CHAPTER I.

INTRODUCTORY REMARKS.

The investigation into the personal names of the people of any country is a subject surrounded with very great interest. By means of family nomenclature much light can be thrown on the early employments and customs of a people, as well as the sources from which they have sprung. In fact, the history of our country lies engrained in its Surnames; and on our shop fronts and in our graveyards may be found side by side the names of the descendants of the Milesian Prince, of the Scandinavian Viking, and of the Norman Knight.

So far back as 1851 the Census Commissioners for that year attempted to arrange the Surnames of the country in such a way as to show their distribution. The effort, however, proved unsuccessful, owing to the difficulties met with, and when the names were partially extracted the task was abandoned.

At the termination of the Census of 1851, the late Dr. Lyons, then M.P. for Dublin, pressed the Government to institute an inquiry into names, such as had been attempted in 1851, and his proposal was very favourably entertained, but as the work of the Census Department was then about to close, the Commissioners were unable to comply with his request.

It may be observed that as a preliminary to any successful effort to tabulate the Surnames in the country, some codification of the variations in form and spelling was necessary. With this and other objects in view, from the materials collected during many years in the General Register Office, as well as special reports obtained from local officers in the Registration Service, I prepared in 1890 a treatise entitled "Varieties and Synonymes of Surnames and Christian Names in Ireland," which was issued by the Registrar-General for use in connection with searches in his Office, and in those of the Superintendent Registrars and Registrars throughout the country.

That book set forth the principal orthographical changes in Surnames, exhibiting the varieties in spelling; the use of prefixes and affixes; spelling according to usual pronunciation; older forms of names showing the alterations they have undergone in course of time; local variations in spelling and form, exhibiting the tendency of names to assume different forms in different localities; variations in spelling at pleasure; and changes owing to illiteracy and other causes.

It further contained examples of the use of entirely different names interchangeably by the same person, a practice which prevails in some parts of Ireland, many being cases of translation of Irish names into English, or vice versa, or equivalents, modifications, or corruptions of them. A table was also given showing cases of English names and their Irish equivalents met with in the

Registration Records. The work also contained an Alphabetical List of Surnames, with their Varieties and Synonymes, and a Table showing the respective Poor Law Unions and Districts in which many of the peculiarities had been found.

The reception which that book met with at the hands of the Press and the Public was very gratifying, and I determined to attempt, in connection with the Census of 1891, the interesting work of extracting and classifying the Surnames of the population generally on the lines unsuccessfully followed in 1851. An unexpected occurrence, however, prevented this. The Census Records which previously afforded complete data for the purpose were, in 1891, rendered imperfect in this respect, owing to the insertion of a clause in the Act of Parliament, directing that in the case of inmates of Public Institutions, initials only should be given in the Enumeration Forms.

The Surnames of a considerable number of persons were thus omitted from these Records, and the question arose whether with these imperfect data, the work should be abandoned, or whether the general results could not be obtained with sufficient accuracy from other sources.

The Indexes of the General Register Office afford a reliable basis on which to found general conclusions regarding Surnames, and though in the Index for any one year all the Surnames in the country will not be found, yet if a name be of frequent occurrence it is certain to be represented in the Index, the number of entries opposite the name indicating its relative frequency with respect to other Surnames.

The Indexes further afford facilities for distributing the Surnames over the country, as in the case of each entry the Poor Law Union is given.

In view of these facts, I decided to take these Indexes as the basis of my inquiries, and I was confirmed in my determination by the opinion of that eminent scholar, the late Right Rev. Dr. Reeves, Lord Bishop of Down, Connor, and Dromore, and President of the Royal Irish Academy, who encouraged me to undertake the task, and promised me his cordial assistance. His lamented death, however, unhappily deprived me of the benefit of his valuable aid and advice.

I may mention that both in England and Scotland the subject of personal nomenclature has received attention, and statistics relating thereto, derived from the Indexes of Births, Deaths, and Marriages, have been published by the respective Registrars-General, to which I shall further refer.

I have divided the consideration of the subject as follows:—

- 1st. The principal Surnames in Ireland compared with those in other portions of the United Kingdom.
- 2nd. The Derivation of Surnames in Ireland.
- 3rd. Surnames in Ireland Ethnologically considered.
- 4th. The Local Distribution of Surnames in Ireland.

CHAPTER II.

PRINCIPAL SURNAMEN IN IRELAND COMPARED WITH THOSE IN OTHER PORTIONS OF THE UNITED KINGDOM.

The following Table exhibits One Hundred of the Principal Surnames in Ireland (including varieties) arranged in order of numerical strength, together with the Estimated Number of Persons bearing each Name.

It will be seen from the foregoing Tables that the name "Murphy" stands first in Ireland, in order of numerical strength, representing an estimated number of 62,600 persons (or 18·3 per thousand of the population), and that in both England and Scotland the name "Smith" occupies the first place, representing, it is estimated, in England and Wales (in the year 1853) 253,600 persons (or 133 per thousand of the population), and in Scotland (in the year 1863) 44,300, or 14·2 per thousand of the population.

The second place on the Irish List is held by the name "Kelly," representing 55,900 persons (or 11·6 per thousand of the population). In the English Tables "Jones" has the second place, representing, it is estimated, 242,100 people (or 13·2 per thousand). It is the most common name in the Principality of Wales, and its prevalence there has given it the high place it occupies on the List for the country generally. The Registrar-General for England states that in some years the Joneses contributed to the registers a larger number of Births than even the Smiths. In Scotland the second place is held by "McDonald," the estimated population bearing the name being 38,600, or 11·6 per thousand.

The third place in Ireland is filled by "Sullivan," the number of persons of which name it is estimated amounts to 43,800 (or 9·2 per thousand). In England "Williams" is the third name in numerical importance, representing 159,900 persons (or 8·7 per thousand). In Scotland "Brown" stands third, reckoning 38,800 (or 10·9 per thousand).

Several names among the first Fifty on the Irish List appear on the Lists for one or both of the other Divisions of the Kingdom. Thus "Smith" is 5th in Ireland and 1st in England and Scotland; "Murray" is 18th in Ireland, and 17th in Scotland; "Moore" is 20th in Ireland, and 38th in England; "Wilson" is 26th in Ireland, 11th in England, and 8th in Scotland; "Campbell" is 31st in Ireland, and 7th in Scotland; "Clarke" (or "Clark") is 32nd in Ireland, 9th (taking both spellings) in England, and 18th in Scotland; "Johnston" appears 33rd in Ireland, and 16th in Scotland; "Hughes" appears 34th in Ireland, and 19th in England; "Brown" is 37th in Ireland, 6th in England, and 3rd in Scotland; "Martin" is 38th in Ireland, 31st in England, and 48th in Scotland; "Thompson" or "Thomson" is 42nd in Ireland, 15th in England, and 4th in Scotland; "White" is 50th in Ireland, 22nd in England, and 41st in Scotland.

It will also be observed that among the second fifty names on the Irish List, several appear in the first fifty of England or Scotland. Thus,—"Stewart" is 58th in Ireland, and 6th in Scotland; "Robinson," 73rd in Ireland, and 12th in England; "Ward" 75th in Ireland, and 30th in England; "Reid" 81st in Ireland, and 13th in Scotland; "Graham," 82nd in Ireland, and 40th in Scotland; "King" 85th in Ireland, and 36th in England; "Bell" 89th in Ireland, and 47th in Scotland; "Scott" 90th in Ireland, and 16th in Scotland; and "McDonald" which is 95th in Ireland, is 2nd in Scotland.

It will be perceived, however, that most of the names in Ireland with the larger numbers are peculiar to this country, representing the names of Irish Clans and Septs, such as the Murphys, Kellys, Sullivans, O'Briens, Byrnes, Ryans, Conaors, O'Neills, Reillys, Doyleys, McCarthys, Gallaghers, Dohertys, &c.

The Scotch Clans are similarly represented in the List for Scotland, such as the McDonalds, McKenzies, McGregors, M'Leods, M'Kays, Campbells, Stewarts, Camerons, &c.

CHAPTER III.

DERIVATION OF SURNAMES.

The consideration of the Derivation of Surnames forms an interesting branch of study, but it would be impossible within the limits of this Report to enter fully into the subject, and all that can be attempted is to give a brief summary of its main sub-divisions as applicable to this Country.

Surnames in Ireland may be divided with reference to their derivation into six classes, viz:—

1. FROM PERSONAL NAMES.
2. FROM RANK OR OCCUPATION.
3. FROM THE ANIMAL, VEGETABLE, AND MINERAL KINGDOMS.
4. FROM LOCALITY.
5. FROM PERSONAL PECULIARITIES OR ATTRIBUTES.
6. OTHER SURNAMES.

1. The following Examples may be given of Surnames derived from Personal names:—

6. Other Surnames.—There are many surnames not falling in any of the above classes, such as those from:—

Parts of the Body (Celtic Names)—Kinnary (*cinne*—Irish—a bone); McOosh (*os*—Irish—a foot); McClave (*clava*—Irish—the hand); (English Names)—Beard, Foots, Head, Leggs.

Names of the Seasons, as Spring, Summer, Winter.
Points of the Compass, as North, South, East, West.
Natural Objects, as Field, Flood, Hill, Snow.
Other Sources, as Church, Ferry, Hood, Hunt, Kirk.

It may be interesting to quote here the remarks of the Registrar-General for England and Wales regarding the derivation of Family Names found in those countries.

Major Graham remarked in his 16th Annual Report, already referred to:—"The most striking circumstance presented by the Index is the extraordinary number and variety of the surnames of the English people. Derived from almost every imaginable object, from the names of places, from trades and employments, from personal peculiarities, from the Christian name of the father, from objects in the Animal and Vegetable kingdoms, from things animate and inanimate; their varied character is as remarkable as their singularity is often striking. Some of the terms which swell the list are so odd, and even ridiculous, that it is difficult to assign any satisfactory reason for their assumption in the first instance as family names, unless indeed, as has been conjectured, they were nicknames or soubriquets, which neither the first bearers nor their posterity could avoid."

Referring to Welsh surnames he stated:—"In Wales, however, the surnames, if surnames they can be called, do not present the same variety, most of them having been formed in a simple manner from the Christian or fore-name of the father in the Genitive case, *son* being understood. Thus, Evan's son became *Ewans*, John's son *Jones*, &c. Others were derived from the father's name conjoined with a form of the word *ap* or *hau* (son of), by which Hugh *ap* Howell became *Powell*, Evan *ap* Hugh became *Pugh*, and in like manner were formed nearly all the Welsh surnames beginning with the letters B and P. Hereditary surnames were not in use even amongst the gentry of Wales until the time of Henry VIII. nor were they generally established until a much later period; indeed, at the present day they can scarcely be said to be adopted amongst the lower classes in the wilder districts, where, as the marriage registers show, the Christian name of the father still frequently becomes the patronymic of the son in the manner just described."

With respect to Cornish names the Report states:—"From the circumstance of their common British origin it might be supposed that the Welsh people and the inhabitants of Cornwall would exhibit some analogous principles in the construction of their surnames; such, however, is not the case. The Cornish surnames are mostly local, derived from words of British root, and they are often strikingly peculiar. A large number have the prefix *Tre*, a town; the words *Pol*, a pool, *Pen*, a head, *Roe*, a heath, and *Lan*, a church, are also of frequent occurrence in surnames."

With regard to the derivation of names in Scotland, the Registrar-General for that country in his 6th Report, remarks:—"Almost all the names of our Border and Highland Clans belong to the first class [Surnames derived from Patronymics], "and they are peculiarly Scottish, neither belonging to England nor to Ireland. These Surnames include all those beginning with *Mac*, as *Macgregor*, *Macaggart*, &c. besides those simple ones, as *Frazer*, *Douglas*, *Cameron*, *Kerr*, *Grant*, &c. . . . "The Surnames derived from rank and occupation are very numerous, but are equally common to England as to Scotland." . . . "Surnames taken from the locality in which the persons originally resided form a very numerous class, and they also are, to a great extent, peculiar to Scotland, seeing that there is scarcely a county, parish, town, river, or remarkable locality but has its name perpetuated in the Surnames." . . . "The soubriquets perpetuated as Surnames are, perhaps, the most varied of all, and embrace every personal or mental quality supposed to reside in the different individuals to whom they were originally given."

The personal Names in the Isle of Man are of considerable interest in connection with Irish Surnames, as that Island has passed through phases of occupancy somewhat similar to those of this country. Its history may be divided into three periods: the first, when it was inhabited by Celts similar in race and language to the Irish; the second, the period of Scandinavian domination; and the third, the time during which it has been under English dominion. The names in the Island represent each of these periods. As in Ireland, the largest number of names are derived from words of Celtic origin; some are from Scandinavian roots, and there are now a large number of names traceable to English sources.

On visiting the Island, I was much struck by the peculiar forms many names had assumed there differing from those found in Ireland, though evidently derived from the same source. Thus, the name "*Cluse*" is the Manx form of *Lucas*, both names being derived from the Celtic *MacLucas*—son of Luke. "*Cannell*," a name peculiar to the Isle of Man, is derived from the Celtic *MacConall*—son of Conall. The Irish modern form is *McConnell*.

"*Kermode*," another Manx name, is contracted from the Celtic name *MacDiarmuid*, son of *Diarmuid*—Irish modern form *McDermott*. "*Mylchreest*" is derived from the Celtic *MacGiolla Chreest*—the son of the servant of Christ. The modern Irish form is *Gilchrist*. Many other instances could be adduced.

CHAPTER IV.

SURNAME IN IRELAND ETHNOLOGICALLY CONSIDERED.

CELTIC NAMES.

The present population of Ireland is a mixture of a number of different races in which the Celtic is the predominant element.

The great bulk of the most common names in the country are undoubtedly of Celtic origin. Many of them still retain the prefixes O and Mac, the former peculiar to Ireland and the latter used both in Ireland and Scotland. In many cases, however, these prefixes have been dropped. It is a matter of common occurrence to find in the same record Celtic names written with the prefixes O and Mac and without them.

It is impossible now, in some cases, to trace whether families are of Celtic or English descent, as some of the English settlers took Irish names, and Irish families were compelled to adopt English surnames.

By a Statute of 1366, it was provided, *inter alia*, that "Every Englishman do use the English language, and be named by an English name, leaving off entirely the manner of naming used by the Irish"; and in 1465 (5 Ed. IV., cap. 3), a law was passed enacting "that every Irishman that dwelle betwixt or amongst Englishmen in the County of Dublin, Myeth, Vriell, and Kildare . . . shall take to him an English Surname of one town, as Sutton, Chester, Trym, Skryno, Corke, Kinzale; or colour, as white, blacks, browne; or arte or science, as smith or carpenter; or office, as cooke, butler . . ."

The existence of the two languages in the country accounts for the practice which prevails in some parts of Ireland of using English names with their Irish translations or equivalents interchangeably, some particulars regarding which will be found in my Book of Varieties and Synonymes of Surnames and Christian Names in Ireland already referred to.

The Annals of the Four Masters, and other eminent Authorities, afford information whereby the ancient location of the principal Irish Tribes and Septs can be approximately ascertained, and Tribal Maps of Ireland have been published from time to time, among which the following may be mentioned:—

1. A Map shewing the territories of the Irish Princes and Chiefs—the various Septs subordinate to them, &c., also the Districts in possession of the English Lords, their armorial bearings, &c., A.D. 1567.

By comparing the foregoing Lists with the Tables at the end of this Report, it can be seen how far these families are at present represented in the localities formerly inhabited by them and in the country at large. The above Tables, however, exhibit the information for counties proper, whereas the Tables on pages 27-29 and 31-73 are compiled by Registration Counties, i.e., groups of entire Poor Law Unions most nearly representing the area of the county proper. The differences are for the most part slight, but in a few instances the name may be found in the county proper immediately adjoining.

It will be seen that some of these names have spread all over Ireland, such as Murphy, Kelly, Kennedy, Maguire, Quinn, &c. Some of these Families have disappeared, or have migrated to another part of the country, or their names have become so altered in process of time as to be incapable of identification.

In many cases, however, the descendants of the ancient families are still domiciled in the same tracts as their forefathers, as shown in the following instances:—

The MacCubes were a warlike clan originally from County Monaghan, but subsequently settled in County Cavan. At the present time they are largely represented in the population of each of these counties.

The MacCarthys were anciently Kings and Princes of Desmond, Southern Munster, i.e., County Cork, the greater part of Kerry, and portions of Waterford and Tipperary. The MacCarthys are now resident principally in the Counties of Cork, Kerry, and Limerick, more than half of them being found in County Cork.

The MacDermotts were ancient Princes of Moyburg, having their territories in the Barony of Boyle, County Roscommon, and parts of the Parishes of Islandeady, Turlough and Breaflay, in Counties Sligo and Mayo. Their chief fortress was on an island in Lough Key, near Boyle, and they were hereditary Marshals of Connaught. At the present time Connaught is the province in which the MacDermotts are principally found, and half of the persons of the name in that province belong to County Roscommon.

The Munster MacMahons formerly possessed the greater part of the Baronies of Moyarta and Clonderlaw, in the County Clare, in which county the predominant name now is McMahon.

The O'Byrnes anciently possessed the greater part of the Barony of Ballinacor, County Wicklow, and were powerful Chiefs in that part of the country. Byrne is the leading name now in the Counties of Wicklow, Dublin, and Louth.

The original habitat of the O'Driscolls was the Barony of West Carbery, in County Cork, where O'Driscoll was Lord of Baltimore, and possessed the Island of Cape Clear and adjacent territory. The great majority of the present Driscolls are to be found there.

The O'Doghertyys were a powerful Sept in County Donegal, and were located in Inishowen Barony, of which O'Dogherty was Lord. The Doghertyys or Dohertyys are numerous represented there at the present time.

The O'Flahertyys were originally located in the Barony of Clare, County Galway, but in the thirteenth century, having been expelled from this territory, they settled in the Barony of Moycullen, and were styled Lords of Iar Conacht or West Connaught. A large number of the Flahertyys are now to be found in the Baronies of Moyvelin, Ross, and Ballinahinch, in County Galway.

The O'Gallaghers were a warlike Clan in the Baronies of Raphoe and Tírugh, County Donegal. As will be seen from the Table on page 28, Gallagher is now the most numerous represented name in County Donegal.

In ancient times the O'Keefes were Marshals and chief military leaders of Desmond. They possessed several castles, and were styled Princes of Fermoy. The principal county for the Keefes and O'Keefes at present is Cork.

The O'Mahonyys were anciently located in Cork and Kerry, where they were powerful Chiefs and sometimes styled Princes. They had several castles along the sea-coast. In County Cork an O'Mahony was Lord of Ivaugh, in the Barony of West Carbery, and an O'Mahony was Chief in Kinsalea Barony. In County Kerry there was a Chief of the name in the Barony of Iveragh, and there were O'Mahonyys in the Barony of Clannmaurice. The majority of persons of the name of Mahony or O'Mahony are still found in these two counties.

The O'Malleyys were celebrated Chiefs whose territory comprised the present Baronies of Murrisk and Burreishole in the County Mayo. The Malloys and O'Malleyys are now located principally in the two baronies named, and in that of Erris, in County Mayo.

The O'Meagherys were formerly powerful Chiefs possessing the Barony of Ikerrin, in County Tipperary, of which O'Meagher was Lord. The Meaghers or Mahers are principally found in the County Tipperary at present.

The O'Mearas had an extensive territory in the Barony of Upper Ormond, County Tipperary, in which O'Meara was a Chief. The name of their principal residence, Tuam-ri-Meara, is still retained in the town of Teamyvara. The Mearas or O'Mearas are still numerous in that locality.

The name Moriarty is now largely represented in County Kerry, in which county the O'Moriartyys were Chiefs in the Barony of Dunkerron.

O'Mulvey was a Chief in the Barony of Mohill, County Leitrim, in which county about 50 per cent. of persons bearing the name Mulvey are now found.

The name Noonan occurs chiefly in Cork, in which county the O'Noonans formerly dwelt. O'Noonan was a Chief in Duballow Barony, and there were O'Noonans in Barrymore and Kinsalea Baronies.

There were two branches of the O'Byans or O'Mulrians—the Carlow branch, in which county O'Ryan was Prince of Idrome—and the Tipperary branch, in which county one O'Ryan was Lord of Ownay and Arra, and another Chief of Bocrisoleigh. They also had possessions in County Limerick. The Ryans are now found in the Counties of Carlow, Kilkenny, Limerick, and Tipperary, the last county having by far the largest number. The Ryans of Tipperary are in some places so numerous that they are distinguished in the records by additional names appended to the surnames, such as—Ryan (Bawa); Ryan (Backly); Ryan (Cooper); Ryan (Cormack); Ryan (Cornoy); Ryan (Dalton); Ryan (Dan); Ryan (Jack); Ryan (James); Ryan (Larry); Ryan (Ned); Ryan (Owen); Ryan (Russell); Ryan (Tim Daniel).

There were several branches of the O'Sullivan family; one was located in County Cork where they were Princes of Bears, now Bere and Benry Baronia, and were called O'Sullivan (Bears). Another (O'Sullivan Mor), occupied portion of County Kerry, where they were Lords of Dunkarroc. At the present time the Sullivans and O'Sullivans are most numerous in the Counties of Cork and Kerry.

The O'Toolas were celebrated Princes of Inalle, in County Wicklow, and had their seat in the Glen of Inalle which still retains that name. Their power extended into County Kildare. A considerable number of Toolas are still resident in the County Wicklow.

DANISH NAMES.

From the Ninth to the Twelfth Centuries the Ostmen or Danes came to Ireland and established themselves on the seaboard. They founded the Kingdom of Dublin A.D. 852, and their chief towns were Dublin, Wexford, Waterford, Cork, and Limerick. Some of the surnames now in use are traceable to Danish origin. Amongst these may be mentioned Betagh, Coppinger, Dowdall, Drumgoole or Drumgoole, Gould, Harold, Palsar, Plunkett, Skiddy, Sweetman (Swedeman), Trant, &c. The name "Ost" is met with in County Wicklow.

Dr. MacDermott, in his annotations to the Annals of Ireland by the Four Masters, states:—"Many families of Danish origin took Irish surnames, prefixing O and Mac, so that their descent cannot now be ascertained, and several of their chiefs took Irish Christian names, particularly that of Patrick in honour of the patron saint of Ireland. The Danes and Norwegians being in possession of Dublin and some other parts of the country, and having maintained their colonies there for more than 300 years, there is consequently much of Danish blood in the Counties of Dublin and Meath, particularly in Fingall, and there are many families of Danish descent mixed by intermarriages with the old Milesian Irish."

ANGLO-NORMAN NAMES.

The circumstances connected with the Anglo-Norman invasion need not be referred to here. It suffices to say that through it the second great graft on our Celtic stock took place, many of our present surnames, notwithstanding the changes in form and spelling which time has wrought in them, being traceable to an Anglo-Norman source. As examples the following may be given:—

Barry, Bellew, Birmingham, Burke, Casew, Clara, Cogan, Dalton, Darcy, De Courcy, Delamere, Dillon, FitzEustace (Eustace), Fitzgerald, Fitzhenry, Fitzmaurice, Fitzmaurice, Fitzstephen, Gannon, Grace, Hussey, Keating, Lacy, Le Poer, Marshall, Mountmorancy, Mortimer, Nangle, Nugent, Petri, Prendergast, Purcell, Roche, Staunton, Taffe, Talbot, Tuitt, Tyrrell, Verdon, Vesay.

Dr. MacDermott, in a note to the "Annals of the Four Masters," states:—"The following Anglo-Norman or English families adopted Irish surnames:—The de Burges or Burkes, of Connaught, took the name of MacWilliam, and some of them that of MacPhilip; the de Angulos or Nangles, of Meath and Mayo, changed the name to MacCostello; the de Erolera, of Mayo, to MacJordan; the Barretts, of Mayo, to MacWatlin; the Stauntons, of Mayo, to M'Avoley; . . . the de Berminghams, of Connaught and other places, to MacFeorain, or Peorals; . . . the Fitzsimmons, of the King's County, to MacRuddery; . . . the Poers, of Kilkenny and Waterford, to MacSbere; the Butlers, to MacPierce; the Fitzgeralds, to MacThomas and MacManrico; the de Courcys, of Cork, to MacPatrick; the Barrys, of Cork, to MacAdam; and many others, in like manner."

ENGLISH NAMES.

Large numbers of English came to Ireland from the 12th to the 18th century, and from these sources the great bulk of the English names now found in Ireland are derived. These names are very numerous, though in many cases, as compared with the old Celtic names, they represent but a small number of persons.

The following are a few specimens of English names numerously represented:—

Adams; Andrews; Arnold; Ashe; Atkinson; Baker; Barr; Barton; Bates; Bennett; Berry; Bingham; Bolton; Bradshaw; Brooks; Canning; Carlisle; Carter; Christy; Cooper; Cox; Crose; Downes; Edwards; English; Field; Fisher; Freeman; Goodwin; Hall; Harper; Harris; Harrison; Hawthorne; Henry; Hewitt; Hill; Holmes; Hopkins; Hunt; Hunter; Jackson; Jenkins; Johnson; Johnston; Kidd; King; Lamb; Lane; Little; Long; Mitchell; Morton; Nash; Osborne; Pearson; Richardson; Roberts; Robinson; Selmon; Shaw; Short; Simpson; Small; Somers; Swan; Taylor; Thornton; Turner; Walker; Wall; Waters; Watson; Webb; Webster; West; White; Woods; Wright.

CORNISH NAMES.

Some Cornish or Briton names are also found in Ireland, such as Jagoe, Lanyon, Pascoe, Pender, Pender, Peurose, Treddenick, Trellian, Trevalyn, Vivian, &c.

WELSH NAMES.

Welsh immigrants also found their way into Ireland. The name "Welsh"—Irish, *Brannagh* or *Breathnach*, a Briton or Welshman—occurs in early times in the counties of Cork, Dublin, Kerry, Kilkenny, Tipperary, Waterford, Wexford, and Wicklow; and at the present day the name is largely represented in nearly every county in Ireland, especially in Cork, Mayo, Waterford, Galway, Dublin, and Wexford. According to some ancient authorities, Welshmen of the following names settled in Ireland after the English Invasion:—Howell, Lawless, Lillis, Llynagh, Llynott, and Merrick.

A remarkable colony from Wales, yet not consisting solely or even mainly of Welsh, was formed at an early date in the Baronies of Forth and Bargo, county Wexford. It is supposed to have been a settlement made at the time of the Norman Invasion. The interest in this colony is centred in the fact that it continued to exist separate from the native Irish, and maintained its peculiarities, character, and language down to a recent period; and traces of its special characteristics are still to be found.

Reference is made to this colony in a series of returns supplied to Sir William Petty, written about 1680. In them it is stated "they preserve their first language and almost only understand the same unless elsewhere educated." Also that "they observe the same form of apparel their predecessors first used," which is, "according to the English mode, of very fine exquisitely dressed frize, combs, but not collie; that they involuntarily profess and maintain the same faith and form of religion," and that "they seldom dispose of their children in marriage but unto natives or such as will determine to reside in the Barony." Several peculiar customs and usages of the colony are also detailed in the returns referred to.

In 1788 General Vallancey visited the colony and embodied the result of his researches in a paper which is printed in the Second Volume of the *Transactions of the Royal Irish Academy*, and in which he gives a specimen of the old dialect of the colony.

His remarks:—"This Colony have preserved their ancient manners, customs, and language; and fully occupying every inch of ground, the natives could never obtain a re-establishment therein. As population increased some of the English have been obliged to remove into the neighbouring baronies within these fifty years, and by an intercourse with the Irish the language of these emigrants became corrupted, and these by their connection with their kindred remaining in the baronies of Bargo and Forth have in some measure introduced this corrupted dialect there."

He mentions, amongst the names of the old colonists at that date—"Hore," "Cod," "Stafford," "Whitty," "Roesiter," "Simott," "Stephen," "Quincy," and "Walsh."

In Hall's Ireland also (published in 1841), there are references to this interesting colony.

Mr. and Mrs. S. C. Hall observe:—"The baronies of Bary and Forth, which extend along the coast from the Bay of Bannow to the Bay of Wexford, form perhaps the most singular and remarkable district of Ireland, its inhabitants being to this day 'a peculiar people.' . . . The peninsular position of these baronies—the sea on the one side, and the mountain of Forth on the other—contributed, no doubt in a great degree, to the safety and stability of the Colony; yet had it not been for the numerous castles, or, more properly speaking, 'fortalices,' the ruins of which form so remarkable a feature in the landscape, the courage and daring of the native Irish would have caused their extermination. Over a surface of about 40,000 acres there are still standing the remains of fifty-nine such buildings; and the sites of many more can be still pointed out."

A paper on the subject of the dialect of the Barony of Forth was read by the Right Rev. Dr. Russell, late President of Maynooth College, at the Dublin Meeting of the British Association in August, 1857.

After an examination of the fragments of the language extant he states:—"I venture, therefore, to conclude that the barony of Forth language is a lineal descent of the English introduced by the first settlers, modernized in its forms, and also, though in a less degree, in its vocabulary."

Dr. Russell also remarks—"Like Irish in what used to be the Irish-speaking districts, the Forth language has become unfashionable in Forth itself, and the young generation are unwilling even to acknowledge an acquaintance with it, much less to employ it as a medium of ordinary intercourse."

Dr. Mitchell, Inspector of Registration, who visited the locality in June last, states:—"There is a very great change over the face of this district since Mr. and Mrs. S. C. Hall—50 years ago—described its inhabitants as still 'a peculiar people.' The change is easily explained by the opening up of the whole country—the district markets—and the facilities for travel afforded by railway train and steamboat. There is no doubt, I think, that the present inhabitants are largely the offspring of intermarriage with native Irish. It is only among the most illiterate that any considerable number of words of their old dialect is now used. Of the surnames given by Vallancey two, viz., Stephen and Quincey, appear to have died out in these Baronies, and others have spread all over the county and beyond. The names Codd, Stafford, Sinnott, Hore, Rosciter, and Walsh are very common in the town of Wexford."

SCOTTISH NAMES.

From an early period there were migrations of Scotch from Scotland to Ireland where they settled in Ulster, but the formal Plantation of Ulster took place in the seventeenth century. The majority of these settlers were Scotch.

On reference to the Table at the end of this Report the very frequent occurrence of Scotch names in the Province of Ulster will be seen. The following may be given as examples—Stewart, Campbell, Scott, Miller, McKenzie, Ross, McKay, Peterson, Fraser, Morrison, Cameron, McIntosh, McGregor, Kerr, Graham, Sinclair, Gordon.

HUGUENOT NAMES.

Representatives of other races have from time to time settled in this country; prominent amongst these may be mentioned the French and Flemish Huguenots. The Irish Parliament in 1674 passed an Act granting letters of naturalization to the refugees. The Duke of Ormonde, then Viceroy, patronized them, and through his instrumentality, colonies of them were founded at Dublin, Kilkenny, Portarlington, Waterford, Cork, and Lisburn.

They started manufactures of silk, gloves, lace, cloth, and linen. The manufacture of "Irish Poplin" in the Liberties of Dublin had its origin with these industrious foreigners, and in the north of Ireland they established the manufacture of linen and cambric.

Many Huguenot names are still amongst us; the following may be given as examples—Barré, Blaquiere, Boileau, Chaigneau, Du Bedet, Champion, Chenevix, Corcollis, Crommelin, Delacherois, Drelicourt, Dubouffieu, Du Cros, Fleury, Gauszen, Logier, Guerin, Hazard (Hazard), La Touche, Le Ferre, Lefroy, Lefau, Matarin, Perrin, Sourin, Trench, Des Vignolles.

I have been furnished by Dr. Mitchell with the following notes regarding the Huguenot settlement in Portarlington at present:—

"There is at the present time (June, 1893) in the Townland of 'Doerpark' near Portarlington, a colony of men of pure Huguenot descent."

"Mr. Smiles, in his book on 'The Huguenots' (1867), states, the Blancs, butchers, transmitted the business from father to son for more than 150 years, and they are still recognisable at Portarlington under the name of 'Blong.' Not only is this so, but there are three families of them there now, two of which have retained (or returned to) the original spelling of the surname Blanc—as can be seen in our Register Books, and the trade of butchering is still followed by the family."

"The Medical Officer of Cloneygowan Dispensary District, Dr. Tabuteau, represents another Portarlington Huguenot family, and his father, the late Dr. Tabuteau (now eighteen years dead), remembered the time when Divine service was conducted in French. The surnames Boileau and Des Voaux have disappeared from this locality only a few years ago. General Boileau and Major Des Voaux with their families having left Portarlington. There is an aged carpenter here, 'Le Combre,' of pure Huguenot descent, so that this name also, as well as another, 'Champ,' may be added to the list. The 'Corcellis' family now spell it Corcella, and the full surname 'Des Vignolles' still occurs."

GERMAN PALATINATE NAMES.

In the Eighteenth Century there was a German migration into Ireland from the Palatinates of the Rhine. In 1709 a fleet was sent to Rotterdam by Queen Anne, which brought over about 7,000 of these refugees to England. About 3,000 were sent to North America, where they settled in Pennsylvania and North Carolina. The remainder, except a few families which remained in England, came over to Ireland, and settled principally in the County of Limerick. They were allowed eight acres of land for each man, woman, and child, at 5s. an acre, and the Government engaged to pay their rent for twenty years. They were an industrious and frugal race, but their numbers were subsequently largely reduced by emigration to America, and at the present day but few, comparatively, remain.

Ferrar, the historian of Limerick, describes thus this German Colony as it existed in 1780:—"The Palatinates preserve their language, but it is declining; they sleep between two beds; they appoint a burgomaster to whom they appeal in all disputes. They are industrious men, and have leases from the proprietor of the land at reasonable rents; they are, consequently, better fed and clothed than the generality of Irish peasants. Besides, their mode of husbandry and crops are better than those of their neighbours. They have by degrees left off their sour kront, and feed on potatoes, milk, butter, oaten and wheaten bread, some meat and fowls, of which they rear many. * * * The women are very industrious * * *. Besides their domestic employments and the care of their children, they reap the corn, plough the ground, and assist the men in everything. In short the Palatinates have benefited the county by increasing tillage, and are a laborious, independent people, who are mostly employed on their own small farms."

Mr. and Mrs. S. C. Hall describe the "Palatinates" in 1840 as "different in character, and distinct in habits from the people of the country." They state:—"The eldest of the family preserve in a great degree the language, customs, and religion of their old country; but the younger mingle and marry with their Irish neighbours."

Dr. Mitchell has kindly furnished me with the following remarks regarding the present condition of this colony:—

"I find, by personal inquiries made on the spot (May, 1893), that Palatinates bearing the following surnames at the present time occupy farms in and round Court Matrix, Bellingran, and Killibeen:—Baker, Bovanizer, Bowen (Adam Bowen was one of my informants, interviewed on his own 8 (Irish) acre farm near Court Matrix), Doabe (pronounced 'Dobe'), Delmago (or his own 8 (Irish) acre farm near Court Matrix), Gilliard, Lotchford, Ligier (pronounced 'Leg-lar,' as they themselves pronounce it), Gilliard, Lotchford, Ligier (pronounced 'Reinart'); Rattle, with the 'g' hard), Millar, Ludwig, Modlar, Pyppe, Reynard (pronounced 'Reinart'); Rattle, Shire, Stark, Switzer (Jacob Switzer was another of my informants, whom I interviewed on his own 24-acre farm at Court Matrix), Teskey, Traversa."

"The above 19 names undoubtedly represent more than double that number of families in the localities specified above; several of them also occur at Adara. There are several families of the name 'Switzer,' several of the name 'Delmago,' and 'Rattle,' and so on."

"When I got to Askeston District, I found a Palatine name, 'Rattle,' on a signboard (a very

universal circumstance). Generally, Palatine sons succeed their fathers on the same farms originally allotted to their ancestors in 1709. And however those may have faded who have since left Co. Limerick for America, the Palatines here at present are tenant farmers, as a rule, like the original settlers, many of the 8-acre lots having been consolidated into larger farms.

"At Court Matrix, I saw the house of the Rev. Mr. Doube—a Palatine Clergyman at present stationed in Co. Wicklow. When I got to Pallaskeyry, I found along with some of the surnames already given, others, viz.:—Neazor, Heavenor, Smyth (spelled with a 'y' and originally 'Schmidt').

"The Christian names for males, Nehemiah, Christopher, Adam, Jacob, Jethro, Julius, Ebenezer, and for females—Dorothy, &c., are still of common occurrence.

"Differing originally in language (though even the oldest of the present generation know nothing of the German tongue, spoken or written), as well as in race and religion from the natives among whom they were planted, these Palatines still cling together like the members of a clan, and worship together. Most of them have a distinctly foreign type of features, and are strongly built, swarthy in complexion, dark-haired and brown-eyed. The comfortable houses built in 1709 are in ruins now. I traced, with Jacob Switzer's aid, the original "Square" of Court Matrix in the ruined walls still standing; I also traced in the very centre of this square the foundations of the little Meeting House in which John Wesley occasionally preached to them in the interval, 1750-1765. Modern houses stand there now, but not closely grouped together. They are all comfortable in appearance, some thatched, some slated, some of one storey, others of two. Nearly all have a neat little flower garden in front, and very many have an orchard beside, or immediately behind the house. There is all the appearance of thrift and industry among them."

JEWISH NAMES.

The last colony to which attention need be called is that resulting from the recent Jewish immigration. For many years Jews have been resident in Dublin and other chief cities in Ireland, but during the decade, 1881-90, their numbers were largely increased by the arrival of Russian and Polish Jews. Most of these have settled in Dublin, where, on the south side of the city, they have formed a Jewish Quarter, and opened several Synagogues. The Marriage and Birth Indexes of this Office now afford abundant evidence of their presence in our midst.

As shown by the Census Returns, they principally follow the occupations of—Commercial Clerks, Commercial Travellers, Drapers, Dressmakers, General Dealers, Merchants, Pedlars, Shop Assistants, Tailors and Tailoresses.

The following may be given as examples of the names of the Jewish Settlers:—

Though "Birthplace" is not an accurate test of nationality, it may be of interest to attach the following Table extracted from the Census of 1891, which shows the Birthplaces of the persons enumerated in Ireland according to each Census from 1841 to 1891:—

From this Table it will be seen that the number of persons resident in Ireland at the time of each Census, but born elsewhere, has largely increased at each decennial period.

CHAPTER V.

DISTRIBUTION OF SURNAMES.

In the Table at the end of this Report, will be found the Surnames in Ireland represented by five Entries and upwards in the Births Index for 1890, and the number of such Entries in each Province, together with notes as to their distribution by Counties. It was not deemed advisable to exhibit in tabular form the details in that Table by Counties, but the relative numerical strength of the principal Surnames in each Registration County is as follows* :-

It will be seen that although the name "Murphy" is the most numerous in the country at large, it does not occupy the leading place in many of the counties. In the Province of Leinster in two Counties only—Wexford and Carlow—does it stand first. With regard to this name in the former County, the Earl of Courtown in a recent paper on the "Colts and Tribes in Ireland," remarks as follows:—

"Murphy is the Anglicised form of MacMurrough, the old regal family of Leinster. On the death of Dermot MacMurrough, the last acknowledged King of Leinster, his rights, by English law, passed to his only legitimate child, Eva, wife of Richard de Clare, Earl of Pembroke, known as Strongbow. The legitimate male line was continued in the descendants of Dermot's brother Morrough, who continue to hold lands in North Wexford. This name is by far the most numerous in the county, and is found in every part of it."

In the counties of Dublin, Louth, and Wicklow, "Byrne" is the most common name, whereas in Kildare and King's County, "Kelly" heads the list. In Longford and Meath, "Reilly" is the principal name, and in Kilkenny, "Brennan." In Queen's County, "Dunne" appears at the head of the list, and in Westmeath, "Lynch."

In the Province of Munster, "Sullivan" is the predominant name in Cork and Kerry, followed, in the former county, very closely by the name "Murphy." "Ryan" heads the list in Limerick and Tipperary, while "McMahon" and "Power" are the leading names, respectively, in the counties of Clare and Waterford.

In the Province of Ulster in one county only, namely, Armagh, is the name "Murphy" in excess of the others. In Antrim, "Smith" appears first; in Cavan, "Reilly;" in Donegal, "Gallagher;" and in Down, "Thompson." The leading name in Fermanagh is "Maguire," and in Londonderry, "Doherty" stands at the head of the list. The principal names in Monaghan and Tyrone are "Duffy" and "Quinn," respectively.

In the Province of Connaught, in no one county does the name "Murphy" occupy the principal position. In Galway and Roscommon the name "Kelly" takes precedence, and in Leitrim that name and "Reynolds" are the first two on the list and equally represented. "Walsh" stands first in the county of Mayo, and "Brennan" heads the list in Sligo.

An interesting feature connected with the Table on pages 31 to 73, is the fact that it exhibits certain names as peculiar to particular provinces or counties. Some of these names may be found in other parts of the country, though not so represented in the Births Index for 1890.

Anglin, Bohane, Bransfield, Brickley, Bullman, Dullea, Horabrook, Keshane, Kidney, Lombard, Lorian, Lowney, Motherway, Northridge, Santry, Twobig, appear in the Index for Cork only; and Bowler, Brick, Courmace, Culloty, Currane, Kerrick, M'Crohan, M'Gillieuddy for Kerry. The surname Leo is peculiar to Limerick, and Dahill to Tipperary.

The following are found exclusively in Antrim:—Brick, Drain, Eder, Gaston, Kernohan, M'Killen, M'Murtry, M'Ninch, Meberg, Miskally, Mulvanna, O'Rawe, Picken, Quee, Richmond, Soaddy, Warwick, Weatherup, and Wharry.

Cartmill and M'Polin appear in Armagh only, and M'Givney in Cavan.

The names M'Geady, M'Gottigan, and M'Nells, have representatives in Donegal only; Jem and Lightbody in Down; M'Eldowney in Londonderry, and M'Ansey in Tyrone.

Gloherly, Derrane, Diskin, Faherty, Gorham, Grealish, Hara, and Welby, are found only in Galway. Dever, Forkin, Hoffree, Kilbane, Kilgallon, Kirrane, Kitterick, M'Andrew, M'Manamon, M'Nicholas, Mea, O'Horn, Rectigan, and Tougher, in Mayo only; and Guihen in Roscommon only.
