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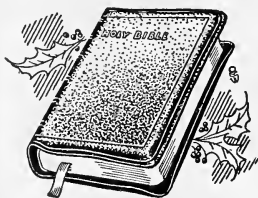

DAILY PROCEEDINGS

WEDNESDAY MORNING

The Eighty-Fourth Session of the North Carolina Annual Conference, Central Jurisdiction, convened in Saint Matthews Methodist Church, Greensboro, N. C., on Wednesday, October 28, 1942, at 9 a. m. Bishop R. E. Jones, presiding.

Bishop Jones conducted a very helpful and impressive devotional service.

Rev. J. E. Brower, by common consent, was elected secretary of the conference. Treasurer, Rev. N. J. Pass. Statistician, Rev. P. I. Wells. All ministers and lay delegates were requested by Bishop Jones to pass in their names that they may be recorded present instead of calling the roll.

Motion prevailed that a committee on the Journal be appointed.

The Secretary, J. E. Brower, was asked by the Bishop to

name the committee. Dr. G. H. Caldwell, Rev. R. B. McRae and E. N. Mattison were named.

On motion of R. W. Winchester the first six seats of the church were made the bar of the conference.

Motion prevailed that the printed program become the official program of the conference.

Introductions: Bishop Jones introduced Dr. Harry B. Gibson, of Youngstown, O.; Dr. J. W. Haywood, president of Mrorristown college; Dr. William McCallum, district superintendent of Columbus district, Columbus, O.; Dr. and Mrs. S. M. Riley, of Columbus, O., and Dr. C. K. Brown, of Jacksonville, Fla. Dr. Brown made impressive remarks after which Bishop Jones led the conference in singing "It Is Well With My Soul." Mrs. R. N. Brooks, of New Orleans, and Dr. Edgar Love, of New York, were introduced. Dr. Love spoke briefly.

Rev. S. S. Seay, pastor of Trinity A. M. E. Z. church, Greensboro; Rev. W. C. Cleland, pastor of Bethel A. M. E. church were introduced by the Bishop.

Rev. J. E. Brower presented Mrs. R. E. Jones to the conference. Rev. W. F. Elliott, pastor of the First Baptist church, High Point, was introduced.

The conference stood with bowed heads as the secretary called the names of the deceased:

Hymn, "Walk In the Light" was sung, after which Rev. D. L. Thomas read the Scripture.

Hymn No. 518 was sung.

Rev. J. W. Simpson presented Rev. L. A. Brown, of Asheville, who delivered a very impressive memorial address.

Hymn No. 525 was sung.

On the recommendation of R. W. Winchester the report blanks sent out by Bishop Shaw were adopted as the method of the pastor's reports. Announcements were made. Then Rev. G. W. Byers pronounced the benediction.

WEDNESDAY AFTERNOON

2:30 p. m.—Several hymns were sung led by Dr. Harry B. Gibson. Rev. J. C. Rush led in prayer. Dr. H. L. Ashe, district superintendent of the Winston District, read his report.

The pastors' reports of the Winston District were called and the following made reports:

Dr. R. W. Winchester, district superintendent of the Greensboro district, read his report.

Dr. R. N. Brooks, of New Orleans, was presented and spoke in the interest of the Christian Avocate Central Edition. Dr. Brooks spoke in glowing praise for the manner in which the North Carolina conference has supported the paper.

Hymn No. 245 was sung, after which Dr. W. A. Wallace, of the Lexington conference, brought words of greetings.

Dr. R. G. Morris, of Cincinnati, O., was presented and brought glowing words which thrilled the conference. Announcements were made after which Dr. Wallace pronounced the benediction.

THURSDAY MORNING

Bishop Jones called the conference to order and conducted a short song service.

Dr. G. H. Caldwell, chairman of the committee on the Journal reported that the Journal had been examined and found to be correct.

Dr. Caldwell recommended that the lay delegates who had not passed in their names to the secretary do so at once so that the record can be completed.

Rev. R. B. McRae, district superintendent of the Laurinburg district, made his report.

Bishop Jones commented on the idea of group assemblies mentioned in Rev. Mr. McRae's report, and recommended the same for all the districts.

Rev. G. M. Phelps, district superintendent of the Western District, read his report.

Hymn No. 106 was sung.

Dr. R. N. Brooks made presentation of a check from the publishing house in the amount of \$514.53. Dr. O. P. Quick, pastor of Cary church in Cleveland, O., was introduced by Bishop Jones and brought greetings to the conference.

Rev. L. A. Brown, chairman of the commission on World Service and Finance, made report. Rev. Mr. Brown made motion that the report be adopted which was seconded by Dr. R. W. Winchester. Dr. Edgar Love was present and made

remarks. He also suggested that we adopt the report.

The report was adopted. (See report.)

Rev. T. H. Wooten made announcement as to material displayed in windows relative to the work of the Board of Missions and Church Extension.

Bishop A. P. Shaw, resident bishop of the Baltimore area entered the conference amid smiles and thunderous applause.

Hymn No. 496 was sung.

Bishop Jones presented Bishop Shaw who in turn presented Dr. David D. Jones, president of Bennett College.

President Jones presented Miss Jeanette White who sang accompanied by Miss Betty Ann Artis. President Jones presented Mrs. Dorothy Bullock Hamilton, dean of freshmen, who directed a panel discussion concerning life on the college campus. Misses Margaret Shaw, Margaret Cardwell, Carol Arter, Catherine Baxter, Catherine Jones took part.

Miss Banks, of New York, was presented and sang.

Bishop Shaw made remarks as to the importance of the Bennett roll call and urged each charge to report at least one book of stamps which is equivalent to a government bond of \$18.75. The roll was called by districts. (See report.)

Resolutions was read by Rev. G. M. Phelps concerning the endowment of Bennett college. Rev. Mr. Phelps moved its adoption; Rev. R. C. Sharpe seconded the motion, and it was adopted. (See resolution.)

Dr. W. C. Carter and Rev. W. C. Haywood, of New Orleans, La., and Rev. Mr. White, of Roanoke, Va., were introduced.

Rev. O. Zollar, of the Christian church, Reidsville, N. C., was introduced.

Benediction: Bishop Shaw.

THURSDAY AFTERNOON

Hymn, "Draw Me Nearer" was sung.

The pastors' reports of the Greensboro district were completed.

The pastors of the Laurinburg and Western districts made reports.

Bishop Jones called a meeting of the Board of Ministerial Training, Committee on Conference Relation, the four district superintendents and Bishop Shaw. Bishop Jones requested Dr. Harry Gibson to lead the singing and Dr. J. W. Haywood to speak to the conference. This request was complied with, after which the benediction was pronounced.

FRIDAY MORNING

Bishop Jones conducted a song service of favorite selections.

Dr. G. H. Caldwell, chairman of the committee on the Journal, reported that the Journal had been examined and found correct.

Bishop Shaw was invited to the platform.

Dr. Otto Leber, representing the Board of Pensions, was introduced and he presented the conference a check for \$75 from the Chartered Fund.

Dr. D. W. Henry, pastor of Tenley Temple Methodist church, Philadelphia, Pa., was presented and spoke.

Dr. Harry B. Gibson, of Youngstown, O., was presented and spoke.

Dr. Robert N. Williams, of Asbury church, Washington, D. C., was presented and spoke.

Bishop Jones presented Bishop Shaw and he made remarks.

R. W. Winchester moved that the Food and Cash rally for Bennett college be held December 1.

Dr. G. H. Caldwell offered an amendment to the motion of Dr. Winchester to the effect the rally be held December 15. Rev. W. C. Scarborough seconded the amended motion. A vote was taken and the amendment prevailed.

Dr. G. H. Caldwell requested the floor for the men of the Winston district. This was granted, and Dr. H. L. Ashe was requested to come to the front. The men and delegates of the district stood while Rev. W. S. McLeod made a presentation to Dr. H. L. Ashe, the retiring district superintendent of the Winston district. Dr. H. L. Ashe responded in a very appropriate manner.

The four district superintendents were called before the conference and their characters passed, together with the men of their districts.

Bishop called all members within the bar of the conference to vote on two constitutional amendments. (See amendments.)

Amendment No. 1 to the Constitution of The Methodist church concerning bishops. Dr. R. W. Winchester made motion that we accept the amendment strike out word ordain and accept the word consecrate. Ballots were cast as follows:

Members present, 91; votes cast, 88 for and none against.

Amendment No. 2 to the Constitution of The Methodist church concerning Central Conferences.

Ballots were cast as follows: 92 members were present; members voted for and none against.

Dr. Willis J. King was presented and spoke relative to Common Theological Seminary.

Mrs. A. P. Shaw was escorted to the front by Drs. R. W. Winchester and R. N. Brooks. Mrs. Shaw brought greetings.

Bishop Jones presented Mrs. David D. Jones and Mrs. B. Caldwell, president W. S. C. Service, to the conference. Mrs. Caldwell made remarks.

Elder Ledbeter, of the Holiness church, this city, was presented. Dr. Leon S. Moore, of Chester, Pa., was also presented.

Hymn No. 66 was sung.

Dr. J. W. Haywood, president of Morristown college, was presented and delivered a very thought-provoking address.

The benediction was pronounced and the conference adjourned for dinner with Bennett college as host.

FRIDAY AFTERNOON

Hymn No. 148 was sung.

Rev. H. C. Gannaway led in prayer.

The floor was accorded Dr. G. H. Caldwell to read a resolution, relative to a Leadership Training Conference, previously held at Bennett college. (See resolution.)

Dr. Brooks was asked to preside and after the singing Hymn No. 275, Dr. Brooks with very fitting remarks presented Miss Dorothy Phelps, president of the Youth Fellowship Organization, of the conference, who made a very fine address showing some of the things done in the last conference year and many references to things that should be done. He also gave the high spots of a meeting held at Lake Junaluska.

SATURDAY MORNING

Session opened with Bishop Jones in the chair.
 Hymn No. 228 was sung.
 Prayer offered by Rev. J. W. Simpson.
 Hymn No. 140 was sung.

Dr. G. H. Caldwell, chairman of the Journal Committee, reported that the Journal has been examined and found to be correct. J. E. Brower moved that we print 1,200 copies of the Journal and that the printed Journal become the official record of the conference. The motion carried.

Dr. R. N. Brooks reported for the Committee on Conference Relations. (See report.)

The report was adopted.

Those elected to elders' order were: John L. Alford and Milton H. Houston.

Those elected to Local Deacon's order were: Hulie L. Perry, John W. Jones and Clarence E. Strickland.

Those admitted on trial were: James H. McCallum and Thur W. Stowe.

George D. Kirkland was received on credentials from the Baptist church as a deacon and placed in studies of the third year.

Rev. G. E. Hogue invited the next conference to Charlotte, and it was unanimously accepted.

Dr. G. H. Caldwell spoke of our responsibility to Gammon Theological Seminary financially. Rev. G. M. Phelps reported \$25 for Gammon. Motion by Dr. G. H. Caldwell prevailed that the conference proceed at once to collect as much for Gammon as possible. Dr. H. L. Ashe was given the floor on unreadiness, after which the Bishop ruled that this be done by districts and not collect the money in conference session.

Rev. L. A. Brown, chairman of the Committee of World Service and Finance, made report. It was adopted. (See report.)

Motion of Rev. W. T. Lomax prevailed that the amount assessed for the treasury read "For treasury expense \$300 or 2 per cent instead of "For treasurer \$300 or 2 per cent salary.

Motion of R. W. Winchester prevailed that the auditing committee examine the treasurer's records and send each pastor a report.

Rev. R. B. McRae requested the floor of the conference for a presentation. This presentation was made by Mrs. L. A. Watson, who, with very fitting words, presented to the conference \$125 for the Conference Claimants Fund, this amount given by the minister's wives' organization of the Laurinburg district.

Motion by R. C. Sharpe prevailed that we accept the report of the minister's wives of the Laurinburg district with thanks and add the amount to our immediate distribution.

Motion of R. C. Sharpe prevailed that conference adjourn at 1 p. m.

Dr. R. W. Winchester made report on the undergraduates of the conference. The report was adopted. (See report.)

Rev. H. C. Gannaway reported on the accepted support pastors. This report was adopted. (See report.)

Dr. R. N. Brooks read report on men who are to retire and moved the adoption of the report. (See report.)

Bishop Jones asked the retiring men to say anything they might wish. Dr. S. A. Peeler and Rev. J. W. Simpson made very touching but fine-spirited messages which will live in our minds and hearts for a long time.

Dr. G. H. Caldwell was requested by Bishop Jones to respond, and he responded in glowing words and spirit for the conference. The report was adopted.

Rev. N. J. Pass, conference treasurer, made his report. Rev. R. W. Winchester moved its adoption and it was adopted.

Dr. N. Forsyth, representing the Board of Education, was presented and spoke.

Rev. R. C. Sharpe read report of the Committee of Conference Claimants. Bishop Jones asked that the report be withdrawn for the presentation of Miss Julia Titus, superintendent of Allen High School, Asheville. Miss Titus brought greetings to the conference in very fitting words.

Miss Muriel Day, of the W. S. C. Service, was presented and spoke.

Rev. R. C. Sharpe proceeded with reports and moved the adoption which carried. (See report.)

Motion by R. C. Sharpe prevailed that all the districts report as did the Laurinburg concerning the ministers wives.

Motion by Rev. R. W. Winchester prevailed that Rev. N. J. Pass, the treasurer, take 2 per cent out of monies on hand and any additional monies as it comes in up to \$300 for treasurer's expenses.

A telegram was read by R. W. Winchester stating the passing of Mrs. S. L. May, one of our conference claimant widows, living in Thomasville. The secretary was requested to send a message of sympathy to the family, which he did at once.

Objectives read by Rev. T. H. Wooten were adopted. (See report.)

Dr. S. A. Peeler reported for the trustees of the conference. This report was adopted.

Dr. R. W. Winchester moved that after expenses incurred the net balance in the treasury be sent to permanent fund.

Dr. G. H. Caldwell reported that the auditing committee

had examined the records of the treasurer and found them to be correct.

The transfer of Rev. C. W. Perry to the East Tennessee conference was announced.

Rev. A. M. Erwin moved that the Lay Board of Activities meet and bring report of nomination of a Lay Leader to the conference tomorrow. It was carried.

Chaplains Plenty Jenkins and C. W. Perry were present and spoke. Rev. Leon Moore, of Chester, Pa.; Rev. W. H. McCallum, of Columbus, O.; Rev. and Mrs. S. M. Riley, pastor of Eleventh Street church, Columbus, O., and Dr. W. J. King, president of Gammon Theological Seminary, were presented and brought final words to the conference.

Benediction: Bishop Jones.

SUNDAY MORNING

At 10 a. m. the Love Feast, conducted by Rev. G. W. Byers and A. E. Robinson, was also a feast of spiritual inspiration.

At 11 the service began by singing Hymn No. 496, after which the choir sang to the delight of the congregation, an anthem, "As Pants the Heart," by Handle. Prayer was offered by Rev. H. L. Ashe. The choir sang an anthem, "Father to Thee We Pray," by Gounod.

A collection of \$136 was given after an appeal by Rev. N. J. Pass.

The secretary, J. E. Brower, presented the following candidates for ordination as deacons:

Hulie L. Perry, John W. Jones and Clarence E. Strickland.

The secretary then presented the following candidates for ordination as elders: John L. Alford and Holton H. Huston.

Bishop Jones brought a very helpful and enthusiastic message, using as his text, Phil. 26.

Complimentary resolutions were read by Rev. E. N. Mattison.

Rev. A. M. Erwin moved that after the reading of the appointments, that the conference stand adjourned, sine die. The motion prevailed. Mr. T. S. Wright was announced the conference Lay Leader for another year.

The appointments were read and the benediction pronounced.

A Resolution To Institute a Leadership Training Conference

That this Conference raise a Commission composed of the District Superintendents, ex officio, one pastor from each district, one lay person from each district, one Youth representative from each district, the Conference Youth Counsellor, the Conference Director of Religious Education, and the Conference Youth Fellowship Director.

BE IT FINALLY RESOLVED, that this Commission shall be charged with the full responsibility of working out all details incident to the holding of a Conference-wide Youth Training Conference, including time, place, program, funds, etc.

Resolution

Amendment No. 1 to the Constitution of the Methodist Church Concerning Bishops

At its first quadrennial session, held in Atlantic City, New Jersey, April 24-May 6, 1940, the General Conference of The Methodist Church by more than the constitutional majority of two-thirds (2-3), the vote being six hundred and seventy-five (675) for to none against, on Wednesday, May 1, 1940, voted to send down to the Annual Conferences of The Methodist Church for their action, the following proposed amendment to the Constiution of The Methodist Church:

Amend Paragraph 35, Article II of the 1939 Discipline of the Methodist Church, which reads as follows:

"The Bishops shall be elected by the respective Jurisdictional and Central Conferences and ordained or consecrated in the historic manner of Episcopal Methodism at such time and place as may be fixed by the General Conference," by striking out the words "ordained or" so that the Paragraph when amended will read as follows:

"The Bishops shall be elected by the respective Jurisdictional and Central Conferences and consecrated in the historic manner of Episcopal Methodism at such time and place as may be fixed by the General Conference."

Amend Paragraph 17, Article II of the 1939 Discipline of The Methodist Church, which reads as follows:

"The Central Conference shall be composed of as many Delegates as shall be determined by a basis established by the General Conference. The delegates shall be ministerial and Lay in equal numbers; the Ministerial Delegates to be elected by the Ministerial Members and the Lay Delegates by the Lay Members of the Annual Conferences," by adding to the Paragraph the words "or the Provisional Annual Conferences," so that the Paragraph as amended will read as follows:

"The Central Conferences shall be composed of as many Delegates as shall be determined by a basis established by the General Conference. The Delegates shall be Ministerial and Lay in equal numbers, the Ministerial Delegates to be elected by the Ministerial Members and the Lay Delegates by the Lay Members of the Annual Conferences, or the Provisional Annual Conferences."

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF EDUCATION

In accordance with paragraphs 1172 and 1173 of the discipline, we the members of the Board of Education, make the following recommendations:

(1) That we co-operate fully with the general board of education in advancing the interests of Christian education.

(2) That we develop support for the educational institutions within the bounds of the Annual Conference.

(3) We recommend further that the Conference will concur with the wishes of President David Jones of Bennett College and the suggestions made by both the resident bishop and our presiding bishop, Bishop Jones, that we raise an amount equal to one-half of the Endowment of \$10,000 for Bennett College by December 15, 1942. We pledge our unstinted support to the District Superintendents and all others who have the responsibility of raising the endowment fund.

(4) We urge the use of the literature furnished by the General Board of Education at Nashville for the promotion of Church School, and local Church Work in every department.

**REPORT OF DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENT,
GREENSBORO DISTRICT**

Mr. Chairman, Brother Ministers and Lay Members of the North Carolina Conference, Greeting:

Bishop Jones, please permit me to express my deepest appreciation of having you with us as a member of this conference and also as our presiding bishop in this annual conference. We have honored ourselves by endeavoring to keep the inscription of your name upon the Conference roll, since the time you were elevated to the Episcopacy. And, too, because of the rare occasion in your ministry of which more will be said in a more formal way, during the Conference. Our resident Bishop has also graced this Conference with his official presence, in the person of our beloved Dr. A. P. Shaw.

I must express my gratitude and thanks to my predecessor, the Rev. V. T. Lomax for the fine and untiring work done to advance Methodism within the Greensboro district and also throughout the Conference. Much of our success has been the result of the fruit of his labor. Beseeching Divine guidance with the mutual co-operation of the pastors and laymen of the district we bring to you the report of our labor. We done, in my opinion, a fine job of work. As district superintendent I have endeavored to do my duty to the best of my ability, observing the laws, rules and regulations of the Church. I have urged the proper upkeep of the church property, the payment of debts, Church repairs, the proportional distribution in all ministerial claims, the benevolent interest, and the importance of an evangelistic Church. And the report of the pastors will indicate that they have wrought well. Our District meetings have

been gratifying and helpful. The District Conference, Missionary Institute, Church School Convention with many other get-together meetings have proven to be profitable and helpful. The health of the pastors in the main has been good with few exceptions. Brother Rush has been ill quite a bit this year but has recently made much improvement. Brother Brower has recently been attacked with the influenza. He is now up and on the job.

Much attention has been given to Church repairs in the district and one church has been completed as a new building. The following Churches have been painted, Reidsville, Leaksville Church and parsonage, Piney Grove, Warren Street, with other improvements, Browning Chapel with much repairing, Basses Chapel, Raleigh Cross Roads. Mt. Carmel has completed her new Church which is one of the neatest little Churches in the Conference, with some incumbrance. Reidsville Church has made a fine showing in debt paying this year even though the pastor has been somewhat ill at times in health. Our Church in Raleigh has done much repair work. Quite a bit of stress has been laid on the importance our church periodicals, most especially the Christian Advocate, Church literature from our own publishing houses, the Youth Fellowship work among the youth and also the lay activity in general throughout the district. Our district lay leader has mailed several letters to this effect.

Bennett College has been before us the entire year in one way or the other. The food and cash rally was outstanding in many ways. I have never witnessed a finer spirit in a similar rally for this great school for our girls. There is a drive on for endowment of which we hope to do our part. We have manifested an interest in securing students for Bennett College. We have influenced several to turn their mind and eyes Bennett-ward.

The war situation has caused many drastic changes since Pearl Harbor was struck by the Japanese last December. The curbing of travel, the rationing of gas and rubber, the restriction on cars, the calling of most of our most efficient young men to arms and their fathers to defense jobs all over the country have upset local conditions in many of the local Churches.

But I have ever endeavored to keep the bright side before the Church, saying to them that God moves in a mysterious way His wonders to perform. I have urged our people to buy all the stamps and bonds they are able to purchase for the safety of themselves and our government. While there may be some things existing in the government we do not like—lynching for instance—yet we are living in the best government on the face of the earth. Therefore let us do our part in keeping the stars and stripes afloat in America and until racial misunderstanding may be banished from the earth so that justice, peace, happiness and racial understanding may cover the earth as the water covers the mighty deep.

REPORT OF DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENT, LAURINBURG DISTRICT

Dear Bishop Jones, Members of the North Carolina Conference and Friends:

I am nappy to present this my third report of the work of the Laurinburg District. A Good Providence has smiled upon us this year, and as I greet you it is with the realization that:

"I bring to you no message graced
 with wonders I have done;
 No great achievement can I show
 at this year's set of sun.
 But humbly I submit to you
 This record of my task, and
 if it meets with your approval
 That is all that I shall ask.

I have given of my best to you
 with heart and courage strong.
 While I prayed for keener Vision
 That my acts might not be wrong.
 Doubtless I have erred in judgment,
 Have not clearly seen my way,
 But I trust you will judge me kindly
 By what I have tried to do each day."

One short year ago I was commissioned to lead the forces of the Laurinburg District for another year. I accepted it as an act of confidence. I hastened to my task with the determination through the help of Almighty God and the support of loyal pastors and members to achieve for the Kingdom sake. Very soon after the close of the annual

conference we called a meeting of all the pastors to meet at Maxton, N. C., and there we laid our plans for our year's work. At the meeting we missed the faces of several pastors who had been with us in previous years but who had gone to labor elsewhere in the conference. While we regretted very much to lose the fellowship of those ministers we were happy to welcome four new pastors who had come to take their places with us. All of the new men were kindly received by the charge to which they were sent and started the year with signal success. All the old pastors who returned to their same charges were welcomed and their work has progressed through the year. Thus a very fine spirit of fellowship and brotherhood has prevailed through the district.

TRANSFER

At our last annual conference Rev. P. W. Webb was transferred from the Southwest conference and stationed at Johns and Beaver Dam. Bro. Webb went to his task not as a tenderfoot but as one who had been a leader in the church and knew what to do. The communities where he serves are loud in their praise of him as a Gospel preacher and his report will show that he has proved himself as a great leader.

On the Laurinburg District we have thirty-five churches served by eighteen loyal pastors. Five of these churches are stationed and the other Thirty are divided among the other thirteen pastors, causing them to have from two to four each. Two of these churches are in two of the largest towns in the state, Charlotte, Fayetteville. Three others are in smaller towns and cities: Hamlet, Goldsboro, and Lumberton. To travel the Laurinburg district necessitates the traveling of about 4,000 miles a quarter. I have held each quarterly conference and visited every church.

SICKNESS AND DEATH

Death has dealt general with us this year and only serious illness has been noted among our active ranks. Rev. H. W. Covington, a supply pastor, was taken seriously ill and passed to his reward last week. We have felt the sting of death in our midst, however, among our ministerial families. Just after the close of our last annual conference Rev. J. R. McNair, a retired minister, folded his tent and quietly stole away to be with his Lord. On October 1, Rev. E. L. Fletcher, a retired supply pastor heard the Master call and joined loved ones on the other side of the river. They all died in the Faith and as true Christian Pilgrims have entered the city which has a foundation whose builder and maker is God.

This has been a year full of challenges, and with the rise of the economic conditions we have urged our people to give to the cause of Christ as the Lord has prospered them, and our first effort this year was for education which came within a few weeks following the annual conference. This was an inopportune time for us to do as much for the College as we would like but our report at that time was the largest we had ever made. I have every reason to believe that when all reports are in our showing for the cause of education will be pleasing.

CHURCH IMPROVEMENTS.

Having come through ten years of depression we found many of our churches in the district badly in need of repairs and we have urged our pastors and members to take care of the churches or we would have nowhere to worship. There has been much improvement to church property this year. Time will not permit me in this report to mention in detail all the improvements made by all the churches. The churches that have been painted are Mt. Zion, Bomore, Rev. Beverly Brown, pastor. Red Springs, Rev. R. B. Rhyne, pastor. Salem, Rev. B. F. Gleaves, pastor. Union Grove, Sanford circuit, Rev. J. L. Alford, pastor. Also on the same charge the Mt. Olive church has installed new pews, Gallile church in Laurinburg, Rev. W. M. Wells, pastor, has money on hand and plans

worked out to install new pews in this church. St. George church at Maxton, Rev. H. C. Gannaway, pastor, has completed the brick work around the church and were it not for the government priority on material would have completed the interior. St. Peters Church, Hamlet, Rev. W. O. Thomas, pastor, has put a concrete floor in the basement. Several years ago when the city of Charlotte was widening the street by our Simpson Memorial Church there they took off several feet of our Church and left a very bad looking sight there, and left no money for repairs. Rev. G. W. Hogue and the good people there have built a very beautiful front, changed the steps, and painted the interior, and have given us a very beautiful Church in Charlotte. Our Church at Fayetteville, under the leadership of Rev. J. J. Patterson has been almost completed this year. They gave to the District Conference a fine entertainment. Rev. B. B. Barnes, an accepted supply pastor, has saved Methodism in Fairmont. Through his untiring efforts we have one of our most beautiful little churches in Fairmont. They, even though small in membership, always lead in paying their assessments. One new church has been built in Bolton, N. C. Rev. E. C. Campbell is the pastor. While the names of Brother L. A. Watson and Rev. C. E. Strickland do not appear in the line of Church improvements it is to be remembered that the Church at Lumberton where Bro. Watson serves was newly built but his work has been just as outstanding as the other pastors of the District, and also the church in Goldsboro where Bro. Strickland serves is a new church also. They both are in favor with their people. So the entire District has had a fine year and I think both preacher and people are happy. Our people have had a good year financially and they have given good account of themselves by standing by their churches.

FINANCIAL STATEMENT.

I have urged every claim of the Church this year and unless there has been some misgiving in the reports of the fourth quarterly conference I feel safe in saying that every claim of the Church that has been presented this year with the exception of possibly one or two will be found. The pastors have all been paid in full with the exception of two. Most of the pastors have been paid more than they were promised. The people have shown a fine spirit this year in taking care of their pastors. In several cases the pastors were paid out before conference more than a month, and they continued to pay them as before. To show their faith there have been a raise in pastor salary on the District from \$100 to \$360 the highest.

CHRISTIAN ADVOCATE

Dr. Brooks, editor of the Advocate, sent to each District an accepted quota and we set out to raise the same. We have stood by the paper and for several years have led the conference in support of the Advocate, not because we were trying to lead but because we were trying to do our duty because of the worth of the paper in and among our members. We shall continue to give our support and urge our people to continue to read the paper because of the information that comes to us from it.

CONFERENCE CLAIMS

The presence among us of these men who have built for us these churches we are now serving is a great inspiration. When we think of what we are giving to them to live on is something to kill our spirit and pride. We have urged with special emphasis that this claim be raised in full. I feel that we as a conference ought to plan in a larger way for our retired ministers. I have watched with interest what the other conferences are doing and we have patterned somewhat after them in that at our last District Conference we organized the Ministers' wives into an organization and asked them to raise and report at the Annual Conference a certain amount for Conference Claims. Mrs. L. A. Watson is

president and has had the complete co-operation of the other ministers' wives of the District. They will give a good account of themselves at this Annual Conference. It is hoped that each District will do the same another year and thereby increase our claims by several hundred dollars.

RETIRED MINISTERS

Only one retired minister lives in the Laurinburg District, Rev. Marcus Monday. He is enjoying splendid health and is regular in his attendance at his church. His children are making last days happy ones, and like Abraham of old, he sits in the door of his tent awaiting the visitation of Angels and the summons to move out.

GROUP ACTIVITIES

The rationing of gas has made it hard to carry on our separate meetings with the different groups and we have combined them and once per quarter we plan what is called District round up, at which time every organization in the District, Pastors, Ministers Wives', W. S. C. S., Layman, Youth Fellowship meet one day at Laurinburg, and have our separate meetings and close out with a general assembly and this has added strength to our work, and has caused each group to have larger meeting than they would without such a meeting. The expenses are taken care of under one head. All of our District meetings have been largely attended this year, and quite successful.

SPIRITUAL CONDITIONS

The spiritual condition of the District is very good and in almost every charge there have been revival meetings and many souls have been added to the church this year, and in some of the churches there is a revival almost every Sunday and as of old members are being added to the Church daily.

CONCLUSION

Bishop Jones: We, the North Carolina Conference, feel highly honored to have you with us to preside over this session of our Conference. Coming back to the place where you began your ministry 50 years ago must bring to you a joy that only he who reaches it can know. Within a short while you will be honorably released from active duties of the Church and claim that rest which you so richly deserve. Your life will continue to be an inspiration to us. May the Lord our God continue to be with you as he has been in the past, and your strength and salvation as he is ours.

I do not ask for a year's work to be more pleasant than this one has been. I have enjoyed the support of every pastor in the program of the church, and not a single asking has gone unnoticed by the pastors. Were it possible for each pastor to return to his same appointments and remain until my time on the District was out nothing would please me more. Since it is not possible, I am expressing my sincere thanks to both pastor and people for the fine spirit of cooperation given me, and pledging to all my best in whatever services I may be assigned for another year.

REPORT OF DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENT, WESTERN DISTRICT

District Superintendent's Report to the Annual Conference October 28, 1942.

Bishop Jones, Brother Ministers and Friends:

I am privileged to represent a group who come to the seat of this Annual Conference, with a very high degree of satisfaction and prayerful anticipation.

We rejoice not only in our accomplishments of the year made pos-

sible by Him that strengthened us. But we give praise, we give thanks to our Heavenly Father for this choice leader, who will not only preside during this Annual Conference, but will make possible a fellowship with one whose life has been sweetened and ripened through fifty years of true and devoted service. We come further with prayerful and joyful anticipation, that God shall not only bless him with health and strength to serve the few more years in active service, but our prayer is that retirement for him shall only make possible many years of service in that capacity which continuous loyal service has fitted him for, and in which he will be so much needed.

In making my report for the Western District, I shall not yield to the temptation to discuss some of the various effects made possible by a world at war. Nor shall I attempt to make a detailed report of the work done. I count it only necessary to assure you that every cause has been sincerely and faithfully represented. The ministers' reports will show this when a final check up is made. You will expect, however, that I at last mention with a word of information concerning the causes represented.

Evangelism—On the Western District we still have Camp Meetings which are attended in large numbers, this with the various other methods of evangelism is bringing some results, in adding many to the kingdom and reviving many of those who had become inactive.

We are thrilled beyond words at the growing interest in reading the Church publications, particularly *The Christian Advocate*, *The Methodist Woman*, *The Methodist Laymen*, *Tidings*, and *The World Out Look*. *The Christian Advocate* enjoys a wider circulation than any of the rest. This can be accounted for though through the skillful planning of its efficient editor, and the unstinted support of each minister. This reading leadership in many ways accounts for the new day which has come to the Western District.

Benevolence—In the past year or two we have beat ourselves in benevolent giving. Last year for World Service we gave something over thirteen hundred dollars, this year beyond fourteen hundred. For Bennett College last year between three and four hundred, this year over six hundred. It should be made known, however, that this advance comes in response to the urgent plea made by Bishop Shaw who, alert to the needs of the whole Church, has ever kept them before us.

You will be interested in knowing further that Gammon Theological Seminary and Allen Home are to receive their share in the educational budget. Allen Home located on the extreme end of the Western District is filling a need not met by any other institution. It is crowded this year to the extent that other facilities have had to be secured.

Before closing my report I must make mention of the unsurpassed spirit of co-operation exemplified by both ministers and laymen. This was evidenced in their attendance of both group and district meetings. The help received from these meetings are beyond estimating, for they were rich in their ideas of helpfulness and in a large way furnished the stimulant which made possible a good year's work. Therefore we come without a single excuse to make, but grateful that we have been allowed to preach the gospel of Jesus Christ.

I must mention further the care which the ministers have given the property entrusted to their care. Here and there remodeling has been done, and church debts of long standing have been lifted, and in at least one instance one new building has been erected.

Finally we solicit your prayers to attain our efforts in organizing in each church the Lay activities, The Woman's Society of Christian Service and The Youth Fellowship. Many of our churches are boasting of their wide awake organizations, and yet there are still others to be

organized. We pledge, however, there shall come no letup until every church has been organized.

Finally I wish to mention that we have on our district two loved and respected retired ministers who give of their time and service in so far as they are able. They are Revs. A. E. Robinson and S. B. Cornelius.

REPORT OF DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENT, WINSTON DISTRICT

Dear Bishops and Members of the North Carolina Conference:

It is my privilege and duty to bring you at this time a summary of the activities of the Winston District. In keeping with the war requirements and conditions and the full program of this Conference, my report will be brief.

Allow me at this time to give a word of welcome to our presiding Bishop.

Now, Bishop Jones, The Winston District with the other Districts of this Conference desire to pay to you a tribute of respect and appreciation. We join you in the celebration of your fiftieth year in the ministry. It is an honor to have you in this city, this Conference and in this church where you were reared, educated and sent forth. We have watched your career during these fifty years. The service rendered by you has reflected credit not only upon yourself and this Conference but upon all Methodism. Your strong, masterful leadership is still felt here. We shall spare no pains to make your stay among us both pleasant and profitable. Our hope is that your future blessings may be abundant and enduring.

This is the sixth year that I have served as Superintendent of this District. During this time I have given what physical and intellectual force I possessed to have the District maintain the high standard that has characterized it throughout the years.

Death has entered our ranks three times this year. Brother U. S. Mumford, supply pastor at St. Home Church crossed the bar on June 29th. Mrs. C. A. Barrett, wife of Prof. Barrett at Lexington has also passed in recent months. Just two weeks ago the wife of Brother G. W. Patterson left us.

With the co-operation of competent and faithful pastors and laymen we have gone forward endeavoring earnestly to measure up to the demands of the great program for the Church. Ideals have not been reached, but we have been fervently and valiantly marching in that direction. We can point with pride to some outstanding achievements. During the six years, six new churches have been erected; two new parsonages built and extensive repairs made on other churches and parsonages. Special attention was given to all benevolent claims. The World Service is up to par. Our great and beloved Bennett College holding its own in our hearts. We are hoping to make a larger Conference report for this school than in any previous year. All agencies of the local churches have supported the work well. The women of the Woman's Society of Christian Service under the splendid leadership of able officers played well a large part in the social relations of the churches. Through the untiring work of the leaders, the lay members are becoming more enthusiastic over their responsibility toward the success of the church. The Youth Movement is reaching the young people very effectively.

Our people are showing a growing interest in good literature as is attested by the enlarged number of subscriptions to the Christian Advocate Central Edition. The Advocate is a voice crying in the wilderness as a strong advocate of social justice and human brotherhood. Its pages bring to us weekly a fine summary of the world's news from a Christian

standpoint. In a masterly way it interprets the signs of the times and points the way to the more abundant life. We take great pride in the fact that its versatile and scholarly editor is a member of this Conference.

There is a shortage in the ministry. This is due to several causes. I will mention two. First: The army is taking our best young men into the defense program. Secondly: The financial support is inadequate. With the cost of living constantly rising it is impossible to keep up our ministerial standards on the present salaries. Notwithstanding the fact that these conditions have been stressed, the membership is slow to make any additions to their budgets for ministerial support. However, the faithful ministers are standing by their guns, willing to make any sacrifice and go on to the end.

Some increases have been made in the membership. We can claim a number of conversions, but by no means as large as we would wish for or feel that it should have been. There is a great need for a spiritual awakening in these trying days. The world of sin and darkness is sending out a challenge. I am praying that the Grand Old Methodist Church will gird up her loins, go forth to meet the challenge and defeat the foe, remembering that the God of Jacob is her refuge.

Now, Mr. President and Brethren, I have submitted my last report as Superintendent of the Winston District. I have served to the best of my ability and with the utmost strength. I wish to gratefully acknowledge the courtesies shown me by preachers and laymen alike over the District. For whatever success we have had in this relation we are indebted to the fine co-operation of my co-workers and it is with joy that I commend them to my successor. May God bless you every one.

- 1) That the apportionment to the Charges be the equivalent of five per cent of the Pastor's Cash Salaries, and that the previous action of the Conference requiring pro-rating be enforced.
- 2) That the annuity rate per year of service for the Conference year 1942/43 be

\$5.00 for Retired Ministers
3.50 for Widows
1.25 for Children
- 3) That the local Church Treasurers be required to make monthly or quarterly remittances to the Conference Treasurer, and that the Conference Treasurer in turn be required to remit promptly all monies received for Conference Claimants from whatever source to the Board of Pensions, 740 Rush Street, Chicago, Illinois.

Report of The North Carolina Annual Conference Commission On World Service and Finance

Whereas, the Methodist Church is faced with emergency needs at home and abroad including relief of the suffering in war torn countries, through the Methodist Committee for Overseas Relief, increased religious activities for men in the armed forces through the Commission On Camp Activities and Chaplains, increased missionary work in Latin America through the Foreign Division of the Board of Missions and Church Extension, church projects in industrial defense areas through the Division of Home Missions and emergency projects in education through the Local Church Division and the Educational Institutional Division of the Board of Education, therefore

BE IT RESOLVED, (1) That we, the North Carolina Conference, accept the following apportionments for the conference year 1942-1943:

World Service -----	\$8,748.00
General Administration ----	185.04

(2) That we, the North Carolina Conference, urge each individual charge to raise its World Service quota in full.

(3) That charges which raised their full apportionments last year work toward an increase in World Service giving this year of 10 per cent and that charges which failed to raise their full apportionments last year work toward an increase of 25 per cent over last year, in order to meet the emergencies confronting the Methodist Church.

(4) That we endorse the action taken by the joint meeting of the Council of Bishops and the General Commission on World Service and Finance, Chicago, Ill., August 28, 1942, recommending

(a) That there shall be a special period of prayer and self-sacrifice throughout the Church, to be known as the "Week of Dedication" February 28 to March 7, and that on Sunday, March 7, there shall be taken a special free-will offering for designated emergency causes and that in connection with this offering no quota, direct or indirect, shall be given to the Church.

(b) That this week be devoted to the most intensive spiritual cultivation of the official groups and of the individual members of the Churches, and that suitable guidance be given to the pastors in preparation for their leadership in this program.

Annual Conference Interests

In addition to the World Service and General Administration Fund, the Commission on World Service and Finance recommends to the Annual Conference for action and determination:

(1) An administrative budget of seven hundred dollars (\$700.00) apportioned as follows:

(a) Treasurer's expense: An amount equal to 2 per cent (not to exceed \$300.00) of all funds collected.	
(b) Conference course of study -----	\$100.00
(c) Youth educational expense -----	100.00
(d) Conference Board of Education -----	100.00
(e) Board of Mission and Church Extension for promotion and field cultivation -----	100.00

(2) For our educational institutions, namely Bennett College, Allen Home High School and Gammon Theological Seminary, the amount of -- 5,600.00 to be distributed as follows:

(a) Bennett College -----	5,000.00
(b) Allen Home High School -----	500.00

HISTORICAL VIEW

From the organization of Methodism in America, the work in North Carolina was continued in Virginia and afterwards in the Virginia and South Carolina Conferences. In the year 1836, the General Conference set up in North Carolina. Its first session opened as a part of the Virginia Conference, but when it adjourned, there were two Conferences.

Facts from the first ninety sessions are gleaned from the General Minutes from the Conference Journal for those years, which is now in custody of the North Carolina Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South.

At the Conference of December 4, 1844, there were 19,495 white members and 3,190 colored. Without consulting the wisdom of the latter, nearly the whole membership became part of a new church, organized in May, 1845, and called the Methodist Episcopal Church, South. Some of the colored members entered the A. M. E. Church, some of the Colored M. E. Church of America, but thousands turned gladly to the bosom of the old Methodist Episcopal Church as it returned to the State after the Civil War.

Between the years 1844, when the Church was separated over the slave question, and in 1865, when at the close of the War, the M. E. Church returned to shepherd its scattering flock in North Carolina, there was no session of the North Carolina Conference.

From the North Carolina Conference, the Blue Ridge was formed with twelve preachers, 2,839 members and probationers, and 41 church edifices.

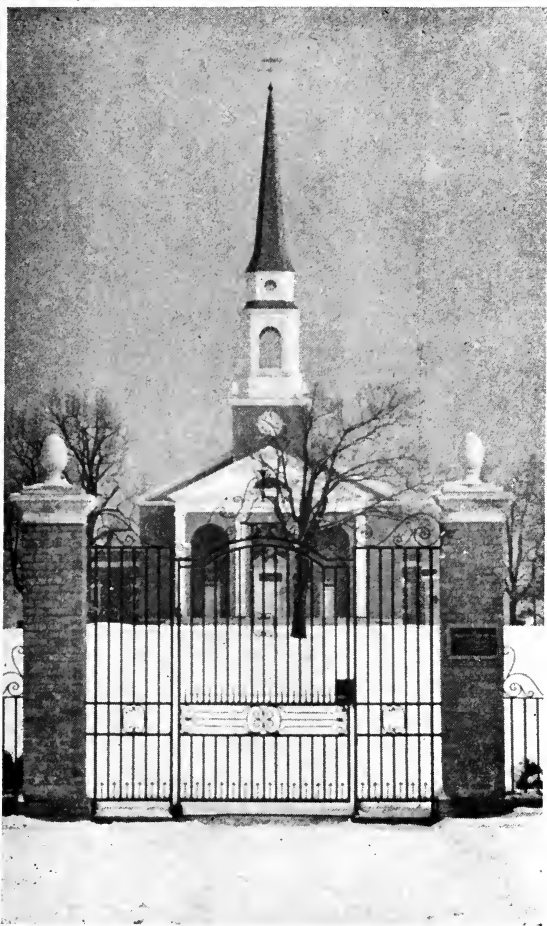

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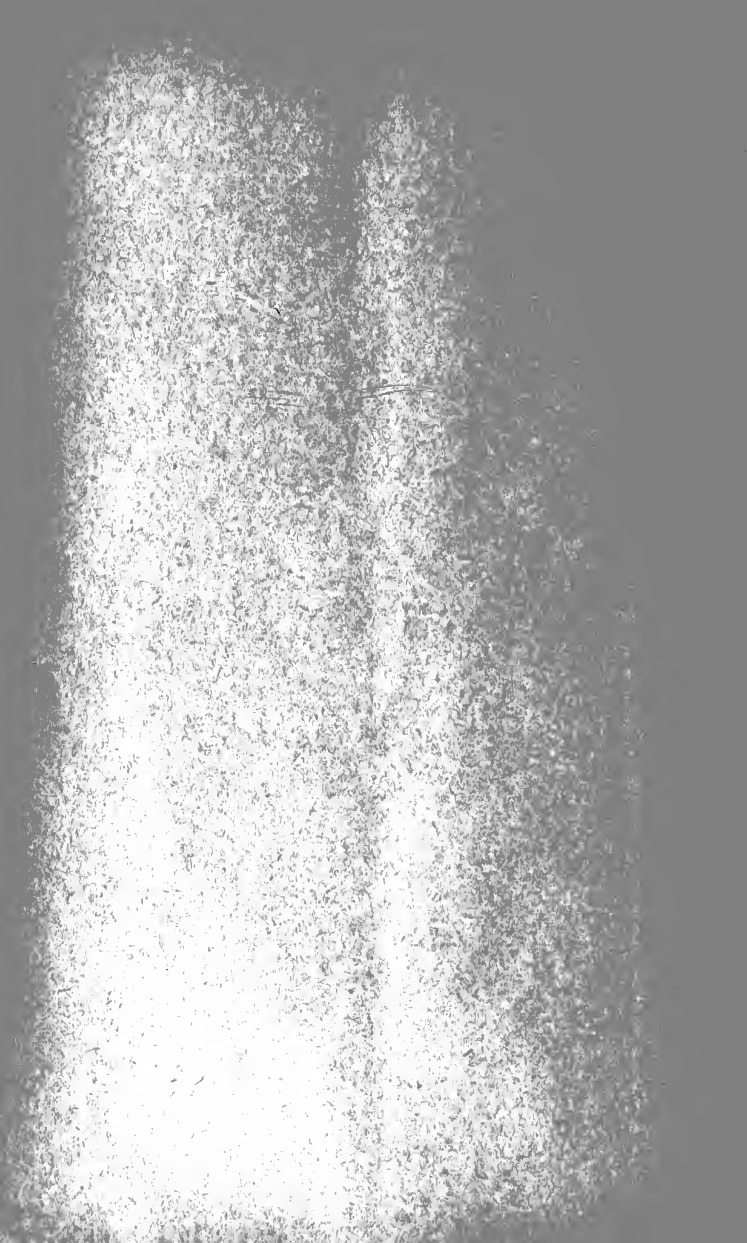
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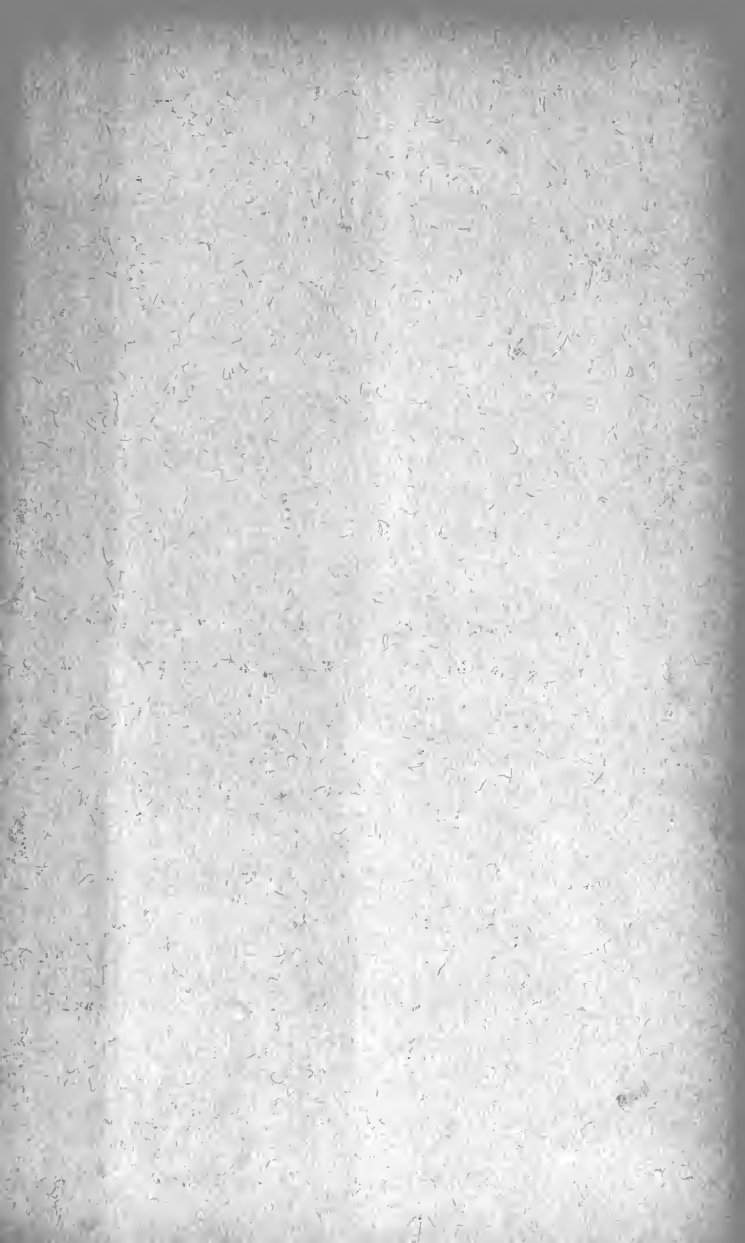
