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

AMENDMENTS TO THE CONSTITUTION.

Non-beneficiary members shall not be required to pay on the death of any but a clerical member of Holston Annual Conference at the time of his death, and then to pay only to a widow, minor children, or both.

That in case the widow has no home at the time of her husband's II. death, that the fund arising from the payment made by the non-beneficiary member shall go to the Trustees of the Brotherhood, who shall invest the same in a home for such widow, the title to rest in her in fee simple. This shall not be operative until the non-beneficiary membership reaches 500.

The beneficiary membership shall be limited by the membership of Holston Conference M. E. Church, South. However, in case of transfer to another conference, membership may be retained for one year, but

no longer.



THE CONFERENCES.

The General Conference, our law-making body, which meets every four years, shall be composed of one clerical member for every forty-eight members of each Annual Conference, and an equal number of lay members. Of the lay members elected, one may be a local preacher. The clerical representatives shall be elected by clerical members of the Annual Conference, and the lay representatives by lay members.

The Annual Conference is composed of all the traveling preachers in full connection with it, and four lay representatives—one of whom may be a local preacher—from each presiding elder's district. The lay members are elected by the laymen of each District Conference. Such members must be twenty-five years of age, and they must have been members of the Church for six years.

The District Conference shall be composed of all the preachers, traveling and local, of the district, the recording stewards of the same, and of laymen, the number of whom, and manner of appointment, each Annual Conference may decide for itself. In compliance with this provision, the Holston Conference, in session at Abingdon, Va., in 1879, fixed the ratio at one delegate for every eighty laymen, to be elected by the Quarterly Conference of the several pastoral charges embraced in the said district; provided, that no charge shall be entitled to more than eight, nor denied a less number than four, delegates. The District Conference meets annually.

The Quarterly Conference shall be composed of all the traveling and local preachers, including superannuated preachers residing within the circuit or station (whether without or within the limits of the Annual Conferences to which they belong), with the exhorters, stewards, trustees who are members of the Church, and class-leaders, of the respective circuits, stations, and missions, together with superintendents of Sundayschools who are members of the Church, secretaries of Church Conferences, presidents of Senior Epworth Leagues, if eligible, and none others.

The Church Conference consists of all the members of a particular charge, or class, with resident members of the Annual Conference. It should meet once a month on stations, once a quarter on circuits.

JOURNAL OF PROCEEDINGS.

FIRST DAY.

WEDNESDAY, OCT. 10, 1900.

Opening Session.—The Holston Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, met in its seventy-seventh annual session at Centenary Church, Chattanooga, Tenn., October 10, 1900, with Bishop John C. Granbery in the chair. The devotional service was conducted by Bishop Cranbery, after which the secretary of last year called the roll chronologically, and the following persons answered to their names:



After announcements the Conference adjourned with the doxology and benediction.


Afternoon Session.





SUNDAY-SCHOOL BOARD.

Your Board finds that, according to the statistical reports, there has been a decrease in attendance on the Sunday-schools of the Conference. This is caused by the fact that many reported Sunday-schools but no. Sunday-school scholars. Many of our schools are organized into Missionary Societies. Our Sunday-schools have contributed \$2,412.11 this year for Missions, as against \$1,660.60 last year. We have printed and distributed literature during the year to all the preachers and Superintendents in the Conference. We have also distributed literature through our Mission Rooms to all our Superintendents. We have held one Institute and several Sunday-school Conferences. The Sunday-schools for the year have raised for all purposes \$13,334.19 as against \$11,238.03.

Children's Day has been observed more generally than heretofore, but some of the money thus raised has been appropriated to other purposes than that directed by the Discipline. Against this we enter our solemn protest, and demand that every cent thus mis-appropriated be refunded to the Treasurer of our Board. We ask also that this Conference hold each preacher in charge responsible for the money raised on Children's Day, and that said preacher in charge report full amount of same to the Treasurer of this Board.

Further, we call attention to our Home Department. Let each preacher write a postal card for sample literature to Barbee and Smith. This will give full information.

We most heartily commend our Sunday-school literature prepared by Dr. Atkins.

J. C. Orr is hereby appointed as a member of committee on pro-

gram for mid-year meeting brought to your attention by the Board of Missions.

We also direct that this Board hold a Conference Sunday-school Institute at such time and place during the year as the executive committee of the Board shall choose.

We are gratified to learn that Dr. Thomson will make a personal tour of our Conference during the coming year, and we pray for God's blessings upon his work among us.

We have examined some of the leaflets on Sunday Reform, published by this League, which Dr. Thomson proposes to distribute throughout our bounds, and believe they are valuable and will be help-

ful in maturing a righteous, public sentiment on this subject.

We believe that we cannot take too strong a stand for our imperiled American Sunday.

CHURCH EXTENSION.

The Board of Church Extension submits the following report for your consideration:

We are pleased to be able to report encouragingly, in some respects, of the work of Church Extension for the past year. Our treasurer shows a little increase in collections; while the enterprise in building churches is exceedingly gratifying. Some of our people are building beautiful, modern houses of worship where they have been long and badly needed. Not in every case, however, do our people act prudently, and in some cases they do not act according to the law of the Discipline governing the building of churches. The law referred to is a safeguard against the incurring of debt, with which some congregations are seriously embarrassed. Then again in some instances the class of houses built is out-of-date and entirely out of harmony with other buildings of the community. We suggest that in no case more should be undertaken than can be completed, but in every case let our church buildings be creditable to the people and honorable to Him whom we worship. A call on Mr. F. Foliansbee, the model church architect, will in almost every case avoid trouble, aid the worthy enterprise and help a deserving brother. We commend him most heartily.

It is distressing also for us to have to state that for this most worthy fund, a less per cent. of the assessment is paid than for any other claim. This year the board was asked to appropriate more than \$3,000, whereas, if the collection had been in full it would have had only \$2,000 at its disposal. We suggest that we must have fuller collections. And again, that our preachers do not encourage our people to expect too much aid. But let our preachers, for after all they control the matter, say to their

people, build good houses of worship and pay for out of that which belongs to Him whose house they build. Your board is called upon to pay for the remodeling of old houses, to paint weather-beaten shacks, to build cheap, box-houses, to liquidate long-standing debts, and even pay loans secured from the Parent Board. And all this with 53 per cent. of a meager assessment. Let us collect more for the work and allow what is collected to go for Church Extension proper!

It is a cause of great encouragement that the sentiment in favor of Temperance is growing; that the best people are taking an uncompromising stand against the liquor traffic; and that, not only in our homes, but more especially in the schools of the land, the children and young people

In view of the great necessity and urgency of this matter, be it resolved that we urge our preachers and people not only to continue to wage an unrelenting warfare against the sin of intemperance, but that they do so more vigorously than heretofore, using all lawful means to secure such legislation as may curtail and prohibit this prince of all evils.

REPORT ON BIBLE CAUSE.

The Bible as a Divinely authenticated revelation of inspired and authoritative truth, itself the world's greatest body of Missionary Literature, is and must forever be the Holy Spirit's great instrument for Missionary achievement. Although as registering the spiritual life of the Hebrews, (the most cultured, religiously, of the ancients), it may be safely said to be the world's greatest body of literature, still the great truths it contains, originated not in the experiences of these people, but came down to them from above. The burden of the message of this Book, first, midst, and last, is salvation from sin: "God so loved the world that he gave his only begotten Son that whosoever believeth in him should not perish, but have everlasting life." God gave the Bible to the church, the church must give it to the world.

This the American Bible Society does. The Bible is published by it in 100 languages and dialects; and by it and other societies to which it has access, in 406 tongues. The business of this society has never been more prosperous than now, the total issue for the current year being 1,406,801 copies, or in round numbers one and a half million. This immense business goes forward on the freewill offerings of the people. The American Bible Society is the greatest charity institution save one on earth. Our branch of the church has honored herself with the custom

of participating in its support.

As a Conference we acknowledge our appreciation of the honor that has fallen to us, in that an honored and beloved member of our own body, Rev. G. D. French, has been appointed one of the field agents of this society, and we pledge co-operation with him in a progressive campaign in Holston.

Resolved 1st, That, as Auxiliary Societies are the only means of circulation, and these are found so often inoperative, we pledge ourselves to

participate in a watchful care over these Auxiliaries, and in an effective working of them in the communities into which we go.

2nd. That the pastor of Morristown Station be appointed treasurer of the Bible Cause in Holston, and to assist the field agent in his work,

provided it does not interfere with his pastoral duties.

3rd. We recommend that each pastor shall preach on the Bible, and immediately thereafter take up a collection for the American Bible Society at each appointment on his church so far as practicable; also that he co-operate with the field agent in any plan he may devise and operate for distributing the society's literature.

4th. Resolved that we assess ourselves as a conference \$800 to be apportioned and collected for the American Bible Society, as are the other

collections ordered by the Annual Conference.

REPORT No. 1-BOARD OF EDUCATION.

Profoundly convinced of the duty of the Church to teach as well as to preach, we make careful inquiry as to what educational work Holston Methodism is doing. Our annual reports give no information concerning the number and state of our Methodist homes as institutions of Christian nurture, and, beyond showing \$343,000 invested in seven Literary institutions, give no account of the worth of our holdings or the extent of our annual expenditures for Christian Education. From the report of 55,106 as our membership last year, we may conclude that possibly our homes number 11,000. Through observation and answers to inquiries we estimate that 8,000 of these are without well established family altars, libraries, and systematic Christian instruction for the young.

It will be conceded that our local Churches ought to have at least one Sunday-school, one Junior and one Senior League to each, for the creditable discharge of their teaching functions. Measured by this standard the reports show a deficiency in equipment of 164 schools and 1,462 Leagues. It is also in evidence that two-fifths of the schools reported at any session of this Conference suspend work, on an average, during six months of the year, and that a greater part of the whole number are without libraries, teachers' meetings, and adequate supply of periodical litera-

ture.

We have only eight Literary institutions, and the average enrollment seldom exceeds 1,000 pupils. Hence we are teaching through this agency scarcely one-fiftieth of our children and young people. The only measurably inspiring view to be gotten of our educational work comes of looking at it in its entirety. Besides our 11,000 Methodist homes exerting a good degree of Christian influence over thousands of our children, we have 785 other educational institutions under 5,200 officers and

teachers giving Christian training to 51,247 of our people.

In striking contrast with the best aspect of our record as regards merely the question of education is the record of the State within our bounds. Under her hand the work of education is organized, pushed and made progressive. She has invested in common and high school property \$2,002,314.60. She opened last year 4,176 schools and employed 4,824 teachers at a cost of \$594,268.49, enrolled 228,644 pupils, and provided for each an average of ninety-one days instruction. She also appoints State and County Superintendents, who organize and direct the teachers, note needs, measure progress, and otherwise promote the work. Through these Superintendents we ascertain the entire school population to be 343,478. For the higher education of this population the State also provides a University and Polytechnic Institute at a cost of more than a million dollars investment, and the income upon a million more. The State is in educational work in earnest, and to stay, because she believes her life to depend upon it. We would not hinder if we could, and could not if we would. But, unlike many among us, we are far from willing to leave any school education, much less all, absolutely in the hands of the State.

Development to be a blessing must be symmetrical. Physical development greatly in excess of intellectual produces the idiot, while intellectual out of due proportion to moral makes certain the greater criminal; the moral without the intellectual insures the fanatic. The physical, intellectual, and moral development, that is sought without the aid of Christianity, only issues in a counterfeit of high character that fails the race in every crisis. The only perfectly developed human being that ever appeared on earth was the Son of Man. The effort of His earthly life was to produce in others character like His own. To per-

petuate this work He founded His Church. Upon her, therefore, rests the duty of securing symmetrical development to the entire race. She cannot ignore any process of development going on among men, but must reach and dominate the whole.

The State knows nothing of the Master's doctrine concerning the necessity of regeneration or a new principle of life to right development, nor does she know aught of His teaching concerning the necessity for daily supplies of grace. Hence her theory of education is without saving salt, either for the individual or the nation. Our Church in Holston holds these doctrines. How shall she put their saving power into all education, even that of the State, carried on among us? Let us learn a lesson from the State. She is an entity, a teaching entity. She has a system, a State system, of education. She leaves nothing to merely individual effort or to local enterprise. She trusts not to spasmodic impulses, but to patient, persistent, and constantly achieving endeavor. Let our Conference become an entity, a teaching entity. Let us have a system, a Conference system, of education. Let the day of dependence upon isolated effort, mere local enterprise, and spasms of endeavor end. Let us lay at once a foundation for our system broader and deeper than any State system through making our Methodist homes 11,000 institutions of Christian nurture, by giving to each a family altar, Christian library, and school of Christ. Add to these 801 local churches so perfected in their life and organization as to exercise thoroughly their teaching functions.

Having done these things, we shall find opportunity to, and demand for, increase of our co-educational academies, so that, instead of four, we shall have a score of such schools doing their appointed work, endeared to the church, and suffering from no sense of orphanage or neglect. Carefully adjusted and freed from friction among themselves, must be maintained as educational forces our three Female Colleges, Martha Washington, Centenary and Sullins. These schools are now in the enjoyment of a good patronage and ample incomes to meet current expenses. We must redeem quickly our promise made last year to pay off the entire indebetedness of the two former, and should carefully guide the future

course and development of all.

As the climax of our system, we must have a Conference College. It will be under our sole ownership and control, because we can not, against influences operative here, educate our young people in any considerable numbers outside our bounds, and no contiguous Conference is at present free to unite with us. We can have but one. The creation of two is not a financial possibility or literary necessity. In view of conditions obtaining throughout our Church, our Commission has recommended that no institution be classified as a College unless it has the support and becomes the only College of at least one Annual Conference. In Emory and Henry we have our great and only possibility for such a College. No other institution of ours provides for the collegiate education of our ministry, and no other is classed as even a conditioned College. It is, indeed, cause for a sense of humiliation to find that this College nears the close of this great century without the freedom, equipment, and endowment so often promised, and not denied to any other College of like worth among the Conferences of our Methodism. This institution has heroically maintained the high standard of requirement that gave her prestige among the colleges and universities in the beginning, and she now broadens her course and seeks to strengthen her faculty to meet the new requirements. She has unfaltering faith in the merit of her cause, and undying hope of full recognition and appreciation by the Church and friends of education before it is too late.

The gift of the \$92,000 adjudged as her portion of the thank offering requested of our people will secure to us an educational plant equal to what it would take a quarter of a million to create on a new foundation elsewhere in Holston. When properly equipped and endowed, her superior country location will give to her a unique charm and peculiar power among the colleges of Methodism and make of her a felt factor in solving some of the perplexing problems of the times. The realization of what is here outlined will give to Holston Conference a system of education that will enable her to powerfully act and re-act upon the education of the State. Through our homes and local churches we can make reliance upon the public school for much of the work it is now doing unnecessarily. Through dominance by these of our communities we can demand that he who teaches the common school shall be true to the ideals of the Church and Home.

Our High Schools and Colleges, together with the great Church University, by which our system shall be joined to those of all other Conferences, will give to the Conference for her work in the State an order of manhood and womanhood whose power shall be transforming. From among these will be given us, if we ask it of the Lord of the harvest, bands of teachers as thoroughly consecrated to the work of teaching as are our itinerants to that of preaching. Through wisely-organized and faithfully-operated bureaus we can leaven through the Christian charac-

ters of such teachers the whole educational system of the State.

What we have here outlined can not be realized in a day, nor by other agency than that of the Conference in its corporate capacity. We must have the full co-operation of our more than two hundred ministers and fifty-five thousand members to attain satisfactory results. The meager results of our two years' campaign in the interest of the Twentieth Century Movement makes a fearful revelation of the difficulties to be overcome. Yet this very movement gives us the greatest opportunity in the history of the Church for doing what, if not done by us, by all the Conferences of our Methodism, and by every church in Christendom, the

The Church is commissioned to disciple the nations. The nations of to-day are the mightiest the world ever knew, and have become the great educators of the race. The Church of God must be a greater educator than any, and than all of them. Let us to-day resolve that the Church of Holston, as represented by us, shall accomplish not only the work we planned one year ago, but a much broader, deeper and grander work. Pass the word down the line, through all the ranks, that the battle is renewed from this hour with ten-fold vigor; that we esteem victory more precious than life. Our plan of campaign in partial outline for the

incoming year is as follows:

1st. A specially vigorous prosecution of the work of securing thankofferings under the lead of each presiding elder, preacher, and special committees, in their respective districts, charges and churches from about

conquest of the world is effectually stayed.

October 21st to January 1, 1901.

2nd. A continuance of this movement throughout our incoming Conference year under the regulations of last year as published on pages 48 and 49 of our Annual for 1899, except a modification of No. 6 so as to allow notes to be drawn payable July 1, 1901, and January 1, 1902, as well as January 1, 1901.

3rd. A continuance of Rev. W. S. Neighbors as Secretary of Education and General Manager of the Twentieth Century Movement, with Reverends David Sullins and R. G. Waterhouse as assistants.

4th. We announce it as our fixed and unalterable purpose to pay off, first, our indebtedness on Emory and Henry, Martha Washington, and Centenary Colleges, and then give to Emory and Henry the sixty

thousand additional we hope to secure for absolutely necessary improvements and the nucleus of endowment. Against any other direction of the offerings of our people (except what Bristol Methodism and friends of education in that town are doing for Sullins' College, and what our people and friends in the particular pastoral charges where our academies are located are doing for their schools) we protest as most unwise and tending to defeat our whole plan of endeavor. We would further state that while the Greeneville Orphanage is a noble charity, worthy of the support of all of our people, and while it may be proper for members of the Woman's Home Mission Society to direct their thank-offerings to this institution under the idea that they will ultimately make of it an industrial school, such an institution was evidently not contemplated as a beneficiary of the Twentieth Century thank-offering by our General Conference, or by our last Annual Centerence. Hence, in our judgment, no offerings directed to this institution, except those by the Home Mission Society, should be credited to the Twentieth Century Fund.

5th. We must have a report from our presiding elders by January

5th. We must have a report from our presiding elders by January 10, 1901, to our Conference Secretary of Education, announcing the state of the work in each pastoral charge as regards the thank-offering, and our Executive Committee must meet immediately thereafter to determine upon a plan for the further prosecution and completion of the work of securing

from every member a thank-offering.

6th. We continue the committee of practical educators provided for and designated in our reports of last year with the request that Dr. T. W. Jordan call said committee to meet during the last week in December and prepare a report to submit to our Executive Committee at its meeting in January on courses of study pursued and to be pursued in our Schools and Colleges.

7th. We recommend the holding from June 15th, 1901, to October 1st, 1901, of special conferences and mass-meetings for the discussion of Christian Education in the home by the local Church, Academy and College. These meetings to be arranged for by our presiding elders and

Conference Secretary of Education.

8th. It must be understood that we are paying off the debts of our schools, and preparing to further foster them with the express understanding that no other debts are to be contracted without the consent of this Conference, and that where we do not now have the right, the right must be secured to us of filling all vacancies in the Boards of Trustees.

REPORT No. 2.

Having had under consideration various difficulties connected with

our educational work, we recommend:

1st. A committee from this Board, consisting of W. S. Neighbors, J. A. Lyons, and J. L. Weber, to procure and furnish our parent Board of Education such information as it calls for concerning our Schools and Colleges, and to investigate for report to this Conference the legal, financial and educational status of each institution. Also to procure and present an itemized statement of all valid indebtedness against each institution.

2nd. That this committee also take into consideration a plan for consolidating all our Literary institutions, calling into consultation such representatives of each institution as they may need. This plan shall provide for such conference control and contain such suggestions as the committee thinks will subserve the cause of Christian education among us.

3rd. This committee is fully empowered to make careful investigation of the needs of our people in the matter of elementary and industrial schools with reference to the establishment of educational mission centers, and the appointment thereto of members of this Conference, and the employment therein of philanthropic workers when the way is open for prosecution of this ministry among those who are perishing for lack of

knowledge.

Let this committee bring before the Trustees of Emory and Henry College, as a suggestion of this Conference, a proposition to admit for instruction into that institution as many as five students from each presiding elder's district, when such students are of proper scholastic attainments and present credentials from their presiding elder and preacher in chage certifying that they are of good moral character and unable to pay tuition fees. Such applicants may be required to give security by note or otherwise for the payment of tuition fees as soon as they are financially able to do so.

5th. The expenses incurred in prosecuting this work shall be paid

from the Educational Fund of the Conference.

The assessments for 1900-1901 are as follows: For our Conference, \$3,125; for Parent Board, \$375; for Payne and Lane Institute, \$500.

BOARD OF MISSIONS.

Two and one-half years ago the Epworth League Conference held at Abingdon, Virginia, inaugurated a movement for Missionary assessments in full. The movement has succeeded, and we are now able to report that the entire amount, \$17,000 assessed for Home and Foreign Missions, has been secured. We make grateful acknowledgment of God's goodness, who has so wonderfully blessed the faithful work of our presiding elders, pastors and laymen, and crowned their efforts with success. We urge a continuance of the methods that have proved so efficient.

The mid-year meeting, which has been so helpful for the two years past, will be held again this year. We invite the presiding elders and members of the Sunday-school and Epworth League Boards to unite with us in this meeting, and we request that each body appoint one of its members to act with our representatives as a committee on program.

We would urge a larger circulation of the "Review of Missions." The editor and publisher of *The Midland Methodist* deserve the highest praise for their faithful service, and the large space which has been given to Missions. We believe the evangelization of the world to be the duty of the present generation, and urge every pastor to secure at once Mr. Jno. R. Mott's admirable book on this subject.

Our thanks are due Dr. W. R. Lambuth for his valuable work and counsel, and we rejoice in the report of success which he brings to us from our Mission fields in the regions beyond.

We trust that many undirected donations to the Twentieth Century Fund may be turned to the educational work in our foreign territory. We recommend the appointment of Rev. P. L. Cobb as Conference

We recommend the appointment of Rev. P. L. Cobb as Conference Missionary Secretary, without salary, and we appropriate \$300 for his expenses.

L. L. H. Carlock, D. V. York and C. W. Kelley have been appointed a committee to estimate what amounts shall be appropriated to the various Missions of the Conference, and to report the same to the Board at its first meeting, which shall be on the day preceding our next Annual Conference session. W. W. Hicks, W. N. Wagner and J. W. Smith, have been appointed a committee to draft suitable by-laws for the gov-

ernment of the Board in the execution of its work, and provide for the preservation in a suitable record of the minute business of the Board, and for the publication of such portions of the minutes as shall be deemed proper by the Board.

The assessments for the ensuing Conference year are \$10,000 for Foreign Missions and \$7,000 for Domestic Missions, which we have

SPIRITUAL STATE OF THE CHURCH.

Your committee on the Spiritual State of the Church have diligently inquired into this momentous subject—have carefully gathered facts as far as possible, and have endeavored to correctly interpret these facts under the guidance of the Holy Spirit. We note as signs of spiritual life and

vigor:

(1). The erection of sixteen parsonages and twelve churches. (2). An increase in adult baptisms over last year of 195; but with pain and sadness, announce to you a decrease in infant baptisms. (3). There is a net increase in membership of 479 over last year's reports, in spite of the vigorous pruning of church rolls that has prevailed in our midst. (4). There is a noticeable increase in salaries, with a splendid increase in all benevolent collections—with the Foreign and Domestic Mission apportionments reported in full for the first time.

We interpret these facts as indications of increasing vigor of spiritual life and vitality, and for this we are devoutly grateful to God and His dear Son, our Saviour. Nevertheless we are sadly conscious of the fact that we are, as a peculiar people, very far short of what we can and ought to be. We ask our suffering Lord's forgiveness and renew our vows to redouble our diligence. As vital interests demanding especial atten-

tion, we suggest:

I. That as ministers of Christ, we be satisfied with nothing but the highest attainments in personal piety. We stated in our ordination vows that we expected to be made perfect in love in this life, that we were groaning after it, and making progress in that direction. We were ex-

horted to so sanctify ourselves and to so fashion our lives after the rule and doctrine of Christ as to be wholesome and Godly patterns for the peple to follow after. Let us forget neither the vow nor the exhor-

tation.

II. Diligent attention needs to be given to family religion. We are most sadly deficient here and this committee can indicate no signs of improvement. In the beginning the altars of religion were erected in the house—the home. The idea is insisted upon in the New Testament—is enlarged in the church, is completed in heaven. The demolition of the family altar is the ruin of Church and State. Let us by example and teaching, and the help of the Holy Spirit, endeavor to work a mighty revival here.

III. Closely coupled with our family altar is the baptism of our children. The need of the revival of this precious Scriptural rite, with its concomitant teaching, is imperative. Let us go back to the old paths, and by next Conference check and turn the tide from a gradually decreasing number to a constantly increasing number of infant baptisms.

IV. We need also a church with a voice. We are not ready to insist that the old type of class-meeting is the thing, and the only thing; but a meeting for testimony and experience—a regular meeting—is an absolute necessity for the life and growth of the individual and the church. It is written—"they that feared the Lord spake often one to another." Again it is written, "they overcome by the blood of the Lamb and the word of testimony." No matter how eloquent and forceful the pulpit, it must always be largely, if not almost completely, ineffective with a voice-less pew.

Life, and life more abundant, must be our constant cry, if we depart not from the true way. Love—perfect love—is what we must groan after. Perfection in love for ministry and laity. Power—the power of the Holy Ghost upon the church—in pentecostal measure, must be our unceas-

ing prayer.

Brethren, the evidences indicate a measurable growth in grace and knowledge and spiritual vigor—but we have not yet attained unto that for which we are apprehended. We repeat, our goal is a pentecostal Church—with pentecostal preaching, pentecostal convection, pentecostal conversions, with pentecostal enduement of spirit and fire, followed by pentecostal ingathering—giving—suffering and daring—with pentecostal joy and glory crowning all.

We desire to call particular attention to the excellency of the Home Department literature, and not being content to recommend this means of grace, we urge the full and freer use of the means wherever possible

The Epwerth Era now comes to us in an altered, but not less attractive form. We believe it has no superior as a religious paper for young people, and we deplore the fact that it is not self-sustaining, as shown by the Book Agent's report—there being a loss on it of \$8,600.54 for the last fiscal year. We are advised by Dr. DuBose that less than half the preachers in Holston are subscribers to this paper. This we regret, and we sincerely urge every one of our preachers to make an effort extraordinary to increase its circulation, so as, if possible, to put it in the home of every Leaguer—not for the sake of the paper per se, but for the benefits it brings to our Leaguers, and through them to our Leagues.

There is no language too strong to give correct expression to our full approval and high appreciation of the Nashville Christian Advocate. The strength, terseness and timeliness of its editorials, the excellent arrangement of its departments, and its general lofty spiritual tone constitute it a peerless family paper. We cannot say too much in its praise, or too strongly commend it to the patronage and support of our preachers and people. Coming as it does, every week, brimfull of the best thought of our most learned and gifted men, we feel that every man, woman and child in our church should have access to its store of good things and receive the benefits, blessings and benedictions of its perusal. Do all you can, brethren, to enlarge the usefulness of this true, noble and peerless advocate of the cause of Jesus Christ.

MEMOIRS.

W. G. E. CUNNYNGHAM.

Rev. Wm. G. E. Cunnyngham, D. D., was born in Knox county, Tennessee, December 3, 1820. His ancestors on his father's side were. among the earliest Scotch-Irish pioneers in the State; and his own father, the late Rev. Jesse Cunnyngham, of blessed memory, was carried off by a raiding party of Indians when only four years old, and rescued after his captor had been pursued and killed. This Jesse Cunnyngham was married to Miss Mary Etter, of German extraction and of fine character. She was as steady as clock-work in all her ways. It is related of her that she kept on attending to all her household duties without intermission while the shells were flying close about her during the battle of

Lookout Mountain.

In all his earlier years, Dr. Cunnyngham lived the plain and wholesome life of a country boy, working on the farm, going to school as he had opportunity, and laying the solid foundation for future usefulness. The best of his mental training came from his contact with his father, whom he greatly admired and loved, and from certain good old English books, including Addison's Spectator, that formed a part of the family library. He early contracted a decided love for reading, and learned to write a hand that was as perfect as copper-plate, and that lost none of its firmness and roundness with advancing age. His religious education was not forgotten. Both his parents regarded it as the main thing. No gross sins defiled his youth. Very early he experienced the grace of regeneration, and formally assumed the vows of church membership. In 1843, he joined the Holston Conference on probation, in a class of thirteen, only one of whom, the venerable J. C. Pendergrast, of the Pacific Conference, still remains. From the beginning his ministry was successful. In some of his charges he witnessed great revivals of religion, and everywhere he was a useful and acceptable preacher. During the first decade of his itinerancy he filled the following charges: Estilville, Chattanooga, Athens. Knoxville, Tazewell, and Abingdon.

In 1852 he was married to Miss Bettie Litchfield, of Abingdon, Va., and soon afterwards was appointed to our new mission in China. The journey to his distant field, vastly more different then than now, was full of strange experiences and various hardships. On arriving in China he addressed himself to the study of the language, and soon became able to use it as a vehicle for preaching. Not content with superficial methods he also undertook to master the literature and philosophy of the strange

people to whom he had been sent, and met with the most gratifying success. But his studies did not abate his ardor for evangelistic work. He preached incessantly for nine years on the streets and in the chapels and saw much fruit of his labors. The universal testimony of those who were associated with him is that he was one of the most faithful and diligent missionaries on the field. The failing health and threatened death of his wife compelled him in 1861 to return to the United States. Not being able to get through the Federal lines, he was transferred by Bishop Kavanaugh to the Kentucky Conference and stationed at Shelbyville, Ky., where he also taught classes in the Science Hill Academy, of which Mrs. Julia Tevis was the noted principal. In the spring of 1865, the war being over, he returned to Abingdon, Va., and lived there till 1873, holding for the greater part of that time the pastorate of the church at that place, and also occupying a chair in Martha Washington College. As always and everywhere, he was much beloved in that old town. In the fall of 1873, he was appointed to Church Street Station, at Knoxville, and continued in it for two years, at the end of which time he was elected to fill the vacancy created by the resignation of Dr. A. G. Maygood, as Sunday-school editor. This latter post he retained by successive re-elections till 1894, or for eighteen full years. The rest of his life, instead of being idled away, was spent in doing literary work. He wrote two valuable books: "The Foreign Missionary" and "The Young People's History of Chien". A spell of the grip through which he pessed four History of China." A spell of the grip through which he passed four years ago left him much debilitated, and quite gradually he relaxed his grasp on life and its duties. His last days were very beautiful. He kept sweet and gentle to the end. Everybody looked up to him with a sort of tender reverence. The wife of his youth ministered to him with incessant fidelity. His son and daughter, both of whom he had the happiness of seeing well settled in life, and his grandchildren also, petted and caressed him. Best of all, the peace of God abode with him. He was "calmly unafraid of death." When the end came on March 31, 1900, he was ready for the summons. After suitable and simple service in old McKendree church, his body was buried in Mt. Olivet cemetery, and his soul departed to be "forever with the Lord."

Any effort to fully appraise his character would be out of place here. A few things, however, may be said in that regard. He was a man of rare intelligence. His stock of knowledge was both wide and accurate. In a social circle or about a family fireside he was the most charming of companions. As a preacher he always commanded the attention of thoughtful and devout hearers. The matter of his sermons was both clear and strong, and his expression chaste and elegant. At times he spoke with great freedom and power. Those who listened to him often appreciated him best. His editorial work received almost universal approbation, and left an indelible impression upon the Church. 'As far as his Christian character is concerned, it is doubtful whether we have ever had a man among us who surpassed him. From his youth up, he maintained an unbroken record of consecration. He was sensitively clean in thought, word, and life. It was not his habit to talk much about himself. He had a very humble view of his own merits, and was utterly averse to anything like parade or boasting. Yet on fit occasions he did not hesitate to bear a firm testimony to the saving grace of Jesus Christ. His laith was strong and steady, and his spirit as serene as the stars. It may be said of him now, as it was said of him at fifty-six annual sessions of this Conference: "There is nothing against him."

JOSEPH F. WAMPLER.

The subject of this memoir was born in Wise county, Virginia, January 3, 1848. He was converted at the age of 16, and was licensed to exhort soon thereafter. He was admitted on trial into the Holston Conference, M. E. Church, South, at Bristol, Tenn., in 1876, and faithfully served the Church for twenty-four years without a break in his ministry. During this time he received fourteen appointments, as follows: In 1876, Laurel Mission; '77 and '78, Vanderbilt Mission; '79, '80 and '81, Burnsville Circuit; '82 and '83, Catawba Circuit; '84, Brevard Circuit; '85, Bakersville Station; '86 and '87, Pigeon River Circuit; '88 and '89, Coal City and Etna Circuit; '90, Madisonville Circuit; during this year—June 18, '91—he was married to Miss Ara Moore, at Shell Mound. Tenn.; in the fall of '91 he and his bride were sent to Spring City and Evansville; in '92 he was transferred to the Western North Carolina Conference, where he remained but a short time. At the death of Rev. J. L. M. French, of Mary Street Church, Bristol, Brother Wampler was appointed to that charge, and the official notice of his transfer back to Holston was recorded at the ensuing Annual Conference. From that Conference he was sent to Jonesboro Circuit, where he remained four years; in '97 he was sent to Jacksboro Circuit, and in '98 and '99 to Charleston Circuit, where he "fell on sleep," May 24, 1900.

He witnessed, under his ministry, between two and three thousand conversions. His power was in the pulpit. One of his presiding elders

He witnessed, under his ministry, between two and three thousand conversions. His power was in the pulpit. One of his presiding elders once declared that he was a veritable cyclone of religious zeal. The writer has heard him carry a congregation by storm with the imperial sweep of his oratory. Shouts interrupted his eloquence, and the Spirit's power was present. In prayer he was not less effective. He was a good pastor, not only among his own people, but with the members of other

Churches.

He loved his widowed mother with strong and tender devotion, and left her a little home in North Carolina. in which to spend the balance of her days. He loved his family with unselfish affection, and labored for them in many ways. For the two boys he purposed a finished education, saying often that he himself had felt the need of it so much in his work. An invalid wife elicited his tender ministrations and care. During his last sickness she returned a wealth of loving attention, standing heroically at her post by his bedside until he became unconscious, when she broke down, and was carried to bed herself. Once, when she began to realize that he could not get well, she turned her face away to hide her falling tears. But he understood, and said gently: "Don't cry mama, have more faith." He talked to her of dying, and gave specific directions about his affairs. It was the writer's privilege to sit with him some by day and by night, and to see the deep appreciation of every little service shown him. No sick man ever had kinder neighbors. But tender nursing and medical skill could not stay the hand of his disease—pneumonia.

The funeral scene at the church in Charleston, Tenn., at an early morning hour, will not soon be forgotten. The faithful wife was carried to the place in a rocking chair. Several preachers of the Holston Conference were present. The services were simple but impressive. Dr. Sullins sang "I want to go there, don't you?" Tears fell almost like rain. We buried the dead soldier of the Cross near Shell Mound, Tenn., where some nine years before he had gone for his happy bride. A letter from her recently, says: "A purer, better man never lived than Mr. Wampler." Who knew him better, or could pay to his memory a richer tribute?

JOHN ALLEY.

John Alley was born August 11, 1825, and died April 10, 1900. He was licensed as an exhorter in 1844, and as a preacher he was licensed in 1845. He entered Holston Conference in the fall of 1845, was ordained deacon by Bishop Andrew, at Jonesboro in 1847, and was ordained elder by Andrew in 1858, at Chattanooga. He went to the Jasper Circuit in 1847, and was married to Miss Elizabeth J. Kirklin, September 27, 1848. Brother Alley stood second in the chronological roll of Holston Conference at the time of his death, Wm. Robeson above and R. M. Hickey next below him. He was devoted to the Church in all her interests and enterprises. He loved the work of the itinerant ministry, and never seemed better contented than when he had the harness on. He went direct from the labors of the Methodist Church to the rest of the Church triumphant. His good wife preceded him to the better land only one year, three months and three days. The major part of his life and ministry was spent in Sequatchee Valley. It can be truthfully said that Methodist preacher that ever lived and died in this Valley. But his long, eventful and useful life, has ended at last. He sleeps beside his companion, at Chapel Hill, where he had done more preaching than at any other place. During his last illness, in conversation with loved friends he said all was well, that his moral sky was bright and his hope of heaven sweet. He left two children behind to fight the good fight of faith, (W. T. Alley and Mrs. Mary Thurman). So one by one the old guard are quitting the shores of time, and answering to the roll-call on the other side. The line of workers in the Church is being thinned at one end, and recruited at the other. MRS. E, F. KAHLE.

Mrs. Eva Gillette Kahle was born in Austin, Texas. December 24, 1858, and died in Abingdon, Va., February 27, 1900. The days of her pilgrimage were 41 years, 2 months and 3 days. She was the daughter of Maj. James S. and Elizabeth Harper Gillette. Her father was a lawyer by profession, and at one time adjutant-general of the State of Texas. Mrs. Kahle was a niece of the first governor of Texas, Henry Smith, and cousin of Attorney-General Garland, of Arkansas, and Gen. Wilcox, of the Confederate army. She seems to have cherished the earliest spiritual impression that came to her as a child, and to have yielded to the earliest promptings which she felt towards piety, "being always," as her sister after her death wrote, "from a child religious." At the age of 12, she was confirmed as a member of the Episcopal Church, in Austin, Texas. by Bishop Gregg. On February 15, 1881, she was happily married to Rev. E. F. Kahle, at Lampasas, Texas, to which place her family had removed. A help-meet indeed she at once became, and when after five years her husband gave up mercantile business to enter the ministry, she, to his surprise, joined the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, and began the life of helper to him as an itinerant.

Mrs. Kahle was possessed of a charm and beauty of person, brightness of intellect, a kind heart, an amiable disposition, a sunny spirit, and strength and womanly gentleness of character; but that characteristic which most distinguished her was spirituality. A deep piety was at the base of her character and all her work. The play even of her beautiful and gentle humor was redolent of her heart's deep sweet piety. Her love for her church work amounted to a passion. This pretty incident

fell under the notice of her pastor. When her last babe was five hours' old, she called her husband and had him write a check for missions (\$5.00)

in the babe's own name.

The records of the charges served by her husband show that the influence of her work was to induce others to work, and to love their work. Especially dear to her was Woman's Work for Woman. She was beautiful in her ministration to the sick and the poor, giving not only to the body, but to the mind and heart, and in unostentatious beauty of delicate deference and tact. She was "given to hospitality," a happy hostess. She never complained of the hardships of the itineracy. Her life itself was a song. Indeed the life she lived is described in the song she loved best:

> "Go, labor on; spend and be spent, Thy joy to do the Father's will: It is the way the Master went. Should not the servant tread it still?"

The writer will never forget the heavenly light in her face as she joined in singing this at one of the quarterly meetings within the last year of her life. She knew that she was sacrificing her life. Among the last words she spoke to a certain friend of hers, who was just entering upon the experience of being a pastor's wife, and whom she had followed to the depot to tell good-bye, were words of loving caution against overwork. work. She suffered much, but no one ever heard her complain. On Friday before her death on Monday, she would not consent that her husband stay from his appointment and when he returned found her unconscious. Surely hers is another name added to the roll of Heroes and Heroines of Faith.

Seven children are left to "rise up and call her blessed." A sister, also, Mrs. R. P. Bean, of Roswell, New Mexico, and a brother, Capt. J. B. Gillette, of Alpin, Texas, survive her. Is not the picture of the model woman given in the Bible, her picture also:

'Her price is far above rubies.'

"The heart of her husband trusteth in her."

"She doeth him good and not evil all the days of her life."

"She spreadeth out her hands to the poor; Yea she reacheth forth her hands to the needy."

"She openeth her mouth with wisdom, and the law of kindness is on

her tongue.

"Her children rise up and call her blessed."

"Her husband also; and he praiseth her, saying, 'Many daughters

have done excellently, but thou excellest them all.'

For our hearts to-day, in the clamor of bereft love, look around and ask, what suitable monument may register the honor which our love would bestow? Ah; no gleaming marble, nor eternal work in brass were equal to it. But we have what is, and looking around on her work, we lovingly say, only, "Give her of the fruit of her hands; and let her own works praise her in the gates."

MRS. JANE STEWART.

Mrs. Jane Stewart, the wife of Rev. George Stewart, whose memory we delight to cherish, was born in Giles county. Virginia, near the banks of Walker's Creek, not far from where it empties into New River, on May 19, 1823. Her maiden name was Johnston. The family was of Irish origin, and she was widely connected with the large and respectable Johnston family, with its cognate branches, which is scattered through several counties of Virginia and portions of West Virginia. Of her early life we know but little. We only know that it budded and blossomed amid rural scenes of great beauty, and developed like the native wild rose, simple in habit and chaste as the dew. We do not know precisely where she was

converted, but it was in early life and near her home.

When in the early forties George Stewart, a young Irishman, then a newly fledged minister, came into the neighborhood where she lived, he attracted a great deal of attention by his fiery ardor in exhortation and the large promise he gave of becoming a successful preacher, and several young ladies said, half in jest, half in earnest, "We will set our caps for him." Jane Johnston said with charming humor, "You may all claim him, if you wish, but as my countryman according to the flesh, he belongs to me." It turned out that way. They were married in Giles, by Rev. C. Campbell, September 4, 1844. Into Sister Stewart's arms came four happy children—two boys and two girls—all of whom died in comparatively early life, save Mary A. E., who married Rev. J. L. M. French, an honored member of this Conference, and the father of Rev. Stewart French, our brother and sole surviving member of the im-

mediate family.

In her religious life Sister Stewart was reserved almost to a fault. She said, Mr. Stewart in his capacity as minister, had to say enough for both, and that she tried to practice what he preached. None who knew her well doubts but that the task she set herself was well performed. Her religion was to do justly, to love mercy and to walk humbly with God. One who knew her well declares, "She expected to do right herself and she expected others to be guaged by the same standard that she set for herself. She was a righteous woman and justice was her motto. Hence she was one whom you had to know to love, and she was most popular among those who knew her best. As her companion of a Methodist minister she shared cheerfully the toils and cares, as well as the hopes and joys of his life, till death stripped him out of her hands. Then she said: "God has taken my husband; my children preceded their father; my home and hearth-stone are desolate." Yet she did not murmur, and we wondered at the fortitude and calmness with which she accepted her lonely lot. She was in my charge towards the close of life, and when we visited her and led in prayer we could hear her fervently responding. Once when we arose from our knees her face was wet with tears and she said with a voice choking with emotion: "I have been trying for years to get ready for my summons when it shall come.'

Her last illness was protracted and painful, yet she bore it all with Christian resignation, and on the fourth of April last, her weary feet passed the gates of the eternal world, where she found her life's lost treasures, sees the beauty of her King, and shares the joy of His ransomed ones. 

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
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
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The statistical tables are, perhaps, more reliable than they have ever been before. If the pastors' reports were in error, then, of course, the tables may be in error. Some requests for changes were sent in after Conference adjourned, but the editor had too much on hand to tamper with statistics; especially since each separate correction called for an additional change of figures in total column, in column of increase or of decrease, in table of recapitulation, in total colum there, and in Minute Questions. The tables will show some inconsistencies, but the trouble is in pastoral reports. Statistical secretaries are helpless here.

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
