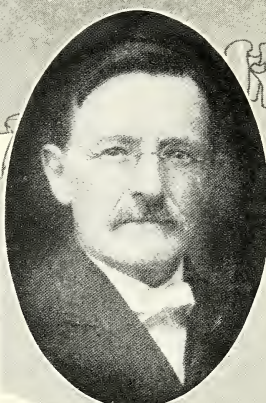

DISARMAMENT.—The following resolution was adopted:

*Whereas*, there is to be held in the city of Washington, D. C., the 11th of November next, a conference for the limitation of armaments among the nations of earth, which, it is to be hoped, will be a "high day in the Christian Calendar," when there will be a practical attempt of the nations there represented to persuade one another to beat their swords into plowshares, and their spears into pruning hooks"; and

*Whereas*, we believe it to be eminently proper and right that the Christian people of the land should help in molding public opinion by expressing their views, in no obscure terms, of the awful horrors of war, and of their earnest desire for the coming of that period when there shall be "peace on earth and good will toward men," which our Lord came to earth to bring; and

*Whereas*, we, the members of the Holston Conference of the M. E. Church, South, a part of the Christian millions in our land, desire, by earnest prayer and devoted activity, to help to put the necessary spiritual note into the Disarmament Conference; therefore be it

*Resolved*, 1st, That we request the representatives of our nation to this conference, appointed by President Harding, Secretary Hughes, Senators Underwood and Lodge, and Hon. Elihu Root, to use their influence to the utmost extent possible, consistent with right and justice, and the honor of our nation, to put an end to making preparation for war, and to urge the importance of devoting our time, and spending our means, to advance education and righteousness among the different peoples and tongues of our earth.

*Resolved*, 2nd, That as ministers and laymen, we will use our endeavor to direct our prayers, and the prayers and importunities and devotions of our people, to that day when the conference for limitation of armaments will meet, on the 3rd anniversary of the end of the World war, and try to make it—even though a week day—a day of religious service and devotion; and pray especially that the Lord God of hosts, Who holds in His hands the reins of all governments, may so direct, by His Spirit, the deliberations of the body as to make the event the psychological moment—the providential moment—for the ushering in of that long prayed for period when the nations of the earth shall "learn war no more."

*Resolved*, 3rd, That the secretary of this Conference be requested to furnish a copy of this paper to the American commissioners to the disarmament conference; also to each of the daily papers published within the bounds of our Conference.

**PROHIBITION.**—The following resolution was adopted by a standing vote, after a brief talk by Charles W. Gant, Assistant Superintendent of the Tennessee Anti-Saloon League:

We, the members of the Holston Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, believing in the total prohibition of the beverage liquor traffic, and in the strict enforcement of the liquor laws of the state and nation, hereby appeal to the United States Senate, now in session, to adopt the Conference committee report on the supplemental enforcement bill to make effective the Eighteenth Amendment.

We regret the reported opposition to this measure by the senior Senator from Tennessee.

We rejoice in and commend the active support of the measure by the junior Senator, Kenneth D. McKeller.

We express our condemnation of that small coterie of United States Senators who, by means of the indefensible filibuster, have prevented a final vote upon this enforcement legislation.

We express our appreciation of the wise action of the Commissioner of Internal Revenue in refusing to issue permits for the manufacture of medicinal beer when it is clear that the overwhelming majority of Congress is in favor of the pending measure and its adoption and is prevented only by a small minority by questionable parliamentary methods.

We congratulate the Attorney General of the United States on his ringing appeal for law and order.

We believe the time is at hand for all law-abiding citizens to take an open stand for the Constitution of the United States and the laws enacted pursuant thereto to make it enforceable.

*Resolved*, That this Conference, that has so nobly contended for sobriety from the beginning, amend its diligence to counteract the fearful peril awaiting the civil and religious welfare of our country. Let this amendment manifest itself:

(1) By a rigid fidelity in teaching custodians of prohibitory enactments to keep their oaths at all hazards.

(2) That all periodicals that are now bartering their honor by selling in one way or another their space to the liquor interests be taught at once that the frown of a righteous nation is upon them, and that unless they cease their unholy efforts to reenthron King Alcohol they will receive the withering rebuke of their supporters.

SATURDAY, OCTOBER 8, 1921.

The Conference convened at 8:30 a. m., with Bishop Denny in the chair. Hymn 19, "Come, thou fount of every blessing," was sung. D. E. Hawk read a Scripture lesson from the first chapter of Colossians, and commented on the same. J. T. Guy led in prayer.

The minutes of yesterday's session were read and approved.

REPORT.—The Committee on Memorials made report, which was disposed of as follows:

We, your Committee on General Conference Memorials, have had before us a memorial, presented by J. W. Rader and others, concerning tampering with fundamentals and weakening of the episcopacy.

The two items were considered separately, and each one was adopted by a practically unanimous vote.

A memorial concerning a church cabinet, presented by I. P. Martin and others. We recommend its adoption.

The item was adopted.

A memorial concerning distribution of funds to superannuates, presented by J. M. Crowe and others. We recommend that it be not adopted.

The recommendation for non-concurrence was adopted.

A memorial concerning submission of plans for special movements to the College of Bishops. We recommend that it be adopted.

The item was adopted.

A memorial concerning enlargement of the General Board of Missions so as to have two members from each annual Conference, presented by J. M. Carter and others. We recommend that it be not adopted.

The recommendation for non-concurrence prevailed.

I. P. MARTIN.

We, your Committee on Memorials to the General Conference, have had before us a memorial concerning the calling of a convention to consider and create plans for the unification of the two Episcopal Methodist Churches in the United States, presented by N. M. Watson and others. We recommend that it be not adopted.

The recommendation was discussed by N. M. Watson, J. E. Wolfe, T. C. Schuler, J. W. Rader, I. P. Martin. The previous question was ordered. The recommendation for non-concurrence prevailed.

BISHOP WATERHOUSE.—Bishop Denny introduced Bishop R. G. Waterhouse.

UNIFICATION.—The following resolution was adopted:

Since it is possible that this Conference be misunderstood by its vote on the General Conference memorial for unification, therefore be it

*Resolved*, That we are heartily in favor of unification, and pray that the day will be hastened when the great family of Methodists in America become one.

**ORPHANAGE.**—The following paper was discussed by F. A. Carter, and adopted:

The Board of Directors of the Holston Orphanage asks the Holston Conference to appoint as directors F. A. Carter, F. A. Weiss, P. A. Dunn, F. B. St. John, J. A. Burrow.

It asks, also, that the Conference set aside one day during the coming year to be known as Orphanage Day, looking to assistance in raising money to put up a dormitory which will enable the administration to take care of 150 children instead of 75. Bro. Wysor recently had to decline to receive, in a short space of time, 23 applicants for housing homeless children. The Executive Committee of the Orphanage will work out plans for the day if the Conference will set it aside. The dormitory to be erected is to be named in honor of Mrs. E. E. Wiley, whose memoir is to be read at the Memorial service tomorrow afternoon. Due announcements of exact date and plans will be made in ample time, if this body will pledge its co-operation.

*Resolved*, That the Holston Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, assembled in Morristown, Tenn., commends the work of the Near East Relief to the Churches and Sunday Schools represented by



this Conference, and we pledge our moral and financial support to this worthy work; and we suggest that Christmas, 1921, next, be set apart for the presentation of this cause to our people, and that contributions be asked of our people.

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## SIXTH DAY.

MONDAY, OCTOBER 10, 1921.

The Conference convened at 8:30 o'clock a. m., with Bishop Denny in the chair. "Come all that dwell below the skies" was sung. H. S. Hamilton led in prayer, after which he read Scripture citations from Isaiah and Revelations, and commented on the same. Hymn 135, "Majestic sweetness sits enthroned," was sung. SPECIAL COMMITTEE.—The following report of a special committee was adopted; the MIDLAND METHODIST being requested to publish the same:

We reaffirm our faith in the merits of the Centenary and Christian Education Movements, and rejoice in their splendid achievements. A great work has been accomplished. A chapter has been written into our Methodist history of which the Church will ever be proud. But the work is not ended. It must be carried on to completion. We dare not stop now, or we would lose much of what we have gained. We are, therefore, gratified to know that the Conference Missionary Secretary and the Secretary of the Christian Education Movement are to be continued in office to carry on the work of these two great movements; and we pledge to them our very best support and heartiest co-operation.

Desiring that the Conference shall receive the greatest possible benefit from the service of those secretaries, we offer the following recommendations touching this work:

(1) That in all missionary institutes, midyear meetings, group conferences or other meetings calling for the attendance of preachers and presiding elders prominence shall be given to the interests of both movements, and that we respectfully request the presiding elders to so arrange the dates of missionary institutes and district conferences as to make the attendance of the secretaries possible.

(2) That the major portion of this time shall be given to the small churches or circuits and missions.

(3) That a period of intensive cultivation be observed in each presiding elder's district; that the secretaries, the presiding elders and other strong preachers shall make up teams which shall reach every church in the district; that these cultivation periods be observed in not more than two districts in any one month, and that they be so scheduled as not to interfere with district conferences or other important district meetings.

(4) That a committee on arrangements be formed in each presiding elder's district, composed of the presiding elder, the district lay leader and one pastor, which committee shall make all arrangements with the pastors and secretaries for this period of cultivation.

(5) That in these periods supreme emphasis shall be placed upon the development of the spiritual life of the people, and that no effort shall be made to secure, or increase, pledges for either of the great movements.

(6) That the secretaries tender their services to the pastors for Sundays not included in these periods of cultivation, and that whenever it is deemed advisable they be secured to present at the close of revival efforts the life-service appeal to the awakened church.

Bishop Waterhouse was called to the platform by Bishop Denny.

BALLOT.—Votes cast, 24; necessary to a choice, 13; elected—Mrs. J. W. Rader, with 16 votes.

The Committee on Memorials was granted permission to retire.

REPORT.—The Board of Education made report, which was adopted. See supplement "J."

BALLOT.—The tellers reported the tenth ballot for lay reserve delegate: votes cast, 27; elected, Harry Trobaugh, with 27 votes, completing the four reserve delegates.

AN OLD DEBT.—Thomas Priddy moved that a committee of seven be appointed to adjust the matter of an old indebtedness to Mrs. Thomas Pruden, growing out of the Conference assuming an indebtedness on Centenary College. The motion was discussed by Thomas Priddy, C. W. Dean, H. E. Kelso, J. A. Baylor, J. B. Ward, J. S. French, J. A. Burrow, R. A. Kelly. Barney Thompson, a former member of this Conference, was given permission to make explanations. H. E. Kelso moved as an amendment that

the word "adjust" be stricken out, and the words "investigate and report" be substituted. The amendment was adopted by a vote of 86 to 75. The motion as amended was then adopted. Bishop Denny appointed the following committee: Thomas Priddy, F. A. Carter, G. L. Hardwick, J. A. Stone, J. S. French, I. P. Martin, F. A. Weiss.

BALLOT.—The tellers reported another ballot for clerical delegates: votes cast, 184; necessary to a choice, 93; elected—T. S. Hamilton, with 95 votes. Another ballot was taken, and the tellers retired to count the same.

REPORT.—The Board of Education, and the treasurer of the Board, made reports, which were adopted. See supplement "J."  
L. E. Hoppe was granted leave of absence.

REPORT.—The Committee on Social Service made report, which was adopted. See supplement "K."

BALLOT.—The tellers reported another ballot for clerical delegate: votes cast, 177; necessary to a choice, 89; elected—N. M. Watson, with 89 votes.

REPORT.—The following committee report was adopted:

Your committee appointed at the last session of our Conference to investigate the advisability of meeting a month earlier sent out a questionnaire to the preachers, inquiring into the time for opening of public schools, attendance upon town or country schools, changing school books by a change in appointment, possible effect on benevolent collections, etc.

While this tabulation shows that there are arguments on both sides of the question, and while there are advantages to be gained in the earlier holding of our Conference, yet the disadvantages seem to offset the advantages, and your committee unanimously recommends non-concurrence in the proposed change.

The Conference sang the doxology, after which Bishop Waterhouse pronounced the benediction.

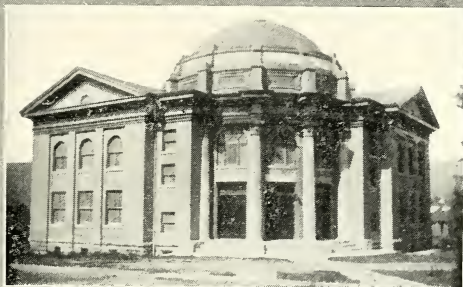

## CONFERENCE REPORTS

### A

#### SABBATH OBSERVANCE.

God commanded all men to honor the Sabbath day and keep it holy; and to rest from their labors, they, their families, servants and beasts of burden. Our Bible and all history confirm the truth that keeping the Sabbath is fruitful of all blessings, and desecrating it fruitful of God's severest penalties. We feel that the general national desecration of the Sabbath is imperiling the moral and financial safety of our nation. Following the language of our Conference in 1920, we repeat that "working seven days in the week will destroy the religious life of man or nation." Every man should have the Sabbath with his home, his wife and children, his Sunday School and Church. For these reasons we urge all our members, citizens and public officials to do their best to stop all Sunday labor, all Sunday trains, state and interstate; to stop postoffices and mails on Sunday; to stop the publication, transportation, reading of, and advertising in, Sunday newspapers; to stop all Sunday theaters, picture shows, baseball and like games for profit; to stop all trade and traffic—including all gasoline stores, soft drink and soda water stores, and drug stores, excepting always cases of charity and necessity, as supplying medicines and necessities to the sick and suffering overtaken by distress that could not be provided against before Sunday."

We reaffirm our action in 1920, urging the passage by Congress of a national Sunday law for Sunday observance in the District of Columbia and in all interstate commerce; and we again indorse the national law for that purpose (proposed by the Tennessee Annual Conference, through the committee, Noah W. Cooper, W. R. Webb and E. B. Chapell), as it appears at page 3377 of the Congressional Record of February 20, 1920. In this action we are co-operating with Tennessee, Louisville, Memphis, Louisiana, Upper South Carolina, North Alabama, North Georgia, Central Texas, Little Rock, North Carolina, South Carolina, South Georgia, Texas, North Arkansas, Mississippi, Alabama, Florida, Baltimore, Illinois, Northwest and Missouri and Western Virginia Conferences, which have indorsed this law.

We recommend that a committee of three—F. A. Carter, W. E. Brock and Dr. N. M. Watson—be elected to co-operate with the Tennessee Conference committee and with committees from other Conferences and organizations to secure the enactment of this National Sunday law, and to arouse public sentiment to support it. And we direct that this committee co-operate with other like committees in securing public sentiment and law in all the states touched by this Conference. As messengers of our Lord we must follow his commandments in seeking a Sabbath day's rest for every person alike; so that our Sunday laws may be uniform.

We agree with our good brethren of the great Southern Baptist Convention, in session at Chattanooga, Tenn., May 16, 1921, that it is the duty of our Government, State and National, "to safeguard the Sabbath so as to guarantee one day in seven as a day of rest for every citizen" alike.

We urge our preachers to preach often on the vital importance of strict Sabbath observance. We request our General Conference to indorse this proposed National Sunday law, and to take suitable action to have this Sabbath-saving crusade carried on to a righteous victory throughout our

nation, and through us to all people as God commands and as our Versailles peace treaty urged upon all nations. We request our delegates to present a copy of this resolution to our General Conference as a memorial from us.

### SUNDAY SCHOOL BOARD.

The past year has been one of progress. The work has arrested the attention of the Church in a more serious way than ever before; the Church is undertaking to provide adequate means for a proper ministry to the childhood and youth of this age; gradation, architecture and physical equipment are being considered in a more serious manner.

At no time have we found a finer spirit of interest and co-operation than we now have in our school, and in many places our attendance is overflowing the present buildings; the importance of trained teachers is growing upon the conscience of the Church, and more and more provisions are being made for the training of our teachers. Ten teacher-training classes were organized, two district standard training schools were conducted the past year, four hundred and forty-six credits were awarded, ten of which were gold-seal diplomas. The enrollment with the teacher-training department is most encouraging.

The Wesley Bible Class work has taken on new interest, twenty-one classes have been enrolled; these classes represent young people and adult departments: this is indeed encouraging, for it shows the Sunday School is getting a strong hold upon those ages that were thought by some as not belonging to the Sunday School.

During the past year twenty-eight institutes were conducted, grouped as follows: three county institutes, seven district institutes, eighteen circuit institutes. In these institutes we had one hundred and ninety-nine schools represented, with one hundred and eleven pastors, one hundred and sixty-seven superintendents, three hundred and seventy-three teachers attending. These institutes have awakened a new interest in Sunday School work in every community where they were held, and in the schools participating in these institutes. In them practically all phases of Sunday School work were presented. In the district institutes particular attention was given to the elementary work in the Sunday School, while in the county and circuit institutes equal attendance was given to other lines of work. A number of circuits organized last year are holding quarterly institutes of their own, and are reporting gratifying results.

We believe that our Sunday School editorial staff are keeping abreast of the best in literature for use in all grades and age groups in the Sunday School. The Superintendent and his helpers are indispensable to the progressive Superintendent.

The *Church School* is conceded to be the best magazine of methods published in North America. The new periodicals substituted for the *Visitor* and adapted to sex and age grouping are in keeping with the best thought among leaders in religious education. The editorials and contributed articles published in the *Teachers' Magazine* and the *Adult Student* should be carefully read by pastors and Sunday School workers. We believe that it is unwise as it is unloyal for our people to use literature published by other than our own Church.

We commend the work of our Field Secretary, Rev. S. S. Boyer, and our Elementary Superintendent, Miss Jean Crawford, for the past year. We respectfully ask Bishop Denney for the reappointment of Brother

Boyer to the same work; and regret to note that Miss Crawford finds herself unable to continue in the work. The Board proposes to put another Elementary Superintendent in the field as soon as the proper person can be found.

We note with pleasure the number of Sunday Schools contributing to the support of our Orphanage. The offering this year will exceed any of former years. With the plans that are now before us for an enlarged Orphanage, we more earnestly request all our Sunday Schools to regard each fifth Sunday as Orphanage Day, and to take an offering for its support.

We urge all our Sunday Schools to meet promptly their pledge to the Centenary. Many are doing so, while others are falling behind. We insist that this matter be given attention by the pastors and superintendents whose schools are in arrears. The amount paid by our schools to October 1st is \$29,528.77.

Your Sunday School Board believes that the most important item of work for the ensuing year in the completion of district organization, and calls upon the presiding elder (without whom it is impossible to accomplish it) to give aid, to the end that the offices in the district organization shall be filled by the most suitable men and women in the district.

Children's Week, emphasized for several years by the United States Government and last year by nine of the leading Protestant denominations, was observed by a few towns in Holston with encouraging results. We recommend its observance in all our schools this year. The time for observance being the last week in April.

#### LAY ACTIVITIES.

We beg to report:

1. The re-election of F. H. Taylor as Conference Lay Leader.
2. That a resolution as follows was adopted, and is respectfully submitted for consideration and action by this Annual Conference:

"We, the Laymen of the Holston Conference, assembled, wish to ex-

press our loyalty to our Church, and we pledge our support in all of her undertakings; we rejoice in the measure of success which she has achieved; we are proud of her great history, and pray for the continuance of God's favor upon us as a Church;

"We are especially concerned for the ministers who bear the burden and discharge their duties faithfully, and, oftentimes, under great difficulty. We deplore the fact that the average pastor's salary is not large enough to give adequate support to his family;

"We wish to suggest that it is the opinion of the Laymen that the policy of fixing the presiding elder's salary on a percentage basis in many cases works a hardship to the pastor;

*"Therefore be it Resolved,* That we as Laymen place ourselves on record as being opposed to the percentage basis for fixing a presiding elder's salary, and respectfully suggest to the District Stewards of the several districts that a fixed salary should be provided for the presiding elders."

3. That a committee of six, namely: F. A. Carter, F. A. Weiss, Lynn Sheeley, Geo. L. Hardwick, G. A. Lambert and Hugh L. Potts, were appointed and were vested with authority to investigate the subject-matter of furnishing, without cost to our preachers, life insurance upon their lives, for their benefit and for that of their families, and to report to the Laymen's meeting of the next Annual Conference the committee's findings and recommendations.

4. That hearty co-operation be pledged to whatsoever plans for spiritual cultivation shall be recommended by the Committee of Fifteen which has been constituted at this Annual Conference.

We respectfully recommend:

1. That through and under the Committee on Evangelism a group of men and women be organized for personal work in each church, whether upon circuit or in station, and whether in rural community, town or city,—the chief object of this personal work by the group to be to lead the unsaved to an acceptance of Jesus Christ as Savior, and to enlist them and all Church members in Christian activities, such as Church attendance, Christian conduct, example and influence, the family altar in the home, the daily reading of the Bible, the entrance upon some branch of Christian service in the work of the Church, and that this group organization shall be planned by the Lay Activities Board of this Annual Conference.

2. To these ends, we recommend (1) that arrangements be made at once for a meeting in January, 1922, of the Conference and Lay Leaders; (2) that, as soon as it shall be practical after the adjournment of this Annual Conference, each district shall call together the Lay Leaders for a conference; (3) that prayer meetings be set up and maintained in every church wherein there is now no such meeting; (4) that the literature which is now being issued by the Department of Spiritual Resources be used by every congregation; (5) that the men and women of the laity shall place themselves at the disposal of the presiding elder and pastor, to be used in holding meetings and in conducting church service in all places at which the pastor may not be able to be present.

3. That this Annual Conference place an assessment of \$1,000 to cover the expense incident to the work and suggested meetings of the Conference and District Lay Leaders, the fund to be disbursed by the Conference Lay Leaders.

The following pronouncement, expressing the faith and the stand of the laity as Christians and members of the Church, was adopted by unanimous action:



1. We believe in the inspiration and supreme authority of the Holy Scriptures. We accept that Book as the Word of God.

2. We believe in the deity of Jesus Christ, in His incarnation, in His virgin birth, in His atoning death, in His resurrection. We accept Him as Lord, Savior, Redeemer.

3. We believe that God so loved the world that He gave His only begotten Son, that whosoever believeth in Him should not perish, but have everlasting life. In this faith and for this faith, we are upon our feet for service.

4. We are against "destructive criticism" of the Bible in whatsoever name, or wheresoever it may be found. We stand for the Gospel of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ; and we stand against destructive criticism, materialism, rationalism, liberalism, skepticism, and every form, open or covert, of infidelity to God, to Jesus, to the Bible, or to the Christian Church.

5. We believe the time has come for action, and that men loyal to Jesus Christ and His cause, and to the fundamentals of Christian faith should unite themselves against the current assaults upon the Word of God, whether found in the pulpit, in the school, in spoken or written word, or anywhere else.

### BIBLE BOARD.

Wherever the people have access to the open Bible there follows religious liberty. The Word of God is the only means for breaking the shackles of ignorance, superstition and slavery; and it is the Bible that has made the United States and England the leading nations of the earth. Truly, the Word of God has enabled them to lead other nations into civil and religious liberty.

The American and British Bible Societies are doing more, perhaps, to dispel heathen darkness than all other agencies. The agencies of these institutions cover the globe, almost, being printed in nearly all known tongues of the world; and hence the demands, ever increasing, that are made upon the Church for funds. Of course all this means increases in collections wherever possible.

Your committee regrets to say there has been quite a decrease in the collections of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South. This ought not to be, as we are now engaged in a great movement in favor of both Home and Foreign Missions. This urgency is intensified by the fact that our missionaries very largely depend on the American Bible Society for the Word of God.

We are engaging in an unprecedented forward movement in Christian Education also, and as the Bible is the chief instrument in promoting Christian Education, we ought to bestow our best encouragement by way of financial support to the chief agency in Bible distribution.

We rejoice that this Conference has not yet taken a backward step in regard to doctrines of the Word or of their willingness to support it.

It may not be amiss to state that our report last year showed that the Conference contributed last year \$1,714.58, while the report of the treasurer, the Chattanooga Savings Bank, gave credit for only \$540.90. The error on the part of the bank has been cheerfully corrected.

Your Board asked for \$1,800 the present year, and, according to the reports of the pastors as submitted to the Chattanooga Savings Bank, the preachers have collected \$1,647.80.

We ask the same assessment the incoming conference year—\$1,800.

### EPWORTH LEAGUE BOARD.

We are glad to bring a report of progress in the work of the Epworth League. Last year an effort was made on the part of the League Board and the League Conference for co-operation in the work for the year that has just passed. That co-operation was realized, is putting it lightly. We found all concerned ready to work in this undertaking.

We are glad to note that during the past year there has been a decided forward movement on the part of the pastors as well as Epworth Leaguers. We report an increase in League chapters—also in membership. There has been a forward movement put into operation to make each League chapter an efficient organization, that is, making each chapter a "Gold Seal" one. We feel that this is necessary, because we have been too loose in much of the work undertaken by the League. We have organized the Efficiency Legion, and Mr. Sam Akers, of Knoxville, is commander, with Miss Grace Tarver, executive secretary. We are hoping that under this wise management much good will be accomplished.

\* Mr. Leon Jeroulman, of Knoxville, has offered his services as field secretary, charging no salary, but expenses only. This offer has been accepted by the Board. We urge that the presiding elders and pastors make the best use possible of his services.

The Board, in conjunction with the Conference Cabinet, decided at the presidents' meeting at St. Louis in December, 1920, that we would depart from the old Conference idea, and organize the Conference Assembly. We did this and held our first Assembly at Martha Washington College, Abingdon, Va., last June. We enrolled 106 delegates and issued 96 certificates for work done in the Assembly. F. J. Prettyman, J. W. Perry, Dr. I. P. Martin, Rev. T. S. Hamilton, Dr. J. S. French, Rev. J. R. Brown and other pastors of Holston rendered valuable services to the Assembly. In addition to these we had Dr. J. A. Duncan, Dr. W. R. Weekley, Dr. J. Wesley Hill and others.

Special mention should be made of the work under the Department of Life Service. This subject was kept prominently before the Assembly during the entire week. On Life Service night we had a great service. Rev. T. S. Hamilton brought a strong and impressive message. The closing moments produced a scene of great power. Nine definite decisions for life service, besides forty-three others who put themselves wholly on the altar, but were undecided as to what line of work they were called to do. If you want to know more of this Assembly, bring some of your young people and be present next year on the first day.

We have outlined the following policy for the coming year and ask the co-operation of all the presiding elders and pastors in an effort to accomplish the task:

- 1st. To have a definite detail organization.
- 2nd. To have a special efficiency leader working towards the standard of efficiency for chapters.
- 3rd. To hold the second annual Assembly at Martha Washington College, Abingdon, Va., June 20-27, 1922.
- 4th. To hold a series of institutes in every district in the Conference.

### CHRISTIAN LITERATURE.

The Holston Annual Conference at its 1920 session in Chattanooga unanimously passed the following resolution: "*Resolved*, That, as presiding elders, pastors and laymen, we pledge ourselves to earnestly endeavor to interest our people in the support of both our Conference and general organs."

The Nashville *Christian Advocate* made a small gain in circulation

during the year and now publishes some 18,000 copies weekly, which is 5,000 more than it was a few years back. The circulation now, exclusive of exchanges and non-Methodist subscribers, is about one to every 140 church members. The *Midland Methodist*, when called into court to testify, answered: "Circulation now about same as this time last year."

How do these facts look in the light of the said 1920 resolution, passed unanimously by this Conference?

It is hardly necessary to repeat what has been so often truthfully stated, that our general organ is a great church paper, and is listed in the first class, and the equal of any. It is furnished to subscribers as low as the lowest of its class and for less than nearly all other church papers of its grade. Its actual cost for publication, excluding editorial salaries and necessary office help, and a fair rental for office room, is the sum of \$2.13 per year, while its subscription price to preachers, probably 5,000 in number, is the sum of \$2 per year; to laymen \$2.50 a year. Considerable of these subscriptions are never paid. Only a small proportion of space is given to advertisements. Thus the edifying reading matter is increased. Its expenses exceed the intake of dollars. But its design was never to declare money dividends for the corporation. Its function is to be a medium for church intelligence, and to aid in all church enterprises, and to assist the Church in spreading holiness throughout the land. Its dividends are moral, religious and intellectual. Religious church papers are as much of a necessity to church progress as are legs to a man in a walking contest. They must be had at any financial cost, and the larger the circulation the wider and the greater their influence for good, hence the increasing desire for every conference to include in its yearly budget a sum with which to put a church paper into every Methodist family.

But for the information given, and the influence exerted by the Nashville *Christian Advocate* and the *Midland Methodist*, the Centenary and the Educational movements would not have moved at all within our Holston country, or at least would have proved a dismal failure.

The *Midland Methodist* is our local paper. It cannot be subsidized by the general church, and, except its income from advertising, must be supported by the membership of the three patronizing Conferences. It fits and fills its place admirably. Just how the editorial department could be strengthened is unknown. Brethren, be loyal to your church papers, and loyal to your vows.

Think on these things. Think and act.

rise to Sunset," by Dr. Frank Richardson, "Recollections of an Old Man," by Dr. David Sullins, "Reminiscences," by Dr. Geo. D. French, and others, have preserved important historical events. We think there should be many successors to these worthy men in the production of literature.

4. We urge the pastors to use to the fullest extent possible the secular press of their respective communities.

A summary of a sermon in the daily or weekly paper will reach a large number of people who do not attend church and many shut-ins, to whom it will be a means of grace.

The divine message needs no defense at our hands. When faithfully proclaimed it does its own execution. Evangelists have helped in many charges, but in the others the pastors have held their own revivals. Larger and better equipment on our part as ministers would inevitably produce greater measures of success.

As a means to greater efficiency we realize more than ever that our pastors need to be relieved from serving tables, and that the material interests of the Church be managed by the laymen.

The giants which intimidated the majority of the spies, when they went to view the land of Canaan, are personified in worldiness, pleasure seeking, indifference, Sabbath desecration, attendance upon picture shows, many of which are immoral. All these are in defiance of the General Rules of the Church, wherein we are taught not to take such diversions as cannot be taken in the name of the Lord Jesus.

Our quarterly meetings, with our old-fashioned love feasts, once a power for developing spiritualists among our people, have become minimized until they are no longer looked to as a place to recount one's spirituality. We state facts, but are unable to prescribe the remedy. We believe that the holding of quarterly conferences on Sunday, except in rare instances, is not conducive to the furtherance of the spirituality of our people.

*Resolved*, That we pledge ourselves with renewed diligence to keep ourselves unspotted from the world.

Second, That we will use our utmost endeavors to reinstate and maintain old-fashioned family altars in the homes of all of our people.

Third, That each of us will endeavor to make the ensuing year the best in our history.

## EDUCATION.

We, the Board of Education of Holston Conference, have had under consideration reports from the General Board of Education and from the Conference Educational Secretary, and we offer the following recommendations:

First—That we express and record our gratitude for the progress that has been made toward the realization of the five objectives of the Christian Education Movement.

Second—That we give grateful recognition to the faithful and efficient services of the laymen and preachers whose faithful labors made possible the remarkable achievements of this movement, and that we offer thanks unto God for the grace which enables us to finance our educational work in this time of financial depression.

Third—That we face the fact that the Christian Education Movement is an uncompleted task which will not be completed until all of its five objectives are realized. And while the simultaneous Every Member Can-

vass is finished, we recommend that every possible encouragement be given to those charges where no canvass was made, or where the results secured were unsuccessful, to do their full and worthy share in meeting the financial objective. The need of our colleges, represented in the sum of \$33,000,000 for the Church at large and \$1,705,000 in Holston Conference, is real and imminent, because of its lack many students are turned away from our colleges.

Fourth—We recommend that the presiding elders be requested to secure in the first round of quarterly conferences accurate reports from pastors, charge directors and church collectors concerning the quotas and pledges for each church. And that they urge churches which have not made the canvass to do so when in their judgment it is wise so to do.

Fifth—We recommend that Dr. I. P. Martin be appointed Conference Educational Secretary-Treasurer.

We have carefully reviewed the report of Dr. R. H. Bennett, Secretary of the Department of Ministerial Supply and Training and Religious Education, and we note with pleasure that more than five thousand young men and women have pledged themselves to devote their lives to the ministry, to missions or to some other form of Christian service. In carrying to completion the cultural movement we recommend that the keynote be: the Church must furnish the facilities by which these five thousand volunteers, with others, may be prepared to render the most efficient life service.

It is worthy of commendation that the Christian Education Movement has laid, and is laying, emphasis on developing the spiritual resources of the Church. Thousands of family altars have been erected and many thousands of our people have entered into a solemn covenant of intercession. We are devoutly glad of the evidences of the deepening of the religious life throughout our Methodism, and we congratulate Brother P. L. Cobb on his devotion to this work.

We rejoice in the continued prosperity of all our Conference institutions of learning, but we deplore the inadequacy of their facilities to meet the increasing demands made upon them. Nevertheless, the quality of the work done by them is such that we most earnestly commend them to the patronage of our people.

Following are the educational statistics: Institutions, 4; teachers, 59; students, 650; endowment, \$75,575; value of property, \$769,362.

We recommend the confirmation of the following nominees for trustees: Hiwassee, J. E. Wolfe in place of O. W. Mueller, deceased; Centenary, Geo. L. Hardwick and T. J. Eskridge to succeed themselves, and Frank Harle in place of R. M. Standefer; Emory & Henry College corporation, J. B. Ward, J. W. Perry, M. H. Honaker, S. W. Keys, G. A. Lambert, M. H. Jackson, L. C. Hassinger and Joseph L. Kelly to succeed themselves, and J. A. Stone in place of Chas. C. Weaver, resigned, and W. W. Neff in place of R. G. Waterhouse, resigned.

We have appointed S. D. Long, Henry C. Stuart, W. M. Morrell and L. C. Hassinger to co-operate with a like committee appointed by the Board of Missions in thoroughly investigating the conditions in Buchanan County, Virginia, and the adjacent territory, and reporting thereon as to the advisability of establishing a school or schools therein.

We recommend that the following be empowered to receive and hold in trust for the Holston Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, a certain parcel of land situated in Buchanan County, Virginia, which Mr. C. W. Boyd offers to the Holston Conference for school purposes, provided the joint commission appointed by the Conference Boards of Education and Missions shall decide that said parcel of land is a suitable place for the location of the school contemplated, viz.—W. L. Dennis,



H. C. Stuart, J. R. Laird, E. R. Boyd, C. W. Boyd, Judge W. E. Burns and I. C. Boyd.

N. M. Watson is appointed as our representative in connection with the proposed summer institute at Emory & Henry College, to be held under the auspices of the General Board of Missions.

We recommend that the following be appointed to school work: F. K. Suddath, Principal of Oceania High School; J. S. French, President E. & H. and M. W. Colleges; S. D. Long, Vice-President E. & H. and M. W. Colleges; W. B. Mitchell, Professor E. & H. and M. W. Colleges; H. M. Houston, Professor E. & H. and M. W. Colleges; J. C. Orr, Professor E. & H. and M. W. Colleges; J. W. Malone, President Centenary College; J. E. Lowry, President Hiwassee College; T. N. Orr, Student Emory & Henry College; W. B. Peck, Student Hiwassee College; Chas. H. Williams, Student Emory University; H. S. Carter, Student Garrett Bible Institute; R. Lake Wright, Student Hiwassee College.

## K

### SOCIAL SERVICE.

The Methodist Episcopal Church, South, has taken a definite position with reference to those questions involved in the field of social service that are, by reason of the unrest of the times, uppermost in the minds of our leaders. It made a deliverance at the General Conference at Atlanta by adopting the paper known as the "Social Creed of the Churches of Christ in America." This paper sets forth the principles upon which the Church has pledged itself to proceed as touching these questions. Nothing more need to be said upon this phase of the question, except to emphasize the importance of this creed, which is published in 809th paragraph of the Discipline of 1918. We suggest that all the preachers and laymen should become familiar with this statement of the social question, to know its implication, and in so far as there is opportunity to apply its statements to the life of today.

In addition to this your committee would call attention to the present status of the prohibition question. Certain sinister agencies are at work to nullify as far as possible the beneficent effects of the great victory of our Christian civilization that wrote into the constitution of the United States the eighteenth amendment. Not alone is this great reform challenged by the secret distiller and the boot-legger, but by the more dangerous influences of certain leaders in public life, and by certain newspapers who seem today to be in league to propagate false ideas connected with the enforcement of the prohibition law. Let it be understood that the boot-legger in open defiance of the law, and the newspaper by false statements, or the process of caricaturing the temperance leaders, are of the same class, and they are both enemies of our civilization, and disloyal to the fundamental law of our land. The eighteenth amendment stands in the same relation to the fundamental law of the land as any other amendment, or indeed as any other part of our constitution, and anyone who endeavors to subvert any of these great principles upon which we have founded our national life is a traitor to the country.

In view of this widespread propaganda to bring into contempt the eighteenth amendment and the Federal law passed by Congress that seeks its enforcement it is important that every temperance agency should be awake and active in defense of this great reform. Especially would we as an Annual Conference call upon our own representatives in Congress

to lend their aid to the enactment of such a Federal law as will adequately protect the prohibition amendment, and effectively execute its provisions.

We also call attention to a movement in this section of the country seeking the better establishment of a friendly relationship between the races. We would call attention first to the fact that never before in the history of the world have two races so widely separated by their essential racial instincts lived together in such friendly relationship and sympathetic accord. The negroes of the South constitute a backward, and, in large measure, dependent race; they enjoy the largest liberty, access to every field of industrial enterprise, easy attainment to the field of professional service, full protection in all their property interests and exact justice before the courts of the land. It is to be greatly regretted that there have been among us, occasionally, lewd fellows of the baser sort who have taken the law into their hands and have disgraced us by brutal exhibitions of mob violence. These exhibitions of brutality we, of course, condemn and abhor; but they should not be allowed to obscure the magnificent and self-sacrificing service on the part of the great mass of white citizenship in the South to protect the interests of the negro and to lead him to his highest possible development in citizenship and Christian character. We recognize the fact that there are still unsettled questions and unsolved problems arising out of the necessarily intimate relations of the two races, and we pledge ourselves to co-operate to the fullest measure with all right agencies to adjust these relationships and to cultivate yet more cordial and friendly relations. We believe that this can be best done by the hearty co-operation of the churches, and we are certain that the ideal relationship between the two races can never be established except under the leadership of the Lord Jesus Christ.

We view with alarm the encroachments of the ideals of Continental Europe upon some of the established customs and institutions of this land. Especially is this true with reference to the observance of the Sabbath day. It will be our first care to guard these customs and institutions by our teaching in our pulpits and our practice in our homes, but as we believe they are essential to the larger ministry of our Church, to the State and to the World we will hear with great satisfaction the efforts of our statesmen to maintain them with the sanctions of law, both State and Federal.

The character of the moving-picture show of the day is a cause of most serious concern to us as a church. We recognize that this form of amusement and instruction has taken a permanent place in our life. It has within it elements of great power which could be used most effectively for the dissemination of truth and useful information. It is to be regretted that the production of films which are most widely used has fallen into the hands of those who disregard, for the most part, the essential elements of Christian morality. We believe that there ought to be established in every community where there is a moving-picture theater a censorship, and that the Federal Government should pass a law putting every picture produced and sent out through our interstate commerce under bond for its moral fitness.

We recognize the fact that amid the unrest of our times, the breaking down of many ancient and honorable customs, the greed of gain and mad whirl of pleasure, the Church has need to gird herself to guard with unsleeping vigilance our blessed inheritance of faith. Our service is to man in all the fullness of his life. The betterment of his life here as well as his eternal interests should be a part of the sacred care of the Church of Christ. Our success in combating all forms of evil and in hastening the coming of the Kingdom will be in proportion to our loyalty to the teachings and to the person of our Lord.

Practically all of the slight increase has been the result either of past Conference action, or of direction of the Discipline. A small increase was made in favor of the Epworth League Board to make possible an enlargement of the vital work among our young people. #### BOARD OF MISSIONS.

As Methodist people we look back over a year of wonderful awakening. Never before have we had such adequate conception of the meaning of



missions as interpreted by the Centenary, and of Christian education as taught by the Educational Movement. We know now that Christian missions and Christian education go hand in hand, and that the one is helpless without the other. Your Conference Board of Missions stands committed to a policy of progress represented by the ideals of these two significant movements of our Church.

Quoting the words of Dr. Pinson, our General Secretary, great victories have crowned the efforts of our foreign fields. He says: "Our schools and colleges are crowded to overflowing; many of them are turning away more students than they can take; almost without exception they are clamoring for enlargement and for equipment to meet the demands of the young people for admission to our Christian schools. The increased liberality of the native church is indicative of the awakening referred to. This liberality is in its growth keeping pace, if not outstripping, the liberality in our homeland. Churches in all our fields are coming to self-support; perhaps in the past year there have been more of these than in any ten years of our past history. Along with this there has come a rapid development of the self-consciousness of the native church. Crowds of people are waiting on the ministry of our Church so that places cannot be found to contain the crowds that wish to hear the message." Thus we see the development of our foreign neighbors through the process of Christian missions and education.

The General Board of Missions advocates two things in particular in which we wish to co-operate, viz.:

First—A comprehensive city mission policy which involves the unification of all church forces, local and general, to meet the crying needs of city life. In this connection we commend the work of the stronger churches of Chattanooga, Knoxville and others, who, through organization largely under the direction of laymen, are ministering to the weaker churches of the community. We would suggest to all city and town churches such a survey of the territory contiguous to them as will enlist the interest of these churches in the particular support of the pastors' salaries, to whom this Board can give only a small appropriation, and in helping these pastors and their laymen to supply vacant pulpits with more services. This policy, we are sure, will cultivate love and sympathy between rural and urban communities.

The second of these policies concerns schools for our rural pastors and city workers where their problems are studied. For the rural pastors of Holston Conference this Board agrees to join with two other boards for the establishment of a summer school at Emory and Henry College. The General Board of Missions assumes the larger expense. A committee of three, one from each of the appropriating boards, will share with the General Board responsibility for the programs. Your Conference Board has elected Rev. J. M. Carter to serve on this committee. Realizing as never before the importance of Christian education in connection with missions in Buchanan County, we have indorsed the school established by Rev. B. N. Waterhouse, and have made an appropriation for its maintenance. Looking still further into the future, we have agreed with the Board of Education to appoint three members, viz., E. R. Boyd, C. K. Wingo and J. M. Carter, to be a part of the commission to investigate this field with a view to acquiring property and building permanent schools in this section.

For the revivals held, the numbers converted, the members added, the family altars erected, the increased interest in Bible study reported, and all other activities this year which have quickened the spiritual life of the Church, we thank God and take courage.

We regret that the funds at our disposal are about \$10,000 less than last year and that we are unable to appropriate larger amounts to mission

charges. Let us urge presiding elders, pastors in charge, and all our subscribers to stress the payment of all overdue Centenary pledges by Jan. 1, 1922.

Your Board requests the reappointment of Rev. J. M. Carter for full time as Conference Missionary Secretary for the coming year, with a salary of \$3,600 and expenses, two-thirds of which is paid by the General Board of Missions.

Rev. E. L. Addington and Rev. J. W. Carter are recommended for appointment as Conference evangelists, and Mrs. J. P. Moorman as Conference evangelist singer.

## MEMOIRS

### JACOB SMITH

The hero of this memoir was born in Wythe County, Virginia, October 20, 1835, and went to his heavenly home in his eighty-sixth year, from his native home. In his fifteenth year, February 16, 1851, he joined the Church, and two days later, at Mount Pleasant, Wytheville Circuit, he was consciously converted under the preaching of Wiley B. Winton and Carroll Long.

At Kimberlin Camp Ground, in Bland County, Virginia, 1857, he was licensed to preach. At Greeneville, Tenn., October 21, 1861, Bishop James O. Andrew presiding, he was admitted into the traveling connection. On a number of circuits he did faithful work till 1874, when he was appointed book agent of the Holston Conference, which position he filled till 1891, when he was superannuated, which relation he held until his death.

Brother Smith was made of martyr stuff, one of those self-made men, though never proud of his maker, yet building a Christian manhood worthy of a monumental statue in the Methodist Hall of Fame. Like St. Paul, he "bore in his body the marks of the Lord Jesus," as the result of his fearless fidelity to the cause of his Master and Methodism during the perilous period of the Civil War and the troublous times of reconstruction following the war. The afflictions unjustly and unmercifully inflicted upon him by "fellows of the baser sort" grievously impaired his voice and embarrassed his public ministrations, but he never wavered once in his self-sacrificing devotion to his Lord, triumphed over hindrances, served his generation by the will of God, filled out his days with fruitful labors; with stainless garments wrought of celestial virtues laid his trophies at the Master's feet, and rather rejoiced the more because his name was written in heaven.

He pillowed his head peacefully upon his red-cross shield and sent word by Rev. D. P. Hurley to his comrades on the battlefield that "all is well." Brother Hurley, assisted by Rev. J. M. Crowe, performed the burial rites in his church, in the presence of a great audience of sorrowing relatives and friends. Rev. J. W. Rader, by special request, later preached the funeral in his home church. Another chivalrous veteran of the old guard has answered his Lord's "well done."

### WILLIAM C. CROCKETT

One of God's noblemen has gone to his reward. April 16, 1852, he was born in Crockett's Cove, Wythe County, Va. He grew up to manhood among his relatives and others who have made Southwest Virginia a delightful place in which to live. He was an old Emory boy who never lost his love for the college.

On December 14, 1875, he was married to Miss Willie Crump, of Crump's Bottom, W. Va. This was a very happy marriage. No man was ever blessed with a more helpful and consecrated wife. Seven children were born to them—four sons and three daughters. One daughter fell asleep in her early girlhood. The wife preceded him to the heavenly home four years and a few months. Although reared in a Christian home and community, he was not converted until after thirty years had passed. In 1886 he was licensed to exhort, and in 1887 was licensed to preach. Admitted on trial into the traveling con-

nection in Holston Conference in 1895, twenty-five years of faithful ministry as a traveling preacher is his record. He died January 4, 1920, on Eggleston charge among a people who loved him.

This man, though in early life reared in the lap of plenty, was never heard to murmur at any hardship that was his lot. He counted it a great joy to preach and serve for his Master's sake. He and his faithful wife were co-workers among the poorest and humblest of the people. He was religious every hour of his life; hence he was the happiest of men. There was an atmosphere in his home that one would carry away after a visit. It was my privilege to be his presiding elder five years and to be with him under trying circumstances, and never once did I hear a word, or see an act, that was not of the highest type of Christian manhood.

His last sickness was of but few days. He was at his post and fell in the midst of a year that was planned for great things for the Lord. His baby girl, Nancy Graham Crockett, who had taken her mother's place after her death, ministered to him in his last hours. He was buried near the home of his childhood with the sacred dust of his loved ones. The funeral services were conducted by the writer, assisted by his presiding elder, Rev. J. B. Ward, Dr. J. M. Crowe, J. V. Hall and W. B. Belchee.

#### BISHOP WALTER R. LAMBUTH

No greater shock could have come than the death of Bishop Walter R. Lambuth. He was somewhat reluctant to leave America at this time on account of the poor health of Mrs. Lambuth. But we did not dream that his end was so near. He had a severe attack of illness on the steamer crossing the Pacific, but after landing in Japan he received relief and went on to Manchuria and Siberia to hold the Mission meeting. Upon his return to Japan he started into the Japan Mission meeting, in the midst of which he became worse and was taken to the hospital in Yokahama, where he received the best of treatment from good physicians and nurses. Members of the Japan Mission took the very best care of him. The following message was received in Nashville: "Operated September 12, successful; September 25 heart failed; will be buried Shanghai."

Bishop Walter Russell Lambuth was born in Shanghai, China, November 10, 1854, of missionary parents. He is the fourth generation of missionaries. He came to America to enter school in 1869; graduated from Emory and Henry College, 1875, and the same year was licensed to preach at McKendree Church, Nashville, Tenn. That year he was appointed to Woodbine, and in 1876 was appointed assistant pastor of McKendree. Meanwhile he was studying medicine in Vanderbilt University and received his degree of Doctor of Medicine in 1877. In the same year he was sent to China as a medical missionary. Before leaving Nashville he was married to Miss Daisy Kelly, who was no less a great missionary spirit, and who made continuous sacrifices in being separated from her husband all through her life, when he was out on long missionary journeys. In 1881 he graduated from Bellevue Hospital Medical College, after which he did post-graduate work in Edinburgh, Scotland. In 1886 Dr. Lambuth, together with his father and mother, went to Japan to open a mission for our Church in that new field. He served as Superintendent of the Japan Mission until his return to America in 1890, Mrs. Lambuth having broken in health.

In 1892 he was elected Missionary Secretary, which position he held until 1910. He made one of the greatest Missionary Secretaries in the world. He was a delegate from the Tennessee Conference in 1910 to the General Conference in Asheville, when he was elected Bishop. He was immediately appointed a Bishop to Brazil and Africa. Following the General Conference of 1914 he was appointed to Mexico and our Western work. In 1918 he was reappointed to Africa and also to work in Europe. In 1919 he was appointed to Oriental fields, in the discharge of which duty he laid down his life September 26, 1921.

He was a son of whom Emory and Henry is justly proud—her most widely known alumnus. He served the cause of Christ around the globe and his great loss is mourned in every continent. He thought in terms of nations and spoke in units of races. His intimates were in all classes from the humblest to the highest. He was probably the best beloved man in Southern Methodism. He had a great love for humanity and never grew weary seeking to save the lost.

Bishop Lambuth was the most Christlike man I ever knew—ever healing the sick, admonishing sinners, comforting saints, teaching the children, visiting the aged, stirring up the minds of the Christians to greater activities. More than any man I ever knew, he seized upon every opportunity to talk to men and women about their own spiritual condition. Whether in the barber shop talking to the barber, on the train speaking to a fellow passenger, or the negro porter—he lost no opportunity to urge men to follow Christ. His preaching was wonderfully stimulating—ever pleading with his congregation to accept Christ as Savior and Lord and urging the Christians to consecrate their lives to His service in the extension of His Kingdom to the very ends of the earth. Multitudes of young men and women offered their lives to missionary service under his ministry. His missionary addresses were comprehensive, taking the whole world into the sweep of his thought.

Like John Wesley, he had the whole world for his parish. He was never satisfied with present attainments, but was ever stretching forth to the regions beyond. Most of our mission fields were opened under his leadership. After serving as a missionary in China and Japan he became Missionary Secretary and had a part in opening Korea and Cuba, and before leaving the Secretaryship he launched the movement to open work in Africa, to which he was appointed Bishop. He was intimately connected with our work in Europe, where he preached to our boys in camps, and labored with them in trenches. The last work of his life was to open Manchuria and Siberia to the Methodist Episcopal Church, South. On each of his trips into the heart of Africa he traveled almost a thousand miles on foot through dangerous forests and across the swamps infested with sleeping sickness, poisonous reptiles, and devouring beasts. Few men have traveled so widely or known the world so intimately. He was a Fellow of the Royal Geographical Society of London. Truly he was a real successor to John Wesley in his passion to extend the Church throughout the whole earth. He was intimately associated with the great world leaders of Christianity of his day. As a missionary statesman he had few equals and perhaps no superior. Bishop Lambuth was the St. Paul of Southern Methodism.

He represented our Church in all its relationships. He was our representative in every great missionary conference of his day. He served as President of the Foreign Missionary Conference, as a member of the great Edinburgh Conference of 1910, and when he died he was Chairman of the Executive Committee of the Federal Council of the Churches of Christ in America, of which Mr. Robert E. Speer is President.



As he said good-bye and started to the Orient on his last trip he seemed to realize that the loads were heavy and that his strength was failing. He sometimes spoke of being weary, a thing unknown before, and being exceedingly solicitous about the great mission fields. He said that the hands of the Church must be laid on younger men who would be willing and capable of bearing burdens which he had borne, but none of us realized that the end would come so soon. Now that he has gone we know not which way to turn. When shall we see his like again? We devoutly thank God for his life and his wonderful world-wide ministry. It is easy to believe in God and in the triumph of the cross of Christ in the presence of such a life. May a double portion of his spirit come upon each one of us.

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### MRS. E. E. WILEY

A mother in Israel has been translated. On February 21, 1921, the veil was drawn aside, and Mrs. Elizabeth Reeves Wiley, from the home of her son-in-law and daughter, in Farmville, Va., crossed over the Great Divide to her eternal home.

Mrs. Wiley was born May 13, 1844, at the country home, Wheatland, four and one-half miles northeast of Jonesboro, Tenn. Could she have had a prenatal choice of parents, it could hardly have been more felicitous than was her parentage in fact. Her environments in early life, in a Methodist family of which she was a member, doubtless were potent factors in the making of the distinguished church-life she lived. In that family she was the fifth child of seven, three of whom survive, and all of whom proved worthy of their splendid parentage.

The salient features of the early life and character of Elizabeth were a healthy and very agile body, a precocious mind, and a girlish vivacity and enthusiasm, which she retained to a remarkable degree to the end of her busy life. During her early years she led in playful exercises, and, being a close student, graded high, not only in the common and high schools, but likewise while a student in Salem College, North Carolina, where she completed her collegiate education. Immediately after the war between the states had closed she taught a school successfully in Morristown, Tenn., and later proved to be a wise and acceptable teacher in Martha Washington College, Abingdon, Va.

October 3, 1870, she was united in holy wedlock to Dr. E. E. Wiley, of the Holston Conference, the eminent educator and college president, and great preacher. Two more intellectual and cultured persons are rarely mated. Each admired the intellectual and exalted character of the other; and in that happy union each was a helpmate to the other until March 13, 1893, when the devoted husband and affectionate father passed to his great reward. Three children were born of that marriage—Rev. E. E. Wiley, D. D., a beloved member of the Holston Conference; Mary Helen, the accomplished wife of Prof. J. L. Jarman, President of the Virginia State Normal College, at Farmville, Va., and Garland Summers Wiley, a splendid young man and physician of great promise, who died in the work of his profession in Brazil, South America, where his body now sleeps. The mother-heart was the more sorely afflicted that her darling boy should sicken and die in a foreign land away from mother, brother and sister—too far away for the sorrowing mother to plant flowers by his tomb to be watered with tears. She mourned as only a mother can—that was human. "Jesus wept" for less at the grave of a friend. But in her heart there was no railing accusation; she simply drew closer to her Lord.

Mrs. Wiley was a potent factor in the organization of the Woman's General Executive Association, authorized by our General Conference

in 1878, the name of which was changed in 1882 by the General Conference to that of the "Woman's Board of Missions"; and later still to the "Woman's Board of Foreign Missions." From the best information at hand it is stated that Mrs. Wiley was a member of the Board of Managers, and among her co-workers were Mrs. Juliana Hayes, of Baltimore; Mrs. D. H. McGavock, of Nashville, and Mrs. Wightman, of South Carolina, wife of the late Bishop W. M. Wightman.

In 1890 Mrs. Wiley was active in the organization of the Parsonage and Home Missionary Society. She was its first president and served until 1896, when it and the Foreign Missionary Society were merged and given the present name of the "Woman's Missionary Society." Among those associated with her while the Parsonage and Home Missionary Society was being organized, and during the six years of her presidency, were Miss Lucinda Helm, Mrs. Nathan Scarritt and Mrs. Hargrove, wife of the late Bishop R. K. Hargrove.

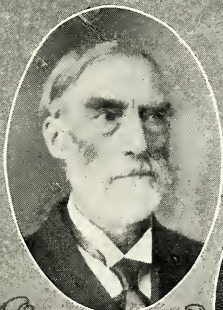
While engaged in the church work of those societies Mrs. Wiley traveled over almost the entire area of our Church east of the Rockies, made talks, public and private, wrote articles for church papers, helpful to the missionary work, and easily became one of the widest known, and perhaps the most beloved, woman in the membership of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South. The facts in detail embracing those labors would fill a book, hence a general reference to them only can be made in this memoir.

When Mrs. Wiley's husband "joined the silent majority," instead of sitting in the shadow of a widow's weeds and feeding the soul on gloom to a state of inertia, she grasped more firmly the good Father's hand, consecrated anew her life, and more actively than ever before engaged in His service. From an intense desire to render larger service to others was evolved the idea of establishing an orphanage, and the desire culminated in the founding of the orphanage at Greeneville, Tenn., in 1895.

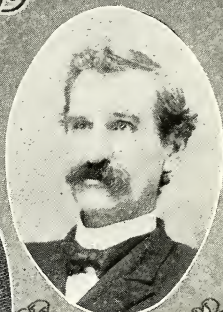
Without any visible means except the major part of her small estate (which she used and never would consent to withdraw), and having no source of expectancy only as she might influence voluntary contributions, she organized the orphanage. She used this writer in procuring a charter. To him it seemed an enterprise foredoomed. Not so to Mrs. Wiley, who worked by faith, not by sight. She naturally was its superintendent, and the very life and soul of the institution that was, and is, the home of destitute orphan children, and for those worse than orphaned. She was mother to the motherless, and an affectionate mother she was. Her love embraced all of her little waifs with whom, and for whom, she prayed and set their feet in the paths of righteousness. She educated them to the sixth grade, inclusive, and then would enter them in the city school for further advancement. Many of them she had regularly adopted into good families, and for many others she found homes, always reserving the right of recall if they were not humanely treated. After eighteen years of unselfish toil, never having received a dollar of financial compensation for her strenuous labors, forced by the enfeeblement of age, she resigned her loved employ, and left a home that was housing, clothing, feeding and educating seventy-five otherwise helpless children; and left a property the cash value of which was placed at fifty thousand dollars, and cash and bonds to amount of some eight thousand dollars, and no indebtedness! All things considered, it was a marvelous achievement, perhaps without a parallel in our church history, and is the attestation of a wisdom and nobility of character rarely, if ever, surpassed. The Greeneville Orphanage, now bearing the name "Holston Orphanage," was the crowning work of the fruitful life of Mrs. Wiley, and that work is monumental.

Mrs. Wiley possessed to an unusual degree the power to interest in private discourse and in public speech, and she was a charming writer who never penned a sentence that was stale or did not throb with meaning. And when she wrote, or spoke to an audience, one was made to believe that the fountain was not exhausted, but that a great reserve power remained. There was a personality behind her utterances that gave tremendous force to words, which, if spoken by almost any other, would have fallen on listless ears. She was in fact strong-minded, but was feminine from soul to finger tips.

Select a company of one hundred, all well endowed mentally, liberally educated and deeply pious, and ninety and nine have failed to acquire and exert an influence more than merely local; but the hundredth one—Mrs. Wiley—reached an eminence that spoke her greatness and extended her influence far and wide. Why the difference in achievements? Why the greatness of this great woman who, receiving five talents, made other five? The reason is found in the leading attribute of her character. It is the same that was exemplified by our Savior on the cross; the same that made St. Paul great, and without which there is no true greatness. It is told by a single word, "Service." Without this simple word and its all-comprehensive meaning all theology would be but a "sounding brass and tinkling cymbal."

The ninety and nine failed from lack of opportunity, or otherwise, to extend their service, but Mrs. Wiley made opportunities to extend her service to others. It was the cardinal objective of her life, a religious passion that brought all things else into subjection to it. Unselfishly she gave her life-service for others; to aid the needy, to relieve the distressed, to elevate the degraded, and to help the helpless little ones in equipping them for the battle of life, thus giving them a chance to make themselves worthy members of society and fit subjects for the kingdom of God. In this service she found pure joy, not for the work's sake, but in duty performed; for it was axiomatic with her that her Heavenly Father works through human agents, and that in rendering worthy service to others she was serving Him.

So wrought upon, and impelled by, the desire to serve others, and thus discharge her highest duty to God and humanity, Mrs. Wiley toiled unceasingly and never found time to rest; and never did find time to rest from labor until her arms were peacefully folded over a pulseless breast. Verily, she was great in goodness, and good in greatness. It is needless to write her last testimony, comforting as it is to those of her blood; for, knowing how she lived, we know she triumphed over the last enemy.

That the translated Mrs. Wiley is wearing a crown radiant with many stars none will doubt who knew her life. That many more jewels will be set in that crown we do believe, for her "works do follow her." Mrs. Wiley filled a large space in human destiny, and now that she is dead who will find the vacancy?

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#### MRS. E. W. MOORE

Laura Matilda Weaver was born at Weaverville, N. C., May 8, 1836, reared to womanhood near Paint Rock, Cocke County, Tennessee, and died at Chilhowie, Va., March 4, 1921. She was married to Rev. E. W. Moore September 22, 1861.

"There is a time to die," we are told, and Sister Moore lived until that time, when the life-forces were spent and the wheels of life stood still.

She was free from any great pain in her last days, having no disease, and was rational to the last. She was always glad to see her pastor and always interested in his work. When he or any of his family was sick, if she was able, she would visit the parsonage, and her visit was always like a burst of sunshine. She never had the blues, and no one could have them where she was. She always found the bright side of every situation. Her faith never wavered. The verities of the Gospel were real to her, and the smile which lingered after the spirit had gone was kindled by the light of another world. Thus believing, hoping, smiling, she passed with her Savior through the shadows to the bright side of the river, where there are no shadows and there is no night.

Her life was one of self-sacrifice: sacrifice for her husband, her children and the cause of the Master; but so complete was this her spirit that she never realized that she was making any self-sacrifice. Religiously, she was devoted to Christ and the Church. Her son, the Rev. J. W. Moore, D. D., stated to the writer that during her last sickness he visited her, and after she told him he had been good to her, he asked her "if she felt that Jesus was with her." She replied vigorously that she knew that He was. The son said: "I then beheld what must have been a similar phenomena to that which occurred on the Mount where Jesus was transfigured. Her face became radiant with light that never was on sea and land." Her face was seamed by the wrinkles of age, but it was glorified that day with the radiance of the joy of His presence. Her faith in God and in Jesus was profound. Sunshiny, gentle, forbearing, trustful, faithful, loving the Church and the Christian ministers, she lived a true life. Today her hope has been realized, and she is with her distinguished husband, who preached the Gospel so long and so effectively among us, and all her loved ones who had gone on before.

As a neighbor and friend she was kind and true. In times of sickness and trouble she was present to offer her help and to speak an encouraging word.

After the death of her husband her health rapidly failed. The last year of her life she was an invalid, being confined to her room. She spoke frequently of dying, but had no fear of the hour of death. She

was ready and willing to die, and on the 5th of June passed to her eternal reward.

The funeral service was conducted at the home by Dr. W. S. Neighbors, and interment was made in the Sweetwater Cemetery, Rev. F. Y. Jackson conducting the service at the grave. There by the side of her husband her body was laid to rest.

On October 9, 1882, she was married to Rev. E. L. Addington, and to them were born four children: Mary S., who died eight years ago; Mrs. M. B. Wampler, of Duke, Okla.; Mrs. E. E. Martin, of Pearisburg, Va., and B. Caradine Addington, of Radford, Va.

Sister Addington lived an exemplary life; her faith was strong; her love for God and his cause was beautifully shown in sacrifice and service. She was a true friend, a devoted mother, and a faithful wife. Without complaining, she shared with her husband the privations, cares, and triumph that they experienced in the following charges: Holston, Bristol, Dickensville, Pennington Gap, Holston (again), Sharon, Grant, Cedar Bluff, East Tazewell, Castlewood, Rural Retreat, and Galax Circuits. Their fourteenth removal brought them to Radford in October, 1915, where they established a permanent home. That winter Sister Addington spent in Oklahoma, hoping to recover her health.

For many years this devout woman was a patient sufferer. She possessed unusual intelligence and consecration. She was wedded to her husband in faith and good works, loyal to her Church, and a modest, Christian heroine. Her last hours were more than resignation, peace, rest; they were gilded with the golden glory of immortality. An aged artist, past ninety, whose masterpiece wore the title "The Valley of the Shadow," when death drew near, exclaimed: "I have made a mistake, there are no shadows; it is all glory, glory, glory." Death to the child of God is glorious. Then comes rest to the weary itinerant and sufferer. As when the tired child after playing all day comes back to its mother's knee, the sweetest couch in all the world, so the soul falls asleep to awake in the morning of a brighter day. We laid her to rest beside her daughter at Rural Retreat, Va.

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### MRS. FRANK RICHARDSON

Florida Clementine Stone was born at Stevens Creek, Grayson County, Virginia, December 19, 1858. When a little girl five years old her parents died, leaving her to the care of her grandparents, Rev.



Ambrose Atkins and wife. Ambrose Atkins was a local preacher of great influence in his day. He was an uncle of Rev. K. C. Atkins, of the Holston Conference, and D. Atkins, of the Western North Carolina Conference. Anyone who has been associated with this Atkins family knows something of the wholesome moral and religious influence under which this child grew to womanhood.

She was married to W. H. Oldis, of New Jersey, March 31, 1880. Soon after their marriage they moved to Knoxville, Tenn., where they lived happily together till the death of her husband, which occurred February 13, 1889. One son, Willam H. Oldis, now living at Chattanooga, Tenn., was born to this union. After the death of her husband she made her own living by sewing and keeping boarders. She was industrious and frugal, and succeeded in giving her only child a fair education.

On March 16, 1897, she was married to Rev. Frank Richardson, D. D., of the Holston Conference, and discharged faithfully the duties of an itinerant minister's wife till April 2, 1912, when her illustrious husband fell on sleep in the parsonage at Fountain City, Tenn.

After the death of Dr. Richardson she moved to Chattanooga to make a home for her son, who for years has held a responsible position in that city. On March 16, 1921—the twenty-fourth anniversary of her second marriage—she quietly and peacefully passed to her reward at the home of her son in St. Elmo. The funeral service was conducted from the St. Elmo Church by her pastor, Rev. J. A. Bays, assisted by Rev. T. J. Eskridge, the latter having conducted the funeral of Dr. Richardson. Short talks were made by Revs. C. H. Williams, W. S. Neighbors, J. A. Burrow, and W. C. Carden. The preachers of our Church in the city of Chattanooga and suburbs acted as honorary pallbearers, and the body was laid to rest in beautiful Forest Hills Cemetery.

I knew Sister Richardson very intimately. I was her pastor for two years when her husband was presiding elder of the Chattanooga District. I knew her in her home. I have never lived by more enjoyable neighbors than the occupants of that district parsonage. The spirit of hospitality and Christian love was always abounding. I knew her in her Church life. She was devoted to her Lord and to her Church. She was interested in all the activities of the Church and made sacrifices to the extent of her physical strength and financial ability to advance the interests of the kingdom. She was loyal to her friends, kind and sympathetic to all who were in distress.

Truly a good woman has gone from among us. We know where to find her. She has joined the innumerable company of the redeemed and, no doubt, mingles now with the white-robed throng.

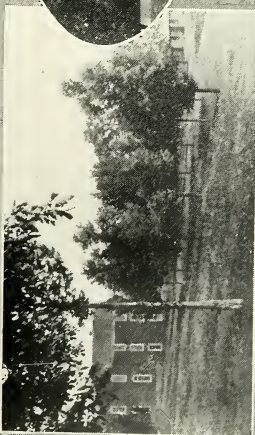
