# Letters from Oberlin Alumni . . .

## Major Grindlay, One of First U. S. Soldiers Sent Overseas

(Somewhere with the U. S. Army  
in China-Burma-India)  
July 22, 1943

Dear Tommy:

The days when you and I passed each other under the elms seem long ago. On two or three occasions in the past two years something has happened to remind me that I am an Oberlin alumnus. A few days ago our mail was dropped in a chute; among that mail was an April *Alumni Magazine* and I noted that you and Chuck Mosher were responsible for its creditable quality. Since you seem to be featuring the part alumni are playing in the war I think you might like a note from a man who undoubtedly has been overseas longer than any other Oberlin soldier—almost two years. In fact, only a half dozen American soldiers have been in this theatre of war as long as I.

When I was in Oberlin my literary efforts were usually concerned with descriptions of tempting lingerie, or almost as thin hamburgers at Pete's, and appeared in the *Review's* advertising columns, or with figures that purported to balance the *Review's* books. Since then my training has hardly fitted me to be a good war correspondent so don't expect dollar-a-line quality.

My career in this hemisphere began with a tour of the Philippines, and the Dutch East Indies, and Malaya. I tasted of life in Burma in the halcyon pre-war days and was by way of being proud of the magnificent adventure of a trip up the Burma Road in the early Pearl Harbor days. From an inactive but interesting period of living and traveling in China I gyrated to the center of action. I joined up, a happy and still-enduring alliance, with the celebrated Doctor (now Lt. Col.) Seagrave\* and shared with him the adventure of doing all the surgery for the Chinese army in Burma.

For a month we carried on with our noble little Burmese nurses, who dubbed me "Uncle," working in abandoned buildings, sheds and bamboo bashes, retreating north the length of the central plain, cutting away on 150 major casualties a day under a blazing sun or by the light of bombed and blazing villages. The famous trek into India with Uncle Joe Stilwell is a book-length story in itself. As I look back on that event now my mind is led by my tongue, a thirsty one these days; the rice beer that the headmen of each head-hunting village greeted us with deserves a place on any good bar list.

Katherine Mayo's book told me what to expect in India. I wasn't disappointed. I started out, however, with a couple of months of hobnobbing with the brass hats and nobility. One month in the Himalayas restored a few pounds to me and revived my drooping spirits. Then ten

months in a primitive region where we set up and operated a hospital of about a thousand beds; our unit had its hands comfortably full again. As chief of surgery I had operating lists that reminded me of apprentice days at the Mayo Clinic. I made a couple more trips to the Himalayas but my main recreation was hunting, sometimes with a maharajah; I wanted a tiger skin to wrap my daughter Sara in but, though many of my friends got tigers, all I got was a sight on one, and the skin of another.

About the time when I thought the War Department should allow me to return to the hardships of rationed America our unit was moved to this area. Unfortunately I am limited in what I can tell you of our current life. The scenery is exotic. Imprisoned by the densest jungle, on a mountain, our hospital surveys a jumble of green mountains and gorges, and snow peaks that few white men had seen until this war. I led our party of men and nurses here, betwixt the agony of leeches and the horror of almost as many skeletons. A porter had to carry my bull-terrier "Tilly" the last day, and I could see the point to that "my kingdom for a horse" crack. Even now I look at the elephants with a calculating eye. Most of our work here has been the care of minor injuries and tropical diseases, and building a hospital of which we are very proud. Our patients are not only troops but the very interesting natives. During this season activities are on a minor scale but occasionally there is a thrilling moment or story—tales I shall have to save for the happy day when grandfather will have to entertain the youngsters.

I should like to encounter Oberlin men in a "ten thousand strong" force; so far I have had the "Doctor Livingston, I presume" experience with Jack Service, '31, in socialite Chungking, with Paul Jones, '27 on a jungle trail, and with my old friend Bill Tucker's younger brother (Francis C. Tucker, '37) in my last station. I don't expect many of our infrequent visitors to turn out to be Oberlin men, but if a man turns out to have a spare cigarette I feel fraternal enough to talk about elm trees.

... brings back pleasant memories of "the good old days"

REMEMBER way back when most of us returned each fall to school by train, disembarking at Oberlin's little old frame station house? Remember the tradition that on the evening before classes started practically everyone went to meet the train from the east, to cheer the crowd of students that always were on it?

Remember how the freshmen snake-danced back up Professor street, and the singing around the big bonfire on the campus? Remember with what trepidation you first viewed this scene as a frosh, contrasted with your joy in greeting old friends as you returned to school the following three years?

During the past two decades most Oberlin students have arrived by automobile, bus . . . or by thumbing it. The "plug" is now Oberlin's only train, into Cleveland each morning and out each evening.

But the old familiar sight of crowds arriving at the same little station was momentarily revived this summer when the Navy trainees reported for duty. Routed strictly according to their Navy orders, hundreds of the new students came into Oberlin from Toledo or Cleveland by train, rather than the usual way now-a-days, from Elyria by bus. Many stayed over night in Toledo and Cleveland hotels at government expense, in order to make the train schedules assigned to them.

Pictured on the cover is a group of the Navy men at the station as they marched off carrying their grips to report for duty at Naval headquarters in the Men's Building. Corporal Boyle, one of the marine drill instructors, has them in charge.

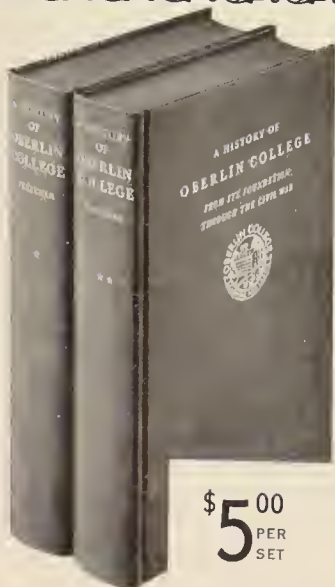
Note the sign "DePauw" painted on one of the suit cases. During the early weeks in July, before the V-12 unit's uniforms arrived, the insignia of scores of other colleges were a familiar sight on the Oberlin campus.

With the opening of the winter Term on November 1, from 150 to 200 new Navy students will arrive on campus, and a similar number will leave. Some 350 new civilian students, 40 men and 310 women, will also enroll. Total enrollment will exceed 1800.

# Under the Elms

## Wartime Brings New Appreciation of "Learning and Labor" To the Campus

Many of the usual things go on under the elms at Oberlin even in these strenuous and strange war days, including learning, labor, recreation, discussion and fun. The Oberlin Dramatic Association presented three performances of the play "Night Must Fall" in the Allen Art Building theatre, with considerable success, and the Summer Glee Clubs (Men's and Women's) gave a fine concert on Sunday evening, September 26, at the Navy Assembly in Finney Chapel. A story in the recent Oberlin *Alumni Bulletin* told about social life in general on the campus.

New types of work, under the general heading of civilian defense, and ranging from first aid and other Red Cross activities to managing blood bank and war bond drives are included among the duties assumed by the Collegiate Service Organization, organized last year on many campuses.

Two co-ed groups operating at Oberlin under CSO are the Campus Crew and the Library Stack-dusters. Campus Crew is made up of college and conservatory women who step forth several hours a week with spears and burlap bags to remove popcorn sacks and other rubbish from Tappan Square and the grounds around most of the College buildings. There are about eight girls on the crew at a time, though the total number is greater as new ones take the places of those who graduate or who are away from Oberlin for a term. On this list have been, or are, Betty Cameron, Mary Freschl, Ellen Fuller, Marjorie Lehman, Margaret Morgan, Jean Munro, Phyllis Russell, Mary Jo Wolfe, Judith Euring, Eleanor Deckin, and Margaret Clifford.

The Library Stack-dusters clean all the stacks in Carnegie Library, sweeping floors and dusting shelves, going over the entire stacks twice a week. Names on this list are Sue Adler, Jean Rawlinson, Eleanor Decker, Ellen Swasey, Patricia Alden, Rosemary Tongg, Eleanor Vickers, Mary Lou Scarborough, Barbara Dougherty, Susan Anspaker and Ruth Jones.

The girls are paid 35 cents an hour for these jobs. They work no more than 90 minutes at a stretch. They're doing these menial tasks not alone to earn money, but to help meet the problem of man-power shortage.

## New Architects Are Appointed For Hall Auditorium

Late in August President Wilkins announced in *The Review* that the trustees of the College, with the approval of the trustees of the Hall estate, had contracted with Messrs. Shreve, Lamb & Harmon of New York City for their services as architects for the Hall Auditorium. The new architects have already begun their work.

"It is our common intention," said President Wilkins, "that their work shall be carried forward as promptly as possible, so that we may be able to build as soon as building becomes feasible again."

Shreve, Lamb & Harmon are internationally known. They have to their credit many business buildings, including the Empire State Building in New York City, and others in Massachusetts, Washington, North Carolina, Florida, the Bahamas, France, and Palestine. They have done work for a number of colleges—Hunter, Cornell, Connecticut College for Women, among others.

President Wilkins also stated that, "In 1941 the distinguished Finnish architect Eliel Saarinen, was employed, with his son and partner, Eero Saarinen, to make preliminary drawings for the Auditorium, on the understanding that on completion of those drawings the College might either accept them, in which case the Saarinens would carry on as architects for the Auditorium, or reject them. Much was gained in our

understanding of the problem during the period of employment of the Saarinens, which was marked by frequent conferences; but the designs finally submitted by them last spring, though representing distinguished modernistic composition, have been adjudged by the Trustees to be incompatible with the design of the existing Romanesque buildings of the College, and our relationship with the Saarinens has therefore been terminated."

## Ballots for Alumni Trustee Must Be Received by October 31

Ballots for the election of an alumni trustee, to succeed Grove Patterson, '05, for the term of six years beginning January 1, 1944 and ending January 1, 1950, were mailed to alumni on September 21.

Under the present plan for the selection of alumni trustee, the executive committee of the Alumni Association nominates three of the five candidates on the final ballot. The other two are named by means of a general canvass of alumni made between April 1 and June 30.

On the current ballots, the three candidates named by the executive committee are Charles W. Ferris, '08, Frank C. Fisher, '14, and Mrs. Rowena Woodham Jelliffe, '14. The two named by alumni are Jerome Davis, '13, and Grove Patterson, '05.

Alumni are asked to vote for any number of candidates, in the order of choice, indicating that order by marking the ballots "1" for first choice, "2" for second choice, and so on. The election will be determined by proportional representation.

Ballots must be received in Oberlin not later than October 31 to be valid.

# Describes the Storming of Sicily's Beaches

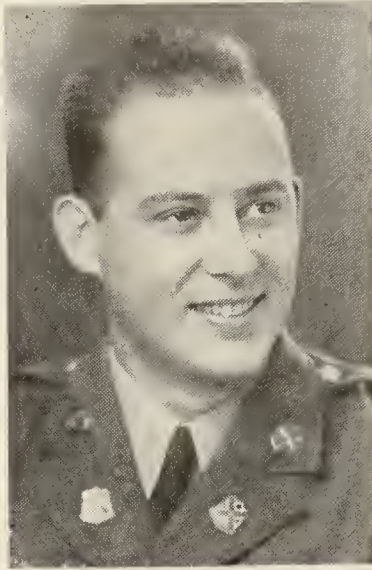
*From a Letter to President Wilkins by Lieutenant George Manlove, '36*

DISTANT churchbells from the hills and a continuous procession of peasants on their patient donkeys passing through our gun positions on their way to prayer bring another Sunday and a chance to write a more cheerful letter than the one I wrote last winter. Those were the hardest days of the war for us, those two months we spent with the British First army around Tabourba and Medjez El Bab; we rushed in with such high hopes to find ourselves in the position of sacrifice troops who had not yet been all sacrificed. As it turned out, the Tunisian campaign with those last difficult days around Mateur-Hills 575, 609, and Jebel Anz—was our training for the Sicilian campaign, and soon after we were on our way to Sicily.

Our crossing, strangely enough, was uneventful — a quiet Mediterranean cruise with warm sun, blue sky, bright blue water, and at night about a quarter moon and stars which seem brighter here than anywhere else on earth. No subs and no planes. It was an inspiring sight to see our convoy in long lines stretching from the horizon in back of us out and over the horizon before us, and on the flanks—cruisers, destroyers, mine sweepers. We studied maps and photographs, played a little bridge, and talked hopefully of getting home some day, which of course we associated with unimportant things like ice cream and cokes and milkshakes and bacon and eggs and juicy steaks and music and plays and books and sleeping in a real bed and shower baths.

## *Like a Brood of Ducklings*

At 2:00 a.m. Saturday morning, July 10th, we pulled up on the southern shores of Sicily, near Gela. Boats bearing infantry, engineers, and Rangers worked in nearer the shore; the others remained moving about on the outer perimeter. Soon little boats began gathering about the larger ones like a brood of restless ducklings around their mother—and then they took off for shore, which was lit up by a long line of fires, telling us that the air force had preceded us. For a long time nothing happened, and then large white explosions lit up the beaches and beads of tracers, white and red, grew more and more intense. Our tracers are red; Italian and German tracers are white and their guns have a much greater rate of fire. Soon cruisers and destroyers closed in to support the land fighting and the sea was all thunder and the ships were silhouetted again and again by the flashes.

At 4:00 a.m. we got a report that landings had been made on all beaches, that the opposition was not as tough as had been expected. At 6:00 a.m. we heard an announcement on the radio from the States that Sicily had been invaded by the Allies and to stand by for further announcements. We were standing by—to land!

At 6:30 a.m. two MEs flew over very high and very fast, sizing up the situation. What they saw must have made them high-tail for home in a hurry with the news. I should like to have heard their report. There were several hundred ships in our area, all bristling with ack-ack guns. The whole sky was covered with bursts and 50 caliber tracers moving skyward in snakelike chains. It seemed impossible that anything could survive such a barrage, and yet ack-ack gets very few planes.

## *Cruiser Smothers Enemy Battery*

Two landing craft put in to shore and began unloading, when shells began bursting all around them. We spotted the battery about a mile down the beach, shooting up a storm. I wished that I could have brought one of our big guns up on deck, but a cruiser spotted it and steamed in full force firing all guns. In less than a minute it smothered that battery completely. I have never seen such fire.

We landed about noon. The captain

drove our craft straight ashore, opened up its huge doors and lowered the ramp almost on the beach, where the engineers had laid wire mat roads. A single ME dove out of the sun, came straight down through the ack-ack, and dropped a single bomb which missed by feet and sent a geyser of water up over the boat, seventy-five feet high. The boat just after us didn't have quite so much luck.

We put our guns into position about six hundred yards off the beach, behind some sand dunes. A few scattered artillery shells kept coming in just to the right of us and some over our heads, but we knew that they were ranging for the beach behind us and kept on with our work. We also knew exactly how many miles they would have to drop down in their elevation to put one right in our position! But men don't feel safe until their guns are in position ready to fire.

## *Continually Bombed*

That afternoon and all night long, planes kept coming over bombing the beaches, but not much was hit. After a dinner of cold "C" rations about eleven o'clock that night, I remembered falling asleep in my clothes, thinking how strange to be in Sicily and wondering what folks were doing back home. We weren't worried. We had learned long ago not to worry about the morrow. In fact, it seemed good to be on shore. "There ain't no fox-holes on ships" and you can't go around camouflaging anything on a ship to look like anything but a ship. And it's mighty aggravatin' trying to make yourself so much smaller when you feel so much bigger when the bombs are falling. You always feel too much like a duck in a shooting gallery when you're on a ship. Next morning we were up at 4:30 checking camouflage, guns and ammunition, fox-holes, and machine guns; then a breakfast of cold "C" ration as we waited for dawn to bring visibility and targets to our OPs.

## *Jerry Gets Up Early*

Jerry brought his planes around early. Fighters came in fast and low, just over our heads as they strafed the beaches. One group of 60 ME 210 bombers came over and made things uncertain for a few minutes, but ack-ack kept them high and their bombs fell widely scattered. Men on the machine guns had a field day. They emptied box after box of ammunition, pausing only long enough to change barrels when they got too hot.

About eight o'clock a tank attack caught us. For over an hour we fired as fast as we could load the guns. Ammunition trucks drove the gauntlet of beach bombing again and again to keep the guns going.

#### *Communications Are Shot Out*

Then the tanks got between the guns and the OP (Observation Post). Our wire was shot out, and our radio went out; the battle grew closer and closer. Infantry began retreating back through our gun positions, and we thought of Tabourba and El Guettar. Twice before we had been through the same thing. Wounded doughboys kept straggling in to our medics. After they had been tied up, they calmly walked off to take up new positions. I ran a telephone line up over the ridge in front of our guns and put an observer there, placed the "bazookas" and the machine guns on the high ground in front and waited for the tanks. We couldn't retreat; the beach was just behind us.

Well, the tanks came up to within a thousand yards, which is much closer than it sounds, when the linemen found the break in our lines, and we began shooting up a storm again. It was a wonderful feeling, because we knew that as long as we could keep shooting, the tanks didn't have a chance. Our observers soon brought in some naval gunfire, and as suddenly as it had come the crisis passed. All together we knocked out eighteen tanks out of twenty—about that number. Several were MK Vies.

#### *Sicilians Enthusiastic as Children*

The people here, peasants most of them, are as enthusiastic as children about our invasion. They visit gun crews regularly and climb the mountains to our OPs, carrying water, figs, tomatoes, pears. A journey through a town, no matter how soon after it has been captured or how much damage that the bombs and shells have done, is like a triumphal procession. People laugh and clap and hold up their two fingers for the sign of victory.

You can always test the genuineness if you need any proof, by keeping an eye on the very young and the very old. They have been bled of their farm produce to the point where they haven't had enough for themselves. Clothing, they haven't had for several years. Their feet are either bare, or bound in hide, rags, straw, or improvised shoes made from old automobile tires. The Germans, especially, have taken food and wine at the pistol point.

Italian soldiers often come out of the woods and farm houses to give themselves up to us, and as we are usually too busy firing to bother with them, they sit down and wait patiently,

FOR twenty-four years, from 1840 to 1864, Hamilton Hill was an administrative officer of Oberlin College.

According to Professor Robert Fletcher, '20, Oberlin historian, it was in 1840 that John Keep and William Dawes returned from their soliciting

watching us fire and admiring our guns and eating our "C" rations until we get the time to send them to PW enclosures. "You ought to go to Rome," many of them say in perfect English. "Everyone is waiting for you there."

Animals are well taken care of. Horses, cattle, mules—all look like prize exhibitions. One peasant said that money could not buy his mule, and he referred to her—not to his wife, but to his mule—as the angel of his household! Get thyself a mule, ye unhappily married!

Well, the fighting is now over for the moment, and we are bivouacked in an almond orchard, where our nights are again peaceful and our days include more training, a little play, a chance to swim and relax in the Mediterranean. The fighting was hard and slow up through Troina and east of Troina to Randazzo, but there was a reward at the end. We ended up in a gun position in the shadows at the foot of Mt. Etna, not far from Randazzo. A mountain is a wonderful balm for man's troubles! I am sure the Greeks were right. The gods and goddesses dwell on these mountain tops and smile and frown on the fortunes of man below.

tour to England bringing back to Oberlin over thirty thousand dollars, some books and scientific apparatus—and Hamilton Hill. Mr. Hill had been their host in London, and it was their hope that he would serve as "a permanent bond of union," "a permanent channel of communication," between Oberlin and certain pious and liberal groups in England.

Mr. Hill was at first made associate secretary and from 1841 to 1864 was secretary and treasurer of the College. Mrs. Hill was a member of the Women's Board of Managers of the College for twenty years.

He was active while in Oberlin, in the peace and anti-slavery causes. In 1849 he attended the Peace Congress at Paris as a delegate, and in the following year he was elected a vice-president of the American National League of Universal Brotherhood. He resigned his position at Oberlin in 1864 and returned to England, where he died in London on July 1, 1870. Mrs. Hill died at St. Leonard's, England, in June 1887.

# News of Oberlin's Faculty . . .

WHERE does the general public get the idea that a college professor leads a cloistered life, far from practical, everyday activity? Alumni of any college, and certainly Oberlin alumni, should know better. Around this campus faculty members not only do their full job of teaching and advising students—with all the work, both special and routine, which that requires—but also carry on extensively as able, responsible and public-spirited citizens. They write books and articles, make fine Chapel talks, take part in town meetings, give concerts, make speeches, lead discussions on post-war organization for peace, cultivate victory gardens on a grand and successful scale, and spend vacation time working in war plants.

## Many Faculty Men Worked In War Plants

Faculty members have been working in war production plants and on farms to help meet the manpower shortage. John Elvin and David Moyer, professors of piano in the Conservatory, Lucius Garvin and Carl Nicol '11, professors of philosophy, Victor Lytle, '12, theory, and George Waln, wood-wind instruments, worked this summer in Lorain at the American Shipbuilding Co.'s yards. Homer Weaver, '24, psychology, and Hayden Boyers, French, are working at the American Radiator Company in Elyria. Miss Neva Swanson, '17, of the Music Education Department worked for the U. S. Automatic Co. in Amherst. Maurice Kessler, professor of violin and ensemble, worked at the same place a year ago but was teaching this year and could not do so again. George Lillich, associate professor of organ and theory, William K. Breckenridge, '88, Emeritus professor of pianoforte, George Waln, and John Kurtz, assistant professor of German, pitched in to help neighboring farmers, picking fruit or working in any needed capacity. Professor Kurtz worked all last summer in an Elyria factory.

Perhaps there have been others. If so, we regret omitting their names, but this is as far as our assistant sleuth could go in the time allotted for this bit of fascinating research.

### Faculty Victory Gardeners, Too!

Inquiry into the Victory Garden situation quickly brought out the fact that it would be easier on paper stock, printer's ink and time, to list people who did

not garden and who were not at this very time reaping handsome rewards in fine crops and shelves full of beautiful canned vegetables and fruits. Here's where faculty and administrative wives should take a bow; the ladies do the canning.

Mrs. Holden, wife of Leo C. Holden, associate professor of organ, made your correspondent's mouth water with her report of a second crop of luscious red raspberries. "Oh, everybody gardens," she said. "On our street there's Dudley Barnard of the treasurer's office, Luke Steiner, chemistry, George M. Jones and Lynds Jones—just everybody you can think of. And these are not just gardens; they've big, fine, successful gardens with excellent crops. And a lot of us have chickens, too. I'm gathering five eggs a day now."

Wolfgang Stechow, professor of fine arts, has been appointed a member of the committee for grants-in-aid of the American Council of Learned Societies.

Axel Skjerne, professor of pianoforte, and his wife appeared in Cleveland on a Danish night program, one of a series of nationality night programs presenting the customs, music and traditions of the different United Nations, for the benefit of the Cleveland Community War Chest.

Dr. Paul B. Sears, head of the bot-

any department, gave the summer commencement address at the University of Oklahoma.

F. W. Kaufmann, professor of German, was co-author of a German reader which was published during the summer and which is unique in that it uses entirely "basic German"—the 1000 words of highest frequency in contemporary German language.

President Wilkins, in August, attended a meeting of the Commission to Study the Organization for Peace in New York City. On September 8, he was host to the representatives of the eight Ohio colleges which have V-12 Units. They met in Oberlin for informal discussion of their common experiences and problems with the V-12 program. Presidents of four of the colleges and other administrative officers attended, as did the commanding officers of seven of the units and members of their staffs. Officers present from outside the colleges were Capt. Heslar from Great Lakes, Ill., who is in charge of the V-12 program for the Ninth Naval District, and Commander Adams of the Bureau of Naval Personnel, in Washington, D. C.

On October 9 and 10, President Wilkins is attending a meeting of the Central Committee of the Universities Committee on Post-War International Problems in New York City.

On October 21, Maurice Kessler, professor of violin and ensemble in the Conservatory will give a lecture-recital at the University of Illinois, on the "Renaissance of Ancient Instruments."

Professor Leo C. Holden gave an organ recital for the Northern Ohio chapter of the American Guild of Organists, at the Cleveland Museum of Art, on October 6.

My graduation from Oberlin College in 1918 was in part made possible by the receipt of certain sums of money in the form of "Student Aid" during the four years of my attendance.

While I realize that money so received was in the form of an outright gift with no strings attached to it, I have always felt a certain moral responsibility to repay it in order that some present or future student might benefit from its use as I did.

If your records are in such shape that you can do so I would appreciate your advice as to the exact amount I received as "Student Aid" while I was in Oberlin as I would like to set up some program toward the payment of this amount to Oberlin College.

In this connection if you could conveniently set up in the Treasurer's Office some record which would show payments to this account and unpaid balances it would be helpful.

It is my understanding that since there would be no legal obligation involved payments made to this account could be treated as gifts for tax purposes but I would appreciate your advice on this point if I am not correct.

## Decision Concerning Honor System in Navy Classes Determined by Vote

Oberlin's traditional Honor System came up for some special study and consideration under the elms this summer. Most of the members of the Navy V-12 Unit came to Oberlin from colleges where proctoring is the practice during examinations. Clearly it was not possible or just to place them under the Honor System without their full understanding and consent. The members of the Unit are Oberlin College students and the conduct of examinations is a college responsibility, as are arranging teaching procedures and maintaining scholarship standards.

It became necessary, therefore, for the college to decide whether (a) to impose its honor system on men unaccustomed to it, or (b) to abandon the honor system, or (c) to adopt a program of orientation leading to either partial or complete use of the honor system on the part of trainees.

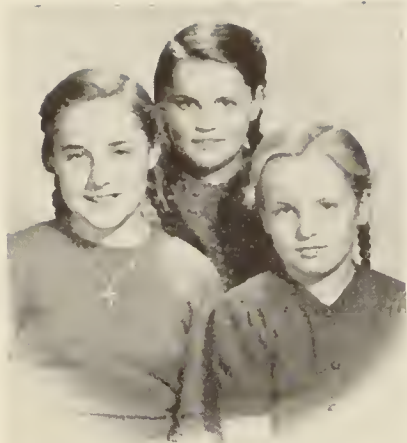
For the present, classes containing both civilian students and members of the V-12 Unit are operating under the proctor system. The purpose is to give the men of the Navy and Marine Corps who may be unfamiliar with it, time to learn about the honor system, to discuss and weigh all phases of its application to their classes, and to elect to operate under it if that is their final judgment.

Some of the practical problems involved were presented to the men in uniform at an assembly in Finney Chapel by two members of the Honor Court, Janet Davis '44, and Apprentice Seaman Richard Simpkins '45. Lt. Commander Homer Howard spoke at the same meeting, giving his favorable views.

A class-by-class referendum is now under way. Students in every class have received forms which they may sign stating that they wish the honor system to be applied. After a class has indicated unanimously that it wants that system and the instructor has approved the request, the men will be interviewed individually by the ship's company to make sure that everything is clear and all conditions favorable.

By September 22 twenty-five classes had voted. Blanks have been returned from nine of them, giving a unanimous vote for the honor system. There are 30 Navy men in these classes. On September 23, Commander Howard recommended to Dean Witke that five of the nine classes—one each in English, Fine Arts, Mathematics, German, and Zoology—operate under the system.

Proctoring, meanwhile, indicates no slump in honor, but is simply an arrangement adopted in fairness to all

concerned until all the students have had a chance to express their attitude, in full understanding of the system.

## Bond-Buying Plan at Oberlin To Aid Future College Students

(An Associated Press Dispatch Reprinted from the Cleveland Plain Dealer)

OBERLIN, O., Sept. 22—(AP)—An Oberlin bank today announced it would advance money for the purchase of War Bonds to parents contemplating enrolling students in Oberlin College after the war.

I. L. Porter, executive vice-president of the Peoples Banking Co. of Oberlin, suggested that "banks throughout the country, especially banks in college towns can perform a distinct service" by adopting similar programs.

Porter said the Oberlin bank would advance funds during the Third War Loan Drive to buy 100 Series C United States Treasury notes of \$1,000 denomination, a total of \$100,000, to qualified applicants.

The plan, as described by Porter, is this:

Anyone planning to send a 'teen-age boy or girl to Oberlin College after the war may make a down

payment of \$100 and obtain a personal loan of \$900 from the bank for the purchase of a \$1,000 treasury note. The bank will hold the note as security for the loan.

The principal of the loan may be paid off in 36 monthly installments of \$25 each.

The bank will charge interest at the rate of 3 per cent a year on the unpaid balance.

At maturity, Sept. 1, 1946, the bank will collect the principal of the note, plus 1.07 per cent interest, and deposit it in the bank in the name of the student.

Parents may, if they wish, restrict withdrawal of the account so students may obtain only a limited sum each week. When the student is graduated or leaves school, the remaining balance, if any, will be surrendered to him.

### With Three New Frosh Classes Each Year, Y's Sponsor Clubs To Supplant Class Organization

Oberlin's YMCA and YWCA, while keeping their separate organizations, began last spring to cooperate more closely than ever before in many of their activities. They are jointly sponsoring College Matins two mornings a week and Vespers on Sunday afternoons, all in Fairchild Chapel.

One of their jobs, brought about by "mix-ups" developing with the three-term college year, has been the organization of the Freshman Class into Men's and Women's Clubs. With students entering college in February, July, and November, with some of them attending three terms a year and some only two, it became so difficult to have a class organization that the Student Council decided to abolish it for Freshmen. The Y's stepped in with the clubs, suppers, speakers and other plans to take the place of former class organization and activities.

The Y's have sponsored a post-war discussion group which has been meeting on Friday nights for many weeks. Faculty speakers have presented issues and problems; there has been group discussion; members have written to their congressmen expressing their views, and so on.

### New Student Council Elections Give Navy Arrivals Representation

Another matter of special consideration which has arisen during the Summer Term is the Navy Students' repre-

sentation on the Student Council. A special election was held in September to effect a temporary reorganization of the Council, increasing its membership by four additional persons to represent the entire student body. The new

members took office as soon as elected and will serve until next spring's regular election, at which time the Council will revert to its normal size.

#### *Parker Lansdale Elected*

The four winning candidates, from a field of 17, included one civilian student and three Marine privates. Private Parker Lansdale, '45, son of H. P. Lansdale, '19, of Rochester, New York, received the highest number of votes. Privates James Benedict from Ohio Wesleyan and Bill Burton from Lawrence College ran second and third. In fourth place was Ed Ryder, '45, a pre-med major, and president of his class in the freshman year.

Here again, was a democratic effort to solve a new problem, imposed by the fact that some hundreds of students in the Summer Term (mostly V-12 men) were not represented on the existing Council because they were not at Oberlin College when the Council was elected. Presentation of other campus problems at a Tuesday Assembly by the President of the Student Council and by a Marine and a Bluejacket, all three from other colleges, was made with such poise, humor, clarity and good will as to delight the heart of the "oldster" and to deepen his respect for the "youngsters" of the present student generation.

The two powerful, hard-hitting elevens, battled it out in midfield all afternoon, so evenly matched that neither team was ever able to penetrate past the other's 25-yd. line. DePauw counted eleven first downs to Oberlin's four, but the Yeoman defense was impregnable whenever there appeared to be danger of a final break through.

Oberlin produced the closest thing to a score during the game on a field goal attempt that barely missed, late in the first quarter. Oberlin's Chuck Heck, All-Ohio halfback last year at Ohio Northern, returned a DePauw punt to midfield. Then a pass from Fritz Graf (Western Reserve) to Gordon Clucas (Albion) gave Oberlin a first down on DePauw's 27. After a series of plays failed to gain the necessary yardage, the attempted field goal by Paul Turner, place-kicking specialist from Kansas University, failed by the narrowest of margins as it sailed slightly to the left of the goal posts.

## *Largest Opening Day Crowd*

After an all-morning rain, the skies cleared and the afternoon was perfect for the game. A regimental review of Oberlin's V-12 unit was held just before the kick-off. The crowd was the largest to witness an opening game in several years.

## *Migration Day Victory*

Celebrating the traditional "Migration Day" for the first time in five years, practically everyone on campus journeyed to Cleveland on October 2 to watch Oberlin crush Case 26 to 6. A long cavalcade of big greyhound busses transported the Navy Units to the game and the Oberlin Bluejackets and Marines, led by the combined Oberlin and Case bands, presented an impressive review on the gridiron before the kickoff.

Case's lightning-fast, hard charging Rough Riders quickly proved themselves dangerous opponents, driving deep into Oberlin's territory and keeping the ball there most of the first quarter. Yeoman Captain Bill Kramer punted a beauty out from near his own goal to Case's 28-yard line as the quarter closed, but on the first play of the second period Bill Lund, Case halfback, broke off right tackle and with the aid of some great blocking reversed his field to race 77 yards down the left sidelines for the first score of the game, the only Case tally.

After that the battle was nearly all Oberlin's, with the Yeoman offensive gaining so much momentum in the second half that Coach Butler was able to throw into the game practically every player on the squad. Case threatened only once again when an aerial attack carried the ball to first down on Ober-

lin's four-yard line, where the Yeoman defense again proved impregnable.

## *Returns Punt 80 Yards*

Oberlin soon tied the score when Harry ("the horse") Waters, a great halfback from Grinnell, made a beautiful 47-yard return of a Case punt to the Clevelanders' 11-yard marker. From there Vern Walters, Alma's captain-elect, and Chuck Dorais, son of the Detroit Lions' coach, maneuvered the ball

down to the half-yard line and Walters crashed over. Turner's kick failed.

Early in the second half Oberlin's Zito, a star tackle from Western Reserve, recovered a Case fumble on the Riders' 32 and another former Reserve star, half-back Fritz Graf, got loose for a couple of dashes that put the ball down where Al Zupek, 1942 Little All-American fullback from Lawrence, could pound it across the goal.

Harry Waters scored Oberlin's final two touchdowns, one a magnificent 80-yard run, weaving and crashing through the entire Case team, on a punt return, and the last off tackle from the Case 14-yard line. Graf and Freilink, big scrappy center from Detroit University, kicked Oberlin's two successful conversions.

### *Renew Old Rivalries*

Oberlin's eight-game football schedule shows the effect of the war, the necessity of playing only those schools which have Navy V-12 units, and which are within the restricted travel distances.

Two opponents are being met on a two-game home-and-home basis, Wooster and Bethany. The West Virginia School and Oberlin are meeting each other for the first time in history.

Oberlin's victory over Case broke a jinx of long standing. Though holding a margin of 26 wins against Case's 18, in the ancient rivalry between the two schools, Oberlin had dropped the last nine games played with the Scientists and had not played them at all since 1938.

Ohio Wesleyan is being met for the first time since 1921, the year of Oberlin's last victory over State, 7 to 6.

### **Harriers Have Difficulty Finding Opponents**

With a fine group of veteran cross-country runners at hand, Coach Dan Kinsey's greatest problem has been to provide a schedule for his harriers.

Reporting from last year's team are Captain Wyatt Miller, Eaton Freeman, Roy Knipper and Kent Martling. Newcomers among the top seven men are Richard Hiler, Marine from Ohio Wesleyan; Steve Nisbet, Marine from Alma College; and Jim Truitt, Blue Jacket from Cincinnati.

The only college in the Ohio Conference sponsoring a cross country team this fall, Oberlin's schedule includes only four meets and one of those very tentative. Miami will be run over the Oberlin course on October 16. On October 23rd, the Yeomen thinclads travel to Bowling Green. A run is tentatively set for Ohio State on November 6 and Oberlin plans to enter the National Collegiate meet at East Lansing, Michigan, on November 20th.

### **Soccer Team Hopes for Games with Semi-Pros**

Yeoman soccer has experienced similar difficulties to those of the cross country team. While an enthusiastic squad has been practicing for several weeks under the leadership of Coach George Willbond and Captain Joel Hayden, a schedule has been almost impossible to arrange. Oberlin is the only college in Ohio sponsoring intercollegiate soccer.

Two games will be played with Western Reserve Academy and it is hoped that matches may also be arranged with some semi-pro teams in Cleveland and Akron. However, at press time no definite commitments or dates have been made.

### **Homecoming Day Is Saturday, November 13**

Because of wartime travel restrictions and the exceptionally War-busy life most alumni are living, no formal plans are being made for the celebration of *Homecoming Day* on November 13, other than the semi-annual meeting of the Alumni Council.

However, Oberlin certainly will welcome all those Alumni living in this vicinity who may be able to visit the campus on that day and attend the Wooster game. ber 13.

### **Alumni Active in Oberlin Town Meeting Discussions**

During August a series of three Oberlin town meetings tackled a post-war problem with considerable success. Speaker at the first meeting was Spencer Irwin of Cleveland, an authority on international affairs and editorial writer and columnist for the *Plain Dealer*. His subject was "Today's Battle for Tomorrow." He set forth the vital need of world cooperation, and stressed the power of the people when they make their wishes known.

Senator Harold Burton (R) of Ohio and Representative Robert Ramspeck (D) of Georgia spoke at the second meeting, discussing the nonpartisan Ball-Burton-Hatch-Hill Resolution, (Senate Resolution 114), which advises that the United States take the initiative in calling meetings of representatives of the United Nations for the purpose of forming an organization with specific and limited authority to assist in the prosecution of the war against the Axis, to establish temporary administrations for Axis-controlled areas as they are occupied by United Nations forces, to administer relief and assistance in economic rehabilitation, to establish procedures and machinery for peaceful settlement of disputes between nations, to provide for the assembly and maintenance of a United Nations military force to suppress military aggression.

At the third Town Meeting five Oberlin citizens expressed their views concerning this resolution. They were Miss Hope Hibbard, chairman of the legislative committee of the League of Women Voters; Miss Eva Mae Parker, '33, an attorney; Professor F. B. Artz, '16; R. R. Barr, '31, secretary of the Oberlin School of Commerce; Wesley Brashares, '44, president of the Forensic Union; A. C. Norris, '98, insurance man and newspaper columnist; Carl Spittler, banker, president of the Oberlin Rotary Club.

A lively discussion and debate followed their five-minute talks, the more than 600 citizens present finally voting overwhelmingly in support of the motion, expressing Oberlin's approval of the Ball-Burton resolution and urging its enactment by the Senate.

The Oberlin Town Meetings were sponsored by a committee of citizens of which J. Jeffery Auer of the public speaking department was chairman. Appointed by the president of the Oberlin Chapter of World Citizens, Professor L. D. Hartson, the committee had the financial backing of the College, the Oberlin Student Council, and six local Community organizations.

# Fund Total at All Time High; \$23,187.10

FOR the second consecutive year the alumni have written a new mark into the records with their response to the 1943 Alumni Fund appeal.

The total subscribed this year, \$23,187.10, exceeds by \$1,945.62 the previous "high" established in 1942 and reached 92.7 per cent of the \$25,000 goal set at the opening of the Fund last March.

While failing of its objective, the 1943 Fund raises high hopes for future efforts which will be carried on in more normal times. The major problem now facing the Fund is finding ways and means of increasing the number of donors. This year the percentage of donors was only 21.6%.

## *Twenty-five 100% Classes*

The Class Agents and their assistants deserve unqualified praise for their loyal and outstanding services given at a time when they were already over-burdened with their own work and the many additional war duties which most of them have assumed. Their energies resulted in the setting of another all time mark of twenty-five 100%-or-better classes. This beats by five the record set last year.

Following the pattern of 1942, most of the successful class efforts belong to those classes which have been out of Oberlin for the longest and shortest length of time. A solid block of thirteen classes beginning with the group of classes prior to 1891 and continuing through 1902 over-subscribed their quota as did the group of seven from 1936 through 1942. The other five were 1904, 1910, 1917, 1928, and 1934.

## *Class Competition Is Keen*

Each year the Association makes three awards to the classes which lead in the following competitions: the High Flyer Trophy for the class which exceeds its quota by the greatest margin, a banner for the class having the largest percentage of contributing members, and a banner for the class with the largest per capita gift.

The High Flyer Trophy was won this year by the "baby" class of the Fund—1942. Under the dual leadership of Class Agents Catherine Wolff Kendall and Donald Emig, '42 in its first Fund effort raised \$515.22 or 442.5 per cent of its quota. Second place was snared by the perennially high class of 1899 with 439.3 per cent. This is the closest race to date in this competition. Third place went to '98 (Agent, Ira Shaw) with its good 375.4 per cent. Last year's winner, '04, with 439.7 per

cent, fell to eighth place with a mark of 210.1 per cent.

## *75% of '95 Contribute*

To the Class of 1895 goes the honor of having taken first place in the very important competition for the largest percentage of contributing members. Finishing with a mark of 75 per cent, '95, led by Class Agent Ernest H. Parridge, had a good lead over second place '92 (Agent Agnes Warner Mastick) which had a better record this year for second place (63.6% as against 54.5%) that it had in winning this award last year. '97 (Agent Edward A. Seibert) was pressing hard on the heels of '92 with 61 per cent.

The banner for the largest per capita gift was snared by '99 under its able and veteran agent Clarence E. Simpson. Their mark of \$19.18 was an increase of almost \$4.00 above last year. Second place was handily won by '98 with \$16.39 and third went to '96 whose \$9.20 gift was closely followed by last year's winner, '04, with \$9.17. The most serious failures are found in the 'teen and 'twenty classes where 1917 and 1928 are outstanding exceptions. Increased support from members of this large group would have easily assured the Fund of its full success.

Encouragement may be gained by the fact that in 1942 there was no class from 1911 through 1937 which reached its objective. In the same area this year 1917, 1928, 1934, 1936, and 1937 entered the ranks of the elite.

## *College Receives \$16,108.30*

Of the \$23,187.10 raised, the College will receive war bonds whose purchase price totals \$10,454.00. Some of these bonds were sent direct to the Fund by contributors and the rest purchased by the money or war stamps given by others. In addition to the bonds, \$5,654.30 in cash has already been delivered to the Treasurer for purposes specified by donors. This brings the total alumni gift from the Fund to \$16,108.30, the largest yet raised for College uses by the Alumni Association. It exceeds the 1942 gift by \$4,705.53.

The bonds will be held by the College until the men who have had their courses interrupted by war service return to the campus. The money realized by their sale at that time will then be used exclusively for War Service Scholarships for these men. While the actual need will probably far surpass the alumni gift, the generous assistance

Under present conditions here at home and also abroad this seems unthinkable!

At any rate, it certainly is to be hoped that next year's Fund will show an increase not only in money but especially in the number of participants.

So to my word of gratification, let me add this other word of *request for help* in the understanding of this problem.

His work for the most part was devoted to cable development for the Western Electric Company and Bell Laboratories both in this country and abroad. A graduate of Oberlin, he also held B.A. and M.A. degrees from Harvard University, and had taught for a year at Harvard and for three in Ohio State University.

He was principally responsible for the design of the first commercially applied cable for loaded phantom circuits. In 1913 Mr. Anderegg was given charge of all lead-covered cable developments. He supervised the manufacture and laying of the telephone cables across the Florida Straits in 1921, the first permalloy-loaded telegraph cable laid between New York and Azores in 1924, and two permalloy-loaded telegraph cables laid in 1926, one in the Pacific Ocean from Fanning Island to Suva in the Fiji group, and one from the Azores to Emden, Germany.

Mr. Anderegg was a Fellow of the American Institute of Electrical Engineers and held memberships in the American Association for the Advancement of Science as well as in the Harvard Engineering Society, the Montclair Society of Engineers, and the Telephone Pioneers of America.

MISS DENSMORE'S achievements as a student of Indian music and legends are recounted in an interesting feature article "She Collects War Whoops," by Edward Crane, published in *The Etude* for October 1941. Her work, which began merely as a summer holiday interest, spans a half century and its fruits are contained in a collection of over twenty-five hundred songs in thirty Indian languages, and in twenty most informative books which she has published. 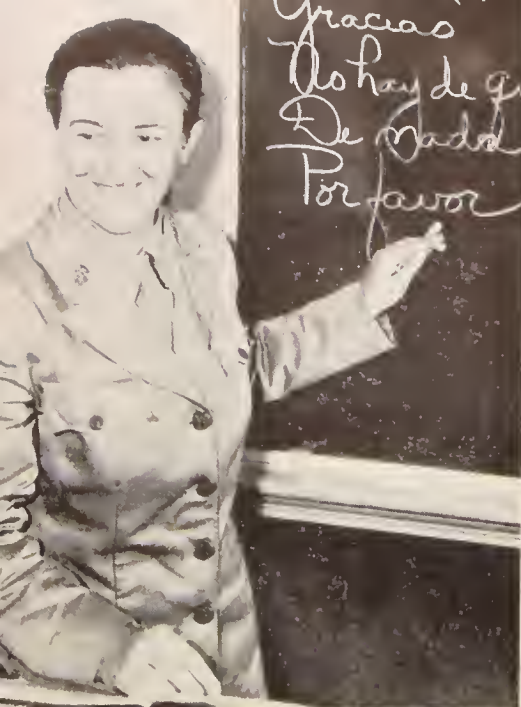

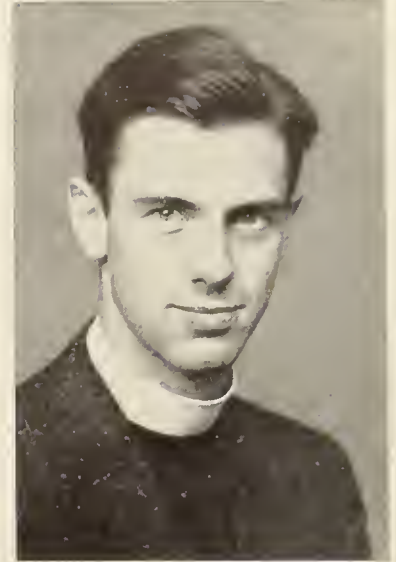

### Gordy Bennett Meets Oberlinites Wherever He Flies

June 18, 1943

Dear Sir:

An Alumni Secretary should have my job of flying all over the country. Ever since I joined the Navy as an aviation cadet in June 1941 (a few days after graduation) I have been bumping into Oberlin people and friends of Oberlin. The first was Art Wyman's brother who was at the top of his cadet class at Jax (Jacksonville, Florida). Then, because Major Koonce's brother (Samuel D. Koonce, '36) was an Oberlin grad I managed to get to Oberlin with Jack Kidd for the Career Conference which ended December 7th, 1941.

As an instructor at Jax I had Tom Clark, '39 as a student. He had no trouble with the course. As a student officer Tom was in command of a PBY (Patrol Bomber) and was putting his plane over the side when the hull accidentally had a hole knocked in it and the plane started to sink. On-the-ball Clark, rather than let the plane sink, gave it full throttle, made a 180 degree turn and taxied the plane up on the ramp. This not only saved the plane, but showed quick thinking. He also saved the taxpayers a couple of hundred thousand dollars. Clark is now instructor at Jax—poor lad!

Bob Chamberlain, x'42, also was a cadet while I was instructing at Jax. We managed to get out on some good parties together. Bob was one of the first cadets to get land-based Navy bombers. I don't know where he is now.

In January 1942 I went to transport school and ever since I have been hopping all over the country—and frequently outside of the territorial limits.

Met Phil DeShong, '40, in a Jacksonville hotel. Got on a bus in Dallas, Texas, and met Earl (Steve) Mathis who was at that time and still is instructing at Corpus Christi. Since then I have met Steve several times in Texas and have had little Oberlin celebrations with him.

Also at Corpus I phoned Jamie Hall, '42, who was just finishing his training as a Marine dive bomber pilot. He is now getting advanced tactics at Jax, having already won his wings.

Mathis told me of Jim Arnold's ('42) success as a cadet at Corpus Christi. All the officers credited him with the most ability of any cadet in his class and considered it a pleasure to instruct him. He was at the top of his class—and is now an instructor at Corpus. Doug Handyside, '42 and Bill Crecraft, x'42 were also cadets at Corpus Christi at that time and undoubtedly have won their wings long ago. Another time I met Sherry Paulin, x'43, who was in instrument training as a flying cadet at Corpus.

On my way back from San Diego last April I stopped at Pensacola, Fla., overnight and had dinner with Dick Tacy, x'41. Tacy is also an instructor but is pulling all the strings he knows to get fleet duty. Both he and Mathis should be out with the fleet soon.

Dear Mr. Love:

Realizing that President Wilkins is at this time doubly busy, what with the new Navy unit just starting at Oberlin, and the tremendous job of personally answering all of the letters from Oberlin men in the service (and I assure you that his letters are a real inspiration to us out here), and all of that in addition to his regular duties as president of the college, I am taking the liberty to ask a favor of you, hoping that it will not be too great an inconvenience.

Enclosed, you will find a money order for thirty-two dollars. I would like to have copies of Mr. Fletcher's "A History of Oberlin College" (both volumes) and of this year's "Hi-O-Hi" sent to my father, Daniel S. McCorkle, Conrad, Montana.

Quonset Point, Rhode Island, and met Bob Harrison, '38. He is connected with the medical corps of the Navy and is doing work in the low-pressure chamber which tests pilots' ability to withstand high altitudes.

My second night at Norfolk, Va., which is my home station, I met Don Holm, '41, at the movies. He is working in the budget department of the Navy. Wally Cooper, '38, is also stationed at Norfolk and has a very responsible job. As I understand it he is the only officer on the station who has any special knowledge about a certain phase of Naval ordnance, therefore he runs that special department. One week-end a couple of months ago Bob Beers, '41, Red Kennedy, '41, Bob Wall, '43, Johnny Hunt, '42, and I got together in Philadelphia. After Red and Beers finished raving about their prospective brides (Lois Reinhardt, '43, and Ev Gracy, '43, respectively) we had an all night bull session. Hunt and Wall are busy carving cadavers at med school in Philadelphia. Bob Beers is dropping all kinds of bombs all over the Aberdeen Proving Grounds—just to see if they will go off. He has dropped several hundred tons by now. Red Kennedy is on the Adjutant General's staff and sees to it that soldier's family allotments get to them safely. He also makes sure that one woman is not collecting allotments from more than one husband at a time.

One week-end at Daytona Beach I saw a couple of soldiers playing football in the sand. One of those men was Fritz Hershleb, '40. Another Oberlin reunion.

Went to Red Kennedy's and Lois Reinhardt's wedding in Buffalo. A gang of Oberlin people were there. We sang Oberlin songs as we sat on the kitchen floor.

Saw Don Emig, '43, at South Station, Boston—where he was meeting Betty John, '43.

I spent this afternoon at Virginia Beach with Dink Flint, '41, and his wife (Ludy Brackett, x'43). Dink is shoving off on a new carrier any day now.

Pete Williams, '41, is flying for the Navy at Anacostia. Harry Otis, '42, passed through Norfolk a month or so ago and is now on a "Yippy" boat on the South Atlantic.

The contents of this letter sounds as though I have a swell time visiting. Well I guess I do but while I am filling up that little black book with nice phone numbers my log book shows an increase of well over 100 hours a month.

Next month I get transferred to Miami

August 9, 1943

Dear Chuck:

Wish I could tell you about my work here. There are many Oberlin men and women in service in Washington. Some, whom I see frequently, are: Lt. W. V. Quine, '30, USNR; Lt. Giles Dawson, '25, USNR; Lt. Wallace Sprague, '38, USNR; Ens. Jane Phillips Hallock, '41, USNR; Dr. Francis Gravitt, '28, also working for the Navy. Lt. (jg) Tom

Boardman, '39, USNR, is perhaps still here, although I haven't seen him recently. He is doing an excellent job. He was at the top of his class, you know, at Midshipmen's school at Northwestern. Another of my former students, Ens. Randy Bellows, '37, USNR, stood at the top of his class, too, at Midshipmen's school—Naval Ordnance instructor now, I believe, at Notre Dame. It is my impression that Oberlin men and women in service are doing an excellent job, at least I can vouch for those who are "fighting" the war from the "foxholes" of Pennsylvania Avenue, Constitution Avenue, and the Mall.

Could you give me the latest news of Dr. Richards of First Church? I considered him one of the best friends in my four years at Oberlin.
