## 1929 Football Season

With only one victory and two ties to its credit, the Ole Miss football season of 1929 could hardly be called successful from the viewpoint of games won and lost. A ridiculously hard schedule, capped by a losing complex and bad weather, kept the Red and Blue at the losing end of the score most of the time. Even though the results show few signs of merit, the season was successful in many ways. There were high spots throughout the schedule to give evidence of splendid playing by the Mississippians.

In the first two games of the schedule, with Vandy and 'Bama, the strength and tremendous fight of the Ole Miss line was demonstrated. After a merciless defeat from Tennessee, the Mississippi Flood staged its wonderful comeback to defeat Loyola. In this game the Ole Miss backfield shone. Doped to lose by a big count, and after being scored upon first, the team kept fighting on, and, led by the stellar playing of Sam Kyzer, found themselves with a two-point lead when the gun ended the game. This was the boy's first try at night football; judging by the brand of playing they exhibited, they must have liked the "bright lights."

After a few days on the campus the team, with thirty gallons of water, set out for Texas to subdue S. M. U. However, the Mustangs kicked and reared too hard to be broken; so the Ole Miss squad, aided by a police escort, rushed across the heart of Dallas to the waiting "Texan," little pleased with the outcome of the game.

The homecoming game was played in a sea of mud. This took the spirit out of the boys, and the game resulted in what the players considered a loss, since they had looked forward to winning by a big score and only managed to come out with a 6 to 6 tie.

The next Saturday found the Mississippians in the North playing Purdue, the Big Ten Champions. Even though the score does not indicate such, the result of this game was a moral victory for the Southerners—at least from the Ole Miss viewpoint. With no chance whatever of winning, the Flood displayed such a fine brand of football that the Boilermakers were kept uneasy throughout the game as to what the final score would be. After the game Coach Phelan paid the squad a very high compliment by saying that Ole Miss had one of the best teams that Purdue had encountered this year. Ole Miss was the only team to score on the Big Ten winners this season.

The L. S. U. game was a disappointment to all. With hard luck dogging the Tiger's trail, and Ole Miss elated over the favorable outcome of the Purdue game, everyone expected a victory for the Red and Blue. But the final score was 13 to 6, with L. S. U. ahead.

The climax of the season naturally was the game with A. and M. on Thanksgiving. The day was perfect for football, although the field was muddy from recent rains. From the initial kick-off Ole Miss found out that she had underestimated the strength of A. and M. Overconfident from victories of three successive years, her little song,

*"Ho, the young cowboys have come from the East;  
Of all of our staunch foemen we fear them least!"*

she found to be deceiving. Early in the game A. and M. completed passes for a touchdown and then scored the extra point to go into the lead, 7 to 0. The Mississippi Flood, thoroughly aroused, braced itself and held the Aggie scoreless for the remainder of the game. In the second half Ole Miss pushed across a touchdown and Marshall was sent in to kick the extra point. He made a perfect drop-kick that saved the day for the Mississippians. No scoring was done during the rest of the half, and the game ended with the score of carrying the Golden Egg, the token of victory, to Starkville for six months; but next year, when the pistol ends the game, the trophy will be in the possession of Ole Miss forever.

## Basketball Season of 1930

Severely handicapped by the loss of four players of all-Southern caliber, the Ole Miss basketball team has been so built up by Coach Hazel of inexperienced recruits for the most part that it can compare favorably with teams of past years. With only four members of last year's varsity eligible for play, the team has nevertheless surpassed all expectations of its success. Although Captain Mabrey and George Boutwell are the only letter men who returned this year, new men have come to take the places of such stars as Laird, Selby, and the Phillips twins.

Starting off the season with unexpected success, Ole Miss defeated L. S. U. in the first game, 31 to 27. The following night was a different story, however, for L. S. U. took the second game to even up that series. The following week-end the Flood swamped the Tigers in Baton Rouge by taking both games of a two-game set.

Next came the pair with Alabama at Ole Miss. Unable to keep up the splendid playing displayed against L. S. U., the Mississippi quintet lost the first game by a score of 31 to 21; but the following night the outcome was doubtful until the final whistle blew, with Alabama at the winning end of a 30 to 26 score.

The team traveled to New Orleans to tackle Tulane the following week. Getting off to a slow start in the first game, they were never able to overcome the Greenies' lead, and Tulane won the game easily. The following night brought a hotly contested fight from the beginning. The game ended with Tulane victorious by a small margin.

Two games with A. and M. in Greenwood were won by Ole Miss by a hard fight. The first one was rather close, while the Mississippians won the second by a pretty big margin.

Ole Miss halved the series of two games played on the campus.

With six defeats and six victories, the season so far has not been completely successful, but there yet remains the Southern Conference tournament, with its opportunities for winning fresh laurels. Mississippi has in the past two years made herself respected and feared in the tournament, by virtue of winning the title of Conference champions once and being defeated only by the team that won the championship last year. Whatever her success may be, we know that Ole Miss will acquit herself creditably this year.

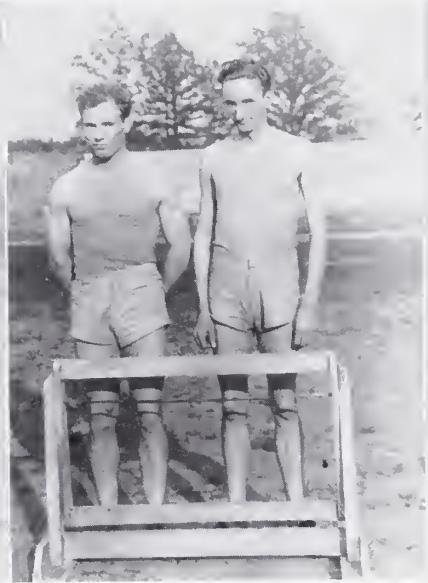

## Track Season of 1929

About three weeks before the first meet the Ole Miss track team began practicing. They had no cinder track on which to run, so they could be seen daily making their rounds on the Big Circle of the campus. Because of a late start; lack of material, since the baseball season was on at the same time; and the poor conditions under which they were compelled to train, the boys were never able to round themselves out to get into perfect form.

The first meet was with Union University at Jackson, Tennessee. Sam Kyzer was the individual star in this meet, winning nearly a majority of the points scored. The score of the meet was 63 to 58 in favor of Ole Miss.

About ten days later the team went to Starkville. The Aggie track men outclassed the Flood team. Ole Miss won only four first places—namely, the 100-yard dash, low hurdles, shot put, and javelin. The score of this meet was 72 to 37 in favor of A. and M.

On the relay team were four unusually fast men. Wallace Crook, captain of the team; Cowboy Woodruff, Jew Hutchinson, and Sam Kyzer.

The men that composed this team were Crook, Kyzer, Woodruff, Hutchinson, Smith, Triplett, Houston, Potts, Abernathy, Rushing.

## Track Season of 1930

So far this year the cross-country team has entered two meets at Memphis. In the first meet Upchurch placed; in the other meet, Ole Miss won team honors and won third, fourth, and seventh places.

Woods, Triplett, Kennedy, Upchurch, and Smith composed this team.

## 1929 Baseball Season

When you gather around for bull sessions in future years and the talk turns to baseball, here is one team that you will recall as long as collegians play the game. There have been great hitting teams, great fielding teams, and teams made great by flawless pitching, but few, very few, have been superlative in all three qualities, as was the 1929 Ole Miss baseball team, champions of the Southern Conference. With only Duke University near enough to challenge their title, they set a record seldom equaled by college nines in winning nineteen out of twenty-two games played. With an air-tight infield, a fence-busting outfield and a pitching staff that needed little support, the team had every qualification for success.

And when your talk turns to batting, consider this outfield—Gerald Walker, Hubby Walker and “Dump” Burnett. All three were sure fly-chasers and able to break up any ball game with a base hit at any time. Besides a batting average of .384 in the outfield, the average for the whole team was .330.

Then there were great fielders—not that they were needed especially. Cutcliff, probably the best second baseman in the South, led in the infield with his perfect fielding and fine work with the bat. The Phillips twins, Ary and Cary, with “Tadpole” Smith, completed an infield matched by few in the country.

And as for pitchers—well, no coach could ask for better. George Boutwell headed the list with seven games won out of seven starts. Redhead chalked up two wins over our traditional rivals, A. and M. Pat Harrison, Lila Lee, Charley Jones and Rube Wilcox were other hurlers who did their share in winning. Hemphill and Vann were two receivers who could also be depended upon for base hits.

For every position there were plenty of good men to answer the call when necessary. Faser and Falkner saw service in the outfield. Mabry, McClanahan and Gene Courtney were capable of filling any vacancy in the infield. Marshall was ready to do his share of catching.

The season began with a five-game series with Indiana. Ole Miss began with a poor start and dropped the first game to the visitors, but came back to win the remaining four. The pitching of Boutwell and the slugging of the Walker brothers featured the series.

Next came the two games with Howard College. These were fast games, but Ole Miss took both of them easily, thanks to the effective pitching of Harrison and Jones. Two games with Southwestern, in Memphis, resulted in two more victories for the Mississippians.

Georgia came to the campus next for a two-game schedule. Ole Miss won the first but met disaster in the second, when she lost her only Conference game. The following day the Mississippians played L. S. U. in Baton Rouge and swept this series without much trouble. Next they stopped in Hattiesburg for two games. Here the Walker boys in their home town showed how baseball is played at Ole Miss by home runs that helped in winning both games.

After this the team traveled to Columbus to take two games from Alabama. After thus entertaining the fair ladies of M. S. C. W., they returned to Oxford to meet Lynx in a two-game series. Ole Miss won the first one easily, but Southwestern eked out a 2 to 1 win over the locals in the second game.



The following week-end brought the climax of the season—the two games with A. and M. The first game was a hard-fought one, marked by the hitting of Gerald Walker, who accounted for a slugfest for the Ole Miss players, and they won without much opposition.

Then came the two games in the Bulldog's back yard. In the first game, with the favorable side of the score changing from one team to the other, the game finally ended with Ole Miss at the long end of the 11 to 7 score. The second game was a struggle throughout, but the Oxford boys won, to make a total of eight out of nine Conference games won and to give them a clear title to the Southern championship.

**PI KAPPA ALPHA**

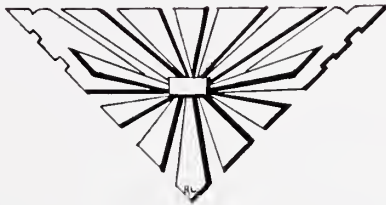

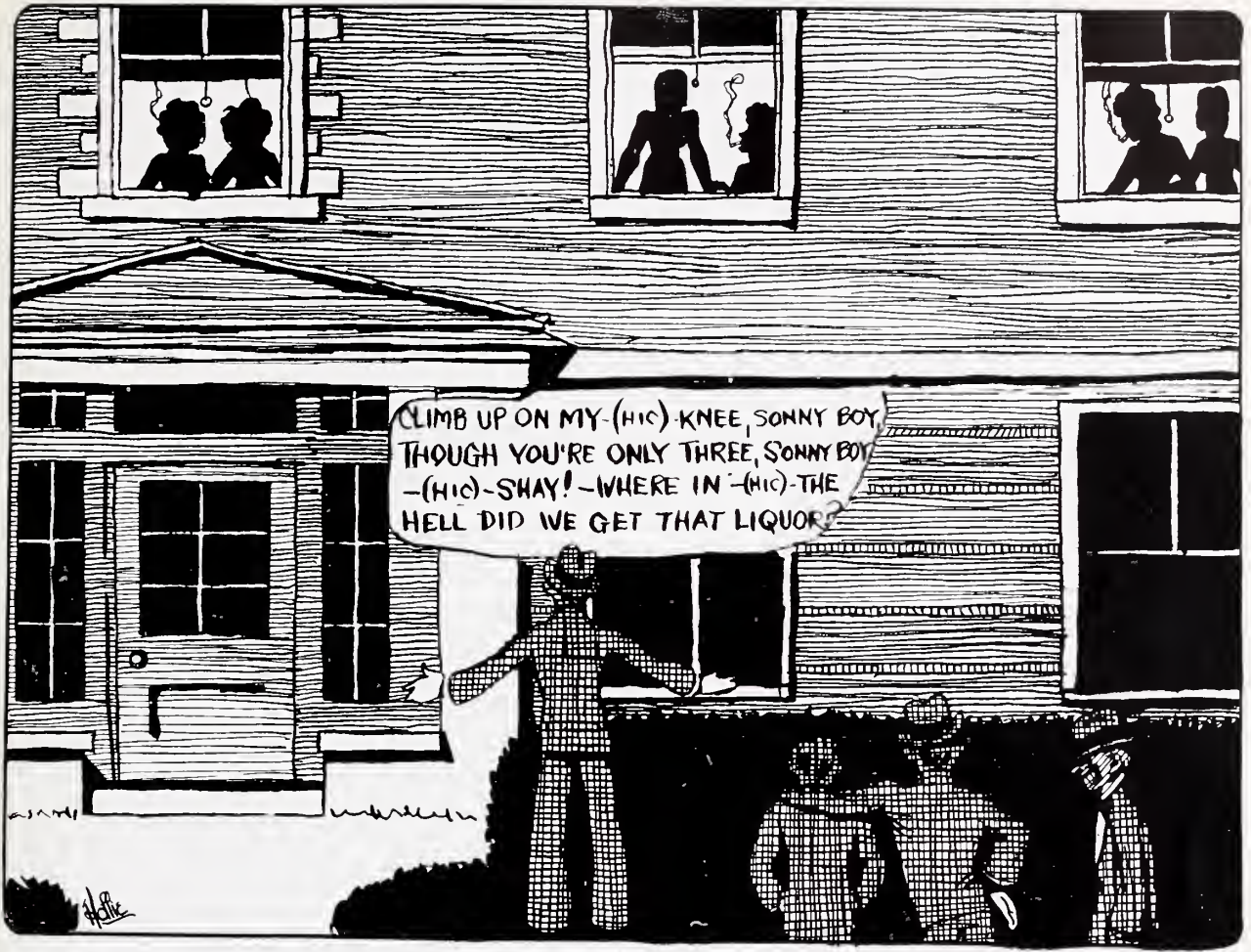
Art Gillham was here and we wish he would come back next year and be in a Freshman Stunt Night.

## The Stag at Eve Had Drunk His Fill

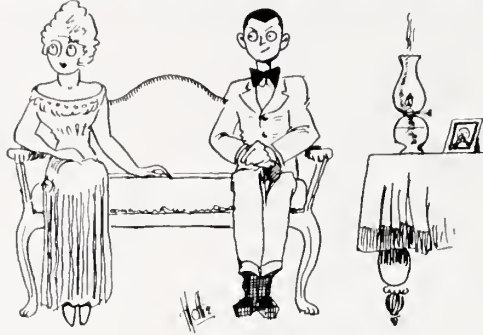
