NEW FEE SYSTEM

The new law which went into effect on the first of this year requiring all fees to the county clerk to be paid in advance, has caused considerable annoyance, even to the point of the fact that the provisions of the law are not fully understood. For this benefit of those of our readers who have business with the clerk of the county clerk, we publish herewith a synopsis of the fees chargeable for various services, and which the new law requires to be paid in advance.

For receiving proof of acknowledgment and entering order in connection therewith, etc., on writing admitted to record, \$1.00

For recording a bill containing not more than six crosses, 50

For each additional cross, 50

Where such writing concerns personal and not real estate, 75

For each additional thirty words in excess of 500, 50

For recording independent notes of five, 50

For swearing witnesses and entering order in proof of a will not contested, 50

For not publicly proved on file, or for each subsequent order, 75

For some services where there is a contest, 1.00

For recording a will, as the option of the clerk, a special fee of 50 and for every 30 words, 50

For entering orders and receiving receipts as an appeal, 75

For entering an accounting document relative to an officer, 50

For making out bond for surety representative, administering necessary order, entering order receiving probate, etc., 1.00

If several representatives qualify at the same time for the same office, the fee for all shall be the same as for one, 1.00

For entering an order to keep a will where liquor is sold, 50

For administering oath and taking oath for same, 50

For marriage license, including receipt, 50

For each for anything over a year marriage, 50

For recording certificate and giving receipt, 50

For recording judgment, decree, bond or recognizance, 50

For including same when quired, 25

For making transcript of record, 50

For proceedings in any case for every thirty words three cents, and for the making out any other paper to go out of the office, 50

For every other service, the same charge as a similar charge of 50

A New Story About Gen. Robt. E. Lee

A hitherto unpublished story about Gen. Robert E. Lee is given in the Manufacturers' Record of Richmond. It is an article entitled "Roaming Out of the Nation's Life Through Southern Development in the course of which it is said.

"At the close of the Civil War several young men who had served in the Southern army, as the Manufacturers' Record has recently been told by one who was in the party, called on Gen. Robert E. Lee. In explaining the object of their visit they said to him:

"Your name has survived in so many places we did not want to go. Now we want to take you to see us where we are going, and we have come to ask for your autograph on these photographs."

"General Lee, in reply, said: 'If my name has survived as you say, it has, it is not what you did not want to go. I want you to be here, and I want to go to any place where you want to go. Where are you going?'"

"General Lee said to them: 'As soldiers you served your State faithfully; you did your duty, you risked your lives in the service of your country; but you do not seek your country more than they do in your war. I had no problems to settle. Its business interests have been destroyed, and for some years remains it seems, in your State by a right to ask you to stay by it in those days of its reconstruction, but you do not do this. Consider whether you do not owe to your State, under these conditions, the same devotion to it, the same self-sacrifice that you did in the call of your war.'

"It had been possible for this thought of the great Confederate soldier to have been carried out, and if by hundreds of thousands of young strike men who left this section within a few years after the war, and the two said a half million people who have left the States during the past 40 years, had been able to find at home scope for their talents, employment for their energies, freedom of trade or manufacture, what a mighty difference there would have been, not only in the South, but in other sections!"

The South would have gained the energy of these people and the energy of the children born to them, while other sections which were made satisfied by their work would be that at most have made less relative progress than they have made.

The importance of the state agricultural interests and resources demands better facilities for our educational work along agricultural lines. Some day the farmers will wake up and insist that this department of the university work shall be adequately endowed and equipped by the legislature. Tax receipts have asked the legislature for a special fund to be used for this purpose. It is to be hoped that this request will be heeded.

That one Survivor of The Secession Commission Left

With the death of Judge Cyrus Hall, Friday, at the home of his son, E. H. Hall, at Laurel, Md., on Dec. 15th, 1908, the only survivor of the Secession Commission left. He was 89 years of age. He was a prominent citizen and a member of the Secession Commission in 1861, which passed the ordinance of secession. Two others of whom is General Eppa Hunton, are alive, but live in Virginia.

Judge Hall lived through a tempestuous time, witnessing the formation of West Virginia from the old State, a time fraught with danger to the nation. State Historian Virgil A. Lewis in his biennial report, to be made public in a few days, has included a report of this remarkable occasion which was without precedent in the annals of the old Commonwealth.

After several States had seceded from the Union, Governor John Letcher issued a proclamation calling the general assembly of Virginia in special session. The legislature convened on January 6, 1861, and seven days later passed a bill calling a convention of the delegates to which were to be chosen by the people. The delegates were elected on the 14th day of February of that year and on the 15th of the same month assembled at Richmond. Out of the 131 delegates assembled in the convention it was from that section of the state now included in West Virginia.

The most prominent men of the state were delegates to the convention. Ex-President John Tyler and ex-Governor Henry A. Wise sat in the convention. On April 18th the ordinance of secession was passed by a vote of 89 to 19. It was signed by 89 delegates. It was the only ordinance of the vote without objection. High bodies illuminated the hall and the delegates from the mountains to the sea all were welcomed.

Of the delegates in the convention from Western Virginia, eleven voted for the ordinance, thirty-two against, and four were absent and not voting. The member from Harrison county withdrew from voting, stating that while he favored the ordinance his constituency was opposed to it. Those who voted for the ordinance were Allen T. Caperton and John E. Eddy, of Monroe; N. B. Fynock, Meigs; James Lawson, Logan; Johnson Furness, Mingo; Fred, John, Joseph, and James, Boone; John, James, and John, Lincoln; S. Hall, of Wendi; John N. Hughes, of Barbour; Samuel Woods, of Berkeley; Franklin F. Turner, of Jackson and Hester and Judge Cyrus Hall, who has just died.

Immediately after the ordinance of secession was passed members of the members who had voted against the same, including William C. Wiley and Charles D. Hubbard, returned to West Virginia. Several of the West Virginians who had voted against the ordinance had declared their loyalty to the new State of West Virginia.

Judge Hall represented Lincoln and Pleasant in the Richmond convention and was the first pro-secessionist and the only one who was not a member of the Secession Commission. 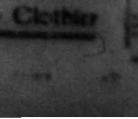

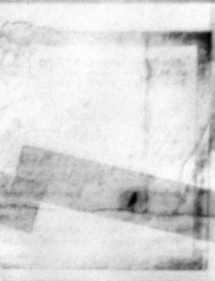

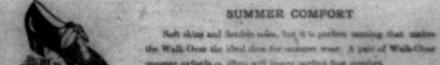

F. G. Massey Killed.

F. G. Massey, Clerk of the Board of Durbin, was killed in an automobile accident near the town of Durbin, Thursday evening. He was driving a Buick, and was struck by a car coming from the opposite direction. He was thrown from the car and killed instantly.

Dates of the State Fire Marshal

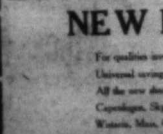

The Game Law
The following letter, published in the *Charleston Gazette*, is from Hon. Geo. W. McCleary, one of the commissioners appointed by Governor Davenport to draft a game law for the state. As a lawyer of marked ability as well as a sportsman, the work of the committee was largely left in his hands.

"Dear Sir—I am glad to note the progress of the real work of the game law of the last session of the legislature, to-wit, the conservative protection and preservation of both game and fish in West Virginia. There are few states which have enacted laws by more than thirty years of age. Ohio and no state has ever revised thereafter after they were enacted. Judging by the experience of the people from the different parts of the state, it is believed that they will never be changed here, unless in the course of time game should again become plentiful. This is probably the purpose to present the idea of a limited quantity.
