SYNOPSIS

David Rowe (RAYMOND ST. JACQUES), a white liberal, recovers from a brain transplant operation with no serious complications, except the massively difficult readjustment period in his career and in his life. His wife Margaret (SUSAN OLIVER), though sympathetic to his recovery, finds herself unable to fully accept him as her husband. He has a black body. The operation is over and reporters are huddled in the hospital waitingroom for news of whether it is a success. They want to know what he is now; a white man in a black body...or a black man with a white brain. The doctor answers, "David Rowe is what he always was -- a human being." Once Rowe is recovering at home, a medical report states: "...since the brain of David Rowe survives -- the brain which reasons, has compassion, personality, loyalties and love, which has memory, instinct and sentience--then David Rowe, district attorney of Dorene County, survives--medically and legally."
Rowe's mother, Angela Rowe (COSETTE LEE), has trouble accepting the change in her son. Near the end of his recovery, Rowe's assistant, Roger Morrow (DONNELLY RHODES), brings him his first case. The town's bigoted sheriff (LESLIE NIELSEN) has been charged with savagely murdering a young Negro girl. Rowe immediately returns to work despite pleas by his party's political boss Bill Chambers (JACK CRELEY) to leave well enough alone. Rowe also refuses an order by the State Governor (JOSEPH SHAW) to drop the case. Frustrated by the political pressure being exerted upon him, and because his wife cannot accept him fully as her husband, Rowe seeks out Elizabeth Dickson (JANET MacLACHLAN), wife of the man whose body he has received. Although he has visited her before and tried to offer help, this visit is different. He finds her singing in a nightclub and becomes embroiled in a fight with her boss, then takes her home. She is attracted to him and he, frustrated by his own wife's rejection, begins to make love to her, but she cannot accept him. Chambers still insists Rowe's name will not be placed on the party roll for the coming election because of his color. Rowe lashes into his case against Sheriff Webb. He produces some extraordinary evidence and the result is suspensful and climactic. How he proceeds with the case and the surprises he uncovers affects not only the life of the man on trial, but David's own life, his marriage and his entire political and personal future.







Director Robert Stevens won an Emmy for his Alfred Hitchcock Presents drama, "The Glass Eye." He has previously directed such films as, "The Big Caper," "Never Love a Stranger," and "In the Cool of the Day."

Seeleg Lester and Richard Wesson make their debuts as producers and film collaborators with "Change of Mind." Both have written extensively for radio and television.

Henry S. White, president of Sagittarius Productions, took on the extra role of executive producer because he felt "Change of Mirid" was the most important and timely script he had read in years.

"Change of Mind" offers us the possibilities of tomorrow. It is the film for today.

BRAIN TRANSPLANTS - FICTION OR REALITY?

Once upon a time Buck Rogers took "fictionalized" trips to the moon and science fiction stories dealt with interplanetary voyages. There were stories and films of mad scientists and doctors who transplanted parts of bodies from one human to another. Fiction to us then; reality today.

Who foresaw, until recently, that man would finally take that first step on the moon and orbit around that strange, once fictional land of "Outer space"? We've seen the reality of transplants with the many heart and multiple organ transplants over the past few years.

"Change of Mind", the Sagittarius Production from Cinerama Releasing Corporation, is the first film to deal with a subject as timely as today-the possibility and reality of the world's first brain transplant.

Ten years ago, a brain transplant would have been thought of as science fiction, but it is now, according to many doctors and scientists, a definite possibility. Dr. Christian Barnard, leading heart transplant pioneer, forecasts that he expects to perform a brain transplant operation. Such statements are not unusual. A leading British magazine, Nova, has reported that at a conference held last year in England, a bio-chemical engineer stated that he foresaw the replacement of every part of the body as a possibility within 20 to 30 years!

There are still many problems of brain surgery--the danger of brain damage because of loss of blood. (It has been reported that doctors feel this can be allayed by reducing the temperature of the body.) There is the problem of linking the many brain cells to the spinal cord and, of course, the brain must be of the correct tissue type.

As the reality comes nearer, studies and reports continue. This year it was reported by an American researcher that brain tissue can regenerate itself.

Each new discovery uncovers new questions. Does the transplanted brain tissue carry over characteristics of the original donor? After the transplant, is the person as he was before or does he inherit the thoughts, dreams and wishes of the donor?

One researcher has stated: "There is absolutely no reason why transplantation of brain tissue should not result in a transfer of behavorial characteristics."

Truth or fiction? In the accelerated Jet Age in which we live, we've learned there's more truth than fiction.

"Change of Mind" tells the story of that first brain transplant and gives some of the answers being asked today. It stars Raymond St. Jacques, Susan Oliver, Leslie Nielsen, Janet MacLachlan, and features Donnelly Rhodes. Directed by Robert Stevens, and co-produced and co-authored by Seeleg Lester and Richard Wesson, with Henry S. White, executive producer, "Change of Mind" has an original musical score by Duke Ellington.

WILL BRAIN TRANSPLANTS BE NEXT?

Young American's This fundamental research—which could be the forerunner to brain transplant procedures in research discovery

ALAN MASSAM

A young American research worker has demonstrated that brain tissue can regenerate - a discovery with immense implications for science.

I understand that work is now in pro-gress to see if the transplanted tissue from one brain to another can carry over characteristics from the donor individual.

the forerunner transplant procedures in human beings — is a big topic of conversation among psychologists in London this week.

It is being discussed by delegates attending the 19th inter-national Congress of Psychology at University College, London.

EXPERIMENTS ON FROGS

The research is at such an early stage that it has not been documented and is not the subject of a scientific paper to the Congress.

The animals being used in the experiment are frogs and salamanders. They have been chosuse a great deal is already known about the basic physiology of these species.

A leading expert on brain blo-

A leading expert on brain blo-chemistry said today that the idea of transplanting charac-teristics from one individual to another was quite feasible.

another was quite feasible.

"We have known for some years that there are enzymes which govern the growth of the central nervous system." he said.

"There is absolutely no reason why transplantation of brain tissue should not result in a transfer of behavioural characteristics since this is fundamentally a question of chemical reactions." he explained.

BRAIN TRANSPLANTS MAY BE POSSIBLE, SAY DOCTORS

BRAIN transplants may become possible. And the recipient of such a graft will become the person whose brain he or she receives. This was the view expressed in London yesterday by a panel of medical experts.

Until now brain transplants have been ruled out because nerve tissue, once damaged, does not regenerate, get better and grow again. The experts were questioned by the audience at the annual meeting of the National Fund for Research

into Crippling Diseases.

Prof. George Dick, of the Middlesex Hospital Medical School, and Dr. John Mar-Hall, of the National Hospital, agreed that science was advancing so rapidly that scientists were chary of saying anything was impossible. It anything was impossible. It might be possible to stimulate regeneration of nerve tissue.

PROF. J. P. TIZZARD, of the Royal Post - graduate Medical School, Hammersmith Hospital, hoped he would not live to see brain transplants. "If they come we shall have to look for a new definition of death and I would suggest, very humbly, when the heart stops."

Research priorities

Asked what should be the priorities in medical research to-day, Prof. Robert Kened, a bioengineering expert at Strathclyde University, said that attention should be paid to the chronic sick as opposed to miracle transplantations, to the ageing process and to preventive medicine.

Was it right to keep alive a baby born with a gross malformation? the panel was asked. Prof. Tizzard instanced babies with severe spina befida, a congenital defect in the spinal column.

Some babies, operated on early, survived normally. Others became helpless cripples. If it was possible to tell which babies would be crippled would it be justified to keep them alive? It was an impossible question to answer.

Doctor's job

"If I had a child with such severe spina befida that it was unable to walk I would rather it died at birth. But that is a different thing from saying: Let it die."

This was a responsibility too heavy to ask parents to bear. It was the doctor's job to take responsibility and make a decision. "These are things much better not discussed, but left to the conscience of individual doctors."

One is designed for the utmost appeal to women, and care should be taken that it is scheduled on the day time soap operas and women's shows accordingly. The other spot is more controversial, an action spot designed for your late evening audiences. This spot is designed for use on late fringe prime shows and on into the late and late late shows. A 20 second spot is available but we recommend its use only when a particularly good availability is present and you cannot buy a 60. In other words your buy should consist of as many 60's as possible with heavy emphasis on the day time "soaps" and the late night movies.
