TYPHOON "BISING" SLIGHTLY WEAKENS AND DECELERATES WHILE MOVING WEST-NORTHWESTWARD OVER THE PHILIPPINE SEA EAST OF CATANDUANES.

Hazards affecting land areas

Heavy Rainfall

- Today, the rain bands of Typhoon "BISING" will bring moderate to heavy with at times intense rains over Eastern Visayas and Bicol Region.
- Tomorrow (19 April), moderate to heavy with at times intense rains will be experienced over Bicol Region and Northern Samar.
- Under these conditions, flooding (including flashfloods) and rain-induced landslides are likely to occur especially in areas identified in hazard maps as highly or very highly susceptible to these hazards.

Severe Winds

- Tropical cyclone winds of at least strong breeze to near gale in strength extend outward up to 440 km from the center of the typhoon. Destructive typhoon-force winds extend outward up to 110 km from the center of the typhoon.
- Based on the current forecast scenario, TCWS #2 remains the highest level of wind signal that will be hoisted due to this typhoon. However, in the event of a further eastward or westward shift in the current track forecast, highest level of wind signal that will be hoisted for this typhoon may be lower or higher than the current scenario suggests.

Hazards affecting coastal waters

In the next 24 hours, under the influence of Typhoon "BISING" and an enhanced northeasterly wind flow, the following sea conditions will be experienced over the coastal waters of the country:

- Very rough to very high seas will be experienced over the northern and eastern seaboard of Eastern Visayas (4.0 to 12.0 m), rough to very high seas over the eastern seaboard of Luzon (2.5 to 12.0 m), and rough to very rough seas over the eastern seaboard of Caraga (3.0 to 5.0 m). Sea travel is risky for all types of seacrafts over these waters.
- Rough to very rough seas over the northern and western seaboards of Northern Luzon (2.5 to 5.0 m) and rough seas over the eastern seaboard of Davao Region (2.5 to 3.5 m). Sea travel is risky for small seacrafts over these waters. Mariners without the proper experience should immediately seek safe harbor.
- Moderate to rough seas over the western seaboard of Central Luzon and the remaining seaboards of localities where wind signals are in affect (1.5 m to 3.0 m). Mariners of small seacrafts are advised not to venture out over these waters. Inexperienced mariners of these vessels should avoid navigating in these conditions.

Track and Intensity Outlook

- Today, Typhoon "BISING" will begin to move slowly northwestward over the Philippine Sea east of Bicol Region until tomorrow early morning. The typhoon will then move generally northward until Tuesday (20 April) afternoon before turning north northwestward while over the Philippine Sea east of Cagayan Valley. By Wednesday early morning, the typhoon is forecast to turn northeastward or east northeastward away from the landmass of Luzon.
- Considering the uncertainty in the track forecast of the typhoon, a westward shift in the current forecast track may result in potentially significant impacts over the eastern portions of Southern Luzon and Visayas. The possibility of a close approach scenario is not ruled out.
- The typhoon is forecast to gradually weaken throughout the forecast period.

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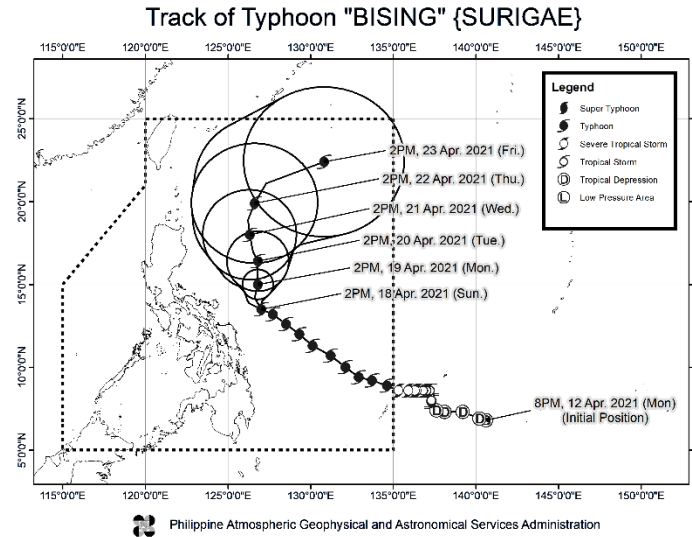

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Location of eye/center	At 4:00 PM today, the eye of Typhoon "BISING" was located based on all available data including from Guiuan Doppler Weather Radar at 290 km East of Virac, Catanduanes (13.5°N, 126.9°E) .
Strength	Maximum sustained winds of 205 km/h near the center and gustiness of up to 250 km/h .
Movement	Moving West Northwestward at 15 km/h .
Forecast Positions	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • 24 Hour (Tomorrow afternoon): 555 km East of Infanta, Quezon (15.0°N, 126.8°E) • 48 Hour (Tuesday afternoon): 500 km East of Casiguran, Aurora (16.4°N, 126.8°E) • 72 Hour (Wednesday afternoon): 495 km East of Aparri, Cagayan (18.0°N, 126.3°E) • 96 Hour (Thursday afternoon): 490 km East of Basco, Batanes (19.9°N, 126.6°E) • 120 Hour (Friday afternoon): 945 km East Northeast of Itbayat, Batanes (22.4°N, 130.8°E)

Most banana plants, a few mango trees, ipil-ipil and similar types of trees are downed or broken. • Some coconut trees may be tilted with few others broken. • Rice and corn may be adversely affected. • Considerable damage to shrubbery and trees with some heavy-foliaged trees blown down.

Some banana plants are tilted, a few downed and leaves are generally damaged • Twigs of small trees may be broken. • Rice crops, however, may suffer significant damage when it is in its flowering stage.
