MAY IT PLEASE YOUR EXCELLENCY,

WE, the Local Government Board for Ireland, submit to your Excellency this, our Thirty-first Annual Report, under the Statute 35 and 36 Vic., Chap. 69, entitled "The Local Government Board (Ireland) Act, 1872."

We are glad to state that our continued efforts to expedite the compilation of our usual Statistical Tables, to be found in the Appendix, have proved so far successful that we are in a position to furnish our Report for the year ended 31st March, 1903, at, comparatively, a much earlier date than has been found possible in recent years. We hope to be able to effect further improvement, in this respect, in future Reports.

The difficulty, however, of completing the half-yearly or yearly examination of the accounts of the several local authorities, which involves the holding of over 1,100 separate audits, at a reasonably early date after the 31st March, the close of each financial year, continues to confront us, and we have again been obliged to adopt, in some instances, figures which, though no doubt substantially accurate, were not, at the time of the compilation of our statistics, certified by our Auditors.

This unavoidable delay in the holding of audits not merely causes us inconvenience in the preparation of our Report, but is distinctly detrimental to the interests of the local authorities. We have, therefore, had under our careful consideration certain measures calculated to improve our Audit system, so as to render it more prompt and effective for the discharge of the greatly increased duties and responsibilities imposed on us, and on our Audit staff, by recent legislation. We have not yet arrived at a final decision in the matter; but the temporary addition to our Auditorial staff referred to under the heading "Departmental Arrangements," at the

conclusion of this Report, has enabled us in some measure to reduce the arrears of Audit work, which have been causing us much anxiety.

LOCAL GOVERNMENT (IRELAND) ACTS.

1.—*General.*

The general administration of the Local Government Acts by County and District Councils continues, on the whole, to be satisfactory, and the manner in which the several local bodies transact their business calls for no special observations.

2.—*Finance.*

The collection of the rates for the past year has been efficiently carried out. In the majority of cases the full sums included in the warrants for collection have been lodged, and we note that County Councils who have hitherto only required their collectors to lodge what they have actually collected are beginning to realise the advantages of requiring these officers to pay in the entire sum they were authorised to collect. Under this system the Councils find themselves in a position to meet their liabilities with regularity. We are glad to be able to announce that no case has been brought to our notice during the year in which a County Council has been in want of funds to discharge their legitimate obligations.

3.—*Direct Labour Schemes.*

A number of County Councils have made declarations, and have formulated schemes for the maintenance of roads in their respective counties by a system of direct labour, under the supervision of the county surveyors. The declarations differ considerably in extent—in some cases a small number of roads being scheduled, while in others a substantial proportion of the roads in the county are included in the proposal. In one county the declaration embraces all the roads under the Council's control.

During the year under review two declarations and schemes have been formally approved by us. These declarations relate to roads in the counties of Limerick and Tipperary (North Riding), respectively.

In Limerick the Council will be in a position to work by direct labour all the roads in the county as they fall out of contract. The scheme in this case was very carefully considered and approved of after some modification in detail by us. The Council hope by working the roads in each Rural District in the county in sections, and thoroughly repairing and rolling them, that at the expiration of the period for which the declaration is in force (*viz.*, three years) the roads will be considerably improved, and that it will be possible to keep them in good order at a less expense.

As regards the North Riding of Tipperary the declaration includes a fair proportion of the more important roads in the county. We found, after inquiry, that this scheme could be approved without amendment, and there is every reason to anticipate that it will be found to work satisfactorily. Copies of the Orders approving these schemes will be found in the Appendix.*

We think it well to remark that, while every precaution is taken to examine the schemes formulated by County Councils so as to secure that they will work satisfactorily, so much necessarily depends on the manner in which the Councils administer the schemes, and on the capacity of each county surveyor and his staff for supervising considerable bodies of workmen so as to ensure that the roads are properly maintained, that we can only await the result of a year or two of practical experience of the schemes before venturing to pronounce them successful, or the reverse. Declarations and schemes have been made in the counties of Antrim, Cork, Kerry, Kilkenny, and the South Riding of Tipperary, but were not approved within the year under review. So far as we are aware, no other County Council contemplates immediately the making of a scheme and declaration, and the contract system will therefore continue to prevail in the greater part of Ireland.

4.—*Local Government (Ireland) Act, 1902.*

During the Autumn Session of Parliament last year an Act received the Royal Assent making important amendments in the law relating to local government in Ireland (2 Edw. 7, c. 38). Amongst other alterations further powers were given to us with regard to extending the time for the payment of overdue accounts out of the poor rate; with regard to the fixing of half-yearly, instead of quarterly, meetings of County and District Councils; and of making regulations for the audit of the accounts of public bodies in Ireland. Provision is also made for the recoupment to Boards of Guardians of Unions from the Local Taxation (Ireland) Account of half the remuneration paid to substitutes for medical officers and trained nurses of workhouses, and for medical officers of dispensary districts, while absent on vacation; and the Act also restricts the total amount which may be recouped in any year under Section 58 of the Local Government (Ireland) Act, 1898, to any County Council on behalf of the Guardians of any Union or any Rural District, or to any Urban District Council.

The law relating to the acceptance of tenders for public works has also been amended with a view to preventing the acceptance or approval of tenders for any fraudulent or improper purpose or object. A copy of the Act will be found in the Appendix.†

5.—*Accounts Orders.*

In pursuance of the powers given to us by the above-mentioned Act of last Session we have in preparation a General Order consolidating and amending the several Accounts Orders issued by us.

6.—*Financial Relations.*

During the past year a large number of applications from County and Urban District Councils for a revision of financial relations have been dealt with by us, and Orders have been made, in the majority of cases, with the object of removing inequalities and inequities found to exist. In coming to decisions on the various cases inquired into we have endeavoured to secure, as far as possible, uniformity in the county-at-large charges to be borne by Urban districts. In every instance Urban Districts were found to be unduly burdened in having to contribute their share of certain items of county expenditure in which they were not directly interested, while at the same time they were bound, out of their own resources, to meet the entire amount of practically identical expenses inside their districts. We have made Orders exempting the Urban Districts named therein from contributing to charges of this kind. Where the amendment of local Acts was called for we have, as far as possible, made only such changes as seemed to be imperatively required by the altered condition of affairs consequent on recent legislation.

Comparatively few cases remain to be dealt with, and in only one or two of these does the question of the alteration of local Acts arise.

7.—*Roads.*

We are glad to note that a number of County Councils are turning their attention to the question of improving the condition of their roads by steam rolling. In a few counties these rollers have been in use for a considerable time, and we trust that, as the Councils realise the great improvement which can be made in the roads by careful repair and rolling, the use of these machines will become general, and that the bad roads which are at present a reproach to so many County Councils will, in time, cease to exist.

II.—*POOR RELIEF.*1.—*Statistics.*

The usual detailed tabulated statements with reference to the administration of the Poor Laws will be found in the Appendices.

The figures denoting the expenditure under the Poor Relief Acts, which have hitherto appeared in our Annual Reports, represented on each occasion a full year's outlay, although a

considerable portion thereof remained to be discharged subsequent to the date on which the year expired. In carrying out this practice, the Union accounts, which are made up half-yearly, were frequently allowed to remain open for a considerable time after the close of each half-year in order that the entire expenditure incurred during the half-year might be included in them, but it has been found during the last few years that this procedure has been attended with disadvantage, as it greatly delayed the preparation of the accounts for the purpose of audit.

To remedy this, and similar inconvenience experienced in connection with the accounts of other local bodies subject to our audit, we have decided to follow the practice adopted in England of requiring that all accounts should be closed on the day on which the year, or half-year, as the case may be, terminates; and, in the month of March last, we communicated instructions to this effect to the local bodies concerned, in a circular letter which will be found printed in the Appendix.*

The Union accounts for the financial year ended on the 31st of March, 1903, which are tabulated in the Appendices to this Report, were, consequently, closed as from that date, and they do not include any of the expenditure incurred during the year which was discharged subsequent to the 31st of March.

In the circumstances, a comparison of the expenditure obtained from these accounts with that in our last Report is not made, but the following table contains certain aggregate figures of outlay in reference to Poor Law administration, which have been obtained from the accounts of 1903, and from the accounts dealt with in our last Report.

As regards the numbers relieved, it will be seen by the table that there was an increase in 1903 of 729 in the daily average number of persons receiving indoor relief in the infirmaries, and in the other portions of the workhouses.

The number of children boarded out of workhouses shows a decrease of 83, while the number in the two district schools of Trim and Glin exceeded the number in the previous year by four.

There was an increase of 390 in the daily average number of those on outdoor relief.

The Pauper Children (Ireland) Amendment Act, to which allusion was made in last Report, became law on the 22nd July, 1902. This Act gives a wider interpretation to the terms "orphan child" and "deserted child." The amended regulations which we issued consequent on the passing of this Act will be found in the Appendix.* As stated in our previous Report, the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury sanctioned the employment of a lady as an Inspector on the 7th March, 1902, and the appointment of a second Lady Inspector was authorized on the 5th November, 1902. The duties of these Inspectors are principally connected with the boarded-out and hired-out pauper children; but they also report upon the administration of the Infant Life Protection Act, 1897.

2.—*Nursing of the Sick.*

During the year we have, where necessary, continued to urge Boards of Guardians to improve their nursing arrangements, and we are glad to say that, in almost all the Workhouse Infirmaries and Fever Hospitals, the nursing and menial staffs have, on our representations, been strengthened. We are not yet, however, able to say that the Poor Law Infirmaries and Hospitals generally possess such nursing staffs as are desirable from the most enlightened point of view; but very great and most creditable improvements have taken place in this respect during the past few years, and Boards of Guardians no longer dispute the necessity of skilled nursing for the sick in the institutions under their charge.

While the number of nurses in many of the Workhouse Infirmaries is hardly sufficient, the number of helpers and attendants in some Unions is frequently excessive. In such cases it is possible that the helpers are, contrary to our order, employed on duties which properly appertain to nurses. Our Inspectors held some inquiries in the course of the year with a view to determining what nursing and menial staff were necessary in certain Union Infirmaries, and we have addressed the Guardians upon the subject; but we have delayed taking final action in the hope that, on reflection, the Guardians concerned

will recognise the necessity of making appointments to the nursing staff, so as to meet all reasonable requirements of the patients.

In connection with the question of the supply of trained nurses for Poor Law service, an important step was taken in this direction by the Guardians of Waterford Union and the Waterford County and City Infirmary Governing Body, who together drew up, and submitted for our approval, a joint scheme for the instruction and training of fully "trained nurses." The scheme is now in working order.

In the Lurgan and Londonderry Unions the Guardians have expended considerable sums in making alterations to provide suitable accommodation for their probationers and nursing staff. In the former Union a lady has been appointed as a resident Assistant Medical Officer, and in the latter Union an assistant Medical Officer for the special purpose of aiding in the training of the probationers as "qualified nurses." A similar scheme is also being inaugurated in the Newtownards Union, and will be undertaken when the necessary structural alterations in the Workhouse shall have been completed.

It has been reported to us that in some Unions it was the practice to retain persons as patients in Workhouse Infirmarys who no longer required medical or surgical treatment. We addressed a Circular Letter to the Boards of Guardians in Ireland on the subject, and we suggested that a medical inspection of the patients should be made periodically, with a view to the revision of the classification where the circumstances or condition of health of individuals had undergone a change. From returns subsequently obtained by us from the Medical Officers it appeared that there were in these hospitals many Aged and Infirm, Harmless Lunatics, Deaf and Dumb, or Deformed, classed as sick who ought, properly, to be classed as healthy. Many persons in these classes, provided they are not bed-ridden, only require ordinary care and attendance; and their presence in the Infirmary is, sometimes, a serious inconvenience, because of the want of sufficient accommodation, and also by reason of the demands made on the services of the nursing staff.

We have called for half-yearly returns to be supplied, in future, of the Hospital and Infirmary patients, and our Medical Inspectors will carefully examine the returns on the occasion of their inspections.

3.—*Lunatics and Idiots in Workhouses.*

We have repeatedly commented on the large number of lunatics maintained in Workhouses, owing to various causes, including the overcrowding of many of the District Lunatic Asylums, and we have pointed out that Workhouses cannot

properly be regarded as institutions for the reception, treatment, or custody of the insane. An unfortunate incident occurred during the year in connection with this matter. A lunatic inmate of a large urban workhouse, who had refused food, was hurried off in the ambulance, practically in a dying condition, to the Police Court, for committal to the Asylum, the Workhouse authorities being under the misconception that insane persons could only be removed from the establishment to the Asylum under a magistrate's warrant as "dangerous lunatics." In the case in question, though it was not alleged that the patient was violent or was dangerous, unless to himself through not taking food, the magistrates committed him to the Asylum, where he died shortly after admission. In view of the facts which came under our notice in connection with this case, we thought it advisable to address a Circular Letter* to the Boards of Guardians, explaining the law, and suggesting to them that they should endeavour gradually to reduce the number of insane in their Workhouse by making a selection of the worst cases, from time to time, and applying to the authorities of the County Lunatic Asylum for the necessary form of Admission (D). Many of the Boards of Guardians acted on these suggestions, and in one Union alone about fifty inmates were so removed to the Asylum. In other Workhouses smaller numbers were transferred, and at present, in some Workhouses there are not any lunatic inmates. Owing, however, to the want of sufficient accommodation in some Lunatic Asylums, many insane persons must continue to be maintained in Workhouses, until some method of dealing with the cases is adopted, such as is contemplated by Section 76 of the Local Government (Ireland) Act, 1898.

4.—*Amalgamation of Unions.*

This is one of the subjects referred to the Poor Law Reform Commission now sitting, and pending the receipt of their Report the question has been allowed to remain in abeyance.

5.—*Relief under the Poor Relief (Ireland) Act, 1851, (Medical Charities Act), 14 & 15 Vic., cap. 68.*

The Dispensary Districts now number 746, and have an average area of 27,273 statute acres; the authorised staff consists of 810 Medical Officers, 47 Compounders of Medicines, and 551 Midwives.

The usual tables for the year ended the 31st of March, 1903, will be found in the Appendix, but, as stated at page v., the figures given therein do not include any expenditure incurred during the year under review, which was discharged subsequent to the 31st of March. For the purpose, however, of enabling a comparison to be made with the expenditure for the previous year, the financial figures in the first column of the

We are aware that for some years past dissatisfaction has been expressed by Poor Law Medical Officers in regard to the remuneration for their services paid to them by Boards of Guardians, and that in many districts these officers have recently formed organisations, with the view of obtaining—(a) higher salaries, (b) an annual vacation of at least one month, (c) superannuation as a right, (d) an improved scale of fees for consultations and *locum tenens* duties.

We are in complete sympathy with those Boards of Guardians who desire to improve the conditions of the Poor Law Medical Service; and we are prepared, so far as lies in our power, to accede to any reasonable suggestions which may be put forward with that object, either by general revision of salaries, or otherwise. Due regard should be had not only to the admittedly just claims of many of the Medical Officers on the grounds of increased expense of living, but also to the taxable capacity of the different parts of the country, and to the possibility of the cost of this service continuing to increase in

the future as steadily as it has done in the past. It is doubtful whether this latter consideration, which forms so important a factor in determining the proper issue of this vexed question, is fully taken into account, and we deem it well, therefore, to indicate the chief figures and facts bearing on the matter.

(a.) *Salaries.*

The Act of 1851 has now been in force for half a century. The declaration of Dispensary Districts under Section 6 of the Act was commenced on the 30th December, 1851, and was completed on the 27th May, 1852. The First Annual Report of the Poor Law Commissioners under the Act contains a summary of the number of cases in which medical relief was afforded from the period of the opening of the respective Dispensaries to the 30th September, 1852. In the Second Annual Report will be found the figures in regard to the operations for a complete year—that ended on the 30th September, 1853; the then authorised staff was 776 Medical Officers, 38 Apothecaries, and 10 Midwives, and the total number of new cases for that year was 690,411; the total number of vaccinations was 43,332, the total number of dangerous lunatics certified was 480, and the total amount of the salaries of Medical Officers and temporary Medical Officers under Section 8 of the Act was £56,966. In the year ended the 31st March, 1903, the total number of medical relief cases was 592,521, and the total amount paid as salaries to the Medical Officers and temporary Medical Officers was £99,437. Taking the year ended the 30th September, 1853, as our basis, the subjoined statement shows the number of cases in which medical relief was afforded in Ireland during the decades 1853 to 1862, 1863 to 1872, 1873 to 1882, 1883 to 1892, and 1893 to 1902, the number of vaccinations performed at the Dispensaries and vaccination stations during these years, the number of dangerous lunatics examined and certified by the Medical Officers, and the total amounts paid as salaries to Medical Officers and temporary Medical Officers under Section 8 of the Act.

The above figures show a decrease of 20 per cent. in the number of medical relief cases attended during the decade 1893-1902, as compared with the decade 1853-1862; and, on the other hand, an increase in the remuneration paid for medical services of 53 per cent. The 13th Section of the Act of 1851 imposed upon the Medical Officer of each Dispensary District, as part of his ordinary duty, the obligation of vaccinating "all persons who may come to him for that purpose," and the 14th Section required him, without any further fee or reward, to examine and certify under the Statute in that behalf, as to the case of any dangerous lunatic brought before a Justice of the Peace in his district. Section 11 of the Vaccination Act of 1858 provided that, in addition to his salary, each Medical Officer should receive from the Board of Guardians the sum of one pound for every twenty cases of successful vaccination performed by him. A Medical Officer now receives, in pursuance of Section 6 of the Vaccination Amendment (Ireland) Act, 1879 (42 and 43 Vic., cap. 70), a fee of two shillings for every person successfully vaccinated or re-vaccinated by him at the Dispensary or the vaccination stations. Moreover, the two Justices of the Peace before whom an alleged dangerous lunatic is brought are empowered by Section 14 of the Lunatic Asylums (Ireland) Act, 1875 (38 and 39 Vic., cap. 67), to order payment of a fee and expenses to the Medical Officer, not exceeding in the whole the sum of £3 for his services in the case.

During the past year the fees of the Medical Officers amounted, for vaccinations, to £10,968, and for the examination of lunatics, to £3,036. The payments for the temporary services during the year amounted to £10,604; this sum includes the remuneration of the practitioners employed during the absence of the Medical Officers on vacation.

Under the Public Health Acts of 1874 and 1878 the Medical Officers of the several Dispensary Districts were constituted Medical Officers of Health, and the additional salaries paid to them for sanitary duties amounted, in the year ended the 31st March, 1903, to £15,232.

It will thus be seen that, whilst in 1853 there were no extra emoluments attached to the office of Medical Officer of a Dispensary District, he now receives, in addition to his salary as such, vaccination and lunacy fees, together with salary and other remuneration incidental to his office as Medical Officer of Health. The average payment to each Medical Officer out of the Union funds, in the year 1853, was £73 8s.; now it amounts, for the combined offices of Medical Officer and Medical Officer of Health, to £141 11s., exclusive of the fees for vaccinations and for the examination of lunatics, and also exclusive of the fees of the post of Registrar of Births, Deaths, and Marriages, which office is usually held by the Medical Officer.

The following is a synopsis of the periods of service, and the combined salaries of the Medical Officers holding office on the 31st March, 1903 :—

The existing salaries are, in many cases, unquestionably small, especially in some large Rural Dispensary Districts, where little private practice can be obtained. It was never intended, however, that the salary of a Dispensary Medical Officer should be a remuneration for his whole time; it was given to secure a first claim upon his services for the sick poor of his Dispensary District, and, unlike the other officers of Unions, it is not necessary, in the case of a Medical Officer, that he should have devoted his whole time to the services of the Union in order that he may qualify, on retirement, for a superannuation allowance.

The enormous diminution in the population of this country from 6,552,065 in 1851, to 4,458,775 in 1901, and the consequent falling off in the amount of work performed by the Dispensary Medical Officers, tend to support the opinion which we have formed, that in many Unions a reduction of the staff of Medical Officers is not only feasible, but is called for by the altered local circumstances. Moreover, the abolition of a Medical Officership enables a Board of Guardians, without adding to the charges on the Union funds, to deal liberally in regard to extra remuneration with those members of their medical staff to whom increased duties would be assigned.

* In some of these cases the Medical Officer holds two Dispensary Districts, or a Workhouse in addition to the Dispensary District.

We have noticed that a large number of permanent Medical Officers are selected as temporary substitutes during the absences of their colleagues, and that this practice has become much more general during the current year—showing, apparently, that in many Unions the Medical Officers would, if remunerated, be able to undertake duties much in excess of those appertaining to their present Dispensary Districts. On the occurrence of vacancies in future, in the Dispensary medical staff, we propose to consider, in each instance, whether the then vacant post could be abolished; and, if so, whether the other Dispensary Medical Officers in the Union could be placed in the charge of extended areas, and in the possession of increased salaries, and their positions thereby substantially improved, without inflicting any real hardship on the sick poor, or imposing further burthens on the rate-payers.

(b). *Vacation.*

We had been approached from time to time, for several years prior to 1899, by deputations, who invariably pleaded the urgent need of securing to Dispensary Medical Officers an annual vacation. The reasonableness of the proposal, and the fact that it was generally approved, caused us to note the matter as one to be dealt with at an early opportunity. The necessity for revising the Dispensary Rules, owing to the alteration in the law made by Section 30 of the Local Government (Ireland) Act, 1898, afforded the requisite opportunity; and we made provision, accordingly, by Article 28 of our General Order of the 24th February, 1899, for an annual vacation not exceeding four weeks for each Medical Officer. A few Boards of Guardians objected, at first, to the regulation, on the ground that the duration of the vacation was too long, and they further contended that it was unfair that the entire cost of the substitutes should fall on the Union funds. These objections have latterly been overcome, and during the year under review vacation was granted to the Medical Officers, except in seventeen Unions. In seven of these there were no applications for annual vacation; in five others the Medical Officers only asked for leave of absence from their districts for short periods, and in the remaining five there were protracted disputes about the payment of the substitutes. In 142 Unions the Guardians paid the remuneration of the substitutes for periods varying from a fortnight to four weeks. Provision is now made by Section 5 (i) of the Local Government (Ireland) Act, 1902, for recoupment out of the Local Taxation (Ireland) Account of one-half of the remuneration paid by Boards of Guardians, with our approval, to the medical practitioners employed as substitutes for the Poor Law Medical Officers, during the absence from duty of these officers on vacation. The conces-

sion of recoupment has influenced favourably a large number of those Boards of Guardians who had not hitherto granted the full term of four weeks' vacation to their Medical Officers; and we hope to be in a position to give definite details of the actual effect of the concession in this matter in our next Report. We have urged Boards of Guardians to grant, under the circumstances, the full term of four weeks' vacation annually to the Medical Officers, and we have reason to believe that the question of vacation has now been settled in a satisfactory manner. There is still some dispute over the scale of remuneration for the temporary substitutes in a few Unions; the matter, however, is eminently one for amicable arrangement between the Boards of Guardians concerned and their Medical Officers, but our good offices are always available, and are freely used to bring about a settlement in such cases.

(c.) *Superannuation.*

Under the Union Officers (Ireland) Superannuation Act of 1865, as amended by the Medical Officers' Superannuation Act (Ireland), 1869, the Boards of Guardians are empowered to grant, subject to our consent, superannuation allowances to their Medical Officers who are qualified for pension, owing to permanent infirmity of mind or body, or old age.

Except in the limited number of cases provided for by Section 118 of the Local Government (Ireland) Act, 1896, Medical Officers have not, on retirement, an absolute legal right to pensions. The cases dealt with in the Section are those of Medical Officers who, on the "appointed day," had twenty years' service, and had, moreover, attained the age of sixty years. Up to the 31st March last, seventeen Medical Officers claimed superannuation under this enactment.

In those Unions where it has been customary to grant superannuation to officers the Boards of Guardians have not, as a rule, acted ungenerously towards their Medical Officers in the matter of the allowances, and have often awarded them better terms than those authorised by the scale of the Treasury for Civil Servants. We had occasion to cause a search to be made in our records, and we ascertained that since the year 1890 pensions were refused by Boards of Guardians to only three Medical Officers of very long service, and two other Medical Officers of over thirty-three years' service resigned their appointments, but did not apply formally for superannuation to the Guardians. The Boards of Guardians of some few Unions have hitherto refused to give any pensions. This refusal represented, in most instances, the settled policy of the Guardians, and was not the result of caprice in the case of an individual officer. Nevertheless, the refusal of pensions has always entailed much hardship on old officials, who are forced to cling to their posts, although weakened by age for the active discharge of their duties, and we should be glad to see a general agreement amongst Boards of Guardians in favour of making Section 118 of the Local Government (Ire;

land) Act applicable to all Dispensary Medical Officers, who would, in due course, be qualified for pensions under the existing law.

The certainty of obtaining superannuation on a liberal scale, when no longer able to perform the duties of their offices, would, we believe, be a powerful inducement to good service and efficiency on the part of Medical Officers.

(d.) *Remuneration for extra professional services.*

The question of the rate of remuneration for extra professional assistance, as well as for temporary duty, is essentially a matter for amicable arrangement between the Boards of Guardians and the Medical Officers, according to local requirements. Article 23 of the Dispensary Rules was framed to obviate disputes in regard to the fees for consultations; and in 150 out of the 159 Unions in Ireland we have approved of the scales of fees which were adopted by the Guardians under the provisions of the regulation.

A good illustration of the situation which has arisen as between Boards of Guardians and their Medical Officers is perhaps to be found in the case of the Kilmakevoge Dispensary District of Waterford Union where, as in the case of some other rural Dispensary Districts, a difficulty was experienced, towards the end of the year 1902, in obtaining candidates for a vacancy which then arose in the office of Medical Officer; the result being that the Board of Guardians, at their meeting on the 4th March, 1903, adopted the following resolution:—

"That, while the Guardians are not prepared to accede to the demand for a uniform scale of remuneration at £200 per annum for the Dispensary Medical Officers, they are quite willing that provision should be made for:—

"(i.) An annual holiday of one month, substitute to be paid by the Guardians, Government recouping half the expense.

"(ii.) Superannuation being secured on the lines of the measure recently framed for that purpose.

"(iii.) A fair remuneration for services rendered outside ordinary duty.

"And the Guardians strongly urge the Local Government Board to take such steps as may be in their power to give effect to the above without delay."

So far as we are able to judge, this resolution, our reply to which will be found in the Appendix,* represents to a great extent the feelings of the Guardians throughout the country upon the matters in dispute between them and the Medical Officers; and we should be glad to see a more general expression of this opinion such as might form the basis of agreement between both parties for future legislation. We have very little doubt that these desired reforms will ultimately come, as it will be seen from the statistics which we have quoted that the

Medical Officers have been steadily gaining ground with the Guardians in urging their claims for more favourable terms.

It has always been our policy to maintain for the Medical Officers the improvement they have secured with the co-operation of the Guardians, whilst at the same time we have sought to prevent discontent amongst existing officers by refusing to acquiesce in proposals to allow newly-appointed men to be placed in a better position as regards salary and allowances than those who have had long and meritorious service.

6.—*Midwives of Dispensary Districts.*

The number of Midwives employed in the Dispensary Districts in the year 1853 was 10, in 1863 the number had increased to 63, in 1873 to 196, in 1883 to 287, in 1893 to 361, and in 1903 to 551.

Since our Report of last year the appointments of twenty-one additional Midwives for Dispensary Districts have been authorised by Order under Seal, bringing the total up to 551 and the poor of the Dispensary Districts concerned can now obtain gratuitously the services of qualified Midwives. Article 18, paragraph 1, of the Dispensary Rules, prescribes that a person to be appointed a Midwife "shall have obtained from some recognised Lying-in Hospital a certificate as to her proficiency in Midwifery." The poor in every Dispensary District in Ireland will, we trust, be enabled, eventually, to obtain the services of competent Midwives. We have frequently before us strong evidence of the necessity for the services of qualified Midwives, and we have brought pressure to bear upon several Boards of Guardians to make suitable appointments.

7.—*Medicines.*

Our Prescribed List of Medicines and Prescribed List of Medical and Surgical Appliances were carefully revised at the commencement of the year. Some items, which were seldom requisitioned by the Medical Officers, have been withdrawn, and a small number of articles introduced on the lists at the suggestion of our Inspectors and the Medical Officers. The prescribed prices were also carefully revised; in accordance with current market quotations.

We found it necessary to insert a proviso in the Prescribed List of Medical and Surgical Appliances, stipulating that certain of the articles therein should have the name of the maker, who should be a manufacturer of repute, plainly stamped upon them. We hope that this precaution will ensure the supply of the highest quality of surgical instruments.

The arrangements made for the analysis of samples of the drugs have worked most satisfactorily during the year. There has been a marked improvement on the part of the Medical Officers in conforming to our regulations regarding the requisitioning of drugs, and the submitting of samples for analysis. The duties of the Analysts have been carefully performed, and their certificates have been much more promptly furnished

than in previous years. The form of certificate drawn up by us has much facilitated the Analysts, who have all adopted it. The schedule of suggested standards for pharmacopœial preparations issued by us in September, 1902, has been very favourably received as being sound in principle, and in accordance with practical experience. The standards, which are printed in the Appendix,* have secured uniformity in the treatment of samples by the Medicine Analysts, and have proved of great assistance in the keeping of records of analytical results.

The number of samples of drugs analysed during the year was 9,868, being 1,950 more than in the previous year. Of the samples, 368, or 3·73 per cent., were found to be more or less below standard; but in most instances the deficiency was slight. The percentage of deficient samples in the previous year was 3·95. A detailed report from our Pharmacist will be found in the Appendix.†

It is worthy of note that, whereas in former years the most general reason for the rejection of galenical preparations by the Analysts was deficiency in alcohol, the experience of the past year has been that the alcoholic strengths of these preparations were not only well above the minima laid down, but in most instances were above the percentages which might be expected from well-made preparations. Out of 2,697 samples of tinctures, only eighteen were reported as deficient in alcohol. Deficiency of extractive or deficiency or excess of alkaloids caused the greater number of unfavourable reports. The inorganic salts, and the other chemicals, were again found to be well up to the pharmacopœial standards of purity.

The medicine contractors have, speaking generally, carried out their contracts satisfactorily. We found it necessary, however, in eleven Unions, to caution contractors; but, on the other hand, in forty-eight Unions there was not a single complaint during the year.

As in previous years, all the requisitions for medicines and for medical and surgical appliances, have been carefully scrutinised in connection with the claims for recoupment, and where there has been any apparent extravagance or irregularity, attention has been called to the matter. We found it necessary to order an inquiry on oath into the question of the medicine expenditure in one case, and, as the result of the investigation, recoupment was disallowed on a sum of £427 11s., which we held to have been excessive, and in addition, a further sum of £121 was refunded to the Guardians by the contractor as overpayment on extras.

8.—Vaccination.

The number of cases of vaccination and re-vaccination performed by the Dispensary Medical Officers in their capacity as public vaccinators, during the year, was 117,720, of which 85,770 were primary vaccinations. In addition, 1,458 primary and 264 re-vaccinations were performed at the Vaccine

Department, Upper Sackville-street, Dublin. These figures, which show a considerable increase on the previous year, are exclusive of vaccinations performed by private practitioners. It appears, from the returns prepared by the Registrar-General, that the total number of successful primary vaccinations in Ireland during the year ended the 31st March, 1903, was 92,057, and in 3,647 cases during the last quarter of the year the operation was postponed. The total number of births during the same period was 101,919, and the deaths of unvaccinated children under three months of age, registered during the year, was 6,006.

Owing to the prevalence of small-pox during the year in some of the large towns in England, and its subsequent appearance in this country, we have been in almost constant communication with Boards of Guardians, both by correspondence and through our Medical Inspectors, with a view to the enforcement of the Vaccination Acts; and, in consequence of our representations, and influenced also, no doubt, by the dread of the spread of the disease, Boards of Guardians made strenuous efforts to clear off the arrears in vaccination, and very considerable progress has been made in that direction. It is not, as in England, obligatory on the Guardians to appoint and pay a special "vaccination officer," to follow up defaulters, and prosecute persons charged with offences against these Acts; the duty is usually performed by Relieving Officers, who, in addition to their salaries, receive small gratuities for the extra service.

Copies of Circular Letters addressed by us on the 16th and 18th March, 1903, to the several Boards of Guardians, on the subject of vaccination and re-vaccination, will be found in the Appendix.*

In our last Report we commented on the fact that for the year then ended as many as 230 children were returned as being "insusceptible to vaccination." We doubted the accuracy of the figures, and accordingly directed our Medical Inspectors to make inquiries into the matter when inspecting the several districts from which the cases were reported. The result, so far as ascertained, has shown that many of the cases were returned in error. We have issued a Circular Letter on the subject to the Medical Officers of Dispensary Districts a copy of which will be found in the Appendix,† and we are glad to say that the number of insusceptible cases returned this year is not one-third of that previously reported.

9.—*Vaccine Department.*

The lymph issued to the public vaccinators was procured, as in previous years, from the National Calf Vaccine Institute, Sandymount, and we are glad to say that the quality continues good, and the number of complaints in regard to failure of the lymph has largely diminished. The complaints were, as heretofore, made chiefly during the periods of hot

weather, when it seems to be difficult properly to store the lymph in country Dispensaries. The number of tubes issued during the year under review and in previous year, were as follows :—

The increase was largely due to the outbreak of small-pox in Dublin.

In the Appendix* will be found the detailed report of the Secretary, Dr. A. N. Montgomery, on the working of the Vaccine Department during the year, together with the report† of Professor E. J. M'Weeney, who makes, on behalf of the Local Government Board, a bacterioscopic examination of all lymph before it is issued. A report received from Dr. J. Knox-Denham, of the National Calf Vaccine Institute, Sandymount Green, Dublin, on the manner in which the lymph is prepared, is also appended.‡

10.—*Emigration.*

The statistics as to Emigration under the Act 12 & 13 Vic., chap. 104, sec. 26, will be found in the Appendix.§

11.—*Invalid Foundlings.*

The number of these foundlings at the close of the year under Report was seven, and we received a satisfactory report as to their condition.

The Dispensary Districts for which Certificates were issued by us under section 4 of the above-mentioned Act from the date of the passing of the Act to the 31st of March, 1903, are shown in the following list.

A certificate issued in pursuance of the section referred to enables a Board of Guardians or owner of land, as the case may be, to apply to the Commissioners of Public Works for a loan to provide a dispensary house or a residence for the medical officer of a Dispensary District.

The amounts paid to County Councils on behalf of Boards of Guardians and to Road Authorities in Ireland under Section 3 of the Probate Duties (Scotland and Ireland) Act, 1888, during the years ended the 31st of March, 1902 and 1903, were, respectively, £247,944 18s. 1d. and £224,886 5s. 9d. The distribution of these sums was as follows:—

This grant forms part of the Guarantee Fund provided for by the Purchase of Land (Ireland) Act, 1891, and the inequality in the sums paid on behalf of Boards of Guardians and to Road Authorities is accounted for by the fact that deductions were made from the grant for the purposes of the fund mentioned, in pursuance of regulations framed under section 6 of this Statute.

Under the provisions of section 19 of the Finance Act, 1894, (57 and 58 Vic., chap. 30), this grant, which was formerly payable out of Probate Duties, is payable out of the Estate Duty derived from personal property.

Schedules of the sums paid on behalf of Boards of Guardians, and to Road Authorities, during the year ended the 31st of March, 1903, are printed in the Appendix.*

“ Exchequer Contribution ” under Land Purchase Act, 1891.

Under Section 5 of the Purchase of Land (Ireland) Act, 1891, an annual grant of £40,000 a year, known as the “ Exchequer Contribution,” was assigned chiefly in aid of the building of labourers’ cottages. In round numbers, about £3,000 of this sum is distributed each year to the six County Boroughs as Estate Duty grant, and the balance, about £37,000, is available for distribution amongst the several counties in Ireland, so far as is required, in respect of the cost of providing labourers’ cottages since the passing of the Act mentioned. There was, on 31st March, 1903, an undistributed balance of this fund, amounting to £50,185 8s. 6d., representing the reserved shares of certain counties, in which no cottages have yet been provided, or in which the full share of the grant was not required to meet the expenditure incurred in providing cottages. The usual statistics as to the distribution of the grant for 1902-1903 are given in the Appendix† in connection with proceedings under the Labourers Acts.

“ County Percentage ” under Land Purchase Act, 1891.

Section 4 of the Purchase of Land (Ireland) Act, 1891, provided that an annual sum (called the County Percentage) of five shillings for every £100 advanced for land purchase should be paid to a Guarantee Fund, and, if not required for the purposes of such fund, to the Local Taxation (Ireland) Account, and applied towards the cost of providing cottages under the Labourers Acts in the counties in which the purchased holdings are situated. This annual payment was, however, discontinued by Section 27 of the Land Law (Ireland) Act, 1896, the full amount which had accrued in respect of the County Percentage being £8,805 12s. 11d. This sum has been allocated as follows, pursuant to the Regulations on the subject made by your Excellency:—Boards of Guardians have received £4,443 10s. 4d., the Commissioners of Public Works have been paid £1,416 13s. 4d. in reduction of sums due by Boards of Guardians under the Labourers Acts, and the balance, £2,945 9s. 3d., has been reserved for the present, as shown in the Appendix.‡

Labourers’ Cottages Grant, 1890.

We referred, in our twenty-eighth Annual Report, to an unissued balance of £10,921 6s. 5d., out of the grant of £40,000, voted by Parliament in 1890, in aid of the liabilities incurred, or to be incurred, by Boards of Guardians under the Labourers Acts. This balance represented the shares of

fifty-two Unions, in which the Acts had not been put into practical operation. Five Rural Districts in these Unions subsequently became entitled to participate, the total amount of their shares being £654 12s. 7d., leaving an unexpended balance of £10,266 13s. 10d. The consent of the Treasury having been obtained to the distribution of this balance amongst the Rural Districts wherein cottages had been provided, the requisite distribution was made and the grant finally closed. A table is given in the Appendix,* showing the shares of the participating districts in the balance in question.

V.—PUBLIC HEALTH ACTS.

1. *Small-Pox.*

The number of deaths in workhouses from small-pox and the number of cases of the disease treated by dispensary medical officers since 1864 are given in the following table:—

It will be observed, from our last Annual Report, that thirteen cases of small-pox were treated by the Medical Officers of Dispensary Districts during the year ended 31st March, 1902, eight of these cases being reported from Ulster, four from Leinster, and one from Munster.

Outbreak of Small-Pox in Dublin.

Towards the close of the year now under review the disease again broke out, and assumed epidemic proportions in the city of Dublin. A few cases of the disease occurred in the neighbouring districts; but the outbreak was chiefly confined to the city.

So early as the 19th April, 1902, a patient suffering from small-pox was removed to hospital from a steamer lying in the Liffey. No other case occurred until August, when a patient was removed from another steamer to the Cork-street Fever Hospital, and soon afterwards a person in this hospital contracted the disease. However, the disease did not spread further at the time.

On the 23rd December following, a man who worked on board a ship that traded between Liverpool and Dublin, and

who had been in the infected districts of Liverpool, was removed to the Hardwicke Fever Hospital from Newfoundland-street, suffering from small-pox. On the 9th January, a patient who had been admitted to this hospital eighteen days previously, suffering from erysipelas, developed small-pox. The infection in the latter case was, no doubt, communicated from the patient admitted from Newfoundland-street.

On the 6th January, a case had also appeared in the Cork-street Fever Hospital.

The next case was that of a girl who resided at 56, Church-street, where, a short time previously, an outbreak of typhus fever had occurred. This girl had attended at the Dispensary of the House of Industry Hospitals, North Brunswick-street, on the 1st February. She was in the midst of a number of persons for over an hour, until it came to her turn to be examined, when it was at once apparent that she was suffering from small-pox. She was immediately sent to the Hardwicke Hospital.

Two other cases were notified on the 7th and 10th February, and between the 11th and 14th no less than six persons were removed to hospital from the house 56, Church-street, in which the girl referred to resided.

Although no cases were reported from the 14th February to the 2nd March, the subsequent rapid spread of the disease showed that small-pox had been widely disseminated, and from the latter date until the end of March, the date to which this Report is made up, new cases were notified almost daily, the total for this month being fifty-two cases.

From the facts elicited there appears to be little reason to doubt that the disease was introduced from Glasgow or Liverpool, where at the time it was epidemic.

Steps taken to check the spread of the disease.

Nearly all the early cases in the epidemic were treated in the Hardwicke Hospital; but, on a representation made to them by the Public Health Committee in December, the Corporation directed that the Public Health Committee should equip, without delay, an Isolation Hospital. Immediate steps were taken, and an hospital provided for this purpose at the Pigeon House Fort. Arrangements were, at the same time, made with the Committee of the Cork-street Fever Hospital, to administer the Small-pox Hospital.

All subsequent cases, with one exception, were treated in the Isolation Hospital.

An agreement was also made with the Committee of the Cork-street Fever Hospital for the use of Beneavin Convalescent Home, for small-pox convalescents.

Under an arrangement made by the Corporation with the Councils of the North and South Dublin Rural Districts, both the Isolation Hospital and the Beneavin Convalescent Home were utilised for cases occurring in these two Rural Districts, as well as for cases occurring in the city.

In order to deal effectively with the danger of inmates of invaded dwellings spreading the infection, the Corporation Refuge

at Nicholas-street was utilised for their isolation, and, where possible, all such inmates were accommodated temporarily at the Refuge, pending the thorough disinfection of their clothing, &c., and of the premises on which they resided. In the earlier cases they were detained until the period in which small-pox would have manifested itself in them, had they been infected, had passed. As the cases became more numerous, this course became impracticable, although the accommodation at the Refuge was increased. However, persons who had been in actual contact with the patients were detained the full time. No objection was raised by any of the "contacts" to their temporary accommodation in the Refuge. This precaution the Board regard as very important, especially in cases where the person attacked had been employed in, for instance, a laundry, or where the habits of the inmates of an invaded house were such as to make it difficult for proper supervision of them to be maintained.

With the view of avoiding delay in securing the immediate removal of "contacts" to the Refuge, an omnibus and additional horses were purchased by the Public Health Committee of the Corporation.

The precautions taken to check the spread of the disease may be summarised as follows:—

- I. Immediate removal of patients to hospital.
- II. Prompt removal of "contacts" to the Refuge.
- III. Thorough disinfection of infected dwellings, destruction of the clothing, &c., of the patients, and disinfection of the clothing, &c., of the "contacts."
- IV. Publication, by placards, of the symptoms of small-pox, the steps to be taken to avoid catching the contagion, and the special necessity for re-vaccination.
- V. A thorough search for concealed cases of small-pox.
- VI. Notification to managers of schools and to pawn offices.

The Board's Medical Inspector, Dr. Edgar Flinn, was specially deputed to attend to this outbreak, and to advise the Sanitary Authority and their officers, from time to time, as to the most desirable steps to take to prevent the spread of the epidemic.

In the month of March, when the outbreak assumed large proportions, the Board, recognising the probability of the disease being conveyed to the other parts of Ireland, re-issued their Circular Letter to Sanitary Authorities of the 3rd July, 1894, giving particulars of the precautionary measures which they considered it desirable should be adopted in the event of small-pox appearing in their districts. On the same date the Board also forwarded to Medical Officers of Workhouses and Dispensary Medical Officers, a copy of this Circular Letter and a copy of their Instructional Circular Letter of the 5th December, 1902, on the subject of small-pox.

Outbreak in Belfast.

In the City of Belfast some thirty cases were also reported between the months of March and August, 1902, seventeen of which occurred in the workhouse, and the remaining thirteen

in different parts of the city. Particulars as to the outbreak and the precautionary measures taken are given in the detailed table on page xxxiii.

2. Cases of Fever treated in Dispensary Districts.

The following table shows the number of cases of fever (other than scarlet fever) reported to us by the medical officers of dispensary districts as having been attended by them since the year ended in 1865:—

On examination of these figures it will be seen that the number of fever cases in Ireland reported by medical officers of dispensary districts during the past year was 634 less than in the preceding year, and, also, less than one-fifth of the number so reported in 1878. This gratifying result is, we think, mainly to be attributed to the improvement in local sanitary administration which has been effected since the passing of the Public Health (Ireland) Act, 1878.

3. Scarlet Fever.

The cases of scarlet fever (1,056) treated by medical officers of dispensary districts in the year ended the 31st of March, 1903, likewise show a diminution of upwards of one-half, as compared with the number treated in 1878.

4. *Outbreaks of Infectious Disease.*

During the year 1902-1903 several outbreaks of infectious disease occurred in different parts of the country, and we give particulars in relation to the more important of these in the following table:—

All factory privy refuse was destroyed by fire, and the disinfection of privies, ashpits, sewers, and manure pits was carried out. The houses where Typhoid Fever occurred were cleaned and white-washed. The clothes used by the patients were also disinfected. The factory water supply also received attention, and the water is now conveyed by perfectly jointed glazed pipes direct to the factory tap.
Galway Rural.	August, 1902.	Doubtful (probably Enteric Fever.)	Towards the end of August, 1902, cases of illness appeared in the villages of Strawn, Onaught, and Craggaheen in the western part of the Aran Islands. About twenty-five cases occurred, many of which were of an ill-defined character. In several cases the illness lasted seven or eight days, the symptoms being head ache, pain in back and stomach, in some instances accompanied by diarrhoea, in others by constipation. In a few cases the illness lasted six weeks and upwards. The history and symptoms pointed to the disease being Enteric Fever. The Board's Medical Inspector gave instructions for the cleansing, disinfection, and lime-washing of all houses. The original source of infection was probably Kibonnan, where cases of Enteric Fever occurred in July and August, 1902.

Belfast City.	Year, 1902.	Diphtheria	During the year, 1902, Diphtheria was prevalent in the City of Belfast. The total number of cases reported from the City was 33, the number of houses in which the disease appeared was 204, the rate per thousand was 8.1, and the death rate 19. Very many of the patients were children under five years of age. The largest number of cases in proportion to the population occurred in Nos. 3, 8, and 10, Dispensary Districts. The greatest number of cases occurred in the month of December (58), and the fewest in August (13). It was impossible to assign accurately any one factor as a principal agency in the dissemination of the disease. Diphtheria and other zymotic diseases have been more or less epidemic in the City of Belfast for years. The insanitary condition of the premises in which the cases occurred, undoubtedly caused a foul state of the atmosphere favourable to the propagation of the disease. The principal causes of the prevalence of Diphtheria in Belfast may be attributed to: (1) defective house drains; (2) the conveying of the contents of privies and ashpits through the dwelling-houses; (3) small, badly-paved yards, containing privies and ashpits of bad construction, in too close proximity to dwelling-houses; (4) the flooding of certain parts of the city during times of excessive rainfall, causing sewage to flow back into the dwelling-houses; (5) overcrowding of portions of the city. Some of the defective conditions alluded to above, especially Nos. 1, 2, and 8, have been remedied within the past few years, by the Public Health Committee.

5. *Alleged Default of Sanitary Authorities.*

Section 15 of the Public Health (Ireland) Act, 1896, provides that, where complaint is made to us that a sanitary authority has made default in providing their district with a proper supply of water, or with sufficient sewers, or in enforcing any provisions of the Public Health Acts which it is their duty to enforce, we may, if satisfied, after due inquiry, of the alleged default, make an Order limiting a time for the performance by the sanitary authority of their duty in the matter of such complaint. Such Order may be enforced by writ of *mandamus*, or we may appoint a person to perform such duty at the expense of the defaulting authority. During the year under review, Orders were made by us, in pursuance of this enactment, in respect of the default of two District Councils.

6. *Investment of Rural Sanitary Authorities with powers of Urban Authorities under the Public Health Acts.*

Under section 1 of the Public Health (Ireland) Act, 1896, we are enabled on the application of the sanitary authority of any rural district, or of persons rated to the extent of at least one-tenth of the net rateable value of such district, or of any contributory place therein, to declare any provision of the Public Health (Ireland) Acts in force in urban districts to be in force in such rural district or contributory place, and to invest the Rural Authority concerned with all the powers, rights, duties, capacities, liabilities, and obligations of an Urban Authority under those Acts. Particulars of the several Orders made by us during the year in pursuance of this enactment, are given in the Appendix.*

7. *Port Sanitary Authorities.*

Under Section 9 of the Public Health (Ireland) Act, 1896, we are empowered to constitute, by Provisional Order, any sanitary authority whose district, or part of whose district, forms part of or abuts on any port in Ireland, the sanitary authority of the whole of such port or of any part thereof. Such port sanitary authority may also be formed by combining any two or more sanitary authorities having jurisdiction within a port, or by forming a joint board consisting of representative members of the sanitary authorities affected. Where such a port sanitary authority have been established, they have jurisdiction over all waters within the limits of their port, and can appoint officers to inspect all vessels arriving therein, and to see that adequate measures are taken as to sanitation.

By Provisional Order dated 30th April, 1902, which was confirmed by Parliament on 22nd July, 1902, we constituted the Galway Urban District Council the Port Sanitary Authority for part of the Customs Port of Galway.

8. Rural Sanitary Expenses.

A Statement of the Orders issued by us during the year, declaring areas of charge for special expenses under the Public Health Acts in Rural Districts, will be found in the Appendix.*

9. Bye-Laws.

A Table of the Bye-laws confirmed during the year will be found in the Appendix†

10. Closing of Burial Grounds.

We are empowered by the Public Health (Ireland) Act, 1878, sections 162 to 164, to order that burials in any city, or town, or other limits, or in any burial ground or place of burial, shall be discontinued wholly or subject to any exceptions or qualifications where, on representation made to us or otherwise, it shall appear to us, after due local inquiry, that such an Order is necessary for the protection of the public health, or for the maintenance of public decency, or to prevent a violation of the respect due to the remains of deceased persons.

The Orders made in the year ended 31st March, 1903, under the provisions of the Public Health (Ireland) Act, 1878, which relate to the discontinuance of burials in old burial grounds, were as follows:—

11. *Infectious Disease (Notification) Act, 1889.*

On the 31st of March, 1903, the provisions of this Act had been adopted in 93 Rural and 56 Urban Districts. During the year ended on that date, there were 2,255 and 14,722 cases of infectious disease notified in Rural and Urban Districts, respectively. Tables showing the number of cases notified in each District will be found in the Appendix.*

12. *Post Office Act, 1891.*

This statute enables rural sanitary authorities to assist in the provision of postal or telegraphic facilities for contributory places within their districts by undertaking to pay to the Postmaster-General any loss he may sustain in providing such facilities.

The extent to which sanitary authorities have availed themselves of the provisions of the Act during the past year will be seen by the following table which shows the number of Orders under Seal fixing areas of charge for costs of undertakings given by such authorities to the Postmaster-General, made each year since the passing of the Act:—

VI.—PROVISIONAL ORDERS.

During the year 1902-1903 we made thirty-two Provisional Orders (exclusive of those under the Labourers Acts), two of these being under the Gas and Water Works Facilities Act, 1870, fifteen under the Public Health (Ireland) Acts, 1878 to 1900, four under the Housing of the Working Classes (Ireland) Acts, 1890 to 1896, ten under the Local Government (Ireland) Acts, 1896 to 1902, and one under the Irish Education Acts, 1892 and 1893. A list of these Orders is given in the Appendix.†

VII.—LOANS.

In Urban, Rural, and united Districts a considerable part of the expenditure on sewerage, water supply, and other local improvements, is defrayed by means of loans to the sanitary authorities, or Joint Boards, as the case may be, which expenditure we sanction in pursuance of Sections 237 and 247 of the Public Health (Ireland) Act, 1878, and under certain local and general Acts. For the purpose of the Housing of the Working Classes Acts we also sanction loans to Urban Sanitary Authori-

ties, and to the Commissioners of towns which are not Urban Sanitary Districts, in cases where it is desired to provide accommodation for the working classes. The loans sanctioned as above during the year ended the 31st of March, 1903, amounted to £523,148 5s. 8d.

We also sanctioned, during the year, loans amounting to £35,689, which were applied for by Boards of Guardians for Workhouse buildings and improvements, loans for the purpose of the Labourers Acts amounting to £388,827, and loans to County Councils and the Joint Committees of Lunatic Asylums amounting to £161,298 5s. 6d.

Detailed lists of these loans will be found in the Appendix.*

VIII.—TOWNS' IMPROVEMENT (IRELAND) ACT, 1854.

Application was made to us for our approval of the adoption of the Act in Tullow and Edenderry, and we made the necessary Orders on the 2nd of September, 1902, and the 10th of January, 1903, respectively.

IX.—ALTERATION OF DAYS FOR HOLDING FAIRS.

Consent has been given to a proposal made to us that the fairs held at or near Ahascragh (County Galway), on the 6th of January, the Eve of Corpus Christi, and on Easter Monday, should be held instead on the 1st of January, the 14th of February, and the 25th of March, respectively.

X.—LABOURERS ACTS.

Improvement schemes were received by us from 45 Rural District Councils, proposing to provide 1,354 new cottages, to acquire and repair 23 existing houses, to provide 470 additional half-acre plots for cottages already erected, and to acquire tracts of land amounting, in the aggregate, to 21 acres, to be parcelled out in allotments, to be let to labourers living in neighbouring villages and towns.

During the year, 49 Local Inquiries were held by our Inspectors, and 54 Provisional Orders were made, authorising 1,444 cottages and plots, 1,084 additional half-acres for cottages already provided, and 9 acres of land for allotments. Orders became absolute, or were confirmed, within the same period, in respect of 1,683 cottages and plots, and 1,047 additional half-acres for cottages already provided.

Tables are given in the Appendix† showing what has been done by sanitary authorities under Improvement Schemes authorised, and what is proposed to be done under further Improvement Schemes.

Table (A) shows that 16,159 houses have been provided, of which 15,906 are actually let, and that 2,081 others were in progress or contracted for on the 31st March, 1903. The aggregate monthly rent of the cottages built in each Rural District, and the amount of such rent in arrear, are also shown.

Table (B) shows that further Improvement Schemes have been, or are about to be, submitted to us, proposing to provide 3,002 new cottages, with garden allotments, 1,785 additional

half-acre allotments to cottages already sanctioned, and 19 acres of land to be parcelled out in allotments to be let to labourers living in villages or towns.

Table (C) of Appendix D. III.* shows that, during the year loans were sanctioned for eighty-two Rural Districts, amounting, as already stated, to £388,827, making the total amount of loans sanctioned since the inception of the Acts, £2,798,949.

XI.—HOUSING OF THE WORKING CLASSES (IRELAND) ACTS, 1890 TO 1896.

Part I. of Act of 1890.

Loans of £965 and £6,286 14s. 4d. were sanctioned to the Blackrock Urban District Council.

Part II. of Act of 1890.

A loan of £200 was sanctioned to the Coleraine Urban District Council for the clearance of obstructive buildings.

Part III. of Act of 1890.

The Corporation of Dublin have been granted loans of £2,409 and £4,000; the Corporation of Waterford a loan of £670. The Councils of the following Urban Districts have also been granted loans, viz.:—Blackrock, £11,213 5s. 8d.; Cavan, £385; Coleraine, £2,550; Dundalk, £1,500; Dungarvan, £1,200; Nenagh, £2,500; Strahane, £4,090; Tralee, £275. These sums added to £469,795 11s. mentioned under this head in our last Report, make the total amount of the loans sanctioned in connection with houses for the working classes residing in towns, £500,587 16s. 8d.

XII.—THE SMALL DWELLINGS ACQUISITION ACT, 1899.

The Corporations of Belfast and Dublin have been granted loans amounting respectively to the sums of £1,598 and £5,849; the Rural District Councils of Antrim and Millstreet have been granted loans of £120 and £4,244 18s. respectively; and the Portadown Urban District Council a loan of £120 under this Act. These sums, added to £3,604 8s. mentioned in our last Report, make the total amount of the loans sanctioned under this Act £15,536 6s.

In addition to the statement in regard to the audit of Union Accounts, which, by Section 20 of the Act, 12 & 13 Vic., cap. 104, we are required to append to our Report,* we also give in the Appendix† a statement with respect to appeals against disallowances, surcharges, and allowances upon which we gave decisions during the year.

XIV.—DEPARTMENTAL ARRANGEMENTS.

Having received the authority of the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury to increase our permanent staff of Auditors from fourteen to fifteen, and to employ two temporary Auditors, instead of one previously authorised, for the purpose of clearing off arrears which had accumulated, we placed on our permanent staff Mr. Cyril E. Browne, who had been acting temporarily, and gave the two temporary appointments to Messrs A. A. Flynn and St. J. Considine. Pending the issue of the necessary certificates of qualification from the Civil Service Commissioners in the cases of the two last-named gentlemen, we recalled to duty Captain Gihson and Mr. C. Pelly, two of our retired auditors.

We, also, with Treasury sanction, made the following appointments :—Dr. Brendan MacCarthy and Dr. Joseph Smyth, from temporary, to be permanent, Medical Inspectors; Mrs. Marie L. Dickie and Miss FitzGerald Kenney to be, temporarily, Lady Inspectors of boarded-out children; and Mr. C. E. Atkinson to be an Assistant Inspector for work under the Labourers Acts.

APPENDIX A.

ORDERS AND CIRCULARS UNDER, AND CONNECTED WITH, THE LOCAL GOVERNMENT (IRELAND) ACTS, 1898 TO 1902.

I.—ORDERS.

(i.) General Orders (arranged according to date).

No. 46 M.—1902.

To the Council of each Administrative County in Ireland not being a County Borough;

To the Council of each Rural District in Ireland; and to all others whom it may concern:

WHEREAS by Article 25A of the Local Government (Procedure of Councils) Order, 1899, as varied by the Local Government (Procedure of Councils) Order, 1901, duly confirmed by Parliament (which Order so varied is hereinafter referred to as the Amended Order) it is directed among other things as follows, that is to say:—

"25A (1) Notwithstanding anything in this Order relating to the execution of public works by contract the council of any county may if they think fit after consideration of a report to be made by the county surveyor with reference to each rural district in the county in the prescribed form and containing the particulars set out in the schedule to this Order make a general declaration specifying the roads in any one or more of such districts which have been selected by them as suitable to be maintained by direct labour under the charge of the county surveyor and upon making such declaration the council shall formulate a scheme for carrying the same into effect.

"(2) At any time after the end of three years the council may if they think fit reconsider the declaration and may with the approval of the Local Government Board make a new declaration and so on at intervals of not less than three years.

"(3) Such declaration shall at first be a provisional declaration and shall be communicated in the prescribed manner by the county council to the Local Government Board and the council of each district in reference to which such declaration has been made.

"(4) After the prescribed time and after considering any representations which may meantime have been submitted either by any district council or by any person claiming to be interested the county council shall take the said provisional declaration into consideration and may adopt the same either in its original form or after modifying it either by way of exclusion or inclusion of roads provided that it shall be obligatory on the county council to include in such declaration as finally adopted all roads other than main roads in any district which the council of the district recommend for inclusion.

"(5) The county council shall forthwith communicate the declaration as finally adopted to the Local Government Board and to every district council in the county and any such district council if aggrieved by the declaration or by the inclusion therein or omission therefrom of any road may within the prescribed time appeal to the Local Government Board and that Board after communication with the county council shall consider any such appeals and may in any case approve or disapprove of the declaration of the county council or make any declaration which the county council could have made and that declaration shall operate as a declaration by the council."

Now, therefore, We, the Local Government Board for Ireland, in pursuance of the above-cited directions of the amended Order do hereby order and prescribe as follows, that is to say:—

1. The report of the County Surveyor shall be made in the form and manner following:

(a.) The maps referred to in Article I. of the Schedule to the amended Order shall be prepared on a scale of not less than one inch to the mile.

Portions of main roads included in the report shall be coloured red on all such maps, and portions of other public roads included in the report shall be coloured brown.

(b.) Where the roads in the Rural District included in the report have hitherto been classified, the schedule annexed to the report shall indicate the class to which each such road belongs.

(c.) A description of the portion of each road included in the report shall be given in the usual manner, that is to say, by indicating its terminal points; and the length of each portion shall be stated in perches or in statute miles and decimal fractions of a mile.

(d.) Quarries available or proposed to be utilized for the purposes of a scheme shall be coloured yellow on the maps, and shall be marked with distinctive numbers.

(e.) (1) Portions of roads included in the report which can, if included in any general declaration of the county council, be at once worked by direct labour shall be fully coloured red or brown as the case may require on the maps.

(2) Portions of roads included in the report which by reason of existing contracts still running cannot if included in any such declaration of the County Council be worked by direct labour for the whole period during which such declaration will be effective shall be partially coloured with a dotted line in red or brown as the case may be.

2. When the Council of any County at any quarterly meeting make, upon the report of the County Surveyor, a provisional general declaration specifying the roads in any one or more rural districts in the county selected by them as suitable to be maintained by direct labour under the charge of the County Surveyor and formulate a scheme for carrying the same into effect, the Secretary of the Council shall, within seven days of the day on which such provisional declaration and scheme are made, send a copy of such declaration and scheme to the Local Government Board, and also to the Clerk of the Council of each District in reference to which such declaration and scheme have been made to be laid before his Council, and shall also within the said period of seven days publish the said declaration and scheme in the manner provided by Article 34 of the amended Order.

3. The County Council at their quarterly meeting held next after the making of any provisional declaration and scheme as aforesaid, shall consider all representations which may have been received from any District Council or from any person claiming to be interested and may, subject to the provisions of Article 25a of the Amended Order modify the said provisional declaration and scheme, if they think fit, by the exclusion or inclusion of any road; and they shall then publish the said declaration and scheme as finally adopted whether modified or not, in the manner provided as aforesaid.

4. A copy of the declaration and scheme as finally adopted shall be sent by the Secretary of the County Council within seven days of the day of the meeting at which the same shall have been so adopted to the Clerk of every District Council in the County; and the Clerk of every such District Council shall within seven days from the day on which the said copy of the said declaration and scheme was received by him summon a special meeting of the District Council to consider the same giving not less than three days' notice to each member of the Council; and at the said meeting so summoned the District Council may decide by the vote of the majority of the members present and voting on the question to appeal to the Local Government Board; and such appeal shall be under the hand of the presiding chairman, acting on behalf of the said majority.

Election of Guardians in County Boroughs.

WHEREAS by section 24 (b) of the Local Government (Ireland) Act, 1898, (hereinafter referred to as the Act) it is enacted that in an urban district the guardians for any district electoral division therein shall be elected by the local government electors for that division subject to the like provisions in the like manner and at the like time as district councillors for a rural district:

And whereas by an Order under our Seal made in pursuance of Article 5 of the Schedule to the Local Government (Application of Enactments) Order, 1898, and bearing date the seventh day of February, 1899, We, the said Local Government Board did order that subject to any directions which might be given by Us the rules in our said Order contained should be observed in connection with the election of guardians in urban districts in Ireland:

And whereas it is necessary that further directions should be given with respect to the election of guardians in certain urban districts being County Boroughs:

Now therefore in pursuance of the powers reserved to Us by Our said Order We the Local Government Board for Ireland do hereby Order and Direct as follows, that is to say :—

Where a Union is situate in two administrative counties one of which is a County Borough and the other a county at large the day of election of guardians in the County Borough shall be that fixed by the council of the county at large for the election of rural district councillors in their county.

Where a Union is situate in three administrative counties one of which is a County Borough and the other two are counties at large the day of election of guardians in the County Borough shall be such one of the days fixed by the councils of the counties at large for the election of rural district councillors in their respective counties as the Council of the County Borough may determine.

GENERAL ORDER.

Compulsory acquisition of land by a County Council for the purpose of widening an old road or making a new one.

WHEREAS by Sub-section (3) of Section 10 of the Local Government (Ireland) Act, 1898 (hereinafter referred to as the Act), it is enacted in effect that where a County Council desire, for the purpose of the work of widening an old road or making a new road, to acquire otherwise than by agreement any land other than demesne land or pleasure ground, or than land situate in a borough or town, they may, if they think fit, notwithstanding anything in the said Section 10 of the Act, to the contrary contained, proceed as follows, namely :—

Publish such advertisement and serve such notice on the owner or reputed owner, lessee or reputed lessee, and occupier of the land as may be prescribed by the Local Government Board, and within the prescribed time petition the Judge of Assize for an Order authorizing the Council to put into force with reference to such land, the powers of the Lands Clauses Acts with respect to the purchase and taking of land otherwise than by agreement :

And whereas by Sub-section (1) of Section 109 of the Act, it is enacted that, unless the context otherwise requires, the expression "prescribed," when used in the Act, means prescribed by the Local Government Board, and that the expression "Local Government Board" means the Local Government Board for Ireland :

And whereas We, the said Local Government Board, in exercise of the powers given to Us by the said Sub-section (3) of Section 10 of the Act by an Order under Our Seal, dated the 15th day of November, 1901, did prescribe certain matters by the said Sub-section required to be prescribed by Us :

And whereas it is expedient that Our said Order of the 15th day of November, 1901, should be rescinded :

Now, therefore, We, the Local Government Board for Ireland, do hereby rescind Our said Order of the 15th day of November, 1901, and in exercise of the powers given to Us by the said Sub-section (3) of the said Section 10 of the Act do hereby order and direct as follows :—

1. Where a County Council desire for the purpose of widening an old road or making a new road, to acquire otherwise than by agreement any land other than demesne land or pleasure ground or than land situate in a borough or town, and think fit to proceed by way of petition to the Judge of Assize in the manner permitted by the said Sub-section (3) of the said Section 10 of the Act they shall—

- (a.) Publish once at least in each of three consecutive weeks in the month of December next preceding any Spring Assizes to be held for their county, if the petition is to be presented at such Assizes, or in the month of April next preceding any Summer Assizes so to be held, if the petition is to be presented at such Assizes, in some newspaper or newspapers circulating in their county, an advertisement describing shortly the purposes in respect of which the land is proposed to be taken, stating the denomination and quantity of land they require, and naming a place where a plan of the proposed undertaking may be seen at all reasonable hours, and where notices relating to the proposed undertaking may be delivered to or for the said County Council ; and shall further
 - (b.) Within the first twenty-one days of the month of January next preceding the Spring Assizes at which the petition is to be presented, or within the first twenty-one days of the month of May next preceding the Summer Assizes at which the petition is to be presented serve a notice on every owner or reputed owner, lessee or reputed lessee, and occupier of such lands, defining in each case the particular land intended to be taken, and requiring an answer stating whether the person so served assents, dissents, or is neuter in respect of the taking such land. Every such notice shall name a place where the answer so required and any notice respecting the proposed undertaking may be delivered to or for the said County Council.
 - (c.) The mode of effecting service of any notice herein prescribed shall be, if a Council or other body Corporate is to be served, by delivering the same to the Secretary or Clerk of the Council or other body Corporate, or posting the same as a registered letter addressed to such Secretary or Clerk at his residence or office ; and if the party to be served is an individual person by serving the same personally on such party, or by leaving the same at the residence of such party with a clerk, servant, wife, or child, or other person therein over the age of sixteen years, or by posting the same in a registered letter addressed to such party at his last known residence : Provided that if in any case service of the notice in any of the modes aforesaid shall not be reasonably possible, the notice shall be served in such manner as may be possible, and if the Judge, on the hearing of the petition, deem the service so effected sufficient, the same shall be sufficient accordingly.

2. On compliance with the provisions of the preceding article with respect to advertisements and notices, and not less than seven nor more than fifteen days after the service of the notices, the County Council may, if they think fit, present a petition under their Seal to the Judge of Assize. The petition shall specify the lands intended to be taken, and the

purposes for which they are required, and the names of the owners, lessees, and occupiers of lands who have assented, dissented, or are neuter in respect of the taking such lands, or who have returned no answer to the notice: it shall pray that the County Council may with reference to such lands be allowed to put into force the powers of the Lands Clauses Acts with respect to the purchase and taking of lands otherwise than by agreement, and such prayer shall be supported by evidence that the prescribed advertisements have been duly published, and the prescribed notices duly served as directed by the preceding section.

To the Councils of the several Administrative Counties in Ireland; to the Mayors, Aldermen, and Burgesses of the several County Boroughs in Ireland acting through the Councils of such Boroughs; to the Treasurer of each such County and County Borough; and to all others whom it may concern.

WHEREAS by Sub-sections (1) to (5) and Sub-sections (7) and (8) of Section seventy-one of the Diseases of Animals Act, 1894 (hereinafter referred to as the Act of 1894), as the said Section is amended by the Local Government (Ireland) Act, 1898, and any Orders made under Part VI. of that Act (which Act and Orders are hereinafter referred to as the Act of 1898) by the Agriculture and Technical Instruction (Ireland) Act, 1899, and by an Order of the Lord Lieutenant made in pursuance of Sub-section (1) of Section two of the last-mentioned Act, it is enacted in effect as follows, that is to say:—

- (1.) The General Cattle Diseases Fund established by the Contagious Diseases (Animals) Act, 1873 (hereinafter referred to as the Act of 1873), shall continue for the purpose of the execution of the Act of 1894 in Ireland, and any money at the commencement of the Act of 1894 standing to the credit of the fund not being money paid to the cattle pleuro-pneumonia account, shall in the first instance constitute the general account of the fund.
- (2.) The Department of Agriculture and Technical Instruction for Ireland (hereinafter referred to as the Department) may as and when they think fit certify to the effect that a sum equivalent to a certain poundage on the net annual value of the property in all the administrative counties is required for the purposes of the Act of 1894.
- (3.) Thereupon the Local Government Board for Ireland shall by Order under their Seal assess that sum on the several administrative counties in proportion to the net annual value of the property therein and shall send copies of the Order to the council and to the Treasurer of each administrative county.
- (4.) Thereupon the Treasurer of each administrative county shall out of county funds pay over the amount assessed on the county to the Bank of Ireland to be placed to the general account of the General Cattle Diseases Fund. The council of each administrative county shall debit the several county districts with proportions of that sum according to the net annual value of the property therein.

(5.) No larger sum shall be levied under the Act of 1894 at any one time than is equivalent to a poundage of one halfpenny in the pound on the net annual value of the property in all the administrative counties; nor shall any larger sum be levied under the Act of 1894 in the whole than is equivalent taken with any money before the commencement of the Act of 1878 carried to the Cattle Plague Account, and with any sums levied under the Act of 1878 to a poundage of eightpence in the pound on the net annual value of the property in all the administrative counties.

(7.) The expression "net annual value of property" in the said Section seventy-one of the Act of 1894, means the net annual value of property rateable to the relief of the poor according to the valuation in force for the time being.

(8.) The expression "county funds" in the Act of 1894, means any money in the hands of the Treasurer of an administrative county to the credit of the council of the administrative county, and if at any time the assets in the Treasurer's hands are not sufficient for any purpose of the Act of 1894, then "county funds" shall be taken to include the moneys next received by the Treasurer and placed to the credit of the council of the administrative county:

And whereas by section 21 of the Act of 1898 it is enacted in effect that each of the boroughs of Dublin, Belfast, Cork, Limerick, Londonderry, and Waterford, shall be an administrative county of itself, and shall be called a county borough; and that the mayor, aldermen, and burgesses of each county borough acting by the council shall, subject as in the Act of 1898 mentioned, have all the powers and duties of the council of an administrative county, and it is further enacted by Sub-section (1) of Section 109 of the said Act, that the expression mayor in that Act includes a Lord Mayor:

And whereas the Department did on the 25th day of November in the year 1903, certify under their Seal of Office that a sum of Fifteen Thousand Six Hundred and Twenty-nine Pounds Nine Shillings and One Penny, being equivalent to a rating of one farthing in the pound sterling on the net annual value of the property in all the administrative counties in Ireland, such net annual value amounting to a sum of Fifteen Millions Four Thousand Two Hundred and Seventy-six Pounds sterling, according to the valuation of such property now in force, is required for the purposes of the Act of 1894:

And whereas the said sum of Fifteen Thousand Six Hundred and Twenty-nine Pounds Nine Shillings and One Penny, and the sums heretofore levied under the Act of 1894 and the Act of 1878, and the sums carried to the Cattle Plague Account before the commencement of the Act of 1878, do not together amount to a sum equivalent to a poundage of eightpence in the pound on the said net annual value of the said property:

Now, therefore, We, the Local Government Board for Ireland, in pursuance of the provisions of the above-cited Section seventy-one of the Act of 1894 amended as aforesaid do hereby assess the said sum of Fifteen Thousand Six Hundred and Twenty-nine Pounds Nine Shillings and One Penny sterling upon the several administrative counties in Ireland in proportion to the net annual value of the property in each such county, according to the valuation thereof now in force, as follows, that is to say:—

We assess upon each such county the amount set opposite to the name thereof in the Schedule hereunto annexed.

A resolution of a council, board, or commissioners to exclude from its meetings representatives of the Press, if sanctioned by Us, the Local Government Board for Ireland, shall, from and after the date at which such sanction shall be given, be valid and take effect in the manner and to the extent therein mentioned.

Amending Certificate of 6th July, 1899.

To the Council of the Administrative County of Westmeath; to the Councils of the Rural Districts of Coole and Kilbeggan; and to all other persons whom it may concern:

WHEREAS, by Sub-section 2 of Section 27 of the Local Government (Ireland) Act, 1898, it is enacted as follows:—

WHEREAS by sub-sections (1), (3), (4), (5), (6) and (7) of Article 25A of the Local Government (Procedure of Councils) Order, 1899, as amended by the Local Government (Procedure of Councils) Order, 1901, confirmed by the Local Government Board (Ireland) Provisional Order Confirmation (No. 3) Act, 1901 (which Order so amended is hereinafter referred to as the amended Order), it is directed in effect as follows, that is to say :—

25A (1) Notwithstanding anything in the amended Order relating to the execution of public works by contract the council of any county may if they think fit after consideration of a report to be made by the county surveyor with reference to each rural district in the county in the prescribed form and containing the particulars set out in the schedule to the amended Order make a general declaration specifying the roads in any one or more of such districts which have been selected by them as suitable to be maintained by direct labour under the charge of the county surveyor and upon making such declaration the council shall formulate a scheme for carrying the same into effect.

(3.) Such declaration shall at first be a provisional declaration and shall be communicated in the prescribed manner by the county council to the Local Government Board for Ireland and the council of each district in reference to which such declaration has been made.

(4.) After the prescribed time and after considering any representations which may meantime have been submitted either by any district council or by any person claiming to be interested the county council shall take the said provisional declaration into consideration and may adopt the same either in its original form or after modifying it either by way of exclusion or inclusion of roads provided that it shall be obligatory on the county council to include in such declaration as finally adopted all roads other than main roads in any district which the council of the district recommend for inclusion.

(5.) The county council shall forthwith communicate the declaration as finally adopted to the said Local Government Board and to every district council in the county and any such district council if aggrieved by the declaration or by the inclusion therein or omission therefrom of any road may within the prescribed time appeal to the said Local Government Board and that Board after communication with the county council shall consider any such appeals and may in any case approve or disapprove of the declaration of the county council or make any declaration which the county council could have made and that declaration shall operate as a declaration by the council.

(6.) No declaration shall come into operation until it has been approved by the said Local Government Board together with the scheme for carrying it into effect and that Board when approving a declaration or scheme may make such modifications therein as they consider necessary.

(7.) A declaration when approved by the said Local Government Board shall remain in force for a period of three years from the date of such approval, and may be brought into operation by the council from time to time during the said period of three years in respect of any road not being the subject of an existing contract.

And whereas the Council of the Administrative County of Limerick (hereinafter referred to as the County Council) did after consideration of a report made by the County Surveyor in the form prescribed by Us the said Local Government Board make a general declaration specifying certain roads as suitable to be maintained by direct labour, and did formulate a scheme for carrying the same into effect, and did also in the manner prescribed by Us communicate the said declaration to Us and to the Council of each district to which such declaration had reference:

And whereas the County Council after the time prescribed by Us and after considering representations submitted to them by certain rural district councils did at an adjourned Quarterly Meeting held on the 22nd day of October 1902 finally adopt the said declaration and the said scheme in their respective original forms as set out in the schedule hereunto annexed; and did communicate the same as so finally adopted to Us the said Local Government Board and to every district council in the county:

And whereas We the said Local Government Board in pursuance of the powers vested in Us have caused a local inquiry to be held:

Now therefore We the Local Government Board for Ireland do hereby approve of the said declaration and the said scheme made and finally adopted by the County Council as aforesaid and modified as hereunder set forth and We declare that We consider the modifications made therein to be necessary:

DECLARATION specifying the roads in rural districts in the County of Limerick as suitable to be maintained by direct labour under the County Surveyor finally adopted by the County Council.

The Limerick County Council hereby make this Declaration specifying that all the roads in the County are suitable to be maintained by Direct Labour under the charge of the County Surveyor.

SCHEME formulated by the County Council for carrying the above Declaration into effect, as modified by the Local Government Board for Ireland.

GENERAL WORKMEN.

1. (a) The work on the roads shall be entirely done by Labourers or Workmen, who shall be employed and dismissed by the County Surveyor, and who shall find their own tools; the wages shall be 12s. per week.

SURFACEMEN.

- (b) Surfacedmen (who shall be also appointed and dismissed by the County Surveyor) shall be appointed and selected for their skill, intelligence, and industry. The wages of a Surfacedman shall be 14s. per week. They must be able to read, write, and keep a time book. In Autumn and Winter they shall act as Gangers over the ordinary Labourers, and shall reside in or close to their sections of road. They must provide their own spade and shovel, and shall be responsible for any tools the property of the Council delivered to them.

FOREMEN.

- (c) Not more than eighteen Foremen shall be engaged (who shall be appointed and dismissed by the County Surveyor) whose duties shall be the checking of the time books of the Surfacedmen, preparation of pay sheets, distribution of paying orders to Labourers and Surfacedmen, and general supervision, with a

view to see that materials are supplied when and where wanted, and that work is being properly done, and that orders of the County Surveyor and his Assistants are carried out. These foremen shall be employed for about thirty weeks in the year, or for such periods as the County Council, on the recommendation of the County Surveyor, shall direct; their wages shall be from One Pound to One Pound Four Shillings a week, as fixed from time to time by the County Surveyor with regard to the experience, skill and efficiency of each foreman. Each foreman will be required to give security in the sum of £100 for his fidelity.

MATERIALS, &c.

- Materials shall be delivered by contract on the roads in depots not exceeding 200 yards apart. Contracts for the delivery of materials as aforesaid shall be entered into by the County Surveyor or Finance Committee on behalf of the County Council. On failure to make the necessary contracts, materials are to be quarried and broken by measurement, and delivered on the roads by hired horses. In no case shall any payment be made for materials until they are measured in the depots on the roads, save in exceptional circumstances and by the special directions of the County Surveyor. Steam rollers, stone breakers, and other machinery may be used when and where considered desirable by the County Surveyor with the sanction of the County Council.

PAYMENTS.

- Payments shall be made fortnightly by the Finance Committee, a Paying Order shall be filled up in the name of each workman by the Secretary, and the Orders sent to the Foreman of each district, who shall distribute the same. During the Summer season, when a reduced number of men are employed, payments shall be made through the Assistant Surveyors, or direct by post, as may be found most convenient.

ASSISTANT SURVEYORS.

- The Assistant Surveyors shall, as formerly, be responsible to the County Surveyor for the proper maintenance of the roads and road structures in their districts, for the supply, measurement, and effective application of materials of proper quality and size, for the prevention of encroachments and nuisances on the roads, and for reports as to the necessity of enforcing the law relating to the cutting of hedges and trees, road drainage, &c., and shall, in addition to a constant general supervision of the road work, make such complete inspections and reports at stated intervals, as the County Surveyor shall direct.
- The County Surveyor shall make a detailed report each half year as to the expenditure on, and condition of the roads in each Rural District, and the manner in which the Assistant Surveyors and Foremen have discharged their duties.
- The maintenance of roads by direct labour under this scheme shall commence on or after the 1st day of April, 1903.

DECLARATION and SCHEME as to the Maintenance of Roads and other Public Works, by the Non-Contract System. Drafted under Amended Procedure of Councils Order, Article 25 A (1 to 5), and finally adopted by County Council at adjourned Quarterly Meeting, held on 22nd day of October, 1902.

GENERAL DECLARATION.

The Limerick County Council hereby make this Declaration specifying that ALL the roads in the County are suitable to be maintained by Direct Labour under the charge of the County Surveyor, and formulates the following Scheme for the purpose:—

SCHEME.

GENERAL WORKMEN.

1. (a.) The Work on the roads to be entirely done by Labourers, who shall be employed and dismissed by the County Surveyor, and who shall find their own tools; the wages per week to be 12s.

SURFACEMEN.

- (5.) Surfacemen (who shall be also appointed and dismissed by the County Surveyor) shall be appointed and selected for their skill, intelligence, and industry. The wages to be 14s. per week. They must be able to read, write, and keep a time-book. In the Autumn and Winter they shall act as Gangers over the ordinary Labourers, and shall reside in or close to their sections of road. They must provide their own spade and shovel, and shall be responsible for any tools the property of the Council delivered to them.

FOREMEN.

- (a.) Twelve Foremen to be engaged (who shall be appointed and dismissed by the County Surveyor) whose duties shall be the checking of the time books of the Surfacemen, preparation of pay sheets, distribution of paying orders to Labourers and Surfacemen, and general supervision, with a view to see materials are supplied when and where wanted, and that work is being properly done, and orders of the County Surveyor and his Assistants carried out. These Foremen will only be required during the heavy working season, or about 30 weeks in the year; their wages to be a £1 a week, and they shall be required to give security in the sum of £100 for their fidelity.

MATERIALS.

2. Materials shall be delivered by piece work on the roads in depots not exceeding 200 yards apart. Quarrying and breaking of stones to be done by the cubic yard at a price not exceeding that approved by the County Surveyor.

It is not to be understood from the above that this Scheme is opposed to the use of steam rollers, stone breakers, or other machinery; on the contrary, it recommends their employment when and where considered desirable by the County Surveyor, provided he obtains the sanction of the Council for their use before employing them.

PAYMENTS.

3. Payments to be made fortnightly by the Finance Committee, a Paying order to be filled for each workman in his own name, by the Secretary, and sent to the Foreman of each District, who shall distribute same. During the Summer season, when a reduced number of men are employed, payments shall be made, through the Assistant Surveyors, or direct by post, as may be found most convenient.

ASSISTANT SURVEYORS.

4. The Duties of the Assistant County Surveyors shall be confined as heretofore to the measurement of the materials, periodical inspections and reports.

THE LOCAL GOVERNMENT BOARD FOR IRELAND.

To the Council of the Administrative County of Tipperary, North Riding:

To the Councils of the Rural Districts of Borrisokane, Nenagh, Roscrea No. 1, and Thurles; and to all others whom it may concern:

WHEREAS by sub-sections (1), (3), (4), (5), (6) and (7) of Article 25A of the Local Government (Procedure of Councils) Order, 1898, as amended by the Local Government (Procedure of Councils) Order, 1901, confirmed by the Local Government Board (Ireland) Provisional Order Confirmation (No. 3) Act, 1901 (which Order so amended is hereinafter referred to as the amended Order), it is directed in effect as follows, that is to say:—

25A (1) Notwithstanding anything in the amended Order relating to the execution of public works by contract the council of any county may if they think fit after consideration of a report to be made by the county surveyor with reference to each rural district in the county in the prescribed form and containing the particulars set out in the schedule to the amended Order make a general declaration specifying the roads in any one or more of such districts which have been selected by them as suitable to be maintained by direct labour under the charge of the county surveyor and upon making such declaration the council shall formulate a scheme for carrying the same into effect.

(3.) Such declaration shall at first be a provisional declaration and shall be communicated in the prescribed manner by the county council to the Local Government Board for Ireland and the council of each district in reference to which such declaration has been made.

(4.) After the prescribed time and after considering any representations which may meantime have been submitted either by any district council or by any person claiming to be interested the county council shall take the said provisional declaration into consideration and may adopt the same either in its original form or after modifying it either by way of exclusion or inclusion of roads provided that it shall be obligatory on the county council to include in such declaration as finally adopted all roads other than main roads in any district which the council of the district recommend for inclusion.

(5.) The county council shall forthwith communicate the declaration as finally adopted to the said Local Government Board and to every district council in the county and any such district council if aggrieved by the declaration or by the inclusion therein or omission therefrom of any road may within the prescribed time appeal to the said Local Government Board and that Board after communication with the county council shall consider any such appeals and may in any case approve or disapprove of the declaration of the county council or make any declaration which the county council could have made and that declaration shall operate as a declaration by the council.

(6.) No declaration shall come into operation until it has been approved by the said Local Government Board together with the scheme for carrying it into effect and that Board when approving a declaration or scheme may make such modifications therein as they consider necessary.

(7.) A declaration when approved by the said Local Government Board shall remain in force for a period of three years from the date of such approval and may be brought into operation by the council from time to time during the said period of three years in respect of any road not being the subject of an existing contract.

And whereas the Council of the Administrative County of Tipperary, North Riding (hereinafter referred to as the County Council) did at a quarterly meeting held on the 19th day of November 1902 after consideration of a report made by the County Surveyor in the form prescribed by Us the said Local Government Board resolve to adopt the said report as a general declaration specifying certain roads as suitable to be maintained by direct labour, and formulating a scheme for carrying the same into effect, and did also in the manner prescribed by Us communicate the declaration and scheme so adopted to Us and to the Council of each district to which such declaration had reference:

And whereas the County Council after the time prescribed by Us and after considering representations submitted to them by certain rural district councils did at an adjourned Quarterly Meeting held on the 31st day of December, 1902, finally adopt the said report of the County Surveyor and the scheme set out therein and did declare that the roads scheduled in the said report are suitable to be maintained by direct labour and did communicate the said report and their declaration as so finally adopted to Us the said Local Government Board and to every district council in the county:

And whereas the Council of the Rural District of Borriskane did appeal to Us against the said report and declaration so finally adopted by the County Council:

And whereas We the said Local Government Board in pursuance of the powers vested in Us have caused a local inquiry to be held and have considered the appeal of the Council of the Rural District of Borriskane:

Now, therefore, We, the Local Government Board for Ireland do hereby approve of the declaration of the County Council and the scheme contained in the said report as the same were finally adopted by the County Council as aforesaid and We declare that the said declaration and scheme shall come into operation on the first day of April, 1903.

DUBLIN, 12th February, 1905.

SIR,—I am directed by the Local Government Board for Ireland to forward to you the enclosed copies of a Table, which they have caused to be prepared, explanatory of the Demands by County Councils on Urban District Councils in respect of County charges, and to request that, when forwarding the annual estimate and demand of your Council to the several Urban District Councils within the County, you will have the goodness to furnish each of these authorities with a copy of the Table duly filled up, in order that the Urban Councils may have fuller information as to the basis upon which the demand in respect of County charges has been estimated.

I am to add that the Board find that some misapprehension exists as to the several Grants in which Urban District Councils are entitled to participate, and they desire to point out that only those Urban Districts which have been constituted since the 1st April, 1899, are entitled to a share of the Agricultural Grant under Section 50 of the Local Government (Ireland) Act, 1898. The Board are of opinion that complications in the County accounts may be avoided by the direct payment to the Urban District Council of such proportionate share.

The amounts, also, which the County Council may have agreed under Section 27 (6) of the Act to contribute to the expenses of Main Roads in Urban Districts should be paid directly, and should not be deducted from the demands.

Urban Districts are entitled to relief from County charges to the extent of their proportionate shares of the sums paid to the County Council from the Local Taxation (Ireland) Account in aid of the expenses of pauper lunatics, and in aid of Railway and Harbour charges in cases where the Urban Districts are embraced in the contributory area of charge and contribute through the County Councils. A short statement of such credits should be appended to the Table as indicated.

Urban District Councils, however, being direct participators in the Estate Duty Grant Act as Road Authorities, in the surplus arising from Dogs Licence duty, and in the Government Bounty in lieu of rates, are not entitled to participate in the Grants received by the County Council under these heads.

The demands on Urban Districts in respect of Union charges should be reduced by the proportionate share of the District in sums paid on behalf of Boards of Guardians out of the Local Taxation (Ireland) Account and from the Estate Duty Grant.

OVERDUE ACCOUNTS.

LOCAL GOVERNMENT BOARD,

DUBLIN, 19th February, 1903.

SIR,—I am directed by the Local Government Board for Ireland to state, for the information of the Council, that, owing to the large number of applications which have recently been received for the making of orders under Section 51 (7) of the Local Government (Ireland) Act, 1898, as amended by Section 4 of the Local Government (Ireland) Act, 1902, granting extensions of time within which payment may be made of debts payable out of the poor rate, the Board think it advisable to notify the conditions on which they will hereafter be prepared to accede to such applications.

Since the passing of the Local Government (Ireland) Act, 1898, owing to the fact that the provisions of Section 51 (7) might fairly be regarded as novel and unknown to creditors of local authorities administering the poor rate, the Local Government Board have felt themselves justified in all cases, when applied to, in granting extensions of time within their powers for the payment of overdue accounts. Having regard, however, to the fact that the obvious intention of this Section is to secure that the ratepayers shall, as far as possible, be called upon to provide the means of paying, in each financial half-year, the debts incurred or becoming due during each such half-year, the Board feel precluded from continuing to grant, as a matter of course, extensions of time for payment of debts, as to do so would, to a considerable extent, render the provisions of the Section of no effect.

In those circumstances, the Local Government Board have decided that, on and after the 1st of April next, they will not make orders granting extensions of time for payment of debts due out of the poor rate, except in cases in which it is clearly proved to their satisfaction that there was reasonable cause for not making application for the payment, and, if the debt was not paid, for not taking legal proceedings for recovery of the amount within three months after the expiration of the half-year in which the debt was incurred or became due.

The Local Government Board consider that the Council should cause the provisions of Section 51 (7) of the Act of 1898 and the determination of the Board as conveyed in this circular letter to be notified to all their creditors, and public notice to the same effect should be posted in some conspicuous place in the Council Chamber or Board-room.

SIR,—I am directed by the Local Government Board for Ireland to forward, herewith, for the information of the _____ a copy of amended Regulations* which the Board have made under the Locomotives on Highways Act, 1896.

Representations have been made to the Board that the provision in the existing Regulations by which the speed of Light Locomotives is restricted to six miles an hour in the rural portions of the Dublin Metropolitan Police District is unreasonable, and that this Regulation is difficult to enforce, and should only be applied to populous places.

The Board have accordingly had the Regulations under consideration, and have made an amended Order, which, among other matters, provides that within the limits of all cities, towns, and villages, the speed of Light Locomotives and Motor Bicycles shall not exceed six miles an hour, and that in rural districts such Locomotives and Bicycles may travel up to the limit prescribed by the Act, namely, fourteen miles an hour, provided the traffic in the highway admits of this speed being adopted without endangering the safety of the public.

SIR,—I am directed by the Local Government Board for Ireland to inform you that they have in preparation an Accounts Order dealing with the accounts of "Public Bodies" in Ireland, as defined by the Local Government (Ireland) Act, 1902, which they hope to issue shortly.

The Board find that some inconvenience and considerable delay has been occasioned in consequence of the provisions in the existing Accounts Orders, which prescribe that the accounts of local authorities, while closing on the last day of each half-year in respect of Receipts, shall be kept open so as to include Expenditure strictly applicable to that half-year, though not actually made for some considerable time after the termination of the half-year. The Board have, therefore, decided to direct that all accounts, both as regards Receipts and Expenditure, shall be closed and balanced for audit as at the end of each financial-year or, in the case of accounts required to be closed half-yearly, as at the end of each half-year.

I am to request that you will be good enough to act accordingly at the end of the current financial year and close your accounts, as regards Expenditure as well as Receipts, on the 31st March instant.

The Board will require that the Abstracts of all accounts shall be sent to this Office within six weeks at most from the end of each year or half-year. Such Abstracts should, in every case, be addressed to "The Secretary, Local Government Board, Dublin."

Now therefore in pursuance of the powers vested in Us by the Poor Relief (Ireland) Acts, 1838 to 1900, We the Local Government Board for Ireland do hereby rescind Our said Order bearing date the Seventeenth

day of January, 1899, and do order and declare as follows, that is to say:—

1. No person who is a Member of a county council shall be qualified to be appointed or to be a Paid Officer of any Union or Dispensary District in Ireland.

2. This Order shall come into operation on the Twenty-sixth day of May, One Thousand Nine Hundred and Two.

*Regulations in pursuance of the Pauper Children (Ireland) Acts,
1898 and 1902.*

To the Guardians of the Poor of the several Unions named in the Second Schedule hereunto annexed; and to all others whom it may concern.

WHEREAS in pursuance of the Pauper Children (Ireland) Act, 1898, We, the Local Government Board for Ireland, did, by a General Order under Our Seal bearing date the twenty-seventh day of April, 1899, make certain Regulations for the purpose of giving effect to the provisions of the said Act:

And whereas We deem it expedient to vary Our said General Order of the twenty-seventh day of April, 1899, and to make certain further Regulations for the purpose aforesaid:

Now, therefore, We, the Local Government Board for Ireland, do hereby revoke Our said General Order of the twenty-seventh day of April, 1899, and in pursuance of the powers vested in Us by the Pauper Children (Ireland) Acts, 1898 and 1902, and all other powers thereunto enabling Us, do hereby make the following Regulations for the purpose of giving effect to the provisions of the said Acts:—

Limit of Age and Conditions.

1. The age up to which orphan and deserted children may be boarded out of the Workhouse shall be fifteen years, and such children may be boarded out either within or without the limits of the Union.

2. Every person with whom any such child shall be placed out at nurse, or boarded out, shall be of the religious persuasion in which the child is registered and shall be called the foster-parent, and shall, before receiving custody of the child, enter into a Contract with the Guardians in the form prescribed in the First Schedule to this Order, binding himself or herself, as the case may be, to observe all the conditions herein contained so long as the said child shall continue at nurse or be boarded out with such foster-parent.

3. The child shall be properly and sufficiently nursed or boarded, and shall be suitably lodged and clothed, and kept clean in its person by being washed once at least every day, and at all times when necessary, and the clothes provided shall not be of such shape or colour as may denote connection with the Workhouse, or with any Institution; and no child shall be nursed or boarded out in any house unless there is a woman living there who is of full age and has experience in the management of children.

4. If the child shall at any time be suffering from illness or the effects of accident, medical relief shall be obtained for it in the manner provided by law at or from a dispensary of the Dispensary District in which the foster-parent resides, and if the Medical Officer of such District shall advise its removal to hospital, the foster-parent shall allow it to be so removed.

5. Before the signing of the said Contract the proposed foster-parent shall produce a recommendation signed by some Clergyman, Magistrate, Guardian of a Union, or Medical Officer residing in his or her neighbourhood, who may be willing to answer for his or her good conduct and respectability.

6. Before the signing of the said Contract the Guardians shall satisfy themselves that the dwelling of the proposed foster-parent is in a healthy situation, that the house contains more than one room and admits of the sexes being completely separated, that a supply of pure and wholesome drinking water is at all times readily accessible to the inmates, that good food and milk are easily obtainable, and that there is a National School or other public school, situate at a convenient distance from the dwelling.

7. There shall be inserted in the Contract the precise terms of monthly payment to the foster-parent, and such payment shall be exclusive of the cost of new clothing or repairs of clothing, and of School Fees, if any, for

the child's education, which shall be separately provided by the Guardians, and the Contract shall be sealed with the Common Seal of the Guardians.

8. The number of children who may be boarded out with one foster-parent shall not exceed two, unless all the children so boarded out are children of the same parents, or unless in any particular case We otherwise direct; and no child shall be boarded out with any person with whom children are boarded out by any person other than the Guardians, or who keeps any pig, cow, horse, donkey, or other such animal within the dwellinghouse, or who keeps any manure-pit or accumulation of filth in dangerous proximity to the dwelling.

9. No child shall be placed out at nurse, boarded out or placed out at service with any person occupying or residing in a house or premises which are licensed for the sale of intoxicating liquors by retail.

10. No child shall be boarded out in any town or village without Our consent.

11. The child shall be produced for inspection and examination at all reasonable times when required by the Relieving Officer, by any member of the Visiting Committee hereinafter mentioned, or by any person having authority from Us, or from the Guardians, to examine and inspect it.

12. The child shall be restored to the custody of the Guardians and their officers at any time when the foster-parent shall be required by the Guardians so to restore it.

Charging Expenses.

13. The name of the child, together with the other particulars required by any Order under Our Seal for the time being in force prescribing regulations for the government of Workhouses shall, on its discharge from the Workhouse, be placed on the out-door relief register, and on the out-door relief list; and the sums expended in the relief of all such cases shall be entered like other sums expended in outdoor relief, in the Relieving Officer's weekly relief and expenditure book, and the expenses of relieving such child, of conveying it to and from the home to the Workhouse, or from one home to another, and of its burial in case of death, shall be charged under the head of out-door relief, and entered in the Union accounts accordingly; and, in the case of burial service having been performed, the expense thereof shall be charged and brought to account in like manner.

Divine Worship and School.

14. The child, when of sufficient age to attend school shall, subject to the approval of the Workhouse Chaplain of the religious persuasion in which such child is registered, attend the nearest National School, or shall, subject to the approval of the Guardians and of such Chaplain, attend some other public school, and a certificate of such attendance, signed by the teacher, and showing the days of absence (if any), shall be given to the Relieving Officer each month, provided that, if the school be not a National School, the child shall be examined annually by an Inspector of the Commissioners of National Education at a convenient time and place, and the result of such examination shall be reported to the Guardians.

The child shall, when of sufficient age, attend Divine worship at the place of worship frequented by the foster-parent and his or her family

Supervision and Inspection.

15. The Guardians shall provide for the supervision of all children placed out at nurse or boarded out by them by assigning the duty of such supervision in each case to the Relieving Officer who shall discharge the same in accordance with the following regulations:—

(a.) He shall see the child safely given over in charge to the person whom the Guardians shall have selected for the purpose.

(b.) He shall pay, in advance or otherwise, as the Guardians shall direct, but not less often than once in each month, from the funds placed at his disposal by the Guardians for that purpose, the sums granted from time to time by them for the maintenance of the child.

(c.) He shall cause the child, if not already successfully vaccinated, to be vaccinated by the Medical Officer of the Dispensary District in which the foster-parent resides.

(d.) He shall visit the child once at least in every month, and also when any special occasion shall arise for visiting it, and shall report in writing immediately thereafter to the Guardians on its health, cleanliness, and treatment, together with such other particulars as the Guardians shall at any time require.

(e.) He shall, in the event of the death of the child, take steps for its burial according to the directions of the Guardians applicable generally to such cases, and shall report the circumstances of the death to the Guardians without delay.

16. The Guardians may, if they think fit, with Our consent, defray any expenses actually and properly incurred by the Relieving Officer in discharging the duties of supervision.

17. A Committee of ladies, not necessarily Guardians, shall be annually appointed as a Visiting Committee, and such Committee, or any member thereof, shall have full authority to visit any house in which a child, subject to the authority of the Guardians, is placed out at nurse, boarded out, or placed out at service, and shall report to the Guardians upon each visit.

18. No child shall, under twelve years of age, be placed out at service, and every child placed out at service shall, so long as he or she is subject to the authority of the Guardians, be visited by the Relieving Officer at such times as the Guardians shall appoint, and the Relieving Officer shall report after each visit as to the condition of the child, and as to the wages which he or she receives.

Application of Regulations.

19. These Regulations shall be deemed to apply to children placed out at nurse, boarded out, or placed out at service at any time before the issuing of this Order; and, in the event of any such child returning to the Workhouse and being again boarded out with the same or other foster-parents, the foster-parent shall in each such case contract as is provided in these Regulations; and in regard to children not coming back to the Workhouse, but remaining boarded out, the Guardians shall require each foster-parent to observe the conditions contained in these Regulations, and in every case of their not consenting to do so, or making default therein, the child shall be restored to the custody of the Guardians.

4. The Rathfarnham Dispensary District shall consist and on and since the First day of April, 1902, has consisted of the Rathfarnham District Electoral Division, as altered by the said Dublin Corporation Act, 1900, and the Whitechurch District Electoral Division.

LUNACY (IRELAND) ACT, 1901.

Circular Letter to Boards of Guardians in Ireland.

LOCAL GOVERNMENT BOARD,

DUBLIN, 3rd June, 1902.

SIR,—I am directed by the Local Government Board for Ireland to draw the attention of the Board of Guardians to the provisions of the Lunacy (Ireland) Act, 1901 (1 Edw. VII, c. 17). This Act extends to Ireland, with certain additions, the provisions of Section 322 (which relates to the ill-treatment of lunatics), and Section 324 (which relates to the abuse of female lunatics), of the Lunacy Act, 1890.

The Sections in question, with the additions referred to, are as follows—

322. If any manager, officer, nurse, attendant, servant, or other person employed in an institution for lunatics or any person having charge of a lunatic, whether by reason of any contract, or of any tie of relationship, or marriage, or otherwise, or any person employed in the care of a single patient or a lunatic in a workhouse strikes, ill-treats or wilfully neglects a patient, he shall be guilty of a misdemeanour, and, on conviction on indictment, shall be liable to fine or imprisonment, or to both fine and imprisonment, at the discretion of the court, or be liable on summary conviction for every offence to a penalty not exceeding twenty pounds nor less than two pounds.

324. If any manager, officer, nurse, attendant, or other person employed in any institution for lunatics (including an asylum for criminal lunatics), or workhouse, or any person having the care or charge of any single patient, or any attendant of any single patient, carnally knows or attempts to have carnal knowledge of any female under care or treatment as a lunatic in the institution, or workhouse, or as a single patient, he shall be guilty of a misdemeanour, and, on conviction on indictment, shall be liable to be imprisoned with or without hard labour for any term not exceeding two years; and no consent or alleged consent of such female thereto shall be any defence to an indictment or prosecution for such offence.

TRANSFER OF INSANE PERSONS FROM WORKHOUSES TO
DISTRICT LUNATIC ASYLUMS.

LOCAL GOVERNMENT BOARD,

DUBLIN, 17th July, 1902.

SIR,—The Local Government Board for Ireland find that a misconception very widely prevails amongst Boards of Guardians and their officers regarding the procedure which should be adopted in the removal of persons of unsound mind from Workhouses to the Lunatic Asylum of the County or District. The idea seems to exist that such persons can be removed to an Asylum only when committed under a magistrate's warrant, on the grounds that the lunatic is dangerous; and a case has recently come under the notice of the Board where, owing to this erroneous impression, an inmate of a Workhouse, who was practically in a dying condition, was conveyed in an ambulance to the Police Courts and committed to the Asylum, where he died a few hours after admission. In this case it was not alleged that the man was violent or dangerous, except to himself through not taking his food; and there was no evidence or suggestion that this refusal to take food was with the object of committing suicide. Yet he was committed to the Asylum as a dangerous lunatic, as the officials of the Workhouse thought that he could not be admitted to the Asylum in any other way.

The Board, therefore, consider it necessary to point out that to constitute a claim for admission to a Lunatic Asylum it is not necessary that a person should be a "dangerous lunatic" within the meaning of the Act 30 & 31 Vic., c. 118. It is sufficient that the person be of unsound mind; and the Rules governing admission to Asylums prescribe a Form of Application (D) to be filled up, perfected, and transmitted to the Resident Medical Superintendent of the Asylum at the time when the lunatic is being sent to the Asylum. The Resident Medical Superintendent is authorised to admit urgent cases in the intervals between the meetings of the Asylum Committee.

The power vested in magistrates to commit an alleged "dangerous lunatic" to an Asylum is an exceptional power intended to meet and deal with those cases only in which there is reason to apprehend the commission of an indictable crime.

The practice of committing all insane persons who have become troublesome in Workhouses as dangerous lunatics is obviously objectionable where it can be avoided; and the procedure is necessarily cumbrous and expensive, as it involves the following steps:—

The making of an affidavit that the lunatic is dangerous, whereupon he is arrested by the police;

The bringing of the lunatic before the Magistrate, who cause him to be examined by the Medical Officer of the Dispensary District, who is almost invariably awarded a fee for his services payable by the Guardians of the Union to which the lunatic belongs; and

The conveyance of the lunatic to the Asylum, after committal, by the police.

The Board are aware that the abuse above referred to has to a large extent arisen in consequence of the difficulty experienced in the past in obtaining accommodation for such patients owing to the overcrowding of the Asylums. Each County Council is now, however, bound, under Section 9 of the Local Government (Ireland) Act, 1899, to provide and maintain sufficient accommodation for the lunatic poor of the County, and within recent years considerable additional accommodation for lunatics has been provided.

When, therefore, any person who has been admitted to the Workhouse as destitute, and who on admission, or at a subsequent period, is found to be insane, the Guardians should make application to the Resident Medical Superintendent of the Lunatic Asylum for a Form of Admission

(D), and should have the form carefully filled up and transmitted to the Asylum with the lunatic, in accordance with the instructions on the form. Not only is the Medical Superintendent authorized to admit during the intervals between the meetings of the Committee, but the responsibility of refusing to afford proper care in an urgent case must rest on him, and not on the Guardians, in the event of any subsequent unfortunate occurrence.

In connection with this subject, the Board would remind the Guardians that the fact of a person being insane does not of itself establish any claim or qualification for admission to a Workhouse. In practice, no doubt, the insane poor have been admitted to and detained in Workhouses for various reasons, including the overcrowding of many of the Asylums, but nevertheless the Workhouse is not to be regarded as an institution for the reception, treatment, or custody of the insane.

The Board think the Guardians should endeavour to gradually reduce the number of insane in the Workhouse by making a selection of the worst cases from time to time, and by applying to the Authorities of the Lunatic Asylum for the necessary Form of Admission (D) as already indicated. It is hoped, that in this way, all lunatics will ultimately be removed from Workhouses to Lunatic Asylums.

MEDICINES.

LOCAL GOVERNMENT BOARD,

DUBLIN, 22nd September, 1902.

SIR,—The Local Government Board for Ireland desire to inform the Board of Guardians that they have now prepared and issued to the Medicine Analysts a Schedule of suggested standards for pharmacopoeial preparations. These standards are designed to produce uniformity of practice on the part of the Analysts when reporting upon samples of drugs for which standards have not been prescribed by the British Pharmacopoeia. The Schedule enumerates the minimum figures below which the analytical results of the various preparations, if normal, ought not to fall, and also sets out the range of specific gravity for drugs otherwise satisfactory.

The Analysts have been requested to note upon the Certificates any case in which a sample is under or over the standard and the extent to which the drug is defective, and the Contractors will then be dealt with in accordance with the provisions of the Contract and Bond. The Analysts have also been requested to bring under the notice of the Board any cases where Contractors habitually supply drugs of qualities which nearly approach the minimum standards prescribed for pure medicines. (Copy of Circular Letter to the Analysts enclosed).

The Local Government Board find it necessary at the present time to repeat, and in some particulars to amplify, the instructions conveyed in their Circular Letter of the 20th February, 1900, in regard to the selection and transmission of samples of drugs to the Analysts. It is very essential that the samples should be examined under conditions that are not unfavourable to the Contractors. The Guardians should, therefore, clearly impress on the Medical Officers of the Dispensary Districts and the Workhouse—

1. That the supplies of medicine must be ordered not less frequently than once in three months, in such quantities as shall be estimated to suffice for that period.

2. That, immediately on receipt of each quarterly consignment, the Medical Officer concerned shall carefully check the quantities with the invoice, weighing each drug, and shall note any excess or deficiency. The Medical Officer shall then personally select a few samples (three to six) and forward them to the Clerk of the Union for transmission to the Analyst, and shall mark on the invoice the items from which the selections have been made. The Medical Officer also shall see that the samples are carefully made up (sample bottles and corrugated paper for packing are included in the Prescribed Lists), and shall attach to each sample a label showing:—

- (a) The name of the Union.
- (b) The name of the Dispensary District, or Workhouse Hospital.
- (c) The Name of the Drug.
- (d) The date of delivery of the drug by Contractor at the Dispensary or Hospital.
- (e) The Name of the Medical Officer and date of forwarding sample to the Analyst.

The Clerk of the Union should provide the requisite supplies of suitable labels, and the Medical Officer should ascertain that the sample bottles are perfectly clean and dry, and he should use stoppered bottles for liquid acids and volatile drugs—the bottles to be entirely filled so as to prevent deterioration. Powders that are liable to chemical change owing to exposure should be sent in properly corked bottles. Sealing wax should not be used on the corks of the sample bottles. The Analysts have been requested to note upon their Certificates any failure to observe the above directions. The Medical Officer should at once call the Guardians' attention to any delay on the part of the Contractor in forwarding the drugs, or the invoices, which latter should be despatched on the same day as the goods.

Medical Officers should exercise their own discretion in selecting the samples, and shall be fully responsible for the judiciousness of the selections made on each occasion. The following are, however, in the experience of the Local Government Board, the drugs most likely to be adulterated or deficient in strength:—Glycerinum pepsini, Hydrargyrum cum creta, Linimentum camphoræ, Liqueur Hydrargyri perchloridi, Liqueur morphinæ hydrochloridi, Liqueur strychninæ hydrochloridi, Oxymel scellæ, Pepsinum, Pulvis glycyrrhizæ compositus, Spiritus Ætheris nitrosi, Spiritus Ammoniac Aromaticus, Syrupus ferri iodidi, Syrupus ferri phosphatis cum quina et strychnina, Unguentum Chrysarobini, Unguentum hydrargyri, Unguentum paraffini, Vinum ferri. Tinctures, Liquid Extracts, and Concentrated Liquors are frequently deficient in alcohol or in extractive.

The Local Government Board have ascertained that the quantities requisite for analytical purposes of the undermentioned drugs are:—

Tinctures, Spirits, Liquors, Wines, Liniments, Syrups, Fixed Oils, Turpentine,	4 ounces.
Liquid mineral acids, Chloroform, and Æther,	2 "

The Analyst's Reports should be recorded on the Guardians' Minutes of Proceedings at their meeting next after receipt; and the originals, which the Clerk should see contain all requisite particulars in regard to dates, should be transmitted as usual to this Department for examination. Copies should be retained in the Clerk's office and a copy furnished to each Medical Officer concerned to be filed by him for reference.

MEDICINES.

LOCAL GOVERNMENT BOARD,

DUBLIN, 22nd September, 1902.

SIR,—Adverting to previous correspondence, the Local Government Board for Ireland enclose the Schedule of suggested standards for pharmacopoeial preparations which they have laid down in accordance with the intimation conveyed in their Prescribed Lists of Medicines for the current year. The standards are binding upon the Medicine Contractors for the several Unions in Ireland; and the Local Government Board wish it to be clearly understood that the minimum figures given in the Schedule do not represent the actual results obtainable from normal drugs and preparations, but are intended to indicate the lowest points which an individual drug may be allowed to touch. A Contractor who habitually supplied drugs of the lowest standards would not, in the opinion of the Local Government Board, fulfil the obligations of his contract; and you are, therefore, particularly requested to call the attention of the Board to any such cases that come under your observation.

The Board desire that, when reporting upon samples of the preparations named in the Schedule, you will, where possible, give all the suggested estimations, and will also set out in your Certificate the standards.

Should a sample fall short of the standard figures in any particular, it should be condemned as not being up to the requirements of the Contract, unless there is some circumstance which may lead you to believe that the sample is not properly representative of the supply.

A copy of a Circular Letter now issued to Boards of Guardians, giving full directions in regard to the selection and transmission of the samples of drugs to the Analysts, is enclosed; and the Board would be much obliged if any neglect on the part of Medical Officers to carry out the instructions contained therein were adverted to in your Certificates.

It is of vital importance that Analysts' reports should be made promptly, and the Board think that, as a rule, more than fourteen days should not elapse between the date of the receipt of samples and the issue of the reports thereon.

SUGGESTED STANDARDS FOR PHARMACOPŒTICAL PREPARATIONS

August, 1902.

NOTE.—This was printed in anticipation, in the Appendix to the Report for 1901-2, in order to make public the suggestions determined upon.

SCHEDULE OF STANDARDS FOR PHARMACOPŒTICAL PREPARATIONS SUGGESTED BY THE LOCAL GOVERNMENT BOARD FOR IRELAND.

These standards, which are supplementary to those appearing in the text of the British Pharmacopœia, have been prepared, and are now issued to Union Analysts as suggestions of the results which the preparations ought to yield on analysis, and are designed to produce uniformity of practice on the part of the Analysts when reporting upon samples of drugs for which standards have not been prescribed by the Pharmacopœia.

In framing the Schedule the Board have had the advantage of receiving suggestions from the Union Analysts, which were carefully considered, and have been generally adopted. The Board have been further assisted by the advice of an eminent expert who reviewed the figures.

It should be noted that:—

(1.) The percentages given in the total Solids column represent the grammes in 100 cubic centimetres which the extract should weigh after being exposed to a temperature of 100 degrees, C., until the weight is constant.

(2.) The percentages given in the Alkaloids, &c., column represent the grammes in 100 cubic centimetres, except where otherwise stated.

(3.) The figures given for Alcoholic Strength of Tinctures, &c., are based upon theory and on observation of well-made preparations, but, as some loss may possibly occur from manipulation when working on a manufacturing scale, an allowance has been made for such loss, and the figures show the minimum percentages which the preparations ought to yield.

The Analyst will be so good as to note on the Certificates the standards required for each item, and in any case in which a sample falls below the minimum standard he should condemn it. In such cases the contractor will be dealt with as the circumstances require, in accordance with the provisions of the contract and bond.

VACCINATION: ALLEGED INSUSCEPTIBILITY.

LOCAL GOVERNMENT BOARD,

DUBLIN, 22nd December, 1902.

SIR,—The Local Government Board for Ireland desire to draw your attention to the fact that, from the Quarterly Returns of Births, Marriages and Deaths, published by the Registrar-General, it would appear that during the year ended the 31st March, 1902, no fewer than 230 children were returned as insusceptible to vaccination.

Insusceptibility to Vaccination is such a very rare constitutional peculiarity that the Board have thought it advisable to make some inquiries through their Inspectors regarding the large number of cases mentioned above.

The result of the investigations made up to the present leaves no doubt that Medical Officers have in some instances entered postponed cases, in error, under the heading of cases insusceptible, and in other instances have certified persons as insusceptible before taking adequate measures to satisfy themselves that the individuals were not capable of being successfully vaccinated.

The Board have therefore to request that, before you certify any person as insusceptible, you will be good enough to make at least three attempts to vaccinate, on three separate occasions; that on each occasion you will use fresh Lymph; and that in performing the operation of vaccination, you will proceed with great care and in strict accordance with the directions laid down in the Board's instructional memorandum on the subject, as printed in the Dispensary Regulations.

ORPHAN AND DESERTED CHILDREN—ADOPTION.

LOCAL GOVERNMENT BOARD,

DUBLIN, 12th January, 1903.

SIR.—The attention of the Local Government Board for Ireland has been directed to the practice which is becoming prevalent in some Unions of handing over to private persons, for the purpose of adoption, orphan or deserted children who have come into the custody of the Guardians.

This is a practice which is open to grave danger of abuse, and the Board do not think that Guardians should countenance it unless they have good grounds for believing that the adoption is genuine, and that the child will be well cared for by its foster-parents. It is to be feared that in some cases adoption is looked upon by the Guardians too much as an economical method of getting rid of their own responsibility towards the children, and that the real interests of the latter are not sufficiently considered. Adoption in many cases is merely a pretext under cover of which a child of less than 12 years of age is hired out in violation of Section 4 of the Pauper Children (Ireland) Act, 1898; and when the child passes from the Guardians' control, it becomes little more than an unpaid servant, with the result that its physical and mental well-being alike may suffer.

A child is likely to be very much better cared for in a home that is subject to the supervision of the Guardians, than in a house in which the value of the services of the child is the reason for the so-called adoption.

The Guardians should therefore be slow to divest themselves of their control over the child, and should not allow it to be adopted, until the fullest inquiries have been made, with a satisfactory result, as to the nature of the home offered.

The Board trust that these recommendations will receive the attention of the Guardians; and I am to request that you, as Clerk of the Union, will be good enough to notify specially to the Board all cases of adoption that may occur in your Union, specifying the age, sex, and religion of the child, and of the person who proposes to adopt it, and the motive, or alleged motive, for such adoption.

The Local Government Board do not, however, wish to throw any obstacle in the way of adoption, where the connection between foster-parent and child is of old standing, and where the adoption is the result of attachment.

CONTRACTS FOR MEDICINES AND MEDICAL AND SURGICAL APPLIANCES.

LOCAL GOVERNMENT BOARD,
DUBLIN, 17th February, 1903.

SIR,—I am directed by the Local Government Board for Ireland to transmit, herewith, a revised Form of Tender and Prescribed List of Medicines, and also a revised Form of Tender and Prescribed List of Medical and Surgical Appliances, to be used when Contracts for the year beginning the 1st of April next are being entered into. Some articles on the previous Lists, which apparently were not ordered by Medical Officers, have been omitted, while other articles have been added, and the prices have all been carefully revised. In fixing the prices the Board have taken into account that the Contractor must purchase certain chemicals, crude drugs, &c., in the open market, and deliver them at the dispensaries in the same state as purchased, while in other instances he can manufacture the preparations on the prescribed list himself.

Before prescribing the prices, the Board ascertained the actual London quotation for each drug on their List, delivered carriage paid in Dublin, and the prices now fixed, in excess of the market quotation, are such as they believe will afford a reasonable margin for competition amongst Contractors, taking into account the cost of distribution at the various Workhouses, Dispensaries, and Depots. Although the prescribed prices are, in some instances (in accordance with the markets), higher than on the previous list, the general effect of the revision is a small reduction on the entire cost of the articles. The Board desire to add that, although the average rate of abatement offered on the prescribed prices for the year ending 31st March, 1903, was 15½ per cent., yet in some Unions contracts were entered into on terms varying from 2½ per cent. to 5 per cent. abatement, apparently for no sufficient reasons. Should the Guardians again be offered such unfavourable terms, owing to the absence of competition or other cause, they would do well to re-advertise the contracts.

The Board observe that, in some Unions, the accounts for Medicines and Appliances are not paid until long after they have become due, and they have reason to believe that, in consequence, Contractors are unwilling to offer to those Unions as liberal terms as they otherwise would be prepared to give. The Board must again request that all accounts may be promptly dealt with in the manner required by the Accounts Order, and this is all the more necessary in view of the provisions of Section 51, Sub-sections 7 and 8 of the Local Government (Ireland) Act, 1896.

The Guardians should not again entrust the Contract to any firm which in the past has been found to have habitually supplied medicines not according to standard, or to have otherwise unsatisfactorily executed their

Contract; and in connection with this matter the Board will be pleased, if asked, to inform the Guardians whether certain firms have proved satisfactory in other Unions.

When a Contract has been entered into, the Contractor should immediately be furnished with a list of the several dispensaries and dispensary depots (including the Workhouse) in the Union, with their approximate distances from the nearest railway station. The names of local carriers should also be stated, and the approximate rates charged by them for the conveyance of parcels, so as to enable the Contractor to make arrangements for the prompt delivery of the goods, or the removal of the empties.

In investigating the claims for recoupment out of the Local Taxation (Ireland) Account, in respect of the cost of medicines and medical and surgical appliances, the Local Government Board find that, in many instances, Medical Officers, in filling up the requisition forms, do not enter the articles in regular numerical order as they appear on the current prescribed lists. In some cases the Medical Officers insert wrong numbers and frequently they make out their requisitions from obsolete lists. The checking of the claim for recoupment is, therefore, rendered more tedious and troublesome than it need be.

With a view to correcting such irregularities, the Clerk of the Union, on receiving a requisition from a Medical Officer, and before submitting such requisition to the Guardians, should satisfy himself that it is made out in accordance with the current prescribed lists. If not, the requisition should be returned to the Medical Officer for amendment. He should then make out and transmit to the Contractor a certified copy of the requisition, as approved by the Guardians, the original being retained in his office to be subsequently attached to the recoupment claim. In order to facilitate the Clerk in making out such a copy, and also to enable the Medical Officer more readily to keep the copy which he is required to retain for comparison with the invoice, the Board will raise no objection to the names of all articles on the prescribed lists being printed on the requisition forms. The Board are aware that this is already done in most Unions. A limited number only of the prescribed lists and requisition forms should, however, be printed, having regard to the fact that the lists are liable to vary from year to year.

As much inconvenience has been caused to the Medical Officers in regard to the weighing and checking of the supplies, in consequence of the delay on the part of the Contractors in forwarding the invoices, and their failure to mark the tare weight on the bottles, the Board request that the Guardians will insist on the invoice being despatched in duplicate, one copy to the Clerk, and one to the Medical Officer, on the same day as the goods, and that they will request the Medical Officer to call attention to any instances in which Contractors fail to do so, or to mark the tare weight.

The Board must request that the Guardians will require the Medical Officers to certify, without delay, the Invoices of Medicines or Medical and Surgical Appliances, and, to enable them to do so without difficulty, forms of Certificates should be printed and copies sent to each Medical Officer, when Invoices come to hand. Suggested forms of Certificate are appended hereto—one form to be used for Medicines and the other for Medical and Surgical Appliances.

Special attention is directed to the terms of the Certificate printed at foot of the half-yearly statement of Medical and Educational Expenditure, by which the presiding Chairman and the Clerk of the Union are required to certify that all the Medicines and Medical and Surgical Appliances, the cost of which is given in the statement, are named in the lists prescribed by the Local Government Board.

SMALLPOX—CASUAL PAUPERS.

LOCAL GOVERNMENT BOARD,

DUBLIN, 18th March, 1903.

SIR,—In view of the fact that cases of Smallpox have recently occurred in some of the Unions in this country, the Local Government Board for Ireland think it right to inform the Guardians that it is believed that the present diffusion of the disease in England is, in some measure, due to infection conveyed from place to place by persons of the vagrant class.

The Board consider, therefore, that the Guardians should use every endeavour to guard against a similar spread of the disease in this country. The Board would point out that Casuals are subject to the same rules as regards searching, cleansing, and clothing as the ordinary pauper inmates of the Workhouse. These rules require, amongst other things, that as soon as a Pauper is admitted his name and address shall be duly entered on the Register, and that he shall be placed in the Probationary Ward, and shall there remain until examined by the Medical Officer of the Workhouse.

If, as the result of such examination, the Medical Officer is of opinion that the Casual is not sufficiently protected by Vaccination, the Medical Officer should at once offer to perform the operation of Vaccination.

The Board would point out that, after the operation, the vagrant should be deemed to be under medical care, and dieted accordingly, and he might properly be relieved from work. When a vagrant comes into a Casual Ward whilst under the effects of Vaccination, although the Vaccination has not been performed in the Workhouse, he should be treated in a similar way.

The Board feel certain that Medical Officers of Workhouses will co-operate with the Guardians in endeavouring to prevent the spread of Smallpox by means of vagrants, and they think a considerable advantage would result if there were a systematic daily medical inspection of the inmates of the Casual Wards.

VACCINATION AND RE-VACCINATION.

LOCAL GOVERNMENT BOARD,

DUBLIN, 16th March, 1903.

SIR,—I am directed by the Local Government Board for Ireland to call the attention of the Board of Guardians to the fact that Small-pox, which is at present prevalent in some of the large towns in England, has also appeared in Dublin; and I am to request that, in the interests of the public health, the Guardians will be so good as to take the necessary steps for the prompt vaccination of all children or other persons in the Union, who may not yet have been vaccinated, and for the promotion of re-vaccination amongst the adolescent and adult population who may be insufficiently protected from Small-pox.

The protection against Small-pox conferred by vaccination in infancy becomes diminished as age advances, and by the age of about ten years a portion of the immunity from attack afforded by vaccination is often lost; and this is particularly the case when the vaccination in infancy

has been incomplete, owing to the operator having failed to produce a sufficiently large number of vesicles and a sufficient area of vesication. The Board require the Medical Officers to aim at producing four separate good-sized vesicles, or groups of vesicles, not less than half an inch from one another. The total area of vesication resulting from the vaccination should not be less than half a square inch.

Under Article 15, paragraph XII., of the Dispensary Rules, the re-vaccination of persons applying for the purpose at a Dispensary or Vaccination Station is limited by the following conditions:—

"1st. That the marks of the primary vaccination are not, in the opinion of the Medical Officer, sufficiently numerous, distinct, and typical to afford the necessary protection against Small-pox.

"2nd. That the person, although well vaccinated primarily, has attained the age of ten years, or, if there be an immediate danger of Small-pox, the age of seven years.

"3rd. That the person has not before been successfully re-vaccinated.

"4th. That there are no circumstances present which would render the operation undesirable."

It is essential that re-vaccinated persons, in the week following their vaccination, should submit their arms to the Medical Officer for inspection, in order that the success of the operation may be properly judged of, and that directions may be obtained as to any after treatment of the arms which may be necessary. The successful cases should then be recorded in the Vaccination Register, Form G, and may subsequently be included in the Medical Officer's next Account, Form H.

The Medical Officers should clearly understand that only those re-vaccinations are to be regarded as successful in which either vesicles, normal or modified, or papules surrounded by aureole, have resulted. A re-vaccination which does not (the interval since previous vaccination being more than ten years) produce this amount of local effect should be considered as unsuccessful, owing to want of activity of the lymph used, or other defect in the performance of the operation; it is not to be regarded as showing that the subject is immune against Small-pox.

SIR,—The Local Government Board for Ireland have received the Minutes of Proceedings of the Board of Guardians of Waterford Union on the 4th instant, containing an entry of a resolution as follows:—

"That, while the Guardians are not prepared to accede to the demand for a uniform scale of remuneration at £200 per annum for the Dispensary Medical Officers, they are quite willing that provision should be made for:—

"(1.) An annual holiday of one month, substitute to be paid by the Guardians, Government recouping half the expense.

"(2.) Superannuation being secured on the lines of the measure recently framed for that purpose.

"(3.) A fair remuneration for services rendered outside ordinary duty.

"And the Guardians strongly urge the Local Government Board to take such steps as may be in their power to give effect to the above without delay."

(No. 1.)—The Local Government Board desire to point out that the Guardians are empowered, under Article 28 of the Dispensary Rules, to allow an annual vacation, not exceeding four weeks, to each of their Dispensary Medical Officers, and to remunerate the substitutes employed to act temporarily; and under Section 5 (1) of the Local Government (Ireland) Act, 1902, recompense can be obtained out of the Local Taxation (Ireland) Account of one half of the amount paid by the Guardians, with the Local Government Board's sanction.

(No. 2.)—The Guardians have at present the power, under the existing law, to grant, subject to the consent of the Local Government Board, superannuation allowances to the Medical Officers; and, in calculating such allowances, to propose, if they see fit in deserving cases, the addition of a number of years, not exceeding ten, to the actual periods of service—provided that the allowance in any case does not exceed two-thirds of the officer's salary and emoluments. Except where a Medical Officer has resigned or ceased to hold office, owing to neglect of duty or other grave misconduct, the Local Government Board have, as a matter of course, always consented to the award of a pension to him. The Board have not refused their consent to the grant of the additional years, for the purpose of calculating the amount of the superannuation, except to Medical Officers who had proved highly unsatisfactory and undeserving of special consideration. It is, therefore, in the hands of the Guardians to secure pensions for their Medical Officers; if, however, the Medical Officers require additional guarantees in this matter, further legislation will be necessary.

(No. 3.)—It is competent to the Guardians to pay, with the approval of the Local Government Board, reasonable remuneration to their Medical Officers in respect of services rendered outside their ordinary duty—that is, for acting temporarily in adjoining Dispensary Districts, or rendering professional assistance as consultants.

The Guardians are, with the sanction of the Local Government Board, paying temporary Medical Officers the current rate of remuneration, and it is entirely within their discretion to do so.

The scale of fees in force in the Union, under Article 23 of the Dispensary Rules, for extra professional assistance, provides for a fee of £2 2s. each for midwifery and difficult operation cases, and £1 1s. each by day and £2 2s. each by night for other consultations. If this scale is considered inadequate, it is open to the Guardians to submit an amended scale for the approval of the Local Government Board.

The Local Government Board have to add that they are in complete sympathy with the Guardians in regard to the desirability of improving the positions of the Medical Officers in the service of the Union; and the Board are prepared, so far as lies in their power, to accede to any reasonable proposals which may be put forward with that object.

REPORTS ON THE WORK OF THE VACCINE DEPARTMENT FOR
THE YEAR ENDED 31st MARCH, 1903.

(I.) REPORT of Secretary of Vaccine Department.

The following is a table showing the issue of glycerinated calf lymph from the Vaccine Department since the inauguration of the present system on the 1st April, 1900, to the 31st March, 1903, and the vaccinations and re-vaccinations at the Institution during the period:—

On comparing the above figures, it will be seen that there has been a large increase in the work of the Department, both as regards the number of vaccinations and re-vaccinations, and the applications for calf lymph, and the number of tubes issued; this latter increase has been owing to the recent epidemic of smallpox in Dublin. The quality of the calf lymph supplied by Dr. Knox-Denham continues good, as proved by the vaccinations carried out here with it. The complaints of failure received from public vaccinators who had used the lymph as directed, within a week after receiving it, have largely diminished; as usual, these complaints are chiefly made during periods of hot weather, when it seems to be difficult to properly store the lymph in country dispensaries.

The vaccine pads supplied by Dr. Denham have given great satisfaction, and are, I think, one of the simplest as well as most effective forms of dressing that can be applied to the infants' arms, both on the day when vaccination is performed as well as subsequently. If the Board could arrange to have these pads included in the list of medical requisites for the public vaccinators, I think that it would tend to the more thorough carrying out of aseptic vaccination in Ireland.

The number of primary vaccinations of children over three months old shows that there has been great neglect in carrying out the provisions of the Vaccination Acts for Ireland.

In several cases two or more children belonged to the same family.

I take a keen interest in the question of insusceptibility to the vaccine virus, as, after an experience of thirty-three years as a practical vaccinator, I have never met a primary case that I could not vaccinate, and on several occasions I have at the first attempt by the arm-to-arm method vaccinated successfully cases which had been certified to be insusceptible after several attempts by other medical practitioners. The importance of this question is emphasised by the fact that in the Registrar-General for Ireland Reports each year very many cases of insusceptibility are reported. Since the year 1900, when we have been carrying out our vaccinations here with calf lymph, I have only come across three infants who, each on two occasions, resisted the insertion of calf lymph, but all of whom I subsequently successfully vaccinated by the direct or arm-to-arm method. The first failures were not due to any inactivity on the part of the calf lymph used, as in each case I made control experiments with the same lymph on several other infants, in all cases with complete success. On one occasion I successfully vaccinated (in the year 1894) at the first attempt, by the arm-to-arm method, an infant whose mother said that a man suffering from smallpox had been removed from the house in which the infant was living; a certificate of insusceptibility had been given for this infant by a medical practitioner some time previously, so I think that I may fairly claim that I saved this child's life by successful vaccination.

Judging by these facts, which came under my own observation, I think that it would be well to instruct public vaccinators in Ireland that if they twice failed to produce a successful result with fresh calf lymph, they should immediately resort to the arm-to-arm method before certifying that a child is insusceptible to vaccination.

(ii.) REPORT of the Bacteriologist to the Local Government Board.

84, ST. STEPHEN'S-GREEN, DUBLIN.

I beg to report that during the year ended March 31st, 1903, the bacteriological purity of the lymph, by which I mean its freedom at the time of issue, from objectionable micro-organisms, has not only been satisfactorily maintained, but owing to the introduction by Dr. Denham of improved methods of working, has been rendered more complete than was previously the case. The plan which Dr. Denham adopted during the year, of treating the crude pulp in the first instance with pure instead of diluted glycerine, has resulted in the production of a lymph almost devoid of the usual white and yellow coccus-colonies, at a period when, under the former system of adding dilute glycerine, these were still very abundant. As evidence of this, I have had several of the plate cultures photographed in my laboratory, and have furnished Dr. Denham with the photographs for publication in his report. They show the almost complete sterility which he has, by his present improved methods, been enabled to achieve, and which comes fully up to the requirements of modern practice.

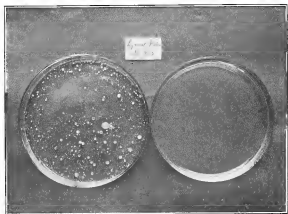

(iii.) REPORT on the Preparation and Storage of the Glycerinated Calf Vaccine Lymph used by the Vaccine Department.

VACCINE DEPARTMENT, 45, UPPER SACKVILLE-STREET,
DUBLIN, November 27th, 1905.

The methods adopted for the preparation and storage of calf lymph have materially altered since my last Report of December 2nd, 1902. As I pointed out in that Report, I visited last year several of the leading State Departments for the production of calf lymph on the Continent, and the alteration in my methods is based on my observations of the methods there employed. I now adopt, to a large extent, the methods of vaccination and storage of lymph employed by Dr. Chaumier, of Tours, which, up to the present, have given excellent results.

The calf is now vaccinated on the side, and not on the belly. I do not vaccinate in lines, as is generally done, but in large patches, with a special five-bladed knife. [The space vaccinated on, and the size of the vesicles, will be apparent from Plate L, photographed immediately before collection.] The shaving and cleansing of the skin, preparatory to vaccination, is carried out as heretofore, with the important addition that, immediately after vaccination, a sterilised linen coat is tied over the vaccinated surface. A fresh sterilised coat is put on every day, or more often if necessary. By this method the vesicles are never in danger of being rubbed, are kept freer from contact with the bedding, and, as Dr. McWeeney's reports will show, are freer from extraneous organisms derived from that source. The second important modification in my method is—that after collection, the lymph is passed through the Chalybaus machine, with only the addition of an equal part of glycerine to the pulp. No water is added. This forms a thick emulsion, so thick that it will not pour out of a glass jar. These jars are sealed, and not opened until required for tubing. At that time a sufficiency of a sterile mixture of equal parts of glycerine and water is added to this emulsion, the exact amount varying with the consistency of the emulsion, only sufficient being added to allow it to enter readily into the capillary tubes.

It is somewhat remarkable how rapidly the admixture of only equal parts of glycerine with vaccine pulp causes the extraneous organisms to disappear. In Plates 2, 3, and 4 will be seen photographs of cultures on agar-agar; the left-hand plates were made on the day of collection, and the right-hand plates only fifteen days from that date. The plates on the left show an enormous number of colonies, mainly *staphylococcus*, *aureus*, and *albus*. The right-hand plates are sterile, or nearly so. All gave excellent results vaccinally. Professor McWeeney was greatly struck by this, and in his Report on Lymph No. 205, of April 18th, 1905, he says:—

"The original plate inseminated with the standard loopful is very rich in germs, including not only the usual white and yellow coccus colonies, but also a variety of minute colony consisting of cocci unknown to me, or at any rate not usually occurring on lymph plates. There are also some colonies of sporing mesentericus forms. The dilution shows the same varieties as the original plate, and is, moreover, partly overgrown with mesentericus. This lymph cannot be issued for the present."

His subsequent Report of May 5th, on Lymphs Nos. 205, 206, and 207, fifteen days later, states:—

"The effect of glycerination is very apparent indeed in the case of these lymphs. On the second examination, made on the 1st instant, the standard loop yielded no germs whatever capable of growing on agar at 37, and the plates accordingly remained sterile. I look upon this result—should the vaccinal power prove to be unimpaired—as most creditable, and in the highest degree satisfactory."

In conjunction with Professor McWeeney, I am conducting a series of experiments on the method recently described by Dr. Alan Green for quickly freeing the lymph from extraneous germs. I shall, in my next report, furnish your Board with full particulars of the results of our experiments, together with illustrative plates.

During the year ending March 31st, 1903, we issued 111,420 tubes. The following table shows the number issued in the last three years:—

The great increase during the month of March, 1903, was due to an outbreak of smallpox in Dublin, which, although now stamped out, does not permit of being fully dealt with in present year's Report.

It is gratifying to notice that each year shows an increased output of glycerinated calf-lymph, and Dr. Montgomery reports that the lymph gives great satisfaction to the Medical Officers, and that the percentage of success obtained by them is much greater than heretofore.

REPORT OF THE PHARMACIST TO THE LOCAL GOVERNMENT BOARD ON THE ANALYSIS OF DRUGS, &c.

TO THE LOCAL GOVERNMENT BOARD FOR IRELAND.

30th April, 1903.

GENTLEMEN,

I have the honour to report, for the information of your Board, upon the work done during the past year in connection with the analysis of drugs, and the supply of medicines and medical and surgical appliances; and also as to the steps which have been taken with a view to checking and controlling the expenditure in regard to the supplies under the Medical Charities Act.

During the year, 3,094 certificates of analysis were reviewed, of which 2,596 were from dispensary districts, and 498 from workhouse infirmaries.

The certificates had reference to 9,868 distinct samples of drugs (being 1,960 in excess of the number examined in previous year), and of these 368 samples were found to be more or less below either the suggested standards, or those laid down by the Pharmacopœia.

The percentage of defective samples, most of which were only slightly out of agreement with the standards, was 3.75 of the total number examined, as compared with 3.95 last year.

As the authorised standards have now been obligatory for six months, and as many of the preparations must consequently reach a higher standard than was formerly required by some of the analysts, the above result may be regarded as satisfactory.

It is a remarkable fact that whereas in former years the most general reason for rejection of galenical preparation was deficiency of alcohol, the experience of the past year has been that the average alcoholic strength was not only well above the minima laid down by the Board, but in most cases was above the percentage which experienced pharmacists regard as the average for well-made preparations.

Out of 2,697 samples of tinctures, only eighteen were reported as deficient in alcohol.

Deficiency of extractive, and deficiency or excess of alkaloids, caused the greater number of unfavourable reports.

This latter source of failure is entirely due to want of care in accurately standardising, as directed by the Pharmacopœia; and contractors must give more attention to this matter.

Except in a few cases, in which the drugs had been used up, the defective supplies were replaced by the contractors.

The inorganic salts and other chemicals were again found to be well up to the Pharmacopœial standard of purity, the few exceptions being the result of careless storage.

The annexed table shows the details in which the various classes of drugs failed to satisfy the analysts.

The above total exceeds the number of samples actually rejected (288), some samples being defective in more than one particular.

* 13 samples Sp. Ether, Nitrod. The condition of this drug was much improved by being supplied in one lb. bottles only.

† Pepsine preparations were condemned early in the year, but later on were uniformly good. Two samples of Ferris of Amazoni Citrus were not up to B. P. standard of purity, and samples of Ammonium Chloride, Ammonium Carbonate, and Magnesia had been badly stored. Summary I. shows the average analytical results obtained from the Examination of Tinctures, Liquors, and Liquid extracts as compared with the suggested Standards.

PRESCRIBED LISTS OF MEDICINES, AND MEDICAL AND SURGICAL
APPLIANCES.

The lists have been carefully revised for the coming year; experience having shown that several items were seldom or never requisitioned by the medical officers. These have been withdrawn, and a small number of drugs have been introduced which were suggested by the Board's Medical Inspectors and the Medical Officers.

The prices have been carefully compared with London wholesale lists; to the prices in which a small addition has been made to cover cost of distribution and competitive discount.

The Board have inserted a condition in the prescribed list of medical and surgical appliances, which requires certain articles to be stamped with the name of the maker, who must be of repute, in order to secure a higher quality of surgical instruments than has been generally supplied hitherto.

ANALYSTS.

The work of the analysts has been carefully done, and there is a marked improvement in the promptness with which reports are furnished.

The Board have intimated to the analysts that in their opinion the reports should be made not later than fourteen days from the receipt of samples, and this interval is now seldom exceeded. The approved form of certificate is used by all the analysts, and produces greater smoothness in carrying out the regulations than was possible before.

The schedule of suggested standards, the preparation of which was referred to in last Report, has been completed, and was issued on the 22nd September, 1902.

In the final stages of its preparation the Board had the advantage of the advice of Mr. J. C. Umney, of London, as well as of the analysts and larger contractors; and the schedule has been very favourably received by scientific pharmacists as being sound in principle and in strict accordance with practical experience.

It has not only facilitated the work of the union analysts, but proves to be a great assistance in keeping the records of analytical results.

Tables are given in Appendix I., which show clearly that the figures laid down in the schedule are in agreement with the actual results which have been obtained.

The ascertained averages in these tables are calculated from *all samples*, whether above or below the suggested minimum standard.

CONTRACTORS.

As shown by the facts stated above, as well as by the reduced percentage of samples rejected, the contractors have generally carried out their contracts satisfactorily.

The Board found it necessary to warn the contractors in eleven unions; but in forty-eight unions there was not a single complaint during the year.

MEDICAL OFFICERS.

There is a marked improvement in the observance of the regulations by the Medical Officers as regards the supply and the analysis of drugs.

The Board, when issuing the schedule of standards, issued a very full circular letter to Boards of Guardians, giving renewed instructions with regard to ordering medicines and forwarding samples for analysis.

The regulations made are now working very smoothly: quarterly requisitions for drugs are made more generally; samples are sent at once to the analyst on receipt of supplies; they are put up with more care; and the prescribed labels are generally used.

The interval between the receipt of the supplies and the date of the analyst's report seldom exceeds three weeks; two years ago it averaged three months.

CLAIMS FOR RECOUPMENT.

The examination of the accounts connected with the claims of the Boards of Guardians for recoupment from the Local Taxation (Ireland) Account, which was commenced last year, has been continued, and carried out in greater detail for the two half-years ended the 31st March and the 30th September, 1902, with the result that a considerable saving has been effected to public funds.

The contractors' invoices, the Medical Officers' requisitions, and the accounts prepared by the clerks of the unions were examined, and attention was directed to the following particulars:—

- (1) Expenditure, which appeared to be excessive, having regard to the number of patients treated.
- (2) Items ordered in excess of reasonable requirements.
- (3) Recoupment improperly claimed upon articles not in prescribed lists.
- (4) Want of punctuality in settling accounts.
- (5) Overcharges in contractors' accounts.
- (6) Neglect by Medical Officers to order medicines quarterly.

As regards the accounts for the half-year ended March, 1902, it was necessary to call attention to matters of the above nature in sixty-nine unions.

It may be mentioned that in that half-year the accounts of Belfast Union were found to be very unsatisfactory. As the result of a sworn inquiry, recoupment was disallowed upon a sum of £427 11s., which was held to have been expended extravagantly, while a sum of £121 was refunded by the contractor as an overcharge upon extras supplied, and a further sum was surcharged upon the Medical Officers of the infirmary.

Reports of a similar kind were made upon the accounts for the half-year ended September, 1902, in ninety-five unions.

There was, therefore, a reduction of £1,316 16s. in the amount claimed in the latter half-year, mostly in unions in which excessive expenditure had been reported in the previous half-year.

Summary II., attached, shows the number of certificates of analysis issued in each union, and number of samples unfavourably reported on.

Summary III. shows the various abatements allowed by medicine contractors, the average amount being nearly 15½ per cent.

I.—ORDERS.

(i.) GENERAL ORDERS (arranged according to date).

THE FACTORY AND WORKSHOP ACT, 1901.—Prescribing Form of Requisition for copy Certificate of Birth.

To all Superintendent Registrars, and Registrars of Births and Deaths in Ireland; and to all others whom it may concern:

WHEREAS by Section 134 of the Factory and Workshop Act, 1901, as applied to Ireland by Section 160 of the said Act, it is enacted as follows:—

"Where the age of any young person under the age of sixteen years or child is required to be ascertained or proved for the purposes of this Act, or for any purpose connected with the employment in labour or elementary education of the young person or child, any person shall on presenting a written requisition in such form and containing such particulars as may be from time to time prescribed by the Local Government Board for Ireland, and on payment of a fee of sixpence, be entitled to obtain a certified copy under the hand of a registrar or superintendent registrar of the entry in the register, under the Births and Deaths Registration Ireland Acts, 1863 to 1880, of the birth of that young person or child; and such form of requisition shall, on request, be supplied without charge by every superintendent registrar and registrar of births, deaths, and marriages."

Now therefore, We, the Local Government Board for Ireland, in pursuance of the powers given to Us by the Statutes in that behalf, do hereby Order as follows, that is to say:—

Article I.—The requisition to be made to entitle any person to obtain a certified copy of an entry of a registry of birth under the section above cited shall be in the Form set forth in the Schedule to this Order.

Article II.—This Order shall come into operation on the First day of July, One Thousand nine hundred and two.

Regulations as to Cholera, Yellow Fever, and Plague.—Amending Order.

GENERAL.

To the Officers of Customs in Ireland; to the Port Sanitary Authorities in Ireland; to the several Councils of Urban and Rural Districts in Ireland abutting on any port or part of a port not subject to the jurisdiction of a Port Sanitary Authority; to all Masters of Ships; to all Pilots; and to all other Persons whom it may concern:

WHEREAS, We, the Local Government Board for Ireland, by a General Order, dated the 30th day of November, 1900, in the exercise of the powers conferred upon Us by Section 148 of the Public Health (Ireland) Act, 1878, and the Public Health Act, 1896, and of every other power enabling Us in that behalf, made certain regulations (hereinafter referred to as "the Regulations"), with a view to the treatment of persons affected with Cholera, Yellow Fever, or Plague, and for the prevention of the spread of such diseases;

And whereas by Article 26 of the Regulations it is provided as follows:

"Art. 26.—The Master of every ship infected with Cholera, Yellow Fever, or Plague shall, when within three miles of the coast of any part of Ireland cause to be hoisted at the masthead, or where best seen, a large flag of yellow and black, borne quarterly, and shall keep the same displayed during the whole of the time between sunrise and sunset, and no person (other than an officer of Customs or a person acting in the execution of this Order) shall leave such ship until after such visit of the Officer of Customs as is mentioned in Article 2, or until after the visit of the Medical Officer of Health in pursuance of Article 8."

And whereas it is expedient that further provision as hereinafter mentioned should be made with respect to the signals to be hoisted by the Master of every ship infected with Cholera, Yellow Fever, or Plague, and the Board of Trade have signified their assent in the matter:

Now therefore, in pursuance of the powers conferred upon Us by the Acts aforesaid, and of every power enabling Us in that behalf, We, the Local Government Board for Ireland do by this Our Order make the following regulations and We declare that the same shall be duly enforced and executed:

The Regulations shall apply and have effect as if for Article 26 of the regulations the following Article were substituted, that is to say:

"Art. 26.—The Master of every ship infected with Cholera, Yellow Fever, or Plague shall, when such ship is within three miles of the coast of any part of Ireland, or is within the limits of a Port, cause to be hoisted—

"(i.) At the masthead, or where it can be best seen, during the whole of the time between sunrise and sunset, a day signal, consisting of a large flag of yellow and black borne quarterly; or

"(ii.) At the peak or other conspicuous place where it can be best seen, and at a height of not less than twenty feet above the hull of the ship during the whole of the time between sunset and sunrise, a night signal, consisting of three lights which shall be arranged, at a distance of not less than six feet apart, in the form of an equilateral triangle, and of which the light at the apex of the triangle shall be white, and the other lights at the ends of the base of the triangle shall be red in colour.

"No person (other than an Officer of Customs or a person acting in the execution of this Order) shall leave the aforesaid ship until after each visit of the Officer of Customs as is mentioned in Article 2, or until after the visit of the Medical Officer of Health in pursuance of Article 3."

NOTICE.—The Public Health Act, 1896, provides, by sub-section (3) of Section 1, and sub-section (b) of Section 4, that if any person wilfully neglects or refuses to obey or carry out, or obstructs the execution of, any regulation made under section 143 of the Public Health (Ireland) Act, 1878, as amended by the Public Health Act, 1896, he shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding one hundred pounds, and in the case of a continuing offence to a further penalty not exceeding fifty pounds for every day during which the offence continues.

AMENDED GENERAL REGULATIONS UNDER THE LOCOMOTIVES ON HIGHWAYS Act, 1896.

THE LOCAL GOVERNMENT BOARD FOR IRELAND.

To the Council of each Administrative County in Ireland: to the Council of each Urban County District in Ireland; and to all others whom it may concern:—

WHEREAS by Section 6 of the Locomotives on Highways Act, 1896 (hereinafter called the Act), it is enacted that—

"(1.) The Local Government Board may make regulations with respect to the use of light locomotives on highways, and their construction, and the conditions under which they may be used.

"(2.) * * * All regulations under this section shall have full effect notwithstanding anything in any other Act, whether general or local, or any byelaws or regulations made thereunder." And whereas by Section 2 of the Act it is enacted that—

"During the period between one hour after sunset and one hour before sunrise, the person in charge of a light locomotive shall carry attached thereto a lamp so constructed and placed as to exhibit a light in accordance with the regulations to be made by the Local Government Board."

And whereas by Section 3 of the Act it is enacted that—

"Every light locomotive shall carry a bell or other instrument capable of giving audible and sufficient warning of the approach or position of the carriage."

And whereas by Section 4 of the Act it is enacted that—

"No light locomotive shall travel along a public highway at a greater speed than fourteen miles an hour, or than any less speed that may be prescribed by regulations of the Local Government Board."

And whereas by Section 11 of the Act it is enacted that—

“In the application of this Act to Ireland a reference to the Local Government Board for Ireland shall be substituted for a reference to the Local Government Board” * * * * *

And whereas by Section 7 of the Act it is enacted that—

“A breach of any * * * regulation made under this Act, * * * may, on summary conviction, be punished by a fine not exceeding ten pounds.”

Now therefore, in pursuance of the powers given to Us by the Act, and by any other Statutes in that behalf, We, the Local Government Board for Ireland, do by this our Order make the following Regulations with respect to the use of Light Locomotives on Highways, and their construction, and the conditions under which they may be used, and direct that the same shall have effect on and after the Thirty-first day of March, One Thousand Nine Hundred and Three.

Article I.—In these Regulations—

The expression “carriage” includes a waggon, cart, or other vehicle.

The expression “horse” includes a mule or other beast of draught or burden, and the expression “cattle” includes sheep.

The expression “Light Locomotive” means a vehicle propelled by mechanical power which is under three tons in weight unladen, and is not used for the purpose of drawing more than one vehicle (such vehicle with its locomotive not exceeding in weight unladen four tons), and is so constructed that no smoke or visible vapour is emitted therefrom except from any temporary or accidental cause; but the expression Light Locomotive shall not include a motor bicycle.

In calculating for the purposes of these Regulations the weight of a vehicle unladen, the weight of any water, fuel, or accumulators, used for the purpose of propulsion, shall not be included.

Article II.—No person shall cause or permit a Light Locomotive or motor bicycle to be used on any highway, or shall drive or have charge of any such locomotive or bicycle when so used, unless the conditions hereinafter set forth shall be satisfied, namely—

(1.) Every Light Locomotive, if it exceeds in weight unladen five hundredweight, shall be capable of being so worked that it may travel either forwards or backwards.

(2.) No Light Locomotive shall exceed six and a half feet in width, such width to be measured between its extreme projecting points.

(3.) The tyre of each wheel of every Light Locomotive, shall be smooth and shall, where the same touches the ground, be flat and of the width following namely—

- (a) if the weight of a Light Locomotive unladen exceeds fifteen hundredweight, but does not exceed one ton, not less than two and a half inches;
- (b) if such weight exceeds one ton, but does not exceed two tons, not less than three inches;
- (c) if such weight exceeds two tons, not less than four inches.

Provided that where a pneumatic tyre or other tyre of a soft and elastic material is used, the tyre may be round or curved, and there may be upon the same projections or bosses rising above the surface of the tyre if such projections or bosses are of the same material as that of the tyre itself, or of some other soft and elastic material. The width of the tyre shall, for the purpose of this proviso, mean the extreme width of the soft and elastic material on the rim of the wheel when not subject to pressure.

(4.) Every Light Locomotive shall have two independent brakes in good working order, and of such efficiency that the application of either to such Locomotive shall cause two of its wheels on the same axle to be so held that the wheels shall be effectually prevented from revolving, or shall have the same effect in stopping the Light Locomotive as if such wheels were so held.

(5.) Clause (4) of this article shall apply to a motor bicycle, and shall so apply as if, instead of two wheels on the same axle, one wheel was therein referred to.

(6.) Every Light Locomotive and motor bicycle shall be so constructed as to admit of its being at all times under such control as not to cause undue interference with passenger or other traffic on any highway.

(7.) In the case of a Light Locomotive drawing or constructed to draw another vehicle or constructed or used for the carriage of goods, the name of the owner and the place of his abode or business, and in every such case and in the case of every Light Locomotive weighing unladen one ton and a half or upwards, the weight of the Light Locomotive unladen shall be painted in one or more straight lines upon some conspicuous part of the right or off side of the Light Locomotive in large legible letters in white upon black or black upon white, not less than one inch in height.

(8.) Every Light Locomotive and motor bicycle and all the fittings thereof shall be in such a condition as not to cause, or to be likely to cause, danger to any person on such Light Locomotive or bicycle or on any highway.

(9.) There shall be in charge of every Light Locomotive and motor bicycle when used on any highway a person competent to control and direct its use and movement.

(10.) The lamp to be carried attached to every Light Locomotive in pursuance of Section 2 of the Act shall be so constructed and placed as to exhibit a white light visible within a reasonable distance in the direction towards which such Locomotive is proceeding or is intended to proceed, and to exhibit a red light so visible in the reverse direction, and such lamp shall be placed on the extreme right or off side of the Light Locomotive in such a position as to be free from all obstruction to the light.

(11.) In the case of a motor bicycle the lamp to be carried as aforesaid shall be so constructed and placed as to exhibit a white light in the direction in which such bicycle is proceeding adequate to signal the approach or position of such bicycle.

Article III.—No person shall cause or permit a Light Locomotive or bicycle to be used on any highway for the purpose of drawing any vehicle, or shall drive or have charge of any such Locomotive or bicycle when used for such purpose, unless the conditions hereinafter set forth in so far as they apply to such Locomotive or bicycle or vehicle shall be satisfied, namely—

(1.) Clauses (2), (3), (6), and (8) of Article II. of these Regulations shall apply as if the vehicle drawn by the Light Locomotive was therein referred to instead of the Light Locomotive itself, and Clause (7) of the said Article shall apply as if such vehicle was a Light Locomotive constructed for the carriage of goods; and Clauses (6) and (8) of the said Article shall apply to a vehicle drawn by a motor bicycle as if such vehicle was therein referred to instead of such bicycle.

(2.) The vehicle drawn by the Light Locomotive or motor bicycle, except where the Light Locomotive travels at a rate not exceeding four miles an hour, shall have a brake in good working order of such efficiency that its application to the vehicle shall cause two of the wheels of the vehicle on the same axle to be so held that the wheels shall be effectually prevented from revolving, or shall have the same effect in stopping the vehicle as if such wheels were so held,

(3.) The vehicle drawn by the Light Locomotive shall, when under Clause (2) of this Article a brake is required to be attached thereto, carry upon the vehicle a person competent to apply efficiently the brake: Provided that it shall not be necessary to comply with the requirements of the said Clause if the brakes upon the Light Locomotive by which the vehicle is drawn are so constructed and arranged that neither of such brakes can be used without bringing into action simultaneously the brake attached to the vehicle drawn, or if the brake of the vehicle drawn can be applied from the Light Locomotive independently of the brakes of the latter.

(4.) Between one hour after sunset and one hour before sunrise there shall be carried attached to the vehicle drawn by the Light Locomotive or motor bicycle a lamp or lamps so constructed and in such a position as to exhibit a red light or lights visible within a reasonable distance in the reverse direction to that in which the vehicle is proceeding and also right and left of such direction at right angles thereto.

Article IV.—The following rules shall be observed by every person driving or in charge of a Light Locomotive (and where specially mentioned a motor bicycle) when used on any highway, that is to say:—

(1.) Subject to the provisions of the Act as to speed he shall not drive the Light Locomotive or motor bicycle at any speed greater than is reasonable and proper having regard to the traffic on the highway, or so as to endanger the life or limb of any person, or to the common danger of passengers.

(2.) If the weight unladen of the Light Locomotive is one ton and a half and does not exceed two tons, he shall not drive the same at a greater speed than eight miles an hour, or if such weight exceeds two tons at a greater speed than five miles an hour.

Provided that whatever may be the weight of the Light Locomotive, if it is used on any highway to draw any vehicle, he shall not under any circumstances drive it at a greater speed than six miles an hour.

Provided also that no Light Locomotive or motor bicycle shall travel along any public highway within the limits of any city, town, or village, at a greater speed than six miles an hour, or, if its weight, unladen, exceeds two tons, at a greater speed than five miles an hour.

(3.) He shall not cause the Light Locomotive to travel backwards for a greater distance or time than may be requisite for purposes of safety.

(4.) He shall not negligently or wilfully cause any hurt or damage to any person, carriage, horse, or cattle, or to any goods conveyed in any carriage on any highway, nor shall he when on the Light Locomotive or motor bicycle be in such a position that he cannot have control over the same, nor shall he quit such Locomotive or bicycle without having taken due precautions against its being started in his absence, nor shall he allow any such Locomotive or bicycle or a vehicle drawn thereby to stand on such highway so as to cause any unnecessary obstruction thereof.

(5.) He shall when meeting any carriage, horse, or cattle keep the Light Locomotive or motor bicycle on the left or near side of the road, and when passing any carriage, horse, or cattle proceeding in the same direction keep such Locomotive or bicycle on the right or off side of the same.

(6.) He shall not negligently or wilfully prevent, hinder, or interrupt the free passage of any person, carriage, horse, or cattle on any highway, and shall keep the Light Locomotive or motor bicycle and any vehicle drawn thereby on the left or near side of the road for the purpose of allowing such passage.

(7.) He shall, whenever necessary, by sounding the bell or other instrument required by Section 3 of the Act, give audible and sufficient warning of the approach or position of the Light Locomotive or motor bicycle.

(8.) He shall on the request of any police constable, or of any person having charge of a reeve horse, or on any such constable or person putting up his hand as a signal for that purpose, cause the Light Locomotive or motor bicycle to stop and to remain stationary so long as may be reasonably necessary.

Article V.—If the Light Locomotive is one to which Clause (7) of Article II. of these Regulations applies, and the particulars required by that Clause are not duly painted thereon, or in the case of a motor bicycle or of a Light Locomotive to which that Clause does not apply, the person driving or in charge thereof shall, on the request of any constable, or on the reasonable request of any other person, truly state his name and place of abode, and the name of the owner, and the place of his abode or business.

Article VI.—This Order may be cited as "The Light Locomotives on Highways (Ireland) Order, 1903."

Order in pursuance of Article 2 of the Second Schedule of the Housing of the Working Classes Act, 1890.

WHEREAS the provisions contained in the Second Schedule of the Housing of the Working Classes Act, 1890, are applicable for the purpose of the taking of lands compulsorily by purchase whenever a provisional order empowering the council of a county or of an urban or rural district, or any town commissioners in that behalf under the Public Health (Ireland) Acts, 1878 to 1900, under Parts I. and III. of the Housing of the Working Classes Act, 1890, under the Housing of the Working Classes (Ireland) Act, 1896, or under the Local Government (Ireland) Acts, 1898 to 1902, shall have become absolute or shall have been confirmed:

And whereas it is directed by the said schedule in effect, that any such council or town commissioners shall, as soon as practicable after any such order shall have taken effect and come into force, cause to be made out maps and schedules of all lands proposed to be taken compulsorily (which lands are hereinafter referred to as the scheduled lands) and that such maps shall be upon such scale and be framed in such manner as may be prescribed by Us:

Now, therefore, in pursuance of the powers vested in Us, We, the Local Government Board for Ireland, do hereby prescribe that the following provisions shall take effect, with respect to the maps of the scheduled lands required to be made by any such council or town commissioners:

1. The maps shall be upon a scale of not less than one inch to every 220 feet, and unless the whole of such maps shall be upon a scale of not less than one inch to every hundred feet an enlarged plan shall be added of any building, yard or garden upon a scale of not less than one inch to every hundred feet.

2. Each field, enclosure, road, passage, house, building, stream, well or spring, which is to be taken, wholly or in part, shall be clearly shown on the maps, with the fences of the lands abutting

thereon accurately indicated, and with the areas to be taken marked in acres, roods, and perches, statute measure, and clearly defined by boundaries.

3. Each separate parcel of land or property of any kind shall be indicated and marked on the maps by a distinctive number corresponding to a number assigned to such property in the schedule of the scheduled lands.

4. The maps shall show the names of the townlands, electoral divisions, county districts and counties in which the scheduled lands are situated, and all townland boundaries so far as they intersect or closely adjoin the scheduled lands.

5. The scale of the map shall be clearly marked thereon and the points of the compass and a portion of any closely adjoining street or road shown, with the name thereof, or with words indicating the towns or villages to or from which the street or road leads.

WHEREAS by Article 25 of an Order under Our Seal of Office bearing date the Thirtieth day of November, 1900 (hereinafter referred to as The Order) We, the Local Government Board for Ireland, did in effect direct that all expenses which might be incurred by any Sanitary Authority in carrying out the provisions of The Order should be defrayed out of a common fund to be contributed in such proportions as We should from time to time order by the Sanitary Authorities whose districts form part of or abut on the port within which the provisions of The Order were to be enforced and executed by such Sanitary Authority:

And whereas the District Councils of Galway Urban District, Gort, Ballyvaghan, Ennistymon, Oughterard, Clifden, and Galway Rural Districts respectively are Sanitary Authorities whose districts form part of or abut on the Port of Galway:

And whereas the District Council of Galway Rural District have certified to Us that in carrying out the provisions of The Order during the period beginning on the First day of October, 1900, and ended on the Thirtieth day of September, 1902, they incurred expenses amounting to the sum of £47 15s. 0d., in connection with an intercepting hospital at Reamore Point for the treatment of sea-borne cases of Cholera, Yellow Fever and Plague:

Now therefore, We, the Local Government Board for Ireland, do hereby Order and declare that the proportion of the said sum of £47 15s. 0d. to be contributed by the District Council of each of the Districts named in column I. of the Schedule hereunto annexed is the sum which is set forth in column II. of the said Schedule opposite to the name of each such District. And We do further order and declare that the sums set forth in column II. of the said Schedule opposite to the name of each of the said Districts, other than Galway Rural District, shall be paid by the District Council of each such District to the District Council of Galway Rural District.

WHEREAS by Section 5 of the Dublin, Rathmines and Rathgar, and Pembroke (Equalisation of Rates) Act, 1901 (hereinafter referred to as the Act), it is enacted as follows, that is to say:—

“ 5.—(1) The Local Government Board may if they think fit cause inquiries to be held for any of the purposes of this Act by such persons as they may appoint, and the provisions of sections 210 and 213 of the Public Health (Ireland) Act, 1878, shall apply to such inquiries as if the same were inquiries under that Act held by inspectors of the Local Government Board.

“(2) The costs and expenses incurred by the Local Government Board in holding inquiries under this section, including fees payable to any legal assessor who may be required by that Board for the purpose of those inquiries shall be paid by the authorities in such proportions and out of such funds or rates as the Local Government Board may determine, and the authorities may borrow for the purposes of this sub-section as if the same were purposes for which they are authorised to borrow under the Public Health (Ireland) Act, 1878.”

And whereas by Section 2 of the Act it is enacted in effect that in the Act unless the context otherwise requires, "The Local Government Board" means the Local Government Board for Ireland; and "the Authorities" mean the Right Honourable the Lord Mayor, Aldermen, and Burgesses of Dublin acting by the Town Council, hereinafter referred to as the Corporation, and the Urban District Councils of Rathmines and Rathgar, and Pembroke;

And whereas We, the said Local Government Board, did cause an inquiry to be held for the purposes of the Act:

And whereas by Section 210 of the Public Health (Ireland) Act, 1878, as applied by the above-cited Section 5 of the Act, it is enacted in effect that We, the said Local Government Board, may make Orders as to the cost of inquiries or proceedings instituted by Us under the Act; and that every such Order may be made a rule of one of the Superior Courts of Law on the application of any person named therein:

Now, therefore, We, the Local Government Board for Ireland, in exercise of the powers given to Us by Section 5 of the Act, do hereby order and direct that the costs incurred by Us in holding the said inquiry as aforesaid, amounting as we hereby certify, to a total sum of Nine Hundred and Eighteen Pounds Eighteen Shillings and One Penny, shall be paid by the authorities in the proportions following, that is to say:—

By the Corporation—Seven Hundred and Four Pounds Ten Shillings and Twopence;

By the Urban District Council of the Urban District of Rathmines and Rathgar—One Hundred and Twenty-six Pounds Twelve Shillings and Threepence;

By the Urban District Council of the Urban District of Pembroke—Eighty-seven Pounds Fifteen Shillings and Eightpence;

And We do further order and direct that the proportion payable by the Corporation shall be paid by them out of the Improvement Fund and Improvement Rate, that the proportion payable by the Urban District Council of the Urban District of Rathmines and Rathgar shall be paid by that Council out of the Rathmines Township Rate, and that the proportion payable by the Urban District Council of the Urban District of Pembroke shall be paid by that Council out of the Pembroke Township Rate.

WHEREAS by Sub-sections (6) and (8) of Section Three of the Dublin, Rathmines and Rathgar, and Pembroke (Equalisation of Rates) Act, 1901 (hereinafter referred to as the Act), it is enacted as follows, that is to say:—

"(6) Any sum payable by any of the authorities under the provisions of this section shall be called an equalisation payment and shall be made by two equal payments in each financial year on such dates and to such other or others of the authorities aforesaid as the Local Government Board shall determine and the amount of every such pay-

ment shall be a debt due to the authority entitled to receive the same and may be recovered by such last-mentioned authority in any court of competent jurisdiction and a certificate under the seal of the Local Government Board that the amount sued for is due to the authority suing for the same from the authority so sued shall be sufficient evidence in all courts that the authority so suing is entitled to recover the same."

"(8) The equalisation payment shall be applied by the authority receiving the same towards defraying the expenses mentioned in the Schedule of this Act or such of them as such authority shall with the sanction of the Local Government Board determine and such authority shall within a time to be prescribed by the Local Government Board render to that Board an account showing how the equalisation payment has been applied in each financial year."

And whereas by Section 2 of the Act it is enacted in effect that in the Act unless the context otherwise requires, "The Local Government Board" means the Local Government Board for Ireland; and "the Authorities" mean the Right Honourable the Lord Mayor, Aldermen, and Burgesses of Dublin acting by the Town Council, and the Urban District Councils of Rathmines and Rathgar, and Pembroke:

And whereas We, the said Local Government Board, did, by an Order under Our Seal, bearing date the Seventeenth day of March, 1902, determine the amounts of the several equalisation payments to be made under the Act, and the several authorities by and to whom the same are to be made:

And whereas it is necessary for Us to determine, in accordance with the provisions of the above-cited Sub-section (6) of the said Section Three of the Act, the dates on which the two equal payments in respect of each of the several equalisation payments determined as aforesaid are to be made by the several authorities by whom such equalisation payments are to be made, and further to prescribe the time within which any authority receiving any such equalisation payment, shall render to Us the account in Sub-section (8) of the said Section Three of the Act mentioned:

Now, therefore, We, the Local Government Board for Ireland, in exercise of the powers given to Us by Sub-sections (6) and (8) of Section Three of the Act, do hereby order, determine, and prescribe, concerning the dates of making equalisation payments by the several authorities by whom the same are payable, and concerning the time within which any authority receiving any such payment is to render to Us an account showing how such payment has been applied in each local financial year, as follows, that is to say:—

1. The two equal payments in respect of each equalisation payment shall be made by the authority from whom such payment is due, in the manner following, namely, one such equal payment shall be made on or before the Thirty-first day of July and the other such payment on or before the Thirty-first day of January in each local financial year.
2. Every authority receiving an equalisation payment shall render to Us, within one month from the close of each local financial year, the account required by Sub-section (8) of Section Three of the Act to be rendered showing how such payment has been applied in such financial year.

II.—REPORTS.

(L)—REPORT ON THE SANITARY CIRCUMSTANCES AND ADMINISTRATION OF ARKLOW.

(RATHDRUM RURAL DISTRICT.)

TO THE LOCAL GOVERNMENT BOARD FOR IRELAND.

GENTLEMEN,—I have the honour to submit the following report regarding the sanitary condition and circumstances of the town of Arklow.

Arklow in point of population is the largest town in the county of Wicklow—the population, according to the last census (1901), is very nearly 5,000; the total valuation is £5,805 15s., and the number of inhabited houses 2,014. The town is under municipal government, and is divided into two wards, viz., Nos. 1 and 2 Urban, which return twelve Commissioners. For public health purposes the town is under the jurisdiction of the Rathdrum Rural District Council.

Water supply.

The water supply is altogether derived from pump wells, several of which are in the immediate vicinity of dwelling-houses, and in the centre of closely congested and populous areas. There is one open dipping well, apparently very largely used, which is situated in one of the main thoroughfares, quite near to several houses. There is a great danger of this well becoming polluted from its situation, and from the fact that surface water and street refuse can easily find their way into it. Steps should be taken to protect this well, especially as it supplies a very large number of persons with water for drinking purposes.

Sewerage and drainage.

Wherever there exists a main sewer, I am informed that it is constructed, as a rule, on the rubble pattern system, and very little flushing takes place, the result being that large deposits of sewage matter must remain unremoved. A very considerable portion of the town is without any proper system of sewerage and drainage. In the lower, or Fisheries

quarter, a large section of the area is intersected with surface drains that receive filth and slops from the houses, and very offensive odours are emitted. In view of the fact that there is a large and increasing population in Arklow, the question of providing a proper system of sewerage and drainage is one of urgency and should not be delayed. The present conditions cannot much longer be allowed to exist without grave danger to the health of the inhabitants. Near to the locality known as "Toole's Open," and "The Togher," on the occasion of my visit of inspection, there were two large and filthy fermenting cesspools, which are evidently fed with drainage and surface percolation. These cesspools in themselves would be sufficient to cause an outbreak of infectious disease, and steps should be taken to abate this dangerous nuisance, which must be regarded as a menace to the health of the people residing in the locality.

The housing of the labouring classes cannot, as a whole, be regarded as satisfactory, inasmuch as in several portions of the town there is distinct evidence of overcrowding. An instance of the congestion that exists is found in River-lane, where there are between thirty and forty houses closely packed together, many of them in a state of dilapidation, and without any backyard accommodation. In some of the houses that I visited here, and which only contained one room, there was marked evidence of overcrowding. In one instance I found twelve persons inhabiting one room; in another there were nine in family; in several there were eight in family, the average number being about five or six. It will thus be seen that the condition under which the people live in this locality is, both from a sanitary as well as from a moral point of view, most unsatisfactory; and a grave danger to the health of the town is caused by this condition, the absence of backyards, and privy and ashpit accommodation, seriously aggravating the evil.

House accommodation and overcrowding.

In other portions of the town there also exists overcrowding. In the quarter known as "The Fishery" considerable congestion occurs, and the density of population is very marked in this area. The houses here in many instances are becoming dilapidated, and a large number of them have no backyard accommodation, the result being that filth of all kinds finds its way on to the thoroughfares. In the entire town there are nearly three hundred dwelling-houses without any backyard accommodation, principally in Kinella's-lane, Chapel-ground, Reynold's-court, Brook-gardens, Condren's-lane, &c. Dwellings without any backyard accommodation are not healthy; they lack the essential elements of sanitation, and are a source of danger to any town, and especially to one such as Arklow, where there is a great tendency to overcrowding.

There are several cowsheds and dairies in the town. The cowsheds and adjoining yards should be much better kept; in one instance I found pigs kept quite close to where there were milch cows. This should on no account be permitted. Pigs should not be allowed on premises from which there is a distribution of milk to the public.

Dairies and cowsheds.

The common lodging-houses, of which there are several, are apparently not submitted to systematic inspection. I understand that they are not registered. Byelaws dealing with the keeping of animals and common lodging-houses would prove of great benefit in Arklow. The Council should consider the advisability of adopting a code of byelaws dealing with these questions, as also with slaughter-houses.

Common lodging-houses.

The public cleansing of the town stands also in need of improvement; this is particularly noticeable in the bye-lanes and smaller thoroughfares. Many of the laneways require to be properly gravelled and metalled, as in wet weather the condition of these places is very bad, and huge pools of filthy and stagnant water are to be met with everywhere, while in the yards attached to the smaller houses, accumulations of organic and vegetable filth are allowed to remain for much too long a period without being removed.

Public cleansing.

The Rural District Council, having jurisdiction under the Public Health Acts over this important town, which is yearly increasing in population, should take earnest steps to improve its sanitary condition on the lines that I have indicated.

The Medical Officer of Health, Dr. Hamilton, who takes a keen interest in the conditions affecting the health of the population in Arklow, accompanied me on the dates of my inspection, as also the Sanitary Sub-Officer, Mr. Evans.

(ii.)—REPORT ON THE SANITARY CIRCUMSTANCES AND ADMINISTRATION OF MALLOW.

(MALLOW RURAL DISTRICT.)

General Description.

The town of Mallow is situate in, and forms part of, the rural district of Mallow, in the administrative county of Cork, East Riding. The town is under municipal government, having twenty-one Commissioners under the Towns Improvement (Ireland) Act, 1854. The sanitary administration is vested in the Mallow Rural District Council.*

The electoral divisions of Mallow North Urban and Mallow South Urban comprise the township of Mallow, which has an area of 1,603 acres and a population of 4,366, according to Census of 1891. The valuation of the township is as follows:—Land, £1,975; buildings, £3,937 5s.; total, £10,912 5s. The rate levied for the financial year ended 31st March, 1902, by County Council for all purposes is, on land, 2s. 5½d.; on buildings, 4s. 2d. in the £. The Town Commissioners' rate is 1s. in the £. The balance due on outstanding loans under the Public Health Acts amounts to close on £4,000.

The principal industries are milling and a condensed milk factory, which give employment to a large number of people. The railway company also employ a good number of persons resident in the township. Weekly markets are held, and monthly fairs; also four horse fairs annually.

Sanitary Circumstances.

Water supply.

The town is supplied with water by gravitation from springs and a stream at Fiddane, about three miles distant from the town, the water being conveyed in pipes from the reservoir at Fiddane and distributed to all parts of the town. There are about thirty fountains for the supply of the poorer inhabitants, the better classes having domestic supplies and paying water rents at the rate of 6d. in the £ on their valuation. Before entering the reservoir the water flows in a stream for about a distance of one mile through pasture lands, on which there is usually a large number of cattle. The stream is not fenced, and the cattle have access to it. There is no system of filtration provided. The last analysis of the water, made about two years ago, gave satisfactory results. The supply is sufficient, except during periods of drought, when it runs short, particularly the supply to the workhouse buildings, which are situate outside the township. On the occasion of my visit there was a very extensive leak in the reservoir, and I found a horse, the property of the caretaker, grazing on the lands surrounding the reservoir, and having access to it.

* Mallow town has since been constituted an Urban Sanitary District

I consider it essential that steps should be taken to protect the water from pollution before entering the reservoir, and that a proper system of filtration should be provided.

All the principal streets and most of the laneways are sewered. The sewers are constructed of rubble masonry and provided with stench traps, but the ventilation is not sufficiently provided for. The yards in connection with the poorer class of dwellings are not, as a rule, connected with the system of sewers, and are drained by surface channels running from yard to yard. The sewage is discharged into a stream flowing at the rear of the houses in Lower Bridge-street, and causes at this place a very offensive and dangerous nuisance. This stream flows into the river Blackwater, close to Bridge-street. The defects in the sewerage system, particularly the nuisance caused at the outfall, and the absence of house connections, require attention. Sewerage.

The better class houses in the township are fairly well circumstanced as regards sanitation, construction, &c. The houses occupied by the working classes, which are situate chiefly in the laneways, are, in many instances, in a dilapidated, insanitary, and overcrowded state. Many have no yards, and are not provided with sanitary conveniences, the refuse, &c., being deposited on the public street, or most convenient place, regardless of consequences. The worst class of houses have earthen floors, and are damp and defective in lighting and ventilation. The yards, where they exist, are, in many instances, unpaved and undrained, and generally in an insanitary state from collections of refuse, filth, &c., and keeping of pigs. I was informed that about 500 of the houses in the town are occupied by the working classes, and that at least fifty of this number were in the insanitary condition described. There appears to be a necessity for providing healthy dwellings for the working classes resident in the town to relieve the existing congestion. Steps should also be taken to remedy the defects pointed out in existing dwellings. The most insanitary localities are Ball Alley-lane, Jones'-lane, Carmichael's-lane, Gallow's-hill, Shoulder's-lane, Chapel-lane, and Bridewell-lane. Dwellings.

I was informed that of the total number of houses in the town (about 1,000), some 250 are provided with water-closets, and about 100 have midden privies, the remainder being unprovided with sanitary conveniences, and the excrement, ashes, and other refuse usually deposited in a heap in the corner of the yards where these exist. Where there are no yards, the refuse, &c., is thrown on the public roadway or disposed of in the most convenient way. The domestic scavenging devolves on the occupiers of houses, and is very imperfectly carried out, particularly in the poorer localities. The scavenging of the streets, lanes, &c., is defective. A man is employed by the sanitary authority to keep the lanes and other passages not under contract in a cleanly state, but my inspection revealed many instances of his neglect to discharge the work properly. Excrement and refuse disposal.

There are about 250 piggeries in the town. Many of these are in small confined yards, close to the dwellings, without proper means of drainage, and kept in a filthy state. They constitute a serious danger to the public health. Keeping of animals on premises.

There are three slaughter-houses in the town, all of which are situate in close proximity to dwelling-houses, and are defective in construction, drainage, &c. Slaughter houses.

There are ten registered common lodging-houses in the town. Some of these are of a very poor class, and show a general want of cleanliness. Common lodging houses.

There are no dairies in the district, the milk, being, as a rule, conveyed direct to the customers. The milking utensils are usually kept in the dwelling-houses. Dairies, cow-sheds, and milk-shops.

Cowsheds.—There are ten cowsheds, all of which are for the most part defective in construction, drainage, and ventilation, and are in some instances situate in small yards to the rear of dwelling-houses. Manure is permitted to accumulate in their vicinity, and there is a general absence of cleanliness.

Milkshops.—There are ten milkshops. In some instances the shop is the living apartment of the house, and none of the shops are used solely for the sale of milk.

There are no regulations in force in the district for the management of dairies, cowsheds, and milkshops.

(III.)—REPORT ON THE SANITARY CIRCUMSTANCES AND ADMINISTRATION OF THE MIDDLETON URBAN DISTRICT.

General Description.

The Middleton Urban District is situate in the East-Riding of the County of York, and comprises an area of 380 statute acres. The population, according to the Census of 1891, was 3,246, and the number of occupied houses about 630. The valuation of the district is £5,364, made up as follows:—Buildings, £5,569; lands, &c., £805. The total indebtedness is £8,332, leaving a margin of borrowing power of about £3,000. The rates levied for all purposes during the past year amounted to 6s. 10d. in the £. The township was constituted an urban district from the 1st April, 1900, from which date the sanitary administration of the district was transferred to the Urban Council.

The river Owenacurra flows through the centre of the town, and is tidal for some distance above the town. Coasting vessels and steamers of small tonnage trade to Ballinacurra village, which is about one mile from Middleton. The principal exports are corn, timber, &c., and the imports, coal, &c.

The surrounding district is an agricultural one; weekly markets and monthly fairs are held in the town. The principal industries are distilling, malting, milling, and a condensed milk factory, which give constant employment to about 600 people.

Sanitary Circumstances.

Water supply. The water supply of the district is obtained by gravitation from the river Leamlara at a point about three miles distant from the town. The river takes its origin from springs about three miles above the intake. The water is filtered and conveyed in five-inch iron pipes from a small reservoir at the intake to the town, to all parts of which it is distributed, as well as to portions of the Middleton Rural District adjoining the town. There are twenty-four public fountains in the urban district and fourteen in the rural district. One hundred and sixty-five houses are provided with domestic water supplies in the urban district and twenty-eight in the rural district.

The reservoir is a very small one, having a capacity of about 72,000 gallons, or little more than one day's supply. The supply is limited to about fourteen gallons per head per day. The water has not been very recently analysed, but the last analysis showed it to be of good quality.

Sewerage

Portions of Main-street, Thomas-street, Cork-road, Free School-lane, Chapel-road, and Youghal-road are provided with piped sewers; the remaining sewers are constructed of rubble masonry. The sewers are trapped, fairly ventilated, and flushed. The outfall is into the tidal portion of the river near the centre of the town. The sewage is discharged direct into the river in proximity to several dwellings on the public road, and gives rise to an offensive nuisance when the weather is warm and the water in the river low.

Parts of the town are unsewered, viz., upper portion of Main-street, Mill-row, Park-street, and portion of Cork-road. There is no provision for efficient drainage at these places.

In places where sewers exist, many of the yards and premises are unconnected with the sewers and are defectively drained. There is no map of the system of sewers.

The number of occupied houses in the district is about 630. About two-thirds of this number are occupied by the working classes, and, with few exceptions, are well constructed and of a good class, with ample provision for ventilation, lighting, &c. The houses face the streets, and have backyards, and in many instances sanitary conveniences. The exceptions are to be met with in Free School-lane, Green's-lane, and Murphy's-lane. Several of the houses in these localities, occupied by the working classes, are in a dilapidated and insanitary condition, and unfit for habitation, a considerable number of them being unprovided with sanitary conveniences, while the backyards are unpaved and undrained, and in an insanitary state from collection of ashes, refuse, &c. Housing.

The better class houses are, generally speaking, fairly well circumstanced as regards construction, drainage, &c. I was informed that many of the dwellings of the working classes are overcrowded, and that a necessity exists for additional housing accommodation in the district. A few houses have recently been erected under the Housing of the Working Classes Act, but the rents—4s. per week—are too high for the average working man. The class of house which is most required is one that would be let at a rent of about 2s. per week.

About 120 houses are provided with water-closets, and 150 have midden privies. The remainder have no sanitary conveniences, the ashes, refuse, &c., being, in the case of the latter houses, deposited in a heap in the corner of the yards and removed only at long intervals when a large quantity has accumulated. Refuse and excrement disposal.

Many of the buildings are defectively constructed, being sunk to some depth below the surface of the yards, the yards becoming receptacles for run-water, slops, &c., rendering the premises insanitary.

The domestic scavenging devolves on the occupiers of houses, and is, as a rule, very imperfectly carried out, the occupiers being, in many instances, too poor to make proper provision for the regular removal of the refuse, &c. There is no manure depôt, and the occupiers are dependent on the farmers for the removal of ashes and manure.

There are five slaughter-houses in the district, which, with one or two exceptions, are situate close to dwelling-houses, and are defective in construction and drainage. Cleanliness is not, as a rule, sufficiently observed, and the offal is permitted to accumulate in the vicinity of the slaughter-houses. Slaughter houses.

There are seven common lodging-houses in the district, only two of which are provided with sanitary conveniences. None of the lodging-houses are registered, and some are unsuitable from insufficient space, ventilation, and lighting, and want of sanitary accommodation or provision for the separation of the sexes. Cleanliness is, as a rule, not properly observed. Common lodging-houses.

There are two dairies and cowsheds in the district, one of which is suitable in every respect. The other cowshed is defective in drainage, and is not kept clean, either in the inside or surroundings. Dairies, cowsheds, and milk-shops.

There are two milkshops, which are suitable and clean, and I am informed that milk is not kept in them over night. They are not, however, used solely for the sale of milk, other commodities being also disposed of.

There are no regulations dealing with dairies, cowsheds, and milkshops in force in the district.

Keeping of animals.

There are about 200 piggeries in the district, which, in many instances, are situate in small confined yards, close to dwelling-houses. They are imperfectly drained, and not kept in a cleanly state, and constitute a serious danger to the public health.

Sanitary Administration.

The town of Middleton was, up to the 1st April, 1900, included in the administrative area of the Middleton Rural District Council, and has since that date formed a separate urban district. The Urban District Council consists of nine members, whose meetings are held weekly. Sanitary matters are usually dealt with at each meeting of the Council.

The Sanitary Sub-Officer attends the meetings of the Council, and submits his diary of work performed and report book, in which the orders made by the Council are entered. He makes daily inspection of the district, and serves the usual notices for abatement of nuisances. During the past year he made thirty-two reports to the Medical Officer of Health, and thirty-eight reports were made by the Medical Officer of Health to the Sanitary Authority, on which the requisite action was taken. Forty-five notices were served requiring the abatement of nuisances, and five prosecutions were instituted for non-compliance with notices. The records of the Sanitary Authority are duly and carefully kept by the Executive Sanitary Officer, Mr. Ronayne, and copies of the minutes of proceedings regularly forwarded to the Local Government Board.

Having regard to the sanitary condition of the district, I consider that more reports should have been submitted to the Sanitary Authority.

Byelaws under the Public Health Act (1878) have been adopted by the Sanitary Authority recently, but are not yet in force in the district. They relate to the following matters:—

- (1.) Cleansing of footways and pavements.
- (2.) Prevention of nuisances arising from filth, &c., and keeping of animals on premises.
- (3.) Common lodging-houses.
- (4.) Slaughter-houses.

The Infectious Diseases (Notification) Act, 1889, has been adopted.

The Infectious Diseases (Prevention) Act, 1890, is not in force in the district.

The workhouse fever hospital is available for the reception of any cases of infectious disease arising in the district. There is also an ambulance in connection with the hospital.

There is no disinfecting apparatus provided.

The matters which most require attention from the Sanitary Authority are as follows:—

- (1.) The remedying of the defects in the sewerage system.
- (2.) Insanitary dwellings.
- (3.) The abatement of nuisances caused by the keeping of pigs.
- (4.) Defective domestic scavenging.
- (5.) The provision of sanitary conveniences in connection with dwellings.
- (6.) The registration of common lodging-houses.
- (7.) The defects pointed out with respect to slaughter-houses.

- (8.) The adoption of regulations with respect to dairies, cowsheds, and milkshops, and the systematic inspection of meat and milk supplies.
- (9.) The provision of a disinfecting apparatus.
- (10.) A manure depôt.
- (11.) More careful inspection of district for the purpose of detecting nuisances.

(iv.)—REPORT ON THE SANITARY CIRCUMSTANCES AND ADMINISTRATION OF NEWBRIDGE.

(NAAS NO. 1 RURAL DISTRICT.)

The sanitary condition and circumstances of Newbridge, from a public health point of view, cannot be regarded as satisfactory.

The town is under municipal government, and is administered by Town Commissioners, of whom there are nine. There is a population of about 3,320. The sanitary administration of the town is vested in the Naas No. 1 Rural District Council. Newbridge possesses a large barracks, and from its proximity to the Curragh Camp, is regarded as an important military centre.

Water Supply

The primary and most important question is the provision of a water supply. This matter has been under consideration for a very long time, and having regard to its urgency, it should be no longer delayed or postponed.

The public water supply is at present principally derived from five pump wells, situated as follows:—

- No. 1 pump—Moorefield-road—is situated in a position that renders it very liable to contamination, as a large ashpit is placed in its immediate vicinity.
- No. 2 pump—Henry-lane—is liable to pollution from a surface drain that runs quite close to it.
- No. 3 pump—Market-square—supplies the largest area of any of the pump wells. It is situated in a densely-populated portion of the town close to inhabited dwellings. The water is liable to pollution from the surface drain in its vicinity.
- No. 4—James'-lane pump.—Quite close to this well, on the date of my inspection, there was a pigstye, which was in a most filthy and offensive condition. The danger of permitting a pig-stye to be erected in the vicinity of a public pump well is obvious.
- No. 5—the Common pump.—This public pump occupies the most favourable position. There are no dwellings in its immediate neighbourhood.

The public pump wells, which supply and are used by the greater portion of the population, are all situated in thickly-populated areas, and having regard to the fact that a population exceeding 3,000 has to depend on its water supply from sources that are nearly all liable to contamination, it is incumbent that steps should be taken without further delay to provide a supply of pure water from a source free from objection in this or any other respect. This question requires the earnest and sustained attention of the Council.

Sewerage
system.

I am informed that practically all the sewers are constructed on the old rubble plan, while some portions of the town are stated to be unprovided with any system of sewers whatever. All the sewers of the town discharge at various points into the River Liffey, which flows through Newbridge. The necessity for improving the present system is very obvious, and should at an early date commend itself to the attention of the Council.

The condition of the backyards of the houses inhabited by the labouring classes is, in the vast majority of instances, very bad. There appears to be no organised method of public and domestic cleansing. Manure and accumulations of organic and vegetable filth are allowed to remain unremoved for much too long a period, the result being that very insanitary conditions prevail in the surroundings of the smaller class of dwellings. The keeping of pigs in close proximity to dwellings is also a custom that should not be permitted. Overcrowding of the smaller houses constitutes a serious danger, as it would appear to occur where there is only one general living room, with perhaps one small sleeping room attached. Great congestion appears to exist in Anne-street, John-street, Patrick-street, Thomas-street; the back-yards of the houses in these streets are kept in a very filthy condition. In some of the houses that I visited I found as many as ten persons inhabiting two small rooms; in other instances there were seven and eight persons inhabiting one room. In view of the need of sufficient air space and adequate ventilation, in this class of dwelling-house, grave danger to the public health exists, and steps should be taken to relieve, or prevent, the overcrowding that evidently takes place in some of the poorer dwellings.

The public cleansing of the town is much in need of improvement, particularly in the smaller thoroughfares and bye-lanes, which require much more frequent attention as to cleansing and scavenging than they appear to receive at present.

LOCAL GOVERNMENT (IRELAND) ACT, 1902.

(2 EDWARD VII.)

CHAPTER 36.

A.D. 1902. An Act to further amend the Law relating to Local Government in Ireland, and for other purposes connected therewith.

[18th December, 1902.]

BE it enacted by the King's most Excellent Majesty, by and with the advice and consent of the Lords Spiritual and Temporal, and Commons, in this present Parliament assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:

Amendment of 61 & 62 Vict. c. 37, s. 10, as to determination of compensation.

1. Notwithstanding anything in sub-head (g) of subsection (5) of section ten of the principal Act, the compensation to be paid for land taken in pursuance of an order under that section shall, in the absence of agreement, be determined by the judge of assize without a jury, or, if the parties so agree, be determined by an arbitrator appointed by the Local Government Board, or by the judge of assize with a jury, according to the agreement.

Increase of contributions to county infirmaries, &c.

2. In addition to the annual amount which may be contributed by a council of a county, or of a county borough, to a county infirmary or fever hospital under subsection (9) of section fifteen of the principal Act, the council may, if they think fit, contribute in any year the whole or any part of such further amount as may be certified by an auditor of the Local Government Board to be necessary to meet any deficit in the funds of such infirmary or hospital during that year.

3. An order of the Local Government Board for constituting a town an urban district shall contain, in addition to the provisions mentioned in subsection (5) of section forty-two of the principal Act, such provisions as may seem necessary or expedient for determining the financial relations between the district so constituted and the county in which it is situated.

4. The time within which the payment of any debt, claim, or demand mentioned in subsection (7) of section fifty-one of the principal Act may be made may be extended by the Local Government Board to a time not exceeding two years from the date at which the same was incurred, or became due, in any case in which that Board are of opinion that there were reasonable grounds for delay in taking legal proceedings, or, where any such debt, claim, or demand was incurred or became due at any time between the first day of April, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-nine, and the first day of April, one thousand nine hundred and one, the aforesaid time may be extended by the Local Government Board to the first day of April next after the passing of this Act.

5. (1) For the purposes of paragraph (a) of subsection (2) of section fifty-eight of the principal Act, and for no other purpose, any sum paid, with the sanction of the Local Government Board, by the guardians of a union during any financial year as remuneration to a medical practitioner, or a trained nurse temporarily employed to discharge the duties of a medical officer, or a trained nurse of a workhouse or dispensary, while he or she is absent on vacation, under the authority of any general regulation of the Local Government Board, made under the Poor Relief (Ireland) Acts, 1838 to 1900, shall be deemed to be part of the salary of that medical officer or trained nurse, and the Lord Lieutenant shall cause one half of the said sum to be paid out of the Local Taxation (Ireland) Account accordingly.

(2) The Lord Lieutenant shall cause to be paid out of the Local Taxation (Ireland) Account one half of the salary of any officer appointed by the Local Government Board for the purpose of assisting them in ascertaining whether the medicines and medical and surgical appliances mentioned in subsection (2) of the said section fifty-eight are provided in accordance with the prescribed conditions.

(3) Subsection (4) of the said section fifty-eight shall apply in the case of an amount required to be raised in an urban county district by the council of that district, to meet a railway or harbour charge, in like manner as it applies in the case of an amount required to be raised in any area by a county council, and any sum payable by the Lord Lieutenant in pursuance of the said subsection, as amended by this enactment, shall be paid by him to the council of the urban district.

6. As from the first day of April, in the year one thousand nine hundred and three, section fifty-eight of the principal Act shall be amended as follows—

(1) After the payments out of the Local Taxation (Ireland) Account, authorised by the foregoing provisions of this Act, have been made, there shall not be paid out of that account in any local financial year to any county council on behalf of the guardians of any union or any rural district, or to any urban district council, a greater amount than was paid on behalf of those guardians or that rural district, or to that urban district council, as the case may be, in the local financial year ending on the thirty-first day of March, one thousand nine hundred and two;

(2) Subsection five of the said section fifty-eight shall be construed as if there were substituted therein for the words "the sums payable thereout under this section" the words "the sums payable thereout under this section as amended by any subsequent enactment."

7. Where, under subsection (2) of section sixty-three of the principal Act, the Local Government Board have directed that a disallowance or surcharge of a payment in respect of interest on any loan shall be remitted, that payment and all subsequent payments of interest at the same rate in respect of the same loan shall, until the loan is repaid, or the Local Government Board otherwise order, be legally chargeable upon such fund or rate as that Board declare to be applicable for the payment thereof.

8.—(1) Where before the first of April one thousand nine hundred and two any urban council have applied for the purposes of their district money obtained by them on loan, the Local Government Board may, if they think fit, authorise the repayment of the whole or any part of that money with interest out of any fund at the disposal of the council, or any rate which the council are authorised to make, or any money raised by re-borrowing.

(2) Any limit on the borrowing power of the council contained in subsection (2) of section two hundred and thirty-eight of the Public Health (Ireland) Act, 1878, or in any local Act, shall not restrict the borrowing of any sum authorised to be borrowed for the purposes of this section.

(3) Nothing in this or the last preceding section shall prejudice or affect any legal proceedings pending at the passing of this Act and commenced before the first day of August, one thousand nine hundred and two.

All officers employed in pursuance of a scheme for the collection of the poor rate, purporting to have been framed by a county council under subsection (10) of section one hundred and fifteen of the principal Act, shall be deemed to be, and to have always been, poor rate collectors appointed by the county council within the meaning of that Act, and no act done in pursuance of the scheme shall be, or be deemed to have been, invalid by reason only that the amount of the remuneration of any existing officer was not fixed by the scheme as approved by the Local Government Board.

10. The provision in section one of the Local Officers Superannuation Act (Ireland), 1869, which prohibits a public body from granting a superannuation allowance to an officer, unless his whole time has been devoted to the service of that body, shall not have effect in the case of a medical officer of health of an urban district or any existing officer within the meaning of the principal Act.

(2) An order under this section may provide for the transaction, at a half-yearly meeting, of any business which would, if the order had not been made, have been transacted at a quarterly meeting.

(3) An order under this section may make such modifications in the application to the rural district councils comprised in the county of the provisions of any Order in Council made under Part VI. of the principal Act, or of the Order confirmed by the Local Government Board (Ireland) Provisional Order Confirmation (No. 3) Act, 1901, as the Local Government Board may consider necessary for giving full effect to the order under this section.

(4) An order under this section may be revoked by the Local Government Board on request made in accordance with the provisions of this section by the county council affected by the order.

(5) If by reason of anything done in pursuance of this section the duties of any officer of a county or district council are increased or diminished, the officer shall be bound to perform those duties, and shall receive such increase or diminution of remuneration in proportion to the

increase or diminution of his duties as the Local Government Board may determine, subject nevertheless, in the case of diminution, to such compensation as is provided by subsection (19) of section one hundred and fifteen of the principal Act, and that subsection shall apply accordingly to any such officer in like manner as it applies to existing officers affected by the principal Act.

Whereas an association of county councils of Ireland has been formed for the purpose of consultation as to their common interests and the discussion of matters relating to local government: Therefore a county council may pay out of the county fund, as general expenses incurred by them in the execution of the principal Act, any sum, not exceeding ten pounds in any one year, as an annual or other subscription to the funds of the association, as well as any reasonable expenses of not more than two representatives at not more than two meetings of the association.

18.—(1) Where a rural district council or a proposal committee, in the exercise of their powers under Article eighteen of the Local Government (Procedure of Councils) Order, 1899, accept a tender for the execution of a public work which is not the lowest tender received for that work, a minute shall be made in the prescribed manner and form stating the reasons for the non-acceptance of the tender, or in case of more than one, of each tender, which is lower than the accepted tender.

(2) The minute shall be produced at any audit of accounts which include any payments made under any contract entered into in accordance with such accepted tender, and a certified copy of the minute shall be furnished by the secretary or clerk of the public body liable under the contract to any person requiring it on payment of sixpence, and shall in any legal proceedings be conclusive evidence of the making and contents of the minute.

(3) If at any such audit it appears to the auditor that any tender was accepted or approved of for any fraudulent or improper purpose or object, or for any purpose or object other than the bonâ fide discharge by the persons who accepted it of their duties in the interests of the rate-

(4) Section twelve of the Local Government (Ireland) Act, 1871 (relating to the duties of an auditor and to appeals), shall apply in the case of any contract declared to be illegal in pursuance of this section, and the persons who accepted or approved of the tender may be surcharged accordingly either with all payments made under the contract, or with such portion thereof as may appear to the auditor, having regard to all the circumstances of the case, just and reasonable.

(5) Where a contract is declared to be illegal in pursuance of this section the contractor may, notwithstanding such declaration, recover any sum due to him for work done or materials supplied before such declaration.

(6) Any decision of an auditor under this section shall, save so far as the same may be altered on appeal, be conclusive and binding on all persons.

(7) So long as any portion of any sum surcharged in pursuance of this section remains unpaid, every person upon whom the surcharge is made shall be deemed to be disqualified for being elected or chosen or being a member of any county or district council, and subsection eleven of article twelve of the Local Government (Application of Enactments) Order, 1898, shall apply accordingly.

Every application under section twelve of the Local Government (Ireland) Act, 1871, by a party aggrieved, to an auditor, to state the reasons for his decision in respect of any allowance, disallowance, or surcharge, shall be made, in the case of an allowance, not later than fourteen days after the allowance has been made, and, in the case of a disallowance or surcharge, not later than fourteen days after any sum has been certified to be due from any person in respect of the disallowance or surcharge; and every such application shall, for the purposes of section thirteen of the said Act, be deemed to be a notice of appeal.

(2) An auditor of the Local Government Board may, at any time when authorised or required so to do by that Board, inspect the accounts and books of account of any public body, or any officer liable to account to him.

(3) Any member or officer of a public body who refuses to allow such inspection, or obstructs the auditor therein, or conceals any account or book for the purpose of preventing the inspection, shall be liable on summary conviction to a fine not exceeding five pounds.

22.—(1) The Local Government Board may make general regulations for the audit of the accounts of public bodies and their officers, and the regulations may prescribe the form in which the accounts are to be kept, the mode of publishing the time and place for holding the audit, the person by whom, and the time within which, the accounts are to be produced for audit, and the mode of conducting the audit.
