ON THE COVER: Rich Glover, Nebraska middle guard, not only made nearly every all-America team in 1971, but was tagged by the Washington Gridiron Club for its John L. Young Trophy as the outstanding college lineman in the nation. He also received lineman awards for his games against Colorado and Oklahoma from ABC-TV, and was the national lineman of the week after the Husker-Sooner game. The 6-1, 234pound senior from Jersey City, N.J., was the only junior honored as a finalist for the Vince Lombardi Award, and was named the outstanding lineman in the 1972 Orange Bowl. Glover led Nebraska last season with 46 solo and 46 assisted tackles, and is a candidate for the 1972 Outland Award.

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

## '72 "Year Of" Label? How About Year Of Trying To Unseat The Big Eight?

What will 1972 be "The Year of" in intercollegiate football?

That is the question. No one will know the answer for sure until Decem-

ber. But there'll definitely be an answer.

College football is big for "years", with nearly as many as the calendar. Included in the college game's 103-autumn history have been "The Year of the Forward Pass," "The Year of the T-formation (rediscovered)," "The Year of the Split-T," "The Year of the Quarterback," "The Year of the Running Back," etcetera, etcetera, etcetera.

LAST SEASON CAME CLOSE to being "The Year of the Wishbone." The formation developed for collegiate capabilities by Texas' Darrell Royal and his offensive lieutenant who moves to Texas A&M as head man, Emory Bellard, was refined to a frenzied offensive peak by Oklahoma and Alabama in 1971.

Alabama's Bear Bryant sprang the Wishbone on Southern California in the season opener and stunned the surprised Trojans with 17 first-half points

which stood up for a 17-10 triumph,

The Tide then inundated 10 more regular season foes by an aggregate score of 362-84 with only Louisiana State making a close scrap of it, at 14-7.

Oklahoma's attacking from the run-oriented Wishbone can only be described as awesome. Chuck Fairbanks' Sooners rewrote the team's rushing record books whilst averaging 472.4 yards per afternoon and 7.3 every time they tried a running play. Opponents were outpointed 494-195.

Michigan utilized a twin offense composed of the Power-I and Wishbone

in rolling through the Big Ten unbeaten.

Michigan State installed the Wishbone in the midst of the season and turned a 2-4 won-lost start into a disaster-averting 6-5 finish. And Colgate went 6-4 using the Wishbone.

ARKANSAS USED the Wishbone, which forces defenders to spread their forces across the entire field because of its options, down close to the goal. Many others also put the formation into their arsenal.

Yes, it would have been "The Year of the Wishbone"-but for Nebraska, Bob Devaney's Cornhuskers proved they could run Wishbones as well as cobs through their cornhusking machine. They won two "Games of the Century" in six weeks to keep the national championship in Lincoln.

The two victims of the mighty Huskers' defense were Wishbonees Oklahoma, a 35-31 loser on Thanksgiving Day, and Alabama, which dropped a 38-6 New Year's Day Orange Bowl decision. Meanwhile, Oklahoma was giving Auburn's throat a 40-22 slitting in the Sugar Bowl.

So instead of being "The Year of the Wishbone," 1971 had turned into

"The Year of the Big Eight."

NEBRASKA AND OKLAHOMA WERE RETURNED to their rightful one-two rankings. And who was No. 3? None other that Colorado, which played 12 times and lost only to—who else?—Nebraska and Oklahoma.

Thus, the best prediction at present on what 1972 will be the "year" of

is the "The Year of Trying to Unseat the Big Eight."

Eleven non-league foes have shots at the Big Eight titans. Minnesota opposes both Nebraska and Colorado. Nebraska faces UCLA, Texas A&M,

and Army while Colorado duels California, Cincinnati and Air Force.

Oklahoma would seem to be in the most hazardous position, non-conference wise, having the traditional rendezvous with Texas in Dallas in addition to dates with Utah State, and Oregon, as well as Clemson.

Who has a chance to mess up the Big Eight's playhouse, or rather penthouse, atop the national rankings and keep the No. 1 plum from going to the victor of the Nebraska-Oklahoma game or the Nebraska-Colorado clash or even the Oklahoma-Colorado confrontation in 1972?

IF ARKANSAS or Texas tippy-toes through the upset-infested Southwest Conference swamp, especially if Texas tops Oklahoma, national champion-ship consideration would certainly be amongst the rewards.

Penn State, its prestige restored by the fracturing of Texas' Wishbone in the Cotton Patch, could contend if it marches into the Lambert Trophy room again. Notre Dame has the spotlight, perennially, if it can make the most of it.

Anyone spreadeagling the talentrich Southeastern Conference would be a strong national championship possibility. Ditto the Big Ten, which could sure use such a boost to its badly bruised pride.

Outside possibilities exist that circumstances could thrust the Pacific Eight or Atlantic Coast champs into the picture. And there's always Arizona State, although pollsters have always held the Western Athletic Conference scoremasters in light regard.

Of course, most of all, what happens in the national rankings depends on

what happens in the Big Eight.

What has already happened is that both Nebraska and Oklahoma have lost their quarterbacks, Jerry Tagge and Jack Mildren, while Colorado has its record-setting sophomore, Ken Johnson, back a year wiser for the experiences he agonized through in the losses to the Huskers and Sooners.

Because Colorado has the only veteran quarterback among the top three, many observers are predicting Nebraska's two-time national champs are in

for a good dethroning. There are other reasons, of course.

Crowder has a rampaging tailback in Charlie Davis, whose sophomore log included 1,386 yards, 342 of them in one afternoon Oklahoma Staters will never be able to forget. Colorado has backfield speed and line size to spare and a flambuoyant defensive leader in ex-Marine Bud Magrum.

Nebraska has not only the momentum of a 23-game victory streak and defeatless string of 32 contests but also an added emotional factor. Devaney has announced he'll retire to his athletic directorship after this season.

Although Tagge is fresh out of eligibility, Nebraska did not exactly get caught with its quarterbacks down. Redshirted last autumn was David

#### NATIONAL CHAMPIONS, 1924-1971

Nebraska won its second straight unofficial national championship in 1971. Both wire services, Associated Press (writers) and United Press International (coaches), voted Nebraska No. 1, as did the Football Writers' Association. Since 1924, Big Ten Conference teams have won or shared 15 national titles, Notre Dame eight, the Southeastern, Southwest and Pacific-8 conferences six

each, the Big Eight five, Eastern Independents four and the Atlantic Coast and Ivy one each.

However, Southeastern and Big Eight teams have won all of their titles since

1950, while the Big Ten owns six and Notre Dame one since 1950.

In terms of national titles won, the top coaches since 1924 have been Notre Dame's Frank Leahy and Minnesota's Bernie Bierman, with four each.

The AP poll was originated in 1936, the UPI poll in 1950. Prior to the polls,

the Rissman (1924-30) and Knute Rockne (1931-35) trophies symbolized the

Notre Dame and Oklahoma have been the nation's most successful majors in 36 years of wire-service polls. Counting 10 points for each first, 9 for second and so on, the Irish have 151 points, the Sooners 111. Over the last 10 seasons, five teams and coaches have dominated the rankings: Texas (Darrell Royal) 50 points, Alabama (Bear Bryant) 49, Notre Dame (Ara Parseghian) 45, Nebraska (Bob Devaney) 43 and Southern Cal (John McKay) 40. The leaders:

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Humm, a southpaw slinger whose popularity with the nation's recruiters was due to more than his home in Las Vegas. Also available is Terry Luck.

And for what else Nebraska has available in the way of talent, you need only glance at the 1971 or pre-1972 All-America teams. You'll find names like middle guard Rich Glover, slotback Johnny Rodgers, defensive end Willie Harper and secondaryman Joe Blahak.

Oklahoma's Fairbanks had a six-pack of candidates to succeed Mildren. in spring practice. If one doesn't break out of the pack, Fairbanks might even consider a couple of bright freshmen, who are now eligible nationwide.

Oklahoma's star list is headed by center Tom Brahaney and halfback Greg Pruitt, who were All-Americans, and halfback Joe Wylie, who was supposed to be but was felled by injuries. On defense, the stable of horses is led by Raymond Hamilton, Derland Moore and Lucious Selmon.

Texas has the same potentially fatal malady as Oklahoma, loss of its Wishbone quarterback. In Texas' case, it was losses not loss, since both Eddie Phillips and pinch-hitter supreme Donnie Wigginton were seniors. But Texas also thinks that even great quarterbacks can be replaced.

Royal thinks a converted defensive secondaryman named Alan Lowry will do just fine at quarterback, thank you. If he does and converted full-back Dennis Ladd is a creditable replacement for ace halfback Jim Bertelsen, the Longhorns could make it five straight conference crowns.

ARKANSAS HAS NO QUARTERBACK PROBLEM AT ALL. Frank Broyles' triggerman is Joe Ferguson, who zeroed in 59 per cent of his passes for 2,203 yards and 11 touchdowns in 1971. Arkansas also has speed aplenty in Dickie Morton, Jon Richardson and newcomer Marsh White and veterans everywhere including the whole receiving corps led by Mike Reppond.

All of which would have Arkansawyers running a national championship fever, Big Eight or no Big Eight, if it weren't for two other items: (1) Texas and (2) lack of a proven replacement for placekicker Bill McClard.

Penn State sustained serious personnel losses but retains seven of the defensive starters who denied Texas a touchdown in the Cotton Bowl, first time that had happened to a Royal team since 1964. And Joe Paterno's rebuilding of the offense will, happily, be done around incumbent quarterback John Hufnagel. The big test of the Nittany Lions' eastern supremacy apparently will be administered by Boston College. Should the Lions stumble, West Virginia would contest B.C. for best-in-the-east recognition.

NOTRE DAME LOST A WHOPPING EIGHT-MAN defensive contingent off the team which finished 8-2 in 1971. Defending Big Ten champ Michigan also

lost heavily from its defense corps.

An anyone-can-win-it scramble is seen in the Big Ten. Michigan and Ohio State have to be conceded a chance because they're almost always in it. But Michigan State and Purdue figure in. So does Illinois, which lost its first six '71 games and then bumped off five consecutive loop foes.

If one team wades through the conference unscathed, it might do well in

national balloting. Big Ten prestige is admittedly down, however. Michigan was 11-0 last year and, despite what Coach Bo Schembechler kept telling em, voters kept the Wolverines in fourth place. Then Stanford knocked 'em

down to sixth with its Rose Bowl ambush.

Arizona State doesn't visit many ambushes. Frank Kush's Sun Devils have lost only one game the past two seasons and three in the three years they've owned the Western Athletic Conference crown. If Kush could get rid of Oregon State, which he hasn't beaten since 1961, in five attempts, all-win seasons would undoubtedly follow.

BUT THAT WOULD ONLY COMPOUND POLISTERS' CHARGES against the Sun Devils, mainly that they don't play a tough enough schedule to rate more than lower top ten ranking. No one disputes, however, that the likes of halfback Woody Green would do well against anybody's schedule.

Air Force is given a shot at out-accomplishing Arizona State. Utah State supporters are even making some optimistic sounds but they probably will fade away after the Utags play Oklahoma and Texas—on the road already!

As in the Big Ten, five outfits have chances to claim the Southeastern Conference flag, Alabama, with now-experienced Wishbone quarterback Terry Davis but without inspirational prancer Johnny Musso, will be pressured by Mississippi, with Kenny Lyons, and Louisiana State, with Bert Jones. Tennessee and Georgia rate consideration, too.

North Carolina's rule in the Atlantic Coast is endangered by Clemson and Duke. Among top southern independents, eyes will be on the aerial artistry

of Florida State's Gary Huff and Virginia Tech's Don Strock. ANOTHER BATTLE ROYAL- or, in this instance, Battle Rose-is brewing in

the Pacific-8. Washington, which has the glamor man in Indian quarterback Sonny Sixkiller, is the pre-combat choice, narrowly, over USC.

But as the Big Ten's last two Rose Bowl entrants will tell you, albeit reluctantly, Stanford can't be down rated. And, some say, neither can California, Nor Washington State. Nor UCLA.

So, as in most conference outposts around the nation, if one of the contending teams gets a hot hand-Sixkiller's or Mike Boryla's at Stanford or one attached to several other key performers-and slaps everyone else around, the national title would be within reach.

ELSEWHERE IN THE AREA of what to look for this season, the top trends are expected to be (1) to the Wishbone on offense and (2) against the Wishbone on defense. In the latter category, of course, there prabably isn't a coach alive who'll face the Wishbone this season who hasn't inquired, at about what Nebraska did length.

against Oklahoma and Alabama and what Penn State did against Texas.

Rulesmakers made one change noticeable to spectators. A kick-off into the end zone is a dead ball unless it's touched by the receiving team. This eliminates the kicking team recovering an untouched ball for a touchdown.

NCAA SCHOOLS APPROVED FRESHMAN PARTICIPATION but most coaches agree few yearlings will play except for a few super athletes and/or specialists

such as placekickers, punters, punt returners and kick coverers.

Individual standouts? How Heisman Trophy balloting will go is always good for several thousand guesses. On paper, Oklahoma's Pruitt would appear to be the leading candidate. He's the only returnee who finished in the top ten in 1971. Pruitt was third behind Auburn quarterback Pat Sullivan and Cornell rushmaster Ed Marinaro.

Pruitt's main problem could be internal. Unless Oklahoma can find someone to reasonably duplicate Mildren's threat, Pruitt will be the bullseye on all defenses' targets. And if halfback mate Wylie is sound, Pruitt can't

count on compiling eye-popping statistics again.

Arkansas' Ferguson, Washington's Sixkiller or Florida State's Huff could pass himself right into the tuxedo one wears to accept the Heisman. Nebraska's Rodgers would rate high if the Huskers stay high but would be hurt because a slotback is limited statistically.

TWO OTHER SUPER ATHLETES who should rate consideration probably won't because they're defensive players. They're Michigan State secondaryman Brad Van Pelt and Nebraska middle guard Glover.

But Heisman predictors, just like national championship prognosticators, have no idea who, or what, 1972 will be "The Year of." Which is what makes college football, every year, a "Year of Fun."

# The East INCAA Districts 1 & 21 Penn State, Delaware Are Favored; Wishbone, Use Of Freshmen Are Not

It doesn't require any expertise with a crystal ball to predict which way

the East wind will be blowing in the Autumn of '72.

Spring—tra, la!—provided ample evidence that Eastern football has a lot of reservations concerning the Wishbone-T, that freshmen now eligible under ECAC rules won't be seen abundantly in the varsity trenches, that Penn State's grip on the Lambert Trophy will not be noticeably relaxed despite an awesome depletion of its Cotton Bowl squad.

For that matter, small power Delaware seems indisposed to move over

and let somebody else take over, either.

COLGATE, WHICH HAD BETTER THAN moderate success in exploring the Wishbone-T (or Full House) offense in '71, has made the commitment total and enthusiastic for '72. The Red Raiders scored 287 points in a 6-4 inaugural season and stood ninth in rushing nationally. Neil Wheelwright will continue to Wishbone from that springboard. With 32 lettermen, plus unbeaten freshmen teams back-to-back, his prospects glow.

Carl De Pasqua of Pittsburgh, an established "multiple" offense advocate, opted for the Wishbone in Spring practices—a decision influenced by the presence of the top eight runners of the '71 season among his 29 lettermen. QB Bob Medwid was tapped as the option key to Pitt's pioneering season

in this offense.

Jerry Nason has been associated with the Boston Globe for nearly 40 years—as a sports car-

Globe for nearly 40 years—as a sports cartoonist, football writer, column writer, sports editor, and now as executive sports

editor.
As evidence of his long standing interest in college football, Nason has twice won the national Dutton Award-both times for college stories.

The first award was in 1946 for the Army-Navy 0-0 game. The second came in 1969 for the Harvard-Yale 29-29 impossible. The current District 1

director of the FWAA was also the author of the East Preview-Review for the 1950 Official Football Guide. But the Raiders from the Chenango Valley and the Panthers from the Monongahela seem to be going it alone with the Wishbone in the East, among the big fellows.

PENN STATE'S Cotton Bowlers shut off Texas' "original" Wishbone without a touchdown in January, a feat unlikely to stampede PS toward adopting it. Columbia alone in the eight-team Ivy League employed any Wishbone in '71, and that only an occasional formation for its shock effect. The Ivy, which can be pretty generally classified as a Slot-T league, will remain so excepting for Joe Restic's innovation Tailgate-T at Harvard, a "motion" offense that started to whir

toward the end of '71, it's baptismal season.

Rustic put into motion every ball carrier and flanker, and was even getting motion out of his ends and split-receivers in late November. The Ivy jury is still out, but will admit there were times when they threw up their hands in despair when attempting to adjust defensively to the Tailgate-T. Harvard's execution of the offense was spotty, due to unfamiliarity into November. But with three top QBs among 27 returnees who lettered in Restic's first season, the truth will out this year.

JOE PATERNO HAD THE EAST'S BEST FOOTBALL TEAM in '71, as he almost perennially has, and the residue from that 11-1 Cotton Bowl squad almost guarantees that Penn State will be there or thereabouts once more. The QB key to open the door again is the towering John Hufnagel, a veteran of two bowls with a 16-1 personal won-loss record since Paterno moved him

into the pilothouse in the middle of the '70 season.

From the team that took down Texas, 30-6, in January, Paterno loses his 1-2 punch in Franco Harris and Lydell Mitchell, and well as offensive

tackle Dave Joyner and tight end Bob Parsons.

So, Paterno may be hurting a little early in '72 while his new crop of ball carriers and blockers is jelling-but he will have seven defensive starters out on the field who conspired to hold Texas to a pair of field goals in Dallas. Defense is not the least reason why the Nittany Lions have appeared in three bowls in the past four years.

THERE MAY BE A TALL DARK MAN IN PATERNO'S FUTURE-say on Nov. 18. That's the Saturday Penn State meets Boston College, and Joe Yukica, at Chestnut Hill, Mass. Yukica is an old PS end of the Rip Engle era and he has the Boston Eagles flying high-at a 17-3 altitude for the past two sea-

sons. Nov. 18 could be the Came of the Year in the East.

This is Yukica's fifth season in Boston. He has his best team coming up. potentially BC's finest since the '40 Sugar Bowlers-34 lettermen reinforced by one of the most talented freshman squads seen in the Boston area for two decades or more. The early BC situation will be exactly contrary to

Penn State's: the offense putting it together while the defense catches up. The Eagles have a legitimate All-America defensive tackle candidate in Jeff Yeates, a strong-armed QB of enormous potential in Gary Marangi, and a split-receiver named Mel (The Mustang) Briggs who is certain to send rival scouts scurrying for the nearest phone.

YUKICA FRANKLY EXPECTS TO SCORE EARLY AND OFTEN behind a marvelous big, mobile offensive line—and he may have to. The BC schedule is prob-

ably its toughest since the late '40s.

Whether or not Syracuse can make it all the way back from its heart-break seasons of '70 and '71 is going to depend a great deal upon the breaks, all of which have lately gone against Ben Schwartzwalder, and the development of an entirely new offensive line. One thing is as certain at Syracuse as snow in January: Benny, who traditionally runs it right at you, has the backs to do it again. The entire rock 'em-sock 'em backfield of Bob Woodruff, Roger Proetorious, Marty Januszkiewicz, plus split-receivers, is returned intact. They can thump.

Syracuse will also get reinforcements, notably Greg Allen, a speedster who missed the injury-strewn '71 season with hepatitis, and defensive tackle Joe Ehrmann, who sat out with an injury. The Orange can use Allen's outside speed and Ehrmann's 6-5, 260-pound defensive charge. Position for

position, Ehrmann may be the best campus player in the East.

A LOT OF PEOPLE IN THE EAST look warily over their shoulders at West Virginia. Well they might. The Mountaineers set forth with 31 lettermen from a 7-4 squad that last year converted a torrent of Boston College turnovers into a stunning 45-14 opening-game upset, but never quite achieved that crescendo again.

Bobby Bowden has good talent at Morgantown, strong support from the '71 freshmen, and eight offensive starters returning. That means Arnold Galiffa is again the QB. But don't go away. West Virginia also returns ten

of its starting defensive unit to the fray, Zig-and-zag receivers Danny Buggs and Marshall Mills, up from the frosh, strongly hint that WV will throw the ball. They may also throw a long shadow across Eastern football.

VILLANOVA OF THE INDEPENDENTS is experiencing some jitters about the QBing, Graduation knocked off two senior QBs and also almost totally destroyed Lou Ferry's offensive line. But opponents have learned from bitter experience never to underrate the Wildcats. Another of their major losses was John Babincz, the superb linebacker. But Frank Polito brings a gleam to Ferry's eye. As a sophomore he picked off 12 enemy passes.

In his first year at Holy Cross, tenacious Eddie Doherty captured the New England "Coach of the Year" award for the remarkable turnabout of the Crusaders, winless since the hepatitis epidemic of '69 almost wiped

varsity football off the agenda at Worcester, Mass.

What Doherty achieved was something of a minor miracle, and largely a spiritual thing. Holy Cross recruiting has been almost at a standstill for two years. Doherty's big gun this season will be Joe Wilson, generally acclaimed as the best ball-carrier in New England, if not the East.

TEMPLE HAS MOVED ONTO THE SYRACUSE SCHEDULE in '72, a subtle suggestion that the Owls in Philadelphia are on the wing under Wayne Hardin. Hardin has a two-year record of 13-5-1 in his reconstruction and Temple has played a lot of the Eastern "iron". Only Boston College and West Virginia beat him last year. And who alone knocked off Delaware?

Temple has formidable talent in key positions—QB Doug Shobert with an "Oh my" pass average of 62.8 percent, a great guard in Skip Singeltary, Paul Longhran, who double-duties as fullback and kick-returner with an awesome yardage total, and an all-purpose kicker in Nick Mike-Mayer.

Some of the best football played in the East at any level for some time has been produced by Delaware which, in the course of "rebuilding" in '71 proceeded to the national College Division title and the Boardwalk Bowl. They averaged 42.2 points and 515.6 yards per game. Very impressive, right? But it was Tubby Raymond's defensive unit that really shook everybody up—50 hits on QBs for more than 300 yards, 25 pass interceptions, an average yielded of merely 57.9 yards per game.

WELL, DELAWARE WILL RETURN NINE STARTERS off that Big D unit, including eye-filling 6-5, 260-pound tackle Dennis Johnson. If the name of the game is truly "defense", then the Blue Hens will be flapping their Wing T around the ol' poultry farm again, despite some pretty serious offensive losses. The maturity of Scotty Reihms in their backfield, they expect, will compensate.

The service academies both approach the '71 season with high hopes. By April, Navy was talking of its "best team in five years" and Army had 14 starters among its 27 lettermen who'd hung it on the Middies, 24-23, in their last game. Their awesome schedules, though, didn't guarantee that

April's cheery mood would survive to October.

Navy, for instance, made William-Mary a late starter on its schedule, a Sept. 16 opener. Otherwise Rick Forzano would have had Penn State and Boston College back to back for starters—engagements with possibly the East's two best squads—with Michigan coming in behind them. And Army merely opens Sept. 23 with Nebraska. Possibly you've heard about Nebraska in recent years? It almost seems as if they haven't lost a football game since George Custer was at The Point.

NAVY HAS 37 LETTERMEN from a team that upset Duke and Syracuse, and lost one-pointers to Army and Pitt, in a 3-8 season. The Middies used the Wishbone-T as a spot thing in '71, but with Larry Van Sloan on the premises, and Al Glenny and Fred Stuvek to get the ball to him, Navy is unlikely to over-emphasize the run. Van Sloan wrecked all Annapolis' receiving marks in '71. No East receiver will invite more multiple coverage. That Tom Cahill emerged with a 6-4 record at Army in '71, a season of

total rehabilitation, surprised almost everybody except Cahill himself. His team was coming fast on the homestretch, winning four of its last five games. He found his QB in game No. 7, junior Kingsley Fink. The Fink-Bob Hines-Bruce Simpson-Ed Francis backfield which finished up in '71 will strike immediately in '72. The word is around the East that Army is going to be "tough cookie", especially on defense where Capt-elect Steve Bogosian is one of the high-rated tigers in the territory and the linebacking promises to be of oldtime Army velocity.

Independent Rutgers returns 18 starters from the 4-7 team which surged and won the last three games. Quarterback Leo Gasienica and running back

Jim "JJ" Jennings are leaders. The secondary must be rebuilt.

LEHIGH IS STRONGER DEFENSIVELY, but suffered key losses from their high-

scoring offense. QB Kim McQuilken is the main returnee.

Lafayette has eight offensive starters back, led by quarterback Tim Grip, but rebuilds on defense. Bucknell hopes for the first winning season since 1965 depend on tackle Stan Durtan and fullback Mitch Farbstein (903 yards in '71). QB Tom Pierantozzi and defensive tackle Doug Olson are good ones at ever-tough West Chester, and Gettysburg's 36 returning lettermen are cause for optimism in the Bullets' ranks. Hofstra will be small but quick and hopes to utilize the speed in a wide-open game.

The Ivy League is where a lot of the hot action was in '71, and will be again. Twelve Ivy games were decided by three or fewer points in a campaign that brought defending Dartmouth and Cornell to a dead heat, 6-1-0. The Indians came from behind in the team race to bring this off, holding

Cornell's Ed Marinaro to one breakaway run and winning, 24-14.

THE TITLE TIE SERVED AS A REMINDER that while Bob Blackman might be in person at Champaign, Ill., his melody lingered on in the Ivy League. Both rookie Jake Crouthamel, who replaced him at Dartmouth, and Cornell's

Jack Musick, had apprenticed on Blackman staffs at Hanover.

Dartmouth's approach to the title deadlock typified the frenzied competitive atmosphere in the Ivy. In rapid succession the Indians nipped Harvard with a last-play field goal, downed Yale with a last-minute field goal—then sustained their only defeat, 31-29, when Columbia reversed the script with a field goal of its own before the clock ran out.

Columbia came up like thunder 'cross Jamaica Bay in '71. And this sea-

son you won't have to look far beyond the Lions (four all-Ivies on hand), Dartmouth (15 returning starters) and Harvard (27 lettermen and a breakaway runner named Mark Wheeler) for the main Ivy action.

Jake McCandless has a big depth problem at Princeton and a 1-5 freshman squad moving up to the varsity. Brown has superb defensive possibili-

ties, but Len Jardine's offensive line has been totally wrecked.

Yale had its first losing season (4-5) since '66, but Carm Cozza lost three cliff-hangers, to Dartmouth, Columbia and Colgate. He has 29 lettermen and an unbeaten freshman squad coming up. If Cozza can put an offensive line together for Dick Jauron to run behind, the Elis will be a

factor. Jauron is one of the East's really fine ball carriers.

Cornell may have some early-season difficulty shaking off the Marinaro syndrome, now that he isn't there to call upon, and Penn is obviously the Ivy League "sleeper". The 2-7 Quakers were decimated by injuries in '71, especially at QB. Now they'll stroke back with 31 lettermen at 22 positions—three of them QBs. Add a 9.6 sprinter named Adolph Bellizeare up from the freshmen and Penn has the "long ball" threat it has lacked for years. And that sparkle in Jarry Gamble's eye is entitled receiver Tom Clune (6-4, 197) who destroyed three Ivy marks as a sophomore.

#### Wagers Are Risky On '71 Winners Repeating In South's Three Leagues

Anyone who parlays last year's champions in the Southeastern, Atlantic Coast and Southern Conferences into a wager on 1972 better have a loan company of his choice ready to bail him out.

In the SEC, Alabama, which had a shot at No. 1 until Nebraska's strongboys made the clock strike twelve, figures to be pressed strongly by Ole

Miss and LSU, and possibly by Tennessee and Georgia as well.

In the ACC, rebuilding North Carolina must replace 14 starters as it faces a stiff challenge from the likes of Clemson and Duke.

And, in the Southern, Richmond, with 14 starters returning, is certainly no cinch in the face of improving William and Mary and East Carolina.

FROM A PERSONALITY STANDPOINT, '72 figures to be the year of the quarterback in the South for more than one reason. To begin with, seniors Don Strock (6-5, 202) of Virginia Tech, Bert Jones (6-3, 200) of LSU and Gary Huff (6-1, 185) of Florida State are ranked as three of the finest signal calling prospects in the country.

Then there will be the debuts of Condredge Holloway at Tennessee and

Mel Barkum at Mississippi State, first black QBs in the SEC.

It was quarterback Terry Davis' ability to handle the Wishbone which brought Bama's Bear Bryant out of hibernation last fall. Terry returns along

Peter Finney, even to the casual observer, is about as pure New Orleans as possible. A native

with starters Joe LaBue and Ellis Beck, but Bear will be hard put to find anyone to fill in for the major absentee, all-America Johnny Musso.

OVERALL, HOWEVER, Bama has a plus in that it will be more experienced in handling the Wishbone, and possibly a minus in having to replace four offensive line starters.

With seven starters gone, problem chief could be defense, to which Bryant has always given prime concern.

Conference-wise, Alabama will be dropping Ole Miss for '72 and picking up Kentucky and Georgia. And it's just as well with Bear, who last season cast his coach-of-the-year vote for rookie coach Billy Kinard of the Rebels.

Taking over for Johnny Vaught, Kinard took Mississippi to a 10-2 season, keeping his club together after lopsided losses to Bama and Georgia, winding up with an upset of LSU and a Peach Bowl win over Georgia Tech. From this team, 10 offensive starters return as well as the entire secondary. If Kinard can uncover a couple of linebackers, and a couple of linemen, the Rebs could go to the post odds-on favorite.

THE QUARTERBACK PICTURE COULDN'T BE ROSIER. Kenny Lyons, who had Ole Miss 3-0 before he went out with an injury, returns as does Norris Weese, who took the Rebs the rest of the way. The pair is so well established that Kinard switched sophomore Bill Malouf (6-3, 195) who some call "another Archie Manning", to split end, the only position where a starter does not return. Kinard calls Burney Veazey "the best tight end in the country."

At LSU, Charley McClendon, whose Tigers closed out with a smashing nationally-televised rout of Notre Dame and Sun Bowl win over Iowa State,

must replace defensive gems Tommy Casanova and Ronnie Estay.

Bert Jones finished up impressively and his QB experience gives him the edge over soph Mike Miley, a run-pass option phenom who could put LSU in the Wishbone before he graduates. LSU has 33 lettermen back and only 13 seniors on the squad, indicating an even brighter 1973.

AT TENNESSEE, WHERE DEFENSE has eclipsed offense of late, 30-year-old Bill Battle moves into his third season with a glittering 21-3 record, including two bowl victories. Battle will bank on some talented young hands to take up the slack in a defense that lost all-America cornerback Bobby

Majors and linebackers Jackie Walker and Ray Nettles.

Offensively, the hope is Condredge Holloway and fellow sophs—fullback Neil Clabo and tailback John Sapp—will mature rapidly and give the Vols the punch they have been missing. Another plus will be Bill Rudder, voted the outstanding offensive player in the Liberty Bowl.

GEORGIA, HUMBLED ONLY BY Pat Sullivan-Terry Beasley heroics last fall, is coming off a banner 11-1 season and a Gator Bowl win. Although Vince Dooley has a nifty-running QB in Andy Johnson and some excellent power men in Jim Poulos, Bob Honeycutt and Horace King, he's worried about who'll be blocking for them. The line was stripped bare, a list that included all-America Royce Smith, all-SECs Tom Nash and Kendall Keith. Defensively, the backs return but there are big holes up front and at linebacker.

With Heisman winner Sullivan and sidekick Beasley gone, Auburn can't hope to duplicate its 9-2 record. "We refuse to use the word 'rebuilding,'" says Shug Jordan, who'll rely heavily on a defense that returns eight regulars. With Sullivan's QB slot wide open, indications are the Tigers will

travel more by land against a backbreaking schedule.

At Florida, which hopes to improve on a 4-7 record, Doug Dickey says the Gators will be better defensively and in the offensive line, with more speed and quickness. Lack of depth and quarterback are major problems.

The spotlight at Kentucky focuses on James McKay, a 6-1, 185 quarter-back coach John Ray plucked from Gulf Coast (Miss.) Junior College, national juco champs. McKay will be battling vet Mike Fanuzzi for the post.

VANDY RETURNS AT LEAST ONE VET at every position from a 4-6-1 team. Bill

Pace is confident over his returnees plus a promising frosh crop.

Likewise, Mississippi State is confident of improving a disappointing 2-9 season, mainly because it won't have to spend three months looking for a quarterback. Mel Barkum had a great frosh year, as did Rocky Felker.

In the Atlantic Coast Conference, although defending champ North Carolina loses 14 starters, coach Bill Dooley is confident over his sophs. Six starters return to the offensive line, but the backfield will be brand new and there is likely to be a problem until Dooley can settle on a quarter-

back, a four-man fight in the spring.

Mike McGee's Duke Blue Devils, which opened with four straight '71 victories, then ran into an injury problem and finished 6-5, has 10 starters

and 21 lettermen returning, making Duke a sophomore-senior team. Run-

ning is strong and the best could be soph QB Mark Johnson.

At Clemson, Hootie Ingram has 37 lettermen back from a 5-6 ball club, including 12 starters. Hootie doesn't believe depth will be a problem, saying "we have a good combination of experience, red-shirt maturity and young talented players." Ed Seigler, who booted 11 field goals in '71, including a conference record 52-yarder, helps keep Hootie sunny.

NORTH CAROLINA STATE, 3-8 LAST FALL, could be ready to move under new coach Lou Holtz, who will greet 15 starters. Willie Burden, who ran for 910 yards last year, gives the Wolfpack a runner of class and, in soph Roland Hooks, he has someone around to remove some of the pressure.

At Wake Forest, coach Tom Harper makes his debut with a team that lost its quarterback and Larry Hopkins, top rusher in Deacon history. Harper, who will stick with the Veer-A, will depend on all-America candidate Ken Garrett, whose 6.7 average last fall was a school record.

Virginia, 3-8 a year ago, will be stronger because of 14 returning starters,

including QB Harrison Davis, and 9.4 halfback Kent Merritt.

Maryland makes its bow under veteran coach Jerry Claiborne, by way of Virginia Tech and Colorado. Quarterback Al Neville, No. 2 in the ACC with

1,265 yards in total offense, returns to spearhead the offense.

Richmond and coach Frank Jones defend their Southern Conference crown with a squad that includes 23 lettermen and 23 sophomores. Five allloop returnees include halfbacks Barty Smith and Bill Meyers. Smith is a 6-4, 230-pounder of considerable potential.

CHALLENGER WILLIAM AND MARY will be under the direction of Jim Root, moving over from New Hampshire and inheriting a 5-6 ball club, a team that lost all six by 30 points. The offense should be exciting with Dave Knight, an all-America candidate, returning at wide receiver along with some nifty runners. Another plus will be punter Russ Brown, who last year punted for a 42.8 average, sixth best in the country.

First year coach Sonny Randle posted a 4-6 record at East Carolina last year. With 14 starters gone, and 19 lettermen back, Randle will bank on

some junior college talent plus a couple of holdover runners, 6-4, 210

Carleton Crumpler and Les Strayhorn.

The Citadel will be rebuilding an offensive unit that ranked fourth in the country and helped spark an 8-3 season, Coach Red Parker's bright spot is that junior QB Harry Lynch will have an added year of experience, but he may need it. The defense will have an entirely new secondary.

AT FURMAN, COACH ROBERT KING lost his quarterback and record-setting runner Steve Crislip. He is banking on new faces after a 5-5-1 season. Defensively, Furman figures to be much improved, especially at linebacker

and in the secondary.

VMI coach Bob Thalman looks on the new freshman rule as a lifesaver. He's bringing in 29 frosh to help complement 23 returning lettermen that

include halfback Mac Bowman and linebacker Mark Weiss.

At Davidson, Dave Fagg coaches the smallest school (1,000 enrollment) playing major college football but he's optimistic with quarterback Scotty Shipp, who last year passed for 1,135 yards back, plus a talented receiver

in Andy Davis, Fagg is confident of improving a 1-9 record.

Among the independents, Florida State shined brightest last season, moving to an 8-3 record under rookie coach Larry Jones. Even though QB Gary Huff, 1971 leader in total offense (241 yards per game) and a Heisman candidate this fall, returns, Seminoles will be hardpressed to match '71. Biggest problem will be replacing three starting linebackers.

AT MIAMI, FRAN CURCI calls 6-3, 215 junior Chuck Foreman the "greatest

running back in the country, a super athlete and Heisman candidate." He ran for a school-record 1,009 yards last fall when the Hurricanes went 4-7.

Defense should be improved but QB is question mark.

Bill Fulcher, only the fifth coach in Georgia Tech's illustrious history, inherits 14 starters from last season, including QB Ed McAshan, who holds a flock of Yellowjacket passing records. High-rated sophs, linebacker Joe Harris and tackle Beau Bruce, are expected to help immediately.

Tulane, in its second season under Bennie Ellender, will have more size,

speed and depth. The defense, anchored by Mike Mullen, one of the finer linebackers around, and rangy end Mike Truax, looks solid. Also Charles Hall, 6-4 and 245, rates super-sophomore category at defensive end. Quick development of Hall and a few other young players could make Ellender's team a challenger for spotlight among the Southeastern independents.

SOUTH CAROLINA IS REBUILDING under Paul Dietzel following a hot-and-cold 6-5 season. Headed by all-America candidate John LeHaup, defense looks good but the secondary could be suspect. Injuries cramped running backs last fall, and QB is wide open even though 71 starter Glenu Morris returns.

Virginia Tech will lean heavily on QB Don Strock, who last fall had a whopping 2,404 yards in total offense. While offense should be explosive, defense, with five regulars gone, is question mark. Coach Charlie Coffey

isn't predicting he'll better last season's 4-7 record.

At the University of Southern Mississippi, coach Cecil Underwood lost 21 lettermen and was hit hardest on defense. Still, he's optimistic over upcoming young talent. Most valuable property is safety-punter-place-kicker Ray Guy, whose 44.6 average left him fourth in the nation last season. In '72, he may see some action at quarterback, too.

WHERE DOES TENNESSEE STATE GO after a 20-1 record over two years? Probably on to more of the same, since coach John Merritt's talent seems inexhaustible. The Tigers will miss QB Joe Gilliam, who gained 2.116 yards

last year.

Northwestern Louisiana should have another good club with a pair of fine runners in Don Johnson (628 yards) and Le Roy Pittman (549). Northeast Louisiana has 18 starters back, including ace receiver Rubin Jones and line standouts Gil Matherne and Grover Mann.

New Coach Earle Bruce has 16 starters back at Tampa, including all-America candidate John Matuszak, a growing boy of 6-7, 275, who plays defensive tackle. UT Chattanooga tries to come back with a team built around record-breaking junior passer Mickey Brokas.


Carter should mean some offense to go with an outstanding defense.

As if it was not already quite apparent, Stanford's come-from-behind 13-12 victory over Michigan in the Rose Bowl game last New Year's Day crystallized the Big Ten's mission for 1972—that of restoring some lost prestige to the conference, long one of the bastions of college football.

The once-proud Big Ten suffered terribly in 1971; in fact, it has for several seasons. Conference teams won just nine and tied once in 27 non-conference games last fall, a paltry 34.6 winning pace which ranked it at the bottom of a list of the seven major conferences in the country. And that was even below its poor 41.4 showing for the previous five years.

OF COURSE, BIG TEN TEAMS have never been pikers when it came to scheduling non-conference games, but even that can't explain away the league's problems. Michigan coach Bo Schembechler addressed himself to the sub-

ject before he took his club West last December:

"There is no question the Big Ten has lost prestige the last couple of seasons," he said. "The fact that Ohio State and ourselves came up short in the last two Rose Bowl games hasn't helped, nor have some of the losses absorbed by the Big Ten's second division teams in intersectional games." In fact, said Bo, the loss of prestige hurt his Michigan team in the national rankings. "If you look at the statistics, we rank in the top five in all cate-

Bruce Bennett, executive sports editor of the Duluth Herald and News-Tribune, begins his 12th season covering Big

Ten football this fall.

A graduate of Michigan, and a former police reporter fo rihe El Paso Herald Post, he joined the sports staff of the Duluh papers in 1959 and was named to the top spot two years later.

Besides heading a sixman staff, writing a daily column, and eyeing the Big Ten, he has covered events in golf, hockey, curling, ski junging, basketball and baseball.

Bennett, 35, has been named Minnesota's sports writer of the year.

gories except passing," he said then. "It shows how the conference has lost prestige if we have such a fine team (11-0) and still not be considered as national champions."

So Michigan, ranked fourth nationally at the time, went out West and lost again.

WHERE TO FROM HERE? There's only one way to go and that's up, but the Big Ten—and the rest of the clubs in the Midwest—will be hard-pressed this fall to recoup in one step.

Michigan will not be overloaded with superstars this season, but still figures to be in the thick of things. Seven starters return to form the nucleus of a good line and backfield in an offense that ranked third nationally in rushing yardage, fifth in scoring and tenth in total offense.

Cornerstone for the blocking contingent are Jim Coode at tackle and Tom Coyle at guard, both of whom were starters a year ago. Tight end Paul

Seymour may shift to tackle with his exceptional blocking ability.

THE WOLVERINES USED SOPHOMORE QUARTERBACKS last year, first Kevin Casey and then Tom Slade, and while neither dazzled too many with his

passing, they should profit from their experiences.

Ed Shuttlesworth, a punishing runner, and a part-time starter last year, heads the list of returning ball carriers. Even with defenses stacked to stop the run, Shuttleworth barged through the line for 875 yards, sixth best in the conference. Alan (Cowboy) Walker, Harry Banks and sophomore speedster Gil Chapman will try to fill departed Billy Taylor's shoes.

Defensively, Michigan lost heavily from a unit that led the nation against per game scoring, against the rush and ranked second in overall defense. Lineman Fred Grambau and Greg Ellis, linebacker Tom Kee and corner-back Randy Logan are the only defensive starters returning, but sophomores

Steve Strinko, linebacker, and Dave Brown, secondary, will help.

MICHIGAN'S STIFFEST CHALLENGE may come from neighboring Michigan State, where Duffy Daugherty will use the Wishbone from the start this fall. "We expect to be a Big Ten championship contender this fall," Daugherty says flatly. "For one thing, we're strong in the vital areas—offensive line and defensive backfield. Also, we think we have two of the finest players in the country around whom to build, tight end Billy Joe DuPree and all-American safety Brad VanPelt, our co-captains."

Solving a quarterback situation would boost the Spartans' stock considerably. Last year's back-up man George Mihaiu and junior Mark Nieson are

the leading contenders. Nieson worked in the defensive backfield last fall because he was too good to languish on the bench as a quarterback. Sophomore Arnold Morgade, Dave Brown and Clarence Bullock are exciting young rushers. Guard Joe DeLamielleure heads up the offensive line.

THREE PLAYERS COMING OFF INJURIES could ease a minor shortage at defensive tackle. They are Duane McLaughlin and John Skinsky, part-time regulars in 1970, and giant Jim Nicholson, while linebacker Gail Clark, who led the team in tackles last season, is the top defender.

Purdue has its top three rushers, two top receivers, two leading scorers and both quarterbacks returning. In addition, nine of the 12 leading tacklers are back on the defensive unit. Quarterback Gary Danielson,, the leading passer and tops in total offense among the conference players coming back, will be returning along with split end Rick Sayers and flanker Darryl Stingley, the league's two top receivers.

In senior speester Otis Armstrong, team leader in rushing, scoring and

kickoff returns, the Boilermakers have an All-America candidate.

Purdue's defense will be built around linebacker Rick Schavietelle, the team's leading tackler; middle guard Greg Bingham, in a line returning intact; cornerback Craig Capria and safety Chuck Piebes.

OHIO STATE RETURNS SEVEN OFFENSIVE and seven defensive starters, but doesn't appear all that solid. To pose a serious threat, the Buckeyes must solve problems at quarterback and the interior line. The fullbacking appears to be in good hands with John Bledsoe, and halfback Rick Galbos is being pressed by the sensation of last year's frosh, Harold Henson.

A big help to the offensive line would be the return of John Hicks to 1970 season form. Hicks, a junior, was regarded as one of the Big Ten's top tackles two years ago before a knee injury put him out of action.

Defensively, junior linebackers Rick Gradishar and Vic Koegel are

At Northwestern, only two starters return on defense-all-America candidate Jim Anderson, tackle, and linebacker Mike Varty-and the entire offensive backfield was lost to graduation. Some help in the secondary will come from Greg Strunk, who returned a kickoff 93 yards to score, and Bob Beutel, with an extra season of eligibility after a knee injury.

Johnny Cooks, a senior also recovered from a knee injury, appears to be the team's top running back. The quarterback will be Todd Somers.

junior John Freyman, or sophomore Mitch Anderson.

Steve Harris, the fastest Wildcat, may become the leading receiver, while split end Jim Lash and tight end Steve Craig add depth. Dave Dybas,

Dave Glant and Donnie Haynes form the blocking nucleus.

At Illinois, which lost its first six games last fall and then turned the Big Ten on its collective ear with five straight loop wins, the key to the offense will once again be quarterback Mike Wells. Wells will likely hook up with split end Garvin Robertson. Fullback Mike Navarro and halfback George Uremovich, both starters a year ago, return. All-America caliber center Larry McCarren anchors the line.

On defense, end Tab Bennett should receive national recognition and the linebacking forces should get a lift from sophomore Tom Hicks. Big Ten interception leader Willie Osley, John Graham and Larry Huisinga return to the deep secondary and may be joined by soph Bill Kleckner.

Wisconsin should have the Big Ten's most exciting ball player in Rufus (The Roadrunner) Ferguson, a package of dynamite who scored 13 touchdowns last fall while gaining 1,222 yards. But coach Jack Jardine has to replace three-fourths of the backfield and fill some holes on the forward line.

Rudy Steiner, a senior, gets first call at quarterback after serving a three-year apprenticeship. Sophs Dave Dykstra and Jon Oberdorfer could push him. Tight end Tom Lonnborg and split end Tim Klosek head up the receiving corps and a top soph ball carrier is Mike Mauger.

Defensively three players who started as sophomores return up front in Mike Siefert, Jim Schymanski and Mark Levenhagen, while leading

tackler Dave Lokano is back at middle linebacker.

INDIANA, NINTH LAST YEAR but a strong finisher, returns all but one of its defensive starters, but will have to rebuild the entire offensive line. However, Hoosier faithful think they may have one of the Big Ten's bright new stars in sophomore split end Mike Flanagan.

In the backfield, the three top rushers are back, headed by junior Ken St. Pierre. Quarterback Ted McNulty who gained 1,140 yards total

offense, and flanker Charley Byrnes also return.

Eleven starters return to Iowa from its 1-10 season, including four on offense and seven on defense. All three quarterbacks, Frank Sunderman, Rob Fick and Kyle Skogman, return, as does running back Craig Johnson. Another speedster, Dave Harris, is back after a knee operation and Iowa figures two good veteran linemen, Jerry Nelson and Bill Windaur, will be solid after sitting out last season mending from surgery.

THE BIG TEN'S ONLY NEW COACH this season, Cal Stell at Minnesota, employed the "Veer" offense at Wake Forest, but his systems at Minnesota depend on his evaluations of spring practice and the talent on hand,

Best of the veterans are all-American tight end Doug Kingsriter, middle guard Clayton Scheuer, defensive backs Tim Alderson and Mike White, flanker George Honza, defensive tackle John Krol and defensive end Steve Neils. The quarterback may be Bob Morgan, seldom used for two years behind Craig Curry, but now the team captain. The best sophomores were two-way performers as frosh-tackle Dave Appleyard, quarterback-

As at Michigan, the No. 1 priority each season at Notre Dame is defense and Coach Ara Parseghian is paying more than the usual amount

of attention this fall because of the loss of eight regulars.

Greg Marx, an all-American defensive tackle candidate, and line-backers Jim Musuraca and Jim O'Malley are all that remain of last year's defense. Offensively, there are five holdovers, including both fullbacks, John Cieszkowski and Andy Huff, plus a number of good running backs and both quarterbacks, junior Clint Brown and senior Pat Steenberge. Tight end Mike Creaney, a regular for two years, heads the receiving corps.

JOHN SCHLEZES, WHO SAW ENOUGH SERVICE in the secondary last year to intercept four passes, is one of a group of non-starting returnees on defense.

along with linebackers Mike Webb and Pat McGraw.

Among the other independents, Cincinnati starts the year braced by back-to-back 7-4 seasons, but it is going to be difficult this fall to maintain the same rushing efficiency and clutch-type defense of the past. Five returning starters give a solid appearance to the offensive line, behind which junior fullback Reggie Harrison will operate. Air Force transfer Kas Oganowski has a chance to be the quarterback and safety Bill Hunter and line-backers Al Mason and Ed Belis head up the defense.

Across town at Xavier, Coach Tom Cecchini is trying to improve on a 1-9 record and probably will. Both quarterbacks, Paul Smith and Tom Dydo, return, with an ample supply of talent in the offensive line. Lack of depth at running back behind Al Banks has prompted the shift of Dwight Allen to

the ball carrying ranks from quarterback.

DAYTON FIGURES IT HAS A NEW RUNNING BACK in sophomore Walt Wingard, who averaged 5.4 yards on the freshman team, caught 15 passes and ran back punts and kickoffs. The offensive line is fair and the defense is led by linebacker Jake Burkhardt.

Marshall, rebuilding after its tragic plane crash in November, 1970, has Lanny Snead, who caught 35 passes last year, and linebacker Charles

Henry and tackle Chuck Wright head an established defense.

Northern Illinois will shift from its "veer" offense of last fall to an "I"

formation and divided backs system this season to take advantage of the excellent power and speed in the backfield. Outstanding individuals will be fullback Mark Kellar, middle linebacker Larry Clark and wide receiver Willie Hatter.

TOLEDO HAS DOMINATED the Mid-America Conference for three years, but now with Chuck Ealey, Mel Long and Co. gone, things may change. Toledo, however, still will be formidable but Miami and Western Michigan have designs on the championship, too. Miami has won more MAC titles than any school (eight), but has not worn the crown since 1966.

Miami, 7-3 last year, has its entire offensive backfield returning, including sophomore sensation Bob Hitchens, who set a single season rushing

record last season with 1,157 yards and 78 points.

If Western Michigan can find a quarterback it may be in business. All-MAC halfback Larry Cates and all-MAC guard Larry Ulmer give a good nucleus on offense, while Bernard Thomas, an all-MAC tackle and safety Ron Karlis are defensive standouts.

Bowling Green has a mercurial ball carrier in Paul Miles, and could challenge for the championship. Quarterback Reid Lamport, tackle John

Czerwinski and guard Fred Sturt are among 32 returnees.

OHIO UNIVERSITY RETURNS FIVE STARTERS offensively and five defensively, but much hinges on the development of last year's promising freshman team. Running back Bill Gary is coming off knee surgery and quarterback Dave Juenger, a remarkable athlete who accumulated 1,426 yards in total offense last season, may shift back to wide receiver, where he played as a sophomore, if young quarterback Rich Bevly develops. Offensive tackle Don Caldwell and safety Bert Dampier are two of the Bobcats' pillars.

At Kent State, where the Flashes limped home last in the MAC at 0-5 and 3-8 over-all, things are looking up but not much. Quarterback Larry Hayes heads a full complement of backs returning and big things are expected from "super soph" Larry Peele, if he can shake off knee trouble.



### What Can Big Eight Do For Encore In Wake Of Its 1-2-3 Poll Ratina?

Because football is an emotional sport and football fans are emotional people, it is often hard to achieve a consensus on the comparative merits

of college football in various conferences and areas of the country.

Last season, however, evidence of the Big Eight's supremacy was indisputable. Nebraska, Oklahoma and Colorado finished 1-2-3 in the final Associated Press poll. It was the first time since the inception of the poll that one conference had supplied the top three teams.

Having achieved this unprecedented feat the question now arises as to

what the Big Eight can do for an encore.

Even Chuck Neinas, the Big Eight's enthusiastic and optimistic commissioner, can scarcely expect a repeat of 1971, but there is a very real possibility that when Nebraska and Colorado meet Nov. 4 in Boulder, Colo... they will be the 1-2 teams in the nation.

THE POSSIBILITY ALSO EXISTS that this will prove to be the game of the year in college football, just as the Thanksgiving meeting between Nebraska

and Oklahoma was the game of the year in 1971.

Nebraska's excellence is more or less taken for granted. The Huskers have a streak of 23 consecutive victories and have gone 32 consecutive games without a defeat. Their last loss was to Missouri by a score of 17-7

Joe McGuff attended Marquette University, then returned to his home town of Tulsa, Okla.,



to take his first sports writing job for the Tulsa World. He joined the staff of the Kansas City Star in 1948 and became sports chief in 1965.

The FWAA District 5 director is a past president of the Baseball Writers assign-Association. His ments have included the Olympics, bowl games, and

other major sports events. McGuff directs a 20-man staff and authors a a column six days a week. He's a three-time winner

of the Missouri Sports Writer-of-the-Year award, and is listed in Who's Who in America.

midway of the 1969 season. Since that time the Huskers are all victorious except for a 21-21 tie with Southern California early in 1970.

ANNOUNCING THAT he will retire as head coach after this season, Bob Devaney has had national championship teams for the last two seasons and is attempting to become the first coach to win three straight.

Since Devaney elected to coach for one more season he obviously believes

he has at least a reasonable chance to achieve this unprecedented goal.

Nebraska's non-conference schedule is not too difficult and Oklahoma probably will not be as good as it was last season. This leaves Colorado as the major threat to another undefeated season.

THE BUFFS HAD A 10-2 RECORD last season, losing only to Nebraska and Oklahoma. Both were road games. Colorado beat Ohio State and LSU away from home and was a victor over Houston in the Astro-Bluebonnet Bowl.

Last year's performance is significant because Eddie Crowder has more lettermen coming back than the United States Post Office. Thirteen starters are returning from the 1971 team. Of the top 44 players on last year's squad, 30 will be back. The Buffs have two strong all-American candidates in tailback Charlie Davis and guard Bud Magrum.

The Buffs have suffered some important losses from their 1971 squad. Cliff Branch, a 9.2 sprinter who was one of the nation's most dangerous kick return men, is gone as is Herb Orvis, the All-American defensive tackle. The Buffs also lost defensive guard Carl Taibi, defensive back Brian

Foster, guard Bill Kralicek and fullback John Tarver.

But shed no tears for Crowder. He's loaded.

HIS BACKFIELD COULD WELL BE THE BEST in the country. Davis will return to tailback. Last season he broke the school rushing record with 1,386 yards and was named the Sophomore of the Year in the Big Eight. Ken Johnson, the returning quarterback, had 1,475 yards in total offense. Bob Matthews, a 240-pounder, is available to replace Tarver at fullback. The Buffs also have a super sophomore in Gary Campbell, a 200-pounder from Honolulu who shattered every CU rushing and scoring record last season.

John Keyworth, a 230-pound junior who broke his leg in the opener a year ago, has moved to slotback to make use of his receiving talents. The Buffs are powerful up front. Tackles Jake Zumbach and Greg Horton may well form the best tackle combination in the country. Chuck Mandril returns at one guard and Bill McDonald will be back at center.

Colorado, which had defensive problems on occasion last year, should be improved. Magrum has been moved from guard to linebacker in the new 4-4 defensive setup. Other outstanding veterans are end Rick Kay; John Stavely, who moves to linebacker; Billie Drake and Randy Geist, both linebackers; halfback Cullen Bryant and safety John Stearns.

THE 1972 SEASON SHOULD BE AN EMOTIONAL ONE at Nebraska, with Devaney closing out his spectacular coaching career. He has a career record of 127-28-6. He has won or shared the Big Eight championship for the last three years and has won or shared the title for seven of the last ten.

Devaney has received numerous awards but has yet to be named coach of the year by the Football Coaches Association, an injustice that should be corrected this season. Last year he was runnerup to Bear Bryant of Alabama even though Nebraska routed the Tide in the Orange Bowl.

Nebraska has ten starters back from its 1971 national champions. Nebraska has lost only 12 of its top 33 offensive players and ten of its top 33 on defense. Nebraska has three returning All-Americans, middle guard Rich Glover, defensive end Willie Harper and slotback Johnny Rodgers.

OFFENSIVELY THE HUSKERS COULD BE AS STRONG as they were last season and perhaps more explosive even though they have lost such stars as quarterback Jerry Tagge and fullback Jeff Kinney. Tagge's replacement will be Dave Humm, who has been called the best quarterback prospect in Nebraska's history, Humm, a lefthanded passer, was red-shirted last season.

Other outstanding offensive players are fullback Bill Olds, tight end

Jerry List, center Doug Dumler and tackle Daryle White.

Graduation cost the Huskers the services of five outstanding defensive

players including Larry Jacobson, the Outland Trophy winner. Even so. the Nebraska defensive unit is expected to be approximately as good as it was a year ago. Glover and Harper form an outstanding nucleus. Tackle Bill Janssen is a third returning member of last year's great front five.

Two returning backfield standouts are Joe Blahak and Dave Mason. Blahak, a senior cornerback, has started every year and is rated by many as NU's outstanding defensive back over the last two seasons. Mason, a

monster back, led the 1971 team with six interceptions.

IF HUMM LIVES UP TO EXPECTATIONS, the Huskers may be able to give

Devaney the going-away present he wants most-another national title.

Oklahoma, which put together the most sensational wishbone attack in the nation last season, has been somewhat forgotten because of the attention being attracted by Nebraska and Colorado. If the Sooners find a replacement for QB Jack Mildren, they could be an outstanding team.

Oklahoma has 12 returning starters, eight of them on offense. Two of the offensive players are all-Americans—halfback Greg Pruitt and center Tom Brahaney. Also returning are hard-running fullback Leon Crosswhite and halfback Joe Wylie. The biggest loss was, of course, at quarterback.

The defensive unit was hit hard by graduation, with all three starting linebackers and three secondary regulars gone. The Sooners have several

standouts returning, among them end Raymond Hamilton.

Chuck Fairbanks has several possible replacements for Mildren.

Senior Dave Robertson is one possibility. James Stokely, a junior, and sophs Gary Vorphal, Paul Krause and Steve Davis are contenders.

KANSAS STATE FINDS ITSELF in the difficult position of expecting to be better and yet facing the possibility of finishing no higher than fourth. But such are the hard facts of life in the Big Eight.

The Wildcats' offense will be built around quarterback Dennis Morrison, who got off to a slow start last season but finished strongly. In the last five games he completed 105 of 205 passes for 1,194 yards, and six touchdowns.

Morrison has a strong receiving corps headed by Henry Childs, who was the Wildcats' leading pass receiver last season. Other receivers are

Fred Merrill, Rick Fergerson and John Goerger.

The K-State defense should be stronger because of greater experience. Fifteen lettermen are returning, including 11 who periodically started.

Last season the Iowa State Cyclones proved to be the surprise team of the Big Eight. They put together an 8-3 regular season record and met LSU in the Sun Bowl, becoming the school's first bowl representative.

Cyclone fans will be glad to know that Johnny Majors believes his

1972 team will be even better.

George Amundson, who moved from quarterback to tailback last season when Jerry Moses was injured, set a school rushing record with 1,316 yards. He is expected to return to quarterback to make room for a healthy Moses.

The defense is expected to be stronger than it was a year ago. Matt Blair, named the most valuable lineman in the Sun Bowl game, will be back. The secondary will return intact and the linebacking should be strong. End Mary Krakau and tackle Larry Hunt are back to anchor the front four.

At Kansas, Coach Don Fambrough speaks optimistically. He says KU will have better depth and more quality young players. The biggest problem is the offensive line, which has to be rebuilt.

"We're better set on defense now than we were a year ago," Fam-

brough says. "We've got some experienced players back on defense who know what we expect of them and some others coming up who look like they can help.

Fambrough is building a pro-type offense around quarterback David Jaynes, a junior who is an outstanding passer. Jaynes has several good targets, among them John Schroll, an All-Big Eight tight end.

Oklahoma State is stressing a balanced attack, with more emphasis on running. The Cowboys hope to develop an option-type offense from the I and split backfield assignments. Bobby Cole, the leading rusher of the last two seasons, is gone, but the Cowboys have some promising newcomers in Alfred Helms, Archie White and James Nunn. The entire offensive line is back and all but one of the defensive line starters has returned.

MISSOURI IS TRYING TO RISE FROM THE ASHES of a 1-10 season. The Tigers

have 29 returning lettermen but graduated ten defensive starters.

Missouri was inept offensively in 1971 but the offensive line showed improvement near the end of the season. The Tigers' greatest problem was

in quarterbacking and running backs.

The three top candidates at quarterback are John Cherry, a junior college transfer who was ineligible in 1971; Ed Johndrow, a junior, and Ray Smith Jr., a juco addition. New running backs Jimmy Smith and Tommy Reamon were junior college All-Americans.

The Missouri Valley Conference operates with eight teams this season

as New Mexico State becomes eligible for championship competition.

Memphis State, defending conference and Pasadena Bowl champion,

faces a big rebuilding job under new coach Fred Pancoast.

Among the top returnees for the Tigers is wide receiver Stan Davis. who caught 33 passes for a team than ran the football most of the time. John Robinson, a promising quarterback, returns. So do offensive guard Tom Parker, a rugged blocker; and defensive lineman Glenn Whittemore.

LOUISVILLE, A WINNER SINCE LEE CORSO ARRIVED on the scene three years ago, is ready to go all the way this season.

Veteran quarterback John Madeya, a two-time all-MVC senior, needs less than 1,200 yards to become Louisville's all-time passing leader. Don't forget that a fellow named John Unitas once played QB for Louisville.

Running back Howard Stevens, all 5-foot-5 of him, gained 1,429 yards in 1971, the smallest man ever to run for more than 1,000 yards in major college football. On the defensive side, linebacker Tom Jackson rates as a genuine all-American candidate. He's been Louisville's best tackler for two years. The Cardinals return nine offensive and six defensive regulars.

Tulsa hopes to develop a stronger running game. Raymond Rhodes, a transfer from TCU, should help. Quarterback Todd Starks, who engineered the 21-20 upset of Arkansas, has competition from Rick Pitalo, an outstanding passer who left Alabama when the Tide went to the Wishbone.

THE DEFENSIVE LINE HAS UNDERGONE some major changes but the secondary is an experienced unit. The Hurricane could challenge for the title.

Wichita State has 53 returning lettermen and one of the largest squads in school history. The Shockers had a 3-8 season last year, an impressive achievement as the school went about the task of rebuilding its football program following the tragic air crash of Oct. 2, 1970.

"We may have finished with only three victories," said coach Bob Seaman, "but to play as well as they did our kids achieved a victory

every time they walked out on that football field."

Defensively the Shockers should be tough. They suffered a major loss offensively with the departure of Randy (The Dandy) Jackson, who had 820 yards rushing. Tom Owen is the best prospect at quarterback. Seaman has committed the Shockers to an all-out passing game.

NORTH TEXAS STATE HAD A DISAPPOINTING 3-8 record. Five different players started at quarterback and the team was wracked by fumbles and interceptions. Only six regulars are returning on offense and defense, but eight junior college transfers, who were ruled ineligible last season in a transfer mixup, will rejoin the squad. Five of them are almost sure to start.

The offense should be better, especially if one of the young quarterbacks comes through. If the newcomers produce, the defense will be stronger. New Mexico State will again have to rely on the passing of quarterback

West Texas State won only one game in its conference debut last season, but the Buffaloes look for better things with a year of wishbone experience under their belts. Halfback Billy Pritchett, who rushed for 1,128 yards and made all-MVC as a soph, leads the West Texas offense.

Arkansas, a year older and with the inimitable Joe Ferguson still at the helm, and Texas, with another storehouse of material, appear capable of maintaining their old standards of living.

But it may be more difficult than usual!

New coaching faces are in great abundance, and it is a pattern of the Southwest Conference that new head coaches bring in new systems and

new enthusiasm and, for the leaders, new threats.

When the season kicks off exactly half the league's football forces will be operating under new management. Texas A&M, Rice, Baylor and Texas Christian all have head coaches other than the ones who kicked off the '71 season, although Billy Tohill did pilot the Horned Frogs' final four games following the tragic death of Jim Pittman, who collapsed and died at the sidelines of the TCU-Baylor game.

THREE OF THOSE FOUR TEAMS FIGURE to be reckoned with, in light of returning material, and the fourth-Baylor-may be greatly improved under new gridmaster Grant Teaff, who arrived and immediately began soliciting sudden help in the form of more than a dozen junior college products.

Jim Carlen and Hayden Fry will be back at Texas Tech and Southern

Methodist, respectively, and neither is without potential.

Burle Pettit has been executive sports editor of the Avalanche-Journal for six years, and has

been with the sports department 12 years.

The graduate of North Texas State is a past president of the Texas Sports Writers' Association, and has been a director of the Football Writers Association the last four years.

A regular contributor to several regional and na-tional publications, Pettit has done two previous Guide articles, in football and basketball.

He also edited two football magazines last year, neither of which, he reports, has yet been made

into a movie.

Ouestion marks loom over the heads of the two major independents in Texas, UT Arlington and Houston. The former will be operating in its second year as a major college. and Houston, a memberelect, will not begin SWC competition until 1976.

THE VERY THINGS that made Arkansas so domineering in its victory over Texas last season return this year.

And with the added age and the elimination of the factors (a school record

41 turnovers) that robbed the Razorbacks of consistency, Frank Broyles' charges could emerge as a national power. Ferguson already has established himself as one of the finest passers in the land, and he won't be taking center stage without a strong supporting cast.

Arkansas led the conference in both offense and defense a year ago, and from that 8-2-1 finish will return all but five starters-three on offense and two on defense. And, it seems, where there is a void, there also

stands a promising newcomer to fill it.

MOVING INTO THE VACATED FULLBACK SPOT is sophomore Marsh White, who does the century in 9.9 and has Porker fans anxiously awaiting his debut.

"Marsh is so fast that he appears to be in motion on every play," Ferguson marveled last spring. "He hits so hard and so quick in the middle, that

it is bound to make our outside stuff go well."

White will be the only newcomer in a backfield of Ferguson, and either Dickie Morton or Jon Richardson-both exceptional performers—at tailback. And all three of Ferguson's top pass targets—Mike Reppond, Jim Hodge and Jack Ettinger—will be on hand to help the Shreveport lad.

Defensively, Arkansas is led by linebacker Danny Rhodes, last season

named SWC's defensive sophomore of the year.

Despite Ferguson's aerialistic acumen, the Razorbacks last season were among the country's best balanced teams. Arkansas led the league in passing yardage and placed second in rushing.

DURING SPRING TRAINING, the main problems facing Coach Broyles and his staff appeared to be finding a kicking specialist, and shoring up a

secondary that was unstable through much of the past season.

Meanwhile, Texas' chief concerns seemed obvious. Royal lost not only his great Wishbone digitator, Eddie Phillips, but lost as well his great

back-up quarterback, Donnie Wigginton. Also gone is Jim Bertelsen, one

of the all-time best Longhorn running backs.

In fact, about the only static portion of the Texas team is the offensive line. The forward wall will return intact except at center. And when you speak of the Texas offensive line, you begin with Jerry Sisemore, a rangy 255-pounder who was everybody's all-America at tackle last season. Bill Wyman, who started at tackle last season, may be moved to center, and Don Crosslin, an all-SWC guard, would then be moved to tackle.

DEFENSIVELY, IT IS A DIFFERENT STORY. The Longhorns must find replace-

DEFENSIVELY, IT IS A DIFFERENT STORY. The Longhorns must find replacements for an outstanding set of tackles, Ray Dowdy and Greg Ploetz. Immediate candidates are a couple of hefties, 300-pound Robert Guevara

and 240-pound Bill Walker, who stands but 5-11.

All that appears academic, however, compared to the quarterbacking situation. The top candidate is Alan Lowry, who made all-conference last year in the secondary and who hasn't taken a snap from center since his

days as an exceptional schoolboy quarterback.

Actually, the most experienced man in Texas' wishbone this fall may be Don Burrisk, a junior who was sidelined by injuries through most of last season. Dennis Ladd, the starting fullback in 1971, will be shifted to Bertelsen's old left halfback position. Glenn Gaspard, who started at line-backer, will be at fullback, where he played as a freshman. All the top receivers, split ends Jim Moore and Pat Kelly, and tight ends Rick Davis and Stan Hicks return. Should Lowry not be the answer at quarterback, however, both Moore and Kelly might be worked into that picture.

DESPITE SHIFTING STARTERS Lowry and Gaspard to offense and the loss of both Dowdy and Ploetz, the Longhorns return the nucleus of a promising defense. Randy Braband is one of the league's top linebackers and veterans

Mike Bayer and Mike Rowan both return to the secondary. And in Malcolm Minnick and Jay Arnold, Texas has a fine set of defensive ends.

Texas A&M, the mystery team of the SWC a year ago got off to a sluggish start then, all at once, caught fire and won four games in a row,

including the telling upset of Arkansas.

WITH MOST OF THESE SAME PLAYERS RETURNING, and Emory Bellard—the man who designed the Wishbone—moving in from Royal's staff to take the Aggie helm, A&M almost immediately was forecast as a contender. A gifted

stable of backs appears to be the main asset Bellard inherited.

During the early part of spring drills, it seemed that he'd found a Wishbone quarterback in Lex James, who took immediately to the Wishbone at the outset of the spring. Should James or junior Tim Trimmier capture the position, it would free Bellard to use a pair of multi-talented lads—Mark Green and Brad Dusek—at halfback and fullback, respectively. Dusek was an all-conference safety last season, but Bellard wants to put his size and speed to use in the run-oriented Wishbone. The other top running back is sophomore John Bounds.

A&M also has top performers in defensive tackle Boice Best, line-backer Grady Hoermann, offensive guard Buster Callaway and tight end

Homer May. A major worry is the secondary.

FOUR OTHER CONFERENCE MEMBERS will go into the season with an interesting mixture of problems and promise, and any one among that quartet could find itself in contention. TCU, for example, wound up with a clear cut claim to third place in last season's wild scramble, losing only to Arkansas and Texas. Tech, with a tremendous defense, lacked outside speed and had a poor passing attack. Rice overcame a sluggish start and was among the league's toughest teams down the home stretch, and SMU, once it got

its offense in the right groove, seemed to be shy only of luck.

First off, TCU must replace a quarterback, and the frontline choice would be Kent Marshall, who lettered as backup last season. But Kent will win the job only by beating out a passel of other candidates, headed by Don Howard, a transfer from Houston who was redshirted last year.

SOPHOMORE MIKE LUTTRELL comes to the varsity to fill a void at fullback with an impressive book of press clippings that date back to schoolboy days. Redshirt Ronnie Webb also is a strong possibility there.

At running backs, TCU returns Steve Patterson and Billy Sadler. The offensive line appears sound, and could be improved now that Ronnie Peoples, an all-SWC at tight end, has been shifted to guard. Lane Bowen, another senior, will handle Peoples' former duties.

The Frog defense, with standout tackles Charlie Davis and Ken Steel anchoring the line, could be a good one. It will be bolstered by such promising newcomers as Dedrick Terveen and Chad Utley, both linebackers.

SMU shows signs of resembling the Mustangs of old and, should Keith Bobo or another of the quarterbacking candidates come through in adequate fashion, the Ponies will almost certainly be better this year.

SUCH RUNNERS AS Alvin Maxson and T. J. Hutchinson provide a constant breakaway threat, and Dennis Howell and Rayford Clark, who shared starting time at fullback last season, are back to shadow each other again this time out. And Coach Hayden Fry wants the type of passing attack that will take full advantage of such speedy receivers as Raymond Mapps and Randy Goss, both veterans, and transfer 9.4 sprinter Rufus Shaw.

Defensively, the Mustangs retained far more than they lost. Returning to his safety position is Robert Popelka, a bonadfide all-America candi-

date, a solid forward wall manned by proven performers like end Jim Ryan and tackle Don Deweber, and a good crop of linebackers.

TECH WILL BE MAKING ANOTHER STAB at the greatness that seemed to be its destiny after Jim Carlen's first team battled its way to a Sun Bowl berth. Joe Barnes and Jimmy Carmichael, who both received considerable exposure as sophomores last season, will battle it out for the quarterbacking job. Hard-running veterans Doug McCutchen and James Mosley will be complemented by letterman Benjie Reed, sophomore Cliff Hoskins and juco transfer George Smith, a sprinter-type. And the receivers, except for veterans Andre Tillman and Ronnie Samford, are green but talented.

Defensively, Tech led the nation against passing last year and was among the ten best against scoring. Donald Rives, the nose guard and among the finest defenders in the conference, heads up a veteran front line, but graduation cost a full set of linebackers and the entire secondary.

Rice is practically the same ball club it was a year ago, only older and wiser. Inconsistency at quarterback last season hurt the Owls, but if starter Bruce Gadd settles with age, Rice could have its best team in years. Tailback Steve Ogletree and fullback David Simpson both return, and speedy Don Brown moves up from the freshman team. The Owl defense again appears stunning, due mainly to an exceptional herd of line-backers headed by Rodrigo Barnes.

GRANT TEAFF SEEMS TO HAVE BAYLOR back on the road, but he has a long way to go. The Bears had some outstanding players on hand in the likes of Roger Goree, the best defensive end in the SWC, running back Godfrey White and tackle Richard Mason. There just wasn't enough of them, and that is a problem Teaff has attempted to remedy through a hard recruiting program in the junior college ranks, where he picked up a number of promising performers. Still, the Bears don't appear yet ready to compete.

Houston, which has finished among the nation's top 20 teams for six consecutive seasons, now faces a rebuilding program that leaves question marks scattered all over the place. A trio of contenders are scrambling for the vacant quarterback spot, including D. C. Nobles, a junior used sparingly last season, Terry Teels, a senior, and Joel DeSpain, a ruggedly strong lad with a potent passing arm.

And that isn't the only issue to be settled. The Cougars must also replace at fullback, halfback, tight end, and linebacker. However, 20 members of last season's No. 2 team return, and will be supplemented by such top newcomers as fullback Milton Wart and linebacker Bryan Willingham.

UT ARLINGTON LEARNED THE HARD WAY last year why it's called "major college" football. In his debut year, coach John Symank won only two games, and now is set to open with a killer schedule, facing Southern Mississippi, Toledo, Oklahoma State and TCU—all on the road—in his team's first four starts. Jack De Grenier, a running back, and cornerback Ernest Baptist are a pair of outstanding athletes, but an unsettled quarterback situation, a lack of depth and the schedule dim the outlook.



## The Rocky Mountains NCAA District 7 None Able To Give Devil His Due; Four May Scramble For Avis Award

Football coaches in the Rockies really don't have to consult their dictionaries to realize the Sun is the star that is the central body around which others revolve and from which they receive heat.

Or that that the Devil is an atrociously wicked, cruel and ill-tempered

person-the supreme spirit of evil, with power to afflict bodily harm.

For while this is the Year of the Rat on the Chinese calendar, it should remain, like a phonograph needle stuck in a crack, the Year of the Sun Devil in the Rocky Mountains and no Henry Kissingers appear to be on the horizon to make overtures of bringing anyone else into the same orbit.

THE ARIZONA STATE SUN DEVILS, coached by Frank Kush, have been 22-1 over the past two seasons (30-3 over the past three) and will be seeking an unprecedented fourth straight Western Athletic Conference championship. They have 42 players returning-28 of them are but juniors-from their second bowl championship club in two years, after capturing the inaugural Fiesta Bowl by a 45-38 verdict over Florida State.

While Air Force and Utah State will be relying on high-powered offenses paced by exceptional quarterbacks to try and emerge as the area's top in-dependent, Arizona, Utah, rejuvenated Wyoming and two-time bridesmaid New Mexico are expected to be in a scramble for the WAC's Avis award.

A graduate of the Missouri University School of Journalism, LeRoy Bearman joined the Albu-querque Journal staff in 1959, and became sports

editor in 1962.

He is a member of the board of directors for the FWAA and the U.S. Bas-ketball Writers Assn., and serves the WAC Sports Writers as Secretary-Treas

Bearman, whose beard dates back to 1959, says he is the first be-whisker-ed member of FWAA, and claims the NCAA record for being hanged and burned in effigy-twice-

by angry University of New Mexico students over his coverage of the Lobos.

Last season was supposed to be the best opportunity to give the Devil his due. Kush-the third winningest coach in the percentage rankings at .780-would have to depend on sophomores in key spots and had a big question mark at the key quarterback spot.

NEW MEXICO with just about everybody from a surprising 7-3 season appeared capable of turning the tables.

But in an early season showdown between those

two clubs sophomore quarterback Danny White, who had been held back by a shoulder separation in the early going, answered the question mark

with six touchdown passes in leading ASU to a 60-28 victory.

White, who came to the Devils on a baseball scholarship, finished with 1393 yards and 15 touchdowns passing, completing 86 of 265 tries. He was unable to play in ASU's only loss, but Kush hasn't beaten Oregon State since 1961 and the Beavers are on the schedule again this year.

WHITE HAD TWO OTHER exceptional sophomores for support in his backfield. Woody Green, who many think could be the finest running back in the history of collegiate football, used his 9.5 second speed to rush for 1209 yards and nine touchdowns in 208 carries. He also scored on a punt return and two of his four pass receptions. The other super soph was full-back Ben Malone, who rushed for an 8.2 average in 104 carries.

Another super should be senior wingback Steve Holden, a two-time all-WAC selection. Holden scored a touchdown every seventh time he handled the ball in 1971, either by pass receiption, punt return or rushing, causing Kush to say: "He's one of the most dangerous all-around players

I've ever seen, he can hurt you in so many ways.

In addition to Holden ASU has outstanding receivers in tight end Joe Pettey and split end Ed Beverly, leading Kush to call receiving his club's strongest suit. The biggest problem will be rebuilding the defensive line.

Kush calls his 1972 spring practice one of his best ever in 15 years as head coach and noted the outstanding sophomore was linebacker Bob

Breunig, who will challenge to start at this well-stocked position.

AIR FORCE WILL BE GUNNING for its fifth straight winning season under coach Ben Martin and is counting on the aerial attack of junior quarterback Rich Haynie to produce it. Haynie brings the finest sophomore credentials in Falcon history into the 1972 season.

It's the defense that gives Martin most of his concern, particularly at linebacker and tackle where the losses were heavy. Martin will rebuild

his defense around end Gene Ogilvie and backer Iim Morris.

Haynie will be protected by the blocking of Orderia Mitchell, one of the better centers in the nation. The Falcons might have to get off fast to keep their winning tradition as their final four games come against Arizona

State, Army, Notre Dame and Colorado.

As a junior quarterback Tony Adams led Silk Bowl champion Utah State to a 10-3 record. Before you go flipping ahead to The Classics Revisited section, be advised that the Silk Bowl came off when the Utags became the first collegiate team to ever visit Japan, worming past two Japanese all-star teams, 50-6 in Tokyo and 46-6 in Osaka.

WHILE ADAMS, EIGHTH IN THE NATION in total offense, won't have his favorite receiver back in Bob Wicks, No. 2 choice Tom Forzani, who caught 45 for 620 yards, is back. Junior Craig Clark and UCLA transfer

Jim Ellsworth should also prove to be fine targets.

The Utags have their most ambitious schedule ever, meeting Oklahoma and Texas on the road, Biggest chore for coach Chuck Mills will be re-

building the offensive line where four starters have departed.

Big Sky champion Idaho moves up to major status this year on the heels of its finest season ever and will open its new 23,000-seat artificially-turfed stadium that is to be domed in another year.

Three-fourths of the backfield that finished the 8-3 season are back, including junior quarterback Rick Seefried, a fine runner and passer;

and running backs Frank Doctor and Bernie Rembert.

Four standouts anchor the defense—safety Steve Hunter and linebacker Rand Marquess both have 4.6 speed, while the tall and hefty pair of Larry

Bosma and Larry Warren man the tackles.

IF ANY WAC TEAM HAS A CHANCE of catching Arizona State off guard, it might be down-state rival Arizona where coach Bob Weber's contract was extended for one more season, despite war cries from the alumni, because of the abundance of talent returning. Arizona lost but 14 lettermen and has 36 returning, including an outstanding defensive back and punt returner in Jackie Wallace and an equally outstanding defensive end in

Bob Crum. The key personnel on both offense and defense return.

Offensively these include tight end Tom Camptell, quarterback Bill

Demory, tailback Joe Petroshus and fullback Bobby McCall.

Defensively in addition to Crum and Wallace, these are linebacker Richard Dodson and safety Bob White, who intercepted seven passes. Wallace intercepted 11, running one back for a TD, and brought back three punts for TDs to rank second nationally in interceptions and 13th in punt returns.

DEMORY WILL HAVE A LOT OF COMPETITION for the quarterback spot with Greg Boyd moving over from defense, Bruce Hill coming up from the freshman team and Nebraska transfer Jerry Davis from the redshirt group.

If coach Bill Meek can find a quarterback—and he generally comes up with a good one—Utah could atone for last year's disappointing 3-8 season.

Meek has seven starters returning on both offense and defense. Top returnees are tight end Leo Gibby, split end Lance Robbins, and halfback Gene Belczyk, and tackle Ron Rydalch and linebacker Elliott Hagood on defense to go with a good crop of sophomores and redshirts.

Wyoming started turning its program around again last year, compiling a somewhat surprising 5-6 record under new coach Fritz Shurmur

who has 35 lettermen back to try and continue the comeback.

BUT MANY OF SHURMUR'S LOSSES were at skill positions, including quarter-back, the leading rusher, tight end, flanker and defensive tackle.

Top returnees include All-WAC offensive tackle Nick Bebout, All-WAC split end Scott Freeman and fullback Steve Brown. If Shurmur finds a quarterback, the ragtime days might be over for Cowboy Joe.

For the second year in a row New Mexico beat all of its WAC foes with the exception of the Sun Devils, but could win but one nonleague game, losing two and tying two others.

COACH RUDY FELDMAN LOST 23 of his lettermen from that group but still returns 25. Some of the losses included starters with eligibility, four

of whom decided to leave the squad.

Still, the biggest loss was three-time most valuable player Rocky Long, who quarterbacked UNM's 1971 offense to No. 2 rankings in the total and rushing offense categories. UNM's running game was the third best in the history of collegiate football, but only half of that backfield returns, the heart of the offensive line has departed, and Feldman must find a quarterback to make his wishbone attack work.

Junior Bruce Boone, who never played the position in high school and saw but little action behind Long last season, is the top candidate with freshman Rick Fambro and UCLA transfer Lewis Thomas also making bids.

Feldman can rebuild his offensive line around tackles John Urban, one of the nation's best, and Ron Kohl. The defense should be led by tackle George Oakes, end Steve Bradshaw and cornerback Don Dungan.

AND IF ANYONE CAN CHALLENGE ASU's Woody Green as the area's finest running back, it would be Lobo Fred Henry, who rushed for 1129 yards in 10 games as a junior. Henry lacks Green's speed, but he makes up for it with great strength and vision. Feldman will be counting on sophomores in running back Carlos McCall as the other leg of his wishbone and center Curtis Akins for big rookie seasons.

Coach Jerry Wampfler at Colorado State lost 27 lettermen from a 3-8 team and has but 19 returning. However, CSU will have its offensive line back intact and if Wampfler can find the needed backs from his sophomores and redshirts, he might see his program start to turn the corner.

Tommy Hudspeth resigned as head coach at Brigham Young and is now offensive backfield coach at Texas-El Paso where he might help light the spark Coach Bobby Dobbs needs to get his Miners above ground once again. The Miners didn't lose a nonleague game last season but could only manage to beat one other WAC foe.

DOBBS HAS THE KIND OF QUARTERBACK he likes in senior Gary Keithley, who played sparingly as a sophomore for Texas. Keithley completed 56.4 per cent of his passes last season for 1374 yards, but his top two running backs, James Berry and Phil Hatch are among the 20 lost lettermen. Dobbs will build his defense around all-WAC linebacker Tony Perea.

Defensive coordinator LaVell Edwards replaced Hudspeth as head coach at Brigham Young and he has already lost his biggest asset-split end Golden Richards, who led the nation in punt returns last season. Richards,

reportedly, was a scholastic casualty last spring.

Though starter Dave Terry returns at quarterback, Edwards is still looking for someone to take charge at that spot to compliment running backs Pete Van Valkenburg and Dave Coon.

But BYU has two outstanding defensive backs in Dave Atkinson (nine interceptions) and Dan Hansen (seven interceptions) and is very high on sophomore defensive end Orrin Olsen, the younger brother Merlin and Phil.

IT COULD BE POINTED OUT to WAC watchers that the two other teams which won three straight championships—New Mexico and Wyoming—saw their programs completely crumble in the year of their fourth attempt. Arizona State will play only six league games this year so that a single conference loss could prove fatal.

One factor that can quickly change the outlook in Rocky Mountain football is a heavy influx of junior college transfers, which happens every fall. As most coaches will tell you, if they believed in preseason predictions,

there would be no reason to play during the season.



### Sixkiller Marked Man In Pacific-8 As Six Teams Harbor Title Dreams

Wanted: The Killer!

From Pullman to Los Angeles, and everywhere in between on the Pacific Coast, the posters are up. And Sonny Sixkiller, Washington's Cherokee passing whiz, is a marked man in the Pacific-8 this year.

Upon the shoulders of the Ashland, Ore., senior rest the hopes of the Huskies and coach Jim Owens for Washington's first conference champion-

ship and Rose Bowl visit since 1963.

But the veteran Huskies must overcome genuine challenges from nearly every member of the Pacific Eight before a host appearance in the Pasa-

dena New Year's extravaganza becomes a reality.

LAST YEAR THE CONFERENCE PROVIDED college football with just about the tightest race in the country, and the outlook is for more of the same in 1972. Five of the seven other league teams also harbor championship aspirations of their own, and with justification.

Any analysis of the Pacific Eight must recognize the potential of twotime defending champion Stanford; perennial power Southern Cal; upsetminded Washington State, formerly the league's doormat; UCLA, with the Wishbone offense and an eligible James McAlister; and California's young

hopefuls under new coach Mike White.

Sam Skinner has been covering Pacific Coast football for 15 years, and presently owns his



s, and presently owns ms own Skinner's News Services, syndicated in San Francisco, and is West Coast editor for Black Sports Magazine.

A sportscaster twice daily over KDIA in Oakland, he and his wife also produce a radio and television show titled "Black Renaissiance" in the Bay area.

In addition to serving on the board of FWAA, he is a member of the National Sportscasters and Sports Writers group.

Skinner is past president of the Northern California Football Writers Association.

Since the last football was kicked in 1971, four changes occurred in the head coaching ranks of major colleges on the Pacific Coast.

JACK CHRISTIANSEN is the new leader at Stanford, replacing John Ralston; White returns to his alma mater at Berkeley; Dick Enright takes over at Oregon; and the University of Pacific has Chester Caddas at the controls for the 1972 PCAA battle.

But all eyes will be on Seattle as Washington, a

solid 8-3 team in 1971, hopes to put it all together this fall.

Sixkiller, of course, is the main cog in the Huskies' offensive machine. Sonny Six passed for 2,066 yards and 13 touchdowns in 1971, and has earned the reputation of a very accurate passer, especially on the bomb.

TOM SCOTT, SIXKILLER'S FAVORITE TARGET with 35 receptions for six TD's, returns. He was the club's most versatile ballplayer, carrying the ball for 221 yards and a 6.9 average when he wasn't grabbing passes.

Graduation losses hurt Washington on the line, but in all the Huskies have 40 lettermen, including 19 starters, returning. Twenty of the 22 men two-deep on offense for the final two games of 1971 are back, as are 16 of the 22 best defensive players.

Equally as important for winning a championship is a sound defense, and Washington had the best in the Pac-8 last year for conference games, ranking second on the season in both rushing defense and total defense.

Nine starters return on defense, anchored by linebacker and tackle Gordy Guinn, 229-pound all-conference performer. Seniors Calvin Jones and Bill Cahill, starters since their sophomore years, are excellent defensive backs and return men. Cahill's 16.2 punt return average led the Pac-8.

BUT THE BIGGEST HUSKY WEAKNESS-perhaps the factor that kept Washington from the Rose Bowl last year-is the lack of an outstanding running back to take some of the pressure off Sixkiller. Junior Pete Taggares was the leading rusher with only 401 yards and a 3.9 average. Soph Willie Hendricks might help out, but if sophomore wide receiver Mark Drennan can make the grade, Scott could be the man to give the Huskies that essential running game in the run for the Roses.

In addition to the passing exploits of first Jim Plunkett and then Don Bunce, Stanford's back-to-back titles came about through their defensive

stoppers, the "Thunder Chickens."

Four members of this vaunted group, including all-American linebacker

Jeff Siemon and all-conference tackle Pete Lazetich, are gone, and new coach Christiansen faces the task of replacing 13 starters in all from the

two-time Rose Bowl winning Stanford squad.

BUNCE, WHO REPLACED PLUNKETT SO HEROICALLY, also departs, leaving still another quarterback vacancy at Stanford. The feeling in Palo Alto is that Mike Boryla, used sparingly in a backup role last year, is the man for the job. Boryla is a stylish 6-3, 195-pounder with an excellent arm who possesses a long-striding running ability.

Dave Ottmar, a JC transfer, will challenge Boryla for the job. Jim Wise, Eric Test, Bob Glick and Duf Sundheim should also get chances.

Whichever QB hopeful gets the call, he will be able to throw to perhaps the finest crop of receivers in college football in Miles Moore, who had 38 catches for a remarkable 21.5 yards per catch; Bill Scott, with 31 receptions in 1971; and the explosive James Winesberry, junior all-American candidate who gathered in 37 passes and set up Stanford's winning field goal over undefeated Michigan in the Rose Bowl.

RUNNING BACKS JACKIE BROWN, Jim Kehl and Hillary Shockley are all gone, leaving Reggie Sanderson, Vic Lamanuzzi, juco transfer Doug Jena

and Scott Lairlow to battle for starting spots in the backfield.

Strong suit on defense for Stanford will be in the secondary, where regulars Charles McCloud and Randy Poltl and four reserves are back.

It's hard to believe, but the Trojans of USC have not been to the Rose Bowl since New Year's Day, 1970.
"We should be a better football team this year," says coach John

McKay, "but we start the season with some questions."

One question is the status of Sam (Bam) Cunningham, who rushed for 742 yards in 1971. He's had knee surgery and USC's running game will be hurting if he can't answer the bell.

Another problem in Troy is finding a QB replacement for three-year starter Jimmy Jones. Mike Rae, Jones' understudy for two seasons, and sophomore Pat Hayden are the top choices to succeed Jones.

Like Stanford, the Trojans have a top-flight group of receivers for the new quarterback. SC's best are Lynn Swann, Edesel Garrison and preseason all-American tight end Charles Young. A soph catcher with great potential is John McKay, Jr., the coach's son.

The offensive line is a seasoned one, but loses all-American tackle John Vella. Steve Riley backed up Vella and is the logical replacement. Dave Brown, Pete Adams, Allan Graf and Mike Ryan are returning starters.

Troy's defense will be anchored by 282-pound middle guard Mike Mc-Girr, with a talented secondary including returning regulars Steve Fate and Artimus Parker. McKay looks to his sophomores to provide linebacking help.

Washington State looks to quarterback Ty Paine as the key to their fortunes in 1972. Paine already holds the Cougars' career total offense record with 3,447 yards entering his senior year. A good option QB, Paine passed for 1,206 yards and ran for 648 more in '71.

But the rest of the offense was depleted by graduation. Gone is Bernard Jackson, holder of 11 Washington State records and probably the greatest

runner ever on the Palouse. Also departed are the five starters in the Cougar offensive line, which helped make Paine and Jackson go.

Ken Grandberry (626 yards) returns at fullback; and Gordon Yomans, who has 9.7 speed, looms as the man to fill Jackson's shoes. Receiving is set with Bobby Redmond and Ike Nelson, sophomore starters in '71; and Brock Aynsley, injured in the first game of the season last year, can also do the job if his petition for another year of eligibility is granted.

ON DEFENSE, THE COUGARS HAVE three of their secondary back—Robin Sinclair, Harry Thompson and Eric Johnson. One good linebacker is junior Tom Poe, who made a sophomore all-American team. Veterans abound in

the line, with three ends and five tackles returning.

Cal's Mike White begins his coaching career against Colorado in Boulder, and must find the personnel to run his multiple offense attack before that time. White, as offensive coordinator at Stanford, developed the successful passing attack there, and hopes for similar results in Berkeley.

White must first select a quarterback from among Jay Cruze, hero of the four last-minute Cal wins in '71; Reed Chestang, who started at the position but suffered a shoulder separation in the season opener at Arkansas; and soph standout Steve Bartkowski, a 6-4, 215-pounder who shattered all of Craig Morton's frosh passing records.

WITH ISAAC CURTIS GONE to San Diego State, the best of the running backs is Steve Kemnitzer, who rambled for 686 yards. Also expected to bid for running positions are Pasadena JC transfer Sylvester Youngblood,

squadman Blaine Warhurst, and sophomore Claude Westmoreland.

Coach White will surely miss the Whites in California's defensive line—Sherman and O. Z. Bob Kampa, a 245-pounder, is the returning mainstay. Lowren Toews is joined at linebacker by stellar sophomore Mike McGinnis. All-star Clarence Duren gives experience to the defensive backfield.

Oregon's new coach, Dick Enright, faces rebuilding problems. Threetime all-conference Bobby Moore, leading Pac-8 rusher in '71, is gone, and only four starters return to a defense that ranked last in the league.

Enright's QB is a fine one, Dan Fouts. Fouts ranked behind only Bunce and Sixkiller with 1,556 passing yards and a 49.8 per cent completion mark. His best returning receiver is Greg Specht, whose 36 catches ranked him sixth in the conference.

BACKFIELD HOPEFULS ARE HEADED by Jim Anderson and 238-pound fullback (how did Dee Andros let him get away?) Greg Herd. Tim Guy is the best man back on defense, and juco transfer John Fridrich is counted on for receiving corps assistance. But there are holes to be filled in both the offensive and defensive front lines.

Down the road apiece, it's being rumored that Oregon State coach Dee Andros is entertaining thoughts of using the Wishbone along with his Power-T offense. The departure of big fullbacks Dave Shilling and Roger Smith may be encouraging the Great Pumpkin's thinking.

Redshirt Tom Hickey is expected to run the offense. He's a good passer and option man, and will be looked to for leadership. The running game will come from the likes of returnees Mike Davenport, Jerry McBurney and

Mike Maestri and sophomores Wilson Morris and Percy Grogans.

The Beavers' defense appears to be solid with all-conference linebacker Steve Brown (230) leading the way. Other defensive standouts figure to be tackle Duane Defees, guard Billy Joe Winchester, linebacker Butch Wicks and safety Jim Lilly. Lilly was also the second best punt returner in the Pacific Eight last year, with an 11.7 average.

UCLA COACH PEPPER RODGERS hopes his club can rebound from a 2-7-1 season with the installation of the Wishbone offense and the varsity debut of the heralded James McAlister, who was ineligible last year.

If the Olympic team doesn't get McAlister, one of the world's best long jumpers, first, the speedster will be on hand when the Bruins meet the nation's top team, Nebraska, in the season opener. Otherwise, he will be available for football action the next week.

In QB's Rob Scribner and Mark Harmon, Rodgers has the right material for running the Wishbone game. Harmon, son of former Michigan all-American Tom Harmon, is a transfer from Pierce JC, where he compiled great statistics, running and passing for over 3,000 yards in two seasons.

RUNNING BACKS KERMIT JOHNSON and Cary Campbell return, while receiving strength comes from trackman Reggie Echols and Terry Varnoy. Bruce Walton, a star member of the UCLA Walton family in his own right, anchors the Bruin offensive line at tackle.

The overall defense is a big question. Experience returns in the secondary where Allan Ellis, Alan Lemmerman and safetyman Jim Bright hold down the fort. End Fred McNeill heads the defensive forward wall.

The Bruins look to be a better team in 1972, with the talented redshirts

and sophomores leading the way.

Last season there were seven teams competing for the Pacific Coast Athletic Association (PCAA) football title, but that number has been reduced since then. UC Santa Barbara dropped football, Los Angeles State will do the same next year, at which time San Diego State drops out of the conference to go as a major independent.

COACH JIM STANGELAND FEELS that this will be his best team ever at Long Beach State. He greets 23 lettermen, including seven starters from the offensive team, led by running back Terry Metcalf. Metcalf rushed for 1,673 yards and scored 29 touchdowns in 1971, and should make the Forty-Niners the choice for their third successive PCAA championship.

The defensive secondary was weak, but six recruits are expected to help out. Steve Hammitt is the leading returnee on the offensive line, and OB

Randy Drake returns for his senior year.

The new look at Pacific under new coach Chester Caddas is the Houston Veer-T offense. Quarterback Carlos Brown and Mitchell True, who gained 836 yards rushing, should move the football for the Tigers. Juco transfers Willard Harrell and Rob Mottan, wide receivers, provide assistance. Jim Sutton, 6-4 and 240, is the big man on the defensive line.

San Jose State, by virtue of its 4-1 PCAA mark and record against strong outside competition, went to the Pasadena Bowl in 1971. With junior quarterback Travis Mitchell running the offense, the Spartans are solid again.

Only the secondary needs rebuilding on the defensive side.

Fresno State will be a factor in deciding the league's outcome.

Newcomers hold the keys to San Diego State's offensive power this season. Besides quarterback candidate Jesse Frietas, the hopeful list includes explosive running back Isaac Curtis, who transferred from the University of California in the wake of an eligibility cause celebre. In late summer, San Diego was confidently awaiting an NCAA ruling that would make him eligible to play for the Aztecs this fall.

San Diego State is deep in experience at linebacker and in the offensive line. Ken Jackson, a UCSB refugee, joins Alva Wright, Pat Scheid

and Joe Lavender to form a strong defensive secondary.

Judging by what happened in 1971, predicting the outcome of the 1972 Southern California Intercollegiate Athletic Conference football chase is risky.



# Top Rating Of Big Eight's Big Three Evolved From Year-End Bowl Results

Bowl games of the 1971 season brought record crowds, new highs in receipts, and convincing evidence of the power of the Big Eight Conference.

After the post-season extravaganzas, the various pollsters agreed Nebraska, Oklahoma, and Colorado should fill, in order, the Nos. 1, 2, and 3 positions in the final national ratings.

Little argument was inspired by this assessment of football strength.

Undefeated Alabama, which went into the Orange Bowl rated No. 2 on its 11-0 record for the regular season, was whacked by Nebraska, 38-6, and vacated its position in favor of Oklahoma.

Unbeaten Michigan, with an 11-0 record behind it as it went against Stanford, 8-3, in the Rose Bowl, was ambushed by the Indians, 13-12, and

yielded the No. 3 ranking to Colorado.

OKLAHOMA, WHOSE ONLY LOSS WAS 35-31 TO NEBRASKA, romped to a 40-22 victory over highly-regarded Auburn in the Sugar Bowl, Colorado, whose only losses were to Nebraska and Oklahoma, defeated Houston, 29-13, in the Astro-Bluebonnet Bowl in Houston. This convinced the pollsters the Buffaloes should be No. 3.

Late in the regular season when a decision had to be made by bowl selectors before Nebraska and Oklahoma and Alabama and Auburn met in their showdowns of the undefeated, the Orange Bowl gambled that Nebraska and Alabama would be the victors, and invited them to Miami.

Now there was a playoff for the national championship between two 11-0 teams that occupied the first two places in the polls. Here was another Game of the Century, obviously.

The hardest part of bowl coverage, according

to 35-year newspaper veteran Dick Herbert, is avoiding New Year's Eve celebrations, so that a cool head and steady hands will be available the next day "When the real action be-

Now public relations director for the American Football Coaches Assn., Herbert best recalls the 1942 Rose Bowl game.

After he went from North Carolina to Pasadena to cover the game, it was moved to Duke's campus because of a Japanese bombing threat. Herbert

thus travelled 7,000 miles to cover a game played 25 miles from his point of departure.

It turned out to be that for less than one period. At the end of the first half it was 28-0, Nebraska. The final was 38-6.

JUST AS IT HAD the year before, Nebraska cemented its No. 1 rating with its victory at Miami. This time it resulted from a near-perfect performance that showed the all-round strength of Bob Devaney's team. Some observers, including Bear Bryant, coach of the beaten Crimson

Tide, wondered if there had ever been a better college football team.

Quarterback Jerry Tagge, wide receiver and kick returner Johnny Rodgers, and tailback Jeff Kinney were the standouts on offense, with middle guard Rich Glover being the leader on the powerful defense that limited the Alabama Wishbone and Johnny Musso to a single touchdown.

THE CORNHUSKERS OUTGAINED THE TIDE 225 yards to 96 in the first half. Errors helped dig Alabama's grave. A 33-yard pass interference penalty set up the opening touchdown. Then the brilliant Rodgers scored on a fantastic punt return of 77 yards. Then came Alabama fumbles at its 27-yard line and 2-yard line that set up the third and fourth touchdowns.

Tagge passed for 159 yards, and Kinney ran for 90.

Michigan, earlier in the day before 103,154 surprised spectators, also had an 11-0 record marred by failure in its bowl effort. Little Rod Garcia spoiled it all with 12 seconds left, with a 31-yard field goal that climaxed a brilliant Stanford rally for the 13-12 upset.

It was the second straight Rose Bowl upset victory for John Ralston and Stanford. Until a tension-packed fourth period, it had been a defensive standoff, 3-3. Then Michigan cranked up its powerful ground assault for

a 71-yard touchdown drive of 17 plays for a 10-3 lead.

STANFORD RETALIATED WITH A TOUCHDOWN MARCH of its own on which Jackie Brown ran 31 yards on a fourth-down fake punt and then swept off tackle for 24 yards and the score.

Michigan went ahead, 12-10, late in the last period when Jim Ferguson tried to run out of the end zone with a short Michigan field goal attempt. He got out to the 3-yard line where fullback Ed Shuttlesworth of the

Only 1:48 remained when Stanford took over on its 22. In eight plays

the Indians were on the Michigan 14 with 12 seconds to play. Enter Garcia. He carried the victory message with a soccer-style boot,

Oklahoma blitzed Auburn with 19 points in the first quarter and led, 31-0, at halftime in its 40-22 breeze to the No. 2 rating. A record crowd of 84,021 watched magician Jack Mildren direct 87 running plays that ate up a record 439 yards on the Sugar Bowl carpet.

He scored on runs of 5, 4, and 7 yards. Long-striding Joe Wylie returned a punt 71 yards. The Sooners asserted their superiority by taking the open-

ing kickoff 77 yards in 13 plays for the first score.

THE OKLAHOMA DEFENSE did an excellent job against quarterback Pat Sullivan, the Heisman Trophy winner, setting up two touchdowns with

interceptions and one with a fumble recovery.

Neither was the Cotton Bowl close-after a first half which ended with Texas on top, 6-3, on two field goals. Penn State took charge after the intermission and rolled to an impressive 30-6 victory. Texas had played 80 straight games in which it had scored at least one touchdown.

Joe Paterno turned Lydell Mitchell loose for 27 ball totin' efforts that produced 146 yards. Quarterback John Hufnagel provided the turning point with a 65-yard TD pass to Scott Skarzynski that sent the lead to 17-6.

Alberto Vitiello contributed three Penn State field goals.

A sellout audience of 71,108 in the Cator Bowl watched a defensive struggle between the Dooley Brothers-Vince of Georgia and Bill of North Carolina-that was decided in the fourth period on a 25-yard sweep of left end by sophomore tailback Jimmy Poulos of the Bulldogs.

THE TAR HEELS HAD TAKEN A 3-0 LEAD early in the second half on a 35-yard field goal by Ken Craven. After Craven missed on another try, Georgia marched 80 yards in seven plays for the lone touchdown of the day.

Colorado came from behind to defeat Houston, 29-13, as sophomore tailback Charlie Davis, ran for two touchdowns and broke the rushing record for the Astro-Bluebonnet game, which was watched by 54,720 spectators.

The largest Liberty Bowl crowd in history (51,410) was treated to a most thrilling and controversial finish as Tennessee got a touchdown with 1:56 to play on a 17-yard sweep by Curt Watson to win, 14-13.

Arkansas was leading 13-7, when it lost the ball on a fumble at its 37 just three plays before Watson's winning run. The Razorbacks claimed their man recovered the ball, but the official ruled otherwise.

The versatile LSU Tigers scored four second-half touchdowns to spoil Iowa State's first bowl appearance, 33-15, in the Sun Bowl in El Paso.

Bert Jones threw for three TD's and 227 yards.

Iowa State trailed by only 6-3 at halftime and late in the second period

stopped the Tigers five times inside the 2-yard line.

THE FIESTA BOWL WAS NEW, and the inaugural at Phoenix was sold out weeks before kickoff. The buyers must have known something. They saw

one of the most exciting bowl battles of all time.

Host Arizona State won, 45-38, before 51,089 on sophomore Woody Green's third touchdown with only 34 seconds to play. Gary Huff passed for 347 yards for the Seminoles. In the first half the lead changed hands five times and the score was tied twice as Florida State took a 28-21 lead.

The Peach Bowl in Atlanta can't escape the elements. This time a downpour before the kickoff made the Atlanta Stadium field a mud puddle. Mississippi performed as though conditions were perfect and had Georgia Tech beaten before the first half was over. The final score was 41-28.

Toledo ran its undefeated string to 35 games with a 28-3 victory over



Boise State's Eric Guthrie tossed two touchdown passes and booted a 42-yard field goal to bring the Broncos back from a 21-point deficit in the final period of the Camellia Bowl. Paced by two scoring receptions from Rusty Scott, Chico State had built a 28-7 lead going into the final fifteen minutes. Then Guthrie went to work with TD passes of 10 and 16 yards, to go with a 42-yard field goal and Gary Howshaw's dive for a 32-28 win.

In the Knute Rockne Bowl, Hampden-Sydney returned to try to avenge its loss the previous year. But a strong ground game by Bridgeport, and a rally that fell short, spelled defeat again. Bridgeport jumped out to a 14-0 lead in the second quarter on a two-yard run by Vin Detore and a 36-yard pass from Roy Ferriera to Lloyd Cornell. Hampden-Sydney only scored twice in the second half on nine and eight-yard passes to lose, 17-12.

In the Amos Alonzo Stagg Bowl which decides the West Championship, Samford broke a fourth period deadlock with Ohio Wesleyan on a 50-yard pass from Jimmy Nipper to Steve Parker. Ohio Wesleyan had opened the scoring on a 35-yard field goal by Tom Burke and tied the score early in the last quarter. Samford added a 22-yard field goal to pad its final margin.

Five of the six games—all but the Alonzo Stagg Bowl—return to the same sites in 1972. The Camellia, Grantland Rice, Pioneer and Boardwalk Bowls on December 10 will again be telecast regionally on the ABC network.

# Huff, Rodgers & Pruitt—TDs, Inc.— Dramatize Football's Different Styles

Approximately 120 college football teams, which play most of their games against each other, are classified as "major-college" or University Division teams. They represent the field of so-called "big-time" college football as judged by class of competition rather than seasonal strength. The football teams of all other four-year, accredited NCAA-member colleges comprise the College Division field. An official list is issued annually each September.

If you're interested in the infinite variety of college football, you can start with 1972's top major-college offensive returnees. You prefer passing? There's Florida State's Gary Huff, 1971 national total offense champion.

Wishbone-T running? There's Oklahoma's Greg D. ("for dangerous," he says) Pruitt, leading runner on history's No. I offensive team. Multiple offense? There's Nebraska's versatile Johnny Rodgers, gamebreaker on two national title teams.

But this is a news story, not a publicity puff, so let's stick to the facts. And the facts are, this trio could win seven national statistics titles (given good support and no injuries).

HUFF COULD WIN passing and total offense, Pruitt rushing, scoring and all-purpose running, and Rodgers

receiving and punt returns.

Rodgers (5 feet 10, 171 pounds) and Pruitt (5-9 and 176) are 1972's only returning consensus All-

America backs. Both have sprinter speed and waterbug moves.

Since Pruitt became a regular halfback, Oklahoma has lost only to Nebraska. Since Rodgers started, Nebraska has gone unbeaten in 25 games and he's scored 29 TDs, averaging an incredible 37.2 yards per TD. Put another way, he averaged 15 yards each time he touched the ball in 1971.

Sooner or later, Rodgers beats you with a big catch or runback, like his punt-return TDs of 72 yards against Oklahoma and 77 against Alabama. And get this: He does it by taking his eye off the ball. "Once I get the punt lined up, I take a peek at the coverage," he says. "I try to get by the first man, then see what's developing with my blockers."

PRUITT'S GAME-BREAKING RUNS so terrorized 1971 opponents they tried everything to keep him from turning end. Even so, no major collegian in history close to his 178 carries ever approached his 9.4-yard average.

Along the way, Pruitt was always his smiling, kidding, confident self. He said, "In high school I was called Spotlight, 'cause I was always in it. I learned my moves playing street ball 'til midnight in Houston. Our street was narrow. You had to be good to get past a guy."

One step below No. 3 Pruitt in national per-game rushing was Louisville's 5-foot-5 Howard Stevens, shortest major collegian ever to rush more than

1,000 yards in a season. Stevens, a psychology major with a B average, says he learned his squirting, lateral moves "by jumping away from cars when I was a kid (in Harrisonburg, Va.)." Stevens led the nation's college-division rushers as a freshman in 1968. After transferring, he asked for jersey No. 1. Prophetically, he can become the first collegian to rush for 5,000 career yards, with 997 this season (his fourth).

Wisconsin's 5-foot-6 Rufus (Roadrunner) Ferguson, also a B student, is another supersquirt among an unprecedented 13 returning 1,000-yard rushers. Ferguson, Stevens, Pruitt (and Rodgers and Huff) are seniors. The 3-4-5 ranking rushing returnees are juniors—Colorado's Charlie Davis, who explains his moves with, "My eyes and feet are in tune," Arizona State's

9.5 speedman Woody Green, and Bowling Green's Paul Miles.

Toledo's Joe Schwartz, a finance major with 3.41 grades, is another

1,000-yard rusher, but he's the No. 1 returnee in scoring.

FLORIDA STATE'S HUFF, a B student majoring in accounting, led the nation in rushing-passing yards per game (241.2), passing yardage (2736) and TD passes (23). "I think 12 came on audibles," he said. "Reading defenses and learning to concentrate and keep calm—that's what you have to learn up here. My dad started teaching me how to set up, throw and react in grade school. We would throw the football an hour before dinner. Afterwards, he'd do things like yelling my name and throwing with my back

turned-much like the reflex drills we have up here."

Among Huff's challengers are Virginia Tech's 6-foot-5 Don Strock, 1971 passing runnerup; Arkansas' Joe Ferguson; Utah State's Tony Adams; New Mexico State's Joe Pisarcik; Kansas State's Dennis Morrison, who averaged 21 completions and 242.8 passing yards his last five games; Oregon's Dan Fouts; Washington's Sonny Sixkiller, 1970 passing champion; Purdue's Gary Danielson; and Temple's Doug Shobert. Among the top 50 passers Shobert led in completion percentage (.628) and Danielson in yards per pass attempt (9.5 to 8.4 for Huff and Nebraska's Jerry Tagge).

Arkansas' Mike Reppond, Northern Illinois' Willie Hatter and Nebraska's

Rodgers lead the returning receivers.

COMPLETING A LIST OF FIVE DEFENDING CHAMPIONS are two seniors—Temple's Paul Loughran in kickoff returns and Brigham Young's Golden Richards in punt returns; and two juniors—Oklahoma's John Carroll in kick-scoring and Villanova's Frank Polito in interceptions. Other top returnees are Oklahoma State's Jim Benien in punting; Penn's Steve Solow in punt returns; Oregon State's Ray Taroli and Missouri's Mike Fink in kickoff returns; Temple's Nick Mike-Mayer and Alabama's Bill Davis in kick-scoring; and Arizona's Jackie Wallace in interceptions.

#### '71 Season Individual Leaders

Florida State's Gary Huff finished strong and won the 1971 total-offense championship by a comfortable margin over Stanford's Don Bunce, an impressive replacement for 1970 all-America Jim Plunkett.

Huff was the first Florida State quarterback to win an individual national title, which is interesting because the Seminoles had led the major colleges in aggregate passing yardage over the combined 1966-1970 five-year span,

going into the 1971 season.

Passing champion Brian Sipe also carried on a tradition at San Diego State, where he had backed up Dennis Shaw, 1969 total-offense champion. And like Huff, Sipe won with a big finish—80 completions his last three games. He edged Virginia Tech's Don Strock, the seven-week leader, by one completion, with Florida's John Reaves third in the tightest finish ever.

On the per-game career charts, Auburn's Pat Sullivan finished 4-7-10 and Reaves 5-4-2 in total offense, passing yards and completions, respectively, and Reaves set a mark for total passing yards (7549). Nebraska's Jerry Tagge finished with a career 8.1 yards per attempt, higher than any major

collegian who threw as often (he attempted 581).

No college football season ever produced as many prolific rushers as 1971, and no rusher ever worked harder or gained more yards than Cornell's Ed Marinaro, triple champion in rushing, scoring and all-purpose running. At 6 feet 3 and 210 pounds, he towered over his pursuers both physically (none of the next five was more than 5-11 or 195) and statistically.

His incredible 209.0-yard per-game season average was more than 81 major teams (out of 119) could manage. He averaged 5.3 yards per carry, even though he carried a record 39.6 times per game. But he took the pounding and carried 8-1-0 Cornell to the Ivy League co-championship. Marinaro's 4715 career rushing yards were 848 more than the former

Marinaro's 4715 career rushing yards were 848 more than the former record. Put another way, his career average of 174.6 yards per game was above the season record of 174.0 (by San Francisco's Ollie Matson in 1951).

Runnerup Robert Newhouse of Houston became 1971's forgotten man. Newhouse, you see, didn't set an all-time per-rush record like Oklahoma's Greg Pruitt, didn't set season records for TDs (29) and points (174) like Penn State's Lydell Mitchell, and didn't smash the single-game record like Michigan State's Eric Allen with his 350 yards. All Newhouse did was rush for 1757 yards—more than any major collegian ever except Marinaro.

Jack Mildren, Oklahoma's indispensable Wishbone quarterback, set a rushing record for quarterbacks at 103.6 yards a game. A record 25 rushers averaged at least 100 yards a game (previous high: 17 in 1970).

Utah's Marv Bateman, whose booming 48.1-yard average broke his own national record for at least 50 punts, spreadeagled the punting field like no collegian ever. The spread between his sky-high career average of 46.9 yards and the 43.7 of runnerup Des Koch (Southern Cal 1951-53) is more than the spread separating the next 54 punters with at least 100 punts.

It was a big year for place-kickers, too. A record 82 games involving major teams were decided by field goals (previous mark: 70 in 1966).

Oklahoma's John Carroll (7.3 points a game) became the first sophomore kick-scoring titlist since 1945, Stanford's Rodrigo Carcia kicked the most field goals—14—then beat Michigan with two more in the Rose Bowl.

Brigham Young's Golden Richards worked hard in winning the puntreturn title. His 624 yards were second-highest ever, and no player who returned as many (33) has matched his 18.9-yard average. His four puntreturn TDs of 87, 73, 62 and 58 yards set a major-college season mark, shared with Colorado's Cliff Branch, who broke for 75, 68, 65 and 59 yards. Temple's Paul Loughran broke a 96-yarder en route to the kickoff-return

Temple's Paul Loughran broke a 96-yarder en route to the kickoff-return title. The interception champion, Villanova sophomore Frank Polito (1.2 per game), returned them 261 yards for a major-college season record.

In career records, add Arkansas' Bill McClard in kick-points (212) and South Carolina's Dick Harris in all-kick-return yards (2637).

'71 Season Team Leaders Oklahoma's 1971 Wishbone Wonders gained 6,232 rushing-passing yards—980 more than any other major team. If that isn't awesome enough, get this: The Sooners gained more yards per game just rushing (472,4—an all-time high)

than any other major gained rushing and passing combined.

But don't get the idea Oklahoma couldn't pass. The Sooners set all-time national records in both yards per attempt (13.3) and yards per completion (27.3), helping them to another all-time mark of 566.5 total-offense yards per game. They made it a triple crown on a 44.9-point scoring average.

For example, on the day 12-0-0 Nebraska held 10-1-0 Oklahoma to its season "low" of 279 rushing yards, OU passing hit its season high of 188. The explosive Sooners averaged 7.4 yards per play total offense and 6.8

in rushing—both second in history only to Army's 1944 and 1945 powers.

San Diego State barely edged Florida State for the passing title.

Thirty-five-straight Toledo became the first major-college team ever to win three straight national total-defense championships, and did it by a scant two yards over Michigan in the tightest finish ever. The 11-0-0 Wolverines came that close to a 1971 defensive triple crown, because they led the nation in rushing and scoring defense. Texas Tech led in pass defense. Tennessee set major-college interception records of 782 yards and seven TDs. Toledo, winner of six national defensive titles in seven years, was the only major finishing in the top 10 in all four categories.

## Rushing Champion A-Z Hits Bullseye, Now Aims For 200-Yard Game Average

Hobart halfback Don Aleksiewicz, the defending college-division rushing champion, spends many hours thinking about goals. Determined and confident, he set his 1971 sights at 180 rushing yards per game, and remarkably missed by a stride, finishing at 179.6.

This season, he's aiming for a barrier that's been broken only once in college-football history: 200 rushing yards per game. Ed Marinaro of major-college Cornell did it in 1971, but the all-time collegedivision record is 182.6.

"Goals are big in my philosophy, and I really strive to reach them," says Aleksiewicz (pronounced

Alec-sev-itch), a 6-foot, 185-pound senior.

NO MATTER WHAT HAPPENS, Mr. A-Z will probably get plenty of chances to exhibit his spinning, straightup running style. He averaged 31 carries a game last season in Hobart's Wishbone-T, and 27 a game as a sophomore when he finished fifth nationally in

rushing while running from the I-formation.

Aleksiewicz' top three challengers may be Hope junior Greg Voss, who ranked eighth and sixth in rushing the past two seasons, Colby sophomore Pete Gorniewicz and Long Beach State senior Terry Metcalf.

As a freshman, Gorniewicz averaged 142.6 yards per game and, after receiving the team's most valuable player award, acted like a senior states-

man by diplomatically giving it to his blocking back.

Metcalf, a quiet junior-college transfer, rushed for 139.4 yards a game, finished second nationally in scoring, broke the all-time college-division season record for total points (178), and never seemed to tire. After rushing for 268 yards and five touchdowns against Hawaii, he celebrated by winning a Honolulu dance contest.

BESIDES METCALF AND ALEKSIEWICZ, the top scoring returnees are Middlebury senior Phil Pope, Colorado College senior Ernie Jones and Louisiana Tech sophomore Charles McDaniel, McDaniel, whose jersey number will now match his nickname Quick Six, has showed Tech fans—used to passing

power—that the run is fun, too.

Among the passers, Evansville's Randy Mattingly, a 6-foot-4 senior, is the defending total-offense champion and leading returnee in completions. Dropback passer Mattingly originally signed a grant-in-aid with Florida State, but decided to stay in his hometown when his brother Jerry, a former Evansville basketball star, was killed in a highway construction accident in 1969. Explains Randy, "I couldn't have been closer to my brother."

Other prominent returnees in total-offense and passing are Amherst's

Rich Murphy, Kutztown State's Terry Woginrich, Drake's Dennis Redmond.

UT Chattanooga's Mickey Brokas, San Francisco State's Kirk Waller and Middlebury's Pete Mackey. Murphy, Woginrich and Redmond are seniors,

the others juniors.

Away from football, this group has unusual interests. For example, Murphy does volunteer work in a mental hospital, Woginrich pole-vaults on the track team and Mackey likes to cook, And like most good cooks, he excels without help. Murphy had only four passes intercepted last season and his 2.2 per cent interception avoidance was the lowest by any college-division quarterback, with at least 150 attempts.

Two other high-ranking passers, Santa Clara's Clyde LeBaron and Idaho State's Tom Lee, will be throwing to the nation's top returnees in receiving,

Tom Bidegary and Tom Hofmann, respectively.

In fact, if these passing combinations are battling for national statistics championships, the Idaho State pair might have an advantage. They play their home games under ideal weather conditions in a dome stadium, and they've been together for two seasons.

Bidegary transferred to Santa Clara from San Francisco, where he showed no fear. He won the light-heavyweight intramural boxing title and once broke into his burning apartment to save his extensive mod wardrobe.

Colorado College's bushy-haired Ben Nitka, a Russian history buff and leading returnee in punting, grew up in Poland playing soccer and says he "couldn't stand football" after coming to the United States with his family 11 years ago, Now, at 24, "Big Foot" Nitka (he once kicked a 65-yard field goal in the Army) plans to switch from soccer-style to conventional.

In the runback categories, all three champions are back. They are Bishop sophomore Ennis Thomas in punt returns, Western Maryland senior Joe Brockmeyer in kickoff returns and Northeastern senior Tom Rezzuti in interceptions. Even before his 14 interceptions, Rezzuti was nicknamed

"Snagger" due to his diving catches as a baseball center fielder.

71 Season | Upstate New York reigned as Rushing Capital, U.S.A., in 1971 college football. In Ithaca, Cornell's Ed Marinaro won the major-college rushing championship (all-time high 209.0 yards per game), and 60 miles to the north, in Geneva, Hobart's Don Aleksiewicz won the college-division title.

A 185-pound halfback, Aleksiewicz averaged 179.6 rushing yards per game and certainly kept busy for 5-4-0 Hobart, which had lost all eight games in 1970. Mr. A-Z averaged 5.9 yards per carry despite punishment from stacked defenses which always expected the run. Of Hobart's 687 rushing-passing plays, an amazing 97 per cent were rushes. Their 23 pass attempts were the fewest by *uny* team in modern NCAA football history.

A sprained ankle forced Aleksiewicz to miss the second half against Drexel after he had already rushed for 175 yards. At season's end, he was just 28 yards short of breaking the college-division season per-game rush-

ing record of 182.6.

Eastern Michigan senior Larry (The Rat) Ratcliff, with three earlyseason 200-yard games, threatened the record, too, but a broken kneecap

prematurely ended his season and he finished second at 169.7.

Zig-zagging Ratcliff made headlines with his break-away running—an incredible 32-yard average for 25 career rushing touchdowns—and with his helmet. It was decorated with tomahawk decals for outstanding plays and a magazine clipping of a rat taped on by teammates.

A sore ankle almost stopped St. Olaf senior Ole Gunderson from becoming the fourth player in history to rush for 4000 yards in three seasons.

As a student teacher before his last game, Gunderson sprained his ankle refereeing a high-school touch-football game. Despite the handicap, he got a final-game 161 yards and finished with 4060 career rushing yards. He also set the career per-game record at 150.4.

Luther senior Bernie Peeters, a fullback with shoulder-length hair, wound

up with 4435 rushing yards in four seasons.

C.W. Post's strong-armed quarterback Gary Wichard, who called his own plays and threw long all season (42 completions at least 20 yards) was

hampered by heavy rain and 40 mile-per-hour winds in his final game and lost the total-offense title after leading four straight weeks. Wichard got only 154 rushing-passing yards, allowing Evansville junior Randy Mattingly to win. 248.2 to 244.3.

Tennessee State quarterback Joe Gilliam (his father is the team's defensive coach) turned in 1971's top total-offense game by any collegian, with 408 yards (384 passing, 24 rushing) against Grambling and also rush-

ed for two touchdowns and passed for three more.

The other offensive champions were Rensselaer teammates Bob Baron in passing and flanker Kalle Kontson in receiving; Fayetteville's Ken Gamble in punting; and Michigan Tech halfback Larry Ras, an Academic All-America (B, mechanical engineering) in scoring.

#### '71 Season Team Leaders

Tiny Hampden-Sydney (690 men) produced the nation's stinglest football team with an aggressive 4-3-4 defense that averaged only 5 feet 11, 185 pounds. The 10-0-0 Tigers won both scoring defense and total defense and finished

second in pass defense and fifth in rushing defense. It was Hampden-Sydney's second straight defensive scoring title, and now over the last 19 regular-season games, the "Coffin Squad Boys" have recorded 11 shutouts

and allowed a meager 56 points-only 2.9 per game.

On offense, 9-1-0 Delaware finally won both the total-offense and rushing championships after winning one or the other the last three seasons. But the Blue Hens missed the scoring title by a field goal: 42.2 to champion Michigan Tech's 42.4. Northern Colorado led in rushing defense, Western Kentucky in pass defense and C.W. Post won the passing crown.





## Headed By Talented Thundering Herd, '71 AA Team Is Most Versatile Ever

Because 1971's thundering herd smashed almost every rushing record in the book, it was inevitable the '71 consensus All-America backfield would be the most prolific running group in history.

Cornell's Ed Marinaro, Oklahoma's Greg Pruitt and Alabama's Johnny Musso combined for 4634 rushing yards—790 more than any previous con-

sensus trio (beating the 3844 by O. J. Simpson & Co. in 1968).

The '71 backup trio—Penn State's Lydell Mitchell, Michigan State's Eric Allen and Oregon's Bobby Moore—also smashed the record with 4272 rushing yards. Indeed, national runnerup Robert Newhouse of Houston, whose 1757 yards ranks second all-time only to Marinaro, didn't make either trio.

The consensus running backs averaged an explosive 6.4 yards a carry and

scored 350 points.

LINEWRECKER MARINARO worked harder and produced more than any rusher ever—an all-time record 209.0 yards per game and a 5.3-yard average per carry despite a record 39.6 carries per game. As for sidestepper Pruitt, no player close to his 178 carries ever approached his 9.4-yard average. Musso was a goal line runner with both power and speed.

At the other three offensive skill positions, the consensus choices were Heisman Trophy winner Pat Sullivan of Auburn at quarterback, and re-

ceivers Johnny Rodgers of Nebraska and Terry Beasley of Auburn.

Boosted by Rodgers' game-breaking punt runbacks, 1971's six offensive skill players produced a record 9,945 yards (5.7 miles) in all categories—rushing, passing, receiving and runbacks.

Such versatility is somewhat surprising in a year that brought the biggest one-season increase in rushing emphasis ever, thanks largely to increasing

use of the Houston Triple Option and Texas Wishbone-T.

The most versatile was Rodgers, who averaged 15 yards every time he touched the ball (132 plays for 1983 yards). Sullivan passed for 2012 yards

and 20 TDs-11 to the fleet Beasley.

ANOTHER SURPRISE was the unanimity of the 1971 selectors. They produced a record nine unanimous choices: Pruitt, Marinaro, Sullivan, Beasley, Texas tackle Jerry Sisemore and Georgia guard Royce Smith on offense; and on defense Notre Dame end Walt Patulski, Michigan linebacker Mike Taylor and Tennessee back Bobby Majors.

Tommy Casanova, Louisiana State defensive back, was the only repeater


from the 1970 consensus All-America.

The '71 team included five juniors, the most since World War II. They were Pruitt and his teammate, center Tom Brahaney; their old rival from the Wishbone wars, Texas' Sisemore; and two more foes from that 35-31 elassic—Rodgers and defensive end Willie Harper of 12-0-0 Nebraska.

Sisemore, 255, was the heaviest player in the offensive line that averaged 240.5 and also featured Penn State tackle Dave Joyner, a B-plus pre-med student and one of three Academic All-America players on the team. The others were Musso (B-plus, pre-law) and Jacobson (B-plus, accounting).





### FOREWORD

## 1972 Outlook - 'Cheapest' Touchdown Gone

It was called football's cheapest of all touchdowns, and although rare, was as embarrassing as Roy Riegels' wrong way run in the 1929 Rose Bowl. The situation was this: On a free kick (such as a kickoff) no one on the receiving team bothered to claim the ball before it landed in their end zone. A member of the kicking team adroitly recovered the ball, his team suddenly had a touchdown, the opponents had red faces, and their coach was purple with rage.

Well, if you never got a chance to see that most colorful play, you probably never will. That was one of the things the Rules Committee changed for the 1972 game. Henceforth (or for at least 'til next the committee takes pen to rule) any free kick that strikes the receiving team's goal line or beyond without being touched by that team becomes a touchback. So there goes the "cheapest" touchdown.

Now the cheapest touchdown may come after the kicking team recovers such an unclaimed pigskin on the six-inch line, which only proves that college football is still not without its eccentricities and oddities.

With the exception of the free kick rule, changes adopted for 1972 deal largely with clarification and amplification of existing rules, and with safety. A significant step in the protection of the players is a recommendation that mouth guards be used this year. It's just a suggestion for the present, but mouth protectors will become mandatory next year. This, then, might be the last year of the suddenly loosened or missing tooth.

If it seems to you there are more officials this year than

there used to be, you are right. Although the basic requirement still is four officials—referee, umpire, linesman and field judge—the use of a fifth official, a back judge, has been permissible in recent seasons. In 1972 a line judge may be added at the discretion of both teams, to watch for the indiscretions of each along the line.

There will be more flags in 1972 than just those in the pockets of the new officials, too. The increase is in the number of pylons at the corners of the field from four to eight. The markers now designate the intersections of the sidelines with the goal lines and the end lines. Only the goal line corners were marked in last year's game.


Also in 1972 the yardage chain and down indicator must be on the side of the field opposite the pressbox, but an auxiliary indicator may be used on the other side.

In addition, the 1972 rules specify that substitutes must enter the field directly from their own team area . . . an obviously injured player must be removed from the game for at least one play . . . if a player's number is so torn as to be illegible, his jersey must be replaced between plays or a time out charged . . . a quarter-inch border on jersey numbers is permissible this year . . and, finally, there is a highly technical clarification of the distinction between an invalid and an illegal fair catch signal.

But then, if you want to get down to the nitty gritty, you can obtain the NCAA Official Football Rules (\$1) and its supplement NCAA Official Football Rules Interpretations (\$1) by request-with-remittance to the NCAA, 349 East Thomas Road, Phoenix, Ariz. 85012.

Then all you'll need are a whistle and a striped shirt.

## Rule One

# GAME, FIELD, PLAYERS AND EQUIPMENT

SECTION 1—This is Football. Two teams of not more than eleven players each compete on a rectangular field with an inflated ball. A goal line at one end of the field is assigned to each team to defend. The ob-

ject is to reach the opponents' goal, advancing the ball by running with it, passing it to a teammate or kicking it, and each team is given opportunities to do so. The rules provide points for scoring and, not surprisingly, the winner is the one with the larger score at the end of the game. There are no protests in college football.

**SECTION 2—Supervision.** There's a set of officials for each game, usually a Referee, Umpire, Linesman, Field Judge and Back Judge. Only each team's Field Captain may speak with the Officials.

SECTION 3—Field Dimensions. The playing field measures 300 feet between the goal lines and 160 feet in width. All boundary markers are outside the playing field, since measurements of the area are taken from the inside of the boundary markers. Thus, a player who steps on the sideline is out of bounds, and the ball has only to be in possession on or above the opponents' goal line to score.

A 10-yard area known as the end zone extends beyond each goal line. This area culminates with the end line, where the goal posts are located. The goal posts are 23 feet, 4 inches apart and are joined by a white crossbar 10 feet above the ground.

SECTION 4—Field Markings. Every white line on a football field serves a purpose and helps spectators, teams and officials. The stripes from sideline to sideline are the 5-yard markers, helpful in determining length of advance and the point to be gained. The

short stripes at one-yard intervals are inbound lines. All plays must begin with the ball on or inside the inbound lines. The short line midway between the goalposts and three yards in from the goal line is the point from which the Try-for-Point is attempted.

**SECTION 5—Yardage and Down Indicators.** The chain used on the sideline to determine the point to be gained in a series of downs is 10 yards in length, with the chain affixed to two five-foot high poles. The down coming up next is shown atop a third pole.

**SECTION 6—The Ball.** The shape and dimensions of a football are unique. It is a "prolate spheroid," and if you don't know what a prolate spheroid is, it is exactly the shape of a football. It just misses being a foot long, measuring 11 to 11¼ inches. It's just short of a pound, weighing 14 to 15 ounces. And don't let anybody tell you a football is made of pigskin. It is not. It's made of pebble-grained leather (or, occasionally, of rubber).

**SECTION 7—Jersey Colors and Numbering.** Opposing players are required to wear jerseys of contrasting color and, inhospitably perhaps, it is the visiting team that must produce the contrasting color if a change is necessary. Players must wear numbers both front and back and groups of numbers are recommended by offensive positions, as shown in the following diagram:

On a scrimmage play, at least five offensive players with numbers 50 through 79 must line up on the line of scrimmage.

**SECTION 8—Protective Equipment.** Each player must wear a head guard, or helmet, and knee pads. Other protective equipment is urged, but not mandatory. If a player shows up without shoulder pads, for example, that's his business. Few are so inclined.



#### **DEFINITIONS**

SECTION 1—Language Unique. The language of football is, as the Mods might say, something else. Its official vocabulary includes a conglomeration of terms and phrases seemingly far removed from the game's slam-bang action, as witness crawling, huddle and neutral

zone. And while the Official Rules Committee annually copes with defining official terminology, each season introduces new words into the popularly accepted unofficial vocabulary, including such of recent coinage as turnover, seam, triple option and wishbone.

Football truly has a language all its own, and one that collegiate coaching inventiveness alters even faster than the rules change.

**SECTION 2—The Ball, Live, Dead, Free.** In the course of a game, the Ball itself may be referred to officially as a live ball, a dead ball, a free ball, a loose ball, an out-of-bounds ball, or unofficially just a blankety-blank ball. In any case, it always is the game ball and once in play, it is "live" until it goes out of bounds, hits the ground on an incomplete pass or is declared dead by the Referee, as detailed in Rule 4. It is "live" also when it is fumbled across the goal line without being in possession of either team.

Obviously, when the ball is not "live" it is considered dead.

A Free Ball is a live ball that is not in possession of either team. The ball is "in possession" when it is controlled by a player or while a forward pass (or backward pass on the center snap) is in flight and while a punt or field goal is being attempted.

**SECTION 3—Other Official Terms.** Those merely start us on a long list of official definitions. Some others:

BLOCKING—Legally hindering the progress of an opponent by contacting him with any part of the blocker's body.

CLIPPING—Running or diving into the back of an opponent, or throwing the body across the back of the leg or legs of an opponent other than the ball carrier.

CRAWLING—An attempt to advance the ball by a player after any part of his person except a hand or foot has touched the ground.

DOWN—A single play by the team in possession of the ball. It starts with a snap from center or a free kick and ends when the ball next becomes dead.

DROP KICK—A technique now rarely employed, in which a player drops the ball and kicks it as it touches the ground or as it rises from the ground.

FAIR CATCH—The opportunity for a player of the receiving team to catch a kicked ball that has crossed the scrimmage line, without being tackled or blocked by an opponent, after signaling his intention by completely extending one arm above his head.

FORWARD PASS-Live ball thrown toward opponents' goal.

FOUL AND VIOLATION—A foul is a rules infraction subject to a penalty. A violation incurs no yardage penalty.

FREE KICK—A kick made with each team restricted from advancing beyond a fixed restraining line until the ball is kicked.

FUMBLE-Inadvertent loss of ball by player in possession.

HUDDLE—Two or more offensive players grouped together after the ball is ready for play, usually for receiving instructions from the quarterback concerning the ensuing play.

KICKOFF—A free kick with which each half is opened, and which is employed also following each Try-for-Point or Field Goal. A kickoff must be either a Placekick or a Dropkick.

LATERAL PASS—A live ball thrown toward or parallel with the passer's own goal line.

LINEMAN—A player who is on the line of scrimmage when the ball is snapped. Conversely, a Back is a player legally behind the line at the snap.

NEUTRAL ZONE—The space between the scrimmage lines of the offense and defense, approximating 11 inches (the length of the football).

PLACE KICK—The technique most often employed to kick off and on field goal and try-for-point attempts. The ball, which may be held in position by any player of the kicking team, is kicked from a fixed position either on the ground or on a tee.

PUNT—A ball that is dropped from the hands of a player and kicked by him before it touches the ground.

SCRIMMAGE—A play which begins with a snap from the center.

SCRIMMAGE LINE—The yard line (marked or unmarked) that passes through point of the ball nearest a team's own goal line.

SHIFT—Change of positions simultaneously by two or more offensive players after play is ready to start and before the snap.

SNAP—A quick, continuous motion by which the ball is handed or snapped back with the ball leaving the hands of the snapper on the motion. The snap normally is made by the Center.

SPEARING—Illegal use of the head and helmet to ram an opponent after his momentum has stopped.

TACKLING—Grasping or encircling an opponent with hands or arms.

YARD LINE—Any line (marked or unmarked) in the field of play parallel to the end lines. "Own" yard line means between a team's own goal line and the 50-yard line (midfield).

**SECTION 4—Unofficial Terms.** Additional football terms in modern use which are not found in the Rules Book but have become common to the unofficial terminology of the game include:

ACTION PASS—Forward pass thrown from an offensive formation simulating a running play.

AUDIBLE—A vocal signal by the Quarterback at scrimmage line changing play called in the huddle. Also called Check Off.

BOMB-A long pass attempt for a touchdown.

BLITZ—Total commitment by any number of defensive backs and/or linebackers to rush the passer.

BUTTONHOOK—A pass pattern in which the receiver goes downfield and U-turns back sharply to receive the ball.

DRAW—Quarterback back pedals as if to pass, but instead hands off for running play by set back who has delayed. Linemen's initial movements are as if to pass block.

FLAG—Officials' penalty marker or field corner flag; also a pass pattern where receiver runs to the corner flag.

FLANKER-Back stationed wide right or left as pass receiver.

FLARE—Pass pattern to a back swinging wide or "flaring" out of backfield. Sometimes called Swing Pass or Wheel Pass.

FLY PATTERN—Pass play on which receiver races deep toward goalposts. Sometimes called Up or Post pattern.

FRONT FOUR-Four-man defensive line-the tackles and ends.

LINEBACKER—A defensive player operating immediately behind his line where he can either aid linemen in stopping a running play or cover an opponents' receiver if a pass develops.

LOOK-IN-PASS—Receiver breaks quickly downfield and turns almost immediately to look over his shoulder for the ball.

MAN-FOR-MAN COVERAGE—Pass defense wherein defenders cover specific receivers wherever they go, rather than areas.

MONSTER—A roving linebacker who usually positions himself opposite opponents' strong side. Also called Rover.

ONSIDE KICK—A kickoff is a free ball once it travels 10 yards. The "Onside Kick" is an effort by the kicking team to kickoff short and recover the ball before the receiving team can do so.

POCKET-Area of protection for the passer, formed by blockers.

PREVENT DEFENSE—Strategem of reducing front line strength to employ more deep defenders. Used when a team is ahead and willing to give short yardage in order to shut off the long gain.

PULLING GUARD—Guard who pulls out behind scrimmage line for a trap block or to lead sweep blocking for ball carrier.

REVERSE—A running play on which the lead blockers go in one direction while ball carrier goes in the opposite direction.

ROLL-OUT—Quarterback runs laterally behind blockers before exercising option to pass or run with the ball himself.

SCREEN PASS—Pass to a receiver behind a wall of blockers, who have permitted defenders to penetrate in pursuit of passer.

SEAM—Imaginary line where two zone-defense coverage areas meet. Passer tries to confuse defenders by "hitting the seam."

SLOT BACK—Back stationed between wide receiver and interior linemen. Must be one yard behind the line of scrimmage.

STRONG SIDE—An overbalance of the number of offensive or defensive linemen to either side of the Center.

STUNTING—Defensive players repeatedly changing positions as the ball is snapped, to confuse offensive strategy.

TIGHT END—Offensive end who lines up in close formation (as opposed to Split End's wide set) where he can either block for a ball carrier or be employed as a pass receiver.

TRAP BLOCK—A ploy permitting a defender to penetrate quickly, only to be blocked from the side by pulling guard or tackle.

TRIPLE OPTION—Basis of the Wishbone-T. Quarterback has option of (1) giving to the short back or Fullback, (2) keeping and running himself or (3) tossing to trailing Halfback.

TURNOVER-Any loss of possession without scoring.

WIDE RECEIVER—A Split End or Flanker Back. Either or both are set wide of scrimmage line as potential pass receivers.

WISHBONE-T—Modern derivative of old formations such as the Split-T, "Y" and Belly Series. Quarterback is under center with fullback close behind and halfbacks split and set behind fullback. Advantage: Fullback is closer to line for dive play. Quarterback reads defensive charge quickly and either gives to the Fullback on quick play or fakes to Fullback and employs one of his other options (see Triple Option).

ZONE COVERAGE—Pass defense wherein areas are covered, rather than individual receivers. Opposite of Man-For-Man coverage.



## Rule Three

# PERIODS, TIME FACTORS AND SUBSTITUTIONS

SECTION 1—Start of the Game. Each half must start with a kickoff, but it doesn't have to be a placekick. If some young man desires to begin a half with a dropkick he will be considered an innovator, but he

will be entirely within his rights. The status of the dropkick has not been changed in years, although it has virtually disappeared from usage.

There's one preliminary to the kickoff. About three minutes before the scheduled start of a game, the Referee calls the field captains together and tosses a coin, first designating which shall call heads or tails. The winner of the toss has the option of kicking, receiving or choosing the goal his team will defend. A choice once announced may not be changed. The loser of the toss has his choice of the options at the start of the second half.

**SECTION 2—Start of Second and Fourth Quarters.** During the brief intermission between the first and second periods and between the third and fourth periods the teams change goals. The ball is relocated in the opposite half of the field at the spot corresponding exactly to where it was before the change of goals. Possession of the ball, the down and distance to be gained remain unchanged.

SECTION 3—Playing Time and Intermissions. The total actual playing time in a collegiate game is 60 minutes, divided into four periods of 15 minutes each and with one-minute intermissions between the first and second quarters and the third and fourth quarters. (High Schools and Prep Schools play 12-minute quarters.) The halftime intermission is 15 minutes, but it may be lengthened or shortened by mutual agreement. At any time during a game, the remaining

playing time may be shortened by mutual agreement of the opposing Field Captains and the Referee.

**SECTION 4—Extension of Periods.** No period ends when the ball is in play, even though time expires during the play. If the time runs out during a play on which a touchdown is scored, the Try-for-Point is completed. The period also is extended to permit completion of a play free of penalty, if a defensive team fouls on a play during which time expires. No such extension of the period applies when the team in possession fouls or when both teams foul on the play.

**SECTION 5—The Game Clock.** This item can be more vital to the outcome of a football game than a timer is to a soft-boiled egg. It may be a stopwatch operated by the Field Judge or Back Judge, or it may be an electrically powered field clock operated by an assistant.

The clock first starts when a Kickoff is legally caught or touched. Thus, if a Kickoff goes out of bounds the clock is not started, since the ball was not legally touched or caught.

On scrimmage plays, the clock is started when the ball is snapped or on prior signal by the Referee.

The clock is stopped (a) when the Referee declares time out; (b) when a Touchdown, Field Goal, Safety or Touchback is made; (c) when a Penalty is called; (d) when a Forward Pass falls incomplete; (e) when a Fair Catch is made or when the ball is illegally touched; (f) when a live ball goes out of bounds; (g) when a first down is declared for either team; and (h) when a period ends.

The clock does not run during a Try-for-Point.

**SECTION 6—Time Outs.** Each team is permitted three free time outs in each half, except that a team may not request two of its time outs consecutively. Free time outs may not exceed one and one-half minutes.

During a free time out, one player at a time may go to the sidelines to confer with the coaches.

The Referee has the authority to call time out for a contingency

such as the repair of damaged equipment which might become dangerous, or quieting the crowd when a team can not hear its signals. He also orders time out during measurement for a first down.

The clock is stopped for each time out.

After its third time out in each half, a team may be allowed a subsequent time out only for the replacement of an injured player and such an excess time out is no longer than the Referee deems necessary for the purpose.

**SECTION 7—Delays.** If a team is not ready for play at the scheduled time for the beginning of each half, it is penalized 15 yards. Failure to promptly remove an injured player is interpreted as delaying the game and is subject to a 5-yard penalty.

But the most common form of delay is action or inaction representing "stalling" tactics by a team attempting to consume time, usually near the end of either half of the game. A 5-yard penalty is invoked whenever the offensive team fails to put the ball in play within 25 seconds after it has been declared ready for play by the Referee. Also, when the Referee believes a team is trying to consume (or conserve) time by unfair tactics, he may order the clock started (or stopped).

**SECTION 8—Substitutions.** The controversial "free substitution" rule in college football is not quite literally that, because no more than two substitutes may enter the game except at specified times. However, present rules are so generous in this respect as to approximate "free" substitution.

The occasions on which any number of substitutes may enter the game include: (a) between periods; (b) after a score or try-for-point; (c) when the ball changes hands after a series of downs or (d) when, following a kick, the kicking team is awarded a first down.

Substitutions may not be made while the ball is in play and a substitute who enters the game may not be withdrawn until one down has intervened, a foul occurs or the period ends.

Even more liberalized or restrictive substitution rules may be adopted in Prep School and High School games.



## Rule Four

# BALL IN PLAY, DEAD BALL, OUT OF BOUNDS

SECTION 1—"Alive" if in Play. The proverbial cat with nine lives was a piker compared to the ball used in a football game. It may be "live" one minute and "dead" the next and then, without fanfare, it

becomes live again, dead again time and time again in the course of a game. And if the sweet young thing with the pom-pon asks if a live ball might race away under its own power, you'll just have to set her straight. Football, remember, has its own language.

After a dead ball has been declared ready for play by the Referee, it becomes a live ball when it is snapped or free kicked. A ball loses its "life" and becomes "dead" in many ways, including when an official blows his whistle accidentally.

SECTION 2—When Ball is Declared Dead. Generally speaking, the ball is "blown dead" by an official, signifying the end of a play:

- a. When it goes out of bounds or touches the goal line of the ball carrier's opponents, or when a ball carrier is so held that his forward progress is stopped;
- When any part of the ball carrier's body, other than his hand or foot, touches the ground (except it remains alive when held for a placekick, even though the ball holder's knee is on the ground);
- c. When a touchdown, field goal, safety, touchback or try-for-point has been made, or when a fair catch has been made;
- d. When the defensive team gains possession of the ball on a tryfor-point, or when the try fails to score;

- e. When the kicking team recovers a kick that has crossed the neutral zone;
- f. When a kick comes to rest on the ground and no player attempts to recover it;
- g. When a forward pass strikes the ground, or is caught simultaneously by opposing players;
- h. When a backward pass or fumble is recovered by an opponent after the ball has hit the ground;
- i. When a live ball touches anything inbounds other than a player, an official or the ground;
- j. When a backward pass or fumble is caught simultaneously by opposing players;

**SECTION 3—The 25-Seconds Rule.** The ball, once dead, may not be put back in play until the Referee declares it ready for play. It then must be put in play within 25 seconds.

**SECTION 4—Out of Bounds.** A play is out of bounds when a player—or the ball in his possession—touches a boundary line or anything on or beyond it except an official or another player. A free ball (except a scoring kick) or a forward pass is out of bounds when it touches the ground or anything else on or outside a boundary line.

The point where the ball crossed the sideline determines where it went out of bounds. If a player with the ball in his possession is tackled with part of his person out of bounds but the ball remains within the playing field, the ball is ruled out of bounds at the farthest point of its advance.



### Rule Five

# SERIES OF DOWNS, LINE TO GAIN

So universally accepted is the word "down" in football that it often is taken for granted and implied, rather than stated—as in "third and three." To followers this means third down and three yards to go.

**SECTION 1—When Series is Awarded.** A down always is one play in a set of four, known as a "series of downs," because when a team comes into possession of the ball (usually by receiving a kick, intercepting a pass or recovering a fumble), it is awarded four downs in which to gain the required ten yards or more to continue possession, and to be awarded another series of four downs.

This, of course, is the significance of the familiar "first and ten," which is simply football shorthand for first down and ten yards to go. The 10-yard distance to be gained is measured from the ball's most forward point and that target (officially termed but seldom called "the line to gain") is kept in view along the sideline by a yardage chain.

Associated with the chain is a down indicator. It is an ancient and revered device now primarily for the information of nearby officials and players, since scoreboards generally serve this purpose better for everyone else in the stadium.

**SECTION 2—When Series is Renewed.** A legal advance to or beyond the "line to gain" may be made in one down, or in any number through four downs. When the yardage requirement has been met,

the team in possession is awarded a new series of four downs and the "line to gain" is advanced ten yards. This, universally but unofficially, is known as "making a first down," as distinguished from a first down inherited when the ball changes hands.

**SECTION 3—When Series is Broken.** A team that fails to gain the required ten yards in a full series of four downs must relinquish the ball to the opposing team at the point where the fourth down play ends. To assure the turnover of possession at the most advantageous possible point on the field, the strategem most often employed is a fourth-down kick.

**SECTION 4—First and Goal.** One of the most conspicuous omissions of the word "down" is in the situation usually called "first and goal." It means a team has made (or inherited) a brand new series of downs less than 10 yards from its opponents' goal line, hence first down and goal (instead of 10 yards) to go.

**SECTION 5—Penalty Interruption of Series.** The Official Rules cover in detail various tricky situations a Referee must unravel when a penalty intrudes on a series of downs. Unless you plan to don a striped shirt, all you will be interested in knowing are these basic facts:

- a. A penalty moving the ball to or beyond the "line to gain" earns a first down the same as a run or pass play.
- b. Most yardage penalties simply cancel the play during which foul occurred and that down is repeated from the new spot (unless a first down was earned by the penalty yardage).
- c. It's also a "do over" when both teams commit fouls during a single play (called offsetting fouls), except there is an option when the ball changes possession in such a situation (Rule 10, Section 2).
- d. However, if a penalty is declined by the team against which the foul was committed, it is the penalty that is canceled and the play and down count as if the foul had never occurred.



#### Rule Six

### **KICKS**

EDITOR'S NOTE-From the sketchy history of the origin of football, we know only that the kick was the very foundation of the early-day game. Without it, the ball could not have been moved, since there were no provisions for carrying the ball.

Research by Herbert O. (Fritz) Crisler of the University of Michigan, perma-

nent member of the Football Rules Committee, has brought to light the first running play of record. It was illegal, and more than fifty years passed before the American version of that run was introduced into football.

The incident took place in 1823 at Rugby School in England under "Association" football rules and William Webb Ellis, the original forgotten man of football, made the run. Near the close of the engagement, "he caught the ball and instead of kicking it back as required by the rules, ran through the astonished opposition across the goal line." Today, on an ivy-covered wall at Rugby, a tablet marks his place in football history.

THIS STONE COMMEMORATES THE EXPLOIT OF WILLIAM WEBB ELLIS WHO WITH FINE DISREGARD FOR THE RULES OF FOOTBALL FIRST TOOK THE BALL IN HIS ARMS AND RAN WITH IT THUS ORIGINATING THE DISTINCTIVE FEATURE OF THE RUGBY GAME . . . A.D. 1823.

Thus, apparently, were sown the seeds of our running game which now, with the pass, shares emphasis with the kick. But the booted ball, the subject matter of Rule 6, never has ceased to be a basic part of football.

**SECTION 1—Free Kicks [Kickoffs].** The most familiar Free Kick—requiring both teams to remain behind their respective restraining lines until the ball is kicked—is the kickoff (see Definitions, Rule 2, Section 3). For the kicking team, the restraining line is its own 40-yard line (unless relocated by penalty) and the receiving team's restraining line is ten yards beyond (usually the 50-yard line).

Much rarer is the Free Kick after a safety is scored, when the restraining line for the kicking team is its 20-yard line, with the

receiving team's restraining line at the 30-yard line.

The ball is placed on the kicking team's restraining line and all of its players except the kicker and the holder of the ball on a place-kick must stay behind the ball until it is kicked. This exception legalizes the "soccer-type" kickoff.

The receiving team not only must keep all its players behind its restraining line, but also must have at least five of them within five yards of that line. This might be termed the "anti-flying-wedge" rule, because it is what prevents the receiving team from forming a solid mass of blockers around its receiver.

**SECTION 2—Free Kick Recovery.** No player of the kicking team may touch a free kick before it either reaches the opponents' restraining line (i.e., travels at least ten yards) or is touched by a player of the receiving team. Thus, when a trailing team attempts an "onside" kickoff (usually in a game's waning moments), the trick is to kick the ball a minimum distance over ten yards and try to recover it before the opposition does. If the ball is touched before it has traveled ten yards, the kicking team is "offside" and the opponents are awarded possession at that spot.

A player of the receiving team may run with a free kick (unless a fair catch was signalled), but a player of the kicking team cannot advance a recovered free kick.

If a ball rolls dead on a free kick, i.e., no one attempts to take possession, it belongs to the receiving team. And for the first time in 1972, an untouched kickoff into the receiving team's end zone automatically belongs to the receiving team, and is a touchback. Previously, the kicking team scored a touchdown by recovering an untouched kickoff in opponents' end zone.

**SECTION 3—Kickoff Out of Bounds.** When a kickoff (or any free kick) goes out of bounds untouched, the receiving team may either (a) take possession where it went out of bounds or (b) require the kicking team to accept a 5-yard penalty and kick again (this time from its own 35-yard line, if kickoff was from the 40).

whether punts, placekicks or dropkicks—have no restraining line for either team except the line of scrimmage. Either a punt or a placekicked field goal attempt is the common fourth down strategy of an offensive team that has failed to make the necessary ten yards in three of its series of four downs.

If a scrimmage kick (except the try-for-point) fails to cross the scrimmage line, whether blocked by an opponent or for other reason, any player may recover and advance the ball. But once the ball has crossed the scrimmage line, no player of the kicking team may recover the ball before it touches an opponent. If the kicking team touches the ball first, possession is awarded to the receiving team at the spot, and the ball becomes dead.

A scrimmage kick that strikes the ground in the receiving team's end zone before being touched by a player of the receiving team is immediately dead and it's a touchback.

Otherwise, as with free kicks, the receiving team may advance any scrimmage kick it recovers or catches (unless a fair catch was signalled), but not so the kicking team. A scrimmage kick that goes out of bounds belongs to the receiving team at that point.


**SECTION 5—Opportunity to Catch a Kick.** A player of the receiving team who is in position to catch a kick may not be interfered with by the kicking team while the ball is in flight. This protection terminates, however, the moment he or a teammate touches the ball.

**SECTION 6—Fair Catch.** A fair catch signal—arm extended clearly over head—gives a player the right to make an unmolested attempt to catch the ball without fear of being blocked or tackled after the catch. As his part of the bargain, the kick receiver's fair-catch signal "promises" he will not attempt to run with the ball.

When a fair catch is made, the ball is dead at the spot of the catch and the receiver incurs a 5-yard penalty if he takes more than two steps after the catch. If a player of the kicking team tackles or blocks an opponent who has made a fair catch, he incurs a 15-yard penalty.

A player who signals for a fair catch is not obligated to attempt the catch, but if he does not, he must not block an opponent on the play (enforced by a 15-yard penalty).





# SNAPPING AND PASSING THE BALL

SECTION 1—The Scrimmage. The action starts with the kickoff, but the tempo usually increases with the "scrimmage"
that follows the kickoff. The
scrimmage literally is the heart
of the game—the means

through which the power, the finesse and the deception of the game are set in motion and the defense thrown into gear. It starts with the teams facing each other across a narrow strip of No Man's Land about 11 inches wide. The snap of the ball sets in motion a play that may be a run, a pass or a kick.

The scrimmage play must start between the hash marks (inbound lines)—within the center-third of the field's width. It need not end there, but if it does not, the Referee must move the ball back into the area between the hash marks before the next play begins.

The Center, officially known as the snapper, may not move the ball or change his stance after he has taken his position for the snap. Nor may any of his teammates make any movement feigning the start of play. Players on defense need not remain stationary before the snap of the ball, but they may not touch the ball, cross or encroach on the neutral zone or make contact with an opponent. A substitute who is entering the game must be within 15 yards of the ball before it is snapped.

**SECTION 2—Scrimmage Formation.** At the snap of the ball, at least seven members of the offensive team must be on the line of scrimmage. Five of these players must wear numbers from 50 through 79. This permits the officials to quickly identify players who are NOT

eligible to receive a forward pass and who, accordingly, are prohibited from going downfield before a pass is thrown.

Those players on the offensive team who are not required to be on the line of scrimmage when the ball is snapped must be at least one yard behind it, with this exception; One player, usually the quarterback who first receives the ball from center, may be less than one yard from the line of scrimmage at the time of the snap. It is legal, however, for the center to snap the ball directly to another back. And it is permissible for one offensive player to be in motion immediately before the snap, but the "man in motion" must run laterally or toward his own goal, not toward his opponents.

**SECTION 3—Shift Plays.** If the snap is preceded by a huddle or a shift (simultaneous movement of two or more players), all offensive players must come to an absolute stop and remain stationary for one full second before the ball is snapped.

An offensive player who is behind the scrimmage line may hand the ball forward to a teammate who also is behind the line.

SECTION 4—Backward Pass and Fumble. A ball carrier may hand or pass the ball backward at any time and a backward pass or fumble may be caught or recovered by any player. If caught in flight by an inbounds player, the ball continues in play, but if recovered after the ball hits the ground, only the offensive team may advance it.

When a backward pass or fumble goes out of bounds or is caught or recovered simultaneously by opposing players, the ball becomes dead at that spot and belongs to the team last in possession.

SECTION 5—The Forward Pass. The offensive team may make one forward pass during each scrimmage down, but it must be thrown before the passer advances beyond the neutral zone. The defensive team may not throw a forward pass, nor may the offensive team intentionally ground a pass in an effort to avoid the risk of interception or to conserve time.

**SECTION 6—Eligibility to Catch Pass.** All defensive players are eligible to catch (intercept) a forward pass, but only six offensive players (including the passer) may do so. They are those wearing numbers other than 50 through 79, normally the two ends and four backs. However, when a defensive player touches a forward pass, all players become eligible.

Ineligible pass receivers (including numbers 50 through 79) may not advance beyond the neutral zone until the pass is thrown.

**SECTION 7—Completed Pass.** A forward pass is completed when the ball is caught by an eligible offensive player who is inbounds, and the ball continues in play. It also is completed when caught simultaneously by opposing players but, although the passing team is awarded the ball, it may not advance it.

**SECTION 8—Incompleted Pass.** A forward pass is incomplete when it strikes the ground or goes out of bounds. It also is incomplete if a receiver jumps to catch the pass and comes down with a foot on or outside a boundary line (sideline or endline) before one of his feet or his body touches in bounds. On an incomplete pass, possession remains with the passing team at the previous scrimmage spot.

**SECTION 9—Pass Interference.** Contact by an opponent which interferes with an eligible receiver (defensive players included) beyond the neutral zone, is pass interference. However, players are not guilty of interference when making a simultaneous and bona fide effort to reach the ball.

Pass interference by a defensive player gives the offensive team the ball and a first down at the spot of the foul (on the 1-yard line, if foul is in end zone). Offensive interference costs a down and 15 yards, if foul occurs in the field of play. If it occurs in the defensive team's end zone, it may be ruled a touchback, thus loss of possession by the passing team.



# Rule Eight

#### **SCORING**

SECTION 1—Value of Scores. The game of football blends brain and brawn to a degree unknown in any other sport, and its offensive and defensive maneuvers have increased in complexity from season to sea-

son throughout the game's 103-year history. Yet its scoring values have remained remarkably simple. They are:

Touchdown	6	Points
Field Goal		Points

That's all, except that a forfeited game (the rarest of occurrences in the case of football) is scored as 1-0 against the forfeiting team. A 1-0 score is possible in no other football situation.

**SECTION 2—Touchdown.** A touchdown, carrying a value of six points, is scored when a player is in legal possession of the ball when it—NOT the player—is on, above or beyond the opponents' goal line. If the ball carrier is thrown or falls on his opponents' 1-yard line and slides across the goal line, it is NOT a touchdown unless the ball's forward point was on or above the goal line at the moment his body hit the ground.

SECTION 3—Try-for-Point(s) After Touchdown. The Try-for-Point(s), also known as the conversion, is a "bonus" opportunity granted a team that has just scored a touchdown to add to its

total by one or two points, while time is out. The attempt is a scrimmage play from the opponents' 3-yard line. A placekick or dropkick clearing the crossbar between the opponents' goal posts earns one extra point. Two points are added by a legally completed forward pass or a running play that advances to or beyond the opponents' goal line.

Following the Try-for-Point(s), play is resumed by a kickoff, with the option of kicking or receiving being exercised by the Field Captain of the team against which the touchdown was scored.

**SECTION 4—Field Goal.** The three points awarded for a successful field goal are earned by a placekick or a dropkick that clears the crossbar between the opponents' goal posts before it strikes the ground or a player of the kicking team. It is a scrimmage play and a field goal may not be scored on a kickoff.

A ball that clears the crossbar between the uprights, but is blown back over the crossbar, does not score a field goal.

As following a Try-for-Point(s), the Field Captain of the team scored against designates which team is to kick off following a successful field goal.

**SECTION 5—Safety and Touchback.** When the ball becomes dead in an end zone, whether out of bounds or in the possession of a defending player, it is ruled either a touchback (which scores no points) or a safety (two points). The determining factor is the impetus that sent the ball into the end zone.

If a team attacking a goal is responsible, it is a touchback and the defending team takes over the ball on its 20-yard line.

But if the ball becomes dead in an end zone as result of a kick, pass, snap, fumble or run (accidental or intentional) with the ball in possession of the team defending that goal, it is a safety, which scores two points for its opponents.

Following a safety, the defending team (having just yielded two points), must put the ball into play from its own 20-yard line by a free kick, which may be a punt, dropkick or placekick.



# CONDUCT OF PLAYERS AND OTHERS

SECTION 1—Limited Violence. If you bruise easily, football probably is not your competitive sport. The game involves the hurtling together of human bodies, often weighing 250 pounds or more and moving at

utmost speed. But this is not wanton violence. Unnecessary roughness, unfair tactics and unsportsmanlike conduct are severely penalized and specified protections are provided for situations in which players are unable to protect themselves adequately. All persons affiliated with the teams are subject to the rules, even if not involved in the game.

**SECTION 2—Personal Fouls.** A loss of 15 yards, plus disqualification of the offender in flagrant situations, is the penalty for these acts of unnecessary roughness identified as personal fouls:

- a. Kicking, kneeing or striking an opponent with a fist, extended forearm, elbow or locked hands.
- b. Striking an opponent's head, neck or face with the heel, back or side of the open hand.
- c. Tripping or clipping an opponent (except that clipping is not a foul within a specified, immediate area of the scrimmage line).
- d. Piling on, falling on or throwing the body on an opponent after the ball becomes dead.
- e. Tackling a ball carrier when he is clearly out of bounds or throwing a ball carrier to the ground after the ball becomes dead.
- f. Running into an opponent obviously out of the play.
- g. Hurdling, or grasping the face mask of an opponent.
- h. Using the helmet or head to maliciously butt an opponent.

**SECTION 3—Roughing Kicker or Placekick Holder.** The same stiff penalty protects the punter and kick holder from rough treatment as they concentrate on their demanding assignments. However, contact with the kicker is forgiven when a punt or placekick is blocked, since this is attacking the ball rather than the man.

**SECTION 4—Interference Fouls.** Other applications of the 15-yards, possible-disqualification penalty are for fouls that interfere with orderly game progress and administration:

- a. Interference with the ball or a player by a substitute or any personnel on the field illegally. (When a reasonably assured touchdown play is thus interfered with, the touchdown is awarded.)
- b. Use of abusive or insulting language to officials or players.
- c. Use of words or signals by the defense to disconcert opponents preparing to put the ball in play.
- d. Concealing the ball beneath clothing or substituting anything for the ball.
- e. Failure of a player to return the ball to an official immediately after a score or at any other time.

**SECTION 5—Blocking Yes, Holding No.** One of the more frequently assessed penalties is the loss of 15 yards for "holding." This is because of the fine line between illegal holding and legal blocking. The latter is using the body to remove an opponent from the path of the play. It becomes holding when an offensive blocker uses a hand or forearm, unless the hand is kept in contact with the blocker's body and below the opponent's shoulders. It also is holding when an offensive player uses his arms to hook, lock, clamp, encircle or lift an opponent. The same restrictions apply to a defensive player only when he is not attempting to get to the ball or ball carrier. Blocking must be an individual effort, i.e., teammates may not grasp one another for interlocked blocking.

**SECTION 6—Batting and Kicking.** Unlike baseball, batting generally is frowned on in football. In this game, it means striking the ball with the hand or forearm, which is legal only while a forward pass or scrimmage kick is in flight. And even though the game is football, it is illegal to deliberately kick a free ball, forward pass or a ball being held for a placekick by an opponent.



### Rule Ten

# PENALTY ENFORCEMENT

SECTION 1—Referee Presides. While all football officials are responsible for enforcing the rules, the Referee's role is the dominant one. Figuratively, he is the presiding judge and chief law enforcement officer. He

has general supervision over the game and his decisions on matters not specifically assigned to other officials are final.

Before a penalty is enforced, the Referee explains the penalty options or alternatives to the Field Captain of the offended team. A penalty is completed only when it is accepted or declined, or when it is canceled because of offsetting fouls.

SECTION 2—Field Captain Accepts or Declines. The role of the Field Captain is unique in football, the one game in which the automatic assessment of a penalty against the opponents would be to the disadvantage of the offended team that has achieved its objective despite the foul.

A striking example is when a team has completed a touchdown play on which the defenders fouled. In such a situation, the Field Captain's choice is simplicity itself. He declines the penalty, since its assessment would erase the successful play. A more difficult decision would be whether to accept a 5-yard penalty against the opposition (without expending a down) or to decline and retain a 7-yard gain on the play (at cost of a down).

Any penalty may be accepted or declined by the offended team's Field Captain, but a disqualified player must leave the game in any case. If opponents are charged with two or more fouls on the same play, the Referee explains the alternative penalties to the

Field Captain, who may then elect only one of them.

Usually no option exists when fouls are committed by both teams on the same play. Such offsetting fouls cancel each other and the down is replayed automatically. However, if the ball changes possession during such a play, the team last gaining possession may decline the offsetting fouls and retain possession, after the penalty for its own transgression is assessed.

**SECTION 3**—Enforcement Procedures. A Referee's lot is not an easy one, as attested by the complex enforcement procedures spelled out by this section of the Official Football Rules. For the rest of us, fortunately, awareness of these basic principles should be sufficient:

- a. No distance penalty may be more than half the distance to the goal, thus assuring that a score cannot be achieved by a penalty. For example, what would normally be a 15-yard penalty is assessed as only five yards when the enforcement spot is the offending team's 10-yard line, or only a half yard if enforced from the 1-yard line.
- b. If the defensive team fouls during a successful try-for-point(s), the offensive team's Field Captain may either (1) accept the point(s) scored, with the distance of penalty assessed against opponents immediately prior to the ensuing kickoff; or (2) choose to replay the try-for-point(s). The latter option might be exercised if the scoring team should decide to try for two points (from the 1½-yard line) instead of the one point it had made (from the 3-yard line).

**SECTION 4—Summary of Penalties.** The Official Football Rules book lists a total of 83 penalties (with some cross indexing), among which the most often encountered probably are:

LOSS OF 5 YARDS—Offside, illegal procedure, illegal motion, illegal shift, substitution infraction, delay of game and (incurring also loss of a down) intentionally grounded or illegal forward pass.

LOSS OF 15 YARDS—Personal foul, clipping, roughing the kicker or holder, unsportsmanlike conduct (chiefly non-contact fouls), illegal use of hands and arms, ineligible receiver downfield and (incurring also loss of a down) forward pass illegally touched and offensive forward pass interference (the penalty for defensive forward pass interference awards the ball to the offended team at the spot of the foul).
