

THE athletic season of 1896 has been a gratifying success. The meet-ings have not been numerous enough to warrant comparison with the halcyon days of a decade ago-a period which "old timers" love to recall-but if the opportunities have been fewer in number, there has been no deterioration in the merits of the men whose names orna-ment and adorn the pages of athletic history. The most industrious campaigners have added largely to their collections of substantial re-wards, while a select few have earned the exceptional honor of a place on the roll of fame represented by the official list of champions and on the roll of fame represented by the official list of champions and record-makers.

Several novel features helped to make the season memorable. Few could be induced at first to believe that the revival of the historic Olympic games at Athens meant anything to them, but, as the date of Olympic games at Attens meant anything to them, but, as the date of the meeting approached, Princeton and Boston organized teams, and, better still, swept practically everything before them when they got there. Still they were hardly satisfied, as they counted on having to confront a representative English team and fight the Manhattan Field battle of September, 1895, over again. But the Britishers, with one or two exceptions, fought shy of the fixture, and American enterprise was enabled to score another triumph.

In addition to the laurels our athletes brought back they imported some classic ideas from Athens, the most notable being the throwing of the discus, hitherto unknown in this country. Athletic America was immediately interested, as Captain Garrett, of the Princeton team, had beaten the Greeks at their own game with a preparation of scarcely a day.

Record performances were numerous, and the standard of improvement may readily be seen by reference to the classified lists in the following pages. The most remarkable features of the season involve Bernard J. Wefers, the great Georgetown University sprinter. He is the only man who has an undisputed record of 9 3-5 seconds for roo yards. He is twenty-two years of age and lacks but a quarter of an inch from being six feet tall. His weight in condition is 167 pounds. His style of run-ning is declared by experts to be almost ideal. As he is not an especially fast starter, it follows that some portions of the 100 yards must be covered at a faster rate than the time for the whole distance indicates. The International matches at 100 and 200 in 1895, and the 100, 220 and 440 Canadian championships in 1896. Americans were not alone in the onward march. Britishers made a few records which are entitled to honorable mention. At the English championships in July Godfrey Shaw, the veteran hurdler, who will be remembered as captain of the London team here last year, won his favorite event. The race was presumably over stiff obstacles fixed in the turf of the infield, as is the usual custom abroad, but despite this Shaw received credit with covering the 120 yards in 15,3-5 sec., which, if officially accepted, will supplant the British record of 15,4-5 sec. made by himself the previous year. It is also faster than any of the Ameri-cans showed during the season. By its recent affiliations the Amateur Athletic Union has been strengthened materially. It is now allied not only with the Inter-collegiate Athletic Association and North American Gymnastic Union, but with the Interscholastic Association and all the Young Men's Christian Associations of America as well. With practically all of the athletes in the country under its control, it will be seen that the A. A. U, is a pretty strong organization. There are more athletic clubs under the jurisdiction of the A. A. U. and its various branch associations to-day and a wider scope of country is represented than ever before. And it seems to be a good thing, for as the A. A. U. grows and extends its power the quantity and quality of the athletic output increases.

The football season of 1896 ended in a glorious victory for Princeton over Yale in the Intercollegiate Championship Series. The season was by long odds the most exciting in the history of the game, de-spite the fact that there has been fewer casualties, less squabbling and rough play. A friendly desire to emulate each other's successes took the place of the intense feeling of hostility among the teams which has characterized the game in former years, and was responsible for the unsportsmanlike manner in which many of the contests were decided. Princeton, both from the individual qualification of her players and her team work, deserves the title of champion. In both of her large contests she demonstrated her superiority and gave an exhibition of scientific football that will be long remembered and talked of in foot-ball circles. Playing on her rival's grounds, she encountered a surprise in Harvard's stubborn resistance that might well have broken up any team's efficiency, but this did not happen to the Nassau contingent. They appeared for the second half as cool and determined as ever, and forced the Crimson to acknowledge defeat by the score of 12 to o. It has been a feature peculiar to every game that Princeton has played that her men played better ball the last half than the first, and every minute added saw an improvement. In the Yalegame the Tigers gave the prettiest exhibition of football seen in many a day. Notknowing the utter weakness of Yale's defense, they relied upon Baird's kicking to win the day. Yale's rushers were too adopt the running game. The complete change of their plans caused not a semblance of a rattle, and Baird himself, his main usefulness spoiled, was the prime factor in their success. They played good, open football and deserved to win. Judging from the actual games played, the season of rag6 must be considered most remarkable. Harvard, Yale, Princeton and Pennsyl-

Judging from the actual games played, the season of r896 must be considered most remarkable. Harvard, Yale, Princeton and Pennsyl-vania have all been scored against, and in some cases barely escaped de-feat at the hands of the smaller colleges, the Indians or West Point. In fact, one might say that scoring by smaller colleges against the larger universities was the rule and not the exception as a few short years ago. This is an encouraging feature in the development of the great game of

brawn and brain, and shows its widespread and enduring popularity. Legislation is afoot now to restore athletic relations between Yale and Harvard, which if brought about, will serve to enhance interest in the College championship for '97. The strained condition of things as they existed during the past season served to cause one of the most im-portant football events of the season to be abandoned. A disposition to bring about a renewal of the friendly rivalry has already manifested it-self in the nature of a preliminary conference which bids fair to be fol-lowed by a satisfactory mutual arrangement by which the representa-tives of those two celebrated seats of learning will meet together on track, field and river as of yore.

SPLENDID in her defeat, Yale's showing at Henley and Jake Gaudaur's victory over James Stanbury in a race for international supremacy on the Thames were the two notable aquatic events of r866. It was expected that Yale would distinguish herself against the pick of England's racing crews for the reason that no more formidable aggregation of college rowing men ever sat in a boat than the crew selected to represent America in the struggle. But a series of unfortunate happenings, involving the illness of the men, internal dissensions growing out of differing opinions between the oarsmen and their coach, lack of familiarity with the changed water conditions, etc., etc., culminated in defeat, although it must be said to the credit of the eight men comprising the crew that they made a game struggle against superior odds, and the prediction was freely advanced that in another race, with equal conditions, they would win.

The aquatic authorities at Yale were sufficiently satisfied with the showing made by the crew to venture the belief that another race would be arranged for 1897, providing, of course, that the result of the intercollegiate races here justified it. Harvard will again be a factor in the struggle, and a very determined factor. The English stroke has been adopted, and Mr. Lehman, an English coach, imported to teach it to the men, suggests the idea that Harvard, too, has in mind a probable trip abroad for the purpose of having a try at the Henley championship. It will all depend, however, upon the outcome of the local struggle, but the indications are that one or the other of the crews will be in the Thames struggle.

There was a revival of interest in professional rowing, due mainly to Jake Gaudaur's victory over Stanbury, the Australian champion, on the Thames. Nothing has happened in the rowing world since Searle and O'Connor crossed blades for the blue ribbon on England's historical river in 1880 to cause more excitement. Professional rowing had languished lamentably during the previous six or seven years. There was a time in Australia when crackajacks kept cropping up with such rapidity that it was difficult to keep track of them; but, looking back, it seems as if the rowing spirit died in young Australia when ill-fated Harry Searle succumbed to typhoid fever shortly after his memorable race with O'Connor. Stanbury, who was an acknowledged rival of Searle in the latter's best days, soon established his right to wear the champion's shoes, and for many years he has been left in undisputed possession of them. There was a flicker of interest when Tom Sullivan, the New Zealander, blossomed out as a championship candidate, but Sullivan proved only a flash in the pan. He was defeated in England, and the talk of a match between him and Stanbury cased suddenly, the champion being compelled to rest on his oars and wait vainly for challengers.

lengers. For a number of years the only interest that rowing held for Englishmen grew out of the fact that the big races were rowed on the Thames. The old country could not turn out material fit to cope with the Beaches, the Hanlans, the Searles and O'Connors that Australia and Canada produced, and all that London could do on red-letter rowing days was to furnish the river and the spectators. But when little Wag Harding came to town—he weighed but 140 pounds and was regarded as the best bit of British stuff seen in half a score of years—the Londoners held their heads aloft and congratulated one another on the prospect of England regaining her old-time rowing supremacy. They backed "Wag" against big, lumbering, easy-going Stanbury, and the Australian simply rowed rings around his diminutive rival. Gaudaur then tried to induce the antipodean sculler to come to America for a race, but he refused, and the only alternative left to the Orillia champion, who had just beaten Hanlan, Bubear and Barry at Halifax, was to go to England. The race was simply no race at all after the preliminary spurt. Gaudaur won handily, upsetting the calculations of the Solons of the aquatic world, who predicted a hollow victory for Stanbury.



BASEBALL.

THE National League campaign of 1896 passed into history as one of the most successful in the history of that organization. Successful from a financial standpoint, but, comparatively speaking, the struggle could hardly compare with the strife of former years. The fact that eight of the twelve clubs finished with almost the same percentage that closed their work in 1895 showed beyond doubt that the relative values of those clubs have reached a fixed standard, and that a general shake-up of some kind will be the only possible way of giving excitement or variety to the race, or of materially changing the order of procession. Unless the unexpected happens, Baltimore, Cleveland, Boston, Chicago and Pittsburg should finish this year almost as they did last scason, while St. Louis and Louisville will continue to ornament the tail end.

The playing of the season was, as a rule, first class, and of a uniform quality that became rather tiresome before the summer was over. There was not so much batting as in 1894 and 1895. The pitchers are beginning to overcome the handicaps placed upon them, and the fielders have learned where to play for the long drives.

Baltimore won the pennant, duplicating her success of '94 and '95, for the reason that the team had everything in its favor. The aggregation that Ned Hanlon worked so hard to get together is exceptionally strong, both individually and collectively. There is not a fault to be found at any point of the whole nine. To be sure, there is no Rusie with his thunderbolt curves to shine as Baltimore's star pitcher, but the very fact that not one of the Baltimore pitchers would be far above mediocrity with any other team makes the Oriole fielders work all the harder. Fielding is really a wonderful point of strength with Baltimore. The batting of the team is of the quick, snappy kind—there is not one ponderous slugger on the nine. The base-running is fast, sprightly, and yet neither too daring nor lacking in judgment and hard work. Cleveland finished second because the nine had better pitchers than Baltimore, could hit as hard but lacked the tricky speed upon the bases

Cleveland finished second because the nine had better pitchers than Baltimore, could hit as hard, but lacked the tricky speed upon the bases. Baltimore stole more than twice as many bases as Cleveland, and there lies the secret of the Orioles' success. Cincinnati has very good pitchers, is strong at the bat, excellent in the field and well stocked with base-runners. Sand and grit alone are lacking in the Reds, and the scarcity of these qualities put the Reds third instead of a tie with Baltimore for first. Boston has elements of batting strength, can field well, and, with Nichols as chief pitcher, is so strong in the box that the nine cannot help finishing high up, even though the ex-champions play in a manner that indicates a lack of interest and a careless disregard for winning principles. Anson's men have talked much of ill-luck, but the team seems to be really just as high as it deserves.

In a maining principles. Anson's men have talked much of ill-luck, but the team seems to be really just as high as it deserves. Pittsburg needs another good winning pitcher. There is something the matter with the nine, which is strong and well balanced. The players hit well, field finely, and the pitchers are good, yet the Gaspipes cannot win more than a bare majority of their games. New York, after being an eyesore and a disappointment, braced up and came down the homestretch in good form. All the team needs, as Capt. Joyce says, is Rusie and a catcher, although a hard-hitting outfielder would help on wonderfully. Brooklyn's men, a trifle light at the bat, seemed also to have elements of internal dissension in the ranks, and their present position is just about what might be expected. Philadelphia was the disappointment of the year. The once mighty batting strength of the team departed when Billy Hamilton was traded, and the nine has been light with the stick and none too strong in the field, while the pitching has been but mediocre. Washington started strong, but fell down hard. The Washington team lacks ginger and aggressiveness and needs a couple of good batters. St. Louis, a hive of mechanical players, light hitters and not too good in the field, was lucky to keep out of twelfth position. Louisville was again a city of experiments and frosts.

- Mar. 21-" Ducky " Holmes, center fielder on the Louisville team, broke his collar bone during a game of ball at Montgomery, Ala., falling while running after a fly ball.
- Mar. 28-Princeton (23), defeated Rutgers (2), in opening baseball game of the season; Princeton, N. J.
- April 3—At a special meeting of the Southern Association a schedule for a six-club circuit was adopted, beginning April 16 to Aug. 16; Birmingham, Ala.
- April 13—The baseball games played this day by the National League clubs were for the purpose of raising a monument memorial fund for the late Harry Wright, the veteran player.
- April 16—The championship season of the National League and American Association began with games in Washington, Baltimore, Philadelphia, Cincinnati, Louisville and St. Louis, a large attendance being at all the games. It is estimated that 22,000 people were present at Philadelphia-Boston game.
- April 23—In the game between Louisville and Pittsburg, Cassidy, first base man of the former team, had his arm broken by a player of the latter team falling on him; Pittsburg The annual basebal game between Republican and Democratic Assemblymen was won by the latter by a score of 20 to 15; Albany, N. Y.
- April 28-The Yale baseball team (13), shut out the Amherst team from scoring a single run; New Haven, Conn.
- May 2—In the championship game between St. Louis and Chicago the latter made a triple play, score 15 to 8. Breitenstein was batted out of the box in the 4th inning; Chicago, Ill.
- May 4—A phenomenal play in fielding was a throw from deep centre to third base by Van Haltren, New York, resulting in a double play in a game between New York and Louisville; Louisville, Ky.

- Nov. 23—The Atlantic League held its annual meeting. The pennant for 1895 was awarded to the Newark Club. Edward Burrows was elected president, and the Board of Directors was also elected; Philadelphia, Pa.
- Dec. 2—Annual meeting Board of Directors of the Eastern Baseball League. The Providence Club was awarded the pennant tor 1896. The farming system was abolished. A championship schedule was decided upon, beginning April 29 and ending Sept. 20, and officers were elected for the ensuing year; New York.



YCLE racing is unquestionably the leading amateur and profes-sional sport of to-day. This fact has been demonstrated by the enthusiasm which attended every event of importance held in this country, by the patronage accorded every race meet and the general con-dition of prosperity which prevails. Whether all this is justified or not can be determined by a careful perusal of the following pages. The record tables indicate the merits of the men who have been foremost in upholding America's claim to supremacy in the 'cycle racing world. From sprinting to distance riding our riders have been in the van, and competition for honors was never so keen. In the championship class there are many claimants, but only three should have a say in the final disposition of the championship plum. These three men are Eddie Cannon Bald, of Buffalo, the champion of '95; Tommy Cooper, of De-troit, who at all times in '95 was an important factor after his coming out in July, and Tommy Butler, the Boston schoolboy, who has re-peated in '96 the performances of Tom Cooper in '95, and has been the surprise of the year.

The percentage table was designed to secure a fair rating of the men. It was designed as a percentage on the mais of scratch events on the National circuit. It credits each man with defeating every man beaten to the tape and with being beaten by each man that beats him to the tape.

In the percentage tables, the men have taken the liveliest interest, and when at the close of the season, the Cannon Bald gained a per-centage of .789, Butler .786 and Cooper .774, Bald was the champion. It is a matter of regret that distance racing has been so long neglected by race meet projectors and the great success which attended the hour contest on Manhattan Beach track under the auspices of the Quill Club wheelmen should be proof sufficient to warrant a long dirtage event wheelmen, should be proof sufficient to warrant a long-distance event being placed on every National circuit program next season. This event was the greatest contest for supremacy ever seen on an American race track since the introduction of the racing wheel, and while it was necessarily defective in points, it was, judged moderately and not too critically, the best contested, and the most original race of the year.

critically, the best contested, and the most original race of the year. For the first time, individual pacing was tried in this country, and while it was not as perfect as that by pacing experts of Europe, owing to the unfamiliarity of the men with this new system, it was enough to set the grandstand and bleechers wild with enthusiasm—an object sought after by all race meets -and showed, also, that the American pace-makers, with a little practice in the art, could easily rank with the best of Europe, and thus add a new interest to all long-distance contests. Those who witnessed this particular race had an excellent chance to compare the merits of the American and the European racers. In Michael, Europe had one of her very best long-distance men—probably the best, if Linton, the countryman of Michael, is barred—ard in the Jallu brothers she had her crack pacing team. Comparing Michael with Starbuck, the American, it can be safely said that the American showed as much ease, if not so much grace, as the European in following pace,

as much ease, if not so much grace, as the European in following pace, while the American pacing teams, who are picked up without any train-ing together—so necessary for a good team—cqualed in every point the Frenchmen, and excelled them in many respects. It was noticeable that the American machines carried the contestants the easiest and most

that the American machines carried the contestants the easiest and most even miles of the race, while the foreigners were erratic. Starbuck is every bit as good a long-distance rider as "Jimmy" Michael, which is saying a great deal, and if the American can get together a set of pacemakers drilled in the art as the foreigners are, he will equal any performance put up by either Michael or any other foreigner of note. It is simply a question of following pace, and Star-buck has demonstrated his ability to follow the hottest pace that could be cut out for him, for while the fastest mile ridden by Michael was 2.01, three of Starbuck's miles were cut out at an average speed of the three of Starbuck's miles were cut out at an average speed of 1.55.





SPORT OF ALL SORTS.

PROBABLY the most notable feature in connection with all around sport is the growing interest which is being taken in events of international importance. During the past season we had an unusually large number of American bred horses entered in racing and trotting fixtures in England and on the Continent. The Yale crew, although beaten, rowed a creditable race at Henley. American cyclists wheeled against their contemporaries in Europe. Princeton and Boston sent their best athletes to Athens, where a revival of the Olympian games was in progress. A trio of our tennis champions went over to England to face the British experts, and Gaudaur, who, while a Canadian by birth, is affectionately regarded as an American champion, journeyed to England and wrested the title for international rowing supremacy from Australia's rowing champion. This competition for honors in foreign fields gives an impetus here to sports of all kinds. The trotting races at Nice, for instance, have awakened the liveliest home interest among the admirers and breeders of the American trotting horse. There is not only a national pride in the success abroad of our home bred horses, but the purely business view of the situation shows that it is opening up a valuable foreign market for our stock. The practice of sending our best athletes and oarsmen abroad is an excellent stimulus to good work at home. While numerous opportuni-ties are to be had here for races on the water or on the cinder path, nothing so keys men up to the highest pitch as the knowledge that they are to compete against the cracks of other countries. Yale's crew have always worked hard to get ready for Harvard, but probably they never were so dead in earnest, so anxious to get the best men in the boat, so ready to strain every muscle, as they were when they knew they were to meet the flower of England's oarsmen at Henley. Columbia's victory on the Thames gave a "boom" to rowing all over America, and if Yale wins next summer she will do a marked service to aquatics from one end wins next summer she will do a marked service to aquatics from one end

of the country to the other. American cyclists have already won high honors in Europe, and they have not only made good names and good records there, but have made a great market abroad for American made machines, which were

a great market abroad for American made machines, which were exported last year in quadrupled quantities. There is every indication that the coming summer will be made memorable by a return visit of the English athletes who were with us in r895. We had things pretty much our own way at the meeting here, and it would have been only fair to play a return match last year, as it were. There are greater difficulties here, however, than exist abroad in sending a team across the water. Our young men, as a rule, have not the leisure or the means that many of the English cracks enjoy, and it is hard for the average young American to get away for a trip to England. Still, if it could have been managed, it would have created added interest in our field athletics. Let us hope that the opportunity will not be lost during the forthcoming season. The tennis experts from England have given us an unpleasant taste of their quality, and it requires considerable nerve on the part of our players to face a net in England with such cracks on the other side of it. But it is said that our amateurs are going abroad to see what can be done.

S TANDING upon the threshold of a new year rich in promise of increased activity, it is only natural to glance retrospectively across the page of '96-a period punctuated by some of the most sensational events recorded in the history of "the ring." One little solitary year-merely a blot upon the tablet of life, yet prolific of great things; and, still better, leaving a track of the brightest possibilities in its wake. The most conspicuous of the many eventful things have happened

The most conspicuous of the many eventful things have happened since September r, when the Horton law went into effect in New York State, bringing with it a revival of interest in boxing throughout the entire country. The existence of the law created a demand for increased facilities; the organization of clubs to promote boxing has been largely occasioned by public demand; increased patronage has likewise occasioned an increased demand for professional services and opened up an avenue of financial promise to those God-gifted individuals who are willing to utilize their brawn and muscle in catering to what fastidious observers are prone to regard as "man's baser instinct," but which less conservative and, I think, more intelligent people regard as the appreciation of those heroic attributes which have given to the world leaders in every walk of life.

leaders in every walk of life. The championship problem is as much of an enigma now as it was at the beginning of the year just past, although at the time of writing this there is a more healthy indication of a solution being effected than at any previous time since James J. Corbett and Robert Fitzsimmonswho are universally admitted to be the contenders for the tille--began their interminable and wearisome controversy. The pages of "Fistiana" are replete with dark doings in connection with pugilism. Conspiracies involving the purity of the game and the honor of its patrons may be recalled with but little difficulty; dishonest methods have been resorted to to attain desired ends, and the sport has been made an avenue for the perpetration of every known kind of fraud, but it remained for Mr. Wyatt Earp to distinguish himself as the medium through which one of the most unsportsmanlike acts ever recorded in the history of sport was exploited. It was Earp who deprived Fitzsimmons of an honestly won victory over Tom Sharkey, by giving a decision in favor of the latter while yet he lay senseless from the effects of the beating he had received. Subsequent legal proceedings brough to light the details of a conspiracy without a parallel in sporting history. Corroborative evidence proved the existence of a plot to prevent Fitzsimmons winning, through the aid of the unscrupulous individual who officiated as the referee; but the redress for which Fitzsimmons applied was denied him, on the ground that the proceedings grew out of an illegal act, and could not, therefore, be judicially considered.

The considered. The conspirators were successful beyond their fondest expectations, for, had the case been decided upon an equity of rights, Earp's decision would have been overthrown and judgment given to the man who was entitled to it.





PUGILISTIC RECORDS.

Rules Governing the "Police Gazette" Diamond Belt Emblematic of the Heavyweight Championship of the World.

RULE 1-All contests for the POLICE GAZETTE Diamond Belt shall be fought according to the new rules of the London Prize Ring.

RULE 2—The holder of the trophy shall be the recognized champion pugilist of the world, and will be required to defend the trophy against all comers.

Rule 3—All matches for the belt shall be for no less a sum than r,∞ a side or upward at the option of the holder and the challenger.

RULE 4—The belt shall be subject to challenges from any pugilist in the world, but no challenges will be accepted unless a deposit of \$250 is posted with a responsible person.

RULE 5—Challenges shall date from the date of their receipt by the stakeholder, and the holder of the belt will be in duty bound to arrange a match with the first challenger.

RULE 6—All contests shall take place within four months from the date of the receipt of challenge by the stakeholder.

RULE 7—The holder of the belt must contend for the belt every four months if challenged, and not more than three times in twelve months.

RULE 8—All contests for the belt must be fought in the United States or Canada, not otherwise unless with the consent of the donor, and the holder of the trophy will have no power to select the fighting ground, but will mutually agree with the challenger upon the selection of the place.

RULE 9-If the holder of the belt and the challenger cannot agree upon the place of meeting, the stakeholder will select the fighting ground.

RULE 10—The belt shall become the personal property of any pugilist who wins it three times in succession or holds it three years against all comers.

RULE 11--The winner or holder of the belt must deposit satisfactory security, in money, with Richard K. Fox for the safekeeping of the same, and be prompt to return it to the stakeholder when called for.

RULE 12—The belt must be delivered to the stakeholder thirty days prior to a contest, and the holder refusing any challenge will forfeit all claims and rights to the trophy.

RULE 13—In all contests for the belt the final stakeholder shall act as or select the referee, with the mutual consent of the contracting parties,

Amateur Athletic Union Rules for Boxing and Fighting.

RULE 1—In all open competitions the ring shall not be less than 16 fert or more than 24 feet square, and shall be formed of 8 stakes and ropes, the latter extending in double lines, the uppermost line four feet from the floor and the lower line two feet from the floor.

RULE 2-Competitors to box in regulation athletic costume, in shoes 'ithout spikes, or in socks, and to use boxing gloves of not more than 8 unces in weight.

RULE 3-Weights to be; Bantam, 105 lbs. and under; feather, 115 lbs. and under; light, 135 lbs. and under; middle, 158 lbs. and under; heavyweight, 158 lbs. and over.

Rule 4-Any athlete who weighs in and then fails to compete, without an excuse satisfactory to the Games Committee, shall be suspended for six months.

RULE 5—In all open competitions the result shall be decided by two judges with a referee. A time-keeper shall be appointed.

RULE 6—In all competitions the number of rounds to be contested shall be three. The duration of rounds in the trial bout shall be limited to three minutes each. In the "finals," the first two rounds will be three minutes each, and the final round four minutes. The interval between each round shall be one minute.

RULE 7—In all competitions, any competitor failing to come up when time is called shall lose the bout.

Rule 8—Inmediately before the competition each competitor shall draw his number and compete as follows: To have a preliminary round of as many contests as the total number of contestants exceeds 2, 4, 8, 16 or 32, and drop the losers. This leaves in 2, 4, 8, 16 or 32 contestants, and the rounds then proceed regularly with no byes or uneven contests.

RULE 9—Each competitor shall be entitled to the assistance of one second only, and no advice or coaching shall be given to any competitor by his second, or by any other person during the progress of any round. RULE to—The manner of judging shall be as follows: The two judges and referee shall be stationed apart. At the end of each bout, each judge shall

RULE to—I he manner of judging shall be as follows: The two judges and referee shall be stationed apart. At the end of each bout, each judge shall write the name of the competitor who in his opinion has won, and shall hand the same to the announcer (or master of ceremonies). In case the judges agree, the master of ceremonies shall announce the name of the winner, but in cases where the judges disagree, the master of ceremonies shall so inform the referee, who shall thereupon himself decide.

RULE 11—The referee shall have power to give his casting vote when the judges disagree to caution or disqualify a competitor for infringing rules, or to stop a round in the event of either man being knocked down, providing that the stopping of either of the first two rounds shall not disqualify any competitor from competing in the final round to decide the competition in the event of either man showing so marked a superiority over the other that a continuation of the contest would serve only to show the loser's ability to take punishment. And the referee can order a further round, limited to two minutes, in the event of the judges disagreeing.

RULE 12-The decision of the judges or referee, as the case may be, shall be final.

RULE 13. In all competitions the decision shall be given in favor of the competitor who displays the best style, and obtains the greatest number of points. The points shall be: For attack, direct clean hits with the *knuckles* of either hand, on any part of the front or sides of the head, or body above the belt; defense, guarding, slipping, ducking, counter-hitting or getting away. Where points are otherwise equal, consideration to be given the man who does most of the leading off.

RULE 14—The referee may disqualify a competitor who is boxing unfairly, by flicking or hitting with the open glove, by hitting with the inside or butt of the hand, the wrist or elbow, hitting or catching hold below the waist, or hitting when down (one knee and one hand or both knees on the floor), butting with the head or shoulder, wrestling or roughing at the ropes, using offensive or scurrilous language, or not obeying the orders of the referee.

RULE 15—All competitors who have been beaten by the winner shall be entitled to compete for second place, and all who have been beaten by the winners of either first or second place shall be entitled to compete for third place.

RULE 16—Any athlete who competes in a boxing contest of more than four rounds shall be suspended for such stated period as may be determined by the Board of Managers of the association of the A. A. U. in whose territory the offense was committed.

RULE 17—In the event of any question arising not provided for in these rules, the referee to have full power to decide such question or interpretation of rule.

TROTTING.

A CONSPICUOUS feature of the speed performances for 1896 among the artificially gaited equines shows a marked distinction in favor of the pacer as a racing animal. The once despised side-wheeler has done all the great work the past year, and not only outnumbers the trotters in the 2:10 list by 139 to 52, but has done all the record-breaking, supreme in which stands John R. Gentry's 2:00 1-2. His mile at Port-land, Me., where he clipped a full st cond from the world's pacing record, was the most sensational event of the year, and gives the handsome bay stallion an unquestioned claim to the pacing crown, which up to that time was owned jointly by Gentry and the grand old champion, Rob-ert J. In the meantime the trotters have failed to come anywhere near the records, Fantasy's 2.06 being the best trotting mile in harness. The most enthusiastic admirer of the diagonal-gaited racers has ceased to hope that the trotter will be the first to enter the 2:00 list, which is only one short half second away from the pacer, the record having been reduced an even second in the year. The list of winning trotters contains three which have won \$5,000

The list of winning trotters contains three which have won $\$_{5,\infty}$ and upward; nine horses have won $\$_{3,\infty}$ and upward, while thirteen have won $\$_{2,\infty}$ and upward; forty $\$_{1,\infty}$ and upward, and seventy-five $\$_{5\infty}$ and upward. Mainly through her victory in the M. & M. stake at Detroit Emma Offutt stands at the head of this year's large winners. She is credited with $\$_{7,7,50}$. She has won four races and two second moneys out of six starts on the Grand Circuit, and considering the fact that she is but a four-year-old, and was green in the Spring, she must be counted one of the best performers of the season. Village Farm's chestnut mare, Valence, was not considered a first-class trotter when her measure was taken in her first race on the Grand Circuit at Saginaw. She has proved herself one of the wear-and-tear kind, however, and the fact that she stands second in the list of winners shows that she has been underestimated. In his only other start on the circuit he was disqualified. Village Farm also stands second in the list of winning pacers. The chestnut stallion Mocking Boy came out green in the spring. He won $$_{3,650}$, earned mainly by one winning first four times and second twice. Frank Agan won $$_{3,750}$. He paced more good and hard races than any other free-for-aller out this season. His Grand Circuit record shows two victories, three second moneys and one third money. Lottie Loraine stands the queen of the pacing turf. At Columbus she equalled the new record for pacing mares of $2:05 - 4_{4}$, made by Pearl C. in the previous heat, and her subsequent victory over that mare and her record of five victories out of five starts on the circuit make her the best pacing mare ever cam-paigned.

THE FOX BUILDING, FRANKLIN SQUARE, NEW YORK. In the field of athletic sport the season of 1897 can hardly be said to have been marked by advancement along encouraging lines. The growth of interest in cycling has been in a measure responsible for the diminishing consideration given to other branches of field sports. Track athletics find less and less favor with each succeeding year. The devotees to the various branches of cinder path sports comprise a mere handful compared to the number which participated in track and field games before cycling came in vogue. The Amateur Athletic Union has utilized every possible endeavor to uphold interest in the various branches of sport over which it holds jurisdiction, but all efforts have thus far proved unavailing.

THLETICS.

Clubs are becoming fewer as to numbers, and the indication seems to be that a few years hence will see them merged into cycling organizations and their general athletic character lost completely. That the popularity of athletic sports is diminishing is most convincingly shown in the lack of patronage given to field and track athletic meetings. It rarely happens nowadays that the balance sheet for an indoor or outdoor meeting shows a profit except in instances where the club or organization holding the games has an exclusive clientelle to draw upon. This is especially the case with regimental organizations, which make a feature of giving indoor meetings during the Winter months. But public affairs do not seem to sufficiently well-supported by its devotees to ensure profitable results. Many of the larger meetings have been abandoned for this reason—a fact which in a measure accounts for the falling off in numbers of the men who evince a prediliction for induiging in general athletic pastimes. The football season has, strange to say, been a marvelously success

The football season has, strange to say, been a marvelously successful one. Three overwhelming surprises loomed big in this season, and the football prophets were left orasping. The greatest feature was the showing of Vale, which, with a green and seemingly hopeless eleven, developed one of the strongest teams in her history, playing a tied game with Harvard and defeating Princeton, both of them supremely and justifiably confident with veteran aggregations. The third surprise was sprung by Cornell, which worked up a magnificent strength for her game with Pennsylvania and virtually played her proud foe to a standstill, losing by only one touchdown. The only big game which turned out as expected was the drubbing of poor Harvard by the Quakers. Thus Pennsylvania and Yale finish unbeaten, and the intangible claim of "the championship" is again disputed on paper for lack of a clash on the turf. The course of college politics toward arrangements for next year is much befogged. The readjustment most desired by the public would cause meetings between Princeton and Pennsylvania, and between the latter and Yale. It is probable that legislation during the coming winter will modify the playing rules, to lessen the predominance of "mass plays" in the interests of the spectator and to make the game less wearing and battering on the participant.

In cricket and tennis an element of international interest has been injected. The experiences which our American cricketers met with abroad were in no sense satisfactory, while our tennis experts made a glorious showing against the cracks of Great Britain. The Gentlemen of Philadelphia eleven toured England with disastrous results, losing nearly all of their matches. While they went up against the strongest county teams and the pick of Great Britain, they had not keyed themselves up for the stiff undertaking by enough hard preparation, and were below their best form most of the time.

Dr. Eaves, Nesbitt and Mahoney, who came here from England for the purpose of winning tennis honors, were forced to acknowledge the supremacy of our American players. In the series of tournaments played East and West, Larned and Wrenn towered head and shoulders over the visitors and won a great string of victories.





ALE'S victory over Princeton was the surprising feature of the football season of 1897. On the strength of her previous success and the knowledge that many of the men who participated in it had been retained on the team, made Princeton's chances look extremely bright. In all the preliminary games leading up to the final struggle, Princeton's form had been consistently good, while with one exception—the game between Yale and Harvard—the Blues had shown nothing of a significant character to justify the hope that they had more than an outside chance to win from Princeton. It was generally conceded that some marvelous condition must arise to facilitate Yale's chances to win. Many times in stances some hero had come into prominence at a critical period and turned the tide of affairs. Football historians are fond of alluding to the valorous deeds performed by the Heffelfingers, Lees, Me-Clungs, Hinkeys, Lakes, etc., etc., of the gridiron. They are the men who have achieved distinction by individual work, but it was thought that the changes in the rules with the adoption of ''close play'' would militate against any individual brilliancy on the field. It must be remembered that the member of a 'varity eleven is only a factor in a big machine. "Team'' work, interference, and even tackling, have been reduced to such a science that the only way a man can distinguish himself or hope to reach the 'varity is by making the most of the part he has to play in the machine. This new method not only deprives the player of the opporunity to gain personal glory, but also robs the game itself of the pectacular features which made it so popular with those other than colege enthusiasts. The modern expert looks upon the present form as the inghest development of scientific football, and there is no spectace more beautiful to him than that of a half-back following his interference or a runner bucking the line for a gain of five or ten yards; but all this is lost upon the great majority of football patrons, who cannot tell a ma

upon the great majority of football pations, who cannot terr a late pair from a foul tackle. Many of the old-school players advocate a return to the open game. They contend that the tackling in a clear field and the long runs with the necessarily brilliant dodging is not only as good football, but affords a more interesting spectacle for the grand stand. This theory was exemplified when De Saules saved the day for Yale by snapping at an opportunity to dash up the field for a thirty yard run and before being downed, placing the ball in an advantageous position, which enabled his associates to score the only points made in the game.

AQUATICS.

DWARD HANLAN TEN EYCK'S victory in the race for "The Sculls" at Henley stands alone as the rowing event of the season of 1897. For a lad yet in his teens to invite the disadvantages of rowing in a foreign land, amidst uncongenial surroundings, local opposition and discouraging antagonism, and defeat the very flower of England's amateur sculling fraternity, certainly cannot be overestimated, at least by American rowing enthusiasts who have long cherished and revered the patronymic which this young man bears. Time and time again American scullers, distinguished by their exploits in American waters, have gone abroad confident of their ability to win the premier honor which all rowing men covet, the "Diamond Sculls," emblematic of England's supremacy. All have returned disappointed and disheartened. Repeated efforts have met with no better success until it almost became traditional that conditions so favored the local exponents of the sport, that our scullers stood but a small chance, if any, to win. It remained for Ten Eyck to upset these calculations, and for the first

It remained for Ten Eyck to upset these calculations, and for the first time in the history of rowing, placed England's amateur sculling championship to the credit of an American. The memorable event took place at Henley on Thannes on July 16. For the final heat Ten Eyck and Blackstaffe measured oars. Ten Eyck got away first, slightly in advance of Blackstaffe, an advantage which he never lost. The half mile was reached in 3 m. 8 s. The three-quarter stake was reached in 4 m. 40 s., when Ten Eyck led Blackstaffe by a length and a half. The mile was passed in 6 m. 22 s. Ten Eyck leading by two lengths. Ten Eyck kept his pace, with perfect composure and without special effort, finishing in 8 m. 35 s.

If Ten Eyck's victory was not a popular one in England, the young champion's countrymen were determined that his distinguished achievment should receive the recognition it deserved, so upon his arrival in America he was welcomed and feted, and in Fanueil Hall, Boston's historic edifice, a public reception was accorded him, an event participated in by the Mayor of the city and many State and local officials.

In professional rowing nothing occurred of an international character to change the aspect of aflairs. J. G. Gaudaur of Orillia, Canada, retaining the title. Gaudaur's only race of importance occurring at Orillia, Canada, on May 24th, when James Rogers opposed him in a two mile match race for the championship of America. Gaudaur's hollow victory made it apparent that we have no professional waterman on this side of the pond to cope with him. His triumph in winning the "Police Gazette" cup, emblematic of the championship of America, by defeating John Teemer, Wm. O'Connor and James Rogers on successive occasions involving the title, was befittingly commemorated in December last by the presentation to Gaudaur of the silver trophy.

Cornell's triumph in the intercollegiate 'varsity series furnished another surprise to the rowing public; and made plausible the theory that why Yale and Harvard have hitherto denied the Ithacans the recognition they deserved was due to a lack of courage to measure skill and muscle in a race involving the question of aquatic supremacy. The Cornell oarsmen certainly proved themselves capable and efficient by defeating Yale and Harvard by two lengths at Poughkeepsie, and a week later disposing of Columbia and Pennsylvania over the same course.

In transatlantic traveling the steamship Kaiser Wilhelm der Gross has accomplished marvelous things in reducing the time in which journeys between the new and the old worlds may be made. Improvements in mechanical construction, which enhances possibilities in this direction are being made so effectively that the five-day steamer is not now looked upon as a chimera, but a probability likely to reach consummation.

The increased capacity for speed in smaller craft has likewise been very marked. The Ellide, a steam yacht, eighty feet long, proved this in three trials that were made over a measured mile on the Hudson River. One of these was accomplished in 1:37%, or two seconds faster than the Vamoose or Norwood had ever gone.

BASEBALL.

T HE League championship season of 1897 ended with one of the most even and closely contested series of games ever recorded in the hisory of the organization; in turf parlance the race between Boston and Baltimore might have been described as a "nose finish" with the Orioles just beaten on the post. The success of the Boston team was only achieved after a long and arduous uphill fight, in which more than the usual number of difficulties had to be surmounted. The story of the championship race might be summarized into a description of what the Boston team did to climb from the very last position in the percentage table to ultimate victory in the last series of games played at the close of the season—one of the most remarkably sustained endeavors in the history of the League. The season began very badly for the Bostonians. Five successive games were lost before a victory was attained, and this continued failure to win games placed them apparently, to all intents and purposes, out of the race. Baltimore, Cincinnati and Philadelphia had begun the season auspiciously, and were tied for first place, and the indications, judged by the playing strength shown thus early, were that thistrivwould be the principal contenders for the pennant at the close. But Boston developed unexpected speed during the first home series and by briliant and marvelous playing against Philadelphia, Washington and Pittsburg broke even two weeks later with a record of eight games lost and eight wow. Then began one of the most remarkable series of games probably ever played by any team. From that date to September 24, when the last series between Baltimore and Boston commenced, Baltimore and again led by .700 to .702. The next day Baltimore won and got the lead by the slender margin of one point in percentage. The third game went to Boston, that team now leading by .705 to .693. There was yet a possibility for the triple champions to win out if Brooklyn could win the series from Boston, coincident with Baltimore's success in the

and the pennant race ended in Boston's favor. The battle between the leaders was in one sense a test between clean, sturdy, scientific ball playing of the old style and the noisy, sensational, spasmodic kind of playing which has recently come in vogue. Boston's success in defeating the three-time winners proved that no one team can remain invincible.

While the season of 1897 has not been as profitable as a whole to the National League as was the season of 1896, several individual clubs that deserved increased prosperity and popularity of baseball is found in the minor leagues. In 1896 there were many changes and several collapses in minor leagues, that looked substantial. This year there was but little of this, and those minor leagues that did go up were of the Fourth of July kind—with the exception of the Texas League which collapsed because of too high salaries paid. Last year the Western Association, Southern, Texas and Interstate Leagues went by the board. This year the leading minor leagues and the Western, Eastern, Atlantic, Interstate and New England Leagues and the Western Association—played with practically no changes in the circuit, only one switch being noted, and that in the Eastern League, where Montreal was substituted for Rochester, because of fire visiting the Rochester grounds. With these facts to go by it seems as though baseball in the minor leagues will be more profitable than ever before. - June 20-The monument erected to the memory of Harry Wright was unveiled at West Laurel Hill Cemetery, Philadelphia, Pa.
- June 21-The Australian Baseball team defeated a team of old-time Boston League players by 27 to 13. Boston, Mass.
- June 24-The Arkansas State Baseball League was formed. H. Edwards was elected president, and a schedule adopted. Little Rock, Ark.
- June 28-Jennings, of the Baltimore team, was hit, while batting, with a ball thrown by Rusie, and was knocked unconscious. New York.
- July 12-It was reported that "Kid" Baldwin, the once famous baseball catcher, had died in an insane asylum.

- Aug. 25-William Norr, well-known baseball reporter and sporting writer, died; typhoid fever. New York.
- Aug. 27-New York defeated Chicage two games, scores 9 to 3 and 6 to 0. Mike Sullivan (N. Y.) shut out his opponents and held them down to three hits. Polo Grounds, N. Y. Tommy Moran, before his illness one of the star pitchers in the Eastern League, died; age, 27 years. R(chester, N. Y.
- Aug. 28-In New York-Cleveland game Cy. Seymour shut out the Clevelands. New York.
- Sept. 11—The Brooklyn-New York exhibition game for the benefit of Billy Norr's widow, resulted in free fight between the players and spectators after the seventh inning Seymour, New York pitcher, was escorted off the grounds by the police. Weehawken, N. J.

The Baltimore Club was a close second, with New York third; Cincinnati fourth; Cleveland fifth; Brooklyn, sixth; Washington seventh, and Pittsburg, Chicago, Philadelphia, Louisville and St. Louis following in the above order.
- Oct. 4, 5, 6, 9 and 11-Boston and Baltimore contended in a series of games for the Temple Cup. Baltimore finished first, winning four straight. Boston won the first game, the respective scores being 13-12, 13-11, 9-3, 12-11, 9-3. The first three were played in Boston and the fourth and fifth in Baltimore.
- Oct. 7-Baltimore beat Boston in an exhibition game 11 to 10. Worcester, Mass.
- Oct. 8-Baltimore beat Boston in an exhibition game 8 to 6. Springfield, Mass.
- Nov. 13—At the National League meeting the double umpire system was adopted. A four-trip schedule was arranged between Eastern and Western clubs, and a committee was appointed to formulate a plan regarding the using of foul language on the field. It was decided to open the season on April 25th and close October 1 th, with teams to play 154 games. Philadelphia, Pa.

"HE cycling season of 1897 passes into history as the most sensational

The cycling season of 1897 passes into history as the most sensational on record. Almost up to the very close of the year the time tables were subject to changes, and marvelous performances on the flying wheels continued to evoke wonder and amazement. For purpose of comparison it is as well to note the phenomenal gain in bicycle racing speed since 1890. Early in that year W. C. Jones pulled the mile in 2.20 3.5, from a standing start, the custom of those days. What followed statistics beet son table. best can tell.

best can tell. At the close of 1891 the record was reduced to 2.15—still with a stand-ing start. If 1892 the flying start came in, and 2.02 3-5 became the figure. At the end of 1893 the two-minute mark had been lowered, and John S. Johnson, paced by a running horse, had cleared the mile in 1.56 3-5. Dur-ing 1894 John made a record of nine seconds better, and in 1895 Berlo cut the time down to 1.40 2-5. The following summer it looked as if the limit had been reached, W. W. Hamilton making the time of 1.39 1-5. Last year, however, his record was assailed. E. A. McDuffee lowered it exactly one second, and later J. Platt-Betts, a famous rider of England, made the mile in 1.37 3-5. This stood until Stocks, almost at the tail end of the season, passed the winnung post in 1.33 2-5.

achievements of the cyclist can be adequately appreciated. Salvator's rec-ord, which for seven years, has stood as the best speed test for a mile ever made, except by a locomotive—1.35 $\frac{1}{2}$ —is 1-to of a second slower than the record made by Stocks, the famous record-riding Englishman. What the season of 1898 will provide in the way of records can only be conjectured, but the concensus of opinion among cycle riding experts, is that 1.30 or 1.31, will be done before the expiration of the year. This is made possible by the success which has been achieved by cycle-riders on straightaway paths, paced by locomotives, race-horses, etc., etc. The best of these unofficially recognized performances was made by C. M. Murphy of the Kings Co. Wheelmen of Brooklyn, N. Y. On Nov. 12, 1897, with a strong, wind blowing behind him, over a surveyed mile which was decidedly down-grade he rode a paced mile in 1 m. 4-5 s. The best time previously made was by Anderson, who, on a stretch of the Southern Pacific railroad, on a straightaway track, constructed for the occasion within the rails, made a mile behind a locomotive in 1.03. for a rule of the L. A. W. only permits man-pacing. At middle distance cycling the most extraordinary performance of the year was accomplished when Cordang, the Dutch cyclist, rode 616 miles and 340 yards in 24 hours. This distance is 50 miles further than the steamship Kaiser Wilhelm der Grosse traveled in making its record steamsnip kaiser Wilhelm der Grosse traveled in mastenig its record breaking westward trip across the Atlantic. One of the most astonishing features of this wonderful performance was the rate of speed maintained in the last hour of the ride. While approaching the 6ooth mile the flyer reeled off miles in tm, 56 s. and tm. 57 s., which, under the circumstances, seems almost impossible. And had the pacing teams been able to go faster the miles would undoubtedly have been run in better time. Dur-ing the ride "around the clock" Cordang was out of the saddle but nine-teen minutes—eight at one time, five at another and six toward the end of the run. of the run.

Next we come to six-day cycling, a type of sport horribly brutal to contemplate, and affording its patrons a spectacle which can only be com-pared to the sports which flourished during the Neronian reign of the Roman Empire. Happily we have about seen the last of these disgusting affairs, for at the time of writing this legislative action is about to be taken to put an end to them. In the race held in December last at Madison Square Garden, New York City, Charles Miller of Chicago accom-plished the extraordinary feat of riding 1983 miles. The official distance given was 2003 miles in 142 hours, but a re-measurement of the track de-veloped the fact that it was 201 ft. 9 in, short on each mile, which accounts for the discrepancy in the corrected distance.



RECORDS on the cinder path, in the field, on the trotting track, racing and cycling courses; in the air, on the ocean, records, nothing but records, show the sporting season of 1897 to be little short of marvelous. In every branch of out-door sport and for that matter, in every form of achievement to annihilate distance, world's records have been made, and we are forced to wonder if there is a limit which defies endeavor.

In swimming some incomparable performances have marked the season just ended. Paul Neuman, of the Chicago Athletic Association, who won in one of the swimming events at the Olympia games a year ago, swam a mile in 30:27 3-5. D. M. Reeder, of the New York Athletic Association, let down the American record for 220 yards from 3:07 to 2:57 2-5, and D. B. Renear, of San Francisco, clipped a couple of seconds off the too-yard mark. He swam the distance in 1:07 2-5. The previous best American time was 1:09¼ made by Whittaker, of the Chicago Athletic Club.

Boyd, of Milwaukee, subsequently equalled the Radcliffe performance. Boyd performed the phenomenal feat of combining drive, approach and put all into one swooping stroke of 195 yards from the tee, and neatly holing his ball at that enormous distance. C. B. MacDonald's brilliant score of 77 strokes for eighteen holes, according to a Western statistician, carries off the palm probably for the whole country, allowing for the difference in length of different links. Mr. Mac-Donald also broke the record at Washington Park, making the double nine in 74 strokes.

Improvements in mechanical construction are responsible for many records made during the past year in steamship and railroad travel. One of the most important records made during the year was the ocean steamship record between Southampton and Sandy Hook. The Kaiser Wilhelm der Grosse, on her first trip made the run in five days twenty-two hours and forty-five minutes. The Kaiser Wilhelm also partly broke the record on the return trip. Her time from Sandy Hook to Plymouth was five days fifteen hours and ten minutes, an average speed of 21.91 knots per hour. Had the Kaiser Wilhelm continued to Southampton at that speed she would have broken the record and made the run in five days twenty-one hours and ten minutes.

A new record for fast time by a railroad locomotive has just been established in New Jersey, the trial being made between Winslow and Cape May. It is said that during part of the run a speed of 120 miles an hour, or two miles a minute, was attained. The entire run of 54.1 miles was made in 56:05. The rate of speed for the entire distance was fifty-seven and one-half miles an hour. It is upon the speed of 120 attained part of the way that the record is claimed. The engine in this case was equipped with a Holman anti-friction speeding truck, to which the increase in speed was due. The truck is so arranged that it gives to the locomotive a "gear" similar to that of a bicycle, so that it travels for each turn of the drive wheels a distance on the track equal to 1.78 turns.

Another railroad record broken during the year was that between Chicago and Denver. The distance, 1,020 miles, was traveled in 18 hours and 52 minutes. The train that made this remarkable run was a special on the Chicago, Burlington & Quincy. It was chartered in Chicago to carry to Denver J. H. Mayham, of New York. Mr. Mayham's son was dying in Denver, and he took the special train method of reaching the boy's bedside at the earliest possible moment. The average speed for the entire trip was a little more than fifty-four miles an hour.



The patrons of sport in America have every reason to be proud of the distinction they have gained in the fistic world. Two decades ago this country figured very insignificantly in connection with "the ring," but to-day in all but one class we can boast of supremacy, and the undisputed possession of all titles. "Kid" McCoy's victory over Dan Creedon brought to a fitting close the pugilistic season of 1897-a period punctuated by some of the most sensational events recorded in the history of the sport. In fact a retrospective glance across the page of the year now drawing to a close shows it to have been more prolific of surprises than any similar period in the annals of fistiana. Three battles have been fought in which championship titles have been involved, in each of which the result was at variance with public expectation. Championship quality is therefore shown to be more uncertain to-day than it was when individual excellence was a more decided factor in ring affairs. "Class" predominates in pugilism as it does in racing. Men of ability are judged by a higher standard to-day than they were in the past, and the even quality of the men engaged in ring affairs deprives aboxer who has reached the pinnacle of success of that fancied security in the possession of his title which characterized the situation in the old days when the judgment of a boxer who had the temerity to challenge a champion was open to criticism and ridicule. Class is responsible for the existence of a condition which provides opportunities for men of championship quality, opens an avenue to increased activity, excites a more general interest in the sport; increased patronage justifies a demand for more and better facilities for promoting and enjoying the sport, and gives a healthy tone to each and every element ever—a fortunate thing for those God-gifted individuals who are willing to utilize their brawn and muscle in catering to what fastidious observers are prone to regard as "man's baser instinct," but which less conservative and, I think,

The most conspicuous of the many eventful episodes of the year was Bob Fitzsimmons' elevation to heavy weight championship distinction. While Corbett's defeat was decisive enough to give his opponent the title, it is, perhaps, unfortunate that the result was not reached in such a manner as to forever settle the question of the respective abilities of the two contestants. While Fitzsimmons' friends enjoy the profound satisfaction of supporting the victor, the friends of Corbett protest that the result was reached through a combination of unlucky circumstances in which the element of chance was a decided factor; in other words, that Fitzsimmons won by a chance blow when all indications favored the defeated one.

of "Kid" McCoy's victory over Dan Creedon little may be said at this time except in the way of comparing the old state of fighting with the latter day school, so ably represented by the men who now hold championships. McCoy compares with Corbett as an exponent of the new school of puglism. By a close and studious observation of the scientific possibilities of the game, he has acquired the art of utilizing an effective delivery with the least expenditure of reserve force, a method which, barring accident of course, will always prove effective against an opponent who depends solely upon muscular force as exemplified in the old school of fighting.

It is unfortunate that the views of the guardians of the morals of the people of the metropolis do not harmonize with the legislators at Albany upon the adaptability of the Horton anti-boxing amendment. Although the Horton law pretends to authorize boxing contests within limited restrictions, a defect in its provisions gives the police discretionary authority, the stringent exercise of which has almost caused the demise of boxing in New York City. Fortunately for the men who have adopted pugilism as a profession, other less conservative centres furnish them with a theatre for the exploitation of their peculiar talents.





Marquis of Queensberry Rules.

RULE I-To be a fair stand-up boxing match in a twenty-four foot ring or as near that size as practicable.

RULE 2-No wrestling or hugging allowed. RULE 3-The rounds to be of three minutes' duration, and one minute time between rounds.

RULE 4-If either man fall, through weakness or otherwise, he must get up unassisted, ten seconds to be allowed him to do so, the other man meanwhile to return to his corner, and when the fallen man is on his legs the round is to be resumed and continued until the three minutes have expired. If one man fails to come to the scratch in the ten seconds allowed, it shall be in the power of the referee to give his award in favor of the other man.

RULE 5-A man hanging on the ropes in a helpless state, with his toes off the ground, shall be considered down.

Rule 6-No seconds or any other person to be allowed in the ring during the rounds.

RULE 7-Should the contest be stopped by any unavoidable interference, the referee to name time and place, as soon as possible, for finishing the coutest; so that the match must be won and lost, unless the backers of both men agree to draw the stakes.

RULE 8-The gloves to be fair-sized boxing gloves of the best quality and new

RULE o-Should a glove burst, or come off, it must be replaced to the referee's satisfaction.

Rule 10-A man on one knee is considered down, and if struck is entitled to the stakes.

RULE 11—No shoes or boots with springs allowed. RULE 12—The contest in all other respects to be governed by the revised rules of the London Prize Ring.

London Prize Ring Rules.

RULE I-The ring shall be made on turf, and shall be four-and-twenty feet square, formed of eight stakes and ropes, the latter extending in double lines, the uppermost line being four feet from the ground, and the lower two feet from the ground. In the centre of the ring a mark be formed, to be termed a scratch.

RULE 2-Each man shall be attended to the ring by two seconds and a bottle-holder. The combatants, on shaking hands, shall retire until the seconds of each have tossed for choice of position, which adjusted, the winner shall choose his corner according to the state of the wind or sun, and con-duct his man thereto; the loser taking the opposite diagonal corner. RULE 3—Each man shall be provided with a handkerchief of a color suit-

able to his own fancy, and the seconds shall entwine these handkerchiefs at the upper end of one of the centre states. These handkerchiefs shall be called "Colors," and the winner of the battle at its conclusion shall be en-

titled to their possession as the trophy of victory. RULE 4—The two umpires shall be chosen by the seconds or backers to watch the progress of the battle, and take exception to any preach of the rules hereinafter stated. A referee shall be chosen by the umpires, unless otherwise agreed on, to whom all disputes shall be referred; and the decision of this referee, whether it may be, shall be final and strictly binding on all parties, whether as to the matter in dispute or the issue of the battle. The referee shall be provided with a watch for the purpose of calling time; the call of that referee only to be attended to, and no other person whatever shall interfere in calling time. The referee shall withhold all opinion till appeal d by the umpires, and the umpires strtctly abide by his decision without dispute.

LONDON PRIZE RING RULES-Continued.

RULE 5—On the men being stripped it shall be the duty of the seconds to examine their drawers, and if any objection arises as to insertion of improper substances therein, they shall appeal to their umpires, who, with the concurrence of the referee, shall direct what alterations shall be made. RULE 6—The spikes in the fighting boots shall be confined to three in number, which shall not exceed three-eighths of an inch from the sole of

RULE 6—The spikes in the fighting boots shall be confined to three in number, which shall not exceed three-eighths of an inch from the sole of the boot, and shall not be less than one-eighth of an inch broad at the point; two to be placed in the broadest part of the sole and one in the heel; and in the event of a man wearing any other spikes, either in toes or elsewhere, he shall be compelled either to remove them or provide other boots properly spiked, the penalty for refusal to be a loss of the stakes.

RULE 7—Both men being ready, each shall be conducted to that side of the scratch next his corner previously chosen; and the second on the one side and the men on the other, having shaken hands the former shall immediately leave the ring, and there remain until the round be finished, on no pretense whatever approaching their principles during the round, without permission from the referee. The penalty to be the loss of the battle to the offending parties.

Rule \$-At the conclusion of the round when one or both of the men shall be down, the second shall step into the ring and carry or conduct their principal to his corner there affording him the necessary assistance, and no person whatever be permitted to interfere in his duty.

person whatever be permitted to interfere in his duty. $RULE \circ On the expiration of thi ty seconds the referee appointed shall$ cry "Time," upon which each man shall rise from the knee of his secondand walk to his own side of the scratch unaided; the seconds immediatelyleaving the ring. The penalty for either of them remaining eight secondsafter the call of time to be the loss of the battle to his principal; and eitherman failing to be at the scratch within eight seconds shall be deemed to havelost the battle.

RULE 10—On no consideration whatever shall any person except the seconds and the referee be permitted to enter the ring during the battle; nor till it shall have been concluded; and in the event of such unfair practice, or the ropes or stakes being disturbed or removed, it shall be in the power of the referee to award the victory to that man, who, in his honest opinion, shall have the best of the contest. RULE 11—The seconds shall not interfere, advise or direct the adversary

RULE 11—The seconds shall not interfere, advise or direct the adversary of their principal, and shall refrain from all offensive and urritating expressions, in all respects conducting themselves with order and decorum, and confine themselves to the diligent and careful discharge of their duties to their principals.

RULE 12-In picking up their men, should the second willfully injure the antagonist of their principal, the latter shall be deemed to have forfeited the battle on the decision of the referee.

RULE 12—It shall be a fair "stand-up fight," and if either man shall willfully throw h mself down without receiving a blow, whether blows shall have been previously exchanged or not, he shall be deemed to have lost the battle ; but this rule shall not apply to a man who in a close slips down from the grasp of his opponent to avoid punishment, or from obvious accident or weakness.

RULE 14—Butting with the head shall be deemed foul, and the party resorting to this practice shall be deemed to have lost the battle.

RULE 15—A blow struck when a man is thrown or down shall be deemed foul. A man with one knee and one hand on the ground, or with both knees on the ground, shall be deemed down; and a blow given in either of these positions shall be considered foul, providing always that, when in such position, the man so down shill not himself strike, or attempt to strike.

RULE 16—A blow struck below the waistband shall be deemed foul, and in a close, seizing an antagonist below the waist, by the thigh or otherwise, shall be deemed foul.

RULE 17—All attempts to inflict injury by gouging, or tearing the flesh with the fingers or nails, and biting shall be deemed foul.

RULE 18—Kicking, or deliberately falling on an antagonist with the knees or otherwise when down, shall be deemed foul.

LONDON PRIZE RING RULES-Continued.

RULE 19-All bets shall be paid as the battle money after a fight is awarded.

RULE 20—The referee and umpires shall take their positions in front of the centre stake, outside the ropes.

RULE 21—Due notice shall be given by the stakeholder of the day and place where the battle money is to be given up, and be exonerated from all responsibility upon obeying the direction of the referee; all parties be strictly bound by these rules; and in future, all articles of agreement for a contest be entered into with a strict and willing adherence to the letter and spirit of these rules.

RULE 22—In the event of magisterial or other interference, or in case of darkness coming on, the referee (or stakeholder in case no referee has been chosen) shall have the power to name the time and place for the next meeting, if possible on the same day, or as soon after as may be. In naming the second or third place the nearest spot shall be selected to the original place of fighting where there is a chance of its being fought out.

RULE 23—Should the fight not be decided on the day all bets shall be drawn, unless the fight shall be resumed the same week, between Sunday and Sunday, in which case the referee's duties shall continue and the bets shall stand and be decided by the event. The battle money shall remain in the hands of the stakeholder until fairly won or lost by a fight, unless a draw be mutually agreed upon, or, in case of a postponement, one of the principals shall be absent, when the man in the ring shall be awarded the stakes.

RULE 24—Any pugilist voluntarily quitting the ring previous to the deliberate judgment of the referee being obtained shall be deemed to have lost the fight.

RULE 25—On an objection being made by the seconds or umpire the men shall retire to their corners, and there remain until the decision of the appointed authorities shall be obtained: if pronounced "foul" the battle shall be at an end, but if "fair," "time" shall be called by the party appointed, and the man absent from the scratch in eight seconds after shall be deemed to have lost the fight. The decision in all cases to be given promptly and irrevocably, for which purpose the umpires and the referee should be invariably close together.

RULE 26—If a man leaves the ring, either to escape punishment or for any other purpose without the permission of the referee, unless he is involuntarily forced out, shall forfeit the battle.

RULE 27—The use of hard substances, such as stones or sticks, or of resin in the hand during the battle shall be deemed foul, and on the requisition of the seconds of either man, the accused shall open his hands for the examination of the referee.

RULE 28—Hugging on the ropes shall be deemed foul. A man held by the neck against the stakes or upon or against the ropes shall be considered down, and all interference with him in that position shall be foul. If a man in any way makes use of the ropes or stakes to aid him in squeezing his adversary he shall be deemed the loser of the battle, and if a man in a close reaches the ground with his knees, his adversary shall immediately loose him or lose the battle.

RULE 29—All glove or room fights be as nearly as possible in conformity with the foregoing rules.

"Police Gazette" Revised Queensberry Rules.

RULE 1—The weights for all pugilists who contend in glove contests, according to the POLICE GAZETTE boxing rules, shall be as follows:—For heavyweights, over 158 lbs.; middle, under 158 lbs. and over 140 lbs.; light, under 140 lbs.

"POLICE GAZETTE" REVISED QUEENSBERRY RULES-Continued.

RULE 2-All contests to be decided in a twenty-four foot ring, which must be erected on the ground or stage.

RULE 4-Each contestant shall select an umpire, and they shall appoint a referee.

RULE 5-In all contests two time-keepers shall be appointed, and the referee, under no circumstances, shall keep time.

RULE 6—During the contest, if either man fall, through weakness or otherwise, he must get up unassisted, ten seconds being allowed him to do so, the other man meanwhile to retire to his corner; and when the fallen man is on his legs the round is to be resumed and continued until the three minutes have expired; and if one man fails to come to the scratch in the ten seconds allowed, it shall be in the power of the referee to give his award in favor of the other man.

RULE γ -A contestant hanging on the ropes in a helpless state, with his toes off the ground, shall be considered down. No seconds, or any other person but the referee, to be allowed in the ring.

RULE 8—Should the contest be stopped by any unavoidable interference. the referee, if appointed, or else the stakeholder, shall name the next time and place for finishing the contest, as soon as possible, so that the match must be either won or lost.

RULE 9—When either pugilist is knocked down within the allotted three minutes, he shall be allowed ten seconds to get on his feet again unassisted, except when this occurs in the last ten seconds.

RULE 10-One minute's rest shall be allowed between each round; and no wrestling, roughing or struggling on the ropes shall be permitted.

RULE 11—The gloves to be fair-sized boxing gloves, of the best quality and new. Should a glove burst or come off, it must be replaced to the referee's satisfaction. A man on one knee is considered down, and if struck, is entitled to the stakes. No shoes or boots with spikes allowed.

RULE 12—In all matches the stakes not to be given up until won or lost by a fight. That if a man leaves the ring, either to escape punishment or for any other purpose, without the permission of the referee, unless he is involuntarily forced out, shall forfeit the battle.

RULE 13—That any pugilist voluntarily quitting the ring, previous to the delibera'e judgment of the referee being obtained, shall be deemed to have lost the fight.

RULE 14—That the seconds shall not interfere, advise or direct the adversary of their principal, and shall refrain from all offensive and irritating expressions, in all respects conducting themselves with order and decorum, and confine themselves to the diligent and careful discharge of their duties to their principals.

RULE 15—If either man shall willfully throw himself down without receiving a blow, whether blows shall have been previously exchanged or not, he shall be deemed to have lost the battle; but that this rule shall not apply to a man who, in a close, slips down from the grasp of an opponent to avoid punishment or from obvious accident or weakness. The battle-money shall remain in the hands of the stakeholder until fairly won or lost by a fight, unless a draw be mutually agreed upon, or in case of a postponement one of the principals shall be absent, when the man in the ring shall be awarded the stakes.

RULE 16—In contests in which contestants agree to box four, six or a stipulated number of rounds, the referee shall have full power to order the men to continue, if it has not been decided during the four, six or number of rounds stipulated by one or the other of the pugilists stopping, losing by a foul or being beaten.

Rules Governing the "Police Gazette" Diamond Belt Emblematic of the Heavyweight Championship of the World.

RULE I—All contests for the POLICE GAZETTE Diamond Belt shall be fought according to the new rules of the London Prize Ring.

RULE 2—The holder of the trophy shall be the recognized champion pugilist of the world, and will be required to defend the trophy against all comers.

RULE 3—All matches for the belt shall be for no less a sum than \$1,000 a side or upward at the option of the holder and the challenger.

RULE 4—The belt shall be subject to challenges from any pugilist in the world, but no challenges will be accepted unless a deposit of \$250 is posted with a responsible person.

RULE 5—Challenges shall date from the date of their receipt by the stakeholder, and the holder of the belt will be in duty bound to arrange a match with the first challenger.

RULE 6—All contests shall take place within four months from the date of the receipt of challenge by the stakeholder.

RULE 7—The holder of the belt must contend for the belt every four months if challenged, and not more than three times in twelve months.

RULE 8-All contests for the belt must be fought in the United States or Canada, not otherwise unless with the consent of the donor, and the holder of the trophy will have no power to select the fighting ground, but will mutually agree with the challenger upon the selection of the place.

RULE 9-If the holder of the belt and the challenger cannot agree upon the place of meeting, the stakeholder will select the fighting ground.

RULE 10—The belt shall become the personal property of any pugilist who wins it three times in succession or holds it three years against all comers.

RULE 11—The winner or holder of the belt must deposit satisfactory security, in money, with Richard K. Fox for the safekeeping of the same, and be prompt to return it to the stakeholder when called for.

RULE 12— The belt must be delivered to the stakeholder thirty days prior to a contest, and the holder refusing any challenge will forfeit all claims and rights to the trophy.

RULE 13-In all contests for the belt the final stakeholder shall act as or select the referee, with the mutual consent of the contracting parties.

Amateur Athletic Union Rules for Boxing and Fighting.

RULE 1—In all open competitions the ring shall not be less than 16 feet or more than 24 feet square, and shall be formed of 8 stakes and ropes, the latter extending in double lines, the uppermost line four feet from the floor and the lower line two feet from the floor.

RULE 2—Competitors to box in regulation athletic costume, in shoes without spikes, or in socks, and to use boxing gloves of not more than 8 ounces in weight.

RULE 3—Weights to be; Bantam, 105 lbs. and under; feather, 115 lbs. and under; light, 135 lbs. and under; middle, 158 lbs. and under; heavyweight, 158 lbs. and over.

RULE 4-Any athlete who weighs in and then fails to compete, without an excuse satisfactory to the Games Committee, shall be suspended for six months.

AMATEUR ATHLETIC UNION RULES FOR BOXING AND FIGHTING. -Continued.

RULE 5-In all open competitions the result shall be decided by two judges with a referee. A time-keeper shall be appointed.

RULE 6—In all competitions the number of rounds to be contested shall be three. The duration of rounds in the trial bout shall be limited to three minutes each. In the "finals," the first two rounds will be three minutes each, and the final round four minutes. The interval between each round shall be one minute.

Rule 7-In all competitions, any competitor failing to come up when time is called shall lose the bout.

RULE 8—Immediately before the competition each competitor shall draw his number and compete as follows: To have a preliminary round of as many contests as the total number of contestants exceeds 2, 4, 8, 16 or 32, and drop the losers. This leaves in 2, 4, 8, 16 or 32 contestants, and the rounds then proceed regularly with no byes or uneven contests. RULE 9—Each competitor shall be entitled to the assistance of one second

RULE or bach competitor shall be entitled to the assistance of one second only, and no advice or coaching shall be given to any competitor by his second, or by any other person during the progress of any round. RULE to The manner of judging shall be as follows: The two judges and referee shall be stationed apart. At the end of each bout, each judges shall write the name of the competitor who in his opinion has won, and shall hand the same to the announcer (or master of ceremonies). In case the judges agree, the master of ceremonies shall announce the name of the winner, but in cases where the judges disagree, the master of ceremonies shall so inform the referee, who shall thereupon himself decide.

RULE 11-The referee shall have power to give his casting vote when the judges disagree to caution or disqualify a competitor for infringing rules, or to stop a round in the event of either man being knocked down, providing that the stopping of either of the first two rounds shall not disqualify any competitor from competing in the final round to decide the competition in the event of either man showing so marked a superiority over the other that a continuation of the contest would serve only to show the loser's ability to take punishment. And the referee can order a further round, limited to two minutes, in the event of the judges disagreeing.

RULE 12—The decision of the judges or referee, as the case may be, shall be final.

RULE 13. In all competitions the decision shall be given in favor of the competitor who displays the best style, and obtains the greatest number of points. The points shall be: For attack, direct clean hits with the knuckles of either hand, on any part of the front or sides of the head, or body above the belt; defense, guarding, slipping, ducking, counter-hitting or getting away. Where points are otherwise equal, consideration to be given the man who does most of the leading off.

RULE 14-The referee may disqualify a competitor who is boxing unfairly by flicking or hitting with the open glove, by hitting with the inside or butt of the hand, the wrist or elbow, hitting or catching hold below the waist, or hitting when down (one knee and one hand or both knees on the floor), butting with the head or shoulder, wrestling or roughing at the ropes, using offensive or scurrilous language, or not obeying the orders of the referee.

RULE 15-All competitors who have been beaten by the winner shall be entitled to compete for second place, and all who have been beaten by the winners of either first or second place shall be entitled to compete for third place.


RULE 16-Any athlete who competes in a boxing contest of more than four rounds shall be suspended for such stated period as may be determined by the Board of Managers of the association of the A. A. U. in whose territory the offense was committed.

RULE 17-In the event of any question arising not provided for in these rules, the referee to have full power to decide such question or interpretation of rule.

THERE is no disputing the fact that the history of harness racing does not show one season that can compare in any respect with the one which has just closed. While the season's trotting, taken as a whole, has been noteworthy and shows a normal advance in the general speed average of the various class contests, with numerous new records made, the disparity in extreme speed compared with pacing has been so noticeable that for the time being the plebeian side-wheeler must be accorded first place in the annals of harness racing. But the immense gap between 207%, the fastest trotting record of the season, which an analysis of the year's records will show to be abnormal. Of course Star Pointer's incomparable performance was the stellar event of the season, but hardly less remarkable were the performances of Joe Patchen, John R. Gentry, Robert J. and numerous lesser lights of the pacing division which have monopolized public attention, almost to the exclusion of the trotter. In the matter of records the most eventful episode of the year was "Pointer's " success in getting under the two-minute mark. This was accomplished at the Readville track near Boston on August 28th. For that performance he is called the "horse of the century." and he deserves the name. Aside from that one great performance, he has gone over the track in time that no horse but one of the best could equal. The details of Star Pointer's great recordbreaking mile are still well remembered. He rolled off the first quarter in 30 seconds flat. The half-mile pole was passed in 59% seconds. At the three-quarters pole the great horse was a quarter of a second more under the two-minute clip, and the mile as he finished it was the fastest ever paced.

Another notable feature of the year to which attention is called in the following tabulated pages is the remarkable exhibition of early and extreme speed. During the year there have been no less than seventy newcomers to the 2:10 list. Of these nineteen were trotters and fifty-one pacers. Three trotters and eleven pacers which commenced the racing season without a record are found enrolled in the fast list, although one of the pacers, Satin Slippers, 2:00, had last season trotted to a mark of 2:13. Of the three green trotters the fastest is the Hamlin four-year-old, The Monk, 2:08¼, while from the same stable came another four-year-old, Dare Devil, 2:09¼, and the racing mare Passing Bells, 2:08½.

Among the season's green pacers are the three-year-olds, Betonica, 2:06¾; Searchlight, 2:07, and Patchen Boy, 2:08¼. The best three-year-old record prior to 1897 was the 2:07¼ made by Directly. This mark was first reduced by Searchlight, who made his mile in 2:07 in California, and a few days later the Palo Alto three-year-old Betonica knocked still another quarter of a second from the mark, his mile being also the fastest for a green pacer. Of the new 2:10 pacers, eleven are four-year-olds, headed by Palmyra Boy, 2:06¼, while there are a round dozen five-year-olds, of which Frank Bogash, 2:04¼, is the fastest. In the trotting, Grace Hastings holds the honor of the fastest mile among the newcomers to the list, her mile in 2:08 being the best of the ninetcen and the second fastest of the year.

Even in Europe, where trotting has only recently become a factor in sports, the record tables show an improvement during the season of 1897. Colonel Kuser, 2:11¹/₄, the stallion by Stranger out of Inez, by Jay Gould, that out-campaigned everything on the European trotting turf during the year, seems to have much of the quality of his paternal grand dam, Goldsmith Maid, 2:14. He has secured the fastest mile record of Europe, 2:14 I-10, repeating in 2:14 3-10, after having trotted the greatest campaign ever known there. But another of his sons, Nominee, 2:17¹/₄, that was exported to Russia some two years ago, won the great free-for-all stallion race of the year at St. Petersburg, thus acquiring the highest turf honors.

HE closing of the season for 1897 left the racing situation in a condi-tion which justifies the Jockey Club in congratulating itself upon the marked improvement in the sport, re-inspired confidence on the part

tion which justifies the Jockey Club in congrafulating itself upon the marked improvement in the sport, re-inspired confidence on the part of the public, and complete satisfaction among the racing contingent regarding the administration of the practical affairs of the turf. As for the racing itself it was quite up to average excellence, and its cleanly character, due to the adoption of rigorous measures by Mr. Belmont and his associates, was a marked feature of the season. The patronage accorded the sport was in every respect satisfactory, and the profits of the various racing associations were substantially increased. The Coney Island Jockey Club, the Brooklyn Jockey Club all paid substantial dividends, and for the amount of money invested the profits of the latter meeting were very large—larger, in fact, in proportion, than at any other track in the country. The same condition of affairs is reported from the Western tracks—good racing, little scandal, and large profits. While, as stated above, the racing was quite up to the average degree of excellence, it can hardly be said that the season was in any sense a brilliant one. Leaving Hamburg out of the question, the year was unproductive of results so far as the development of phenomenal form is concerned; but, in Madden's splendid son of the great Hanover, et and the black son of the great Hanover, while he does not possess the unbeaten record of Tremont, he will live in history as a mightier racer than the black son of Virgil, and in the opinion of M. F. Dwyer, one of the former owners of Tremont, there is no doubing Hamburg's superiority. At the time of writing this Hamburg had just passed out of the hands of John F. Madden and into those of some unknown owner for a consideration of \$60,000—the highest price ever paid for a young horse. a young horse.

In the three-year-old division The Friar and Ornament divided the honors of the season. The former's showing in the Realization was the greatest in the history of that race. His performance in the Brighton Cup at two miles, in which he reeled off the furlongs with mathematical precision, was the best race at the distance ever run by an American three-year-old, if not by a three-year-old in any country. How The Friar would have fared had he been given an opportunity to meet Ornament, the Western champion of the three-year-old division, can only be surmised, for the former had retired before Ornament entered upon his Eastern campaign. A race between them at any distance from six furlongs to two miles would have afforded a fair test of merit, for both horses had shown form as sprinters and distance performers. Among the older division Ben Brush was the bright, particular star, having as many admirers as any horse on the turf.

American bred horses have been more successful on the English turf than in any previous season since 1881. History sometimes repeats itself, but only at long intervals, and, though American horses won more inservices and the search of t

important fixtures to which foreign bred animals are eligible. A summary—which is necessarily brief—of the season of 1897 would not be complete without reference being made to Jockey "Tod" Sloan, whose success on the English turf, furnished one of the sensations of the defunct season. An entire stranger, with a prejudice against the American style of jockeyship to live down, he succeeded in convincing the English racing public of his ability, enlisted a good feeling, and reached a pinnacle of fame and popularity that is simply astounding.


