FIRST DAY SESSION—WEDNESDAY, 9 A. M.— JUNE 15, 1955

The Conference was formally opened by Bishop Love. Music for the Communion service was given by the choir of the Galilee church. Bishop Love delivered the Communion message. The offering was to go for scholarship for someone of Malay. The District Superintendents and the pastor, G. E. Hogue assisted with the Holy Communion.

MOTION: Was made that the printed program serve as a guide for the conference, except where changes will be made. Several changes in the program was suggested:

MOTION by W. T. Brown, "That copies of the report of the Board of World Peace, be sent to President Eisenhower, Secretary of State, John F. Dulles, and Chairman Walter George, of the Senate Foreign Relations Committee. Motion passed.

R. B. McRae asked for the floor to present the cause of the church which he is now serving as pastor. He asked the conference to help the church in Fayetteville, N. C. to re-build. He pointed out the very urgent need to re-locate in another place, also keep abreast with the changing times as well as the need in meeting the demands of the community. Motion by McRae, "In view of the very great need for immediate consideration for the John Wesley Methodist Church, in Fayetteville, N. C., and the embarassing situation in which the members are placed, and the shameful reflection that the present church imposes upon the North Carolina Conference, Be it resolved that the conference go on record as making Fayetteville a conference special, and pledge ourselves to give to Fayetteville the sum of \$15,000.00 within the next five years."

After considerable discussion from the floor the motion passed, with a provision "that each charge within the conference do as they choose in giving to this cause."

D. S. Harkness motioned: "In view of the fact that this type of discussion (in the above motion) comes up from time to time, I move that an overall study be made of all projects in the bounds of the North Carolina Conference, to determine the needs in the light of population, trends, economic outlook and church needs. Motion passed.

WHEREAS: The Methodist Church has gone on record as saying "There is no place in the Methodist Church for discrimination or racial segregation, we memorialize the General Conference to direct the Methodist Publishing House in Nashville, or any other Publishing House to stop immediately its policy of discrimination in regards to water fountains, rest rooms, and eating facilities.

Parkway Memphis, 12, Tennessee WHEREAS—The Supreme Court has declared segregation in the public schools to be unconstitutional; Whereas, the Supreme Court has outlined the procedure whereby de-segregation is to take place; We memorialize the General Conference to give the moral and spiritual support to the recent action of the Court, and call upon our laymen and ministers to creatively aid the several states in de-segregating the public schools.

THE NORTH CAROLINA ANNUAL CONFERENCE Conference Rules of Order

1. The Conference shall meet at 9:00 a.m. and open with devotional exercises, and close at 12:30 p.m.

2. The Memorial Services shall be held the first morning of the Conference immediately following the Communion Service and shall include the calling of the roll of the honored dead.

3. The nominating committee consisting of five persons shall be appointed by the Bishop quadrennially.

4. No person shall be a member, concurrently, of more than two standing committees or commissions (except as provided for by the Discipline).

5. No person shall serve as chairman, concurrently, of more than one committee or commission.

6. The Conference fiscal year shall end 20 days before the first day of the Annual Conference.

7. The pastors' reports shall be in the hands of the treasurer and statistician 15 days before the opening day of the Annual Conference.

8. The reports of all major commissions and committees shall be mimeographed and passed out at the seat of the Conference on or before the day the report is read.

9. The roll of Conference lay members shall be called at the opening day of the Conference.

10. The Treasurer's report shall be mimeographed and passed out at the meeting of the Conference.

11. The minutes of the Annual Conference shall be printed and distributed within 90 days after adjournment of the Conference.

12. All recommendations and memorials shall be presented to the Conference in duplicate form.

13. All motions from the floor shall be in writing when requested by the secretary of the Conference.

14. The program for the Annual Conference shall be arranged by a committee composed of the host pastor, the host district superintendent, the Conference lay leader, and two persons at large named by the nominating committee, in consultation with the Bishop.

15. When a member wishes to speak he must arise and address the chair and shall not proceed until he is properly recognized by the presiding officer.

16. No member shall speak on any question more than once until all who wish to do so have spoken, nor shall a member speak more than ten minutes except by permission of the Conference.

17. Motions made and seconded, reports made and accepted are to be deemed the property of the Conference and cannot be withdrawn without the consent of the Conference.

18. All motions to lay on the table, to take from the table, shall be taken without debate, but the one who offers a formal motion or resolution shall have five minutes to close debate and this right shall not be forfeited by a motion ordering the previous question or to lay on the table.

19. All questions of privilege shall be decided by the president.

20. No member of the Conference shall be recognized who is outside the boundary of the Conference.

21. The following motions may take precedence of the original motion or precedence of each other in the order given here: (a) to adjourn to a given time; (b) to adjourn indefinitely; (c) to take up the order of the day; (d) to lay on the table; (e) to move up the order of the day; (f) to postpone to a given time; (g) to refer to a committee; (h) to amend; (i) to postpone indefinitely. 22. Any person voting with the majority may move a reconsideration, but such motion shall not be debatable.

23. The yeas and nays may be taken on any motion on the call of onethird of the members present.

24. These rules may be suspended by a two-third vote of the Conference.

25. These rules may be amended at any regular session of the Conference by a two-third vote, provided such amendments be presented in writing at least one day before action is taken.

REPORT OF THE DISTRICT SUPERINTENDENTS WINSTON DISTRICT

Bishop Love, Members and Friends of the North Carolina Annual Conference:

It is with a deep sense of grateful humility that I stand to give this report; for I count this a real honor and great privilege given me in making this, my fourth annual report to this great annual conference as district superintendent. God has blessed our work on the district with much success throughout the year. We now pay special tribute to the many pastors, their wives, and host of consecrated laymen and friends of the District for their cooperative service and contributions to our God and great church.

DISTRICT GROUP MEETING

We held several group meetings on the district this year; at which time the ministers and laymen came together to plan and promote the work of the district. Thus, we have been able to keep the district working as a unit, as will be revealed in our report.

YOUTH INSTITUTE

Under the leadership of Rev. G. A. Brooks as dean, we held two district youth institutes. He was able to secure the help of an excellent staff of workers. The youth work in the district has been strengthened by the work done at the Institute.

We will send four youth and two workers with youth, to the Youth Conference at Perdue in August.

DISTRICT EVANGELISM

We have had the best of cooperation with the evangelistic program of the Church in the Winston District. First, we began by securing of two of the Seventy Evangelists sent out by the General Board of Evangelism last summer. The ministers of the district gave the men much work and encouragement in their work. The two evangelists did a great work in the district. We will have two assigned to us again this summer.

Most of our churches made a good showing with the Bishops Evangelistic Crusade. Most of the churches reported an encouraging increase in church attendance. Many reported an increase in membership. The district increase in membership from January to Easter was 125. The number of M. Y. F. members secured by the Christian Witness Mission was 69.

Dr. D. W. Lester from the Board of Evangelism conducted an Evangelistic Coaching Conference at the St. Andrew Church with the ministers and laymen of the district.

DISTRICT CONFERENCE

On April 16, 1955 we held a one-day district conference at the Lovell's Chapel Church at Pilot Mountain, North Carolina, with Rev. W. P. Cole as host pastor. The pastor and members of this church gave us the best of entertainment. The attendance and participation at this conference was very good. The reports from each department of the church showed outstanding progress. The Woman's Society of Christian Service has made real progress in each phase of its work under the leadership of Mrs. Sophia East, as president.

The Ministers Wives of the district under the leadership of Mrs. L. M. Mayfield will make a good report at this conference. In August we are sending two delegates to the Town and Country Conference in Bloomington.

Under the leadership of Atty. R. C. Erwin, district lay leader, the laymen have accomplished much with the Board of Lay Activities.

The district conference elected Atty. Erwin as director of the special advance (district) for the Saint's Home Church. Under his direction the special effort was a great success, as the reported \$630.00 from fourteen charges of the district nineteen.

FINANCIAL STATUS

On the district we have six charges that will pay three thousand dollars or more for pastor salary, and two that will pay twenty-five to twenty-six hundred and two others that will pay \$2,200.

Our report as given by our conference Treasurer will show some outstanding gains in most of the claims. Please note the increase in Conference Claims, etc.

The Sunday School and Church membership of the Hoover Chapel church is rapidly growing with their new church building under the leadership of Rev. Jones. Every organization of the church is devoted to the total task and will someday take its place with the stronger churches of the district.

Saint John, R. F. McCallum, pastor:

Rev. McCallum has done a good job at this charge. They plan to do some much needed repairs in the near future. The several organizations of this church are well organized and are blending their efforts for the spiritual growth of the church.

Lexington-Midway, G. A. Brooks, pastor:

This charge is doing a good job under the leadership of Rev. Brooks. They have entertained our District Youth Institute in the month of August in 1954, the first quarter of this conference year. They have raised some money for a remodeling program and will pay their pastor over three thousand dollars (\$3,000) in the next conference year.

Madison-Stonesville Ct., B. W. Stewart, pastor:

Brother Stewart has the work of this four-point charge well organized. Many improvements are being made on the charge, and several members added to the church.

Mount Airy, C. G. Bynum, pastor:

This charge under the leadership of Rev. Bynum has raised some money for a new building. The financial report from this charge will be the best in several years.

Penhook-Boone Mill, V. Otto Withers, Pastor:

Brother Withers has done an excellent job in Virginia. The Methodist Men and Wesleyan Service Guild at the Boone Mill Church have done much to help this charge with its financial program.

Trinity-Glenola, E. Frost, Pastor:

This charge has had another good year. Members have been added to the church. All claims are paid in full.

Oak Grove-Red Bank-Rural Hall-Walkertown, P. G. Carter, pastor and Eldridge, assistant pastor.

Brother Carter, assisted by Brother Eldridge, has had one of the best years in the history of this charge. The four commissions of the church have been most active all the year through. Rev. Eldridge is doing a good job at the Walkertown Church and hopes to be able to save our Methodism in Walkertown.

WINSTON-SALEM:

Mount Pleasant, Wm. R. Crawford, pastor:

Rev. Crawford has had another good year at this charge. He has plans in the making to use one of the Seventy Evangelist sent out by the Board of Evangelism this summer. He is planning an enlarged educational and recreational program for summer.

St. Andrews-Walnut Cove, H. W. Phillips, pastor:

St. Andrews operates a child care center that is approved by the city of Winston-Salem. Many members have been added to this charge. The church at Walnut Cove is near completion. Last week, June 7-10, Rev. Phillips entertained the District Youth Institute. This charge under the leadership of Rev. Phillips gave one of the Seventy Evangelists some six or eight weeks work last summer.

St. Home, M. S. Laughlin, pastor:

This church is in an all out drive to liquidate its indebtness. Last summer under the leadership of Rev. Laughlin this church had the service of one of the Seventy Evangelists. Their Commission on Membership and Evangelism is ready to help evangelize the church and community.

St. Paul, W. C. L. Scarborough, pastor:

Here again we compliment a pastor and people for doing a real good job for the great church. Their reports will show outstanding gains in membership and in general and local benevolence of the church.

And now, Bishop Love, we are so very happy to express our deepest and most sincere gratitude to you for your kindness, your wise counsel and brotherly love. May God's richest blessings forever shine upon you and your family.

First I am grateful to Almighty God for life, health, and strength that enabled me to carry on during the past six years.

I am grateful to the Governing Body of our great church who saw fit to appoint me to this assignment, which has proved to be one of the most challenging experience of any in my career as a minister of the Gospel.

I am grateful to you Bishop Love, for the brotherly way in which you have counseled me, and your sympathetic understanding of problems that had to be solved. The time you have taken to come on the District and worked with the ministers and laymen has been of untold value.

My deepest gratitude goes to the worthy and loyal ministers and laymen on the District. They both are a responsive and responsible to leadership, and responsible to God for what has been entrusted to them.

A bond of friendship has been developed between me and this people that will be lasting. I shall continue to pray God's richest blessings on the District and those who will follow me in the work of Kingdom building. This report is but a brief summary of what has been accomplished this conference year:

DISTRICT CONFERENCE AND LEADERSHIP TRAINING SCHOOL

Last August our training enterprise and District Conference was held at Hartzell Memorial Church, Hickory, N. C. On the closing day the District W. S. C. S. Officers Training Day Program was held. This was one of the most attended and most profitable meetings of this year. Youth, Ministers and laymen spent three days studying the local Church Program, and trying to find ways to solve problems common to their respective churches. The area of study were as follows:

1. The M. Y. F. at the local Church level_____Instructor (Mrs. Jettie D. Morrison, Dist. Director of Youth)

2. Adult Education At the District and Local Church Level....(Rev. J. T. Jones, Conference Adult Director)

3. The Doctrine and Discipline of the Methodist Church......(Rev. W. J. Cameron, District Supt.)

4. Recreation for Young and Old......(Mrs. Mary N. Morrison)

5. Training Program for W. S C. S. Officers (Mrs. Mary Morrison,

District President in Charge)

The Ministers of the District have been deeply conscious of the job of winning young people into the Church through a well planned educational program.

EVANGELISM

Evangelism is the major role of the Church. Whether it be through an old-fashioned camp meeting, a preaching mission or a visitation program, the goal is the same. The number of conversions and children added to the Church have shown that the efforts have been rewarding. On some of the charges the ministers have conducted Church-membership classes for children. Local Church Commissions on Membership and Evangelism are to be commended for the excellent job they have done, in this area.

DISTRICT ACTIVITIES

Laymen:

The Laymen of the District cannot be given too much praise for the fine way they are carrying on the program of the local Church. On some of the charges, sacrificial offerings were given during Holy Week. These offerings were applied on Conference Benevolences. The Layman's Day Program highlights each local Church Calendar. The inspirational addresses, reports of activities, and musical contributions, show what the future holds for Lay Participation in the Church.

The Woman's Society of Christian Service:

The W. S. C. S. on both the District and local level are making an out-standing contribution to the total program of the Church. It can be truthfully said that they are giving unsparingly of their time, talents, means, and prayers for Kingdom Building around the world.

The Ministers' Wives:

We shall always pay tribute to the silent partners of our Ministers, who hold up their hands so that the husbands may have public acclaim. Under the leadership of Mrs. R. D. Sharpe and her co-workers the District has ranked in contributing to the Retired Ministers Fund. We trust that they will continue to find joy in working for this very worthy cause, and that each year their contributions will be larger.

THE CHARGES (A Brief Summary)

Berry Temple, Asheville:

This charge is to be commended for the excellent work done by the Commssions on Membership and Evangelism, and Finance. All members on the Church roll were contacted, and as a result of a well devised plan, within a sixty-day period, every member with the exception of two, who were physically disabled, had attended Church and made a financial contribution.

The Commission on Finance was able to get the entire membership together for at least one month during this conference year. As a result of the work of these two commissions the Church has been able to meet all financial obligations, and has received special commendation from the General Church Board for the fine way they are meeting their obligations. This is but a sample of the high type of work and the interest that is being manifested on the charge.

CATAWBA CHARGE: Rev. T. D. McCorkle has done a splendid job of unifying the Charge. Many members have been added to the Churches, and the financial obligations have been met in a fine way.

FOREST CITY: This charge has had a very hard struggle this conference year. Under the circumstances these fine people are to be complimented for a revival of faith in their ability to work out their financial difficulties and to do the job of which they are capable.

FRANKLIN AND MOORESBORO: A portion of the year this charge was without a pastor. The members did a fine job in carrying on the program of the Church. They are to be commended for their efforts to meet their financial obligations.

GASTONIA: Epworth is showing both Spiritual and Financial growth. Emphasis has been placed on education and evangelism throughout the year.

HICKORY CHARGE: Hartzell has placed special emphasis on evangelism this conference year, as a result of this campaign fifty members have been added on the charge. All financial obligations have been promptly met. Conover is striving to build a new Church in the near future.

KINGS MOUNTAIN: The charge as a whole is moving forward. Galilee has made definite plans to build a new Church. St. Paul has shown some degree of Spiritual and financial growth.

LINCOLNTON CHARGE: Rev. C. O. Hill is still doing a good job on this charge. Tuckers Grove has plans for a new Church. Hinton Chapel is meeting its financial obligations in a fine way. Caldwell Chapel takes pride in its Church School, and promptly meets its financial obligations.

LENOIR: The future of Smith Memorial Church can be assured because of the large number of children and youth that are being baptized and taken into the Church. They are receiving training in Church membership by the pastor. The general condition of the Church is very good. Plans are in the making for a much-needed Educational department.

LOWESVILLE CHARGE: Rev. A. W. Stowe and his good people have done a fine job this year. The program of Evangelism has been exceptionally good. El-Bethel has taken on new life and is doing a fine job. St. James can always be counted on. Rock Hill and Ebenezer are to be commended for their local Church program.

MARION: Marion is still going forward under the leadership of Rev. Royster. A heating plant has been installed, and financial obligations have been met promptly.

MOORESVILLE CHARGE: The spirit of cooperation on this charge is better than it has been in many years. An outstanding job has been done at Morrow's Chapel, a new brick Church has been completed. The pastor and officers have handled this project in such a way that only a small indebtedness remains. Mt. Mourne, Stewards Chapel, and St. Paul are meeting their obligations in a fine way.

MT. HOLLY: Rev. B. J. Dula continues doing a very fine job on this charge. Hunters has accepted plans for a new Church Building. Mt. Holly has an excellent Church school which is a good sign for a future Church.

NEWTON & GRANITE FALLS: Granite Falls is a good example of what a small group of conscientious workers can do. They were among the first to report their finances in full. Their local Church program is carried on in a dignified and business-like manner. St. Paul has rearranged the interior of the Church, bought and installed new pews and carpets. The open chancel adds to the atmosphere for worship.

SHELBY CIRCUIT: This charge has had a very good year. There are possibilities for a fine future for this charge.

STATESVILLE CHARGE: Rev. J. W. Ferree can always be counted on to do a good job. Plans have been proved for a New Church on a new location at Scotts Chapel. Philadelphia has a well organized Church school, and a good summer recreational program.

UNION MILLS: Rev. Bowman is still carrying on in a fine way.

STANLEY: Both spiritual and financial growth have been evidenced on this charge. The young adults are contributing in a fine way to the total program of the Church.

WEST-ASHEVILLE: Rev. Davenport has had a degree of success on this charge. Some repair work has been done on the Church building. Financial obligations have been met.

WILKESBORO CHARGE: Rev. C. W. Bailey continues in his quiet, but impressive way to do a good job on the charge. The children and youth at Harpers give promise of a bright future for the Church. St. Home is facing the job with renewed interest. Boone can be counted on to do what is asked of them as far as possible. Beaver Creek is still loyal.

In conclusion I would like to use a brief illustration to pay tribute to that group of loyal workers, who gave their support to my program during my six years on the district.

GREENSBORO DISTRICT

BISHOP LOVE, BROTHER MINISTERS OF THE NORTH CAROLINA ANNUAL CONFERENCE, FRIENDS:

The Conference Year of 1954-55, in many respects, has been unique, challenging, and full of hope.

Your Commission, Bishop Love, under Divine Guidance at the last Annual Conference, has inspired beyond words to express, and to keep us alert and move forward to a succesful year's work.

That ministers and members of the district have worked throughout the year with a degree of team work which accounts for much of our success.

Some changes made in our last Annual Conference — the District Superintendent's salary, and other apportionments — made it necessary for us to hold district meeting immediately following the Annual Conference. The plans worked out by the District Superintendent for this meeting were unanimously accepted and have been engaged in without friction. In this first district meeting, our program for the year outlined, the presiding officer was assisted by others in stressing the fact that each day carries with it significance to a complete year's work.

The ministers' reports will show that improvements have been made along all lines in many instances.

BUILDING AND IMPROVEMENT

The agreement by the ministers and lay leaders of the district, to raise money and let it go where it is most needed, has been unparalleled. (I speak, of course, of our district.) We are one in our desire and purpose to have an adequate building in which to worship for every congregation on the district. Under the wise leadership of our Executive Secretary, Rev. W. E. Hairston, we have advance plans to organize a new congregation in East Greensboro. This project has received unstinted support by the district superintendents, Boards of Education, and the Board of Missions.

I dare not take the time to give in detail the work done on building and improvement at points all over the district; I shall only take time to just mention those places where we have done the most commendable work:

Reverends Clinton C. Armstrong, new pews in Browning Chapel.

I. A. Friend, plans well on the way for a new building at Wesley Chapel.

C. L. Gidney, remodeling at Raleigh to a cost of more than \$20,000.

F. D. Caldwell, remodeling Warren Street Church and taking care of some needed work at Mt. Carmel.

Douglas Moore, beautifying the parsonage at Leaksville.

W. L. Napper, painting and remodeling the church at Kernersville.

Money has been raised at Collins Grove and Shady Grove for building new churches by R. W. Winchester and T. C. Tarpley.

Long-standing debts have been cancelled at Garretts Grove and Laughlin Memorial and at Colfax by W. T. Lomax and G. H. Caldwell, and by W. N. Johnson.

The debts with the Board of Missions and Church Extension have been taken care of by Reverend W. T. Brown and I. G. Simpson.

Reverend W. H. Greene, though getting a late start at Durham, has taken care of the interest and done some other much needed work.

Local loans made by Mt. Tabor, St. Peters, Oxford, and Randleman beyond \$4,000 are being taken care of by R. M. Martin, J. W. Gwynn and J. F. Bowden.

OTHER FINANCIAL OBLIGATIONS

Ministerial support has had an increase in many instances, but it still is far from what it ought to be. It is heartening, however, to note that most quarterly conferences are willing to share in the minister's travel and expense fund.

With but few exceptions all claims have been met, and in several instances, charges have gone beyond their apportionment, thus enabling the district to raise its quota.

DISTRICT ORGANIZATION

The Methodist Youth Fellowship Men and the Woman's Society of Christian Service have held their annual meetings and conducted study courses wherever practicable. Many of the ministers used these organizations in helping to foster their general program. I think in each instance the work of evangelism has furnished the most thrilling experiences.

EVANGELISM

The total program of the district this year has been undergirded by the work of evangelism. Both before and after my return from the meeting of the district superintendents in connection with that organization of the bishops and other leaders of both church and state, I have followed up the appeals from our church leaders, which have been given in various ways to an evangelistic endeavor. Watch Meeting Night was conducted by young people in many charges. The Crusade for Church Attendance from the first of January to Easter, was worked to the delight of many. The Crusade for World Order during the month of February, with suggested subjects to preach on were used by many of the ministers. In all of the places where this program was followed, great results were obtained and closer fellowship recognized. The Bishops request for Four Nights for God, and "The Christian Witness," leading up through Easter Sunday, made Easter to many this year a new experience.

Thrilling experiences have been witnessed and told. Reverend J. E. Brower, Eugene Black, G. H. Caldwell, Beverly Brown, F. D. Caldwell, W. S. Berry and H. A. Davis were among those who had greatest results.

STEWARDSHIP

Christian Stewarship is so closely allied with the raising of money, until money raising is looked upon by many as the register of success in this field. Prof. Caveness, the District Secretary of Stewardship, often assisted by the District Lay Leader, Mr. C. M. Winchester, have played well this part in traveling over the district showing pictures and giving addresses. This has aided much in making us stewardship conscious.

Reverends W. T. Brown and Douglas Moore. have used this system in their churches, and when asked for other plans to finance their programs, report that they have always answered "We have no other plan." Their report for this conference year shows that Christian Stewardship will work when given a fair trial.

EDUCATION INSTITUTIONS

Bennett College, located in the heart of the district, is ever ready to give for its service in any way it may be found necessary. President Jones has had to spend much of this year in rebuilding his health, yet, his efficient such of workers are always available. We have increased our giving for Bennett this year along with other increases.

The other two schools which receive direct support from our conference, have shared in whatever increase might have been given for the cause of education. Our interest in these two schools is no less than that which we have in Bennett.

Bishop Love, we come to this Annual Conference without a single problem to place before your cabinet. We come with open hearts and minds to this Mount of Privilege, and our hope and prayer is that we shall experience here anew the presences of the living Christ, who through you, will send us back to our fields of labor with renewed strength and a clearer vision for life's tasks.

LAURINBURG DISTRICT

Bishop Love, District Superintendents, officers, members and friends of the 97th session of the North Carolina Conference of the Methodist Church; As your humble servant of the Laurinburg District. I solicit your prayers as I submit my report for my 1954-55 year's work.

Today when you read the headlines of the newspaper, you get the impression that the world is "going to the dogs." Then you go out to one of our little churches and meet a group of faithful, consecrated,

Christian people who are spending themselves sacrificially to make their communities fit places in which to live—praying and giving so that their Christ may be shared with the world—it gives one a renewed faith in his fellowmen. I am reminded of Jesus' turning to his followers and saying: "Ye are the salt of the earth, ye are the light of the world." Can one find a higher privilege than going and ministering to these churches?

There is no simple rule for measuring the greatness it is so busy and the program seems so adequate, we must beware for we shall find down the road a little church where so many more have attained the higher spiritual life. The true purpose of the church is attained when its people know and serve God.

Bishop Love, as I come to the close of my first year on the Laurinburg District, I find much for which to thank God and take courage. Through the fine cooperation and splendid work of the preachers, laymen and laywomen, solid and substantial progress has been made in practically every department of work for our Lord and Savior in Kingdom Building; and to these men and women I accord the credit. Of course, there is no adequate yardstick to measure the most important advances—those in the realm of the spiritual development and soul-growth of the people. Furthermore, it is not possible in a short report to enumerate all of the achievements in the district this year, but the major area of work may be summarized under these headings.

EVANGELISM

The general program of evangelism has been promoted in all the charges through revival meetings, visitation evangelism, and the church school. The period designated by the Bishop, for the Four Nights for God, was used to a great spiritual benefit to both pastors and people. Many souls were initiated into the service of Christian Living. Many were baptised; and several churches increased their membership during this period. Dr. W. D. Lester from the Board of Evangelism was with us in Fayetteville on February 16 for a district as a whole.

CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

Christian Education is one of the main points of emphasis in the Church. The men and women of the district are doing an excellent job in teaching and training the young people. Most of the churches on our district have active commissions on Christian Education. Our Christian workers school was held in Fayetteville State Teachers College in August of last year. Rev. Marshall McCallum dean of the school, was assisted by a very able staff. Rev. J. E. McCallum, executive secretary at that time, also gave valuable information and assistance during this conference.

BUILDING AND IMPROVEMENTS

Beauty Spot, at Elrod, N. C., is under the leadership of Brother R. B. Rhyne. A new structure has been erected at a cost of \$12,000.00. The pastor and people have experienced untold sacrifices, and yet, they are happy for the privilege. As you look about you this morning, you do not have to ask what Brother Hogue is doing. At my first quarterly visit the condition of this church was beyond belief, but Brother Hogue and his good members rose up and accepted the challenge that was at hand, and as a result, a mammoth job was well done.

DISTRICT LAY ACTIVITIES

Under the very competent Leadership of Mr. Bruce Hargroves as District Lay Leader, the men of the Laurinburg District have been most helpful in the work in general. Bishop Love, and members of the Conference, I want you to know that people of the Laurinburg District are among the best in North Carolina. And when I make the statement I refer to the people of all races. The general attitude seems to be: "I heard of a city called Heaven, and I'm trying to make it my home." One of the very special features of our district work, the District Conference and Seminar of the Laurinburg District, was held in Smith Chapel, Bolton, N. C., with Rev. E. C. Campbell and his people serving as excellent hosts. The theme for the conference was "Growth through Christian Experience." The whole trend was in the evangelistic spirit, with every message being highly spiritual, as all of the brethéren handled their messages well. Then, too, at our check-up which we held at this conference, we raised nearly \$5,000 towards our claims, for nearly all of the charges reported something. When the final report is made I think we will be elated over the increase made by the district this year.

WOMAN'S SOCIETY OF CHRISTIAN SERVICE

These good women are doing just what the name implies: Christian Service. There is a Society in most of the local churches on the district. Mrs. Zilphia Waugh with her staff of efficient workers, is doing a great work in Kingdom Building, and they have all pledged themselves to greater service for another year.

THE MINISTERS' WIVES' ASSOCIATION

Too much cannot be said about this group of patient, sympathetic, understanding women as they take their places beside their husbands and labor without salary, and in many instances, without even the usual compliment, that others receive, and yet they go on smiling and working, trying to put the loose ends together in helping their husbands to do a great work in Kingdom Building. It has been Mrs. Sharpe's good fortune to visit every charge on the district, and most of the churches. Except for her school work, she would be on hand Saturday to speak for herself. Mrs. Hogue, the pastor's wife agreed to service in her stead. Along with the other fine women of this district in the parsonages, they have held the standard very high in Christian service this year. It has truly been a job to work with these good men and their lovely general managers.

THE CHARGES

BOLTON AND WILMINGTON: Rev. E. C. Campbell, pastor. At Bolton, we have a very loyal group of Methodists. At Wilmington, the city condemned and tore down our church building. Since 1940, the members have been holding their services in the Seventh Day Adventist Church building. Through these handicaps and besetments, the pastor has done a good job in keeping the identity of Methodism alive. I feel that we have been like the great spiritual, "Poor pilgrim of sorrow, left in the wide world alone; no hope have I for tomorrow, but I am trying to make heaven my home." We must do something concrete in Wilmington or come out and leave the city to other religious groups.

BOULWARE CHAPEL: Rev. S. H. Lockard, pastor. The membership is very small, and yet they have done well.

SIMPSON MEMORIAL: Rev. T. H. Wooten, pastor. The people have had a great year. All claims have been paid in full; however, realizing the growth of nearby business, committees on relocation and building construction were appointed at the third quarterly conference.

FAYETTEVILLE: Rev. R. B. McRae is the popular pastor. This group has taken on new life and has had a new spiritual rebirth. Additional seats are needed on Sunday mornings. The building fund was about \$105 when he went there. To date, the members have purchased a lot upon which they are planning to build a new church. More than \$4,000 or \$2,000 has been raised toward the project. They have paid on claim accepted by the local church although the pastor's salary has been paid in full.

GOLDSBORO: Rev. James Campbell, pastor. Brother Campbell has

done well in Goldsboro and is looking forward to a greater work next year.

HAMLET: Rev. Marshall McCallum, pastor. Brother McCallum and his good people have done well this year. The church is well-organized in every department.

HICKORY BEND: Rev. J. W. McRae, Sr. pastor. This pastor and his people are working quite well together.

ST. MARK: Rev. John Monroe, pastor. Brother Monroe is ministering to these people in an admirable way.

BEAUTY SPOT: Rev. R. B. Rhyne and his people have done a great job in the building of their new church. We are hoping that the Board will help us so we can do a better job with the youth.

GALILEE: Rev. G. E. Hogue, pastor. Brother Hogue deserves great commendations for the fine work done at this charge. As you can see, the church has been made very worshipful. The pastor and people are working together and making great progress.

MAXTON: Rev. D. Harkness, pastor. Brother Harkness has done very well and is to be commended for the fine work done.

MT. OLIVE: Rev. D. H. McLean, pastor. The pastor and people have had a great year together. The church has been redecorated, an organ has been installed, and programs are regularly broadcast from the church. The officers say that the church is in the best condition in its history. The group and its ministers are doing a great work in Kingdom Building. The parsonage has also been completely renovated, and all claims have been taken care of in full.

MILLERS: Rev. John McEachin is pastor. Brother McEachin and his people are hoping to finish their church this year.

PEMBROKE: Rev. Huley Perry, pastor. This pastor and people have done well and are hopeful of improvement.

ST. PETERS: Rev. J. W. McRae, pastor. The pastor and his congregation are striving diligently and are constantly going forward.

FAIRMONT: Rev. Will Thompson, pastor. Brother Thompson has been ill more than six months. Brother Walter Davis has been acting 'as supply pastor on this charge. He and the members desire your prayers.

MT. ZION-NEW ZION: Rev. B. L. Gleaves, pastor. Brother Gleaves has had a long, long pastorate at this charge.

PHILADELPHIA: Rev. D. C. Skeen, pastor. Brother Skeen, though 84 years old and retired minister, is most active and seeking every opportunity, not only to preach, but also is negotiating buying a school building adjacent to the church to use for religious education and recreational activities.

RED SPRINGS: Rev. McBrayer, pastor. Brother McBrayer has done a great job. When he went there, there was an outstanding debt of \$1,500 to the Board. To date, the debt has been cleared and \$400 has been paid on claims.

ROWLAND AND SALEM: Rev. J. F. Sawyer, pastor. This charge and pastor have had an excellent year, and the fold wants him back.

SANFORD CIRCUIT: Rev. F. F. McCallum, pastor. Brother Mc-Callum has had a very fine year. A great spiritual revival was held last August at McQueen's Chapel, and a half of the debt and all claims were paid in full. Brother E. A. Rush was taken ill on this charge and is still in the N. C. Sanitorium. I went to visit him about three weeks ago but was unable to see him because it was during rest hour. I understand, however, that he is quite cheerful and wants to be remembered in your prayers.

JOHN'S STATION: Rev. D. S. Harkness, pastor. Brother Harkness has supplied this church this year. The people and pastor are very happy together and plans are being made to build a parsonage this year. All claims were paid at Bennett College, Roll Call.

HOFFMAN AND COOL SPRINGS: Rev. J. H. McCallum, pastor. This charge has paid all of its claims in full. The Walls Chapel Church has paid off indebtedness of \$1,900 and is ready to help some needy charge.

PINEY GROVE: Rev. E. M. McLeod, pastor. Brother McLeod has served these fine, loyal people for six years.

WILMINGTON: Bishop Love and conference, with your help we have new hope for Wilmington, in something, which, I think will be a credit to the North Carolina Conference. We have located a church that will adequately fill our needs. It has 25 classrooms, a kitchen and dining space, an elevenroom parsonage, and an auditorium that will seat 500 people. A twelveweek revival and membership campaign have been scheduled. I have a report of a survey made by the Rev. Samuel M. Carter of the Washington Conference. The report is as follows:

In closing, may I leave this thought with you? "Life is so full of meaning and purpose; so full of beauty beneath its covering that you will find earth only cloaks you for heaven, and so with courage and knowledge, we are still pilgrims together, wending through an unknown country, on the way home. I greet you; not as the world sends greetings, but with profound esteem, and with the prayer that for you, now and forever, the day breaks and the shadows flee away."

REPORTS AND RESOLUTIONS BOARD OF SOCIAL AND ECONOMIC RELATIONS

Bishop Love and members of the North Carolina Conference the following is the report of Board of Social and Economic Relations:

We realize that the days in which we live are probably the most challenging in human history. This being true, we further realize that no greater need for the application of the Christian gospel to the total life of man ever existed, social and economic life not excepted.

Economics is a necessary factor in human life; Man must deal with the wealth getting and wealth using activities of the social order. Recognition of this fact is found in the Old and New Testament. In the Old Testament we find rules against the violation of personality and character; in the New Testament we find Jesus Christ teaching brotherhood of all people, and the intrinsic worth of the human soul. Hence, there is embedded in our religious tradition and faith the Christian answer to social and economic problems. It is our firm conviction that the Christian individual is morally obligated to consider economic and social problems in the spirit of Jesus Christ and bring to bear the ethical teachings of Jesus on these problems.

PUBLIC SCHOOL ISSUE

The age in which we live finds the world locked in a life and death struggle for the minds of men and their loyalites to various principles real

or imaginary which are so numerous in our world today. The claims of the various isms of our times demand that individuals now more than ever before be able to think critically, and arrive at conclusions based on undeniable facts. This demands education of the highest calibre, therefore, we deplore the action of some state legislatures and "stand-by" legislation of others whose motive is to circumvent the Supreme Court ruling of May 17, 1954, as well as the ruling of May 31, 1955. We recognize that tax supported schools are essential to American democracy; without schools democracy will be seriously weakened at a time when world conditions demand that it be stronger than ever before.

The problem of intregration can never be solved outside the pail of Christian thought and action. We urge every Methodist Christian to give this issue calm, courageous and intelligent study to the end that justice will be done in this area of our social activities. We suggest that small study groups be set up at every annual Conference affected by this problem composed of the Woman's Society of Christian Service, the Methodist Men and the Methodist Youth Fellowship, for the purpose of providing the moral and spiritual guidance in solving this acute problem now facing us all. We feel that such Christian action will be helped in creating a favorable state of mind for courageous Christian action in this crisis in public education in the South.

SEGREGATION IN THE METHODIST CHURCH

In the social creed of the Methodist Church is found the official position of our church on human relations. The creed traces Methodist concern for all people, its devotion and interest in ministering to their physical, social, and intellectual needs to John Wesley. In 1952, the church in its declaration on race said, "There is no place in the Methodist Church for racial discrimination or racial segregation, to discriminate against a person solely on the basis of his race is both unfair and unchristian." In this, the year of our Lord, 1955, the Methodist Church as an institution practices segregation solely on the basis of race. The cultural pattern of American segregation appears in the constitution of the Church in the form of the Central Jurisdiction which is wholely and solely for Negroes.

In principle, the Methodist Church has declared itself against segregation on race. It has not, however, to make its policies and practices coincide with its principles. Anyone who reads the cumbersome and entangling legislation passed by the last General Conference in regard to the transfer of a church in the Central Jurisdiction to a geographical jurisdiction cannot escape the fact of its inadequacy both as a practical means of transfer as well as a vehicle by which the pattern of segregation may be changed.

Paragraph 538 of the discipline only allows for the transfer of one segregated local church from the Central Jurisdiction and into a geographical jurisdiction which the pattern of segregation remains unaltered. It grieves us as Methodists to know that the publishing house in Nashville, Tenn., has separate rest rooms, water fountains and eating facilities. We mince no words in saying that is undeniably unchristian, that these practices are a flagrant denial of the fatherhood of God and the brotherhood of man, that these practices have continued in the face of the clear pronouncement of the General Conference. We call for an immediate end of these practices. We are appalled at the silence of the Central Christian Advocate in this matter. We would call its attention to the following propositions:

- 1. That the editorial policy of a free press ought to bring out all controversy that may affect the Church.
- 2. That there must be internal and external criticism of different policies of the Church.
- 3. That when the Central Christian Advocate does not discuss these matters and expose them and whereas found out about these problems through the secular press we feel that it has failed to let the

rank and file of our church know about the discriminatory practices of the Nashville Publishing House.

4. That the Central Christian Advocate affirm itself as an expression of the truth unbridaled though it must point its fingers at its governing board.

The church cannot expect to maintain its power and potency and keep our time indeed if as the Dr. Benjaman E. Mays said to the second Assembly of the World Council of Churches, if further historians have to write that the church stood in the way to fellowship among Christian people. It is imperative that the General Conference remove these artificial barriers in the Methodist Church between the children of God and their brothers.

SUGGESTED ACTIVITIES FOR THE YEAR

- 1. Urge every pastor to organize a committee on Social and Economic relations in his church.
- 2. Encourage local church committee to cooperate with other community groups and interested individuals in a program for better Christian social relations.
- 3. Establish rapport between the Central Jurisdiction minister and congregation and that of the geographical jurisdiction in places where no such rapport exists.
- 4. Ask every minister in the North Carolina Conference to work prayer-fully and deligently to bring into existence integrated Ministerial Alliances in their various communities.
- 5. To urge every minister in the Conference to lend all aid possible in setting up the school issue in their respective communities.

RECOMMENDATIONS

- 1. In keeping with the request of the General Board's request, we ask that the Board of Social and Economic Relations be given a place on the Conference program next year.
- 2. That the Board of Social and Economic Relations of the North Carolina Conference of the Central Jurisdiction exchange reports with the two conferences in the North Carolina Southeastern Jurisdiction and any other conference desiring to do so.
- 3. That the three Boards, Social and economic relations, World Peace, and Temperence cooperate in an interboard council on all social questions.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF WORLD PEACE

Bishop Love and members of the North Carolina Conference of the Central Jurisdiction of the Methodist Church:

As your Board of World Peace submits its annual report in this year of our Lord 1955, it is happy to say that since its last report there has been an easing of world tensions. For this we are thankful to Almighty God.

We feel that the following factors have played, are playing, and will play important parts in the easing of world tensions:

1. The signing of the Austrian Peace Treaty by Britain, France, Russia, and the United States, establishing a free and independent Austria.

2. The holding of the historic conference of African and Asian nations at Bandung, Indonesia. This Conference called for the peaceful settlement of all international disputes and for nations to live together in tolerance, cooperation and peace. It was also at the Bandung Conference that Premier Chou En-lai of China announced that the Chinese government is willing to enter negotiations with the United States to discuss the matter of easing tensions in the Far East and especially in the Formosa area.

3. The visit of United Nations Secretary-General, Dag Hammarskjold, to Communist China in the interest of freeing the American airmen and the recent freeing of four of these airmen.

4. The State visit of top officials of the Soviet government to Yugoslavia.

5. The present visit of India's Prime Minister Nehru to Russia.

6. The coming meeting of the British, French, Russian, and United States heads of state at Geneva, Switzerland on July 18 of this year.

Recognition of Communist China by the United States.—The Central Peoples Government of China has been recognized by twenty-seven governments who represent 960,000,000 people. These countries include sixteen members of the United Nations: Burma, Britain, Byelorussia, Czechoslavakia, Denmark, India, Indonesia, Israel, The Netherlands, Norway, Pakistan, Poland, Russia, Sweden, Ukraine, and Yugoslavia.

Our government has refused to recognize the Central Peoples Government of China on the ground that recognition would imply approval. This policy was advocated by President Wilson and reaffirmed in the so called Stimson doctrine of non-recognition of any "situation, treaty, or agreement, brought about by violence contrary to the pact of Paris."

Our policy on recognition has changed through many years. In 1793 President Jefferson set fourth a policy which the United States has followed most. He stated:

> "We surely cannot deny to any nation that right wherein our own government is founded: that every one may govern itself by whatever form it pleases and change these forms at its own will."

Although President Monroe sent to Congress a message wherein he denounced the Czarist government in Russia, he also said that the United States would consider that government de facto as the legitimate one. This same principle was adhered to when President Pierce recognized five successive revolutionary governments in Mexico during the early months of the revolution in 1856.

In 1933 President Roosevelt recognized the Russian government but emphasized that this did not mean approval.

On September 21, 1954, Sir Pierson Dixon, the British permanent representative in the United Nations, said:

> "As everybody knows, Her Majesty's Government in the United Kingdom recognize the Central People's Government as the Government of China. Moreover,

they consider that the question of Chinese representation in the United Nations is a matter which will have to be settled before peaceful and friendly relations can be re-established between the various Governments with interests in the Far East."

In the light of the foregoing discussion your Board of World Peace suggests that this Conference go on record asking United States recognition of Communist China.

We believe that our government should recognize the Central People's Government of China for the following reasons:

1. It is the government that is in control of the Chinese mainland.

2. Historically we have established the principle whereby we recognized a government while we do not approve of it.

3. Diplomatic relations would make it possible for our country to know what is going on behind the Bamboo curtain and perhaps Amercan interest could be better protected.

4. There is the great possibility that recognition might ease the tension between the two countries.

What Has Been Done in the Conference This Year.—The Reverends Douglas Moore, I. G. Simpson, and J. W. Ferree attended the Southeastern Jurisdiction World Peace Seminar held at Lake Junaluska last summer. The Reverend W. E. Hairston attended the World Council of Churches held in Evanston, Illinois last summer.

The Reverend W. T. Brown was a delegate from the Conference to the Methodist Ministers' Seminar held in Washington, D. C. last fall. The members of the Seminar spent one day at the State Department discussing the problems of peace and American foreign policy with officials of the State Department.

In February of this year, at the request of the Council of Bishops, sermons were preached on the "Meaning of Peace," "The United Nations," and "Disarmament."

Recommendations for Next Conference Year.—We make the following recommendations for next year:

1. We recommend a Church-wide study course on peace in every local church.

2. We recommend Church and community observance of the tenth birthday of the United Nations on October 24th of this year.

3. We further recommend that this Conference sponsor a Seminar at the United Nations.

4. Finally, we recommend that we pray earnestly for peace during the coming year.

A MEMORIAL TO THE GENERAL CONFERENCE OF THE METHODIST CHURCH TO BE CONVENED APRIL 25, 1956, IN MINNEAPOLIS, MINNESOTA:

Dear Fathers and Brethren:

WHEREAS, Twelve hundred men each year during 1952-53 and 1953-54 were separated from active membership in the Annual Conference through death, retirement, withdrawal, location, etc., and

WHEREAS, Eight hundred sixty-four Methodist men were graduated from the accredited seminaries of the United States (679 from Methodist schools; 185 from non-Methodist schools) in 1953-54 and

WHEREAS, An increase in theological schools enrollment of 50% is necessary if The Methodist Church is to meet the minimum number of ministerial replacements needed with trained ministers, and

WHEREAS, The ten existing Methodist theological schools are at near capacity with 2,967 students and cannot accommodate the 4,450 men (50% increase) needed in seminary training annually;

THEREFORE, We respectfully memorialize the General Conference of the Methodist Church, now in session, to take immediate steps to make provision for an expanded program of theological education.

North Carolina Annual Conference

TOWN AND COUNTRY COMMISSION OF N. C. CONFERENCE REPORT

Bishop Edgar A. Love, Ministers, Delegates and Friends: Greeting:

We are very happy to bring to you this report, as I was elected at the last Conference in Asheville, N. C., the Secretary of Town and Country Work, known as the one to promote the policies and plans of the commission. He shall also gather and interprete all dates and information for the commission. But before beginning my work in the Annual Conference, I was privileged to attend the National Convocation on The Church In Town and Country, Salina, Kansas, October 26-28, 1954.

There was so much information gathered from this Convocation that I was very anxious to share it with my Commission. Therefore, the Bishop Love granted me the privilege of calling a meeting with the Commission. On the 18th of February, more than forty (40) persons met in Charlotte, North Carolina, at Simpson Memorial Methodist Church, Reverend T. H. Wootten, pastor. However, to make homony with the District Superintendents, and to receive the Bishop's advice on all matters pertaining to this meeting in Charlotte, we called a meeting the night before the Bennett Roll Call, and discussed the expense of delegates to our National Methodist Town and Country Conference which was to meet in Bloomington, Ind., July 22-25, 1955. Only two districts had made preparation to send their number of delegates, the Reverend G. M. Phelps of the Greensboro District and the Reverend L. M. Mayfield of the Winston District.

In the meeting at Simpson Memorial Methodist Church, February 18, I shared all the material that was bought in Salina, Kansas, at the Convocation. We bought \$15.00 worth and all the many kinds of materials that any Conference may need to inform it of all the information needed on the Lord's Acre Plan as it related its program to Christian Stewardship.

We elected the following, in setting up our Conference Council on the MRF. Reverend C. E. Strickland, as the MRF minister of the Conference, and Mr. Bruce Hargrove as the Conference Layman, the Reverend Strickland represented the Western District, and Mr. Hargrove the Laurinburg. The other two District Superintendents were to send in theirs, one from the Woman's Society of Christian Service (Woman) and one youth.

SOME OF OUR RURAL PROBLEMS

Now may we look at some of our rural problems and situations. We have in our Methodist Church approximately 40,000 churches (in the U.S.A.) and 16,000 are served by Approved Supply Ministers, some are men who are in college, or seminary, some are retired, and others have not finished their high school training.

There was a time we could lay shortage of ministers upon the shoulder of war times, but now war is over, and our problems seem to grow worse. Circuit work is getting to be one of the greatest alarming needs we have. And to help matters we must begin to train our best prepared laymen in order that our churches can be kept open every Sunday. We must make these loyal and sincere laymen feel that they are needed, and the Church has a place in her program for them. Too many of them feel as if they have but little or no status in the church or conference, therefore, they just live in the little town of Nazareth, and the Conference is expecting nothing good to come out of it. And Joseph's son growing up in such a place is not expected to have wisdom.

WHEN PEOPLE MOVE AWAY (Members)

This moving away from place to place, as Methodists, and not leaving their address is a very serious threat to our church membership roll. The 1950 Census reveals that the population (rural) is shifting from the open country to town, and from town to the great Metropolitan centers of industry. And here they don't seem to seek our church. And there is the let down of our membership roll. Then comes the threat of abandonment of property, before a survey is made to see if others in this same community may like a church home.

SOME SAY DEVELOP AN AGGRESSIVE PROGRAM

Well this can be done, but do we have anyone out there to do this? If not who will go? Before we send, someone may say, "How can we get people to want more services?" The only answer may be, like Jesus raised with the man at the pool, as he waited for someone to put him in after (as they say) the angel bless water. "Do you want to get well?" (John 5, 2-7) Goodspeed, and Knox, "Have you a mind to get well?" No, he was waiting on somebody to pull out of the hat the rabbit trick. Jesus seemed to be thinking now mysterious the heart was and too how a person could be satisfied with the way of life he had developed. It maybe many of our churches are too satisfied with only one service a month. Here is where the whole church is fixed to this pool, and pleased to lie there. It maybe if someone could go there and make a survey, chart it, and outline the things a church not only could do but the things he should do to be a church, doing a graphic form analysis, which may be a new revelation for the congregation, showing that at some Morning Service, letting each member see his church sitten and as solvowing how the officials can plan a well rounded long range aggressive church program, emphasizing organization, evangelism, Christian education that can be practiced through the "Lord's Acre Plan".

CHARLOTTE MEETING ON TOWN AND COUNTRY

The following resolutions were adopted:

- To enlist all its small town and rural charges in working together in practical training by projects, in Christian Stewardship, as it relates itself to God's holy soil.
- 2. To increase its financial strength, in supporting the local Church and its obligations and creating resources for Benevolences.
- To make the many teachings of God's word effective in daily occupations, broadening, and deepening the spirit of giving or sharing with other causes of Christ.
- 4. To develop cooperation and fellowship in Christian work throughout the local church among all its organizations and groups.
- 5. To give spiritual satisfaction, and incentives for furthering the accomplishments in the work of the church.
- 6. To promote improved farming practices, discovering the worth and use of God's holy soil.
- To provide means and ways for giving larger tithes and offerings to lift the rural and small town work back into their rightful place in Christian giving.
- 8. To enable the entire family without cash, to make worthy contributions to church and community.
- 9. To reach non-church members, both old and young, in all areas in town and rural areas.
- 10. To condition for a total program for evangelism, build better places of worship, and training centers for all ages, raising up an efficient leadership in the church.

Therefore, we do recommend to all pastors in the small town and rural charges to make a survey in his parish for the purpose of discovering its many needs, calling on every family to accept, enlist, and dedicate some piece of land, cattle, or lot for God's Holy use, so that each member of the family will help to share in a large way supporting His cause.

We also recommend that each pastor contact his day school, seeking information as to the whereabout-relation of all pupils attending and their church membership. In this way there can be a training center set up in some central place for training and winning our share of 13,000,000 children who now have religious training. And also seeking our share of the 19,000,000 youth who do not belong to anybody's church.

Finally, we recommend that the minister of each charge make a perfect checking on his physical plant, whether its building and facilities are living up adequately to the present demands for training, worshipping, fellowshiping, and entertaining the entire membership.

PROJECTS FOR THE LORD: These named projects may be dedicated to God: The Lord's Acre, pig, chicken, calf, patch of strawberries, onions; a cherry, apple or peach tree; hour; some crafts in wood or other materials.

THE TOWN AND COUNTRY WORK OF THE NORTH CAROLINA CONFERENCE COMMISSION

Bishop Love and Members of the Conference:

It is with joy that I make this report concerning my work as secretary of the Commission on town and country work to gather data from our rural and small town areas which would give us the understanding of conditions of the church and its needs.

I BELIEVE THERE IS A WAY OUT OF THIS NEGLECT AND DULL DILEMMA.

There ought to be a program carried to the Rural Country Side. A program that they would accept. And it ought to be carried by a trained leader who will go and love the people.

Our Rural Program handed down today for the rural people will fit every need they may have. Such as the Lord's Hour, God's Garden, God's poultry yard, God's calf, God's pig, and other small projects.

Think of the garden project, where they may plant peas, potatoes, beans or any crop that they may choose.

They should set up a program committee on Promotion; one that will encourage every family to join (the) God's Promotion Plan of Stewardship. Every child can have a place in this program. Take the Sunday eggs from the poultry yard, or the apples that fall on Sunday or any other like projects. Then on Thanksgiving Day have known as Harvest Fester, or Harvest Thanksgiving and Ingathering.

Then let the Conference set aside a day for the rural people to come together and have them meet is not in the Conference, let them meet in a place, separately, using an hour in the midst of the Conference to give out rewards to the most successful farmers. And offering some token of gratitude of citation for the worthy farmer, because the world or society have stepped far beyond the church in rewarding such recognition.

In the Town and Country Convocation, farmers were there all across the West to receive honors at the hand of the Convocation. There is an organization for the district farmers, known as MRF which is Methodist Rural Fellowship, when once or twice a year the district meet for guiding this organization, by helping each other, in workships, retreats and so on. These same persons are present in each Annual Conference in the Commission on Town and Country Work. In this way farmers will being to feel that they are a part of this big Methodist movement.

Someone has said that the only permanent thing is change. The many and far-reaching changes of the last twenty-five years fill us with amazement and wonder. Since our society is dynamic, we cannot event hazard a guess as to the changes that are now in progress for the near future. As we see the old farm homestead and the Church of our boyhood, we are attempted to sing, "Change and decay while all around I see, O thou who changest not, abide with me." These are a few noticable changes we may find, and more to come.

BOARD OF TEMPERANCE

Bishop Love and members and friends of the ninety-seventh session of the North Carolina Annual Conference of the Central Jurisdiction of the Methodist Church.

As your Conference Board of Temperance submits its annual report to the ninety-seventh session of the North Carolina Annual Conference, it is aware of the historical Methodist position regarding the use of intoxicating beverages which commits us as a church to abstinence as a wise and Christian way of life. This position can be maintained as, however, only as our people are enlightened about the personal and social dangers involved in using alcoholic beverages and the unwise efforts constantly being made by the alcoholic beverages industries to make it easier to drink than not to drink. We therefore, call upon this conference to reaffirm its opposition to the manufacture, sale and use of beer, wine, whiskey, and all other intoxicating beverages.

It is a known, but tragic fact that since the repeal of national prohibition in 1933, and especially since the legalization of liquor in many areas in North Carolina in 1935, there has been a continuing increase in drinking, drunkenness, and evils that are caused by liquor. This is not only true of North Carolina, but it is true throughout the cities of our nation. This fact was revealed in an FBI report recently. Quote,

"More than half of all arrests reports to the FBI in 1954 were related to drinking according to figures published in the Bureau's annual Uniform Crime Report.

Out of 1,688,555 total arrests reported from 1,389 cities, 59.2% were for the offenses of drunkenness, disorderly conduct, driving while intoxicated and liquor law violations. These figures do not include the offenses of assault, rape and offenses against family and children in which alcohol is often a major factor." Unquote.

One of the distressing factors in the present liquor situation is the growing tendency of our people to believe in the mistaken idea of socalled moderation drinking. We therefore, urge an intensive educational program. The liquor industries and other propaganda to create false impressions in the minds of our people. We must explode the foolish falsehoods that beer and other liquors add zest to life, that social drinking is helpful in business, that cocktails give social prestige, and that drinking is a mark of distinction. All of these claims of the liquor interests are entirely ridiculous falsehoods; and we must cause our people to know that the effects and results of drinking are entirely opposite from the assertions of the liquor advertisements. This program of education must be conducted in our homes, in our Church Schools and pulpits, in our public schools, in newspaper articles, in radio programs, and many other means of instruction. And as a part of our educational work, we further urge that an Alcohol Workshop be conducted on each district under the direction and supervision of the District Secretary of Temperance, and with the support of the Conference Board of Temperance and the District Superintendent.

We also call upon pastors and all local churches to give effective and full support to the projects of the General Board known as Commitment Day Project and The Film Project. We further call upon every person who is interested in the Church to use his influence, his means and his vote against the liquor traffic. We appeal to all pastors and church members to increase and make more effective their opposition to this wicked business which seeks to destroy the life of our church and let us build for God, and with God a Christian community that will purpose in its heart that it will not defile its self with the king's meat or wine.

REPORT OF THE AREA ADMINISTRATIVE SECRETARY

Bishop Love and Members of the Conference:

The office of a bishop of The Methodist Church is one of great responsibility and trust. The many demands made upon the physical and mental energies of our bishops are generally too great for any of our bishops to meet without administrative assistance. Only those who have had the opportunity of being close to our bishops and of looking intimately at them in their work can fully appreciate the magnitude of their task and the multitudinous duties they are required to perform.

It is for this reason that many of the bishops of our church have chosen administrative assistants. These "area secretaries," as we have called them the past twelve years or so, are especially needed to assist our bishops of the Central Jurisdiction in their work, because of the tremendous expanse of our episcopal areas—in each case covering several—or many—states of our country.

My position in the Baltimore Area is that of administrative assistant to our resident bishop. I am grateful to Bishop Love for his confidence in me as manifested in his choosing me to assist him in carrying out the arduous duties of his office.

For the past fifteen years I have worked with Bishop Love—for twelve years when he was with the Board of Missions—in pastors schools, city institutes and in other activities of the church. I say in deep sincerity that there is no man in the Central Jurisdiction more worthy than he of the position to which he has been elected. An able administrator, one well versed in Methodist history, tradition, polity and law; a profund student of human nature, and one possessed with an innate sense of goodness and justice, he is eminently fitted for the high and holy office of a bishop of The Methodist Church.

It is a tremendous challenge and privilege to be associated with him; to have the honor of representing him on occasions when he cannot himself be present, and to help lighten his administrative duties.

During Bishop Love's two and a half month absence from the office last Fall, responsibilities of the office were delegated to me. Fortunately, only one problem arose requiring the episcopal attention of Bishop Matthew W. Clair, who had oversight of the Delaware and Washington Conferences during that period. This was the tentative appointment of Dr. O. H. Spence to the Wilmington District, Delaware Conference, following the death of the Rev. W. H. Mears, last October 28th.

STEWARDSHIP EMPHASIS

As Area Director of Stewardship, I have been able to meet with the District Directors in each of the four annual conferences, viz., the Delaware Conference in Wilmington, Delaware, on May 29; the North Carolina Conference at Bennett College, Greensboro, North Carolina, on July 3; the Washington Conference on October 22 in Batlimore; the East Tennessee Conference at Morristown College, Morristown, Tennessee, on February 13, 1955.

Of course, mere conferences are not enough. It is hoped that these District Directors will do a good work in Stewardship Education until the people of our churches all become "good stewards of Jesus Christ."

We must work toward the goal of having a Stewardship Committee and a Stewardship Director in each local church. Let us remember that Christian Stewardship is a continuing program of the Church—based on the Scriptural standard of giving.

The District Superintendents have given competent and faithful leadership in this field.

THE MESSENGER

The Baltimore Area Messenger, our monthly paper, continues to be our chief promotional effort. Despite the high standing of our paper throughout the country and among the leaders of the church, we still lack the whole-hearted support of the conferences of the Area in this project.

We pointed out editorially in our March-April issue that many metropolitan newspapers which carry a large volume of advertising matter are operating in the red today. It is to be expected normally that any publication issued for promotional purposes, with no paid advertisements, can be self-supporting only to the extent that paid subscriptions and individual sales are sufficient to take care of operating expenses. If we could double our income of the past year, we would almost reach this goal.

We are now planning our first intensive subscription campaign-with 3,000 as our goal.

We are suggesting Sunday, June 26th, as MESSENGER DAY in every church in the Baltimore Area—on which day we hope that each charge in the Area will report a minimum of five subscriptions.

CONCLUSION

The program of The Methodist Church is one which calls for the employment of the resources of all our leaders in its successful execution. The details are worked out by the various agencies of our church, and the program is promoted by our bishops, district superintendents, pastors and leading laymen. The Bishop's office, therefore, is the first link in this long chain of avenues through which Methodism speaks to the local church congregation.

I pledge continued devotion to the work assigned to my hands—and on behalf of the Area Office I thank all of you again for your support of our program and for helping to make possible the fellowship which we all enjoy in Jesus Christ our Lord.
