This book was written by David A. Orebaugh, son of Eli(6) and Sarah Maxfield Orebaugh, for his daughter, Virginia Grace Orebaugh. In the introduction, the author writes "You are one of the really old families in America. Your ancestors, though not renowned, helped in several wars to win and maintain independence." -----5

The name Orebaugh is an anglicized form of an old German name, originally Overbach. All family names ending in "baugh" are of Pennsylvania German origin.

In 1648, the Thirty Years War came to an end in Germany and many Germans, mostly Lutherans, regarding it as a long, bloody and senseless war, decided to seek religious and other freedoms in the new world. Many sailed for the--10 United States and when the English ship "The Johnson", commanded by Captain David Crocket, sailed from Rotterdam, Holland in 1732 we find that among other German immigrants sailing on that ship one Andreas Overbach and family.

From the time "The Johnson" landed at Philadelphia until the Revolutionary War, there is no authentic record and little family tradition concerning---15 Andreas and his family. The author knows only that Andreas' grandson, Andrew, served throughout the Revolutionary War as a soldier in the Continental Army. He received, after the war, several thousand dollars in Continental money and a land grant which entitled him to locate 300 acres of land in the Virginia Military District of the then Territory of Ohio. The fact that----20 Andrew received a warrant for 300 acres indicates that he had attained the rank of captain since the Virginia law did not give as much as 300 acres to a soldier of lesser rank. (Henings Statutes Chapter 2 Page 179)

It is understood that Andrew bought a farm in Rockingham County, Virginia, near Timberville and in 1925, an Orebaugh still lived on that farm. -----25

David A. Orebaugh says that there are conflicting reports on whether Andrew and Jacob, sons of the Revolutionary Andrew, both emigrated to Highland County, Ohio in 1828. One source says "About 1828, Andrew and his two sons, Andrew and Jacob, emigrated to Highland County, Ohio." But another source says "Jacob, with his family, emigrated to Highland County, but his brother,--30 Andrew remained in Virginia where he left many descendants." The Revolutionary Andrew had three sons, Andrew, Jacob and Abraham all of whom served in the War of 1812. Abraham died unmarried.

Phillip Overbach--date and place of birth unknown. Wife unknown. It is not known definitely whether Phillip had children but it is believed that Rudolph Orebaugh, whose name appears in the U.S.Census publication "Heads of Families in Virginia at the Close of the Revolutionary War" was his son. I also have reason to believe that the Orebaughs who came--5 from Rockingham County, Virginia and settled in Preble County, Ohio and later in Shelbyville, Indiana are descendants of Rudolph. However, owing to the uncertainty of the connection and the difficulty of tracing it, I have decided to not include this branch of the family.

Adam Orebaugh was a member of the early Lutheran Church in Dodson, ---20 Highland County, Ohio.

A marriage certificate, in the possession of Mathilde Johnson states that Andrew J. Orebaugh of Dodsonville, Ohio and Miss Mary A. Stroup of Dodsonville, Ohio were joined in Holy Matrimony at the Dodsonville M.E. Church on November 17, 1850 by Thomas Wallace, Minister of the Gospel. ----25

Mary Ann Stroup was the daughter of William W. and Elizabeth Thompson Stroup and the granddaughter of Michael (known as the Hatter) and Mary Ann (Polly) Walker Stroup whose wedding was the first celebrated in Highland County, Ohio and is written up in the History of Ross and Highland Counties.

The following information was sent to Mathilde Johnson by Miss Flavia --30 Converse, a genealogist of Harrisonburg, Virginia.

Mr. Strickler in his book listing marriages and marriage bonds in Virginia from 1778-1816 gives "The groom is kuardian of the bride" when listing And. Cerbcugh's 1808 bond for marriage with Hannah Fry, daughter of Henry, who had died. In these guardianship bonds the word guardian is not used at all, 31 but from the wording of the bonds and the labeling on the outside of the book, you are made aware of the fact that this is meant. The date of Andrew's bond was November 15, 1808 and the amount of the bond was one hundred dollars. This bond made Andrew responsible for " funds to be turned over to Hannah Fry, orphan of Henry Fry".

Miss F. Flavia Converse explains a custom of those days by saying " In those

days, the death of the father made a child an orphan".

Miss Converse supplied the following from books of deeds in Rockingham County (formerly Augusta County, Virginia)---

1822--Christian Orebaugh to George Miller (Burned records)

1845--Dorothy Orebaugh to Elizabeth McGahey, B.R.D.B.18,241,part.-----5
Indenture dated June 30,1845. Grantors were: John Arehart, Jacob Arehart, George Airhart, Abraham Airhart, Mathias Minich and Dorothy his wife, John Rife and Catherine his wife, Dorothy Oerbaugh, Lydia Oarbaugh of the County of Rockingham State of Virginia" and the grantee was Elizabeth McGahey of the County of Rockingham and State-10 aforesaid". It is stated "the said parties above named of the first part being brothers and sisters, children of said Jacob Stouttemire, deceased". (Strange that, being brothers and sisters and children of Jacob Stouttemire they shculd all have such different names?)

1857-- Dorathy Orebaugh to John E.Brown, B.R.D.B.30,Page250; whole.----15
By this indenture dated April 24, 1857, Dorothy Orebaugh sold to John E. Brown, in trust to secure indebtedness of hers, two Rockingham County lots each five acres more or less". (Miss Converse says that in the 1845 instrument Dorothy signed by mark with her given name spelled Dorerthy. Her surname and Lydia's were both spelled Oerbaugh-20 and Lydia signed for herself".

1857-- Eve Orebaugh, 7c. to J.S. Bowman, B.R.D.B.30, 397; none. Evidently this deed was lost for the notation on the deed book reads " A Deed for Land from Eve Crebaugh to Joseph S.Bowman was among some deeds returned for record at the August term, 1857 of the County Court, the record-25 thereof being wholly lost and neither the original deed nor certified copy being found for record."

1845--Carbough, G.A.,&c. to Elizabeth McGahey, B.R.D.B.18,Pages 274, 276
This was an indenture dated July,12,1845. Grantors were " Anna Stoudamere Phebe Skyles Reuben Stoudamire John Stoudamire George A.-- 30 Orebaugh and Elizabeth his wife Jacob Stoudamire Aaron Stoudamire of the County of Augusta and state of Virginia." Again we find " Brothers and sisters, children of said Jacob Stoudamire, deceased." Jacob's widow was Barbara.

1846- B.R.D.B.19, Pages 23-25. Miss Converse says " You can't see all of--35 the date in the beginning, but according to a certificate of acknowledgment dated October 25, 1845, George A. Orebaugh, who signed for himself, and Elizabeth Orebaugh, who signed by mark, were evidently the grantors. Elizabeth is referred to in one place as "formerly Elizabeth Stoudamire." Jacob Long was the grantee. Land passing by-40 this instrument was in the neighborhood of Keezletown."

1851- Isaac Orbaugh to Samuel Gordon, B.R,D.B. 23.413; whole.

" Now we are going over to Madison County, Indiana, for it is stated that Isaac Orbaugh was of that county and state. He was the grantor; the grantee, Samuel Gordon or Gordian as it is written part of the---45 time, was of Rockingham County. Sold by Isaac " to the said Samuel Gordon and his heirs and assigns forever all his undivided share and interest in and to the lands of Abraham Orebaugh, deceased-- lying and being on the east side of the little North Mountain about four miles below Brock Gap in the County of Rockingham and State of-----50 Virginia." Isaac signed by mark.

- 1829- In B.R.D.B.9, Pages 130-131, is recorded what was left of an indenture dated September 15, 1829. This was between Jacob Carbaugh and Rachel his wife of the County of Rockingham state of Virginia of the one part and George Miller of the same State and County aforesaid of the other part. Land sold: "One certain tract or parcel of Land Containing Seventy Two Acres more or less lying and being in the County of Rockingham and State aforesaid and on a small branch called Holman's Creek and the Same part whereon the Said Carbaugh now lives and being a part of the Tract of Land which by Survey now appears to measure One Hundred and Six Acres which whole tract was by their Father Andrew Orebaugh by his last will and Testament willed and Bequeathed unto his two sons Viz. Jacob and Andrew and the said Jacob Carbaughs part is now laid off according to equity and to contain (With other considerations) Seventy Two Acres more or less for and in consideration of the sum of five hundred and Four Dollars Current money of the united States to him the said Miller in hand paid by the said Jacob Carbaugh and Rachel his wife the receipt whereof is hereby Acknowledged do sell and Bargain and by presents do---- Bargain and sell unto the said George Miller and his heirs forever all their Moiety claim----any person whatsoever to the said land and bounded as follows Viz." &c. Miss Converse says there are many blanks in this description of the land and nothing definite as to location. -5 -10 -15 -20 -25
- 1853- B.R.D.B.25, Page 87 " A deed dated April 2, 1853. The Grantors were Martin Obaugh (sometimes recorded as Marlin) and Susannah Obaugh his wife of the county of Augusta in the State of Virginia; the grantee was Robert Grattan of the County of Rockingham and state aforesaid. The tract contained ten acres. -30
- 1842-B.R.D.B. 15, Page 439; part. Peter Orebaugh grantor; John Hottinger, grantees.
- 1850- The recordation date is 50-2 7 which would indicate February 2, 1850 but, strangely the only name following the date is Carbaugh. I quote Miss Converse " Perhaps a caller said it was cold in the Clerk's Office that February day, and the clerk had to go to stir up the coals in the stove. At any rate not even the deed book and page are indicated. Probably the deed, if not destroyed, could be found without too long a search for the next listing was that of an instrument in B.R.D.B. 22, page 398, and its recordation date was some time in 1850." -35
- 1850- Rebecca Carbaugh to Samuel Gordon B.R.D.B. 22 Page 398; whole.
- 1777- Miss Converse says the date is uncertain-- Solomon Carbaugh to Benjamin Dellinger, B.R.D.B. 201 Page 327; whole.
- 1850- Rebecca Carbaugh to Samuel Gordon B.R.D.B. 22 Page 398-- this indenture dated September 11, 1849- Grantors: Jonathan Hulva and his wife Lydia Samuel Price and Regina his wife Henry Miller and Leana his wife heirs of Abraham Carbaugh, deceased, and Rebecca Carbaugh widow of said Abraham, deceased of the County of Rockingham and State of Virginia-- grantee- Samuel Gordon of the County and State aforesaid." -40 -45 Consideration, \$780.00 paid. By this instrument, the grantors conveyed "all their undivided interests right and title in the lands of Abraham Carbaugh, Dec. being the same upon which the said Carbaugh resided at the time of his decease lying and being in the North Mountain Road about five miles below Brook Gap. The interest of the undivided shares of the aforesaid heirs hereby intended to be conveyed also includes their future interest in the dower to which they would be entitled after the death of the aforesaid widow Rebecca Carbaugh." The widow united in the deed 50

convey" to the said Gordon all her dower rights and interest in the lands of her late husband Abraham Orebaugh deed." Jonathan signed for himself. Regina's name doesn't appear at the end. The others signed by mark. Regina must have signed in some way, for a certificate of Samuel Cootes and William G. Thompson, Justices of the Peace, mentions Regina along with the other 5 wives. Samuel Cootes at one time lived at Cootes Store, at which is called the mouth of Brock's Gap. I do not know whether he ever lived elsewhere. But you will notice that Abraham Orebaugh's land upon which it was said he resided at the time of his death was about five miles below Brock's Gap. So probably Samuel Cootes was living at Cootes Store in 1849. These same 10 two justices took the acknowledgment of the three men and of the widow, using a separate certificate. Both of these certificates were dated September 14, 1849. Recordation date: February 7, 1850.

1819-B.R.D.B.4.353- An indenture dated October 26, 1819 between " Adam Orebaugh alias Orebaugh of the County of Rockingham in the Commonwealth of Virginia -15 of the one part, and William Orebaugh(son of the said Adam) of the County and Commonwealth aforesaid of the other part." The land sold was a tract of six acres in Rockingham County "at the forest", which had been by two instruments of 1771. it seems, recorded in Augusta County, "part-20 of a tract of two hundred acres which was granted to the Said Adam Orebaugh (alias Orbach) by patent bearing date the Second day of August in the year 1787 and is bounded as followeth" etc. William had a brother, Christian, it seems. Adam signed by mark, with his surname written as Orebaugh-- or Orebough. Miss Converse writes "'The forest' must have been what we-25 call Forestville now--not far from Timberville."

B.R.D.B.4 Pages 354-356--An instrument in which Adam Orebaugh was grantor and his son, Christian, was grantees. By this tract of 48 $\frac{1}{2}$ acres in Rockingham County "at the forest" was sold to Christian and it is stated that it was conveyed to the "said Adam Orebaugh by Andrew Orebaugh and--30 Mart ant his wife Devisee of William Stelp Deed. by deeds of Lease and release dated the 9th and 10th days of August in the year 1782 and duly recorded in the County Court of Rockingham" etc.

1822-B.R.D.B. 5, 418- This indenture was marked " Destroyed" and was between Andrew Orebaugh, Grantor and John Wise, Grantee" -35

1830- B.R.D.B.9,530; part.; Adam Orebaugh to John Evers. This Adam and wife Elizabeth united in the deed. The land was in Rockingham County "on the Waters of William Rxx--" -- probably William's Run. "Trourbaughs Corner is mentioned in this description."

1834-B.R.D.B. 11, Page 377;whole. Adam Orebaugh and Elizabeth his wife were-40 grantors; date March 27, 1834. Frederick Cupp was grantees. The two tracts in this deed, for which the sum of \$1,400.00 was paid, were near the North Mountain, on the South west side of Briery Branch etc.-- about 154 acres.

1851-B.R.D.B.28,283-284;part. The land in this was "near the Mountain Road -45 it being part of a larger tract owned by the said Andrew Orebaugh all Included within the metes and bounds to wit." "Samuel Orebaugh's line is mentioned. As Naason Bare was the Justice of the Peace who took the

acknowledgment, my surmise is that this was near Timberville."
1855-B.R.D.B., Pages 297-299; part. B.R.D.B.28. Andrew Orebaugh was grantor
and Noah Orebaugh the grantees.

1859-B.R.D.B.32, Pages 488-489; only partly destroyed is an instrument in
which "Adam Orebaugh and Sarah his wife were among various grantors. -5
This was dated January 18, 1859. Miss Converse says " I would not be
surprised to learn that this Sarah Orebaugh was an Armentrout as all
the other grantors besides Adam and Sarah are either Armentrouts or
Michaels. Eli Keeran was the grantees. The land granted by this instru-
ment was in Rockingham County "between Cub Run and the Peaked Mountain." -10
It seems that "the heirs of Henry Arme---- had coveyed this tract to
Henry Armentrout by a deed recorded in 1834. Henry Armentrout is not
among those named as grantors. There are twelve grantors but only eleven
signatures, five of which were by mark-- three of the Michaels and Adam
and Sarah. Adam and Sarah were in Augusta County at this time. -15

1859 B.R.D.B.33, Pages 352-355 record a deed in which Adam and Sarah are again
among various Armentrouts and Michaels as grantors. The date is January 18,
1859. This is again land "between cub run and----- Mountain in Rock-
ingham." The Armentrouts were of Rockingham County, but Adam and Sarah
and the Michaels were of Augusta County, and an Augusta County Notary -20
Public, Andrew Clinefest, by his two separate certificates, showed that
he had taken Sarah's acknowledgment and that of "----Orebaugh", presumably
Adam.

Miss Converse says " The '4' means that Jacob was taxed with four horses
that year. If I understand correctly, the finding of a man's name -30
in these titheable lists doesn't mean necessarily that he had military
service. The whole country was divided into sections then, with a captain
for each, and all of the men of the County (and their sons 16 or more)
had to be counted in one or another of these companies,-- in the Company,
of course, in their section of the County. I suppose the listing was -35
partly for taxation purposes, but I think the various Captain's Companies
were, in a way, like State Militia,-- subject to call to military
service, if necessary.

Linville is not too far from Timberville."

Pages 40,41:

Among those listed as comprising Company 9 are " 1-- Oreboh, Adam -40
and William"-- Adam was taxed with only one horse and, as William is
listed with him, William presumably was Adam's son. Here is the listing:

(Capt. Ezekial Harrison's Company Present west portion of Plains District)

As this Andrew had five horses, and Jacob four, and Adam only one. I should think Andrew and Jacob had been established earlier (even though I did not find Jacob in the 1788 listings) and that-15 Adam, with only one horse(and with William in the household) had not been so long established, unless it just happened that he had not acquired so much of this world's goods and had not been able to buy more than one horse at that time."

Rockingham County was formed from Augusta County, Virginia, Rockingham records began in the spring of 1778, when the first court was held, Rockingham having been formed in the autumn of 1777 by an Act of Legislature. Augusta County was formed (from Orange) more than thirty years earlier, but, sad to say, the available marriage records there seem to begin in 1785.-- seven years later than those in Rockingham County.

In Strickler's Book of Virginia Marriages from 1778 to 1816, there is a note that Andrew Orebaugh gave bond at the time of his marriage to Hannah Fry and this bond held --5 Andrew responsible for funds to be turned over to Hannah from her father's estate. This notation mentions that Rachel Fry, who married Andrew's brother, Jacob, in 1811, and Lydia Fry were also orphans of Henry. In those years a fatherless child was called an orphan whether the mother was living or not. Andrew(4) died September 12, --10 1864 and Hannah Fry Orebaugh died September 15, 1852. Andrew(4) fought in the War of 1812. One source says that Andrew moved to Highland County, Ohio but others say that Andrew stayed in Virginia when his brother Jacob moved his family to Highland County about 1828-- and that Andrew has many descendants in Virginia. It is said--15 that the Orebaughs in Virginia were sharply divided in their opinions at the outbreak of the Civil War and that they fought in about equal numbers for the Union and the Confederacy. Andrew J. Orebaugh, born December 1825, married Mary Ann Stroup of Dodsonville, Highland County, Ohio in November 1850.

On November 17, 1850 the Reverend Thomas Wallace at the Dodsonville Methodist Church at Dodsonville, Ohio, performed the marriage ceremony of Andrew J. Orebaugh to Miss Mary Ann Stroup, a member of his church. Unfortunately we have been unable to learn much about Andrew J. Orebaugh except that he was born in December 1825 and died shortly after the birth of his second child, --5 America Jane Orebaugh, who was born in 1854. Since his widow married again in 1857, we assume that his death date can be placed between 1854 and 1857.

On October 16, 1855 a son was born to Adam and Rebecca Screechfield Orebaugh and he was named Andrew J. Orebaugh and on March 8, 1858 a son was born to-- 10 George A. and Elizabeth Stoudamire Orebaugh and he, also, was named Andrew J. Orebaugh. The Andrew J. who was born in 1855 was the grandson of Jacob and Rachel Fry Orebaugh and the Andrew J., born in 1858, was the great grandson of Andrew Orebaugh, who was Jacob's father. So Andrew Orebaugh(1750-1805) had two great grandsons named Andrew J. and it seems more than a coincidence--15 that these two boys, born so soon after the death of Andrew J. Orebaugh should have been given the same name. This helps to convince us that Andrew J. Orebaugh was of this branch of the Orebaugh family but so far proof has eluded us.

Since we have so much data on the family of Mary Ann Stroup who married --20 Andrew J. Orebaugh in 1850, we are including a bit of her history before giving the information on the descendants of Andrew J. and Mary Ann Stroup Orebaugh.

The Stroups, like the Orebaughs, were of German origin. Mary Ann Stroup's grandfather was Michael Stroup, known as "The Hatter", who was born in --25 May 1, 1779 (it is believed in Huntingdon, Pennsylvania) and died in Highland County, Ohio February 20, 1860. Michael migrated to Highland County, Ohio about 1798 where he married Mary Ann (Polly) Walker in March 1803 in the first marriage ceremony performed in that county. Mary Ann Walker was born January 16, 1786 at Stamping Ground, Fleming County. --30 Kentucky; migrated to and was married in Highland County; lived there and reared her family in Dodsonville; died there April 17, 1866. Both Mary Ann(Polly) and Michael are buried in the Stroup Cemetery in Highland County and their tombstones verify their birth and death dates. They had fourteen children, all but one of whom lived to maturity. William M. --35 Stroup was their oldest child and was born January 1, 1804 and married Elizabeth Thompson on June 1, 1826. Elizabeth was born in Virginia on August 28, 1802; was reared in Kentucky; migrated to Highland County, Ohio where she married William M. Stroup; died October 5, 1882 at the home of her son, Michael, in Carroll County, Missouri at whose home her husband, William M. Stroup, died on September 16, 1883. Both William M. and Elizabeth Thompson Stroup are buried in Union Cemetery, Bosworth, Missouri. --40 They had four children, one of whom was Mary Ann Stroup.
