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



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PIONEER

THOMAS KING FAMILY TREE BOOK

Believing that the majority of the King relatives would appreciate a record of the family from an early date (1813) to the present (1956), I have tried to complete the work in book form so it may be handed down to the future generations.

In making this book of Thomas King and descendants, I have tried to print everyone in rotation by age and family as their birth and marriage will permit.

Families not related to the Kings will be mentioned in order that you may get a better understanding of why some families are related to other families.

I find it interesting to give the birth and age of someone in each family and the date of some incident that occurred.

I have collected some statements of olden times and a few believe-it-or-not tales.

I want to thank all of the relatives for the information given to complete this book.

O-R-I-G-I-N

King is Anglo Saxon. It is derived from "Cyning" and has been shortened to "King."

THOMAS KING --- PIONEER

Thomas King and wife Nancy lived in what was known as Spartanburg or Pendleton District, South Carolina. About the time his oldest boy William was six years old, Thomas moved his family to a place in the wilderness. Later on, a town was started and named Springville, Alabama. Since William King's tombstone states he was born June 1813, died July 1899, they must have settled near Springville in 1819 or 1820. Thomas' sister, Rebecca, came with them and never married. Her tomb at the Truss Cemetery one mile south of Springville on Highway 11 states that she died over 100 years old. There is no history of anyone else coming with Thomas King.

Thomas and Nancy are buried about one mile south of Springville on Highway 11. The burial place is about 250 yards from the north side of the road in a small patch of bushes surrounded by a cultivated field (Warrick farm). Their graves are marked with a flat rock. The birth and death dates inscribed on the rock state Thomas King 1788-1861, Nancy King 1796-1868.

This cemetery is known as the Truss Graveyard. The last one to be buried there was about 1910. At that time there was a grove of large trees in the center of a large field. Now there is only a patch of saplings and small underbrush.

A few old-time tombstones are standing-several are lying down and broken. THOMAS KING'S stone or red rock slab is in the center of the 20-yard diameter bunch of bushes.

William stated that he remembered riding a pack horse part of the time on their journey to Springville, Alabama.

When Thomas settled near Springville, he and his neighbors had to keep their dogs and trusty rifles near at all times to protect them from the beasts and stray, savage Indians while working or playing.

Thomas bought, or inherited, a tract of land one mile southwest of Springville on the Birmingham 11 Highway. He built a log cabin home near a big spring that continues to furnish an abundant supply of water today in the same old, generous way it did over one hundred years ago.

The old home was sold about 1865 and was kept in living-in shape till about 1931 when it was torn down. Only the spring and an old cedar stump are left to mark the old home site.

Thomas and Nancy had eight children: William, Marion, Thomas, Reuben, James, Alfred, Nancy, and Bettie.

Soon after Thomas, James, Reuben and Alfred were grown and married, they decided to go West. They loaded their old covered wagons with their belongings-food, stock, feed, cooking pans, cows and dogs and guns. I couldn't get any account of the route they journeyed or anything that happened on the way. I do know they settled near Clarksville, Arkansas, as follows:

Thomas and Hannah King	1844
James and Margaret King	1844
Reuben and Margaret King	1850
Alfred and Nancy King	1850

One of Thomas King's daughters, Nancy, married Pleas Self and lived in a community now known as Margaret, Alabama, (a deserted coal mine). Pleas and family decided to move farther west, and the family spent the last night with Thomas King. There, while sharpening a stake for his wagon, Pleas almost cut his foot off, just before he left for the West.

When Pleas Self and family got up on their last morning at Thomas King's house near Springville, Alabama, they found that one of their girls, Leassie, had run away. They didn't try to find her and left her behind. She settled near Margaret, Alabama, mines and lived there till an old lady. Leassie had two boys.

Pleas and family settled near Clarksville, Arkansas about 1870. Russell King has an Arkansas King Family Tree book—a history of Pleas Self is found in that book.

Thomas King's four boys who married and went west (Thomas, Alfred, Reuben and James) married Hannah Patrick, Nancy Truss, Margaret Riggs and Margaret Paine respectively. I have not been able to find any of their relatives.

ARKANSAS KINGS

I will give a brief history of Thomas King's four boys and one girl who went West, and settled near Clarksville, Arkansas. The dates have already been mentioned.

The four King boys left their Springville home at the same time, travelling in covered wagons and carrying most of their eats and stock feed, camping equipment, cows and dogs and guns. The dogs and guns were used mostly for hunting game.


From a copy of the Arkansas King history book I find that they settled within a few miles of each other. A number of families by the name of Bean settled in the same community with the Kings, and there have been many marriages between the two families. It is estimated that there are about eight or nine hundred relatives of the Arkansas Kings.

MAKING GOOD

History shows that many of them are making good. Some are in business for themselves, others are holding good jobs. I find there are many successful farmers-many of them peach growers. There are a number of merchants, lawyers, doctors, preachers, sheriffs, teachers and barbers, several dairymen, and too many more good positions to mention here.

REUNIONS

The Arkansas Kings have a reunion once in a while. They had one in 1923. The next and most recent one in August 1936 was attended by about seven or eight hundred people.



ABOUT FIFTY YEARS PASSED

About forty or more years passed during which the Alabama and Arkansas Kings didn't write to each other. In 1927 a family of the Arkansas Kings were on a sight-seeing trip East. On their return home they came by Springville, Alabama, as they knew that was where their great-grandfather had lived. When they inquired about some Kings, they were told of Mattie Stephens in Springville and gave her a visit. Incidentally, George C. King was at the Stephens' house. Since that time there has been quite a bit of correspondence and some visiting.

In August, 1936, Guy King, his wife Leland, and daughter Freda Lee, and Luster King and wife attended our King Reunion near Springville. The Arkansas Kings' big reunion on August 16, 1936 was held near Clarksville at Lone Pine. There was a special platform built behind a church where the crowd was entertained most all the day with music, singing, and speakers. Guy and Leland King took a leading part in making the reunion a success. Relatives came from a number of states to the reunion.

Guy King in Arkansas has made quite an effort to locate someone in Anderson and Pendleton, South Carolina, who has some history of Thomas King. That was where Thomas lived before he settled near Springville. Guy contacted some Kings, but they could not give him any information leading to Thomas King.

ALABAMA KINGS

The King Reunions

About 1930 the older King men, James, George, Price, and Alfred, decided to start having a King Reunion in August each year. As the old Thomas King house had just been torn down, they decided to have the reunion at a big spring in a grove on the adjoining farm-once the Pete McClendon farm, now owned by a farmer named Warrick. The reunions were held there each year until 1937. From 1938 till 1954 they were held at East Lake Park in Birmingham. After 1954 the reunion place was changed to Camp Cosby at Clay, Alabama-the first one being held there on the first Sunday in August, 1955.

THOMAS KING

Thomas had two boys and one girl, William, Marion, and Betty, who remained at home or near Springville until death. All the other children went to Arkansas. The Kings in Clarksville, Arkansas, have a history book of the Kings who moved West.

MARION KING

Marion, the second child of Thomas, married Julia Cox near Ashville, Alabama, where Marion farmed. He had one boy named Tom who died with the fever about 1871 at the age of fifteen. Marion died about 1860. They are buried at the Truss Cemetery one mile south of Springville. Some say Julia's relatives are near Ashville.

Julia moved to Arkansas soon after her boy died, and we haven't any more history of her.

WILLIAM KING

William was the oldest child of Thomas King. It is said that he remembered very well their move to Springville when he was about six years old. William married Sabret Lawley near Odenville, Alabama. She had a near relative, Bill Lawley, near Odenville. William lived on Simmons Mountain near Springville, then at his daddy's farm a while. In a few years he bought a tract of land near Argo, Alabama, which later became the home of one of his boys, Price. Their children are Katherine, John, Lewis, Thomas, James, William (Bud), Frances, George, Wiley, Price, Alice, and Alfred. Two died in infancy.

KATHERINE KING

Katherine, the oldest child of William King, married Harvey Pearson, son of Harvey Pearson. Both of them farmed near Springville. Harvey owned a farm and their children are Mary E. (Mollie), Rose, Henry, Mattie, Jim, and Comillus Fue (Dick). Minnie died at the age of twelve. Harvey and Katherine are buried at Springville.

MARY ELIZABETH (MOLLIE) PEARSON

Mollie married Ben Sims, son of Thomas Sims of Trussville, Alabama. They lived in Birmingham most of their married life. Ben worked as an overseer at the County Alms Home in Birmingham for many years. He retired from work and lived to be over 90 years old. His home was in East End of Birmingham.

They have three children: Rosa Lee, Ercelle, and Paul.

ROSA LEE SIMS

Rosa married Ted Wolford, the son of Isac Wolford of Birmingham. Ted was a draftsman with the T.C.I. (steel mill) in Ensley. One child died in infancy. Rosa died about 1931.

ERCELLE SIMS

Ercelle worked in the probate judge's office in Birmingham for many years as a photograph or staff girl. She married a retired

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lawyer, Guilford Hanes and lives in Blunt Springs on Highway 31 North.

PAUL SIMS

Paul worked for the Cosby Hodges Feed Company in Birmingham for many years while single. He married Emily Ellen Poe of Anniston, Alabama. Paul was transferred to Montgomery, Alabama and promoted to Sales Manager for the same company.

They have three children: Paul, Jr., Robert, and a girl.

ROSE PEARSON

Rose married John Coker of Odenville, Alabama, and lived there until death. She had one girl, Mildred Coker. When her mother died, Mildred lived for a while with her mother's sister, Mattie Stephens. Later, John Coker married Carrie Rankin, a farmer's daughter, near St. Clair Springs. They have two boys, John and George.

MILDRED COKER

Mildred finished high school, took a business course and worked several years in the Farmers and Merchants Bank at Ashville, Alabama. She then married Kermit McCullough who works at Gadsden Steel Plant.

JOHN COKER

John, a farmer, married a school teacher. He was in World War II. John has two children.

GEORGE COKER

George married an orphan girl from Shoals Creek. He lives in Ashville, Alabama and works at the Sreel Plant in Gadsden.

HENRY PEARSON

Henry married Alma South, daughter of Austin South of Birmingham. Except for a few years when he ran a boarding house and a wagon and mule parking stable on Second Avenue and Twenty-fifth Street North in Birmingham, Henry farmed most of his life near Springville.

Their children are Katherine, Louise, Horace (who is adopted), Harold, Ralph, and James (deceased).

When Henry passed away, Alma continued to live on their farm north of Springville for a few years. She then made her home with Louise.

KATHERINE PEARSON

Katherine married William Goode of Mount Olive. They live near Mount Olive Church, north of Birmingham. Mr. Goode is a carpenter with the Dupont Powder Company at Watson, Alabama. They have one boy, Alfred Pearson Goode, age fifteen, who goes to Phillips High School in Birmingham.

LOUISE PEARSON

Louise married Andrew Cherry, son of Alexander Cherry of Dothan, Alabama. Andrew worked with the fire department of Birmingham till his retirement about 1945. Then they moved to Pensacola, Florida. He has a side line job as an auto salesman. They have one adopted boy, Jimmie.

JIMMIE CHERRY

Jimmie married Martha Lambert of Birmingham. He studied to be a commercial artist in college and holds a good paying job. Jimmie, about 31 years old, works and lives in New York City.

HORACE PEARSON

Horace married Beulah Collier of Roanoke, Alabama. He worked with the Alabama Power Company at Eufaula, Alabama, as a superintendent for a number of years, then moved to Virginia and did about the same kind of work there. He returned to Birmingham a few years back and is working in the Engineering Department with Alabama Power Company. They have two children, Patricia and Horace, Jr., who are in school.

HAROLD PEARSON

Harold left the farm early. He worked with the Seals Company in Birmingham for a number of years as a collector. He has been on the police force for many years now. He married Viola Berton of Adger near Bessemer, Alabama, and lives in East End of Birmingham. They have three children: Flouretta, Kathy, and Harold, Jr.

RALPH PEARSON

Ralph farmed for a while with his mother at Springville after his daddy died. At the present time he is working at Hayes Aircraft. He married Lucille Rebino of Ensley and lives in Ensley. They have two children, Carlon and baby.

PICKENS PEARSON

Pickens married Wilma Dyer, daughter of Mose Dyer, a railroad section foreman at Springville, Alabama. She is a sister to Edd Dyer of Springville. Pickens worked in the Pell City, Alabama, Bank until his health failed and he had to quit work altogether. He owned a home in Pell City and a good farm nearby. They have three children: Ralph, Edward, and Evelyn. Wilma died about 1930; Pickens died in December, 1938.

Ralph married several years ago and has some children. He has lived in New Orleans, Louisiana for many years and has a government job in the Engineering Department.

Edward married several years back and has children. He also works for the government in the Engineering Department at Arlington, Virginia.

EVELYN PEARSON

Evelyn married a Birmingham boy who worked for several years with the Brown Funeral Insurance Company in Birmingham. They moved to Fort Worth, Texas, where he worked in the same business. In a short while he accumulated some property. When he died (still a young man), he left his wife well off. Evelyn disposed of her property and got a job as secretary and treasurer of a club in Fort Worth.

JIM PEARSON

Jim spent several years out in the West looking for a fortune. About 1915 he came back to Springville. Just before becoming an old bachelor he married a home town girl, but soon separated. Then he married Mrs. Mae McCrory near Ashville, Alabama. They had one girl. He farmed near Ashville until death or sometime in the Thirties.

MATTIE PEARSON

Mattie (Mat) married Dick Stephens, son of Richard Stephens of South Alabama. Dick farmed near Springville all of his life. He died about 1928 at the age of 63. Mattie continued to live in Springville until she became an invalid in 1956. Now she is in a nursing home near Gadsden. Mattie has been a lively, spry person all the years back. She is about 82 years old. She has in her possession a number of pictures of old timers and places—some are about 100 years old. There are small tintypes and the large ones that hang on the wall. They have five children: Virginia, Henry, Ione (deceased at age thirty), Flora and John Emery.

VIRGINIA STEPHENS

Virginia married Joe W. Light and their home is in St. Elmo, Tennessee. Joe worked most of his life with the Combustion Engine Company in Chattanooga, Tennessee. The last several years there he was assistant manager (vice president). He served in World War I. Joe, of the Baptist faith, died in 1953. They have three children: Joe W., Jr., Mary Linda, and Charles.

JOE LIGHT

Joe spent quite a hitch in World War II. He met a service girl and married her while still in the Marines. Joe finished college and lives in Red Lands, California.

MARY LINDA LIGHT

Mary Linda finished high school and began working with GMAC in Chattanooga, Tennessee. She married Herb Wilson of Chattanooga. He served in World War II and now works with Combustion Engine Company in Chattanooga, Tennessee.

CHARLES PATRICK LIGHT

Charles married a girl in his home town. Their two children are Ginnie and Pat. They are Baptist.

HENRY STEPHENS

Henry married Christine White, daughter of Porter White, a farmer near Beaver Valley, Ashville, Alabama (RFD *1). They have three children: Richard Lamar, Betty Faye, and John Henry.

RICHARD LAMAR STEPHENS

Lamar married a Sebring, Florida girl and has one child. He was in service during World War II.

BETTY FAYE STEPHENS

Betty Faye married David Green of Sebring, Florida. She worked while he was in service during the last war. They have one child, David.

IONE STEPHENS

Ione remained single and continued to live with her mother until death. She was in her early thirties when she died.

FLORA STEPHENS

Flora married Hunter Brooks near Springville, Alabama. Hunter farmed many years and as time rocked along he became a full time public workman. He has been with Hayes Aircraft in Birmingham for several years. They live in Springville near the railroad depot.

Hunter Brooks was in World War I. Their children are James B. and Frank W. They attend the Baptist Church.

JAMES B. BROOKS

James married Ruby Simmons of Springville. He served in the Navy as a First Electrician. James works for Allis Chalmers in Gadsden, Alabama. Their children are Lynda F. and Marilyn Debborah.

FRANK W. BROOKS

Frank married Shirley Lowery of Trussville, Alabama. He finished high school and is employed at Allis Chalmers in Gadsden, Alabama.

JOHN EMERY STEPHENS

John the youngest child of Mattie Stephens is now about 41 years old. John married Mabel Sizemore of Keener, Alabama, but in a very few years she passed away. He then married Alene Bradford, Pil Bradford's daughter of Altona, Alabama. Alene finished college and taught school for a while. They have a boy, Larry, and live at Altona, Alabama.

COMILLUS FUE PEARSON (Wild Dick)

Dick, or C. F., is the youngest child of Katherine Pearson. He is 76 years old or better. Dick continued to live in his mother's old home and "batch." for many years after her death. He then made his home with his sister, Mattie Stephens. Dick gave the fair sex the run-around and never married.

Dick holds the record of doing the least visiting and the least mixing with people of the surrounding country. Back about 1902 a cousin of Dick's visited him on a Saturday, riding a mule. After dinner the cousin asked Dick to go home with him. To his surprise, Dick dressed, got on a mule, and off they went. The trip was about five miles and all was going well till they got about half way there. All of a sudden, Dick pulled up on the bridle rein straps, said, "I am going back home," turned around, and giving the mule a rap, back home on a trot he went...that is about the extent of Dick's visiting.

MINNIE PEARSON

Minnie's name was not mentioned in Katherine Pearson's children. She lived to be about twelve years old.

JOHN AND LEWIS KING

John and Lewis were called to the Civil War. One of them soon died and the other one wrote home for a while. Soon he failed to write, and they were not heard of again. They were about thirty years old.

THOMAS J. KING (TOM)

Tom, born in 1842, is next after Katherine. He married Molley Presley, daughter of Bill Presley. Molley was a sister to Margaret Elizabeth (Sis) Melton and Squire Bud Presley. She was raised near Fair Field School, which was abandoned in the early Twenties.

Tom, who was a lifetime farmer, owned a farm next to his daddy's old farm.

Tom had a byword which was, "Pshaw," this, that and etc., with a lot of remarks he made.

Their children are: Lee Ander, Jim Alice, Minnie, Easter, Ira, William (Billy), and Presley (Pres).

Lee married Zannah Hall, the daughter of Slyvester Hall, near Springville, Alabama. She was a sister to Rev. John and Hugh Hall.

When Lee Ander married he bought his daddy's old log home near a spring which has never been dry. His daddy had just built a new house on another part of his land. Lee Ander lived there all his life.

His travelling history shows that he never was over fifty miles away from home-or Argo, Alabama. Lee Ander was a spry, lively man all his life. His witty remarks at gatherings brought out many a hearty laugh. There are a few pictures of him among the relatives, taken the last two or three years of his life.

Their children are Bertie, Artie, Ernest, Hugh, Nettie, Tom, and Irene. One baby is dead.

Zannah died about 1909 or 1910, and Lee married Annie Bowerman. Her father, whose name was Benton was a farmer on Blount Mountain, near Oneonta, Alabama.

Their children are Price, Stella, Lucille, Elizabeth, Ida, John, and Carry. One baby is dead. So, Lee Ander was blessed with 16 children.

He was born in 1869, and passed away in 1951, nearly 83 years old.

BERTIE KING

Bertie was born about 1894 and married Charlie Newman of Argo, Alabama, son of Bud Newman, a farmer. Charlie did some farming soon after he married. He has been working at Ensley Steel Mill for many years now, and lives in Ensley.

They have four children: Virginia, Ralph, Robert, and Donald.

VIRGINIA NEWMAN

Virginia married W. D. Betts of Eclectic, a small town near Wetumpka, Alabama, about 1949. They have two children-one girl and a boy, Fred Eugene.

Betts works for Tennessee Coal & Iron Company in Ensley, Alabama, and lives in Ensley.

RALPH NEWMAN

Ralph married Mary C. Hayes. They have one girl, Belitta. Ralph served in the Navy during World War II, and now works with Bell Telephone Company. They live in Ensley.

ROBERT NEWMAN

Robert is serving a hitch in the Army overseas, 1955-1956.

DONALD NEWMAN

Donald is studying Engineering as a co-op student at Auburn. His co-op job, which pays his way through college is at Oak Ridge, Tennessee.

ARTIE KING

Artie, the second child of Lee Ander, was born in 1896, in the good old horse and wagon days-even a few ox wagons remained. Artie left the farm early in life and worked a while in Birmingham. She married James Brown, son of Nicolas Brown of Ashland, Mississippi. James began early in life to work with T.C.I. in Ensley, and worked until he became 65 years old. He retired the first of 1955. They live near Fairview in Birmingham.

Their children are James, Jr., Frances, and Harold.

JAMES BROWN

James is about 34 years old. He married Mary Louise Satterfield of Birmingham. They had one child, Jane Marie. They are divorced. James married Ethel Ash of Irondale, Alabama, and has one child, Linda. He lives in Irondale and works at the tin mill in Fairfield.

FRANCES BROWN

Frances married Pervy W. Matthews of Birmingham and lives in Midfield on the Birmingham-Bessemer Super Highway. He works with Blue Cross Insurance Company in Birmingham. They have a threeyear old child, Jerry.

HAROLD BROWN

Harold married Martha Joe Fortner of Birmingham and they live in Roebuck. He worked on the police force in the city a while and quit there the last of 1955.

They have one boy, Harold, Jr.

ERNEST KING

Ernest left the farm early in life and picked up a few jobs here and there. Finally, he dug coal for a year or so, then joined the Army and served part of the time in France during World War I. After that hitch he continued to dig coal at Margaret Mines, Alabama, which have been closed down for about 20 years now.

While he worked at Margaret he married Maggie Mize, the daughter of Sam Mize of Odenville, Alabama. They married soon after he got out of service. He later dug coal near Bessemer. In 1925 he got a job with the Birmingham Electric Company as a motorman. About 1927 he got on the City Fire Department, worked there several years, but was pensioned off the job because of his health. As time rocked along, he picked up carpenter work on the side and soon became a house building contractor.

Ernest had a fatal heart attack in December, 1951, at the age of 52. His burial place is in Elmwood Cemetery in Birmingham. The family attends the Seventh Day Adventist Church in West End.

Their children are Jewel and Ernestine.

Maggie owns and lives in an apartment house on Third Avenue and Tenth Street West in Birmingham.

JEWEL KING

Jewel married James Dodson of Birmingham. They were divorced, and she married Jessie J. Fulgham of Birmingham. They live in the West Side of the city. He is an inspector at the Hayes Aircraft Corp.

Their children are Franklin E. and Fredrick-about 7 and 8 years old.

ERNESTINE KING

Ernestine finished school at West End High about the end of World War II. She married Fred Buck, a lieutenant in the Air Corps from Davenport, New York. He was in service about four years. Soon after being discharged he began working with Ernestine's father. Fred made a go as a builder, and is now a contractor for himself. They own a home in the West Side of Birmingham.

Ernestine has been working with the Hayes Aircraft for several years as a stenographer.

HUGH KING

Hugh left the farm early and worked in the steel mill at Ensley. Later he got a job with the Street Car Company in Birmingham as a conductor. He quit that job about 1929 and got on the Birmingham police force. He has worked long enough to retire on the city plan, but prefers to continue working a few years extra. Hugh is well known as JOHN HENRY KING among the street car men, city firemen, and especially the policemen.

Hugh married Daisy Motley, daughter of R. W. Motley, a farmer of Prattville, Alabama, about 1927.

Their children are Milton and Elsie Faye. Hugh owns a home in the West Side of Birmingham. He and his family attend the Seventh Day Adventist Church in West End.

Hugh is the first King to be a policeman.

MILTON KING

Milton finished high school in Ensley, and soon got a job with International Harvester Company of Birmingham, in the office. While working he took a business course and is now doing clerical work with the same company. Milton served two years in the Army under the peace-time draft.

He is about 27 years old and lives with his parents.

ELSIE FAYE KING

Elsie Faye finished Ensley High School and is now a stenographer at the Board of Education in Birmingham. She lives with her parents.

NETTIE KING

Nettie finished Fairfield high school in a community known as Dippersville on Highway 11, three miles northeast of the Argo Railroad Station. She married Lloyd Littlejohn, son of Charlie Littlejohn of Lawley, Alabama. Floyd has been driving a gasoline truck for the Woco Pep or Pure Oil Company ever since they married. Janitte took up the hobby of riding a motorcycle. History shows she is the only motorcycle riding girl of the Kings' relatives. She rode the motorcycle to work each day and on many pleasure trips. One morning on her way to work she had an accident and was almost killed. She stayed in the T.C.I. Hospital for many weeks. Janitte recovered all right and continued to work.

She married Melvin Fultz of Mississippi in 1950. He is a road machine machinist. They live in Birmingham.

ZONA MAE LITTLEJOHN

Zona married Willie C. Walker of Birmingham in 1952. Willie was injured while serving his country in World War II and is a disabled veteran. Zona Mae is a window decorator at Woolworth's Ten Cent Store in Birmingham. They live in the city.

TOM KING

Tom left the farm while a young lad and picked up a few odd jobs. He worked for the movies in Birmingham and elsewhere. About 1934 he began working for the Street Car Company in Birmingham as a conductor.

Tom married Gladys Quattlebaum, daughter of Thad W. Quattlebaum of West End in Birmingham, about 1928. They have one child, Tommy, Jr. Tom passed away with a heart attack in 1938. Gladys and Tommy lived with her parents till she passed away in 1947.

TOMMY KING

Tommy continued to live with his grandparents. When he finished school he began to work for the city on the police force.

After serving a hitch in the Navy, he married Dale Caldwell of Birmingham. Their children are Thomas and Dawn. They live in West End Highlands.

Tom is the number two policeman in this line of relatives.

IRENE KING

Irene married Clyde Fortenbery of Irondale, Alabama. Clyde worked at the Munger Gin Company in Birmingham for several years. Then he began to work at the Anderson Brass Foundry in East Birmingham and has been there for several years.

They own a home in Inglenook and have three children: June Carnice, Curtis, and Linda.

JUNE CARNICE FORTENBERY

June is 20 years old and was married to John C. Hobbie of Hartsville, Alabama, in 1955. John has just finished high school and is subject to being drafted in the Army any time. They are now living in Hartsville, Alabama.

Curtis and Linda are going to school.

Next will be the children of ANNIE and LEE ANDER KING, or, the second marriage of Lee Ander.

PRICE KING

Price was born in 1911 and raised on the farm. He has never done any public work. He married Doc Simmons' daughter, Grace, a farm girl of Claytons-Cole. Price rented farms for a few years after he married until he bought a good one near Vincent, Alabama. He has made a wonderful success farming. Price started out with a plow and mule; now he does the work with a tractor and machines. So, Price is the only late model farmer among the Kings who depends on farming alone.

He has four children: Harold, Bernice, Joyce, and Floye.

HAROLD KING

Harold finished high school at Vincent, Alabama, and married Mattie Lue Sanford about 1951. He lives in Orlando, Florida and works in a cafe.

They have two children.

BERNICE KING

Bernice married Jessie Mae Jemerson of Vinson, Alabama. He is farming with his father.

JOYCE KING

Joyce married Marvin Brasher of Westover, Alabama. He works in Birmingham as a carpenter, and they live near Westover.

STELLA KING

Stella quit the farm while quite a young girl and worked in the city until she was just about old enough to qualify as an old maida few years under 40. She married Mr. Chirichigno, a bakery man of Denver, Colorado, and they live there.

LUCILLE KING

Lucille married a widower, Sims Lovejoy of Centerville, Alabama, in 1942. He had one child Lyman A., and since they married they have one child, David L.

Sims was a machinist at Stockham Pipe, but quit about 1951 to become manager of Camp Cosby at Clay, Alabama. They live in a house on the camp grounds.

ELIZABETH KING

Elizabeth married Ewell Gill, the son of Charlie Gill, a farmer near Springville, Alabama, about 1937. He did some farming after

They have one boy.

John joined the Navy before the attack on Pearl Harbor in 1941. The ship he was on was bombed and sunk. Many were killed around him. Although he was in several battles, he came out without a scratch. The only injury he got during the war was when he missed a step, tripped, fell and broke his arm on the ship. A short time later he was discharged from the service. He began working at Sears in Birmingham as a refrigerator repair man. About 1950 he married Sara D. Handy of Dadeville, Alabama. They live in the Southwest side of Birmingham.

Minnie was born about 1874. At the age of 21 she married Walter Weems, age 22, the son of Jim Weems, a farmer of Clay, Alabama. Walter has owned a farm adjoining the Tom King farm ever since he and Minnie married. They have been married 61 years and are 82 years old.

Their married life has been wonderful-their cup of joy has ever been overflowing. They were blessed with four children. One child died before he was grown.

It so happens now, that they have more birthdays stacked up than any of the rest of the living relatives. Walter and Minnie have lived all their life around their farm, except for a year or two. During that time, in the Thirties, they made a trip to California and Oregon, and worked in restaurants.

Their children are Essie Mae, Lester (deceased), Grady, and Aubry.

ESSIE MAE WEEMS

Essie was born in 1898 and married James Poe of Leeds, Alabama, when she was about seventeen years old. They have lived on the farm James owns, near Leeds, ever since they married. He farmed and worked in an auto garage in Leeds for many years. He has been working at the Munger Gin Works Company in Birmingham for several years.

They have six children: Leon, Marcella, Donald, Harrel, Tommy, and Charles.

LEON POE

Leon married Nellie Maudine Taylor, Jackie Taylor's daughter. He is a railroad man, and their home is in the West Side of Birmingham.

They have four children: Patricia Ann, age 15; Linda Leona, age 12; Essie Carol, age 10; and Margaret.

MARCELLA POE

Marcella married Woodrow W. Reeves, Henry and Elsie Reeves' son. They live in the West Side of Birmingham. He is a steel inspector at the Steel Mill in Fairfield.

They have two children: Judith Annette, age 11; and Gloria Gale, age 15.

DONALD G. POE

Donald married Agnes Low Shook, Charlie and Nellie Shook's daughter. They live at Concord near Bessemer. He is a maintenance man at Conoco Oil Company.

Their two children are Peggy Lynn, age 5, and Donna Lou, age 3. Donald spent two years in service during World War II, part of the time in India and Burma.

HAROLD W. POE

Harold married Martha Louise Scott, daughter of Maurice and Ruby Scott of Leeds, Alabama. They live in the West Side of Birmingham. He spent two years in the Navy during World War II, and is now a machinist.

Their two children are Harold W., age 7, and James Preston, age 5.

Eugene finished high school and then college at Berry College in Rome, Georgia. He and his wife teach school. They live in Raburn Gap, Georgia.

They have a boy, Timothy Ray.

Grady was born and jerked up, or raised, on the farm. He was born too late to serve in World War I, and too early to be in World War II...a lucky guy. While a young lad he made a trip in the far West, to make that his home, and feast on the flowers and sunshine and opportunities. He soon got homesick for good old Argo, Alabama and returned home to live among his loved ones and friends. Grady has always lived on the farm. He married Martha Stout of Cookville, Tennessee. Soon after, he built a house near his father's home, and has lived in it ever since.

Their children are Joann, Dalton, Sue, Bobby Cantrel, age 17, and Michael Grady, age 3.

JOANN WEEMS

Joann married Riley S. Key, of Argo. He drives a highway freight truck all over the states, and is seldom at their home at Springville, Alabama.

Their two children are Charlotte Ann, and James Samuel.

SUE WEEMS

Sue married Charles Crandall, a lawyer, and the son of Huston Crandall, of Springville, Alabama.

They have one child, Robin Sue.

DALTON WEEMS

Dalton finished high school and attended Jacksonville State Teachers College for about two years, then served in the Army for a while. He is about 20 years old.

BOBBY CANTREL WEEMS (SHUG)

Bobby is still living with his parents.

MICHAEL GRADY WEEMS

Michael was born in 1953. He is 14 years younger than Shug.

AUBRY WEEMS

Aubry was born and raised on the farm, and has lived there all his life. He went out West while a young lad, looking for a place to get rich fast. Soon he got homesick for good old Argo, Alabama, and returned. In the meantime, he married Estelle Reed, daughter of Marcus Reed, of Argo. Aubry bought a farm and made a great success farming. In fact, he made one of the most outstanding farmers in the community. During the war, Aubry worked a lot at public work as well as farming. For the last few years he has been doing the same.

Their children are Marie, Patricia (Patsy), Marcus, Emma Lou, and Audry Lee (Sis).

MARIE WEEMS

Marie married George Palmer, a widower of Ashville, Alabama, who had one child, Shirley Ann. Now, they have one child, Mary Debra.

They live in Gadsden, Alabama, where he is a shipping clerk for Republic Steel.

PATRICIA WEEMS (PATSY OR PAT)

Pat finished high school at Trussville, Alabama. She made the most outstanding farm hand. For a girl she was an expert when it came to plowing with a tractor-she could handle a truck with the greatest of ease. She grew up with a wonderful personality. Her witty remarks brought out many a hearty laugh.

Pat went into nurse's training in a clinic at Leeds, for Dr. Clifton Clayton, a close relative. In a few years she married Charles Pierce, of Leeds, and soon quit nursing. He spent two years in college and two years in military service during World War II. He is a draftsman, and they are now living in Tuscaloosa.

They have one boy, John William, age 1.

EMMA LOU WEEMS

Emma, who was quite a farm girl too, finished high school at Trussville. She married Lester Earl Frazier, of Ashville, Alabama, and they live near Aubry. Lester served four years in the Air Corps during World War II. He graduated from the University of Alabama, and is a bookkeeper in Gadsden.

Their children are Sharon and Jennie.

MARCUS WEEMS

Marcus joined the Army before finishing school, and was stationed in Germany for quite a while. He finished the hitch in the Army in 1955. Marcus lives with his parents, and works away from home.

AUDRY LEE (SIS)

Audry was born in 1939. Her twin died at birth. Sis is going to high school.

EASTER KING

Easter was born about 1874. She married Warren Melton, son of Tom Melton, of Argo, and a brother to Guss and Comillus (Mill) Melton. Warren farmed a few years at Argo after they married. He moved to East Lake and worked for the City of Birmingham for several years, quit the city and got a job with the Street Car Company as a track foreman. He held that job a long while, until the street cars were replaced with transit buses. He then picked up odd jobs. Warren started out in life without anything. He worked and managed so well that he owned a nice home and some city and country property.

Easter passed away in May, 1942, and Warren passed away about 1950.

Their children are Emmitt, Clyde, Alma, Ruby, Hollin, and Lois.

EMMITT MELTON (RED)

Emmitt finished high school and married Susie Womack, daughter of Thomas Womack, of Ensley. Emmitt began to work for the Alabama Power Company while a young lad and has been there ever since. He is a foreman or superintendent now. He has lived at Tallassee, Alabama, for many years. Since he has red hair, he is well known about Tallassee as "Red" Melton.

There are seven children: Carlton, Robert Earl, Thomas, William, Horace, Nora, and Peggy Sue. Emmitt's wife passed away March, 1956.

CARLTON MELTON

Carlton was born about 1922. When he married, back in the early Forties, he lived in Tallassee, Alabama, and had one girl, Martha Sue. A few years later, he was fatally wounded in an auto accident. His widow remarried.

ROBERT EARL MELTON

Robert Earl married a girl in Oregon and has 3 children. He is employed by the State Patrol in Klamath Falls, Oregon, and lives in the same city.

THOMAS MELTON

Thomas is married and has four children. He lives in Gulfport, Mississippi, and works for Alabama Power Company.

WILLIAM MELTON

William is making a career in the Navy as a doctor. He is married and has three children. Their home is at Long Beach, California.

HORACE MELTON

Horace is single and works for the Southern Bell Telephone Company as a lineman.

NORA MELTON

Nora is about 25 years old. She married Leighton Beers, a law student who will finish his work in the middle of 1956. They live in Tuscaloosa, Alabama.

PEGGY SUE MELTON

Peggy, born in 1935, married Boyd Hornsby of Tallassee, and lives in the house with her father.

CLYDE MELTON

Clyde married Mrs. Eva Patton, daughter of John. Eva had one child, Betty Lane Patton, when she and Clyde married. Clyde worked for the Alabama Power Company at Tallassee for several years, then returned to Birmingham, and lives in the East End of the city. He worked at Smith Steel Works, then for the Street Car Company in Birmingham, as a welder. For several years he has been working in the Steel Mill at Ensley as a welder foreman. Clyde has stacked up 55 birthdays to his credit.

Clyde and Eva have two children of their own: Dorice and Nancy.

BETTY LANE PATTON (Stepdaughter)

Betty married Lou Baldine. They are separated, and she lives in New York.

DORICE MELTON

Dorice, 30 years old, married Mack G. Brownie, who works in the Construction Department of Alabama Power Company. He inspects the jobs and covers most of the state. They live with her parents.

NANCY MELTON

Nancy, the youngest child, married Milton Howton, who is a salesman for a food and spice company in Houston, where they live.

ALMA MELTON

Alma married Horace King, son of Elias King of Collinsville, near Gadsden. Horace hails from another tribe of Kings. They have a nice home in East Lake (South). Horace, like most of the Kings, doesn't like hard work. So, while a young man, he made a bookkeeper out of himself and has worked in an office where there is no work. Alma works with the Overton Johnson Insurance Company.

LOIS MELTON

Lois married N. Cecil Bishop of Center, Alabama. Cecil is a carpenter foreman. They separated about 1940. Lois married Junior Carson of Detroit, Michigan, and they live there.

HOLLIN MELTON

After Hollin finished school, he picked up a few jobs here and there. He was manager of a Hill's Store for a few years. He married Ruth Crow, daughter of Charlie Crow, in Woodlawn. They had one child, William Eugene.

Hollin and Ruth separated about 1940. She married Marvin Cook in May, 1941. About three days after the wedding, Hollin visited Ruth at her home. When they met in the hall he shot and killed her, then shot and killed himself. The boy Eugene was raised and schooled by his grandfather Crow. Eugene is about 18 or 19 years old.

RUBY MELTON

Ruby married Frank Jones of Birmingham. He works with the Armour Packing Company in Birmingham. They separated before 1936, and she married W. Edwin Day. They live in East Lake and have a boy and a girl.

WILLIAM KING (BILLY)

Billy was born back in the horse and buggy days about 1887. He got his schooling in a small frame school house known as Fairfield School, in the days when there were no report cards to grade the pupils. There was no steam or hot air to warm the school housejust a big belly heater fired with pine knots or coal. Billy left the farm early in life, headed for the bright lights in the city. He worked for the City of Birmingham for several years, then quit and got a job with the Southern Express Company as an express truck driver. The company changed its name to Railway Express about 1940.

He was a proud owner of a motorcycle back in 1914 and 1915. Billy is past sixty-five years old and still working on his retired time.

He married Era Willett, daughter of Linn Willett of Argo, in 1918. He owns a home on 83rd Street in East Lake which he bought soon after he married. He also owns his father's old farm or home.

They have one child, Lillie Mae.

LILLIE MAE KING

Lillie finished school and began to work in the office with Roy Bridges Company (auto sales and service in South Side). She held that job for several years, quit and married J. Rogers in 1940. They lived in Atlanta, Georgia, where he was employed until his death in October, 1953.

Their child, Virginia, is seven years old. Lillie is making her home with her parents and working in the office with Mayer Electric Supply Company in Birmingham.

PRESLEY KING (PRESS)

Press was named after his mother's surname. He continued to farm with his parents until they passed away. Then he batched and rented the old home, but still lived there.

After his father died, he quit giving the fair sex the run-around. Just about the time he qualified as an old bachelor, he married Lucy Ware, the daughter of Dale Ware, of Clay Community. They lived together only a short while. During World War II Press worked quite a while in the city, in restaurants and hotel cafes. For the last several years he has been farming a little and taking care of the old home which belongs to his brother Billy. Press has seen about 74 birthdays.

IRA KING

Ira was born in 1880. He went to Birmingham while a young lad, and secured a job. Since smallpox was raging for a time then, and was such a deadly disease, he was vaccinated for it. In the meantime, he took smallpox, which was fatal to him at the age of 20.

Two men in the community, who had had smallpox, Tom Helton and John Wade, made the trip to Birmingham and got the body in a onehorse wagon. They arrived with the body just about dark at the Argo Church-too late to bury him. They decided not to carry the body to anyone's house for fear of spreading smallpox. So, they parked the wagon under a big tree near the church and left the body there for the night, where no one would bother it. Wade and Helton put the body in the grave the next morning and covered it partly. Some of the few men who stood off at a distance came to help finish filling the grave.

TOM KING AND FAMILY ATTENDED THE ARGO PRESBYTERIAN (ROCK CHURCH), AND THAT IS THEIR BURIAL PLACE.

JAMES KING (JIM)

Jim, the fifth child of William King, was born in 1849. About the time Jim was 22 years old, John Pierce moved to Arkansas, by wagon, and Jim went with them to see the Kings, who had moved out there a few years before. He was gone a number of months, and returned home on a mule. (History shows that there was no visiting between the Arkansas and Alabama Kings from about 1872 till 1927 and 1936 . . . nearly 60 years.)

James married Nannie Perkins, the daughter of Bud Perkins, near Trussville, Alabama, and a sister to John, Will, and Finis Perkins.

James owned a good farm not far from Trussville, which he farmed on till about 1912. He sold the farm, and bought a house with a few acres of land on the edge of Trussville, and did a little farming till he passed away in 1937. A broken hip was fatal to him. Nannie passed away in August, 1936. Their burial place is in Trussville, Alabama.

Their children are Mamie, John Manley, William Edward (Edd) and Daisy.

MAMIE KING

Mamie married Fee Self, the son of Jasper Self, a farmer near Clay, Alabama. Soon after they married, he bought the old Jim King farm near Happy Hollow, or Mount Olive Church. They lived in that house for many years. About 1928 or 1930 he built a new house near a big spring on his farm. The old King house was later torn down. Fee and Mamie always attended the Argo Presbyterian Church, and that is their burial place.

Fee was a thrifty farmer. He managed so well that he didn't realize there was a depression during the Twenties and Thirties. He was a self-supporting farmer. There was always plenty of pork in his smokehouse and enough lard on hand the year round. Canned vegetables galore-good old home ground meal-'taters and pumpkins-dried apples and peaches-and bushels of peanuts and walnuts and apples for the children to enjoy. What a good life the family did enjoy!

All good things will not last forever, so Fee passed away about 1948. Mamie, now 81, remained at the old home by herself. She is slowly recovering from a broken hip she got while doing house work in 1955.

Their children are Alton, Hugh, Mildred, John M., Hershel, Theodore (deceased), Elbert, and Alvin.

MILDRED SELF

Mildred married Matthews Jones, the son of John Jones, of Leeds, Alabama. Matthews, a painter and paper hanger, works in Leeds and the surrounding community. Mildred began teaching school several years after she married. Their home is near Leeds.

They have one child, Harold. He served a while in the Army during World War II-part of the time in Germany. He is going to college in Maryville, Tennessee (1955).

ALTON SELF

Alton, born about 1905, soon left the farm and went in business with his brother Alvin in North Birmingham. They sell new and used cars and auto parts, and run an auto garage.

He married Josephine Coats of Birmingham, and they own a home in North Birmingham.

JOHN MANLEY SELF

John M. married Jean Hooper, the daughter of Jim Hooper, a farmer near Mount Calvary Church. He owns part of his daddy's farm. He does a little farming and works at Conner Steel in Birmingham.

They have six children: Lawrence, age 17; Jimmy; Peggy; Mary; Don, and Danny (twins). One child is dead.

HUGH SELF

Hugh married Annie Bell Cox, the daughter of John Cox of Trussville, Alabama. Hugh worked in Tom Gleen's store at Trussville for several years, quit, and is working now at T.C.I. in Ensley. They live in Trussville.

They have two children: Charles and Ann.

HERSHEL SELF

Hershel married Virginia Hooper of Clay, Alabama. He works with Conner Steel Company in Birmingham and lives near Trussville. They have three children: Hellen, Sandy, and Bobby.

ALBERT SELF

Albert, the youngest child, married Lucille Denton, the daughter of Tom Denton of near Argo, Alabama. Albert works at Conner Steel in Woodlawn, and has a home on part of his dad's farm.

There are four children: Carrol, Johnny, Richard, and Arnold.

ALVIN SELF

Alvin left the farm soon after he finished school. He went in business with his brother Alton, selling new and used cars and auto parts, and running an auto garage. He married Virginia Chanell, the daughter of John Chanell, a farmer of Argo, Alabama. They live in Norwood (Birmingham).

JOHN MANLEY KING (Dentist)

Manley was born about 1877, down on the farm. While a young lad he found out that his hands just didn't fit the plow or the hoe handles. He also found out that it hurt his back to pick cotton...so off to college he went to study dentistry. When he got his degree he began practicing in Birmingham.

Manley is the first King to own an automobile-about 1915.

When Manley was a young man it was stylish for doctors, preachers, professors, and well-dressed men to wear a derby—so Manley wore a derby till he married. Back in the days when Manley began his practice, most dentists had a foot pedal tooth drilling machine. They often carried it with them to do some work right in the home where there was a toothache. It was customary for a dentist to carry his dental satchel when he went off visiting any distance.

Manley married Betty Morrow, the daughter of Woolsy Morrow, a wealthy farmer near Trussville on Highway 11 North.

Manley fell and broke his hip in 1953, and has not been able to do any work since. They have a nice home in Norwood.

Their children are John Manley, Jr., and Mary Elizabeth. Two died very young.

JOHN MANLEY KING, JR. (Dentist)

John was born in December, 1913. When he finished high school, he followed his dad's footsteps and studied dentistry in Memphis, Tennessee.

When he finished college he started to work in the office with his Uncle Ed, also a dentist. Later, he went in with his father. Now, John has an office of his own in Homewood. He has become one of the best dentists around Birmingham.

He married Robina Coates, of North Birmingham, in 1941. In 1942, he enlisted in the Navy to do dental work. He served about two years -part of the time in the South Pacific. John was called back in service during the Korean War for about one year, but didn't leave the states during that hitch.

He owns a modernistic home off Lake Shore Drive in Edgewood near the old Edgewood Lake.

They have two children: Jean, age 11; and Andy, age 6.

MARY ELIZABETH KING

Mary, born in 1924, finished Phillips High School in Birmingham, then attended the University of Alabama. Soon after she got out of college she went to work for America Fore Insurance Company, in the office, and is still with them. She lives with her parents.

DAISY KING

Daisy was born about 1884, and was jerked up on the farm. She took after the rest of the Kings-she always had plenty to eat and ate a lot.

Daisy married Almos Taylor, the son of John Lewis Taylor, a farmer near Mount Calvary Church (Claytons Cole). They owned a home on the edge of Pinson, Alabama, better known as Mount Pinson. This is where the old Confederate Soldiers held their reunions till about 1920 or 1921, when they discontinued them.

Almos was a rural route postman until his health failed him. Then he was a retired postman for several years. Almos carried the mail in a buggy-rain, shine, or freezing weather, the mail had to go. He passed away in 1935. Daisy sold the home and bought a home down the road toward Tarrant, about two miles.

There are three children: Bonnie, Vestal, and James.

BONNIE TAYLOR

Vestal is Daisy's only girl, and she is a redhead. She became a beautician while very young, and has continued doing the same. Her shop is in Pinson.

She married W. K. Bach, of Birmingham, back in the Twenties, but they soon separated. In the Forties she married Charles E. Spencer, a retired merchant seaman. They room with her mother.

JAMES TAYLOR

James married Lucille Heaton near Pinson. He is a painter, and they live in Tarrant City, Alabama.

Their three children are: Harvey, age 17; Bonnie, age 13; and Evelyn, age 11.

WILLIAM EDWARD KING (Dentist)

Ed left the farm while a young lad and enlisted in the Navy for a hitch of four years. He was the first King boy to join the Navy.

When he left the Navy he studied dentistry in college. He started his practice in Birmingham, and continued there till his health failed him about 1946.

Ed holds another first. In 1914 and 1915 it was stylish for men to own a motorcycle-so Ed was the first King to own one.

He married Mrs. Toxie Baker, the daughter of Mr. Spencer, of Mobile, Alabama. Toxie had a girl named Toxie, born about 1920. When Toxie died, young Toxie moved to New York City to live with a relative. In 1937, Ed married Gertrude Bailey of Leeds, Alabama.

Ed sold his West End home in 1947, moved to Denver, Colorado, and bought a home there. He soon had a stroke, and is now an invalid. He sold out in Denver in 1955, and moved to Leeds, Alabama.

WILLIAM KING, JR. (BUD)

Bud, the sixth child of William King, married Nannie Keith, the daughter of John Keith, and sister of Rich, Jeff, and Jennie Keith Hall. Nannie lived only a few years after they married.

Then, Bud married Leona Smith, the daughter of John Allen Smith, and sister of Malone Laster's wife, Ila Inez. Their children are Jessie Lee and Lucille. Bud died with TB in 1903, the girls passed away about 17 years old with TB, and their mother also died with TB. They are buried at Argo Rock Church.

FRANCES KING

Frances, born in 1854, married Richard Keith (Rich) the son of John Keith. Rich owned a large farm just north of Argo.

Their children are Tellie, Mamie, William R. (Will), Honor, Frances Alice (Fannie), and Kate. Frances died about 1888, and Rich married Sara Byers, the daughter of Edd Byers, of Ashville, Alabama. They have four children: Wesco, Cuba, Essie, and Myrtle. Rich passed away with TB about 1902. His wife continued to live at their home till 1916. She then made her home with the youngest child, Myrtle. Sara passed away February 3, 1922-age 56.

Rich Keith's family attended the Presbyterian Church (Rock Church), and that is their burial place.

TELLIE KEITH

Tellie married Tom Stephens, the son of John Stephens, of Coffee County. Tom was a rural route postman out of Trussville until he retired in about 1933. He then ran a filling station in Trussville,

Talmadge had one child, Dewitt, Jr., by his first wife.

He worked for the Woodward Iron Company in Brighton, Alabama, for a long time. He was promoted to chief timekeeper, and held that position until he passed away in the Forties. He lived at Dolomite, near Fairfield, Alabama.

RALPH LEE STEPHENS

Ralph was born and raised in Trussville, and has always lived there. He married Mary Sams, the daughter of Hugo Sams, a railroad section foreman at Trussville. Ralph has run a filling station, and repaired cars for many years. He lives on the edge of Trussville.

MARVIN STEPHENS

Marvin joined the Navy while a young lad, and made it his career. He married Roberta Thomas of Washington, D.C.

Their two children are Marvin Massey, and Franklin. Marvin retired about 1951, and is living near Washington, D.C. He was born about 1908.

ADAR STEPHENS

Sara married Dowfas D. Reed of Chattanooga, Tennessee. He is a lawyer, and practiced in Chattanooga for several years. They are living in Miami, Florida, now.

MAMIE KEITH

Mamie married John Bradford, the son of Gus Bradford of Claytons Cole Community. John farmed a little. He worked with road construction contractors as a foreman most of his life.

They had three children: Eugene, Ruth, and Hugh. Mamie died in 1910 with TB - about 30 years old.

In a few years, John married Carrie Cosper of Easonville, Alabama. John died about 1920, and Carrie then married a man named Cosper, of Easonville. Ruth and Hugh died with TB at the age of 14 or 15 years. They are buried at Argo Rock Church, and John is buried at Easonville. Eugene made his home with his Uncle Oscar and Lula Bradford in Athens, Alabama. After Eugene's father died, his step-mother was financially unable to care for Eugene, Ruth, and Hugh. All three were sent to an orphans home in Montgomery, Alabama. Ruth and Hugh passed away there with TB.

Eugene made friends with a girl in the orphans home who helped care for her sisters and brothers. After a time he left the home to live with his Uncle Oscar Bradford in Athens, Alabama.

Years later, by chance, he met the girl he had known in the orphans home. Eventually they were married, and now have two children.

Eugene holds a good position with the government, at Huntsville, Alabama.

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WILLIAM R. KEITH (BIG WILL)

Big Will has lived on the farm all his life. He has farmed some. Since he was raised in the wagon and team days, he has done a lot of hauling jobs.

He married Vada Horsley, the daughter of Daniel Horsley of Argo. They had six children: Margaret, Geneva, Reuben, Sam, Judy, and Ray (Pete).

In 1955 Will and Vady moved away from the old Keith home to Clay, Alabama-after living many years on his daddy's old farm.

MARGARET KEITH

Margaret was born about 1915. She worked for a while in Birmingham, and married Jerry Morrow of Birmingham.

While Jerry served in the Army, during World War II, Margaret worked as a clerk in a store. Jerry is now a route milkman with Southern Dairies in Birmingham, and their home is there.

GENEVA KEITH

Geneva went to Atlanta, Georgia, in 1937, worked a while, then married Ernest Lewis Nelson of North Carolina. He then worked for a dairy, or creamery, in Atlanta. They moved to Ashville, North Carolina, several years back, where Ernest is a carpenter and painter now.

Their children are: Butch, Barbara Ann, Linda Sue, and Vickie.

REUBEN KEITH

Reuben left the farm, and got a job with the Southern Railroad, as a flagman, about 1942. He served in the Army overseas, in France and Germany. When he was discharged from the service he continued to flag. Reuben married Wanda McGloure, from Hanceville, Alabama. He bought the old Rich Keith farm in 1950, and lives there.

Their children are: Brenda, Joyce, Judy Gale, and Charlotte Lee.

SAM D. KEITH

Sam married Louise Wright. He sorts the mail in the Southern Railroad Depot in Birmingham. His wife works in the office at the Veterans' Hospital in Birmingham. They live in Clay.

JUDY KEITH

Judy went to nursing school. She married Jack Paresky, who was in the Navy during World War II. He is now a Sergeant in the Air Force, working in an office in Washington, D.C. He is making the Army a career.

They have one adopted child, Rebecca Jane.

EDWARD RAY KEITH (PETE)

Ray, born about 1927, married Evelyn Wright, a sister to Sam's wife, Louise. He was a mechanic for Addressograph, and is an Addressograph salesman now. They live in Birmingham, and have three children: Sandra, Debbie, and a baby, born about the first of 1955.

HONOR KEITH

Honor has made his home around Argo, farming all his life. He owned the old Jim Morgan home, or farm.

He married Grace Sellers, the daughter of Harrison Sellers, a farmer at Argo. They have eight children: Richard, Geraldine, Nannie Marie, Talmadge Lee, Jack, Jane, William Harrison, and Lowell. Honor passed away suddenly April 8, 1956.

RICHARD J. KEITH

Richard was born in 1922. He left the farm early in life, and went to work with T.C.I. in Ensley, and continues to work there.

He married the daughter of Arnold Jennings of Chalkville, in 1941. He served in the Navy during World War II. They own a home on 68th Street in Birmingham, and attend the Methodist Church.

Their children are Becky, age 13, and Dickey.

GERALDINE KEITH

Geraldine married Ray Applegate of Baltimore in 1945, at the age of 22. Ray served in the Army in World War II, is now a salesman, and is of the Catholic faith. They live in Baltimore, Maryland.

They have five children: Pat, Sandra, Mike, Clifton, and Myles.

NANNIE KEITH

Nannie was born in 1926. She married Stacey A. Turner, the son of Comillis and Clytell Turner of Argo, in 1942. Stacey was 26 years old when they married. They lived at Argo until about 1952, and are now living at Green Cave Springs, Florida. Stacey was in the Army, and served overseas in Guam. He is now a carpenter.

There are five children: Judy and Janet (twins), Ruth, Kay, and Stacey, Jr.

TALMADGE L. KEITH

Clemmie married Elmer O. Sturkie of Lafayette, Alabama. They lived in Birmingham for several years where he worked for the Guarantee Shoe Store. They live in the East now, and have two children: Margaret and Elizabeth.

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ELIZABETH STURKIE

Leta married J. Howard Miller of Youngstown, Virginia, and soon separated. Then she married Robert Christian Sackhoff of Mobile, Alabama. They own a nice home on the South Side of Birmingham. Sackhoff is retired.

KATE KEITH

Kate, the youngest child of Rich and Frances, married George Massey, the son of Bob Massey of Argo, Alabama, (one of the best molasses-making families in the country). George is a jack-of-alltrades. Soon after he married he worked at the Alms Home in Woodlawn for several years. He has worked in wood shops as a cabinet man, and in garages. For several years he lived and worked in Fairfield.

They had eight children: Frank, Harry, Sara Louise, Frances, Josephine, Burton, Ruth Ann, and George, Jr.

Burton married Eva Adams of Fayette, Alabama. He served a hitch in the Army during World War II. They live in Meridian, Mississippi. He is a sales manager.

ELLA JOE (JOSEPHINE) MASSEY

Ella Joe married Fred Kantsky of Chicago. Fred is a city policeman there. They have two children: Freddie and Karen.

RUTH ANN MASSEY

She married Lou Opiliski of Chicago. They live on the South Side of Birmingham.

GEORGE MASSEY, JR.

George was born about 1930, and is the youngest child of George and Kate Massey.

He married Deloris Bailey of Birmingham, and worked for the Alabama Power Company, Birmingham, until the middle of 1955. He quit there, and now has a country milk route. They have a home in Woodlawn.

They have two children: Eric Berton, and Stephen G., born the first of 1956.

Myrtle sold the farm, and has lived in Birmingham most of the time since.

They have three children: Charles Wesley, Loraine, and Wade.

CHARLES W. DUNAHOO

Charles was born in 1917, and married Nell Creel. He is working with a construction company that contracts over a number of states. Their home is in Irondale, Alabama.

LORAINE DUNAHOO

Loraine married Herbert Chandler, the son of Benson Chandler, a Southern Railroad section foreman at Irondale, Alabama. RICH KEITH'S FAMILY ATTENDED THE ARGO PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH, AND THAT IS THEIR BURIAL PLACE

GEORGE CAPART KING

George, the eighth child of William King, was born in 1857, about one mile south of Springville, Alabama, on Highway 11.

He married Hattie Louvina McClendon, the daughter of Sam McClendon, a farmer. Hattie was a sister to James and Minnie McClendon, and a half sister to Bud Presley's wife Isabel.

He was married in the Argo Presbyterian Church, at the end of preaching service, in about 1882. Soon after they married he bought some land from his daddy, and built a house on it, and lived there till 1913. His wife inherited some land from her father's estate on Highway 11, and George built a house on it, and lived there till about 1926. He sold the old farm about 1915. His wife passed away in 1925, at the age of 55. He then made his home with his youngest daughter, Zera.

George was a very spry fellow all his life. He was able to knock about very well up to a few weeks before he passed away on April 9, 1942, at the age of 84 years and 10 months. George was the last of William King's children to pass away.

When it was customary to have preaching on Saturday morning before preaching day on Sunday, he would stop all farm work, and take the family to preaching at 11 o'clock. For many years he was appointed Sunday School superintendent. He hardly ever missed a funeral in the community. In his early days the neighbors and friends dug the grave, and the casket-better known as a coffin-was made in a neighbor's shop right after the person died. All work was done free, so there wasn't any expense to a funeral.

In August, 1936, George started out to Arkansas with his son-inlaw and family to visit the Arkansas Kings, and be at a reunion on August 16, 1936. He became sick at a tourist camp the night before at Russelville, Arkansas (35 miles away), and didn't get to the reunion, or visit the Kings in Clarksville, Arkansas.

There were four children: Della, Elsie Mae, Russell Baxter, Zera and Vera (twins). Vera died at birth.

DELLA KING

Della was born in 1887, near Happy Hollow Church (Mount Olive). She married Eugene Roddam, a widower of Center Point, Alabama, in 1925. Eugene was a farmer, a store man, a stock trader, and a property trader. His last home is near Huffman, on the highway. He passed away with cancer on January 22, 1943. Della continued to live in the home until 1955. She broke up housekeeping and is living with her daughter.

Eugene had two children, Joe and Earl, by his first marriage. Dorothy and Sam are Eugene and Della's children.

JOE RODDAM

Shortly after Joe finished high school he became a Hill Store manager, and soon married Annie Mae Stansell, the daughter of J. B. Stansell, a Birmingham streetcar man. He ran a grocery store in Huffman a few years, then quit or sold out. He served a year or more in the Navy during World War II. After he was discharged, he soon owned and operated one of the best used car lots in the East side of Birmingham, on Highway 11 (East Lake Auto Sales). Joe also owns and operates a new filling station next to his used car lot, along with building houses and selling property. Joe has just moved into his new home, in Huffman, which has all the latest fixtures for a modern home. He is about 40 years old.

Their children are Barbara Jo (age 12) and Ronnie.

EARL RODDAM

Earl finished high school, and was drafted into the Army. When he was discharged, he began carpenter and plumbing work. He boards in Birmingham.

DOROTHY RODDAM

When Dorothy finished school she got a job with Vulcan Readers Service (magazine sales company) as a stenographer, in West End (Birmingham), for a few years. Dorothy's hobby was going places. She made a trip to California, to Colorado, and many other distant states.

She married Hubert A. Howard in the Huffman Church in June, 1950. He is a plumber, and works for Smitherman Plumbing Company in Birmingham. He served in the Army, and was in battle. They own a modern home in Crestwood, in Birmingham.

They have one daughter, Judy Marie, born in November, 1953.

They have two children, Jimmy and Mark Eugene.

ELSIE MAE KING

Elsie was born in 1890, on a hill in the woods just north of Argo, Alabama. She got her schooling at Fairfield Schoolhouse (a small one room school). As the pupils in her day didn't get any report card, she doesn't know just what grade she finished. It's a known fact that she can read and write.

Elsie has seen more than 65 summers, and never married, so she has earned the title of being an old maid. She started to work in Birmingham, while a young girl, as a cashier in restaurants. She retired from work in 1955, and rooms in Homewood, near Birmingham, with Mrs. Minnie (Marcus) Farley.

RUSSELL BAXTER KING

Russell was born in the Gay Nineties at Argo (not New York) in September, 1895. He was jerked up in the horse and buggy daysa few ox wagons were still in use. He was named after a preacher, Russell, although he did not become a preacher.

Russell married Orean Nancy Taylor, the daughter of Pank Taylor, a farmer at Argo. She was a sister to Earl Taylor. They were married by the justice of the peace (Bud Presley), December 16, 1917, at the bride's home. Soon after they were married, Russell was drafted into the Army (World War I) and trained at Camp Shelby, Mississippi. He was carried to Canada, England, France, Belgium, and was stationed 6 months in Germany after the fighting was over. He continued farming, when discharged, till 1924. At that time he left the farm, and began working on the street cars in Birmingham, as a motorman (March 24, 1924), and has continued to work for the same Transit Company till the present.

Their two children are Shaffer Eucklus and Ray R. Russell's wife, Orean, passed away in April, 1926.

Russell then married Elva Jewel Townsend, the daughter of Will Townsend of near Alexander City, Alabama, a farmer.

There are two children by the second marriage: Betty Jane and Peggy Joyce (Trixie). Russellowns a home in West End in Birmingham.

Russell has in his possession an antique eight-day mantel clock (Seth Thomas) which was bought about 1870 by his Uncle Wiley King. The clock still keeps good time.

Russell and his family attended a King Reunion on August 16, 1936, which was held at a church and a schoolhouse known as Lone Pine, about 9 miles out of Clarksville. There was a bush arbor with a speaker's platform built behind the church, from which the crowd was entertained most of the day, with string music, singing, and a lot of speakers. About 800 relatives and some friends attended that reunion-several states were represented. Guy King and his wife took a leading part in making their 1936 reunion a great success.

Guy has made quite an effort, back in Anderson, South Carolina, to locate someone that has some history of Thomas King-Pioneer, who at one time lived in Anderson, or nearby county. His efforts are fruitless. Russell and family made a trip to Pendleton and Anderson, South Carolina, in search of a trace of Thomas King. They found a number of Kings, but no trace of Thomas.

History reveals that Russell is the only King who has a hobby shop. His hobbies are: some sketching, writing or printing books, and making whatnots, and a variety of wood novelties for children, and grown-ups. His novelty work will long be remembered by those who have seen it!

SHAFFER EUCKLUS KING

Shaffer was born in the hills of Argo, on August 7, 1922. He got his schooling in Birmingham. In April, 1940, he enlisted in the Navy for six years, at the age of 17. He was in the Morocco invasion, made several transport trips, and was in several battles with the Navy in the South Pacific.

During the war he married Betty Lewis of Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, in 1942. At the end of his enlistment he began working with the Gulf Refinery, in Philadelphia, and bought a home there. He quit the Gulf Company in 1953, and joined the Merchant Marines-he transports oil from different countries.

They have two children: Orean, born April, 1944; and Joe, born July, 1949.

RAY R. KING

Ray was born March 9, 1926, and got his schooling in Birmingham. He enlisted in the Navy during the war, and served in the South Pacific.

When discharged, he began to work for Western Electric Company, installing new telephone equipment over Alabama, Georgia, Mississippi, and Louisiana. Ray married Fradie McCannon, a farmer's daughter near Lexington, Georgia. He then began to work for General Motors in Atlanta, and bought a home there.

They have two boys: David, age 5; and Denny, age 2.

BETTY JANE KING

Betty is 26 years old. She finished West End High School in 1946 -after being in school for only ten years and four months. She took a commercial course.

When she finished school she worked for a while in the office at Birmingham-Southern College. She then married Jimmy Jordan (a student at Georgia Tech), the son of Jimmy Jordan of West End. They lived at Marietta, Georgia, till he finished college. He served two years in the Army, as a Lieutenant, near Baltimore, Maryland. The family lived in Edgewood, Maryland, while he was in service. He was a teacher and football coach at Dalton, Georgia, for a while. Jimmy is now working toward a Doctor of Philosophy degree at Emory University, in Atlanta, where they have bought a home.

They have two children: Julie Jayne, age 8; and Claire Suzanne (Susu), age 6.

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PEGGY JOYCE KING - JUST FINISHED SCHOOL 1950

PEGGY JOYCE (TRIXIE) KING

Peggy finished school at West End High, in 1950, where she took a commercial course. She soon went to work with an Insurance Company in Birmingham. In a year or so, she quit there, and is working in the office with American-Standard Plumbing Company, in the city. She lives with her parents.

ZERA IRENE KING

Zera was born just before the beginning of the Twentieth Century. She also got her schooling at Fairfield Schoolhouse. In her schooling days the pupils didn't have a report card—so there wasn't any grading done. She is not certain what grade she finished. There is one thing certain: the schoolhouse got so old and beat up, it leaned over till it fell down, and that is when Zera didn't go to school anymore. She has in her possession a picture of the schoolhouse taken about 1902.

She took a music course from Mrs. Hugh Hall, one of the most outstanding music teachers. Zera was the organist at Argo Presbyterian Church for a number of years. She worked for a while in Birmingham, where the lights shine bright.

In 1920, she married George Hammock, the son of Jack Hammock, a farmer on Simmons Mountain near Springville, Alabama. George served about one year in World War I-part of the time in France. He left the farm while a lad, and worked in Birmingham as a streetcarman and a truck driver. He has been farming since 1932. George owns a farm, northeast of Argo, on Highway 11.

There are two children: George Farris; and Betty Lou, age 29.

GEORGE F. HAMMOCK

George Farris was born in 1923. Soon after he finished school he was drafted into the Army, in World War II. He was in the first invasion in France against the German Army, and became a casualty within a few days. His body was returned to Argo Cemetery by the government.

BETTY LOU HAMMOCK

Betty Lou was so determined not to be like her old maid Aunt Elsie, that she took the first chance to marry before she was sweet sixteen. She married Henry L. Hughes, of Brompton, Alabama, in 1942. He farmed a year or two, then moved to Birmingham, and began to work in North Birmingham. They own a home near the lake, in East Lake, on 84th Street.

They have two children: George Elwin, age 13; and Steven, age 1.

A STATEMENT MADE BY GEORGE C. KING, IN 1938, OF OLDEN TIMES

"I was born May 29, 1857, one mile south of Springville, Alabama, on Highway 11. I walked-rain, shine, or freezing weather-for two or more miles to a one room log schoolhouse. There just wasn't any ride to school. I had only one to three books to study in school, and the pupils were not graded. "Our swimming pool was a long deep hole in the creek in our pasture...a built swimming pool was not heard of then. Once in a while the neighbors would get together and have a big barbecue for all the community-free for all. There also would be a baseball game. The players didn't have gloves to catch the ball-they just caught it with bare hands. Sometime there would be a wrestling match to add to the day's attraction.

"We walked, or rode a mule or horse, or a wagon which sometimes was pulled by a yoke of steers to church. The church was usually built of logs, and didn't have an organ or piano.

"About the time I was 12 or 14 years old, a railroad was built through my father's farm-about 1870. The engines were fired with wood, and the water was put in the tanks along the railroad at creeks. Buggies were few and far apart, and the automobile just wasn't heard of. I didn't see an auto till I was fifty years old, or about 1906. The first airplane I saw was in 1917. Now, I will drop back several years.

"When I was a young lad, it was customary for a man to hitch his steers or horses to the wagon on Saturday, load up all the family in the wagon, go spend the night with a relative or friend, and stay till Sunday evening. Usually, there weren't enough beds for all, so they would make a pallet on the floor for the kids to sleep on.

"It was also customary, up till about 1908, for some farmers to chop down the timber on an acre or two of land, and cut the trees in 10 or 12 foot lengths ready to be rolled or piled together so the logs could be burned, and they could cultivate the field. Then the farmer would invite the men neighbors to come to his house on a certain day and have a log rolling; that is, pile the logs in his new ground so he could burn the logs. And, of course, a big dinner was the main issue. It was a day of work, lots of good eating, and much laughter about someone's corny jokes.

"Since everybody was a farmer, he had a barn-and rats were bad to eat the corn and hay. A farmer would invite his neighbor to come and bring all his boys to have a rat-killing. They would move the corn and hay around, and the rats would run out. When a rat would run out, one to a half dozen boys would begin to hit at the rat. When the rat-killing was over there were sometime about a half bushel of dead rats. (Unquote-enough rats for several rat pies.)

"Corn shucking was a fad among some farmers. He would gather his corn, pile it by his corn crib, and invite all of his neighbors to a corn shucking. The men would shuck all of his corn if it took all night. The women helped the wife to prepare a big supper, and later some coffee and teacakes for a snack. It was understood at a corn shucking that if a man shucked a red ear of corn he had the privilege to kiss any lady he wanted to at the shucking. And, of course, there were always some men at a shucking who told jokes which brought out laughs that could be heard away across the hollow. "Back in my days the women spun their own thread at home out of wool or cotton. A few had a homemade loom which they made cloth on.

"The women made soap out of fireplace ashes. They placed them in a wood hopper in the yard, poured water on the ashes, and caught the water when it drained through the hopper. They put some meat skins in the lye water, boiled it, and made soap to wash clothes, dishes, and hands.

"And the women had a scheme of getting together to gossip. A lady now and then would have a quilting and invite all the women in the community to come. They had a big day dipping snuff, eating a big dinner, and of course a few jokes, and a great deal of gossiping.

"Those happy days are gone forever-my flaming youth is out-the things that used to be my joy are just about flickered out."

WILEY KING

Wiley married Matilda McClendon, the daughter of Billy McClendon of Springville. Matilda is a sister to Sam McClendon of Argo. Wiley and Matilda had one son, Lonnie. Wiley owned a small farm near Springville, Alabama. He passed away with malaria fever in 1889.

Matilda then married Ben Reese of Remlap, Alabama. They lived at Remlap, but soon separated. She and Lonnie then lived at her farm for several years. She then left the farm and lived with Lonnie.

LONNIE KING

Lonnie left the farm while a lad, and got a job with his cousins, Johnnie and Porter Presley, in their store at Springville, as a handy boy. He drove their peddling wagon to Birmingham to sell their butter, and eggs, etc., and bring in supplies for the store.

Lonnie married an orphan girl, Willie Eaton, of near Springville. He got a job with an ice company in Birmingham, working in the office till about 1920. They lived in Pratt City till about 1921, and moved to Ensley Highlands. He then worked for a sand and cement company until he passed away with pneumonia, March, 1926, at the age of 38.

Willie soon broke up housekeeping, married a New York man and moved to New York. Lonnie's mother then stayed with her niece, Bertha Walker, at Springville until she passed away in 1934. After Willie moved to New York, she seemed to have just faded away.

MARION PRICE KING

Price was born in 1861. He married Fannie Youngman, the daughter of Peter Youngman, a farmer of Argo. She was a sister to Charles Youngman, a country store man at Argo till about 1940. Fannie's father lived in Germany until he was 12 years old. Price bought his father's old farm about 1890.

He holds the record of having the largest family of the Kings. He had 16 children. The last baby was born January, 1918, and died in a day or two. All the rest are living. Their names are Lela, Lurline, Joe Billie (Willie), Dolphus, Wiley, Bue W., Minnie Lee, Alice, Reuben, Otis, Bessie, Helen, Ray, Janie, and Lois. The old log house where Price King's 16 children were born is still in good living condition.

Fannie passed away in November, 1925, with blood poisoning. Price passed away in May, 1936. Price and Fannie attended the Presbyterian Church at Argo, and that is where they are buried.

LELA KING

Lela was born in 1888. She married Price Sellers, the son of Harrison Sellers, a farmer of Argo. Price farmed a few years after they married, then he worked at the Alms Home on 50th Street in Woodlawn. Price's hobby, down on the farm, was cutting the farm boys' hair for free. He is the only known relative who can cut his own hair and do a perfect job. About 1922 he began barbering in Birmingham-hair cuts were 25 cents, and the present price is \$1.25.

Price owns his home in West End, and other property. His hobby is raising honey bees. Price and Lela attend the Beverly Methodist Church is West End.

Their children are Teddie, Jack, Carolyn, Martha, and Mary.

TEDDIE SELLERS (TED)

Ted is 42 years old, and got his schooling in West End. He married Daisy Martin, the daughter of Walter Martin of West End in Birmingham. Ted ran a Hill's Food Store a few years before World War II. When the war broke out he began flagging on the L & N Railroad. His wife has been employed most all the years as a bookkeeper. At present she is working at the South Highland Hospital in Birmingham. They own a home in West End.

There are three children: Marion, age 16; Martha Louise; and Charles.

JACK SELLERS

Jack was schooled in West End. He was in partnership in the Hill Food Store with his brother Ted until the war started. Then he worked in an aircraft plant in Birmingham till the war was over. At that time he began to work with Braswell Furniture Company in North Birmingham. Jack married Jewel B. New, the daughter of Lawson New of Tallapoosa, Georgia. Jewel works in the office with the same company that Jack works with. They own a home in Oakwood in West End.

Their two children are Jack McGee and Jewel Marie (Judy).

CAROLYN SELLERS

Carolyn married James Lyons, who finished college at Auburn. He was a chemist at Sloss Furnace (now U.S. Pipe) by the First Avenue viaduct for several years. He was promoted to yardmaster. Their home is in West End.

They have two children: Jimmy (James) and Carol, age 3.

MARTHA SELLERS

Martha married Robert (Bob) Wynn. He was a clerk for a large hardware store in Birmingham for several years, but quit, and opened a hardware store of his own in West End, where he is making a success. He owns a home in Ensley Highlands, and some other city property. They have two children, Bobby, age 6, and Joyce.

MARY CATHA SELLERS

Mary married Bill Jeff. Bill is a commercial artist at Hayes Aircraft Corporation, Birmingham. They own a home in West End, and have one boy, Billy, age 8.

LURLINE KING

Lurline married T. Carl Powell, the son of Green Powell of near Warrior, Alabama, about 1912.

Carl taught school for a number of years, but quit teaching and began bookkeeping for big stores and companies. About 1935, he moved into an office of his own. He was an expert when it came to fixing income tax returns.

They have three children: King, Annie, and Charles.

Carl passed away in September, 1951 with heart failure, at the age of 61.

They owned a home on the West Side of Birmingham, and Lurline continues to live there.

ANNIE POWELL

Annie was born about 1914, and was schooled in Birmingham. She was a stenographer, and worked for several years in an office.

She married Jasper Hall of Greenville, South Carolina, in 1948. Jasper is employed by an undertaker in Greenville, South Carolina. They have one child, Dale, age 4.

KING POWELL

King was born in 1919, and enlisted in the Army in 1938, and made a career of it. During World War II he was a radio mechanic. Shortly after the war ended, he married Vivian Studdard, of Ensley.

CHARLES POWELL

Charles was born in 1922. He was called in the service during World War II, and was trained to be a gunner, and made several bombing trips against the enemy as an engineer gunner on B-24's in the South Pacific. He was wounded slightly in the eye on one trip by glass when his plane window was hit.

Shortly after being discharged he married Margaret Watkins of Panama City, Florida, and they own a home in the same town. He is a mechanic at the Tyndal Air Force Base, Panama City. They have two children: Tamblyn and Thomas Charles (Tommy).

WILLIE KING (JOE BILLY)

Willie married a boy, Gordon Melton, who was in the same class at school with her at Fairfield School. He is the son of Jim Melton.

Gordon enlisted in the Army at the beginning of World War I, and was on the front lines facing the German Army in several battles, and was wounded. Soon after he was discharged, he started working at the Birmingham post office, and worked there until he retired about 1950.

They owned a home in East Lake till he retired, and then moved to Florida for a while, but now live in East Lake.

DOLPHUS KING

Dolphus was born about 1893. While a lad he began working at Margaret Mines, digging coal (1916). He was drafted in the Army, and served about one year. While serving in France he was in battle.

After the war he continued to dig coal, and soon married Pearl Coleman, her father Thomas Coleman, was a coal miner at Margaret, Alabama. Dolphus did a little farming as well as mining until about 1935, when the Margaret mines were abandoned, and he bought a farm near Springville, on the road from Springville to Odenville, Alabama.

He has been raising cattle, farming and working with the Continental Gin Company in Birmingham for the last 15 years.

Their children are: Virginia Louise, George Clayton, Mary Alice, and Hugh Lamar.

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VIRGINIA LOUISE KING

Louise married the Rev. William E. Glidewell, a Baptist minister, of Margaret. At present they live at Cook Springs. Their three children are: Terry Paul, age 11; David; and Timothy.

GEORGE CLAYTON KING

Clayton enlisted in the Navy during World War II, and was in battle. His ship got a blast of some sort, and he was thrown several feet in the air from his bunk one night, and was slightly wounded.

Soon after being discharged, he began to work for Birmingham Transit Company, on streetcars and buses. He quit the Transit Company, and got a job with Hayes Aircraft Corporation in Birmingham. In the meantime, he married Mrs. Billie Corbin of Birmingham, about 1948. They own a home in Irondale.

MARY ALICE KING

Mary married Billy G. Alverson of Acmar, Alabama, and had one child, Larry.

They separated, and she then married Joe Shores. He works at a filling station, and Mary works with the Alabama Finance Company, and they live in Elyton Village housing project, Birmingham, Alabama.

HUGH LAMAR KING

Hugh joined the Navy soon after he finished school at Springville. At the end of his enlistment he began working at Hayes Aircraft Corporation, as an instructor.

He married Betty Bangston of Jasper, Alabama.

WILEY KING

Wiley was born in September, 1895. He was drafted in the Army during World War I, and served in France on the battlefield.

Shortly after being discharged, he started working on the Southern Railroad, with a block signal crew. He soon was promoted to a block signal maintenance man. He has had a section at Laurel, Mississippi for many years, and lives there.

He married Effie White, the daughter of Ben White, near Margaret, Alabama. She is a granddaughter of Harrison Sellers. They have two girls, Lila Mae and Barbara.

LILA MAE KING

Lila Mae was schooled in Laurel, Mississippi, and married George W. Chancellor of Laurel. George served a two year draftee time in the Army in 1953 and 1954, and works for Machine Foundry in Laurel now. They have one daughter, Billie Jean, born in 1955.

BARBARA JEAN KING

Barbara married John A. Gatlin of Laurel, Mississippi. He was a draftee in the Army for two years, and is now working in Laurel for Norris Dispensers, Inc.

BUE W. KING

Bue, the sixth child of Price King, was born in 1897. He was drafted into the Army near the end of World War I, and served part of the time in France. When he was discharged, he began to work on the Southern Railroad with a block signal crew. He was promoted to a maintainer, and now has a section in Tifton, Georgia.

Bue married Tessie Venable, the daughter of Will Venable of near Corinth Church at Argo, Alabama.

They have one set of twins, Billy and Betty; and Joe Earl. Joe Earl is home with his parents, and has just completed high school.

BETTY KING

Betty married Clifton York. They have one child, Steven, and live in Panama City, Florida. Clifton works for Colonial Stores there.

BILLY KING

When Billy finished school he enlisted in the service. At the end of his enlistment he began working for Colonial Stores in Tifton.

MINNIE LEE KING

Minnie married a widower, James Y. West, the son of J. John West of Opelika, Alabama, in 1925. He had a boy, James, Jr.

James was an auto mechanic in Birmingham. He passed away in 1927. The boy then lived with a relative in Collinsville, Alabama.

Minnie married a widower, Marcus A. Farley, the son of John Farley of Bald Springs, Alabama, in about 1937. Marcus ran a mercantile business in Homewood, near Birmingham, for many years. Marcus passed away in 1954. Minnie continues to live in their home in Homewood.

Marcus had four children: Rosco E., Hubert W., Margaret, and Ida Mae.

ROSCO FARLEY

Rosco married Edith Planton of Opelika. He is a butcher, and they live in Homewood.

They have one daughter, Mary Frances.

HUBERT FARLEY

Hubert married Ruth Herring, the daughter of Robert Herring of Sand Mountain near Boas, Alabama. Hubert is a clerk in his father's store in Homewood.

They have three children: Susan Gail, Hubert, Jr., and one child who is dead.

MARGARET FARLEY

Margaret married Lewis A. Parker of Birmingham. He is a drug store decorating salesman.

They live in Pratt City in Birmingham, and have one child, Joann.

IDA MAE FARLEY

Ida Mae is a clerk in her father's store.

ALICE KING

Alice married Lee Martin, the son of John B. Martin of Trussville, Alabama, about 1921. Lee has been in the dairy business near Trussville for about 35 years.

They have one girl, Vena Lee.

Alice and Lee separated about 1939. Alice works in a hotel in Miami, Florida, for several months a year.

VENA LEE MARTIN

Vena Lee, born about 1925, married H. B. Pane in June, 1942. Pane is employed by American Bridge in Birmingham. They live in Trussville.

They have 5 children: Mary Alice, Age 12; John; Charles; Arther Lee; and a baby girl.

REUBEN KING

Reuben was born about 1903. He was too young to be in World War I, and too old to be in World War II.

He became a barber very young, and barbered in Springville till about 1954. He has a shop in Trussville now.

Reuben married Ester Sellers, the daughter of Harrison Sellers of Argo, and a sister to Lela King's husband, Price Sellers.

Ester is a beautician, and has been in business with Reuben ever since they married at Springville. They own a home in Springville. Their two children are: James and William Neil.

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JAMES KING

James went to Colorado Springs, Colorado to work. He married Margaret Menry there, but they separated. He now works for a construction company in Sterlin, Colorado, and is about 24 years old.

BESSIE KING

Bessie married Albert Wright of Cullman, Alabama. Albert was a truck or tractor driver for several years. Then he began to work with Southern Bell Telephone Company. Their home is between Chalkville and Center Point-near Chalkville School.

Their children are Frances, Maurice, and James H. Two children are dead.

FRANCES WRIGHT

Frances married Lawrence Allman, a Birmingham City Fireman. He served overseas with the Navy Seabees during World War II. They are living in East Lake.

Alice, born about 1865, was the eleventh child of William King, and the youngest daughter.

She married Dr. Ben Clayton, the son of Dr. Berry Clayton, of Claytons-Cole. Ben was considered one of the best country doctors around. He practiced till his health failed him. In his days of practicing he walked, rode a horse, or in a buggy to see a patient.

Ben owned one of the best farms in the community.

Sabret's sister, Penina Lawley, married Jim Taylor. Jim and Penina Taylor's children were John Lewis, Davis, and Martha. Martha married John Wade, and some of their children are: Wiley, Perry, Sibbie, and Lula. Since Penina married Jim Taylor, that made them Uncle Jim and Aunt Penina to William King's boys and girls.

BETTY KING

I will remind you that Betty (Betsy), born about 1815 near Springville, Alabama, is Pioneer Thomas King's daughter and William King's sister.

She married John Laster (a widower with eight children) near Bear Mountain, or Possum Trot Church, 3 miles northwest of Springville.

They had 7 children-two died at birth. The children who lived are: John, Jr., Jimmie P., Bell, Amanda, and Caroline.
