First Day

The ninth annual session of the Atlantic Mission Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church convened at Parmele, N. C., Thursday, October 19, 1905, at 9:30 a. m., Bishop Earl Cranston presiding.

CONSTITUTION FOR THE GOVERNMENT

of the

BOARD OF TRUSTEES

of the

GRAHAM COLLEGIATE INSTITUTE.

ADOPTED BY THE ATLANTIC MISSION CONFERENCE IN EDUCATIONAL SESSION. SATURDAY, OCT. 21 1905.

ARTICLE 1. The name of this corporation shall be THE GRAHAM COLLEGIATE INSTITUTE.

2. The purposes of this corporation shall be for the better education of the youth of both sexes, and its operations shall be carried on under the direction of the Methodist Episcopal Church through its constituted authority in the patronizing territory of the Institution.

3. The management of the Institution shall be vested in a board of nine Trustees, to be elected by the Atlantic Mission Conference, or its successors; at least two-thirds of whom shall be members of the Methodist Episcopal Church. Three of these Trustees shall be elected for one year, three for two years and three for three years. Vacancies in this board occurring by death or resignation, shall be filled by the Atlantic Mission Conference or its successors in the territory now occupied by this Conference as the same may be hereafter determined by

the General Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church.

4. The Trustees shall have power to buy, hold and dispose of such real estate and other property as may be necessary to carry out the purposes of this organization; to sue and be sued, and to transact any other business that ordinarily belongs to institutions of like character.

5. The location of the principal office shall be at Marshallberg, Carteret county, North Carolina.

6. This corporation shall have no capital stock.

7. The trustees, as soon as practicable, after their election, shall meet and organize by the election of a President of the Board, a Secretary and a Treasurer.

8. The powers of the Board may be delegated to an Executive Committee, consisting of not less than five members of the Board to be exercised in the interval between its annual sessions; but all the actions of the said executive committee, when relating to property, or the incurring of debt for building purposes, shall require confirmation by a majority of the Board in annual or called session.

9. The Board may adopt such by-laws for the transaction of its business as it may deem necessary or convenient.

10. The annual meeting of the board of Trustees shall be held at Marshallberg, N.C. on the second Monday in May of each year.

The Statistical Secretary read his reports, which on motion, were adopted and ordered printed in the minutes.

Various resolutions of thanks were, on motion in every case, adopted and ordered printed.

On motion of W. Q. A. Graham, a vote of thanks was tendered C. M. Levister, President

of Graham Collegiate Institute.

Question 4, was on motion of W. Q. A. Graham, resumed, and on his motion, William C. Baines and William R. Woodell were admitted on trial, they having been recommended by their respective quarterly conferences.

On motion of C. M. Levister, A. Boylan FitzGerald and W. C. Baines were elected to Deacon's Orders under Missionary Rule.

The Auditing Committee's report was read and adopted.

On motion, the Secretary was instructed to print the report of the committee on Educational Interests in the minutes.

On motion it was ordered that after devotional services, the reading of the minutes and the appointments, the conference stand adjourned without day.
