by Bishop Paul Hardin, Jr.

So, Mr. Hoover, from the forgoing statements of fact, I hope you can understand why I am "confused."

Now, some two pages ago, I said I had one other cuestion to ask you. That is simply this:



I hope you will not infer either that we do or do not have information in our files relating to the subject of your inquiry.

With regard to Mr. Smoot, he was employed in the FBI as a Special Agent from March 23, 1942, until June 15, 1951, when he voluntarily resigned for personal reasons. Since his writings at the present time are personal ventures of his own, I am unable to comment concerning them.

In response to your inquiry concerning Mr. Philbrick, he furnished information concerning subversive activities on a confidential basis to this Bureau from 1942 to 1952, for which he was compensated. His services were terminated with his appearance as a witness in the trial of the communist leaders in New York City.

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There Is No Danger From Internal Reds'

TO THE EDITOR: I note the letter of Ruth Imhoff Schumacher published on February 18. She intentionally confuses the local Council of Churches of Cincinnati and Hamilton County, which is completely autonomous, with the National Council of Churches. The National Council of Churches is strictly a representative body made up of delegates and board members officially elected by the constituent churches. Whatever they say is said by those officially elected representatives, and any delegation from a particular church may dissent on any vote taken by the National Council of Churches. They speak for themselves as delegates, and in so doing they do not bind their churches, and they certainly do not bind the members of those churches. This has been repeatedly stated and is only denied by extremists like Mr. Philbrick.

She objects to spending "\$90,000 in ball bonds for racial demonstrators." There is no evidence that any such sum was spent for such purpose. But the work the Mational Council of Churches' Commission on Religion and Race, jointly with the National Lawyers' Committee set up in Washington after a White House conference two years ago, of which I am proud to be a member, secured the release of demonstrators locked up in an abandoned penitentiary in Mississippi with little food and evidently no clothing, and of a group of young women imprisoned in Georgia under the most distressing conditions.

The National Council of Churches is not pacifist and never has been, and does not distribute peace propaganda of any such character as Mr. Philbrick is quoted as claiming.

'Church Council Needs An Awakening'

TO THE EDITOR: As daughter, granddaughter and niece of three deceased, well-loved Cincinnati elergymen and one medical missionary to the Congo, I feel certain none of them is resting in peace if he is aware of how well many clergymen and the Council of Churches are demonstrating the effectiveness of the Communists in using our churches.

Herbert Philbrick, FBI counterspy, said, "The church is the No. 1 target of the Communists in America." J. Edgar Hoover has expressed real concern over the safety of our nation "as long as Communists can secure clergymen to do their evil work." And Earl Browder, while still leader of the American Communist party, said at one of our seminaries, "You would be surprised to learn that we have many ministers active in churches who are members of the party."

As a tax-exempt organization, the council is supposed to refrain from political activities; yet in organizing the Washington march, signing of petitions for the passage of the civil rights bill, and lobbying for many controversial political issues, it is ignoring the conditions for its exemption. The council in '63 boasted of spending \$90,000 for ball bonds of racial demonstrators. They have sent and paid students to participate in sometimes militant demonstrations, and are advocating "forced integration."

When council leaders, speakers and clergymen are saying, "Marxism may be God's means to Christian fulfillment in history," and, "Since democracy has failed, God has put His blessing on the Communist system," when hundreds of them are participating in Communist-front organizations and when the council makes political pronouncements on highly controversial issues, they are dividing us in our congregations, losing support for the council and weakening the strength of Protestant America, which is just what Khrushchev has ordered.

If you belong to a member church of the Council and are not in accord with this fraternization with atheistic Communism, launch a protest in your own denomination and pray that somehow the council may be brought to its senses.

Our brief showed that the National Council was not under the domination of communists. that time we have been alcrt for any information concerning communist infiltration, domination or control of NCC, particularly in connection

It is noted that the mational officers are elected on a triennium basis. Hy memorandum to you dated 9/20/61 set forth the identities of the national officers for the 1950-63 triennium together with the results of file reviews concerning those national officers.

The above memorandum pointed out that the next election of national officers would take place in the latter part of 1963.

On 3/23/64 the Washington Field Office secured and forwarded to the Bureau a list of the national officers elected in the latter part of 1963 for the triennium 1963-1966. In this regard it is noted that a booklet currently being distributed by NCC still carries the officers elected for the 1960-1963 triennium; however, Washington Field was able to secure the list of officers elected for the 1963-1966 triemium which the person whom they contacted at NCC stapled over the page of the booklet containing the old officers.







Please refer to your letter to me dated March 11, 1964.

The files of this Bureau are confidential and, therefore, no comment can be made concerning areas in which you are interested. No conclusions, either positive or negative, should be drawn from this stated position.

It can be stated that while churches and related religious organizations have been targets of communists their afforts have been thwarted by the FBI's internal security programs and by investigations, arrests and prosecution of Communist Party officials. Further, communist activities have been neutralized by calm and rational public opposition emanating from the major segment of our social order.

The communists have not, in any way, changed their goals and, therefore, we must continue to be alert to prevent them from making any headway in our free institutions.





Dear Mr. Hoover:

I am very much concerned about the possibilities of the communist movements within these United States, especially within the areas so vitally affecting our youth, namely the Church.

Therefore, I submit the following statement by Bishop Faux Mardin of Columbia, South Carolina which appeared in the March 3, 1964 issue of The Methodist Christian Advocate, the official publication of The Alabama-West Florida Conference of The Methodist Church:

"A number of people have written to me recently, expressing concern over the unfounded rumors that Communism is invading the Church and the National Council of Churches...So I pieked up the phone on Tuesday, February 25th, and called the Chief Inspector of the F.B.I. in Washington and asked him about it ... He said flatly that it was not so ... And he is in charge of F.B.I. investigations of Communism."

Please confirm the above.

In Bishop Hardin's sermon delivered in Dothan, Alabama the evening of March 8, 1964, he made the same statement along with other comments.

To me, this leaves the impression that your bureau has made an evaluation or conclusion in this instance.

Does this mean that the National Council of Churches has a clean slate, with your bureau? Does your bureau have evidence to prove that there are no communists, communism or communistic leanings among the officials and leaders within the National Council of Churches? Do any of the programs of the National Council of Churches parallel those of the Communists?

I greatly appreciate the work which you and your department are doing and have the utmost faith in your bureau. You are highly commended and admired.

The Union Springs church dilemma has now reached the court stage and I am sure that all of us deplore this unfortunate circumstance . . . The former pastor has publicly announced his severance from The Methodist Church, yet continues to be presented as the pastor of the Union Springs Methodist Church, and clines to his credentials as a Meth-edist minister, although his ministered privileges as such have been suspended according to the rules of The Methodist Church . . . Although I think that they are wrong in what they are trying to do I know that the people who are attempting to withdraw and take the property with them are honorable people — and as a bishop of The Methodist Church I am left with no choice but to up-hold the law and structure of the Church . . . 

The Other Face Of The NCC

For some time now, the readers of this newspaper have been conducting, by means of letters to the Forum, a running battle over the National Council of Churches. The NCC has been attacked and criticized as sympathetic to Communism and as being infiltrated with fellow travelers. It has been defended as a great force for Christianity.

Now, finally, the NCC itself has jumped into the fray, with a letter from its director of information in which he sets forth the goals and programs of the NCC and attempts to discredit its critics and their criticism. We published the letter last Sunday.

Except in unusual circumstances, it is the policy of this newspaper, as it is with most, not to argue with the opinions expressed by individual letter writers, although we do point out errors of fact. The NCC letter, however, expressed the opinion of an organization and contained statements of policy. It is the opinion not of one man, but of many. And as such, it might be accepted by some as the last word on the subject.

Well, it isn't. Far from it. This

men of the NCC have been published by Circuit Riders, Inc., which stated: "In 1961, Communist fronts had the support of more than 1,200 different Protestant clergymen."

On Feb. 25, 1960, Mr. Richard Arens, then staff director of the House Committee on Un-American Activities, testified during a Committee hearing that, on the basis of "careful, but yet incomplete checks" it had been shown that "Thus far, of the leaders of the National Council of Churches of Christ in America, we have found over 100 persons in leadership capacity with either Communist front records or records of service to Communist causes." This testimony was verified Tuesday by the present director of the HCUA staff, Mr. Francis McNamara.

The foregoing should suffice to show that the letter began with a deliberate whitewash.

Among other things, the letter stated that the NCC had "never referred directly to right to work laws." This is a dodge. As the letter stated, the NCC is on record as saying: "Union membership as a basis of continuing employment should be neither required nor forbidden by

W it isn't. Far from it. This high-sourcing statement of ideals, this results of programs, this explanation of and denial of accusations, contains so many half-truths, distortions of fact, artful dodges and careful omissions as to qualify it as a masterpiece of deception. Instead of turning the other cheek, the NCC has turned the other face.

For instance: "Nothing could be further from the truth—" the letter states in the beginning as a reply to accusations that it is infiltrated with fellow travelers and with Marxist-Communist ideals.

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As a matter of fact, nothing could be further from the truth than that denial.

The National Council of Churches of Christ in America was founded in 1950 as a merger of the old Federal Council of Churches and several minor religious organizations. The House Committee on Un-American Activities and the Senate Internal Security Subcommittee have identified many FCC and NCC officials and members as Communist fellow travelers.

And what is a fellow traveler? The Senate subcommittee defines one as "... an individual who from time to time supports one or more organizations or campaigns operating under the indirect and usually unpublicized initiative and control of the Communist Party or its representatives." There are three types of fellow travelers, according to the subcommittee: the conscious, who is aware that he is supporting Communist objectives; the consistent, who sometimes takes issue with the Party but continues to support its programs and campaigns even after they have been exposed; and the unwitting, who is a dupe.

On this basis, and documented by the Congressional committees, the NCC is shot through and through with Communist fellow travelers, from its longtime official and former president, Dr. Edwin T. Dahlbers, on down.

One of the favorite techniques of the NCC is to have its members and officials promoting a desired program while the organization itself takes no official stand. This is subterfuge.

For example: the letter stated that the NCC has never called for the abolition of the HCUA. Perhaps, technically, it has not. But its officers and members have signed such petitions.


Another example: the letter stated that the NCC has made no statement calling for the admission of Red China to the United Nations. But an NCC-called conference, attended by top NCC officials, made such a statement unanimously. And the NCC urged that the statement be publicized and given great weight.

The letter stated the NCC does not favor repeal of the McCarran Act, but instead, wants to have it changed. However, the changes it wants would make the present act ineffective. Furthermore, past-president Dahlberg has signed at least 11 petitions calling for an outright repeal of the act.

We could go on and on, but it is not necessary to prove the point. And that is: on the basis of the public records, the NCC stands convicted of Communist front activities indulged in by its members and officials. And on the basis of its letter, it stands convicted of propagandiatic trickery.

The NCC, on the one hand, has endorsed Christian programs as an organization, while on the other hand it supports atheistic Communist doctrines through the individual efforts of its members and officials. The NCC reminds us of Janus, the two-faced Roman pagan god. It turns the Christian face to the nation. But we should never forget that other face.



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

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

Dear Sir:

The National Council of Churches' Cormission on Religion and Race has had, as you know, considerable involvement in the various attempts which have been made to attain equal justice by White and Negro citizens in the State of Mississippi during the past several months. Two areas are of particular concern to us, and I should like to enquire, if I might, as to the actions, if any, which the Department of Justice intends to take in regard to them.

1. U.S. v. leflore County, Mississippi, et al. - Suit seeking release of 45 residents of Itja Bena, Mississippi.

On June 28, 1963 the Department of Justice filed a complaint sceking the release of 45 residents of Itta Bena who were arrested after they marched downtown to seek police protection after persons unknown had allegedly released noxious substances into a church where they were holding a voter registration meeting. On or about July 19, 1953 the District Court ruled that the Severment had not established a violation of 1971(b). The Government appealed this ruling and applied for an injunction pending its appeal. The injunction was denied by the Court of Appeals for the Fifth Circuit. The Government, we understand, has now withdrawn its appeal to the United States Court of Appeals. A trial do novo of these 15 defendants was hald in the County Court of Leflore County during the week of January 20-24, 1964. Forty-four of the forty-five defendants appeared for the trial and were convicted; a forfeiture was taken on the bond of the one abcent defeniant. Their sontencing, which was scheduled for January 27, was postponed 48 hours so that I might obtain new appeal tonds which would allow the desendants to remain at large pending an appeal to the higher courts of Mississippi.

The Mational Council of Churches, through its Commission on Religion and Race, arranged for the bonds which effected the releast of these his Megroes lest August, after they had been imprisoned for nearly two months. At that time \$10,000 from our Emergency Bail Fund was paid to the insurance company

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which wrote the bonds as collateral and premium payments, and in addition

we have a moral obligation to the company to make good any loss over and above that amount. An additional \$450 was paid to the company on January 27, 1964 for the new bonds.

It appears to me unlikely that the courts of the State of Mississippi will reverse the decision of the County Court. I am not in a position to know whether certiorari to the United States Supreme Court will be sought by the defendants. It is my belief that the interest of the defendants and the financial interest of the National Council of Churches' Emergency Bail Fund would best be protected by the Department's suit, if it could be brought to a favorable termination. I would appreciate knowing, therefore, what further steps the Department contemplates in regard to its action.

State of Mississippi v. Moses, and State of Mississippi v. Guyot II.

On January 23, 1964 Robert Moses was convicted in the Justice of the Peace Court of the City of Hattiesburg on charges of obstructing a sidewalk and refusal to obey the lawful command, of an officer. At the time of his arrest, Mr. Moses was engaged in directing a voter registration drive in Forrest County, Hississippi. Mr. Moses' defense was conducted by J. Robert Lunney, Esq., of New York, representing the Lawyers' Committee on Civil Rights Under Law, and by myself. The Department of Justice provided a stenographer who recorded the proceedings. I am requesting you, sir, to order the stenographer to make a transcript of the trial and asking the Department to examine the transcript for the purpose of determining whether the Government has enough evidence to initiate a suit to protect Mr. Moses' rights.

Mr. Robert Guyot was tried on January 30, 1964 before the County Court of Leflore County, Mississippi, a court of record, on a charge of contributing to the delinquency of a minor. He was found guilty, fined the sum of \$500 and sentenced to six months in prison, five months of which were suspended. I served as defense counsel for Mr. Guyot in that case. In my judgment, the record demonstrates ample proof that Mr. Guyot's arrest was an attempt to intimidate and suppress the voter registration drive in Hattiesburg and that Mr. Guyot's conviction was contrary to the weight of the evidence. I would like to know whether the Government has any present intention of initiating an action which would protect Mr. Guyot's rights.

III. Alleged Police Brutality Against Oscar Chase

On or about January 22, 1964 Oscar Chase was arrested and incarcerated in the County Jail of Hattiesburg, Kississippi on a charge of leaving the scene of an accident. This charge was subsequently passed into the files after the private citisen whose truck had allegedly been damaged withdrew his complaint. While in jail Hr. Chase was severly beaten by another

prisoner. Er. Chaco has alleged that the beating was done in the presence and with the encouragement of the jailer and two or three members of the Matticsburg Folico Dopartment. The beating allegedly took place at approximately 8:00 P.H., and Mr. Chase was given no modical treatment until the following morning when he called the voter registration headquarters and informed them of the beating and requested to be released on bail. It is my understanding that an investigation of this incident has been conducted by the Federal Bureau of Investigation and I am enquiring as to what, if any, actions the Department contemplates in this matter.

May I say, sir, that during my two weeks in Hattiesburg, Hississippi, I was doeply impressed with the efficiency and thoroughness of the operations of the agents of the Federal Bureau of Investigation working under the direction of Er. Joseph Sylvester, Assistant Chief Agent of the New Orleans office. Realizing that some people in the civil rights struggle frequently charge the Federal Bureau of Investigation with being on the side of the local authorities and with doing too little to protect the rights or the genonstrators, I wish to take this opportunity to commend hir. Sylvester and the agents who worked under him in Hattiesburg for their efforts.

I am a Presbyterian minister here in with some other ministers in our city, have become quite concerne about charges being made by Billy James Hargess and Dan Smoot that the National Council of Churches is a 'left-wing' organization.

For example, yesterday I listened to the Christian Crusade broadcast. Dr. Hargess was telling why Dr. Charles J. Poling, outstanding Presbyterian minister for fifty years, left the Presbyterian Church. One of the reasons was that the Presbyterian Church belonged to the NCC. Despite the above, the world communist conspirately and its advocates in the United States continue to pose a basic threath our country. It is important that our citizens educate themselves concerning the true nature of this atheistic philosophy in order that they will be able to resist its eroding influence. At the same time, opposition to communism must be careful and constructive, and kept within the due process of law. It is not enough to be merely against communism. We should exhibit in positive ways the superiority of our form of government over any foreign ideology.

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Regrettably, there is a tendency on the part of some to make exaggerated charges as to the extent of communist success in gaining influence within legitimate organizations and segments of our society, such as our religious institutions. We must continually be alert to communist attempts to penetrate and influence; however, our efforts must be rational and objective.

I am inquiring for facts concerning members of the Governing Body of the National Council of Churches.

At a recent Church meeting, a representative of this organization stated that a letter was in their files from you stating flatly that there are no Communists in the organization's leadership.

I have in my possession literature printed by the Circuit Riders, Inc., 110 Government Place, Cincinatti 2, Onio, which is in conflict with this. According to this literature, at least thirty men who helped write "The Standard Revised Version of the Bible" under the auspices of the National Council of Churches, are, or have been affiliated with various Pro-Communist projects, fronts, and publications. Specifically, I would like information concerning Leroy Waterman, University of Michigan; W. Russell Bowie, Grace Church, New York; Fleming James, University of the South, Sewanee, Tenn.; Frederick C. Grant, Seabury-Western Theological Seminary; Luther A. Weigle, Yale University Divinity School. Even though these men may not be actually members of the Communist Party, they are reported to be conclously serving the Communist cause.

If you are not permitted to release information on individuals, any information that you can furnish substantiating ties between Communist activities and individuals associated with the National Council of Churches would be most helpful.

We who are most seriously concerned about the menace of Communism deeply appreciate your dedication to duty and exceplary performance in the high office which you hold.

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

The U.N. has more say for us than our own Government.

We find ourselves in a group that started out glorious. It was to be an exchange of ideas. Christian brothers were to get together and have a mutual exchange. The Episcopal Church is in it. Do they speak for me? Do they speak for us? I would say since we have 32 voting members, since we have been in it for over 10 years, since we have paid \$500,000 a year, I would say yes, they probably speak for us.

Now, there are several things that are controversial. I do not plan to debate so-cialized medicine, people more capable than I can do that. I do not plan to debate the ethnic problem, that has been debated by people not as intelligent as I. "Lasten, Christ, you did all right in your day, I reckon, but that day's gone now. They ghoated you up a swell story, too; called it the Bible, but it's dead now. The Popes and

Trs 'we made too much money from They've said you to too many kings, generals, robters, and killers; even to the Caar and the Consecta; even to Rockefeller's church, even to the Saturday Evening Post. Make way for a new guy with no religion at all—a real guy named Marx Communist Jenin Fresent Stalin worker mo—I said, me; go shead on, now. You're getting in the way of things, Lord, and please take St. Gandhi with you when you go, and St. Pope Pius, and St. Atmos Me-Phernon, and big black St. Becton of the consecrated dime. And step on the gas, Christ. Move. Don't be so slow about movin'. The world in mine from now on, and nebody's gonna sell me to a king, or a general, or a millionaire. Goodby, Christ, good morning, evolution."—Langston Hughes.

It is very hard to give an impartial appraisal of people who are tearing flown my God and my Jesus! I have had enough of it! I don't plan to ask the Bishop to get me out of the National Council of Churches. I plan to tell him I am out of the Council of Churches. Like the Pennsylvania Dutch say "I Want O-u-t, Out"! "I want to be shut of it"! They didn't ask me if I wanted to get in, and I think I have the privilege of teiling them I don't want to belong

The Church is on the spot, Brethren? The days shead will try our souls. It's going to call for days of consecration. Maybe I don't speak for you. Maybe you'd rather pray "O. daddy, O". But I've had enough of it! I was ordained 28 years ago to preach the Gospel of Jesus Christ. I have been a priest 28 years. I have had three parishes in 28 years. So, you see, I don't run around! The time has come when consecrated Christians, those who love their Lord and Saviour Jesus, must press on to the goal.

The diocesan convention will mret in May. I will tell you how this thing will go. 
I am interested in some information concerning a book by Edgar C. Bundy entitled Collectivism in the Churches. ____

Eeur Mr Hoover:

Several members from various denominations of protistent churches in the La Jolla area, have become increasingly concerned about a trend we think is developing; emphasizing legislative programs and the over-emphasizing of the National Council of Churches.

Because of this concern, we have formed a study group, primarily to investigate the influence; if any; of the N.C.C. on our churches: in regard to legislative matters, and as to it's stand on communism.

I would like to stress that we are not extreme in our views; we have no feelings of racism; nor do we necessarily agree with the views of Billy Hargis or Carl Mac Entire. Our group is made up of doctors, lawers, housewives, business men, but most of all Christians.

We are diligently seeking all points of view on the subject, so that we can constructively learn the facts.

In seeking one point of view, I attended a church meeting of Lutherans: to hear their minister discuss "Christians, Communists, and the N.C.C."

The minister made the following statements, not only in his name, but in the name of the Lutheran Church of America. I quote from printed material he distributed.

"Americans who know what communists believe and how they conduct themselves and who have real knowledge of the organizations and persons listed below will agree with the following statements:

There are no communists or communist sympathizers in the leadership of the N.C.C.

There are no communists or sympathizers in responsible position in any denomination having membership in the N.C.C.

There are no communists or communist sympathizers on the board of the American Civil Liberties Union. (A resolution, adopted in 1940, bars

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supporters of com nist or other totalitarian octrines from serving.)

There are no munists or communist sympthizers in the leadership of the N.A.A.C.P.

There are has never been a communist or a communist sympathizer in the Presidency or on the Supreme Court.

UNESCO is not "communist or communistic".


UNICEF is not "communist or communistic". "

We will certainly agree about the Presidency, and the Supreme Ct.

But we do question some of these other organizations, not so much from
the leadership point of view, but rather from the communist sympathizer
point of view.





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

BAN SMOOT

NATIONAL COUNCIL OF CHURCHES

In a speech at Grand Rapids, Michigan, on January 6, 1964, Senator Barry Goldwater, saying that a "mind fed by communism" produced the assassination of President Kennedy, declared:

"To anyone who blames America for the tragedy which struck in Dallas, I say you libel our people and purposely misread our politics. It was not a mind nurtured by American philosophy that turned to violence

"Mark this well — the day we permit anyone to equate protest with hate, we will set the stage for one-party tyranny and the end of open debate. To anyone who says that honest opposition breeds hatred, I say you lie — that you pervert the very basis of our government."

America urgently needs leadership which expresses such wholesome national pride and such simple, forthright accuracy in evaluating momentous events. Compare the tone of Goldwater's remarks—in a fund-raising political speech—with that found in the pronouncements of America's "religious" leaders just a month before, when the National Council of the Churches of Christ in the U.S.A. met in its Sixth General Assembly at Philadelphia, December 1 to 7, 1963.

Much of the speech-making at the Assembly was devoted to commentary on the assassination of President Kennedy. J. Irwin Miller, retiring President of the National Council, said:

"And now in this last shocking week, like birds of ill-omen, all our fears, our unharnessed hates, our selfishness which we have tried to rename 'Liberty' — they have all come home in one dreadful act, and have forced us to our knees in shame "(1)

In a formal "Message To The Churches," the Sixth General Assembly of the National Council of Churches said:

"With the loss of our President we see . . . the disclosure of mounting hatreds in the nation which threaten our very structure as a democracy In recent days we have looked upon the incredible horror of hate in our nation the full extent of which remains unknown Surely we are under the judgment of God."(3)

The Reverend Dr. Frankli Littell (official of the National Council who as a communist-front record) alleged that crimeism of the National Council comes from "America's spiritual underworld" and compared it with "attacks" which can be found in communist newspapers and in the "captive press under the Nazis."

The "racial question" in the United States was the principal topic of discussion and action at the National Council's Sixth General Assembly. The Assembly endorsed all provisions of the proposed Civil Rights Act of 1963, including specifically the controversial "public accommodations" section. It demanded that Congress "take every step necessary" to pass the Bill. It urged all Christians to write, call, or telegraph their representatives; and it sent busloads of Assembly delegates to call on U. S. Representatives in Washington and demand speedy vote on the measure. (1)

THE PROPERTY OF THE PROPERTY O

The National Council of Churches represents church organizations whose total lay membership is estimated at 40 million. The implication is that 40 million American Christians approve of lobbying, on the part of their churches, for the Civil Rights Bill. The implication is false. The National Council of Churches utilizes the prestige of 40 million American Christians and of their churches, but does not express their will. It expresses the will of officials who control the National Council. Indeed, many activities of the Council are objectionable, if not repulsive, to the millions of Americans whose church donations help support the Council.

The Council Created Itself

The Federal Council of Churches was organized in 1908. By the middle thirties, it was so heavily infiltrated with communists that the Office of Naval Intelligence branded it a subversive group."

By 1950, pro-communist extremism in the Council was so apparent that the organization

was losing puppers. A change of name—but not of policy leadership—was effected. In November, 1995, the Federal Council merged with 7 other church organizations and formed the National Council of Churches. The old Federal Council leaders became the leaders of the National Council. The Federal Council Bulletin for December, 1950, officially announced that "All the work of the Federal Council will continue under the new auspices."

This "constituting convention" was held in Cleveland, Ohio. Delegates of 28 church denominations took their whole church families into the National Council. Thus, denominational churches with a total membership of something like 28 million people became members of the National Council of Churches by the arbitrary action of a few score delegates at the Cleveland convention. The question was never submitted to individual church congregations for approval or ratification. Today, the National Council represents the hierarchy of 33 cooperating Protestant and Eastern Orthodox denominations" whose total lay membership is estimated at 40 million.

The Repulsive

In 1957, the department of racial and cultural relations of the National Council of Churches published a 40-page pamphlet entitled "The Negro American—A Reading List." It was a recommended reading list of 240 books for church people—both children and adults.

On April 20, 1960, United States Representative Donald L. Jackson (Republican, California) discussed the National Council's reading list in a speech to the House. Some books on the list contain passages so filthy that Mr. Jackson, in deference to good taste, refused to put sample passages into the Congressional Record. He told of a California housewife who, trying to alert other adults, quoted passages from some of the books, but was told by Postal officials that the material was too obscene to mail. Mr. Jackson did, however, discuss a few of the authors:

- (1) One of Victor Perlo's book is on the National Council's reading list. The book was published in 1953 by International Publishers, major communist book-publishing firm in the United States. Victor Perlo, a communist, was at one time head of a Soviet espionage group inside the U. S. Government. (10)
- (2) One of Herbert Aptheker's books is on the National Council's list of recommended books for church people. Aptheker is one of the chief theoreticians of the communist party in the United States.(10)
- years the leading negro communist in the United States, a hero of international communism. A few years before his death, Du Bois told an audience of Chinese communists, in Peking, that the United States is an enemy of Africa, saying, "Beware, Africa, America bargains for your soul." He urged Africans to "arise" and join the Soviet bloc. Commenting upon the trial of Julius and Ethel Rosenberg (Soviet spies), Du Bois said of the American people:

THE RESERVE OF THE PARTY OF THE

"We are the murderers hurling mud. We are the witchhunters drinking blood."(10)

In a poem praising communist China, Du Bois wrote these lines:

"Down then, religion and church away myth and miracle, creed and dogma. Rejoice, honesty, God lives again! But not your God, Europe and America! Not that, not that; No Christ to kill, no faith to fan. What China worships is a man. A workingman."

One of W. E. B. Du Bois' books is on the National Council of Churches' list of "best" books "safe to recommend for children."

- (4) Shirley Graham, wife of the late W. E. B. Du Bois, was also a leading American communist. The National Council of Churches' reading list recommends six of her books. (18)
- (5) Gene Weltfish, who has an extensive communist front record, was dismissed from Columbia University in 1953 after she had accused the United States of waging germ warfare in Korea. The late Ruth Benedict also had an extensive communist record. A book by Weltfish and Benedict is on the National Council of Churches' recommended reading list. (10)
- (6) Gunnar Myrdal is a Swedish socialist. His son is an official of the communist party in Sweden. Myrdal's book, An American Dilemma,

- criticizes the distributed for modern conditions." It accuses the Founding Fathers of intrigue which made the "Constitutional Convention . . . nearly a plot against the common people." An American Dilemma is on the National Council of Churches' recommended reading list for American church people."
- (7) E. Franklin Frazier, a writer for communist publications who has been associated with dozens of communist fronts, has two books on the National Council of Churches' reading list. One of the two books—The Negro In The United States—has been favorably reviewed in at least two communist party newspapers, the Daily Worker and the People's World.
- (8) Alan Lomax has been associated with 15 or more communist fronts and has been active as an entertainer at communist meetings. A book by Alan and John Lomax is on the National Council of Churches' reading list. (16)
- (9) Benjamin A. Botkin, who has been associated with 15 communist fronts, has one book on the National Council's reading list. (10)
- (10) Langston Hughes, for years a leading communist, "" who wrote the blasphemous poem "Goodbye Christ," has 9 books on the National Council's reading list."

William Graham Cole wrote a pamphlet entitled Called To Responsible Freedom: The Meaning of Sex In The Christian Life. The Office of Publication and Distribution of the National Council of Churches (475 Riverside Drive, New York 27, New York) published the pamphlet in 1961 for The United Christian Youth Movement.

There are words in this National Council of Churches pamphlet which I will not, in respect to the good taste of my readers, repeat in my Report; but I have extracted enough to reveal not only a preoccupation with erotica, but a falsification of the meaning of Scriptures. The pamphlet is written as a dialogue between the author and a teenager, in a style and language which the author, apparently, considers suitable for American youth.

Here is some of the author's counsel to the im-

aginary teenager about sex reedom and the Word of God:

We are asking you to take a look at what the Bible has to say about this whole problem ... You may be surprised to discover how much sense this dusty old book makes. For instance, I am sure you think the Bible takes a dim view of sex in general — all that jazz about Thou shalt not' and anybody who even thinks about sex is already guilty. The fact is, however, that the Bible as a whole is not only strongly in favor of sex, but also surprisingly frank about it There is no suggestion anywhere that anyone should be celibate

"Jesus had his greatest difficulty with a group of characters known as Pharisees If they were around today (and some of them are!), they would have your relationships with the opposite sex regulated totally. Holding hands in the back seat of a theatre would be permitted as would a chaste good night kiss at the door, providing only the lips met without further bodily contact. You could neck in a parked car for six minutes and thirty seconds, but no longer, and there would be carefully detailed rules about what you could and could not do

"Well, both Jesus and the Apostle Paul were seeking to set men free from this sort of legalistic bondage....

"You're being pulled in two directions today. One group says to you, 'Be free!' No rules, no holds barred, anything goes. On the other side, you are told, 'Be responsible!' Live according to the rules of society, the dictates of your parents, and the faith of your church. Now 'the Christian life' occupies a point in no-man's land between these two opposing camps. It says a yes and a no to both sides. For the Christian there are no laws, no rules, no regulations But this does not mean that the Christian is irresponsible, selfish, and capricious. He must always be concerned about the effect of his actions on those around him

"Do you think there are definite rules governing your behaviour on a date? If so, then you can stop right here. You have no problem. You know all the answers But if you are just a little bit unsure . . . then we can continue our discussion . . .

The trouble with most of society's codes of sexual morality is that they are almost entirely concerned with the group, forgetting about the needs and the problems of the individual

"Officially. Western civilization has for some

time now the deal sexual activity... before marriage and reced that monogamous fidelity until death seed to block irresponsible sexual activity by building up walls of guilt and shame and anxiety about the whole business, seeking to frighten the young into conformity with the rules. The net effect has been to make people feel that sex is 'dirty,' unclean, shameful—something nice people never discuss and seldom do except in strictest privacy and then primarily for purposes of parenthood.

"It is against this shadow of silence and shame that many a modern has revolted This revolt is, of course, correct. Sex is a God-given fact of nature

"Our culture declares that all sexual activity within marriage is legal, proper, and good, while any such activity outside marriage is illicit, sinful, and wrong. This is to ignore the personal dimension of life.... You and I know perfectly well that there are many marriages that are simply matters of convenience, that such sex as goes on within in them is selfish, exploitative, and evil. We know further that there is sexual contact between unmarried couples that is motivated by love and which is pure and on occasions beautiful....

"The real essence of immorality, from the biblical standpoint, is for one human being to treat another as a thing and not as a person

"The crucial question to be asked about any sexual contact - from holding hands to complete intercourse - is not so much what is done as what is meant. A relatively mild necking session can mean a crude and selfish abuse of a person as a mere object while a more intense type of petting can mean that two human beings are expressing a genuine and deep love for each other. This is why the attempt to set up elaborate rules governing dating behaviour is so silly. Is it all right to hold hands but wrong to pet? Society seems to say so, but then society has only its external concern. It cares little or nothing for any motivation, only for results But as Christians we are very much concerned with inner motivation

"In the personal, individual sense, then, what justifies and sanctifies sexuality is not the external marital status of the people before the law but rather what they feel toward each other in their hearts. Measured in such a way, holding hands can be very wrong indeed while intimate sex-play can be right and good....

"You have got to make up your own mind, in the best light of your own conscience, what your own standards of conduct are going to be, and then do your best to live up to them. No one else can tell you. And face it, you may be wrong

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"The Christian faith is based on forgiveness, so this is not our real problem the Epistle to the Hebrews would have us continue to run the race, looking to Jesus the author and perfector of our faith, rather than look back in remorse over the times that we stumble . . . "

The Objectionable /

There is probably no activity of the National Council of Churches more objectionable to most Americans than the Council's debunking of American patriotism and its relentless propaganda for a one-world socialist super-state which would eliminate not only the independence of our Republic but our identity as a nation.

Years before the Council adopted its present name, it was clearly on record as an advocate of reducing America to the status of a province in a socialist one-world.

On March 16, 1942, Time magazine reported the highlights of a report adopted by 375 delegates of the Federal Council of Churches attending a National Study Conference held that month at Ohio Wesleyan University. The report, submitted by the Commission to Study the Bases of a Just and Durable Peace, called for:

"Ultime world government of delegated powers.' abandonment of U. S. isolationism. Strong immediate limitations on national soverenty. International control of all armies & navies. A universal system of money Worldwide freedom of immigration. Progressive elimination of all tariff and quota restrictions on world trade . . . A 'democratically controlled' international bank 'to make development capital available in all parts of the world without the predatory and imperialistic aftermath so characteristic of large-scale private and governmental loans.'"

The conference concluded:

"Many duties now performed by local and national governments 'can now be effectively carried out only by international authority.' Individual nations . . . must give up their armed forces 'except for preservation of domestic order' and allow the world to be policed by an international army & navy

"The ultimate goal: 'a duly constituted world government of delegated powers: an international legislative body, an international court with adequate jurisdiction, international administrative bodies with necessary powers, and adequate international police forces and provision for enforcing its worldwide economic authority."

Three years later — 1945 — the Federal Council of Churches was one of 42 national non-governmental organizations invited to send delegates to the international conference, at San Francisco, which founded the United Nations. Support for the United Nations, and for efforts to "strengthen" and expand U N functions, has been a major policy goal of the National Council of Churches since the Council was formed. The UN represents a step toward a one-world socialist super-state, which is a primary goal of the Council (just as it is the primary goal of the international communist conspiracy).

The United Nations is a godless organization in which no Christian would ever be permitted to testify officially to the saving grace of Jesus Christ; in which no Jew would be permitted to expound the principles of his own religious faith. The governmental principles expressed in the

United Nations Charter are in, and sharply inimical, to the governmental principles expressed in the American Constitution and Bill of Rights. Yet, large numbers of American Christians and Jews—and Americans of other faiths or of no faith—believe that the UN is a noble organization deserving praise and militant support. Responsibility for this wide-spread ignorance can be attributed in large measure to propaganda of the National Council of Churches (together with that of other "religious" organizations, Jewish and Catholic, which cooperate with the Council's political ecumenism).

National Council officials realize that mass support for world government can never be created in the United States until Americans abandon their national pride. Hence, debunking patriotism—subtly inculcating the notion that love of one's own country is somehow evil—is an insistent refrain in the National Council's pronouncements. This fact can be seen in speeches of Council officials at the December, 1963, meeting of the Sixth General Assembly. America is a land of bate, violence, and bigotry, whose people bave shown insufficient concern for the rest of the world: this is a theme which can be found in major speeches to the Sixth General Assembly of the National Council of Churches.

Christians generally feel that their faith lays upon them a responsibility to share their material blessings—to give aid to others in need; but giving is an individual responsibility, which must be discharged voluntarily. The decision to give (when, how much, and to whom) must be made by the individual, prayerfully and in response to his own conscience. When the federal government confiscates the earnings of people for "giving" to someone else (at home or abroad) it not only violates the Constitution, but also robs individuals of the means of giving in response to conscience.

All of this should be obvious; but the National Council of Churches distorts the obvious. The Council supports every totalitarian welfare-state and foreign aid program, with the spurious argu-

ment that "we a nation have a Christian responsibility to the others less opulent. Some of the Council's most ludicrous misrepresentations of Scriptures are in its arguments for foreign aid. Note this passage from "The Message To The Churches" adopted by the Sixth General Assembly of the National Council:

"As churches, we must actively support the United Nations and adequate aid for developing nations . . . bearing in mind our Christian injunction to feed our enemies as well as our friends and neighbors."

Robbing Americans of the fruits of labor for aid to godless dictators abroad is a Christian commandment?

What To Do

The National Council of Churches is a powerful political and legislative lobby for socialism, hiding behind the facade of a Christian name. As a "religious" organization, it enjoys tax-exemption, which means, among other things, that contributions to the Council are tax deductible.

On page 7 of Instructions for Preparing Your Federal Income Tax Return Form 1040 for 1963, the Internal Revenue Service says that gifts to a religious or any other organization are not deductible for federal income tax purposes if the organization "conducts propaganda or otherwise attempts to influence legislation." Was the National Council not attempting to influence legislation in sending busloads of people to Washington to lobby for the Civil Rights Bill, and in urging all church people to lobby for it? If the Internal Revenue Service would apply, to the National Council of Churches, this rule which it enforces upon tax-paying citizens and other organizations, the National Council of Churches would die from want of revenue. The organization is not legally entitled to its tax-exempt status.

The people, through Congress, could compel the IRS to require National Council compliance with the Revenue Code; but it is unlikely that this will ever be done. Assembly, the National micil of Churches urged all churches (in their corporate investments as well as in their purchasing and contracting) to institute an economic boycott against all business firms whose employment practices are not pleasing to officials of the National Council.

Church members could use this same weapon of economic boycott. If your church supports the National Council, a portion of everything you give to your church goes to the Council. If all Church members who do not agree with policies of the National Council of Churches stopped their church giving until their churches withdrew from the Council, the National Council of Churches would probably die very soon, from lack of support. This can be done. In a small way, it has already been started.

You who want to help should make maximum effort to get copies of this Report, and similar material, into the hands of church people throughout the United States.







Attached is a letter dated February 25, 1964, which has just been received from the captioned individual in which he makes reference to a news release of January 30, 1964, to the Associated Press by the Joint Commission on Ecumenical Relations of the General Convention of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the USA. This Commission/stated that members of their study committee had met with a representative of the FBI and were not able to discover facts that support charges of communist penetration of the National Council of Churches.

The Bureau's attention has heretofore been directed to this news release as is reflected in my memorandum dated January 31, 1964, which answered the Director's question in this connection. Attached is a copy of this memorandum which adequately describes the circumstances which were involved.

Dear Mr. Hoover:

There have recently come into this headquarters a deluge of letters from every corner of the United States, many from members of the Protestant-Episcopal Church, questionning a news release which was given out on January 30, 1964 to the Associated Press by a group calling itself the Joint Commission on Ecumenical Relations of the General Convention of the Protestant-Episcopal Church in the U.S.A.

This commission'stated "the members of our study committee met with personnel of the Federal Bureau of Investigation, but were not able to discover any fact or record that Would support such charges", meaning charges that the National Council of Churches had been penetrated by communist influence or propaganda.

Perhaps you will recall that the House Committee on Un-American Activities conducted a full hearing for Secretary of the Air Force, Dudley Sharp on February 25, 1960 in relation to certain statements in the Reserve non-commission officers training manual on Internal Security.

At that time it was stated by the Chief Counsel of the House Committee, Hr. Richard Arens, that a check of committe sources and files showed that more than one hundred persons in leadership positions in the National Council of Churches had been associated with Communist, enterprises running into the thousands. the thousands.

When the House Committee under the chairmanship of the late Congressman Francis E. Watter, invited leaders of the Nation Council of Character and Council of Character and Council of Character and Ch Vouncil of Churches to appear under oath before this same committee, and deny the committee's documentation, these leaders of the National Council of Churches refused to do

· You will also recall that during your testamony before the Sub-Committee on Appropriations of the U.S. House of Representatives in 1961 you were asked the question by Congressman Elford Cederberg of Michigan why the National Council of Churches and its leaders were "so naive toward the threat posed by communism in this country.

This question was followed by a detailed answer by yourself.

Although you did not mention the National Council of Churches specifically in your reply, the question was concerned, in the main, with the National Council of Churches.

Over a period of years the Church League of America, its officers, Board of Directors, and the countless thousands of members and support we have throughout the United States in every branch of the Christian faith, have whole-heartedly supported the Federal Bureau of Investigating and its Director. We have defended it from the public platform, over radio and television, and in debates with communists and communist sympathizers throughout our country. We have avoided hysterical, unsupported, and undocumented charges or statements. We have reproduce the statements of the Director and his testimony before the various committees of the Congress, starting with his "Menace of Communism" given to the House Committee on Un-American Activities on March 26, 1947.

We have written resolutions in the Illinois Department of the America: Legion, in the Sons of the American Revolution and for other patriotic groups in this country supporting the F.B.I.

Consistently, we have told all of our audiences, orally and in print, that the Federal Bureau of Investigation does not furnish evaluations or comments on any organization or individual. We have cited your ow: letters to us, your statements to the Committees of the Congress, and your statements to the press in this regard. We have told them that the F.B.I. can only gather data, process it, and send reports to the Executive Agencies entitled to receive such information.

We cannot believe that the Joint Commission on Ecumenical Relations of the General Convention of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the U.S., would be given evaluations or comments on the National Council of Churches by the Federal Bureau of Investigation, from personnel which are not identified in the press dispatches. This, of course, would be in violation of the rules governing the conduct of the Bureau as state by yourself time and time again.

In order to answer the many hundreds of letters which have come into this headquarters from concerned Episcopalians and members of other branches of the Christian Church, we would appreciate a statement of clarification in regard to the meeting of the Joint Commission on Ecumenical Relations of the General Convention of the Protestant Episc Church in the U.S.A. with "personnel of the Federal Bureau of Investigation."

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

Dear Mr. Hoover:

Remember the child "Virginia" who wrote to the New York Times, asking them if there really was a Santa Claus? She said she was writing to them because her Deddy told her that if the Times said there was a Sante Claus, then she could believe it.

Mr Hoover, that is just the way I feel about you and the FEI. You are the one person I trust explicitly and if you answer the questions that are worrying me (and they are just as real and important to me as Virginia's question) then I can believe it:

Our whole church has been split apart by the influence of liberalsocialist-communist ideas (it appears to be a combination of all
three melded together) coming through our church literature, programs, study-courses, suggestions and outlines. Our church leaders
tend to cover over any criticisms with the "liberal" label, explaining that it is a changing world and a changing planet, and idea
change and we must grow with them (sometimes this even includes
changing our minds about what the Bible really means, or what Christ
really taught, or even about the importance of these things at all.)
They seem to have put all of the emphasis in our church school
literature, magazines and study courses on "social concerns", and
our obligations as Christians to actively concern ourselves in this

Our contention is that the church does not need to take a stand at oll on these issues, but if they think they must, should they tell their people how they should think, urging them to write Congress or to pressure various other groups to get these things enacted?

Do you feel the idea of communist influence in the National Council of Churches is far-fetched, impossible, unlikely, ridiculous, or at all possible or probable?
