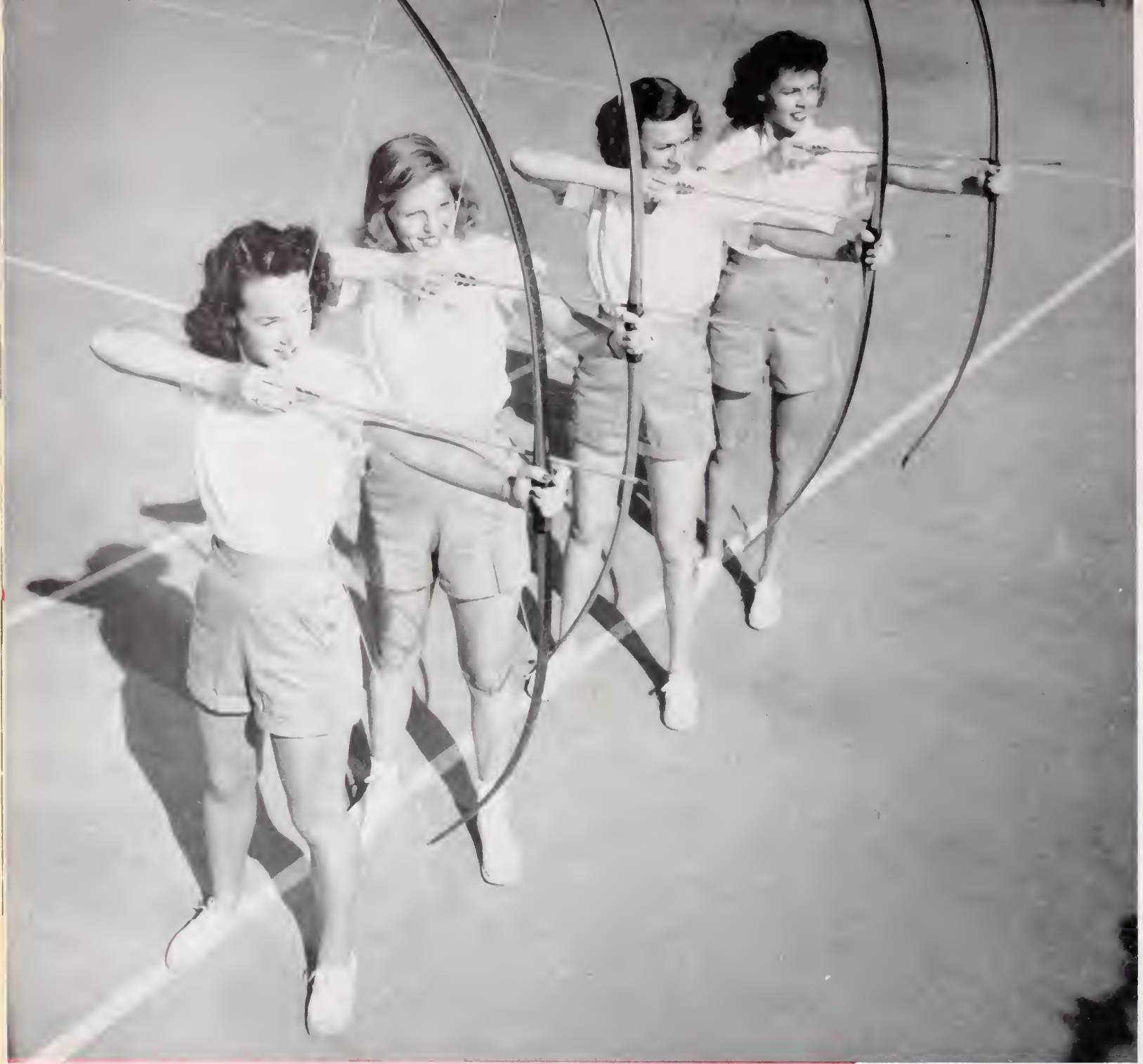

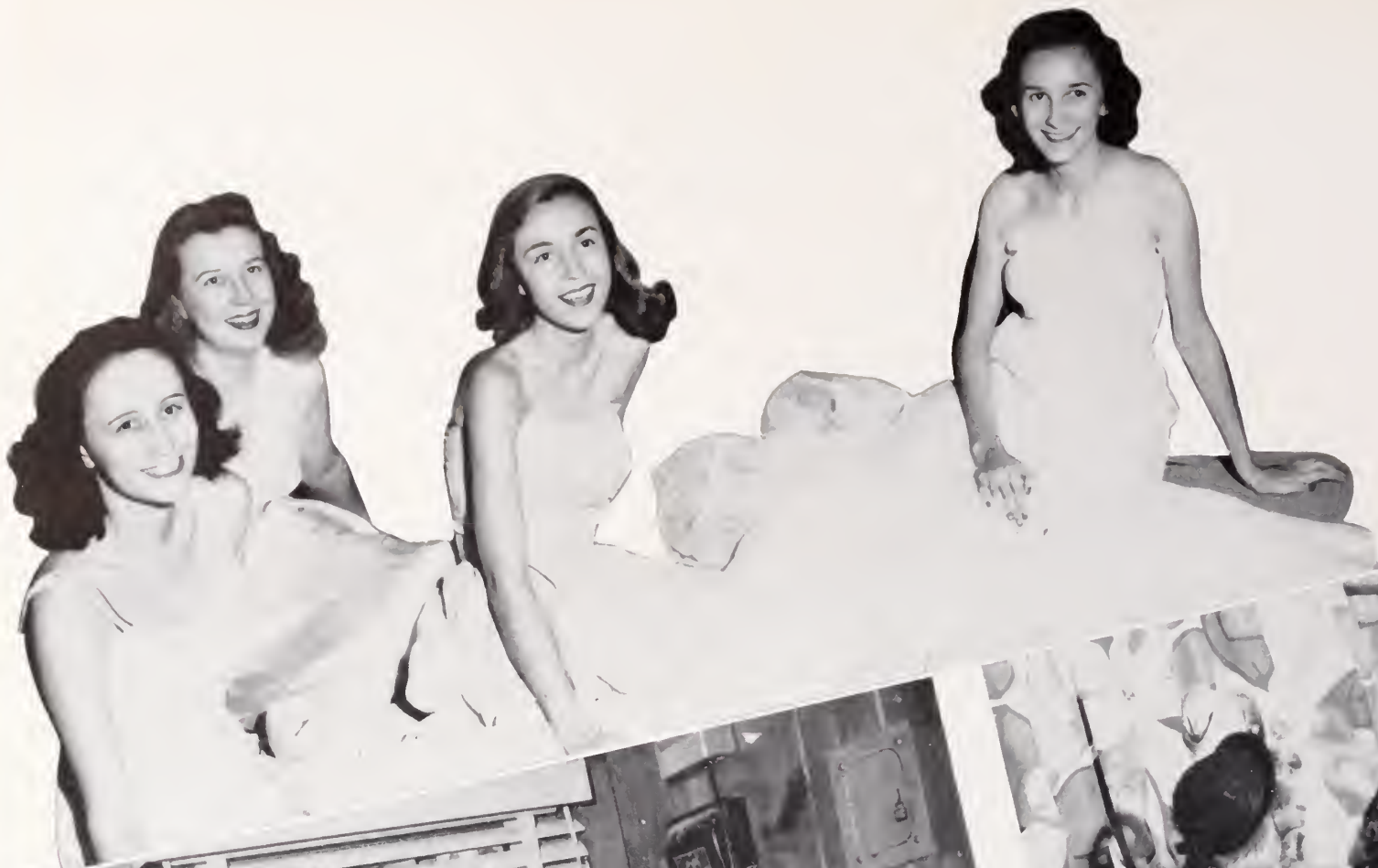






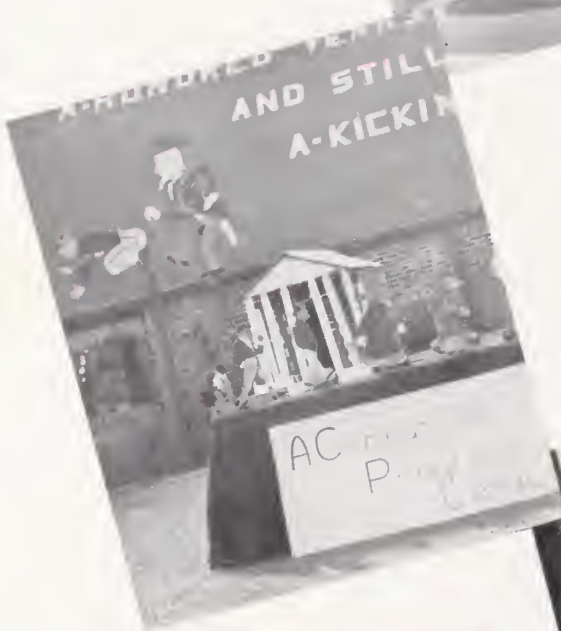

If Chancellor J. D. Williams had his way, he would spend more of his time with the students. As it is, though, meetings, conferences, luncheons, and general office business take up so much time that few students see him more than half a dozen times a year.

On one particular day last November, for instance, the chancellor rushed into his office for a 3:00 p.m. appointment.

"Ole Miss is winning 21-0!" he told his secretary. He had left the grid battle between the Baby Rebels and the State Yearlings in the second half. Snatching a few minutes here and there to be around the students has become one of the most familiar traits of the man who succeeded A. B. Butts in 1946.

As an example of a usually busy day, here is the rest of the chancellor's schedule on the day of the freshman football game:

Up at 6:45, Dr. Williams ate breakfast and read the paper before going to his office at 8:15. He checked the day's calendar, talked over the schedule with his secretary, and read and answered his mail.

Conferences began at 10:00 with a discussion with Dean of Men R. M. Guess about student representation on the Men's Disciplinary Committee. After the discussion he opened bids for providing meat and canned vegetables for the cafeteria.

He then prepared a greeting to the speakers of Religious Emphasis Week, met with Dr. G. A. Carbone, chairman of the Committee on Foreign Students, and

discussed plans for hiring art professors with Deans P. K. McCarter and V. A. Coulter.

The chancellor met Mrs. Williams for lunch and they ate with a group of foreign students on the campus. He returned to his office soon after lunch for a conference with Dean D. S. Pankratz of the School of Medicine.

After seeing the first half of the freshman game, Chancellor Williams returned to another conference. Representatives of the Oxford Junior Chamber of Commerce and MGM studios met with him to discuss plans for filming William Faulkner's latest book, "Intruder in the Dust," in the Oxford-University area.

The chancellor had dinner with members of Tau Kappa Alpha debating fraternity and their guests at the Southern Regional tournament. He studied applications of three junior colleges for admission into the Junior College Committee of the Commission on Higher Education of the Southern Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools. The chancellor is chairman of the committee.

He spent a half hour reading before going to bed.

Dr. Williams is a native of Newport, Ky. He received his A.B. degree at the University of Kentucky in 1926 and his M.S. from the same school in 1930. He was awarded his Doctor of Education degree at Columbia in 1940. Before coming to Ole Miss he had been president of Marshall College in Huntington, W. Va.

He is a member of ODK, Phi Delta Kappa, Kappa Delta Pi, Phi Sigma Kappa, Alpha Phi Omega, the Rotary club, Masons, and the Methodist church.

A typical day with the Chancellor: the usual early morning conference with his secretary about the day's schedule, an on-the-job inspection of campus construction, office meetings by the dozens, and guests for dinner.

ADMINISTRATION

The 1949 Ole Miss defies anyone to find two people on the campus who can give the names of the top administration officers of the University in the same order. It is generally agreed that Chancellor Williams is top man. After that it is anybody's guess. After interviewing four sources and receiving four different and widely varying opinions, we arrived at the following list of names.

This list gives the names of 16 administrative officers and their titles. The officers are divided into five general groups. The list was provided by an official source, and if any reader wants to figure out who is the most important, he can do it for himself. We don't know.

In the first group, besides the chancellor, is Dr. Alfred Hume, Chancellor Emeritus of the University, and Dr. Pete Kyle McCarter, Dean of the University.

Another group includes Dean of Men, R. Malcolm Guess and Dean of Women, Estella G. Hefley. Third

member of this group is Dr. V. B. Harrison, Director of the Student Health Service.

The third group, which seems to be concerned with financial and clerical duties, includes Mr. W. C. Trotter, the Financial Secretary; Comptroller Carroll W. North; and Mr. Fred C. Ford, new Director of Personnel.

Group four has the Registrar, Dr. A. J. Lawrence; Mr. J. Sykes Hartin, Director of Libraries; Mr. Marvin M. Black, Director of Public Relations; and Alumni Secretary William S. Griffin.

In the athletic division there are Mr. C. M. Smith, Director of Athletics; Business Manager Jeff K. Hamm, Jr.; and Head Coach John Vaught.

On the following pages are large pictures and write-ups of the deans. It is doubtful if a logical reason for making their pictures larger than the others can be given, but we did it.

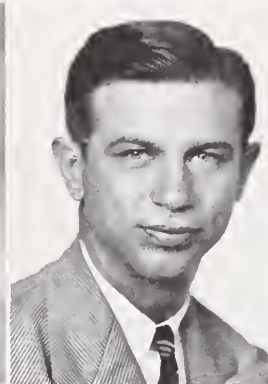

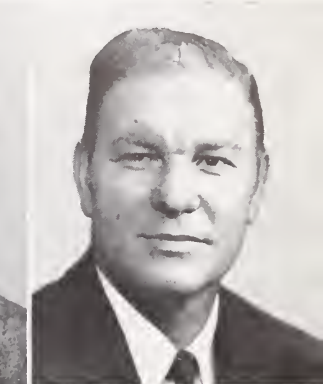

DEAN JAMES WARSAW BELL

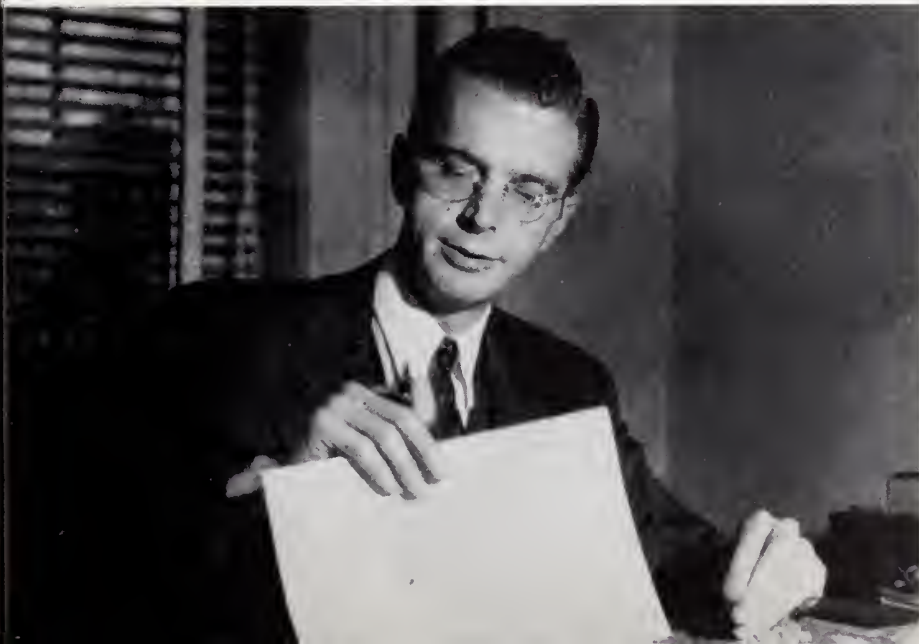
" 'Tradition' is a word which has been used so frequently and carelessly that it has lost its shape—its impact upon the ear . . . But Dean Bell was a Rebel tradition in the really spacious and hard-hitting meaning of the term. He came to Ole Miss as a student in 1894 and became a member of the Athletic Committee in 1908. Since then he has been woven into the Ole Miss athletic skein as firmly as headgears and catching masks. The imprint of one man's personality upon the personalities of others is necessarily vague, but we believe that Dean Bell operated a tremendous influence upon the boys who wore Red and Blue across their shoulders. DEAN

VICTOR ALDINE COULTER of the College of Liberal Arts started out as a chemist. Until last year he was a chemistry instructor here, although he has been BA school dean since 1936.

Dean Coulter first became interested in chemistry when, as an ambitious high school student, he began reading college chemistry texts his older brothers left around his home in Newton, North Carolina. He attended the University of North Carolina, receiving his bachelor's, master's, and doctor's degrees there in 1913, 1914 and in 1916. He taught the course at North Carolina in 1916-17 and then accepted a job as a research chemist in Pittsburgh in 1917. He went into the army after a short while.

When he was discharged in 1919, Dr. Coulter looked around for another job as a research chemist. Not finding any he liked, he accepted a teaching position here after studying a few months in Cambridge University in England. Except for time spent as a graduate student at Columbia in 1927, he has been teaching at the University ever since. As dean of the College of Liberal Arts, he looks forward to the opening of an art and a geography department here in 1949.

His hobbies are woodworking and metalworking. An ardent hunting and fishing enthusiast he makes his own gun stocks and has constructed two boats himself since he came to Ole Miss. He also is an amateur photographer.



DEAN

ROBERT JOSEPH FARLEY of the School of Law has been a high school principal, mayor of Oxford and a victim of Theodore G. Bilbo.

He decided to become a law teacher when he, along with several other Ole Miss faculty members, was forced to resign in the days when "The Man" was trying to run Ole Miss. Dean Farley at the time was practicing law in Oxford and teaching at the University on the side. When Bilbo decided the dean didn't know how to teach, Dr. Farley decided to do nothing but that.

A native of Hernando, he was graduated from Ole Miss with a BA degree in 1919. He was principal of Canton High school in 1919-20, and for two years following held the same position in Natchez. He was mayor of Oxford, 1923-25, during which time he received his LL.B. here in 1924.

He had become interested in law by reading his father's law books when he was teaching in high schools. Admitted to the bar in 1924, he practiced from 1929-31. From 1926 until 1931 he was city attorney for Oxford. At the same time he was an assistant professor of law here.

Dr. Farley was Dean of Law at Tulane University from 1942 until 1945. He accepted the same position here in 1946. At present the school has 12 faculty members with an enrollment of about 250.

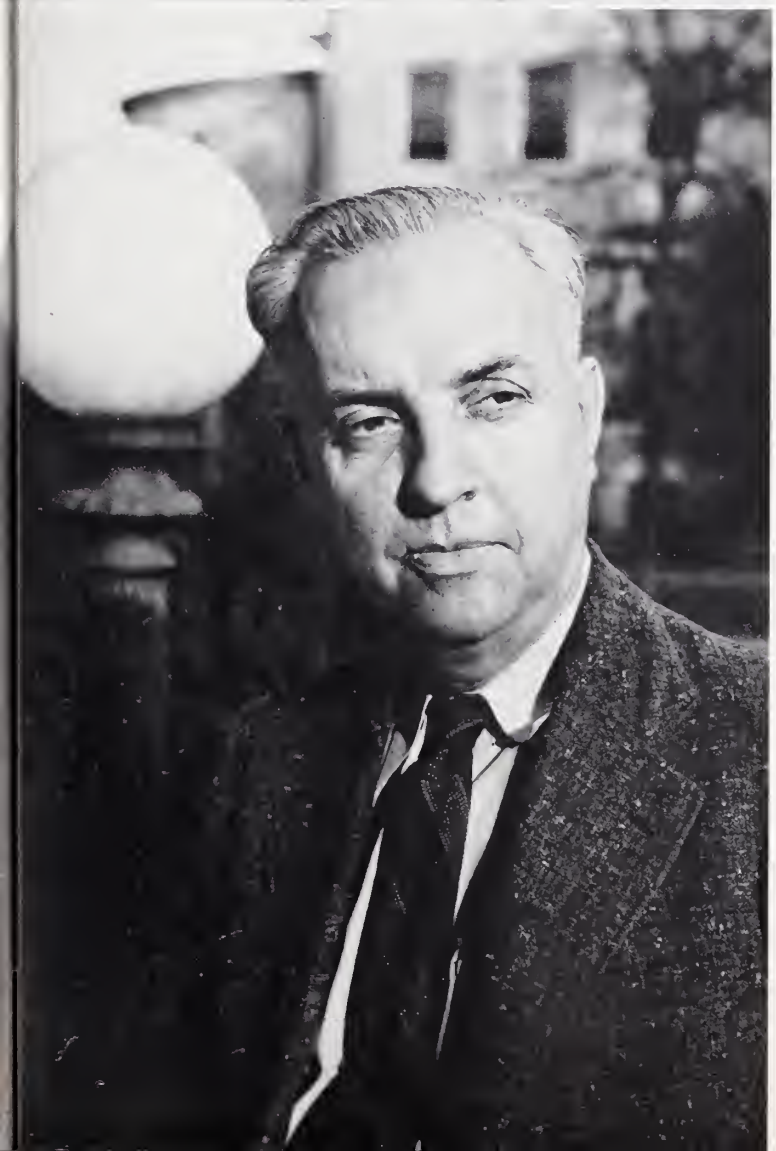
LEE HARNIE JOHNSON, JR., of the

School of Engineering, goes in for hard projects. In high school at Houston, Texas, he amused himself by solving complicated math problems and became interested in engineering. At Rice Institute he received his BA and MA degrees in 1930 and 1931, but he didn't stop there.

Having a natural liking for studying and schools, Dean Johnson followed up those two degrees with an MS from Harvard in 1932 and an ScD degree from there in 1935. He was made dean of the School of Engineering in 1938.

Even his hobbies are more complicated than usual. Summer afternoons he spends mostly behind the Graduate building, dividing his time between the tennis courts, where he is agile and able, and the University swimming pool where he practices fancy dives from the high board. During football season he is often perched on the press box wherever Ole Miss is playing, making play-by-play movies of the game.

Engineering courses before 1909, when the school was opened, were offered in connection with physics, astronomy or mathematics. The school first opened with civil, electrical and sanitary engineering departments and a department of geology. Various courses now offered cover periods of four, five and six years of study. Since 1947, when the curriculum was reorganized, courses in construction and maintenance engineering have been stressed, in keeping with industrial expansion in Mississippi.



DEAN

FORREST W. MURPHY of the School

of Education is possibly an example of a Hoosier school-master. A native of Muncie, Indiana, he received his BA in 1917 at Transylvania College, now the University of Kentucky, and his MS in 1931 from the University of Illinois. He was a graduate student at Columbia in 1945.

After college, he taught in high schools in Kentucky and Louisiana. He came to Greenville, Mississippi, High School in 1924 and was made superintendent of schools there in 1933. He served in Greenville until 1946 when he was appointed Dean of the School of Education.

According to Dean Murphy, Mississippi needs about 1000 teachers and most of them should come from the University. More finances in the education school and higher teacher pay in public schools will wipe out this shortage, he says. He points out that money trouble is not new with the School of Education. First organized in 1903, it was temporarily abandoned for four weeks in 1906 when the money ran out.

The school now boasts of its health and physical education departments, and the audio-visual educational laboratory which loans instructional films to schools throughout the state.



DEAN

DAVID SCHULTZ PANKRATZ of the School of Medicine believed he could do more good in the medical profession by teaching rather than by practice. He explains that the shortage of doctors is further hampered by the lack of medical teachers.

He received his Doctor of Medicine degree in 1939 at the University of Chicago, but he worked for it the hard way. A native of Cordell, Oklahoma, he was graduated with a BA from the University of Oklahoma in 1923. From there he went to the University of Kansas, where he received his MA in 1927 and a PhD in Anatomy in 1929. For ten years following he was assistant professor of anatomy at the University of Tennessee. After this he studied for his MD.

Dr. Pankratz came to Ole Miss as assistant dean of the School of Medicine in 1945. The following year he was made dean.

In the past year the medical school alone received a total of \$30,000 for research grants, more than it has ever received in its history. Most of the medical staff are now engaged in active research.

Under the present accelerated program, in which the student finishes the two-year course in one and one-half years, 50 persons are graduated each year. The first graduating class, in 1905, when the school was two years old, numbered only six. Four-year medical instruction will be offered students in the state as soon as legislative appropriations are voted for construction of facilities.

DEAN

ELMER LIONEL HAMMOND has seen the enrollment of the School of Pharmacy jump from 60 students when he came here in 1928 to 300 at the present time.

He received his pharmacy degree from the University of Michigan in 1921. As a high school student in Chicago he first became interested in the profession when he worked at a drug store after classes. He received his MS degree from the University of Michigan in 1923. From 1921 until 1928 he taught pharmacy at West Virginia University.

Dean Hammond was a graduate student at the University of Chicago in 1927-29, and during this time he was made dean of the Ole Miss pharmacy school. He received his PhD in 1941 from the University of Wisconsin.

He boasts that his school is one of the finest in the South, and he is especially fond of the chemistry and pharmacy building, the entire third floor of which houses the school. It is a far cry, he recalls, from the three small laboratories which supplemented the lecture rooms when the school was first established in July, 1908. Fifteen students applied for admission then. There have been 537 graduates from the school since that day, and with an annual enrollment of 300, the total number of graduates can possibly double in the next ten years.



DEAN

HORACE B. BROWN, JR., of the School of Commerce and Business Administration, grew up in a Holly Springs hardware store. He has been interested in business ever since he began work there when he was 10 years old.

A home-grown product, he received his BSC degree from Ole Miss in 1931. He became a Master in Business Administration the following year at Northwestern University. Returning to Ole Miss, he was made dean of the commerce school in September, 1932. In 1941 he received his PhD at Northwestern.

Although the business school was organized in 1917, next to the last to be added to the University, Dean Brown traces its origin back to the 1871-72 session, when bookkeeping was first taught here.

When first opened, the school offered only a limited number of courses. Besides general courses in banking, transportation and merchandising, political science, economics, shorthand and typing were offered. Today six times as many courses are listed. The school is second in size only to the College of Liberal Arts. It is accredited by the American Association of Schools of Business, of which Dean Brown is secretary-treasurer.



DEAN

DUDLEY ROBERT HUTCHERSON doesn't know how he became interested in English, but the course has brought him from the hills of West Virginia to the position as dean of the Graduate School at Ole Miss.

A native of Bluefield, West Virginia, Dr. Hutcherson was awarded a BA from Emory and Henry College in 1923. In 1931 he received his master's degree from the University of Virginia. He taught in high schools from 1923 to 1934, and in 1935-36 he was an English instructor at Wesleyan College for Women. He received his PhD from the University of Virginia in 1926 and came to Ole Miss the same year. Ten years later he was made dean of the Graduate School.

Like most of the other deans, Dr. Hutcherson believes that the shortage of money is holding up a more rapid expansion of Ole Miss. According to him, the University needs more money to build classrooms and dormitories.

Dean Hutcherson's hobbies vary from music, reading and the theater to tennis and football. He is a member of the Modern Language association, the Conference of Deans of Southern Graduate Schools, and Phi Beta Kappa.

The school he heads was established in 1927, although courses in graduate study had been offered as early as 1870. Today the school confers the degrees of Master of Arts, Master of Science and Master of Business Administration. 36 degrees were awarded in 1948, and 645 graduate degrees have been conferred since the school was opened. The present faculty consists of 83 members.





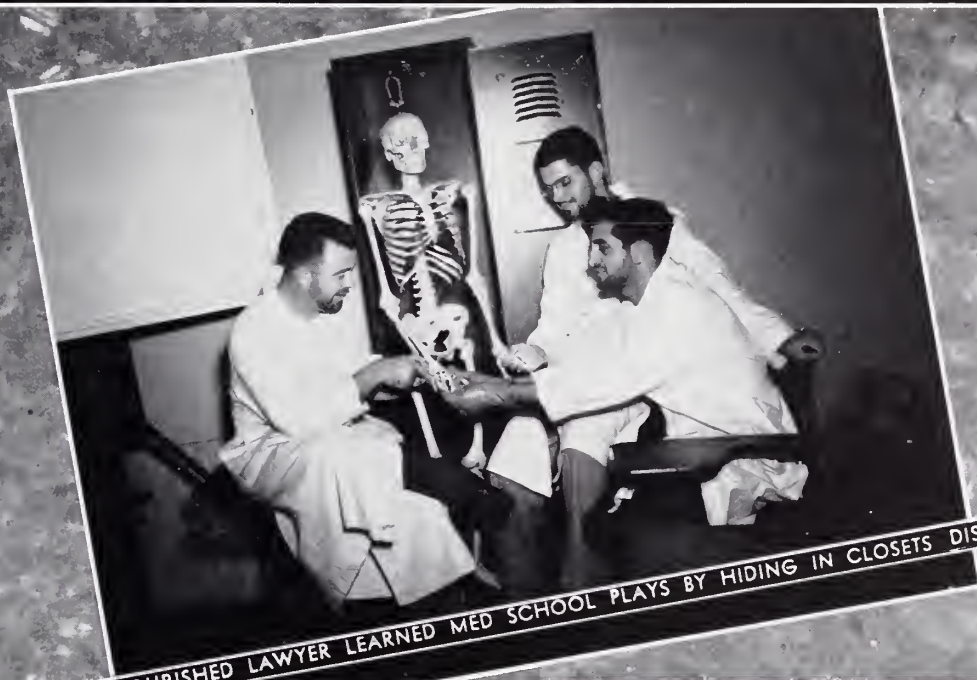

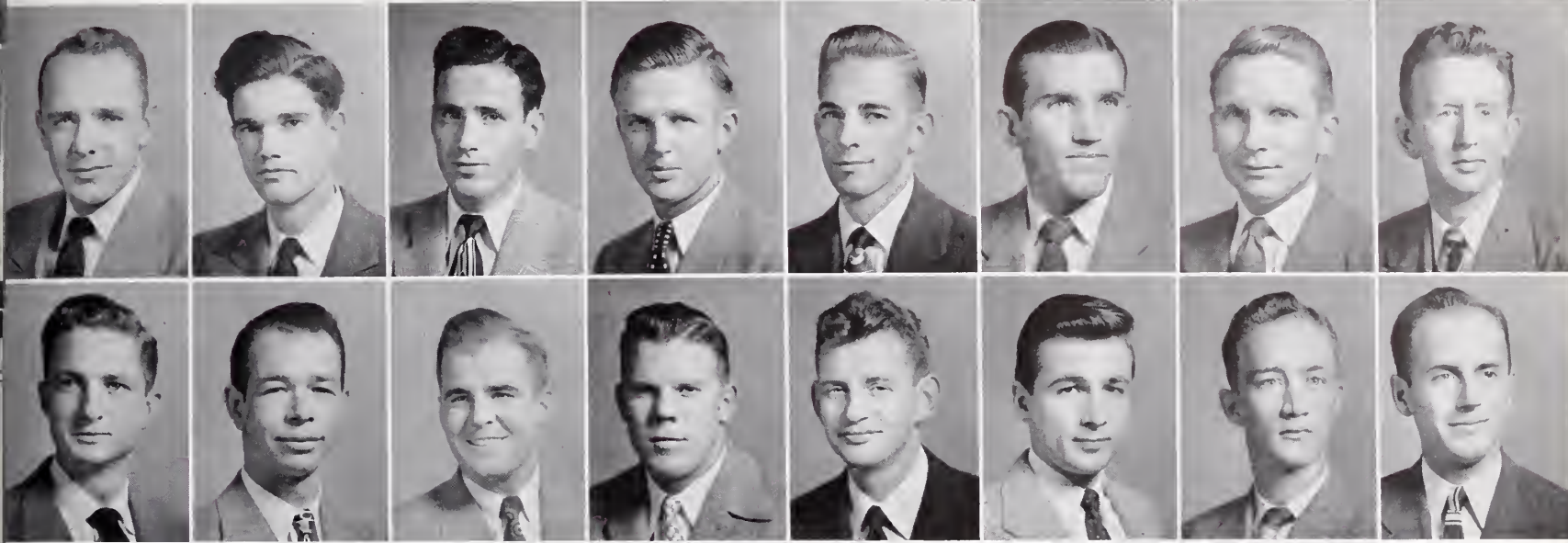

The band is governed by its own members through an executive council headed by the band officers. Through this council all major decisions are made and pertinent grievances of members are discussed.

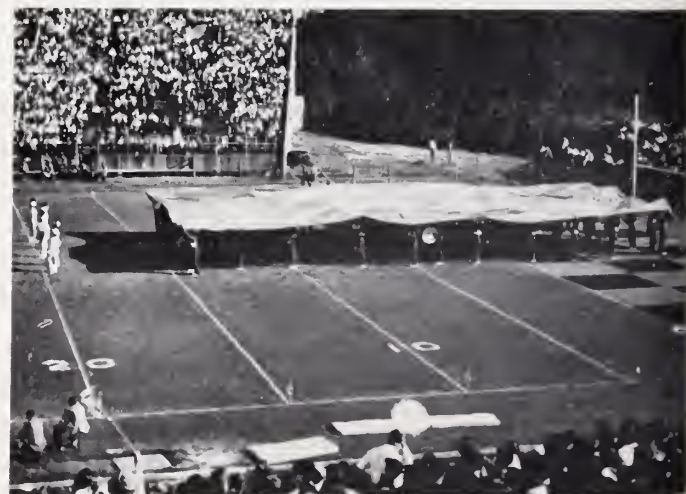
Becoming of increasing importance is the concert band. An annual program was started this year with a Christmas concert presented in Fulton chapel on Sunday preceding the Christmas holidays.

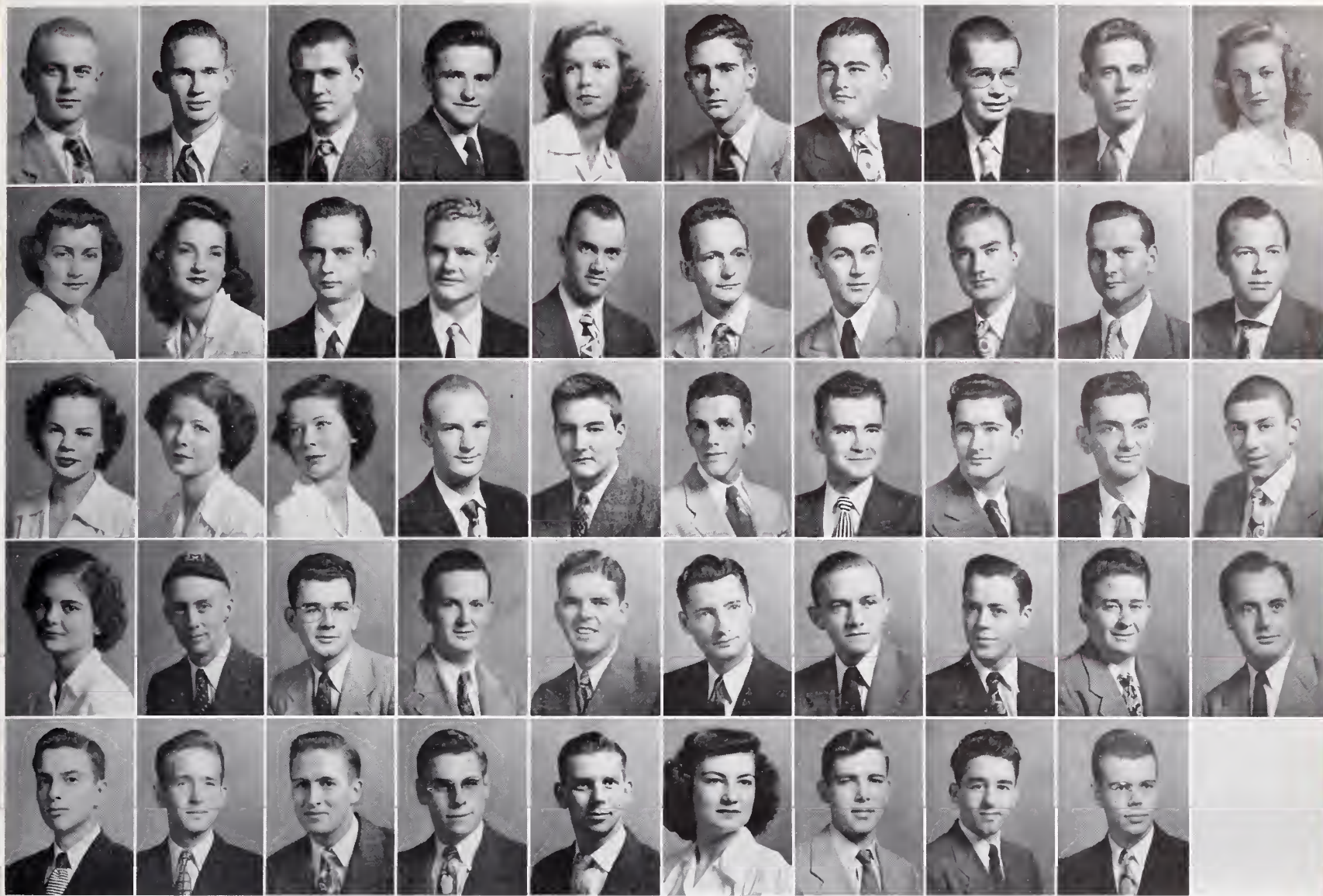

Members of the 1949 Hall of Fame were photographed with the gracious consent of Dr. and Mrs. Christopher Longest in their home on South Lamar in Oxford.

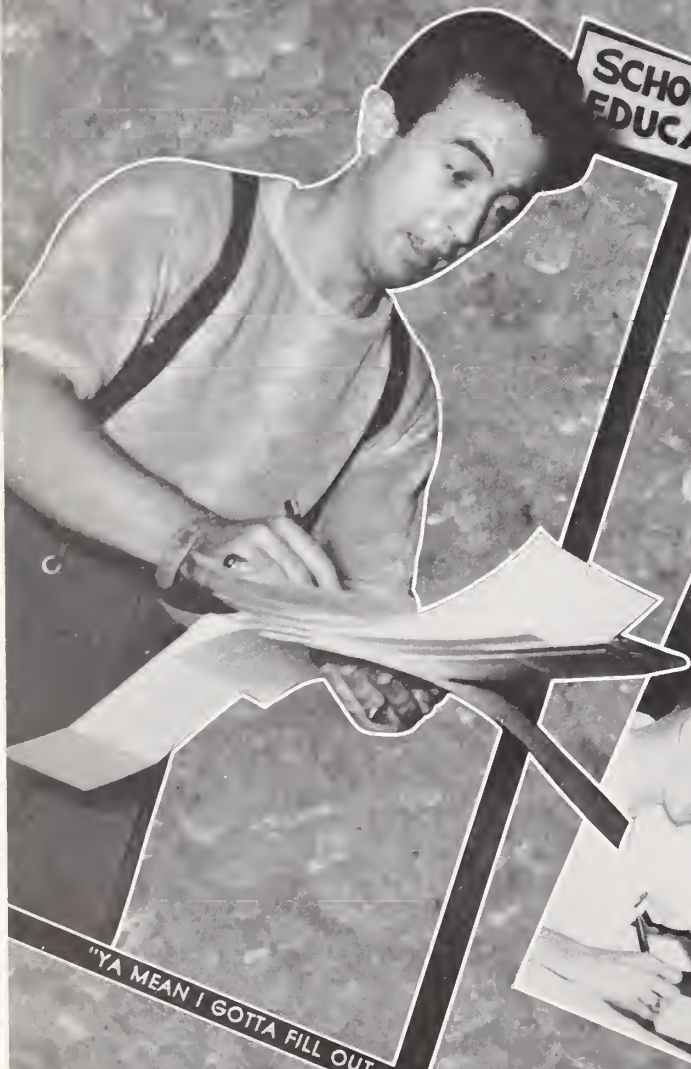

With the end of the war, there came to Ole Miss a new era of football warfare. For under the golden early years of Harry Mehre, Ole Miss had just begun its rise to national pigskin prominence when Pearl Harbor sneaked upon the scene. The years that followed, from the Rebel hoghide point of view, were strictly on the decline, although strangely enough the Mississippians had discovered the power to whammy State.

The initial post war grid year for Ole Miss brought no major change in won-lost activity, although the brand of ball had constantly improved as the season neared its end. This was 1946 and the first and only term for Red Drew, who returned to his favorite Alabama haunts.

Drew's number one assistant, John Vaught, was promoted to the general's chair and the securing of Jim "Buster" Poole, Ole Miss standout of years gone past, who had blazed a trail of glory in the professional ranks, as end coach, were changes made in quick time.

Towering Jim Whatley, Junie Hovious, and Wobble Davidson remained onward with the Vaught regime. Tom Swayze, another former Rebel star in the early thirties, was secured to wield the pipe, and for contact work, scouting, and "swaying" prospective Rebels down Oxford way.

Vaught hit the wire-service, bellowing in his likeable Texas voice, for two ole shipmates, Mike Brumelow and Wes Knight. Vaught

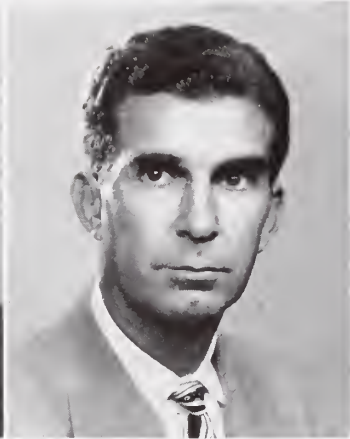

had worked with both at service units while wearing the Navy blue, and knew for a fact the keen knowledge each man had for his particular task

Brumbelow was captain of the Texas Christian team when Coach Johnny wore the freshman cap at the same university. Both were captains of their team during their stay at the Horned Frog institution. "Doc" Knight had won the respect of Coach Vaught as a trainer when the two marked up hash marks together for Uncle Sam.

Hovious and Davidson, who were famous figures of the Mehre golden era, were handed the important task of developing the freshmen. The latter, an end during his playing days as co-captain of the 1941 Red and Blue team, polished the line, while the fiery Hovious, one half of the "H" boys tandem (Hapes-Hovious), took over backfield duties.

To round out the staff that was to direct the Rebels to their first conference crown in history, Vaught chose Johnny Cain, the Alabama hurricane of the fabulous Wallace Wade period, to handle the varsity backs. Cain had marked up an impressive record at Southwestern Louisiana Institute, molding one of the finer service teams in the country.

Further breaking down revealed two Texans, two men from Alabama, one from Rhode Island, and the remainder home-grown here in the heart of Magnolia. The Southwesterners, Vaught and Brum-

below, were both all-conference, so were Cain and Whatley, and Hovious and Poole.

"Doc" Knight, the only Yankee on the squad, produced the first unbeaten Rebel track team in history, and made a surprising showing in the SEC meet at Birmingham with the Rebs placing five on the conference team for 1948.

The almost perfect staff was made practically complete with another raid of the professional ranks, and back home after an illustrious pro career came the first All-American in Ole Miss history, "Bruiser" Kinard, the finest tackle ever produced in the Southland.

The "Bruiser" took over line duties with teammate "Buster" handling the ends. Brumbelow and Whatley tutored the guards and centers, while Cain watched the backs. Vaught, as all over supervisor, made an almost miraculous changeover in a single season with the "T" replacing the single wing.

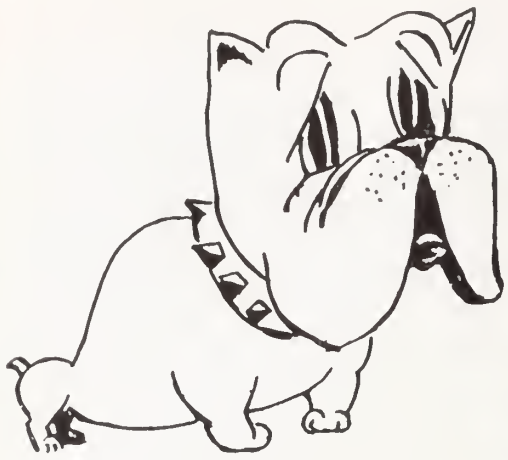
Another breakdown reveals further honors for the star-studded staff, for sometime, look, if you please, at the former All-Americans, Vaught, Kinard, and Cain. The Bruiser and Poole netted All-pro status, while Hovious and Whatley have also performed in the big time.

The Mississippians have taken the correct step now towards national recognition, for they have gathered together a group of men who were stars themselves, who love to win.

With All-American Charley Conerly vamoose, and with stalwart linemen Bill Erickson, Bernard Blackwell, Hairline Harper and Dave Bridgers absent from the Ole Miss scene, Head Coach John Vaught installed the T formation in spring sessions. He substituted a running attack for the great aerial route supplied by Conerly's good right arm.

Bear Wolf's Florida Alligators were the first to test the new system of the defending champion Rebels. Showing only a half dozen or so plays, quarterback Farley Salmon took to cover after running up a 14-0 halftime lead.

After 'Bama Jenkins had crashed over from seven yards out, Bobby Wilson intercepted a Gator pass on his own two, then raced the remainder of the distance behind grand downfield blocking for 98 yards. The big Mississippi forward wall held the hosts scoreless for the first time in two years.

All-American Barney Poole played one of the finest games of his career, sparking the forewall play. But he was ably assisted by Captain Doug Hamley, Jimmy Crawford, Buck Buchanan, Roland Dale, Bob Fuerst and Hank Campbell. Twice Dixie Howell garnered the open field, but in both trips he lost his footing on the concrete-like Gainesville gridiron.

The Rebels, picked to finish no better than eighth in the annual mentor's poll, thus broke into the win column in their first game, with an un-game-tried new formation. The sensational passing team of the preceding year sounded the warning that their 1948 tactics would vary slightly, but not in punch.

OLE MISS 20 KENTUCKY 7

The next week the team was away from home again, way up in the Bluegrass country. Eager students sat behind the "Y" and listened to the Ole Miss-Kentucky game over a special wire system.

They heard the Rebels, who had been stamped a seven-point underdog in pre-game tabulations, rack up win number two in their crown defense campaign, as they unloaded a 20-7 setback on the once proud shoulders of a battered and bewildered Wildcat in Lexington.

The Rebels led 7-0 at halftime after Farley Salmon had sent a payoff pitch to Barney Poole. Again the huge Ole Miss line went to work against the opposing front, and Tank Crawford was particularly effective. With the second half underway, tailback Billy Mustin took a punt return and handed off to Jerry Tiblier who dashed 65 yards for the second marker of the night. Bob Oswald, he of the educated toe, added his second success of the night.

The final Reb tally saw 'Bama Jenkins drive across from the five after Barney Poole had taken a forty-yard aerial from Bobby Jabour. For this victory, Vaught was named Coach of the Week while All-American Barney Poole was chosen "Best in Dixie" by International News Service.

The next afternoon, a screaming crowd of 1500 students, aided by the Rebel band, cheered in front of the Student Union building as the team came home. The first game the majority of the students would see was a week away.

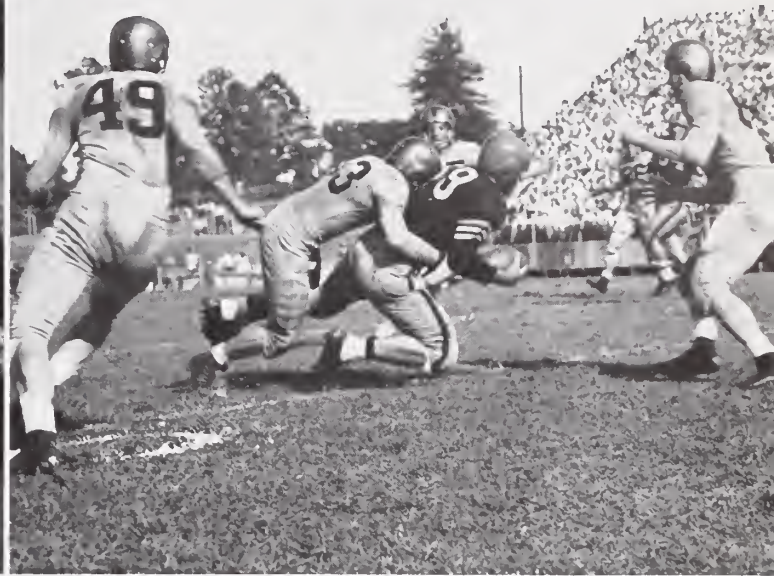

It was the Centennial Homecoming—and Colonel Rebel showed off before 22,500 fans as his favorite sons dropped a 20-7 defeat on a vigorous Vanderbilt eleven.

For three quarters the Commodores bettered the Rebels up front, but the highly touted Nashville forewall didn't possess the finishing touch. The Johnny Rebs did, though, for successive victory number three. And even if it was the roughest game of the season so far, the so-called experts of three weeks back were crying in their beer.

John Vaught repeated as Coach of the Week, while fearless Farley Salmon captured Player of the Week honors. Trailing 7-0, the Rebs were sparked by Salmon's 32-yard dash for the first score of the day. Oswalt missed the extra point for one of the few times in history, and things were rough all over.

With three minutes remaining, Howell returned a punt to the enemy 45. Salmon and Mustin, alternating, picked up a first down. Tiblier rambled to the 20, before being chased out of bounds. Salmon then hit terminal Jack Stribling on the one yard line. Buddy Bowen crashed over from there, and Oswalt converted. Wilson intercepted a pass from Davidson—and thus committed his second bit of larceny of the day and ended a scoring threat.

With seconds to go, Howell intercepted a desperation pass, racing 30 yards for the game's final six-pointer. Oswalt converted again. Roland Dale swiped lineman honors for the day along with Jim Crawford, Bubba Bidgood and Captain Hamley.

OLE MISS 7 TULANE 20

The inevitable one bad game reared its ugly head, and the Tulane Green Wave converted a blocked kick and two Ole Miss fumbles into three touchdowns and the margin of victory, 20-7, in tropical New Orleans—where anything can happen, and did.

Playing in the Sugar Bowl stadium, the Rebels started off correctly, but bogged in their initial drive. Tulane tackle Paul Lea blocked Bob Wilson's punt, setting up the first score. A Joe Ernst-Dick Sheffield combination produced the second Wave tally and finally Eddie Price lumbered 20 yards for the other Louisiana marker.

Dixie Howell's scintillating 60-yard run in the third period was the lone bright spot of this dismal day for the men of John Vaught. In the weekly poll for player honors, the Barnabus was the lone Reb nominated, and the big All-American returned from the game minus several teeth. Rated tenth in the nation prior to this game, Ole Miss dropped to the twentieth slot, never returning to the big ten the remainder of the season.

Hundreds of the Ole Miss student body, who had hopped the Tulane special, hitch-hiked, or driven down to the Crescent City, waited vainly for the fourth period rally which had figured so heavily in the Vandy game a week before. It came, but there wasn't enough of it. Cursing Lady Luck and the boiling sun of the Cajun country, the Rebel rooters retired that night to the dismal catacombs of the French quarter to drown their sorrows. If Tulane stadium didn't provide a happy memory, the Vieux Carre did.

After a scoreless first period, the Rebels magnificently racked up a 20-0 score before the intermission whistle sounded. 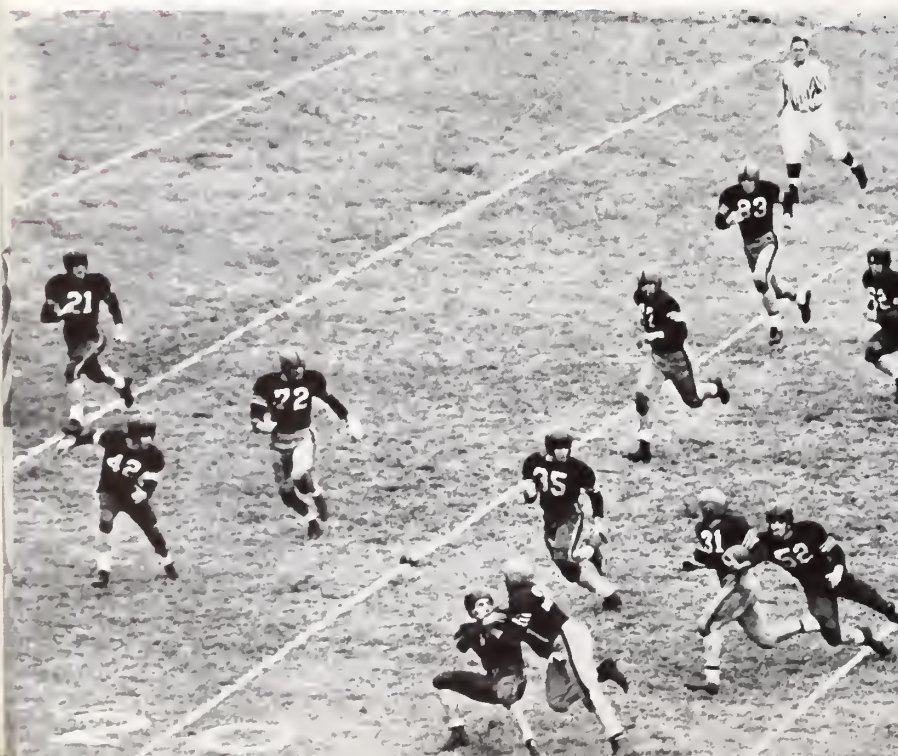

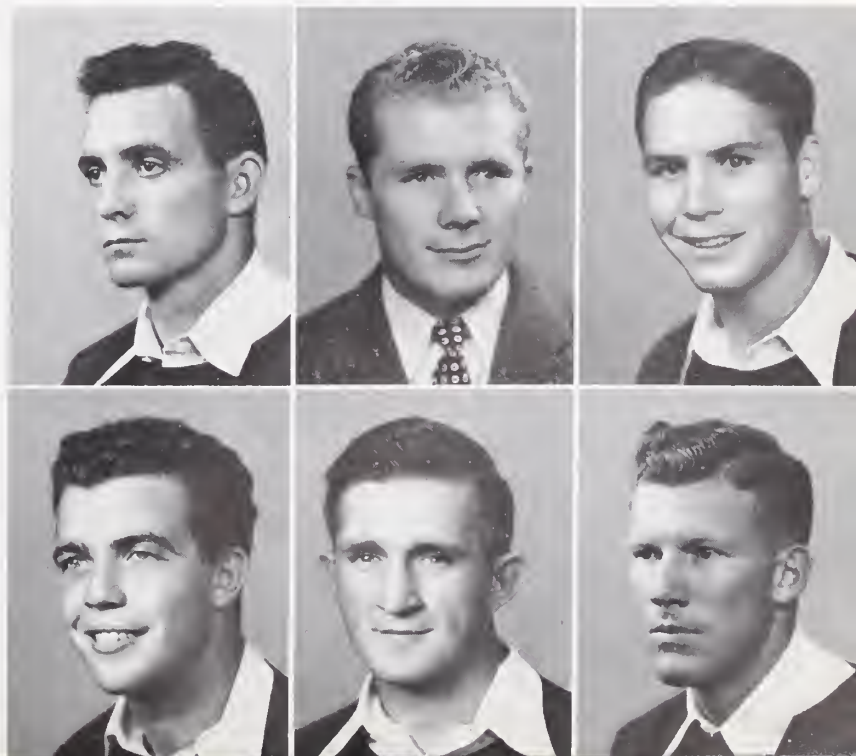

Roland Dale, the iron rail, assured one and all that he is absolutely one of the best tackles in the loop, while Jim Tank Crawford is undoubtedly one of the most destructive linemen in the conference.

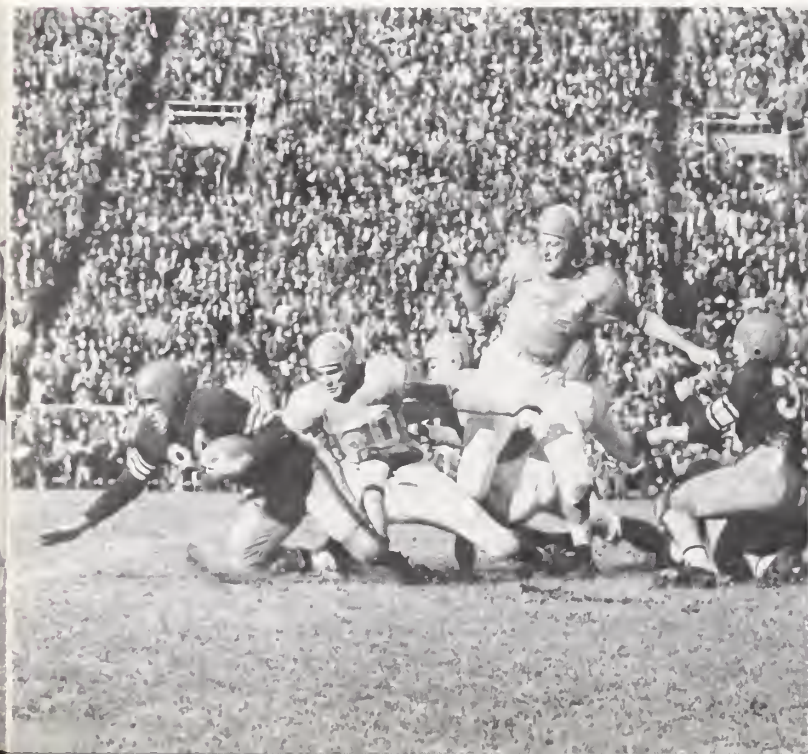
Vaught's strategy called for Howell to become a blocker, for Salmon to allow the bulk of the attack to ride with Tiblier and Dottley. The Vols scored once again, but the Rebels, who led 14-13, added an additional two points as Roland Dale, aided by a Vol, batted a bad pass into and out of the end zone for a safety.

The Rebels annihilated arch-rival Mississippi State 34-7 on Turkey Saturday before a chilled and thrilled standing room crowd of 31,000.

The Ole Miss gridders clinched the second place slot in the SEC with this one.

Playing smoothly as they mastered fullest confidence in the effective T formation, Farley Salmon guided the Rebels to a masterful win over their once tough rivals. Ending his fabulous playing career magnificently, All-American Barney Poole captured two touchdown passes and played a fine defensive game before being ejected from the game in the waning minutes of play. Salmon pitched one of the aerals and Bob Wilson tossed the other.

Billy Mustin broke the ice with a 52-yard punt return scoring bit behind fine downfield blocking. Roland Dale took out Harper Davis and Jim Clark ran over Tom McWilliams for the key blocks of the dash.

A Wilson to Bill Stribling scoring pass was nullified by a clipping penalty which was later proved unwarranted in the motion pictures. Buck Buchanan, line backer deluxe the season long, intercepted a McWilliams flip and raced 22 yards for the second score of the day. Dixie Howell added the final, taking a wide pitchout from Salmon. Oswalt missed but one extra point in five tries.

Dale, Crawford, Hamley, Bidgood Odom, Phil Poole, Farragut and Clark were particularly effective up front, and Vaught used many reserves before the rout was complete.

B A S K E T B A L L

Winning eight of twenty basketball games during the 1948-49 hardwood campaign, Jim Whatley's Ole Miss Rebels finished eleventh in a twelve-team league, with only traditional rival Mississippi State behind them.

The Rebels, however, were a more offensive-minded ball club than the Rebels of the previous season, yet lack of height and inability to control the backboard

allowed the opposition to average 60.8 points per game, while the Mississippians were connecting for 53.8.

The Rebels batted 1.000 during the pre-season campaign and added two more quick victories before school was officially under way after the holidays. But they bogged down with the simultaneous illness of crackerjack forward Jack Marshall. The Alabama win saw the end of the local triumphs during the next eight ball games.

The great Kentucky Wildcat quintet inflicted the most severe defeat with a mortifying 85-31 lacing. All Americans Ralph Beard and Alex Groza, however, were just as painful to many other opponents before their climax collegiate year was completed. The towering Tulane Green Wave likewise inflicted and unmerciful trouncing, socking Ole Miss 74-34 in gay New Orleans.

In all, these eight straight losses, boiled down, revealed that the first and second place Kentucky and Tulane team had had a hand in exactly half of the lickings, with fourth seeded Louisiana State also doling out a pair of setbacks. A fast improving Vanderbilt Commie five was victorious in their own back yard, while the Florida boys outdueled the Red and Blue in Rebtown 63-61 in a last second victory.

Ole Miss broke the string with two consecutive wins

over Southwestern and arch-rival State before bowing to Auburn and Alabama, two teams they had beaten at home, in the season windups. The best feature of Whatley's crew was four successive wins at the beginning of the season. The Rebels bested the State Maroons in each of their clashes to gather some salve for the painful wounds.

Once again Jack "Shadow" Marshall was the offensive bellcow, racking up 283 points over a 21-game stretch for a 13.5 season average. Captain Maxie McMullen and sophomore star R. B. Reeves finished second and third, with Memphis Maxie shading Reeves 234 to 233. Their point average was the same, however.

Marshall's 348 field goal percentage was better than Kentucky's Beard, but other than McMullen and Reeves, who were hot in spots, the Shadow had little help over the entire route.

With seniors Marshall, McMullen, Ray Busby and Darrel Rosamond slated to depart, the Rebels would have to be looking toward replacements for 1949-50 from the fine freshman team and returnees Reeves, Rabbit Cook, Jack Mann, Jim Dupuy, Bob Fletcher, Bill Parker, Howie Stringfellow and Otho Kortz.

the destinies of the frosh hardwood merchants and came up with some Grade A talent.

From the Hoosier state of Indiana came a guard tandem, Al Graehler and Cliff Mehrtens, that seemed likely candidates for much cage duty before their terms draw to a close at Ole Miss. Florida's Billy Renfroe, an all-state prep performer, showed well as did another all prep star, Memphian Jimmy Childers. A potential red hot drawing card for future reference was the five-foot five Windy City sensation, Wally Piekarski, who holds the Chicago individual scoring record—92 points in a single game. Tom Crockett, Dan Robbins, Les Shumate, as well as King, Beil and Fairchild, were other rookies who saw yannigan action.

Having much space to be filled, and because McDowell refused to write any more copy until this all-star squad was sent to the printer, we agreed it was a wonderful idea.

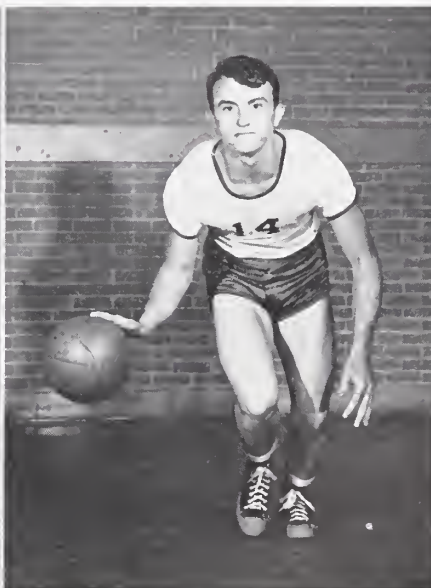
The KD's, who were beaten in their second outing of

Wilson made the most roundtrips around the field—five—followed by Barney Poole's four and Conerly's three. Conerly drove in 22 runs, Wilson 21, and Poole and John Burch 15 each.

George Scheider and Toby Majure were the only twirlers to win two games for Tad Smith's nine. Majure lost three as did Jim Dupuy and Slim Jim Pannell.

Wes Knight guided Ole Miss spikesters to an undefeated season plus a fine showing in the Birmingham SEC meet. He boasted one of the finest groups of Red and Blue thinclads in recent years.

Opening the season, the Rebs blasted Arkansas State 103-30 before moving into Big Shelby and handing Southwestern a 100 $\frac{1}{2}$ -33 $\frac{1}{2}$ licking. Vanderbilt's Commies could chalk up only 26 points, while the University marked up an impressive 88.

Mississippi State entered the fray as favorite, but the local squad reached its zenith, particularly in the field events, and a 71-60 triumph was racked up.

The fourth and final team victory was the invasion of Mississippi College, where Ole Miss marched ahead, despite the Choctaws possession of keen middle distance and distance events runners.

At Birmingham, no less than five men from Oxford came out on the 1948 All-SEC roster. "Dixie" Howell raced Tulane's Paul Beinz down to the wire before finishing as runnerup in 9.7 time.

Howell and winged-footed Will Glover had given Doc Knight's

aggregation a powerful one-two punch, along with the neat efforts of freshman sprinter Bobby Hemphill.

Big Jim Fields and Dynamite Farragut set new University records in the shot put and discus throw respectively, and also made the luminary squad.

Memphis Joe Johnson, a fine hurdler, and Bob Kell, able quarter-miler, were other Ole Miss members of the honor squad. Hairline Harper, co-captain with Johnson, provided able representation in the high and broad jumps. "D" and "J", the Salley twins, and Red Davis showed definite ability in the pole vault. Doug Hamley and Puny Mann aided Farragut and Fields as weight men, while Denny Faggard was but a stride behind Johnson as a hurdler. Bruce Austin was the top gladiator in the distance events.

But it was swifties Howell and Glover, along with Farragut, Fields, Harper, and Johnson, who contributed the greatest number of total points during the entire season.

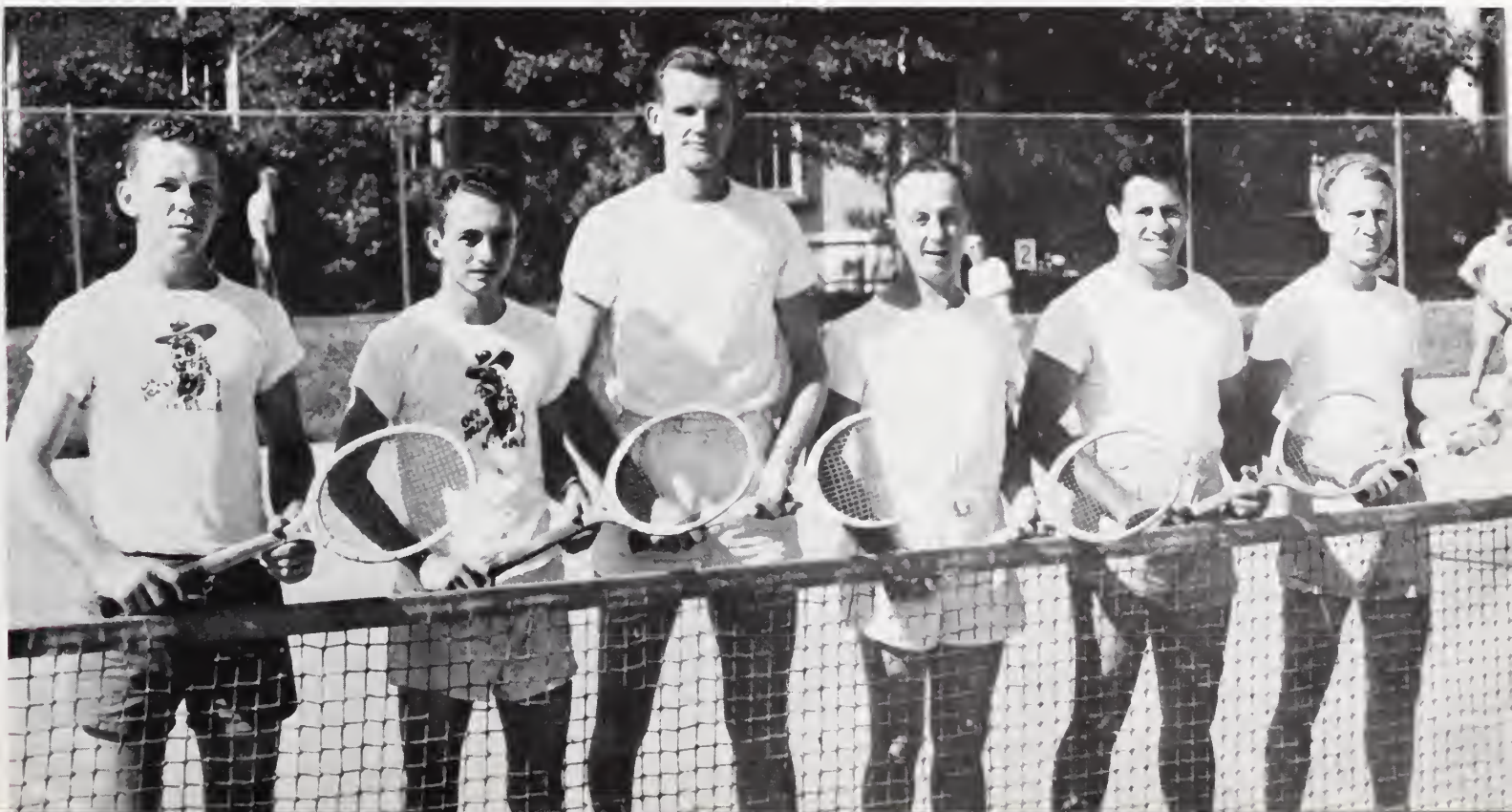

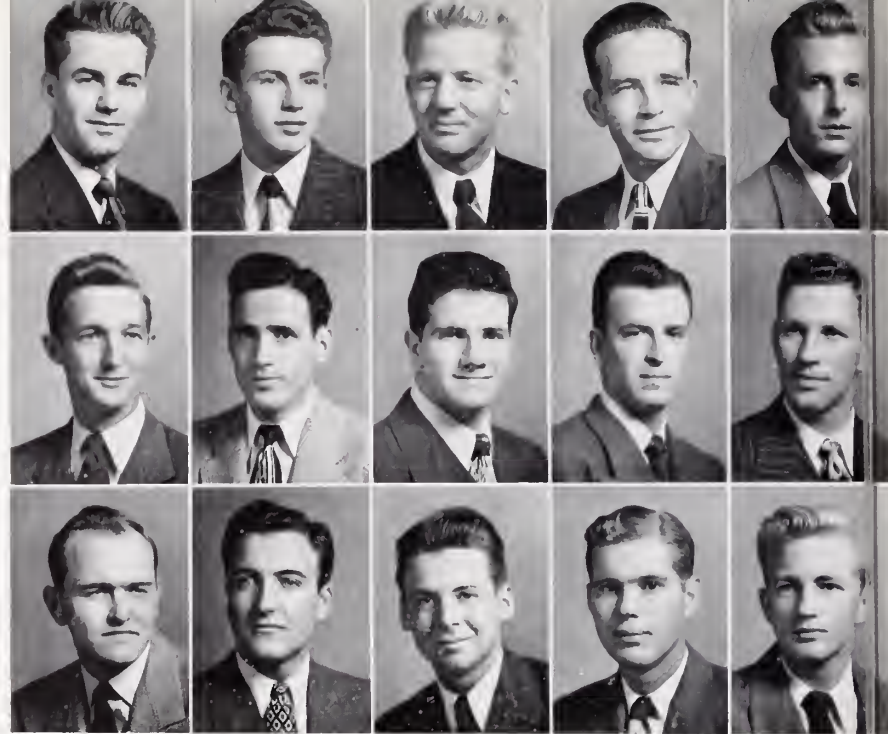

It was the second time the fraternity had appeared on the campus, being established first in 1859. It disbanded in 1861 when all the members joined the University Greys. Phi Kap's were the first local chapter to have private meeting quarters, being located in downtown Oxford. During the first semester seven students were pledged, and Chambliss pledged four more as a result of second semester rushing. One faculty member, Dr. Benjamin I. Harrison, professor of modern

languages, is a member. The fraternity was originally founded at the University of Pennsylvania in 1850. The colors are black and gold. "Phi Kap Girl" is the official song.

Since the credit union was organized, any student with a little foresight can assure himself of a place to borrow some cash. The purpose of the union is to give members practical experience in business organization and procedure, to accept savings of students and make loans to them. Any student or faculty or staff member can be a member of the credit union by buying a \$2.50 share of stock. This entitles him to borrow up to \$50 without security. Stock in the credit union is redeemable at par value, and each member has one vote regardless of the number of shares he holds. 190 members are now listed. About \$1,475 worth of stock is outstanding and more than 175 indi-

vidual loans have been made to students since the organization first began in January, 1948. The board of directors meets once a month, and there is an annual meeting of stockholders.

versity in 1861 to defend the Confederacy from the invading armies of the United States. The present outfits, however, are controlled from Washington, now in the hands of the Feds.

The record 400 students now enrolled in courses offered by the Department of Military Science and Tactics are divided between the infantry unit, established in 1936, and the air unit which was formed here in 1946. The two units operate under a coordinated instructional and supply command.

Several classes of infantry officers were graduated and commissioned second lieutenants before World War II, and a second post-war class has been graduated. Students pick the branch in which they wish to serve, and after completing the four-year course successfully they are commissioned as rifle platoon leaders with the Army Ground Forces or as Air Force administrative or supply officers.

Each summer junior class cadets of the infantry unit take a six-week basic course at Fort Benning, Ga., while air cadets are trained at Orlando, Fla., Air Base, or at Keeseler Field, Miss. Cadets are paid while on summer duty, and third and fourth year students receive subsistence allowances while in school.

Uniforms are worn during drill periods, at all official military functions. Provided free to all cadets, the uniforms are kept by graduates of the course.

An annual social event sponsored by the units is the Spring Military Ball, at which the unit sponsors are presented. Recognition societies exist in Scabbard and Blade and in the Pershing Rifles. The rifle team has a consistently high record in intercollegiate circles.

The units, cooperating with Scabbard and Blade, contributed to the Centennial Homecoming parade with a platoon of "University Greys," military students dressed in authentic Confederate uniforms.

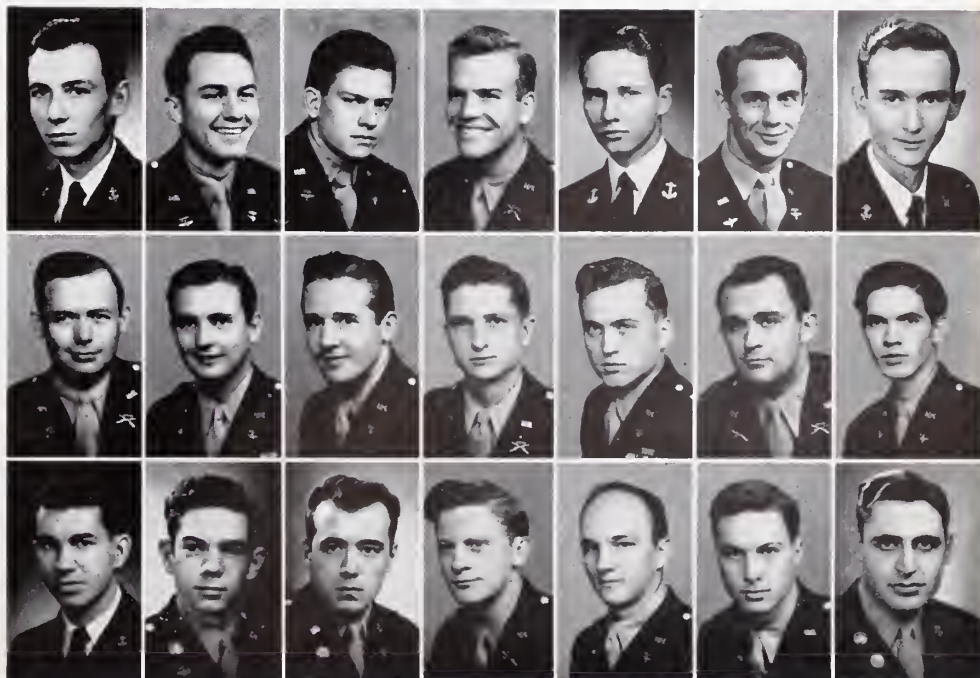

NAVAL ROTC

The Naval ROTC unit was established here in June, 1946. It outgrew the old quarters in Peabody Hall, and in 1947 the west wing of the old Physics Building, renovated and renamed McCain Hall, in memory of the late Admiral John S. McCain, Ole Miss alumnus, became the campus naval headquarters.

The unit here supervises five-term navy officers as well as NROTC students. The five-termers are mentioned later. The NROTC students fall into two categories, regular students and contract students.

Regular students are sent to college on government scholarships as a result of aptitude tests in their respective states. After receiving their degrees, the students must accept a commission, if physically qualified, as ensign in the Navy or as second lieutenant in the Marine Corps. After two years service, they may serve an additional year, or serve four years in the reserve.

Contract students join the navy unit in schools to which they have already been admitted. During the third and fourth years of college, they are paid commutation of subsistence, and upon graduation they are offered commissions in the Navy or Marine Corps Reserve.

Regular students make two summer cruises with the navy during their training and an additional summer is spent taking the naval aviation indoctrination course. Contract students are offered cruises between their third and fourth years of college. Summer duty usually lasts about eight weeks.

Uniforms are furnished for drill and for official naval functions. Highlight of the unit's social activities is the annual Navy Ball, at which the sponsors for the officers are presented.

The unit now numbers about 125 students.

Five-termers are Naval Officers who have received their commissions with little or no college training. These officers, on full active duty status, are sent to the University for five semesters, working for or toward a degree. The time spent at college serves as one of the officers' rotational periods of shore duty.

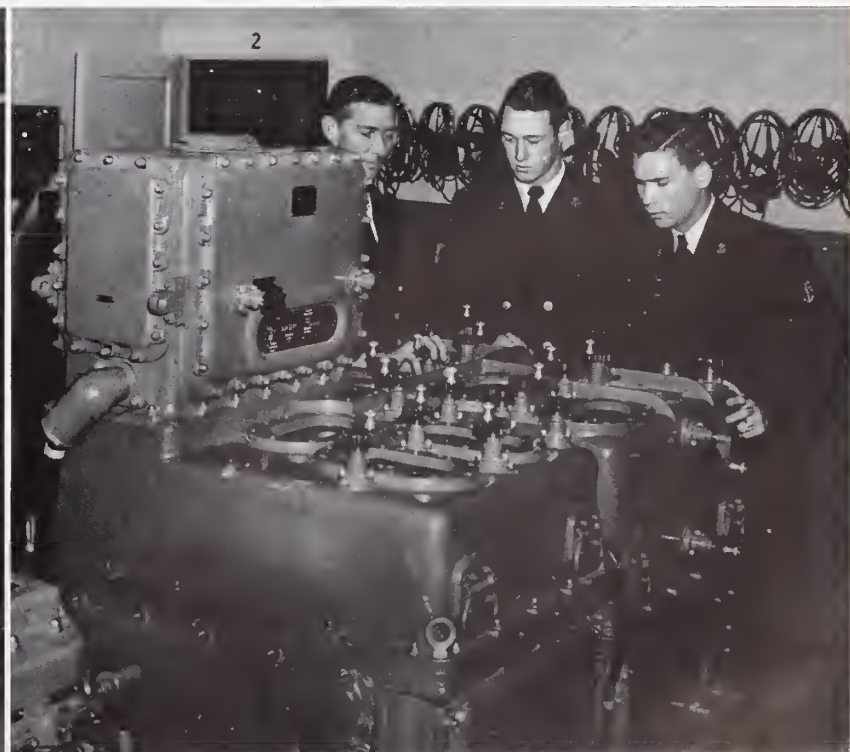
