Jack Nicholson won an Academy Award nomination for his "Easy Rider" portrait of a young Southern lawyer, alienated by his repressed and repressive environment and finding solace only in liquor. Currently, at the Theatre, Nicholson is starred in "Five Easy Pieces" as an erstwhile child musical prodigy alienated by his comfortable, intellectually sterile environment and seeking escape by working and living as a "hard-hat."

Nicholson is a multi-talented young actor who probably is less alienated from his movie-making milieu than anyone in Hollywood. He knows exactly what he wants to do with filmeverything!-and he already has done

a good deal of it.

Nicholson began his screen career as a motion picture cartoonist, studied acting at the Players Ring Theatre in Hollywood and ultimately wound up acting, writing and/or producing. He has been involved, one way or another, with such pictures as "Cry Baby Killer," "Too Young to Love," "Ensign Pulver," "Flight to Fury," "Studs Lonigan," "The Raven" and "Head." "The Shooting" and "Rider in the Whirlwind," two films of which he is especially proud, were low-budgeted Westerns which won considerable critical acclaim and many festival honors abroad. Nicholson wrote "The Trip," "Hells Angels on Wheels" and "Psych Out," and he is co-starred with Barbara Streisand in "On a Clear Day You Can See Forever," a film in which he made his debut as a singer (of the title tune, no less!) After "Five Easy Pieces," Nicholson went to work on his debut as a director, filming "Drive, He Said," for Columbia Pictures and BBS Productions, makers of "Easy Rider" and "Five Easy Pieces." Karen Black and Susan Anspach appear in princi-pal support of Nicholson in "Five Easy Pieces," which was produced by Bob Rafelson and Richard Wechsler from a screenplay by Adrien Joyce based on a story by Rafelson and Miss Joyce.



Her only other film, "You're a Big Boy Now," marked her motion picture debut after two years of college and a considerably longer period on and off-Broadway and in television. One of her Broadway performances, in the short-lived "Playroom," won her a drama critics' nomination as best actress of the season.

In preparing for her "Five Easy Pieces" role as a thickly-accented, Oklahoma-born waitress, Miss Black spent several weeks traveling throughout the country and studying the mores and morals of hash house waitresses. She befriended several, and lived and worked with them for weeks.

Her devotion to this duty is clearly evident in her "Five Easy Pieces" performance as a woman with a tremendous capacity for love unable to satisfy

a man who is not easily satisfied. Bob Rafelson who directed "Five Easy Pieces," from a screenplay by Adrien Joyce based on a story he wrote with Miss Joyce, also co-produced with Richard Wechsler. Bert Schneider served as executive producer.

Not too long ago, Jack Nicholson, who stars in Columbia Pictures' "Five Easy Pieces," a BBS production in color directed by Bob Rafelson, decided, after 11 years in motion pictures, that it was about time to quit acting and to concentrate on writing and producing. But Rafelson, a long time friend, talked Nicholson into taking just one more acting assignment, that of the alcoholic, small town southern lawyer in "Easy Rider" and he also talked Dennis Hopper and Peter Fonda into putting Nicholson into the role. Nicholson received an Academy Award nomination for the acting stint.

Helena Kallianotes makes her screen debut in a small, but virtually non-stop, role in support of Jack Nicholson in Columbia Pictures' "Five Easy Pieces," the BBS production also starring Karen Black and Susan Anspach. A former belly-dancer and erstwhile Roller Derby skater, Miss Kallianotes plays a girl whom Nicholson and Miss Black pick up while on her way to Alaska, which she has been told is somewhat cleaner than the rest of America, and she delivers a lengthy commentary on the dirt, pollution and trash that are destroying the nation.

Columbia Pictures' "Five Easy Pieces," a BBS Production in color starring Jack Nicholson, called for scenes in which an oil field worker, Nicholson's sidekick portrayed by Bill (Green) Bush, plays with his 18-month-old son. Bush's own 18month-old son plays the part to perfection.

A professional actor for 40 years, having started his career with the original Group Theatre in New York, William Challee makes his motion picture debut in "Five Easy Pieces," starring Jack Nicholson, as the patriarchal head of an intellectually-deprived and emotionally-uninvolved family. Challee plays his entire role in silence. As a man who has lost his power of speech as the result of a stroke, he must convey all of the many emotions required of the role using just his face.
