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

INGROSSING AND INROLLING OF BILLS.

" Die Jovis, 8° Februarii, 1849.

- " Resolved, by the Lords Spiritual and Temporal in Parliament assembled,—
 - 1. "That it is expedient to discontinue the present system of Ingrossing, and to alter the present system of Inrolling Bills, and to make such provisions in lieu thereof as are hereinafter mentioned.
 - 2. "That this House is prepared to agree to the following arrangements, if agreed to by the other House of Parliament."
- I. That in lieu of being ingrossed, every Bill shall be printed fair immediately after it shall have been passed in the House in which it originated, and that such fair printed Bill shall be sent to the other House, as the Bill so passed, and shall (subject to the regulation next hereinafter mentioned) be dealt with by that House, and its Officers, in the same manner in which Ingrossed Bills are now dealt with.
- II. That on its Return to the House in which it originated, without Amendments (or if amended, after the Amendments shall have been settled and agreed to), it shall be fair printed by the Queen's Printer, who shall furnish a fair print thereof on vellum to the House of Lords, before the Royal Assent, and likewise a duplicate of such fair print, also on vellum.
- III. That one of such fair prints of each Bill shall be duly authenticated by the proper Officers of each House, as the Bill to which both Houses have agreed.
- IV. That the Royal Assent shall be indorsed in the usual form on such fair print so authenticated, which shall be deposited in the Record Tower, in lieu of the present Ingrossment.
- V. That the Copies promulgated in the first instance by the Queen's Printer, shall be impressions from the same form as the deposited Copy.
- VI. That for the present Session this arrangement shall not apply to Private Bills, nor to Local and Personal Bills, which last-mentioned Bills, intended to be brought in this Session, have been, for the most part, already printed, in pursuance of the Standing Orders of the House of Commons.
- VII. That the Master of the Rolls shall, upon being duly authorized in that behalf, receive in lieu of the Copies of Public General Acts as now inrolled, the hereinbefore-mentioned duplicate fair print of each Public General Bill, to be held for the same purposes, and subject to the same conditions for and upon which the Inrolled Acts are now received and held by him.
- VIII. That it is expedient, with a view to economy, convenience, and dispatch, and to the diminution of the chance of errors, that one Printer should print the Public General Bills for both Houses; and that inasmuch as the Queen's Printer is by virtue of his office bound to print the Acts, it would be advisable for the attainment of the before-mentioned objects, that the Queen's Printer should be employed by both Houses to print the Public General Bills.

TO THE LORDS COMMISSIONERS OF THE TREASURY.

The General Board of Health, Gwydyr House, Whitehall, 19 March 1849.

My Lords, Whitehall, 19 March 1849.

The 9th section of the Public Health Act contains the following provision with reference to the presentation of the Report of the Superintendent Inspector in relation to the preliminary inquiry for the application of the Act to any town or place: "Upon the presentation of such Report, or further Report, the said "Board shall cause copies thereof respectively to be published in the parts to "which such Report or further Report respectively relate, in such manner as "they may direct; and shall also cause other copies respectively to be de-"posited."

The object of the Legislature in this provision was obviously that publication should be made of the facts, showing the applicability of the new measures, in such a manner as to diffuse complete information amongst the whole of the rate-payers, and, as far as possible, carry local opinion with the measures of amendment.

We therefore feel it to be our duty to direct the publication of these Reports in such a manner and form as will be most convenient and accessible to the rate-payers and the public at large.

The local expense of the preliminary inquiries, and the Reports in question. founded upon them, are all means of preventing dire local and general waste; or, in other words, they are in every instance demonstrably means of ensuring large pecuniary economies. Whilst at this time it would be most unwise to economise the means of economy, yet the efficiency of the means applied is the first consideration; we nevertheless feel it equally necessary to guard against any just local complaints, on the ground of unnecessary expenses chargeable to the local rates.

Considering the great number of local Reports which must be issued and come under the consideration of Parliament, there being already 115 applications from as many towns and places for the application of the Public Health Act, nearly one-third of which are in progress, we have felt it to be our duty to inquire carefully into the expenses of the several modes of printing with a view to an efficient system, as well as to the reduction of expense.

We submit to your Lordships' attention the results of the inquiries we have made, and which may be submitted in reference to the public printing in general,

as well as that for this particular branch of the service.

From information which we have received from competent persons on the subject of printing as well as of publishing, it appears that by printing the Reports in question in an Octavo form, and in a type which is practically of equal distinctness with the Folio editions, though of one size smaller, a considerable saving of expense might be made.

It is necessary to observe, that Folios and other large books, which are to be read lying flat on a table, or set up on stands, or which cannot be held close to the eye, or conveniently adjusted to the habits of sight, must be in a type sufficiently large to be read at a distance. Hence, in general, the larger the size of the book the larger the type, while the smallest works have the smallest types.

A comparatively small type in an Octavo book which can be readily held at any distance from the eye, and which therefore admits of convenient adjustment to the vision, will be practically more distinct than the positively larger and more expensive type of a Folio edition.

The length of the line of print of the Folio being greater is more difficult for the eye to keep upon it, and the reading is therefore rendered more fatiguing.

We find that in the smaller type, of which the Octavo edition admits, the expense will be-

Twenty per cent. less in printing; Twenty per cent. less in paper;

or, to take another illustration, 100 pages of "Pica," the type in which Reports are usually printed, will only hold as much matter as 75 pages of "Small Pica," the type next in size, which may be used for printing in Octavo, and, consequently, by the use of the latter type, the reduction in paper and printing will be in this proportion. The "Small Pica" is a size larger than the type of the leading articles of the "Times," and four sizes larger than the type in which the debates in Parliament are usually printed.

There appears to be some additional expenses in folding the Octavo editions, and other incidents, which slightly diminish the saving as above calculated; but if printed with paper covers of the same description as the covers of the Folio editions, the expense of producing Reports and Papers in an infinitely more serviceable shape than the Folio will be, according to the very lowest estimate, a reduction of 15 per cent.; but on an estimate, hereunto appended, which we have obtained from Messrs. Spottiswoode, Her Majesty's Printers, and on which we would rely, would be a reduction of 25 per cent. on the total expenditure for printing. (Appendix 1.)

The expense of binding Folio works is proportioned to their size. In respect to Reports printed in Octavo, it appears to have been the practice to issue them

bound and cut at once.

As most public documents are printed with a view to be preserved and ultimately bound, the practice of binding them at once is more economical than to send them out in a condition in which they are very liable to be injured so as to require to be re-sewn. Yet, when sent out bound and cut, they are not more expensive than the inconvenient and comparatively useless editions in Folio. But considering the object of the outlay for printing, namely, the diffusion of information, it may be confidently averred that 1,000 of the same Reports in the Octavo form will be read as much as 3,000 copies in the Folio form, consequently the great bulk of the public expenditure in printing editions in Folio is money spent fruitlessly and in waste, even if the price of production were the same.

From applications made from Members of Parliament for Octavo editions for their own convenience, when they have their editions in Folio at hand—from the fact of the known extensive reading of Reports distributed amongst Members in the Octavo form, which are not looked at in Folio-it will be evident that the convenience of the Members themselves will be consulted by printing in the Octavo form. In the Octavo form they carry copies with them, and read them in their carriages or in railway travelling; and minor conveniences are consulted,

which, in the aggregate, are of real and great importance.

The Law Reports, and the Text-books in use in the Courts of Law, have long been printed in Octavo; and Octavo editions of the Statutes, and even duodecimo editions, have an increasing sale among the members of the legal profession.

The like public convenience will be consulted by printing Statistical Tables and works in Octavo instead of Folio. In reading figures, it is of advantage to have them compact; and examples may be given, page for page, Octavo for Folio, of

the same figures, proving the superiority of the more compact form.

The Registrar-General's Reports have been printed in Octavo; the Transactions of the Statistical Society are printed in Octavo; the Minutes of the Committee of the Council on Education are reprinted for the public convenience in Octavo; Mr. M'Culloch's Statistics of the British Empire, and his Commercial Dictionary, which contains a large amount of statistical tables, are printed in Octavo; Mr. Porter's statistical work on the Progress of the Nation is printed in Octavo. It is stated that Mr. M'Gregor found the Folio edition of his Commercial Tables so cumbersome, inconvenient and comparatively useless, that he obtained leave to print an Octavo edition at his own expense for circulation.

Since we apprehend that our own local Reports, and, as we are informed, the Reports of the Registrar-General, and the Minutes of the Committee of Privy Council on Education, must be printed in Octavo for public circulation, we submit whether the expense of re-setting them all should be incurred, for the purpose of their presentation to Parliament in a form the least convenient to the

The greater proportion of the Reports under consideration will require to be

transmitted through the post.

Great inconvenience, as well as large additional expense of postage for transit. is incurred by the system of printing in the Folio form. Taking several Reports in Octavo, which happen to be at hand, it appears the Folio editions are on the average nearly 120 per cent heavier (Appendix 2); the additional expense of postage will be in the like proportion; which, with copies that must be generally circulated by post, would make it worth while to print in the Octavo form on that account alone.

On these grounds, it is proposed as a measure of superior economy in all respects, including convenience and efficiency, not only to print and publish the Reports of the Local Inquiries in the Octavo form; but also in this manner, to print such of them as are required to be laid before Parliament, namely, those to which the sanction of Parliament is required, and to present them in the Octavo form.

We would submit that Parliament, by permitting the continuance of the printing of Reports in the expensive, cumbrous, and comparatively useless form, limits injuriously the extent of its own influence, and does great injustice to the labours of Members who serve on Committees. If your Lordships will direct a Return to be made of the comparative sales of Folio and of Octavo copies of the same Reports, some conception will be formed of the expensive barrier placed by the editions in Folio to the circulation of Reports, and legislative documents of the deepest interest to public bodies and to various classes of the community, • whose condition is affected by proceedings in Parliament.

As an example, it may be mentioned that an honourable Member, who deemed the evidence in relation to practical improvements in agriculture, collected before the Agricultural Committee in 1836, so important to be made known amongst agriculturists, that he was at the expense of preparing and publishing an Octavo edition for the purpose. Several other examples might The circulation of private works of the greatest merit would be adduced. probably be as much restricted as are other important collections of Evidence and Reports of Committees of both Houses by the use of the Folio form; and one of the most eminent publishers in the country has stated to us that he will never again publish any work even in the Quarto form, so strong is the practical

objection to this form on account of its inconvenience.

Your Lordships should be made aware, that the barrier to the use of Reports created by printing in the Folio form not being used, and being moreover from the excessive bulk often an inconvenient charge for house-room, we are informed that large quantities of them are sold as waste paper, for which, from their size, a large price is given; whilst Folio Reports sell for 24s. per cwt. as waste paper, only 12s. per cwt. is given for the paper in Octavo, which indeed is scarcely saleable at any price, as it will not serve to wrap up such large commodities as the Folio sheet: the Octavo form reduces by one-half, at least, the temptation to waste in respect to public stores of paper. It may be mentioned, that the Folio form offers a great temptation to the printing of matter of doubtful importance

in Appendices; and that the Octavo form could not be so easily swollen in bulk, without due consideration and efforts to keep it within a convenient

compass.

We are assured by eminent publishers, that we have under-estimated the economy of printing in the Octavo form; and that it would, if properly executed, be upwards of 25 per cent. cheaper than the Folio form, inclusive of the various indirect economies. We find the public charge for printing and stationery was, according to the estimate last given in round numbers, at 300,000 l. for the year. Assuming the cost of printing to be two-thirds, or one-half of this sum, and taking the saving to be effected by the general adoption of the more convenient and efficient form of printing at only 25 per cent., a sum will be saved twice or three times more than will suffice to defray the direct and collateral expense of the supervision of the Public Health Act, and of the Epidemic Diseases Prevention Act, over the whole of the kingdom.

On these grounds we trust that Parliament may be induced to consider the subject, and that we may be allowed to present the Reports of our Superintend-

ing Inspectors in the Octavo form instead of the Folio.

Our Secretary will submit objections to the expense of supplies and mode of expenditure, under the control of the Stationery Office, which is charged to this department.

To Sir Charles E. Trevelyan, K.C.B., &c. &c.

Sir, Stationery Office, 26 March 1849.

I HAVE the honour to return the letter of the Commissioners of the Board of Health of the 19th instant, in regard to the comparative advantageousness of printing Parliamentary Papers, the Reports of Commissioners, &c. in Folio and Octavo; and with reference thereto I have to state, for the information of the Lords of Her Majesty's Treasury,—

That this is a subject which would more properly, perhaps, come under the notice of the Printing Committee of the House of Commons; but their Lordships having been pleased to refer it to me, I have to submit the following remarks

upon it.

Without entering into the extraneous details that have been or may be mixed up with the discussion of the present subject, the statements of the Commissioners of the Board of Health in favour of printing in Octavo rather than in Folio, the form in which Parliamentary Papers and the Reports of Commissioners are usually given to the public, may be classed under the two heads of, 1st, the "greater cheapness;" and of, 2d, the "greater convenience" of printing in the Octavo form.

I regret to say that I am unable to concur in the statements of the honourable Commissioners, either in regard to the first or the second of these heads.

I.—Supposed greater Cheapness of the Octavo form.

This supposed advantage of the Octavo shape is altogether imaginary; so far from its being true, the very opposite is the fact, and it may be laid down as a general rule from which there is no exception whatever, that cæteris paribus, or with the same types and paper, printing in Folio is decidedly cheaper than in Octavo. This is occasioned by the greater waste of paper in margins, in folding the sheet into the Octavo form, and by the increase in the charges for composition and press-work in consequence of the greater number of head lines, and the greater number of sheets to throw off.

It is no doubt true, as is observed by the Commissioners, that by lessening the size of the types, works in Octavo may be produced at a cheaper rate than works in Folio. But I anticipated and answered this objection in the letter I had the honour to address to your Lordships on the 1st instant. I stated in it, that owing to the less breadth of an Octavo page, a less type might be used in it than would be required in a Folio page, provided the latter were to be printed across in continuous lines. But there is no necessity why this should be done; and your Lordships are well aware of the fact that very many works in Folio, I believe I may safely say the majority, are printed in double columns; three, and even four columns being occasionally used. But when double columns only are used, the breadth of the line becomes less in the Folio than in the Octavo page, and a smaller type may consequently, were it thought desirable, be used in printing the former. Some of the best and handsomest works in the English, French and other languages, are printed in Folio in the way now mentioned, and they cost, in consequence, decidedly less than they would have done had they been printed in Octavo.

To show practically the difference of the expense in printing in Folio in double columns and in Octavo, I beg to enclose specimens of the same matter taken from the Reports of the Superintending Inspectors of the Board of Health now publishing, set up in the same type (Small Pica), and printed on paper of the same weight and quality, in Folio in double columns, and in demy Octavo; and the result is:—

Cost of printing, paper, folding and sewing 13 sheets demy Octavo
(208 pages), 2,000 copies

Cost of printing, paper, folding and sewing 18 sheets of foolscap
Folio (72 pages), 2,000 copies

Difference in favour of Folio in two columns set in the same type, and printed on paper of similar quality

And their Lordships will see that inasmuch as the lines in the double column Folio page are shorter than in the Octavo page, whatever size of type is used in the latter, a still smaller sized type may be used in the former, so that the difference in favour of the Folio shape will become still more decided.

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This, however, is not all; corrections, which are usually a very heavy item in the cost of printing, may be always more easily made in Folios than in Octavos. Their Lordships will at once perceive that such must be the fact, when they consider that if a paragraph be struck out or inserted in the first page of an Octavo sheet, the other 15 pages have all to be altered; whereas, if it be so struck out or inserted in the first page of a Folio sheet, only three pages instead of 15 are thereby affected.

The charges for folding and sewing Octavos are also higher than those for

folding and sewing Folios.

It may also be observed that, from the greater time required in folding, stitching and making up Papers in the Octavo shape, it would not be possible to get Reports and Papers ready for distribution to Members of Parliament with the speed that is now frequently required.

And further, it is certain, as I stated in my letter of the 1st instant, that the Octavo form, were it in other respects as desirable, as it is the reverse, could not be generally adopted in the printing of Parliamentary Papers, without leading to a great expense in the printing and folding of Tables that could not be reduced to an Octavo size. But there are not only innumerable single Tables, but many entire books, that are wholly insusceptible of being reduced to the Octavo size, such, for example, are the Tables of Criminal Returns, those annexed to the Reports of the Inspectors of Prisons, the Statistical Returns of the Board of Trade, the Population Abstracts, and many more. I beg to enclose specimens of some of the Tables now referred to (Papers C. D.), and their Lordships will see that the type cannot be further reduced without being rendered illegible; so that they must be either printed in Folio or not printed at all. But even if the type could be reduced, the charge for composition would be increased, such being the case whenever the type is reduced below what is called the "Brevier" size.

I am not disposed to attach much weight to the statement of the Commissioners, that the printing of irrelevant matter would be less likely to occur in Octavos than in Folios. In my humble opinion, a very large proportion of all the matter printed by Parliament and by Commissioners is irrelevant. But I have no idea that it will be made more to the purpose by adopting one form of printing rather than another. The true remedy for this cost, and for the cost of Parliamentary printing, must be found, if it is to be found at all, in the carrying out of their Lordships' regulations in regard to the sending of matter to press, and the improvement of the manuscript.

After what has been previously stated, it may, perhaps, be deemed superfluous by their Lordships for me to notice the statement of the honourable Commissioners, from which it might be inferred that saving of somewhere about 50,000% a year may be effected in the cost of public printing by adopting their suggestions. In truth and reality, however, not a single farthing can be saved by substituting Octavos for Folios so long as the same type is used in both; but, on the contrary, a loss would be incurred. But without insisting on this point, the honourable Commissioners must surely have known that a very large portion of the cost of public printing consists in the printing of the various Forms and Schedules of Taxes required by the Boards of Internal Revenue and Customs, the Post-office, &c.; in the printing and ruling of Ledgers and other Account-books for these and other Departments of the Public Service; in the paper for the same, &c.: and I do not suppose that any one proposes that these Schedules, Ledgers, &c. should be printed in Octavo; but if they were, their cost would be doubled or trebled.

In our estimate for 1849-50, a sum of 103,000*l*. is taken for the cost of Parliamentary printing and paper. But of this, the cost of the Acts, the Journals and Minutes of the Lords, the Journals and Votes of the Commons, and the Bills of both Houses, none of which can be turned into Octavo, amounts to 27,115*l*., leaving 75,885*l*. for the cost of all the other printing and paper. And I have not yet heard that either the Lords or the Commons have consented, or are at all likely to consent to a diminution of the size of the type in which their Papers are printed, or to any change in their form. Hence the only item to be affected by the change, supposing it were adopted, would be the Reports and Papers printed under the superintendence of this office, and the entire cost of these is not likely (thanks to the restrictive regulations of their Lordships) to exceed this year the sum of 25,000 *l*. And I repeat again, it is not possible to effect any saving in the

cost of printing these Reports, &c. in Octavo, that may not be effected to a still greater extent by printing them in Folio.

II.—The superior convenience of one form of a book or paper as compared with another depends on a variety of considerations, but principally, perhaps, on the purposes to which the work is to be applied. The Folio or Quarto form appears, speaking generally, to be the best for books of reference. Rymer's Foedera, Thurloe's State Papers, Bayle's Dictionary, and the Encyclopædia Britannica, for example, are in all respects more desirable in a Folio or Quarto than they would be in an Octavo shape; while, on the other hand, the latter is the appropriate shape for the Spectator, Tatler, Guardian, Rambler, Pope's Poems, Scott's Novels, and such like works. And, supposing this statement to be well founded, we apprehend it will be found that Parliamentary Papers, Reports of Commissioners, and so forth, have far more in common with the former than with the latter class of publications. Parliamentary Papers may sometimes be consulted, but they are very rarely read. Occasionally, indeed, there is an exception, as where a Report or Paper happens to be on a subject of more than ordinary interest, such as the Report on "Marriage with a deceased Wife's Sister," but, generally, it may be laid down that nine-tenths of all Parliamentary Reports, and of all Papers printed by order of Government, are still-born, and have either no sale or next to none; such works pass from the printers to the Members of Parliament and other parties entitled to receive copies; and from these by far the greater part, and sometimes the whole, is transferred immediately, or at the end of the Session, to the trunkmakers and the buttermen; the latter indeed are the great gainers by the system of Parliamentary printing as now carried on. There are, at this moment, in the Government warehouses, hundreds upon hundreds of tons of Parliamentary Papers and Reports of Commissioners for which there is literally no demand. Small as is the price for which they may be obtained, nobody buys them, reads them, or cares for them; and in selling them for waste paper, care has to be taken not to overload the market; for otherwise they are so very voluminous that they would choke and incumber even this wide channel.

Nothing, therefore, as it appears to me, can be more futile or fanciful than the proposal to print Parliamentary Papers in an Octavo form, that they may be the more easily read.

The fact is, that, print them as you please, they will not be read. To read them, partakes in nine cases out of ten more of the nature of a task, a duty, or a punishment, than of a voluntary undertaking or a pleasure. But were it otherwise, the Folio form appears to be the preferable one for all papers that are not too heavy to be held in the hand, which is the case with by far the greater number.

In a Folio, the eye can take in a much larger space at once. There is a greater facility of comparing one passage with another, and of making annotations. His would be a peculiar taste who should prefer having the "Times" done up in an Octavo pamphlet.

The General Report of the Sanitary Commissioners was not printed in Folio, so that it is not possible to say whether its sale would have been greater or less than it has been, had it been printed in Folio.

Works in Octavo will not weigh less, and consequently will not circulate more freely by the post than those in Folio, unless they be printed with a smaller type. But as smaller types may be more conveniently used with Folios than with Octavos, there is no room or ground for the statement of the Commissioners on this head.

By way of showing the limited circulation obtained by Reports, &c. printed in Octavo, I may mention that only 15 copies were sold of the Digest, in two vols. Octavo, of the evidence taken by the Land Commissioners in Ireland.

Notwithstanding their excellence, and the great amount of information they embody, hardly 150 copies are sold of the Annual Reports of the Registrar-General, and not so many of the Minutes of the Council on Education.

However, I do not think that the greater cheapness of printing in Folio in double columns should be held to be conclusive against printing those Reports or Papers in Octavo, for which a considerable sale may be fairly anticipated, or to which it may be thought proper to give an extensive fictitious or gratuitous circulation. And considering the interest of the subject and the talents of the Commissioners, it may perhaps be concluded that there will be a considerable demand for the publications of the Board of Health; that they will have some vitality

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about

about them, and be exempted from the premature extinction which appears to be the common fate of almost all publications brought forth under the auspices of Government. At all events there can be little or no harm in allowing the Commissioners to have in this respect their own way. And I would therefore beg humbly to suggest to their Lordships that the Board of Health should be authorized to print the Reports and other Papers in such a form and with such types as they may please to direct.

Heretofore it has been usual to print Octavo editions of the Reports and Papers,

of which large quantities have been distributed gratis.

But I cannot permit this opportunity to pass without repeating my humble

but earnest protest against such distributions.

I believe it is in every case an unmixed evil, productive of loss to the public, and if not of the reality, of at least the imputation of favouritism and jobbing. Parliamentary Papers are sold at an extremely low rate, and are in fact obtainable by the very humblest classes. And it should be borne in mind, that but little value is attached to that which may be had for nothing; and that as much benefit will arise from the circulation of one book or paper that is bought, as from that of ten that are given away.

Besides, it is not possible to know the parties to whom they should be given; and if a copy of a Report be given to A, while B, who is equally entitled to one gets none, an injustice is committed, and Government or its agents are, whether

justly or not, exposed to the charge of favouritism.

No works can be more necessary to any class than the Mutiny Act and the Articles of War are to military men; but neither officers nor soldiers are supplied gratis with these indispensable works. They buy them, and they value them accordingly. And, following out this sound precedent, I object to the giving away of a single work. Make the prices of necessary works as low as may be thought proper; send them to convenient depôts, and let it be known that they are there; but do no more; if you go further, you pauperise and debase the mind. I see no ground to vindicate the gratuitous distribution of books and tracts, that would not equally vindicate the gratuitous distribution of corn, cloth or beef.

I trust their Lordships will not suppose, from anything stated either in this or any other paper of mine, that I entertain any prejudice against printing in

Octavo.

On the contrary, while I have never printed a line in Folio, I believe I have given occasion to as much printing in Octavo as almost any private individual in England.

And I only venture to object to its being generally introduced into public printing from my being satisfied that it is less suitable and would be more

expensive than the Folio form.

I AM directed by the General Board of Health to acknowledge the receipt of the Return made by the Comptroller of the Stationery Office of the comparative cost of producing, under his direction, the Folio and Octavo editions of the Metropolitan Sanitary Report, and I am to convey, for the information of the Lords Commissioners of the Treasury, the following statement in reference

thereto.

As it appears that the cost of producing 3,500 copies of the Second Sanitary Report in Folio, including the Evidence, was 41 l. 1s. 6 d. per 1,000, while 2,000 copies in Octavo amount to 82 l. 10 s. per 1,000, there would seem to be some unexplained cause for rendering the Octavo edition dearer than the Folio, seeing that the most respectable and competent printers are ready to contract for producing Octavo editions in general at a cheaper rate than Folio.

On the other hand, it would appear from Returns relative to the First Report, that, setting aside the expense of lithography and engraving, the relative expense was,—

It is proper to observe that the Octavo edition of the First Report contains the Evidence, although not so expressed in the Schedule attached to Mr. M'Culloch's answer. There, however, it is seen that the expense of production of the Octavo edition is 42 per cent. less than the Folio, and, at the same time, is so large that it will probably admit of some explanation that would serve to reduce it.

More satisfactory grounds for the comparison will probably be obtained if it be made with the editions of other Reports in which there are few or no plates or engravings. It is therefore suggested that a Return should be requested of the relative expense of printing the Folio and the Octavo editions of the Annual Reports of the Poor Law Commissioners, under the following heads:—

without corrections, proofs or other extra charge.

1 am also to request you to call their Lordships' attention to the charge for binding the Octavo edition of the Sanitary Reports, which the Board would represent as undue and extraordinary. It appears that the expense incurred for binding the Octavo edition of the First Report was 30l.7s.10d. per 1,000. A highly respectable publisher has informed the Board that his binder, on examining a copy, stated that his charge for binding in the same manner would be 23l. per 1,000, or about $24\frac{1}{2}$ per cent. less. The Stationery Office expense of binding 1,000 copies of the Octavo edition of the Second Report is $30l.1s.0\frac{1}{2}d.$, while the same respectable tradesman states that his charge would be 21l., or 30 per cent. less.

MEMORANDUM on the RETURNS in regard to the Comparative Expense of Printing Reports in Folio and Octavo, transmitted to the Treasury on the 10th April 1849.

THE accompanying Paper, No. 1, contains an account of the expense of Printing, &c. the 10th, 12th and 13th Reports of the Poor Law Commissioners, in the manner required

by the Commissioners of the Board of Health.

The 2d Report of the Poor Law Commissioners, though required by the Board of Health, is not included in this Return, because it was not printed by the Contractors under this office, but by Messrs. Hansard, Printers for the House of Commons, whose charges are much higher than those of the contract printers.

But this Return is, in various respects, deceptive, and it is not, in fact, possible to make a perfectly fair statement of the expense of printing Reports in Folio and Octavo in

the way required by the Board of Health; for,

I. The Octavo editions are not always literal copies of the Folio editions, matter having sometimes been added to the Octavo editions that is not in the Folio, and matter in the latter having sometimes been left out of the former. This is especially the case with marginal notes or side references, which, though usually forming a heavy item in the cost of Folio editions, are commonly left out in the Octavos. In the reprints of the Poor Law Reports, this has always been done. There is, however, no doubt, that these marginal references are very convenient for facilitating the consultation of Reports and Papers, and it is not, perhaps, very likely that the Printing Committee would permit them to be omitted in Reports printed for the use of Parliament.

II. The composition of Folio and Octavo Reports is paid at different rates per 1,000 letters. The Folio is reckoned or cast up, by the custom of the trade, as Parliamentary Printing, at 6½ d. per 1,000 letters, whether leaded or solid, MS. or Reprint, while the Octavo editions (being hitherto considered by the compositors as work done for the public offices, or, as it is technically termed, bookwork) is paid at the rate of $5\frac{3}{4}d$. per 1,000 for leaded MS. matter, 6d. per 1,000 for solid MS., and for reprints of Octavo at 5d. per 1,000 for leaded, and 51 d. per 1,000 for solid. If, however, it were decided to print Reports in Octavo for presentation to Parliament, the compositors would claim and be entitled to 61 d. per 1,000 letters, as paid for the Folio. The few (two or three) cases which have occurred of presenting Reports in Octavo to Parliament, have not been known to the compositors, or

they would certainly have charged them at the Parliamentary prices.

III. The charges for press-work will require to be remodelled if an extension of the Octavo editions be decided on. When the prices of the Printers to the two Houses of Parliament were reduced in 1832-33, with the sanction of Parliament and of the Treasury, it was arranged that the Folio Reports, which had previously been charged at 8s. per ream for single foolscap, and, occasionally, at 12s. per ream for double foolscap, should be reduced to 4s. 6d. per foolscap ream for the House of Commons' Printers, and to 5s. 6d. per ream for the Lords' Printers; this augmentation being given to the latter because of their only printing short numbers, or 500 copies of each Report or Paper. But, as the numbers printed for the Lords increased, and they frequently printed copies of Reports for both Houses, their printers were soon afterwards called on to reduce their prices to 4s. 6d. per ream of foolscap. This arrangement gave them 9s. per ream for double foolscap; but as it was made divisible into 1s. 1½d. for 250 copies of a half-sheet of foolscap, of which there are a great many in the course of a Session, the price was in fact, brought considerable under 2 and 1 many in the course of a Session, the price was, in fact, brought considerably under 9s. per ream for double foolscap. The charge for working demy paper (the size used for the Octavo Reports) on which the Journals of both Houses, and some other works, were at that period

printed, was then also reduced to 7s. per ream, at which it still remains.

When arrangements were made for having "Reports and Papers presented by Command," printed by contractors under the superintendence of this office, their Lordships directed that the conditions of contract should be framed in all respects in accordance with the prices paid to the Parliamentary Printers; that is, that the charges for composition and reading should be the same; that the charge for press-work should be 7s. a ream demy, and that biddings should be made at so much per cent. on the two former items. And tenders being received, Messrs. Clowes, who offered the lowest rate of per-centage addition, or 10 per cent. for profit and loss on the fixed charges (50 per cent. being allowed to the Printers to the two Houses of Parliament), obtained and still hold the contract. Under these circumstances it would have been unjust had Government called on Messrs. Clowes, without some material change taking place in the interval to reduce the price of press-work in their contract, as they must have been partly guided by it in making their tender. But if the printing of Reports in Octavo should be considerably extended, 7s. per ream, though not too much for the bookwork of the Public Offices and for short numbers, would be decidedly too much for printing long numbers on demy paper. Hence, in the case supposed, it will be advisable either to make a new arrangement to print at a reduced rate, where the numbers printed amount to or exceed 1,000 copies, or to contract for and use double-demy papers, making an agreement to print on them at machine prices. And should Messrs. Clowes object to these arrangements (which is not at all likely), it will be for their Lordships to consider whether the contract should not be again submitted, under proper conditions, to public competition.

IV. The charge for sewing the Folio books in blue covers (which was reduced in 1833 to the fourth part only of the prices previously paid to the Parliamentary Printers) appears, considering the contingencies attending this work, the hurried manner in which it is required to be executed, the detailed deliveries, and the mode in which the stock accounts are required to be kept, to be fair and reasonable. No doubt, however, the charge for binding in cloth, if taken by itself only, would require to be revised, especially as the mode of lettering the backs of books has latterly been much improved and economised. But this is only a small item in our contract, and any excess of price we may pay for it must be fully compensated by a corresponding diminution in other items; the biddings of parties offering to contract being framed on the aggregate amount of the various items. I beg, however, to state that the existing contract for binding expires on the 30th September next, and that we have already begun to frame a new scale of prices for binding, which it is my intention to submit, with their Lordships' approbation, to the competition of the trade in June next; and I further propose, in the view of facilitating competition, to distribute the binding for the public into three separate and nearly equal portions, so that we may reasonably expect to have a keen competition, and to get the work done at the lowest possible rates.

It is further to be observed, that though owing to the existing contract scale, the charge

It is further to be observed, that though owing to the existing contract scale, the charge for binding the 1st and 2d Reports of the Sanitary Commissioners, referred to in the letter of the Board of Health, be, if separately considered, too high, yet the actual cost of the binding was but 26 l. 0 s. 10 d. per 1,000, and not 30 l. 7 s. 10 d., as stated by the Board of Health; for, in the gross charge for binding is included the charge on account of two copies in morocco for the Queen and Prince Albert, two copies in calf extra for the Commissioners, the binding of 20 over copies (the number telling out 2,020) and the enveloping and glueing up, for security in transmission by post, of 1,800 copies for the

Commissioners.

Their Lordships will observe, that from the mode in which the Board of Health divide the expense of printing the Reports in Folio and Octavo at per 1,000 copies, whether 4,000 or 2,000 copies of either size be printed, it is impossible for them to frame any correct comparison between the two; as, in the case of 4,000 copies being printed, only one-fourth part of the expense of the composition is reckoned for 1,000, while in the case of 2,000 copies being printed, half the expense of composition is so reckoned.

On the whole, there can be no question-

1st. That Octavo editions, printed with the same types and on the same paper as Folios, are dearer than the latter; and

2d. That Folio editions, printed in double columns, in the same types as the Octavo, are decidedly cheaper than Octavo. In proof of this, I beg to refer to the conclusive statements in the accompanying Paper, No. 2.

But no one doubts that it is possible to print in the Octavo cheaper than in the Folio size now in use, by using smaller types, and thinner and consequently cheaper paper. Even in that case, however, the difference will not be very material, the charge for corrections (generally a very large item in the cost of Reports of Commissioners) being more expensive in Octavo than in Folio editions. The greater expense of printing and folding tables in Octavo is also to be taken into account, as stated in my letter of the 26th March, and the impossibility of reducing various works to the Octavo form.

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THE General Board of Health having seen the observations made by Mr. M'Culloch on the 26th March and the 10th April, in relation to their letter to the Lords of Her Majesty's Treasury, suggesting the economy as well as convenience of printing Reports and Public Documents in the Octavo instead of the Folio form, as at present, I have been directed, in reply, to observe, that when inquiries have been made by Members of the Legislature, as to the expediency of printing all Reports in Octavo, they must be taken to have meant, not some unknown or speculative form of Octavo Report, but the form of Octavo in which official Reports have been printed, and which they have been accustomed to see or use from year to year, during the last sixteen years

When, in answer to such inquiries, it has been represented by the Stationery office or by the Comptroller, that unless the Octavo Reports were printed in a much smaller type, the expense must be greatly increased by printing in the Octavo form, it could only be understood that the existing form of Octavo was intended to be represented as more expensive than the Folio form, and that in order to reduce the expense to the expense of printing in the Folio form, the 293.

size of the type must be reduced greatly below the size of the existing Octavo

Reports.

Mr. M'Culloch was asked by the Committee on the Miscellaneous Estimates, (931) "Have you considered whether the Folio form of Parliamentary Papers is the most economical mode of printing?—Unless you reduce the scale of type very much, the Folio form is the cheapest; and then if you reduced the size of the type, I apprehend there would be an objection; and if you took the Octavo form, you would have a great expense in the reduction of Tables, and a great expense

in folding."

The Board being desirous of ascertaining under which head the expense of printing the existing form of Octavo Reports could be made out to be on the whole the greatest, by the method in use at the Stationery Office, requested that they might be furnished with the particulars, under the several heads, of printing the Folio and the Octavo editions of the Metropolitan Sanitary Commissioners' First Report. From there being a difference in the engravings, or from the mode in which the accounts are kept, it would appear that data for a comparison could not be obtained from the statement of the expenses in respect to those Reports. The Board then submitted the offer of Her Majesty's Printers, Messrs. Spottiswoode, to contract for printing the Octavo editions of Reports 18 per cent. cheaper than the Folio editions, to show that whatever might be done by the Stationery Office, respectable tradesmen were ready to contract for producing Octavo editions cheaper than the Folio editions; other respectable tradesmen are ready to offer similar contracts. In existing circumstances, when a question arises as to economy of production between a Government department and private tradesmen or private manufacturers, on a large scale, the public do not hesitate as to the side on which a decision is to be given. Still the Board could not be satisfied that the impression left by the Comptroller's return as to the Octavo and Folio editions of the Metropolitan Sanitary Report could be correct, and they requested a further analytical return of the comparative expense of printing the Folio and Octavo editions of the Annual Reports of the Poor Law Board. The Board has requested a competent printer to analyse this return; and the results, as displayed in the Table annexed, are as follows:

The mean difference of expense (including a more expensive binding for the Octavo editions) being, on the analysis of the Comptroller's own return, within a fraction of twenty-eight per cent. in favour of the printing of the Octavo form of Reports, even as now printed under the superintendence of the Comptroller himself, and in a type one size larger than that in which Hansard's Debates are printed.

Mr. M'Culloch objects, that the comparison is unfair, because the Octavo editions have no marginal notes. He should have known that, instead of the running head line being merely a repetition of the general title, the head lines in

the Reports in question set forth the titles of the pages beneath.

They were intended as substitutes for marginal notes, and also to form the table of contents, and in the Octavo editions of the Metropolitan Sanitary Reports, these running headings sufficiently serve those purposes; yet if additional marginal notes were inserted in the Octavo editions, it will be found that the additional expense would not reduce the difference in favour of the Octavo editions so low as 20 per cent.

Mr. M'Culloch says, that the Octavo and Folio editions are seldom precisely the same. The fact is, that inasmuch as it is known how little the editions in Folio are read, the Octavo editions are the only ones that are carefully corrected; but if their Lordships will call for a list of the variations of the copies, in respect to which the returns were made, they will probably find them to be utterly trivial, and such as to leave the relative economy of printing in the two forms much as stated in the Board's letter.

Inasmuch as the question of printing in Octavo and in Folio appears to involve a large economy, as well as great public conveniences, the Board would suggest that the Returns of the comparative cost of printing the same Reports in Octavo and in Folio should be completed in the same form as those already procured; when the mean difference will be likely to establish the accurate conclusions on the subject, should the Returns already obtained be considered as leaving room for doubt. In his letter of the 19th March (written, it is presumed, before the Returns received on the 12th April were sent in), the Comptroller renews his general assertion of the comparative economy of the Folio editions, and avers, in respect to the supposed cheapness of the Octavo form, "this supposed advantage of the Octavo shape is altogether imaginary. So far from its being true, the very opposite is the fact, and it may be laid down as a general rule, from which there is no exception whatever, that cateris paribus, or with the same types and paper, printing in Folio is decidedly cheaper than in Octavo."

The Board, in their former letter, pointed out the fallacy of the assumption that types positively the same are practically of the same effect to the eye, whether they are to be read close or at a distance; cateris paribus, there should be a difference in types according to the size of the volumes, and the distance at which they may be adjusted to the sight, the type that serves for the Folio, which is to be read at a distance, being practically larger in the Octavo editions, which may be conveniently read closer. But granting the equality of type, I am to submit an estimate of the Queen's Printers', in which they offer to contract to print the 3,000 copies of the Octavo Report, "Pica" Demy Octavo, for 2961. 3s., whilst of "Small Pica" Foolscap Folio, the same Report, would be 2951. 17s., and the same in double columns, 3061. 13s., showing nearly the same price for printing the same matter in the Octavo form, as for any form of Folio.

An eminent printer was requested to take 10 sheets of the Folio Report, and put the same matter and type into Octavo, and state what would be the comparative expense. The result was as in the appended estimate, that, supposing the Folio printed in quadruple instead of double foolscap, the saving on the Octavo would be 28 per cent. Another printer, who proceeds upon the assumption of a smaller Folio or a larger Octavo margin, reduces the advantage of the Octavo edition to an economy of 10 per cent., the type, paper and amount of matter being the same. The Board are assured that the saving would be at the least what is set forth in the last estimate, and would probably approach the amount given in the first.

The representations made from the Stationery Office as to the superior economy of printing in Folio, must, as before stated, have been intended or understood to have reference to the existing mode of printing in Folio, and not to any new or imaginary one. After the inquiries had been made by the Board for an analysis of the comparative charges of printing the accustomed Folio and the accustomed Octavo editions, the Comptroller presents a new form of Folio page, with a type several sizes smaller than the accustomed Folio type, and with a less margin, printed closely in a double column; and he represents that that new form, with diminished type and double columns in Folio Reports, will be cheaper than the accustomed Octavo editions; but it appears that the whole saving from such an inconvenient reduction (for that form of publication) of the size of the type would be nine per cent. on the cost. For the reason before stated, however, namely, the more convenient adjustment of the distance of the smaller volume to the eye. however small may be the type chosen for the Folio editions, the Octavo editions may, with the same practical effect, as shown by common experience, be printed in a type yet smaller and cheaper; and the economy of printing in Octavo may be increased from 20 to 25 per cent. over the accustomed form of Folio Reports, to 25 or 30 per cent. in the case of Octavo editions of the relative proportions in size of type to Mr. M'Culloch's specimen of double columns Folio. The disregard of the economy of reading (as already represented by the Board, in

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their statement, "That 1,000 of the same Reports in the Octavo form will be read as much as 3,000 copies in the Folio form; consequently, the great bulk of the public expenditure in printing editions in Folio is money spent fruitlessly and in waste, even if the price of production were the same,") appears, in the advocacy of Folio printing with smaller type in double columns from the analogy of newspaper printing in several columns. It is scarcely requisite to observe that if the public Reports, instead of being issued in large and heavy volumes, were issued for perusal in single sheets, they might then be constantly printed in double columns, and in types as small as newspapers, which are readily folded to 8vo., 12mo. or 18mo., or any other sizes, and conveniently adjusted to various distances to accommodate the different types to the sight of the reader.

The Board would here direct their Lordships' attention to the fact that the experiment of printing a Folio work in double columns was submitted to Members of the Legislature in the "Mirror of Parliament," where the debates were more fully and expensively given than in any other work, yet Hansard's Octavo edition of the Debates was preferred both by the Members of the Legislature and the public. The Comptroller treats Parliamentary Reports as documents not to be read, but as works to be referred to, for which, he contends, the Folio form is the most appropriate; yet his own work of reference, his "Commercial Dictionary," is issued in the Octavo form; and in deference to the public demand, the "Encyclopædia," issued by the Society of Useful Knowledge, it is now proposed to issue in Octavo, as the most acceptable form to the public as a work of reference.

It is objected to the Octavo form that it is less convenient for corrections. Their Lordships should not suppose, from this objection, that it is proposed only to make corrections in the sheets when made up and folded in Octavo, or that it is imagined that they would be laid before Members in that form. The practice now is, to have evidence and proofs of Reports printed in slips with half margins, which are found to be far more convenient for making notes of observations, or for the insertion of corrections.

In respect to the Comptroller's positive declaration that such Tables as the Criminal Returns are "wholly unsusceptible of being printed in the Octavo form," in support of which he encloses a Table as a specimen, being one "which must be printed in Folio or not at all," I am to ask you to direct their Lordships' attention to a specimen of the like form of Table, the Criminal Returns of the Metropolitan Commissioners of Police, which is printed in the Octavo form under the control of the Stationery Office itself.

In respect to the Comptroller's denial of the large economy to be obtained by a change in the form of printing, and to his statement that the Commissioners should have known that the larger portion of the cost of public printing consists in the printing of the various Forms and Schedules of Taxes required by Boards of Internal Revenue and Customs, the Post-office, &c. I am to state that the Members of the Board do not pretend to be acquainted with the whole field of consumption, but some of it has come under their observation in the course of their employment in the public service, and they are informed of one example connected with the last-mentioned department, the Postoffice, to which they would direct their Lordships' particular attention. In that department, by the reduction of the size of only two forms, namely, the forms of Money Orders, upwards of 2,000%, per annum was saved, with an increase of conveniences to the public. The Board would express their confident opinion in respect to that class of printing, that if it be subjected to a competent examination, or if it were opened to the competition of respectable printers, who might come in with improved adaptations of forms and execution, economies similar to that displayed in the instance referred to might be more extensively obtained, together with an increase of convenience.

On the subject in question, there are necessarily differences in the technical incidents of production, which afford opportunities of making general denials and assertions as to the inapplicability of general conclusions; e. g., such differences as the Comptroller presented to the Committee of the House of Commons as the chief reason for printing in Folio, the comparative expense of folding, and the expense of the valuation of tables.

But it nevertheless appears on the whole, from the information given by the eminent printers consulted by the Board on the question of the relative economy of production, that they are unanimous in declaring that the representations made by the Stationery Office, as to the superior economy of printing in Folio,

are unfounded; they declare, on the contrary, that comparing what they call a "fair Folio" with a "fair Octavo," the Octavo form of printing is the cheapest.

Whatsoever may be done by the Stationery department, from which there can scarcely be expected extreme compliance in making exertions to secure economies in details at variance with such confident declarations as have been made on the subject, I am to request that you will submit to their Lordships' particular attention the estimates and offers of contract of Her Majesty's Printer, to produce Octavo copies, in type of the same positive size as the Folio (but in the Octavo form practically larger type in effect), generally at the same expense; and his previous offer of contract to produce Octavo Reports, of one size larger than the print of Hansard's Debates (which may be submitted as equivalent to the Folio type), at 18 per cent. less than the existing rate of charge.

As a further practical conclusion, I am to ask their Lordships' attention to the estimate adduced respecting the method of printing Octavo double-sheets, as establishing the conclusion that Octavo editions may be printed even in the larger type with an economy of from 10 to 20 per cent. upon the present charge.

Bearing in mind the impression which must have been created on the minds of Members of Parliament, by declarations of the general expensiveness of printing Reports in the Octavo form, that an additional expense had been incurred in printing the Reports already issued in that shape, I am to request their Lordships' especial attention to the fact, as a conclusion extending beyond the particular case, that so far from the printing of those Reports having occasioned additional expense, the production of the Octavo Reports by the Stationery Office itself, is shown, from the instances selected, to have been nearly 28 per cent. cheaper, instead of being an additional expense.

I am to repeat the conviction of the Board, upon a renewed investigation, that the practical economy of printing in the Octavo form, if it be done by contracts, extends over the whole mass of printing the Reports and Papers now printed in Folio, and to a possible economy of, probably, from 20,000% to 30,000% per annum, or upwards. These being the results of further inquiry as to the relative pecuniary economy of the production of Octavo as compared with the Folio editions of Reports, I am to state, that the Board, upon the consideration of the Comptroller's statement, are confirmed in their opinion, in respect to the still more important question of efficiency of the expenditure, that "the greater mass of expenditure in the production of Folio editions is expenditure fruitlessly and in waste."

It is to be presumed that the Comptroller was really unaware of the actual economy of the production of the Octavo Reports, until it was elicited upon the inquiries directed by their Lordships on the suggestion of the Board. It is also to be presumed that he was unaware of the evidence of public and private convenience afforded by the comparative sale of the Octavo and Folio editions of the same Report. I am to state, that although there had been an extensive distribution to magistrates and to persons connected with local administration, the sale of the first Octavo edition of a public Report that was ever printed, was between 4,000 and 5,000; of the second, between 8,000 and 9,000; and of the third, upwards of 2,000.

I have been unable to obtain correct information as to the relative sales of the Octavo and of the Folio editions of the same Reports; for it now appears that in the case of the Metropolitan Sanitary Report, that when Octavo editions have been printed, it has sometimes occurred that the public have been only enabled to purchase the Folio editions. Nor have I been able to obtain complete information as to the total sales of Reports by private booksellers. But it appears that, although the later Reports have not been advertised, nor stated trade allowances made, nor means taken to make the public aware that Reports were purchaseable, yet, after the local authorities had been supplied by gratuitous distribution, upwards of 2,000 copies were sold of the General Sanitary Report. and the Appendices, and about an equal number of the Metropolitan Sanitary Report. Adding to the number of Reports in Folio sold by the Messrs. Hansard, the Octavo copies sold by private booksellers, the sale of the Public Reports appears to have been much larger than there was any fair reason to expect in the absence of facilities, trades allowances, advertisements, &c., and after large distributions to the local authorities and parties directly concerned.

Wheresoever Members of Parliament or the Public have had the option of obtaining copies of the Folio or Octavo editions, the latter has been preferred and sought for. Whilst about 2,000 copies were sold of the First Annual Report of the Poor Law Commissioners in Octavo, only 49 copies were sold in Folio. The sales of Octavo copies appear to have been generally three or four times the amount of the sales of the Folio copies; and any sales whatsoever of the latter will be found to have arisen from accidental circumstances. been unable to obtain information as to the number sold of the Folio editions of the first Octavo Report printed, but I apprehend it will be found that nearly the whole mass of copies of that Folio Report and Appendices must have contributed to the mass of wasteful printing in Folio which the Comptroller describes, where he states, that by far the greater part, and sometimes the whole, of the Official Reports and Papers "is transferred immediately or at the end of the Session to the trunk-maker or the butterman; the latter are indeed the greater gainers by the system of Parliamentary printing as now carried on. There are at this moment hundreds upon hundreds of tons of Parliamentary Papers and of Reports of Commissioners, for which there is literally no demand, and in which, in selling for waste-paper, care has to be taken not to overload the market, for otherwise they are so voluminous that they would encumber and choke even that wide channel."

I am, however, to guard against any supposition that the Board will estimate the public importance of Official Reports by the amount of popular sale. From the nature of a large proportion of those Reports, only limited sales can reasonably be expected. The Comptroller states, that "hardly 150 copies of the Octavo editions of the Registrar-general's Reports are sold." The proportion of professional persons who study medicine as a science, or the means of alleviating disease, are known to be comparatively few, and of those who study the new science of prevention, still fewer. The evidence afforded by a sale of 150 copies of Tables and Reports on vital statistics, to show that there are so many persons engaged in the studies to which the facts in those Tables are subservient, is satisfactory. If it be to the public interest, as it doubtless is, to endow a few persons for the promotion of particular studies, it would be to the public interest, if it were practicable to do it by such means, to promote such studies even by gratuitous distribution, instead of impeding it by cumbrous and expensive forms of publication. An extensive popular demand is not to be expected for such works as the Reports of the Commissioners of the Law of Real Property, the Criminal Law Commissioners, or many others; yet that is no reason why wasteful expense should continue to be increased, and obstacles placed in the way to the study of the law and of law reform, by printing in those forms so extremely inconvenient for persons actively engaged in professional pursuits.

In respect to that part of Mr. M'Culloch's paper, where he volunteers an opinion on the subject of the gratuitous distribution of Reports, I am to submit that these are questions as to the means of advancing the public service, which are determinable by the circumstances of each case, and admit of conclusive evidence from past experience, of the advantages in mere pecuniary economy of maintaining and extending the practice. In respect to those new legislative measures by which interests are disturbed, and for which new expenditure or rates must be raised, it appears to be due to those who are required to make the sacrifice to satisfy them as far as practicable of the grounds of the required outlay. In cases where they might obtain the information indirectly, it is yet an economy of money, as well as time, to place the information before them in the most authentic shape without loss of time. It is due also to satisfy them that what is proposed to be done, is done upon adequate consideration; and in general, however well the Legislature may be informed itself, if it would free itself from the inconvenience of ignorance without, measures must be taken to meet and

dispel it.

The Board do not deem it requisite that I should enter into any detailed examination of all the points which arise upon Mr. M'Culloch's statements and propositions, further than to notice his recommendation that Reports should be submitted in manuscript, and that no corrections should be allowed to be made in Reports in type. According to this view, whilst works of speculation, or imagination, or amusement, are subject to careful labour and correction, works involving questions of legislation, practically affecting the interests of large masses of the community, may be dashed off on the first intention.

Their Lordships will be aware that when Reports are to be considered by Commissioners or Boards, it is desirable that each member should have the opportunity of deliberately reading and considering, and noting the Draft Report. It is frequently requisite, especially on scientific questions, that the Commissioners should be enabled to consult persons eminent on the special subject of their drafts. This, when the consultation extends beyond two or three persons, is more economically done in print than in manuscript. However disproportionate may be the expense of correction to the expense of printing, it will in general be found that the more a Report is considered and re-considered and re-corrected, the better for the service and for the public.

In conclusion, I am to represent the hopes of the Board, that the evidence as to the practical increase of the public convenience, and efficiency of the branch of expenditure under their Lordships' consideration, as well as the large economy of production, may undergo a close scrutiny.

ESTIMATE, showing the Practicability of Printing Octavo Editions of Reports in as Large a Type as the Folio Editions of Reports, and at a Cheaper Rate.

THE data presumed in this Estimate is for 10 sheets, and shows the difference of prime cost between Quadruple Foolscap paper, with 16 pages in a sheet, and Double Royal Octavo, with 32 pages in a sheet. It presumes a value for each size paper, viz. 42s. per ream for Quadruple Foolscap, and 48s. an excess for Double Royal. Her Majesty's Stationery Office would pay less. The price of composition of types would in each case be about the same, but certainly less for the Double Royal size. Corrections ad valorem, not more in the one case than in the other.

The saving in the Royal Octavo size would be in the less number of reams required, and the less amount to

be charged for machining them.

But it seems that a saving of 12½ per cent. might be effected in the Double Royal size, and that size might be deemed more convenient for general perusal. Smaller type would in each case increase the expense, but the profit allowed is additional, according to the cost of composition.

Appendix, No. 4.

COMMENTS on Appendix, No. 3, by another Printer.

THERE is considerable difficulty in forming a comparison between the relative cost of a Folio and an Octavo; if all the circumstances remain the same, the balance is in favour of the Folio; thus, if a sheet of Double Foolscap be folded into four, it gives eight pages of print; if folded into Octavo, it produces 16 pages of print. Now there is an evident loss in the increased folding of the sheet, supposing the same type to be used and the same quantity of margin to be retained in the smaller form as in the larger. When, however, the Folio of one paper is to be compared with the Octavo of another sized paper, and the same type used, the balance will be, in a trifling degree, in favour of the Octavo, and the larger the size of the paper employed for the Octavo, in comparing it with a fixed sized Folio, as in the present instance, the cheaper will be the cost of production: thus, a Demy Octavo will be cheaper than a Foolscap Folio, a Royal Octavo will be cheaper than a Demy Octavo, and a Super Royal Octavo cheaper than a Royal.

The calculations now in review are so evidently based in error, that it is difficult to imagine how a printer could possibly have arrived at so mistaken a conclusion; had the data been erroneous, the results must necessarily have been so; but in the present instance the data are true, and the inference false.

The difference between a sheet of Quadruple Foolscap and of Double Royal is but small, the superficial contents of each being 1,819 inches and 2,000 inches respectively.

A sheet of Quadruple Foolscap folded into eight at once becomes a sheet of large Octavo, while a sheet of Double Royal is a sheet of large 16mo., or a Double Octavo sheet; hence it must be evident, that covering each sheet with the same quantity of type, if the same size, the same number of sheets of paper would be required, the same amount of margin being retained, the difference in the size of the two sheets of paper only sufficing for the loss sustained by the increased folding of the paper and cutting the edges in the binding; but as an Octavo does not require an equal amount of margin with a Folio, the marginal notes being omitted, the contents of 10 sheets of Quadruple Foolscap might be fairly printed on eight sheets of Double Royal, the comparison being 160 pages of Folio against 256 pages of Octavo in the same sized type. But if the 10 sheets of Quadruple Foolscap are to be contained in six sheets of Double Royal, of 32 pages to the sheet, the comparison will be 160 pages of Folio against 192 pages of Octavo.

The Folio page consists of 67 lines in length: $-67 \times 160 = 10,720$; $10,720 \div 192 = 56$; so that the Octavo page must contain 56 lines of the same width as the present folio page, leaving one quarter of an inch of margin all round the page.

With respect to the cost of composing, the conclusion is equally erroneous:—if 720,000 letters, at $6\frac{1}{2}$ d. per 1,000, cost 19 l. in Folio, the same number of letters must cost the same amount in Octavo, and not 15 l. as stated. The marginal notes are purposely omitted in the present calculation, having nothing to do with the general principle. Assuming the other charges to be correct, the total cost of the Folio (without profit on the composition) would be 183 l. 10 s., and admitting the practicability of printing a book with a quarter of an inch of margin, and adding the same amount for folding and stitching as allowed in the Folio but omitted in the Octavo, the total cost of the Octavo would be 131 l. 14 s., showing a difference of 28 per cent. in favour of the Octavo, and not $12\frac{1}{2}$, as stated; a difference so large that it must be at once perceived by an experienced printer to be an error.

The difference, however, between the cost of the 720,000 letters in 10 sheets of Quadruple Foolscap and eight sheets of Double Royal, admitting that the other items in the estimate may be correct, would be less than 10 per cent.; and even to effect so great a difference, the page of Royal Octavo is perhaps the largest the paper would allow of.

No opinion is offered on the estimate itself. The object of these remarks has been simply to show that the computer commenced with a truth, and concluded with a fallacy.

Annexed is the estimate amended, with two notes attached, for the information of any other printer to whom this brief analysis may be submitted, and which form the key-note to the whole.

To illustrate still further the difficulty of truly determining which form of printing is the most economical (the same sized type being employed), and that either form may be made to appear the cheapest, the following example of a large sized Folio page in double column, with the margin in the same proportion as the Royal Octavo, shows that the balance of cheapness is in favour of the Folio; eight sheets of Quadruple Foolscap containing the 720,000 letters, exhibiting a reduction in the cost of nearly 8 per cent. when compared with the Royal Octavo.

The large payment in the last two years has arisen as follows:

In 1847, Eleven Acts were passed; viz., Burgh Police Amendment Act; Service of Heirs; Crown Charters; Transference of Lands; Burgage Tenure; Heritable Securities; General Register House; Mussel Scalps; Constabulary Amendment; Drainage of Lands; and, Herring Fisheries.

Besides these Acts, a Bill for Registering Births, Deaths, &c., was introduced in the House of Commons and considered in Committee; the Marriages, Scotland, Bill was introduced and considered in Committee; Qualification of Peers Bill was brought into the House of Lords and considered in Committee; and the Lunatic Asylum Bill was brought into the House of Commons and considered in Committee.

In 1848, Five Acts were passed; vis., Law of Entail Act; Highland Roads and Bridges; Caledonian Canal Act (which two last involved the observance of the Standing Orders relative to Private Bills); Register of Sasines Act; and, Justiciary Courts Act.

Besides these, the Marriage and Registration Bills were brought into the House of Lords, where they were altogether five days in a Select Committee, and were both sent to the House of Commons and read a second time; and the Lunatic Asylum Bill was brought into the House of Commons and considered for four days in Select Committee. There were seven other Bills partly proceeded in, but not introduced

In the above sums are included all the charges in relation to English Bills affecting Scotland; some fees paid to English Counsel in relation to the Entail Act; Copying Stationers' charges, and all other outgoings.

ANNO PRIMO VICTORIÆ REGINÆ. CAP. LXXXIII.

AN ACT to compel Clerks of the Peace for Counties and other Persons to take the Custody of such Documents as shall be directed to be deposited with them under the Standing Orders of either House of Parliament.

WHEREAS the Houses of Parliament are in the habit of requiring that, previous to the introduction of any Bill into Parliament for making certain bridges, turnpike-roads, cuts, canals, reservoirs, acqueducts, waterworks, navigations, tunnels, archways, railways, piers, ports, harbours, ferries, docks and other works, to be made under the authority of Parliament, certain maps or plans and sections, and books and writings, or extracts or copies of or from certain maps, plans or sections, books and writings, shall be deposited in the office of the clerk of the peace for every county, riding or division in England or Ireland, or in the office of the sheriff clerk of every county in Scotland, in which such work is proposed to be made, and also with the parish clerk in every parish in England, the schoolmaster of every parish of Scotland, or in Royal Burghs with the town clerk, and the postmaster of the post town in or nearest to every parish in Ireland, in which such work is intended to be made, and with other persons: And whereas it is expedient that such maps, plans, sections, books, writings and copies or extracts of and from the same, should be received by the said clerks of the peace, sheriff clerks, parish clerks, schoolmasters, town clerks, postmasters and other persons, and should remain in their custody for the purposes hereinafter mentioned; BE it therefore Enacted by The QUEEN'S most Excellent Majesty, by and with the advice and consent of the Lords Spiritual and Temporal, and Commons, in this present Parliament Clerks of the assembled, and by the authority of the same, That whenever either of the Houses of Parliament shall by its Standing Orders, already made or hereafter to be made, require that any such maps, plans, sections, books or writings, or extracts or copies of the same, or any of them, shall be deposited as aforesaid, such maps, plans, sections, books, writings, copies and extracts shall be received by and shall remain with the clerks of the peace, sheriff retain them clerks, parish clerks, schoolmasters, town clerks, postmasters and other persons with whom the same shall be directed by such Standing Orders to be deposited, and they are hereby respectively directed to receive and to retain the custody of all such documents and writings so directed to be deposited with them respectively, in the manner and for the purposes and the Standing under the rules and regulations concerning the same respectively directed by such Standing Orders, and shall make such memorials and endorsements on and give such acknowledgments and receipts in respect of the same respectively as shall be thereby directed.

II. And be it further Enacted, That all persons interested shall have liberty to, and the said clerks of the peace, sheriff clerks, parish clerks, schoolmasters, town clerks and post-masters, and every of them, are and is hereby required, at all reasonable hours of the day, to permit such permit all persons interested to inspect during a reasonable time and make extracts from or Documents copies of the said maps, plans, sections, books, writings, extracts and copies of or from to be inspect-the same, so deposited with them respectively, on payment by each person to the clerk of the peace, sheriff clerk, clerk of the parish, schoolmaster, town clerk or postmaster interested. having the custody of any such map, plan, section, book, writing, extract or copy, One Shilling for every such inspection, and the further sum of One Shilling for every hour during which such inspection shall continue after the first hour, and after the rate of Sixpence for every One hundred words copied therefrom.

III. And be it further Enacted, That in case any clerk of the peace, sheriff clerk, parish Clerks of the clerk, schoolmaster, town clerk, postmaster or other person, shall in any matter or thing Peace, &c. refuse or neglect to comply with any of the provisions hereinbefore contained, every clerk for every of the peace, sheriff clerk, parish clerk, schoolmaster, town clerk, postmaster or other person omusion to shall for every such offence forfeit and pay any sum not exceeding the sum of Five Pounds; comply with and every such penalty shall, upon proof of the offence before any Justice of the Peace for the provities county within which such offence shall be committed, or by the confession of the Act liable to party offending, or by the oath of any credible witness, be levied and recovered, together the Penalty with the costs of the proceedings for the recovery thereof, by distress and sale of the of 5 L, to be goods and effects of the party offending, by warrant under the hand of such Justice, which recovered in warrant such Justice is hereby empowered to grant, and shall be paid to the person or a summary persons making such complaint; and it shall be lawful for any such Justice of the Peace to way. whom any complaint shall be made of any offence committed against this Act to summon the party complained of before him, and on such summons to hear and determine the matter of such complaint in a summary way, and on proof of the offence to convict the offender, and to adjudge him to pay the penalty or forfeiture incurred, and to proceed to recover the same, although no information in writing or in print shall have been exhibited or taken by or before such Justice; and all such proceedings by summons without information shall be as good, valid and effectual to all intents and purposes as if an information in writing had been exhibited.

CAP. XX.

AN ACT to amend an Act of the Second Year of Her present Majesty, for providing for the Custody of certain Monies paid in pursuance of the Standing Orders of either House of Parliament by Subscribers to Works or Undertakings to be effected under the Authority of Parliament.

1 & 2 Vict. c. 117.

Recited Act repealed. Monies already paid in to be dealt with as directed by former Act. WHEREAS an Act was passed in the second year of the reign of Her present Majesty Queen Victoria, intituled, "An Act to provide for the Custody of certain Monies paid in pursuance of the Standing Orders of either House of Parliament, by Subscribers to Works or Undertakings to be effected under the Authority of Parliament:" And whereas it is expedient that the said Act should be repealed and should be re-enacted, with such modifications, extensions and alterations as after mentioned: BE it therefore Enacted, by The Queen's most Excellent Majesty, by and with the advice and consent of the Lords Spiritual and Temporal, and Commons, in this present Parliament assembled, and by the authority of the same, That the said Act shall be and is hereby repealed: Provided always, That all acts done under the provisions of the said Act shall be good, valid and effectual to all intents and purposes, and that all sums of money paid under the provisions of the said Act shall be dealt with in all respects as if this Act had not been passed.

Anthority to deposit.

II. And be it Enacted, That in all cases in which any sum of money is required by any Standing Order of either House of Parliament, either now in force or hereafter to be in force, to be deposited by the subscribers to any work or undertaking which is to be executed under the authority of an Act of Parliament, if the director or person or directors or persons having the management of the affairs of such work or undertaking, not exceeding Five in number, shall apply to one of the Clerks in the office of the Clerk of the Parliaments with respect to any such money required by any Standing Order of the Lords Spiritual and Temporal in Parliament assembled, or to one of the Clerks of the Private Bill Office of the House of Commons with respect to any such money required by any Standing Order of the Commons in Parliament assembled, to be deposited, it shall be lawful for the Clerk so applied to, by warrant or order under his hand, to direct that such sum of money shall be paid in manner hereinafter mentioned; (that is to say) into the Bank of England in the name and with the privity of the Accountant-general of the Court of Chancery in England, if the work or undertaking in respect of which the sum of money is required to be deposited is intended to be executed in that part of the United Kingdom called England; or into any of the Banks in Scotland established by Act of Parliament or Royal Charter in the name and with the privity of The Queen's Remembrancer of the Court of Exchequer in Scotland, at the option of the person or persons making such application as aforesaid, in case such work or undertaking is intended to be executed in that part of the United Kingdom called Scotland; or into the Bank of Ireland in the name and with the privity of the Accountant-general of the Court of Chancery in Ireland, in case such work or undertaking is intended to be made or executed in that part of the United Kingdom called Ireland; and such warrant or order shall be a sufficient authority for the Accountant-general of the Court of Chancery in England, the Queen's Remembrancer of the Court of Exchequer in Scotland, and the Accountant-general of the Court of Chancery in Ireland, respectively, to permit the sum of money directed to be paid by such warrant or order to be placed to an account opened or to be opened in his name in the bank mentioned in such warrant or order.

Payment of Deposit.

III. And be it Enacted, That it shall be lawful for the person or persons named in such warrant or order, or the survivors or survivor of them, to pay the sum mentioned in such warrant or order into the bank mentioned in such warrant or order in the name and with the privity of the officer or person in whose name such sum shall be directed to be paid by such warrant or order, to be placed to his account there ex-parte the work or undertaking mentioned in such warrant or order, pursuant to the method prescribed by any Act or Acts for the time being in force for regulating monies paid into the said Courts, and pursuant to the General Orders of the said Court respectively, and without fee or reward; and every such sum so paid in, or the securities in or upon which the same may be invested as hereinafter mentioned, or the stocks, funds or securities authorized to be transferred or deposited in lieu thereof as hereinafter mentioned, shall there remain until the same, with all interest and dividends (if any) accrued thereon, shall be paid out of such bank, in pursuance of the provisions of this Act: Provided always, That in case any such director or person, directors or persons, having the management of any such proposed work or undertaking as aforesaid, shall have previously invested in the Three per Centum Consolidated or the Three per Centum Reduced Bank Annuities, Exchequer Bills, or other Government Securities, the sum or sums of money required by any such Standing Order of either House of Parliament as aforesaid to be deposited by the subscribers to any work



or undertaking which is to be executed under the authority of an Act of Parliament, it shall be lawful for the person or persons named in such warrant or order, or the survivors or survivor of them, to deposit such Exchequer Bills or other Government securities in the bank mentioned in such warrant or order in the name and with the privity of the officer or person in whose name such sum shall by such warrant or order be directed to be paid, or to transfer such Government stocks or funds into the name of the officer or person; and such transfer or deposit shall be directed by such Clerk of the Office of the Clerk of the Parliaments, or such Clerk of the Private Bill Office of the House of Commons, as the case may be, in lieu of payment of so much of the sum of money required to be deposited as aforesaid as the same Exchequer Bills, or other the Government stocks or funds, will extend to satisfy at the price at which the same were originally purchased by the said person or persons, director or directors, as aforesaid, such price to be proved by production of the broker's certificate of such original purchase.

IV. And be it Enacted, That if the person or persons named in such warrant or order, or Investment of the survivors or survivor of them, desire to have invested any sum so paid into the Bank of Deposit. England or the Bank of Ireland, or any interest or dividend which may have accrued on any stocks or securities so transferred or deposited as aforesaid, the Court in the name of whose Accountant-general the same may have been paid may, on a petition presented to such Court, in a summary way by him or them, order that such sum or such interest or dividends shall, until the same be paid out to the parties entitled to the same in pursuance of this Act, be laid out in the Three per centum Consolidated or Three per centum Reduced Bank Annuities, or any Government security or securities, at the option of the aforesaid person or persons, or the survivor or survivors of them.

V. And be it Enacted, That on the termination of the Session of Parliament in which the Repayment Petition or Bill for the purpose of making or sanctioning any such work or undertaking shall of Deposit. have been introduced into Parliament, or if such Petition or Bill shall be rejected or finally withdrawn by some proceeding in either House of Parliament, or shall not be allowed to proceed, or if the person or persons by whom the said money was paid or security deposited, shall have failed to present a Petition, or if an Act be passed authorizing the making of such work or undertaking, and if in any of the foregoing cases the person or persons named in such warrant or order, or the survivors or survivor of them, or the majority of such persons, apply by petition to the court in the name of whose Accountant-general the sum of money mentioned in such warrant or order shall have been paid, or such Exchequer Bills, stocks, or funds shall have been deposited or transferred as aforesaid, or to the Court of Exchequer in Scotland, in case such sum of money shall have been paid in the name of the said Queen's Remembrancer, the Court in the name of whose Accountant-general or Queen's Remembrancer such sum of money shall have been paid, or such Exchequer Bills, stocks or funds shall have been deposited or transferred, shall by order direct the sum of money paid in pursuance of such warrant or order, or the stocks, funds or securities in or upon which the same may have been invested, and the interest or dividends thereof, or the Exchequer Bills, stocks or funds so deposited or transferred as aforesaid, and the interest and dividends thereof, to be paid or transferred to the party or parties so applying, or to any other person or persons whom they may appoint in that behalf; but no such order shall be made in the case of any such Petition or Bill being rejected or not being allowed to proceed, or being withdrawn or not being presented, or of an Act being passed authorizing the making of such work or undertaking, unless upon the production of the certificate of the Chairman of Committees of the House of Lords with reference to any proceeding in the House of Lords, or of the Speaker of the House of Commons, with reference to any proceeding in the House of Commons, that the said Petition or Bill was rejected or not allowed to proceed, or was withdrawn during its passage through one of the Houses of Parliament, or was not presented, or that such Act was passed, which certificate the said Chairman or Speaker shall grant on the application in writing of the person or persons, or the majority of the persons, named in such warrant, or the survivor or survivors of them: Provided always, That the granting of any such certificate, or any mistuke or error therein or in relation thereto, shall not make the Chairman or Speaker Certificate, signing the same liable in respect of any monies, stocks, funds and securities which may are not to be paid, deposited, invested or transferred in pursuance of the provisions of this Act, or make the Chairman the interest or dividends thereof.

BILLS respecting RELIGION.

[30 April 1772.]

THAT no Bill relating to Religion, or the alteration of the Laws concerning Religion, be brought into this House, until the Proposition shall have been first considered in a Committee of the whole House, and agreed unto by The House.

BILLS respecting TRADE.

[9 April 1772.]

THAT no Bill relating to Trade, or the alteration of the Laws concerning Trade, be brought into The House, until the Proposition shall have been first considered in a Committee of the whole House, and agreed unto by The House.

APPLICATIONS for Public Money.

[11 June 1713.]

THAT this House will receive no Petition for any Sum of Money, relating to Public Service, but what is recommended from The Crown.

[29 March 1707.]

THAT this House will not proceed upon any Petition, Motion or Bill, for granting any Money, or for releasing or compounding any Sum of Money owing to The Crown, but in a Committee of the whole House.

[25 March 1715.]

THAT this House will not receive any Petition for compounding any Sum of Money owing to The Crown, upon any branch of the Revenue, without a Certificate from the proper Officer or Officers annexed to the said Petition, stating the Debt, what Prosecutions have been made for the Recovery of such Debt, and setting forth how much the Petitioner and his Security are able to satisfy thereof.

[22 February 1821.]

THAT this House will not proceed upon any Motion for an Address to The Crown, praying that any money may be issued, or that any expense may be incurred, but in a Committee of the whole House.

PECUNIARY PENALTIES.

[24 July 1849.]

THAT with respect to any Bill brought to this House from the House of Lords, or returned by the House of Lords to this House, with Amendments, whereby any pecuniary penalty, forfeiture or fee shall be authorized, imposed, appropriated, regulated, varied, or extinguished, this House will not insist on its ancient and undoubted privileges in the following cases:

1. When the object of such pecuniary penalty or forfeiture is to secure the execution of the Act, or the punishment or prevention of offences.

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- 2. Where such fees are imposed in respect of benefit taken or service rendered under the Act, and in order to the execution of the Act, and are not made payable into the Treasury or Exchequer, or in aid of the Public Revenue, and do not form the ground of public accounting by the parties receiving the same, either in respect of deficit or surplus.
- 3. When such Bill shall be a Private Bill for a Local or Personal Act.

TEMPORARY LAWS.

[24 July 1849.]

THAT the precise duration of every Temporary Law be expressed in a distinct Clause at the end of the Bill.

PRESENTATION of PUBLIC PETITIONS.

[14 April 1849.]

THAT every Member offering to present a Petition to The House, not being a Petition for a Private Bill, or relating to a Private Bill before The House, do confine himself to a statement of the Parties from whom it comes, of the number of signatures attached to it, and of the material allegations contained in it, and to the reading of the prayer of such Petition.

That every such Petition not containing matter in breach of the Privileges of this House, and which, according to the Rules or usual Practice of this House, can be received, be brought to the Table by the direction of The Speaker, who shall not allow any Debate, or any Member to speak upon, or in relation to, such Petition; but it may be read by the Clerk at the Table, if required.

THAT if such Petition relate to any matter or subject which the Member presenting it is desirous of bringing before The House, and if such Member shall state it to be his intention to make a Motion thereupon, such Member may give Notice that he will make a Motion on some subsequent day, That the Petition be printed with the Votes.

THAT, in the case of such Petition complaining of some present personal grievance, for which there may be an urgent necessity for providing an immediate remedy, the matter contained in such Petition may be brought into discussion on the presentation thereof.

THAT all other such Petitions, after they shall have been ordered to lie on the Table, be referred to the Committee on Public Petitions, without any Question being put.

THAT, subject to the above regulations, Petitious against any Resolution or Bill imposing a Tax or Duty for the current service of the year, be henceforth received, and the usage under which The House has refused to entertain such Petitions be discontinued.

MEMBERS' PLACES.

[6 April 1835.]

THAT no Member's name be affixed to any seat in the House before the hour of Prayers; and that the Speaker do give directions to the doorkeepers accordingly.

STRANGERS.

STRANGERS.

[5 February 1845.]

THAT the Serjeant-at-Arms attending this House do, from time to time, take into his custody any Stranger whom he may see, or who may be reported to him to be, in any part of the House or Gallery appropriated to the Members of this House, and also any Stranger who, having been admitted into any other part of the House or Gallery, shall misconduct himself, or shall not withdraw when Strangers are directed to withdraw, while The House, or any Committee of the whole House, is sitting; and that no person so taken into custody be discharged out of custody without the special order of The House.

THAT no Member of this House do presume to bring any Stranger into any part of the House or Gallery appropriated to the Members of this House, while The House, or a Committee of the whole House, is sitting.

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PROMULGATION of STATUTES.

ON 3d June 1801, an Address was agreed to, by both Houses:—To present to His Majesty the following RESOLUTIONS, agreed to on the 7th May; and to entreat His Majesty to give Directions for the more speedy and general Promulgation of the Statutes of the United Kingdom:
—And on 9th June 1801, His Majesty's Answer thereto was reported, That His Majesty would give Directions accordingly:—

THAT it is expedient, for the more general and speedy Promulgation of the Laws of the United Kingdom of *Great Britain* and *Ireland*, that His Majesty's Printer should be authorized and directed to print not less than 5,500 Copies of every Public General Statute, and 306 Copies of every Public Local and Personal Statute.

THAT His Majesty's Printer should be authorized and directed to print and deliver, or transmit (by the Post, or otherwise,) so soon as possible after each Bill has received the Royal Assent, the aforesaid number of 5,500 Copies of each Public General Statute, according to a certain mode of distribution.

THAT His Majesty's Printer should be authorized and directed to print, and deliver or transmit in like manner, the aforesaid 306 Copies of each Public Local and Personal Statute, according to a certain mode of distribution.

THAT every Chief Magistrate and Head Officer of any City, Borough or Town Corporate in *England* and *Ireland*, and of every Royal Burgh in *Scotland*, and every Sheriff, Clerk of the Peace, and Town Clerk, in the United Kingdom of *Great Britain* and *Ireland*, receiving any such Copies, should preserve them for the public Use, and transmit them to his Successor in office.

That for the purpose of effectuating the Promulgation of Private Statutes (if the Parties interested therein shall think proper) and also for making compensation to the Clerk of the Parliaments and Officers of the House of Lords (in lieu of their annual average emoluments arising from the Office Copies of such Statutes) without bringing any new charge upon the Public, the Parties interested in every such Statute should make good such expense and compensation; "and that thereupon such printed Copies of every such Statute should be made judicially admissible in evidence, by adding thereto a Clause declaring the same to be a Public Act."

THAT His Majesty's Printer should also be authorized and directed to class the General Statutes, and the Public Local and Personal Statutes of each Session, in separate Volumes, and to number the Chapters of each class separately; and also, to print One general Title to each Volume, together with a general Table of all the Acts passed in that Session.

In Session 1803, it was resolved by both Houses of Parliament,

That so much of the 5th Resolution of the Lords and Commons, of the Session 1801, as provided that printed copies of Private Statutes shall be made judicially admissible in evidence by adding thereto a Clause declaring the same to be a public Act, shall be vacated;

That so much of the Resolutions of the Lords and Commons, of Session 1801, as relates to the printing and distribution of Private Acts of Parliament, shall be construed to extend only to such Acts of Parliament in which a Clause shall be inserted, declaring that such Act shall be printed by the Printer to the King's Most Excellent Majesty, and may be given in evidence in all Courts of Justice, and before all Judges and Justices, who shall take judicial notice thereof, in like manner as if the same had been declared to be a Public Act. Com. Jour. 58. 273. 281.

By 41 GEO. III. c. 90. s. 9. it was enacted,

That the Statutes of *England* and of *Great Britain*, printed and published by the King's Printer, shall be received as evidence in any Court in *Ireland*, and the Statutes of *Ireland* prior to the Union, so printed and published, shall be received as evidence in any Court in *Great Britain*.

3.—Subsisting Regulations under which the Library of the British Museum is accessible to the Public.

Directions respecting the Reading Room of the British Museum.

THE reading-room of the Museum is open every day, except on Sundays, on Ash-Wednesday, Good-Friday, Christmas-day, and on any fast or thanksgiving days ordered by authority; except also between the 1st and 7th of January, the 1st and 7th of May, and the 1st and 7th of September, inclusive.

The hours are from 9 till 7 during May, June, July, and August; and from 9 till 4 during

the rest of the year.

Persons desirous of admission are to send in their applications in writing (specifying their christian and surnames, rank or profession, and places of abode), to the principal librarian, or, in his absence, to the secretary, or in his absence, to the senior under librarian, who will either immediately admit such persons, or lay their applications before the next meeting of the trustees. Every person applying is to produce a recommendation satisfactory to a trustee, or an officer of the house. Applications defective in this respect will not be attended to.

Permission will in general be granted for six months; and at the expiration of this term fresh application is to be made for a renewal. The tickets given to readers are not transferable, and no person can be admitted without a ticket.

Persons under 18 years of age are not admissible.

The librarians are strictly enjoined to use all possible despatch in supplying the readers with the printed books or manuscripts they may apply for, but in so extensive a library it may not be always possible to find every article immediately.

Readers, before leaving the room, are to return the books or MSS. they have received to an attendant, and are to obtain the corresponding ticket; the reader being responsible for

such books or manuscripts so long as the ticket remains uncancelled.

Readers will be allowed to make one or more extracts from any printed book or manuscript, but no whole, or greater part of a manuscript is to be transcribed, without a particular leave from the trustees. The transcribers are not to lay the paper on which they write on any part of the book or manuscript they are using, nor are any tracings allowed without particular permission of the trustees.

No person is, on any pretence whatever, to write on any part of a printed book or manuscript belonging to the Museum; but if any one should observe a defect in such book or manuscript, he is requested to signify the same to the officer in waiting, who will make proper use of the information.

It may be sufficient merely to suggest that silence is absolutely requisite in a place dedicated to the purposes of study.

N. B.—Readers are, under no circumstances, to take any book or manuscript out of the reading-rooms.

In compliance with your letter, dated 27 October 1848, desiring certain Returns respecting the Bodleian Library, I have to state—

- 1. As to the number of books received under the various Copyrights Acts, no distinct register of the books so received has been kept, but they have, at the end of each year, been incorporated into the general collection, so that I am unable to give the number of the books so received.
- 2. The number of printed volumes in the Bodleian Library amounts to about 220,000; but this statement will very inadequately express the real extent of the collection, as so many works have been bound together in one volume.
 - 3. The number of manuscripts is about 21,000.
- 4. All graduates of the university have the right of admission to the library; other persons must apply for permission to the regular authorities.
- 5. No register is kept of persons consulting the library; accordingly the number of students who have frequented it during the last 10 years cannot be ascertained.

2. That the number of printed volumes at present in the library, as nearly as the same can be ascertained, is 166,724, and the number of manuscripts 3,163.

3. That the control of the library is delegated by the senate to a syndicate, consisting of the Vice-chancellor and other ex-officio members, who meet three or four times a year, or oftener, as occasion requires, for the purpose of making new regulations or altering the old.

That the library is at present accessible to members of the university under the following regulations:

The library is open on week days from ten till three, excepting Saturdays and Saints' day,

when it is open on Saturdays from ten till one; on Saints' day from twelve till three.

The library is closed on Sundays and on the following days: Christmas-day, the Epiphany, the Purification, Ash Wednesday, Good Friday, Easter Monday and Tuesday, Holy Thursday, Whit Monday and Tuesday, November the 5th, appointed fast days and thanks-givings, two days after each quarter day, and fourteen days immediately following September 29, to allow time for an annual inspection.

Persons privileged to use the library and to borrow books to the number of ten volumes, under a note bearing their name and college, with the title and class mark of the books, are members of the senate and bachelors of law and physic, who are all bound by oath not wilfully to injure the same. Bachelors of arts may also obtain to the extent of five volumes,

for which their college tutors render themselves responsible.

Strictly speaking, members of the senate and bachelors of law and physic are the only persons who are privileged to search the catalogues and to take down books from the shelves; but that privilege is by courtesy extended to bachelors of arts, to masters of arts, who have ceased to be members of the senate, and to persons who have taken an ad-eundem degree from Oxford or Dublin.

Undergraduates can only use the library when accompanied by a member of the senate or a bachelor of law or physic, and are not at liberty to take out volumes in their own right, though they frequently obtain them through a member of the senate or bachelor of law or physic, the latter being responsible for them.

The total number of volumes borrowed during the year 1847 was 25,530, making an average of 6,382 per quarter. We have no records by which the number of volumes borrowed in former years can be ascertained, but it is certain that within the last eight or ten years the number has rapidly increased.

No record is kept of persons visiting the library to consult it, nor would such a record be any criterion of the use made of it, inasmuch as the delivery of books upon note does not require personal attendance on the part of the member who borrows them; and they are frequently delivered to servants bringing a note properly signed and bearing the title of the books, with or without the class marks, which may be inserted by the library keepers.

The notes are filed in compartments corresponding to the different colleges, and are returned to the bearer when the books are brought back.

The books must be returned to the library on or before each quarter-day, under a penalty of 2 s. for every folio or quarto, and 1 s. for every book of less size; the penalty to be repeated 18.

repeated every month till the book be returned, or another of the same edition and equal value placed in its room; and persons lose the privilege of using the library so long as their fines remain unpaid.

Persons borrowing books are also responsible for any damage which the books may have

incurred during their absence from the library.

Certain books of great value, books of prints, certain named books of reference, and books purchased under the will of Mr. Rustal, are not allowed to be taken out of the library.

Other expensive books can only be taken out under an order from the Vice-chancellor,

and subject to double penalties.

No manuscript can be taken out without a grace of the senate authorizing its removal, and the person borrowing it must give a bond according to the value of the manuscript.

Twelve payments have now been made, each of 363 l. 15 s. 2 d., being the annual compensation awarded by the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, amounting to the sum of 4,365 l. 2s.

The lists of books purchased each year has been annually delivered at the Treasury prior

to the receipt of the compensation.

The present Librarian, the Rev. Henry Christmas, has prepared for the court the annexed list of books that have been purchased and added to the library since his appointment in 1842.

Asked to return the number of printed books, he says, that the books not having been numbered in the time of his predecessor, the Rev. R. Watts, who died in 1842, very infirm, at an advanced age, and the catalogue which he is preparing being yet incomplete, he cannot state their exact number, but he gives 35,500 as a very close approximation; he returns the number of manuscripts as 387.

There is no register of those who have used the library before 1842. The only register

kept since that year is of those who have not been fellows of the college.

The fellows of the college, who are the rectors, vicars, curates, and lecturers of churches in the city and suburbs of the city of London, are not registered when they attend, and with certain restrictions, they have the privilege of taking books out of the library for their own use, and that of their friends.

The law by which strangers are allowed to read in the library prescribes that leave be granted either at a court of the officers of the college, or by the president; but in practice,

any person recommended by a fellow to the librarian obtains the permission.

The library is open every day, from ten in the morning to four, except during a recess of

six weeks in the summer.

Trinity College Library, 8 January 1849. In compliance with the order of the Board, requiring me to furnish you with the information necessary to enable you to reply to Mr. Redington's letter of the 1st November, I beg to send you the enclosed documents

I am unable to make any report of the number of books received under the Copyright Act prior to the year 1835, when I was first appointed to the office of assistant librarian.

I do not find that any such records were kept before that period as would enable me to make a correct return of the number of volumes and parts of volumes of printed books received under the Copyright Act which was then in force. That Act did not require the college to keep any such records, or to make any such return as that which is now called for; and no means now exist by which it would be possible to distinguish, with any certainty, the books then received under the Copyright Act from those purchased by the funds of the library.

When I was appointed assistant librarian in 1835, I established a regular system of inquiring into and demanding from the publishers such books and other publications as the library was entitled to by the law, and although not required by any order of the Board or hy Act of Parliament to do so, I have kept such records as enable me to furnish you with a

return of the number of books received from the year 1835 to the present time. (No. I. of

the enclosed papers.)

I have only to add that the delay which has occurred in making out these Returns was occasioned by my endeavour to devise the means of recovering the information called for in Mr. Redington's letter for the period from 1814 to 1834. But I found that to make anything more than a very rough approximate calculation would be impossible. I must therefore confine myself to a report of the period during which I have been officially connected with the library, and for which I have been myself responsible; merely stating in general terms that the average number of volumes annually received during the 20 years before that period, must have been considerably under 1,000. The other papers enclosed will, I trust, sufficiently explain themselves.

II. A RETURN of the whole Number of Volumes (distinguishing Printed Books and Manuscripts) now in the Library of Trimity College, *Dublin*, as nearly as the same can be computed.

It is to be noted that in this Return the word "volume" is not used to signify a distinct work, pamphlet, printed sheet, or portion of a book coming out in numbers. A volume here may include several pamphlets or smaller books bound together, and now constituting but one volume on the shelves of the library.

It is necessary also to state that the following is the whole number of books in the library on the 5th day of August 1848, at which time it is customary to count annually the number of printed books and manuscripts.

III. A RETURN of the subsisting Regulations under which the Library of Trinity College, Dublin, is accessible to the Public.

The Regulations of the Library are of three kinds:

1. The statutes enacted by Royal letters patent; 2. Decrees of the provost and senior fellows, made with the formal assent of the visitors of the college, which decrees have the same force and effect as statutes, until repealed by the same authority that enacted them; and 3. Rules made by the provost and senior fellows, without the formal assent of the

First. The existing statutes of the library are contained in the letters patent of 8 Geo. 2,

a copy of which is annexed.

It is to be observed, however, that by the letters patent of 1 Geo. 3, a general power was given to the college of altering the hours at which the library is kept open, which the letter of Geo. 2 had absolutely determined; and that in pursuance of this power the provost and senior fellows have changed the hours of the library, which is now open daily (Sundays excepted) from nine o'clock A.M. to four o'clock P.M. in summer, and from nine o'clock A. M. to three o'clock P. M. in winter.

They have also commuted the observance of the church holidays (on which days by the statute of Geo. 2, the library was formerly closed) to a vacation of six weeks in summer and three days at Christmas; but the vacation of three weeks allowed by the statutes at Christmas is also now abolished. On Ash Wednesday, Good Friday, and Ascension Day, how-

ever, the library is still always closed.

The letter of 1 Geo. 3 above alladed to made one other alteration in the statutes of 8 Geo. 2, by allowing the provost to have a key for the library, as well as the librarians; and a subsequent letter of 60 Geo. 3 gave a power to the provost and senior fellows of appointing more than one sub-librarian, if necessary; and also further enacted, that fellows of Trinity college only should be eligible to the offices of librarian and sub-librarian.

Second. There is but one decree of the Board made with the formal assent of the visitors, which is now in operation for the regulation of the library. It was enacted for the purpose of enabling the college to admit the public more freely to the use of the books, by assimilating the rules of the library to those of the British Museum and other public libraries, as well as to secure against the misplacing of books, which had frequently given rise to serious inconveniences. (For a copy of this decree, see page 21.)

Third. The most important regulations made by the Board without the formal assent of the visitors (although with their tacit concurrence) are:-

1. The establishment of a lending library. This library is supported and increased by an annual grant from the college, and the use of it is restricted to students having their names on the college books. Being founded entirely by a decree of the Board it is not subject to the statutes or other regulations of the public library.

2. The admission of the public to the use of the library is also an act of the Board, not

required by any statute.

The statutes of 8 Geo. 2, did not contemplate the admission of any person to read in the library who was not a graduate of the university and in residence, or having his name on the college books. The wording of the statutes expressly excludes undergraduates from this

privilege; see cap. iii. p. 20.

But as the admission or non-admission of others is not alluded to or expressly prohibited by the statutes, the provost and senior fellows deem themselves at liberty to admit the public; and for many years past they have admitted to the privilege of reading in the library any one who brings a sufficient introduction, signed by two fellows of the college, certifying that he is a fit and proper person to be allowed the use of the library. The individual so admitted is then received exactly as if he were a graduate of the university, and is subject to the same rules which the library statutes impose on graduates; that is to say, he is required to take the library oath, and to observe all the regulations of the library, on pain of exclusion from the privilege of reading there, if he should persist in violating them.

3. The establishment of a separate reading-room for the use of all who are privileged to read in the library is also an act of the Board, not enjoined in the statutes or formally sanctioned by the visitors. This room is heated by a hot-water apparatus, and is placed under the same regulations as the reading-room of the British Museum.

Quicunque Bibliothecam ingreditur, quamprimum librum ab eo desideratum reperiat, aut ei, ubi reperiatur, a Bibliothecario ostendatur, eo se recipiat, et ibi quiete et modeste sedebit, quousque Bibliothecá sit egressurus; secus facientes Præpositus puniet, quum corum nomina a Bibliothecario ad eum delata fuerint, et gravi pœnà, si aliquis sæpius deliquisse deprehendatur. Ignem, candelam accensam, vel aliud aliquid unde ignis accendatur, in Bibliothecam sub ullo prætextu inferri, omnino prohibemus, sub pænå a Præposito et Sociis senioribus infligendå. Decree of the Provost and Senior Fellows for the Regulation of the Library.

Whereas it has been found, from the great increase of the library since the statute "De Bibliotheca bene ordinanda" was granted by his late Majesty King George the Second, that it is impossible for the utmost vigilance on the part of the librarians and attendants in the library to guard against losses, mutilations, and displacement of the books, without some additional regulations not provided for in the aforesaid statute; and whereas the said statute gives a power to the provost and senior fellows, with consent of the visitors of the college, to make new decrees, in cases not defined or provided for in the statutes; Therefore, we, the provost and senior fellows of Trinity College, having obtained the consent of the visitors, do hereby decree, that from and after the date of these presents, no persons who are now privileged, or shall hereafter be privileged, to read in the library, except the provost, fellows, ex-fellows, or professors of the college, or such as shall have obtained special permission from the Board, shall be suffered to read in the recesses, windows, or on the short bookcases, or to take down any book whatsoever from the shelves; but every reader requiring any book or books shall give the title of the said book or books in writing, with his name signed to the same, to one of the library porters; and the porter shall bring him the book or books, if they be in the library and not otherwise previously engaged; and shall receive the said book or books from him again, and cause them to be replaced in their proper places on the shelves of the library.

And any person who shall transgress this decree, or who, in defiance thereof, shall read in the windows or within the bookcases, or who shall without permission take down the books from the shelves, or otherwise obstruct the porters in the discharge of their duties, shall be admonished by the librarian; and if after such admonition he shall continue to repeat the offence, the librarian shall forthwith exclude him from the library, and not suffer him to enter the library again, without permission from the provost and senior fellows. SOCIETY OF KING'S INNS, DUBLIN.

RETURNS from the Library of the Honourable Society of King's Inns, Dublin.

1. RETURN of the several Sums of Money which have been paid out of the Consolidated Fund of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, to the Person or Persons, Bodies Politic or Corporate, being the Proprietors or Managers of the King's Inns. Libraries, in Dublin, under the Act of 6 & 7 Will. 4, c. 10.

There has been paid on this account, 433 l. 6s. 8 d. annually, from February 1837 to August 1848 inclusive, making a total amount of 4,983 l. 6s. 8 d.

2. RETURN of the Appropriation of such Sums of Money, in each year, since the passing of the Act aforesaid.

The said sum has been regularly expended each year in the purchase of books solely, and a return has been annually made to the Lords of the Treasury of the books so purchased, and their prices. This return has been made, according to the order of the Lords of the Treasury, every year, before the 20th day of August, previously to the making of any fresh grant for the next year by their Lordships.

3. Return of the whole Number of Volumes (distinguishing Printed Books and Manuscripts) at present contained in said Library, as nearly as the same can be computed.

The number of volumes contained in the King's Inns library is 30,938, or thereabouts; besides about 400 separate pamphlets and about 150 manuscripts, being the entire number of manuscripts contained therein.

4. RETURN of the subsisting Regulations under which the said Library is accessible to the Public, and of the Number of Students and others who have frequented it in each Year since the passing of said Act, for the purpose of Reading or Consulting Books.

The library is not open to the public generally, being, and having always been, the property of the Honourable Society of King's Inns, and it is accessible only to members of that society, viz.—barristers, students, attornies and solicitors. It has also, under a late regulation, been opened to the present proctors practising in the Prerogative Court of Dublin. It is open every day of the year, excepting during the entire of the month of August, and all Sundays, Christmas day, and Good Friday, from the hour of nine o'clock in the morning until six in the evening.

The number of students and others who have frequented the library previously to the year 1843 cannot be ascertained, no record of their attendance previously to that year having been kept. The average attendance "for the purpose of reading and consulting books," since the year 1843, has been about 42 persons each day; which would give the average number 11,928 in each year.

REGULATIONS under which the several Libraries are Accessible.

ADVOCATES' LIBRARY, EDINBURGH.

THE individuals entitled to the full privileges of the Library are the 13 Judges, and the Faculty of Advocates, which includes 426 members. Although the property is vested in a body of lawyers, it is for all practical purposes a public library, and is the most accessible of all the great libraries in the United Kingdom. Any person of a decent appearance is allowed to consult books, a formal application being very seldom thought necessary.

ABERDEEN UNIVERSITY AND KING'S COLLEGE.

THE Library is accessible to all the Professors and Lecturers of this University, and of Marischal College, Aberdeen, as well as to all Graduates and Students of the former, on depositing the value of the books received.

Persons who are neither Graduates nor Students of the University, are allowed to take out books, if recommended by a Professor of the University or of Marischal College. If the Professor hold himself responsible for the books, no deposit is required; if such security is not given, the value of the books taken out must be lodged with the Librarian.

The Library is closed annually for about a week, previous to which all books must be returned under certain penalties. A strict examination is then made of the state of the Library, which is not re-opened until its conclusion. Every facility is afforded, and suitable accommodation provided for persons wishing to consult books.

SAINT ANDREW'S UNIVERSITY.

ALL Students attending the University have the use of the Library free of expense. They are allowed to take out three volumes at a time, to be returned at the end of a fortnight; and besides, the Library is accessible to them, at stated times, for the purpose of reading and consulting books.

Feb. 13, 1847.—The following Resolution was put to the meeting of the Senatus Academicus: -" That the practice of permitting each Professor to grant the privilege of obtaining books from the University Library to five individuals not connected with the University be abolished, as it is destructive of the books, consumes much of the time of the Librarian, converts the University Library into a circulating library for the people of the town, is a privilege which the Senatus are not justified in granting, and which has been condemned in the late Report of the Royal Commission." This resolution was unanimously agreed to.

Persons resident in the town or elsewhere, engaged bonâ fide in literary and scientific investigations, with a view to publication, may still receive books from the Library, on application to the Senatus Academicus, and on giving a sufficient guarantee for their security; and free access to the Library, for the purpose of consulting books, is granted to any respectable person.

Every facility is afforded to render the Library available for literary and scientific purposes, consistent with the due preservation and safe custody of the books.

EDINBURGH UNIVERSITY.

THE Library of the University of Edinburgh, like the other University Libraries of Scotland, is designed primarily for the use of Professors and of Matriculated Students. By a contract made in the year 1764, between the University and the Members of the Royal College of Surgeons (which was ratified by the Town Council as Patrons of the University), the members of the latter body have the privilege of borrowing books from the University Library.

The Library is open every lawful day from 10 A.M. till 4 P.M., except on Saturdays, when it is shut at 1 o'clock precisely.

It is divided into two departments; 1. The Borrowing Department; and, 2. The Reading Room.

4 ABSTRACT RETURN RELATING TO THE PUBLIC LIBRARIES IN SCOTLAND.

The Rules applicable to the first of these; viz. The Borrowing Department, are as follows:—

1. Professors:

Every Professor is entitled to borrow to the extent of 25 volumes (not works) at a time, but on a written application to the Curators, and their leave obtained, the number may be increased. The books must be returned after the expiry of six weeks from the date of their being borrowed, and an annual Return of all the books in their possession borrowed from the Library is called for by printed circulars in the last week of August.

2. Members of the Royal College of Surgeons:

The Rules applicable to them are similar to the above.

DEPOSIT RECEIPT, No. _____ (Name) -

3. Students:

Every Student before being entitled to borrow books from the University Library must have inscribed his name in the Record of Matriculations, or General Album, and been enrolled in the class of at least one Professor.

On applying for the loan of any book, he must present his Matriculation Ticket, and also the ticket of at least one Professor to the Librarian, who, on receiving from him a deposit of 1 l. sterling, gives him a receipt for the same, and enters his name in the Deposit Receipt Book.

Every Student is entitled to borrow two volumes at a time for the deposit of 1 l.

On applying for the loan of books, every Student must fill up a Schedule of the annexed form, containing his Name, Address, the Number of his Deposit Receipt, and the Titles of the Books he wishes to borrow.

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As the main object of the University Library is to serve as an auxiliary to academical study, and as the collection is not more than adequate to supply the demands made upon it by Professors, Students and Members of the College of Surgeons, (all of whom are contributors to the funds) there cannot be any considerable provision for the accommodation of strangers. But literary gentlemen or others, who have occasion to consult or to borrow books, on application to the Curators or to individual Professors willing to be responsible for them, are allowed every practicable facility.

GLASGOW UNIVERSITY.

EXTRACTS from the REGULATIONS respecting the LIBRARY.

6. The Library shall be open for giving out and receiving back books every lawful day during the winter session, from eleven to three o'clock, except on Saturdays, when it shall close at one o'clock. During the summer recess it shall be open on Wednesdays and Fridays from twelve to three o'clock.

- 8: Students shall be allowed the use of two volumes at a time during the winter session, and of four volumes at a time during the summer recess. They shall be allowed for the perusal of 12mo. volumes, a week; of 8vo. volumes, a fortnight; of 4to. volumes, three weeks, and of folio volumes, four weeks.
- 9. No romances, novels, tales nor plays shall be lent to Students, nor shall books with valuable plates be allowed to be taken out of the Library.
- 10. Every student paying the Library dues, besides being allowed to take out the number of volumes sanctioned by Regulation 8, shall be entitled to consult books in the Readingroom, which shall be kept open for that purpose from half-past nine to three o'clock every lawful day, except on Saturdays, when it shall close at one o'clock.

The University Library, besides being thus freely open to the Students (and to all the Professors, 23 in number), both for taking out books and consulting them in the adjoining Reading-room, is also open to all respectable persons, properly introduced, who have the privilege of reading in the Library, and to whom, when engaged in any researches, books are lent through the medium of a Professor, who is accountable for the same.

the Commissioner during the whole of that time is not always necessary; much of the business being matters of account, &c., which are settled between the Registrar and the Solicitor. (*) No account has been kept. The average attendance at Court on each day has been four hours, exclusive of other attendances, when there have been no appointed aittings; the Court is open on an average aix hours daily for the transaction of general business, and one Commissioner attends every such day.

(*) The average number of hours occupied in each sitting has been nearly five; this is exclusive of the sittings held by the Registrar for the taxation of bills of costs. The Commissioner has made it a practice to attend in the Court building, for the transaction of general business, every day of each week here given, except the Saturday and Sunday, and save in the month of September, certain portions of which are set aside for a vacation.

(2.) By Act of Sederunt, 1 June 1824, it was provided as follows:-

"The fees established by Nos. 8 and 9 of the Table, Schedule (B.) annexed to the first mentioned Act," (the Act of Sederunt, 20 December 1823) "shall be and are hereby repealed, and in lieu thereof, that an addition shall be made of 1 s. each, to the fees specified in Nos. 1 and 7."

(3.) The Act of Sederunt making further alteration on the said Table of Fees, dated 6 July 1838, is in the following terms:-

"Whereas, by Act of Sederunt, 20 December 1823, certain tables of fees were declared to be exigible by the commissary clerks of Edinburgh: and whereas it has been considered expedient to alter the Table, Schedule (B.) annexed to said Act of Sederunt, and there are now no vested interests opposed to such alteration. III.—STATEMENT of the Manner in which the DUTIES of the COMMISSARY CLERK'S OFFICE in Edinburgh has been Discharged, stating whether the Principal Clerk has attended the Office, and performed the Duties in Person, or whether Daily or Monthly, or whether by Deputy or by Deputy's Substitute, since the Year 1823, when the Office was regulated.

In reference to this head of the return, the depute clerk reports to the Crown agent as

" From the year 1823 till the end of the year 1837, the duties of the office of the Commissary Clerk's Office in Edinburgh were performed by the principal and depute clerks, who

both attended the office daily.

" For a few years after 1837, say till about 1842, the duties of the office were performed by the depute clerk, assisted by the principal clerk; but after that period, till May 1847, the duties were entirely performed by the depute clerk, the principal mostly living in the

"From May 1847 till January 1848, the whole duties were performed by myself, as

interim clerk under the appointment of the Court of Session.

"During last year the duties were performed by the depute clerk, assisted by the principal, who daily attended the office."

In further explanation, the depute clerk reports the following particulars to the Crown

agent:—
"That for sometime after Mr. Gracie's appointment as principal commissary clerk, in November 1837, he gave attendance at the office daily, and occasionally signed some of the papers. He remained however but a short time, say for an hour or two each day, and even this got shorter till at last he would merely look in, in the morning, and sign any paper that might be wanted, and immediately go away again. During the last few years of his life he gave up his house in Edinburgh, and lived the whole year in Peeblesshire, and would only make his appearance in the office for half an hour, or an hour, once in the month or six weeks; and during the whole time of his incumbency he never did any of what I would call the laborious part of the duties of the office, the same having been entirely done by myself as his depute, with the assistance of the writing or copying clerks. Not having taken any jottings as to dates, I cannot be more particular as to them.

"As mentioned in my last, during the vacancy between Mr. Gracie's death (12th May

1847) to Mr. Orr being admitted as principal commissary clerk (12th January 1848), the whole duties of the office were performed by me, under the interim appointment of the

Court of Session, assisted by the two writing or copying clerks.

"During the whole time Mr. Orr held the office of principal commissary clerk, the labour also devolved upon me as his depute, with the foresaid assistance, he mere occasionally comparing some of the papers and signing the same and making inquiry as to the sufficiency of proposed cautioners for executors in confirmations. Although he was daily in the office, his attendance there was short and irregular.'

It does not appear that any Minute was made by the Board of Treasury in 1823 on this subject. The Barons of Exchequer in Scotland were empowered, by the Acts under which the compensations to Mr. Graham were granted, to award the amount of compensation, and copies of the warrants issued by them are annexed, as well as copy of the Treasury Warrant in 1841, granting compensation to Mr. Graham under the Act 4 Geo. 4, c. 97, for loss of remuneration in the appointment of depute commissary clerk.

By virtue of the powers in us being, by and under an Act of Parliament passed in the 49th year of His present Majesty's reign (c. 42), intituled, "An Act for better Regulating the Public Records of Scotland," (12 May 1809,) and which enacts, that in order permanent compensation may be made to keepers of public records, for and in respect of the profits and emoluments of which they have been deprived; and that we, after due inquiry made into the circumstances of each case, do determine what sum will form a just and reasonable compensation to claimants under the said Act, either by payments in the gross, or in annuities during their respective lives, or continuance in office of the claimants, and no longer: And whereas Robert Græme, esquire, advocate, principal clerk of the Commissariat of Edinburgh, on the 29th day of May 1810, presented to us a memorial and claim, praying compensation for and in respect of the profits and emoluments of which he has been and will be deprived by the operation of the Act; and we, having given out the said memorial and claim to His Majesty's Advocate, in order that he might appear and object thereto if necessary, and referred the same to the Remembrancer for his report; and having on the 15th day of last month had the said memorial and claim, together with two several reports from His Majesty's Advocate, and a report from the Remembrancer thereon, under our consideration, did determine and ascertain the amount of the fees and emoluments of which the said Robert Græme has been deprived by the operation of the said Act, to be 12 L 13 s. 4d.; therefore we do hereby direct and require you to make payment to the said Robert Græme of the said sum of 12 l. 13 s. 4d., for and in respect of the fees and emoluments of which he has been deprived by the operation of the Act, for the year ended the 12th day of November 1810, out of any monies in your hands arisen from the revenues of land-tax; and we do further direct and require you to pay the said sum to the said Robert Græme in every succeeding year, on the 12th day of November, during his life or continuance in the said office, and no longer; and every sum so to be paid under this warrant will be allowed in your accounts. Given at the Exchequer Chambers in Edinburgh, the 7th day of August 1811, in the 51st year of His Majesty's reign.

By virtue of the powers in us being, by and under an Act of Parliament passed in the fourth year of the reign of His present Majesty (c. 97), intituled, "An Act for the Regulation of the Court of the Commissaries of Edinburgh, and for Altering and Regulating the Jurisdiction of inferior Commissaries in Scotland," (19 July 1823,) and by which the 21st section enacts, "That it shall and may be lawful for any commissary, commissary clerk, or other officer holding his office at the passing of this Act, and entitled to compensation for the loss to be suffered through the operation and effect of this Act, to make application to the Barons of Exchequer in Scotland, who shall direct intimation thereof to be given to His Majesty's Advocate, and thereafter the said Barons shall inquire into and consider the circumstances of the case, and after due investigation of the legality of the claim and of the fees or emoluments in respect whereof such loss shall be stated to have arisen, and having regard to the fees to which any such person may become entitled pursuant to this Act, the said Barons shall award to every such person such compensation as they shall think such person entitled to, either by the payment of a gross sum or by way of annuity, as they shall think proper; provided always, that every order made for such compensation shall be laid before Parliament within two calendar months after the commencement of the Session next ensuing after making the same: provided further, that no decision of the said Barons shall be final and conclusive until two calendar months after a copy of the order of such Barons for compensation shall have been laid before Parliament. And whereas Robert Graham, esq., who held the office of principal clerk of the Commissary Court of Edinburgh, has presented a petition and claim to us, praying compensation for and in respect of the fees and emoluments of which he has been deprived by the operation of the said Act, and also for the right of which he will be deprived for receiving a remuneration on the appointment of a depute clerk on the death of the present depute clerk, if that shall take place during the lifetime of the said Robert Graham; and we having directed the petition to be intimated to His Majesty's Advocate, and inquired into the circumstances of the case, and after due investigation into the legality of the claim, and having heard His Majesty's Advocate, and considered a report from our Remembrancer respecting the amount of the fees and emoluments the petitioner has lost by the operation of the Act, do find that he is entitled to compensation, by way of annuity, of the sum of 278 l. 1 s. 4 d., and that over and above the sum of 12 l. 13 s. 4 d. which we directed you to pay to him as compensation of the emoluments of which he was deprived by the statute 49 Geo. 3, c. 42, intituled, "An Act for the better Regulation of the Public Records of Scotland," and which payment is to be continued; Therefore we do hereby order and direct you to pay out of the monies to be imprested into your hands, charged and made chargeable by the Acts made in the seventh and tenth years of the reign of Her Majesty Queen Anne, with the fees, salaries, and other charges allowed for keeping up the Courts of Session, Justiciary, and Exchequer, to the said Robert Graham the sum of 278 l. 1 s. 4 d. for the year commencing the 1st day of January and ending the 31st day

of December 1824, and the like sum for the year commencing the 1st day of January and ending the 31st day of December 1825, and so on thereafter at the 1st day of January of every succeeding year, in full compensation for the loss of the fees and emoluments he has sustained under the operation of the said Act of the 4th Geo. 4, c. 97. And we, the said Barons, postpone the consideration of that part of the petition which prays that we will award compensation to him, the said Robert Graham, for any remuneration he may be entitled to for the right of which he has been deprived of the appointment of a depute clerk, but you are hereby directed to make no payments under this warrant until two calendar months after a copy hereof shall have been laid before Parliament. Given at the Exchequer Chambers in Edinburgh, the 17th day of March 1826, in the seventh year of the reign of His Majesty King George the Fourth.

And whereas by the 1st section of the Act 3 Will. 4, c. 13, intituled, "An Act to provide for the execution of the Duties performed by the Barons of Exchequer in Scotland in relation to the Public Revenue, and to place the management of the Assessed Taxes and Land Tax in Scotland under the Commissioners for the Affairs of Taxes," the power and authority of ascertaining, ordering, issuing, allowing, or paying any sum or some of money payable by way of compensation to any officer or other person is transferred to, conferred upon, and vested in the Lord High Treasurer or Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury for the time being: And whereas Robert Graham, esq., who held the office of principal clerk of the Commissary Court of Edinburgh, has presented a petition and claim to us, the Lords Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, praying compensation for the right of which he has been deprived under the operation of the said Act of 4 Geo. 4, c. 97, of receiving remuneration on the appointment of a depute clerk, on the death of Nr. George Carphin, the late depute clerk, which took place on the 7th day of October 1837, and we having directed the said petition to be intimated to Her Majesty's Advocate, and inquired into the circumstances of the case, and after due investigation into the legality of the claim, and having considered a report of the Queen's and Lord I reasurer's Remembrancer of the Exchequer in Scotland, find that the said Robert Graham is entitled, in respect of the right of which he has been deprived of receiving remuneration on the appointment of a depute clerk as aforesaid, to compensation, by way of annuity, of the sum of 364 l., the same to commence from the day of the death of the said George Carphin; therefore we do hereby order and direct that an annuity of 364 l., to commence from the 7th day of October 1837, be payable and paid to the said Robert Graham, free and clear of all taxes and deductions what-soever, at the four most usual quarterly days of payment in the year, by equal portions, out of any monies charged or made chargeable by Acts made in the seventh and tenth years of the reign of her Majesty Queen Anne, with the fees, salaries, and other charges allowed or to be allowed for keeping up the Courts of Session, Justiciary, or Exchequer in Scotland. And we further direct that a copy of this our order shall, in terms of the 21st section of the said Act of 4 Geo. 4, c. 97, be lid before Parliament within two calendar ments after the commencement of the Session next ensuing after the date hereof; and that such order shall not be final and conclusive until two calendar months after a copy of the same shall have been laid before Parliament. It may be considered that the Total of the Sums represented by the 259,118 Plaints, which proceeded to trial, was not less than £.820,000, as it will be seen by the Table at page 16, that a greater proportion of the Plaints entered for the larger Sums are tried than those entered for the smaller, and the difference between £.820,000 and £.752,543 for which Judgment was obtained would be the amount of those Causes in which the Plaintiffs were nonsuited, or in which they claimed larger amounts than they obtained Judgment for; this Sum would be about - 67,457	906,292
Leaving the Sum of £.	440,510

Of which the Courts had no cognizance after the summonses for the same had been issued; but there is reason to believe that at least 90 per cent. of such sum was paid by the Defeadants to Plaintiffs, or arrangements made between the parties.

The Total Amount of Costs adjudged to be paid by Defendants, on the amount (£.752,543,) for which Judgment was obtained, was £.199,980, being an addition of 26.5 per cent. on the amount ordered to be paid. All the fees to Counsel and Attornies, as well as the allowances to witnesses, are included in the sum of £.199,980. Witnesses' expenses amount to about 10 per cent., and those of Counsel and Attornies to about 7 per cent. of the said sum. The remainder is composed of the Court and Officers' Fees, which amount re-appears, and is included in the columns, showing the separate amount of the Fees of each Officer and the produce of the General Fund Fee.

If there were not included in this sum the fees on Executions, and the fees for paying of monies in and out of Court on Judgments obtained prior to 1st January 1848, the Total Amount of Fees paid on the Plaints entered in the year would be nearly ascertainable It will be seen, however, that the Total Amount of the Fees (£.286,058) is equal to 21 per cent. on the Total Amount claimed, viz. £.1,346,802.

Of the sum of £.568,891 shown to have been paid into Court to the credit of suitors, about £.240,000 would be in satisfaction of Judgments made prior to 1st January 1848, for payment of the debts by instalments. The amount paid into the Suitors' Fund, therefore, is not dependent upon the business shown to have been done in the Return. In some cases, the order for the payment of a debt will extend over years.

Supposing that this sum of £.568,891 was paid into Court by 10s. instalments, and was paid out in similar sums; the number of Entries in the Clerks' cash-books and ledgers would exceed four millions, but there is reason to believe that 10s is too high an average for the payments into Court, though it may not be for the payments out.

The Total Amount of Fees received by the Clerks amounts to £.87,283, very nearly as much as the sum taken on account of the Judges' Fees. This arises from the number of Executions and payments into Court increasing with the age of the Court, which they will continue to do until the Judgments for payment of debts by instalments are satisfied in the same proportion as new and similar Judgments are made, which may be expected to be the case in about two years time should the business of the Courts continue the same. The fees upon Executions are receivable by the Clerks and Bailiffs, and those on payments into Court by the Clerks only.

The amount of Clerks' Fees, if divided by 491, the number of Courts, gives £.180 per Court; but it will be seen that there is a Court in Yorkshire in which the Gross Amount of Fees received by the Clerk in the year appears to have been only £.9. 4. 3., and another in Wales where the amount was only £.8. 10. There are many Courts, in which the Clerks' Fees do not exceed £.30 per annum, the amount of business in such Courts being of course trifling.

COMPENSATION to OFFICERS of abolished Courts of Request.

My Lords have before them the claims of the several persons mentioned in the accompanying statement, for compensation under the Act of the 9 & 10 Vict. c. 95, for the loss of their respective offices in the old Courts of Request, &c., which have been abolished by the establishment of the new County Courts, under the provisions of the said Act, and of Her Majesty's Orders in Council, dated the 10th March 1847, &c.

My Lords read the Act of the 9 & 10 Vict. c. 95, s. 38, which empowers them to award compensation either by a gross or yearly sum, as they shall think proper, to all officers attached to the courts mentioned in Schedule (A.) annexed to the Act, for any loss sustained by them in consequence of the operation of the said Act, provided the parties claimed such compensation within six months after the time when the alteration in the courts was made; and all the compensations so awarded are directed to be paid out of the Consolidated Fund of the United Kingdom.

The statute also authorizes the Lords of the Treasury to inquire in such manner as they shall think proper, what were the lawful fees and emoluments of each officer in the situation which he held in the old courts, and what were the special circumstances of each case. And as a Commission of Inquiry appointed under the Act of the 7 & 8 Vict. c. 96, did, in the year 1846, inquire fully into the legality and amount of the fees and emoluments of the several officers whose claims are now under consideration according to an average of years prior to August 1844, and whose reports are now before their Lordships, the Board are of opinion that they are warranted in acting, upon the present occasion, conformably with the suggestions of the said Commissioners.

In determining upon the claims in question, their Lordships advert to the Municipal Corporation Act, and to a Minute of this Board founded thereupon, in which it was decided that all claimants under that statute who held their offices upon such a tenure as to give them a just expectation that they would continue for life, should be allowed two-thirds of their net lawful fees and emoluments, by way of compensation for the loss of office

their net lawful fees and emoluments, by way of compensation for the loss of office.

Their Lordships also advert to the Act of the 8 & 9 Vict. c. 78, authorizing them to grant compensation to the clerks of petty sessions at Deptford and Clapham, whose offices were abolished by the establishment of police courts at Greenwich and Wandsworth; and as that Act empowered the Treasury to award such compensation as might be thought proper, the Board, upon that occasion, awarded to the claimants two-thirds of the net value of their offices for their lives, payable out of the Consolidated Fund.

Their Lordships also advert to the fact that in several cases where parties were in possession of offices which they had the right of executing by deputy, and were not called upon to perform any duties themselves, it has been decided by former Boards of Treasury that in such instances the whole net emoluments enjoyed by the holders should be awarded to them, inasmuch as they were not relieved from any labour or responsibility by the abolition of their offices, like other officers who were required to attend and perform certain duties in person.

Taking into consideration all the special circumstances of the cases now before their Lordships, and acting upon the principles which have been adopted in cases of a similar nature, they are opinion that the Board will be justified in awarding to the stewards of the Courts of Ecclesall, Pontefract, and Sheffield (Messrs. Maude, Hardy, and Parker), who were respectively entitled to execute their offices by deputy, the full net value of the income enjoyed by them, after deducting the amount paid to their deputies, and other expenses of the courts over which they presided; and with respect to the other claimaints who partially or wholly executed the duties of their respective offices, their Lordships are of opinion that it will be just to award to the said parties two third parts of the net income previously enjoyed by them.

My Lords therefore award the following annual sums to the claimants by way of compensation, the said allowances to commence from the 14th March 1847, except the officers of the Sheffield Court, and to continue until further directions, viz.

With reference to the case of Mr. Parker, the steward of the late Sheffield Court, the Chancellor of the Exchequer states to the Board, that although Mr. Parker is clearly entitled to receive the compensation allowance of 1,239 l. 4s. per annum awarded to him from the time of the abolition of his Court, in April 1847, yet that he has voluntarily offered to relinquish his right to such compensation, so long as he holds his present situation of one of the joint secretaries to the Board of Treasury.

My Lords fully appreciate the liberal conduct of Mr. Parker, in relinquishing for the public benefit the receipt of so large a sum whilst he retains his present important appointment in this department, particularly when it is considered that if the Court at Sheffield had not been abolished Mr. Parker would have continued to receive the fees of the office of Steward of that court, as he did prior to the month of April 1847, and that therefore he has submitted to a great sacrifice of his income in relief of the public funds of the country. Under these circumstances their Lordships are not at present required to make any charge upon the Consolidated Fund for Mr. Parker's compensation, but they will be most ready to do so whenever they shall be called upon for that purpose.

The accompanying statement will show the amount due to each claimant from the period of the abolition of their respective offices, down to the 30th June 1848, according to the annual sum awarded to each party as before mentioned; and my Lords desire that the necessary steps may be taken for charging upon the Consolidated Fund of the quarter ending the 5th July 1848, and for paying to the parties, the undermentioned sums, namely:

And their Lordships further desire that the necessary measures may be hereafter taken for charging the several annuities awarded to the parties before mentioned upon the Consolidated Fund quarterly; the first of such quarterly payments to be charged at the quarter ending the 10th October next, for the three months from 1st July to 30th September 1848.

Write to the several parties, apprizing them of the award which their Lordships have made in each case, and state that the amount due to the 30th June 1848 will be paid to them at once by the Paymaster of Civil Services at the Treasury, either upon personal application, or upon the production of a receipt (written upon properly stamped paper, and signed by the party), through the hands of a banker or other person in London.

State that the allowances will be hereafter paid to them quarterly, the first payment to be made soon after the 30th September next.

State further, that as the Act of the 9 & 10 Vict. c. 95, s. 38, has provided that the compensation in question shall cease or diminish, according to circumstances, if any of the parties shall be appointed to any public office or employment, their Lordships desire that in the event of any of the parties having been already appointed, or being hereafter appointed to any public office or employment in the new County Courts or otherwise, that the time when and the nature of such appointment should be immediately reported by them to this Board for the further consideration and direction of their Lordships.

Write to Mr. Parker, acquainting him with the award made in his case, and that, for the reasons before stated, my Lords have not at present made any order for such compensation being issued to him; but that they will be ready to do so whenever any circumstances may call for the exercise of such power at the hands of their Lordships.

MINUTE, 6 October 1848.

COMPENSATIONS to late OFFICERS of Abolished Courts of Request.

My Lords have before them the claims of the several persons mentioned in the accompanying statement, for compensation under the Act of the 9 & 10 Vict. c. 95, for the loss of their respective offices in the old Courts of Request, &c., which have been abolished by the establishment of the new County Courts, under the provisions of the said Act, and of Her Majesty's Orders in Council, dated the 9th March 1847, &c.

My Lords read the Act of the 9 & 10 Vict. c. 95, s. 38, which empowers them to award compensation, either by a gross or yearly sum, as they shall think proper, to all officers attached to the courts mentioned in Schedule (A.) annexed to the Act, for any loss sustained by them in consequence of the operation of the said Act, provided the parties claimed such compensation within six months after the time when the alteration in the courts was made; and all the compensations so awarded are directed to be paid out of the

Consolidated Fund of the United Kingdom.

The statute also authorizes the Lords of the Treasury to inquire, in such manner as they shall think proper, what were the lawful fees and emoluments of each officer in the situation which he held in the old courts, and what were the special circumstances of each case. And as a Commission of Inquiry, appointed under the Act of the 7 & 8 Vict. c. 96, did, in the year 1846, inquire fully into the legality and amount of the fees and emoluments of several of the officers whose claims are now under consideration, according to an average of years prior to August 1844, and whose Reports are now before their Lordships, the Board are of opinion that they are warranted in acting upon the present occasion conformably with the suggestions of the said Commissioners, as relates to the said officers; and with regard to those officers who did not claim compensation under 7 & 8 Vict. c. 96, and whose fees and emoluments were not consequently inquired into by the said Commissioners, their Lordships have caused to be ascertained the net amount of fees and emoluments enjoyed by such officers, according to the mode adopted by the said Commissioners. In determining upon the claims in question, their Lordships advert to their Minute of

the 4th July last, in which they awarded to the claimants therein mentioned, for compensation under 9 & 10 Vict. c. 95, two-thirds of the ascertained net value of their offices, for their lives, according to the principles which had been adopted by this Board in cases of a similar nature; and their Lordships are of opinion that as the circumstances of the cases now under consideration are identical with those of the cases to which compensation was awarded in the Minute referred to, that the Board will be justified in awarding to the several claimants two-third parts of the net income formerly enjoyed by them.

My Lords therefore award the following annual sums to the claimants, by way of compensation; the said allowances to commence from the 14th March 1847, and to continue

until further directions; viz.

MINUTE, 5 January 1849.

COMPENSATIONS to late OFFICERS of Abolished Courts of Requests.

My Lords have before them claims for compensation from the following persons, under the 38th section of the Act 9 & 10 Vict. c. 95, for the loss of their respective offices in the old courts of request, &c., which have been abolished by the establishment of the new county courts, under the provisions of the said Act, and by Her Majesty's Order in Council, dated the 9th March 1847, viz.:

Thurlow Groom, serjeant-at-mace in the late court of requests at Lynn.

Thomas Wilkinson Hill, assistant barrister to the commissioners of the late court of requests at Manchester.

William Garfield, clerk of the late court of requests at Wolverhampton.

Christopher Smith, bailiff of the late court of passage for the borough of Liver-pool.

My Lords advert to their Minute of the 4th July last, and to the subsequent one of the 6th October last, in which are laid down the principles upon which compensation was to be granted to persons similarly situated to the present claimants, and their Lordships consider that, in accordance with such principles, this Board will be justified in awarding to the present claimants, annuities equal to two-thirds of the net annual value of their respective offices.

As the value of the offices, for the loss of which compensation is now claimed, was not, with the exception of Mr. Hill's, ascertained by the Commissioners appointed under 7 & 8 Vict. c. 96, to inquire into the legality and amount of the fees of claimants for compensation under such Act, by reason of the persons then holding such offices not having so claimed, their Lordships have caused to be ascertained the net amount of fees and emoluments produced by the offices, according to the mode adopted by the said Commissioners, and which are set forth in the accompanying statement, together with the amount of compensation now due.

My Lords, therefore, award the following annual sums to the claimants, by way of compensation, the said allowances to commence from the 14th March 1847, and to continue until further directions, with the exception of the allowance to Mr. Christopher Smith, which is to commence from the 11th November last only.

ANSWERS by the Judges of the INNER House and Permanent Lords Ordinary, to Articles 5 and 6.

ANSWER to ARTICLE 5.

EACH Division of the Court sits 157 days in the year, in two continuous and unbroken sessions. The Divisions do not meet on Monday, that day being by statute exclusively appropriated to the sittings of the Court of Justiciary. No note or record has ever been kept of the number of hours on each day during which the Judges sit in Court, nor if kept would it be any test of the actual amount of judicial duty performed. As must happen in regard to the business of every court, the time actually occupied on successive days must necessarily vary from causes over which the Judges have no control. Cases turn out to be imperfectly prepared, new views are stated on which counsel wish to be further prepared, or a case which promised to extend to great length unexpectedly goes off, at least for the time, on some incidental or preliminary matter. During the year referred to in the Return, the sittings in both Divisions often extended till four o'clock; in the sittings of the First Division this very often happened, and that Division not unfrequently sat until five o'clock.

The principle on which the business of the Divisions (that is of the Inner House of the Court of Session) has always been distributed is this; viz. to put out in the paper for each day only such a number of cases as there is a reasonable prospect of finishing on each day; the advantages of this plan are great and most beneficial to the suitors, since it is thus known with certainty, for some time before, when certain cases are to come on, and counsel are instructed and prepared accordingly, while the parties themselves are, if they desire it, enabled to be present without inconvenience; much trouble and expense is thus saved to all concerned. It may, no doubt, occasionally happen, both that the cases put out may, even if all decided, last for a shorter time than was anticipated, and that some may go off either wholly by settlement or on some incidental point; but, on the whole, the advantages of having but a manageable number in each duy's roll are great, and the inconveniences of putting out a longer roll would soon lead to universal complaints; in fact, the wish to give despatch frequently leads to the rolls being made longer than is desirable, so that the postponement of cases, which is no doubt the cause of great inconvenience to the parties, becomes often necessary. This inconvenience is occasionally unavoidable, as it is impossible to foresee precisely the time which a case will occupy, for a case which appeared likely to be short, may unexpectedly give rise to very long and important arguments, and summary cases often come, in as to the stay of diligence, or applications for interdict, requiring despatch and entitled to precedence, which occupy much time, and thereby impede or wholly interrupt the progress of the ordinary business for the day; still, in both Divisions, the object is so to distribute the cases as to give a reasonable prospect of finishing the particular business allotted for that day; but, notwithstanding, it much oftener happens that the business allotted for the day turns out to be more than the Divisions can overtake, than that it is insufficient to occupy their time, although occasionally that must and does happen.

We are firmly persuaded that the principle on which the business is arranged is, on the

We are firmly persuaded that the principle on which the business is arranged is, on the whole, the most beneficial, and that any departure from it, with a view to fill up a spare hour or two on occasional days, would cause far greater evils than can be ascribed to the present system.

It is right that we should state, that a great deal of the proper judicial work of the Judges of the Court of Session, both of the Lords Ordinary and of the Divisions, is not performed in court, but is necessarily done at home; we do not here refer to the study of authorities, the examination of decisions, or the preparation of opinions, but to labour of a different kind, which occupies a great deal of time, and which must accompany and keep pace with the work in court, being devoted to the same causes. In the first place, various of the more important cases are still left for decision, substantially, on elaborate written arguments, in the form of cases or minutes of debate, which often extend to 30 or 40 printed pages on each side, to which, when the cause is called on for decision, the counsel frequently state that they have no addition to make, and, in fact, never require to be heard, except for a few supplemental or correctory observations; the Judges, accordingly, are always expected to make up their minds, and, generally, write out their opinions after studying these written arguments at home, and the time so occupied is therefore as truly employed in the discharge of their proper judicial functions, as if it had been spent in listening to the same arguments delivered orally in open court.

Then it is to be considered, that a large proportion of the cases in the Court of Session (very similar, we believe, to the cases in the Courts of Equity in England) must be decided on the respective statements and admissions of parties on the record, on the import of numerous titles and other deeds, or of long and voluminous correspondence, frequently, as printed for the Divisions (which is less expensive than making several manuscript copies for the Judges and Counsel), extending to 50, 60, or 100, or even 200 pages, and in some cases to a much greater number, all of which require to be carefully examined. The precise conclusions of the summons must be carefully considered and compared with the statements subsequently made, and the pleas at last urged; and the arguments of counsel in court are all directed to enable the court satisfactorily to go through this important work at home. This labour is often as onerous as it is anxious, and, in a great number of cases, the hours so

spent at home occupy much more time than the arguments in court.

It sometimes happens, also, that the cases which thus occupy a great deal of time at home, may not take up, and that unexpectedly, much time in court, for it not unfrequently occurs, that when there is a great mass of documents which must thus be carefully studied at home, or a voluminous proof taken in the inferior courts, and brought under our review on the written depositions of the witnesses, the counsel, after general and explanatory remarks, intended only to aid the Court in the study of the documents or proof, make a much shorter statement than had been anticipated, and request the Court to study the documents and proof with the aid of such explanations, calling on them again for argument only, if we should find that necessary. In all consistorial causes the proof is taken by the depositions of witnesses examined before certain Sheriffs appointed for that purpose, and such proofs are often of great length. If the practice were to read over in Court, to the Judges, all the evidence in the cause thought to be material, the time spent in court would be longer, but the actual business would be less, and, in our decided opinion, the causes less satisfactorily studied.

be less, and, in our decided opinion, the causes less satisfactorily studied.

The preceding statements apply generally, with equal force, to the business before the Lords Ordinary; and, without going into details, it may be proper to mention, that in the return of cases decided by them, there are not included interlocutory judgments upon points occurring in almost every cause, and requiring to be disposed of before the ultimate decision, which often give rise to very anxious and important discussions, and occupy a great deal of

time.

It is also to be remarked, that the Judges who are not members of the Court of Justiciary, also sit successively during the whole vacations, for the purpose of disposing of a great number of cases which come into the court in the forms of suspensions of diligence, interdicts or injunctions, and other summary matters, now including appeals in bankruptcy, processes of cessio, &c. One of these Judges is always sitting, and a large proportion of business is so disposed of. His decisions are liable to be reviewed on appeal to the Divisions, and a certain proportion of those cases invariably come before the Divisions. Two of those Judges, likewise, now discharge, for the period of a year successively, the whole functions of the former Barons of the Scotch Court of Exchequer, in which capacity they not only try by jury all revenue causes, but also decide all fiscal questions raised on motions or special verdicts, and hear all appeals from the Commissioners of Taxes, and perform a variety of functions in the Treasury department, and as Bailies of the Sovereign, in granting investitures in Crown holdings, and superintending the administration of the demesne lands, &c.

During the sessions of the Court of Session, the Criminal Court meets every Monday to dispose of the business that is ready for it under the charge of the Public Prosecutor; and the Court of Justiciary has also regular sittings for all the cases that are ready, both before the sessions begin, after the close of each, and during the short recess at Christmas, besides going two circuits in the year into the different districts of the country, and also holding a circuit at Glasgow in the Christmas recess.

The heads of the two Divisions have sittings for civil causes ready to be tried by jury, both before and at the close of each session, and also during the Christmas recess.

The number of civil causes tried before juries is, doubtless, small; but while we are aware that this form of disposing of causes is not popular in Scotland, it is right that we should admit that the number actually tried is no test of the actual good done by the introduction of trial by jury in civil causes. The cases in the Court of Session intended for jury trial are so fully prepared and disclosed by the records, and the preparation by the production and disclosure of documents, all of which must be produced before the trial, and are so fully considered in the preparation of the issues, that as surprise on the one hand is quite 90.

impracticable, so also the prospects of success in a fair and full trial are so well known on both sides, that very many cases are abandoned as untenable before they come to a trial, and many end in a fair and equitable arrangement. Thus it appears from the Return accompanying this answer, that of the whole cases set down for trial between the 20th July 1847 and the 20th July 1848, no fewer than 26 were settled, withdrawn or abandoned.

ANSWER to ARTICLE 6.

To the first head or branch of the 6th requisition, we have to answer, that the authority referred to was conferred by the Act 2 & 3 Vict. c. 36, and sect. 10. To the sequel of this

requisition, we answer as follows:

Though there is a considerable number of cases waiting their turn to be argued and decided in one Division of the Court, and before some of the Lords Ordinary, we have not thought it expedient to act on the powers confided to us by the statute in question; both because we consider the inconvenience thence arising not to be of any great present urgency, and to be almost sure to work its own cure in the course of no long time; and, chiefly, because we are persuaded that it would not be effectually remedied, but, on the contrary, very probably aggravated, and certainly prolonged, by such partial extension of the times of

sitting as is contemplated by the statute.

It is proper to state, as the basis and main ground of this opinion, that we are perfectly satisfied that the present periods of sitting would be quite sufficient for the despatch of the whole business of the Court, if that business were only more equally divided among the Judges; and that the arrears now existing in certain departments are entirely owing to the unequal distribution, occasioned by the casual preference of the suitors (or their solicitors), for one Judge or Division, rather than another. But this we conceive to be obviously, and, in its own nature, but a temporary and occasional evil; and not only likely, but certain to correct itself, as soon as the inconveniences of delay before the tribunals now in arrear are found to overbalance the inducements, whatever these may be, which led, in the first

instance, to their being so burdened.

It will always happen, we take it, that where there are two or more courts of co-ordinate jurisdiction, equally accessible to the suitors, some of them will, for a time, have a greater share of business than others, and will, consequently, have more remanets at the close of their ordinary terms of sitting. There may be some inconvenience in this, but it is an inconvenience inseparable from such a plurality of courts, and has an obvious tendency to remedy itself before it can become very formidable. We are not aware, accordingly, that it has ever been thought necessary to obviate it, by temporary prolongations of the sittings of the Courts most resorted to at the time; and there would be difficulties in applying such a remedy to the Court of Session, which might not occur in some other cases; for it is right always to bear in mind, that this Court, though now consisting of two separate Divisions, and of Five Lords Ordinary, is still, in many respects, but one judicial establishment, in which all the Judges are appointed as Judges of the Court of Session simply, in which the decrees of the Lords Ordinary are accordingly subject to review in either of the Divisions indiscriminately; and if not taken to review, have effect as decrees of the whole Court, in which the whole procedure is regulated by acts of sederunt, issued by all the Judges as one body, and in which, in particular, there never has been any separate bar attached to either of the Divisions, or to any of the Lords Ordinary, the limited number of advocates practising in the court, and the moderate amount of their emoluments, as well as the nature of their avocations, rendering any such arrangement palpably impracticable. But the obvious consequence of this is, that unless when the whole Court is in session, the necessary attendance of counsel can never be relied on,—a point as to which we can now speak with more confidence, from what has been observed as the result of the experiment introduced by the Act of the Queen, already referred to. By that Act it was enjoined on the whole Lords Ordinary to sit for the despatch of business from the 1st to the 12th day of November, and again from the 11th to the 20th day of March in every year, while the two Divisions of the Court were in vacation, and they have so sat ever since accordingly. But from the difficulty of obtaining the attendance of counsel, and other circumstances, the experiment, hitherto at least, has certainly not been attended with the benefit intended and anticipated. The greater part of the cases actually in arrear are those depending before two or three of the Lords Ordinary; and if it was found impossible to make any useful progress, even when the whole five were sitting (without the two Divisions), it would be evidently still more hopeless to look for any benefit from the separate sitting of only two or three of their number. The separate sitting of one Division indeed might, and probably would, command a somewhat better attendance; but still the amount of business done at any such sittings would, we are satisfied, be far less than would be accomplished in the same time, while the whole Court was in session.

But this is by no means the consideration which has chiefly weighed with us in declining to exercise the power conferred on us by the statute. We have been much more influenced by the conviction that its exercise was but little likely to diminish, even for a time, the evil complained of, and indeed might probably aggravate it, while it would certainly interfere most materially with that process of self-correction or adjustment, under the operation of which we are persuaded that it would speedily disappear.

The

The objection which at once occurs to the remedy now proposed is, that though some of the existing arrears would no doubt be got rid of in these additional sittings, they would infallibly generate a new set of arrears, by the extraordinary influx of new cases to which they would give occasion; it being plain to us, 1st, that if one Division of the Court were to sit for two months in the year more than the other, it would infallibly attract to itself a large share even of the ordinary business which now goes to that other. But, 2d, that, at all events, by far the greater part of the summary and routine business which is now divided between the two courts, would be brought almost exclusively into these additional sittings. This business, which is of very great extent, has, from its nature, a precedence over the ordinary business, at the same time that it can be conducted with far less preparation or exertion on the part of counsel than that which depends on argument and investigation of disputed facts, and is therefore frequently left in less experienced hands. Most cases of importance would therefore be allowed to stand over till the whole Court was again assembled, as the only time when the attendance of leading counsel could be relied on; while the partial and additional sittings of one Division would be mainly occupied by trifling and summary cases, crowded into them from all quarters; and the practical result would be, 1st that very little, if any, reduction of the existing arrears would be effected; and, 2d, that the inequality of the distribution between the two Divisions, which is the sole root and source

of the evil, would be very greatly and permanently increased.

The imminency, as well as the magnitude of these results, will be more apparent when the effects of the proposed change on the Bill Chamber jurisdiction are considered. This department of the Court of Session is the channel through which many of the cases originating in the inferior judicatures of the country must be brought under its review, and especially when so submitted in notes of suspension, and in this way supplies a considerable proportion of the whole causes of which it takes cognizance. It is at all times, therefore, of very great importance, but more especially when the Court itself is in vacation; for there is never any vacation in the Bill Chamber, which is open accordingly for the despatch of business de die in diem throughout the whole year; and it is expressly provided by statute, that while the rest of the Court is in vacation, the powers of the Judges officiating in this Chamber shall (though liable to ultimate review) be substantially co-extensive with those of the Court itself. Now, if we were to appoint additional sittings of one Division only, or even of one or more of the Lords Ordinary, it would immediately give rise to a question of some nicety, viz. whether these partial and extra sittings constituted a proper session of the Court, in the sense of the statutes referred to, or were to be considered as special proceedings in vacation, like the sittings for jury trials, after or before the ordinary terms? But however that point might be decided, the Bill Chamber must at any rate throw a great part of the cases that now pass from it more or less equally into both Divisions, exclusively into that which might happen to be thus sitting alone for the time; a very large part of these cases being of a summary nature, in the shape of interdicts or other proceedings for staying execution on previous decrees or registered obligations; while, if it should be determined (as we think most likely) that the Court was in session when one Division only was sitting, the whole of the disputed judgments in the Bill Chamber, which had been marked for that Division (and almost all would in this case be so marked) must be brought before the Division so sitting, since they would become final, if not taken to a Court of Review within the usual reclaiming days; thus affording a new proof that the additional sittings would be mostly occupied by additional cases; and that the distribution of cases among the Judges would be made much more unequal than it now is.

If that distribution were once equalized, however, we repeat that there would be no arrears anywhere, and therefore no need for any additional sittings; and we have already said that as soon as the pressure of any existing arrears is felt as a serious grievance to the suitors, they have the means, as well as the motives, for redressing it entirely in their own hands. Independently of their interference, however, it is obvious to us, that the evil is of a fluctuating and temporary nature, and sure, if not wholly to disappear, at least to shift its place of incidence, and so to baffle all peremptory or precise remedies in the common course of

events.

But if any interference with these natural correctives should, on longer experience, be found indispensable, it may then become matter for the consideration of the legislature, whether an authoritative equalization of the business of those tribunals should be established, in such a way as in its wisdom should appear most expedient.

Duties performed of Services rendered by the Clerk of the Patents relating to Letters Patent for Inventions.

THE Clerk of the Patents receives from the patentee or his agent the Privy Seal Bill; he procures the stamps and engrosses the patent from the Privy Seal Bill and examines the same therewith; he makes out a docquet on stamp for the Lord Chancellor, containing the name and address of the patentee, the title of the invention, the term of years granted, and the time for enrolment of the specification; he writes the Lord Chancellor's receipt on the Privy Seal Bill, and procures his Lordship's signature thereto, and files the same; he enters the name and address of the patentee, title of the invention, date, and time for enrolment of the specification, in a book kept in the office for the use of the public; he enters and files all disclaimers and memoranda of alterations, as directed by 5 & 6 W. 4, c. 83, in a book kept in the office for the use of the public; he enters and gives notice to the parties 5 & 6 W. 4, c. 83, in a book kept in the office for the use of the public; he enters and gives notice to the parties of caveats against letters patent for inventions being sealed, until the matter in dispute between the parties is decided on petition by the Lord Chancellor; he writes the Lord Chancellor's fiat on the petition, and procures his Lordship's signature thereto; he receives, files, enters, and makes office copies of all affidavits relating to such petitions, and attends the court on the petition coming on to be heard before the Lord Chancellor, and takes minutes of his Lordship's order, and draws up, passes, and enters the same; he receives and keeps an account of all the fees above stated, and pays over the same to the several parties entitled thereto, to the Consolidated Fund and Fee Fund of the Court of Chancery, on affidavit, verifying the account.

The increased and additional or extra fees in case of opposition at the Great Seal are of very small amount, and consist only of the charge for copies of evidence filed, and vary in each particular case.

After this office became a branch of the Public Record Office much of this business was withdrawn, on account of the facilities afforded to the public under the rules made on the establishment of the office to make their own copies.

The whole of the fees to the 1st July 1840 were received by the officer, and appropriated by him in payment of clerks' salaries and the incidental expenses of the office; some charges connected with the drawings made for the Roll and for attending after the office hours to receive specifications, previously to 1st July 1840, are not included, and no account can now be given of them. Since that date the messenger has received a small gratuity for attending after office hours to receive specifications, but has no account of them. Since the 1st July 1840, the whole amount of fees has been paid into the Bank of England to the account of the Consolidated Fund.

SCOTLAND.

Tire offices through which patents pass in Scotland, and where fees are payable, are-

I. The Lord Advocate's;

II. Chancery; and

III. The Great Seal.

The following are the returns from each of these departments; viz.

I. LORD ADVOCATE'S SECRETARY.

WHEN a petition for a patent for an invention is presented at the Home Office, a remit is made thereon to the Lord Advocate to examine the same, and to report what, in his opinion, may be properly done therein.

The petition, with the said remit thereon, and relative declaration by the petitioner, are thereafter lodged at the Lord Advocate's chambers, and a fee of 4 l. 4s. paid thereon; whereof 3 l. 3s. go to his Lordship, and 1 l. 1s. to his secretary.

The secretary thereupon enters the application in a book or roll kept for the purpose, in which are recorded the name and designation of the applicant, the description or title of the invention as given in the petition, and the name and designation of the solicitor for the petitioner. He then carefully examines the roll of caveats for twelve months back, to see what of these may possibly strike at the petitioner's invention; and he writes and dispatches notices to all parties whose caveats in any way resemble or may apply. These notices are often very numerous and require the utmost attention, for caveats are generally so ambiguously expressed as to make it matter of difficulty to discover what they embrace; and on the other hand, the "titles" given to the patents are frequently so very general in their nature as to lead to no small obscurity, and keep the true nature of the invention as much as possible in reserve.

Ten days are allowed to elapse after notice is given, and then, if there be no intimation of opposition, the petition, remit, and declaration are examined by the Lord Advocate, and if no objection appears, his secretary, by his directions, writes out his report, gets it signed, and transmits it to the petitioner's solicitor.

If opposition be entered, notice thereof is sent by the Lord Advocate's secretary to the petitioner's solicitor, and both parties are by him required to lodge (under seal) descriptions or specifications of their respective inventions, accompanied by models or drawings, or whatever else may be necessary to render the specifications intelligible. When these are lodged they are opened and submitted to the examination of the Lord Advocate, and if any difficulty occurs he calls the parties before him, and hears each party upon his own invention apart from the other party, by himself or his counsel and agent, or it may be by a man of science selected for the purpose. No communication is made to either party of what is specially proposed by the other. The petitioner is heard to explain his invention; the opponent is heard to explain the patent or invention on which he grounds his opposition. The Lord Advocate then reports either in favour or against the application for a patent. The respective specifications are again placed under seal, and filed for preservation in the Lord Advocate's office. Hearings very seldom become necessary, the specifications being, in general, sufficient to enable the Lord Advocate to decide.

For these latter proceedings, in the case of opposition, a fee of three guineas is payable by each party.

On Disclaimers,

A fee of four guineas is payable at the Lord Advocate's chambers, whereof three guineas to his Lordship and one guinea to his secretary. These very seldom occur.

On examining the petition and proposed disclaimer, the Lord Advocate orders notices to be given, by public advertisement and otherwise, in terms of the Act. When the order has been complied with and evidence to that purpose has been lodged with the Lord Advocate's secretary, the whole documents are examined, and if no opposition be made, the necessary certificates or docquets are written out and issued. If opposition be intimated, the matter undergoes investigation in the same way as in the case of an original application for a patent, and is disposed of as may appear right. No further fees are payable.

On Alterations of Title, or "Going over again."

When application to this effect is made the original proceedings are examined of new, the necessary entries and references made in the book of enrolments, caveats are again examined, and notices given as at first, and after all the preliminaries have been gone through, the Lord Advocate reports of new.

For this no additional fee has been charged by the Lord Advocate, but his secretary receives a fee of one guinea.

Application and Appropriation of the Fees.

All the fees drawn at the office of the Lord Advocate are applied and appropriated to his own and his secretary's uses.

It is to be observed that the fourth part of the aggregate amount received by the Queen's Remembrancer as one of the registrars is accounted for by him to the public, and no part thereof appropriated to himself.

The fees taken for the registry of deeds are 7s. for memorials of 500 words, and 6 d. for every one hundred words exceeding that number. In this sum of 7s. is included 1s. for administering the oath of the due execution of deed, and 1s. for the certificate endorsed thereon of its registration.

The scale of fees prescribed by the Act 7 Anne, c. 20, was altered, as the present registrars are informed, in the year 1768, but of the authority for such alteration they are ignorant, further than by the arrangement alluded to in the last return made from this office on the 18th of March 1840.

Such were the recognized fees when they respectively were appointed registrars, and the same by custom have been received since the year before referred to.

The duties required of the registrars are not generally performed in person, but by deputy, as the Act constituting the office provides for.
