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## '97 Class bìstory.

|I' was on the 1 Sth of September, iS93, that Mother Phillips was given the task of inventing a name for a gathering of slim-legged, frightened infants. With astonishing boldness she named it a Class, and that the Class of '97. This class, howerer, was promptly christened "Preps" by the rest of the school.

These "Preps" soon showed their athletic prowess in having Pierson on the football team, and Parker, who won the temis singles from Exeter, and in the doubles, aided by Prentiss, easily defeated our New Hampshire rivals.

During the Junior Middle year '97 abolished the old cane rush, substituting for it the now famous baseball games. During the class meeting held in reference to the abolition of the came rush, an orator of great promise was developed, hut he has since transferred his bursts of eloquence to '9 ${ }^{8}$ 's class meetings.

Ninety-seren was again well represented on the football team, boasting of four men and one substitute.

The time for the baseball game with 'g6 soon came around, and such a ncene as the old campus never before saw was enacted there in June, 1895 . Both classes were assembled in full force, and every one was provided with some instrument for making noise. Ninety-seven made a grand success in that part of the game, for one would have thought that all the immates of the Dansers Asylum were holding high carnival. Ninety-five ably seconded the class with a battery of small connon and a hrass band; but notwithstanding all the efforts, ' $9^{6}$ succeeded in carrying off the championship by the score of $13-10$.

On June 11, 1895 , we saw Lawrenceville dismissed from the campus with a large-sized goose egg to their credit; while Andover, largely through the magnificent pitching of Sedgewick, one of '97's numerous athletes, rolled up eleven runs.

Throughout the Middle year '97 maintained her high stand in athletics, but unfortunately she was unahle to win from ' 9 號 the spring. This defeat was largely due to the fact that all her best baseball players were on the first team. for five of the members of the class were representing Old Phillips on the diamond.

The whole class took its usual prominent part in the nightshirt parade, which is claimed to have been the greatest part of the celebration of the two hundred and fiftieth anniversary of the founding of Andover.

During the spring term the old Co-op scheme was once more resurrected, but by the valiant efforts of ' 97 and a few other members of the school it was once more hurried back to the shelf, where it will probably remain until it is again thrown upon the tender mercies of the school.

Ninety-seven began her career as Seniors by instituting several new schemes into the school, and re-establishing some of the old customs laid aside by previous classes. In all these she has met with great success.

In the establishment of the Class Handicap Track Games, the advantage of the plan was immediately seen, for the entries were larger than in any previous Handicap Meet. And in this '97 easily defeated the under classes and won the cup, which is now to be seen in the trophy case.

The Class Book is another of the innovations introduced by the class, and bids fair to become an established publication by succeeding classes.

The greatest of all of ' 97 's successes is the renewal of the athletic contests with our old rival, Exeter; this was brought about by the members of the class on the Athletic Advisory Committee.

Another of the old customs re-established is that of making a present to the school, which was discontinued by '94.

November 1 fth saw the first of the renewed games with Exeter, and Old Phillips once more came out victor by the magnificent score of $28-0$.

The cup offered by P. S., '97, for the best individual playing against Exeter, was awarded to F. L. Quinby, '9S.

It will thus be seen that '97's career as Seniors has been one of the most useful that the school has seen for many years, and that the stained glass window that the class is to present to the school as a companion to the '93 class present, will be a fitting memorial of the benefits she has wrought for the school on the hill.
