DAILY PROCEEDINGS

FIRST DAY

Tuesday, October 4, 1910

The Fourteenth Annual Session of the Atlantic Mission Conference convened in Parmele Methodist Episcopal church at Parmele, N. C., Tuesday Cctober 4, 1910, 10 a. m.

Bishop Anderson having telegraphed the Superintendent that he would necessarily be late in arriving but that the business should proceed, the Superintendent opened the Conference.

After singing 'Jesus Lover of My Soul' and prayer by T. S. Davis, the superintendent read the first chapter of Saint John.

The former Secretary called the roll and the following Members responded: -D. D. Bailey, M. L. Chappell, T. S. Davis, W. Q. A. Graham, W. F. Graham, J. J. Lewis, W. J. Plint, W. R. Woodell.

Probationers:-W. C. Baines,

W. J. Plint was elected Secretary and named D. D. Bailey as his Assistant.

W. F. Graham was elected Statistical Secretary and named W. E. West as assistant.

W. Q. A. Graham was elected treasurer and named T. S. Davis as assistant.

On motion of W. J. Plint the Conference hours for the day were fixed at 2:30 and 7:30 pm.

On motion of Dr. Graham the meeting at 2:30 was declared a statistical session.

The Secretary read a communication from National Reform Association. On motion of J. J. Lewis, W. Q. A. Graham and T. S. Davis were appointed as delegates to the World's Conference in Philadelphia November 16, 1910.

ATLANTIC MISSION CONFERENCE

On motion of M. L. Chappell, J. J. Lewis was appointed as Canvasser for Methodist Review.

On raotion of D. D. Bailey, Conference adjourned. Benediction was pronounced by T. S. Davis.

STATISTICAL SESSION

After devotional services by Dr. Graham the secretary called the roll of charges and the pastors passed in their reports.

Appropriate remarks, relative to the good of our work were made by Brothers M. L. Chappell, J. J. Lewis, W. Q. A. Graham, W. R. Woodell and T. S. Davis.

The Secretary again called the roll for delinquents and we adjourned.

EVENING SESSION

Conference convened at 7:30 p.m., Bishop W. F. Anderson, D. D., presiding.

After preaching service by the Bishop the business of the conference was resumed.

Question 14 was taken up, T. S. Davis, Superintendent was called, his character passed and report read.

The following were called, they reported their collections and their Characters were passed:-W. J. Plint, M. L. Chappell, J. J. Lewis, W. Q. A. Graham.

Question 1 was called and W. Q. A. Graham, T. S. Davis and W. J. Plint were appointed committee on Incorporation.

Question 2 was taken up and the Bishop announced the Transfer of William E. West, in the Studies of the First Year, from the Blue Ridge Annual Conference.

Questions 3, 21, 23 and 24 were called. The answer to each being 'none.' $\label{eq:Question}$

The Bishop appointed W. F. Graham and J. J. Lewis as tellers and T. S. Davis, W. J. Plint and J. W. McWilliams were elected Trustees of the Graham Collegiate Institute, terms to expire in 1913.

Question 32 was considered. Invitations were received from Elizabeth City and Rowlands. Upon vote Rowland was selected as the seat of our next conference session.

On motion of D. D. Bailey Conference adjourned. Benediction by the Bishop.

SECOND DAY.

Wednesday, October 5, 1910.

Conference convenel at 8:30 a. m., Bishop Anderson in the chair. After singing and prayer by Dr. W. E. Tomkinson the Bishop read the thirteenth chapter of First Corinthians.

The journal of Tuesday was read, corrected and approved.

Dr. Graham made a very interesting report of 'the work of our school.

Question 7 was called. On motion of the Superintendent Evan J. Midgett. in Studies of Second Year, was Discontinued.

Question 6 was taken up and W. C. Baines was Continued on Trial in Studies of Second Year.

Q testion 9-b was called, W. F. Graham and W. L. Moore were Continued in Studies of Third Year.

Question 10 was taken up. The Examiners made favorable report and on motion of T. S. Davis, W. R Woodell was advanced to Studies of Fourth Year.

Questions 28 and 30 were called, the answer to each being 'nil'.

Question 29 was called. The Bishop announced to the Conference that the Annual Draft on the Book Concern had not been received, however the Treasurer reported \$7 received by collections.

Question 27 was taken up and the Treasurer announced \$401 as the Aggregate of Conference Collections.

On motion of M. L. Chappell, the case of L. .N Booth was referred to Superintendent for investigation.

The Bishop announced a recess of 30 minutes.

After recess question 6 was recalled, the Examiners made report and on motion of T. S. Davis, Wm. E. West was Continued on Trial and advanced to Studies of Second Year.

The Treasurer read his report which was adopted.

The Statistical report was read and adopted.

The following Committees made reports which were adopted, viz:-Temperance, Periodicals, Education, Foreiga Missions, Home Missions, Church Extension, Sunday School, Freedman's Aid. Thanks. Auditing.

The Bishop read the distribution of the Missionary Appropriations which were accepted.

Question 15 was called and the Bishop announced the Transfer

of D. D. Bailey to the Blue Ridge Conference. Question 4. On motion of T. S. Duvis, Zucheus Weston from the Independent Methodist Church of America was received into membership in the Conference as an Elder upon his Credentials.

On motion of the Superintendent the Secretary was authorized to edit and publish the conference minutes, assessing each pastor their proportional part of the cost.

On motion of M. L. Chappell. after the communion service and the reading of the minutes and appointments the conference stood adjourned 'sine die'.

REPORT OF THE BOOK COMMITTEE TO THE ATLANTIC MISSION CONFERENCE

Dear Brethren:-We return thanks to the Giver of all good and perfect gifts for His continued blessings and the prosperity we now enjoy.

We acknowledge our indebtedness to those pioneers of Methodism who, guided by the Spirit of Divine Wisdom, laid the foundation of our great publishing interests, and to those God-fearing men of later years who by their untiring energy and zeal have contributed toward the present attainment.

The general financial and commercial condition of today indicate that the former prosperity that this country enjoyed has not fully returned; notwithstanding our Agents, by painstaking constant endeavor and careful management have produced results that exceed those of any year heretofore with the result that your Committee has been thus enabled to increase the dividend in the sum of ten thousand dollars (\$10,000), making for the benefit of the Conference Claimants an amount that is most gratifying, and aggregating one hundred and seventy thousand dollars.

In addition to this cash dividend there has been forwarded to the homes of these veterans of the Church, free of expense, Advocates and other periodicals, whose cost aggregates eight thousand seventy-eight dollars and eighty cents, making an actual dividend of one hundred and seventy-eight thousand and seventyeight dollars and eighty cents.

There comes from the press of the Publishing Houses many thousands of books and periodicals that spread the doctrines of our Church, and which supply the demand for good and wholesome literature. Thus our agents have made available to preacher and people the words of the best writers of the day, and afford opportunities for great intellectual and spiritual advancement.

In this day of apparent indifference to things spiritual, when the tendency seems to be toward a literature rationalistic, striving to break down the historic faith, the publications as offered to our connection, whether they be along the lines of practical religion; theology; biography, sociology, or in fiction, can be read and recommended to your people without fear.

The record made by our Sunday-school publications is most gratifying; the present is a time of transition, the old system making way for the more modern graded lessons, which, if properly used, must prove of valuable service and further increase the scope and power of the work.

No periodicals issued by the church make such demands on the thought and energy of those interested as the various advocates. Why these papers, attractive in form, composition, and literary merit, should not receive a more generous support is difficult to comprehend. We urge a hearty co-operation on the part of our preachers for a strong, systematic effort that will bring up the circulation of these papers.

We report the Episcopal fund in a healthy condition, Lut it must be so maintained, that we may be prepared to meet any increased demand upon this fund.

The collection for general conference and the commission expense must not be overlooked. The total amount required is approximately \$140,000, which was to be raised during the term of three years; one-third of that time has elapsed, and the amounts so far received indicate that a special effort should at once be put forth if the amount needed is collected and the funds of our conference claimants protected.

. We urge upon the committee on entertainment for the annual conference sessions, in their preparation of program, that they arrange in connection with the publishing agents for an "anniversary for the book concern." and we request that the pastors use their efforts to secure a similar service annually in their Brotherhood, Epworth League, Sunday-schools and Young Ladies' Aid Societies.

We congratulate the general membership upon the financial showing as made by the book concern, and express our sincere appreciation of the efforts of those who have in any manner contributed toward the results.

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Finally, the interests we serve are your interests, and we ask for your hearty co-operation that the dividends for the conference claimants may be maintained.

EDUCATION.

Dear Brethren:-Your committee on Education begs to renort. - We believe that Christian culture, educational excellence and genuine spirituality, may be classed among the things which accompany salvation and that at no period of the child's life does he need the guiding hand of consecrated Christian influence more than in the days when he is learning the things which he is to believe. and which are to shape the events of all his after life. We do not intend this report to condemn the political schools of our state or nation. In some respects they are indispensible, especially in the making of a cosmopolitan American citizenship, but when the choice of schools is to be made in a Christian home the result should always be the placing the boys and girls where they will receive the advantages of Christian Education. We have many such institutions in our own Church, under the control of the Board of Education, The Freedman's Aid Society and The Womans Home Missionary Society. Each of these societies should be liberally supported by the Church, and we should make earnest effort to raise every dollar asked of us by the Board of Education which has oversight and is giving aid to our white schools in the South.

We gladly re-affirm the statement made by us the last two years as follows:—We have within our bounds one of the schools under the auspices of this society, the Graham Collegiate Institute. This school has been at work for twenty years and has been a blessing to many of our young people and a strong factor in the accomplishment of whatever good may have been wrought by us in this field. This school is under splendid management at the present time and is worthy of the confidence and support of our people. We ask our people for enlarged liberality towards this institution and we hereby endorse the appeal which the president is making to the benevolently inclined for financial aid in carrying on the work of the school.

We gladly recommend that as a Conference we make a special appeal to the friends of Education for aidfor our Conference School and respectfully ask that, by vote, you adopt the following paper and ask the Bishop and Secretary to attach their signatures to the same.
