PUT ON BANNER CAMPAIGN

Decorate your front in real political campaign style. Use blowup of Glenda Farrell in action — making a stump speech for election (still No. 302-X). Surround with plenty of colorful bunting and flags. Get permission to string a large net banner across street, from theatre to building on opposite side.

Start Your Campaigning By Electing Local 'Torchy' Mayor for Day

Glenda Farrell was recently elected Mayor of North Hollywood in a duly authorized election. Make the most of this by tying in with a local newspaper in a search for local 'Torchy'. Paper runs a coupon daily; readers write in their choice and deposit ballots in lobby of theatre. When local 'Torchy' has been selected arrange with City officials to name her mayor for a day.

Variation on this idea: have a group of girls take over the city government for a day during celebration of Girl Scout's Week. With all the picture and newsbreak possibilities of this stunt, it should be an excellent publicity build-up for your showing of the picture.

FIND MOST POPULAR GAL SCRIBE

In cooperation with local daily conduct poll among school papers newshawks to find most popular gal reporter. Girl chosen is named local Torchy Blane. Might try to include deal with local paper to give her trial as reporter with regular assignment.

AROUSE WIDE DISCUSSION

For inquiring reporter or special newspaper interviews get statements from prominent club women, politicians and educators on why they think a woman would or would not make a good mayor. Care, of course, must be taken not to antagonize the local administration.

'KISSES' PUT OVER YOUR SHOW



'Torchy Runs For Mayor' As Did Glenda Farrell

Torchy Blane has become so famous and popular that it was inevitable she should go into politics, and that is just what she does in "Torchy Runs for Mayor," the latest picture in the Warner Bros. series about the clever and intrepid girl reporter, opening at the Strand Theatre next Friday.

Torchy is again played by Glenda Farrell, and Barton MacLane, as Steve McBride, again shares her adventures, with the inevitable Gahagan of Tom Kennedy to make bad matters worse.

Torchy's boss is still Joe Cunningham, and other familiar faces are those of Frank Shannon, and George Guhl as well as John Miljan, Joe Downing, Irving Bacon, John Butler and Charles Richman.

Her new picture is based on her campaign for mayor in the fictitious city where she is a star reporter. With no intention of running for public office, but merely to get a good story, Torchy sets out to get evidence that a certain Dr. Dolan has political and governmental control of the city. She gets her evidence but her paper refuses to use the story and she is fired. She carries her evidence to the

Dolan's men murder the publisher.

Finding the recall petitions, McBride writes her name in as the candidate as a gag. Torchy takes the matter seriously, however, and enters upon a vigorous campaign, announcing that she is going to lay her evidence before the grand jury.

Dolan's men kidnap her, but McBride forces one of them to reveal where she is held. Meanwhile another of the gangsters has put a bomb in McBride's car which will go off when the siren is sounded.

McBride and Gahagan, with some more cops, rescue Torchy, and when Dolan attempts to escape in McBride's car, the underworld boss is blown to bits.

Killed Again

John Miljan, born at Lead City, S. D., of non-professional parents, estimates that he has played 875 roles of every possible description during his fourteen years on the stage and seventeen years on the screen. He has met violent death in fifty-two different ways but never before was blown to bits by a bomb as he is in Warner Bros.' "Torchy Runs for Mayor," which opens at the Strand Theatre next Friday.

Wears Novel Shoes

Glenda Farrell strikes a new angle with her rocker soled shoes. They are very chic adaptations of Dutch girl wooden shoes, for they combine wine-colored mesh and suede and are without toes or heels. Mayor Glenda Farrell Frowns On Baby Kissing

Glenda Farrell swept into office as the mayor of North Hollywood without kissing a baby.

However, during the filming of "Torchy Runs for Mayor," her latest Warner Bros. picture, which opens at the Strand Theatre next Friday, she had to spend an entire day kissing an infant. That, according to Director Ray McCarey, was the touch of realism needed to bring authenticity to the scene, which was of the events immediately following Torchy Blane's inauguration as mayor.

Constituents thronged her office to wish her well. There were flowers and sheafs of telegrams — but no baby.

Director McCarey sent out a rush call to "casting" and four-months-old Charles Buddy Dolan and his mother soon arrived. But Glenda demanded something else and that was a doll the size of the baby.

"If I had a baby," she said,

"I wouldn't want a stranger to kiss it."

So the baby had his time be-

Barton MacLane writes poetry. You don't have to like it but you'd better not poke fun at it. For MacLane combines the sensitivities of the poet with the aggressiveness of a Hell's Kitchen truck driver.

He's afraid of no man. He'd take Joe Louis on in a minute. He knows he'd get a beating. But that's all right — he's taken these before from lesser opponents.

But he's afraid of women. Which is why MacLane continues to be one of Hollywood's most eligible bachelors. "When

and if I do get married," he says, "it will be to a girl who can bake biscuits and mend socks and is content to sit back and watch Papa MacLane meet the weekly expense."

That's why he likes his role in the Warner Bros. Torchy Blane series, the latest of which, "Torchy Runs for Mayor," opens at the Strand Theatre next Friday. His romance with Glenda Farrell, as Torchy Blane, is a hail-fellow-well-met proposition; he buys her steaks; gives her scoops on stories; promises to marry her — but never kisses her.

'Torchy Runs for Mayor' Opening at Strand Today

Glenda Farrell parallels a real-life experience in "Torchy Runs for Mayor," the latest in the Warner Bros. series of Torchy Blane pictures, which opens today at the Strand Theatre — only the motion picture parallel is much more exciting and interesting than the actual experience which inspired the picture.

Miss Farrell, who has become so completely identified with the character she enacts in the Warner Bros. series that even her friends call her Torchy, ran for mayor of North Hollywood and was elected.

It was a good-natured campaign in a well-behaved little community where there are no very serious civic problems. Running for mayor, however, in the big city where Torchy Blane has become a star reporter, is distinctly another matter.

Vice and crime are rampant

in the city and it is because of Torchy's expose of the political reasons for that fact that she finds herself nominated for mayor in a recall election.

In an attempt to shut her up, the vice lord of the city has thugs kidnap her, but she is rescued by the ever-reliable Steve McBride, the boss gangster is blown to pieces by an infernal machine that was intended to kill McBride, Torchy is elected and she makes McBride chief of police.

Barton MacLane again plays opposite Miss Farrell in the role of McBride, and Gahagan is again played by Tom Kennedy. Others in the cast include John Miljan, Joe Cunningham, Joe Downing, Frank Shannon, George Guhl, Irving Bacon and John Butler.

The screen play was written by Earle Snell, the production was directed by Ray McCarey.

Secret Illness

Barton MacLane, when he reported for his role in "Torchy Runs for Mayor," the Warner Bros. picture now playing at the Strand Theatre, revealed that he was convalescing from a serious ear infection which had endangered his life for weeks.

Sleep Baby Sleep

Glenda Farrell turned over her dressing room to Charles Buddy Dolan, four-months-old baby working with her in "Torchy Runs for Mayor" at the Warner Bros. Studio and spent all her time shushing people so he could nap between scenes. The baby could only spend 30 seconds on the set at a time, according to state law. The latest "Torchy" film now at the Strand Theatre stars Glenda Farrell and Barton MacLane, with a large name cast. Directed by Ray McCarey.

Just Call It "X"

Censorship regulations won't permit mention of a deadly poison in a picture so the script for Warner Bros. "Torchy Runs for Mayor," featuring Glenda Farrell and Barton MacLane, which is now running at the Strand Theatre, had to be rewritten with the entirely fictitious "toxic chloride" substituted for the acid, previously mentioned as the lethal agent.

Sews To Music

When Glenda Farrell, heroine of "Torchy Runs for Mayor," the Warner Bros. picture opening Friday at the Strand Theatre, sews or crochets at home, she likes to sit in a rocking chair with a music box attachment which plays old-fashioned tunes.

Actor Accidently

Joe Cunningham, widely known newspaperman who plays the city editor in Warner Bros. "Torchy Runs for Mayor," which is now playing at the Strand Theatre, gave up his newspaper career to become a technical advisor on the filming of newspaper stories. He displayed such talent as an actor, however, that he is kept busy in that capacity and rarely finds time to act as technical adviser.

Early To Bed

Glenda Farrell always retires no later than eight p.m. when working, she revealed during the filming of Warner Bros. "Torchy Runs for Mayor," now playing at the Strand Theatre, and then she wears herself out taking care of business affairs by telephone for several hours. Glenda is mayor of North Hollywood, California and takes her job seriously. She keeps busy both as an actress and a mayor.

WHY KISS BABIES THEY DON'T VOTE —GLENDA FARRELL

"Why kiss babies? They don't vote," replied Glenda Farrell to a question about her rather unorthodox campaign methods when she was running last fall for the office of mayor of North Hollywood, a sizeable community near the Warner Bros. Studio, where she works.

"Political osculation," she explained, "has been wasted on non-voters. Anybody I'll kiss will be over voting age."






