Admission, Course of Instruction, &c.

Terms of Admission.

Candidates for admission to the Freshman Class must be acquainted with Arithmetic, Geography, (Ancient and Modern) English, Latin and Greek Grammar, Latin Reader, Cæsar's Commentaries, Virgil's Æneid, Cicero's Orations, or Sallust, and the Greek Reader.

There is a Preparatory Department in which these studies are pursued, under the instruction or immediate supervision of the several Professors.

Candidates for any advanced classes will be examined in the studies previously pursued by the class they propose to enter.

Testimonials of good moral character are required. If the applicant has been a member of another College, he must bring with him a certificate of having been regularly dismissed, free from censure.

Each student, except those specially exempted by the Faculty, before being permitted to recite to any instructor, must produce the certificate of the Treasurer that he has paid the tuition and other fees for one term in advance.

Frequent and stated exercises in Elocution and Composition are required throughout the course. Ancient Geography and Greek and Roman Antiquities are studied in connection with the languages. Translations, and exercises in Greek and Latin composition, are also required.

Religious Exercises and Instruction.

All students are required to be present at morning prayers and the reading of the Scriptures, daily, at 9 A. M., and on the Sabbath, to attend a Bible Class at 9 A. M., and Divine Service in the College Chapel at 3 P. M.

Merit Roll.

An accurate account of the delinquencies of every student, and of his daily attendance, conduct and scholarship, is kept by the Faculty, and entered on record every week. From this record his place on the merit roll is determined at the close of each College term, and communicated to himself or to any friend, upon application.

Examinations.

There are three public examinations each year, at the close of each College term, to which the Trustees of the University, the parents and guardians of students, and all persons who feel an interest in science and literature, are invited.

College Terms and Vacations.

The College year is divided into three terms. The annual commencement is on the first Wednesday of August, after which there is a vacation of six weeks. The first term commences from and after the expiration of the autumnal vacation, and continues to about the 21st of December, when there is a vacation of two weeks. The second term begins at the expiration of the winter vacation, and continues until the first Wednesday of April, when there is a vacation of four weeks. After the expiration of the spring vacation, the third term commences and continues to the annual commencement.

Literary Societies.

There are two Literary Societies connected with the University, the Athenian and Philomathean, each of which has a Hall and Library, and in which students enjoy the advantages of exercises in declamation, composition and debate, besides becoming familiar with the proper modes of conducting business in deliberative assemblies.

Library and Apparatus.

The Philosophical and Chemical Apparatus is amply sufficient for all the purposes of instruction. The University and Societies' Libraries contain a large number of choice and valuable books. The Mineralogical Cabinet is well selected, and enriched by the extensive and valuable Cabinet of Professor Mather, thus constituting one of the largest and best Cabinets of Minerals in our country.

Expenses.

The expenses of a student will depend much upon his habits of economy. The following is a list of necessary items of expense: Tuition for the Preparatory Course is \$8,00, and in the College \$10,00 per term; boarding is from \$1,00 to \$1,50 per week; washing, lights, fuel and bedding from \$12,00 to \$15,00 per year. Students who may have lodging rooms in the University Buildings are each charged \$1,50 per term. Hence the necessary expenses of a student for the College year, exclusive of books and clothes, will not much exceed \$100,00.
