Tie-up With Veiled Lady

Heavily veiled woman can wander around town, sitting in various hotels, bars and restaurants. Teaser campaign in co-operation with these places consists of ads of this type: "Have you seen 'The Widow from Monte Carlo?' She's having dinner this evening at the Loyale Restaurant." Same idea can be worked with various department stores and dress shops, possibly allowing the "widow" to parade in some of the dress models. And then there's the old one of the newspaper contest, with ducats for those who identify the "widow", who wanders about town. In order to win, y know, contestants must have a copy of the paper with them.

Success on London Stage

Entry slips are handed out and patrons mark down their choice, with tickets offered to those who guess the correct names. Of course, contest can be made easy or hard, depending on how many candidates they have to guess, so you can suit yourself in planning this stunt.

Women almost always stop at the mirrors to straighten their hats and see if their make-up's O.K., and even the men generally sneak a glance at themselves as they leave theatre. So put your plug where most people will see it—right on the mirror! Of course, you'll paste 'em so that they don't shut off the glass completely, or the whole idea is spoiled. And then you can change it all the time.

She called Bette her favorite actress and slipped in a couple of mentions about the film which just happened to be opening the next day. To help the stunt along, announcer started to gag about it . . . which all helped to nab a couple of added plugs for the film. Think you can do something of the sort with local amateur hour?

MONTE CARLO LUCKY NUMBER NIGHT

Title suggests many gambling stunts, but here's one we think is a little out of the ordinary. Idea is to have a new idea in lucky number drawings at your opening, possibly calling it "Monte Carlo Night." You go about it in this way:

PATRONS RECEIVE NUMBERS

Week before opening, usher invites patrons to choose number between I and 100. He writes numbers on special slips and hands 'em back to patrons. (Another way of assigning numbers is to hand out numbered heralds, telling patrons to bring 'em to opening.)

WINNING NUMBER SELECTED

On opening nite, big lottery wheel is set up on stage. Just before feature goes on, one of town's celebrities gets up and spins the wheel. When wheel stops, all holders of lucky numbers are asked to step up and receive free tickets. Of course you realize that if you can get a wheel with more than 100 numbers on it, the less will be the chances of more than a couple of people winning.

"Monte Carlo Week"

For a stunt the whole town can tie in on, why not a "Monte Carlo Week?" Patrons making purchases at co-operating stores receive numbered coupons. Idea is planned so that it ends on night picture opens, with your theatre the locale for choosing of lucky numbers and awarding of whatever prizes co-operating stores have donated. Needless to say, stores carry window streamers and newspaper ads telling folks about "Monte Carlo Week," and tying up your show with the whole stunt.

Find Perfect Hairdress

With Del Rio as the inspiration, see if local hairdressers will tie up with search for hairdress that most perfectly suits the personality of its wearer. Co-operating beauty shops advertise coiffures that blend with personalities, illustrating with Del Rio stills. After this build-up, contest is held on stage, with city's best-known hairdressers acting as judges.

Gag Spiel for Heralds

In distributing heralds, you could have man handing 'em out on street with spiel like this: "Here you are, folks! Read all about a night at Monte Carlo with 'The Widow from Monte Carlo.' Here it is, folks, step right up and get your copy." If you've got the right kind of a spieler, there's no reason why stunt shouldn't go over.

Travel Agency Ties Up

Film's stills of Monte Carlo's gambling casino, hotels, and heaches should make nice background for fravel agency's window display, no? Copy tells all about the "Widow"—and other sights in Monte Carlo.

Print Invites & Cards

Instead of programs, why not mail invitations to your patrons. Made up real swanky, they should look as much as possible like the real McCoy, inviting folks to see your show. Another angle is to print up calling cards, leaving 'em under doors. Copy reads: "The Duchess of Rye called. She will be at the Strand Theatre all week in 'The Widow from Monte Carlo'."

The picture is based on the rollicking play by Ian Hay and A. E. W. 'Widow From Monte Carlo' Riotous Comedy Romance

Warren William and Dolores Del Rio In Series of Delightful Adventures

This rollicking comedy drama, besides its laughter and love affairs, carries plenty of exciting action, though even this is more or less shot with humor. The characters involve a playboy major, a widowed Duchess, somewhat flirtatiously inclined, her very

proper English relatives and her even more proper fiance; a very rich and persistent widow who is trying to crash society and an American crook who is a fugitive from justice.

These are all mixed up in a series of thrilling, although amusing adventures, which lead to a rather amazing climax. Warren William never played with more deliberate and delightful abandon than in his role of the major who sweeps the Duchess off her feet and into his arms after an informal flirtation at the Casino at Monte Carlo to which Her Grace had gone incognito for a night of adventure.

Dolores Del Rio, as the Duchess, is as beautiful and charming as ever and gives the part a piquant flavor which makes it entirely delightful.

As the woman seeking to crash society, especially that of the Duchess, Louise Fazenda does an excellent job. She plays the part with all the comedy side lines for which she is famous.

Colin Clive gives a good performance as the quite proper and over dignified English diplomat, betrothed to the Duchess. She gives him a merry run-around and winds up by ditailing him entirely.

Warren Hymer adds a big share of humor as the crook, who teaches the stiff neck. English butler, a part played by Olin Howland, how to shoot crap, purloins an indiscreet letter the Duchess had written the major, which had fallen into the hands of the social climber, who was using it as a means of blackmail. Incidentally the crook steals several diamond necklaces at the same time, which is eventually his undoing.

Others in the cast include Herbert Mundin, Ely Melyon, E. E. Clive, Mary Forbes, Viva Tattersall and Herbert Evans. Arthur Greville Collins, who handled the megaphone, has done an excellent job of directing. F. Hugh Herbert's screen play, based on the comedy drama of Ian Hay and A. E. W. Mason, is exceptionally well handled as is also the dialogue by Charles Belden.

In addition the tractor motor can be turned into a pump to use in a fire emergency to siphon out the 40,000 gallons of water in the William swimming pool.

A compressed air tank on the tractor keeps the tires on the cars in the William garage inflated and can also be used as a paint spray unit or for spraying the trees in the orchard.

When he first began to plough the ground on his Encino Ranch in California, he found so many rocks that the blades in the fur-row maker were broken three times. He set to work and built an ingenious device which now picks up rocks first.

The section of San Fernando Valley in which William lives is one in which the fire peril is particularly hazardous. It is in a heavily forested section, one of the more or less unpopular "No Smoking Zones." He realized that in the event of one of those un-fortunate forest conflagrations he would practically be without water to protect his own property.

For this reason he purchased the water pump which operates from the motor of his tractor. His swimming pool which is always kept full, contains 40,000 gallons of water and this he can now turn into a reserve supply in the event water pressure from the main system is being concentrated at some other nearby point.

It was a simple matter to add the compressed air tank which now offers a three-fold use. It is the same type tank with which many automobiles are equipped for tire inflation.

In addition to supplying his tire air, a couple of simple attachments and the tank supplies the necessary pressure for either painting or spraying his trees.

William has been credited with inventing a number of devices but none that have caused so much comment as his "jack of all trades" tractor.

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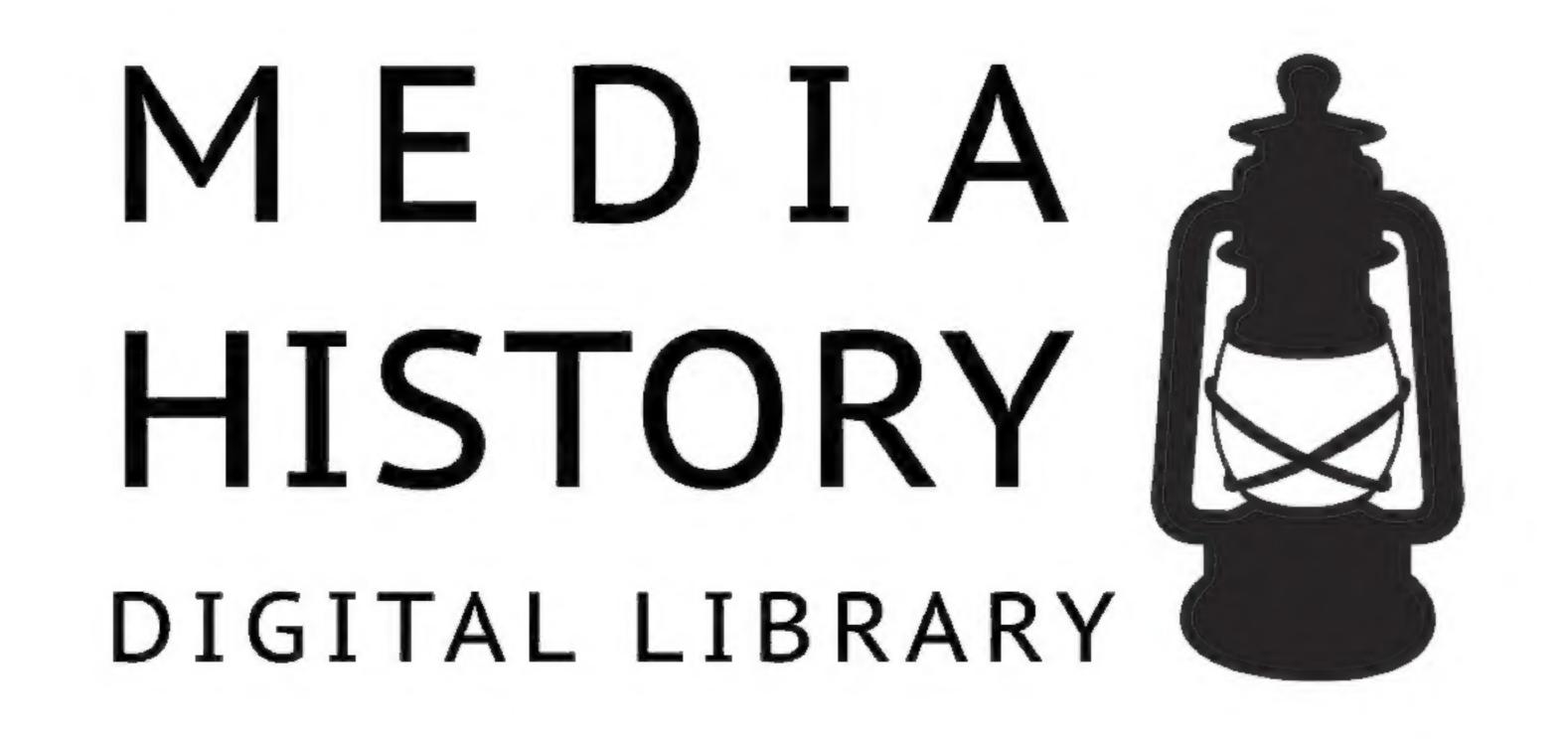


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
