

SYNOPSIS

(Not For Publication)

In 1937 Denard (Charles Boyer), ex-musician, now agent for Spain's Republican Party, Rose Cullen (Lauren Bacall) and Licata (Victor Francen), Fascist agent, meet on the Channel steamer to England.

Denard accepts a lift to London from Rose. En route they stop at a roadhouse managed by Captain Currie (George Coulouris). Followed and beaten up by Licata's chauffeur, Denard manages to arrive at last in London at a small hotel kept by Mrs. Melandez (Katina Paxinou) where he finds a loyal friend in little Else (Wanda Hendrix), Cockney servant. A roomer at the hotel is Mr. Muckerji (Dan Seymour), Hindu mystic. Denard contacts Contreras (Peter Lorre), another Republican agent, later exposed as a traitor.

On his way to meet Rose, Denard is again attacked by Licata's agents, but escapes injury. He tells Rose his mission involves buying coal from Lord Benditch (Holmes Herbert), Rose's father.

Else reports to Denard that Mrs. Melandez and Contreras are his enemies. Then, while he is away, Mrs. Melandez and Contreras kill Else.

Denard sees Lord Benditch but cannot consummate a purchase because his credentials have been stolen by Licata's agents. Denard is accused of the murder of Else and becomes a fugitive, swearing vengeance to Contreras and Mrs. Melandez for the girl's murder.

Denard follows Contreras and threatens him at revolver point. Contreras collapses and dies, victim of a heart attack. Back at the hotel, Mr. Muckerji informs Mrs. Melandez that he has information and witnesses to prove that she and Contreras killed Else. Mrs. Melandez drinks poison, defeats Denard who arrives in time to watch her die.

Next, Denard goes to the coal mines, about to reopen to supply Licata's Fascists with coal. He pleads with the miners not to go through with this scheme. A riot ensues and with Rose's help Denard escapes. She arranges for him to leave the country by enlisting the aid of Neil Forbes (John Warburton), her ardent admirer.

Forbes, driving Denard to the tramp steamer which will take him back to Barcelona, informs Denard that Licata's coal contract was cancelled because of the riot at the mines and its attendant publicity. Denard has not failed after all. The Fascists will not get the coal.

A last-minute attempt to capture Denard before he boards the steamer is foiled. Once on board, he stares dreamily into the dark water, imagines he hears Rose's voice, turns in astonishment and joy to discover she has followed him aboard. They embrace tenderly.

Warners' 'Confidential Agent' Opening Tonight At Strand

A subtle blend of terse melodrama and inspired romance, Warner Bros.' "Confidential Agent" opens tonight at the Strand Theatre with Charles Boyer and Lauren Bacall in the top starring roles and a featured cast that includes Katina Paxinou, Peter Lorre, Victor Francen and George Coulouris.

Adapted from Graham Greene's well-known novel of the same name, "Confidential Agent" traces the incredible adventures of a freedom-loving artist who undertakes to perform an impossibly difficult mission on behalf of the Spanish Republican Party in the days before the rest of the world had become embroiled in the life and death struggle against fascism. Apart from its pure entertainment value, the film also affords a timely and invaluable backward glance into the isolationist attitude of the world of 1937 which contributed heavily to the later world holocaust.

Directed by Herman Shumlin, "Confidential Agent" was produced by Robert Buckner. Franz Waxman contributed the film's original music.

Exciting New Drama At Strand Stars Charles Boyer, Lauren Bacall

(Prepared Review)

Hardy followers of the action-packed, lightning-paced school of drama which has become synonymous with the name of Warner Bros. since that studio produced "The Maltese Falcon," "To Have And Have Not" and other hits of like caliber, will rejoice at today's news of a new and equally expert thriller, "Confidential Agent," which opened last night at the Strand Theatre. With a cast headed by Charles Boyer and Lauren Bacall, and featuring Katina Paxinou, Peter Lorre, Victor Francen and George Coulouris, the film is a worthy descendent of those earlier exponents of murder and intrigue. Just on the odd chance that there remains any doubt about Warners' unquestionable superiority in the field of melodrama, "Confidential Agent" is designed to dispel it for all time.

In the first place, "Confidential Agent" relies for its plot on the exciting tale of adventure and espionage as originally set down in Graham Greene's popular novel of the same name, from which the film was adapted. As readers of Greene's books can testify, he is one author who can always be depended on for the ultimate in terror and suspense. The screen version happily retains all the interest-consuming qualities of the original and adds a few new ones on its own.

Action-Filled Drama

The film's action takes place in 1937 and, in barest outline, concerns the hairraising adventures of one Denard (played by Charles Boyer), ex-musician, now engaged in a secret mission on behalf of Spain's heroic Republicans. In those days, it will be recalled, the world was a tenuous paradise of isolationism and it was no mean feat for the beleagured but freedom-loving Spaniards to enlist outside aid in their fight - to - the - death against

But Denard, in spite of (or, perhaps, because of) his extraordinary artistic temperament, is immune to physical risk, mental torture and other generally unendurable hardships. When he embarks on a trip to London in order to purchase large stores of coal from the British his purpose is twofold. First, his antifascist comrades can use the fuel to manufacture much needed implements of war;

second, he can at least prevent his enemies, the fascists, from obtaining the coal for the same purpose.

Improves Story

Credit Hollywood with the added ability to make a good script even better. As proof, "Confidential Agent" also offers, in addition to its wellsustained action, an eloquent and impassioned love story which is patricularly wellsuited to the combined acting talents of Boyer and Lauren Bacall. The latter portrays Rose Cullen, impetuous daughter of an English lord, at first only mildly curious about the mystery surrounding Denard; later, deeply in love with him and willing to risk her fortune and her life itself for his safety.

Auspicious casting and excellence of direction have contributed in equal measure to the films success. As Denard, Charles Boyer enacts the most mocing role of his career and brings to it a wealth of acting experience that renders the characterization completely believable and extraordinarily sympathetic. The choice of Lauren Bacall as Boyer's romantic leading lady is entirely fortuitous. In this, her second screen role, the actress has an excellent chance to prove her thespian prowess and does so with great ability. In addition, she further cements the extraordinary impression she created when she made her film debut in "To Have And Have Not."

Others in the generally excellent supporting company turn in fine performances, with particular emphasis on Katina Paxinou, who continues to employ that same screen

skill which won her an Academy Award in the past. In "Confidential Agent", she portrays a turncoat Spanish woman who manages the small London hotel in which Denard takes refuge; and her murderous plotting takes on special terror by dint of her expert handling of the role. Also worthy of note is the job turned in by Peter Lorre as the sly, mendacious London contact maintained by the Republicans. Other featurned members of the cast are all good, too.

The difficult job of directing fell, fortunately, into the competent hands of Herman Shumlin who manages to sustain the film's action and suspense from beginning to end with a maximum of artistic effect. Robert Buckner produced for Warner Bros. while Franz Waxman contributed the film's stirring music.

Denard himself encounters beatings, robbery and finally, murder, before his suspenseful journey comes to an end.

Of mortal enemies, Denard can claim an abundance. There are Mrs. Melandez (Katina Paxinou), manageress of the small London hotel in which he makes his abode; Contreras (Peter Lorre), a "contact" man attached to the Spanish Republicans; (Victor Francen), suavely treacherous fascist; Captain Currie (George Coulouris), British Army, Ret., and active opportunist; and,

lastly, the curious Mr. Muckerji (Dan Seymour), ponderous Hindu and follower of a mysterious Far Eastern philosophy. How Denard meets these enemies and outwits them through a series of hairraising encounters that includes at least one brutally sadistic attack on his own person, the heartless murder of an innocent little girl who tries to aid him, and a breathtaking pursuit and escape through the labyrinth of blackest London streets, makes for as exciting an evening of entertainment as has come out of Hollywood in a season lush with screen ex-

Inside Information "CONFIDENTIAL AGENT"

Charles Boyer, currently co-starring with Lauren Bacall in Warners' "Confidential Agent" at the Strand, entertained Admiral Charles Fenard of the French Navy on the studio lot during the picture's filming, and found they had a mutual friend in Lt. Commander Douglas Fairbanks who was decorated by the Admiral at a recent ceremony in London.

Katina Paxinou, famed character actress who plays the important featured role of "Mrs. Melandez" in Warners' "Confidential Agent," renewed her professional association with Charles Boyer during the picture's filming. They had previously worked together for Greek War Relief.

While visiting on the set of "Confidential Agent," Norma Boleslawski showed the director, Herman Shumlin, and stars Charles Boyer and Lauren Bacall, a copy of her late husband's book on acting which, she explained, would soon be published in Braille as a result of numerous requests from blind students throughout the United States.

The first film made by Charles Boyer, currently co-starring with Lauren Bacall in Warners' "Confidential Agent" at the Strand, was "Barcarole d'Amour," which he made (in French) in Berlin in 1930 as a member of the French company brought in by the German producers to do a complete French version.

Lauren Bacall, who co-stars with Charles Boyer in Warners' "Confidential Agent," currently at the Strand, learned to drive a complicated British Vauxhall of early vintage, in less than five minutes for a sequence in the picture.

Director Herman Shumlin made a scene, lasting over two and half minutes, comprising two full pages of dialogue, with Charles Boyer and Victor Francen for Warner Bros.' "Confidential Agent," in only one take. This sets a new Hollywood record in economic film-making.

Victor Francen, currently to be seen in an important featured role in the Charles Boyer-Lauren Bacall co-starring film, "Confidential Agent," has been a friend of Boyer's for twenty-five years, from the time they played together in the Paris presenta-tion of "A Thousand And One Nights," in which Francen had the role of the Sultan and Boyer was one of the princes.

Victor Francen, who plays a leading role in Warner Bros.' "Confidential Agent," was once known as the Barrymore of the French stage, and did not speak a word of English until he came to New York a little more than four years ago.

It's 'Whistle While You Work' On 'Agent' Set

Lauren Bacall may be an expert on whistling of all kinds, including the variety she produces on the small gold whistle that dangles at her right wrist on a gold chain, and Peter Lorre is no slouch when it comes to whistling as he kills. All-Star Trio Born Amid Props And Studio Noise

The Shumlin, Bacall, Boyer Concert Trio was born on the set during the filming of Warners' "Confidential Agent," now at the Strand, when director Herman Shumlin, after directing a sequence with music in the restaurant of the Dover Road tavern, borrowed a violin and played "Humoresque."

Plays Violin

Charles Boyer, inspired by the director, followed suit although he has not played for about twenty-eight years, and Lauren Bacall sat at the piano and did a good job of accompanying, despite lack of practice.

George Coulouris, Victor Francen, and other members of the cast diplomatically suggested that the trio do some rehearsing before giving a public performance at the Philharmonic or the Hollywood Bowl.

Lauren Bacall Modeled Her Way To Screen Fame

From fashion pictures to motion pictures – via a season of seasoning on the Broadway stage – is the opening chapter in the career story of svelte, slender and blonde Lauren Bacall, currently co-starring with Charles Boyer in Warners' "Confidential Agent," at the Strand.

Miss Bacall has a face that is easy to look at, hard to forget. Mrs. Howard Hawks, wife of the director, saw it looking out at her from the pages of a national fashion magazine, and was greatly impressed. So was Hawks, when his wife called his attention to it.

The director wrote to New York for information about Miss Bacall and it wasn't long before Miss Bacall herself arrived in Hollywood, "testcontract" in hand.

In the flesh, she looked even better than her pictures on the magazine pages. Furthermore, Hawks discovered the photogenic Lauren had a background of stage training and experience. A screen test proved she possessed acting talent, and Hawks signed her to a personal contract.

Jack L. Warner, executive producer of Warner Bros. pictures, saw a subsequent test of the former model and budding Broadway actress and had an extremely brief run. suggested she be given one of the two feminine leads opposite Humphrey Bogart in the picture "To Have And Have Not." It was her first screen part, and it automatically put her in the featured actress class, establishing her as a potential star. Her contract is now shared by Warner Bros.

Miss Bacall was born in New York City on Sept. 16, 1924. She is the daughter of parents who trace their American ancestry back several generations.

Her early education was received in a private girl's school: Later, she attended, and was graduated from, Julia Richman High School. She was just fifteen when she received her diploma.

Bette Davis is her favorite actress, and the inspiration for her own acting ambitions. By the time she was graduated from Manhattan's Julia Richman High School, she'd seen enough Davis pictures to realize it took training to be an actress.

She received some of that necessary training during a season's study at the American Academy of Dramatic Arts, got more of it by playing parts in two short-lived plays. The first was called 'Johnny Two-By-Four." . It never reached Broadway. The second, "Franklin Street,"

A social introduction to one of the editors of Harper's Bazaar led the then eighteenyear-old Miss Bacall into the modeling detour that proved a short-cut to a motion picture acting career. She modeled fashions, and was in only a few issues of the magazine when the query from Hollywood arrived.

Miss Bacall signed her contract with Hawks in May of 1943. Then she encountered the first of the delays she had been eager to eliminate. Hawks was is no hurry to launch his new discovery on a career. He chose to coach her while waiting for the proper debut role to put her immediately into the "big leagues."

Married Stars Give Bit Player **New-Type Role**

Barbara Stanwyck, Alexis Smith and other happily married but superstitious young women on the Warner Bros. star roster, have brought Marvelle Andre a more or less continuous job in pictures.

Miss Andre, an extra and bit player subject to studio call, has appeared, in part, in more pictures than has either of the better known stars mentioned. "In part," in fact, because only her hands are photographed.

Stars Like Rings

Miss Stanwyck, Miss Smith and a number of other feminine stars do not like to remove their wedding rings, even for picture purposes. So, when they are supposed to write letters, or wring their hands or wash dishes-as Miss Stanwyck did recently, for example in "Christmas In Connecticut,"-it is Miss Andreor at least her hands-photographed in the closeups.

Lauren Bacall, the new Mrs. Humphrey Bogart, did not want to remove her brand new wedding ring for scenes with Charles Boyer in Warners' "Confidential Agent," now at the Strand. Her wedding ring, however, is not a plain gold band but an elaborate gold chain ring and both Director Shumlin and head cameraman James Wong Howe agreed that it would not look like a wedding ring in the picture. However she had no closeup scenes of her hands and consequently wears her wedding band throughout the picture.

According to the Warner Bros. insert department, where letter writing scenes are filmed in closeup, Miss Andre has beautiful hands which makes her a fit successor to other young women like Fern Berry and Augusta Bovier who have performed similar services in years past. Miss Stanwyck and Miss Smith have pretty hands too-under their tell-tale wedding rings.

'Agent' Requires Vast Amount of Research

Diligent workers in Warner Bros.' research department, headed by scholarly, encyclopaedic Dr. Herman Lissauer, have discovered that as far back as 1788, it was not uncommon for a young man to whistle at - or to - a doll, or a young maiden.

This was incidental to the department's work on the production of "Confidential Agent," the Charles Boyer-Lauren Bacall starring film now at the Strand.

For several weeks before sets were ready and the cast finally chosen, questions by the dozen came into the research department even though "Confidential Agent," is not a period nor a costume

Why all the fuss and bother?

Because Jack L. Warner, executive producer at the studios, insists on accuracy and authenticity as far as possible within the limits of dramatic license.

Endless Details

"Confidential Agent" is set in England in the Fall of 1937. It is a mystery-drama of mood and action. There were many details for the research department to settle for the production department. For example, what kind of a wash-room would there be in an exclusive road-house on the highway from Dover to London? What did a Spanish passport look like in 1937? What kind of road signs were in use then? What does the third class bar on a Channel steamer look like? The customs shed at Dover? What style of identification would be used by an English taxidriver? Could you have newspaper streamers on a London

A writer challenged the use of the word "roadhouse" in England. Dr. Lissauer countered with the Oxford English dictionary definition, "a wayside inn or hotel."

Production experts wanted photographs of London streets, London hotels, London types, and London houses in 1937. Research provided them at once from their files.

The art director, Leo Kuter, wanted to have topical signs made for use in street scenes on buses and trucks. Research gave him "Pygmalion at the Old Vic," "Europe's Dictators," and "Is Hitler A Menace?"

The research department gave the Earl Hays Press in Hollywood, a concern that will print you a newspaper or a birth-certificate from Istanboul, if they use them there, exact details of the Spanish passport and you can see Charles Boyer using it in one of the early scenes of the picture.

For details of the washroom, the researchers delved into the novel on which the film is based, "Confidential Agent," by Graham Greene, and used his description. That's basic material and should be right.

As for the matter of a fellow whistling to a dame in 1788, that is co-incidental but Lauren Bacall seemed to have planted an idea in one researcher's mind and he had to find out.

Peter Lorre Thinks About **House-Haunting**

Peter Lorre, who plays an important role in support of co-stars Charles Boyer and Lauren Bacall in Warners' "Confidential Agent," now at the Strand, looked troubled when he reported for work at the Warner Bros. studios one day and director Herman Shumlin, always very considerate of his players, asked the cause.

Sadly Lorre told him that he had bought this little house, wanted to get in, but the people just couldn't or wouldn't move out.

Shumlin reflected for a moment.

"Got it, Peter. Why don't you just haunt them out?"

Sitting quietly near his fogmaking apparatus was C. Otis (Dusty) Miller, of the studio special effects department.

A former engineer and a powder expert of the last war, Miller is a veteran of a thousand fogs, sandstorms, windstorms, floods, fires, earthquakes, train wrecks, shipwrecks, tidal waves, and volcanic eruptions, planned and prepared for the screen.

He carries a Federal license from the Bureau of Mines to handle explosives of all kinds and handling explosives is the hazardous part of his work.

Cameraman Reviews Chinese Film Plans

"I have made up my mind not to be a cameraman all my life," says James Wong Howe, director of photography for the Charles Boyer-Lauren Bacall co-starring film, Warners' "Confidential Agent," currently at the Strand.

"I expect to go to the Orient and direct and produce pictures, made first for the millions in Asia, and second for world release."

Chinese learn fast. Even in the caves and cellars of Chungking, they went right ahead with the making of films to tell the world what China was doing in the fight against Japan."

"Very important to me is the part movies will take in the education of millions in China. We in this country often say that one pictures peaks at hous and words. In the

There was also a shortage of cricket bats, a sort of flatsurfaced gadget used in the game.



Herman Shumlin directed "Confidential Agent," and Robert Buckner produced the film for Warner Bros.



SYNOPSIS

(Not For Publication)

In 1937 Denard (Charles Boyer), ex-musician, now agent for Spain's Republican Party, Rose Cullen (Lauren Bacall) and Licata (Victor Francen), Fascist agent, meet on the Channel steamer to England.

Denard accepts a lift to London from Rose. En route they stop at a roadhouse managed by Captain Currie (George Coulouris). Followed and beaten up by Licata's chauffeur, Denard manages to arrive at last in London at a small hotel kept by Mrs. Melandez (Katina Paxinou) where he finds a loyal friend in little Else (Wanda Hendrix), Cockney servant. A roomer at the hotel is Mr. Muckerji (Dan Seymour), Hindu mystic. Denard contacts Contreras (Peter Lorre), another Republican agent. later exposed as a traitor.

On his way to meet Rose, Denard is again attacked by Licata's agents, but escapes injury. He tells Rose his mission involves buying coal from Lord Benditch (Holmes Herbert), Rose's father.

Else reports to Denard that Mrs. Melandez and Contreras are his enemies. Then, while he is away, Mrs. Melandez and Contreras kill Else

Denard sees Lord Benditch but cannot consummate a purchase be cause his credentials have been stolen by Licata's agents. Denard is accused of the murder of Else and becomes a fugitive, swearing vengeance to Contreras and Mrs. Melandez for the girl's murder.

Denard follows Contreras and threatens him at revolver point. Contreras collapses and dies, victim of a heart attack. Back at the hotel, Mr. Muckerji informs Mrs. Melandez that he has information and witnesses to prove that she and Contreras killed Else. Mrs. Melandez drinks poison, defeats Denard who arrives in time to watch her die.

Next, Denard goes to the coal mines, about to reopen to supply Licata's Fascists with coal. He pleads with the miners not to go through with this scheme. A riot ensues and with Rose's help Denard escapes. She arranges for him to leave the country by enlisting the aid of Neil Forbes (John Warburton), her ardent admirer.

Forbes, driving Denard to the tramp steamer which will take him back to Barcelona, informs Denard that Licata's coal contract was cancelled because of the riot at the mines and its attendant publicity. Denard has not failed after all. The Fascists will not get the coal.

A last-minute attempt to capture Denard before he boards the steamer is foiled. Once on board, he stares dreamily into the dark water, imagines he hears Rose's voice, turns in astonishment and joy to discover she has followed him aboard. They embrace tenderly.


