

# Even If '73 Freshmen Match '72 Crop, What Team Can Stem The Trojan Tide?

It's that time when college football buffs begin their annual search for

new trends.

Down through the modern football years, meaning the post-World War II period, the game has gone full circle on emphasis. From time to time, since offensive and defensive specialists came in, there has been emphasis, or over-emphasis, on running, passing, balanced mixture and the various kinds of options, not to forget the cutely-named wishbone-T.

Defensively, changes are unceasing, all aimed at frustrating every offen-

sive innovation.

LAST YEAR, THERE WAS justifiable pre-season debate, not over new stratagems but whether the new freshmen-eligible rule would help the varsities at major football institutions. Most coaches took an understandably dim view of the possibilities. Most had preached for years that sophomores inevitably made mistakes, which turned games the wrong way. So how could naive teenagers, fresh out of high school, create enough significant impact? If you can't trust a sophomore, how can you have faith in a freshman, except in isolated cases?

The coaches, not for the first time, were wrong. Some freshmen made big time teams right from the start. Others edged into the starting lineup as the season were on. By season's end, these children were dotting the starting 22's in every class of football. Hardly a school was without some.

If this created coaches' embarrassment, it wasn't noticeable. The kids unquestionably had talent. Now we'll know shortly whether what happened

When last seen, the prolific Burick was looking for encores. in 1972 was created by coincidence, unusual skills, or by an absence of skills among upperclass players. Chances are there will be more freshmen playing. Some may be good enough to replace sophomores who made unexpected headlines as freshmen.

THE 1972 season saw Southern Cal emerge as the absolute, undisputed national champion. John McKay'sTrojans capped a 12-0 season with a second-half surge that routed Ohio State in the Rose Bowl.

So the question for 1973 is, "Where is there a college team in the

country capable of supplanting the Trojans?"

That's no patsy schedule USC will be playing. There are the customary seven games in the Pacific-8 Conference, and before launching league warfare, McKay, whose Rose Bowl victory was No. 100 for his career, must send the Trojans against three major intersectional opponents-Arkansas, Georgia Tech and Oklahoma, last year's second-best team which will be out to achieve great things in the wake of the Kerry Jackson eligibility case which made the Sooners forfeit nine 1972 victories in April.

OKLAHOMA WILL HAVE THE ADVANTAGE of playing its games against Southern Cal at home, and so will Notre Dame, the Trojans' mid-season opponent.

McKay looks at the suggestion of an encore with customary optimism, despite such losses as Sam (Over the Top) Cunningham, all-America tight

end Charles Young and first-team quarterback Mike Rae.

There is apparently no worry on the future of Anthony Davis, who ran for 1,191 yards and scored 19 touchdowns as a sophomore, six of them in a

one-man show against Notre Dame. Davis, although injured in a January freeway accident, is expected to come all the way back.

Pat Haden, Rae's backup man as a sophomore, still threw for 468 yards and seven TD's, all with a now-healed sore throwing shoulder. McKay has no qualms about Haden.

All of which makes USC the team to beat again, not only for Pac-8 honors, but for the national championship


as well.

COMPETITION IN the Pacific-8 will come mainly from UCLA, where Pepper Rodgers installed the wishbone-T to turn a 2-7-1 record in 1971 around to 8-3 last season, including a startling upset of Nebraska. Tom Harmon's boy Mark is back at quarterback among other returning regulars for the Bruins.

Stanford expects better days after a 2-5 conference mark. California. with a veteran team, is more optimistic; and Washington, a disappointment in 1972, looks for improvement even with quarterback Sonny Sixkiller

graduated.

No conference dominated football in 1972 in the manner of the Big Eight in 1971. If the purpose of the last season was to break up this car-tel of influence, the rest of the football world almost triumphed. Of the Big Eight's national Big Three, only

Oklahoma held its position, second. Nebraska had to settle for fourth, while four-time loser Colorado slipped all the way to 16th.

Texas finished third, and the rest of the Top Ten included Auburn, Michigan, Alabama, Tennessee, Ohio State and Penn State, none exactly a stranger to upper-crust living.

And the truth is that based on long-term prospects, not many changes appear too likely . . . except that unpredictability is the name of the game.

The Big Ten put two teams in the Top Ten last year, proving that despite problems against other conferences in recent years (including four straight Rose Bowl losses), there's still strength in the league.

If strength has been concentrated in Michigan and Ohio State, so be it. Controversial Woody Hayes continues to defy the one-time Ohio State reputation as a "graveyard of coaches." Coming up is season No. 23.

At Michigan, Bo Schembechler, who played for Woody at Miami, Ohio, and coached for him at Ohio State, has brought back the old power to the Wolverines. Bo's football is not much different from Woody's brand. Both know a good thing and stick to it. And both produce stadium-filling teams, which usually play for the Big Ten title and the Rose Bowl on the final Saturday of the conference season.

Things aren't likely to be different this time. They will put more or less familiar personnel on the field. Ohio State returns two all-Americas-linebacker Randy Gradishar and offensive tackle John Hicks. Michigan's senior fullback, Ed Shuttlesworth is a prime candidate.

New coaches at four institutions, two switching within the league, should

### NATIONAL CHAMPIONS, 1924-1972

Don't be surprised if Southern Cal wins the unofficial national championship in . . . 1977. Coach John McKay's Trojans seem to win it all ever five years — 1962, 1967 and 1972. Both wire services, Associated Press (writers) and United Press International (coaches), voted USC No. 1, as did the Football Writers'

Association of America.

It was USC's fifth national crown (the first two, 1928 and 1931, were coached by Howard Jones). Only Notre Dame with eight has won more since 1924. And Pacific-8 teams have won seven, runnerup to the Big Ten's 15.

In terms of national titles won, the top coaches since 1924 have been Notre Dame's Frank Leahy and Minnesota's Bernie Bierman, with four each, McKay is one of five coaches who have won three national titles each.

The AP poll was originated in 1936, the UPI poll in 1950, Prior to the polls, the Rissman (1924-30) and Knute Rockne (1931-35) trophies symbolized the championships. Here's the list of titlists:

Notre Dame and Oklahoma have been the nation's most successful majors in 37 years of wire-service polls. Counting 10 points for each first, 9 for second and so on, the Irish have 151 points, the Sooners 120, Over the last 10 seasons, five teams and coaches have dominated the rankings: Texas (Darrell Royal) 51 points, Alabama (Bear Bryant) 50, Nebraska (Bob Devaney) 46, Notre Dame (Ara Parseghian) 45 and Southern Cal (John McKay) 40. add to Big Ten uncertainty. The only pure rookie is Lee Corso, whose Louisville team ranked 18th in the nation last year, setting up his jump to Indiana. The other "newcomers" are Alex Agase, switching to Purdue from Northwestern; Johnny Pont, shifting from Indiana to Northwestern, and Dennis Stolz, Michigan State assistant who replaced Duffy Daugherty.

Life will be more uncertain in the Big Eight, too, with new coaches running the show at Nebraska, Oklahoma, Iowa State and Oklahoma State. The leaders, Oklahoma and Nebraska, both were hit by graduation, which is a handicap sometimes met in this league by redshirts coming up.

Iowa State's Earle Bruce, another of Woody Hayes' ex-aides, has inherited a good nucleus as Johnny Majors' replacement. Bob Devaney finally retired to the Nebraska athletic directorship, naming Tom Osborne as his coaching successor. Ex-assistant Barry Switzer is the new chief at Oklahoma. And former aide Jim Stanley is Oklahoma State's new head man.

Does it come as a surprise that Bear Bryant is expected to have another winner at Alabama? Of course not. The Crimson Tide has dropped only one regular season game in two years. Principal competition should come from Tennessee, Auburn and LSU.

In the Southwest Conference, the signs point toward Texas to make it six straight titles. The Longhorns did better than expected a year ago and have enough of a nucleus left, especially on defense, to prevail again.

Arkansas could come back, but early ratings put Texas Tech in a stronger role, and SMU's new coach, Dave Smith, found some surprisingly good material left behind. Texas A&M also appears to be moving up in the world.

The strong Texas independent is Houston, which gets full SWC membership in 1976. The Cougars will be hard to score on, considering ten regulars return to the defense. They also have seven offensive returnees.

On the Atlantic Coast, a coach can't do much better than Bill Dooley has done since going to North Carolina six years ago. His Tar Heels will be co-favored to wrap up their third ACC crown in succession. His team lost

much of its offense to graduation, but has defensive experience.

Strong competition is expected from North Carolina State, where the coach, Lou Holtz, is another of Woody Hayes' ex-assistants (the woods are full of them). Holtz has nine starters returning from his offense, not the least of whom is Bruce Shaw, the quarterback, who suffered a broken arm last season. Also back is Stan Fritts, who scored 124 points, and Dave Buckey, a freshman who played a vital role as Shaw's substitute in the Peach Bowl, a 49-13 walkover against West Virginia.

In the Southern Conference, Richmond is favored to return as champion

after finishing behind East Carolina in 1972.

Georgia Tech, of the independent ranks, gets a quick test of where it will stand nationally by trying Southern Cal for openers. The Ramblin' Wreck has Jim Stevens back. He's the one who stepped into the quarterback breach and led Tech to its surprise victory over Iowa State in the Liberty Bowl. Gone from Florida State are all-America quarterback Gary Huff and his favorite receivers, but 25 lettermen return.

NO NEW COACH FACES A MORE DIFFICULT schedule than Pete Elliott at Miami of Florida. How about a schedule that includes Texas, Notre Dame, Oklahoma, Alabama, Syracuse, Florida, Florida State and Houston? It makes

a man sweat just to think of it.

Paul Dietzel has not found consistent success at South Carolina, and this may be another trial-and-error year for the Gamecocks. Tampa starts with its third head coach in as many years, but Dennis Fryzel won't find a football player as good as John Matuszak. Southern Mississippi will miss all-America specialist Ray Guy, who made the Football Writers' team for his punting and field goal kicking last year.

Down East, it is about as surprising as tomorrow's sunrise to suggest that Joe Paterno will have another big year at Penn State. This is the hardy perennial of football in that part of the country, the strong independent that usually is ranked in the Top Ten, often gets an important bowl assign-

ment and more often than not comes up with all-Americas.

SOMEHOW, PATERNO MANAGES to find replacements for the big ones he loses. Much will depend this time on quarterback Tom Schuman's skills in

John Hufnagel's spot. Running back John Cappelletti returns.

Long-time power Syracuse, a loser in 1972 for the first time since 1949, may not give coach Ben Schwartzwalder as pleasant a going-away gift as he'd like. Ben is quitting after this season, rounding out 25 Syracuse years as head coach.

Johnny Majors is Pitt's new head coach. This time Pitt's policy of limited scholarships (25 a year) has been scrapped. Eighteen lettermen are back, which would be impressive if they hadn't participated in a season that brought ten defeats for the Pitt Panthers.

GEORGE WELSH, long-time aide to Paterno, is Navy's new football "admiral." Army lost 29 lettermen from its strange 6-4 season that included borrible losses to Pen State and Nebraska.

Dartmouth has won four consecutive Ivy titles, but coach Jake Crouthamel's pessimism comes from the 31 football players in the last graduating class. Yale, Cornell and Penn see improvement in the offing.

Out in the Rockies, the problem is the same. If you are a fellow member

of the Western Athletic Conference, how do you stop winning coach Frank Kush and his Arizona State Sun Devils? They've won the WAC title four years in a row, have gone to bowls the last three seasons, and despite Kush's annual litany of despair, they are again the team to beat.

KUSH STARTS OUT THIS SEASON with 21 lettermen, including all-America

running back Woody Green and productive quarterback Danny White.

Utah is given the best chance of catching the Sun Devils, with 16 returning regulars including quarterback Don Van Galder and speedy flanker Steve Odom. A new coach, Jim Young, takes over a veteran Arizona team.

Independent Air Force, with eight straight winning seasons, should be a winner again if the defense shapes up. Utah State's new head man, Phil Krueger, must replace the Tony Adams-Tom Forzani air combo.

Louisville and Drake figure to battle for the Missouri Valley crown. An early-season matchup should help decide the eventual winner. Another preseason favorite, Memphis State, withdrew from the conference in June.

The Mid-American is another conference that often mixes favorably with the higher-ranking fellows. Until recent years, however, league strength was rarely spread around. Defending champion Kent State, Bowling Green, Miami, Toledo and Ohio University all look for good seasons in 1973.

OUT ON THE WEST COAST, the PCAA (for Pacific Coast Athletic Association) has a new candidate for conference honors in Pacific, 8-3 last year and winner of its last seven games. San Diego State is the other hot title candidate after winning last year while going 10-1.

So that's college football, 1973, a season without radical innovations, but one that should produce the usual excitement and upsets, which make the

game what it is.

## Eras Come And Go, But Life Styles The Same For Three Eastern Powers

One era will end. Another will begin. And a third may go on . . . and on . . . and on. The East is dotted with intriguing new football developments, but none of them is taking shape around University Park, Pa.

The rumor that eastern coaches were going to chip in whatever it might

cost to get Joe Paterno into professional football was not true.

But along toward November they may wish it had been.

Graduation has removed some of Paterno's best athletes, but that happens every year at Penn State and strong young strangers keep showing up to fill the gaps for Paterno.

THE SITUATION IS SIMILAR at Dartmouth, where the Indians will seek their fifth straight Ivy League championship with a team described as their

"most inexperienced" in 10 years.

And also at Delaware, where the Blue Hens must replace 15 starters

from a squad that won two national College Division titles in a row.

While those institutions concentrate on maintaining accustomed excellence, the University of Pittsburgh will again try to establish a style it would like to become accustomed to and Syracuse will watch the end of a quarter-century of gridiron guidance.

GONE FROM last year's squad, which won five and lost six, are all-America defensive tackle Joe Ehrmann, and the thump in Schwartzwalder's traditional ground game—Roger Praetorius and Marty Januszkiewicz.

could be brightened by quarterback Rob Sutton, receiver Brian Hambleton and running back Bob Barlette guiding the offense.

It would also help if the Orange could play every game in the concrete antique, Archbold Stadium. It won five of six there in '72. By old math

calculations, that leaves five defeats in five road games.

Pitt has opened numerous "new eras" in the last decade, all of them uniformly brief and disastrous. With a nine-year record of 22 victories and 68 defeats, the Panthers will have to move up a notch before they can even classify what they've been going through as a slump.

THIS TIME THEY FEEL THEY HAVE the formula to do much better than that. Johnny Majors, who took an embarrassing gridiron program at Iowa

State and made it respectable, is the new coach.

The usual talk about administration backing has been heard, but this time there is tangible evidence that Pitt is serious.

It has withdrawn from the Eastern "Big Four" which, among other

things, limited scholarships to 25 a year.

Majors will begin work with 18 starters from a 1972 team that was its

worst enemy while losing 10 of 11 games.

The Panthers' 11 leading rushers, 12 top pass receivers and eight leading scorers all return. And the top defensive veteran is 6-3, 238-pound Jim Buckman, an end who would have been pushed for all-America on anything but a team that lost 10 games.

MAJORS, A MAN IN A HURRY in a job that defied all recent efforts to plod

back to competence, also expects help from JC transfers.

A year ago West Virginia's sophomore-studded Mountaineers surprised everybody with total offense figures that sounded more like their zip code. If coach Bobby Bowden can find an adequate replacement for quarterback Bernie Galiffa and this season's sophs provide as much help as 1972's, he might well enjoy another 8-3 season.

Back is Danny (Lightning) Buggs, who averaged 19.5 yards gained every

time he touched the ball on passes, reverses and punt returns while con-

tributing heavily to a 36.5 points-per-game scoring figure.

If Buggs, who may be the best wide receiver in the country, can duplicate those figures, the Mountaineers, who played in the Peach Bowl last season and lost 49-13 to North Carolina State, will be a post-season fixture for the next couple of years.

If West Virginia's 1972 performance was a pleasant surprise, Boston

College's work was a bitter disappointment.

THE EAGLES WERE EXPLOSIVE but inconsistent as they won four and lost seven in a year that was supposed to be their biggest in a long time.

Coach Joe Yukica has most of his offensive line back, along with quarter-back Gary Marangi, receiver Mel Briggs and running backs Mike Esposito and Phil Bennett who accounted for 1,651 yards rushing.

An ineffective road team in the past, the Eagles will have to get tougher away from home as they take on Tulane, Texas A&M and Miami on foreign fields early in the '73 schedule.

Army's resilient Cadets had an amazing season in 1972, losing to Nebraska and Penn State by a cumulative score of 122-7 but still maintaining

enough dignity to finish 6-4 and beat Navy.

Coach Tom Cahill lost 29 lettermen, including leading rusher Bob Hines and nine defensive starters. Coming back are quarterback Kinglsey Fink and his best receivers, Jim Ward and Joe Miller.

Sophomores Pete Ramsberger and Willie Thigpen carried the ball only sparingly but will head up the returnees in the running slots. Up front,

there are three good linemen returning.

NAVY, WHICH BROKE ITS OWN total offense record last season, should move the ball well again, but a new head coach, George Welsh, will be trying to figure out how to stop the enemy from polishing their own vardage records at the same time.

Welsh, a former Navy all-America and an assistant under Joe Paterno at Penn State for the last 10 years, has never been associated with a loser

in 15 years of football coaching.

In attempting to turn the Navy program around, Welsh starts with Cleve-

land Cooper, a 1,000-yard rusher as a sophomore; receiver Bert Calland, who caught 61 passes, and Larry Van Loan, who could approach that figure

if he avoids the injuries that plagued him in 1972.

Meanwhile, back at Penn State, Paterno not only has to replace his longtime aide but one of the best quarterbacks Welsh helped develop, John Hufnagel. Gone, too, are two all-America defenders, end Bruce Bannon and linebacker John Skorupan.

IF PENN STATE PARTISANS are concerned about who is gone, their oppo-

nents' partisans are just as concerned about who is coming back.

John Cappelletti, a 1,000-yard rusher, is. So, too, are offensive tackle

Charley Getty and Dan Natale, one of the better tight ends around.

Fullback Tom Donchez, who was good enough to share the job with Franco Harris two years ago, is back and fully recovered from the injuries that cancelled 1972 for him.

If Tom Shuman can play quarterback, the Nittany Lions will again be shooting for the Top Ten and a major bowl game for the sixth time in

seven years. They've won three of the last five.

Dartmouth's Ivy League rivals can take heart from the fact that 31 lettermen are gone from a senior group that, including freshman games, compiled a career record of 31 victories, two defeats and one tie.

Just so they don't take too much heart, two-time all-Ivy defensive end Tom Csatari is back, along with such proven offensive players as running

back Bob Klupchak and Ellis Rowe.

MUCH WILL DEPEND ON SOPHOMORES, and as many as eight may start, that Jake Crouthamel will have to fit into his plans.

Prominent in the crowd waiting for Dartmouth to abdicate its position

in the throne room are Cornell, Yale and Penn.

Cornell is heavy with backfield talent. Its 29 lettermen include quarterback Mark Allen and its top three rushers, Dan Malone, Horace Bradshaw and Rich Russo. The defense is built around middle guard Mike Phillips and Bob Lally, who is 6-2, 215 pounds and considered the best Big Red linebacker since World War II.

Coach Jack Musick must find receivers for Allen's passes and some way

to make playing time for Malone, Bradshaw and Russo, any one of whom could handle the tailback job competently.

Penn surprised everybody in 1972 but has one problem. So many good

ones are coming back, it won't sneak up on anybody in 1973.

Adolph (Beep Beep) Bellizeare is the best of a flock of strong runners who will be administered to by quarterbacks Tom Pinto and Marc Mandel, both of whom won key games as starters a year ago.

YALE HAS 28 LETTER WINNERS BACK from a team that finished second last year, but its losses are large ones. Gone are such outstanding players as running back Dick Jauron, who set 10 Yale offensive records, split end Paul Sortal and defensive tackle Bob Leven.

Jauron's accomplishments become even more noteworthy considering the

fact a back named Calvin Hill worked for Yale not so long ago.

Rushing yardage should be no problem, however, with quarterback Tom Doyle and Tyrell Hennings and Rudy Green among the returnees.

Princeton has a new coach, Bob Casciola, an all-Ivy tackle in 1957. His first problem will be rebuilding what had been the strongest part of the '72 team, the defensive line.

Two veterans he can count on are Bill Cronin, a solid blocker who may be moved from tight end to guard, and Gary Marshall, a small but com-

bative safety.

Harvard's Joe Restic will be without 32 lettermen from a squad that broke even in league play last year. Ball control is his best bet. One of his most valuable players could be Jim Stoeckel, quarterback who also happens to be an all-Ivy punter.

STOECKEL CAME OFF THE BENCH to set two Harvard passing records in his debut during the 1971 Dartmouth game. He will have help in the backfield from senior Nick Leone, the school's 600-yard record holder indoors, who

missed nearly all of last season with an injury.

Brown has won only one game in the last two seasons but hope still springs, at least in the summer. New head coach John Anderson has 32 lettermen to work with, plus sophomores up from an unbeaten freshman team. Most impressive credentials are held by quarterback Pete Beatrice, who passed for 1,131 yards and eight touchdowns in 1972.

Busy quarterback Don Jackson is gone and only 13 lettermen are back from a Columbia team that won three games. In short, the Lions are not

writing threatening letters to anybody.

Elsewhere in the East, one of the busiest quarterbacks in any section, Tom Parr, will be back at Colgate. If his performance the last two years has a flaw it is that the only records left to shoot at are his own.

PARR WILL HAVE AMPLE HELP from backfield mates Mark Van Eeghen, Russ Brown and Steven Corrigan, plus a defense that should be improved for

'73 by a year of togetherness.

Temple lost almost all of its offensive line, but Wayne Hardin, the first coach to put three winning seasons together for the Owls since Pop Warner

was in charge in 1937, isn't likely to be caught empty-handed.

Quarterback will be the key, and Hardin has Steve Joachim, a transfer from Penn State, Marty Ginestra and Joe Monniger seeking the job. Whoever gets it will be throwing at Randy Crossman, a tight end the Owls consider a bona fide candidate for all-America.

"Joachim showed me he is a class quarterback in spring practice," Hardin says. "But Ginestra and Monniger just don't want to back off and let him

have the job."

RUTGERS HAS A NEW HEAD COACH but there aren't likely to be any startling format changes. Frank Burns has been at the school in various capacities most of the time since 1949, including the last five years as chief aide to the man he replaced, John Bateman.

Burns must replace quarterback Leo Gasienica but Jim (II) Jennings

will be back to further abuse Rutgers rushing records.

Under Ed Doherty, Holy Cross had its first winning season since 1966. With 36 monogram men back, led by safety John Provost and running back Steve Buchanon, the Crusaders hope for more of the same.

Villanova, a winner just twice in 11 tries a year ago, has another difficult season ahead, but Wildcat partisans feel the problems that stirred specula-

tion football would be dropped are all behind them.

Delaware's College Division opponents are beginning to wonder just when an era becomes a bad habit. The Blue Hens face a big rebuilding job, but the situation was similar in 1971 and coach Tubby Raymond rebuilt well enough to win the first of two straight national titles.

RAYMOND ISN'T EXACTLY WITHOUT tools this time. His top scorer, Vern Roberts, is back, along with quarterback Scotty Reihm, a sparing but accurate passer. Glen Covin, hurt in the opening game in 1972, is sound

again and hoping to surpass the 900 yards he gained as a soph.

If Fred Dunlop can come up with a little more running and defense, Lehigh could be difficult to get along with.

The Engineers' record in 1972 was 5-6 but four of those losses were

by a touchdown or less, including Army and Penn.

Kim McQuilkin, who already holds all Lehigh passing records, is back, along with his top targets, Bill Schlegal and Norman Liedtke. And returning to the backfield is last year's top runner, tailback Jim Farrell, who picked up 564 yards in 139 tries for a 4.0 average.

Lafayette's problem is just the reverse. Coach Neil Putnam has record rusher Tony Giglio back but will have to get passing help from Tim Grip or sophomore Joe Maddon if his team is to improve on last year's 3-7

record and move up in the independent standings.

FORTUNATELY, THE LEOPARDS have experience on the interior line with center Jim Nolan, guards Harry Norton and Matt Micir and tackle John

Costea. The defensive line returns five veterans.

Bucknell, 6-3 in 1972, is rebuilding its defense around all-East linebacker John Dailey. Coach Fred Prender has more experienced help on offense, including quarterbacks Don Rubright and Bob Bianchi and receiver Carl Probst, to help brighten the outlook.

Another plus for the Bisons is the return of last year's second leading

Crawford must produce, along with veteran runners Rich Hetrick and Tony

Cameron. Split end Joe Ignatuk will also help the offense.

All defensive positions could be strengthened by a solid corps of sophomores. Ed Battisfore and Ioe Sabadish head the deep backs, with John Bergandino and Jeff Barnhart on the line.

Entering his 24th year at Hofstra, coach Howdy Myers will be looking at a lot of new faces, but one familiar one, defensive back Tony Newton, will be a welcome sight. Myers holds a 153-96-4 career coaching record.

There is room all over the East, on all levels, for change in what has

become an established pecking order.

The coaches who are accustomed to winning-Paterno, Crouthamel, Raymond—will be trying to maintain the comfortable tradition with new people

in the ranks at key positions.

There is an excellent chance, of course, that their new people will be better than whatever kind their rivals have. But in this particular September, the have-nots have cause to hope for brighter Novembers.



# he South [NCAA District 3] Morning Lines Like '72 Favorites; Alabama Trying For 'Triple Crown'

In the ever-changing South the pre-season football favorites are much the same. In the Southeastern, Atlantic Coast and Southern Conferences,

morning lines are virtually unchanged from the 1972 races.

Alabama is favored to win its third straight and sixth SEC title in a decade. North Carolina and North Carolina State are primed for another photo finish in the ACC, and defending champion East Carolina and Richmond are properly armed for a shootout in the Southern.

On the independent front, Georgia Tech and Florida State remain promi-

nent with Tulane on the upswing.

IN A "SECRET" POLL TO HANDICAP the SEC Derby, sports information directors exhibited no more originality than sports writers. Alabama, Tennessee, Auburn and LSU were picked on the front row, with Georgia, Florida and Mississippi in the middle bracket and Kentucky, Mississippi State and Vanderbilt in the customary back pew.

Atlantic Coast swamis foresee a race to the wire between North Carolina and North Carolina State, and Richmond is the consensus choice to

overhaul East Carolina in the Southern.

With Paul Bryant handling the reins, Alabama is the perennial choice of SEC seers. Since the Bear returned to his alma mater. Alabama has

WILBUR JACKSON, a 215pound speedster, fullback Ellis Beck and All-SEC receiver Wavne Wheeler are top offensive returnees. And they say in Tuscaloosa that OBs Gary Rutledge Ir., Richard Todd and Robert Fraley are talented enough to fill Davis' huge shoes.

Defense should rank with

the best in college football. Most of the defenders from last year's 10-2 edition, including four linebackers, are back. So is Jeff Rouzie, a regular who sat out last season with injuries.

If Bill Battle, a Bryant scholar at Alabama, figures a way to beat his alma mater and Auburn, move Tennessee into the favorite slot. In three seasons Battle has not lost an SEC game outside the state of Alabama.

QUARTERBACK CONREDGE HOLLOWAY, conference soph of the year, and senior running back Haskel Stanbeck are ringleaders of what may be the most potent offense in the league. Holloway was so poised as a soph that he was excused from spring football to play baseball. Stanbeck scored 12 touchdowns last season while gaining 890 yards.

Ricky Townsend, a barefoot kicker, is another familiar name in the Tennessee scoring column. He has never missed a college conversion, kick-

ing 31 straight and hitting on 12 of 19 field goals as a soph.

The Vols should extend their skein of being the only college team to

win eight or more games the past eight seasons.

Coach Ralph (Shug) Jordan, dean of SEC coaches with 23 seasons at his alma mater, did not like the label, but his Tigers were the Cinderella team last year. Picked in the second division, the Tigers capped a 9-1 regular-season record by beating Alabama via two blocked kicks in the closing minutes for a third victory over the Tide in four years.

AUBURN WALLOPED FAVORED COLORADO, 24-3, in the Gator Bowl. Jordan then requested the news media to cease calling the Tigers a Cinderella

team, because Cindy was a myth and Auburn was for real.

With seven members of the offensive unit and six defensive regulars returning, the Tigers should be for real again. Chris Linderman and Mitzi Jackson are capable rushing replacements.

Randy Walls, the sophomore who quarterbacked surprising Auburn and injured his knee during bowl practice, and Wade Whatley, who directed

the triumph over Colorado, duel for the starting assignment.

Louisiana State, only team to beat Auburn last year, is an annual title contender in the SEC. The Tigers compare favorably overall with SEC rivals. Reserve Mike Miley and Billy Broussard are sharing the quarterback slot, and tailbacks Brad Davis and Steve Rogers and fullback Ken Addy trigger a strong ground game.

Linebacker Warren Caprone and Mike Williams and safeties Frank Racine

and Joe Winkler return in the traditionally tough LSU defense.

Florida, featuring sensational running back Nat Moore, is the darkhorse choice of the experts. Moore, who had never played big-time football, was not listed in the Gator pre-season brochure last year. After 13 touchdowns, including five runs for more than 50 yards, Moore is considered the best

broken-field runner in Florida annals.

Georgia is the mystery team of the conference. A year ago the Bulldogs, advertised as title contenders, flopped to 7-4. Andy Johnson, a soph phenom, had a so-so junior year and co-quarterback James Ray was injured. If Johnson plays back to his first season, Georgia should have a potent offense. Horace King, used sparingly as a soph, is the leading runner in the revised offense. Senior Jimmy Poulos and Bob Burns are talented run-

After a record 15 straight bowl junkets, Mississippi spent the holidays at home last year. The hard-luck Rebels lost to Auburn by six, to Georgia by one and to LSU on the final play. With quarterbacks Norris Weese and Kenny Lyons heading a promising offensive unit, Ole Miss should be back on the winning track in 1973.

KENTUCKY, VANDERBILT AND Mississippi State have new coaches attempting to break long losing streaks. In his debut at Vandy, Steve Sloan faces a tough challenge because the Commodores have enjoyed only one winning

season in the past 13 years.

Bob Tyler will attempt to get Mississippi State above the .500 level for the second time in eight seasons. He inherits 25 lettermen, including Bill

Buckley, leading SEC receiver with 47.

Fran Curci hopes to become Kentucky's first consistent winning coach since Bear Bryant. The Wildcats have won 18 games in six years and haven't soared to more than four victories since 1965.

In the ACC Bill Dooley of North Carolina and Lou Holtz of North Caro-

line State have football teams the basketball teams can be proud of.

In each of six seasons at North Carolina, Dooley has improved his coach-

ing record, peaking to 11-1 last year.

NORTH CAROLINA OPENS THE SEASON seeking its third straight ACC crown and 16th league victory in a row. Senior quarterback Nick Vidnouic and fullback Dickie Oliver are key returnees. Dooley has experience on defense.

Clemson, an annual ACC threat in the glory days of Frank Howard, has another new coach. Red Parker of The Citadel has replaced retiring Hootie Ingram. He inherits a cast of 30 lettermen from a 4-6 team.

Presence of performers at Duke such as 260-pound Bruce Snyder in the offensive line and senior quarterback Mark Johnson boost coach Mike

McGee's hopes of staging an upset in the ACC race.

Maryland made immense progress on the long road back under coach Jerry Claiborne, and the Terps could emerge as the surprise team.

On the heels of a 4-7 season, Don Lawrence expects Virginia to move

up the ladder with nine members of the defensive unit back.

For the second straight year, Wake Forest has a new coach. Chuck Mills replaced Tom Harper, but it will take more than one season to get the

Deacons back on the winning path.

IN HIS SECOND SEASON at East Carolina, Sonny Randle startled the Southern Conference by dethroning Richmond. But Frank Jones' Spiders, with fullback Barty Smith, a 240-pound speedster, are a slight choice to reclaim the title. Jones has quarterback depth, with Harry Knight, David Young and Dennis Wilkerson vying for the starting job.

At William and Mary, Jim Root did an outstanding rebuilding project,

finishing with 4-2 conference credentials. The Indians could go all the way, Southern seers say, if Richmond or East Carolina falter.

BOBBY ROSS, THE NEW HEAD COACH at The Citadel, has all-time Citadel offensive leader QB Harry Lynch (3,756 career yards) to build around.

Art Baker is the new Furman coach, but it appears he'll be dueling

Davidson, VMI and Appalachian in the second division.

In the independent ranks, Georgia Tech, after two bowl appearances, gets a chance to boost its national reputation in the home opener. The

Yellow Jackets entertain Southern Cal.

Though Tech doesn't compare with the Trojans, Bill Fulcher's troops should have another winning season. Jim Stevens, a junior college transfer, stepped in at quarterback when Eddie McAshan left and led Tech to an upset triumph over Iowa State in the Liberty Bowl. Greg Horne, an outstanding running back, heads a list of offensive holdovers. Randy Rhino, who made all-America as a soph defensive back, is the most prominent returnee on the defensive unit.

At Florida State, coach Larry Jones lost five offensive and eight defensive regulars. But 25 lettermen and the newcomers should supply FSU

with its customary winning season.

AT TULANE, COACH BENNIE Ellender's program is progressing, and he is optimistic that the Greenies will log a winning campaign. Steve Foley, who won the regular quarterback job as a soph, and defensive end Dave

Lee spark an ambitious and experienced team.

Pete Elliott, who directed Illinois and California into Rose Bowl games, is the new Miami head coach. He has Tony Cristiani, the circus tight-wire performer, who reminded scouts of Nebraska's Rich Glover on the ground; Rubin Carter, 260-pound defensive tackle, and 6-6 offensive tackle Dennis Harrah on the all-America checklist.

In his second season at Virginia Tech, Charlie Coffey rode an exciting offense to a 6-4 season. But Don Strock, the super passer, is gone and his

absence means a different offense.

At South Carolina, Paul Dietzel is relying on a vastly improved defense

to turn around last season's 4-7 mark.

SOUTHERN MISSISSIPPI LOST THE MOST versatile player in college football in Ray Guy, the super punter and field goal kicker. However, coach Cecil

Underwood is confident that Southern will improve.

Tampa lost coach Earle Bruce to Iowa State and John Matuszak, the No. 1 choice in the draft. Dennis Fryzel should be able to fill Bruce's shoes, but there's no way of replacing the 275-pound Matuszak, so the Spartans may not play back to their 9-2 record.

New coaches take over at four of the Big Ten schools. New faces will star in the playing ranks. But when the season comes to an end Nov. 24, it is likely to be the same old story: Ohio State and Michigan will meet at Ann Arbor for the Big Ten championship.

The Mid-American Conference expects a wide-open race. Among the independents, Notre Dame isn't as optimistic as usual, and it may be a re-

building year for the Fighting Irish.

But the Ohio State-Michigan streak has made a run that's without parallel in the Big Ten's 77-year history. For five straight years the winner of this traditional game, played the last week of the season, has been the Big Ten champ or co-champ and Rose Bowl representative.

IN THIS PERIOD OHIO STATE has held two undisputed league championships, Michigan has won one and they've shared the other two. Michigan's

loop record in these five years is 33-4, Ohio State's is 32-5.

Success has brought customers. Michigan last season led the nation's football teams—professional, college, everyone—in average attendance, 85,566 per game. Ohio State, which had led the country for 14 straight years, was No. 2 with an average of 84,476.

The home team has been the winner in the five Michigan-Ohio State

Pat Harmon's biography reads like a road map. The son of Irish-French parents who were trapeze performers in a circus,

peze performers in a circus, he lived in 20 Midwestern towns during his nomadic childhood.

The University of Illinois graduate headed sports staffs in Illinois and lowa before going to the Post in 1951.

Harmon, the father of eleven children, is also a contributing sports editor of the World Book Encyclopedia, listed in Who's Who in America and a busy public speaker. He was named national sports

was named national sports writer of the year for 1973 by the Churchmen's Sports Hall of Fame.

matchups. This year the game is at Ann Arbor, but it would be difficult to predict a winner now.

Both teams are stocked deep in veterans. It is possible they will both be undefeated going into the final week; it has happened that way before.

THE MICHIGAN story is rosy. The Wolverines retain their starting offensive backfield. This includes the powerful runner, Ed Shuttlesworth; the all-conference quarterback, Dennis Franklin; a tail-



back, Chuck Heater, and a wingback, Clint Haselrig.

Michigan also has the spectacular kick-return specialists, Dave Brown, who ripped off an 83-yard run last year, and Gil Chapman, who had a 73-yarder. Brown doubles as a safety and made all-conference. Chapman works at split end and carries the ball on end-around plays.

EVEN THE MICHIGAN DEFENSE has six starters back, led by a brilliant tackle, Dave Gallagher. Coach Bo Schembechler, who had 54 lettermen last year, has 37 of them returning. Michigan hasn't lost a home game since early

October 1969, and has seven '73 games in Ann Arbor.

Woody Hayes has achieved coaching immortality by going 22 years on the Ohio State job. Leading the football department in Columbus used to

be a most uncertain proposition.

But Hayes has turned out a succession of winners. His winning percentage since he arrived in 1951 is the highest in the Big Ten, and it should increase in 1973. Hayes likes to have a lot of football players, and he likes to display them. In one game last fall he had 114 men in uniform. One of them was Archie Griffin, a freshman from home-town Columbus, who proceeded to set a new Buckeye ground-gaining record—239 yards in one game. In another game he rolled up 192.

GRIFFIN IS EXPECTED TO ROLL AGAIN, and he'll have lots of help-like eight starters returning on offense and eight on defense. All 16 of these opened

in the Rose Bowl last Jan. 1.

No wonder Hayes refers to the 14 days spent in California for the game as "additional spring practice for our returning veterans." Ohio State had a 50-man squad for its main engagements, and only 11 of them were seniors—a fact that makes the picture even brighter for '73.

The Buckeyes have John Hicks, who made all-America at offensive tackle as a junior. But their pride is the threesome of Randy Gradishar, Vic Koegel and Rick Middleton. Buckeye followers say this will be the finest

linebacking crew in the country.

Hayes would like to go back to the Rose Bowl—a move that's permissible since the Big 10 dropped its no-repeat rule. The conference also goes to red-shirting this year, a decision which may restore the league to some of its former strength. The Big 10 was 12-16 against non-league foes in 1972.

At Notre Dame, Ara Parseghian has a restrained outlook as he opens his 10th season. The defensive line was below its recent level last year, and the Irish lost games to Missouri, Southern Cal and Nebraska.

AN INJURY TO STEVE NIEHAUS coincided with the decline. He is back this year following a successful knee operation and is an all-America candidate at defensive tackle. The Notre Dame offense, led by a junior quarterback,

Tom Clements, is capable of a lot of scoring.

The Big Ten has an unprecedented wave of new head coaches. Dennis Stoltz has moved up as the replacement for his former boss, Duffy Daugherty, after Duffy's 19 years at Michigan State. Lee Corso, formerly at Louisville, now is at Indiana. John Pont switched from Indiana to Northwestern, and Alex Agase went from Northwestern to Purdue.

Agase already has made some football history. He played as a civilian at Illinois and also as a V-12 training student at Purdue during the war years. He made all-America guard at both places and is on each school's

all-time team-the only player ever to achieve this honor.

Agase, now 50, takes over at Purdue after nine years at Northwesternin one of which (1970) he was voted coach of the year by the Football Writers' Association of America.

AGASE INHERITS A SQUAD which finished third in the race, but the graduation losses are formidable. Gone are Otis Armstrong, running back who was the Big Ten's most valuable player; and Dave Butz, an all-America tackle.

The best bets for excellence this year are Tim Racke and Carl Capria, safeties. Racke is the only veteran who started all 11 '72 games. The Purdue

strength this year, at least at the outset, will be on defense.

Northwestern's Mitch Anderson was the No. 1 passer in the conference last year, and Pont will have him throwing again. Northwestern, in fact, has its offensive backfield intact, with Jim Trimble, Greg Boykin and Steve

Harris teaming around Anderson.

Northwestern hopes to overcome its first-quarter jinx. The Wildcats were

outscored 109-14 in the initial period but did all right after that.

Lee Corso's reputation indicates he will replace Duffy Daugherty as the league jester. He played his spring game under what he called "Can-Am rules," combining Canadian and American codes into a system which gave extra points for special plays.

AT LOUISVILLE, HE KEPT HIS athletes loose with wisecracks and such tricks as coaching a linebacker to do cartwheels when leaving the field. When asked to help observe the 100th anniversary of college football, he suited

his captain in jersey No. 100.

Corso's coaching record is stimulating, too. He turned Louisville into the nation's No. 1 defensive team last year. And when he arrived on his new job, he remarked, "I'm so excited, I can't wait to get started."

Corso has two good runners to get started with in his new post at Indiana. Ken Starling and Ken St. Pierre are fifth and sixth on the school's

all-time rushing list.

In this rare day of an athlete competing in multiple sports, Indiana came up with two last year, both freshmen. Quinn Buckner was a safety and Trent Smock a split end on the football team, and both lettered in basketball for a squad which was third in the NCAA tournament.

BUCKNER MAY HAVE BEEN the only freshman in the country who made the

starting lineups in two sports at a major school.

Stolz was the defensive coordinator on Daugherty's staff at Michigan State. He will miss Brad Van Pelt, an all-America defensive back, but all others in the defensive secondary will return.

Michigan State has 27 of 50 lettermen back, including the five leading rushers in the backfield. One of these is Mark Niesen, who operated the wishbone-T from quarterback and had runs of 61, 57 and 56 yards.

The kicking game is sound, with Bill Simpson to punt and Dirk Krijt, a native of the Netherlands, for placements. Simpson also returns kicks and

plays cornerback for the Spartans.

Of the top nine rushers in the conference last year, seven are back, and the leader of these is John King. He could make Minnesota a factor in any game, especially when he teams with Doug Beaudoin, who was a starter at running back as a freshman.

THE GOPHERS HAVE EXCELLENT BLOCKERS up front with Keith Fahnhorst, end, and Matt Herkenhoff, tackle. On defense they expect a lot from Steve Neils, an end, and Keith Simons, who started all 11 games as a freshman

tackle for Minnesota a year ago.

Illinois hopes to avoid the injuries that ruined 1972. The most versatile Illini in years may be Lonnie Perrin, who kicks off, does field goals, throws passes, catches passes and was the team's No. 2 rusher last year. Then there is the excellent receiver, Garvin Roberson. Illinois has 15 starters back but, most of all, the coaching staff prays for good health.

Iowa took advantage of the new eligibility for freshmen last year. Fifteen freshmen lettered. Ten started one or more games. One freshman, Andre

Jackson, a linebacker, led the Big Ten in total tackles.

Kent State won the Mid-American Conference for the first time in history and will try to repeat with Greg Kokal, who passed for 310 yards in the Tangerine Bowl. Kent lost most of its offensive lineup but still has Gary Pinkel, all-conference at tight end.

ANOTHER STAR IS JACK LAMBERT, a linebacker who was voted defensive

player of the year in the Mid-American.

Kent's competition will most certainly come from Bowling Green, which has 20 seniors who will be starters. As sophomores and juniors, these athletes were part of squads which finished second in the Mid-American race both years. And last year they took part in a 17-14 upset over Purdue.

One of them, Paul Miles, has put together two straight seasons of gaining 1,000 or more years by running. Bowling Green was 10th in the nation in total defense and once held Dayton to a net 16 yards.

WESTERN MICHIGAN MUST REPLACE half its 22 starters. But Bill Doolittle had the same problem last year and had a 7-3 record. The Broncos look for a good year from Dominic Riggio, middle linebacker; Dan Arbour,

defensive end, and Larry Cates, running back.

Miami of Ohio has gone 30 years without a losing season (only Penn State has a longer string). The Redskins should make it 31 straight with the help of Bob Hitchens, second in the nation in rushing last year. Then there is Dan Rebsch, a defensive back who tied an NCAA record by intercepting five passes in one game. Talk about consistency—Miami has posted five consecutive 7-3 seasons.

Toledo, slightly down last year after three straight championships, expects to come back. Its coach, Jack Murphy, believes, "We have as much speed and skill as any team in the conference except Kent State. I will say

right now the title will be decided when Kent plays Toledo."

The Toledo strength is in the offensive line, with six out of seven

positions manned by returning starters.

OHIO UNIVERSITY IS READY TO MOVE up and has a schedule that includes Penn State, South Carolina and Northwestern. The Bobcats' trouble in 1972 was a series of injuries that caught, at one time or another, 12 starting players. One of these was Bill Gary, who was the nation's eighth leading rusher as a sophomore, and who was lost the second time he carried the ball last year.

Cincinnati aims at a comeback with Reggie Harrison, a running back. He belted out 109 yards in the first quarter against Colorado last year before being hurt. Also around with good credentials are Evan Jolitz, line-

backer; Tom Forrest, offensive guard, and Bob Menke, end.

But a new face on the scene may be Cincinnati's biggest asset. Tony

Mason, after spectacular success as an Ohio high school coach and assistantships at Michigan and Purdue, has moved into the college head coaching ranks. In his debut on the Cincinnati job, he proved to be a non-stop, sleepless worker. He made 59 speeches his first 45 days.

Dayton also has a new coach. Ron Marciniak has taken over as John McVay moves up to athletic director. The offense revolves around the

quarterback, talented Ken Polke.

Xavier, under Tom Cecchini, went to 3-8 last fall after three successive 1-9 seasons, and expects to go higher. The schedule is unusual—opening with seven straight road games, closing with four at home.

Northern Illinois expects a good running game, led by the 232-pound

Mark Kellar. He was sixth in the country in rushing last year.

Marshall has dedicated this season to its 17 seniors. They were freshmen in 1970, when the varsity squad and coaching staff went down in a plane crash. They are the only players left who were on the campus at the time of that tragedy.

Coach Jack Lengyel has had to build every year since the new class. This is the first time in three years Marshall has had a senior group on the football squad. Reggie Oliver, a quarterback, carries the hopes for a win-

ning season.

Northern Illinois, Central Michigan and Eastern Michigan have joined the Mid-American but won't be in this year's football race.



The leaves may hardly have started to fall before a Missouri Valley football champion is decided this fall, but folks in the Big Eight may have

shoveled the first snow before a champion emerges in that league.

Missouri Valley 1972 co-champions Louisville and Drake meet head-on in Des Moines September 22, and if the pennant flying atop the MVC standings at season's end bears the colors of any school other than those two, it'll come as a surprise.

OVER IN THE BIG EIGHT, Oklahoma and Nebraska lost enough quality players to stock a pro franchise, but the Big Eight title again figures to be decided when those two meet in late November, just as in the past two years.

The 1973 clash takes place in Norman, November 24.

While Nebraska and Oklahoma were hit heavily by graduation, the replacement parts for the two Big Red machines aren't exactly what you'd have to pick out of a bargain basement sale at the local five and dime store.

And while 1972 was primarily a year of upperclassmen in the Big Eight, as evidenced by the 36 seniors drafted by the NFL and the fact that the Heisman Trophy winner (Nebraska's Johnny Rodgers) and the Outland and Lombardi awards winner (Nebraska's Rich Glover) came from the Big Eight, underclassmen made their presence known throughout the league.

Hal Brown became sports editor of the Lincoln Star in 1963, one year after Bob Devaney took over the head coaching job

at Nebraska.

The University of Nebraska graduate covered the last ten years of Devaney's remarkable 11-year football coaching career in Cornhusker land.

A former first-place winner in baseball writing competition conducted by the College Baseball Coaches Association, Brown also contributes to golf magazines. In addition to his re-

In addition to his responsibilities as an FWAA director, he's a member of

director, he's a member of the selection committee for the Nebraska Racing Hall of Fame. Four of the top five rushers return-Iowa State's Mike Strachan, the Big Eight leader with 1,260 yards; Oklahoma State's George Palmer (3rd) and Brent Blackman (5th), and Colorado's Charlie Davis (4th).

AND THE TOP two passers from '72, Nebraska's David Humm and Kansas' David Jaynes, return.

An outsider looking at the coaching changes in the Big Eight might get the idea that the alumni got restless last fall, but the four changes all came at the dismay, not request, of alumni.

Bob Devaney stepped out at Nebraska after leading the Cornhuskers to 11 straight winning seasons; Oklahoma's Chuck Fairbanks moved to New England after winning the Big Eight championship; Johnny Majors left Iowa State for Pittsburgh after taking the Cyclones to two straight bowl games, the first in Iowa State history, and Dave Smith posted a 6-5 mark in his first year at Oklahoma State, then left for Southern Methodist.

ASSISTANTS FILLED THREE of the vacancies-Tom Osborne at Nebraska, Barry Switzer at Oklahoma and Jim Stanley at Oklahoma State-while Iowa State

lured Earle Bruce from Tampa.

Nebraska lost three-fourths of its starting backfield and most of its defense, but the talent that Osborne has to work with to fill those holes would

look good to most football coaching staffs.

No one is expecting carbon copies of Rodgers or Glover-both had their numbers retired-but either junior Ritch Bahe or sophomore Tom Heiser could be the second-best wingback in Husker history, and John Bell (6-0, 205) could fit into the succession of great middle guards at Nebraska.

Humm, the sophomore who passed for 2,074 yards and 17 touchdowns during the regular season, returns at quarterback and the passing should be strong with Bob Revelle and Frosty Anderson returning at split end.

Replacing Doug Dumler at center will be a difficult chore, but the Huskers return three fine interior linemen in tackles Daryl White, an all-America candidate, and Marvin Crenshaw and guard Bob Wolfe.

LINEBACKING FIGURES TO BE STRONG despite the loss of last year's starters.

Juniors Tom Ruud (6-3, 215) and Bob Nelson (6-5, 230) move in.

But Nebraska must shore up its defensive secondary, which was riddled by the passing of both Iowa State and Oklahoma last season; and only end Steve Manstedt and tackle John Dutton return in the defensive line.

Oklahoma lost its entire offensive backfield, but many opponents couldn't

tell the difference between the Sooners' starting and alternate units.

That alternate unit consisted of quarterback Kerry Jackson, halfbacks Joe Washington and Grant Burget and fullback Tim Welch.

The Sooners lost Jackson in the middle of spring drills when the sopho-

more from Galveston, Tex., was declared ineligible because his high school transcript had been altered. However, Oklahoma has another Texas school-boy phenom at QB in Scott Hill of Hurst, who was bidding for the starting job last fall when a practice injury sidelined him for the season.

WASHINGTON WAS THE SOONERS' second leading rusher as a freshman with

630 yards, behind only all-America Greg Pruitt.

Another freshman, Tinker Owens, younger brother of former Sooner Heisman Trophy winner Steve Owens, was so impressive as a pass catcher in wins over Nebraska and in the Sugar Bowl over Penn State that John Carroll, the season-long starter at split end, has been moved to tight end.

Switzer's major problem will be filling gaps in the offensive line where

all-America center Tom Brahaney, and others, have departed.

Defense was a Sooner strong point in 1972, and although all-America

tackle Derland Moore is gone, a good nucleus returns.

Anchoring the defense is middle guard Lucius Selmon, perhaps the best in the nation with Glover gone. Selmon's little brother, 6-5, 255-pound LeRoy, moves in at tackle beside Lucius.

Colorado, which had hopes a year ago for the Big Eight and national championships, may have been just a year premature if veteran coach Eddie Crowder can plug the holes in the offensive line left by graduation.

THE BUFFS COULD HAVE THE BEST backfield in the Big Eight and one of the

best in the nation with all four starters returning.

That unit includes Charlie Davis, who rushed for 926 yards in 1972; Bo Matthews, who added 720; Jon Keyworth, and quaterback Ken Johnson, who gained 378 yards on the ground and another 1,044 through the air.

Colorado returns an outstanding tight end in J. V. Cain and a top split end and punt-returner in Steve Haggerty.

Colorado also lost its entire defensive backfield and all-America defensive lineman Bud Magrum, who passed up his final year of eligibility.

JOHNSON, STARTING HIS THIRD YEAR as the CU quarterback, could face a struggle for the job from David Williams, a speedy 6-3, 210-pounder who was named Louisiana prep player of the year two years ago.

New coach Earle Bruce inherited what looks to be the best nucleus of returnees in Iowa State history, and if a quarterback can be found, the Cyclones figure to make a strong bid for the Big Eight crown.

Included among the eight offensive and seven defensive starters returning is what could be the best trio of pass receivers in the country.

Tight end Keith Krepfle, split end Ike Harris and flanker Willie Jones combined for 92 receptions totaling 1,456 yards last season, but the pitcher. George Amundson, is gone after leading the Big Eight in total offense.

Bruce looked at nine quarterback candidates in the spring, none of them

with any varsity experience.

In addition to Strachan returning in the backfield, the Cyclones also return starting fullback Moses Moore.

OKLAHOMA STATE LOST ITS HEAD COACH but not much else, with 17 of the Cowboys' 22 starters returning, including quarterback Brent Blackman, fullback George Palmer and halfbacks Fountain Smith and Alton Gerard.

Only two starters are missing from the offensive unit, leaving the Cow-

boys with the best overall picture offensively in the Big Eight.

The defense wasn't hurt much either by graduation, with only three faces missing from the starting cast.

All three defensive backs return and two of them, Lee Stover and Darryl

Stewart, are all-Big Eight material. Barry Price at tackle and Cleveland Vann as a linebacker are all-America caliber.

Missouri is another team that returns a bevy of offensive talent with a

backfield that should stack up with anyone in the conference.

John Cherry returns at quarterback, with familiar faces Tommy Reamon, Ray Bybee, Bill Ziegler, Leroy Moss and Jimmy Smith in the backfield.

TIGER COACH AL ONOFRIO plans to abandon the wishbone-T as his primary

offense, going instead with the slot-I.

Those doing the blocking also have experience, with five starters returning. One of the gaps in the offensive line is at center, but guard Scott Anderson has been moved there and he's likely to close that gap.

The Tigers also will have an experienced defensive unit. Seven starters

return with halfback John Moseley the leader.

Kansas State returns eight offensive and seven defensive starters, but coach Vince Gibson must get his Wildcats, who lost five in a row to end the 1972 season, turned around

The offense is led by senior running backs Isaac Jackson and Don Calhoun, who rushed for 599 and 608 yards, respectively, last season, but the passing combination of Dennis Morrison to John Goerger is gone. The Wildcats offensive line is virtually intact.

An outstanding KSU returnee is tight end Henry Childs, who caught 33 passes for 467 yards and five

touchdowns a year ago.

WHILE SEVEN DEFENSIVE STARTERS return, that was a defense that yielded 55, 52, 31, 45 and 59 points in

losing the last five games.

Kansas coach Don Fambrough faces one of the biggest rebuilding jobs in the Big Eight, but he does have the league's top passing quarterback in David Jaynes and Jaynes' leading receiver, Bruce Adams, for starters.

Jaynes passed for 2,253 yards a year ago and Adams was the receiver on 704 of those yards. Also returning in Jaynes' corps of receivers are speedster Emmett Edwards and Robert Miller.

But if the Jayhawks are going to win many games in the Big Eight. the running game must improve

markedly.

BACK TO ANCHOR THE DEFENSE is tackle Richard Bishop, a 6-2, 255-pounder described by some as the best defensive tackle in Louisville history.

Louisville losses, however, were in the super quality category, starting with Howard Stevens, the all-time collegiate rushing and scoring leader; quarterback John Madeya, and all-America linebacker Tom Jackson.

Memphis State is well-stocked with defensive returnees and is missing only the quarterback from last year's offensive backfield. Juniors David

Fowler and Mike Robb will battle for the starting quarterback job.

To do the blocking for returning running backs Dan Darby, Darnell Harris and Cliff Taylor are five of the seven offensive linemen from '72.

Seven starters return on defense and great things are expected from two

newcomers, linebackers Jerry Dandridge and Van Anderson.

Memphis State was a late scratch from the MVC race, withdrawing from the conference in June to go as an independent.

DRAKE MUST COME UP WITH offensive line help, but the Bulldogs have a trio of very talented backs to put points on the board.

Quarterback Jonas Sears, who moved from tailback as a freshman in mid-season last year, produced 1,185 yards passing and ran for 138 more. Two of the best running backs in the league will be lining up in the Drake backfield, with Jerry Hesston, who has broken all but one of Johnny

Hank Cook, who caught 41 passes a year ago, also returns, but the Aggies need offensive line help and they must find a way of stopping opponents.

West Texas State returns 18 starters, including the top seven rushers, with which to wage defense of its one-third share of the MVC crown. Cole Fraley rushed for 837 yards, while Billy Pritchett and Jimmy Lisle each added more than 400, but a passing attack is needed.

Tulsa coach F. A. Dry lost all-America Drane Scrivener, leading scorer

Sam Henry and three other all-conference players.

If a good passing quarterback can be found, the Hurricane could have a good attack. Wide receiver is a strength with Raymond Rhodes.

Wichita State will field a team with 22 four-year players, who shouldered

the load back in 1970 when the tragic plane crash occurred.

PERHAPS THE BEST FOOTBALL PLAYER from that group is Rick Dvorak, a 6-4, 230-pound defensive lineman. Tommy Owen returns at quarterback and the offensive line is well-stocked. Backfield depth could be a problem.

New North Texas State coach Hayden Fry moves from a 7-4 SMU team

to a 1-10 rebuilding job, but he finds 15 returning starters available.

Offensive standouts include running back Charlie Johnson and tight end Frank Davis. The Eagles return several competent players on defense.

With North Dakota, South Dakota and North Dakota State all ranked by the wire services last season, it could prove tough for the rest of the league to crack the top three in 1973.



## Brand X Muffed Its Chance In '72; Now Steers Are Everybody's Choice

Last year was to be a biggie for Brand X in the Southwest Conference. The University of Texas, that old reliable stable of football excellence, was expected to crash from the top shelf. Some folks even figured the Longhorns

to fall all the way down to fourth place in the standings.

Bah, humbug, said Longhorn fans. And they were right. Darrell Royal's team won an unprecedented fifth straight SWC championship. The Steers upset mighty Alabama in the Cotton Bowl and hung up a 10-1 record for the campaign. Their only loss was to Oklahoma.

The orange-and-white crowd finished three full games ahead of league

runners-up Texas Tech and Southern Methodist.

That was some kind of crashing.

IT'S HERE-WE-GO-AGAIN-TIME, and there's no questioning of Texas' power in 1973. From out of what figured to be a "down" year comes the makings for what could be one of Royal's best teams.

Texas is famed for its wishbone offense, but it was defense that carried the Steers to the heights last year, and will in '73.

No one would dare predict Texas will get to the SWC wire by three lengths again. As good as the Longhorns figure to be, they have some tough competition that could put it together for a surprise. Overall, there may be more solid teams in the race than at any time in recent history.

In his seventeenth year with the Dallas Times Herald, Bob Galt has handled the Southwest Con-

ference beat for the last ten of those years. As a student at North

Texas State, he worked part-time for the Denton Record-Chronicle, where he occasionally tried to do it all at once.
"I once had the lead

story on the sports page the same day I subbed for a sick friend to throw his paper route."

A past president of the Texas Sports Writers As-sociation, Galt served on the FWAA all-America

selection committee in 1972 and is a regular contributor to various publications.

Those '72 runners-up, Texas Tech and SMU, figure to be teams to watch. Jim Carlen's Tech crew is coming off an 8-4 year with a crowd of class vets.

A 7-4 EFFORT by SMU wasn't good enough to save Hayden Fry's job. Dave Smith was hired away from Oklahoma State to take over. He inherits some good talent fronted by top notch running backs Alvin Maxson and Wayne Morris.

Two teams stripped by graduation but boasting

outstanding young prospects could pack strong wallops. They are Texas A&M and Arkansas. A&M, under former Royal assistant Emory Bellard, has had sensational back-to-back recruiting seasons.

ARKANSAS, THE PRE-SEASON FAVORITE a year ago but a giant disappointment, has junked its pro-type game for the slot-I. Frank Broyles has gone back to the attack he found success with in the early 60s.

Young hands will be at key controls, but Broyles isn't trying to rebuild

with sub-par material.

The surprise team of the league a year ago was Baylor. The Bears had won only three games in three seasons until Grant Teaff took over. He turned the Bears into a respectable entry that finished with a 5-6 record. Teaff hopes to plug holes here and there with junior college transfers and a couple of prize freshman recruits.

If he's successful, Baylor could have a strong say-so in who gets to

represent the SWC in the Cotton Bowl.

Teaff has his team thinking it can win, and that's a plus factor that hasn't been suiting out with the Bears in recent campaigns.

TEXAS CHRISTIAN AND RICE have to be a couple of question mark entries. TCU may or may not have a new coach. Tragedy seems to be riding with the Frogs. Head coach Billy Tohill was critically injured in an auto accident in March. He suffered multiple injuries and had to have his right foot amputated. His pre-season status as a coach was unknown.

If he's unable to assume full command, defensive coordinator Frank Young is likely to run the team. Tohill was named as the Frogs' head man late in the 1971 season when Jim Pittman collapsed and died of a heart attack during the Texas Christian-Baylor game.

Rice coach Al Conover isn't without a slice of good talent, but he must replace his three top offensive weapons from '72—quarterback Bruce Gadd, tight end Gary Butler and super field goal kicker Mark Williams.

THE UNIVERSITY OF HOUSTON, the SWC's ninth school, doesn't start playing for the league title until 1976. Head coach Bill Yeoman would probably like a shot at it this time around. Last year was a rebuilding one for the Cougars. They didn't figure to be able to keep their heads above water but surprised all by going 6-4-1. Ten defensive starters return, which is hint enough as to why the Cougars are excited.

Defense was Texas' bread and butter last year. Opponents scored but seven touchdowns against the Longhorns during the regular season. And Alabama's potent wishbone offense was held to one TD in the Steers' 17-13

Cotton Bowl decision over the Tide.

Eight starters are back from that defensive giant. The count goes to nine if you considered the 11 men who played most of the way against Alabama. The key men will be linebacker Glen Gaspard, who could be one of the

best in the land, and polished junior tackle Doug English.

ROYAL ISN'T WITHOUT PROBLEMS on offense, but he's famous for solving attack worries. Like last year, he's without a proven quarterback. All Royal did was take a two-year starter at defensive back and make him a quarterback. Alan Lowry went on to become all-SWC at the position.

Marty Akins was only a freshman last season but good enough to understudy Lowry. He should be the man to fill in. If not, the call could go to

sophomore Mike Presley, who had an outstanding spring.

Lowry and all-America offensive tackle Jerry Sisemore are among seven offensive starters not returning. Fullback isn't one of the vacant positions.

Coming back is big Roosevelt Leaks, who made one of the most sensational sophomore debuts in the history of the conference. He rushed for 1,099 yards and was everyone's player of the year.

AT TEXAS TECH, CARLEN RETURNS seven offensive and six defensive starters. The Raiders were generally picked for the second division last year, but they came up with a high-powered offense that charged them into No. 2.

Tech averaged 368 vards a game, the best in the SWC.

The man who made the offense click was quarterback Joe Barnes. He's back for his senior year and has some familiar folks to work with in the backfield. Tailback George Smith averaged 6.9 yards per carry, Bowlingball fullback James Mosley, 5-8 and 212, returns. And the conference's best tight end just could be Andre Tillman.

Carlen lost the heart of his defense when both starting tackles and middle guard graduated. If he can come up with the adequate replacements, Tech should be able to play with the best of 'em. One tackle prospect owns an unusual first name. He's Ecomet Burley, who was pressed into duty as a freshman in the Sun Bowl game. Ecomet heard opportunity knocking and

won the game's most valuable defensive player award.

IN MAXSON AND MORRIS, SMU should have the best pair of running backs in the conference. Maxson has rushed for more than 1,000 yards the past two seasons. Morris was one of the most sought-after players in the land when he was recruited. He didn't disappoint anyone with his debut performance. He made more yards than any other varsity freshman in the nation when he rushed for 884 steps.

Defensively, the Mustangs will peg most of their hopes on junior tackle Louie Kelcher, a true all-America candidate. Kelcher is 6-5 and 260 and one of the fastest lineman to hit the league in years. He'll be supported by five other starters from last year.

On paper, Texas A&M may be one of the most inexperienced teams in the land. Bellard can count only 19 lettermen. Five offensive and four de-

fensive starters return from last year's disappointing 3-8 team.

BUT THE AGGIE PICTURE ISN'T quite that dark. Bellard has more than a dozen quality sophomores, youngsters who were sought by every school in the conference at recruiting time. Ten of those sophomores were good enough to letter last season as freshmen at A&M.

Receivers Richard Osborne and Carl Roaches and running backs Bubba Bean and Skip Walker started as freshmen, as did linebacker Ed Simonini. The trouble spot on offense could be at QB, where Bellard may have

to go with a freshman signal caller.

Much help is needed on defense, and Bellard is assured of having at least one outstanding newcomer on that side. He signed all-America junior college linebacker John Paul McCrumbly from Tyler JC.

Arkansas' youth is reflected in its loss of 10 three-year starters, including

QB Joe Ferguson and receivers Mike Reppond and Jim Hodge.

Broyles will be building his team around two of the SWC's best performers, running back Dickey Morton and linebacker Danny Rhodes. Morton was the league's leading ground gainer with 1,188 yards. As a senior, he'll

be trying for all-SWC honors for the third straight year.

THE HOGS WENT WITH A PRO-TYPE attack for five years minus one game. Broyles put his team in the slot-I for its final 1972 outing against Texas Tech. Ferguson watched from the sidelines while soph Scott Bull quarterbacked the team to a 24-14 decision over the Sun Bowl-bound Red Raiders. The 6-5, 205-pound Bull is likely to be at the controls this year. The Hogs went 6-5 a season ago - winning ball most places, but not in the Ozarks.

Teaff, who won SWC coach of the year honors for his '72 turnaround of Baylor, faces a familiar problem—lack of depth. No team really blew the Bears out of the ballyard last year. There was no rest for the starters and they were simply worn down.

THE DEFENSE HAS THE MOST holes in it. All-America end Roger Goree is gone, along with three secondary starters and two linebackers. Safety

Tommy Turnipseed is the top returnee.

Teaff used three quarterbacks last year and all return. Neal Jeffrey did the most playing. All-SWC split end Charles Dancer is back, along with the club's top ground-gainer, tailback Cary Lacy. TCU is home for three of the SWC's better players. The hoss of hosses

TCU is home for three of the SWC's better players. The hoss of hosses is defensive tackle Charlie Davis (6-3, 260), who is being boomed for all-America. Behind him is a dandy linebacker, Dede "Mean" Terveen.

Halfback Mike Luttrell, who gained 906 yards as a sophomore, fronts the offense. The make-or-break man could be quarterback Kent Marshall, a sensation for four games last year before going out with a broken collar bone. If he comes back strong and the Frogs find a couple of linemen, TCU could improve on its 5-6 record.

WITH ARKANSAS RETURNING TO the slot-I, Rice stands as the SWC's only team with a pass-oriented offense. The only trouble is, Conover isn't sure who'll be doing the chucking.

Transfer Fred Geisler, letterman Bill McCabe and three hopefuls up

from the freshman team are crowding the question-mark picture.

Conover has an outstanding catcher if he can find a pitcher. Split end Edwin Collins ranks with the best in the conference. He's among seven returning offensive starters. Another bonus is running back Gary Ferguson, the team's leading rusher with 639 yards.

Defense is the side of the game that may blind the Owls. Only four starters return. Bruce Henley was a consensus all-SWC pick a year ago,

but there's little to get excited about after him.

The picture is much brighter with Rice's crosstown rival, Houston. Heading that gang of defensive hosses are linebackers Deryl Ray McGallion and Harold Evans, tackle Gerald Hill and end Mack Mitchell.

THERE'S ALMOST AS MUCH EXPERIENCE returning on offense, where seven veterans are set. The key man there is quarterback D. C. Nobles, who came on strong in the late stages of the '72 season.

He's now a polished, confident performer, one who has set a personal

goal of 2,000 yards of total offense for the year.

Yeoman's big problem will be to find a sub for fullback Puddin Jones, who rushed for 1,216 yards last season. Leonard Parker, a 5-10, 205-pound

junior, is expected to get the call.

One Cougar junior has a familiar name. He's quarterback Chuck Fairbanks Jr., son of the former Oklahoma coach. Young Fairbanks was injured most of last year and saw little action. But the Cougars do regard the 6-2, 190-pounder as a good prospect.

McNeese State and Lamar, each 8-3, sustained big graduation losses and will probably have to rebuild, Southwestern Louisiana also has quarterback

problems but is strong along the line, especially on defense.

Arkansas State, which tried three quarterbacks last season, has the same group back for '73, plus backs Stan Winfrey and Steve Burks.

still finished with solo membership in the 1,000-yard club.


Texas Southern's big problems will be getting by Jackson and Grambling. If it does that, the race could be a tight one.

# The Rocky Mountains [NCAA District 7] Despite Kush's Cries Of Anguish, Arizona State Still Has Firepower

Arizona State football coach Frank Kush has been referred to at times-

not without some justification-as the Polish Paul Revere.

He's renowned in the Rockies for autumnal cries of anguish over inadequacies of his Sun Devil football teams. Kush can find a dark cloud on even the brightest of horizons.

Well, he's been out sounding the alarm again, which traditionally is bad

news for the rest of the Western Athletic Conference.

Kush, whose winning percentage (121-33-1, .784 over 15 years) is second only to that of Penn State's Joe Paterno, is in quest of an unprecedented fifth consecutive WAC title. After opposing post-season play for years, he is after his fourth straight bowl appearance.

KUSH MAY BE SINGING THE BLUES, but he appears to have the horses for

another strong run at a Top Ten finish.

Talent-laden Utah, which returns 16 starters and catches the Devils at home on artificial turf, could derail Kush's swift express.

Among independents, Air Force is blessed with eight offensive starters

as the Falcons bid for their sixth winning season in a row.

New Utah State coach Phil Krueger will be hard-pressed to replace graduated Tom Forzani, the nation's leading receiver, and quarterback Tony Adams, who was third ov-

erall in passing.

Football is an everlasting love for Arizona Republic sports editor Verne Boatner. "Give it

to me morning, noon and night, seven days a week,

he insists.

The Texas native is especially familiar with the type of game played in the Western Athletic Conference, which he has followed since its founding in 1962. Boatner covered members Arizona State and Arizona before assuming duties as sports editor-col-umnist of The Republic.

An alumnus of the University of Texas, the Arizona scribe toiled briefly

for newspapers in the Longhorn State before Uncle Sam called him into the service.

Kush's opponents can take little consolation from his prediction that the Sun Devils won't be as explosive as a vear ago.

THAT TEAM merely led the nation in total offense and scoring (with a record-breaking 513 points) and was third in rushing.

The WAC was wacky as ever last year as ASÚ got ambushed early by Wyoming, 45-43. That shocker threw the race into a six-way scramble.

Runners-up Brigham Young and Utah, as well as Arizona and Wyoming, could have lost once and still have beaten out ASU for the title, since the Sun Devils played one less league game.

BUT THEY PLAYED RIGHT INTO the Devils' hands by knocking off each other.

Arizona State finally reassumed command by trouncing Arizona in the final

conference contest on Arizona's home field.

Returning as host in the Fiesta Bowl, Arizona State ran up a school-record 718 yards total offense against dazed Missouri and prevailed, 49-35. Woody Green scored four times, gaining 202 yards and the MVP nod.

Kush has built his dynasty on speed and an open-throttle offense.

He returns the catalysts in running back Green and quarterback Danny

White among 21 lettermen.

Even though he missed one game and three quarters of another, Green placed third nationally in rushing and became the WAC's first consensus all-America. If Arizona State enjoys a banner year, he could be a Heisman Trophy contender as the nation's top offensive player.

Kush has cause for concern at quarterback. White, who is ahead of Johnny Bright's 22-year-old career record of 7.16 yards per offensive play,

broke his right collarbone in spring drills.

IF WHITE—WHO MISSED THREE games as a sophomore with a shoulder separation—is not fully recovered, Arizona State's offense could sputter. There is no experience behind him. Freshman sensation Fred Mortensen took time out for a two-year church mission and junior Jim Brady opted for the Canadian pro ranks. Freshmen must fill the void.

Some-time starter Ben Malone should handle fullbacking capably.

All three of White's favorite targets are gone. Junior Morris Owens and freshman Mike Haynes will battle for the wingback slot.

Kush's offense is built around his guards, and he has an outstanding one in 6-1, 232-pound junior John Houser, who missed spring practice with a knee injury. Tackles Steve Gunther and Ed Kindig anchor the interior line.

UTAH COACH BILL MEEK boasts a whopping 38 lettermen, led by all-conference quarterback Don Van Galder. Although injured for three games, Van Galder threw for 15 touchdowns.

Trailing Arizona, 27-0 in the fourth, Van Galder tossed two scoring passes and rushed for another in the final seconds to win, 28-27.

Most dangerous scoring threat in the conference is 5-9 flanker Steve Odom. Possessed of 9.3 speed, Odom scored 13 times last season and is among the top kick-return artists in the nation. Odom scored every seventh time he touched the ball and carries 7.4 rushing credentials.

Utah's offense may rival ASU's for explosiveness. Guard Bill Powers, center Chuck Johanson and tight end Willie Armstead should open holes for running back Ike Spencer and fullback Steve Marlowe.

Defensively, Meek must find a couple of ends and linebackers, but the secondary is solid with Steve Marshall, Bill Lucas and Mike Stevens.

**EX-MICHIGAN ASSISTANT JIM YOUNG** has taken on the task of rejuvenating Arizona, which has had only one winner in the last eight years.

Tackle Jim O'Connor, 6-4, 250—one of the best in the nation at his position—and center Bob Toon key a veteran offensive line.

The Wildcats possess a premier scoring threat in flanker Theo Bell, fifth nationally in kick returns as a freshman in 1972. Sophomore Bruce Hill took the quarterbacking job away from junior Jerry Davis with a sensational showing in the spring game. Jim Upchurch and Willie Hamilton are the only experienced running back returning to the Tucson campus.

Defensively, Arizona will be tough up front, led by all-America candidate Ransom Terrell at linebacker. Tackles Glenn Gresham and Mike Dawson

and end Greg Poole are all tough hombres.

Brigham Young coach Lavell Edwards, who took the Cougars to a 7-4 season in his first year, lost but 14 of 46 lettermen. But included was NCAA rushing champ Pete Van Valkenburg. His replacement likely is to be Dave Coon, who started two years ago but was sidelined by injuries last season. Quarterback Dave Terry and fullback Steve Stratton return, but Terry

has to fend off the challenge of touted transfer Gary Shiede.

Top defensive hands include cornerback Dave Atkinson, who pilfered eight passes; tackle Paul Linford (6-5, 245), and end Orrin Olsen.

NEW MEXICO COACH RUDY FELDMAN is adjusting his wishbone attack to accommodate the passing talents of quarterback transfer Don Woods, NAIA total offense leader in 1972. Last year's quarterback, Bruce Boone, has shifted to running back. The Lobos will miss halfback Fred Henry but have Rich Diller and fullback Bob Barber to take up the slack.

Feldman has a major problem in rebuilding his offensive line, though. Defense could be a Lobo strong point, with nine regulars anchored by

by end Steve Bradshaw, noseguard Curtis Akins and linebacker Pat Rogers. Wyoming should uphold its reputation for tough defense but has a multitude of question marks offensively. Coach Fritz Shurmur must rebuild around quarterback Steve Cockreham, tailback Charlie Shaw, tight end John Dunn and offensive tackle Mark Chalman.

All-conference cornerback Fritz Turner and the linebacking corps of

Only four of 36 lettermen from last year's 1-10 team are missing. The entire offense is back, including Willie Miller at split end, quarterbacks Tom Juliana and Mark Driscoll and running backs Reggie Leonard and Tom Wallace. Linebacker Terry Kirk is one of eight defensive regulars.

Tommy Hudspeth, who took over at mid-season at Texas El Paso last

year, faces a formidable rebuilding job.

Greg Taylor and Lonnie Crittenden, the WAC's top two receivers, are

back. Sophomore Mark Jackson will probably take over at QB.

If Air Force coach Ben Martin can shore up his defensive line, the

Falcons could soar on the national scene.

Firepower offensively is certainly there, with eight returnees from the team that averaged 30.3 points a game. Weber State under new direction from coach Dick Gwinn.


Idaho was in "development" last year, but proved the Vandals are to be reckoned with in '73. They also will be in a new stadium.

## After 100th Win For No. 1 Team's No. 1 Coach, 1973 Is Even Brighter

When fullback Sam (Bam) Cunningham swan-dived over Woody Hayes' vaunted Buckeye defenders for a record four touchdowns as Southern California butchered Ohio State 42-17 in the 1973 Rose Bowl game, John

McKay achieved his 100th victory as Trojan head coach.

McKay's Trojans now have won seven Pacific-8 Conference crowns and three national championships (1962, 1967 and 1972) within the past 11 years. USC's 1972 national championship squad (12-0) set seven individual and three team school records.

AND THE COACH HIMSELF again reigns as America's No. 1 collegiate mentor by vote of both the Football Writers Association and his peers of the

American College Football Coaches Association.

So what does white-haired John McKay have left to prove? Why doesn't he retire to the comparative comfort and security of athletic director—a second hat he already wears modishly—and rest on his laurels?

One reason is because USC's 1973 outlook is perhaps brighter than ever,

and that's extraordinary, if you'll excuse the understatement.

Elsewhere on the west coast, the Pacific Coast Athletic Association race will be close and hotly competitive as always, but University of Pacific looks like the solid club, though it won't have a cakewalk.

Chuck Johnson, now sports editor of The Tidings, made his journalistic debut as a high school

student when he wrote a column for The Football News in its first year of existence in the late '30's.

Since then he's covered everything from the Olympic Games in Rome to jai alai in Mexico City.

alai in Mexico City.

The father of 10, he has been president of the Catholic Press Council and other organizations.

Johnson's No. 1 distinction occurred when "the Rams moved west in 1946 and I dropped — and broke —their world championship

trophy, which was a treasured NFL antique, even older than Blanda."

Champion San Diego State, Fresno State and San Jose State all will be trying to make the summit under new coaches. Highly touted Long Beach State 49ers, disappointed in '72, don't appear to have the potential.

USC's 1972 team was the strongest in school history, by McKay's own admission, and possibly the most explosive attacking force yet produced.

But as Al Jolson used to say, "Honey, you ain't heard nothin' yet."

Tailback Anthony Davis fired shots heard around the world when he zig-zagged for six scores against Notre Dame, and he exhibited almost as

much TNT in the Rose Bowl battle on New Year's Day.

OKAY, BAD ANTHONY WILL BE BACK. In a nutshell, all he accomplished as a green sophomore last season was to carry the ball 207 times for 1,191 yards and 17 touchdowns, catch 18 passes, return 12 kickoffs (two for back-to-back TDs against Notre Dame) and seven punts, and kick off 81 times. McKay says Bad Anthony will assume place kicking chores in '73, too. But henceforth he won't have to blow up the balls before home games. Yet don't get the idea USC will be a one-man team.

"As far as people returning who have played," McKay acknowledges, "we are much better off than a year ago." (Twelve-and-Oh, ho-ho-ho.)

Equally important to Trojan fortunes this fall will be QB Pat Haden. Back-up man for Mike Rae last season, playing much of it with a painful shoulder injury, Sir Patrick still managed to complete 34 of 62 aerials for 468 yards and seven touchdowns.

Making life easier for this budding all-America will be a pair of proven pass-catchers of exceptional skills, Lynn Swann and young J. K. McKay. Swann returns at flanker where he caught 27 passes for 543 yards. Lithe

Lynn finished sixth nationally in punt return stats.

J. K., THE COACH'S NO. 1 SON and heir, caught 26 passes as a soph last year, good for 342 yards and four TDs, tops on the Trojan club. (Not too bad for a skinny 19-year-old playing split end behind Edesel Garrison, who reputedly was quicker than the crack of dawn.)

Offensively, in the line are Booker Brown, Steve Riley and mastadonic Mike McGirr (6-5, 270). And the defensive line has Monte Doris, Mike

Hancock and Glenn (Tough) Byrd.

McKay figures Richard Wood, Charles Anthony, Dale Mitchell and James Sims "could be the best linebacker corps we've ever had." And in the secondary Artimus Parker has 12 interceptions, just one away from the USC career record, and is joined by Charles Phillips.

IF ANY TEAM IN THE WEST figures to give USC's Trojans a run for the money—and the roses—that club would have to be the UCLA Bruins, coach-

ed by excitable and effervescent Pepper Rodgers.

This staunch champion of the wishbone, working in concert with Tom Harmon's quarterback son, Mark, and running back wonders, the "Blair Pair", Kermit Johnson and James McAlister, really turned things around for UCLA last season. Pepper probably produced America's most improved major college football team. His Bruins rebounded from a 2-7-1 losing sea-

son in 1971 to finish 8-3 in '72. They beat Nebraska, too.

One of the keys to the UCLA grid renaissance was the wishbone, which stuck in the craws of enemy defenders. The Bruins, in fact, wound up as the nation's No. 2 rushing team. The "Blair Pair" literally ran wild, Classy Kermit is rewriting UCLA's individual rushing records. His 952 net yards on 140 carries last season bettered the previous Bruin standard. This speedster's two-year total of 1,366 yards on 200 tries is well within reach of the legendary Kenny Washington's all-time Bruin career output of 1,915 yards set back in 1937-39.

McALISTER, ANOTHER SUPER GALLOPER, came off a season's layoff to net 778

yards rushing for a 4.9 average and nine TDs.

Harmon was the Bruins' No. 5 runner with 440 yards and seven TDs. Critics complain he is loath to pass, yet young Harmon clicked on 30 of

60 aerials in '72 for 574 yards and six TDs.

Defensively, UCLA figures to have 10 of 11 starters returning from last season, including possibly the nation's niftiest pair of ends, Cal Peterson

(6-4, 200) and Fred McNeill (6-3, 198).

Stanford never really did get rolling last year, though rookie coach Jack Christiansen's crew did give USC its closest call (30-21). Overall the Cardinals were 6-5, but they bested only Oregon State and Washington in the conference, finishing tied for sixth place.

Oh, what a falling off was there for the Rose Bowl kings of '71 and '72! Notwithstanding the loss of 20 lettermen, and no fewer than 14 starters, Stanford adherents are looking forward to lots of offensive excitement. On the bright side QB Vince Boryla and swift John Winesberry will be back to assure an explosive attack—along with 29 lettermen.

Boryla finished fourth in the country last year in passing and 12th in total offense, Undoubtedly one of the nation's most dangerous runners,

Winesberry performed heroically despite knee and ankle injuries.

Tab the Cards for improvement, but they don't figure to trump the likes of USC and UCLA. They open tough, hosting Penn State.

Is California on the comeback trail?

Papa Bear Mike White had a rocky start (3-8) in '72, but things were looking up at season's end.

With the Bears floundering 1-7, freshman Vince Ferragamo got the start-

ing call against Oregon. He responded by beating the Ducks 13-12 in the mud with a pair of TD bombs. On the road a week later, Vince set a Cal single-game total offense record of 300 yards (285 passing).

In the season finale, Ferragamo drove his Bear mates 62 yards in 11 plays to upset Stanford, 24-21, with a TD aerial on the game's final play

before 68,000 screaming fans.

COACH WHITE HAS 35 RETURNING lettermen including 11 starters, plus an outstanding crop of junior college transfers, to blend with Ferragamo for a victory recipe. Top offensive returnees include running backs Fred Leathers and Sylvester Youngblood, tight end Randy Schmidt and interior linemen Ted Seifert, Steve Lawrence and Kevin O'Dorisio.

Bears to reckon with defensively will be veteran standouts Bob Smith,

middle linebacker, and end Fred Weber.

If the Pacific Northwest has a bona fide Pac-8 title contender by mid-November, or even as late as mid-October, it will be a surprise. Last year Washington's Huskies, with QB Sonny Sixkiller shooting to kill, and with Jim Owens' defenders two deep and reportedly ready to repulse the Red Chinese if necessary, didn't live up to advance billing.

Rebuilding is the motif this time, which figures with 17 starters gone. But going into his 17th season, Owens isn't going to panic. He feels the nucleus is there for a representative Husky club and, with hard work and the pressure off, who knows how far Washington will climb?

OREGON WILL BE IMPROVED and competitive most of the way in '73. Coach Dick Enright's Ducks muddled through at 4-7 last season, but they finished strong. This time around the Ducks figure to be flying higher with 40 lettermen returning, including seven exceptional frosh letter winners along

with 18 sophomores and 15 juniors.

Oregon's biggest challenge will be to find another Dan Fouts, or a reasonable facsimile of the departed Duck who shattered 19 school records and wound up seventh on the NCAA's all-time passing list and 11th on the total offense chart. A lot hinges on the adaptability of Norval Turner, who has been waiting patiently in the wings for his shot at OB.

Enright believes he has the nucleus of a very good offensive line, with guards LeFrancis Arnold and Mike Bollinger, center Carl Nickerson and tackle Ron Hunt as bell cows for the backs.

DEFENSIVELY, OREGON EXPECTS TO BE vastly improved. The Ducks gave up

only five total points in their last two games.

Across the Oregon border in Cougar country, Washington State also has a quarterback problem. With Ty Paine gone but not forgotten, coach Jim Sweeney must make a choice among Chuck Peck—Ty's back-up the past two seasons—frosh pitchman Brad Wagner and JC hotshot Mike Mitchell.

Otherwise, with 42 lettermen evenly split between the attacking and

Otherwise, with 42 lettermen evenly split between the attacking and defensive forces, WSC's outlook is reasonably bright. Ken Grandberry, third leading Pac-8 rusher last year with 833 yards, will return at tailback. The

Cougar line generally will be solid.

Oregon State (2-9) suffered through its worst season since 1954, so JC transfers will be flocking into Beaverville in response to Dee Andros' impassioned SOS. In eight seasons, Andros has experienced only two losing campaigns. So, naturally, "The Great Pumpkin" is eager to win again.

DEE WILL HAVE 37 LETTERMEN BACK trying to make his power-T productive. Who will be quarterback is anybody's guess. Dee has all three back—Tom

Hickey, Scott Spiegelberg and soph Steve Gervais.

Offensively, OSU will pass more and fervently pray. Defensively, Andros will pray even harder. Dee's defenders will be weefully inexperienced. It'll be a miracle if the Great Pumpkin still can grin by Halloween.

University of Pacific, which won seven straight games last season en route to its best record (8-3) since 1949, looks to '73 with a big chance

to win its first-ever PCAA championship.

In his second campaign as Tiger trainer, coach Chester Caddas will have 35 lettermen (10 returning starters) to help his Houston veer option stay productive. Last year it was good for an average of 265.3 rushing yards a game, with freshman Bruce Keplinger running the show.

ALL BUT ONE RETURNS IN UOP'S explosive backfield, which will be better than ever. The gallopers are 5-10 flash Willard Harrell (697 yards) and

hard-running Mike Mangrum (657 yards).

Big gaps in last year's defense, which yielded only 101 rushing yards per game to rank fifth nationally, will have to be filled if UOP is to success-

fully challenge defending champion San Diego State.

San Diego State boasts 27 lettermen back from the squad which was 10-1. The Aztecs return 15 men who saw considerable offensive action, including 6-1, 195-pound all-America quarterback aspirant Jesse Freitas, who hit on 97 of 171 aerials for 1,201 yards and seven TDs.

Likewise back are the No. 1 and No. 2 rushers, Dennis Haughn (6-1, 215), 301 yards in 90 carries, and Tim Thorn (6-2, 194) with 267 in 83,

and also some experienced receivers.

On defense, nine gladiators return with considerable experience, but

Aztec coaches secretly worry about the secondary.

coach Jim Stangeland Hopes to rebound after his worst campaign (5-6) in four seasons at Long Beach State, but it figures to be an upbill struggle. The 49ers have four obvious liabilities right off: (1) inexperience at quarterback; (2) a tough schedule starting with Grambling Sept. 8 in the Freedom Classic; (3) eight games will be on the road, and (4) the defense largely must be rebuilt, with many 49er stalwarts graduated.

On the plus side, Stangeland is a proven winner at Long Beach, and he will have tailback Al Youngblood running out of the same backfield with a

pair of JC all-Americas, Tommy Nathan and Leanell Jones.

Offensive-minded Darryl likes to pass. The ex-grid boss at nearby Fresno State declares, "Last year San Jose primarily was an inside running team-

which means that you lose.'

He will have 27 lettermen returning from a '72 loser (4-7) which nonetheless had enough firepower to beat California, Long Beach State and New Mexico. Rogers isn't rash enough to predict a PCAA crown right away, but he guarantees the Spartans will (1) attack the outside more, (2) throw the football and (3) be an entertaining team.

Fresno State was a solid team last season, but it's hard to prophecy how the Bulldogs will react to the abrupt loss of their old boss. Nobody on the

hastily assembled new staff was talking.

Los Angeles State's Diablos will launch their third season under coach Foster Andersen with 35 returnees from a 3-7 squad. QB Rick Holouback figures to create plenty of devilment, combining his passing prowess with a fine crop of other incoming Juco gems. Rick clicked on 173 of 354 aerials the past two campaigns for 3,485 yards and 35 TDs.

Redlands, which lost to Whittier in the championship showdown, appears to


be the best bet, with halfback Tim Streeter, who rushed for 1,201 yards, back

# If Any Doubts Were Out About No. 1, Race For Roses Settled the Question

Southern California utilized post-1972 season bowling to obliterate the final few stray doubts about its right to the national championship, squashing Ohio State, 42-17, with a 35-point second-half onslaught.

College football's post-season showcases, which had brought the Big Eight the heady prestige of an unprecedented 1-2-3 national finish in 1971,

seemed about to be the conference's undoing in 1972.

Setbacks suffered by Missouri, Iowa State and Colorado, however, were offset when Oklahoma squelched Penn State, 14-0, in the Sugar Bowl and Nebraska numbed Notre Dame, 40-6, in the Orange scrap.

THE ATLANTIC COAST CONFERENCE had the best bowl record of any circuit, thanks to North Carolina State's 49-13 thumping of West Virginia in the Peach and North Carolina's 32-28 conquest of Texas Tech in the Sun.

There were some scorching shootouts besides the one in El Paso. Georgia Tech shaded Iowa State, 31-30, in the Liberty. Arizona State out-offensed Missouri, 49-35, in the Fiesta. Texas axed Alabama, 17-14, in the Cotton. Tennessee topped LSU, 24-17, in the Astro-Bluebonnet. And Tampa nicked Kent State, 21-18, in the Tangerine.

Pasadena, Miami and Atlanta didn't have the only lopsided scores. Au-

burn surprised Colorado, 24-3, in the Gator.

It was in the Sugar Bowl that the final few stray doubts about Southern California's right to the national title were straying around. Actually, they were more like wishful thoughts by Oklahoma's Sooners.

The Oklahomans had been running a close second to USC in the polls

The Sooners offensed 453 yards in between fumbles but did their only scoring damage after two of the five eye-popping catches freshman split end Tinker Owens made of passes from quarterback Dave Robertson, for 27 and 17 yards during the drive.

OKLAHOMA'S DEFENSE WAS OVERWHELMING. Penn State had averaged 402 yards per afternoon on offense. This time the net was 29 on 28 rushes and 147 on 12 successes out of 31 passing tries. It was the first time Penn State hadn't scored in 68 games dating back to 1966.

Oklahoma's championship hopes lasted the rest of New Year's Eve and through half of the Rose Bowl clash. At that point, Ohio State had fought USC to a 7-7 standoff. It didn't last long. By the end of the third period, the Buckeyes were draped over the ropes, 28-10.

Ohio State was in the Rose Bowl because its bristling goal line defense

had denied Michigan at the one and five.

But in the Rose scrap, 218-pound Trojan Sam (Bam) Cunningham scored four times, from the two, one, one and one, on headlong dives over the center of the line. It was a Rose Bowl record.

Obviously, Cunningham had some help. Quarterback Mike Rae missed only seven of 25 passes, logging 229 yards and a touchdown. Sophomore

sensation Anthony Davis tailbacked 157 yards on 23 journeys.

SOUTHERN CAL, THE ONLY ALL-VICTORIOUS major college outfit, and Oklahoma thus finished as unanimous first and second choices of post-bowl pollsters. The decision on third place involved Texas, Nebraska and Auburn and came out in that order.

Texas wasn't thinking third place, or even victory, early in its Cotton contest with Alabama. The Tide used two Steve Wade pass interceptions

to burst in front, 10-0, less than 11 minutes into the game.

Texas still trailed, 13-3, at intermission but Alan Lowry quarterbacked a 59-yard, 15-play offensive and scored himself from the three.

Alabama drove deep but Terry Davis' pass was intercepted in the end zone by Terry Melancon, and Lowry then guided the Longhorns 80 yards on seven plays. Lowry hit passes of 20 and 16 before uncorking a disputed, but decisive, 34-yard trip down the sideline. Photos seemed to indicate

he might have stepped out, but the pictures were made from an angle.

Nebraska had no comeback worries in the Orange affair. It was 20-0 at halftime and 40-0 before Johnny Rodgers left, having answered critics of his Heisman Trophy triumph by scoring four TDs, some while running from I-back instead of flanker, and passing for another.

RODGERS HURLED A 52-YARD SCORING shot to Frosty Anderson, sidelined 50 yards to paydirt with a flat pass from David Humm and flitted in from

eight, four and five yards out during his one-man show.

Notre Dame's statistics were mainly negative. It was the worst defeat in Ara Parseghian's nine seasons, and the first time his Irish have lost three games. The Irish did keep a 72-game scoring skein intact.

Auburn, the team no one got around to taking seriously although it

matched Texas' 10-1 record, smothered Colorado in Jacksonville.

Auburn coach Shug Jordan expressed some surprise, and sarcasm, over Colorado's 11-point favoritism, since his Tigers stunned No. 2 ranked Alabama and were sixth-rated themselves to Colorado's 13th ranking. And after the game, everyone saw Jordan's point.

Colorado netted two yards offense in the first period and averted a shut-

out with a 33-yard field goal by Fred Lima.

Auburn converted two turnovers into a 10-0 halftime advantage, on Gardner Jett's 28-yard field goal after Johnny Simmons' interception and Wade Whatley's one-yard run after Eddie Welch's fumble recovery.

ARIZONA STATE ROLLED UP 718 offensive yards, 202 of them by halfback Woody Green, who scored on trips of 21, 16, 12 and two yards. The Sun Devils led, 28-7, at intermission but Missouri reeled off three straight touchdowns to slash the deficit to 35-28 early in the fourth period. Then ASU made it 49-28 before the Tigers struck again.

Mike Fink's 100-yard kickoff return and Chuck Link's two TDs on passes of 48 and five lengths from QB John Cherry comprised the rally. ASU

quarterback Danny White passed for a staggering 266 yards.

Iowa State also had a comeback flame out. It got up to 31-30 against Georgia Tech in the Liberty clash on George Amundson's five-yard pass to Ike Harris. But the try for two extra points failed.

Jim Stevens, playing in only his third game, was the Rambling Wreck hero. His third scoring pitch of the night, a three-yarder to Kevin McNa-

mara, produced the 31-24 advantage which stood up.

North Carolina's Atlantic Coast kings found themselves trailing Texas

Tech, 21-9, in the third quarter after leading, 9-7, at the half.

But Tech got back on top, 28-24, on a five-yard dash by George Smith, who earlier had broken scoring scampers of 65 and 46. The clincher for Carolina came on a Nick Vidnovic-to-Ted Leverenz scoring pass.

NORTH CAROLINA STATE FLATTENED West Virginia with a 35-point second half haymaker. West Virginia was on top, 14-13, at intermission but N.C.

State scored three times in the third, twice in 21/2 minutes.

Tennessee shocked LSU with a 24-3 first-half spurt as sophomore quarterback Condredge Holloway ran 15 and 10 to score and hit Jimmy Young with a six-yard payoff pitch. Bert Jones got the Tigers on the prowl in the second half, but a final effort was killed by an interception.

Tampa opened up a 21-0 halftime lead on Kent State, and that was enough to withstand the latter's three-TD-but-no-extra-point rally. Quarterback Buddy Carter threw TD passes of 15 and 35 to tight end Paul Orn-

dorff and sub signal caller Fred Solomon led an 89-yard drive.

In Division I, Massachusetts won the East regional crown, 35-14, over

California Davis at the Boardwalk Bowl. Meanwhile, Louisiana Tech downed Tennessee Tech, 35-0, for the Mideast title at the Grantland Rice Bowl.

Tennessee State rolled over Drake, 29-7, for the Midwest mark at the Pioneer Bowl, and North Dakota prevailed in the West with a 38-21 victory over

Cal Poly in the Camellia Bowl.

IN DIVISION II, HEIDELBERG defeated Fort Valley State, 28-16, to win the West regional title in the Amos Alonzo Stagg Bowl. In the Eastern contest, Bridgeport extended its win streak to 21 with a 27-22 come-from-behind victory over Slippery Rock in the Knute Rockne Bowl.

The CD football championships used a new selection process in 1972—for the first and last time. The team rated first in its region was automatically invited to that region's championship, and then the College Football Committee picked an at-large opponent

the College Football Committee picked an at-large opponent. In 1973, both Divisions I and II will decide a champion through a playoff. In Division I, eight teams will be selected for the single elimination

event, while four Division II schools will decide the champ.

UC Davis boasted the CD passing leader in quarterback Bobby Biggs, and he did complete 27 of 60 passes for a record 388 yards and one touchdown in the Boardwalk Bowl. But the balanced Massachusetts attack had the Aggies playing catch-up the entire afternoon.

MASSACHUSETTS BUILT A 20-0 LEAD on a 17-yard Piel Pennington-to-Tim Berra pass, a 10-yard scoring run by Steve Scubert and a 20-yard pass play

from Paul Mettallo to Pennington.

Davis closed the first half with a scoring strike from Biggs to Frank Attick and then opened the second half scoring. But that was as close as Davis could get as the Redmen scored twice in the final period.

Louisiana Tech, laying claim to the No. 1 CD football ranking, stalled Tennessee Tech's offense and won an easy 35-0 Grantland Rice Bowl tri-

umph. Louisiana Tech closed with a perfect 12-0 record.

Allowing Tennessee Tech only 94 total yards, the Bulldogs never were faced with a threat. Quarterback Denny Duron passed for the winning TD in the first quarter, and Louisiana scored three touchdowns in the second quarter and a final marker in the second half.

Tennessee State, a fixture in the CD football championships, rolled over Drake, the Missouri Valley titlist, but the game was not the runaway the

29-12 score might indicate.

Tennessee State jumped out to a first quarter 12-0 lead, but the offense didn't have a hand in either. Drake's defense then set up its only score in the third period on a fumble recovery at the Tennessee State 14.

But the Tigers broke open the tight struggle in the fourth quarter with

two long-range touchdowns and a 21-yard field goal.

It was a familiar story in the 12th annual Camellia Bowl. Sacramento recorded the best turnout of the six games with an attendance of 17,194,

and the North Central Conference won another title.

North Dakota, rated below Cal Poly, showed power on the ground and a capable air attack to run away from the Mustangs. After two Sioux TDs and a field goal, Cal Poly came back with a 60-yard interception return, but North Dakota was too far ahead by then.

Bridgeport's Rockne Bowl decision was its 11th of the year and 21st

straight, the longest current string, But Slippery Rock almost ended it.

Down 14-0 at the half, Slippery Rock took the lead, 22-21, in the fourth quarter. Bridgeport, with its streak on the line, took the Slippery Rock kickoff and marched 66 yards for the winning score.

In the Phenix City inaugural of the Alonzo Stagg Bowl, Heidelberg used

# Who's Leading Total-Offense Returnee? Not Davis, Boryla Or Green. Give Up?

The decision as to whether a team is major-college or college division (determined by strength of schedule) is made annually by the eight-man NCAA Football Statistics and Classification Committee, three of whose members represent the Football Writers Association of America. There were 121 majors in 1972.

You'll never guess 1973's leading returnee in total offense. No, it's not Southern Cal's Anthony Davis, nor Stanford's Mike Boryla, nor Arizona State's Woody Green. Give up? Well, it's Green's teammate, Danny White,

quarterback of the nation's highest-scoring team since 1944. Would you believe White led the country in rushing-passing yards per play (7.58) last season and topped all major collegians by putting 28 TDs on the scoreboard?

Green understandably attracts most of the attention. He's the nation's only returning consensus All-America back, a broad-shouldered 190-pounder with fluid speed (9.5 in track) and the No. 2 rushing returnee to Miami (O.)'s Bob Hitchens.

NO MAJOR TEAM has ever had two players win rushing and total-offense titles the same season, but this pair might do it: In two years they've put exactly 500 points on the board, gained an awesome 361.5

yards per game and broke 13 TD plays between 52 and 82 yards. In 21 games at quarterback, White has lost only twice (31-39 and 43-45).

Not bad for a tall, slender kid (6 feet 3 and 175) who arrived on a baseball scholarship thinking he'd punt and play a little defense. He hit .325 a year ago, was the nation's No. 5 punter (43.0) in '72 and his passing improved after letters from an unknown fan who signs "mother." Says Danny, "She seems to know football. She writes after a bad game with encouragement and pointers on improving my throwing style."

White's career 7.36 rushing-passing yards per play is ahead of the major-college record 7.16 by Drake's Johnny Bright, total-offense champion the same year (1950) Danny's father was national rushing champion.

STANFORD'S BORYLA also has a famous dad (Vince Boryla, basketball all-America at Denver in '49), "Dad gets a kick out of watching me," says senior Mike, the No. 1 passing returnee. "It's funny to remember he wanted me to quit football my senior year in high school. My coaches talked me out of it." Mike says the pressure at Stanford "after people like (Jim) Plunkett and (Don) Bunce helps you play better."

Southern Cal's Davis talked about his dad (his first coach, in Pop Warner play) after scoring six TDs, including 97 and 96-yard kickoff returns, against Notre Dame). "I owe him a lot," Anthony said. "We had a rough time when I was 16. I was involved in a car theft." In high school he was a good lefthanded quarterback "but baseball was my first love." He still

plays baseball, but "now it's hard to choose."

Davis, a junior, resembles O. J. Simpson facially, is the same size as Mike Garrett (5 feet 9 and 185) and owns a skip-step like Gale Sayers had. Davis is the No. 2 returnee in scoring, No. 4 in all-purpose running and a 1034-yard rusher despite playing third-string the first four games.

Like Davis, Ohio State's Harold Henson likes to talk about his father: "From the time I was three years old, my dad and I used to go up and walk around Ohio Stadium and talk about my maybe playing there some day." And play he did. The 6-foot-4, 218-pound farm boy became only the fifth

sophomore ever to win a major-college scoring championship.

ONE STEP BEHIND HENSON AND DAVIS among scoring returnees is North Carolina State junior Stan Fritts, a B student in pre-med whose father died when he was about to start college. "I thought about not going to school," Fritts said. "But my father had always been my biggest fan and I knew he wanted me to go. I always felt like I was playing for him.'

Fritts and Henson worked hard for their TDs, but no player in the country worked harder than Miami junior Bob Hitchens, the No. 1 rushing

returnee. His 32.6 carries per game led the nation.

Besides Hitchens, Green and Davis, there are 11 more 1000-yard rushers returning, including Northern Illinois' Mark Kellar, East Carolina's Carl Crumpler, Rutgers' Jim Jennings, Iowa State's Mike Strachan, Texas' Roosevelt Leaks, Arkansas' Dickey Morton, Minnesota's John King and Bowling

Green's Paul Miles. Leaks and Strachan are juniors, the other seniors. On White's heels in total offense are Colgate's Wishboning Tom Parr, Kansas' strong-armed Dave Jaynes and New Mexico State's big Joe Pisarcik (6-4 and 215), all seniors. Pisarcik says he'd like to forget 1972. First, his parents' home at Wilkes-Barre, Pa., was destroyed in a flood. Then a friend died of a sudden illness, Joe's brother-in-law died in a factory explosion and finally, New Mexico State finished 2-9-0.

Completing a list of five defending champions are Colorado senior Fred Lima in kick-scoring, Notre Dame senior Mike Townsend in interceptions. Georgia Tech junior Randy Rhino in punt returns and Texas Tech junior Larry Williams in kickoff returns. Lima, a barefoot Latin, played bit parts in two movies (a thug in "Godfather" and a cop in "Planet of the Apes").

Completing the list of No. 1 returnees are seniors Steve Odom of Utah in all-purpose running, Chuck Ramsey of Wake Forest in punting and Walt

Walker of Davidson in receiving.

'72 Season Individual Leaders No place for the little man in major-college football? 1972's supersquirts squelched that idea—maybe for all time. There was Heisman Trophy winner Johnny Rodgers of Nebraska and runnerup Greg Pruitt of Oklahoma, both

5 feet 9. And the smallest of them all, Louisville's 5-foot-5 Howard Stevens, led the country in all-purpose running and was the first 5,000-yard career rusher in college history. (In '71, Stevens was the shortest major collegian ever to rush 1,000 yards in a season and Wisconsin's Rufus Ferguson, 5 feet

6, second shortest. In '72, both broke 1000 again.)

Many opponents wanted to forget Rodgers, whose style was described by one writer as "like a ping-pong ball in a wind tunnel." He averaged over his career one TD every 9.0 plays—a TD frequency exceeded among all-purpose runners only by Glenn Davis (8.7) and Doc Blanchard (8.2), Army's TD twins of the Mid-1940s. Rodgers' 45 career TDs amazingly averaged 30.3 yards, his 5,586 all-purpose yards were most ever in three seasons and his 13.8 yards per play broke the record 13.6 by SMU's Jerry LeVias in 1966-68.

Stevens broke O. J. Simpson's major-college career mark in all-purpose running (193.7 yards per game to 192.9). Adding two seasons at Randolph-Macon, he holds collegiate career marks in rushing yards (5,297), all-purpose yards (7,564), points (418) and TDs (69). Ironically, he was in tears after breaking 5,000 rushing, because he was stopped fourth-and-inches late in his team's only loss. He said, "Nobody will ever understand

how badly we wanted to go unbeaten."

Well, Brigham Young's 6-foot-2 Pete Van Valkenburg used power and speed to break TDs of 93, 73 and 64 yards en rounte to the rushing championship. And Ohio State's Harold Henson, a 218-pound sophomore fullback, won the scoring title on tough, short-yardage TDs.

Take it from Virginia Tech's Don Strock, 1972 champion in total offense and passing, a strong finish can make the difference between a champion and an also-ran. In both 1971 and 1972, Strock led the nation for six weeks and topped both categories with two games left. In '71, he faded to third in total offense and lost the passing crown by one completion. In '72, he was stopped by Alabama in his 10th game and lost the total-offense lead to Utah State's Tony Adams, but Strock closed by completing 25 for 385 yards while Adams was hurt and completed only four for 28. Using a classic drop-back style and a powerful, overhand release, 6-foot-5 Strock gave Tech its first national statistical titles ever.

Adams picked off some consolation honors by leading the country both in completion percentage (.581) and interception avoidance—just 2.6 per cent. So did Florida State's Gary Huff with a country-high 25 TD passes. Among the top 25 passers, Penn State's John Hufnagel led with 9.4 yards per pass attempt and Adams' 8.0 was second.

When Southern Mississippi's Ray Guy wasn't making TD-saving tackles and interceptions (or booting a record 61-yard field goal), he found time to be probably the most effective major-college punter in history. It's true Guy's 46.2-yard punting average in 1972 ranks second to the record 48.1 by Utah's Marv Bateman in 1971. But if you subtract runback yardage, Guy's net average was 43.1 to Bateman's 39.5 (and over their careers 40.9 to 39.3, as only four of every 10 Guy punts were returned while six of every 10 Bateman punts were returned).

Kick-scoring champion Fred Lima of Colorado, Virginia Tech's Dave Strock and Rice's Mark Williams led in field goals (15 each). Missouri's Greg Hill and Wichita State's John Potts led in game-winning Field Goals

(four each).

The other three titles went to Notre Dame's Mike Townsend (10 interceptions in 10 games), Georgia Tech's Randy Rhino in punt returns and Texas Tech's Larry Williams in kickoff returns.

'72 Season Team Leaders In a heyday of Power-I and Wishbone formations, 1972's total-offense and scoring champion was Arizona State, using coach Frank Kush's idea of the venerable Wing-T. The 9-2-0 Sun Devils' 516.5 rushing-passing yards per game

was fifth highest ever and their 46.6 points per game second in modern history to Army's 1944 powerhouse (56.0). Oklahoma's Wishbone Wonders took a second straight rushing title (and seven Wishbone teams made the rushing top 10). Virginia Tech captured the passing championship.

It was a big year for offense. Scoring went up to 41.1 points per game (both teams combined) compared to 40.4 in 1971. Passing yardage went up 8.8 yards per game to 273.4 and rushing yardage went up 4.7 to 369.0—second in history only to the record 386.2 in 1956. TD passes showed the biggest increase—10 per cent—and field goals inched up to a record high.

1972's top defensive teams were 9-1-0 Louisville, which badly wanted a bowl bid and didn't get it, and 10-1-0 Michigan, which missed the Rose Bowl by inches. Louisville won both total defense and rushing defense and was fifth in scoring defense. Michigan won its second scoring-defense title in a row and ended up third in total defense and fourth in pass defense. Vanderbilt won the pass-defense title, but Michigan and Louisville led in permitting only one TD pass each. National champion Southern Cal took the ball away from opponents 51 times (second to Wichita State's 57) on fumbles, interceptions and blocked punts and scored 28 times afterwards.


# Puff . . Puff . . Big-Play Billy Runs Wild Despite Allergies, Breathing Problem


With 9.5 speed, white football shoes and an end-zone touchdown dance. he's earned the nicknames Blazin' Billy White Shoes and Lovable Hot Dog. His real name is Billy Johnson. He's a 5-foot-9, 180-pound junior halfback

at tiny Widener College in Chester, Pa., and the defending college-division champion in rushing.

scoring and punt returns.



"Medical tests indicate allergies," evplains Wid-ener coach Bill Manlove. "Doctors assure us he can



touchdown runs. In just two seasons, big-play Billy ("I like to get the job done quickly") has averaged an incredible 39.2 yards for 30 career runing touchdowns; 79.5 for six punt-return touchdowns; and 32.3 for three TDs receiving. Puff . . . puff . . . six other touchdowns called back averaged a whopping 57.8.

IMAGINE A HEALTHY JOHNSON. Handling the ball only 19.4 times per game in 1972, he exceeded the 35-year-old major-college season record for allpurpose running. He averaged 251.6 yards per game (rushing, receiving and runbacks), and at season's end, Johnson visited the record-holder, Supreme Court Justice Byron (Whizzer) White.

Unlike Johnson, his top rushing challengers are workhorses. Colby junior Pete Gorniewicz and Hope senior Bob Lamer were the nation's only col-

lege-division running backs who averaged more than 30 carries.

Corniewicz (146.3), who carries pennies in his football shoes for good luck, will probably reach 30 again, but Lamer might not. He must beat out senior teammate Greg Voss, twice a 1000-yard rusher, whose season ended with torn knee ligaments four minutes into Hope's 1972 opener. Lamer, a defensive safety, replaced Voss and finished third at 145.6.

EASTERN ILLINOIS JUNIOR NATE (THE GREAT) ANDERSON, another high-ranking rushing returnee, easily adjusted to offense after starting at safety as

a freshman. The 6-foot-3, 200-pound halfback averaged 125.5.

Versatility also describes Cal State Northridge senior Don Gray, the leading returnee in total offense. He's a dangerous quarterback, who operates the sprintout run-pass option exceptionally well. Of his 222.5 totaloffense vards, 67.6 were gained by rushing.

In contrast to Gray, the next three total-offense returnees—Lehigh senior Kim McQuilken, Heidelberg senior Jim Ruth and Abilene Christian junior

Clint Longley—are primarily passers.

McQuilken, also the No. I passing returnee with 16.7 completions per game, owns a rifle arm and saves his best games for the toughest opponents. Against four major-college teams and college-division power Delaware, he completed 56 per cent and gained 241.2 rushing-passing yards per game (against 49 per cent and 195.7 the other six games).

RUTH'S DETERMINATION to succeed, as much as anything else, accounts for his sharp passing and his team's 13-game winning streak. Following a disappointing sophomore season ("My passes wobbled, and I wouldn't be satisfied being No. 2"), Ruth threw 200 passes every day during the summer.

It paid off, and last season he averaged 14.7 completions.

Longley performed like a veteran as a sophomore last season and he completed 14.6 per game. If he ever leads the nation in passing or total offense, you can be certain of accurate statistics. He's an accounting major

and his dad works for the Internal Revenue Service.

As in '72, the pass receiving race may involve Amherst's Fred Scott, the defending champion, and UC Davis' Tay Thompson, national runnerup. They differ in size (Scott is 6 feet 3, Thompson 5-11) but are similar in other respects. Both are seniors majoring in pre-med and plan to use their good hands later on—as doctors in a small town.

COMPLETING THE LIST OF FIVE DEFENDING CHAMPIONS are Jackson State junior Ray Key in punting, Fort Valley State junior Eugene (Head) Hunter in interceptions and Indiana State senior Rick Murphy in kickoff returns.

Thanks to Murphy, Indiana State usually has good field position. In two seasons, he boasts a 30.1-yard average for 38 kickoff returns. His secret to success? "I like contact," he says. "I don't worry about fumbling and the guys who do the blocking are great."

Y72 Season Individual Leaders No matter what happens in his final two football seasons, Widener halfback Billy Johnson will long remember the Fall of 1972. Just an unheard-of sophomore before the season, the fleet Johnson quickly made headlines and won national statistics championships in rushing, punt returns and scoring,

becoming the first triple-crown winner in 27 seasons of official national college-division weekly rankings.

He averaged 172.9 rushing yards per game, and week by week established himself as one of the most exciting runners in college football. Of the four times he rushed for at least 200 yards, three were in heavy rain.

His eye-popping average of 10.5 yards per rush on 148 carries in nine games his never been approached by any player who carried that often in modern NCAA history—major-college or college-division. His lofty 34.1-yard punt-return average included touchdowns of 91, 85, 80 and 66 yards.

Such explosiveness, not surprisingly, made Johnson a threat to go all the way every time he touched the ball. He scored a country-high 18 points per game (one touchdown every 6.5 plays), and incredibly, 15 of his 27

touchdowns came on dashes from 40 to 93 yards.

Although Johnson easily won the rushing championship—by an overwhelming 26.6 yards per game—a race existed for the runnerup spot among several talented backs. Colby's Pete Gorniewicz finished second (146.3), after ranking seventh nationally as a freshman in 1971. Next were Hope junior Bob Lamer (145.6), who switched from defensive safety to tailback in the first game, and Hobart senior Don Aleksiewicz (138.8), who won the 1971 rushing championship.

UC Davis expected big things from senior quarterback Bob Biggs (who comes from a big family—eight children). Sure enough, Biggs rolled up big figures and won the total-offense and passing championships (261.8 rushing-passing yards and 20.7 completions per game, respectively). Along the way,

rubber-armed Biggs threw all 327 passes attempted by UC Davis.

## If '72 Consensus Team Looks Familiar, Five Repeaters Unequaled Since 1949

If you thought the 1972 consensus All-America football team looked vaguely familiar, you were right.

Five '72 consensus choices-Nebraska's Johnny Rodgers and Willie Harper, Oklahoma's Greg Pruitt and Tom Brahaney, and Texas' Jerry Sizemore

-were repeaters from the '71 team.

You have to go back to 1899 to find a consenus team with six repeaters, and only one since then had five. That was the 1949 gang-Southern Methodist's Doak Walker, Minnesota's Leo Nomellini, Michigan's Alvin Wistert, and Notre Dame's Emil (Six-Yard) Sitko and Leon Hart.

Hart was the last end to win the Heisman, beating out North Carolina's Charlie (Choo Choo) Justice and Walker in '49. The last end, that is, until Rodgers. But Rodgers gained more yards receiving than in any other

single category, and he was named twice as a receiver.

RODGERS WAS FULLY AS VERSATILE as Walker and Justice, as he proved in the Orange Bowl against Notre Dame by running wild from tailback and even throwing a TD pass. As all the ships at sea must know by now, Rodgers averaged a record 13.8 yards per play over his career, an amazing 30.3 yards per TD and one TD every nine plays.

The '72 consensus running backs-Purdue's Otis Armstrong, Arizona State's Woody Green and Pruitt-as a group averaged 6.06 yards per carry (against Six-Yard Sitko's 5.93 in '49) and scored a robust 40 touchdowns.

Louisiana State's Bert Jones boasted as strong an arm as any previous consensus quarterback. And Jones couldn't ask for a better tight end than 6-foot-4 Charles Young of Southern Cal's national champions.

Young was one of eight unanimous choices—one short of the record. The others were Rodgers, Sisemore, Pruitt, Alabama guard John Hannah, Notre Dame tackle Greg Marx, Nebraska middle guard Rich Glover (winner of the Outland Trophy and Lombardi Award), and Michigan State's 6-foot-5, 221pound defensive back, Brad VanPelt (winner of the Maxwell Award).

THE '72 TEAM OWNS ANOTHER DISTINCTION. It was the heaviest in history. averaging 221.8 pounds per man. At 282 pounds, Hannah was the second heaviest consensus player ever (to Michigan State's Bubba Smith, 283, in 1966). Not surprisingly, the offensive interior line averaged a record 248.4. It also included Michigan's Paul Seymour and North Carolina's Ron Rusnak. Purdue defensive tackle Dave Butz was the third heaviest ever at 279 and the defensive line averaged 241.8, another record. Penn State's Bruce Bannon, Marx, Harper and Glover were the others.

The consensus linebackers were Penn State's John Skorupan and Ohio State's Randy Gradishar, one of two juniors on the team (Arizona State's Green was the other). Joining VanPelt in the secondary were Colorado's

Cullen Bryant, SMU's Robert Popelka and Michigan's Randy Logan.

The team combined the Football Writers' Association, American Football Coaches Association, Associated Press, United Press International, Newspaper Enterprises Association and Walter Camp Foundation.

## FOREWORD

# 'Free' Substitution Has Come Full Cycle

In the 1947 Official Football Guide, Chairman William J Bingham of the NCAA Football Rules Committee wrote, in part: "During the past fifteen years the tendency has been to liberalize the substitution privilege. Formerly, a player withdrawn from the game in any half could not return to the game in the same half. Later . . . players could be substituted freely while the watch was stopped.

"Now, we have gone one step further . . ."

Strangely, those comments by Mr. Bingham 26 years ago would serve quite well as a foreword to the 1973 football rules. For with its legislation this year, the Rules Committee has completed a full cycle of the oft-amended and oft-controversial substitution rule.

The new rules' "one step further" now reads: "Any number of substitutes may enter the game between periods, after a score or Try, or during the interval between downs."

Thus is restored to the game for 1973 virtually the same degree of "free" substitution that prevailed 21 years ago, or just before the Committee abruptly reversed the whole process with its "anti-platoons" 1953 legislation.

A dozen or more other new regulations also were adopted for the coming season, among which the most noticeable will be the new fair-catch signal, designed to eliminate the halfhearted gestures sometimes offered by receivers. Now, not only must a player raise his arm clearly above his head, but he must wave his arm from side to side.

Some team's jersey numbers will be easier to read this year, too. Newly required are numbers at least eight inches on the front, with ten-inch numbers on the back.

Among the less-visible changes is a ban on the use of non-healing drugs before or during a game. And a long-standing, always understood policy concerning players with artificial hands, arms or legs, is now a part of the rules. Such artificial limbs will not be permitted.

As promised a year ago, the Rules Committee made mandatory for '73 the use of a mouth guard, and ordered for the first time that a chin strap must firmly secure a player's helmet. There's also a newly specified zone along each sideline, between the 35-yard lines, to which coaches and substitutes are restricted. Substitutes must enter from that area and those leaving the game must return to it.

However, the major impact of the new code undoubtedly will be the lifting of nearly all other restrictions on substitutions. Inexorably tied to the most discussed (and cussed) question of how and how often substitutes should enter or re-enter the game is what has become known as the "platoon system." On the horizon for 1973 may be all kinds of "specialists" platoons, in addition to the now familiar offensive and defensive units.



#### Rule One

## GAME, FIELD, PLAYERS AND EQUIPMENT

SECTION 1—This is Football. Two teams of not more than eleven players each compete on a rectangular field with an inflated ball. A goal line at one end of the field is assigned to each team to defend. The ob-

ject is to reach the opponents' goal, advancing the ball by running with it, passing it to a teammate or kicking it, and each team is given opportunities to do so. The rules provide points for scoring and, not surprisingly, the winner is the one with the larger score at the end of the game. There are no protests in college football.

**SECTION 2—Supervision.** There's a set of officials for each game, usually a Referee, Umpire, Linesman, Field Judge and Back Judge. Only each team's Field Captain may speak with the Officials.

SECTION 3—Field Dimensions. The playing field measures 300 feet between the goal lines and 160 feet in width. All boundary markers are outside the playing field, since measurements of the area are taken from the inside of the boundary markers. Thus, a player who steps on the sideline is out of bounds, and the ball has only to be in possession on or above the opponents' goal line to score.

A 10-yard area known as the end zone extends beyond each goal line. This area culminates with the end line, where the goal posts are located. The goal posts are 23 feet, 4 inches apart and are joined by a white crossbar 10 feet above the ground.

SECTION 4—Field Markings. Every white line on a football field serves a purpose and helps spectators, teams and officials. The stripes from sideline to sideline are the 5-yard markers, helpful in determining length of advance and the point to be gained. The

short stripes at one-yard intervals are inbound lines. All plays must begin with the ball on or inside the inbound lines. The short line midway between the goalposts and three yards in from the goal line is the point from which the Try-for-Point is attempted.

**SECTION 5—Yardage and Down Indicators.** The chain used on the sideline to determine the point to be gained in a series of downs is 10 yards in length, with the chain affixed to two five-foot high poles. The down coming up next is shown atop a third pole.

**SECTION 6—The Ball.** The shape and dimensions of a football are unique. It is a "prolate spheroid," and if you don't know what a prolate spheroid is, it is exactly the shape of a football. It just misses being a foot long, measuring 11 to 11¼ inches. It's just short of a pound, weighing 14 to 15 ounces. And don't let anybody tell you a football is made of pigskin. It is not. It's made of pebble-grained leather (or, occasionally, of rubber).

**SECTION 7—Jersey Colors and Numbering.** Opposing players are required to wear jerseys of contrasting color and, inhospitably perhaps, it is the visiting team that must produce the contrasting color if a change is necessary. Players must wear numbers both front and back and groups of numbers are recommended by offensive positions, as shown in the following diagram:

On a scrimmage play, at least five offensive players with numbers 50 through 79 must line up on the line of scrimmage.

**SECTION 8—Protective Equipment.** Each player must wear a head guard, or helmet, knee pads and a mouth piece. The helmet must be firmly secured by a chin strap. Other protective equipment is not mandatory. If a player shows up without shoulder pads, for example, that's his business. Few are so inclined.



#### Rule Two

#### **DEFINITIONS**

SECTION 1—Language Unique. The language of football is, as the Mods might say, something else. Its official vocabulary includes a conglomeration of terms and phrases seemingly far removed from the game's slam-bang action, as witness crawling, huddle and neutral

zone. And while the Official Rules Committee annually copes with defining official terminology, each season introduces new words into the popularly accepted unofficial vocabulary, including such of recent coinage as turnover, seam, triple option and wishbone.

Football truly has a language all its own, and one that collegiate coaching inventiveness alters even faster than the rules change.

SECTION 2—The Ball, Live, Dead, Free. In the course of a game, the Ball itself may be referred to officially as a live ball, a dead ball, a free ball, a loose ball, an out-of-bounds ball, or unofficially just a blankety-blank ball. In any case, it always is the game ball and once in play, it is "live" until it goes out of bounds, hits the ground on an incomplete pass or is declared dead by the Referee, as detailed in Rule 4. It is "live" also when it is fumbled across the goal line without being in possession of either team.

Obviously, when the ball is not "live" it is considered dead.

A Free Ball is a live ball that is not in possession of either team. The ball is "in possession" when it is controlled by a player or while a forward pass (or backward pass on the center snap) is in flight and while a punt or field goal is being attempted.

SECTION 3—Other Official Terms. Those merely start us on a long list of official definitions. Some others:

BLOCKING—Legally hindering the progress of an opponent by contacting him with any part of the blocker's body.

CLIPPING—Running or diving into the back of an opponent, or throwing the body across the back of the leg or legs of an opponent other than the ball carrier.

CRAWLING—An attempt to advance the ball by a player after any part of his person except a hand or foot has touched the ground.

DOWN—A single play by the team in possession of the ball. It starts with a snap from center or a free kick and ends when the ball next becomes dead.

DROP KICK—A technique now rarely employed, in which a player drops the ball and kicks it as it touches the ground.

FAIR CATCH—The opportunity for a player of the receiving team to catch a kicked ball that has crossed the scrimmage line, without being tackled or blocked by an opponent, after signaling his intention by completely extending one arm above his head and waving it from side to side.

FORWARD PASS-Live ball thrown toward opponents' goal.

FOUL AND VIOLATION—A foul is a rules infraction subject to a penalty. A violation incurs no yardage penalty.

FREE KICK—A kick made with each team restricted from advancing beyond a fixed restraining line until the ball is kicked.

FUMBLE—Inadvertent loss of ball by player in possession.

HUDDLE—Two or more offensive players grouped together after the ball is ready for play, usually for receiving instructions from the quarterback concerning the ensuing play.

KICKOFF—A free kick with which each half is opened, and which is employed also following each Try-for-Point or Field Goal. A kickoff must be either a Placekick or a Dropkick.

LATERAL PASS—A live ball thrown toward or parallel with the passer's own goal line.

LINEMAN—A player who is on the line of scrimmage when the ball is snapped. Conversely, a Back is a player legally behind the line at the snap.

NEUTRAL ZONE—The space between the scrimmage lines of the offense and defense, approximating 11 inches (the length of the football).

PLACE KICK—The technique most often employed to kick off and on field goal and try-for-point attempts. The ball, which may be held in position by any player of the kicking team, is kicked from a fixed position either on the ground or on a tee.

PUNT—A ball that is dropped from the hands of a player and kicked by him before it touches the ground.

SCRIMMAGE—A play which begins with a snap from the center.

SCRIMMAGE LINE—The yard line (marked or unmarked) that passes through point of the ball nearest a team's own goal line.

SHIFT—Change of positions simultaneously by two or more offensive players after play is ready to start and before the snap.

SNAP—A quick, continuous motion by which the ball is handed or snapped back with the ball leaving the hands of the snapper on the motion. The snap normally is made by the Center.

SPEARING—Illegal use of the head and helmet to ram an opponent after his momentum has stopped.

TACKLING—Grasping or encircling an opponent with hands or arms.

YARD LINE—Any line (marked or unmarked) in the field of play parallel to the end lines. "Own" yard line means between a team's own goal line and the 50-yard line (midfield).

**SECTION 4—Unofficial Terms.** Additional football terms in modern use which are not found in the Rules Book but have become common to the unofficial terminology of the game include:

ACTION PASS—Forward pass thrown from an offensive formation simulating a running play.

AUDIBLE—A vocal signal by the Quarterback at scrimmage line changing play called in the huddle. Also called Check Off.

BOMB-A long pass attempt for a touchdown.

BLITZ—Total commitment by any number of defensive backs and/or linebackers to rush the passer.

BUTTONHOOK—A pass pattern in which the receiver goes downfield and U-turns back sharply to receive the ball.

DRAW—Quarterback back pedals as if to pass, but instead hands off for running play by set back who has delayed. Linemen's initial movements are as if to pass block.

FLAG—Officials' penalty marker or field corner flag; also a pass pattern where receiver runs to the corner flag.

FLANKER-Back stationed wide right or left as pass receiver.

FLARE—Pass pattern to a back swinging wide or "flaring" out of backfield. Sometimes called Swing Pass or Wheel Pass.

FLY PATTERN—Pass play on which receiver races deep toward goalposts. Sometimes called Up or Post pattern.

FRONT FOUR-Four-man defensive line-the tackles and ends

LINEBACKER—A defensive player operating immediately behind his line where he can either aid linemen in stopping a running play or cover an opponents' receiver if a pass develops.

LOOK-IN-PASS—Receiver breaks quickly downfield and turns almost immediately to look over his shoulder for the ball.

MAN-FOR-MAN COVERAGE—Pass defense wherein defenders cover specific receivers wherever they go, rather than areas.

MONSTER—A roving linebacker who usually positions himself opposite opponents' strong side. Also called Rover.

ONSIDE KICK—A kickoff is a free ball once it travels 10 yards. The "Onside Kick" is an effort by the kicking team to kickoff short and recover the ball before the receiving team can do so.

POCKET-Area of protection for the passer, formed by blockers.

PREVENT DEFENSE—Strategem of reducing front line strength to employ more deep defenders. Used when a team is ahead and willing to give short yardage in order to shut off the long gain.

PULLING GUARD—Guard who pulls out behind scrimmage line for a trap block or to lead sweep blocking for ball carrier.

REVERSE—A running play on which the lead blockers go in one direction while ball carrier goes in the opposite direction.

ROLL-OUT—Quarterback runs laterally behind blockers before exercising option to pass or run with the ball himself.

SCREEN PASS—Pass to a receiver behind a wall of blockers, who have permitted defenders to penetrate in pursuit of passer.

SEAM—Imaginary line where two zone-defense coverage areas meet. Passer tries to confuse defenders by "hitting the seam."

SLOT BACK—Back stationed between wide receiver and interior linemen. Must be one yard behind the line of scrimmage.

STRONG SIDE—An overbalance of the number of offensive or defensive linemen to either side of the Center.

STUNTING—Defensive players repeatedly changing positions as the ball is snapped, to confuse offensive strategy.

TIGHT END—Offensive end who lines up in close formation (as opposed to Split End's wide set) where he can either block for a ball carrier or be employed as a pass receiver.

TRAP BLOCK—A ploy permitting a defender to penetrate quickly, only to be blocked from the side by pulling guard or tackle.

TRIPLE OPTION—Basis of the Wishbone-T. Quarterback has option of (1) giving to the short back or Fullback, (2) keeping and running himself or (3) tossing to trailing Halfback.

TURNOVER-Any loss of possession without scoring.

WIDE RECEIVER—A Split End or Flanker Back. Either or both are set wide of scrimmage line as potential pass receivers.

WISHBONE-T—Modern derivative of old formations such as the Split-T, "Y" and Belly Series. Quarterback is under center with fullback close behind and halfbacks split and set behind fullback. Advantage: Fullback is closer to line for dive play. Quarterback reads defensive charge quickly and either gives to the Fullback on quick play or fakes to Fullback and employs one of his other options (see Triple Option).

ZONE COVERAGE—Pass defense wherein areas are covered, rather than individual receivers. Opposite of Man-For-Man coverage.



#### Rule Three

# PERIODS, TIME FACTORS AND SUBSTITUTIONS

Each half must start with a kickoff, but it doesn't have to be a placekick. If some young man desires to begin a half with a dropkick he will be considered an innovator, but he

will be entirely within his rights. The status of the dropkick has not been changed in years, although it has virtually disappeared from usage.

There's one preliminary to the kickoff. About three minutes before the scheduled start of a game, the Referee calls the field captains together and tosses a coin, first designating which shall call heads or tails. The winner of the toss has the option of kicking receiving or choosing the goal his team will defend. A choice once announced may not be changed. The loser of the toss has his choice of the options at the start of the second half.

**SECTION 2—Start of Second and Fourth Quarters.** During the brief intermission between the first and second periods and between the third and fourth periods the teams change goals. The ball is relocated in the opposite half of the field at the spot corresponding exactly to where it was before the change of goals. Possession of the ball, the down and distance to be gained remain unchanged.

SECTION 3—Playing Time and Intermissions. The total actual playing time in a collegiate game is 60 minutes, divided into four periods of 15 minutes each and with one-minute intermissions between the first and second quarters and the third and fourth quarters. (High Schools and Prep Schools play 12-minute quarters.) The halftime intermission is 15 minutes, but it may be lengthened or shortened by mutual agreement. At any time during a game, the remaining

playing time may be shortened by mutual agreement of the opposing Field Captains and the Referee.

SECTION 4—Extension of Periods. No period ends when the ball is in play, even though time expires during the play. If the time runs but during a play on which a touchdown is scored, the Try-for-Point is completed. The period also is extended to permit completion of a play free of penalty, if a defensive team fouls on a play during which time expires. No such extension of the period applies when the team in possession fouls or when both teams foul on the play.

SECTION 5—The Game Clock. This item can be more vital to the outcome of a football game than a timer is to a soft-boiled egg. It may be a stopwatch operated by the Field Judge or Back Judge, or it may be an electrically powered field clock operated by an assistant.

The clock first starts when a Kickoff is legally caught or touched. Thus, if a Kickoff goes out of bounds the clock is not started, since the ball was not legally touched or caught.

On scrimmage plays, the clock is started when the ball is snapped or on prior signal by the Referee.

The clock is stopped (a) when the Referee declares time out; (b) when a Touchdown, Field Goal, Safety or Touchback is made; (c) when a Penalty is called; (d) when a Forward Pass falls incomplete; (e) when a Fair Catch is made or when the ball is illegally touched; (f) when a live ball goes out of bounds; (g) when a first down is declared for either team; and (h) when a period ends.

The clock does not run during a Try-for-Point.

**SECTION 6—Time Outs.** Each team is permitted three free time outs in each half, except that a team may not request two of its time outs consecutively. Free time outs may not exceed one and one-half minutes.

During a free time out, one player at a time from each team may go to the sidelines to confer with the coaches.

The Referee has the authority to call time out for a contingency

such as the repair of damaged equipment which might become dangerous, or quieting the crowd when a team can not hear its signals. He also orders time out during measurement for a first down.

The clock is stopped for each time out.

After its third time out in each half, a team may be allowed a subsequent time out only for the replacement of an injured player and such an excess time out is no longer than the Referee deems necessary for the purpose.

**SECTION 7—Delays.** If a team is not ready for play at the scheduled time for the beginning of each half, it is penalized 15 yards. Failure to promptly remove an injured player is interpreted as delaying the game and is subject to a 5-yard penalty.

But the most common form of delay is action or inaction representing "stalling" tactics by a team attempting to consume time usually near the end of either half of the game. A 5-yard penalty is invoked whenever the offensive team fails to put the ball in play within 25 seconds after it has been declared ready for play by the Referee. Also, when the Referee believes a team is trying to consume (or conserve) time by unfair tactics, he may order the clock started (or stopped).

**SECTION 8—Substitutions.** It was often called the "controversial free substitution" rule, because it seldom allowed for literally free entry of substitutes in the game, and usually restricted the number of substitutes which could enter at one time.

Now, however, a coach may send in any number of substitutes (up to 11, of course) when the ball is dead. This includes when the ball strikes the ground after an incomplete pass, when the ball goes out of bounds, or when it is blown dead by the referee.

Such multiple substitutions are permissible between periods, after a score or try-for-point, when the ball changes hands after a first down or when, after a kick, the kicking team is awarded a first down. Multiple substitutions also may be made after a fair catch.

Substitutions may not be made while the ball is in play and a substitute who enters the game may not be withdrawn until one down has intervened, a foul occurs or the period ends.



#### Rule Four

## BALL IN PLAY, DEAD BALL, OUT OF BOUNDS

SECTION 1—"Alive" if in Play. The proverbial cat with nine lives was a piker compared to the ball used in a football game. It may be "live" one minute and "dead" the next and then, without fanfare, it

becomes live again, dead again time and time again in the course of a game. And if the sweet young thing with the pom-pon asks if a live ball might race away under its own power, you'll just have to set her straight. Football, remember, has its own language.

After a dead ball has been declared ready for play by the Referee, it becomes a live ball when it is snapped or free kicked. A ball loses its "life" and becomes "dead" in many ways, including when an official blows his whistle accidentally.

SECTION 2—When Ball is Declared Dead. Generally speaking, the ball is "blown dead" by an official, signifying the end of a play:

- a. When it goes out of bounds or touches the goal line of the ball carrier's opponents, or when a ball carrier is so held that his forward progress is stopped;
- b. When any part of the ball carrier's body, other than his hand or foot, touches the ground (except it remains alive when held for a placekick, even though the ball holder's knee is on the ground);
- When a touchdown, field goal, safety, touchback or try-for-point has been made, or when a fair catch has been made;
- d. When the defensive team gains possession of the ball on a tryfor-point, or when the try fails to score;

- e. When the kicking team recovers a kick that has crossed the neutral zone;
- f. When a kick comes to rest on the ground and no player attempts to recover it;
- g. When a forward pass strikes the ground, or is caught simultaneously by opposing players;
- h. When a backward pass or fumble is recovered by an opponent after the ball has hit the ground;
- i. When a live ball touches anything inbounds other than a player, an official or the ground;
- j. When a backward pass or fumble is caught simultaneously by opposing players;

**SECTION 3—The 25-Seconds Rule.** The ball, once dead, may not be put back in play until the Referee declares it ready for play. It then must be put in play within 25 seconds.

**SECTION 4—Out of Bounds.** A play is out of bounds when a player—or the ball in his possession—touches a boundary line or anything on or beyond it except an official or another player. A free ball (except a scoring kick) or a forward pass is out of bounds when it touches the ground or anything else on or outside a boundary line.

The point where the ball crossed the sideline determines where it went out of bounds. If a player with the ball in his possession is tackled with part of his person out of bounds but the ball remains within the playing field, the ball is ruled out of bounds at the farthest point of its advance.



#### Rule Five

### SERIES OF DOWNS, LINE TO GAIN

So universally accepted is the word "down" in football that it often is taken for granted and implied, rather than stated—as in "third and three." To followers this means third down and three yards to go.

**SECTION 1—When Series is Awarded.** A down always is one play in a set of four, known as a "series of downs," because when a team comes into possession of the ball (usually by receiving a kick, intercepting a pass or recovering a fumble), it is awarded four downs in which to gain the required ten yards or more to continue possession, and to be awarded another series of four downs.

This, of course, is the significance of the familiar "first and ten," which is simply football shorthand for first down and ten yards to go. The 10-yard distance to be gained is measured from the ball's most forward point and that target (officially termed but seldom called "the line to gain") is kept in view along the sideline by a yardage chain.

Associated with the chain is a down indicator. It is an ancient and revered device now primarily for the information of nearby officials and players, since scoreboards generally serve this purpose better for everyone else in the stadium.

SECTION 2—When Series is Renewed. A legal advance to or beyond the "line to gain" may be made in one down, or in any number through four downs. When the yardage requirement has been met, the team in possession is awarded a new series of four downs and the "line to gain" is advanced ten yards. This, universally but unofficially, is known as "making a first down," as distinguished from a first down inherited when the ball changes hands.

**SECTION 3—When Series is Broken.** A team that fails to gain the required ten yards in a full series of four downs must relinquish the ball to the opposing team at the point where the fourth down play ends. To assure the turnover of possession at the most advantageous possible point on the field, the strategem most often employed is a fourth-down kick.

**SECTION 4—First and Goal.** One of the most conspicuous omissions of the word "down" is in the situation usually called "first and goal." It means a team has made (or inherited) a brand new series of downs less than 10 yards from its opponents' goal line, hence first down and goal (instead of 10 yards) to go.

**SECTION 5—Penalty Interruption of Series.** The Official Rules cover in detail various tricky situations a Referee must unravel when a penalty intrudes on a series of downs. Unless you plan to don a striped shirt, all you will be interested in knowing are these basic facts:

- a. A penalty moving the ball to or beyond the "line to gain" earns a first down the same as a run or pass play.
- b. Most yardage penalties simply cancel the play during which foul occurred and that down is repeated from the new spot (unless a first down was earned by the penalty yardage).
- c. It's also a "do over" when both teams commit fouls during a single play (called offsetting fouls), except there is an option when the ball changes possession in such a situation (Rule 10, Section 2).
- d. However, if a penalty is declined by the team against which the foul was committed, it is the penalty that is canceled and the play and down count as if the foul had never occurred.



#### Rule Six

#### KICKS

EDITOR'S NOTE-From the sketchy history of the origin of football, we know only that the kick was the very foundation of the early-day game. Without it, the ball could not have been moved, since there were no provisions for carrying the ball.

Research by Herbert O. (Fritz) Crisler of the University of Michigan, perma-

nent member of the Football Rules Committee, has brought to light the first running play of record. It was illegal, and more than fifty years passed before the American version of that run was introduced into football.

The incident took place in 1823 at Rugby School in England under "Association" football rules and William Webb Ellis, the original forgotten man of football, made the run. Near the close of the engagement, "he caught the ball and instead of kicking it back as required by the rules, ran through the astonished opposition across the goal line." Today, on an ivy-covered wall at Rugby, a tablet marks his place in football history.

THIS STONE COMMEMORATES THE EXPLOIT OF WILLIAM WEBB ELLIS WHO WITH FINE DISREGARD FOR THE RULES OF FOOTBALL FIRST TOOK THE BALL IN HIS ARMS AND RAN WITH IT THUS ORIGINATING THE DISTINCTIVE FEATURE OF THE RUGBY GAME . . . A.D. 1823.

Thus, apparently, were sown the seeds of our running game which now, with the pass, shares emphasis with the kick. But the booted ball, the subject matter of Rule 6, never has ceased to be a basic part of football.

SECTION 1—Free Kicks [Kickoffs]. The most familiar Free Kick—requiring both teams to remain behind their respective restraining lines until the ball is kicked—is the kickoff (see Definitions, Rule 2, Section 3). For the kicking team, the restraining line is its own 40-yard line (unless relocated by penalty) and the receiving team's restraining line is ten yards beyond (usually the 50-yard line).

Much rarer is the Free Kick after a safety is scored, when the restraining line for the kicking team is its 20-yard line, with the

receiving team's restraining line at the 30-yard line.

The ball is placed on the kicking team's restraining line and all of its players except the kicker and the holder of the ball on a place-kick must stay behind the ball until it is kicked. This exception legalizes the "soccer-type" kickoff.

The receiving team not only must keep all its players behind its restraining line, but also must have at least five of them within five yards of that line. This might be termed the "anti-flying-wedge" rule, because it is what prevents the receiving team from forming a solid mass of blockers around its receiver.

**SECTION 2—Free Kick Recovery.** No player of the kicking team may touch a free kick before it either reaches the opponents' restraining line (i.e., travels at least ten yards) or is touched by a player of the receiving team. Thus, when a trailing team attempts an "onside" kickoff (usually in a game's waning moments), the trick is to kick the ball a minimum distance over ten yards and try to recover it before the opposition does. If the ball is touched before it has traveled ten yards, the kicking team is "offside" and the opponents are awarded possession at that spot.

A player of the receiving team may run with a free kick (unless a fair catch was signalled), but a player of the kicking team cannot advance a recovered free kick.

If a ball rolls dead on a free kick, i.e., no one attempts to take possession, it belongs to the receiving team. And for the first time in 1972, an untouched kickoff into the receiving team's end zone automatically belongs to the receiving team, and is a touchback. Previously, the kicking team scored a touchdown by recovering an untouched kickoff in opponents' end zone.

**SECTION 3—Kickoff Out of Bounds.** When a kickoff (or any free kick) goes out of bounds untouched, the receiving team may either (a) take possession where it went out of bounds or (b) require the kicking team to accept a 5-yard penalty and kick again (this time from its own 35-yard line, if kickoff was from the 40).

whether punts, placekicks or dropkicks—have no restraining line for either team except the line of scrimmage. Either a punt or a placekicked field goal attempt is the common fourth down strategy of an offensive team that has failed to make the necessary ten yards in three of its series of four downs.

If a scrimmage kick (except the try-for-point) fails to cross the scrimmage line, whether blocked by an opponent or for other reason, any player may recover and advance the ball. But once the ball has crossed the scrimmage line, no player of the kicking team may recover the ball before it touches an opponent. If the kicking team touches the ball first, possession is awarded to the receiving team at the spot, and the ball becomes dead.

A scrimmage kick that strikes the ground in the receiving team's end zone before being touched by a player of the receiving team is immediately dead and it's a touchback.

Otherwise, as with free kicks, the receiving team may advance any scrimmage kick it recovers or catches (unless a fair catch was signalled), but not so the kicking team. A scrimmage kick that goes out of bounds belongs to the receiving team at that point.

SECTION 5—Opportunity to Catch a Kick. A player of the receiving team who is in position to catch a kick may not be interfered with by the kicking team while the ball is in flight. This protection terminates, however, the moment he or a teammate touches the ball.

SECTION 6—Fair Catch. A fair catch signal—arm extended clearly over head and waved from side to side at least once—gives a player the right to make an unmolested attempt to catch the ball without fear of being blocked or tackled after the catch. As his part of the bargain, the kick receiver's fair-catch signal "promises" he will not attempt to run with the ball.

When a fair catch is made, the ball is dead at the spot of the catch and the receiver incurs a 5-yard penalty if he takes more than two steps after the catch. If a player of the kicking team tackles or blocks an opponent who has made a fair catch, he incurs a 15-yard penalty.

A player who signals for a fair catch is not obligated to attempt the catch, but if he does not, he must not block an opponent on the play (enforced by a 15-yard penalty).



#### Rule Seven

### SNAPPING AND PASSING THE BALL

SECTION 1—The Scrimmage. The action starts with the kick-off, but the tempo usually increases with the "scrimmage" that follows the kickoff. The scrimmage literally is the heart of the game—the means

through which the power, the finesse and the deception of the game are set in motion and the defense thrown into gear. It starts with the teams facing each other across a narrow strip of No Man's Land about 11 inches wide. The snap of the ball sets in motion a play that may be a run, a pass or a kick.

The scrimmage play must start between the hash marks (inbound lines)—within the center-third of the field's width. It need not end there, but if it does not, the Referee must move the ball back into the area between the hash marks before the next play begins.

The Center, officially known as the snapper, may not move the ball or change his stance after he has taken his position for the snap. Nor may any of his teammates make any movement feigning the start of play. Players on defense need not remain stationary before the snap of the ball, but they may not touch the ball, cross or encroach on the neutral zone or make contact with an opponent. A substitute who is entering the game must be within 15 yards of the ball before it is snapped.

**SECTION 2-Scrimmage Formation.** At the snap of the ball, at least seven members of the offensive team must be on the line of scrimmage. Five of these players must wear numbers from 50 through 79. This permits the officials to quickly identify players who are NOT

eligible to receive a forward pass and who, accordingly, are prohibited from going downfield before a pass is thrown.

Those players on the offensive team who are not required to be on the line of scrimmage when the ball is snapped must be at least one yard behind it, with this exception; One player, usually the quarterback who first receives the ball from center, may be less than one yard from the line of scrimmage at the time of the snap. It is legal, however, for the center to snap the ball directly to another back. And it is permissible for one offensive player to be in motion immediately before the snap, but the "man in motion" must run laterally or toward his own goal, not toward his opponents.

**SECTION 3—Shift Plays.** If the snap is preceded by a huddle or a shift (simultaneous movement of two or more players), all offensive players must come to an absolute stop and remain stationary for one full second before the ball is snapped.

An offensive player who is behind the scrimmage line may hand the ball forward to a teammate who also is behind the line.

SECTION 4—Backward Pass and Fumble. A ball carrier may hand or pass the ball backward at any time and a backward pass or fumble may be caught or recovered by any player. If caught in flight by an inbounds player, the ball continues in play, but if recovered after the ball hits the ground, only the offensive team may advance it.

When a backward pass or fumble goes out of bounds or is caught or recovered simultaneously by opposing players, the ball becomes dead at that spot and belongs to the team last in possession.

SECTION 5—The Forward Pass. The offensive team may make one forward pass during each scrimmage down, but it must be thrown before the passer advances beyond the neutral zone. The defensive team may not throw a forward pass, nor may the offensive team intentionally ground a pass in an effort to avoid the risk of interception or to conserve time.

**SECTION 6—Eligibility to Catch Pass.** All defensive players are eligible to catch (intercept) a forward pass, but only six offensive players (including the passer) may do so. They are those wearing numbers other than 50 through 79, normally the two ends and four backs. However, when a defensive player touches a forward pass, all players become eligible.

Ineligible pass receivers (including numbers 50 through 79) may not advance beyond the neutral zone until the pass is thrown.

**SECTION 7—Completed Pass.** A forward pass is completed when the ball is caught by an eligible offensive player who is inbounds, and the ball continues in play. It also is completed when caught simultaneously by opposing players but, although the passing team is awarded the ball, it may not advance it.

**SECTION 8—Incompleted Pass.** A forward pass is incomplete when it strikes the ground or goes out of bounds. It also is incomplete if a receiver jumps to catch the pass and comes down with a foot on or outside a boundary line (sideline or endline) before one of his feet or his body touches in bounds. On an incomplete pass, possession remains with the passing team at the previous scrimmage spot.

**SECTION 9—Pass Interference.** Contact by an opponent which interferes with an eligible receiver (defensive players included) beyond the neutral zone, is pass interference. However, players are not guilty of interference when making a simultaneous and bona fide effort to reach the ball.

Pass interference by a defensive player gives the offensive team the ball and a first down at the spot of the foul (on the 1-yard line, if foul is in end zone). Offensive interference costs a down and 15 yards, if foul occurs in the field of play. If it occurs in the defensive team's end zone, it may be ruled a touchback, thus loss of possession by the passing team.



#### Rule Eight

#### **SCORING**

SECTION 1—Value of Scores. The game of football blends brain and brawn to a degree unknown in any other sport, and its offensive and defensive maneuvers have increased in complexity from season to sea-

son throughout the game's 104-year history. Yet its scoring values have remained remarkably simple. They are:

Touchdown	
Field Goal	
Safety (points awarded to opponents)	2 Points
Suggestive Two for Daint(s) (by run or pass	2 Points
Successful Try-for-Point(s) { by run or pass } by kick	Point

That's all, except that a forfeited game (the rarest of occurrences in the case of football) is scored as 1-0 against the forfeiting team. A 1-0 score is possible in no other football situation.

**SECTION 2—Touchdown.** A touchdown, carrying a value of six points, is scored when a player is in legal possession of the ball when it—NOT the player—is on, above or beyond the opponents' goal line. If the ball carrier is thrown or falls on his opponents' 1-yard line and slides across the goal line, it is NOT a touchdown unless the ball's forward point was on or above the goal line at the moment his body hit the ground.

**SECTION 3—Try-for-Point(s) After Touchdown.** The Try-for-Point(s), also known as the conversion, is a "bonus" opportunity granted a team that has just scored a touchdown to add to its

total by one or two points, while time is out. The attempt is a scrimmage play from the opponents' 3-yard line. A placekick or dropkick clearing the crossbar between the opponents' goal posts earns one extra point. Two points are added by a legally completed forward pass or a running play that advances to or beyond the opponents' goal line.

Following the Try-for-Point(s), play is resumed by a kickoff, with the option of kicking or receiving being exercised by the Field Captain of the team against which the touchdown was scored.

**SECTION 4—Field Goal.** The three points awarded for a successful field goal are earned by a placekick or a dropkick that clears the crossbar between the opponents' goal posts before it strikes the ground or a player of the kicking team. It is a scrimmage play and a field goal may not be scored on a kickoff.

A ball that clears the crossbar between the uprights, but is blown back over the crossbar, does not score a field goal.

As following a Try-for-Point(s), the Field Captain of the team scored against designates which team is to kick off following a successful field goal.

**SECTION 5—Safety and Touchback.** When the ball becomes dead in an end zone, whether out of bounds or in the possession of a defending player, it is ruled either a touchback (which scores no points) or a safety (two points). The determining factor is the impetus that sent the ball into the end zone.

If a team attacking a goal is responsible, it is a touchback and the defending team takes over the ball on its 20-yard line.

But if the ball becomes dead in an end zone as result of a kick, pass, snap, fumble or run (accidental or intentional) with the ball in possession of the team defending that goal, it is a safety, which scores two points for its opponents.

Following a safety, the defending team (having just yielded two points), must put the ball into play from its own 20-yard line by a free kick, which may be a punt, dropkick or placekick.



#### **Rule Nine**

# CONDUCT OF PLAYERS AND OTHERS

SECTION 1—Limited Violence. If you bruise easily, football probably is not your competitive sport. The game involves the hurtling together of human bodies, often weighing 250 pounds or more and moving at

utmost speed. But this is not wanton violence. Unnecessary roughness, unfair tactics and unsportsmanlike conduct are severely penalized and specified protections are provided for situations in which players are unable to protect themselves adequately. All persons affiliated with the teams are subject to the rules, even if not involved in the game.

**SECTION 2—Personal Fouls.** A loss of 15 yards, plus disqualification of the offender in flagrant situations, is the penalty for these acts of unnecessary roughness identified as personal fouls:

- a. Kicking, kneeing or striking an opponent with a fist, extended forearm, elbow or locked hands.
- b. Striking an opponent's head, neck or face with the heel, back or side of the open hand.
- c. Tripping or clipping an opponent (except that clipping is not a foul within a specified, immediate area of the scrimmage line).
- d. Piling on, falling on or throwing the body on an opponent after the ball becomes dead.
- e. Tackling a ball carrier when he is clearly out of bounds or throwing a ball carrier to the ground after the ball becomes dead.
- f. Running into an opponent obviously out of the play.
- g. Hurdling, or grasping the face mask of an opponent.
- h. Using the helmet or head to maliciously butt an opponent.

**SECTION 3—Roughing Kicker or Placekick Holder.** The same stiff penalty protects the punter and kick holder from rough treatment as they concentrate on their demanding assignments. However, contact with the kicker is forgiven when a punt or placekick is blocked, since this is attacking the ball rather than the man.

**SECTION 4—Interference Fouls.** Other applications of the 15-yards, possible-disqualification penalty are for fouls that interfere with orderly game progress and administration:

- a. Interference with the ball or a player by a substitute or any personnel on the field illegally. (When a reasonably assured touchdown play is thus interfered with, the touchdown is awarded.)
- b. Use of abusive or insulting language to officials or players.
- c. Use of words or signals by the defense to disconcert opponents preparing to put the ball in play.
- d. Concealing the ball beneath clothing or substituting anything for the ball,
- e. Failure of a player to return the ball to an official immediately after a score or at any other time.

**SECTION 5—Blocking Yes, Holding No.** One of the more frequently assessed penalties is the loss of 15 yards for "holding." This is because of the fine line between illegal holding and legal blocking. The latter is using the body to remove an opponent from the path of the play. It becomes holding when an offensive blocker uses a hand or forearm, unless the hand is kept in contact with the blocker's body and below the opponent's shoulders. It also is holding when an offensive player uses his arms to hook, lock, clamp, encircle or lift an opponent. The same restrictions apply to a defensive player only when he is not attempting to get to the ball or ball carrier. Blocking must be an individual effort, i.e., teammates may not grasp one another for interlocked blocking.

**SECTION 6—Batting and Kicking.** Unlike baseball, batting generally is frowned on in football. In this game, it means striking the ball with the hand or forearm, which is legal only while a forward pass or scrimmage kick is in flight. And even though the game is football, it is illegal to deliberately kick a free ball, forward pass or a ball being held for a placekick by an opponent.



#### Rule Ten

#### PENALTY ENFORCEMENT

**SECTION 1—Referee Presides.** While all football officials are responsible for enforcing the rules, the Referee's role is the dominant one. Figuratively, he is the presiding judge and chief law enforcement officer. He

has general supervision over the game and his decisions on matters not specifically assigned to other officials are final.

Before a penalty is enforced, the Referee explains the penalty options or alternatives to the Field Captain of the offended team. A penalty is completed only when it is accepted or declined, or when it is canceled because of offsetting fouls.

**SECTION 2—Field Captain Accepts or Declines.** The role of the Field Captain is unique in football, the one game in which the automatic assessment of a penalty against the opponents would be to the disadvantage of the offended team that has achieved its objective despite the foul.

A striking example is when a team has completed a touchdown play on which the defenders fouled. In such a situation, the Field Captain's choice is simplicity itself. He declines the penalty, since its assessment would erase the successful play. A more difficult decision would be whether to accept a 5-yard penalty against the opposition (without expending a down) or to decline and retain a 7-yard gain on the play (at cost of a down).

Any penalty may be accepted or declined by the offended team's Field Captain, but a disqualified player must leave the game in any case. If opponents are charged with two or more fouls on the same play, the Referee explains the alternative penalties to the Field Captain, who may then elect only one of them.

Usually no option exists when fouls are committed by both teams on the same play. Such offsetting fouls cancel each other and the down is replayed automatically. However, if the ball changes possession during such a play, the team last gaining possession may decline the offsetting fouls and retain possession, after the penalty for its own transgression is assessed.

**SECTION 3—Enforcement Procedures.** A Referee's lot is not an easy one, as attested by the complex enforcement procedures spelled out by this section of the Official Football Rules. For the rest of us, fortunately, awareness of these basic principles should be sufficient:

- a. No distance penalty may be more than half the distance to the goal, thus assuring that a score cannot be achieved by a penalty. For example, what would normally be a 15-yard penalty is assessed as only five yards when the enforcement spot is the offending team's 10-yard line, or only a half yard if enforced from the 1-yard line.
- b. If the defensive team fouls during a successful try-for-point(s), the offensive team's Field Captain may either (1) accept the point(s) scored, with the distance of penalty assessed against opponents immediately prior to the ensuing kickoff; or (2) choose to replay the try-for-point(s). The latter option might be exercised if the scoring team should decide to try for two points (from the 1½-yard line) instead of the one point it had made (from the 3-yard line).

**SECTION 4—Summary of Penalties.** The Official Football Rules book lists a total of 83 penalties (with some cross indexing), among which the most often encountered probably are:

LOSS OF 5 YARDS—Offside, illegal procedure, illegal motion, illegal shift, substitution infraction, delay of game and (incurring also loss of a down) intentionally grounded or illegal forward pass.

LOSS OF 15 YARDS—Personal foul, clipping, roughing the kicker or holder, unsportsmanlike conduct (chiefly non-contact fouls), illegal use of hands and arms, ineligible receiver downfield and (incurring also loss of a down) forward pass illegally touched and offensive forward pass interference (the penalty for defensive forward pass interference awards the ball to the offended team at the spot of the foul).
