Our Family, The Jones's

IN THESE PAGES beside giving the descent as far back as our great grand parents, are narratives and sketches, etc., of individuals and members of the family, the Jones's.

This data has been gathered from various members of the family and creditable remarks and occurrences of note are set

forth as worthy of notice and remembrance.

In order to show the real person in our father, I have written his sketch as he related it to me. Also there is a sketch copied from one on file in the Joseph Feilding Library, written in his own hand writing and numbered 25 in the Thomas Jefferson Jones Files. This manuscript is a sketch of his life as he wrote it. Also in this book I have written a sketch of each of his wives and his diary written during the year 1881. All other diaries which he wrote, and I am sure there were more, were lost or destroyed when clearing out old letters and papers as of no value.

No doubt there are errors, but as near as I can gather from old records and assistance from members of the family, I confidently hope that the presentation may be interesting enough to cause some at least to overlook the faults of the construction and try to visualize him as he was, the kindest, most honest, honor-

able person of my knowledge.

What he must have suffered in mind and body, and more especially during the days of trying to live the law of plural marriage! Trying to be fair and just to all wives and children; trying to keep down contentions and strife and setting examples before his children and co-workers, worthy of following; trying to be a father in the Wards and Stakes where he was called by authority to preside. Administering to the sick and comforting the bereaved.

Building coffins, extracting teeth, constructing water and molasses barrels for the use of the farmers and freighters; arising at the break of day and on the job of earning a living, many times when it was still dark. On call night and day to go to the bedside of the sick, for he was endowed with unlimited faith, never a stop while he was needed. There are none of us that can do enough to glorify his honorable name or cease to remember he lived and labored untiringly to provide for us. His one and only great desire was to see his children living good upright lives and being real Latter-Day Saints.

With my love and appreciation of all the assistance from each member of this family, I thankfully submit and dedicate this work

to our father and his descendants.

The Origin of the Jones's

THE EARLY JONES'S and origin of the family were descendants from an ancient Welsh line. The surname Jones ranked first in number among the family names in Wales. One Welsh man in seven bearing the name of Jones.

In England it holds second place, being of patronymic derivation. It came into use as a family surname during the 15th

century.

Over fifty colonists bearing the name, progenitors of families settled in New England before seventeen hundred, most of whom came from England, of Welsh descent and settling in Massachusetts.

They were a very serious-minded and religious people with

whom life was a strenuous business.

His Sketch As Copied From the Library Files

I, Thomas Jefferson Jones was born the 6th of September, 1838, in Pittsfield, Pike County, Illinois, and lived there until the 13th

of April, 1852.

My father, James Hart Jones, was the son of Stephen Dudley Jones and Elizabeth Hart of Kentucky. He passed away the 31st of July, 1839, when I was about ten months old. My mother married Isaac Turnbaugh during the year 1841. She had two children by Turnbaugh before coming to Utah.

On the 13th of April, 1852, I, with my mother and step-father and the children, started for Oregon, but my mother being a Latter-Day Saint, prevailed on father to go to Council Bluff, Iowa, and get into the Mormon Company to travel across the plains, it being safer in a large company of Saints, because of the

Indian trouble on the plains.

On arriving in Council Bluff we remained around that district of the country, recruiting ox teams until about the 30th of May, when we moved down near the Missouri River where a company of Saints were organized by Apostle Orson Hyde, making John Higbee Captain of the first company of Saints to leave the Missouri River for Salt Lake Valley that year. There were 100 wagons in the company, which were divided into tens, a Captain over each ten wagons or families. We commenced our journey across the plains the 2nd day of June, and were in the third ten with Brother P. T. Farnsworth as our Captain. We made the

trip to Salt Lake Valley in seventy-three days, arriving there on

the 13th day of August, 1852.

After camping around for a few weeks, we went to Centerville, Davis CO. and rented a farm from O. M. Dewel and prepared for winter. The fall of the next year, after taking off our crops and disposing of them, we moved to Willow Creek, now known as Willard Boxelder County Utah. There were only two or three families living there at that time.

I remained with the family until the Spring of 1860. My step father told me that because of their oxen dying, and being short of funds to finance the journey on into Oregon, they decided to remain in the Valley and never got around to moving on, and subsequently my stepfather joined the Church of Latter-Day-Saints and spent the rest of his life near Salt Lake City, finally dying in the old home in Bountiful Davis CO. Utah.

Out for I for I 1960 I.

On the first day of April 1860, I in company of Judson Stoddard of Farmington, Utah and others, started for Omaha, Nebrasba. I was going to Illinois to sell the farm of my father

which I had inherited when he died.

We arrived at old winter quarters on the 9th of May, and on the 11th I boarded a steam-boat for St. Joseph, Missouri, and from there going by foot to Pittsfield, Illinois. I went to my Uncle Orlando Spencer's home and remained there for the summer, and at his home I met the girl I married as my first wife. She was teaching school out in the wooded country, and boarding at my Uncles. We fell in love and I ask her hand in marriage.

Here follows the proposal and acceptance in their own words and spelling, which to me is very touching and unique in its styling.

"THE PROPOSAL"

Sunday Evening. Winchester, Illinois, Aug. 19, 1860. Miss Emily Miller:

Dear Madam:

Its with much pleasure I take this preasant time to write a few words to you. I am not much of a hand to talk, as you well know, but I will thry to say a few words on this sheet of paper.

I am not well posted in letter righting however, and I hope my blunders will be overlooked. I wish you to not get offended at my stillness of speech is here of late employed with making plans for my future happiness with you if possible. I admire you above all others in the world and would like you for my own, and would ask you how you would like to join heart and hand with me?

Providing your parents do not object. I am true in what

I say.

I mean every word that I say. This is a subject I never thought of before but if you wish to comply with my wants, I will do the best for you that lais in my power and always try to comply with your wants.

I will say that much, I will be by you in want or in

wealth in sickness and in health.

Fear not my love, where your spirit is weak, This troth I have plighted I never will break

And you I hope will foresake not.

There is one bright enchanting spot

Where love and beauty flow,

Which oft the glorious grace of God,

Hath made a Heaven below.

There is a radiant gem,

More precious far than oceans pearls,

Or empress diadem.

Oh! keep that gem my plighted one

Nor from that spot depart,

That spot is home, delightful home

That gem the faithful heart.

A reunion of feeling of sentiment and taste is indeed the chief bliss of earth.

I will say no more at this time, so good bye my dear.

I will say more next time. Give me an answer as soon as possible.

Please excuse my bad righting,
My pen is bad, my ink is pail,
My love for you will never fail.

"THE ACCEPTANCE"

Tuesday Evening.

Mr. Jones:

Dear Sir:

I am indeed happy to return your compliments. Trusting you will excuse my awkward way of addressing you. I am

willing to comply with your wishes, providing you gain the consent of my parents. Pardon my mistakes and excuse me this morning.

Yours Truly, Emilie.

These original letters are now eighty-nine years old.

He courted her the balance of the summer and when her school term was finished, and for all the objections her parents offered, and stubbornly refusing their consent. They decided to marry without it and accordingly the last day of her school, he met her at the school house and drove to the county seat at Pittsfield and procured a permit, and drove to the little town of Time, and was married by Bishop David Scanlon on October the 20th, 1860. Bishop Scanlon was not a Bishop of the Latter-Day Saints. Church.

I bought two wagons and teams. Some horses and mules, and my wife and I proceeded to Council Bluff, she driving one team. We were in company with the Saints and Brother David H. Cannon as Captain. We left the Missouri River on the 2nd day of June, 1861, arriving home on the 9th day of August, Emily

driving all the way across the plains.

I went to farming and teaming and living in Willard until after our first three sons were born. In the fall of 1865, I was called by President Brigham Young to go into the Southern Mission in Washington County, Utah. After reaching Washington, I was sent by President Erasctus Snow to Panaca, Nevada, which was then known as Meadow Valley, Nevada, to settle, and remained there until March first, 1875. Later when the breaking up of the Saints in the Muddy Valley, (now known as the Moapa Valley), and their moving from the Muddy Valley, in May, 1871 I was appointed by President Snow to take charge of the Panaca Ward, as acting Bishop. I served in that ward until March the 1st, 1875. I arrived in Panaca Dec. 17th, 1865 and helped to survey the townsite of Panaca and also the land surrounding, which was occupied by the saints.

The Church Co-op Store in Panaca had become badly involved in debt and Apostle Erastus Snow ask me to take charge of this institution. In five years I had cleared up the indebtedness

of \$3000.00, and had the store in good condition.

In my labors in the Panaca ward, I also freighted between Panaca and Salt Lake City. I was elected County Commissioner of Lincoln County, and served two terms, from Jan. 1st, 1873 until Jan. 1st, 1875.

(He was an able and alert business man and proved himself

to be a leader in building and fronteiring.)

His mother was the first in his family to become converted to the principles of Mormonism, and therefore he was taught those principles by a good worthy mother from his infancy. He had very little opportunity for schooling but was very adept at learning, improving every moment of his time and forever counselling his family and all young people to study and learn the gospel, as well as other good things, "never let a day go by without learning some thing good." He was an example of what one can do in becoming self educated. I remember his telling me he made the first pair of shoes he ever possessed. I think moccasins were about all the shoes he knew until he was quite a large boy.

In 1875 I was called by President Brigham Young to move my family to Washington, Utah, and take charge of the Rio Virgin Cotton and Woolen Mills as Superintendent. I sold my property, which consisted of a large tract of land out south of Panaca where the town of Caliente now stands. I traded the land there for land and interest in the Cannan beds and herd, which land lies south of the town of Hurrican, Utah, I sold my home to my brother,

Isaac Turnbaugh.

The first of March, 1875, with my family of seven children and wife, Emily, and journed back to Washington, Washington County, Utah, and assumed my duties at the Washington factory, which responsibility I held for six years. Also during that time I was ordained to the office of Bishop of the Washington Ward and called and sustained as first Councillor to President John D. T. McCallister in the Stake Presidency.

I was appointed County Commission of Washington County serving two years. Served as Bishop of the Washington Ward

four years.

On March the 13th, 1882, I was appointed by President Wilford Woodruff to serve as President of the Parowan Stake.


(Here follows his diary, beginning January 1st, 1881, copied from his own hand writing):

Saturday, Jan. 1st.—Spent the day in Washington attending to local duties as well as family and factory labors of the Zions Cooperative Rio Virgin Manufacturing Co. A business I have had charge of since the 1st of March, 1875, and up to date have done a very good business considering all circumstances.

Sunday, Jan. 2nd-Spent the day in Sabbath School, also

Sacrament Meeting with my family. Talking at some length in Sabbath Meeting as well as attending other local duties I taught the Book of Mormon class in Sabbath School, and have done so for nearly two years, and as Bishop of the Ward attending to the duties of that office as well as local ones.

Monday, Jan. 3rd-Spent the day looking after Z.C.R.V. Manufacturing Company's business and attending other local duties.

Tuesday, Jan. 4th-Time taken up looking after factory business, family affairs and other local duties.

Wednesday, Jan. 5th-As usual looked after factory and general duties.

Thursday, Jan. 6th-Attended fast meeting in Washington City School House at 10 A.M. and talked at some length and bore my testimony to the truth of the gospel and the Latter-Day. work. Reconfirmed Judson A. Wilkins a member of the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-Day Saints. Also reconfirmed Mary A. Proctor.

Friday, Jan. 7th-Spent the time in Washington attending

factory, family and local affairs.

Saturday, Jan. 8-Spent the time attending to factory and other business, private and local until 2 P.M., at which time I started for Toquerville in company with president John D. T. McAllister, arriving at Bishop Wm. A. Bringhurst's at 5:30 P.M. Attended Priesthood Meeting at 6:30 P.M. and as feeling existed between the Bishop and his first councillor, George Spillsbury, the matter was talked over and settled satisfactorily at which

meeting I talked at some length.

Sunday, Jan. 9th-Left the Bishops and started for Virgin City at 8 A.M., arrived at 10. Met with the brethren in their prayer circle, also met with the Saints in the ward meeting at 11 A.M. Talked a little and bore my testimony. Dined at Bishop Parker's at 2 P.M. and then started for Toquerville and arrived at 4 P.M. Went to their ward meeting and with Brother Mc-Callister and others, set apart the officers of the Relief Society. Young Men's and Young Ladies' Mutual Inmprovement Associations. Started for Leeds and attended a meeting at that place at 6:50 P.M. Dined at Joseph Wilkins' and slept at Brother Charles Wilkerson's.

Monday, Jan. 10-Breakfasted at Brother Wilkersons and at 8 A.M. started for home arriving in Washington at 11 A.M. Attended to factory and other local business the remainder of the

day.

Tuesday, Jan. 11th-Nothing of importance turned up today but attended to factory and local and private affairs.

Wednesday, Jan. 12th-Attended factory affairs, local and

otherwise as well as private matters.

Thursday 13th, Friday 14th and Saturday 15th as usual.

Sunday 16th—As usual on the Sabbath, attended my class in Sunday School teaching the Book of Mormon, and attending meeting at 2 P.M. The 17, 18, 19, 20, 21 and 22nd all as usual, factory and local duties. The 23rd, 24th, 25th, 26th, and 27th all as usual.

Friday, 28th—Attended County Court at St. George as I am one of the County Selectmen and a County Water Commissioner. Attended meeting at the said commission and attended other duties.

Saturday 29th—As usual.

Sunday 30th-As usual attending my duties on the Sabbath.

Monday, 31st, Tuesday, Feb. 1st and 2nd all as usual.

Thursday, Feb. 3rd—Attended all duties and also attended fast meeting. Made some remarks and blessed John Nicoll Chidister. Assisted in blessing Ethel Matilda Boggs.

Friday, Feb. 4th-As usual.

Saturday, Feb. 5th—Attended our Stake Priesthood meeting in St. George Tabernacle and made some remarks, also attended other duties as they came along.

Sunday, Feb. 6th-As usual at my place attending my duties

on the Sabbath.

Monday, Feb. 7th—Attended duties at home and in town. Went to Santa Clara and gave my note to Sister Lydia K. Mc-Clellan for \$336.00. Payable in one year at the rate of 12% per annum. Also ordained Judson H. Wilkins an Elder and reported the same to President McCallister.

Tuesday, Feb. 8th—As usual, at home and local and factory duties. Also attended our City Council meeting as I am Mayor

of Washington City, having served in that office two years.

Wednesday, Feb. 9th—As usual. Also attended our Mohava Stockholders meeting, as I am President of the said Company. Went to Washington fields to my farm and instructed my sons how to make our portion of the water ditch, and to commence plowing up some of my lucern to make a grain field.

Thursday, Feb. 10th—As usual, except that I went to the field and did some plowing and cut down some very large cotton-wood trees, which stood in the way and were a great damage to the land. Also set out some trees on the north side of the farm.

Friday, Feb. 11th-As usual. General duties as Bishop of

the Ward and Superintendent of the Z.C.R.V. Mfg. Co., also other matters.

Saturday, Feb. 12th—As usual and attended as clerk in our factory, as our regular clerk, P. H. McGuire, is on a missionary tour up to Virgin City.

Sunday, Feb. 13—As usual in my place on the Sabbath day. Took up some time in the ward meeting and read some instructions upon vocal music, as spoken of by the Prophet, Joseph Smith.

Monday, Feb. 14th—Today at my post in the factory, as clerk and other duties. Also posted notices of Water Commissioners.

Tuesday, Feb. 15th—Spent the day in attending to factory business, also attending to some Mohava Stock Company business. Directed my sons in some of their labors on the farm.

Wednesday, Feb. 16th—Spent the day attending to affairs at home and around the town and factory business. Went to St. George, five miles distant and met with the St. George Sheep Herd Board, and settled some business. At 2 P.M. returned to Washington and met with the Mutual Improvement Association. Attended to some business in the factory at 6 P.M. Also at the same place met with the City Council and attended City Business.

Thursday, Feb. 17th - Spent the day on the farm, making

ditch, setting out trees and plowing up lucern.

Friday, Feb. 18th—Spent the day on the farm setting out more shade trees and making more ditch. Also sowed about three acres of Barley.

Saturday, Feb. 19th-Spent the day in the factory and other

local duties.

Sunday, Feb. 20th—Spent the morning in Washington attending to some Mohava Stock Company business which kept me away from Sabbath School, but was at the meeting at 2 P.M. James Paxton was the first speaker and Robert the second, all of which were very interesting and the truth.

Monday, Feb. 21st—Spent the day attending business for the factory and the Mohava Stock Company, both in Washington and St. George. I rode over to St. George with brother W. D.

Chidster.

Tuesday, Feb. 22nd—Spent the day attending my duties as mayor and also notified the members of the board of the Mohava Stock Company of a meeting at 6:30 P.M., which I attended as President.

Wednesday, Feb. 23rd—Spent the day looking after the business of the Mohava Stock Company. Also ward duties, factory and private affairs.

Thursday, Feb. 24th-Spent the most of the time of that day

on my farm. Attended some town and factory business.

Friday, Feb. 25th—Spent the fore part of the day in town looking after factory business. In the afternoon went to the farm and sowed some barley and worked some on the main street of Washington.

Saturday, Feb. 26th—Looked after City affairs until 10 A.M., and then went to St. George and attended to some private business. At 2 P.M. went to the High Priest meeting in the first ward Sunday School house. President J. D. T. McCallister, G. W. Averett, Marinus Ensign, Isareal Ivens, President Will Fawcett, John Lytle and myself were the speakers.

Sunday, Feb. 27th—Was at my place in Sunday School in the Book of Mormon class at 10 A.M., and attended meeting in the St. George Tabernacle. President Wilford Woodruff occupied all the time, whose sermon was very interesting. I was also at

our ward meeting at 7 P.M. Talked at some length.

Monday, Feb. 28th—Looked after factory and local business. Also attended to some Mohava Stock Company business with Mr. Funk and Virgil Kelly. Bishop Erastus McIntire and wife came to our house to stay overnight. I administered to and blessed George Henry Potter.

Tuesday, March 1st — Spent the day looking after factory affairs and made out our ward report for the Quarterly Conference. Directed my sons in their labor and administered to and blessed

George Henry Potter.

Wednesday, March 2nd—Went and administered to George Henry Potter and then on into the hills and administered to Indian Chipo. In the afternoon worked on the factory tail race, and directed five other hands; during the balance of the day looked after local and factory affairs.

Thursday, March 3rd—Went to St. George and attended to some Mohava Stock Company business. Paid to the St. George Sheep Association \$200.00 in the Cannan Herd as the President of the said Company. As Bishop of the Washington Ward I paid \$146.00 on the apportinment of the ward. Attended to factory and other local at home and gave our quarterly report of the ward.

Friday, March 4th—In the factory today as the clerk was absent. While handling some heavy floor timbers, I hurt my back. Read in the Desert News the sermons of President John Taylor and Erastus Snow, delivered Aug. 8th, 1880 at Paris, Bear Lake.

Saturday, March 5th - Met with a goodly number of the brethern in prayer Circle in the Temple at 10 A.M. Came out

at 2 P.M. President Woodruff was very ill, but began to get better.

Sunday, March 6th—At Sabbath School in my place with my class at 10 A.M., and at ward meeting at 2 P.M. Brother A. P. Windsor was the first speaker. He spoke at some length on the labors in the Temple and on our duties. I also occupied about forty minutes, reading a Sunday School Circular, and talking upon the several duties of the Saints. Spoke of the judgments that are to come, which are to commence in the house of the Lord.

Monday, March 7th—Went to St. George and spent most of the day attending County Court. Also gave my note to Patty Perkins for \$130.00, payable in six months. Attended other local

and factory business the remainder of the day.

Tuesday, March 8th—Spent the day in Washington looking after factory and local duties, then my own affairs. Set out a lot

of apricot trees on my lot.

Wednesday, March 9th-Spent the most of the day at the factory and then set out some shade trees, and cleaning water ditches.

Thursday, March 10th—Attended to the factory business and then affairs around home. Not able to do much because of the hurt in my back, through lifting the heavy timber at the factory.

Friday, March 11th—Attended local affairs and at the factory, labored in the Ward and looked after work at home. Worked in

my garden and dug a lot of popular trees out.

Saturday, March 12th—Went to the farm and helped my son, Orlando, to plow out some water ditches, and showed the boys where to set out the poplar trees. The first to be set out in the

Washington field.

Sunday, March 13th—Met President Wilford Woodruff at the St. George Temple at 10 A.M., and received word from him to go with him to Parowan Iron County, Utah, and commence my labor as the President of the Parowan Stake of Zion, on Wednesday the 23rd. I returned from St. George and attended ward meeting at 2 P.M. Being a stormy and snowy day there was no meeting at night.

Monday, March 14th—Attended local and factory duties and affairs of the ward, also reconfirmed Alfred Ford a member of the

Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-Day Saints.

Tuesday, March 15th — Spent the most of the day on and around my farm, burning off grass and plowing some new ditches. Blasting some rocks and cleaning out the rocks from the ditches. Attended a meeting in the school house and attended other local business.

Wednesday, March 16—Spent the day in the factory and around the town, attending local and other business. Called a meeting for that night at 7 P.M., in which William Freely made his confession to the Priesthood and was forgiven. I also had E. M. Steers sign a bill for divorcement for his wife, Elizabeth.

Thursday, March 17th-Attended affairs at home and at the

factory and Ward affairs.

Friday, March 18th—Also at home on this date and attended home and factory affairs. Invited Apostle F. M. Lyman and John Henry Smith home to dine with us at 1 P.M. Held meeting at 2

P.M. A good attendance.

Saturday, March 19th—Attended Conference at St. George at 10 A.M. Apostle Wilford Woodruff and Brigham Young both spoke in the morning and also the afternoon meetings. The Bishops gave in their reports. I was released from any further duties as Councilor in the St. George Stake and as Bishop of the Washington Ward.

Sunday, March 20th—Attended the St. George Stake Conference at 10 A.M. and at 2 P.M., also Priesthood meeting at 9 A.M. Apostles Lyman and Smith addressed the Conference in the morning meeting and Apostle Woodruff and Young in the afternoon. A good time of rejoicing throughout the conference.

pany business.

Tuesday, March 22nd — Attended home and factory affairs until 1 P.M., and then started for Parowan on horseback, arriving at Leeds at 4 P.M. Stopped overnight with Bishop Geo. H. Crosby. In our company going to Parowan are President Wilford Woodruff, Brigham Young, Jr., President John D. T. McAllister, Howard Spencer, and President Teasdale from Jaub Stake, and from Bellview to Kanarraville, Sister E. R. Snow and Sister Zina D. Young.

Wednesday, March 23rd—Left Bishop Crosby's at Leeds at 8 A.M. and arrived at Kanarraville at 3 P.M. Took dinner at Bishop W. W. Roundy's also supper. Attended ward meeting at 7 p.m. I talked for a few moments. Apostles Brigham Young, Jr., and Frances M. Lyman and John Henry Smith talked of tithing and the duties of the Elders. I slept at Bro. Williams'.

Thursday, March 24th—Took breakfast with Brother Williams and started from Kanarraville at 9 A.M. for Cedar City, arriving at 12 noon. Dined at President Henry Lunts at 1 P.M., also had supper at Lunts. At 6 P.M. meeting and Pres. Mc-Allister, Pres. Teasdale and myself occupied 20 minutes each in

preaching. President Woodruff occupied the balance of the

time. A good meeting. I slept at Bishop C. J. Arthurs.

Friday, March 25th—Took breakfast with Bishop Arthur and family at 7 A.M., and started at 8 A.M. for Parowan a distance of 18 miles, arriving at 1 P.M. Dined with Bros. Thos. Durham and family at 2 P.M. At 6 P.M. went in to council with President Wilford Woodruff, Erastus Snow, Brigham Young, F. M. Lyman, John Henry Smith, and President Teasdale, in Brother Durham's North room. Took supper with W. H. Dame and in his sitting room, President E. Snow, J. Gates and myself met as a board of the Z.C.R. Virgin Company. Talked up business at some length, and agreed upon a meeting to be held at 4 P.M. in the Vestry of the Meeting House on the 25th inst., inviting the Apostles all to be present. I slept at Bros. Thos. Durhm's.

Saturday, March 26th—Attended the Parowan Conference at 10 A.M. Various reports were presented. President Woodruff called on Erastus Snow and President McAllister to speak which was very interesting. Took dinner at Thos. Durhams with President Woodruff and President Teasdale. Meeting at 2 P.M. The general authorities were then presented and sustained and after some remarks by President Snow, President Woodruff presented me to the Conference as President of the Parowan Stake of Zion, and I was sustained unanimously. I then spoke a few minutes Elder Jacob Gates then addressed the Conference. Meeting closed. I also went to the meeting in the evening at 7 P.M. President Lyman, J. H. Smith, and E. Snow all talked at some length, and very interestingly. Meeting closed. I slept at Bro. Durhams.

Sunday, March 27th—Attended Conference at 10 A.M. After the opening exercises, President Woodruff presented Edward Dalton as my first councilor, James T. Orton as one of the High Council, in place of Edward Dalton. I then presented the missionary list. Also presented Andrew Cory as a missionary to the States. Brigham Young Jr., then preached, also President Woodruff preached until 12 noon. At 2 P.M., with Jesse Crobsy, J. D. T. McAllister and President Woodruff addressed the Conference very interestingly. At the close of the Conference I was set apart as President of the Parowan Stake of Zion. Brigham Young, Jr., set apart Brother Dalton as my first Councilor. Brother Dalton and myself then set apart the Officers of the Young Ladies M.I.A. and the Primary Association for the Stake. At 7 P.M. I went to a testimony meeting at Bro. Dalton's and slept at Bro. Durham's.

Monday, March 28th—Took breakfast at Brother Durham's and then went to several places to see if I could rent or buy a lot or some farming land. Took dinner with Bro. William M. Mitchell

also looked around again in the afternoon as before but was not successful in getting a place. Visited Bro. W. H. Dames during the day and took supper with Bro. Dalton and Family. During the evening talked up business matters of the Stake and made out appointments of our missionaries to the various wards during the next quarter. At 9 P.M. I returned to Brother Durhams and retired.

Tuesday, March 29th—Took breakfast at Brother Durhams and then went through the town again looking for a home and a place. Took dinner with Brother Wm. Adams at 12 Noon and attended the funeral of Sister Charlotte Orton. Talked a few moments. During the afternoon of that day, I hunted up Brother David Matthison, and called him to go on a mission to the Manti Temple to work on the building. He said he would go. Also Brother W. Webb said one of his sons would go. As I have to start for home tomorrow, Brother Dalton said he would go to the April Conference in Salt Lake City. We left the business of getting the brethern of to Manti Temple in Bro. Mitchell's hands. I took supper at Brother Durham's and also slept there.

Wednesday, March 30th—Took breakfast at Brother Charles Adams' and started for Cedar City at 10 A.M. and arrived at 1 P.M. Took dinner at Brother Henry Lunt's, and in company of Bishop C. J. Arthur, and Bro. Webster, I set apart a sister as second Council for the Y.L.M.I., Association for the Stake. Also a sister as Secretary of the Primary Association. At 4 P.M. started for Kanarraville arriving at J. W. Berry's, took supper and slept

at Brother Berry's home.

Thursday, March 31st—Took breakfast at 8:30 A.M. and started for home and at six minutes after 9, arrived at Leeds, at 2:30 P.M., ate dinner at Bishop G. H. Crosby's and started on home at 5 P.M., arriving home at 7:30 P.M. and was quite tired and sick, and had quite a high fever. Found the folks in Washington all well.

Friday, April 1st-Attended business of the factory and home

affairs during the day.

Saturday, April 2nd—Attended factory and home affairs and had the ague from 1 P.M. until 5:45 P.M. Attended City Council of Washington at 4 P.M., also attended a board meeting of the Mohava Stock Company 7:30 P.M. I resigned my position as President of the said Company.

Sunday, April 3rd—Attended Sabbath School at 10 A.M. and took charge of the Book of Mormon Class. At 2 P.M. attended ward meeting. Elder E. R. Snow talked on the law of tithing and the effects and use of intoxicant drinks. Elder Richard

Morris talked at some length upon Scriptural Doctrines and Elder J. G. Hardy talked very interestingly upon the various duties of the Fathers and Mothers. Also instructed the young to abstain from all evil habits. At ward meeting at 7 P.M. Bishop Funk and myself occupied the time. A very good meeting.

Monday, April 4th—Attended factory business all day and wrote seven business letters for the factory and attended home

affairs. Planted a pea patch in our garden.

Tuesday, April 5th — Attended factory affairs in the early morning then went down to the farm. Came back to the Vineyard and plowed until 3 P.M. Came home and took dinner. At 4 P.M. attended a meeting of the Washington Mercantile and Manufacturing Association, and at 7 P.M. tendered my resignation as President of the said Company, which was accepted. Rained today.

Wednesday, April 6th—Rained a great portion of the night and rained most of the morning. I attended factory business most of the day. Also attended home affairs. Made'a deed to Louisa Miller for a lot sold to her three years ago. I sold to John Tanner, my pasture lots and made him a deed. The amount sold for was

\$275.00 factory pay.

Thursday, April 7th—Attended factory and home affairs, also went to St. George and paid the Co-op Store \$40.00 on my account.

Friday, April 8th-Attended factory and home affairs all day.

Went to my vineyard and back during the day.

Saturday, April 9th — Attended factory and home affairs; went to the vineyard and plowed out the head ditch and put old hay in it and covered with the plow, to keep from washing. Also attended the Y.L.M.I.A. at 4 P.M., and talked at some length. Attended City council at 7 P.M.

Sunday, April 10th—Attended Sunday School at 10 A.M. and took charge of the Book of Mormon Class. Also attended the Ward meeting at 2 P.M. Elder Robert Parker preached about 45

minutes, very interestingly.

Monday, April 11th.—Attended factory affairs, also went to St. George and returned about 1 P.M. to dinner, then went to the factory until 5 P.M. Hitched up my team and took Emily and her children down to the farm in the Washington field, returning home at dusk.

Tuesday, April 12th.-Attended factory and home affairs as

usual, and made some garden during the day.

Wednesday, April 13th—Attended factory business and made more garden during the day.

Thursday, April 14th.—Attended factory and made some more garden.

Friday, April 15th—Attended factory affairs, watered some of my garden during the day, and went to the Ladies' Mutual Improvement Dance in the evening at the school house.

Saturday, April 16th—Attended factory business and made arrangements to halter-break some horses that my son, J. O., brought in from the Mohava Ranch.

Sunday, April 17th—Attended Sunday school at 10 A.M. and took charge of the Book of Mormon Class. Ward meeting at 2 P.M. I talked 25 minutes. Peter Neilson talked forty-five minutes.

Monday, April 18—Attended factory affairs and helped take stock on my release from the factory, my labors for the factory ended on this date. Have served the Company six years and eighteen days. Attended also home affairs.

Tuesday, April 19—Attended home affairs and went down to the farm, also attended a young colt foaled on this date.

Wednesday, April 20—Attended home affairs and hitched up our young roam mare to the wagon, she worked right off.

Thursday, April 21st-Attended home affairs as yesterday; all

went right.

Friday, April 22nd—Attended home affairs as of yesterday. At six P.M., I with all my family met at the School House with all the old folks of the town, to a well provided spread supper in honor of myself and family. Also a dance at the close of supper, all to show the kindness and good feeling of the Saints towards us for our labors of the last five years.

Saturday, April 23rd.-Attended home affairs as usual.

Sunday, April 24th—Attended Sunday School at 10 A.M. and took charge of the Book of Mormon Class. Attended meeting at 2 P.M.

Monday, April 25th-Went to the farm and took Emily and

three little girls and son, J. O. and his wife.

Tuesday, April 26th—Attended home affairs and arranged for removal to Parowan and wrote President E. Dalton a letter appointing our Priesthood meeting for Parowan Stake on the Fifteenth day of May.

Wednesday, April 27—Attended home affairs, went to the farm in view of trading part of my land to J. F. Chidister. He also along. Went to St. George in the afternoon and got a sewing

machine for H. and A.

Thursday, April 28th—Attended home affairs.

Friday, April 29th-Attended home affairs as usual. Nothing

of note happened.

Saturday, April 30th—Attended home affairs all day and got a lot of lucern seed from Joppa Iverson and went in the afternoon and sowed all the spots where the lucern had not set.

Sunday, May 1st—Attended Sunday School at 10 A.M. and took charge of the Book of Mormon Class. Did not go to meeting at 2 P.M., as other matters of importance kept me away. A small

matter with my son, Orlando.

Monday, May 2nd—Attended home affairs and loaded up our house hold goods and fixtures on two wagons, prepartory for starting for Parowan on the morrow and taking with me Johannah

and Alice, James H., Thos. Jeff, Jr. and Willard L.

Tuesday, May 3rd.—Bid adieu to Emily and her children, except those going with me, and started for Parowan at 9:30, arrived at Leeds, a distance of 12 miles at 2 P.M. Dined and rested a while and started on and stopped at Sandy, six miles, over night.

Wednesday, May 4th—Started from camp at 6:30 A.M., and arrived at Dry Creek at 12 M. and rested until 3 P.M., traveled on, arriving at Fort Hamilton at 7:30 P.M. Traveling during

that day twenty-eight miles.

Thursday, May 5th - Broke camp at 6:30 A.M. Traveled until 12 M. arriving at Summit a distance of 18 miles. Stopped for two and a half hours at Brother Dalley's who accommodated me with hay for my horses. Started on, arriving in Parowan at five P.M. All well.

Friday, May 6th—Helped the folks to tack down their carpets and arranged for and assisted James and Thomas, Jr. to haul forty-three hundred pounds of hay from Bishop Mitchell's yard. Also visited E. Dalton and talked over several interests of the Stake. Also visited W. Adams in the evening and talked up Board of Trade matters.

Saturday, May 7th—Attended home affairs and also visited the Sisters Durham, also Bro. W. H. Dame and family, Brother Dalton called on us in the evening and read notes taken by himself at the April Conference and Priesthood Meetings in Salt Lake

City, April 2nd at 10 P.M. and at 2 P.M.

Sunday, May 8th—Attended Sunday school and took part in the Testament class and at the close of the exercise I addressed the school for a short time. I also attended the Sabbath meeting at 2 P.M., and preached 25 minutes. At 4 P.M. attended prayer meeting, but did not clothe, and went and administred to Sister Gurr. Attended meeting at 7:30 P.M.

Monday, May 9th—Attended the May Day celebration at 9 A.M. and spoke to the children 15 minutes. In the afternoon the children had a dance in the open around the Maypole. They had a good time. In the evening attended a dance for the grown ups. That also went off very good. Johannah, Alice, James and Willard were also present.

Tuesday, May 10th—Attended home affairs, also did some trading with the Parowan Co-op. Sold them some goods from the Z.C.R.V.M. Company and received of said store three thousand two hundred and twenty pounds of wheat. I took it to the grist mill. I also attended a meeting of the City Council at 7:30 P.M. and talked with the council, the propriety of not issuing license to

liquor dealers, also other matters of importance.

Wednesday, May 11th—Attended home affairs; went into the west field in company of Brother Charles Adams and looked at some land he gave me free use of for potatoes, for this year. He also showed me some vacant land outside of the field and recommended me to file on thirty or forty acres, which I thought to do. I also looked around the City in view of recommending some public improvements.

Thursday, May 12th—Went to Parowan canyon and got a load of wood and returned at 12 M. Looked around town during the afternoon. Looked at the meeting house block and lot and in view of grading the lot and finishing the meeting house. Visited

the Furniture shop and also Brother E. Daltons.

Friday, May 13th—Went for wood and returned at 12:15. Visited E. Dalton also Brother Wm. Marsden and made out an estimate of the amount per soul, to pay for our Stake hands who are at work on the Manti Temple, which amounted to 47½ cents each. Gave Brother Marsden, our Stake Clerk, the order in which our Stake and wards should be called, at our Priesthood meeting on the 14th inst.

Saturday, May 14th—Attended the Stake Priesthood meeting at 10 A.M. in Parowan meeting house. Talked at some length upon the duties of the Priesthood in all the various offices. Warned the people about sustaining outside schools. Against sustaining liquor drinking and saloons. Invited all to sustain all our home institutions and exhorted all to attend all our meetings, and to sustain all our Improvement Associations. Meetings adjourned at 12 M. Meeting at 2 P.M. I encouraged Stake meeting of High Priests at our Quarterly Conferences. Recommended local Priesthood meetings in all the Wards of the Stake, also teachers to visit and report once each month. Others of the Brethern spoke and gave good council.

Sunday, May 15th—Attended Ladies Conference at Summit, seven miles distant at 10 A.M. Conference met at Bishop Huletts residence. Meeting was addressed by Sister Lunt and a number of the Sisters representing the Relief Societies and Young Ladies' Mutual Improvement Association. Also representatives of the Primary association. President E. Dalton spoke. Meeting at 2 P.M. in Bowery prepared by Bishop Hulett and assistants, Sister Lunt and several others addressed the meeting. Also Brother J. P. Jones, T. Durham and J. W. Dalley, Bishop Hulett and Bishop Mitchell talked at some length. Meeting closed and Brother Dalton and myself returned home and went to Paragoonah, four miles distant and held meeting at 7:30 P.M. and returned home in the evening.

Monday, May 16th — Attended home affairs and visited Brother Dalton and talked up better regulating of the High Council and agreed to meet the Council on Thursday evening next.

We had a very heavy rain this afternoon.

Tuesday, May 17th—Attended home affairs and took my son, James, to work in the Cabinet shop and went on in to the field and watered about one and one half acres of land to put into potatoes. And in the afternoon was at Brother Hobbs' and was called and went and administered to a little boy that had fell and thrown his elbow out. Sister Hobbs set the bone.

Wednesday, May 18th-Attended home affairs and went to

the Canyon and got a load of wood.

Thursday, May 19th—Attended home affairs and plowed and planted one-fourth acre of potatoes and attended a called meeting of the High Council at 7:30 P.M. for the purpose of introducing a

better system in its meeting.

Thursday, May 20th—Visited Sister John West and talked with her at some length upon the principals of the Gospel and showed her the evil of sending her children to the Presbyterian School in our City, and asked her to not send them to that School any more. Talked with Brother W. H. Dame upon the enlargement and completing of the meeting house; he gave me the idea that President Young had, which was to enlarge it. Visited the Cabinet Shop and encouraged my son, James, to pay close attention to his labors.

Saturday, May 21st—Attended local and home affairs and also High Council meeting at 7:30 P.M., and talked up the matter of enlarging and finishing our meeting house and matters of interest. Meeting adjourned at 10 P.M.

Sunday, May 22nd—Attended Sabbath School at 10 A.M. and meeting at 2 P.M., and presented the matter of moving the

Sunday School from the basement, into the upper room of the meeting house, which was carried unanimously. Also gave notice of a Priesthood meeting at 7:30 P.M., to talk up the propriety of enlarging and finishing our meeting house, and getting a town clock to put upon the house, which was all agreed upon by unanimous vote.

Monday, May 23rd—Started for Washington at 7 A.M., arrived at Cedar City at 12 M. and stopped for a few minutes at Brother Henry Lunt's who made me a present of 8 oranges. I started on to Kanarra and stopped for the night at Brother John W. Berry's.

Tuesday, May 24th—Started on before breakfast from Kanarra and arrived at Bellview at 11 A.M. Rested a while and started on and arrived at Bishop Crosby's at 7 P.M. Stayed overnight.

Wednesday, May 25th—Started at 7 A.M. and arrived at home at Washington at 11:30 A.M., all right and found all tolerable well.

Thursday, May 26th—Attended home affairs and worked some in the garden and went to the farm. Helped take off the hay and cut about four acres.

Friday, May 27th.—Worked on the farm and helped J. O. and Thos. J. Jr., put up the hay and cut about four acres.

Saturday, May 28th.—Cut some hay and cocked a lot of hay.

Pitched one load on the wagon and sent it to St. George.

Sunday, May 29th—Attending Sunday School at 10 A.M., and took charge of the Book of Mormon class. Also attended meeting in P.M. and talked about 20 minutes. Took my family to the farm to look at the barley in the evening.

Monday, May 30th—Stacked a lot of hay; pitched on one load for St. George and cut one and one-half acres and attended some watering. Went at 6 P.M. and administered to Nellie, my daughter-in-law, my son J. O.'s wife, who was sick of confinement.

Tuesday, May 31st—Attended home affairs and helped put up

hay.

Wednesday, June 1st-Attended home affairs and attended to hay crop and worked some in the garden.

Thursday, June 2nd-Attended home affairs and helped to

put up hay and finished the first crop for the season.

Friday, June 3rd—Attended home affairs and cut one and half acre of hay for Ute Perkins.

Saturday, June 4th-Worked some in the garden and at-

tended other duties.

Sunday, June 5th-Went to the field and turned the water and returned and went to Ward meeting at 2 P.M.

Monday, June 6th—Attended home affairs and started son, Thomas, for Cedar City for a load of coal and attended County Court at 10 A.M. June term at St. George.

Tuesday, June 7th-Attended home affairs and worked some

in the garden.

Wednesday, June 8th-Attended home affairs and worked

some in the garden.

Thursday, June 9th—Worked in the garden and shod one pair of mares. Went to the farm at 1 P.M. returned at 2:30 P.M., and attended ward meeting at 4 P.M. F. M. Lyman, J. H. Smith, J. R. Murdock of Beaver and Junius F. Wells were present and gave some very good instructions.

Friday, June 10—Attended home affairs and went to St. George in the afternoon and attended the St. George Stake Board

of Trade at 3 P.M. I took charge of the meeting.

Saturday, June 11—Attended the Quarterly Conference at St. George Stake at 10 A.M., and talked a few minutes. Took dinner with Bro. Joseph H. Randle. Attended meeting at 2 P.M., and attended Priesthood meeting at 6 P.M. President F. M. Lyman and J. H. Smith gave some very good instructions.

Sunday, June 12 — Attended Quarterly Conference at St. George at 10 A.M., and also at 2 P.M. J. Gates, President Mc-Allister, D. D. McArthur, W. H. Branch, A. W. Ivins. Apostle J. H. Smith and Frances H. Lyman gave some very good instruc-

tion.

Monday, June 13th—Attended home affairs and started for Parowan at 9 A.M. Stopped at Harrisburg for dinner, arrived at Bellview at 8 P.M., stayed overnight.

Tuesday, June 14th—Started on at from Bellview at 6 A.M., had a very sick horse all day but arrived at Kanarra at 12 M., and rested until 2 P.M., and started on and arrived at Brother Henry Lunt's in Cedar City at 8 P.M. and stayed all night.

Wednesday, June 15th—Started on at 6:30 and arrived in Parowan at 1 P.M., and attended a meeting called for 7:30 P.M., by Dr. Fisher who organized a Bible Society for Iron County, he

representing the American Bible Society.

Thursday, June 16th—In Council meeting with Brother Dalton (my first Councilor for this Parowan Stake of Zion) in my house and arranged the missionary list for the next quarter for our Stake. Also talked up various other matters until 12 M. Brother Dalton dined with us. Attended personal affairs in the afternoon.

Friday, June 17th—Attended home affairs during the day and

also attended a short Priesthood meeting at 6 P.M.

Saturday, June 18th—Attended our Quarterly Conference at 10 A.M., and at 2 P.M., and also Priesthood Meeting at 6 P.M.

Sunday, June 19th—Attended Conference at 10 A.M., and talked at some length upon tithing and the word of wisdom. At meeting at 2 P.M. Apostle F. M. Lyman, Jesse Crosby and others addressed the meeting. Attended Mutual Meeting at 6 P.M., and Brother J. F. Wells addressed the meeting and organized the Stake.

Monday, June 20th.—Started at 7:30 A.M. in company with Marcus L. Guyman for Panguitch overtaking Apostles F. M. Lyman and J. H. Smith, Junius F. Wells and Brother Wm. Holyoak at Red Creek Canyon. We traveled together to Panguitch Lake arriving at Brother Apson's at 3 P.M., and had a boat ride on the lake. Tried to catch some fish but caught none. Took dinner at 4:30 and started for Panguitch at 5 P.M., a distance of 15 miles, arriving at President James Henries at 9:40 P.M. President Frances M. Lyman stopped with Amasa Lyman and the rest of the company at Brother Henries. I did not sleep until 2 A.M. of the 21st.

Tuesday, June 21st.—Attended meeting at 10 A.M. A good large audience. I talked about 15 minutes. J. F. Wells talked about 30 minutes. J. H. Smith preached the balance of the time. Brother W. M. Holyoke bore his testimony to the truth of what was said during the day. I also attended Priesthood meeting at 6 P.M. F. M. Lyman and J. H. Smith occupied all the time talking of the political aspect of the people, and wanted all on hand to vote at the election in August. I took dinner at John Camerons' and supper at Bishop J. C. Davis'.

Wednesday, June 22—Took breakfast at James Huston's and called on Samuel Henrie and family a few minutes and also on aged Sister Scow for a few minutes, and started for Parowan at 6:30 A.M. Traveled with the other Brethern. Brother Culbert King and wife joined our company until we came to the road. 15 miles, they going on to Beaver. Myself and young Guyman going to Parowan, arriving at 3:12 and I went to the telegraph office and delivered a telegram to the operator to be sent to J. R. Murdock of Beaver, for F. M. Lyman, at 3:30 P.M. I attended home affairs the balance of the day.

Thursday, June 23rd—Attended home affairs and cut lucern for Thomas Durham, James Connell and Peter M. Jensen, also Brother Hobbs. Wrote a letter to President Taylor on business for Brother McIntyre of Paragoonah. Also wrote a letter to my

wife, Emily in Washington.

Friday, June 24th-Attended home affairs and cut 6 acres of

lucern, for three of the brethren, W. Hobbs, his father, and W. Holyoke.

Saturday, June 25th-Attended home affairs and cut 2 acres of

lucern for John West and a small piece for W. Hobbs.

Sunday, June 26th—Attended Sunday School at 10 A.M., Sabbath meeting at 2 P.M. Brothers Abram Smith Scogard, Mortensen, Thomas. Adams and Myself talked. Program for the 4th of July was read by Brother T. Durham. Went into Prayer Circle at the close of the meeting. Attended evening meeting at 6 P.M.

Monday, June 27th—Attended home affairs and cut 1 acre of lucern for Sister Smith, 2 acres for P. M. Jensen, and 2½ for Wm. Holyoke and attended a board meeting of the Parowan Manufacturing Company at 8 P.M., until 12 midnight, at which meeting I brought up the propriety of putting up a woolen factory.

Tuesday, June 28th—Attended home affairs and cut lucern for W. Holyoke and Thomas Richards, until 3:30 P.M., and then came home and attended the Young Ladies Improvement Associa-

tion at 4:30 P.M.

Saturday, Nov. 19th.—Talked up Stake affairs with Bro. Dalton and Richards and attended home affairs. Took 51 bushels of wheat to the mill.

Sunday, Nov. 20th.—Attended Sunday School at 10 A.M. and meeting at 2 P.M. and evening meeting at 6:30 P.M.

Monday, Nov. 21st.—Went and got a load of wood and attended duties around home, and town.

Tuesday, Nov. 22nd.—Got a load of wood and attended duties around town and went to meeting at 6:30. C. H. Wheelock and Bro. George Farnsworth preached. They are traveling in the interest of the Manti Temple.

Wednesday, Nov. 23rd.—Loaded up my wagon with flour, wool, and potatoes ready for starting for Washington on the morrow.

Thursday, Nov. 24th.—Started for Washington at 7 A.M. and arrived at Hamilton at 4 P.M. and stayed at J. Middleton's place overnight, in the Camp house.

Friday, Nov. 25th.—Started on at 8 A.M. and arrived at Belleview at 5:30 P.M. and stayed over night at Samuel Gould's Camp house.

Saturday, Nov. 26th.—Started on at 7:30 A.M. and arrived at my home in Washington at 6 P.M. and at 9 o'clock I went down to Bro. Sandberg's to see my son Orlando's wife, who was quite sick. Bishop Funk, Bro. H. H. Larsen and Bro. H. H. Larsen and Bro. Sandberg and son and myself administered to her. She got better and my wife and I stayed until 1:30 then went home.

Sunday, Nov. 27th.—Up quite late and went to the Ward meeting at 2 P.M. and talked about 30 minutes. Bros. R. L. Covington and J. M. Chidister talked also. I visited Orlando's wife

after meeting.

Monday, Nov. 28th.—Unloaded my wagon in the forenoon and went to St. George in the afternoon.

Tuesday, Nov. 29th.—Attended to business during the day.

Wednesday, Nov. 30th.—Attended my affairs and shod some horses during the day.

Thursday, Dec. 1st.—Went and got a load of hay and shod a horse and made some preparations for my teams to start to Mil-

ford. Also hauled up a load of hay to go to Silver Reef.

Friday, Dec. 2nd.—Started James and Tom after a load of wood and J. O. to Reef with a load of hay and traveled to Mocock 18 miles, and got one of my colts (Sam by name) and returned home at 10 P.M.

Saturday, Dec. 3rd.-Got up a load of hay and prepared one

of the wagons for the boys to start to Milford on Monday.

Sunday, Dec. 4th.—Went to Sunday School at 10 A.M. and took charge of the Doctrine and Covenants Class. I also talked

to the School a few minutes. Also went to meeting at 2 P.M. Bros. McMullin and H. Harriman talked very interestingly.

Monday, Dec. 5th.-Hauled up a load of hay and helped my

boys to arrange to start for Milford.

Tuesday, Dec. 6th.-Worked some on some wood racks and attended some business in town during the day.

Wednesday, Dec. 7th.—Attended affairs around home.

Thursday, Dec. 8th .- Attended affairs around home and some in town.

Friday, Dec. 9th.-Made repairs on corrals, shed and gates.

Saturday, Dec. 10th.-Completed repairs on corral and visited

Nellie, Orlando's wife, and administered to her.

Sunday, Dec. 11th.-Attended Sunday School at 10 A.M. and took charge of the Doctrine and Covenants class. Visited Lon's sick wife in the afternoon and night.

Monday, Dec. 12th.-Attended affairs around home and tried

to sell some of my land in the field during the day.

Tuesday, Dec. 13th.—Attended affairs at home and continued trying to sell my land, also house and lots.

Wednesday, Dec. 14th.-Went to St. George and tried to

trade off my property.

Thursday, Dec. 15th.-Visited the sick wife and child of the son and attended to other home duties.

Friday, Dec. 16th.—As usual today.

Saturday, Dec. 17th.-Made some repairs in the yard and upon the wood rack. And did some watering in the lot.

Sunday, Dec. 8th.-Not being able to attend St. George Stake Conference, owing to the teams being away, I stayed home

most of the day and read Parley P. Pratt's History.

Monday, Dec. 19th.-Made arrangements for some grain of H. P. Iverson and went to the field and showed some of my land to C. M. Iverson in view of a sale.

Tuesday, Dec. 20th.-Attended home affairs and sold to Marcus Funk twelve acres of my land for \$600.00. Also helped to unload one load of goods as my boys arrived from Milford at 5 P.M.

Wednesday, Dec. 21st.-Started for Parowan at 9:40 A.M.,

arrived at Bellview at 7 P.M.

Thursday, Dec. 22nd.-Started on at 8 A.M. and arrived at Bro. Henry Lunt's at Cedar City at 7 P.M., and stayed overnight.

Friday, Dec. 23rd.-Started on at 7:30 A.M. and arrived in

Parowan at 1 P.M. and found my family all well.

Saturday, Dec. 24th.—Attended our Quarterly Conference at 10 A.M. and made a few opening remarks. Bishops McIntyre, Mitchell, Hulet and John E. Dalley made their ward reports. Attended Conference at 2 P.M. Bishop Arthur reported. Henry Lunt talked at some length. Priesthood meeting at 6:30 P.M. I talked

at some length.

Sunday, Dec. 25th.—Attended Conference at 10 P.M. President Dalton talked most of the time. Meeting at 2 P.M. Bro. D. Matheson and myself took all the time. At the close of the meeting I set apart W. C. McGregor as first Councillor to Bishop W. C. Mitchell. Called the Bishops together and gave some instructons in regard to not giving out information to those not of us, pertaining to Church matters.

Monday, Dec. 26th.—Christmas Holiday, so no work done. Received visit from several Bands. Generally a merry time among

the people, and a dance in the evening at 7 P.M.

Tuesday, Dec. 27.-Attended home affairs and made arrange-

ments to go to Cedar. Shod one span of horses.

Wednesday, Dec. 28th.—Started for Cedar at 6:15 A.M. Arrived there at 9:40 A.M. Started for the coal beds at 12 M. Returned to Cedar at 4:30 P.M. Camped in the street at Bro. Dutton's.

Thursday, Dec. 29th.—Started for Parowan at 9 A.M., after seeing my son James loaded with coal for Washington. I arrived in Parowan at 4 P.M. Found all well.

Friday, Dec. 30th.—Unloaded my coal and got some wheat and took to the mill. I was then served with notice that I was appointed one of the select men of Iron County and went and qualified as such. Set in Court at 11 A.M. until sundown. Also attended a board meeting of the Co-op Co.

Saturday, Dec. 31st.—Attended County Court at 9 A.M. until 12:15. Also attended Water Commissioner's meeting at 2 P.M.

until 5:30 P.M. Spent the evening at home.

Sunday, Jan. 1st, 1882.—Attended Sunday School at 10 A.M. and meeting at 2 P.M. and talked on the law of tithing. Attended prayer meeting at 6:30 P.M.

Monday, January 2nd.—Took some wheat to the mill. Attend-

ed other home duties and town labors.

Tuesday, January 3rd.—Took some wheat to the mill. Ground the axe and cut some wood.

Wednesday, January 4th.—Loaded my wagon with wool and flour ready to start for Washington on the morrow.

Thursday, Jan. 5th.—Started for Washington at 7:15 A.M.

Arrived at Hamilton at 5 P.M.

Friday, Jan. 6th.—Started out at 5 P.M. and arrived at Bellview at 4:30 P.M.

Saturday, Jan. 7th.-Started on at 8 A.M. having a sick

horse. Hung up in the sand and went to Leeds on horseback with the sick one. Took dinner with Hyrum Bryson. Went back to the wagon, got there at 4:30 P.M. Bro. Jensen of Parowan came and brought his team and hauled my wagon into Leeds, arriving at Bishop Crosby's at 9:30 P.M. Stayed overnight.

Sunday, Jan. 8th.—Started on at 10:30 A.M. having the assistance of Bro. McIntire's horse; met my son Thomas at Cottonwood Creek with a pair of horses to help me on the way. Arrived home in Washington at 2 P.M. Found all tolerable well.

Monday, Jan. 9th.-Attended home affairs and went and got

some hay.

Tuesday, Jan. 10th.—Hauled up some hay and helped the boys to get ready for their work.

Wednesday, Jan. 11th.-Hauled up some hay and repaired

the wagon brakes.

Here the diary ends, but to show what rate of interest he paid when forced to borrow money, I will copy part of the accounts written in the back of the book.

Tuesday, March 7th, 1881.—Cash received from Sister Patty Perkins, for which I gave my note at 15% annum, \$130.00 payable

in six months.

Wednesday, June 12th.-Paid interest \$20.00.

June 10th.—Cash received from William G. Perkins for which I gave my note at 15% per cent per annum. \$55.00 payable in six months.

January 12th, 1882.—Paid to William G. Perkins, \$55.00.

February 18th, 1882.—I went to Santa Clara and gave my note to Sister Lydia G. Knight for \$772.00 with interest at 12% per annum.

This diary was only one of several that he kept, and which were probably destroyed when clearing out old papers, as being

of no value.

If people who are interested in geanology research, would keep a diary each year, it would be helpful to their future generations in finding facts and incidents sometimes very necessary in their work.

CHAPTER II.

Before the Edmunds Tucker Law came into existence prohibiting plural marriage, the leading men who were financially able to support more than one family, accepted the law of Plural Marraige.

In May, 1878, Thomas Jefferson Jones married Johannah C.

Larson of Washington, Utah, who was the daughter of Brother and Sister Andrew Larson, good faithful people who were con-

verted to the Gospel in Malmo, Sweden.

In 1879 he married Alice Hall of Washington, a daughter of Newton D. Hall and Sarah Busenbark. These wives were fine, high type women and each gave to the world a fine type of children. Men and women who have done nobly trying to better the world by setting examples worthy of imitation.

His first wife was the mother of eleven children, all to grow to man and womanhood, with the exception of one son who died

at 13 years and nine month.

His second wife was the mother of eight children, seven sons, all to become men, and one daughter. Two sons passed away in their late teens.

His third wife was the mother of seven children, but was

called to part with the last child at the age of five months.

Thomas Jefferson Jones moved his second family to Overton, Nevada, in 1884. They frontiered and went through the hardships of a new country, that was sparsely settled. He had to haul his grain to Parowan to the mill to be ground into flour. On other trips he hauled salt from the mines near St. Thomas, to Cedar City, Utah, and Parowan, to trade for other food and merchandise. The distance from Parowan to Overton was about 200 miles. At the time of his first wife's death in May, 1885, his third family was residing in Washington, Utah, and as she had left a babe hardly four months old, Alice came to take over the duties as mother to Emily's family.

Later the family moved to Cedar City and remained there a number of years. It was rather a difficult business, transporting food and goods back and forth between Nevada and Utah. Father decided it best to have all his families nearer together. therefore Alice and family moved to Bunkerville, Nevada, where they resided until about the year 1913. Alice and family settled in Delta, Utah, where the remaining members of this family still reside. Father was appointed Postmaster at Overton, Nevada, and served as such for a number of years until he felt he had served the public long enough and resigned and spent the last few years of his life visiting relatives living in various parts of the west and Old Mexico. Also visiting old relatives in Nebraska. During his life he was ever ready to assist those in need, and was forced to break up his homes and move because he was called by higher authority to help build new towns and communities that were being established in the west.

He was a community Father in the towns where he lived.

Often assisting in the sickroom, sometimes called to assist serious cases of childbirth, to set broken limbs, or shoulders, or pull teeth. He had a set of carpenter tools and often made coffins and helped to lay away the dead.

He built wagon beds, hay racks and barrels, often used by travelers to carry water in the long trek across the dry rough roads.

Also for storage of molasses and honey.

He was a good farmer and always had plenty of garden to give to those who were less fortunate. With his large family they never really wanted for the real necessities of life. He raised his own sheep, hogs, and chickens, and bees, which produced plenty of honey for the family use, and furnished a goodly portion to sell or trade for other products, such as shoes and clothing from northern stores.

He was a thorough Latter-Day Saint and devoted much time to the study of the Scriptures, and was an eloquent speaker, a devoted husband and father, a dependable friend and neighbor and loved those in need and ever ready to give counsel and encouragement to those who were wayward.

In all his life he never intimated that he ever regretted the course he had taken. If he had desired, he could have spent an easier life by staying in one place, but he chose to be obedient to those in authority and do a full share in confronting the hard-

ships of pioneer life.

CHAPTER III BOOK 1

BIOGRAPHICAL SKETCH OF EMILY MILLER

Emily Miller was born the 15th of March, 1840, in Winchester, Scott County, Illinois. She was of good parents, whose pride and joy was the honesty and integrity of their children. Her father's name was Jacob Miller of High Dutch descent. Her mother's name was Angaline Linn, whose ancestors were of Scotch-Irish. She was the third child of a large family, who were at one time very well established, with a good home, large tracts of land, a rock quarry from which they sold much of the building blocks used in the construction of homes and business houses, which furnished a good income.

The county fair was held each year on her father's ground, from the year 1855 to 1859, which gave him a good rental. The plot for the first Cemetery in Winchester was deeded by her father to the City of Winchester free gratis, he reserving a plot

for the family burying ground, and where those who passed away at the time are resting in this Cemetery.

Through the misappropriations of family funds and breaking of a trust by an in-law, these people were reduced to humble cir-

cumstances in their declining years.

Emily with all her sisters and brothers were given the best advantages the school had to offer in that vicinity. All her sisters taught school at various times and assisted in the family income, and became homemakers with large families.

The proposal and acceptance spoken of in a former chapter of this book were copied from the originals, which are still in the

family and are eighty-nine years old.

The event of the marriage of father and mother was very touching as her people would not accept him as a husband for their daughter because he was one of those hated Mormons, and so the marriage was an elopement.

On the last day of her school, her people were to come for her and take her to the home, a distance of about 20 miles, and since they would not consent to the marriage, it was up to father

to play the young Lochinvar.

He arrived at the school house at the close of school and carried her away on horseback to the County Seat at Pittsfield, and procured a permit to marry and proceded to the minister of the Baptist Church, David Scanlon, and were married October the 22nd, 1860.

Her brothers followed with guns, but were unsuccessful in stopping the young lovers, as they were married and away on

their honeymoon in spite of guns and wild threats.

Some few days later they ventured back to the old home, arriving about dinner-time; she was invited in to eat but not Jeff, the Mormon, who had stolen their daughter. No, he could not sit at their table, and he never did.

She declined to eat without her husband, and gathered up her clothes and all her belongings and departed despite the pleadings of her parents and sisters. Her mother gave her a length of

calico for a wedding present.

Though the family became reconciled to the marriage after a few years, but until they left for the west they did everything possible to get her to leave her husband. As their pleadings worried her and for a time she wavered between the love of her people and her husband, and the thought of going so far away among strange people and to strange places and customs, and a new religion. She decided to stay with her folks for a time and as the time drew near for the departure for the west she wrote to her parents to come

after her. She gave the letter to her husband to post, and he, manlike, was curious at the possible contents. He carried the letter and finally opened and resealed it and still carried it until near the time to start on the journey, when there was not time for the folks to reach her.

Too, because the Illinois river was swollen from the terrific rains, when her people reached the ford or the crossing place it was impossible to get across. They could only turn back home sorrowful and sad.

Poor mother watched and waited, tearfully wanting to stay and wanting to go with her husband, whom she truly loved. She was certainly torn between love and duty to her aged parents.

When the next day had dawned and father was ready to start on the long journey, and her folks had not come for her, not knowing the cause, she decided in his favor and came west. I am sure she never regretted the step she had taken and took pride in her husband and children.

For many years she grieved for her people, but never felt like giving up her husband and family to go back to stay. She made a long visit back to Winchester, Illinois, in the latter part of the year 1879, and returned in the month of January, 1880. All the while she visited with her folks she faithfully kept the secret of his plural marriages to the other wives.

She was the mother of two sons before she embraced the gospel and was baptized by Harrison Burgess the 7th of June, 1863. She became a firm believer and a faithful member; believed in large families and gave birth to eleven children. She was a kind, loving, adorable mother and gave to her husband and children the love and trust and confidence of a noble woman.

She was reluctant in accepting the principals of plural marriage and not converted to it until she was counselled and advised by Brigham Young, and when at last she accepted it, went to the St. George Temple with her husband and the girl who was to become the second wife and placed Johannah's hand in Father's with her blessings. Father admired her for that jesture and said it was a thing not many women would have done.

At the time of Father's marriage to the second wife, Johannah, Alice Hall was living in the home as an assistant to mother and she, too, was promised to Father, and the day before the marriage was to take place, he asked Alice to be ready to go at the same time. Because of the short notice (strange that a man should have his say), Alice was hurt and refused to go. She left the home and went away to work at the Cotton Farm and the engagement was apparently off. Mother had a great love for her

and worried over and dreamed so much of Alice, she finally went after her and asked her to come back and marry Father,

which she did one year later.

Mother was a wonderful helpmate in many ways. She rented orchards of fruit in Washington and cut and dried it on shares; wove many yards of carpet; a wonderful housekeeper and cook and immaculately clean. Was a good friend and neighbor, as well as a loving wife and mother.

That you may know she believed a woman's duty was to her God and her husband and family, I have quoted some excerpts from a letter written to her sister, Annie Miller Johnson, dated

the 30th of January, 1881.

"I was glad to hear you had another baby, and it was a boy. I hope that you will not stop now that you have one of each kind and think you have family enough. I don't think that woman has enough children; as long as the Lord sees fit for her to bear children, and that he will not hold her guiltless when she employs means to keep nature from doing all it can to obey the first great command that God gave to our first parents, Adam and Eve. To multiply and replenish the earth, and I want to do all I can to obey that commandment.

"I already have nine and hope to have more. I do not think we are any better than our mother, who had twelve. I wish father and mother would come out west and visit us and see our children. I think I have as good looking bunch as the common run of scrubs."

CHAPTER IV.

Their Children

Jacob Orlando, first child of Thomas Jefferson Jones and Emily Miller, as born 25th of September, 1861, in Willard, Box Elder County, Utah. He was five years of age when father and mother moved to Panaca, Nevada. He began his schooling in Panaca and was fourteen years of age when they moved (by call of President Brigham Young) to Washington, Washington County, Utah.

He spent his boyhood and young manhood in Washington, there attending the public schools, and later the high school in St. George. He attended the B.Y.U. in Provo, Utah, and after his return home, married Nellie Sanberg of Washington. They re-

mained in Washington until early 1884, when they moved to Junction, Piute County, Utah. Later in the year of 1886 moved to Montrose, Colorado. The family remained in Colorado until the year 1895, and because he had been ill and having lost his hearing through being exposed to the deep snow and cold while logging and earning a living for his family, they returned to Washington, Utah.

He found employment in the warmer climate and for some time was better in health. He worked at various jobs in Utah and at the Eldorado Canyon. Came back to Utah and had a very severe illness from which he never recovered sufficiently to earn a living for his family.

They moved to Idaho and he passed away Dec. 13, 1908. He was an adorable boy and as a father was everything a woman or family could ask for until his health failed. He had a host of friends wherever he lived or was employed. Always jolly and

happy.

Nellie was a good wife and mother and did all possible to sustain and rear the family when he was unable to help. She was a good friend and neighbor, and all who knew her will remember her goodness and loyalty to her husband and children. She lived to be a good old age and in her later life was financially able to travel to and fro, visiting her children, and maintained and lived in her own little home comfortably until four days prior to her death, when she gave up her home and went to live with her daughter, Pearl, where she passed to eternal rest at the age of eighty-four.

Orlando and Nellie raised a nice family and have much

credit due them in the training of their children.

CHAPTER V.

Their Children

Pernellie Emily, the first child, was born in Washington, Utah, 30th of May, 1881. She was a lovely girl and worthy of the husband she married. Has been one of the Lord's chosen mothers,

and been extremely blessed with eight children.

Pernellie Emily married Elias Alonzo Strong, who was born in Springville, Utah. He was a thorough Latter-Day Saint. They were married in the Temple and have been an exemplary couple. Elias filled a short term mission during the winter of 1928 and 1929. Was stationed in Denver, Colorado. He is a High Priest, a ward teacher and teacher in the High Priest Quorum. Was

President of the Young Men's Mutual Association for a number of years. A good, honorable, trustworthy neighbor and friend.

Their first child, a son, Elias Earl, was born 27th of January, 1906, at Kimberly, Piute County, Utah. He married Sigrid Leona Christensen, 15th of September, 1930, in the Salt Lake Temple. Is a Sunday School Superintendent at Logan Square in Chicago, Ill., which place he has filled for about three years.

They have two children, Robert Earl Strong, born 1st of May, 1938, in Chicago, Ill., and Richard Allen Strong, born 14th of

July, 1941, in Chicago.

Pernellie Emily Strong, the second child of Pernellie Emily Jones and Elias A. Strong was born 22nd of November, 1907, in

Moore, Idaho.

She married Byron Tuttle in 1929 in the Salt Lake Temple. They have five children, Harold Strong Tuttle, born 21st of March in Springville, Utah. Thelma Tuttle, born 26th of April, 1931, in Springville, Utah.

Earl William Tuttle, born 26th of April, 1935, in Spring-

ville, Utah.

Donald Byron Tuttle, born 31st of March, 1937, in Spring-ville, Utah.

Elias Glenn Tuttle was born the 5th of November, 1940, in

Springville, Utah.

Rhoda Mae Strong, the third child of Pernellie and Elias Strong, was born the 27th of December, 1909, at Springville,

Utah, and died the 19th of March, 1910.

Pearl Luella Strong, the fourth child of Pernellie and Elias Strong, was born the 29th of March, 1911, in Springville, Utah. She married Woodrow Wilson Stevens on the 4th of January, 1939, in Ely, Nev., and later was married in the Salt Lake Temple. She married Edmund Van Orden of Washington, Utah, in St. George, Utah, the 8th of February, 1905. They went to Idaho to make their home and were the parents of six children as follows:

Their first, Edmund Orlando VanOrden, born the 12th day of November, 1905, in Thomas, Idaho. He married Irene Liljenquist the 10th of September, 1930, in the Salt Lake Temple. He was previously endowed in the Temple in January, 1927.

He entered the army as 2nd Lt. and was first stationed at Camp Robinson, Little Rock, Ark. Oct. 1st was sent over across the Atlantic, landing in England Columbus Day, Oct. 12th.

He was sent to Africa in Nov. and went through the African Campaign in the 1st Division, 16th Infantry. While fighting at Matsur he led his platoon across open terrain under deadly barrage of enemy fire and due to lack of reinforcements he was taken a prisoner, loaded on an Italian Prison ship and started for Italy. But the American Air Force bombed and strafed the ship for three days. The enemy abandoned the ship and the prisoners were picked up by the French and landed on African Soil on Mother's Day. He was awarded the Silver Star for gallantry in action and nicknamed "Lucky" by his comrades.

Back in Africa and in action he made the invasion of Sicily and on through the campaign. He was commissioned 1st Lt. on the 4th of July, 1943, in Sicily. In November of 1943 he was sent to England to prepare for the Invasion of France. When D Day came he was one of the first to set foot on French soil and when night came and he was still alive, and no wounds of any kind, he was grateful and thanked to his Heavenly Father for his care and mercy and was surprised too as only about a third of the boys were able to land and hold the Beach. He said the Lord certainly was taking care of him.

He contracted malaria while a prisoner and he became so ill he was sent back to England under a Dr.'s care, was later sent to U.S.A. in Nov. of 1944 to a Malaria Hospital in Texas until in 1945 he seemed to improve and was sent to Indiana to head the Bond drive of that State. He was there from the 1st of June until in July and returned to Texas where he remained until his discharge in Oct., 1945. He was never wounded in any way all through the Campaign. He received the Bronze Star for displaying outstanding courage and coolness in the incessant fire of the enemy.

These are the copies of the Citations.

SILVER STAR APRIL 30TH, 1943, WHILE IN AFRICA For Gallantry in action in the vicinity of Mateur, Tunisia, although subjected to a deadly barrage of enemy fire, Lt. Murdock led his platoon across open terrain in a successful attack upon the enemy.

Quentin C. Murdock, First Lt., for heroic achievement in connection with military operations against the enemy in the vicinity of St. Laurent-sur-mer, Normandy, France, June 6th, 1944. Displaying outstanding courage and coolness in the face of incessant enemy fire, Lt. Mprdock supervised movement of vehicles along mined roads and established a motor pool from which he directed immediate delivery of ammunition, food and water to forward assault units.

He made thirteen trips to Brest, France, from New York Harbor on the U. S. S. Transport Von Steuben, the former German Ship, "The Crown Prince Wilhelm", which was in U. S. waters and taken over by the U. S. when war was declared on Germany.

BOOK 2 CHAPTER XX.

Sketch of the Life of Johannah C. Larson Jones

JOHANNAH C. LARSON, the second wife of Thomas J. Jones, was born the 1st of Jan., 1854, in Malmo, Sweden. Her parents were of the working class, but honest and good and the kind who go to make honorable citizens.

They heard and embraced the gospel in 1853. Their people all turned against them, but they were sure of their convictions and were able to secure passage and embarked for the United States in the fall of 1854.

Johannah was but six months old when they set sail for America. They were nine weeks crossing the ocean and landed in New Orleans, La. After some time they continued their journey into Missouri and worked two years in that state, saving and planning to get to Zion. They earned enough to live and buy a yoke of oxen and a wagon, also a cow, before continuing their journey into Missouri.

They made friends and obtained work in that state and were able to build a small abode. The mother did housework and the people she worked for grew fond of her little six-year-old son, and begged her to let him stay with them overnight. She never dreamed that harm would come to her boy, so let the little fellow spend the night occasionally. But when these people learned that she with her husband and children were planning to go to Utah, they hid the boy. She came day after day but they still kept him out of sight. Finally they told her if she would give up her religion she could her her son. They said he was too smart a boy to go to Utah to be a slave for Brigham Young, and set the dogs on her. They drove her husband's cattle away and told her if he ever came near they would shoot him and for that reason she would never let her husband go after the boy. They said they would not hurt her.

Some of the saints advised her to go to court and told her the law would give her her child as it was hers and no one could take him away. So she went to the courts and her case was put before the judge and it was difficult for her to understand the proceedings and the room was filled with men. At last one gray-haired man arose and told the court the boy was hers and no law could take him away from her. They decided to let the boy go. A

policeman offered to accompany her, but she had no fear and yet she had quite a distance to go; she had spent all her money and thought they would be safe. She took her boy and lead him homeward, but when they came to a heavily wooded district with dense undergrowth, a shot was fired nearby and she was so frightened, her boy was snatched from her and it was the last she ever saw of him. She stood paralyzed for awhile and a man stepped up to her and offered a quarter for the boy's coat she carried over her arm. These ruffians sent word for them to get out and leave the country or they would murder them. The neighbors helped them to get away the next day and that a mob surrounded the house and burned it.

She grieved constantly for her little boy but would not deny

her belief and the Gospel she had embraced.

They moved to Nebraska, where another son was born. There they farmed and raised crops which were stolen by the Indians, and their lives were in danger. From there they moved to Omaha and continued to work and earn means and equipment to continue their journey to Utah. They owned one-half interest in a wagon with another family, a yoke of oxen and two cows.

Johannah was six years of age by this time, and when crossing the plains was like many others, walked the greater part of

the wav

They started for Utah in June and arrived in Salt Lake City in September. They moved to San Pete County, where they remained one year and were then called by Brigham Young to the Dixie mission. They journed again over rough untamed country and landed in Washington, Utah, in December, 1861, where they spent the remainder of their years. These devout, good people never forgot the loss of their child, never wavering in their belief. After a number of years in searching for some news and whereabouts of their son they learned he grew to manhood and became a fine man. Had married and his wife had died at the birth of a baby daughter, later he got into some kind of trouble and was killed by some ruffian's bullet.

Johannah spent most of her life in Utah. Through illness and other disadvantages she had very little opportunity for an education, but like many others of that day, did her studying at home, becoming sufficiently educated to teach and instruct, not only her own children, but held responsible positions in the Primary, Young

Ladies' M.I.A. and the Relief Societies.

She became a member of the Relief Society when at the age of seventeen and remained a member all her life. She married Thos. J. Jones on May 2nd, 1878, in the St. George Temple. Her first child was born in Washington, Washington County, Utah, and when he was two years of age moved with her husband to Parowan, Utah, here he had been called by President Wilford Woodruff to take charge of the Parowan Stake as its President.

Because of the pressure brought to bear upon the plural marriages she was compelled to break up housekeeping and depart with her husband and four young children in the middle of the night to parts unknown. She stopped with her parents for two months and as the colonization of Old Mexico had begun by the Church members they decided to go to Mexico, but when reaching

the Moapa Valley they were advised to remain there.

The many hardships endured in the Moapa Valley during the first ten or fifteen years will never be known only by those who endured them. They continued living in the Moapa Valley where other sons were born and reared in the gospel. In July, 1885, Johannah and her children were stricken with the ague, or fever, and chills, and they were more or less afflicted for two or three years.

In 1891 she was set apart as first councilor in the Primary, and later, when the Relief Society was organized, was chosen as first Councilor in that organization, where she labored until the year 1914, and due to ill health was released. Though her life had been filled with grief and hardships she never fell to murmuring, but acknowledged the hand of the Lord in all her joys and sorrows, and held to that all abiding faith instilled in her by her worthy parents.

She gave birth to eight children, seven sons and one daughter, and to her credit at this writing, has thirty-one grand children and thirty-nine great grand children. Two of her sons preceded her in death in their late teens. There are also two adopted great

grand children.

On the 2nd of May, 1878, Thomas Jefferson Jones and Johannah Christenia Larsen were joined in Plural Marriage in the St. George Temple, with my Mother Emily witnessing and sancti-

fving that marriage.

Johannah was a woman worthy and good, and a mother to be proud of. She bore a family of eight children to Thomas Jerferson Jones, and endured many hardships for the gospel's sake, her children and her husband. With her infinite belief in the gospel and all its principles as taught by the Prophet Joseph Smith, which was revealed to him by our Heavenly Father.

She did a noble part in frontiering and helping to build a home, not only for her own children, but after the death of Emily (my mother), the first wife, who left a family of small children, the babe was but four months old, she became a second mother to some of them.

She endeared herself to all who knew her and was certainly one of God's noble women.

CHAPTER XXI.

The first child of Thomas Jefferson Jones and Johannah Christenia Larsen, Willard Larsen Jones, was born the 19th of May, 1879, in Washington, Washington Co., Utah. Blessed the 27th of May, 1879, by his grandfather, Andrew Larsen, at Washington, Washington Co., Utah. Baptized the 19th of May, 1887, ordained a deacon in the Overton Ward in the year 1891, ordained a Teacher, Priest and Elder in the same ward and called into the mission field and assigned Oct. 20, 1899, to labor in Texas in the Southern States' mission. After his release March 15, 1902, from the mission, he returned to his home in Overton, Nevada, and engaged in farming. He entered into a contract with the U. S. Government to carry mail from Moapa to Goodsprings, Nevada, via Las Vegas, Nev., which at that time was just an outpost or ranch.

He continued to labor in the interest of the Overton Ward and was appointed President of the Young Men's Mutual Improvement Association and was set apart to labor as councilor to Bishop John M. Bunker and held those offices from 1906 to 1908, and was appointed Bishop of that Ward the 18th of Sept., 1908, in which capacity he served until the Moapa Stake was organized the 9th of June, 1912, at which time he was released from that position in order to fill the office of President of that newly organized Stake. And which position he maintained until the 9th of Sept., 1939. Twenty-seven and one-half years as President of the Moapa Stake.

He married Lois Emily Earl of Bunkerville, Nevada, the 24th of May, 1904, in the St. George Temple, who was a daughter of Joseph I. Earl and Elethra Calista Bunker, and was born the 1st

of Jan., 1881, in Bunkerville, Nev.

Willard and Lois have given to the world seven children;

six daughters and one son.

Their services in the Moapa Stake have been unlimited and unequalled. Sister Lois worked four years in the mutual work, eight years in the Primary and 10 years in the Relief Society, in the Ward and held the office of Stake Relief Society President for seventeen years. In 1944 they disposed of their property in the Moapa Valley and moved to Salt Lake City. They reside in, and

are members of the Capitol Hill Ward and are still keeping their amour bright as members of the Stake Relief Society Board of Salt Lake Stake and on the genealogical committee. They were both called to work Feb., 1947, as ordinance workers in the Salt Lake Temple, and I may say in truth, their lives have been well filled with the goodness and mercy and love of our Heavenly Father.

And what an inheritance of the Priesthood.

Willard L. Jones was ordained an Elder by his father, Thomas Jefferson Jones, who was ordained a bishop by Apostle Wilford Woodruff, who was ordained an apostle by Brigham Young. Willard was ordained a Bishop by Geo. Albert Smith, and set apart by George F. Richards. Both of these men were ordained apostles by Joseph F. Smith, who was also ordained by Brigham Young, who was ordained by Oliver Cowdry, David Whitmer and Martin Harris, who were blessed by the laying on of hands by the Presidency of the Church, Joseph Smith, Sidney Rigdon and Frederick G. Williams, to choose the Twelve Apostles. Joseph Smith and Oliver Cowdery were ordained by the Apostles Peter, James and John, and received their ordination under the hands of the Savior Jesus Christ, and thus the line of Authority of Thomas Jefferson Jones and his son, Willard L. Jones.

Willard's services also include being a member of the Nevada State Legislature in 1910 to 1912, inclusive. Member of the Board of Directors of the Dixie College, member of the Clark County Hospital Board, of which Hospital he assisted in establishing.

His work in establishing the Senminary in Overton and untiring effort in bringing education to the Valley in the way of High School, the Moapa Valley Hospital, Moapa Valley Railroad by helping to provide and clear the right of way, and bringing the attention of the people and his efforts toward Boulder Dam Power into the valley. They were all worth while achievements and were all supported by him in every way possible.

Lois was a graduate of the Branch Normal Training College of Cedar City, Utah, and taught school five years after graduating, and in her Sabbath School work, labored from the age of eleven as a teacher until her other Ward duties took her in other capacities.

Was active in the Ward work and filled a two years' mission to the Eastern States, where she presided the last year over the Lady Missionairies, the Mutual Improvement Association and the Relief Society. After her return from the Mission field she married Paris Udell Stewart the 1st of June, 1934, in the St. George Temple, who was born 28th of Oct., 1906, at Alamo, Nev., and the son of Sumner Stewart and Mary Jane Paris of Leeds, Utah.

Paris, too, filled a mission and is still laboring in the Moapa Stake as a member of the High Council and a member of the Clark County Board and a willing worker assisting the sick and the needy. He was an employee of the Federal Government as a postal clerk in Las Vegas and resigned that position to work for the New York Life Insurance Co. and is one of the top workers and won a trip to Eastern Canada in 1947 and to Baniff, Canada, in 1948, and a trip to a Life Insurance Convention in White

Flora married Lawrence Junius Colton of Vernal, Utah, the

8th of June, 1937, in the St. George Temple.

Lawrence Junius Colton is the son of Charles Henry Colton and Nellie Hacking, and was born the 11th of June, 1912, in Vernal, Uinta Co., Utah. After their marriage they made their home in Logan where Lawrence continued in College and Flora taught four years. After his graduation in Forestry in 1941, he served at Alta and South Willow Range Station in Salt Lake County and at present is Forest Ranger at Stock More Ranger Station in Duschene Co., Utah, where he supervises 260,000 acres of range timber and wilderness land, maintains 225 miles of trails, 70 miles of roads with its problems of fire protection, public recreation, stock on the ranges, timber cutting for lumber, and wild life management, etc. He has a crew of three to eight men and one assistant.

A Short Sketch of the Life of Alice Hall Jones

ALICE HALL was born the 8th of February, 1857, in North Ogden, Utah. She was the daughter of Newton Daniel Hall and Sarah Jane Busenbark. Her parents were converts to the Church of Latter Day Saints in Genesse of Senaca County, New York, and her father was a distant cousin of the Prophet Joseph Smith.

They were pioneers of 1847, settling first in North Ogden and later moving to Providence, Utah. When President Brigham Young called the Saints to the Southern Mission to colonize the Moapa Valley (known then as the Muddy Valley) her parents

were among that group that settled there.

When the Saints were compelled to abandon their homes in that mission they moved to Washington, Washington County, Utah.

Her father was a farmer and fruit grower and managed by

his labors to raise and educate his family of ten children.

They had what advantages the country had to offer in the way of education. Alice worked in the woolen and cotton factory

that was operating in Washington at that time.

She also assisted my mother, Emily, the first wife of Thomas Jefferson Jones, and became his third plural wife the 5th of June, 1879, in the St. George Temple. She resided in Washington until the 3rd of May when she with Father and his other wife, Johannah, arrived in Parowan, Iron County, Utah, to make their home.

Two children were born to here there, and father moved his second wife Johannah to Overton in 1884, and Aunt Alice to Washington, Utah, leaving my Mother and her children in Parowan.

When Mother passed away in May, 1885, Aunt Alice came back to Parowan and assumed the roll of mother to the motherless children and became especially attached to the babe who was but four months old. Alice was indeed a mother to him and the love that grew between them was as a son and own mother, for I am sure the love was mutual.

In 1893 when the pressure on the pologimist had some what abated, and after the manifesto was proclaimed, father moved Aunt Alice with her family to Bunkerville, Nev., and established a home there for them.

Alice Hall Jones was a true mother and Latter-Day Saint,

and a woman whose wisdom, virtue and kindliness had no end. Was faithful in her home life and always on hand to assist those who were in need, and a faithful worker in the ward.

She moved to Delta with her children to assist them in reclaiming the uncultivated land, that became good farms under

their care and labor.

She passed away to her great reward the 16th of Jan., 1921,

in Delta where she had spent the last seven years of her life.

Iron County, Utah.

Blessed by his father the month of October, 1882. Baptized the 20th of May, 1891. He received all the ordinations of the lesser priesthood and was ordained an Elder the 5th of April, 1908, by J. Nephi Hunt in the Bunkerville Ward. He was called to the mission field and was set apart by Hyrum H. Smith the 27th of April, 1908, and departed from Salt Lake City the 29th of April. Appointed to the Southern States Mission May the 4th and stationed in the Florida Conference under Bro. Callis. He labored in Georgia with headquarters in Jacksonville, Florida. After his release the 17th of Dec., 1910, he returned home and remained in Bunkerville until about 1913 when he moved to Delta, Utah, and became one of Delta's successful farmers. Subsidizing new land and producing wonderful crops of alfalfa seed, beet seed or sugar beets, grain and hay.

He married Sarah Annie Guynn the 5th of June, 1912, in the Salt Lake Temple. She is the daughter of Leonard Jackson Guynn and Louisa Millissie Du Bose, of Ft. White, Columbia

County, Florida, and a convert to the L.D.S. Church.


