

### Report of the Bishop

Synod Convention time may well mean different things to different people. Whatever it means to you that time is here again as we assemble at Lenoir-Rhyne College P.E. Monroe Auditorium for the 177th Annual Convention of the North Carolina Synod. Let us rejoice and be glad in it and look for inspiration, information, direction, fellowship, and enthusiasm. The theme "Confessing Christ in the World" is our mandate from the Lord. It challenges us to look beyond ourselves, narrow parochialism, the roof that needs repairing and the cemetery maintenance to opportunities we have together to be a part of the total mission of Christ around the world. Our reports, our budget, our plans, our discussions are certainly in the framework of the larger Christian community. Let us pray that "Confessing Christ in the World" will be more than a convention theme but a way of life, a style of ministry, a commitment by all of us and our congregations back home.

Synod Convention time also means Lenoir-Rhyne College and Hickory since for many years now we have gathered on this campus for the annual meeting of Lutherans in North Carolina. It is with great appreciation that we express thanks to Dr. Albert Anderson, President of the College for so willingly and cheerfully serving as host and to Pastors James Stephenson and Phillip Squire of Holy Trinity for being the host congregation this year. The behind the scenes work to accommodate our needs done by our two hosts is tremendous and for all of it we say a big thank you.

In addition, I want to give special recognition and appreciation to the Convention Sub-Committee, Chaired by Mrs. Opal Moretz; the Convention Co-ordinator, Pastor Leo Smith; the Secretary of Synod, Pastor David Martin; other members of the Synod Staff; Church House Secretaries who have all invested so much of themselves and contributed so much to make the 1981 Convention a rewarding and significant event.

### HIGHLIGHTS OF THE PAST YEAR

Since the 1980 Convention of Synod we have had a good year in our mission together to confess Christ in the world. Our team work has enabled exciting things to happen. I am calling attention to the following as illustrations:

- The LCA Seattle Convention gave us many items to implement in the N. C. Synod with insight and enthusiasm for the task.
- A new title, Bishop to replace the term Synod President came out of the Seattle decisions. All year together we have been adjusting to this with positive results.
- Successful Synod Days at Lenoir-Rhyne to equip congregational leadership August 1-2, 1980.
- 4. The Commissioning of our first Missionary in recent times, Miss Margaret "Peggy" Chandler serving in Japan.
- Our first Luther-Baptist Dialogue at Camp Caraway, Asheboro last September was a great success.
- Two Pastors' Wives retreats in September and October were well attended, appreciated events.
- Two Augsburg Confession retreats for pastors and church leaders brought the response, "This is what we need more of".
- 8. The Conference of Synod Bishops in the Virgin Islands in October was a great event and a good Lutheran witness in the Caribbean Synod.
- The fall district meetings gave the Conference and Camping Ministries Appeal a great beginning.
- The new Professional Leaders' Workshop in November made its good annual contribution to this group among us.
- 11. Margaret's stroke in Houston, Texas was a traumatic experience for us. The prayer circles of love, concern, and support you formed throughout the synod, the good wishes expressed through cards and letters, and God's miracle of complete recovery, brought us through this crisis with appreciation and gratitude.

- The best end of the year apportionment receipts on record provided needed resources to confess Christ in the World.
- 13. The \$91,000 given for World Hunger was cause for rejoicing.
- The 1981 District Church Days set attendance records and sent church leaders away better equipped for ministry.
- The Executive Board retreat in January was a strengthening experience for our leadership.
- 16. The 1982 Synod Budget Forum and CWA Consultation was one of the best ever.

For all of the experiences, achievements, and accomplishments we are grateful to God. Certainly they fill us with enthusiasm and prepare us with faith and vision for even greater things ahead.

### PRESENT 1981 CONVENTION EXPECTATIONS

As interesting as the past year has been what happens right now in the present, at this Convention, is uppermost in our minds. Here are some 1981 Convention expectations.

- The opening Service of Holy Communion led by the Synod Staff with the sermon by the Bishop will set the tone for the Convention.
- Bishop Dennis Anderson of the Nebraska Synod and a member of the Executive Council of the LCA is our representative. In a challenging way he will share what is happening in our mission together through Church Wide Agencies.
- The Rev. C. Peter Setzer of Holy Trinity, Gastonia will serve as Convention Chaplain with timely messages and uplifting worship experiences each day.
- This is the year for the election of the Synod's 24 delegates to the September 1982 LCA Convention in Louisville, Ky.
- Other elections include filling 28 vacancies on Boards as well as editor and business manager of the N. C. Lutheran.
- 6. The Convention Agenda features a 30 minute presentation on Lutheran Unity by Bishop Dennis Anderson and a division into small discussion groups for a one hour forum and opinion poll.
- An exciting report should come from the Capital Funds Appeal for Conference and Camping Ministries.
- 8. The Youth Convo group will be very visable at this Convention leading song periods at intervals and presenting their usual exciting report.
- Saturday evening will feature a fellowship and cultural event with the Western Piedmont Symphony Orchestra.
- The Synod's new agency, Lutheran Family Services, will present its first report on a most rewarding ministry in which we all share.
- 11. The Convention will hear a recommendation to adopt a \$2,631,647 Budget for 1982 representing an 11.18% increase over 1981.
- 12. Amendments to the Constitution placed on notice last year will be considered and by-law amendments will be proposed.
- 13. As usual there will be issues from the delegates brought up for discussion.
- 14. Memorials for the LCA 1982 Convention will be proposed.
- A festival service with the message by Dr. Robert Stackel will bring to a close the 1982 Convention.

While this year's Synod Convention may not have as many issues for debate as some previous Conventions, it promises to be interesting, stimulating, and exciting.

### **FUTURE NEW DIRECTIONS FOR 1981 AND 1982**

In 1981 and 1982 I hope we can continue doing the things as a synod staff that meet the expressed needs of our pastors and people, while at the same time cut back on some of our services that may have outlived their usefulness. During 1981 I

have been discussing the following points with the staff, the executive board, committees and pastors at District Church Days.

- The need to change the priorities of synod staff services from program to people, from services to committees to services to pastors. To achieve this the responsibility of the synod staff person assigned to the committee would be more to assist in planning, to serve as counselor, and to be a resource person rather than "the implementor".
- 2. To change priorities from smorgasbord type offerings to pastors and congregations to a few selected, quality events during the year. The present operation of the synod staff is like a snowball that keeps getting bigger and bigger as it rolls along. We have reached the point where we must resist the impulse to initiate new directions without offsetting decreases.
- 3. To use a criteria check list for our offerings which might include the following:
  - Will it meet a real need in our congregation?
  - Are we proposing this because we've always done it?
  - Is it necessary that this be an annual event?
  - Is this a necessary meeting? program? project?
  - Are we taking too much time away from our pastors and people for meetings which they could better use for ministry on the congregational level?
- 4. To introduce modifications of Partners in Mission (Apportionment Consultation Process) so as to provide a more rewarding experience and a better climate and motivation for participation.
- To demonstrate our support of Conference and Camping Ministries by providing \$1,600,000 for three Centers by the end of 1983.
- 6. To participate in the LCA wide Stewardship development program in 1982.
- To become more and more an inclusive church not just in name only but in witness, outreach, and loving service.

All of our concerns for the future cannot be listed here but these are seven to which I want to give major attention during the remainder year of my term. We will appreciate your feed back and suggestions as we seek to strengthen our ministry together.

The members of my staff, Pastors David Martin, Richard Little, Robert Shoffner, and layman Jim Chesky give me a great team to carry out the responsibilities of my office. The staff members are responsible to the Bishop. They represent him wherever they go, speak for him, and their assignments in the various areas of our Synod concerns are all in the interest of assisting the Bishop in the performance of his duties. Our interest in each other as well as in the work of each, along with our regular staff meetings have enabled us to develop excellent team work. This year new titles have been given the staff members to replace the old title of Administrative Assistant. Pastor Martin is the Minister for Professional Leadership. Pastor Little is the Minister for Outreach. Pastor Shoffner is Minister for Parish Services. Layman James Chesky is Minister for Resources. It is with pride in my staff and appreciation for their support and good work that I ask you to give attention to their reports.

### DAVID L. MARTIN, MINISTER FOR PROFESSIONAL LEADERSHIP

Reflecting on all that happened as Minister for Professional Leadership and Secretary of the Synod during the interim, and attempting to get a focus on the big picture, the conclusion is that I have been involved in ministry with and to persons on many levels of interaction. It has taken many forms including counseling and personal consultations with pastors and lay persons, synodical committee meetings, church council meetings and retreats, congregational meetings and special services, and, synod hearings and training events. Even the countless hours spent on the phone are a part of that ministry to persons. It has been a good year filled with joys, frustrations and anticipation. Along with the good experiences there have been situations of pain, struggle and conflict, but even those experiences can be moments of grace as God would use them. A second conclusion, with a focus on the future, is that the church has new opportunities for ministry in view of the emerging issues of the 80's, the changing political climate, inflation, and soaring energy costs.

As Minister for Professional Leadership and Secretary of the Synod, I relate to the Committee for Professional Preparation, the Committee for Professional Service, the Cabinet for Professional Leadership, the Committee on Historical Work, and the Committee for Campus Ministry along with responsibilities as counselor to profes-

sional leaders and their families. In describing the activities during the interim, the attempt will be made to summarize the work with the committees, identify some personal highlights and, share some thoughts about the future as we head into the 80's.

### Professional Leadership

The health of the church is based in part on the health and the effectiveness of its leadership. My work with the Cabinet and the two professional leadership committees addresses these aspects in the preparation and service areas.

Professional Preparation — This is one of the most demanding committee responsibilities in the synod for both committee members and staff. Over 60 individuals relate to this committee in any one year. Basically, the committee's time is directed to the oversight of students who are in the process of preparation for ordained ministry and lay professional ministry. In working with the committee, I relate to each seminary student in an extensive evaluation and guidance process that covers the four years of work. Also, there is personal follow-up with students for which the committee has special concern. The work of the committee and the staff becomes even more challenging as more of our students are attending seminaries other than Lutheran Theological Southern Seminary. This involves more travel and the establishment of good working relationships with the other seminaries. Many hours have been spent working with students who are at the level of inquiry into the possibilities of a vocation in the church.

There are hard decisions to be made by the committee as it deals with the two-fold concern of what is best for the church and what is best for the student. Numerous time students are encouraged to pursue other occupations if they do not have the skills, personal attributes or qualifications for ordained ministry. It is personally gratifying to witness the commitment and dedication of the members of this committee. Highlights for the year include the seminarian and spouses retreat held at Lutheridge in October with 80 persons participating, and, the trip to Gettysburg Seminary in February to work with six of our students enrolled there.

Issues or opportunities in the 80's will include the Church's financing of seminary education, especially internships, and preparation of students for changing times. We will be seeing more second career students coming through the committee and hopefully more minority persons.

Professional Service — This is a time of transition as the committee and staff attempt to address and serve the needs of our pastors and lay professionals in their personal and professional growth. Much frustration has been felt this year as a number of programs have failed to materialize. While the Growth In Ministry program is an exceptional opportunity for personal and professional growth, there seems to be little interest in the program as it has been offered this past year. As a result of this, the committee is rethinking its program strategy and seeking new ways of identifying and meeting growth needs. New planning has definitely taken a different direction as the Growth in Ministry program has been set aside for the present and a large pastors' convocation is being planned for the fall with a major speaker and a series of tracks. The Retreat for Lay Professional Leaders slated this past January was cancelled due to low registration. As a result, we are seeking new ways to relate to our lay professional leaders by other means.

But not all the work of this committee has been frustrating. The New Professional Leaders Workshop which involved 36 new professional leaders and their spouses was successfully implemented. The committee has developed excellent Guidelines for Adequate Compensation of Pastors and a guide for congregations in considering an Impounded Equity Housing Program for pastors living in parsonages. Many hours have been spent counseling with congregational leaders in the areas of compensation to pastors and lay professionals and impounded housing equity. I continue to work with the college and the seminary in planning continuing education. The synod, by way of the Professional Service Committee, is supporting a long tenure ministry study conducted by the Alban Institute of Washington, D.C. Three of our pastors are involved in the project. The hoped for results of the project study are to provide resources to assist pastors in long tenured ministries to evaluate, clarify and set goals and directions for future ministry.

Highlights of the interim were the New Professional Leaders Workshop in November and the Division for Professional Leadership Southeastern Regional Workshop in February.

Issues for the 80's will include decisions on mandatory continuing education for pastors and lay professionals; new and innovative approaches to continuing education and up-dating of skills; and, resources to aid pastors experiencing burn-out and career stress. In regard to compensation for pastors, there may be congregations who will not be able to afford a full-time pastor in the future and must seek other alternatives.

Counseling — Well over 60 formal counseling sessions were scheduled with pastors, pastors' spouses or lay professionals during the interim. This does not include informal and casual contacts or phone conversations. Professional, marital, financial and personal issues seem to be most evident. Six persons were referred to the career evaluation program at St. Andrew's College in Laurinburg. Referrals have been made to qualified therapists throughout the state. Unfortunately there are many persons each year who need counseling who hesitate to seek any help at all. Along with the counseling sessions, numerous pastoral calls have been made during the interim.

In the 1980's there will be more demand for career evaluation and resources to assist pastors in moving into second careers. There is a need to develop stronger, more qualified support for pastors and their families and to broaden our use of existing resources in the synod.

### **Historical Work**

It has been an exciting and demanding part of my work being staff support person to the Committee on Historical Work; the Task Force on the Celebration of the 450th Anniversary of the Augsburg Confession and the Synod Archives.

The first major event involved the Committee on Historical Work as it planned and implemented a major microfilm program. Through the able leadership of Luther and Frances Stirewalt, 50 of our congregations in Western Piedmont and Mountain regions of the synod have had their records microfilmed by the Division of Local Records of the State Archives. Microfilm equipment was set up at Lenoir-Rhyne College and the project went from the end of April until mid-July. Committee members along with the staff support person took their turns staying on campus and coordinating the handling of records.

The second event or series of events centered on the Celebration of the 450th Anniversary of the Augsburg Confession. Assistance was rendered to the Task Force in planning and implementing the special observance at the 1980 Synod Convention. A bulletin insert was published and distributed to congregations in June and two identical retreats for pastors and lay leaders on the Augsburg Confession were held in September at Agape Camp and Conference Retreat Center and Lutheridge. Over 70 persons were involved in the retreats.

Attention to the Archives is a continual responsibility. While the traffic is not heavy, there is a steady stream of visitors requesting information and access to documents. During the year there have been consultations with three congregations who were planning anniversaries in the coming months.

In working with the Committee on Historical Work, we are planning for a multimedia piece to assist congregations in establishing archives, a renewed emphasis on the maintenance and development of the archives and plans for future microfilming of congregational documents.

The future of the archives in the synod involves more than the present level of preservation and accessibility. There is much that needs to be done and many precious synod documents yet to be gathered. The archives needs to have a strong financial basis for its development and maintenance hopefully through endowments. The committee is projecting plans for a new synod history to be published for the 250th anniversary of the synod in 2003.

### Campus Ministry

Campus Ministry remains an exciting vital part of the Church's ministry in North Carolina. My staff responsibilities with this committee are not as demanding as other committees. The most important task that the committee performs is the development and maintenance of strong Lutheran presence on college and university campuses across the state through the support of agencies, covenant congregations, and contact pastors. Response to our ministry on campuses is growing and so are demands for ministry to students. I have assisted the committee as it struggles to encourage and support strong ministry and keep in line with budget constraints. Budget building seems to be a crisis each year in this respect.

Highlights for the interim include participation in the Biennial Conference for Campus Ministry Agencies, Covenant Congregations, and Contact Pastors held at St. Paul's, Durham this past September. It was a privilege to be the presenter at a retreat for Duke students at Kure Beach in September as well. In April I was a part of a team which evaluated the Campus Ministry Agent in Raleigh.

The 80's for Campus Ministry will be critical in regard to financial resources and the priorities of the synod. There will be a struggle to maintain and enhance our ministry on campuses especially in light of the recent religious developments over the years while future budget decisions may indicate cuts in the Campus Ministry Program.

### District and Congregational and Other Contacts

Over 40 contacts with congregations across the synod have been made during the interim including ordinations, installations, congregational meetings, retreats and church council meetings, planning sessions, services and general visits. A real highlight has been in leading five congregational church council retreats. I have attended numerous district meetings, conference and camping ministries appeal meetings, Executive Board meetings and retreats. A major highlight of the year has been the honor of attending the Seattle Convention of the Church as a synod delegate.

### Special Appreciations

There are so many wonderful people who make ministry joyous. I am thankful to the Church House secretaries and staff, especially Mae Blake and Betty Munday, who work directly with me. I am thankful to the committee chairmen Sarah Walker, George Whittecar, Bill Milholland, T. C. Plexico, and Frank Binkowski for their leadership and support. I express gratitude to Bishop Misenheimer for placing his confidence in me to be a member of his staff. Especially am I grateful to Jim, Dick and Bob for their love, support and sensitivity.

I am grateful to have the privilege to serve the people of the North Carolina Synod who make this ministry fulfilling. It is being said that these are hard and conservative times. But in many ways, we, together, are partners in ministry that move against the times as we live out the richness and lavishness of God's love and promise. Our joyful ministry can reflect nothing less than His love and promise no matter the cost or sacrifice.

### ROBERT H. SHOFFNER, MINISTER FOR PARISH SERVICES

### Report to Convention

Ephesians 4:11-14 indicates we are gifted "for the equipment of the saints, for the work of ministry, for building up the body of Christ."

My constant prayer is that everything in which I involve myself will lead to the "equipment of the saints" — helping prepare fellow brothers and sisters in Christ to be the Lord's people in the world. My particular job description says I am to do this as an assistant to Bishop Misenheimer and as a partner — resource person with the Worship and Music, Parish Life and Ministry Development, Camp, Educational, and Youth Committees of our synod. The reports shared in this Bulletin by the chairpersons of these committees will give you a good idea of the specific ways our partnership has been directed toward the "equipment of the saints."

### General

The LCA Convention — Seattle, Conference for Parish Secretaries, visits with pastors, Executive Board Retreat, Church Council Retreats and Adult Sunday School Class presentations are involvements with special significance for me.

The 1980 LCA Convention in Seattle gave me an even greater appreciation for our leaders and our partnership in ministry. The gifts and witness shared at that event reaffirmed for me our Lord's presence now among us.

October, 1980 thirty parish secretaries gathered in Reidsville for our synod's first Conference for Parish Secretaries. Those attending were able to receive training and share ideas. Most important was the support which they established for one another. Mrs. Marilyn Perryman (First, Greensboro) and Mrs. Caroline Hampton (Synod Office Staff) deserve praise for coordinating this weekend event.

Visits with pastors have become a priority for the synod staff. Such visits have helped me hear first-hand the personal and program support pastors need and parishes want. These needs and wants have also been the focus of the 1981 Executive Board Retreat. Joining the Executive Board in identifying ways to serve even more responsibly in managing and directing our synod's ministries has been at times frustrating but always an experience of growth for me.

Equipping the saints is central to all of my ministry but especially prominent in Church Council Retreats and in visits with Adult Sunday Church School Classes. Both these settings have provided occasions for developing leadership in parishes and helping interpret our synod's ministries. Both strengthen our partnership in ministry. The number of requests from parishes for leadership in these settings and the nature of questions asked on such occasions prompt me to say we need more work in our congregations in these settings.

I have also enjoyed being involved in the formation of the Camp and Conference Ministries Appeal for our synod. It is very gratifying to see the response so many of our parishes and individuals are making to this important means for enriching our witness.

Official acts I have performed on behalf of Bishop Misenheimer are listed as part of his report. Administration of the Supply Pastors Service, oversight of the Media Center, participation in the North Carolina Council of Churches Commission on Christian Nurture, administration of our Lutheran Church Volunteer Network, participation with the Executive Board's committee for ministers and congregations and the Cabinet for Parish Services are all part of my administrative responsibilities.

### Cabinet for Parish Services

This cabinet continues to grow in its coordination of services to parishes under the leadership of Pastor Glenn A. Boland. Greater scrutiny is being used in reviewing possible services such as Church Day events. Illustrative of this is the cabinet's recent decision to strengthen the District Church Day events and not offer the Synod Church Days in August. Members of the cabinet have all cited the need to help congregations be selective in choosing resources to meet current needs and to prepare for and resource future ministries. This has led to a new emphasis on Parish Life and Ministry Development (PLMD) in our synod, corresponded by a resurgence of interest among our congregations.

### **Educational Ministry**

Introducing the LCA's new "Catechetics for Today," strengthening the fifteen member Educational Ministry Resource Team System, purchasing a video cassette player for loan to congregations, doing some long-range planning, and introducing the Leadership Education and Development (LEAD) emphasis in our synod are highlights of the past year. The committee's able leader, Pastor Gary Perryman, shares details of the committee's work in his report. We are especially excited about the August 9-15, 1981 Workshop in Educational Ministry with Persons who are Mentally Retarded, planned with Mrs. Claire Edwardson of our synod's Task Force on Ministry with Disabled Persons.

Some educational ministry concerns and prospects. The following concerns must be addressed through our synodical educational ministry: the inability to

deliver effectively to all parts of our synod the services available to congregations; only nominal support from some pastors and laity for well-planned, comprehensive educational ministry in the congregation; mounting requests for assistance in selecting Sunday Church School materials and planning special educational events; and the need to help congregations improve their educational ministries with adults and families. These may not be new concerns but they are set in new times and thus each has facets not present before. Our synod's Educational Ministry Committee is aware of and addressing each of these concerns, as is the LCA where we see Sunday Church School and catechetics as key settings for congregational educational ministry. I am acquainted with these concerns not just as a staff person for educational ministry, but as a church school teacher and chairperson of the Educational Ministry Committee in my own congregation.

Our Resource Teams with their battery of workshops and consultation aids, plus the resources they will share with each congregation in the 1981-82 Leadership Education and Development emphasis, all address many of these concerns. "The Pastor as Educator" workshops and more individual consultations with pastors and parish leaders will also help. But one can legitimately ask: how much can we expect from volunteer resource teams? Should we have one or more full-time synod staff persons working solely in educational ministry? Should we pursue more vigorously the establishment of cooperative programs in educational ministry with ten to twenty congregations hiring their own field consultant (a model which has good precedence in our synod)? These are questions the synodical committee is grappling with as we still hear our Lord's commission, "Go . . . teach," and our congregations' request, "Show us how."

### **Youth Ministry**

"Advocacy for Youth Ministry" is the banner under which our Youth Ministry Committee has functioned this past year. Chairperson Pastor Richard Campbell has spearheaded this emphasis.

What has happened? Primarily, youth on the synodical committee, on district planning groups and event task forces have been guided in taking more responsible leadership in our synod and the LCA. Twelve attended the LCA Convo in Seattle in 1980, two participated in the LCA New York-Washington Conference on World Hunger and Economic Justice, six were active leaders in the 1981 Winter Youth Rally, more than thirty are involved in leading district activities, eight led District Church Day workshops, and at least twelve others are, at this writing, planning synodical events for 1981. Some of our youth have also been nominated for election to boards and other positions at this convention. This gives you a glimpse of the committee's advocacy work.

Tim Paulson, our first Youth Staffer to specialize in Stewardship, has spent numerous days helping congregations develop fuller involvement of youth in their total ministry. Is that stewardship? Yes! Youth have gifts, energies, skills and enthusiasm of which we need to be wise stewards. As of this writing Tim had worked with congregations in the following ways: fourteen — contacts for planning; nineteen — leadership for retreats, programs or workshops. This is in addition to Tim's work with the sponsoring committees, telephone and mail correspondence, and occasional assignments from synod staff.

We especially thank Tim for his ability to share a ministry of presence with youth, to be a role model for youth involvement in the church and to initiate our stewardship emphasis. The Executive Board has approved the youth and stewardship committees' recommendation for a Stewardship Youth Staffer in 1981-82 also.

As the Youth Committee continues to evaluate the services it provides congregations, the youth staffer program will be thoroughly evaluated later this year. Personally, I am excited about plans now being developed to offer congregational youth and adult leaders practical training for providing youth ministry locally. We hope this will meet some perennial needs across our synod.

Youth Ministry is happening. Youth and adults are involved in ministry — together!

### Worship and Music

How can one best advocate the centrality of worship in parish life and the life of our synod? This has been a question for our synodical Worship and Music Committee this past year now that the Lutheran Book of Worship (LBW) has been introduced. Our response so far has been to give immediate attention to requests for consultations, to provide a few resources to congregations, to cooperate in events (i.e., the Convocation on Worship, Music and the Arts held in Columbia, S.C., and the North Carolina Lenten-Easter Preaching Seminar for pastors), to continue assisting congregations who want help in using the riches of the LBW in their worship life.

The establishment of a Music Lending Library and future initiation of a supportresource system for church musicians in our synod are also key means for helping
congregations in their worship and music ministries. Committee Chairperson, Pastor
Robert E. Allen continues to offer innovative leadership in these ventures. The committee is engaged in seeking even more helpful ways to be advocates for responsible
worship planning and celebration in the parish as well as in district and synodical
events. The key here seems to be increased worship education in our parishes and
among synodical leaders.

### Parish Life and Ministry Development

As indicated earlier, there is new interest in Parish Life and Ministry Development (PLMD) in our synod. Currently six congregations are considering using the comprehensive "Customized Approach." Six congregations have also ordered one or more of the multiple approaches: "Move Ahead," "Open to the Spirit," "Recovering our Past, Discovering our Future," and "Developing a Ministry Profile."

Chairperson, Pastor Don Michael has led the snyodical PLMD Task Force in giving broader promotion of PLMD among our congregations. This included presentations at each of our 1980 District Church Days.

Since 1975, eighteen of our congregations have used the "Customized Approach" to PLMD. With its five approaches, PLMD offers a variety of ways for a congregation to evaluate its ministry, determine its purpose and set ministry objectives. One participant has said, "If you want your congregation to sit still, avoid PLMD."

### **Media Center**

The Heilig Multi-Media Center continues to provide the most used service we offer congregations. In 1980, 2,479 distributions of media were made. Due to frequent use of many pieces, funds are currently needed for repair and replacement of these more popular items.

The newest service of the Center is a growing video-cassette library. Through a grant from the Hine Fund of Augsburg, Winston-Salem, the synodical educational ministry committee purchased a video-cassette player to loan to congregations and other synodical groups. Several committees are currently planning ways to develop this media. Taping synodical events and producing training and information tapes are part of these plans. Through a gift from Lutheran Brotherhood Insurance Company, the LCA has given each synod a video monitor and cassette player-recorder. We are already receiving tapes from the LCA for use with synodical leaders.

Mrs. Betty Munday has ably coordinated the media center again this year. In addition to distributing media she also helps congregations select media and other resource materials according to their program needs.

Priorities for the coming year include funding for repair-replacement of current media, purchasing new media and developing our video-cassette system.

### Conclusion

I was asked recently, "doesn't synod staff work get monotonous — meeting with the same few committees, planning the same events year after year?" First, the inquirer has a pretty limited view of synod staff work. Second, it never gets monotonous. Nothing is ever the same in this ministry except the constant presence of the Holy Spirit. Even that presence brings freshness each day — surfacing new gifts among us, opening new vistas on ministry.

The always growing partnership I experience with Bishop Misenheimer, Pastors

David Martin and Richard Little, and James Chesky also give new life to my work. Especially helpful is the support of the synod office clerical staff, Mildred Casper, Nancy Howard, Caroline Hampton, Julia Walters and Mae Blake.

Minister for Parish Services is the title under which I serve with these people and many others. The ministry I serve is for the equipment of the saints. Thanks be to God for the opportunity for this service, for a family which supports me in it, for partners whom I join in Christ and for the Holy Spirit who keeps on calling, gathering, enlightening and sending us!

### RICHARD C. LITTLE, MINISTER FOR OUTREACH

As I pause to reflect on this past year, my heart is filled with warmth and good feelings about the Outreach Ministries of our Synod. Substantial activity and growth in ministry has taken place thanks to the able leadership, involvement, and vision of many people.

### Thank You

I want to thank all of those involved in the various committees, task forces, research and strategy groups, boards, special ministries, consultation teams, and resource networks for all the time and effort they have given to outreach ministry across the synod. Although there are too many to name (in all this includes over 160 people in synod ministries), I feel it is important to note that a lot has been done in this last year through these people's efforts.

### Still Much To Do!

This, however, is only a beginning. There is still much to be done in our congregations to improve the climate for outreach. There is still much to be done in our communities to share the good news with the poor, lonely, imprisoned, sick, and hungry. There is still much to be done across the whole state of North Carolina as we seek to faithfully share the joy of the Gospel.

### **Political and Social Climate**

In this last year the need for outreach ministry has intensified. Various religious groups have become very vocal and visible as they use their influence in the political arena. We Lutherans need to carefully study and articulate our understanding of the Christian faith so we can lead and guide our people to recognize that there are other options for Christians. If we choose to be timid or fail to articulate an alternative, we may be drowned out by the masses who are following this popular religion. (Note the Executive Board's statement adopted at its September, 1980, meeting.)

Not only are we being called to witness boldly to our faith, but also we are being called to serve boldly. As drastic cuts are made in our nation's budget reducing or ending many social service programs that minister to people, we in Christ's church are going to have to respond more boldly to serve those people previously fed or cared for through government assistance. Matthew 25:31ff keeps echoing through my mind, "In as much as you have done it to one of the least of these . . . . ."

To some these conditions of our times may sound bleak. To me, they are an opportunity, a call from our Lord, a challenge to us in the church to stand up and be what we have been called to be. It is a call to move from the comfortable pew that we have come to know in the complacency of the '50s, '60s, and '70s and go out and share our wealth in this hurting world.

### Role of Synod and Staff

Along with these events in the political and social arena, this year we on the synod staff have been wrestling significantly with our role and purpose. The handwriting on the wall has become very visible — "Too much programming!" In these 2-plus years on the synod staff I have sat through numerous meetings only to find myself asking afterwards, "Is it really making a difference?" How easy it is for us to be busy and feel that what we are doing is important. And more often than not it is impor-

tant! But I often think of the story of Mary and Martha (Luke 10:30ff) and ask myself what is the "one thing needful?"

I therefore rejoice that our Executive Board and we on the staff are taking the time to evaluate and struggle with how we can best use the gifts God has given us to help effect Christ's mission and ministry in North Carolina and the LCA through the 82,439 Baptized people who make up the North Carolina Synod. Exactly what will result is not yet clear, but it is evident that the Bishop and his staff will be spending more time in direct involvement in the congregations to provide support and encouragement and thereby build a closer relationship as we work as partners in ministry.

### Conclusion

As I pen this report I realize that I haven't shared the specific activities in which I have been involved. Most of the specifics are included in the reports of the various committees to which I relate. Official acts are reported elsewhere in this report. Any other activities I would be glad to discuss with anyone who is interested. I simply felt it would be more meaningful to share with you in this report some of my feelings about outreach ministries in our synod. I personally see it as a very exciting but also a crucial time for us as we re-discover who (or **whose**) we are and boldly re-affirm our call to be the People of God engaged in His ministry.

It has been and continues to be an honor and joy to serve on Bishop Misenheimer's staff. I greatly appreciate the relationship that he, Jim, Dave, Bob, and I share. I wish to also express my appreciation to the support staff. Our work is so dependent on the commitment and dedication of Caroline, Ann, Mildred, Betty, Mae, Nancy, and Julia. As we enter into another year, I anticipate that it will be the best one yet as we all continue to grow in our ministry together. May our Lord be with us and fill us with His power and His peace!

### Report to Convention

In reviewing the past year I have summarized my activities in the following paragraphs.

### Stewardship Counselor

Again this year consultations were conducted with about one-third of the congregations of synod. The Partnership in Ministry Emphasis is intended to help congregations grow in their stewardship and grow in their support of all the ministries which happen because we are part of the Lutheran Church in America. My hope is that through the efforts of the Stewardship Committee and the many volunteer consultants that the congregations, God's people, will respond with giving beyond apportionment to enable the ministry we do together to grow and be even more effective.

This year we did have 118 congregations who met or exceeded their apportioned share or the amount committed through the consultation process.

The Stewardship Committee is again emphasizing Proportionate Giving. This is also the emphasis of the Lutheran Church in America as affirmed by the action of the Convention. The aim is to increase giving toward or beyond the tithe by giving 1% more of our income each year.

A major concern is that only 40% of our congregations use the materials developed by the LCA in conducting Every Member Response visits in the fall. Perhaps that is why our growth in giving was only 0.3% last year.

### **Budget Control Officer**

The 1982 Synod Mission Profile and Budget is being presented to synod for its action at this convention. The program and its supporting budget represent the work of hundreds of people in synod and are an expression of the ministry plan for next

year. The proposed program for 1982 is supported by a budget of \$2,631,647. This is a 9.18% increase over the 1981 Program Budget. The growth in Budget since 1980 is an additional 2% or a total 11.18% which is much less than the inflation rate. Every effort has been made by all involved in building the 1982 program to hold down expenses while keeping up a balanced program of ministry.

The Church Wide Agency Consultation and Budget Forum was conducted February 19 and 20. This allows all recipients of synod support to be aware of where they fit within the total picture of the synod's ministry.

### Business Manager/Personnel Director/Synod News Bureau

The day to day operations of the Church House and Secretarial Staff are ongoing responsibilities. The efforts here are always to be the most efficient in our work and the most economical in the cost of operating. The rising prices of paper, equipment, oil and electricity, to list only a few items, make this a constant challenge.

### Miscellaneous

I have been privileged to represent Bishop Misenheimer at installations, meetings and other official functions. I also find that I am receiving more requests to be of assistance in stewardship, finances and other management areas.

A cold listing of events does not begin to say anything about all the people involved in the ministry of which I am a part. Ministry is people working together to fulfill Christ's mission. My work has involved me with hundreds of people throughout synod and it is with their help that things get done in my area of responsibility. Although I can not list them all here I do want to recognize the members of the Synodical Stewardship and Communication Committees, the Executive Board, congregational Stewardship leaders and the Church House staff — Nancy Howard, Ann Leonard, Mildred Casper, Caroline Hampton, Betty Munday, Julia Walters and Mae Blake.

Special thanks to Bishop Misenheimer for allowing me to be a part of this ministry together and to the rest of the staff, David Martin, Dick Little and Bob Shoffner, for helping me to see where we are going.

The agenda would include Holy Communion, introduction of the synod's youth staffer, the Missionary-in-Residence, a report from the Bishop and the appeal presentation.

### 2. 1981 Winter District Church Days

The deans planned for the 1981 Winter District Church Days requesting that the consultation style meeting be reduced from a longer 4 hour consultation to  $2\frac{1}{2}$  hours. At the February meeting, the deans evaluated the meetings which were received well in the districts.

At the February meeting, the Deans were privy to a video tape demonstration of the synod's new equipment. A video tape message from Bishop Crumley on the possibilities for its use as a new communications media was received and discussed. Also, at the February meeting Bishop Misenheimer shared the handbook he had developed for congregational call-committees and asked for their evaluation of the document.

### Central District

The Central District had their first joint Reformation Service in many years in partnership with St. John's, Salisbury. The preacher for the occasion was Dr. Marshall Mauney with other pastors and lay people from district churches participating.

The Conference and Camping Ministries Appeal dictated the location and content of the Fall District Meeting. It was at Camp Agape with the District providing a bus for transportation. After the Service of Holy Communion, at which the Dean preached, and lunch provided by Camp Agape, we were instructed concerning the Conference and Camping Ministries Appeal.

The Spring District Meeting was in the form of District Church Days held on Sunday, February 15, at Salem, Salisbury. There were slightly more than 300 attending representing pastors, Evangelism, Social Ministry, Educational Ministry, Youth Ministry, Stewardship, Worship and Music and energy conservation. We took note of Salem's new worship facility and rejoiced with them in their work. Bishop Misenheimer brought greetings and spoke of the life of the Synod.

### Coastal District

The fall meeting of the Coastal District was held October 30, 1980 at Kure Memorial, Kure Beach for a worship service with Holy Communion. Dean Harold McSwain was the preacher. Bishop Ernest Misenheimer was the celebrant. Thirty-two pastors, lay-delegates and visitors were present. Following the worship service, Dean Harold McSwain welcomed to the district the Rev. Richard Boger as pastor of Our Saviour, Jacksonville. Bishop Misenheimer then brought greetings from the synodical office and spoke about the life and health of the synod in its various ministries and programs. He introduced Mr. Tim Paulson as youth staffer in the synod for the year and Mrs. Ruth Fisher as vice-chairperson of the Conference and Camping Ministries Appeal. Following lunch at a nearby restaurant, the meeting resumed at the Kure Beach Retreat Center with a presentation of the Conference and Camping Min-

istries Appeal by Mr. Charles Bartlett of the Lutheran Laymen's Movement, the Rev. David Castor, Director of Outdoor Ministries and the Rev. Robert Troutman of Lutheridge.

The winter-spring meeting was held at St. Matthew, Wilmington, on February 28, 1981 with approximately 80 pastors and lay-persons in attendance. Basic and enrichment tracks were offered in evangelism, educational ministry, property, social ministry, stewardship, worship and music, and youth ministry. Bishop Misenheimer met with the pastors for a "sharing session."

### Eastern District

The Fall Eastern District Meeting was held at Camp Agape on October 28, 1980. The meeting opened with Holy Communion at 10:30 A.M. Dean John Nagle preached the sermon, Bishop Ernest Misenheimer was the Presiding Minister and Secretary Charles Huggins was the Assisting Minister. The business meeting included the introduction of Harold McKnight, head of the Campaign for Outdoor Ministries, Charles Bartlett, LLM staff person, and the district campaign personnel. The following pastors, new to the district, were also introduced: Dean Lingle, Holy Trinity, Raleigh; Curt Leins, St. James, Fayetteville; Tim Sims, Trinity, Rocky Mount; and Rob Martz, intern at Christ the King, Cary. Bishop Misenheimer introduced missionary David Eichner, youth staffer Tim Paulson, and Pastor Christine Bohr who spoke briefly in favor of the Equal Rights Amendment. The bishop discussed the state of the synod. There were no committee reports offered. The afternoon portion of the meeting outlined the campaign for Outdoor Ministries led by Harold McKnight.

The District Church Day was held on Sunday, February 22, 1981, at St. James, Fayetteville. Approximately 200 people attended the various workshops presented by district representatives and synod staff members. A dinner was prepared by the men of St. James.

### Northern District

Since the 1980 convention of Synod the Northern District has held two events involving the Pastors and representatives of the congregations of the District. The spirit and response in these events appeared very high. We are grateful to the hosts and participants of each event for the fine job they did for the District.

The Fall District Meeting was held at Camp Agape, near Sanford, on October 27. The day long event opened with the Service of Holy Communion, Bishop Misenheimer presided, Rev. William Rhyne assisted and Rev. Charlie Hoyle preached. The day was given to the Synod's "Camping and Conference Ministry" in order to lay a foundation for the capital funds campaign during 1981-1983. Ninety eight persons were in attendance, representing thirty-two congregations. We were delighted with the response.

Spring Church Day was held this year at Augsburg Lutheran Church, Winston-Salem on February 14. Official registration was not taken but attendance was good and the shortened day appeared to solve the problem of people leaving early. The special workshop for church property members on planning for more fuel efficient buildings was well received. Twenty-two pastors were in attendance. Two new pastors of the District were introduced: Rev. David McCleary, the mission developer in Clemmons and Rev. Timothy Glenham, second Pastor of Augsburg, Winston-Salem.

### Southern District

The fall meeting of the Southern District was held on October 22, 1980 at Lutheridge with forty-two persons present. The Dean preached at the opening worship service of Holy Communion with Bishop Misenheimer serving as celebrant. A "state of the church" discussion opened the business meeting with introductions of four new pastors, the Youth Staffer and Missionary-In-Residence. Bishop Misenheimer then spoke to the assembly on the subject "Our Progress in Mission". Following a soup, sandwich and salad bar luncheon in the dining hall the delegates gave their attention to the "Conference and Camping Ministries Appeal". Presentations were made by Pastors Boyce Whitener, David Castor and Robert Troutman and orientation provided by Charles F. Bartlett.

The winter-spring meeting took the form of a "church day" leadership development event and was held at Christ Church, Charlotte on February 8, 1981, 3-6 p.m., with more than three hundred persons present. Following an opening worship service basic and advanced workshops were held for the various committees and interest groups. Pastors heard presentations by Minority Ministry Director Richard Perry and Bishop Misenheimer, who shared some of his goals and plans for the future.

During the year the Dean has attended all meetings of the District Deans and a number of congregational and auxiliary functions as a representative of the district. He has made written contact with others in his official capacity. He has attempted to fulfill the constitutional requirement that deans "assist the bishop of synod in giving pastoral care to the ministers in the district and in counseling with congregations" by numerous visits and telephone conversations.

The past year was a good year for the congregations of the Southern District. Our pastors and congregations pray that God will continue to speak to us and through us as we serve in His Name.

We thank again those many people who have given unselfishly of their time and talent to make the district functions helpful to participants.

### Southwestern District

### Report of the Secretary

This is the ninth year I have served as Secretary of Synod. While my major responsibilities are in the area of Professional Leadership, the work of the Secretary is important and time consuming. In this capacity, I serve as Statistician, Archivist and Necrologist as well.

Briefly, I serve as secretary to the Convention, the Executive Board and the District Deans, and, staff person to the Executive Board's sub-committee on conventions and the synod's Committee on Historical Work. Responsibilities include the publication of the *Bulletin of Reports* and *Proceedings of Synod*, assisting congregations in revising and amending their constitutions, maintaining an up-to-date role of ministers and congregations, processing transfers of ministers in and out of synod, the issuance of calls to special service, certifying elections to the various boards, and attest all legal documents. As Necrologist, I keep accurate records of ministers' deaths and related news releases. As Archivist, I am responsible for the maintenance and preservation of the synod's archives. As Statistician, I oversee the annual parochial reporting process. Many details of organizing the synod convention are handled through this office including pre-convention registration.

I express my deepest appreciation to Mrs. Mae Blake and Mrs. Betty Munday of the Church House staff for their excellent work and dedication. Mae serves as my secretary and Betty serves as recording secretary to the Executive Board and the convention. I thank Bishop Misenheimer, Jim, Bob and Dick for their support and cooperation. Finally, I thank the congregations and pastors of the synod who have given splendid cooperation over the year.

### STATISTICS

Annual parochial reports are received from about every congregation of the synod. These reports are checked, corrected and sent to the Church's Division for Parish Services for tabulation. I am especially grateful to Mrs. Mildred Casper for her assistance in this momentous task while Mrs. Mae Blake was recuperating from injuries received in an accident. Ministers — As of December 31, 1980, there were 314 ministers on the roll of synod. The breakdown is as follows: 201 parish pastors; 29 serving under call by the synod, 7 ministerial officers and staff, 3 mission developers, 4 administrators of educational or eleemosynary institutions or agencies; 11 serving under call by the LCA Executive Council including 2 full-time administrative staff officials, 7 military chaplains and 2 employees of federations of Lutheran churches; 57 retired pastors, 2 by reason of disability; 13 on status on leave from call and 3 applying for status on leave from call.

Observations on the membership statistics — This is the first year in decades that the North Carolina Synod has shown a loss in baptized membership. On the surface, this would seem to be an alarming statistic but there are a number of factors that contribute to the statistic. First, constitutional provisions regarding baptized numbers have changed setting up procedures for clearing the roll of inactive members. Second, our growth in membership in previous years has included the reception of new congregations into membership in the synod. While there are three congregations under development, no new congregations were received in 1980. Third, population trends in the nation are reflected in our synod as the general population is getting

older and the "baby boom" has subsided. However, there may be many other factors which contribute to the slight loss. It should be understood that while a loss is indicated, this is not a trend at this time. Future statistics will tell that story.

**Communing/contributing membership** has shown a decrease over the last two years: (1978) 47, 267, (1979) 47, 110, (1980) 46, 996. This may reflect a trend. However, it is too early to predict since the percentage change between 1978 and 1979 was .35% and between 1979 and 1980, .24%. Looking at the financial statistics, they do indicate that fewer people are giving more to the work of the Church.

#### **ARCHIVES**

This has been a busy year in the synod archives. Many visitors and over 50 researchers have visited the archives. Mrs. Mae Blake, assistant archivist has helped visitors orient themselves to the holdings of the archives. All of this indicates that entusiasm is still running high making a sound synodical archives program in the synod essential.

Each year new materials are being accessioned into the archives. Gifts from congregations, pastors and other individuals help in strengthening the holdings of the archives and enhance its usefulness as a major resource for the German Lutheran heritage in North Carolina. But the task is never complete. There are significant documents in the possession of congregations and individuals that would further enhance the understanding of our synod life and heritage which are not a part of the archives. We encourage people to donate these important documents into the archives for maintenance and preservation.

Through the efforts of the Committee on Historical Work of the Synod, over 50 of our congregations in the Western Piedmont and Mountain areas of the synod were microfilmed last spring and early summer. As soon as the microfilm is processed by the State Archives in Raleigh, copies will be purchased for the synod archives. We are all grateful for the fine cooperation of our congregations in this effort. Through this project, we are assured that these valuable records are preserved. It is the hope of the synod archivist and the Historical Work Committee that all 209 congregations of the synod will have their records on microfilm in the near future. What a rich heritage we have in the archives, bringing together under one roof so much precious information.

There are challenges ahead for the synod archives. We face a number of pressing needs that should be addressed in the near future. The task of arranging and describing the complete holdings is far from complete. A full-time professional archivist employed for two or three years would be necessary to complete the task. There is a need for more space so that researchers may have room to do their work. A permanent endowment is essential to the further development of the archives. The status of the archives needs to be firmly established as a creditable archives in the Church, the state and nation. Steps are being taken to address all these issues.

The archives are at the Church House to serve people. Over the year, a number of congregations have been assisted in preparation of congregation histories. Congregations have been assisted in having records microfilmed and developing their own archives. For persons visiting the archives, a guide to the holdings is available. Annual accessions to the archives are listed in a record book in the archives for visitors.

This year the Committee on Historical Work will publish a multi-media piece for congregations who are seeking help in developing a sound congregational archives program. Information on the tape and filmstrip will be sent to congregations in the coming months.

#### FOR YOUR INFORMATION

The archives at the Church House is open 9:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. Monday through Friday except holidays. You are invited to visit and become familiar with the rich heritage of North Carolina Lutherans. Mrs. Mae Blake, archivist assistant and secretary, or I will be glad to assist you in any way that we can.

Four files are maintained for each of the congregations of synod; the card index

file, listing materials which are available; a constitutional file, containing a copy of the congregation's constitution and amendments; a correspondence film which the Bishop of Synod maintains; and a historical data file containing histories, bulletins, and newspaper clippings of events and functions in the life of the congregation. Each congregation is encouraged to keep this file up to date by sending copies of bulletins of historical occasions, year books, and newspaper clippings.

#### **NECROLOGY**

In the sure and certain hope of the resurrection, we lost from our midst 686 members of our congregations by death in 1980. Four pastors have died since the last convention: The Rev. Voigt Rhodes Cromer, D.D., LL.D.; the Rev. John Daniel Barringer; the Rev. Noah David Yount; the Rev. Walter Cleveland Davis, Jr.; and, the Rev. Glenn A. Miller. Biographical information on these pastors is located on pp. 289-294 of the Proceedings.

# MEMORIALS FROM THE NORTH CAROLINA SYNOD TO THE 1980 SEATTLE CONVENTION OF THE CHURCH

The 1979 and 1980 Conventions of the North Carolina Synod sent six memorials to the 1980 Seattle Convention of the Church. The convention's disposition on these memorials is as follows:

 Energy, conservation and development of 1979 Proceedings of Synod, pp. 333-334 and 342.

The following is the response of the convention: The Division for Mission in North America is involved in assessing the effect of energy conservation as well as cost and development. Whether or not a statement on energy will emerge is too early to determine at this time. The Division for Parish Services has available now seven discussion guides in the Ecology/Energy Series and the course Food, Fuel and Future includes energy as a major topic.

The Committee on Memorials from Synods recommends that the above minute be transmitted to the North Carolina and Pacific Northwest Synods as the response to their memorials. (DM 17)

b. World Hunger Appeal, extension of 1979 Proceedings of Synod, p. 341

The recommendation was adopted that the LCA World Hunger Appeal be continued through December 31, 1990. (DM 63)

 Continuing Education, standards for and requirements of 1980 Proceedings of Synod, pp. 283-284.

The convention approved the following minute be transmitted to the Pacific Northwest, Pacific Southwest, and North Carolina Synod in response to their memorials:

The Division for Professional Leadership (DPL) is working with its cognate units in synods to increase the number of ordained ministers engaged in continuing education as is evident in "A Study of Ministry, 1980". The Conference of Synodical Presidents at its March 1980 meeting advised DPL that continuing education should not be mandated and advised that continuing education be included in its document "Expectations of the LCA of its Ordained Ministers." (DM 14)

And further; the adoption of the recommendation: That in order for the Lutheran Church in America to stress both the responsibility of ordained ministers to engage regularly in continuing education and of congregations and agencies served by them to support them in it with time, funds and counsel, the Division for Professional Leadership be requested to recommend provisions appropriate therefore to be included in a statement of "Expectations of the Lutheran Church in America of its Ordained Ministers." (DM 61)

#### d. Health benefits, continuation of, from seminarian to ordained minister status 1980 Proceedings of Synod, p. 283

The following recommendations were adopted:

It is sense of the 1980 convention of the Lutheran Church in America that the Board of Pensions be asked to develop for consideration and possible approval by the Executive Council, revisions of the Ministerial Health Benefits Plan embodying the following principles:

- 1. all eligible persons will be included equally,
- only pre-existing illnesses or medical conditions known to exist at the time of entry into the plan will be excluded from coverage,
- exclusion will be for a limited period not exceeding two years from the date of entry into the plan,
- after the exclusion period all previously excluded illnesses or conditions will be covered,
- 5. natural born children of members will be fully covered from birth.
- all persons excluded from the plan because of pre-existing illnesses or medical conditions shall be included effective January 1, 1981, provided 24 months have elapsed from the date of their exclusion from the plan.

The revisions to take effect January 1, 1981, and after five years the revisions will be evaluated by the Board of Pensions and the Executive Council for report to the church. (DM 41, 29, 56-57, 65)

 South Africa, reactions to apartheid in, 1980 Proceedings of Synod, pp. 294-295 (DM 74-79, 102)

The following response was adopted by the convention:

- To affirm unequivocal rejection of apartheid and all other forms of racial discrimination in our own society as well as in other nations;
- 2) To request the Executive Council to revise the 1973 procedure so as to allow, as an option, divestment as well as shareholder action; and
- 3) To call on the Executive Council, the Board of Pensions, the Common Investment Fund, congregations, synods and their institutions and agencies to continue their diligence in carrying out the action of the 1972 convention as it applies to social criteria for investments.
- 4) To inform the members of this church of this action and to urge them to make a similar continuing review of their personal investment and banking decisions.

That the Division for Mission in North America be directed to develop policy which defines criteria on the basis of which the option of divestment would be used, including the criteria for determining when total divestment from a given situation (such as South Africa) would be the most effective strategy; and to report this policy to the Executive Council by December of 1980.

Further, that the Executive Council be authorized to adopt and implement this policy and to disseminate it to congregations, synods, institutions and agencies of the LCA and that the effect of the implementation of this policy be reported to the 1982 convention of the LCA.

 Unemployment insurance, provision of, 1980 Proceedings of Synod, p. 275, 281, 296)

The response is as follows:

In November 1976, the administrator of the Board of Pensions reported to the Conference of Synodical Presidents that the U.S. Government unemployment benefits, administered through the states, were usually available to unemployed clergy. The synodical presidents were advised to learn of the programs in their states.

The Committee on Memorials from Synods recommends that the response to the memorial from the North Carolina Synod be to refer it to the Executive Council. (CM 105)

#### PROPOSED AMENDMENTS TO THE CONSTITUTION OF SYNOD

 a. The following proposed amendments to the Constitution of the North Carolina Synod was PLACED ON NOTICE at the 1980 Convention for consideration at the 1981 convention. (Words in **bold** are to be added and words in parenthesis ( ) are to be deleted.)

Article Ten, ORDAINED MINISTERS, Section III

All ordained ministers shall attend all conventions of the synod, and the pastors of congregations shall also attend the meetings of the districts to which they belong. (In case of unavoidable absence, the absentee shall submit a proper excuse to the secretary. After two warnings, absence without excuse from further conventions or meetings shall render the offender subject to discipline.)

- b. Amendments to the Approved Constitution for Synods (ACS) were recommended by the Executive Council of the Church and ratified by the 1980 Seattle Convention of the Lutheran Church in America. The Executive Board reviewed the amendments and approved them for recommendation to the 1981 synod convention. Amendments to the Approved Constitution for Synods may be adopted by a simple majority vote of any convention upon the recommendation of the synod's Executive Board, see Article Fourteen, Section 3 of the Constitution of the North Carolina Synod. Therefore, the following amendments to the Approved Constitution for Synods are officially PLACED ON NOTICE with the recommendation that the following be adopted as amendments to the Constitution of the North Carolina Synod: (Words in italic are to be stricken and words in bold face are additions.)
  - Article Ten Ordained Ministers, II Relationship to Congregations, 4, b (investigating committee, petition for)

In the last three contingencies, it shall be the duty of the president of the synod, when such difficulties are personally known, or have been brought to the bishop's attention by the dean of the district, by an official recital of allegations by the church council, or by a petition signed by at least one-third of the **voting** (communing) members, to investigate such conditions personally in company with a committee of two ordained ministers and one lay person.

 Article Ten, Ordained Ministers, II — Relationship to Congregations, 4, d (suspension of pastors)

In case of alleged neglect of duty or of local difficulties which imperil the efficient conduct of the congregation, all those concerned shall be heard, after which the bishop of the synod together with the advisory committee shall decide on the course of action to be recommended to the pastor and the parish. If both agree to carry out such recommendations, no further action shall be taken by the synod. If either party fails to assent, the matter shall be referred to the Executive Board on the basis of the advisory committee's record and report, and the board's action, after hearing such written or oral arguments as the parties care to present and such further testimony as the board may call for, shall be final. Such action shall not be regarded as an act of discipline but as an act of expediency based on the principles of Christian love. The bishop of the synod may at any point in the foregoing proceedings suspend the pastor from the functions of the ministry within the congregation pending resolution of the allegations completion of the formal proceedings.

Article Twelve — Bylaws and Amendments, Section 2 (mandatory amendments)

(amended by placing an asterisk in front of Section 2)

\* The sections and paragraphs of this constitution with an asterisk incorporate and record herein provisions of the constitution and bylaws of the Lutheran Church in America. If and when such provisions are amended by the church, corresponding amendments shall be in-

troduced at once into this constitution by the secretary of the synod upon receipt of formal certification thereof from the secretary of the Lutheran Church in America.

#### c. The title 'bishop''

As a result of the actions of the 1980 Seattle Convention of the Lutheran Church in America changing the title of "president" of the Church to "bishop" of the Church and "president" of the synod to "bishop" of the synod, the editorial change is made wherever the term "president" is employed, referring either to the president of the Church or president of a synod, the term "bishop" shall be substituted.

#### RECOMMENDATIONS

- That two copies of the 1980 Proceedings of the North Carolina Synod held at Lenoir-Rhyne College, May 15-18, 1980, be approved as the official protocol of said convention as certified by the Bishop and Secretary of Synod.
- That memorial pages including pictures and biographical data of the Reverend Voigt Rhodes Cromer, D.D., LL.D., the Reverend John Daniel Barringer; the Reverend Noah David Yount; the Reverend Walter Cleveland Davis, Jr., and, the Reverend Glenn A. Miller be so designated in the 1981 Proceedings.
- 3. That the proposed Amendments to the Constitution of the North Carolina Synod placed on notice at the 1980 Convention be considered.
- 4. That the proposed Amendments to the Constitution of the North Carolina Synod as ratified by the 1980 Seattle Convention of the Church in amending the Approved Constitution for Synods, PLACED ON NOTICE at this synod convention be considered.

#### Note 1 — Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

The North Carolina Synod of the Lutheran Church in America prepares its financial statement on the basis of cash receipts and disbursements; consequently, certain income is recognized when received rather than when earned and certain expenses when paid rather than when the obligation is incurred.

To insure observance of limitations and restrictions placed on the use of available funds an annual budget is prepared. Accounts are classified for accounting and reporting purposes into funds in accordance with activities and objectives of the Synod. The statement of cash receipts and disbursements includes transfers between the various funds and activities as receipts and disbursements of the funds affected.

Expenditures for property and equipment are recorded as cash disbursements in the year payments are made. Physical properties are not capitalized and depreciation is not recorded.

### Michael Peeler Trust Fund

The Auditor's report shows that the Fund performed well during the year. The stock market fluctuation had little effect on the Fund. The selection of conservative investments resulted in a very satisfactory income according to the Auditor's report, which is made a part of this report. \$50,000.00 was turned over to the Synod and a nice sum added to the corpus. It is a tangible proof that a person can participate in the work of the Lord for many years beyond this life. A find factor is the increase provided as the years pass for the word of the Lord.

#### NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS December 31, 1980

Note 1 — Summary of Significant Accounting Policies Accrual Basis

The financial statements of The Michael Peeler Fund have been prepared on the accrual basis. The statement of current fund revenues, expenditures and other changes is a statement of financial activities of current funds related to the current reporting period. It does not purport the results of operations or the net income or loss for the period as would a statement of income or a statement of revenues and expenses.

Fund accounting — In order to ensure observance of limitations and restrictions placed on the use of the resources available to The Michael Peeler Trust, the accounts are maintained in accordance with the principles of "fund accounting". This is the procedure by which resources for various purposes are classified for accounting and reporting purposes into funds that are in accordance with objectives specified.

Note 2 — The Michael Peeler Fund originated under the terms of the will of the late J. M. Peeler, Salisbury, North Carolina, which stated "I give and bequeath and advise to the North Carolina Lutheran Synod one-half of my estate, to be known as 'The Michael Peeler Fund' and the income therefrom is to be used by the Synod each year wherever it is needed most for the advancement of the Kingdom of God." The North Carolina Synod of the Lutheran Church in America received one-half of the estate assets on or about July 31, 1959 and the trust fund was established. On October 8, 1965 they received, also under the terms of the will, one-third of the remaining assets of the estate upon the death of his wife.

Note 3 — The Michael Peeler Fund is administered by a board of trustees presently consisting of H. E. Isenhour. Glenn E. Ketner and John W. Cobb.

The trustees, by approval of the Executive Committee of the North Carolina Synod of the Lutheran Church in America, have established a reserve for principal losses fund. On March 5, 1980 the Executive Committee authorized the Treasurer of the Synod to return to the trustees current earnings of The Michael Peeler Fund in excess of \$50,000 for investments within the reserve for principal losses fund.

# Report of the Investments Committee

The Investments Committee has worked closely with the Treasurer regarding the investment of Synod funds in interest bearing deposits. The committee is pleased to report that during 1980 the deposits earned a total of \$21,075.73.

NOTE: The title "Bishop" is used throughout this report for consistency though the Church's action changing the title of the head office of the synod from "President" to "Bishop" did not occur until July 1980.

#### A. OFFICERS AND STAFF

Quarterly reports were submitted to the board by the officers and staff of the synod reporting official actions and activities related to their respective offices and assignments. The report of the Bishop included listings of resignations of pastors, acceptances of calls, vacancies, appointments of vice-pastors, and other matters of information and interest pertaining to the life of the Church. Included in Bishop

Misenheimer's report were the reports of James A. Chesky, Minister for Resources; the Rev. David L. Martin, Minister for Professional Leadership; the Rev. Robert H. Shoffner, Minister for Parish Services; and, the Rev. Richard C. Little, Minister for Outreach. The quarterly report of the Secretary, the Rev. David L. Martin, included monthly parochial information on ministers transferring in and out of the synod, those who were "on leave from call", applying for status "on leave from call", resigned, deceased and dropped from the roll. Quarterly reports of the Treasurer, James A. Chesky, included breakdowns of receipts and disbursements were received. The reports of the Rev. David L. Castor, Director of Outdoor Ministries and the Rev. Richard J. Perry, Jr., Director of Minority Ministries were received through the report of the sub-committee on boards, committees and auxiliaries as well as reports of the Youth Staffer. Full reports are appended to the minutes of the board meetings. Recommendations attached to reports of officers and staff were referred to the appropriate sub-committees of the board. At each quarterly meeting the board set aside time in its executive sessions to dialogue with one of the members of the staff.

 Secretary of Synod, election of, action on (EBM, September 1980, ES)

Minister for Professional Leadership, the Rev. David L. Martin was nominated and elected Secretary of the Synod by the board, the term to expire in June 1981.

Treasurer of Synod, election of, action on (EBM, September 1980, ES)

Minister for Resources, James A. Chesky, was nominated and elected Treasurer of the Synod by the board, the term to expire in June 1981.

#### B. ELECTIONS

In accordance with Article V, Section 2, paragraph 3, item m of the Constitution of Synod, the board held elections to fill the following vacancies:

- 1. North Carolina Lutheran Homes, Board of Trustees the Rev. Donald R. Deal of Mt. Pleasant was elected to fulfill the unexpired term of the Rev. Floyd W. Bost, who resigned to fulfill a term on the Executive Board, the term to expire in 1982.

(EBM, September 1980, p. 8)

Bishop Misenheimer reported a letter had been received from the Secretary of the Church notifying the synod of actions taken at the Seattle Convention of the Church in reference to synods. The matter was referred to the sub-committee on legal affairs. See Section L, item 5 for further information.

8. Calvary Church, Concord; re Sunday conventions (EBM, September 1980, p. 8)

A letter was received from the church council of Calvary, Concord objecting to having the synod convention over Sunday. The matter was referred to the subcommittee on conventions. See Section J, item 3 for further information.

Augsburg Church, Winston-Salem, Hine Fund Committee, grant from, information on

(EBM, September 1980, p.8)

Bishop Misenheimer informed the board that a letter had been received from the Secretary of the Hine Fund of Augsburg Church, Winston-Salem notifying the synod that a \$3,000 grant had been made to the synod in honor of Executive Board member Mrs. Ruth Fisher to be used to purchase furnishings for the Chapel-Conference Room at the Church House. The matter was referred to the sub-committee on property, personnel and finance. See Section O, item 7 of this report for further information.

10. Fundamentalist Methods of Political actions, Executive Board resolution, communications on, information on (EBM, December 1980, p. 5)

Bishop Misenheimer informed the board of numerous communications he received in regard to the board's action in adopting a resolution on fundamentalist methods of political action which appeared in the *North Carolina Lutheran*. The report was received as information. For infomation on the resolution refer to Section G, item 10 in this report.

11. Office of Administration and Finance of the Church, 1981 apportionment figure, recalculation of, information on (EBM, December 1980, p. 5)

A letter from the Church's office of administration and finance was presented to the board by the Bishop which informed the synod of the recalculation of the 1981 apportionment figure in the amount of \$1,067,860. The matter was received as information.

 The Rev. Charlie Hoyle, Lutheridge, Board of Trustees, unexpired term, correction of, information on (EBM, December 1980, p. 5)

The Bishop reported that the Rev. Charlie Hoyle declined his election to the Lutheridge Board of Trustees fulfilling the unexpired term of Pastor Don L. Safrit who resigned. Upon examination of the by-laws of Lutheridge, it was discovered that an error had been made in the number of board members required from North Carolina and that there was no vacancy to be filled. The matter was received as information.

 Seamen's Center, Wilmington, letter of appreciation, information on (EBM, December 1980, p. 6)

Bishop Misenheimer read a letter to the board from the Seamen's Center in Wilmington expressing appreciation for the synod's support of the Center in the past and requesting the synod's future support. For further information of the board's action in this matter see Section K, item 7 of this report.

14. Eastern Cabarrus Historical Society, Inc., request for funds, information, referral of

(EBM, December 1980, p. 6)

A letter was received from the Eastern Cabarrus Historical Society, Inc. requesting the synod's financial support. The matter was referred to the subcommittee on property, personnel and finance. See Section K, item 15 for further information.

 President of Lenoir-Rhyne College; Dr. Albert Anderson; re: Michael Peeler Professorship, report on (EBM, March 1981)

Minister for Resources, James A. Chesky, reported that a letter had been received from the President of Lenoir-Rhyne College regarding the status of the Michael Peeler Professorship endowment and a description of the fund as it appears in the catalog. He expressed appreciation to the synod for the establishment of the endowment. The letter was referred to the sub-committee on personnel, property and finance. At the March meeting, the board received a letter from the Rev. Robert L. Troutman, Executive Director of Lutheridge expressing appreciation to the synod, on behalf of Lutheridge, for the apportionment support provided by the synod in 1980.

18. The Rev. Paul B. Beatty, Jr.; re: Broadcast Ministry Project, Executive Board's Action on, response to, referral of

(EBM, December 1980, p. 23; EBM, March 1981)

Bishop Misenheimer informed the board in March that a letter had been received from the Rev. Paul B. Beatty giving more information about the possibility of developing a "broadcast ministry" in the synod. The matter was referred to the subcommittee on long range planning. Refer to Long Range Planning, Section M, item 8 for further information.

 Bishop Misenheimer; re: Equal Rights Amendment; (letter of affirmation of); to North Carolina General Assembly; information (EBM, December 1980, p. 13; March 1981)

As authorized by the action taken at the December meeting, Bishop Misenheimer informed the board that he had sent a letter to the North Carolina General Assembly expressing the support of the Equal Rights Amendment by both the North Carolina Synod and the Lutheran Church in America. For further information on this action refer to Section G Boards, Committees and Auxiliaries, item 16 of this report.

Bishop of the Church, James Crumley, video-tape re: use of video tape equipment in the Church, viewing of

(EBM, March 1981)

The board viewed a video tape presentation from the office of the Bishop of the LCA which shared the possibilities of the use of video tape in the Church and the proposed development of the LCA Communications Network. Video tape equipment was furnished to all 33 synods through the Lutheran Brotherhood Fraternal Insurance Company for the development of a communications network.

#### G. BOARDS, COMMITTEES AND AUXILIARIES

Reports of the Director of Outdoor Ministries, the Director of Minority Ministries and the Youth Staffer were received quarterly by the board through the report of the sub-committee on boards, committees and auxiliaries.

1. Youth ministry, youth staffer Wenda Thielking, appreciation of, action on (EBM, June 1980, p. 12)

In conjunction with the acceptance of the report of Youth Staffer Wenda Thielking, the board expressed its thanks to her for her many and varied contributions to the ministry of the synod.

2. Minority Ministries program, facilities for, action on (EBM, June 1980, p. 12-13; EBM, September 1980, p. 19)

As a result of a report at the June meeting by the Rev. Richard Perry, Director of the synod's Minority Ministries Program, in which he indicated a need for permanent office facilities for the Director, an **ad hoc** committee of the board was established to pursue options for acquiring permanent office facilities in Charlotte. At the September meeting it was reported that a new office facility had been located for Pastor Perry.

3. Lutheran Family Services in North Carolina, establishment of, actions and information on

(EBM, March 1980, p. 24; PRO 1980, pp. 288-289; EBM, June 1980, p. 13; EBM, September 1980, pp. 20-34; EBM, December 1980, pp. 8, 27-28; EBM, March

At the 1980 Convention, the synod set in motion the establishment of a new agency Lutheran Family Services in North Carolina which would be created upon official withdrawal from ownership and operation of the Lutheran Children's Home of the South effective January 1, 1981 or as soon thereafter as the North Carolina Synod would be legally qualified to assume responsibilities for the services of the Home in North Carolina. Prior to the action of the 1980 Convention the board approved the creation of a task force for a North Carolina Lutheran Family Services agency to begin the process for such an agency to operate as soon as the convention approved such recommendations and was legally feasible. At the June meeting of the board, the task force reported on the development of a statement of purpose, its historical connection and a projected time line for the completion of its task. At the September meeting of the board, Articles of Incorporation and By-Laws of Lutheran Family Services in North Carolina were presented to the board by the task force who worked in consultation with the church's Division for Mission in North America in its creation. After approving suggested amendments to the documents, the board approved the Articles of Incorporation and the By-Laws of the Lutheran Family Services in North Carolina as amended. The Articles and By-Laws were sent on to the State of North Carolina for approval and official action.

A report was received at the December meeting indicating that the board of trustees of the new agency had met, adopted an insurance package, set budgets and salaries for 1981, adopted personnel policies, set a loan repayment schedule and discussed the need for a public relations program. Further, the board was informed that Bill Brittain had been elected Executive Director and Larry Parrish of Salisbury was elected president of the board.

4. Conference and Camping Ministries Capital Funds Appeal, information on (EBM, June 1980, pp. 13-14; EBM, September 1980, p. 31; EBM, December 1980, pp. 4-5; EBM, March 1981)

The Conference and Camping Ministries Capital Funds Appeal which had been approved by preceding conventions of the synod was given the final approval at the 1980 Convention to proceed. At the June meeting of the board it was reported that the policy committee had dealt with the recommendation that had come from the 1980 convention and that they were in the process of making arrangements to set up a campaign office at the Church House and developing the campaign schedule for the appeal. It was reported at the meeting that May 3, 1981 had been set as the Appeal Sunday when bulletin inserts and pledge cards would be distributed. At the September meeting Bishop Misenheimer reported that there was good success in securing people to work with the campaign. At the December meeting, the board received a report from Charles Bartlett, Lutheran Laymen Movement Director for the Appeal, who distributed manuals, campaign brochures, pledge cards and a time schedule of events and gave a progress report on the campaign and presented a film strip. At the March meeting Director Bartlett gave a progress report which included a summary of advanced giving for the appeal.

5. Communications Committee, re: St. Andrew's, Andrews radio ministry, grant, request for, referral of

(EBM, June 1980, p. 14)

At the March meeting, it was reported by the chairman of the sub-committee on boards, committees and auxiliaries that a request had been received from the synod's Communications Committee that a grant be extended to St. Andrew's Church, Andrews for the continuance of its radio ministry. The matter was referred to the sub-committee on property, personnel and finance. See Section K, item 5 for further information.

6. Committee Appointments, 1980-81, action on (EBM, June 1980, pp. 15-16)

At the June meeting, the board approved that the 1981 appointive committees as recommended by Bishop Misenheimer be approved, and, that in the future, retired pastors be given consideration for membership on appointive and operational committees. Also, the board approved the appointment of the cabinet chairman, authorized the synod staff to make replacements on the 1980-81 Appointive Committees as needed, and, authorized the District Deans to make Operational Committee appointments with prior approval of the board, such appointments to be reported at the September meeting.

 Camp Committee; Agape Camp and Conference Retreat Center and Kure Beach Retreat Center; rates effective September 1, 1980; approval of; request for; action on

(EBM, September 1980, p. 19)

Upon the recommendation of the Camp Committee, the board ratified the rate schedule for Outdoor Ministries at the Kure Beach Retreat Center and the Agape Camp and Conference Retreat Center.

8. World Missions Committee; Missionary-in-Residence; introduction of (EBM, September 1980, p. 20)

At the September meeting, the Rev. David Eichner and his wife were introduced to the board as participants in the Missionary-in-Residence program in the synod for the year. He shared biographical information about himself and his family with the board.

9. American Missions Committee; Melanchthon Church Fund; 1980 grants from; recommendations; action on

(EBM, September 1980, p. 32)

Upon the recommendation of the synod's committee on American Missions, the board approved the grants to congregations from the Melanchthon Fund with the stipulation that priority be given to paying up to date all salaries and pension matters in those churches to which the need applied. The grants were as follows:

 Social Ministry Committee, Advocacy and Strategy Group; resolution re: fundamentalist methods of political action; statement on; action on (EBM, September 1980, pp. 32-34)

The board received a request from the Social Ministry Committee's Advocacy Research and Strategy Group requesting that the board prepare and endorse a statement on advocacy to address the Christian Fundamentalist's methods of political action in the state of North Carolina. The board created and adopted a resolution with copies to be sent to all pastors in the synod by first class mail with a cover letter of explanation by the Bishop and directed that the resolution be printed in the North Carolina Lutheran. The statement is as follows:

- "WHEREAS the efforts to mobilize Christians along lines of a 'movement for Jesus' to represent 'the Christian Voice', making moral, theological, and political judgment on political issues and candidates solely on religious grounds constitute a phenomenon of considerable impact and extent during this election year; and
- "WHEREAS these movements or groups promote a self-righteousness not in keeping with the Gospel; and
- "WHEREAS the labeling of issues or politicians as 'Christian' or 'non-Christian' is predicated upon
  - a highly selective interpretation of Scripture,
  - $\boldsymbol{-}$  a rejection of both the pluralism and the interdependence in our political process, and

- an attempt to make religion a single-issue political force for the purpose of gaining political power; and
- "WHEREAS Lutheran theology acknowledge the twofold reign of God (as ruler of both the world and church), under which Christians live simultaneously; and
- "WHEREAS Lutherans strongly discourage joining or supporting movements which confuse church-government relations and distort the churches' advocacy mission in the political world by pressing for total agreement on some moral issues while ignoring others; and
- "WHEREAS the Lutheran citizens of North Carolina deserve to hear from their church concerning the rise of these groups and their possible influence on the political process;
- "BE IT THEREFORE RESOLVED.
- "THAT the Executive Board of the North Carolina Synod of the Lutheran Church in America stand boldly against the misuse of the church's name as a guise to gain political power;
- "THAT this Executive Board reject the self-righteousness which these groups promote as being not only unfaithful to the message of the grace of God but also as a manifestation of the legalism which the New Testament decries;
- "THAT this Executive Board affirm with other Lutherans the principle of functional interaction between the government and religious bodies in areas of mutual endeavor, so that such interaction assists the maintenance of order, the protection and extension of civil rights, the establishment of social justice and equality of opportunity, the promotion of the general welfare and the advancement of the dignity of all persons;
- "THAT this Executive Board affirm with other Lutherans the principle of separation of church and state and the rights of all persons and groups in society to free exercise of religion within the laws of morality, human rights, and property;
- "THAT this Executive Board encourage Lutherans across the synod to stand firm in the Gospel, resisting the temptation to self-righteous or simplistic identification as 'Christian' some politician or policy and labeling others 'non-Christian' along similar grounds, resisting as well the temptation to control by election or legislation matters of conscience among all citizens;
- "THAT this Executive Board register strong opposition to self-professed religious groups exploiting religious belief for political purposes, even for avowed purposes of political power 'in the name of Jesus'; and
- "THAT this Executive Board urge Lutherans across the synod
  - to be wary of the theology of these groups.
  - to seek guidance from pastors and teachers and other church leaders before accepting as true the often appealing but erroneous message of these groups,
  - American Missions Committee: Melanchthon Church Fund; 1981 grants, request for, action on

(EBM, December 1980, p. 8)

The board received requests from the American Missions Committee noting that allocations would be needed from the Melanchthon Church Fund and the 1981 synod budget to meet sustentation needs. The following allocations were requested from Melanchthon Church Funds:

St. Andrew's, Mt. Airy	\$3,000
Shepherd of the Hills, Sylva	1,800
New Covenant, High Point	5,000
Whiteville	7,000
St. Peter, Southport	1,800

A total of \$18,600 was requested. It was noted that the Melanchthon Church Fund generates \$10,000 in estimated earnings annually and that there was a balance of \$3,270.86 from 1980. The recommendation was adopted that up to \$12,000 in 1981 be

made available from the Melanchthon Church Fund for use by the American Missions Committee for 1981 allocations to mission congregations.

 Professional Service Committee, Long-tenure ministry project, participation in, request for, action on (EBM, December 1980, p. 10)

he board approved a request

The board approved a request from the Professional Service Committee for the North Carolina Synod to participate in the "Long-Tenure Ministry Project" developed by the Alban Institute of Washington, D.C. Four pastors and their spouses from the Synod would directly participate in the project with funds to be granted from Lutheran Theological Southern Seminary Continuing Education Funds and from Aid Association for Lutherans Fraternal Insurance Company.

 Professional Preparation Committee: seminarian Grady W. Beaver, loan from revolving loan fund, request for, action on (EBM, December 1980, p. 10)

The board approved a loan request of \$500 for seminarian Grady W. Beaver, Jr., funds to be taken from the synod's revolving loan funds.

14. Michael Peeler Fund; Board of Trustees; Harry E. Isenhour, LL.D. retirement, appreciation of services, action on (EBM, December 1980, pp. 10-11)

The board acted, at the December meeting, to draw up a letter of appreciation to Dr. Harry E. Isenhour, expressing the synod's gratitude to him for his dedicated service for 24 years as a trustee of the Michael Peeler Fund. At the noon hour of the December 11 session of the board, Dr. Isenhour was personally honored by the board and presented with the following letter of appreciation:

Dear Dr. Isenhour.

On behalf of the Executive Board of the North Carolina Synod of the Lutheran Church in America and the many persons who have benefited from the Michael Peeler Fund, we want to express our deep appreciation to you for 24 years of service as a trustee of that fund.

The trustees of the Michael Peeler Fund were appointed in 1956 with their first meeting being held on April 10 of that year. From its initiation the legacy has increased substantially in value and had provided hundreds of thousands of dollars "for the advancement of the Kingdom of God" in accordance with Mr. Peeler's will.

As a trustee of this fund from its inception, you have been instrumental in managing this fund effectively. Through your expertise and sound judgment, this generous bequest of Michael Peeler has been significantly expanded.

As you retire from this position at the end of 1980, we thank you for these many years of dedicated service. As the manager said in a parable told by Jesus, we say to you, "Well done good and faithful servant".

15. Social Ministry Committee, Justice and Dignity Month, board support for; request for, action on

(EBM, December 1980, p. 12)

The board was informed by the sub-committee on boards, committees and auxiliaries that the Social Ministry Committee requested the board to affirm and support the action of the North Carolina Council of Churches designating February 1981 as Criminal Justice Month and requested that the board encourage the congregations of the synod to join in that support. The board reacted to the terminology of the request and approved the following action: that February 1981 be observed as Justice and Dignity Month in the North Carolina Synod; that a list of LCA resources be sent to the congregations of the synod for use in the study and discussion of this issue, and, that the information relative to the observance of Justice and Dignity Month be communicated to the editor of the North Carolina Lutheran for publication.

16. North Carolina Lutheran Church Women; Equal Rights Amendment; support of; request for; action on

(EBM, December 1980, p. 13)

The Executive Board of the North Carolina Lutheran Church Women requested the Executive Board of synod to affirm the following actions of the LCW in support of the Equal Rights Amendment:

- Write to key state government officials and legislators requesting reexamination of the Equal Rights Amendment during the 1981 legislative session;
- Utilize the North Carolina Lutheran to emphasize reasons for support of ERA;
- 3. Prepare or give guidance in preparing a bulletin insert for congregational use early in 1981, preferably January;
- Enable the North Carolina LCW to work through synodical committees toward the passage of ERA in 1981.

The recommendation was adopted that the Executive Board of the Synod affirm the action of the North Carolina Lutheran Church Women in support of the Equal Rights Amendment, and, that Bishop Misenheimer's letter to the North Carolina General Assembly of February 1979 expressing the synod's position on ERA be sent again.

 Social Ministry Committee; Conscientious Objector status, 1982 LCA Memorial, possibility of, information on (EBM, December 1980, p. 13)

The board was informed at the December meeting that the Social Ministry Committee had discussed the possibility of memorializing the 1982 LCA Convention in regard to conscientious objector status and requested that the board study the issue for possible action at a later time. The board took no action on the matter.

 Lutheran Family Services in North Carolina, Mother's Day offering; and information to be sent to congregations, request for, action on (EBM, December 1980, pp. 13-14)

Upon the suggestion of Lutheran Family Services in North Carolina, through its Executive Director Bill Brittain, the board granted permission for congregations to take a special offering to be designated for Lutheran Family Services in North Carolina on Mother's Day, the second Sunday in May 1981. Also, the board approved a recommendation that the Bishop of the synod send out a letter to all congregations supplying information about Lutheran Family Services in North Carolina, asking pastors to include this information in bulletins and newsletters, and, encouraging congregations and individuals to consider this information in re-evaluating budgets and wills.

 Nativity, Arden, 1982 Ordination Service, invitation from, referral of (EBM, March 1981)

At the March meeting, the board received an invitation from Nativity, Arden to hold the 1982 Ordination Service at Nativity. The recommendation was approved that the board acknowledge the request from Nativity, Arden and inform them that this item would be referred to the sub-committee on congregations and ministers for consideration at a later date.

20. Youth Ministry and Stewardship Committees, 1981-82 Youth Staffer; application for, action on (EBM. March 1981)

At the March meeting, the board approved the request from the Youth Ministry and Stewardship Committees to make application for a Youth Staffer for 1981-82 provided that an assessment of the program's effectiveness, a good evaluation, be conducted and supportive data be received regarding the program. At that meeting, the Rev. Robert H. Shoffner, Minister for Parish Services, was asked to provide information including a job description and goals for the program. The sub-committee on

personnel, property and finance requested an in-depth study and evaluation of the Youth Staffer program as well.

21. Lenoir-Rhyne College, Board of Trustees, future vacancies, suggestions, information on
(ERM Moreh 1991)

(EBM, March 1981)

It was reported to the board that a letter had been received from the Board of Trustees of Lenoir-Rhyne College submitting the names of the Rev. Stephen Gerhard and George P. Hages to be placed on file as suggestions for filling unexpired terms on the board which might occur at some future time.

22. Educational Ministry Committee, Leadership Education and Development (LEAD) emphasis, presentation of, information on (EBM, March 1981)

A presentation was made to the board by the Rev. Gary Perryman, chairman of the Synod's Educational Ministry Committee, on the Leadership Education and Development (LEAD) program which was designed for individual congregations and using synod resource teams and materials from the Church's Division for Parish Services. The board expressed appreciation to the chairman and committee for their ministry in the synod.

23. Stewardship Committee, Partners in Ministry Process, future direction, referral of

(EBM, March 1981)

With the direction of the sub-committee on boards, committees and auxiliaries, the board heard presentations and discussed the future direction for the Partners in Ministry Process, also known as the Synod/Congregation Apportionment Consultations. A number of options were discussed as well as problems with the current program. The board referred the matter to the Stewardship Committee with comments and feedback to be shared from the board's discussion.

#### H. CONSTITUTIONS

 Congregational Constitutions, amendment to, action on (EBM, September 1980, p. 42; EBM, December 1980, pp. 14-15; EBM, March 1981)

Upon recommendation of the board's sub-committee on congregations and ministers, the board reviewed constitutions submitted by congregations and took the following actions:

- a) St. Andrew's, New Bern the board approved the constitutional changes with the notation that Article X, Section 1 was unnecessary inasmuch as the pastor is a member of the church council as provided for in Article IX, Section 1; and, that Article X relates to "officers" rather than council members.
- b) Good Shepherd, Goldsboro the board approved their constitutional changes with the notation that further consideration be given to Article XIII, Section 5-8, which should be removed from this Article and become "by-laws".
- c) New Covenant, High Point the board approved revision of Article VII, Section 4 as submitted but suggested that the entire constitution be revised and updated to comply with the latest model of the approved constitution for congregations.
- d) Mt. Hebron, Hildebran that the constitution be returned to the congregation and that they be asked to re-submit it according to the guidelines set by the Executive Board with the following notations: (1) Article VII, Section 4 "deacons shall be elected by plurality vote". This contradicts normal election procedures which had been set as their official guide; and (2) Article XIII By-Laws and amendments. In this Article, Section 2 of the ACC has been omitted. Further, congregational by-laws could be set into an authentic section of By-Laws separate from the constitution.

- e) Macedonia, Burlington the board approved their constitution as submitted.
- f) St. John's, Statesville the board noted that it could not approve Article V because of its variance with mandatory Article V of the ACC but the subcommittee on Congregations and Ministers would refer this Article to the Secretary of the LCA for a ruling. Also, it was noted that the subcommittee must have the entire constitution as prescribed in the Guidelines before any final action could be taken.
- g) Holy Trinity, Gastonia returned to the congregation asking that it be submitted according to the guidelines set by the Executive Board.
- h) Holy Trinity, Raleigh the board approved their constitution with the notation that they need to add the asterisk to Article V, Section 4, d.
- i) Concordia, China Grove the board returned the constitution to the congregation asking that it be re-submitted according to the guidelines.
- j) Calvary, Morganton approved as amended
- k) St. Timothy, Havelock approved as amended with the suggestion that they review their present constitution in light of the 1980 model and notify the board of any editorial changes.
- Holy Trinity, Raleigh approved the amendment to their constitution which adds the treasurer to the executive committee of the congregation.

Constitution of the North Carolina Synod and Approved Constitution for Congregations, editorial changes in, re: title of Bishop, recommendation on (EBM, September 1980, pp. 42-43)

It was reported that since the Executive Board acted to treat changes in the North Carolina Synod Constitution and the Approved Constitution for Congregations in regard to the title of Bishop as an editorial change, it was suggested that the Secretary of Synod correspond with congregations requesting the editorial change, substituting "Bishop" for "President of Synod" in all cases where "President of Synod" appears in their constitutions.

#### I. CONGREGATIONS AND MINISTERS

1. St. Philip's, Raleigh, relocation of, progress report, information (EBM, June 1980, p. 16; EBM, September 1980, p. 43) (For background information see 1980 Proceedings page 137.)

At the June meeting of the board, it was reported that the relocation of St. Philip's, Raleigh was proceeding on schedule and that Pastor Kepley had attended mission developers school. At the September meeting, Bishop Misenheimer informed the board that legal papers had been signed to sell the old church property to the Baptist Association and that on August 17, 1980 groundbreaking services were held at the site of the new location of St. Philips.

 St. Andrew's, Concord, relocation of, request for, progress on (EBM, December 1979, p.19; EBM, March 1980; EBM, June 1980, p. 17; EBM, September 1980, p. 43)

In December of 1979, the congregation of St. Andrew's, Concord requested that they relocate and be a new start mission under the direction of the Division for Mission in North America. The board approved the request. By the March 1980 meeting it was reported that proposed sites were being sought. At the June 1980 meeting it was reported that progress would advance rapidly once a site was selected and approved by the congregation and neighboring churches. Further, it was reported that the Rev. David Johnson, Regional Director for the Division for Mission in North America would be meeting with the Cabarrus County Planning Board so that possible sites for the relocation could be identified. At the September meeting it was reported that a site had not been identified but there had been conversations with a major corporation holding property concerning the possibility of a donation of land.

#### Note 1 — Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

The North Carolina Synod of the Lutheran Church in America prepares its financial statement on the basis of cash receipts and disbursements; consequently, certain income is recognized when received rather than when earned and certain expenses when paid rather than when the obligation is incurred.

To insure observance of limitations and restrictions placed on the use of available funds an annual budget is prepared. Accounts are classified for accounting and reporting purposes into funds in accordance with activities and objectives of the Synod. The statement of cash receipts and disbursements includes transfers between the various funds and activities as receipts and disbursements of the funds affected.

Expenditures for property and equipment are recorded as cash disbursements in the year payments are made. Physical properties are not capitalized and depreciation is not recorded.

## Michael Peeler Trust Fund

The Auditor's report shows that the Fund performed well during the year. The stock market fluctuation had little effect on the Fund. The selection of conservative investments resulted in a very satisfactory income according to the Auditor's report, which is made a part of this report. \$50,000.00 was turned over to the Synod and a nice sum added to the corpus. It is a tangible proof that a person can participate in the work of the Lord for many years beyond this life. A find factor is the increase provided as the years pass for the word of the Lord.

7. Task Force to Review Synod's Communications Networks, recommendations from, action on

(EBM, June 1980, p. 7; EBM, September 1980, p. 7; EBM, December 1980, pp. 22-23)

As a result of the planning done at the January 1980 Executive Board retreat, a task force to review synod's communications networks was created. At the December 1980 meeting, the board adopted the following recommendations of the task force:

- a. That the committee on communications in consultation with the long range sub-committee and the finance sub-committee engage in an ongoing study in the area of communications to assess the need for equipment and leadership within the synod.
- b. That the Synodical News Bureau be maintained as a function assigned by the Executive Board to a staff member to prepare news releases related to synodical and churchwide events and activities of significance, and to distribute the same to the news media (press, television, radio, etc.) and to congregations within the synod. It should operate in conjunction with the Committee on Communications.
- c. That each congregation within the synod receive a complimentary subscription to the North Carolina Lutheran.
- d. That a flow chart of communications within the synod be distributed to members of the Executive Board and to each of the members of the Cabinet for Professional Leadership, Cabinet for Parish Services and the Cabinet for Mission.
- 8. Committee on Communications, broadcast project, recommendations, actions on

(EBM, December 1980, pp. 23-24; EBM, March 1981)

At the December meeting, the board received a presentation from the Committee on Communications in regard to a cable TV telecast project. The board defeated the recommendations of the Communications Committee after lengthy discussion.

At the March meeting, the board received a communication from Pastor Paul Beatty in response to the board's action at the December meeting defeating recommendations on a broadcast project. He offered a series of modified recommendations which the board approved. They are as follows:

- a. That the offer of Pastor Roy Lloyd of the LCA Office for Communications of the Department of Press, Radio and Television be accepted to carry out a demonstration project in Cable TV programming in our synod.
- b. That the questionnaire and cover letter provided by Pastor Lloyd be used in preparation for the demonstration project.
- c. That the Bishop be authorized to appoint a task force to work with Pastor Lloyd in carrying out the demonstration project.
- 9. Synod Mission Profile, goal language, change of, request for, action on (EBM, March 1981)

The board approved the request of the Cabinet for Professional Leadership that the terminology of goal #20 be changed from "Recruitment" to "Preparation" of leadership.

#### N. PERSONNEL

1. Church House staff, secretary, employment of, information on (EBM, June 1980, p. 25)

The board was informed that Mrs. Nancy Howard of Salisbury had been employed as a secretary at the Church House filling the vacancy on the secretarial staff.

# 2. Bishop's staff, titles, change of, action on (EBM, June 1980, pp. 25-26)

At the June meeting, the board acted changing the titles of Bishop Misenheimer's staff from "Administrative Assistant for" to "Ministers for", as a result of a study coming out of the board retreat in January.

3. Church House staff, full-time printer, employment of, action on (EBM, December 1980, pp. 26-27)

At the December meeting, a recommendation was adopted that Julia Walters, who had been working in a part-time capacity as printer at the Church House, be hired as a full-time employee and that she be given benefits accordingly.

4. Officers, staff, directors and other employees, compensation for 1981, action on

(EBM, December 1980, ES)

At the December executive session of the board, the salary and compensation schedule was approved for 1981 for officers, staff, Church House secretaries, book-keeper, printer, Director of Outdoor Ministries, Camp Ranger and Director of Minority Ministries.

 Secretary Mae Blake, return, information on (EBM, March 1981)

It was reported at the March meeting that Church House secretary Mae Blake was involved in a serious auto accident in January and was out for a few weeks but had returned to work.

#### O. PROPERTY

 Church House, copier and headliner equipment, purchase of, information on (EBM, June 1980, p. 24)

It was reported at the June meeting that a new copier and a headliner had been purchased.

 Richland Church property, Liberty; disposed of, report on (EBM, September 1979, p. 14; EBM, December 1979, p. 26; EBM, March 1980; EBM, June 1980, pp. 24-25)

Background: At the September 1979 meeting, the board received a report that the Richland Church property was being leased to a "Gospel Church" and that a formal lease would be executed by the officers of the synod and the "Gospel Church" with terms and conditions to be worked out. At the December 1979 meeting, a request was approved for the "Gospel Church" to construct an additional unit for Sunday School on the property. Other recommendations regarding the property were approved by the board at the March 1980 meeting including a selling price for the property excluding the cemetery.

At the June 1980 meeting it was reported that the signed lease had not yet been returned from the "Gospel Church" group.

3. Conference and Camping Ministry Appeal, office space, provision of, actions on

(EBM, June 1980, p. 25; EBM, September 1980, p. 10)

It was reported at the June meeting that office space for the Director of the Conference and Camping Ministries Appeal and his secretary was being explored. At the September meeting the board approved the setting up of an office in the Executive Conference Room at the Church House for the Conference and Camping Ministries Capital Fund Director and secretary.

 Conference and Camping Ministries Appeal, secretary for, action on (EBM, September 1980, p. 10)

The board approved the employment of Mrs. Larry Llewellyn as secretary to the Director of the Conference and Camping Ministries Appeal for the duration of the campaign period, October 1980 through May 1981.

5. Church Home, Bishop's office, chairs, re-upholstering of, action on (EBM, September 1980, p. 10)

The board approved a bid of approximately \$275.00 for the re-upholstering of chairs in the Bishop's office at the church house.

 Cherry Hill Church property, action on (EBM, December 1978, p. 28; EBM, March 1979, p. 24; EBM, June 1980, p. 25; EBM, September 1980, pp. 11-12 and 41; EBM, December 1980, pp. 19-20; EBM, March 1981)

For actions regarding Cherry Hill Church property refer to Legal Affairs, Section L, item 7 of this report.

 Church House, Chapel-Conference Room, furnishings for, grant for, action on (EBM, June 1980, p. 30; EBM, September 1980, pp. 9 and 11; EBM, December 1980, p. 26; EBM, March 1981)

At the June meeting, a request to consider more suitable chairs for the Chapel-Conference Room at the Church House was referred to the sub-committee on property, personnel and finance. At the September meeting, the board was informed that a grant of \$3,000.00 from the Hine Fund of Augsburg, Winston-Salem, had been made to the synod in honor of Executive Board member, Mrs. Ruth Fisher, to be used for the purchase of furnishings for the Chapel-Conference Room. The board authorized the purchase of suitable furnishings using the grant from the Hine Foundation, and, if necessary seek additional funds as needed. At the December meeting it was reported that a chair sample had been selected and arrangements would be made to have 25 chairs made by Gregson Furniture Company of Lexington.

8. Flat Rock Church property, improvements for, request for, action on (EBM,September 1980, p. 12)

The board was informed at the September meeting that a request had been received from a group concerned about the cemetery of the defunct Flat Rock Church in Stanly County. Further, it was reported that the \$2,500.00 received from the sale of the Flat Rock property had been in a savings account, and with accumulated interest, amounted to \$3,028.00. The board adopted the recommendation that a fence be installed to enclose the Flat Rock Church cemetery at a cost of approximately \$1,500.00 and that Mr. Tucker of that community be asked to continue to care for the cemetery as he had in the past.

9. Defunct Church cemeteries, maintenance of, guidelines for, information on (EBM, September 1980, p. 12)

The board was informed that the sub-committee on property, personnel and finance would study the matter of establishing guidelines on the care of cemeteries of defunct congregations.

10. Church House, modifications for handicapped persons, study of, information on

(EBM, December 1980, p. 26; EBM, March 1981)

It was reported to the board at the December meeting that the sub-committee on property, personnel and finance was exploring the need for providing facilities at the Church House for handicapped persons and that cost estimates would be secured.

#### P. SPECIAL ITEMS

 Executive Board, 1980 retreat, followings, information and actions on (EBM, March 1980, p. 5; EBM, June 1980, pp. 7-8)

At the Executive Board retreat held on January 3-4, 1980 at Agape Camp and Conference Retreat Center, synodical needs were identified and assignments were made to board members to discuss, evaluate and make recommendations. At the June 1980 meeting reports were received and actions taken in regard to some of the needs:

a. Better communications within the synod, action on It was reported by the group assigned to this need that while communica-

tions between the synod and the Bishop and his staff were good that there was a need for better communications between committees, cabinets and the Executive Board. The board approved a recommendation that Bishop Misenheimer appoint a task force to study the issues of communications, using a previous study conducted in 1976 by the Communications Committee, and that this task force complete its assignment by December 1, 1980. For further information refer to Section M, item 7 in this report.

b. Improve relationships between pastors and congregations
The committee assigned to this need concluded that because of the confidential nature of the issue of improving relationships between pastors and congregations, it remained within the province of the Bishop but that the Executive Board would be willing to give support and assistance when called upon to do so.

c. Personal contact and visitation between synod staff and Executive Board and pastors and congregations

The matter of personal contact and visitation between synod staff and Executive Board with pastor and congregations was reported out at the March 1980 meeting and referred to the Sub-committee on Congregations and Ministries at the June 1980 meeting. For further information refer to Section I. Congregations and Ministries, item 10 of this report.

d. Continuing Education for laity and clergy A detailed report on the need for continuing education for laity and clergy was received by the board at the March 1980 meeting. In June the matter was referred to the Professional Service Committee.

 Executive Board, 1981 Retreat, follow-up, information and action on (EBM, June 1980, pp. 8 and 23; EBM, September 1980, pp. 5-6; EBM, December 1980, p. 4; EBM, March 1981)

On January 2-3, 1981, the Executive Board held its second retreat. The agenda included a presentation by the Reverend AI Haversat on "Issues Facing the Church in the 80's and 90's," and Church and Government Relationship. The board identified a number of needs within the synod but was not able to complete its task within the time-frame of the retreat. As a result, a follow-up session was requested and took place on March 5, prior to the regular quarterly meeting of the board. It was led by the Bishop and members of the staff. Again, this session did not provide enough time to deal with all the issues but the board did classify the items under six clusters.

At the regular meeting of the board in March, the board did act on one issue regarding the use of synod staff time by adopting the recommendation that: the Executive Board support and encourage the Bishop of synod in emphasizing more involvement by his staff with pastors and people throughout the synod, and, through appropriate consultation, in reducing staff involvement in committee work to that of planning, counseling, and assisting as the Bishop may determine.

In regard to completing the task of dealing with the issues coming out of the retreat and the special meeting, the board requested the Bishop to appoint a task force consisting of members of the Executive Board and the synod staff to review and condense the concerns and goals expressed by the six study groups at the special meeting of the board on March 5, 1981, with regard to Board Leadership, Resources/Training, Synod Planning, Mission Concerns, Staff and Bishop's Letter, and, Leadership Support. Further, it was requested that the task force, following such review and condensation, prepare specific recommendations or a statement of policy, as deemed appropriate, for consideration by the Executive Board at its June 1981, meeting.

## Communications

The Committee on Communications held meetings on September 29 and December 6 in 1980 and on March 7 in 1981. A fourth meeting will be held on May 14 prior to the opening of synodical convention.

The basic work of the committee has been to continue in its efforts to insure that the members of our congregations know about the activities of our synod and the LCA.

The NORTH CAROLINA LUTHERAN represents the primary publication for informing all our members and thanks to the continuing good work of Editor John E. Wertz and Business-Circulation Manager Frances C. Huddle, we have been receiving a very attractively displayed summary of the synod's news. The new format has been received favorably across the synod and the new procedure for up-dating addresses by computer has made for much improved services to all our subscribers. We are grateful to both these persons for the many hours they have devoted in making the transitions smooth and successful.

An audited financial statement of the NORTH CAROLINA LUTHERAN is appended.

The 1980 convention of this synod approved the constitutional and by-law change permitting the offices of editor and business-circulation manager to be elected for three-year terms beginning with this 1981 convention. It is the feeling of the committee that with this extended term, the work and direction of this publication can be more effective.

In recognition of the fine work of both Pastor Wertz and Mrs. Huddle, the committee has nominated them to continue in their current positions and thereby be considered by this convention for the three-year term 1981-1984.

In an effort to continue to encourage the every-member plan, the committee hopes the subscription rate of \$1.00 can be continued through 1982.

The Rev. Ronald W. Fink is currently serving as the promotion chairman for THE LUTHERAN and the committee encourages congregations to continue to make this publication available to its members. Every member subscription plans are encouraged and the details for making these arrangements may be secured from Pastor Fink. Lutheran homes deserve both the NC LUTHERAN and THE LUTHERAN.

The committee continues to be pleased with growing reports that various congregations are taking the initiative to develop and expand their ministry through the broadcast media. A number of cable television firms have indicated a willingness to assist in whatever way possible to make their channels available for local programming. As possible, the committee encourages local churches to continue to make local contacts and share those progress reports with the committee for distribution and encouragement to other congregations.

In addition, the committee is encouraged that progress is being made at the synodical level to develop certain pilot projects, funded with designated gifts, that should give samples, of the kinds of directions that are possible within the broadcast medium. This work will proceed under the guidance of representatives from LCA. At this writing, these strategies for implementing the projects are being developed.

The committee calls attention to the LCA-produced promotional spots that began appearing on certain television stations within the Charlotte, Triad and Asheville areas during early March period. These spots are experimental and it is hoped other communities will be able to utilize them in the near future.

The special Communications Handbook, distributed at the 1980 Convention continues to be a valuable resource and congregations are encouraged to appoint publicity committees charged with responsibility for sharing the news with the media. The committee will be forwarding replacement sheets for more current data as appropriate.

As further assistance for congregational publicity committees, the communications committee will be conducting special workshops as part of the Synod-wide church days to be held in the Winter of '82. In the meantime, congregations should feel free to contact any member of the committee for assistance in their communications' needs. The committee is blessed with solid talent representing the entire communications spectrum.

Two members of the committee, Johnnie Hood and Cynthia L. Clemmer, along with staff assistant, James A. Chesky, attended the Lutheran Media Mission Project Consultation workshop held in Atlanta during September. This event provided those seventy-five registrants from across the LCA with additional insights for better and more effective communications using all media resources.

Throughout this convention, members of the Communications Committee will be hard at work in the convention news bureau and will be assisting the news media of the state in reporting the actions of this convention. Reporting will go to both the print and the electronic media.

In addition, at the close of the convention, the news bureau will provide a summary of the proceedings of convention which will be available to delegates as they leave. This summary should serve as a valuable aid in reporting the convention news to home congregations.

We have examined the statement of cash receipts and disbursements of the North Carolina Lutheran for the year ended December 31, 1980. Our examination was made in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards and, accordingly, included such tests of the accounting records and such other auditing procedures as we considered necessary in the circumstances.

As described in Note 1, the North Carolina Lutheran's policy is to prepare the aforementioned financial statement on the basis of cash receipts and disbursements; consequently, certain revenue is recognized when received rather than when earned and certain expenses are recognized when paid rather than when the obligation is incurred. Accordingly, the accompanying financial statement is not intended to present the results of operations in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles.

In our opinion, the financial statement referred to above presents fairly the revenue collected and expenses paid during the year ended December 31, 1980 on the basis of accounting described in Note 1, which basis has been applied in a manner consistent with that of the preceding year.

#### Note 1 — Significant Accounting Policy

The North Carolina Lutheran prepares its financial statement on the basis of cash receipts and disbursements; consequently, certain revenue is recognized when received rather than when earned and certain expenses when paid rather than when the obligation is incurred.

# Historical Work

The Committee on Historical Work met three times during the period of this report.

Significant commemorations of the 450th Anniversary of the Augsburg Confession focused on the *Evening with Martin Luther* presented by Dr. Michael McDaniel to the North Carolina Synod Convention, the two retreats on the Augsburg Confession held at Lutheridge and Agape, and the Augsburg History bulletin insert distributed to all North Carolina congregations. These events were arranged by the Anniversary Task Force and the Historical Work Committee.

From April through July the records of 48 congregations mostly in the Catawba Valley, Western Piedmont, and Mountain areas were placed on microfilm. A team of pastors, lay people of the participating congregations, members of the Historical Work Committee, friends at Lenoir-Rhyne, and the North Carolina Division of Archives and History made this project a success. The committee will continue to concentrate on promoting the microfilming of congregational records until all congregational records are preserved.

Members of the committee met with the Long Range Planning Committee prior to the Executive Board's December meeting. In this meeting the board adopted encouraging recommendations which recognized the need for additional space, how to capitalize on what has been accomplished, and the possibility for a permanent endowment.

Additional private and institutional holdings relating to Lutherans in North Carolina are continuously coming to light. The committee is confronted with the need for contacts, examinations, acquisitions, and in some instances, translating German into English.

The multi-media productions presenting an overview of the Synod Archives and suggestions for local congregational history preservation will be available for distribution.

The committee believes that an increasing awareness of and an appreciation for our Lutheran heritage is stimulated by participation in collecting, preservation, and finding history of the saints a sense of directions for the future.

# Cabinet for Professional Leadership

A responsibility of the church is to provide for its own professional leadership. The Cabinet for Professional Leadership and its member committees and institutions gives leadership and guidance to this process.

The cabinet includes representatives of the Committee for Professional Preparation, the Committee for Professional Service, Lutheran Theological Southern Seminary, and Lenoir-Rhyne College, particularly in the field of continuing education. It provides inter-communication among these units, seeks to coordinate their efforts, and represents them to the synod. The Rev. David F. Martin is the Bishop's representative in the cabinet.

The chairman of the cabinet has met regularly with the two committees, and participated in the retreat for seminarians at Lutheridge, the synod-CWA budget consultation, and the workshop conducted by the Division for Professional Leadership at Columbia, S.C., February 12-14.

Reports of the seminary and the committees for Professional Preparation and Service follow.

# **Professional Preparation**

This committee is charged with the responsibility of recruiting, evaluating, guiding, supporting, endorsing and examining candidates who express an interest in a church vocation. As soon as a person indicates this interest in a ministry through the church, this committee begins the process of giving direction to the candidate's growth and development. Our involvement with a candidate can continue over several years and we desire to meet with each one at least once during the year. There are 63 persons in various stages of their development who are presently registered with us.

Some of the activities of this committee include:

1. Registrations: Eighteen new candidates have been registered with the com-

- mittee since the last meeting of synod. One candidate transferred to North Carolina from the Virginia Synod.
- Examinations: Seven senior seminarians were examined and upon completion of their academic work will be recommended for a call.
- 3. Certifications: The following lay professionals were certified: Linda Schutt Everett as organist/choir master; Daniel Paul Hannemann as director of church music; and Wade Douglas Ludlum as director of church music.
- Financial Aid: Twenty-one requests for financial aid were received and granted which totalled approximately \$54,000. The average grant was about \$1,700, the minimum being \$500 and the maximum \$2,000. Grants were made on the basis of need.

Motions adopted were: that each student having a financial need apply and that loans will be given based on perceived need. A loan may not exceed a maximum of \$1,500 per year and the student receiving the loan must have an over all 2.5 GPA.

This policy will become effective for the 1981-1982 academic year.

5. Clinical Pastoral Education: The committee took the following action: In keeping with the Lutheran Church in America's expectation of its candidates for the ordained ministry regarding competency normally related to Clinical Pastoral Education, the Committee for Professional Preparation of the North Carolina Synod requires the satisfactory completion of one unit of accredited Clinical Pastoral Education prior to the internship. This requirement is effective with candidates entering seminary in the fall of 1980 and succeeding years. Upper class students are encouraged to meet this requirement. Requests for financial aid for Clinical Pastoral Education will be heard on the same basis as all other requests for financial aid by candidates for the ordained ministry.

## **Professional Service**

This committee has continued its work this year with regular committee meetings and additional work sessions by four task forces.

The task forces and the chairmen are:

Pastor David Franzen — Concerns for Ministry
Carroll Robinson — Professional Support
Pastor E. W. Ridenhour — Lay Professionals
Pastor Henry Lineberger — "Growth in Ministry" implementation.

#### **REGIONAL WORKSHOP**

The committee chairman, Pastor David Franzen, and staff advisor, David Martin (along with representatives of the Professional Preparation Committee) attended a regional workshop sponsored by the Division of Professional Leadership. The meeting, held February 12-13, 1981, at our Lutheran Theological Southern Seminary, sought to:

(1) assist the synods, seminaries and DPL to affirm our partnership in the

- "preparation of" and "service to" pastors and lay professionals during the 80's.
- (2) develop more uniform understanding and practice throughout the LCA in the area of "preparation of" and "service to" pastors and lay professionals during the 1980's.
- (3) provide opportunity for sharing of ideals, trends, experiences, and concerns among the synods, seminaries, and DPL.

#### LAY PROFESSIONALS

The Lay Professional Retreat announced last year was completely planned and arranged. However, lack of registration led to a cancellation of the event. We still consider this as a potential viable means of communicating and dialoging with this important group of people in our synod.

We plan to publicize and have participants involved in a regional retreat which has been scheduled for Camp Kinard, near Columbia, South Carolina. Committee member, Karl Kinard, Jr., is actively involved in helping to plan this retreat and we feel that with his leadership in this area that we will have some of our synod involved.

Work continues on the HANDBOOK for Lay Professionals. We hope that this can provide information regarding constitutional and by-law items which have been adopted by the synod: A digest of LCA policy, procedures and regulations regarding lay professionals; suggested job descriptions; salary guidelines; and a personnel directory.

Plans have been completed for our lay professionals to meet during the 1981 Hickory Convention. The committee chairman will extend invitations to our lay professionals and also correspond with pastors of the congregations involved, and through them encourage congregations to help provide expense funds for their staff people to attend.

Our goals for this area of service remain the same: to upgrade all lay professionals, to encourage non-certified lay professionals to upgrade themselves for more effective service to the congregations and the church-at-large.

#### WORKSHOP

The committee served as sponsor for another "New Professional Workshop". We participated in the experience through the presence of the committee chairman, synod staff advisor, and cabinet chairperson. During these two days of sharing, representatives of the committees and auxiliaries of the synod had opportunities to share their goals and objectives and to respond to questions from clergy, lay professionals, and spouses. Lutheran Men sponsored the evening fellowship dinner.

More than 35 persons participated. Evaluations given by those in attendance gave a high value rating to the experience.

#### LEADERSHIP SUPPORT

During the last several years, our committee's task force, under the chairmanship of Carroll Robinson, has made a vital contribution to the professional leaders of our synod.

We have completed a handbook on the pastor's housing allowance and the study of impounded housing equity. The demand for this publication exhausted the first printing. We are now in the process of moving into a second printing on this book.

#### AUGSBURG CONFESSION

Our committee participated in the sponsorship of the retreat commemorating the 450th Anniversary of the Augsburg Confession. Evaluations received indicated that the presenters and their presentations were very well received.

Out of this retreat (and from other sources) there has come an expressed concern about the number of retreats, seminars, workshops, and continuing education opportunities. In view of these expressions and the feelings within the committee, we moved to ask our Concerns for Ministry Task Force to study the matter and to present suggestions and/or recommendations.

#### FALL RETREAT - 1981

Out of the study just mentioned there has come some very concrete plans for 1981. By the time of the convention we hope to be able to share some specifics about this opportunity.

Certainly some features of the study-growth opportunity will be: presentations by an outstanding theologian of the church, time for reflection and discussion, and opportunities for rest and recreation.

# **Lutheran Theological Southern Seminary**

Lutheran Theological Southern Seminary is in its 151st year. Having celebrated 150 years of history it now is busily engaged in serious study and planning for the future, trying to anticipate opportunities, resources needed and obstacles to be overcome during the remainder of the 20th Century.

#### PEOPLE

We are fortunate to have gifted and dedicated people at our Seminary. Our president, Dr. Hugh George Anderson, is widely recognized and in great demand throughout the church. We are thankful to God for his leadership. Our faculty is competent. An added dimension during the past year has been the coming of Dr. Michael John Root, as Assistant Professor of Systematic Theology and Dr. Robert James Marshall, Professor of Old Testament. Dr. Root is the first layman to fill this teaching position at LTSS. Dr. Marshall, former President of the church, is a highly respected world churchman. Our faculty are in great demand for lectures, speaking engagements and study courses, etc., throughout the whole church.

Two long time employees of the Seminary have retired. Mr. O. T. Barr and Mrs. Mary Nichols. They have both been faithful members of the maintenance staff for many generations of students and endeared themselves to both students and faculty. Mr. Barr has been at the Seminary since the fall of 1938. We report this because so many of you have appreciated their ministry.

As a part of the planning for the 80's a study was made of personnel needs of the constituency served by the Seminary. The study indicated that as early as the second half of the present decade there will be an increased need for clergy to fill pulpits, staff ministries, and new missions.

#### **PROPERTY**

The past decade has seen the upgrading of our property. The new Lineberger Memorial Library continues to be a most important part of the Seminary. The renovated Continuing Education Center in the old Price house has provided a valuable resource as well as the renovated Voigt Class Room Building and the Dewey F. Beam Dormitory. The upgrading of these buildings was done at much expense and the remaining debt for these improvements is minor.

Some questions remain about housing for married students. The administration and board is at present studying this matter trying to determine what the future should be. The matter of campus security has also become a chronic problem for which answers are being sought.

#### SUPPORT

For the past several years the Seminary has finished its fiscal year "in the black". This has been accomplished by careful planning and at times with postponement of needed expenditures. Inflation and rising energy costs are making it increasingly difficult to keep a balanced budget. New levels of support must be reached by our supporting Synods, Alumni, and interested friends if we are to adequately meet our future needs.

Our Director of Development, Dr. Curtis Derrick, is dedicated to this task and is doing all within his power to build a strong base of support. He needs the assistance of every interested person to find adequate sources of support for the Seminary. He believes that one of the greatest potentials for this is in the area of wills and the remembering of the Seminary in personal estate planning. Your assistance is needed to find friends of the Seminary who might be interested in becoming donors.

The Seminary needs churchmen throughout the Southeast as advocates for the financial needs of the Seminary if we are to avoid serious difficulties in the future.

Your attention is called to, and your support is solicited, for the Hugh George Anderson Endowed Professorship Project. The successful completion of this project will increase our endowment and be a step in the direction we need to go to meet the financial needs of the future.

### Cabinet For Parish Services

The Cabinet for Parish Services is charged with the responsibility of coordinating and supervising sevices that are offered to congregations. The chairpersons of committees and agencies that relate directly to congregations are included in the membership of this cabinet.

Synod Church Days, August 1-2, 1980, at Lenoir-Rhyne College was coordinated by this cabinet. Each operational committee participated in this event and attempted to provide an enrichment experience for congregational members working in these various program areas. In evaluating this event, the cabinet felt that there was some overlapping of purposes of Synod Church Days and District Church Day in that both attempted to provide enrichment rather than basic experiences for congregational committee personnel. Therefore, the cabinet will not conduct Synod Church Days in 1981. The decision to conduct this event in 1982 will be made as time approaches to begin planning the event.

District Church Days were held in each district during January and February 1981. These events were planned by the Cabinet and District Deans. The response was excellent to these three hour events which offered a track for both new and experienced congregational leadership. Since there will be no Synod Church Days in 1981, the Cabinet plans to work with District Deans in strengthening District Church Days in 1982.

As in past years, the Cabinet has had direct input in developing a proposed budget for 1982 for synodical approval. We appreciate this opportunity in assisting the Finance Committee of our Executive Board to determine our synod's priorities in programming.

The Cabinet for Parish Services is also keenly aware of the vast amount of programming that is done throughout the synod. We feel that we must strengthen the quality of our programming, paying particular attention to the needs of our congregations. In this era of inflation, every effort must be made to be good stewards of our resources. With this in mind, we anticipate an approach to programming that will be more specific and detailed for individual congregation's needs rather than so general that no one's needs are met. We see a strong movement to the consultant approach in programming. Our concern is that local congregational needs be met with a high level of expertise.

Another area of concern of this Cabinet is the rapid change of our society that affects the lives of congregations and individuals. How do we handle these changes as the church? How do we handle these changes as individuals? At the request of the

Executive Board, the Cabinet for Parish Services will be addressing these questions as we look forward to ministry in the '80's.

## Stewardship

The Operational Committee on Stewardship has endeavored to fulfill a top goal of our Synod of assisting the members and congregations of our Synod in developing a stewardship lifestyle. This was done by providing materials, training events, sharing sessions and resource leaders to the congregations of the Synod.

Among the specific actions taken were:

- 1. Utilized the skills of Mr. Tom O'Brein, DPS deployed staff in training leaders, planning events, and as presenter for some events.
- Held a "Stewardship of Life" Pastor's Retreat in early April 1980 at Lutheridge with The Rev. Calvin C. Gilck, LCA Stewardship Coordinator and The Rev. Richard L. Peterman, LCA Director for Resource Development as leaders.
- 3. Participated in Synod Church Days in August at Lenoir-Rhyne College.
- 4. Worked with the Youth Ministry Committee to secure a Youth Staffer in 1980-1981 with emphasis on stewardship. Mr. Tim Paulson has served in this capacity and has done a fine job in emphasizing stewardship as a way of life among the youth of our synod.
- With the assistance of Staff Minister for Resources, Mr. James Chesky, sent a Thanksgiving Card to the leaders of all synodical congregations, and a yearend emphasis letter.
- Held the "Partnership In Ministry" consultations with congregations all over the synod to share with them in our partnership in ministry through the congregation, the synod and the Church Wide Agencies.
- 7. Participated in the 1981 District Church Days training of church leaders.
- 8. Recommended that a certificate of appreciation, signed by the Bishop, be sent to all congregations who had provided 100% or more of their accepted benevolence in 1980.
- 9. Through its chairman, participated in the new professional leader workshop.
- Through its chairman, participated in the budget consultation process for the synod.
- Authorized the continuation of the monthly Stewardship Bulletin, including the listing of congregational apportionment and remittance figures and special gifts.
- 12. If planning an Every Member Response Growth emphasis in the synod during 1981 and 1982 to assist congregations in deepening their total stewardship commitment and response.

The stewardship committee is sincerely grateful for the skilled leadership and dedicated labor of Mr. Jim Chesky of the synod staff and of Mr. Tom O'Brein, LCA/DPS field staff person. They have assisted us immeasurably in our responsibilities and actions. We also thank Mr. Tim Paulson for his dedication and service as our Youth Staffer with emphasis on stewardship. He has given us many insights in our ministry with the youth of our synod. We especially thank God for his grace, and

for the gifts and service provided by the individuals and congregations which have enabled us to minister with others in His name.

# Evangelism

The Operational Committee on Evangelism performs its ministry by involving itself in the numerous tasks of the Evangelical Outreach Emphasis. This emphasis is an integral part of the witness mission of the Lutheran Church in America. The following is a listing of the various events/activities that we have coordinated in the past year.

- Word and Witness. Sixty-nine congregations are involved in this educational ministry program of in-depth Bible Study and practical witness training. Each summer professional leaders and lay people can receive leadership instruction at either L.R.C. or L.T.S.S.
- Church Days. August gave us the opportunity to offer four skillshops. (a.) Daily
  Ministry of the Laity, (b.) Back to the Basics, (c.) Goals and Plans for Minority
  Ministry, (d.) Evangelical Outreach in the Small Parish. All were well attended
  and received positive evaluations.
- Preaching from Commitment. Two such four-day events have been held in late September and early October of 1979 and 1980. Thus far, forty pastors have been invited to participate in this seminar. Twenty more pastors will receive invitations for the Fall 1981 event when they will be led by a Pastor Evangelist and a Professor of Homiletics.
- Ministry with Inactives: Savage Lab. Pastor Roy Riley, formerly of our synod, led a comprehensive workshop in October 1980. This ministry continues to be a major concern of pastors and congregations.
- 5. Abundant Life Missions. Under the direction of the Institute of Church Renewal in Atlanta, Georgia, four congregations held ALM and invited area congregations to participate with them. These events are still being evaluated, but we expect them to be endorsed by our committee and used by congregations of synod much like the Faith Sharing Missions (Lay Witness Missions) have been used.
- Koinonia Institute. One such event aimed at helping congregations in the area
  of ministry with small groups was planned for November of 1980. Due to a small
  pre-registration, this was cancelled. We hope to address this area again in the
  coming years.
- 7. Lenten/Easter Preaching Workshop. The fifth such workshop was conducted in January. The Rev. Dr. Franklin D. Fry, pastor of Saint John's Church in Summit, New Jersey was the key presenter. The synodical Worship and Music Committee led daily devotions and also developed other sessions involving alternate worship experiences and opportunities during the season.
- 8. District Church Days. During February and March committee members and/or trained evangelism consultants led two workshops in each district of synod. The basic tract was for new congregational committee members, and it described for them the foundation of evangelical outreach and the resources available. The enrichment tract was an explanation and demonstration of Koinonia Groups.

9. Witnessing in the South. This is an experimental evangelism model conducted by Our Saviour, Southern Pines in conjunction with four other regional synods under the guidance and direction of DPS. It is being evaluated presently and the results will be made available via workbook form to allow other congregations to experiment with it. More congregations of synod will be invited to participate in future New Model Labs.

The following is a list of people who have been elemental in our implementation of evangelism ministry.

- 1. Evangelism Consultants. This is a network of 20 pastors and lay persons who have been trained to meet with individual congregational evangelism committee and/or church councils to support and encourage outreach ministry. This is our primary delivery system and point of contact with the local congregation. Initial entry into congregations of synod has been most positive and productive, but we need more congregations to invite us if our commitment to this process is to prove mutually beneficial.
- 2. The Rev. Richard Perry. The Director of Minority Ministry works with our committee and has proven to be an effective catalyst and resource person. His expertise in working with minorities can enable every congregation the opportunity to develop an outreach and witness ministry to and with this virtually untapped population of our synod.
- The Rev. James R. Connelly, Jr. Deployed Staff Person of the Division for Parish Services. Jim provides continued skilled guidance as we plan, execute, and evaluate our ministry. His contribution to our synod is immeasurable.
- 4. The Rev. Richard Little. Synodical Minister for Outreach is the staff person who relates directly to our committee. We try to use Dick as a resource person and to assist the committee as we carry out our goals, objectives, and strategies. He has proven to be most cooperative and committed in his work with us.

#### Looking Ahead:

- The Carolinas' Evangelism Conference. This biannual event involving N.C. and S.C. Lutherans will be held again Sunday through Tuesday, January 24-26, 1982. A Sunday evening rally will begin the event at Charlotte's Ovens Auditorium and the theme, "Study and Share: Saint Luke's Good News", will be developed in Bible Study presentations and small group work under the leadership of Professor Foster McCurley.
- 2. Future Delivery of Services. In keeping with the bishop's request and with good stewardship practices made more evident due to current energy demands and costs, we plan to adjust our future modes of operation. This committee will be adopting a leaner and hopefully more productive lifestyle. The quantity of events/activities will diminish, but the quality will be increased. Primarily we intend to focus and direct our resources upon individual congregations and/or clusters of congregations through the use of our consultants and other skillshop leaders. Synod-wide activities will be held to a minimum, while person-to-person and face-to-face encounters will be maximized.
- 3. Pastors' Convocation. In the future this committee will coordinate various offerings (eg. the Lenten/Easter Preaching Workshop, Koinonia Institutes, Ministry with Inactives Seminars, etc.) with other operational committees under the auspice of the Cabinet for Professional Leadership. With that cabinet's Committee for Professional Service we will be able to offer annual or twice annual ministry events that will reach more pastors more effectively, efficiently, and economically.

As the person who chairs this committee I want to encourage and invite all questions, observations, and suggestions to be made regarding the operation of this committee. Also, any request for services, aid, or information should be directed to me.

# Social Ministry

Relating the Gospel to man's needs in every situation while providing direction and resources to congregations in their fulfillment of this responsibility is the main goal of the Social Ministry Committee. How this purpose could best be accomplished in relation to the synod's long range goals for 1981 was the task of the committee this year.

As an attempt to accomplish a top synod priority goal of "providing guidance and resources in developing strategies and programs of congregational social ministry", a **Social Ministry Network**, consisting of three to five persons in each district, was formed. A weekend training session was held in November under the leadership of Ms. Sue Pursch, from the Division of Parish Services. These area resource teams are available for consultation with individuals or congregations, conducting workshops and seminars, and providing resources at the congregation's request.

The goal of ''. . . strengthening and expanding the synod's ministry to the aged and social service ministries . . .'' was pursued by:

#### Research and Strategy Groups

These groups of persons with expertise in each area, met regularly in order to study, disseminate information, and, in some cases, took direct action in the following areas:

- 1. Advocacy Mrs. Pat Bullard, Chairman; The Rev. Frank Perry, Mr. Robbie Robinson, Mrs. Lila Hill, Mrs. Norma Currie, Mrs. Juanita Bremer. Studious consideration of the best way to educate Christians as individuals and in congregations of their role as advocates is a continuing function of this group. This year support was given to the Executive Board's September Resolution concerning church-state relationships, encouraging Lutherans "... to speak out strongly for the Gospel and carry the Gospel message to others who might be misled by the tactics of self-professed religious groups speaking in the name of Jesus"...". Advocacy promotion was a special presentation at the Social Ministry Committee's workshops at each Church Day meeting in February/March.
- 2. Criminal Justice Mrs. Sue Kepley, Chairman; The Rev. Maurice Staley; Mrs. Kay Conrad; Mr. Phil Gerdes; Mrs. Irene Dukes; The Rev. Earlean Miller. Promoting a ministry to prisoners, the promotion of February as Criminal Justice month, with materials provided by the N.C. Council of Churches, was an emphasis of the Committee this year.
- 3. **Disabled Persons** (formerly Handicapped Persons) Mrs. Claire Edwardson, Chairman; The Rev. Palmer Clemmer; Mrs. Sally Sloop; The Rev. Richard Smyth; Mrs. Mary Moretz; Ms. Melissa Anderson. This group has been actively promoting 1981 as the Year of the Disabled Person, offering bulletin inserts, special brochures, seminars, and other resources for proper celebration. A slide presentation presented at the Synodical Convention on elimination of architectural barriers in churches was made available to congregations. The second Sunday in October has been designated Access Sunday by the group. A challenge has been made to congregations for 1981 to study and act on attitudinal and physical barriers than hinder full participation of persons in church; to provide transportation for the disabled; to

find at least one permanent job for an unemployed disabled person; to support one significant piece of legislation regarding disabilities; to lift up educational opportunities for and with disabled persons. A lab experience for Educational Ministry with mentally retarded persons will be held August 9-15 at Lutheridge with the chairman of this group actively involved in promotion and program. Mrs. Edwardson has been appointed as a member of the Governor's Executive Council for the Year of the Disabled Person, as well as being invited in January to attend the Inter-Lutheran Commission with the Handicapped Meeting in Atlanta to report on our synod's work with the disabled.

4. Older Adults — Mrs. Annie Ray Moore, Chairman; Mrs. Patty Scotten; Dr. J. Lewis Thornburg; Dr. David Keller; Mrs. Fran Jenkins; The Rev. Robert Beard. This committee has been very active, with regular meetings resulting in the survey sent to all congregations for their use in considering the activities of their ministry and to report this information to be shared with others. The results of the survey have been compiled and will be used to help congregations make future plans. The committee has also been active as resource persons in congregations and as advocates for older adults.

#### Institutions

Continued evaluation of agencies providing health and welfare services is a responsibility of this Committee.

- 1. N.C. Lutheran Family Services, with Mr. Bill Brittain as Executive Director, was officially established on January 1, 1981. Preparatory transitional work was done with a special task force, appointed by Bishop Misenheimer, and including the Social Ministry Committee Chairperson.
- 2. N.C. Lutheran Homes, The Rev. Robert Beard, Executive Director. Because of the number of churches considering ministry in their communities to older adults, a proposal is being considered to add a part-time staff person to act as consultant for such activities. The Rev. Richard Graf from the Social Ministry Committee and Mrs. Annie Ray Moore are working with The Rev. Beard on this proposal.

#### Institutional Chaplaincy

The Rev. David Franzen continues to serve as chaplain at Duke Medical Center and Veterans' Administration Hospital in the areas of pastoral care, theological education and synod-wise ministry. The Rev. D. Thomas Ford serves in a related capacity at N.C. Memorial Hospital in Chapel Hill. The question of appropriate placement of the supervisory group, presently under the Social Ministry Committee, is being addressed.

#### Grants

Seed money for projects in communities or congregations was made available to the following:

- 1. Christ the King, Cary; Holy Trinity, Raleigh; St. Philip's, Raleigh: \$500.00 to Pan-Lutheran Ministries of Wake County for the Hostel program at Wake Medical Center.
- 2. Emmanuel, Lincolnton: \$500.00 for initial consultant fee for proposed program for aging in community.

"To inform congregations of the church's stance on issues of social concern and guide them in studying and implementing such stances in their parish life and communities" was yet another synodical long range goal. Participation in the formation of the North Carolina Branch of the Lutheran Human Relations Association was a forward step. An organizational workshop was held in Winston-Salem in October with members of all Lutheran bodies in N.C. present. The Rev. and Mrs. Luther Stirewalt and The Rev. and Mrs. Harold Letts are two retired pastors and wives who are sharing coordination of activities with leaders from the American Lutheran Church and Lutheran Church, Missouri Synod.

This activity also implements the goal of ''... increase areas of cooperation with other Lutheran . . . bodies''. Other such activities in this area are:

1. Formation of a Pan-Lutheran task force for disaster preparedness, with members from three Lutheran Church bodies. The Rev. Lewis Doggett, The Rev

Larry Hartsell, Ms. Darlene Markey, and Mrs. Virginia Soberg Rhyne are L.C.A. task force members

- Dialogue is beginning with leaders of the American Lutheran Church and Lutheran Church, Missouri Synod around better coordination and cooperation in social ministry areas. These dialogues have been initiated and coordinated by the Rev. Richard Little.
- 3. Region V, LC/USA The Rev. Richard Little continues to represent the North Carolina Synod at social ministry consultation meetings held in Atlanta.
- 4. North Carolina Council of Churches' Commission of Christian Ministries. From the committee, Mrs. Margy Robinson serves at-large, Mrs. Pat Bullard represents legislative concerns, Mrs. Sue Kepley represents criminal justice, and Mrs. Barbara Gerhard represents Migrant Ministry.

Social Ministry is being done daily throughout the synod. The Committee wishes to thank all of those individuals and congregations who continue to witness in all areas of social ministry. The committee's work is a small supplement to all that is being done, and to all that needs to be done. The guidance and support of The Rev. Richard Little, Administrative Assistant, continues to be invaluable and inspirational to this committee.

At its meeting on April 9, 1981, the Social Ministry Committee approved the following:

- Grant of \$200.00 to Shepherd of the Sea Lutheran Church at Atlantic Beach for use with the Seamen's Center;
- Donation of \$500.00 to Religious Coalition for Abortion Rights;
- Recommendation to transfer supervision of Chaplaincy Training Program at Memorial Hospital, Chapel Hill, to the Cabinet for Professional Leadership:
- Appointment of the Board of Trustees of North Carolina Homes for the Committee to conduct, with the
  Executive Board's approval and funding support, a thorough study of the need for long-term care
  facilities for physically incapacitated persons between the ages of 16 and 59 years who require more than
  the normal custodial level of care provided by nursing homes for the aged;
- Proposal that the Committee identify, train as necessary, and appoint a task group of resource persons
  for providing pastoral care, consultation, and support to persons in the synod faced with a decision regarding military service as well as providing synod membership with pertinent information related to this
  issue.

# 1980 Annual Report for Lutheran Chaplaincy

Lutheran Chaplaincy has had a milestone year in 1980 at Duke University Medical Center. Because the hospital is a major medical referral center for this region of the United States, I have provided over 500 pastoral visits with Lutheran patients and families. Their medical needs and crises have brought them hundreds of miles from their homes, congregations and life-long support systems. I have had the opportunity to function as people's pastor away from home — an extension of the ministry of Word and Sacrament which the Church provides. The North Carolina Synod is to be commended for its support of this ministry to persons in their hour of great need.

In addition to my pastoral care of patients and families at Duke and the V.A. hospitals in Durham, I also provide a ministry of theological education through my supervision of pastors and seminarians in programs of Clinical Pastoral Education at Duke Medical Center. Three of our students at Duke in 1980 have been Lutherans, and I have also developed relationships with Lutheran seminarians at Duke Divinity School. I also teach a course at the Divinity School entitled "Introduction to Pastoral Care in the Hospital Setting". Included in my pastoral work has been a modest

amount of pastoral counseling, and through this avenue I have provided counseling mostly for Lutherans.

Another focus of my work has been of synodical scope. I am a member, ex officio of the Social Ministry Committee and an appointed member of the Professional Services Committee where I chair the Concerns in Ministry Subcommittee. In this capacity I am particularly interested in advocacy of support for synod pastors and their families through continuing education, career evaluation and counseling of various kinds. In 1980 I made presentations at District Church Days, and I have done a workshop and occasional supply preaching in congregations of synod.

The year was particularly abundant in terms of awards, honors and achievements. In April I became a Member of the N.C. Chaplain's Association and was later appointed to its Continuing Education Committee. In November I was certified as a Full Supervisor in the Association for Clinical Pastoral Education. In January, 1981 I got certification as a Clinical Fellow in the College of Chaplains of the American Protestant Hospital Association. Finally, I have been elected to the Accreditation and Nominating Committees of the Mid-Atlantic Region, ACPE.

If you should need to refer a patient to me, please communicate the following information: The patient's name, address, date of admission, reason of admission and the reason for your referral. This information is most helpful to me in locating the patient and in gaining a quick appreciation for the person's pastoral needs.

# **Educational Ministry**

The Educational Ministry Committee of the N.C. Synod feels that its foremost responsibility is to provide a solid foundation for learning in the church. We can provide this foundation only by identifying the needs in the local congregation. The committee has worked hard to accomplish this identification, to provide assistance, to share resources which are available, and to train leaders to be effective in educational settings.

We have been greatly assisted in our tasks by the Rev. Robert H. Shoffner, Minister for Parish Life. His service and expertise have been invaluable to the committee. We express special thanks for his personal commitment and efforts. The Educational Ministry Committee's services have reached the congregations in these areas:

RESOURCE TEAMS: Three five member teams were called to serve across our Synod. These teams were trained by LCA-DPS at St. Simon's Island, Georgia in midsummer. The teams have been successful in reaching individual congregations for special customized help. A relationship of trust has developed in many instances between these experts and their contact congregations. The Rev. Gary A. Perryman has served as coordinator of the ministry. The committee encourages congregations to call upon these Resource Teams to use their expertise.

CONFIRMATION MINISTRY — The Rev. John Misenheimer has served our committee as Synod Confirmation Ministry Coordinator. Since the introduction of the new Catechetics for Today material, published by the LCA, this sub-committee has been involved in personal consultations with individual congregations interested in using it. The sub-committee is also planning a "summer edition" of the successful Campfirmation program. The setting will be at Lenoir-Rhyne College. Any congregations interested or needing assistance in Confirmation programming should contact the Rev. John Misenheimer.

VACATION CHURCH SCHOOL — Mrs. Jo Ann Spees is chairperson of the sub-committee on Vacation Church School. Mrs. Spees has coordinated the program of "All God's People" into workshops on April 27. The leaders were trained by a representative of LCA-DPS. We are grateful for the leadership of this sub-committee and the volunteer service given toward this special educational effort.

VIDEO MINISTRY.— The Rev. George Sims served as chairperson of the task force. Since receiving a gift from the Hine Fund from Augsburg Lutheran Church, this task force has purchased a video tape player for use in our Synod's congregations. A tape library has been started at the church house to store recorded programs for congregational use. The task force has drawn up requirements for using this equipment and we encourage congregations to reach out and experience this new ministry provided by the Educational Ministry Committee.

RESOURCES — Our Multi Media Library continues to be a valuable tool in assisting educational ministry across our Synod. An entire set of curriculum plus many other resources are being used by planners in local congregations. The Educational Ministry Committee continues to review, replace, and purchase necessary and new pieces of media pertinent to education field. Our special thanks to Mrs. Betty Munday for her tireless services as Media Center Coordinator.

CHRISTIAN EDUCATION FOR SPECIAL EDUCATION — The committee is cosponsoring an interdenominational workshop at Lutheridge to deal with techniques and methods for teaching the mentally retarded. Claire Edwardson has represented us in this effort.

LEADERSHIP EDUCATION AND DEVELOPMENT — Teams of educational experts have been trained by LCA-DPS to work with individual congregations who choose to participate in a comprehensive effort for educational ministry leadership and development. This will be a consulting emphasis and a close examination of needs and resources available. Leadership Education and Development is being coordinated by the Rev. Gary A. Perryman. This program is just beginning and congregations will be contacted for a full explanation and interpretation.

The Educational Ministry Committee wishes to express appreciation to the many volunteers who have given their time and talents to our effort. We give special thanks once again to the Rev. Robert H. Shoffner and to his Parish Life Newsletter which publicizes our ministries to the congregations.

# Worship and Music

The Worship and Music Committee has continued to broaden its service to the synod and is called upon increasingly by the Bishop and the local parishes to provide meaningful assistance in the areas of worship, music and the arts that was no different in 1980. In fact, the year saw the attainment for the committee of long-range goals, which were the direct result of a DPS consultation. It was in the calls for service, the previously-set goals and a third area, the invitations to respond to numerous, unplanned needs, that the committee found its agenda for 1980.

In cooperation with the Bishop and the Reverend Robert H. Shoffner, the service of ordination was planned and developed at Holy Trinity, Hickory. The structure and format of that service were revised to reflect the mood and verbage of the LBW and to be doctrinally sound. The ordination service was the first in that the ordinands administered the elements, which has previously never been done.

Three tracts were offered at the annual August Church Days. Workshops in Music Planning, Confirmation and First Communion, and the *Minister's Desk Edition* were conducted. These offerings provided a broad selection so as to enrich both the layman and the pastor. The Worship and Music Committee also planned and arranged for the services of worship and secured the ecclesiastical furniture in conjunction with the Church Days worship.

1980 has seen the expansion of the Music-Lending Library. Additional anthems,

which may be loaned for a six-weeks interval, were added to the library. At the present time one-third of the library is in use. Mrs. Marlene Rogers is the librarian. Facilities for housing all materials are provided in Laurinburg and withdrawals are made directly from there. The committee has continued to be convinced that great savings can be realized for congregations by the active use of the lending library.

Across September and October ten workshops were conducted in selected areas of the synod. The purposes of the workshops were to enable congregations to see the broader worship possibilities of the LBW and to become more familiar with the hymnody of the LBW. The use and exploration of this worship aid is not a one-time event. It must be addressed constantly. Although we are beyond the introductory phase of the LBW, an in-depth exposure to this rich worship, hymnal treasury is an ever-present, on-going need.

The District Church Days provided the opportunity for the committee to offer a clinic-type approach to the local parish and its desire to grow and develop. Leaders at District Church Days had the opportunity to introduce new worship resources, as well as to deal with specific concerns and issues.

In the last two years this committee, at the request of the Evangelism Committee, has designed and conducted worship for the annual Lenten-Easter Preaching Retreat. This year's emphasis focused on the events of Holy Week and was an extension of the presentations by Pastor Franklin D. Fry.

It is encouraging that greater numbers of congregations request the assistance of the committee as they seek both to discover creative growth opportunities and to solve practical problems concerning worship, music, and the arts. Primary areas of assistance have been in the reorganization of parish committees, choir development, LBW use, and the selection of organs.

## **Youth Ministry**

On September 26 and 27, 1980, the Youth Ministry Committee met in retreat at Agape Camp and Conference Center. At the conclusion of that retreat, the committee established as its primary goal for 1980-1981 the Advocacy of Youth in the life of the Lutheran church in North Carolina. Since September, that advocacy of ministry with youth has been felt in all work done by this committee.

Again this year, it seems appropriate that this report be divided into the three major areas of concern identified by the committee as it has worked.

CONGREGATIONAL SUPPORT — Much has been done in the last year to strengthen youth ministry on the congregational level. 1980 Church Days included several basic workshop designs through which congregational adult and youth leaders could sharpen skills in program planning, group building, and discovering what resources are available through the synod Media Library and the LCA's Division for Parish Services.

The Planning Calendar is another excellent tool for helping ministry happen with youth. Developed by Staff member Robert Shoffner and Youth Staffer Tim Paulson, the Planning Calendar offers a step by step outline for planning youth ministry in relationship to all other ministries within a local congregation.

Youth Staffer Tim Paulson has worked hard this year to raise the concern of "Stewardship of Life" for the youth of North Carolina. Called to serve numerous congregations through retreat leadership, weekend programming, and planning consultation, Tim has spent this year encouraging youth and adults to identify specific avenues for joint ministry. This committee is grateful for his ministry with us. His stewardship of life has been an appropriate model for the youth of our Synod.

District Church Days held in February was another opportunity for this committee to challenge the congregations of the synod in the area of youth advocacy and ministries with youth. Each workshop presented in each of the seven districts was led by one adult and one youth member of the committee. Through the workshop design, congregational leaders were able to identify the areas of ministry mutually supported by youth and adults, and those areas of ministry where work needs to be done as youth and adults work together.

For the first time this year, our committee, through the hard work of a task group on Youth Sunday Programming and our Youth Staffer, sent to each congregation a detailed plan for an effective and exciting Youth Sunday Worship experience, led by youth, for all members. Again, this program, through dramatic dialogue and congregational participation, offered very graphic illustrations of ways youth and adults can be co-workers in ministry.

DISTRICT AND SYNOD-WIDE EVENTS — Advocacy of youth in ministry was the basis for the work of our committee in planning district and synodical events during this year. For the second year, an organized process of district organization and event planning was emphasized, with note-worthy results across the synod. In each of the seven districts a committee of youth and adults, with youth serving as coordinators, has planned and implemented district events bringing youth from every congregation together for worship, fellowship, growth, and recreation. The Subcommittee on Districts, led by Rev. Tim Glenham, has worked well in re-establishing this important link in the lives of our youth.

Synod-wide events have included or will include the following:

- The Winter Rally Held at Camp Caraway near Asheboro, this event was attended by 300 junior and senior high school youth. Through workshops, total community events, and the gospel in song presented by Singer Ed Kilbourne, the participants dealt in dramatic ways with the 1980 stewardship theme "We Believe We Share!"
- Camp with the Mentally Retarded This annual event was again held at Agape
  Camp and provided an exciting week of ministry for a selected number of youth
  to be involved in ministry for and with the developmentally handicapped. This
  camp is being planned for 1981.
- 1980 Synod Convo Thirty-eight youth and adult leaders spent five days studying and becoming involved in the work of our synod through this annual event. Convention business, discussions with synod staff and leaders, worship, service projects involving youth and delegates, and many fellowship opportunities make this experience an invaluable one for youth who attend.
- 4. Leadership Training Event This weekend event is in the planning process at this writing. Projected for the month of September, the purpose of this event is to aid youth in developing their skills in youth ministry. This event is slated to be an annual one, perhaps growing into a week-long training experience.
- Ind²-Bla-Whi This annual event, formerly supported by the Committee on Justice and Social Change has now become a part of our committee's program. Held during July at Kure Beach Retreat Center, Ind²-Bla-Whi provides exciting cross-cultural experiences for youth from our Synod.

REGIONAL AND LCA EVENTS — Furman University was the setting for the 1980 Southeastern Regional Event for high school youth. Held every three years, the regional event, usually lasting four days, has as its prime purpose the coming together of Lutheran youth from across the south to share in growth in involvement in their congregation, to grow spiritually, and to develop a strong sense identity as Lutheran youth in the south. An event is now being planned for August 1983. This event will be sponsored by North Carolina, South Carolina, Southeastern, and Florida Synods.

During June 1980 thirteen N.C. Youth and one adult attended the LCA Convo, held in conjunction with the LCA Convention in Seattle, Washington. Much like synod convo, this event provided excellent opportunities for youth to talk with churchwide leaders and be involved in the ministry of the church-at-large. A somewhat revised

format for LCA Convo is being planned for the 1982 convention, since it will occur in September 1982.

And finally, everyone is aware of the coming of the JOY Event. JOY will be held at Purdue University, West Lafayette, Indiana, July 20-24, 1981. Its purposes will include the sharing of a common faith and growth together through Worship, learning, witness, service, and support and to experience new approaches to congregational youth ministry. We expect a large number of North Carolina youth to attend JOY.

As I conclude this report I must express my deep appreciation to Staff Member Robert Shoffner for his support in the work of our committee. Without him and his sensitive in-put into our work, we could never have accomplished all that we have. To Bob, Youth Staffer Tim Paulson, and each member of this committee I say "Thank You". Because of your in-put and your hard work, our synod is becoming increasingly aware of the many and varied opportunities for ministries with its youth. I certainly hope that each congregation will continue to advocate the involvement of its young people in ministry.

We urge every individual of every congregation in the synod to pledge his/her support and make a firm commitment to attaining the goals of this campaign.

# 1980 Annual Report for Outdoor Ministries

1980 has been an excellent year in Outdoor Ministries. We hosted a total of 128 ministry events at Agape and Kure Beach. This is a record number and reservations for 1981 indicate this number will be larger.

Outdoor Ministries continues to move forward in person-centered programs, encompassing the vital needs of mission and ministries of Lutherans of all ages. The rationale of these ministries is focused in three areas: 1) aiding congregations in planning their programs; 2) developing synod-wide programs that meet the needs of people; and 3) providing the facilities to host these programs. The demand for programs and facilities is constantly expanding and a great effort is given to relate and develop programs that will enrich the lives of all of our youth, adults and families.

This past year has been a very busy time for this office. The demands are currently heavy with planning and implementing the Capital Fund Appeal for Conference and Camping Ministries, with management of facilities including food service, maintenance, reservations and hosting of programs, to writing and conducting programs and planning for future ministries and facilities. However, I must add these are fruitful and joyous times as we recognize that more ministry events are occurring at our camps than ever before. With the large increase in reservations, the following information should be helpful.

- Reservations for Outdoor Ministry facilities should be made at least six (6) months prior to the event.

- Reservations are necessary for utilization of any facility.

#### **KURE BEACH**

The Kure Beach Retreat Center had another good year. The occupancy rate was high and reservations for 1981 are coming in at the same pace. We expect to limit our maintenance to only necessary items with the hope of removing this unit and constructing the new center in the fall of 1982. The summer of 1982 will be the 15th year for Kure Beach and during that time approximately 15,000 have used this center.

We wish to express our continued appreciation to Mr. Kenneth Deal, manager of the center, and to our congregations for their splendid cooperation with him. We wish to express our appreciation to Mr. Harold McKnight for providing three airconditioning units.

We are pleased to learn of the many adult groups expressing a need to use the new center after its completion.

#### AGAPE CAMP

Agape continues to attempt to meet the needs of our congregations and people in Conference and Camping Ministries. More people came to Agape in 1980 than any year before and we expect a 20% increase in 1981. We are happy to report that several of our congregations have made first-time reservations this spring. We welcome them to the large number of churches that use this program. Our Ranger, Ed Shawver, is doing a fine job and we express our appreciation to him. He is always the willing host and able worker.

During the past year, the following equipment or improvements were made at Agape:

a) A 1974 Chevrolet pick-up truck was purchased, the 1969 pick-up was sold,

- b) A new heavy-duty tractor blade for road maintenance,
- c) Gravel was placed on the road to the Lodge,
- d) Additional kitchen equipment and linen service for the Lodge,
- e) Power tools, including chain saw and skill saw,
- f) Replacement of dining deck at retreat kitchen.

The Lutheran Men's Retreat Lodge has completed its second year of use and during that time, individuals and groups from over eighty (80) of our congregations have utilized the facility. Lutheran men have developed a plan to complete the payment of the Lodge by the end of 1981. Congratulations and thanks to the N.C. Lutheran men for their excellent effort in this ministry of our church.

#### CONFERENCE AND CAMPING MINISTRIES CAMPAIGN

At the writing of this report the Conference and Camping Appeal has been introduced and church council visitation is progressing. We are happy to share that reports are excellent across the Synod. We wish to express our appreciation to all pastors and congregations for their support of this appeal. We are grateful for the work of the Policy Committee, the General Appeal Committee including Synod and District leaders and all workers and supporters of this Campaign. The needs are real and we invite everyone to share in prayer and support of this appeal.

#### APPRECIATION

We sincerely express our appreciation: 1) to the N.C. Lutheran Men for the Lodge and efforts to complete its final indebtedness; 2) to the Camp Committee for its leadership in Outdoor Ministries; 3) to all workers and congregations in their effort for the Conference and Camping Ministries Appeal; 4) to the 1980 program leaders at Agape Camp; 5) to the Bishop and Synod Staff and Executive Board for their support in this program; and 6) to all pastors and congregations for your prayers and support of this ministry.

# Conference and Camping Ministries Appeal

This report of the recent appeal constitutes a success story. Beginning with a Policy Committee chaired by Bishop Misenheimer, and comprised of people who have a grasp of the outdoor ministry needs of the synod, we were off to a booming start.

With the employment of LLM and, especially, Mr. Chuck Bartlett as our Campaign Director, things began to take strategic shape. With his stories of "how it could be done", Mr. Bartlett tackled the task of setting up the program. A synodical general committee was appointed. The members of that committee are: The Rev. Boyce D. Whitener, Pastor Chairman; Mr. Harold McKnight, Vice-Chairman (Layman); Mrs. Ruth Fisher, Vice-Chairperson (Woman); The Rev. George R. Whittecar, D.D., Major Gifts Chairman; Mr. Clarence Pugh, Publicity Chairman. The committee promptly took the reins of this \$1,600,000 appeal and emersed themselves quite sacrificially into the mechanics and inspirations necessary to convince our constituency of the incumbency of this ministry of our church.

Thirty-five members of district teams, patterned after the synodical team, tackled faithfully the task on the boundaries of the seven districts. These were all well-chosen people who carefully attended to the details of implementing the Lord's out-door ministry work on their territory. Each of these teams was a spectacle in themselves.

The visiting teams (a force of 150 people) were soon recruited on the district level, and off went those well-trained teams to the many church councils. They shared the story of outdoor ministry and the massive needs. Each church council was asked to make recommendation of a "Share of Need" to the congregation. A most gratifying response has resulted.

A final step in follow-up will be set in motion by the time of convention. A special "Progress Committee" will be appointed by the Policy Committee. This group will

supervise the collection and distribution of pledges, help to work out any problems that occur in the 30 month pay period, and help keep the campaign a "live issue" until we have successfully gone all the way.

Go home to your congregations and report that their share in the Conference and Camping Appeal is critical. Encourage your people to give as pledged . . . and more! You will be mighty glad you did! Our gratefulness to all concerned.

# Parish Life and Ministry Task Force

The decision to continue the PLMD Task Force as a separate entity in the N.C. Synod committee structure, as a part of the Cabinet for Parish Services, has proven to be most helpful. It has provided a viable means of interpreting and promoting PLMD as a program and service of the LCA to assist congregations in strengthening their ministry.

Three congregations, St. John, Asheboro, Holy Comforter, Belmont, and Center Grove, Kannapolis, have continued to work with the customized PLMD program. At least four other congregations have ordered one or more of the multiple approaches to PLMD.

The primary thrust of the Task Force's work this year has been a series of presentations to the New Professionals in the synod, the Cabinet for Parish Services and to interested pastors and lay persons at the 1981 District Church Days. By these means we have been able to publicize the value of PLMD as a resource for ministry evaluation and planning.

The Task Force is grateful to Pastor Robert Shoffner for the dedicated staff support and guidance he has given to the group. His contacts with committee chairpersons, pastors and church council members has greatly enhanced the efforts to strengthen our partnership with congregations.

All congregations are invited to consider the resources of PLMD as an effective means of actualizing their ministry potential.

## Lutheridge

Among some purists, there is debate whether the new decade began in 1980 or 1981. Whatever the case, Lutheridge completed thirty years of programming in 1980 and begins its fourth decade of ministry in 1981. Overall, the thirtieth year was one of Lutheridge's better years, as evidenced by activities reported in the following categories.

**Program Participants.** In practically every tally, 1980 statistics remained within a percentage point of the 1979 count. Highlights of 1980 are as follows (percentage comparisons with 1979 are in parentheses):

- a total of 13,277 persons were involved in tabulated activities (-1.8% with most losses occurring in worship and picnic group tabulations),
- person-nights (an overnight stay by one person) totaled 30,086 (-0.2%) an average of 82 persons a day for each day in 1980,
- 4,307 persons were counted in 153 different retreat/conference groups, mostly in the spring, fall, and winter (-1.1% in persons and +4.1% in groups),
- 484 persons registered in Lutheridge sponsored non-summer events (+0.6%),

- resident campers (children and youth) in the summer tallied 2136 camper weeks (+1.0%) 785 or 36.7% in grades 3-5 age group, 957 or 44.8% in grades 6-8, 224 or 10.5% in grades 9-12, and 170 or 8.0% in sessions for mentally retarded persons,
- 263 campers, 27.5% of all grade 6-8 registrants, participated in confirmation camp programs held in seven weeks and involving 47 congregations from four synods,
- 999 adults and their children (not campers) registered for summer conference and/or fellowship week events or for program leadership responsibilities (+ 26.3%, a figure made higher by a change in counting procedures),
- Lutheridge staff members provided a resident camping experience for a total
  of 50 campers at two satellite locations: New Ebenezer Family Retreat and
  Conference Center at Rincon, GA, and Rau-Wood Retreat Center at Nashville,
  TN.

**Staff.** Mrs. Sarah B. Frey retired in early November from her position as Retreat/Conference Registrar. She was the first person to fill this position, beginning in January 1972 and hosting hundreds of groups and greeting thousands of guests during her tenure. The vacancy will be filled during the winter. A study and reorganization of the year round staff was completed by a special task force and the Board of Trustees early in 1980. This resulted in two new positions: (1) Administrative Assistant, assumed by Mrs. Nellie H. Robertson, former Bookkeeper-Secretary, and (2) Director of Development and Promotion, to be filled in the spring. The 1980 summer staff totaled 265 persons — 146 who were weekly program leaders and 119 who were employed staff (some full and some part summer).

**Facilities.** The maintenance building became a reality in 1980! The facility measures 60 by 65 feet and provides 3900 square feet of ground level floor space. A large overhead door is at each end. Along one side of the building are rooms serving as (1) an office, (2) a carpentry shop, and (3) a storeroom. A loft above these rooms yields an additional 975 square feet of storage space. The rest of the floor space will be used for vehicle and equipment service and parking.

Another major project was also completed in 1980 — a three phase renovation of the swimming pool. A 100-collector solar heating system was installed, replacing an oil-fired boiler which failed in late summer 1979. The pool itself was rebuilt with a new concrete shell and deck. The electrical system was also replaced.

The maintenance, repair, and renovation of buildings as well as replacement of equipment and furnishings continue to be high priority needs. A volunteer work program continues to provide valuable assistance in this regard. The funded depreciation budget item, begun in 1980, provides additional money for replacement, renovation, and renewal of facilities. Capital fund appeals in the South and North Carolina Synods will provide the financial transfusion necessary to rejuvenate the entire facility.

Finances. Lutheridge again operated "in the black" in 1980 — operating expenses not exceeding income. Debt reduction also remained on schedule. Double-digit inflation, however, continues to take its toll through increased costs for labor, utilities, insurance, food, and other needs. Demands of property maintenance add to already heavy budgetary pressures. A complete financial report and auditor's statement follows this report.

The new funded depreciation budget item provided \$14,640.00, much of which is being carried over for spring 1981 projects. Budgets in 1981 and 1982 will continue this item at a rate of \$.50 per person per day which is a part of registration fees.

At the end of 1980, receipts from the South Carolina Synod Conference and Camping Ministries Appeal amounted to \$98,535.64, including a \$15,000.00 designated gift from the late Miss Nell Kohn of Columbia. Approximately \$56,500.00 has been spent on a new roof for Mission Hall, projects at the swimming pool reported earlier, a new roof and central heating system for Carla Cottage, interior paint and new wooden bunks for five Wilderness Cabins, and repairs to two other

buildings. Additional projects to be funded by South Carolina campaign receipts will be determined by the amount of these receipts and the priority of various needs.

The Conference and Camping Ministries Appeal in the North Carolina Synod began with the opening in October 1980 of a campaign office in the synod Church House in Salisbury. The Lutheran Laymen's Movement Fund-Raising and Counseling Service is directing the campaign. Resident campaign director is Mr. Charles F. Bartlett. A series of briefing meetings was held between October 20 and 31, 1980, one for each synod district. The first half of 1981 will feature campaign activities in the congregations, preceding a thirty-month appeal payment period which begins July 1. Current reports from both appeals will be made at conventions of the supporting synods.

The Fourth Decade. Lutheridge eagerly enters upon this milestone of service called by the Lord of the Church to a ministry of Christian education and leadership training, quickened by the presence of God's children of all ages involved in this ministry, and strengthened by the prayers and interest and contributions of this synod's congregations and their members. For this ministry and your support, Lutheridge is truly grateful!

#### Notes to Financial Statements December 31, 1980

#### 1. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

The financial statements of Lutheridge, Inc. have been prepared on the accrual basis, whereby revenue is taken into income when earned and expenses are charged to operations as incurred. The significant accounting policies followed are described below to enhance the usefulness of the financial statements to the reader.

#### **Fund Accounting**

To ensure observance of limitations and restrictions placed on the use of resources available to the Corporation, the accounts of Lutheridge are maintained in accordance with the principles of fund accounting. This is the procedure by which resources for various purposes are classified for accounting and reporting purposes into funds established according to their nature and purposes. Separate accounts are maintained for each fund; however, in the accompanying financial statements, funds that have similar characteristics have been recorded and reported by fund group.

The assets, liabilities, and fund balances of Lutheridge are reported in three self-balancing fund groups as follows:

Operating funds, which include unrestricted and restricted resources, represent the portion of expendable funds that is available for support of operations of the Corporation.

Endowment funds represent funds that are subject to restrictions of gift instruments or action of the Board of Directors requiring in perpetuity that the principal be invested and the income only be used.

Plant funds represent resources restricted for capital property additions and funds expended for capital properties.

#### Inventories

Inventories are valued at the lower of cost (first-in, first-out) or market. Costs are determined at invoice cost.

#### Capital Properties and Depreciation

Uses of operating funds for capital properties additions are accounted for as transfers to plant funds.

Capital properties acquired prior to 1972 are valued based on an independent appraiser's report for

real estate, kitchen and dining hall equipment and on estimated valuations as determined by the Executive Director for other equipment and furnishings. Acquisitions since January 1, 1972 are based on actual costs for purchased properties and on estimated valuations for donated properties.

Beginning in 1975, depreciation was computed on all depreciable capital properties. A reserve for depreciation was set up with the plant fund being charged with the annual depreciation. Depreciation is determined on the straight-line basis for all capital properties acquired since 1971 with the remaining useful life being used as a basis for depreciation on all assets acquired prior to 1972.

#### 2. Investment in Securities

Investments are presented in the financial statements at the lower of cost (fair market value at date of donation for donated investments) or fair market value as of December 31, 1980.

#### Interfund Loan to Unrestricted Fund from Conference and Camping Ministries Appeal — South Carolina Synod

A temporary loan balance of \$19,300.00 from the restricted operating fund, Conference and Camping Ministries Appeal — South Carolina Synod, to the unrestricted operating fund represents various funds advanced for paying off bank indebtedness and other working capital. Interest is being charged on this interfund loan at the rate of 5½% per annum. The interfund loan and the related accrued interest have been eliminated in the combined totals columns of the financial statements.

#### 5. Contingent Liability

The North Carolina Synod of the Lutheran Church in Americca is conducting a capital funds drive for its Conference and Camping Ministries. Lutheridge is one of three camp and conference centers to benefit from this campaign.

The contract with the Lutheran Layman's Movement Fund-Raising and Counseling Service for conducting the campaign was signed by Lutheridge as contracting agent on behalf of the North Carolina Synod. Additionally, Lutheridge has the responsibility for maintaining the accounting records and banking transactions concerning the campaign. As a part of these responsibilities, various short-term loans totaling \$49,863.11 had been borrowed from Wachovia Bank and Trust Co. as of December 31, 1980 in Lutheridge's name, on behalf of the campaign for various initial expenses. These loans are to be repaid from contributions to be received in the campaign.

#### Cabinet for Mission

The purpose of this cabinet is to bring together various ones who are working in the broad field of the mission of THE CHURCH in its outreach in order that each may see what the other is doing and in order that there might be some coordination of efforts in ministry.

In addition, the purpose of this cabinet is to develop in the lives and ministry of the institutions and/or committees, which are represented by membership on this cabinet, a perspective of their institution or committee which shows them as being one part of the whole missionary thrust of The Church. The concern is that the various committees, agencies and institutions develop their programs and interests in view of others who also have specific concern in the broad range of The Church's outreach. The cabinet seeks to find the best method of approach which would allow it most effectively to achieve the objective in ministry given to it by the synod.

The cabinet seeks to discharge its duties faithfully. In so doing it has come together on a number of occasions during the past months to try to meet its responsibilities. On September 10, 1980 a general meeting of the cabinet was held at the Church House for the purpose of sharing activities in ministry engaged in by the respective agencies/institutions/committees, etc. represented on the cabinet. Coordination of ministry activity within the synod resulted from this meeting as well as suggestions for any new ministries that might be projected for the year 1982. On January 8, 1981 the cabinet came together again for the purpose of becoming involved in the synod's Budget Building Process as it relates to the 1982 synodical budget. Projects in ministry which are expected and/or being proposed by the institutions or committees for the year 1982 were revealed and were arranged in order of the cabinet's ranking of priority for purposes of recommendation to the synod's Committee on Budget and Finance as it prepared for the 1982 budget draft. Plans for the cabinet's presentation to the 1981 convention of synod were also made at that time. On February 19, and February 20, 1981 members of the cabinet attended the Church Wide Agency Consultation and Budget Forum at the Church House.

Our basic concern as a cabinet is for The Church's outreach, particularly as it is "sent" into the world in a kind of institutionalized or organized manner as opposed, for example, to the outreach engaged in by a congregation or an individual Christian.

It is the cabinet's responsibility to concern itself with MISSION as it occurs and is expressed beyond the confines of the local congregation. Consequently the cabinet attempts to coordinate, share in, enable, implement, plan, develop ministries, etc. that constitute the outreach of The Church beyond the congregational level as we know it.

#### II. MEETINGS

Most business was conducted at one of our two meetings — September 30 and January 15. Other business was conducted by mail or by telephone. Committee membership was decreased by eliminating some of the consulting members. A travel meeting will be held on May 26-28. The Raleigh area will be the focal point of the committee's study-learning-field excursion.

#### III. RELATIONSHIPS

The committee cooperates with the DCE of the DMNA. This activity entails:

- Review and study of data on new fields, recommending new ministry priorities to DMNA for new work in suburbia, inurbia, and exurbia.
- Reviews the ministry profile of each DMNA related congregation, with assistance from Dr. Johnson. Approves program grants for each congregation.
- Assistance to younger synod churches initial equipment, settling in of developer, etc.

The committee approves all recommendations of the Sustentation Committee to non-DMNA congregations. The committee is also represented on the Sustentation Committee.

This committee approves all applications for funds from the Home Missions Foundation. Two categories of applications are received and acted upon. Category "A" are always DMNA-related organizations. These funds become first mortgage money for first unit construction. Category "B" are those funds which possibly might become available for second unit construction. Very seldom is there money left over from Category "A" to be appropriated in Category "B".

This committee approves the appropriation of Melanchthon Funds to needy situations. The Executive Board has placed at our disposal some \$12,000 for use in 1981.

A sub-committee on Appalachian concerns meets regularly and works closely with the Rev. Carroll L. Wessinger, Mission Consultant, DMNA. Mr. Steve Ridenhour was employed by Grace, Boone, Holy Communion, Banner Elk, as an intern to minister to vacationers and others in 1980-81. The committee has supported CORA, RAM, and other Appalachian Ministries.

#### IV. DEVELOPMENT OF NEW FIELDS

Development of new congregations is underway at Burnsville (Rev. Paul Rimmer), Raleigh-Urban (Rev. Eugene Powell), Whiteville (Rev. William Flowers), and Clemmons (Rev. David McCleary).

LC-USA clearance has also been secured for:

- Greensboro (South of I-85)
- Northeast Raleigh (NC 50 and Lynn Road)
- Cary (US 64 and NC 55)
- Eden
- Wilmington (US 17 North)
- Manteo

Special attention should be given to the fact that almost 75% of the membership of our congregations is coming from non-Lutheran background: unchurched persons, adult Baptism, profession of faith. This is mission in action.

Other opportunities for new congregations (as well as relocation of several existing congregations) in North Carolina are being constantly studied and development is expected to be a continuing and challenging activity, limited only by the availability of funds.

# Lutheran World Relief/World Hunger

World Hunger Appeal. During 1980 members contributed \$91,059.75 through congregations of the N.C. Synod to the LCA World Hunger Appeal. This is the largest total for one year since the appeal began. This amount represents an increase of more than 25% over 1979. We express our thanks to everyone who contributed to help hungry people in the name of Jesus Christ. Also, we say "Thank you" to congregations and pastors for supporting and promoting the appeal, and we ask your continued support in this effort.

A Hunger Newsletter was begun during 1980. It is to serve as a means for sharing information and ideas. Each issue is sent to pastors and Social Ministry chairpersons.

Our new LCA World Hunger Appeal Director, the Rev. Vernon N. Cronmiller, met with the committee at the Church House on December 2, 1980. He praised the committee for its work and issued the challenge for our synod to do even more in the future to raise awareness and stimulate response to the hunger needs of the world.

**Media Center.** The Near Edge, a 30-minute film that examines more simple lifestyles, was purchased and placed in the media center.

An Event on Lifestyle changes is scheduled for June 19-21, 1981 at Agape Camp. The Rev. John D. Keister, co-author of *Food, Fuel and Future*, will serve as leader. The Rev. and Mrs. Harold Terry will be assisting with the menu and food preparation. Participation in this event will be by invitation only. It is our hope that other events will grow out of this experiment.

The Fall Clothing Appeal for Lutheran World Relief resulted in 18,605 pounds being transported from North Carolina to the New Windsor, Maryland, warehouse. We continue to be extremely grateful to those congregations, pastors, and lay people who help in these arrangements by providing and supervising collection centers. Also, we are grateful to Carolina Freight Carriers for continuing to provide free trucking for goods collected in the fall appeal.

NC-INFACT. At its meeting on April 27, 1981 the committee endorsed the position taken by the LCW to boycott the Nestle Company in an effort to combat Baby Bottle Disease in developing countries. This was done by a unanimous vote of the committee to support INFACT, state chapter of the Infant Formula Action Coalition, national coordinator of the Nestle Boycott. Responsible medical research has shown that the substitution of commercial infant formula for breast milk in areas of the world

where poverty, illiteracy, impure water, and inadequate sanitation prevail has resulted in infant malnutrition, illness, brain damage and death. There is a strong consensus among international health experts that promotion of infant formula is a major contributing cause of this tragic problem. Some U.S. manufacturers of infant formula have modified their promotion and marketing practices in the less developed countries as a result of shareholder actions and other expressions of concern by religious, medical and other groups. Nestle, a Swiss-based corporation, controls between ½ and ½ of the world's infant formula market but is immune from U.S. shareholder and congressional action. Direct appeals to Nestle to change its practices have been generally futile.

Purchase of The Longest Stride, a fifteen minute color film, was authorized by the committee. This film calls for "the longest stride of sour men ever took" in economic injustice "in which we are all involved." Most affluent Americans find it difficult if not impossible to identify with economic conditions in developing countries where most people live on \$100 a year. The Longest Stride dramatizes these economic conditions by juxtaposing Third World realities with American affluence. The final part of the film gives information about the causes of economic injustice "in which we are all involved."

#### Resolution Concerning the World Hunger Appeal:

Whereas, the number of hungry and undernourished persons in our world continues to increase:

Whereas, the tragic plight of people in parts of Africa and especially in Somalia commands our concern and our assistance;

Whereas, our U.S. Government is doing less to assist hungry people;

Whereas, the number of hungry and malnourished persons in our own country is likely to increase due to budget cuts by the U.S. Government;

Whereas, 53 congregations of the North Carolina Synod failed to send in contributions to the World Hunger Appeal in 1980;

Whereas, the opportunities to help hungry people in the name of our Lord Jesus Christ through the LCA World Hunger Appeal will continue to increase;

Whereas, there will be media coverage and information about world hunger during September and October provided by CROP/Church World Services and other groups; and

Whereas, our Lord Jesus Christ has commanded us to feed the hungry and has said that when we feed a hungry person we are feeding Him;

THEREFORE, Be it resolved that we, as a convention, urge the members of the congregations of the North Carolina Synod, LCA, to continue their support of the LCA World Hunger Appeal with the goal of every congregation participating and contributing to the Appeal in 1981;

Be it resolved that congregations and church councils set aside October 4, 1981 A.D., World Communion Sunday, along with other dates that they would normally set aside to receive offerings for the LCA World Hunger Appeal; and

Be it resolved that members of congregations and congregations join in support of local community efforts to combat hunger and/or local CROP walks.

#### Environmental Concerns

In the past year the Environmental Concerns Committee has continued to throw all of its effort and energy into helping congregations work toward making their buildings more energy efficient.

Although the initial efforts of using trained persons to visit congregations were less successful than hoped for, the committee has not given up on the idea that every congregation needs to evaluate its energy usage. At the writing of this report, workshops are being held at the District Church Days in all districts. These workshops provide Property Chairpersons with ideas and resources to carry back to their congregations to help them conserve energy. Also plans are being made for a display and for handouts at the synod convention to try to reach even more congregations.

With the continuing rapid rise in the cost of all forms of energy, we are convinced there will be a rising interest in this committee's consultative services on energy efficiency in the future.

Besides the concern with the most crucial matter of energy, the committee continues to make available resources (persons, materials, audio-visuals, etc.) on environmental concerns of a wide spectrum. Any person or congregation who wishes to avail themselves of these resources in other areas need only ask.

Finally, this committee is open to receive ideas, suggestions, directions about our work in environmental concerns at anytime from you — the people of N.C. Synod. We exist not as a separate entity, and not only to initiate from within our own group, but as a servant to hear and to respond to your needs and desires.

# Campus Ministry

The Campus Ministry Committee provides guidance and financial support for ministry on campuses within the territory of synod. This ministry is carried out by three types of local groups or individuals. First there are eight covenant congregations which have accepted the campus as part of the congregational mission: Grace, Boone; First, Greensboro; Emmanuel, High Point; Living Word, Laurinburg; Our Saviour, Southern Pines; Shepherd of the Hills, Sylva; St. Matthew, Wilmington; Epiphany, Winston-Salem. Second, fourteen contact pastors serve campus communities near their own congregations on a part time basis. Finally there are three locations where full time work is carried on: Raleigh, Durham, and Chapel Hill.

The budget planning process indicates that the problem of rapidly increasing costs and slowly increasing resources will be with us for the next several years, and increasing in severity.

We want to thank Pastors David L. Martin and Robert G. Walker for their unceasing labors on behalf of campus ministry. We wish to thank also the most important people in campus ministry, those who work with students, faculty and staff members at our 27 locations. The campus is a place where the clash of ideas, facts, opinions and tradition combine to forge the cultural values of the future. Ministry in this environment is like missionary work in a culture which changes yearly. The various forces on a campus pull in many different directions; it is only campus ministry which pulls to Christ.

# Justice and Social Change

The Committee on Justice and Social Change devotes itself to addressing matters of injustice and social change which may divert us from the Lordship of Jesus Christ. In addition to calling attention to such concerns, we have attempted to spawn programs and ministries consistent with our confession of faith in a Lord who seeks justice for all people.

To accomplish these purposes we have not only organized ourselves into several task forces, but have also joined forces with other communities, agencies and organizations. We always stand ready to assist congregations in their ministry of justice and social change as they seek to serve in their local situation.

The Task Force on Native American Concerns, chaired by The Reverend Dennis Bolton, gathers itself around four important goals: (1) The Task Force assists tribes in North Carolina in their attempt to become federally recognized. Unfederated tribes in North Carolina will soon have access to a Federal Recognition Center being established by the National Indian Lutheran Board. (2) The Task Force researches and makes recommendations on resources that are needed by the Native American population. (3) It assumes the role of disseminator of communications between and among North Carolina Native Americans, Lutherans, and others. (4) Finally, it works to raise the awareness of and educate Lutherans across North Carolina to the issues and concerns of Native American persons. On a quarterly basis the Task Force meets with members from some of the following tribes: Lumbee, Tuscarora, Coharie, Haliwa-Saponi, and Waccamaw-Siouan.

Chaired by Mrs. Betty Gamble, the Task Force on the Role of Men and Women aims to increase the awareness, understanding, and acceptability of the equal partnership of men and women in church and society, and of women in the ordained ministry. In this respect the Task Force has actively supported the North Carolina Synod in its efforts to pass the Equal Rights Amendment to the United States Constitution. Also a focus of concern for this Task Force is studying the climate for change in our society and what seems to bring Christians to greet change with fear. In this respect the Task Force is planning a seminar and a study group to help us apply our theology to the changing world in which men and women live.

Of central concern to our committee is our synod's Minority Ministry Program. The program reflects our commitment to implementing the L.C.A. Statement of Goals and Plans for Ministry Among Minority Persons, 1978-1984. Since January, 1980, the Reverend Richard Perry has served as Director of our Minority Ministry Program. We are grateful to our Lord for Pastor Perry's sensitive and incisive leadership as the family of God seeks to become a more inclusive, redemptive body. Please read Pastor Perry's report printed elsewhere in this bulletin.

To give direction, evaluation, and support to our Minority Ministry Program and its director, a Task Force on Minority Ministry is chaired by Josephine Conn. The group meets quarterly with our director.

Our committee also maintains contacts with other communities, agencies, and organizations such as the synod Youth Committee through its Camp Ind<sup>2</sup>-Bla-Whi, the National Indian Lutheran Board, the Lutheran Human Relations Association, Project Equality, Ventures in Vocation, Association of Black Lutherans, and local congregations.

This committee is grateful for the opportunity to extend our synod's commitment to God's people as they face matters of justice and social change. We are encouraged by the continuing commitment of our synod and its leadership toward justice and social change in the name of our Lord Jesus Christ.

# **Minority Ministries Program**

"There is one body and one Spirit, just as you were called to the one hope that belongs to your call, one Lord, one faith, one baptism, one God and Father of us all, who is above all and through all and in all" (Ephesians 4:4-7).

These words of St. Paul's letter to the Ephesians serve as a model for being an inclusive church in the North Carolina Synod. St. Paul recognized that people from various backgrounds and nationalities form the church of Jesus Christ. Yet in the midst of diversity all have the same Father, the same Lord and participated in one baptism.

This is the vision I bring to each of you as I begin my second year as your Director. I believe God has called all people to be a part of the Christian Church recognizing that in spite of our background and nationalities, we are to be open to what God's people want to share through His Church. I hope this decade will be one in which 30-40 specific congregations will catch this vision. We can be an inclusive Church with the knowledge that God is with us and mightily leading us forward!

#### STYLE OF MINISTRY

Over the past year, I have communicated a certain style of ministry which is the basis of our work together. Numerous comments have been shared with me about that style. I appreciate the affirmation which so many of you have given to me. I want to share therefore the style I will be using because I think this will lay to rest some fears we may have about participating in The Minority Ministries Program.

The style of ministry we will be using is certainly a pastoral approach. I am concerned about people and their local situations. I am concerned about what is important and life-giving to the people of the congregation. I am concerned about identifying those bridges, in the congregation and minority communities, which can be built so God's Word can be proclaimed loudly and with conviction. I am concerned with the climate of 30-40 congregations which certainly is important for inclusive ministry to happen. I am concerned that we see the opportunity for leading people, who are from different backgrounds and nationalities, to a commitment to Jesus Christ.

From this we develop programs to meet the needs of people in the local congregation and minority communities. This is a long and tedious process and will certainly take patience. We will take our time and be patient.

This is and has been my approach for the last year and will be my approach in the coming years as your Director. Our salvation will come through **our trusting in God** rather than through programs I, The Task Force on The Minority Ministries Program or The Consulting Committee on Justice and Social Change would recommend.

#### **ACTIVITIES**

The vision set before us by St. Paul and the style of ministry which I have shared has been evident in the many activities over the last year.

There has been over 20 visits with pastors over 30 preaching general visitation with congregations and presentations about The Minority Ministries Program. I have led two full workshops and a condensed workshop on "The Goals and Plans For Ministry Among Minority Persons, 1978-1984", a "People of Faith: Reaching and Serving" workshop for two congregations, attended over 35 meetings in the synod and participated in over 20 meetings in the various communities of synod.

I have participated in several continuing education events, served as Pastor-in-Residence at Lenoir-Rhyne College, chaired the Black and Lutheran Project of D.P.L.-L.C.A. and served as consultant to the national Lutheran Human Relations Association of America Board of Directors.

I have prepared quarterly newsletters and developed with The Consulting Committee on Justice and Social Change a bulletin insert which was distributed during our District Church Days.

I am happy to report that three congregations are involved with the program and making progress toward being an inclusive congregation.

So St. Paul's words have been active in our ministry together.

#### THE FUTURE

Lest we rest on our laurels of the past year, I have great hopes for the future. I hope that by the end of this year we will have at least twelve congregations committed to being involved in The Minority Ministries Program. I hope there is some growth in minority membership in some of our congregations of minority persons who have lived, for years, in North Carolina. Evidence of that type of growth will show that we are proclaiming the Word of God. I hope there will be an increase in our openness to dialogue together about the various ways we can build bridges with minority communities.

I invite each of you to consider joining with me as we seek to be God's church in this decade. Your invitation can make the difference in our proclaiming, together, the God we know to be the God of all people.

#### CONCLUSION

I want to express my appreciation for our Bishop. Dr. Ernest Misenheimer has been a great person to work with and has been quite supportive and encouraging as we have dialogued together about The Minority Ministries Program. My appreciation goes to the synod staff, the secretarial staff and the persons serving on The Task Force on The Minority Ministries Program and The Consulting Committee on Justice and Social Change. Each person has been a source of strength and guidance as we have come to know each other and work with each other. This is a great spirit among each of them. Finally, I greatly appreciate the invitations and opportunities to be with so many of you during the year. You have shown a spirit and willingness to extend God's love. I say Thank You!

I eagerly look forward to another great year, patiently working together with you, as we seek to be an inclusive church in The North Carolina Synod of the L.C.A. God's rich blessings be with each of you.

#### SUPPLEMENTAL REPORT

The Lutheran Church in America, through its convention, adopted in 1978 "Goals and Plans for Minority Ministry 1978-1984". This statement provides the church with guides for it to become an "inclusive" body.

"Goals and Plans" is a statement for congregations, synods and churchwide agencies and institutions to share, in an international way, ministry "with" and among minority persons. This statement is one which encourages us to grow in faith and witness in proclaiming together the Gospel.

What has happened in the North Carolina Synod of the Lutheran Church in America with regard to "Goals and Plans"? This report is being provided so the synod may be encouraged in its work to become more inclusive.

The report contained herein was prepared in late 1979 and updated in early 1980 for the "Goals and Plans" Update meeting in New York. The information provided are the facts as far as they were obtainable. More specific data will become available later in the year through the congregational report forms.

- Goal #I-A: That the leadership of the congregations, synods, churchwide agencies periodically assess their attitudes and programs for the purpose of eradicating racism, making changes suggested by those reviews.
- Goal #I-B: That (I) churchwide agencies provide appropriate materials, and (2) synods work with and support leadership of congregations to enable them to examine their racism and devise strategies for working toward the elimination of their racism.
  - The Minority Ministries Program.
  - The availability of films and filmstrips in Media Center.
- Goal #I-C: That the LCA exhibit a self-understanding consistent with the Gospel of what it means to be the church in a diverse culture.
  - The Minority Ministries Program.

- Ind²-Bla-Whi Camp.
- Goal #2-A: That, until the LCA has within its membership a percentage of minority group persons at least to the percentage of minority group persons in the general population, the LCA set as a goal an annual growth figure of at least 15,000 minority group persons and that efforts be made to reach that annual goal as early as possible during the 1978-1984 period.
  - The Minority Ministries Program. See Note at the conclusion.
- Goal #2-B: That the LCA enter areas of more than 50% minority group persons for the purposes of establishing within the minority communities at least 40 congregations before 1984.
  - Hope Lutheran Church, Raleigh.
- Goal #2-C: That, based on the recommendation of synods, the DMNA (I) give up to eight years support to established congregations during the period of racial and cultural transition, and (2) support for an indeterminate period of time congregations in areas where poverty conditions make it impossible for the members to provide funds necessary for the ministry.
  - Prince of Peace, Greensboro
- **Goal #2-D:** That the LCA establish broadcast ministries in the Spanish language in six key cities in the United States and Puerto Rico.
- Goal #3-A: That the LCA annually adopt a plan for addressing the priority issue for justice in the economic life of the U.S. and Canada as it specifically affects minority persons, and that in 1978-1979 that issue be the disproportionate number of minority persons who are unemployed.
  - Investments in one Black owned bank and one American Indian owned bank.
- **Goal #3-B:** That congregations, coalitions, districts and synods join with other organizations in assisting local school districts raise the quality of the education particularly in schools where minority group students are in the majority.
- Goal #3-C: That the LCA during 1978-1984 advocate for funding of federal government programs for the development of appropriate housing for all people.
  - Lutherhaus in Hickory.
  - Housing project being sponsored by congregation in Lincolnton.
- Goal #3-D: That using LCA educational materials on criminal justice, the congregations, synods and church-wide agencies work in local communities, in states and provinces, and within nationwide institutions to address deficiencies and to support effective programs in the criminal justice system.
  - "Justice and Dignity Month".
  - NC Unit of LCW is working in the area of Juvenile Justice.
  - Task Force on Advocacy in Synod Social Ministry Committee
  - Task Force on Criminal Justice which is researching and advocating participation in Yokefellow Prison Ministry and Chaplains in prisons.
- Goal #4-A: That throughout the period of 1978-1984 the LCA cooperate with the National Council of the Churches of Christ in the U.S.A., the Lutheran Council in Canada, the Joint Strategy and Action Commission, the Lutheran Council in the U.S.A. and other interfaith organizations and task forces to fulfill Goals 3-A—3-D.
  - Involvement with National Indian Lutheran Board through Task Force on American Indian Concerns.
  - Participation in NC-LHRAA through Synod's Social Ministry Committee.
  - Minority pastor serving as delegate to North Carolina Council of Churches House of Delegates.
- Goal #4-B: That the Executive Council of the LCA include minority group members in delegations to the National Council of the Churches of Christ in the

U.S.A., the World Council of Churches, the Lutheran Council in the USA and the Lutheran World Federation.

- Goal #5-A: That prior to 1984 all seminaries of the LCA develop portions of their curriculum to address racism and ministry with minorities so all students are given resources from which they can develop self-confidence in relation to these areas.
  - The director of the Minority Ministries Program made a presentation at LTSS and at Professional Services Retreat for seminarian students.
  - Internship with Guilford Native American Association and 2 congregations in Greensboro.
- Goal #5-B: That prior to 1984 churchwide agencies develop a program to identify and prepare professional leaders who have demonstrated skills that commend them for city ministries, and that synodical presidents use this information in making recommendations to city congregations.
- Goal #5-C: That by 1984 the Division for Professional Leadership in cooperation with synod professional leadership committees enlist additional persons so that (I) at least 100 minority group persons will be on the roll of ordained ministers of the LCA, and (2) 10 minority group persons will enter the lay professional field or diaconate of the LCA.
  - Ventures in Vocations participant.
- Goal #5-D: That by 1984, synods will give counsel to congregations so that at least one-third of the minority group persons serving as pastors in the LCA will be serving congregations where the membership is a majority of white persons (suburban town and country, and/or city).
- Goal #5-E: That by 1984, responsible governing boards of churchwide agencies, synods and synodical agencies and institutions enlist 60 minority group persons in full time executive or professional staff positions.
- Goal #6: That during 1978-1984 publications of the church (synodical papers, *The Lutheran, The Congregation,* and other church wide publications) expand their coverage of minority group persons and ministries among minority group persons so that the inclusiveness of the church is apparent through these publications.
  - The North Carolina Lutheran has carried three articles on minority persons.
- Goal #7-A: That the number of minority group persons at the LCA conventions shall increase so that by 1984 at least 50 minority group persons will be in attendance as delegates.
- Goal #7-B: That the nominating committee of the LCA convention presents at least 10% minority person candidates for positions to be filled at the convention in 1980, 1982, 1984.
- Goal #7-C: That minority group persons be appointed to consulting committees so that by 1984, at least 5% of their membership will be minority group persons.
  - The N.C. Synod had 4 minority group persons serving on committees, boards, etc. in the North Carolina Synod.
- Goal #8: That the churchwide agencies, synods and synodical agencies and institutions provide funds in their spending authorization for the accomplishment of the above goals during the period 1978-1984.
  - Ventures in Vocations: \$2,400.00
  - Investments: \$23,000.00
  - The Minority Ministries Program: \$8,496.32
  - Ind²-Bla-Whi Camp: \$1,180.21
  - Project Equality
  - Task Force on American Indian Concerns: \$173.50 for conference on "Cross-Cultural Conflict as it relates to Indian and Non-Indian Values".

#### Lenoir-Rhyne College

Lenoir-Rhyne College has entered a new decade — 1980s — with a renewed sense of its mission as a college of the church. The College continues to strive for excellence in all programs while, at the same time, it is broadening areas of service.

Bolstered by the successful completion of the Strategy for the Seventies longrange plan, Lenoir-Rhyne is looking to the future with some optimism. The decline in students of traditional college age will hopefully be offset by new programs which meet the needs of other age groups, and cautious fiscal management will ward off, to some extent, the ravaging effects of exploding energy costs and general inflation.

Lenoir-Rhyne has adopted new planning strategies for the 1980s which call for annual review of five-year projections. The College feels that long-range planning is essential to the survival and well being of the institution but that frequent review of progress is necessary in the face of the effects on the College of our rapidly changing economy and world situation.

The 1980 fall enrollment defied, to an extent, the gloomy forecast for small private colleges. Lenoir-Rhyne opened its doors to 1,386 students, the second highest enrollment in its history. As the reference above hinted, however, a significant portion of this total consisted of non-traditional college students. More than 200 students were part-time, 68 of whom were enrolled in one of Lenoir-Rhyne's newest programs — the graduate program in education.

June 1980, marked the beginning of this exciting new educational thrust for Lenoir-Rhyne. Taking maximum loads of six semester hours during each of four summer sessions (over a two-year period) and during the intervening fall and spring semesters allows the highly-motivated graduate student to complete his or her degree in just 14 months while maintaining full employment as a teacher. As last year's plans projected, the Master of Arts degree can now be offered in early childhood, intermediate and hearing-impaired education. Accreditation by the Southern Association of Schools and Colleges is pending. Continued success in the program could pave the way to additional areas of graduate study.

Another innovation at Lenoir-Rhyne designed for the non-traditional student is "T'N'T". This jaunty nickname refers to the "Tuesday and Thursday accelerated degree program", an evening college for working adults. Five eight-week mini-terms during the calendar year allow the degree candidate to complete his or her course in just a little over four years. Two courses per term constitute a full load, and majors are offered in business administration, education, and psychology. As the name of

the program indicates, classes are scheduled for Tuesday and Thursday evenings, after regular working hours.

Spring of 1980 offered a challenge to which Lenoir-Rhyne faculty and staff members are diligently responding. Time for regular re-accreditation has arrived, as it does every ten years. This year the new graduate school will apply for accreditation at the same time the general program seeks renewal.

Under the chairmanship of the vice president for academic affairs, Dr. Arthur E. Puotinen, a steering committee was organized last spring to begin the necessary self-study prior to the visiting accreditation team's appearance on the campus in March, 1982.

In addition to the steering committee, eleven standards committees have been formed to study the whole range of College operations. Each committee is composed of five to seven faculty members, a student representative and several resource persons from the College community who fit each area of expertise. The Board of Trustees will review the self-study as part of its summer retreat.

As one year closes and another begins, Lenoir-Rhyne continues to make progress and to adjust its traditional objectives to the ever-changing present. The College is committed to opening its doors to increasing numbers of people while at the same time maintaining its standards of excellence and safeguarding its strengths.

**Enrollment and Degrees:** Registration for the fall semester or 1980 was 1,386 undergraduates, up 95 from last year, and 68 graduate students.

The College awarded 274 bachelor's degrees at its graduation exercises on May 4 and August 15, 1980. Preacher for the Baccalaureate service was the Rev. Mr. Louis V. Rogers, former chaplain at Lenoir-Rhyne. Graduation speaker was Mr. Sydney J. Harris, nationally syndicated columnist. Honorary degrees were awarded to Mr. Harris; the Rev. Mr. David F. Johnson, regional secretary, LCA Board of Missions; the Rev. Mr. C. Ross Ritchie, Jr., pastor, Augsburg Lutheran Church, Winston-Salem, N.C. The first Trustee Awards, in recognition of service to the institution, were presented to Mr. Charles D. Dixon, a Hickory attorney; Mr. Robert R. Rhyne, Sr., vice president, Vinson Realty, Charlotte, N.C.; and Dr. Voldemars of Bernards, retired associate professor of Classics, German and Russian at Lenoir-Rhyne.

Staff: In September, 1980, Dr. Paul Kercher resigned as Vice President for Development to open his own consultancy service. The position is still vacant, but a search committee is working on selecting a new Vice President.

As Mr. Harry S. Livengood prepares for retirement from Lenoir-Rhyne after 22 years of service to the institution, Mr. Jeff L. Norris moves into the business office as Vice President for Administration and Finance, and Treasurer Mr. Livengood continues to work at the College on a part-time basis.

With a deep sense of loss, the College notes the death of Dr. Voigt R. Cromer, president emeritus of Lenoir-Rhyne College, on May 31, 1980, in his home. Funeral services were held on June 2 at St. Andrew's Lutheran Church, Hickory, and burial at Hollybrook Cemetery in Lincolnton.

Governing and Advisory Boards: The Board of Trustees held regular meetings on November 21, 1980, and March 27, 1981, and conducted a two-day seminar on the campus August 12-13. On November 1, 1980, the Board met in a special joint session with the Development Board; at that time the boards were informed of a \$500,000 challenge gift for a new academic complex on campus. Current officers of the Board are David W. Hoyle, chairman; Dr. Paul E. Lutz, vice chairman; Dr. Albert H. Keck, Jr., secretary; the Rev. C. Peter Setzer, assistant secretary; and Walter S. Lineberger, treasurer.

The Development Board held meetings on November 1, 1980, and March 21, 1981. The following persons have accepted membership on the board since the last convention of the Synod: Hugh G. Ashcraft, Jr., Charlotte; T. Cass Ballenger, Hickory; Thomas W. Borland, Salisbury; Weston P. Hatifeld, Winston-Salem; J. Russell Helderman, Albemarle; G. Leroy Lail, Hickory; and Daniel C. Long, Newton.

Trustee Nominations: In accordance with Section VII, B, 2 of the Bylaws of the

Synod, the Board of Trustees has placed in nomination: Miss Sandy Keiser and Mr. Harry Heltzer, for election to the Board of Trustees for three-year terms expiring in 1984. Miss Keiser is Concert/Arena Manager at Southwest Missouri State University in Springfield, Missouri, and Mr. Heltzer is retired 3M executive now living in Lenoir.

#### LENOIR-RHYNE COLLEGE NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS May 31, 1980 and 1979

#### Note 1 - Summary of Significant Accounting Policies:

ACCRUAL BASIS — The financial statements of Lenoir-Rhyne College have been prepared on the accrual basis except for depreciation accounting as explained subsequently in this note. The statement of current funds revenues, expenditures and other changes is a statement of financial activities of current funds related to the current reporting period. It does not purport to present the results of operations nor the net income or loss for the period as would a statement of income or a statement of revenues and expenses.

To the extent that current funds are used to finance plant assets, the amounts so provided are accounted for as (1) expenditures, in the case of normal replacement of movable equipment and library books; (2) mandatory transfers, in the case of required provisions for debt amortization and interest and equipment renewal and replacement; and (3) as transfers of a nonmandatory nature in all other cases.

FUND ACCOUNTING — In order to ensure observance of limitations and restrictions placed on the use of the resources available to the College, the accounts of the College are maintained in accordance with the principles of "fund accounting". This is the procedure by which resources for various purposes are classified for accounting and reporting purposes into funds that are in accordance with activities or objectives specified. Separate accounts are maintained for each fund; however, in the accompanying financial statements, funds that have similar characteristics have been combined into fund groups. Accordingly, all financial transactions have been recorded and reported by fund group.

Within each fund group, fund balances restricted by outside sources are so indicated and are distinguished from unrestricted funds allocated to specific purposes by action of the Board of Trustees. Externally restricted funds may only be utilized in accordance with the purposes established by the source of such funds and are in contrast with unrestricted funds over which the Board of Trustees retains full control to use in achieving any of its institutional purposes.

Endowment funds are subject to the restrictions of gift instruments requiring in perpetuity that principal be invested and only income be utilized. Although quasi-endowment funds may be established by the Board of Trustees for the same purposes as endowment funds, any portion of quasi-endowment funds may be expended.

All gains and losses arising from the sale, collection or other disposition of investments and other noncash assets are accounted for in the fund which owned such assets. Ordinary income derived from investments, receivables and the like is accounted for in the fund owning such assets, except that income derived from investments of endowment and similar funds is accounted for in the fund to which it is restricted or, if unrestricted, as revenues in unrestricted current funds.

All other unrestricted revenue is accounted for in the unrestricted current fund. Restricted gifts, grants, appropriations, endowment income and other restricted resources are accounted for in the appropriate restricted funds. Restricted current funds are reported as revenues and expenditures when expended for current operating purposes.

INVESTMENTS — Investments exclusive of physical plant are valued at cost or at fair market value at date received from donated investments. The College receives all earnings of the Martin Luther Stevens Memorial Trust, the assets of which are not included with those of the College.

RECEIVABLES — Accounts, notes and pledges receivable are charged-off as they are deemed to be uncollectible. An allowance for uncollectible pledges of 25% of the uncollected pledges at the end of the fiscal period is reflected in the financial statements. The allowance is considered to be a best estimate based on historical loss. In addition, an allowance for doubtful NDSL loans has been established for the current year and is based on the historical default rate of the College.

INVENTORY VALUATION — Inventories are stated at the lower of cost (first-in, first-out method) or market. Market is considered as net realizable value.

PROPERTY AND PLANT — Property and plant are stated at appraised value for acquisitions prior to 1958 and at cost for all other acquisitions; deferred costs of proposed building projects are stated at cost and donated items are carried on the books at fair market value as of the date received. The College makes no provision for depreciation on campus improvements, buildings and equipment. Disposals normally are not removed from the accounts, except for material items

AGENCY FUNDS — Effective with the year ended May 31, 1980, the College has elected to treat as current fund revenues and expenditures amounts received from federal and state agencies and designated for the benefit of specified students. In prior years, such funds were treated as agency funds. The May 31, 1979 financial statements have been restated in the same manner for comparability purposes. This restatement had no material effect on the May 31, 1979 financial statements.

#### Note 7 - Retirement Plans:

The College participates in Teachers' Insurance and Annuity Association Contributory Retirement Plan for professional, administrative and clerical personnel. The plan contains no provision for past service benefits and the College assumes no further liability beyond the periodic contributions for each participating employee. There are several small pension plans for ministers and nonacademic employees to which the College makes periodic contributions to the extent of any liability. Total pension expense amounted to \$139,354 in 1980 and \$138,416 in 1970

#### Note 8 - Interfund Borrowings:

The liabilities created by interfund borrowings are payable within one year without interest.

#### Note 9 — Construction in Progress:

Contracts were let in 1977 for the construction of the Shuford Memorial Physical Education Center. Construction began in June 1977 and was completed during the current year. The total cost of completing the project was \$1,925,408.

#### Note 10 - Other Matters:

Quasi-endowment funds, by definition, are internally designated by the Board of Trustees, rather than externally restricted by the donor. Consequently, the Board has the right to decide at any time to expend the principal to help meet costs.

#### North Carolina Lutheran Homes, Inc.

#### THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES

The Board of Trustees met in regular quarterly sessions, including a 24-hour conference retreat at Lutheridge. The Executive Committee met once.

At the annual meeting of the Board on June 10, Dr. Marshall E. Agner was elected President, Mr. Oren L. Cline, Vice President, and The Reverend Donald R. Safrit, Secretary. Mr. Joe A. Moretz was re-elected Treasurer. Dr. Agner succeeds Mr. H. D. Fry, Jr., who had served on the Board for 18 years, half of them as President. Both Fry and The Reverend Ernest W. Ridenhour had served the maximum number of terms on the Board and were not eligible for re-election. The Reverend Floyd W. Bost resigned in order to accept election to the Synod's Executive Board, which appointed The Reverend Donald Deal to complete his unexpired term.

Continued strengthening of the staff has been a major concern of the Board. The job description of Management Coordinator was re-written to become Assistant to the Executive Director, making it more functional. In response to repeated recommendations from the auditors, Rink and Robinson, as well as the conclusion reached by a special study of the financial structure of Lutheran Homes conducted by Grisette and Company, the Board created the position of Fiscal Manager last spring. More recently, the Board acted to go into the "Administrator-in-Training" program in order to provide a licensed nursing home administrator trained within the Lutheran Homes structure. Both of these positions should be filled by May 1, 1981.

In October, Miss Kelley Beaver became secretary to the Executive Director, succeeding Mrs. Lou Ann Roy, who moved out of the Salisbury area.

On February 28, 1981, Mr. John C. Southern resigned as Administrator of the Salisbury Unit, effective April 30, for reasons of health. Trained and licensed in 1977, he had served as Administrator since January 1978. Last June Mr. Southern suffered a heart attack. After recuperating he returned to his post in late September, where he had remained until resigning. The Board will act on the resignation at its March 17 meeting and may name a successor at that time.

It might be observed that management has been "kept in stitches" for much of the past year; in addition to the illness of Administrator Southern referred to above, Management Coordinator Job Kistler, Administrator Isaac Kuhn, and the Executive Director all underwent surgery during the past twelve months.

In December the Corporate office was moved from one of the apartments in the Salisbury Unit to a private residence owned by Lutheran Homes. The dwelling at 720 Klumac Road, renting for \$175 per month, was renovated at a cost of approximately \$16,000, freeing up the one-bedroom apartment for occupancy at an initial subscription price of \$19,500 and renting for \$295 per month. The new location provides much-needed additional offices, adequate work area, more parking space, and a conference room.

Two bequests were received during the year. Mr. Weldon W. Newman of Conover left most of his estate (about \$98,000) to the Hickory Unit. Miss Maude Powlas of Cleveland, North Carolina, remembered the Salisbury Unit in her will. The amount of this bequest is not known at this time, as the will is in the process of being settled.

#### THE FINANCIAL OUTLOOK

A casual glance at the audit report for Fiscal Year 1980 indicates that the overall change in the financial status of North Carolina Lutheran Homes was minimal, with a decrease of \$34,096; but this does not reveal the critical loss of undesignated funds from the corporate treasury. During the twelve-month period from October 1979 through September 1980, it was necessary to supplement the operating budgets of the three Homes by \$270,052. Since this represents excess expenses over income, there is no possibility of recovering this money.

In the past, undesignated funds have been reserved for capital improvements, using only small amounts occasionally for contingencies. But with operating costs of nursing homes mushrooming the past two years, it has become necessary to draw large amounts of money from the corporate treasury to supplement current operating expenses of our Homes in order to maintain our customary level of high quality care

for older persons. The result is that the undesignated funds, which exceeded \$400,000 two years ago, have been depleted to approximately \$100,000, and can no longer be relied upon for either capital improvements or for subsidizing operating expenses. It also means that essential upgrading of facilities must be postponed, and unit operating budgets must be cut back to fit into income.

Historically, the prime concern of North Carolina Lutheran Homes has been to provide the highest possible caliber of care in a Christian environment, with the cost of providing this care being a secondary consideration. But with continued depletion of reserve funds, it has now become necessary to alter the prime objective to say, "Lutheran Homes will provide the best care possible, limited only to the extent that financial resources are available."

Steps have been taken to achieve a balanced budget by the end of Fiscal Year 1982. During the current year which ends in September 1981, the Hickory Unit is operating on a balanced budget, and Albemarle, with some assistance from the Efird Endowment, expects to break even also. The Salisbury Unit anticipates a deficit of \$99,000, which will be subsidized by the \$20,000 Michael Peeler grant from Synod and approximately \$13,000 from memorial gifts designated for the Unit. The remainder will have to be raised by the Executive Director's Office through interested persons and concerns in the Salisbury area. The deficit of the Salisbury Unit would have been much larger, but was reduced considerably by cutting back staff by 9.2 positions. Further cuts in staff may be necessary to achieve a balanced budget at this Unit by next year. Our concern here is that cuts in staff may result in reduced services and quality of care for residents.

#### HICKORY UNIT RENOVATION

Plans for the renovation of the Hickory Unit were described in last year's annual report. State approval was slower than expected, preventing letting the project for bids until November. Groundbreaking was held Sunday afternoon, December 7, 1980. Anticipated date of completion is March 1982.

Costs exceeded estimates by \$240,703, forcing cancellation of plans to add a chapel and crafts wing. The project now consists of enlarging the present dining room, relocating and enlarging the kitchen, constructing a new laundry unit, providing eight private rooms, and the addition of a multi-purpose room, office space, storage area, and installation of a complete sprinkler system, at a cost of \$787,184. With approximately \$488,000 on hand or assured, this leaves almost \$300,000 to be raised through individual gifts — or borrowed at 14% interest.

The Hickory Development Group, appointed by the Board of Trustees, is assisting the Executive Director in the soliciting of funds, which must be done on an individual, informal basis. Members of the group are: J. Allen Arndt, C. Eugene Bowman, Mrs. Elsie Deaton, Forrest E. Drum, H. D. Fry, Jr., Mrs. Callie Gregory, Leroy Lail, Loyd Mullinax, Jeff Norris, Auburn L. Poovey, Wilbert W. Seabock, Mrs. Mary Thuesen, and Jackie Dietz. The Ex-Officio members of this group are Oren L. Cline, Joe A. Moretz, and Isaac F. Kuhn, Administrator of the Hickory Unit.

#### PROPOSED ALBEMARLE UNIT EXPANSION

Looking ahead to construction of a rest home wing at Albemarle, the Board has begun the formation of a Development Group similar to the one at the Hickory Unit. Members already named are: Pritchard Dennis, James W. Morgan, and J. Russell Helderman. Ex-Officio members are: Board Pesident Marshall E. Agner, Charles P. Brown, and Pastor Mark C. Johnson, Administrator of the Albemarle Unit. Projections indicate that a 16-bed wing would cost approximately \$300,000. It is expected that this expansion program will begin just as soon as sufficient funds are on hand or assured.

Administrator Johnson reports that significant events for the residents included a beauty pageant, a picnic, a Halloween carnival, and interdenominational Lenten services. New Director of Nursing is Ms. Kaye McAlister.

#### SALISBURY UNIT

A. Job Kistler is serving as Acting Administrator of the Salisbury Unit, pending Board action on a successor to John C. Southern.

#### PERSONNEL ACTIONS

At its regular quarterly meeting March 17, 1981, the Board of Trustees took a number of important steps regarding personnel matters:

- (1) Appointment of Fiscal Manager. Ronald L. Bowman of Taylorsville was employed as Fiscal Manager effective May 1, 1981. A certified public accountant, he has been with the firm of Rink and Robinson in Hickory for twelve years, and has been responsible for the annual audit of Lutheran Homes for the past eight years.
- (2) Selection of Administrator-in-Training. Ted W. Goins, Jr., was selected from twelve applicants for the position, subject to the approval of the State Board of Nursing Home Examiners. Mr. Goins will receive on-the-job training for approximately one year at the Salisbury Unit beginning June 1 under the guidance of Administrator Isaac F. Kuhn, a certified nursing home preceptor.
- (3) Filling the vacancy at Salisbury. Isaac F. Kuhn, who has been administrator of the Hickory Unit for sixteen years, has been named Administrator of the Salisbury Unit, filling the vacancy created by the resignation of John C. Southern. Mr. Kuhn will assume his new responsibilities at the Salisbury Unit, the newest and largest of our three Homes, on May 4, 1981. During his tenure of office at Hickory, he led that Unit through two expansion programs which increased the bed capacity from 43 to 80, and initiated the current renovation program there.
- (4) Appointment of administrator for Hickory. The Reverend Mark C. Johnson, who had been Administrator of the Albemarle Unit since January 1980, was named to succeed Mr. Kuhn at the Hickory Unit. It is expected that he will transfer to the post at Hickory by June 1, 1981.
- (5) Recruitment of a licensed administrator at Albemarle. The Board is actively seeking a competent, licensed administrator, preferably one with experience, to fill the impending vacancy at Albemarle. It is hoped that a long vacancy can be avoided. Candidates are being screened by the Executive Director's Office, and the Personnel Committee will make recommendations to the Board based on its findings.

To be a licensed nursing home administrator in North Carolina, one must have completed a minimum of two years' college level study, and have successfully completed the administrator-in-training program and passed the State Board Exam.

#### ADMISSIONS POLICY AND REQUEST TO THE SOCIAL MINISTRY COMMITTEE

Also at the March 17 meeting, the Board of Trustees requested the Social Ministry Committee of Synod to conduct a study of the need for long-term care facilities for persons who are not elderly.

In presenting the reasons for this request to the Social Ministry Committee, the Board stated:

"For several years it has been the stated policy of North Carolina Lutheran

Homes to decline the admission of other than elderly persons who are victims of accident, stroke, or who are mentally retarded, psychotic, or terminally ill. At one time, when Lutheran Homes was in a state of growth, the Board of Trustees did accept several such unusual cases. But we are no longer expanding our facilities, while the elderly population is increasing rapidly (38 percent faster than the State's population as a whole), creating mounting pressures on North Carolina Lutheran Homes to serve those older adults already on our approved waiting list, only 20 percent of whom can ever hope to be accommodated. At the present time, we have 244 beds, and we operate at full capacity; yet we have 256 active approved applications on hand, with another 141 approved contingent applications.

"Those few exceptional cases which have been admitted in the past have clearly demonstrated that North Carolina Lutheran Homes cannot adequately care for them. Geriatric institutions are geared to custodial care, and they are not equipped for providing the intensive level of nursing care required, nor do they have the rehabilitative equipment and life support systems frequently necessary for caring for these special cases. Among those patients who are aware of their surroundings, serious social adjustment problems usually arise, with detrimental effects on both the special person and the older resident whose environment he has invaded.

"In addition to these practical and psychosocial problems, there is also the economic factor. With the life expectancy in many instances of several decades, and with most of these cases underwritten by the federal Medicaid program — which usually does not pay the full cost of care — each such admission obligates the admitting institution to a long-term deficit of thousands of dollars.

"In the last eighteen months, the Admissions Committee has received and reviewed in depth nine of these "special" cases, ranging in age from 20 to 37 years, plus a terminally ill two-year-old child. The Committee, while sympathetic with the plight of the applicants, felt it necessary to decline all of these applications, and in each case the Board of Trustees accepted the Committee's recommendations. Lutheran Homes is beginning to receive such applications with increasing frequency, and efforts to suggest suitable alternatives to pastors and the families caught up in these tragic circumstances only magnify the problem, for our experience indicates there are presently no existing facilities in the State appropriately equipped and structured to serve this specific category of patient. The increasing frustration on the part of professionals in the service delivery field, coupled with the agony of the families and loved ones involved, behooves the Church to investigate this area of human need and either take steps to meet that need itself or, if it is beyond the capability of the Church, to seek to motivate other sectors of our society — especially government and private interests — to step in and fill the gap."

The request, as approved by the Social Ministry Committee at its meeting April 9, 1981, is: "The Board of Trustees of North Carolina Lutheran Homes, Incorporated, requests the Social Ministry Committee of the North Carolina Synod of the Lutheran Church in America to conduct a thorough study of the need for long-term care facilities that are adequately equipped to serve physically incapacitated persons between the ages of 16 and 59 years who require more than the normal custodial level of care which is provided by nursing homes for the aged.

Examples of persons in this category include:

- (1) Victims of accidents who have suffered irreversible brain damage leaving them paraplegic or in a comatose or vegetative state;
- (2) Victims of stroke who have been left paralyzed and helpless, unable to control bodily functions and or to communicate with others;
- (3) Victims of diseases or disorders such as multiple sclerosis and cerebral palsy which have invalided them and confined them to bed or wheelchair, but whose awareness of surroundings is such that a nursing home for the aged is a totally inappropriate environment;
- (4) Younger persons who are mentally retarded, psychotic, or terminally ill.

This study, while not limited to the following, is requested to include:

 A reasonable accurate determination of the location of facilities and the total number of beds presently in existence in the State of North Carolina, either in nursing homes or hospitals, special-care wings of health service institutions, or free standing special units, which have the capability of providing the intensive level of care necessary to sustain life within a minimum of discomfort to the patient.

- (2) Ascertaining the type, design, and equipment of facility and staffing pattern required for performing this level of long-term care, including daily cost of care.
- (3) Establishing the urgency and extent of need for this kind of facility.
- (4) Identifying possible sources of funding and other kinds of assistance available for the establishment and operation of such a special-care institution, and what portion of costs could expect to be underwritten by these sources.
- (5) Determining the feasibility of the North Carolina Synod's going into this area of social ministry service; and if so, how this might be accomplished.

The Social Ministry Committee is further requested to report its findings to the Executive Board of the North Carolina Synod of the Lutheran Church in America, along with recommendations based on those findings, by December 31, 1982.' "

#### **ADDITIONAL ACTIONS**

The Board has requested permission of Synod to proceed with the construction of the rest home wing at Albemarle "at such time as it is economically feasible."

As Treasurer Joe A. Moretz leaves office at the end of Synod Convention, the Board authorized President Marshal Agner to appoint an acting treasurer until the Board's annual meeting June 9, 1981. Dr. Agner has appointed Joe L. Bookout to serve in this capacity.

#### SETTLEMENT OF NEWMAN ESTATE

The bequest of Weldon W. Newman of Conover, mentioned earlier, has just been settled, and Executor Jesse Sigmon reports that the total to be received by Lutheran Homes is \$100,275. This is the largest bequest ever received by the Hickory Unit, exceeding by several hundred dollars the bequest of Mrs. Maud Plonk. Mr. Newman, who died at the Hickory Unit early in 1980, was a retired employee of Duke Power and a charter member of Faith Church in Conover.

#### PRESIDENT OF NURSING HOMES ASSOCIATION

For the past two years, A. Job Kistler, Assistant to the Executive Director, has been serving as President of the Greater Carolinas Association of Non-Profit Homes for the Aging. During his term of office, the organization has divided into two separate groups along state lines. His leadership paved the way for a smooth transition, and through his efforts the North Carolina Association is in the process of becoming incorporated.

- The note receivable of \$8,759.16 arose as a result of the sale of real estate and is secured by deed of trust.
   The note is payable \$109.00 monthly including interest at 8%.
- Inventories are valued at the lower of cost, based on the first-in, first-out method or market. Included in the
  inventories are food, drugs, medical supplies, fuel oil and housekeeping supplies.
- Plant and Equipment are stated at original acquisition cost, or fair market value if donated, less accumulated depreciation. Depreciation is charged against current operations and is included in the cost of care expense for reimbursement by the Medicaid and Medicare Programs.

- 6. In March of 1978, Dr. Samuel Waightstill Hahn and Doris Becker Hahn conveyed their right to and interest in a piece of property located in Hickory, North Carolina to the North Carolina Lutheran Homes. This conveyance was made subject to a life estate whereby the donors shall retain the right to the income from their interest in this property. The property has been recorded at \$10,050.00 which represents its fair market value as of the date of the clift.
- The mortgage fee was paid to Wachovia Mortgage Company to obtain permanent financing for the Salisbury Unit. This fee is being amortized over a 23 year period.
- 8. During 1977, the apartments located at the Salisbury Unit opened for occupancy. Each apartment resident was charged an initial fee of \$14,000.00 for one-bedroom apartments and \$18,000 for two-bedroom apartments. Upon withdrawal of a resident during the first year, the resident will be refunded 85% of the initial fee. In the case of death during the first year, 50% of the initial fee will be refunded to the resident's estate. After twelve months of residency, the fee is refundable on a declining equity of 10% per year. At September 30, 1980, \$113,900.00 of initial fees may be refundable, consequently, this amount is reported as deferred income.
  - In addition to the initial occupancy fee, the residents pay a monthly rental fee of \$175.00 for one-bedroom apartments and \$260.00 for two-bedroom apartments.
- 9. The mortgage is payable to Western-Southern Life Insurance Company and is due monthly with interest at 8.35% per annum. The Health, Education, and Welfare Department, a governmental agency, shares in the interest at 3% leaving 5.35% payable by the North Carolina Lutheran Homes, Inc.
- The principal of the John A. Pless Memorial Endowment Fund consists solely of cash and is to remain intact. Income from the fund is to be used to subsidize the cost of care of any needy resident of the North Carolina Lutheran Homes, Inc.
- 11. The Judge Oscar Ogburn Efird Endowment Fund consists of cash and securities and is administered by the Trust Department of North Carolina National Bank in Charlotte, North Carolina on the cash basis. The cash basis of accounting is a departure from generally accepted accounting principles. The effect upon the financial statements of this departure is not considered material.

The principal of the Judge Oscar Ogburn Efird Endowment Fund is to remain intact and income from the fund is to be used for the benefit of the Albemarle Unit with first preference given to any member of the Efird family.

- Contingencies Maude Plonk died in July, 1978 bequeathing \$100,000 to the Hickory Unit of the North Carolina Lutheran Homes, Inc. The bequest is pending based upon the settlement of the deceased's estate.
  - W. W.Newman bequeathed approximately \$75,000 to the Hickory Unit. At September 30, 1980, \$50,000 had been received with the approximate balance of \$25,000 contingent upon the settlement of the deceased's estate.
- Contractual adjustment represents the difference between customary charges made to Medicaid and Medicare residents and the amount reimbursed by Medicaid and Medicare.

If more congregations of our synod would support this worthwhile work, more members of our synod would get to know overseas missionaries and understand their work.

# Lutheran Family Services in North Carolina

1980 was a year of transition for Lutheran Family Services. Ownership transfer was completed on January 1, 1981 from the Lutheran Children's Home of the South to Lutheran Family Services in North Carolina, Inc. A new charter and by-laws were written and a new Board of Directors were elected. The new board took office on January 1, and will serve until the 1981 North Carolina Synod Convention.

Much energy and attention was contributed to the transfer process but the program of services to families and children continued to improve and grow.

The ninth group home for children was opened in December in Chapel Hill, giving us a daily group home capacity of forty-five. Through these nine homes we were able to serve over two hundred children. Our foster care program in Mecklenburg County continued to grow and we moved nearer our goal of twenty foster homes, using mostly Lutheran families. To date we have served over 500 children and young people in our program.

Through the efforts of the Pastors in the Triad area we were able to open our first family counseling education and enrichment office called Triad Lutheran Center (TLC).

Although the number of refugee sponsorships decreased in 1980, our efforts were greater than in years past. We added services to Cuban and Haitian families and in December we began a program that will establish thirty foster homes for Indochinese children.

Officers for our first year of operation included: Mr. Larry Parrish, President, The Rev. Glenn Boland, Vice-President, Mr. Allen Holderman, Treasurer and Mrs. Joan Lee, Secretary.

We look forward to improving and expanding our services in 1981. We are excited about the opportunity to serve North Carolina families and children in the Name of our Lord.

#### Lutheran Church Women

Lutheran Church Women in North Carolina strives to fulfill the purpose of the auxiliary: to be a community of women which, in response to the Holy Spirit, engages in the mission of proclamation and reconciliation through its life and work and through the life and work of the Lutheran Church in America. This newly stated purpose and the accompanying program planning structure has permeated our work since last summer when approximately 75 women from North Carolina attended the Seventh Triennial Convention of the Auxiliary in Atlanta, Georgia, August 11-15, 1980.

In joyful response and in recognition of 100 years of women's work in the church, the women of this Synod gave a Centennial Offering of \$11,324.94. This figure was given a boost by the unexpected gift of \$5,000.00 by Mrs. W. B. Aull in celebration of her 100th birthday in early 1981. Mrs. Aull has been active for many years both in LCW and in LCW's predecessor organizations.

The special joy and privilege of the North Carolina Unit was to be hostess to nine international guests during the five days following the Atlanta Convention. These

nine women are leaders in their churches at home and shared their experiences with individuals and church groups in our synod. Through this experience we were led to understand how the church is a worldwide community.

The goals and activities of Lutheran Church Women is organized in a structure of six (6) Functions which allows us to develop our program in a holistic manner. Following are the Functions with a reporting of our activities in each:

#### FUNCTION I - Spiritual Growth

Using the theme "Christian Women's Outlook: Personal Enrichment", 32 women attended a spiritual renewal retreat at Camp Agape September 19-21, 1980. Two simultaneous retreats will be held in September 1981 at Lutheridge and Camp Agape. Bible Studies, "Books of Beginnings: Studies in Genesis and Acts", and Prayer at Pentecost programs, "The Church In Your House", also are held.

#### FUNCTION II - Mission Education

Regular programs focusing on issues most relative to Christian women in the 80s are used by many in LCW. In addition, we continue to communicate and support missionaries assigned to us by the church. Our special privilege this year has been to learn from Missionaries-In-Residence, the Rev. and Mrs. David Eichner, who presented their work at our Fall District Assemblies. They also have been invited to visit many Congregational Organizations.

#### FUNCTION III — Personal Growth and Relationships

Through workshops, speakers, and regular programming, LCW continues to focus on affirming the self-worth of the individual woman and helping her to relate this and her faith to the family in whatever form that takes. LCW is interested in developing those resources that are needed to meet all related concerns.

#### FUNCTION IV — Justice and Outreach

Even though the priority concerns for the next triennium and literacy and economic justice, the North Carolina Unit understands that many other issues are equally important and directly related to these two emphases. Therefore, the Unit will continue to be involved in a wide range of concerns: juvenile justice, support of the Lutheran Homes and Lutheran Family Services, aging, women's issues, child abuse and neglect, and the concerns of the disabled. This last concern will be the focus of this year's Unit Convention at Lenoir-Rhyne College, May 29-31. Highlighting the UN International Year of the Disabled Person and under the banner of "Reach Out In Love", featured speakers will be Mrs. Ruth Youngdahl Nelson, noted speaker and author, and Dr. Robert Stackel, former Director of the World Hunger Appeal.

#### FUNCTION V — Ecumenical Relationships

The Unit is supportive of Church Women United and encourages LCW members to become active. We continue to seek ways to cooperate and share our spiritual renewal and leadership training events with the members of American Lutheran Church Women and Lutheran Women's Missionary League.

#### FUNCTION VI — Organizational Support and Renewal

On the Saturdays of October 1980 seven District Assemblies held their Fall Meetings. Using the theme "Lutheran Church Women in the Eighties", 878 women heard the challenges presented to them by Delegates to the Atlanta Convention and by Carol and David Eichner (referred to above). Possibly our most successful training event ever occured in November when 111 presidents representing that many Congregational Organizations attended 7 weekend retreats. These received ex-

tremely high marks. Fifteen (15) Spring Fellowships were held between April 4 and May 2. The theme was "Circles of Love". In addition to these meetings communication with the membership is maintained through the Unit newspaper, "Care-O-Lines", a calendar of events, "Happenings", and periodical bulk mailings. In 1980 Lutheran Church Women in North Carolina gave a mighty response to God for His many generous gifts. Through offerings they gave \$3,186.28 in excess of the budgeted amount for a total of \$108,436.22. More than \$124,000.00 was received and disbursed during that fiscal year. The Unit will continue to work with Congregational Organizations needing special assistance and with those new congregations being developed.

On behalf of the 9,190 members of the North Carolina Lutheran Church Women in 204 Congregational Organizations, the Officers and Executive Board thank the Synod, Bishop Misenheimer and his staff, the Synodical Executive Board, the support staff at the Church House, and countless others in the Synod, both clergy and lay, for their support and encouragement as we seek to do God's will, led by the Holy Spirit.

We invite all women in the Synod to join with us as we strive to be a community where each woman can grow in her faith and in her response to our Lord.

#### North Carolina Lutheran Men

The men's auxiliary of the synod under the supervision of the Project Directors has been active in the promotion of various projects that have claimed the attention of the organization over the years, together with emphasis on current needs as they arise.

The Camping program under the direction of David Fleming and Carl Webb keeps before the synod's constituency the many opportunities that are available both to individuals and groups.

V. J. Vierling as Director of Campus Communications keeps in close contact with pastors in an effort to secure names of students attending the various institutions and supplies Campus Pastors, Chaplains and Pastors in the area, with these names in order that the church may minister to students while away from home.

Promotion and Development is under the direction of Elbert McCray and Elbert Bowman. They are continually seeking to promote the organization of Lutheran Men's units throughout the synod. At the end of 1981 there were 84 chartered units out of 211 congregations of the synod. This may sound like a small number in comparison with the number of congregations, but only a few years ago there were just 39 chartered units.

The Loan And Gift Fund Directors are George Page and Otho Moose, through their efforts and the cooperation of many people in the synod, the Loan and Gift Fund increased by \$35,915.10 during 1980, with \$9,408.78 having been designated for the amortization of our indebtedness on the Retreat Center at Agape Camp. The following loans were made during 1980. Holy Cross, Mocksville — \$17,000.00, Shepherd of the Hills, Sylva — \$75,000.00. Other loans made since the synodical convention were Community in Christ, Huntersville — \$75,000.00 and St. Philip, Raleigh — \$125,000.00. Two challenge gifts of \$500.00 each were given to Messiah, Burlington and Christ, Elkin, provided by Faith, Faith and Friendship, Taylorsville. Both congregations met the challenge by raising a like amount and the total in each case was paid on their first mortgage held by the Home Mission Program of the church by making it possible for mission congregations to secure low interest loans.

The Scouting program under the Director Elmer Barnhardt reaches into all parts of the state and provides exciting advantages to many of our youth. Two retreats were held during the year, one at Agape Camp and the other at Lutheridge.

The records of the activities of Lutheran Men are cared for by Ray Cline, Archivist, so that the history of the organization may be preserved for posterity.

Youth Work is under the direction of Brad Schiele who seeks to coordinate the efforts of Lutheran Men with the Youth Committee of synod.

Some of the highlights of the year that deserve mention were: The Annual Convention held Saturday, November 8 at St. John's, Concord, using as the theme "Confessing Christians Today". Both the business session and the banquet which followed at Mt. Pleasant High School Cafeteria emphasized that "Confessing Christ" demands doing the work of the Lord and not sire ply talking about it. The banquet at 6:00 p.m. featured Dr. Michael McDaniel as speaker. The offering received in the church banks during the banquet was \$8,271.47. More than 300 were in attendance.

The Annual Lutheran Men's Retreat held each year at Lutheridge the week-end following Easter, was a week-end filled with inspiration and challenge. The 1980 Retreat had as the leader Dr. Benjamin Bedenbaugh, from Southern Seminary, and the 1981 Retreat had Dr. Robert Stackel as speaker. Men and wives left the mountain top renewed in body and soul.

Lutheran Men were host to a dinner for Mission Pastors and wives during the 1980 convention of synod at Mt. Olive, Hickory, with the ladies of the church serving the meal, there were more than 75 present.

In connection with the synod orientation program for Professional Workers entering the synod during the year, Lutheran Men hosted a dinner at Haven, Salisbury and used the hour following to acquaint the new-comers with the work of Lutheran Men and supplied them with helpful material explaining the auxiliary.

Program packets containing 12 suggested programs have been sent to all congregations in the synod. The Retreat Center at Agape now has more than 50 blankets given by various individuals and congregations. Our Speaker Bureau has supplied speakers throughout the synod all during the year and assisted pastors by filling pulpits during the Synodical and LCA Conventions.

We regret that Derwood Bost, who has served as Treasurer of the Loan and Gift Fund for more than 19 years, felt it necessary to resign from this post due to additional responsibilities in connection with his recent promotion as Vice-President of Cannon Mills. We are grateful to him for his faithful service through the years in taking care of the various contributions to the Loan and Gift Fund. His resignation was accepted with regrets.

Don Wagstaff, Jr. was elected Treasurer. His address is P.O. Box 1357, Concord, N.C. 28025. Otho Moose was elected assistant Treasurer. His address is P.O. Box 166. Faith, N.C. 28041.

We strongly urge congregations that do not have Lutheran Men units to look with favor on the organization of such units, which would prove to be a real asset to the life and work of their congregations.

#### 7. REPORT OF THE EXECUTIVE BOARD

N.C. Synod Constitution, proposed amendment to, Article Seven, Item 4 a

Dr. Bachman S. Brown placed on notice an amendment to the N.C. Synod Constitution necessary for withdrawal from ownership and support of the Lutheran Children's Home of the South, Salem, Virginia, and the establishment of Lutheran Family Services in N.C. which read:

"We, the undersigned members of the voting body of the 1981 Convention of the North Carolina Synod of the Lutheran Church in America, do move that the Constitution of the North Carolina Synod of the Lutheran Church in America be amended in the following respects:

That Article Seven, Item 4-a, be amended by deleting all of "a.", and in its place inserting the following:

"a. Lutheran Family Services in North Carolina, a corporation chartered by the State of North Carolina and related to the North Carolina Synod of the Lutheran Church in America."

Secretary David Martin moved its adoption. The above proposed amendment to the constitution was PLACED ON NOTICE.

#### b. By-Laws proposed amendments to Section VII, Item C

Executive Board Member Bachman S. Brown placed on notice the following proposed amendment to the By Laws:

that Item C of Section VII of the By-Laws be amended by deleting all of Item C and in its place inserting the following:

- "C. Lutheran Family Services in North Carolina
  - 1. The Synod is entitled to elect fifteen persons, five of whom are ordained ministers, five of whom are lay persons, and five of whom may be either ordained ministers or lay persons, for terms of three years to the Board of Trustees of Lutheran Family Services in North Carolina, so that the terms of at least five persons expire each year. The Bishop of the Synod or a designated representative shall be a member in addition to the other elected members.
  - 2. The Executive Board shall elect persons to fill vacancies which might occur between conventions of the Synod. Election by the Executive Board shall be for the unexpired term.
  - 3. The President of the Board of Trustees of Lutheran Family Services in North Carolina may suggest persons to fill interim vacancies for election by the Executive Board.
  - 4. All persons nominated must be either on the roll of ordained ministers of the North Carolina Synod or Confirmed, Communing or Contributing members of congregations of the North Carolina Synod."

Secretary David Martin moved that the proposed amendment to the By-Laws be adopted as rules of procedure for this Convention. The motion, requiring a two-thirds majority, was **ADOPTED**.

The above By-Law amendment was PLACED ON NOTICE.

c. N.C. Synod Constitution, proposed amendment to, Article Ten, Section

Secretary David Martin moved the adoption of Recommendation 3 from the Secretary's Report and from the Executive Board which read:

"That the proposed amendment to the Constitution of the North Carolina Synod PLACED ON NOTICE at the 1980 convention of Synod be considered." (Words in bold are to be added and words in parentheses () are to be deleted.):

#### Article Ten, ORDAINED MINISTERS, Section III

All ordained ministers shall attend all conventions of the synod, and the pastors of congregations shall also attend meetings of the districts to which they belong. (In case of unavoidable absence, the absentee shall submit a proper excuse to the secretary. After two warnings, absence without excuse from further conventions or meetings shall render the offender subject to discipline.)

The motion to consider was ADOPTED.

This item would be considered during the Third Meeting.

Secretary David Martin moved the adoption of Recommendation 4 from the Secretary's Report and from the Executive Board which read:

"That the proposed Amendments to the Constitution of the North Carolina Synod, as ratified by the 1980 Seattle Convention of the Church in amending the Approved Constitution for Synods: PLACED ON NOTICE at this synod convention be considered.":

Article Ten — Ordained Ministers, Section II — Relationship to Congregations, 4, b (investigating committee, petition for)

In the last three contingencies, it shall be the duty of the **bishop** of the synod, when such difficulties are personally known, or have been

brought to the **bishop**'s attention (by the dean of the district), by an official recital of allegations by the church council, or by a petition signed by at least one-third of the **voting** communing members, to investigate such conditions, personally in company with a committee of two ordained ministers and one lay person.

Article Ten — Ordained Ministers, Section II — Relationship to Congregations, 4, d (suspension of pastors)

In case of alleged neglect of duty or of local difficulties which imperil the efficient conduct of the congregation, all those concerned shall be heard, after which the **bishop** of the synod together with the advisory committee shall decide on the course of action to be recommended to the pastor and the parish. If both agree to carry out such recommendations, no further action shall be taken by the synod. If either party fails to assent, the matter shall be referred to the Executive Board on the basis of the advisory committee's record and report, and the board's action, after hearing such written or oral arguments as the parties care to present and such further testimony as the board may call for, shall be final. Such action shall not be regarded as an act of discipline but as an act of expediency based on the principles of Christian love. The Bishop of the synod may at any point in the foregoing proceedings suspend the pastor from the functions of the ministry with-in the congregation pending completion of the formal proceedings.

Article Twelve — By-Laws and Amendments, Section 2 (mandatory amendments)

(amended by placing an asterisk in front of Section 2)

\* The sections and paragraphs of this constitution with an asterisk incorporate and record herein provisions of the constitution and bylaws of the Lutheran Church in America. If and when such provisions are amended by the church, corresponding amendments shall be introduced at once into this constitution by the secretary of the synod upon receipt of formal certification thereof from the secretary of the Lutheran Church in America.

The title "bishop"

As a result of the actions of the 1980 Seattle Convention of the Lutheran Church in America changing the title of "president" of the Church to "bishop" of the Church and "president" of the synod to "bishop" of the synod, the editorial change is made wherever the term "president" is employed, referring either to the president of the Church or president of a synod, the term "bishop" shall be substituted.

The motion to consider was ADOPTED.

These items would be considered during the Third Meeting.

#### 8. Report of the Committee on Nominations (BR, pp. 238-255)

The Rev. Frank C. Perry, D.D., chairman of the committee, presented the report referring the convention to the Bulletin of Reports and making corrections to the information recorded there. He explained procedures for nominations from the floor.

The Rev. John R. Jones, III, Chairman of the Committee on the Conduct of Elections, was recognized by Bishop Misenheimer. He described the election procedures to the convention.

#### 10. REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON DISTRICT DEANS (BR, pp. 97-98)

The Rev. John R. Nagle, Dean of the Eastern District, made reference to the Bulletin of Reports, and, on behalf of the Executive Board, in compliance with Article Five, Section II, S, and the Committee of District Deans, moved the recommendation that:

The convention was recessed.

#### THIRD MEETING

Friday Morning, May 15, 1981 — 8:45 a.m. to 12:00 Noon

- Opening Prayer Convention Chaplain C. Peter Setzer opened the meeting with prayer.
- Call to Order Bishop Misenheimer called the meeting to order and presided.
- 3. Announcements Bishop Misenheimer made announcements regarding convention procedures and recognized Paul Milholland, head page.
- 4. COMMITTEE ON REPORTS OF OFFICERS AND STAFF

The Rev. David R. Keck, chairman, presented the report and moved the recommendations as follows:

"The Committee on Reports of Officers and Staff met and reviewed the Report of the Bishop; the reports of Pastor David L. Martin as Minister for Professional Leadership and as Secretary of the Synod; of Pastor Robert H. Shoffner, Minister for Parish Services; of Pastor Richard C. Little, Minister for Outreach; and of Mr. James A. Chesky as Minister for Resources and as Treasurer of the Synod; which appear in the Bulletin of Reports.

It is obvious from these reports that the Spirit is at work in our Synod in particular through these conscientious and capable leaders, and that the past year has been a very busy and challenging time for them and for us all in the North Carolina Synod.

In the Report of the Bishop we concur with the statement that theme of this 177th Annual Convention, "Confessing Christ in the World" is our mandate from the Lord, challenging us "to look beyond ourselves, narrow parochialism, the roof that needs repairing and the cemetery maintenance to opportunities we have together to be a part of the total mission of Christ around the world." We appreciated the Bishop's orderly presentation under several headings: "Highlights Of The Past Year" (which included mentioning the Commissioning of our first Missionary in recent times, Mrs. Margaret "Peggy" Chandler, serving in Japan; the first Lutheran-Baptist Dialogue; the Synod-wide emphasis on the commemoration of the Augsburg Confession; God's miracle of Margaret Misenheimer's complete recovery after her stroke in Houston; the best end of the year apportionment receipts on record; and the District Church Days attendance records); "Present 1981 Convention Expectations" (a helpful preview); and "Future New Directions for 1981 and 1982". We particularly applaud the emphasis in this section on people and pastors rather than on programs and committees.

Throughout the Bishop's Report, we see clearly and gratefully an unselfish, serving, caring, cooperative and attentive servant of our Saviour led by the Spirit of the Living Lord Jesus. We deeply appreciate this and the spirit of mutual support and teamwork apparent in this report.

We've reviewed Pastor Martin's Report and are impressed with his diligent work in the areas of Professional Leadership, Historical Work, Campus Ministry and District and Congregational Life. We salute him for his excellent service in many difficult areas. Echoing his concerns, we call attention to his 'red flags' regarding the Church's financing of seminary education, the lack of response to the Growth in Ministry program, the possibility of there being congregations who will be unable to

afford full-time pastors, and the difficulty of reaching persons each year who need counseling, but who hesitate to seek any help at all. Pastor Martin's Secretary's Report also gives us some concern as we read that parochial reports are not received from every congregation, as we note the strong decline in black membership from 1979 to 1980 (down from 189 to 116), and especially as we observe that this was the first year in recent memory that we've had a loss in baptized membership (also in communing/contributing membership). There are, of course, many positive statistics for which we rejoice.

Pastor Shoffner's Report shows us the very capable and efficient work he's been doing, especially in Educational Ministry, Youth Ministry, Worship and Music, Parish Life and Ministry Development, and the Supply Pastors' Service. Though most of his report is encouraging, we do call attention to his concerns in Educational Ministry.

We liked the way in which Pastor Little shared his feelings about Outreach Ministry and appreciated his view that the social concerns of these times are not burdens, but rather opportunities, "a call from our Lord, a challenge to us in the church to stand up and be what we have been called to be." We also share his optimism that the next year "will be the best one yet as all continue to grow in our ministry together."

As Stewardship Counselor, Budget Control Officer, Business Manager/Personnel Director/Synod News Bureau overseer and as Treasurer, James A. Chesky is serving us in a splendid manner. We rejoice with him that last December's receipts were the highest ever recorded for one month (\$246,000) and suggest that he challenge us to give him that much every month! We do commend him for work well done and urge your careful study of his report.

In all of the reports of our officers and staff we see a heightened level of personal service; we see a true team, from the office secretaries through the Bishop, performing faithfully and fully; we see the Hand of the Living Lord guiding and sustaining our leaders; and for these manifestations of grace we give thanks!''

The Rev. John Nagle spoke concerning the adopted amendment and pointed out that the By-Laws, Section I, Conventions, D, Procedures, 9 should be deleted so as to conform to the constitutional amendment. He then made a motion that:

By-Laws, Section I. Convention, D. Procedures, 9 which read:

"9. Any ordained minister or lay delegate not attending a meeting of a convention shall send a written excuse to the secretary of synod." be deleted and the subsequent items be re-numbered accordingly."

The above by-law amendment was PLACED ON NOTICE.

#### Recommendation No. 6: ADOPTED

Secretary Martin observed that this was the first year in decades that the North Carolina Synod had shown a loss in baptized membership, citing a number of factors which could have contributed to this statistic.

He noted that communing/contributing membership had shown a decrease over the last two years, indicating that fewer people were giving more to the work of the Church.

#### Recommendation No. 7: ADOPTED

James A. Chesky, Synod Treasurer, referred the convention to his report and commented briefly about its contents (BR p. ). He expressed appreciation to the congregations of the synod for their support.

#### Recommendation No. 8: ADOPTED

The synod staff was given a standing ovation.

 Presentation by Churchwide Representative — The Rev. Dennis A. Anderson, D.D., Bishop of the Nebraska Synod, Lutheran Church in America

Bishop Anderson brought greetings from the LCA, from Bishop James R. Crumley, Jr., D.D. and from the Nebraska Synod. He presented Margaret Misenheimer a gift from his wife.

Bishop Anderson spoke of the Church as a "world-wide fellowship" and referred to the LCA as meaning "Linked Together in Caring/Christian Action." He compared

the Church to a "body", using its various parts to describe the strengths of the Church and its potential ministry. He challenged the North Carolina Synod to make missions its number one priority and urged Christ-centered economics in order to keep the "life-blood" of the Church flowing.

Youth Convo — Bishop Misenheimer called on Youth Convo to lead the convention in action songs.

#### 7. Report of the Cabinet for Missions (BR pp. 199-232)

The Rev. James A. Harbinson, chairman of the Cabinet for Missions, referred the convention to the report of the Cabinet for Missions in the Bulletin of Reports, page . He highlighted his report with a slide presentation of the various ministries coming under his Cabinet. He introduced the chairmen of the Cabinet for Missions com-

mittees which included the following committees and institutions:

AMERICAN MISSIONS: The Rev. Boyce D. Whitener; WORLD MISSIONS, Mr. Vincent J. Vierling; JUSTICE AND SOCIAL CHANGE, The Rev. David A. Sloop; MINORITY MINISTRIES PROGRAM, The Rev. Richard J. Perry, Jr., Director; ENVIRONMENTAL CONCERNS, The Rev. Alfred Mullen, II, Chairman; WORLD RELIEF/WORLD HUNGER, The Rev. Donald Deal, Chairman.

CAMPUS MINISTRY (BR p. 205) Dr. Francis S. Binkowski, Chairman of the Committee on Campus Ministry, and the Rev. Robert G. Walker, Regional Director of National Lutheran Campus Ministry, spoke to the convention about the significance of their work with students and emphasized the need for a vital link between Campus Ministry and the local congregation.

NORTH CAROLINA LUTHERAN HOMES. (BR. pp. 220-231) The Rev. Robert Q. Beard, Executive Director, presented the new President of the Board of Trustees, Marshall E. Agner, M.D., who brought greetings. He advised the convention of administrative changes and the management team of North Carolina Lutheran Homes. Bishop Misenheimer, on behalf of the Division for Mission in North America, presented official certification to North Carolina Lutheran Homes, Inc. for 1981.

LUTHERAN FAMILY SERVICES (BR, p. 232) Larry Parrish, Chairman of the Board of Trustees, presented Bill Brittain, Executive Director, who referred the convention to their report and introduced Virginia Soberg-Rhyne, who spoke on the work of the Lutheran Immigration and Refugee Service and presented one of the refugees from Ethiopia, sponsored by Holy Trinity Lutheran Church, Hickory. Miss Sherrell Goolsby reported on the Foster Homes program and presented Jan Conrad who spoke of her experience as a foster parent. Bishop Misenheimer presented official certification to Lutheran Family Services, Inc., on behalf of the DMNA. Dr. Harry Robinson suggested that members of the N.C. Synod might consider changing their wills to include Lutheran Family Services instead of the Children's Home of the South, which was no longer supported by our Synod.

Bishop Misenheimer stated that the remainder of the report of the Cabinet for Missions would be heard under Unfinished Business.

#### 8. Lutheran Church Women, North Carolina Unit (BR p. 232)

Sarah Ingle, N.C. Unit President, highlighted the past and future programs of the LCW, especially noting the study on economics. She announced that the N.C. Unit Convention would be held May 29-31, 1981, at Lenoir-Rhyne College using the theme, "Reach Out in Love."

#### 9. Committee on Conduct of Elections

The Rev. John R. Jones, III, announced that the first ballots would be ready and the polls would open at 12:45 and close at 1:45 p.m.

#### SPECIAL ORDER — CLOSING DEVOTIONS 11:30 a.m.

Chaplain Peter Setzer used the Service of the Word as the closing devotions, basing his meditation on I Peter 2:9, 10 and speaking on being "who we are and whose we are": Christian proclaimers of Our Lord Jesus Christ.

The convention was recessed.

#### FOURTH MEETING

Friday Afternoon, May 15, 1981 — 1:45 to 5:30 p.m.

- 1. Opening Prayer Chaplain C. Peter Setzer opened the meeting with prayer.
- 2. Call to Order Bishop Misenheimer called the meeting to order and presided.

The Rev. John F. Weaver made a motion that:

the balloting be extended until 2:05 p.m.

The motion was ADOPTED.

- Report of Committee on Reference and Counsel The Rev. David F. Conrad, Chairman, reminded the convention of the duties of the committee. He noted that the continuation of the Report of the Cabinet for Missions should be considered as the first item of Unfinished Business.
- 4. PRESENTATION OF THE CHURCHWIDE AGENCIES REPRESENTATIVE, BISHOP DENNIS A. ANDERSON, D.D., NEBRASKA SYNOD

Bishop Anderson used his presentation time for a question and answer period, addressing his remarks to the LCA's involvement in the issues in South Africa; a commentary on the Church in China; the reasons for the increased number of pastors on-leave-from-call; the LCA Board of Pensions investment program and salary questions. He also answered questions concerning the social programs of the Church; the use of the Lutheran Book of Worship; the possibility of a clergy rotation system; cooperation between the LCA and Lutheran Church Women; and Lutheran Unity.

- 5. Youth Convo Bishop Misenheimer recognized representatives of Youth Convo to lead the convention in action songs.
- 6. Report of the Committee on Communications (BR, pp. 165-166) Clarence Pugh, chairman, presented the report and commented briefly about the North Carolina Lutheran, its leadership, change in format and financial condition. He expressed appreciation to the Rev. Raymond A. Petrea who had filled in for Editor John Wertz, who was ill, and to Editor Wertz and Mrs. Frances Huddle, Business Manager. He indicated growing interest in the cable television project being coordinated by the LCA and a Task Force on Communications of the synod, the Rev. Paul B. Beatty, chairman. Mr. Pugh noted that the committee would publish a convention summary available to delegates at the close of the convention.
- 7. Report of the Executive Board, continued (BR pp. 132-165)
  - a. Long Range Planning Sub-Committee

The Rev. J. A. Harbinson, Chairman of the Sub-Committee on Long Range Planning of the Executive Board, moved the following recommendation from the board:

1. Synod goals, interpretation of priority rating

That the following resolution be ratified:

"It is the interpretation of the Executive Board that in implementing the synod's action on NORTH CAROLINA SYNOD GOALS, synod funds, to the extent available, are generally to be budgeted and expended in accordance with the following method which reflects:

- (a) The order of project priority suggested by the various synodical committees, agencies and institutions;
- (b) their requests for funding;
- (c) the order of priority listed in the 30 North Carolina Synod Goals adopted by the synod in convention in 1979.

However, the Executive Board has the authority to consider and implement any adjustments it deems necessary with regard to the numerical order of the goals, as it seeks to be responsible for the monitoring and spending of synod funds needed in ministry. The Ex-

ecutive Board reserves the authority to appropriate funds toward a project in ministry which appears low on the listing of the synod's 30 goals if the Executive Board concludes that such a project's ministry would suffer unless it receives the necessary funding."

The motion was ADOPTED.

The Rev. Alfred L. Mullen, II, made a motion:

That the Synod go on record as being strongly behind the Bishop's proposal to cut synod programming and appropriate its staff time more toward personal contact time with pastors and congregations and less in administrative efforts, and,

That the Synod go on record as requesting the Task Force assigned to this job to take swift action on this and formulate guidelines on staff personnel's duties, that they may be reviewed at the 1982 Synod Convention.

The motion was ADOPTED.

b. By-Laws of Synod; amendment of, Section VII, Item c

Dr. Bachman Brown presented the recommendation that:

the following amendment of the By-Laws, placed on notice at the Second Meeting, be adopted:

That Item C of Section VII of the By-Laws be amended by deleting all of Item C and in its place inserting the following:

- "C. Lutheran Family Services in North Carolina
  - 1. The Synod is entitled to elect fifteen persons, five of whom are ordained ministers, five of whom are lay persons, and five of whom may be either ordained ministers or lay persons, for terms of three years to the Board of Trustees of Lutheran Family Services in North Carolina, so that the terms of at least five persons expire each year. The Bishop of the Synod or a designated representative shall be a member in addition to the other elected members.
  - 2. The Executive Board shall elect persons to fill vacancies which might occur between conventions of the Synod. Election by the Executive Board shall be for the unexpired term.
  - 3. The President of the Board of Trustees of Lutheran Family Services in North Carolina may suggest persons to fill interim vacancies for election by the Executive Board.
  - 4. All persons nominated must be either on the roll of ordained ministers of the North Carolina Synod or Confirmed, Communig or Contributing members of congregations of the North Carolina Synod.

The motion was ADOPTED.

Secretary David Martin made a motion that:

the By-law amendments be adopted as Rules of Procedure of the conven-

The motion was ADOPTED.

Dr. Bachman Brown noted that the proposed amendment to the constitution concerning Lutheran Family Services in North Carolina, Inc., placed on notice at the Second Meeting, would be considered at the 1982 N.C. Synod Convention.

#### 8. Report of the Committee on Ecumenical Affairs

The Rev. Terry W. Agner, Chairman, presented The Rev. Collins Kilburn, Executive Director of the N.C. Council of Churches, who brought greetings to the convention and commended the N.C. Synod for its active participation in the Council activities. He reported that the most current topic dealt with the Council was religion and politics.

9. Report of the Committee on Conduct of Elections

This report was postponed by common consent.

#### 10. Unfinished Business

The Rev. Richard B. Graf, Jr., D.Min., Chairman of the Committee on Minutes and Unfinished Business, announced that daily summaries of the convention sessions would be available. He reported that the following items should be considered as unfinished business:

- 1. The Report of the Cabinet for Missions, continued.
- 2. Report of the Committee on Investments
- 3. Report of the Committee on Historical Work
- 4. Report of the Trustees of the Michael Peeler Fund
- 5. Report of the Lutheran Church Men

Pastor Graf recommended on behalf of his committee that the Report of the Cabinet for Mission's be continued.

#### a. Report of the Cabinet for Missions, continued

The Rev. J. A. Harbinson, Chairman of the Cabinet for Missions, was recognized and presided over those reporting.

#### American Missions Committee (BR pp. 200-203)

The Rev. Boyce D. Whitener, chairman, introduced a slide presentation on ministry in Appalachia and made reference to the committee's report in the Bulletin of Reports. Dr. David F. Johnson, North Carolina and South Carolina Regional Director for DMNA, brought greetings and told what American Missions was doing in the State. The following Pastor/Developers were recognized: The Rev. David A. McCleary, Clemmons; The Rev. J. Paul Rimmer, Burnsville; The Rev. C. William Flowers, Whiteville; and The Rev. Eugene Powell, Raleigh.

#### Lutheran World Relief/World Hunger (BR pp. 203-204)

The Rev. Kenneth W. Fink, Chairman for Hunger Concerns, reported for the committee and moved that:

#### the following resolution be adopted:

Whereas, the number and undernourished persons in our world continues to increase;

Whereas, the tragic plight of people in parts of Africa and especially in Somalia commands our concern and our assistance:

Whereas, our U.S. Government is doing less to assist hungry people;

Whereas, the number of hungry and malnourished persons in our own country is likely to increase due to budget cuts by the U.S. Government;

Whereas, 53 congregations of the North Carolina Synod failed to send in contributions to the World Hunger Appeal in 1980;

Whereas, the opportunities to help hungry people in the name of our Lord Jesus Christ through the LCA World Hunger Appeal will continue to increase;

Whereas, there will be media coverage and information about world hunger during September and October provided by CROP/Church World Services and other groups;

Whereas, our Lord Jesus Christ has commanded us to feed the hungry and has said that when we feed a hungry person we are feeding Him;

THEREFORE, Be it resolved that we, as a convention, urge the members of the congregations of the North Carolina Synod, LCA, to continue their support of the LCA World Hunger Appeal with the goal of every congregation participating and contributing to the Appeal in 1981;

Be it resolved that congregations and church councils set aside October 4, 1981 A.D., World Communion Sunday, along with other dates that they would normally set aside to receive offerings for the LCA World Hunger Appeal; and

Be it resolved that members of congregations and congregations join in support of local community efforts to combat hunger and/or local CROP walks.

The motion was ADOPTED.

#### Justice and Social Change Committee (BR p. 206)

The Rev. David A. Sloop, Chairman of the Justice and Social Change Committee, presented the report and introduced The Rev. Dennis R. Bolton, Chairman of the Task Force on Native American Concerns, who informed the convention of the goals of the Task Force, designed to "raise the awareness of and educate Lutherans across North Carolina to the issues and concerns of Native American persons."

#### Lenoir-Rhyne College (BR, pp. 211-219)

Dr. Albert Anderson, President of Lenoir-Rhyne College, referred the convention to their report in the Bulletin of Reports, and stated that every significant number was "up" at the College, including enrollment, costs, academics, endowments, and operating funds. He thanked the Synod for its continued support of the College.

At the suggestion of the Rev. J. A. Harbinson the convention paid tribute to Dr. Robin Gatwood of the College giving him a standing ovation in recognition of his service to the church and the convention.

This completed the report of the Cabinet for Missions.

#### b. Report of the Committee on Investments (BR p. 130)

Mr. James Chesky called attention to the report of the Committee on Investments. The report was **RECEIVED**.

#### c. Report of the Committee on Historical Work (BR, pp. 167-168)

Miss Sarah E. Walker, chairman, introduced a slide presentation called "Your Lutheran Heritage — Yours to Preserve", which encouraged and gave guidelines toward the establishment of congregational archives.

#### d. Report of the Trustees of the Michael Peeler Trust Fund (BR, pp. 127-128)

The Rev. John W. Cobb, D.D., Chairman, gave the report. He expressed appreciation to Dr. Harry E. Isenhour, who had resigned as Chairman of the Board of Trustees of the Michael Peeler Fund, after many years of service. Dr. Cobb announced that Elmer L. Allen, Salisbury, was a new member and Secretary of the Board. Pastor Cobb advised the convention of the recent endowment from the Michael Peeler Income Fund for the Lutheran Theological Southern Seminary.

#### e. Report of the Lutheran Men (BR, pp. 236-237)

Mr. George Page, former President of N.C. Lutheran Men, gave the report and presented the first honorary life membership pin of the organization to the Rev. Walter N. Yount, Executive Director. Pastor Yount reported that through the Loan and Gift Fund the following loans had been made:

\$125,000 to St. Philip, Raleigh \$100,000 to Living Saviour, Pineville \$100,000 to Community in Christ, Huntersville

#### 11. Report of Committee on Reference and Counsel

Mr. Harold McKnight, member of the committee, moved the following resolution:

We, the Pastors and Lay Delegates of the North Carolina Synod of the Lutheran Church in America, assembled in convention at Hickory, N.C., extend our deepest sympathy to the family of the Rev. Glenn Allen Miller, whose death occurred just prior to our Synod meeting. With grateful

hearts we remember him and we all thank God for his many years of faithful service in the North Carolina Synod.

We regret that we are not able to be with you during this special time of need. Be assured that you are remembered lovingly in our hearts by this resolution and the prayers of this assembly.

- Opening Prayer Chaplain C. Peter Setzer opened the session with the convention singing a prayer hymn.
- 2. Call to Order Bishop Misenheimer called the meeting to order and presided.
- 3. "Confessing Christ in Global Sharing" Dr. Robert Stackel

Dr. Robert Stackel challenged the convention to become aware of how to "confess Christ through global sharing", by sharing our food and love with the starving; by helping the poor to help themselves and to realize their God-given potential; by living more subdued, less wasteful life styles; and by advocating justice and equity for all people.

4. REPORT OF THE CABINET FOR PROFESSIONAL LEADERSHIP (BR, pp. 168-176)

The Rev. George R. Whittecar, chairman of the Cabinet for Professional Leadership, presented the report and commented on the scope of the work of the cabinet.

#### Lutheran Theological Southern Seminary (BR, pp. 173-176)

Dr. Rufus Moretz, secretary of the Board of Trustees of the Lutheran Theological Southern Seminary, introduced other members of the board who were present and expressed appreciation to the N.C. Synod for their support, especially the recent endowment established through the Michael Peeler Fund. He presented Dr. H. George Anderson, president of the Seminary, who spoke about increased enrollment and some of the changes at the Seminary.

#### Committee for Professional Preparation (BR, pp. 168-170)

The Rev. William Milholland, Chairman, presented the report and moved the following recommendations on behalf of the Examining Committee of the Committee for Professional Preparation:

That the following be approved for ordination at the May 24th Ordination Service scheduled for Epiphany, Winston-Salem, at 4 p.m., on meeting requirements for graduation from the Lutheran Theological Southern Seminary:

Ed Martin, President of North Carolina Lutheran Men, and David Beam, treasurer of the Home Mission Foundation of North Carolina Lutheran Men, presented \$100

checks to be used for continuing education and histories of N.C. Lutheran Men to the ordinands and to all pastors new to the Synod in 1980-1981.

#### Committee For Professional Service (BR, pp. 170-172)

The Rev. T. C. Plexico, Chairman of the Committee for Professional Service, presented the report. He moved the following recommendations concerning compensation of parish pastors on behalf of the committee:

#### The motion was ADOPTED.

#### **Recommendation 3:**

That in team ministry the lead pastor should be compensated at the appropriate guideline category and that the other pastors in the team ministry should be compensated at no less than the category which equals 50% of the budget.

The Rev. Brady Faggart made a motion that:

the terminology in Recommendation 4 be changed from "team" ministry to "staff" ministry.

The motion was ADOPTED.

The Rev. John Nagle made a motion that:

the recommendation be tabled.

There was a call for division of the house: 177 voted to table the recommendation; 96 voted against tabling the recommendation.

The motion to table was ADOPTED.

Bishop Misenheimer declared that further discussion and voting on this item would be continued under Unfinished Business.

Pastor Plexico moved the following recommendation on behalf of the Committee for Professional Service:

### Recommendation 4:

That the congregations of the North Carolina Synod adopt the following standards in granting vacation time to their pastors:

- (A.) A minimum of two weeks (14 days, 2 Sundays) to pastors in their first two years of ministry.
- (B.) A minimum of three weeks vacation (21 days, 3 Sundays) to pastors in the ministry for three years or more,

the exception being those pastors who have served a congregation for five years or those who have served 15 years or more in the ministry. For these we recommend a four weeks vacation period (including 4 Sundays).

In each case continuing education study is not to be considered a part of the vacation time granted.

The motion was ADOPTED.

The Rev. David M. Franzen, member of the Committee for Professional Service and Chairman of the Sub-Committee on Concerns in Ministry, reported on the need for continuing education, the need to support pastors in this program and announced the 1981 Fall Convocation for Pastors and Lay Professionals to be held at Lutheridge in October.

The Rev. Ernest W. Ridenhour requested that the Certified Lay Professionals, certified in 1980 and 1981, be recognized:

LINDA SCHUTT EVERETT as organist/choir master; DANIEL PAUL HANNEMAN as director of Church Music; WADE DOUGLAS LUDLUM as director of Church Music; FRANCES A. WOODY, as Director of Christian Education.

5. Announcements and Closing Prayer

Bishop Misenheimer made announcements and Chaplain C. Peter Setzer led the convention in closing prayer.

The convention was recessed.

- 2. Call to Order Bishop Misenheimer called the meeting to order and presided.
- 3. Report of the Committee on Reference and Counsel —

The Rev. David Conrad, chairman, presented the report and moved the following recommendations:

a. That the convention adopt the following resolution re: the attempted assassination of Pope John Paul II:

WHEREAS men and women of faith throughout the world are of one Body of Christ regardless of their denominational persuasion, and

WHEREAS all people of good will oppose terrorism and violence, and

WHEREAS the bishop of Rome, Pope John Paul II, is a man of grace and peace who has ministered to people around the globe,

### BE IT THEREFORE RESOLVED

That this convention of the North Carolina Synod of the Lutheran Church in America with one voice condemn the recent act of violence which was perpetrated upon Pope John Paul II, and

That this convention with one voice condemn terrorism, violence, and all acts of harm done in the name of ideology, and

That all Lutherans in North Carolina pray for the health of Pope John Paul II and for the grace of God to be effective in the life of his assailant, and That a copy of this resolution be sent to the appropriate judicatories.

### The motion was ADOPTED.

b. That the convention adopt the following resolution re: the murders of Black youth in Atlanta:

WHEREAS, the mystery of the murders of Black youth in Atlanta continues to go unsolved, and:

WHEREAS, the families of these 27 victims have experienced great sorrow heightened even more by the fact that these crimes continue, and:

WHEREAS, the existence of such violent acts and senseless murders creates a life filled with anxiety and grave consciousness on the part of all Black families in Atlanta and throughout the United States, and:

WHEREAS, congregations of the Atlanta area and the Executive Board of the Southeastern Synod of the Lutheran Church in America have:

- (1). through the Bishop, The Rev. Gerald Troutman, met with pastors in the general area who may be affected and with local judicatories and the Mayor's office, and;
- (2). provided financial resources to the "Help The Children Project" of the Christian Council of Metropolitan Atlanta, and;
- (3). encouraged, through communications, commitment of time and financial resources to life-style changing organizations such as the Lutheran "Atlanta Help Our Youth" project, and;
- (4). provided financial resources for a Ventures-In-Vocations participant in a congregation affected by this persistent tragedy, and;

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that we, as the North Carolina Synod of the Lutheran Church in America, in convention, affirm, support and continue in our prayers the work of our sister synod, and:

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that we encourage our pastors and congregations of the North Carolina Synod, that they regularly in the prayer of the church offer a petition for the victims, their families, those seeking to solve the crime and those who may be responsible for committing these murders, and:

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that we encourage the congregations of our synod to work with local community and government organizations which create and sponsor programs that affirm the worth of youth and encourage youth in developing skills and abilities to cope with situations such as the one in Atlanta, and;

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that we, through the Secretary's office, transmit said resolution to the Bishop of the Southeastern Synod of the Lutheran Church in America as they are now gathered in convention.

### The motion was ADOPTED.

c. That the convention adopt the following resolution re: refugee sponsorship:

WHEREAS Jesus says to us in Matthew 25: "Then the King will say to those on His right, 'Come you are blessed of My Father, inherit the Kingdom prepared for you from the foundation of the world . . . I was a stranger and you invited Me in . . . I say to you to the extent that you did it

to one of these brothers of Mine, even the least of them, you did it to ME.' "and

WHEREAS Hebrews 13:1-2 says: "Let love of the brethren continue. Do not neglect to show hospitality to strangers, for by this some have entertained angels without knowing it.", and

WHEREAS We are His disciples and world circumstances have presented us with the opportunity to show Christian love to our neighbors in need, and

WHEREAS Lutheran congregations are being asked to respond to this need through sponsorship of refugee families out of love for their Lord,

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the North Carolina Synod recognize this special opportunity to serve the Lord by serving those in need,

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the North Carolina Synod recommend that delegates encourage sponsorship of a refugee family either by means of a group within their congregations, by the congregation as a whole or by viable groups within the community, and authorize the pastor or a spokesman to process the sponsorship application as soon as possible.

### The motion was ADOPTED.

d. That a resolution regarding Infant Formula in Third World be distributed to the convention for study and be considered under Unfinished Business at a later meeting.

The motion was ADOPTED.

Don Michael; and Outdoor Ministries, the Rev. David Castor.

The convention joined in singing "Thank the Lord and Sing His Praise."

The Rev. Richard Campbell, Chairman of the Youth Ministry Committee, introduced the 1980-1981 Youth Staffer, Tim Paulson, and expressed appreciation for his work in the synod.

### 6. Youth Convo

Bishop Misenheimer recognized representatives of Youth Convo to lead the convention in action songs.

### 7. Report of the Cabinet for Parish Services, continued

a. Report of the Conference and Camping Ministries Appeal (BR pp. 189-190, 233)

The Rev. Boyce D. THE REVEREND VOIGT RHODES CROMER, D.D., LL.D.

The Rev. Voigt Rhodes Cromer, D.D., LL.D., 73, died at approximately 6:30 a.m., May 31, 1980, of an apparent heart attack in his home. Death was unexpected. Dr. Cromer was a noted Lutheran churchman having served as President of Lenoir-Rhyne College 1949-1967 and President of the United Evangelical Lutheran Synod of North Carolina 1947-1949. At the time of his death Dr. and Mrs. Cromer were living in retirement in Hickory, North Carolina.

The funeral service for Pastor Cromer was held on Monday, June 2, at 2:30 p.m. at St. Andrew's Lutheran Church, Hickory, North Carolina. The Rev. William F. Milholland, a pastor of St. Andrew's Lutheran Church and Dean of the Western District of the North Carolina Synod, and, the Rev. Jeffrey L. Lingle, a pastor of St. Andrew's Lutheran Church officiating. The Rev. Ernest L. Misenheimer, D.D., President of the North Carolina Synod of the Lutheran Church in America delivered the sermon. Interment was held at Hollybrook Cemetery in Lincolnton immediately following the service.

Dr. Cromer was born on July 31, 1906 son of the Rev. Joseph Lee and Lily Mae (nee, Rhodes) Cromer. The place of his birth was Rhodhiss in Caldwell County, North Carolina. He pursued his preparatory schooling at Chapin High School and the Lenoir College Preparatory Department. Entering Lenoir-Rhyne College he graduated with an A.B. degree in 1925. Having entered Southern Seminary that same year, he was graduated with a Bachelor of Divinity degree in 1928. During his seminary career he attended the University of South Carolina earning an M.A. degree in 1927. Also, he earned a Master of Sacred Theology degree from Hartford Seminary in 1929. On May 16, 1928 he was ordained into the Gospel Ministry in the Lutheran Church at Ebenezer Lutheran Church in Columbia, S.C., the Rev. Charles J. Shealy, D.D. officiating. On August 17, 1932 he married Sarah Elizabeth Dreher, the daughter of H. H. and Carrie (nee, Hoffman) Dreher of Lexington County, South Carolina. He served as pastor of St. Luke's, Summerville, 1929-1930; Emmanuel and St. Luke's Churches, Lincoln County 1930-1936; St. James Church, Concord 1936-1941; Holy Trinity, Hickory 1941-1947. In 1947, Dr.Cromer was elected President of the United Evangelical Lutheran Synod of North Carolina serving in that capacity until 1949 when he resigned to become President of Lenoir-Rhyne College which he served until his retirement in 1967. During his retirement, Dr. Cromer continued to serve the college as President Emeritus and Administration Consultant. In 1947 Lenoir-Rhyne College bestowed upon Dr. Cromer the honorary D.D. degree and, in 1956 Gettysburg College, conferred an honorary LL.D. degree.

As a noted Lutheran church leader Dr. Cromer served the church in many capacities. He was president of the Western Conference in the North Carolina Synod 1944-1946; Secretary of the Southern Conference of the North Carolina Synod; President of the Alumni Association of Lutheran Theological Southern Seminary 1937-1940; attended as a delegate from the North Carolina Synod most conventions of the United Lutheran Church in America (ULCA) and the Lutheran Church in America

(LCA) from 1936 to 1966; member of the Board of Trustees of Lenoir-Rhyne College 1936-1949; President of the Conference of Church Related Colleges in the South 1954-1955; President of the National Lutheran Educational Conference 1955-1956; a member of the Board of Social Ministries of the United Lutheran Church in America 1948 forward; a Commissioner of the National Lutheran Council 1948-1954; a member of the Commission on Relations to American Lutheran Church Bodies on behalf of the ULCA, simultaneously a member of the Joint Commission on Lutheran Unity 1959-63; a member of the Board of American Missions of the ULCA, 1960-62; and, a member of the Executive Council of the Lutheran Church in America 1963-66. He was active in community affairs as a Rotarian and in other service organizations.

Literary and service contributions to the church include service as a member of the Commission of the United Lutheran Church of America on "The Doctrine of the Ministry"; was preacher on the CBS radio network Church of the Air and United Lutheran Hour; and, was a noted speaker and lecturer. In the area of literary contributions, Dr. Cromer wrote "Christian Action in Human Relations" and was contributor to the book "This Holy Venture" and numerous other articles for church publications and periodicals.

The Cromers have two daughters, Elizabeth Rhodes Carswell of Columbia, South Carolina; and, Rebecca Ruth Campbell of Charlotte, North Carolina, wife of the Rev. Richard Campbell.

Surviving are his wife Sarah, two daughters and four grandchildren.

### THE REVEREND JOHN DANIEL BARRINGER



The Rev. John Daniel Barringer, 65, died on Monday evening August 25, 1980 of an apparent heart attack. Death occurred at Scotland Memorial Hospital in Laurinburg and was unexpected. Pastor and Mrs. Barringer were living in retirement in Laurinburg at the time of his death.

The funeral service for Pastor Barringer was held at 1:00 p.m. on Thursday, August 28, at Living Word Lutheran Church, Laurinburg, North Carolina. The Rev. Ernest L. Misenheimer, D.D., Bishop of the North Carolina Synod of the Lutheran Church in America preached the sermon. The Rev. James E. Rogers, pastor of Living Word, and the Rev. John R. Nagle, pastor of Christ the King Lutheran Church, Cary, and Dean of the


synod's Eastern District officiated. Interment was held at St. John's Lutheran Church, Cabarrus County, following the service.

Pastor Barringer was born on April 7, 1915, the son of Daniel L. and Mammie (nee Rowland) Barringer of Mount Pleasant, Cabarrus County, North Carolina. He received his preparatory schooling at Mt. Pleasant High School and attended Pfeiffer Junior College, Misenheimer, North Carolina for two years. Having enrolled at Lenoir-Rhyne College in Hickory, North Carolina, he graduated in 1937 with an A.B. degree. That same year he entered Lutheran Theological Southern Seminary in Columbia, South Carolina and was graduated in 1940 with a B.D. degree. On December 6, 1940, Pastor Barringer married Evelyn E. McLemore, in Columbia, South Carolina, the daughter of W. H. and Claire (nee Talent) McLemore of Columbia. The Barringers had three children, Elain Elizabeth Key of Gainesville, Georgia; Martha Sue Safrit, deceased; Sheila Ann Hancock of Vernon Hills, Illinois; and three grandchildren.

On May 30, 1940, at St. Andrew's Lutheran Church, Hickory, North Carolina, Pastor Barringer was ordained into the Gospel Ministry of the Lutheran Church, the Rev. J. L. Morgan, D.D., President of the United Evangelical Lutheran Synod of North Carolina officiating. He served as pastor of Zion, Hickory, North Carolina 1940-1942 before entering the chaplaincy of the United States Army which he served from 1942-1946. During that time he served both statewide and the China-Burma-India Theatre on Tinian Island in the Southwest Pacific. Upon being discharged from the army, he served as pastor of Grace, Hendersonville, North Carolina, 1946-1948. He was recalled into the United States Air Force in 1948 and served as a chaplain until 1966 having achieved the rank of Lt. Colonel. During his career as a military chaplain, he served outside of the Continental United States in England and Korea and in Alaska. He received honors including the Soldiers Medal; the Asiatic-Pacific Campaign Medal with six battle stars, the Humanitarian Medal and the Air Force Commendation Medal. After retiring from the military chaplaincy, he served as pastor of Morning Star, Matthews, North Carolina, 1966-1970; Kure Memorial, Kure Beach, North Carolina, 1970-1973; and, Living Word, Laurinburg, North Carolina, 1973-1977. He retired on May 1, 1977, in Laurinburg, North Carolina. After his retirement he assumed vice-pastoral responsibilities at various churches including Shepherd of the Sea, Atlantic Beach, North Carolina; St. Andrew's, New Bern, North Carolina, and, a mission at Whiteville, North Carolina,

Pastor Barringer was active on the synodical level having served the North Carolina Synod of the Lutheran Church in America on its Evangelical Committee 1968-1970; Social Ministry Committee 1970-1974 and, the Committee on Service to Military Personnel 1967-1970 and 1978 until his death.

### THE REVEREND NOAH DAVID YOUNT



The Reverend Noah David Yount, 88, died on Wednesday morning, October 1, 1980, at the Hickory Unit of the North Carolina Lutheran Homes. He had been in declining health for the past few years. Pastor Yount had been living in retirement in Conover and with his daughter in Raleigh briefly prior to his residence at the Lutheran Home.


The funeral service for Pastor Yount was held on Saturday, October 4 at 11:00 a.m. at Faith Lutheran Church, Conover, North Carolina. The Rev. L. O. Roof, Jr., pastor of Faith, Conover was liturgist, the Rev. George R. Whittecar, D.D., past president of the North Carolina Synod of the Lutheran Church in America preached the sermon and the Rev. Robert H. Shoffner, Minister for Parish Ser-

vices of the North Carolina Synod of the Lutheran Church in America, representing the Bishop of the Synod, was lecturer. Interment was held at Conover Cemetery immediately following the service.

Pastor Yount was born on February 24, 1892 near Conover in Catawba County, the son of the Rev. Joshua Alonzo and Sarah Lugene (nee Miller) Yount. After finishing preparatory school in Catawba County, he entered Lenoir-Rhyne College in Hickory, North Carolina and graduated in 1915 with a B.A. degree. That same year he entered Lutheran Theological Southern Seminary in Columbia, South Carolina, graduating in 1918 but received his B.D. degree from there in 1925. On November 10, 1936 he married Rena Bertie Simmons. They had two children, John David and Sara Ella.

Pastor Yount was ordained in the Gospel Ministry in the Lutheran Church on November 6, 1918 by the Evangelical Lutheran Tennessee Synod at Mt. Horeb Lutheran Church, Chapin, South Carolina, the Rev. B. D. Wessinger, President of the synod presiding. He served the following churches: In Watauga, Avery, Ashe, and Caldwell Counties, Four-Holy Communion; Mt. Pleasant, Zion, and organized in 1918 Holy Trinity, and three preaching points — Boone, Blowing Rock (Bailey's Camp). and Banner Elk. From 1923-25 he served as a Tennessee Synod field missionary for Western North Carolina, surveying territory, developing and organizing missions including Ascension, Shelby; St. Mark's, Asheville; and St. Andrew's, Andrews. He served as pastor of Ascension, Shelby and Grace, Bessemer City, 1925-32; and, Grace only, 1932-37. From 1937-55 he served as pastor of St. John, Hollywood, Florida. In 1955 he accepted the call to be pastor of Augsburg, Union-St. Timothy, Whitmire, South Carolina until 1964 at which time he retired. As a member of the Tennessee Synod, he served as a delegate of the merger convention which created the United Lutheran Church in America in 1918. During his pastorate in Florida he served the synod as statistician, president, secretary, and member of the Board of the Children's Home of the South and Lowman Home. At the time of retirement he moved to Conover, North Carolina having transferred into the North Carolina Synod of the Lutheran Church in America in 1965. During his retirement he served as a supply pastor and vice-pastor in a number of the synod's congregations.

Surviving are brothers, the Rev. Walter N. Yount of Cabarrus County and John Yount of Columbia, Tennessee; a sister, Mrs. Olive Sugg of Snow Hill, North Carolina; a son, John David Yount of Duluth, Minnesota; a daughter, Sara Ella Nichols of Raleigh; and, four grandchildren.



THE REVEREND WALTER CLEVELAND DAVIS, JR.

The Rev. Walter Cleveland Davis, Jr., 62, died on Friday morning, April 17, 1981 at Forsyth Memorial Hospital in Winston-Salem, North Carolina. Death was unexpected. At the time of his death, Pastor Davis was serving a call as Pastor of St. Matthew's Lutheran Church, Rowan County, North Carolina.

The funeral service for Pastor Davis was held on Tuesday, April 21, 1981, at 11:00 a.m. at St. Matthew's Lutheran Church, Rowan County. The Rev. Ernest L. Misenheimer, D.D., Bishop of the North Carolina Synod of the Lutheran Church in America presiding and preaching. Assisting him were the Rev. Floyd W. Bost, Pastor of St. Paul's Lutheran Church, Salisbury and Dean of the Central District of the Synod, and the Rev. David L. Martin, Minister for Professional Leadership and Secretary of the Synod. Interment was held at St. Matthew's Church Cemetery immediately following the service.

Pastor Davis was born on November 3, 1917 in Knoxville, Tennessee, the son of the Reverend Walter C. Sr. and Fannie (Ghormley) Davis. He received his preparatory training in Charleston, South Carolina. Pastor Davis graduated from Wittenberg University, Springfield, Ohio in 1939 with an A.B. Degree in Economics. Entering Chicago Lutheran Seminary, Chicago, Illinois that year, he graduated with a B.D. Degree in 1942. During his ministry, he pursued graduate work at Ball State University, Indiana; Purdue University, Indiana; Washington University, Missouri; the Lutheran School of Theology at Chicago; and Lutheran Theological Southern Seminary in Columbia, South Carolina. Pastor Davis married Ruthanna Gotherman, the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. John E. Gotherman of Port Williams, Ohio, on February 17,1940. They were married in Carrollton, Kentucky. The Davises have three children: Mrs. Barbara Ann Falb of Mishawaka, Indiana; Mrs. Helen Louise Yoder of Augsburg, Germany; and Walter C., Ill of Salem, Maine.

Pastor Davis was ordained into the Lutheran Ministry in May 1942 by the Indiana Synod of the United Lutheran Church in America, at St. Luke's Church, Logansport, Indiana, the Rev. Homer Turney, D.D., President of the Synod presiding. Pastor Davis served the following calls: Jay County Parish, Indiana (Zion, Portland; Faith, Bryant; and Zion, New Corydon) 1942-1948; Board of American Missions Pastor Developer, Tuscaloosa, Alabama, 1948-1949; Unity, St. Louis, Missouri, 1949-1952; St. Luke's, Logansport, Indiana, 1952-1965; Oak Grove, Bristol, Virginia and Faith, Bristol, Tennessee 1965-1968; and St. Matthew's, Rowan County, North Carolina, 1965 until his death.

During his ministry in the North Carolina Synod, he served on the Synod's Committee on Continuing Education for Ministers, 1973-1974, and, the Committee for Professional Preparation, 1974 until his death. Pastor Davis was a member of the Rowan County Lutheran Ministers Association and served as Chairman of its Continuing Education Committee.

Pastor Davis is survived by his wife, Ruthanna; a son, Walter, III; two daughters. Barbara Ann and Helen Louise; one brother, two sisters, and six grandchildren.



THE REV. GLENN ALLEN MILLER

The Rev. Glenn Allen "Razz" Miller, 71, died Wednesday afternoon, May 13, 1981 at his home in Rockwell, North Carolina. Death was unexpected. At the time of his death, Pastor and Mrs. Miller were living in retirement in Rockwell.

The funeral service for Pastor Miller was held on Saturday, May 16, 1981, at 11:00 a.m. at St. Peter's Lutheran Church, Rowan County where he and his wife were members. The Rev. John E. Pless, Pastor of St. Peter's officiated at the service. Interment was held at St. Peter's Lutheran Church Cemetery immediately following the service.

Pastor Miller was born on November 7, 1909, at Rockwell, North Carolina, the son of Calvin "Cal" Middleton and Maggie Lee (Bost) Miller. He received his public school education in the Rockwell schools. Entering Lenoir-Rhyne College, he graduated with an A.B. Degree in 1930. He pursued graduate study obtaining an "A" grade high school principal's certificate. From 1930 to 1931 he was coach and math teacher at Landis High School. Entering Lutheran Theological Southern Seminary in Columbia, South Carolina that year, he graduated with a B.D. Degree in 1934. On May 25, 1941, Pastor Miller married Virginia Ruth Hollis in Waynesboro, Tennessee. The Millers have three children: The Rev. Hollis A. Miller, Pastor of Zion Lutheran Church, Lexington, South Carolina; Mrs. Marillyn Lee (Miller) Remata of Oakland, California; and Mrs. Cheryll Jill (Miller) Allison of Boiling Springs, North Carolina; and two grand-children.

Pastor Miller was ordained into the Lutheran Ministry by the United Evangelical Lutheran Synod of North Carolina in 1934, at St. Paul's Evangelical Lutheran Church in Wilmington, North Carolina, the Rev. J. L. Morgan, D.D., President of the Synod presiding. Churches and Schools served: Calvary, Concord 1934-36; Southmont High School math teacher and coach, 1939-43; and principal, 1943-44; St. Stephen's Parish (St. Stephen's, Gold Hill and Mt. Olive, Mt. Pleasant, North Carolina), 1944-50; Trinity, Vale, 1950-59; St. Peter's, Rowan County, 1959-until his retirement in 1974.

Glenn "Razz" Miller was an accomplished athlete and hunter. In college he lettered in three sports. After college graduation he participated in 17 seasons of semi-professional and minor professional baseball. Teams included Landis, Kannapolis, Concord, Lenoir, Thomasville, Forest City, and, Bassett and Martinsville, Virginia. While serving the St. Stephen's Parish he was appointed coach at Rockwell High School in 1948.

Pastor Miller is survived by his wife, Ruth; a brother, Retired Lt. Col. Carr L. Miller of Corpus Christi, Texas; a son, Hollis; two daughters, Marillyn and Jill; and, two grandchildren.

### SEVENTH MEETING

Saturday Afternoon, May 16, 1981 — 1:45-5:00 p.m.

1. THE SERVICE OF REMEMBRANCE was led by Chaplain C. Peter Setzer. In the prayers the convention remembered THE REVEREND VOIGT RHODES CROMER, D.D., LL.D.; THE REVEREND JOHN DANIEL BARRINGER; THE REVEREND GLENN ALLEN MILLER; THE REVEREND NOAH DAVID YOUNT; THE REVEREND WALTER CLEVELAND DAVIS, JR. and the 686 members of the North Carolina Synod who died during the year. In his sermon Pastor Setzer used the imagery of tombstones he and his family saw last summer in the southwest to raise the issue of Christian remembrance and to affirm that "they are gone, but not forgotten."

He noted that the church has a need to benefit from a blessed look backward to rediscover how much we owe to those who have gone before us and to express our gratitude for their lives in remembering. Pastor Setzer recalled that Paul counseled the Corinthians on how to remember "whatever is lovely, whatever is true . . ." and pointed out that Christians are called to remember in that way. Pastor Setzer concluded by tying the remembrance theme in to the remembrance motif of the Holy Eucharist and affirmed that as we remember Christ He also remembers us and is alive and present among us.

 Call to Order — Bishop Misenheimer called the convention to order and presided.

### 3. Report of the Committee on Reference and Counsel

The Rev. David F. Conrad, chairman, presented the report and recommended that the following motion by The Rev. Richard Graf, Jr., be referred to the Executive Board:

That when a delegate is requested to serve on a convention committee which removes him/her necessarily from participation in the proceedings of the convention (i.e. Minutes, Elections), the delegate's congregation be allowed to seat an alternate during those sessions during which that delegate's service is required.

The motion was ADOPTED.

### 4. Report of the Committee on Conduct of Elections

The Rev. John R. Jones, III, chairman, presented the final report on the elections. Bishop Misenheimer declared elected those persons who received the necessary votes for election.

5. Report of the Committee on Audits (BR pp. 130-131)

Mr. James A. Chesky, Treasurer of the Synod, presented the report on behalf of the Audits Committee. The report was **RECEIVED**.

- 6. Report of the Executive Board, continued
  - a. 1982 Budget Proposal (BR pp. 153-154)

The Rev. Harry Robinson, D.Min., Chairman, presented the board's recommendation regarding the 1982 Synod Budget and moved that:

the proposed budget for 1982 be adopted as printed in the Bulletin of Reports.

The Rev. John Cobb, D.D. moved a substitute motion as follows:

That we adopt Level I as our base budget and that we add to Level I the amount of 19% of Level I as the basis for assignment of 1982 apportionment which amount shall be designated as "Safety Factor" and listed Program Budget Section VIII.

(Explanation: This would add \$420,280 to Level I for total of \$2,632,280 to be apportioned to congregations, representing an addition of \$633.)

The substitute motion was DEFEATED.

The Rev. Paul Conrad made a motion that:

the entire amount of the LCA apportionment be placed in Level I of our Synod Budget.

Bishop Misenheimer declared that further discussion and voting on this item would be continued under Unfinished Business.

 SPECIAL ORDER (3:15 p.m.) — LCA Churchwide Representative — Bishop Dennis A. Anderson re: Lutheran Unity

Bishop Anderson addressed himself to the current considerations regarding Lutheran unity. He introduced the process of asking the people of the church for their opinion via straw polls in the synod convention, expressing his opinion that the people will want merger. He stated that recommendations would be presented to the national church conventions during 1982. They would then determine whether to vote, study, or dismiss the issue.

He outlined the present options as: (1) Status Quo — with additional joint cooperation. (2) Three Units in One National Church — non-geographical units as now, but under one national umbrella. Little reorganization. (3) Geographical (regional) Units in One National Church — five to eight units. (4) One National Church — complete merger into one Lutheran church.

Bishop Anderson then gave reasons for advocating merger: Because our Lord calls us to it — "that they may be one"; the challenge of our own confession, e.g. The Augsburg Confession; the commitment of our own constitution to seek unity; and the confrontation of the world with the scandal of disunity among Christians.

Bishop Anderson continued to say that our new church must bring about a church that is: catholic and evangelical in spirit; worldwide in its vision; committed to social justice and peace; united based on adherence to our historical confessions; caring and concerned for others; and, organized in such a way to be effective in mission.

8. Announcements — The delegates were dismissed to attend the Small Group Sessions concerning Lutheran Unity.

- OPENING PRAYERS that we walk with the Lord this day were offered by Chaplain Peter Setzer.
- 2. Call to Order Bishop Misenheimer called the meeting to order and presided.
- 3. COMMITTEE ON REFERENCE AND COUNSEL

The Rev. David Conrad, chairman, thanked the members of his committee, presented the report and made a motion that:

the following resolution be submitted to the Executive Board for study and action:

Since 1963, the month of May officially has been designated as Older Americans Month. The purpose of this observance is to emphasize the vital role of older Americans in American society.

Through legislation, discrimination against the hiring of older persons in the U.S. has been made unlawful. But this is not the case within the church. Through their practices, the congregations and Synod of the Church discriminate against the middle-aged and older pastors. Ask many of our pastors who have reached the ages of 50 and upward, who are laboring in sometimes intolerable situations and who have requested a call to another field of labor, if this is not true.

Ask the retired pastor if he has been asked to serve on the committees of the synod and the answer probably will be "no."

Therefore, believing that this unamerican and unchristian attitude and practice toward our senior pastors is wrong,

Be it resolved:

That the Professional Service Committee study this situation and bring to the convention next year some actions to remedy this matter:

and that the Executive Board seek to provide guidance in recognizing the importance of experience in extending calls to middle-aged and older pastors, and appointing and electing them to working committees of the synod.

The motion was ADOPTED.

### 4. UNFINISHED BUSINESS

Bishop Misenheimer listed these as items of unfinished business to be considered: 1982 Budget Proposal and apportionment formula; Professional Service Committee, substitute motion for Recommendation 3; Infant formula in Third World, resolution.

- 1. Executive Board Report, continued
  - a. 1982 Budget Proposal (BR, pp. 153-154)

Bishop Misenheimer informed the convention that the following proposed amendment made by the Rev. Paul Conrad was before the convention at the close of the discussion of the proposed 1982 Budget during the Seventh Meeting:

That the total request of the LCA for Churchwide Agencies be included in Level I of the budget.

The Rev. C. Marion Starr moved:

the previous question that the proposed amendment be considered.

There was a call for division of the house. Bishop Misenheimer ruled that the motion to consider the proposed amendment was **ADOPTED**.

The proposed amendment was **DEFEATED**.

Frank C. Bouknight, Jr., St. Philip's, Raleigh moved the previous question:

that the proposed budget for 1982 including the N.C. Synod's agreement with LCA Churchwide Agencies be adopted as printed in the Bulletin of Reports.

The motion was ADOPTED.

### b. 1982 Apportionment Formula for congregations

Harry Arne, Executive Board member, explained the 1982 Apportionment Formula and the Rev. Harry Robinson, Jr. moved that:

it be adopted as follows:

In calculating the 1982 Apportionment that the 53 congregations with less than 100 Confirmed, Communing or Contributing Members (CCC's) with 8.64% of the Synod's total CCC's have that percentage reduced one-half to 4.32% and that the 98 congregations with 200 or more CCC's have that percentage increased by 4.32% to 76.71% for determining the 1982 Per Capita for congregations in these two categories. The apportionment formula be adjusted so that apportionments for congregations reporting less than 100 CCC's in 1979 but with more than 99 CCC's in 1980 be calculated on the same basis as apportionment for congregations with less than 100 CCC's for 1982.

The motion was ADOPTED.

### 2. Professional Service Committee, Recommendation no. 3 re: pastor's compensation in Staff Ministry

The Rev. T. C. Plexico, chairman of the Professional Service Committee, presented the motion which was under consideration by the convention in the Sixth Meeting regarding pastor's compensation in a staff ministry (BR, p. ; Pro., p. ) with the understanding that a clarification chart would be considered as a part of the motion.

The Rev. E. Edward Long, D.D. proposed an amendment to the motion that:

it be amended to include the 50% reduction chart not already adopted, and.

that these words be added to read:

minimum base salary for non-lead pastors in staff ministries in their first year of ministry be with parsonage provided, \$12,650; with housing allowance, \$15,800.

The motion to amend was DEFEATED.

The Rev. Richard Boye made a motion that:

the motion be tabled and brought back to the convention for consideration in 1982 along with a proposal regarding salary compensation for lay professionals.

The motion was DEFEATED.

A motion to consider the previous question was ADOPTED.

The motion as proposed by Pastor Plexico was **DEFEATED**.

### 3. Infant Formula in the Third World, Resolution

The Rev. Kenneth W. Fink, chairman for Hunger Concerns, presented and moved the adoption of the following resolution:

WHEREAS people working for agencies like Lutheran World Relief and Church World Services in Third World nations have brought to our attention the fact that the promotion of infant formula has been shown to contribute to infant malnutrition and death in these countries generally lacking adequate conditions for its proper use, and;

WHEREAS the Lutheran Church In America has recognized the infant formula issue as part of its commitment to deal with the problem of world hunger and has been involved in such tactics as stockholders' actions toward American-based infant formula companies in order to remedy unethical promotional activities, and;

WHEREAS Nestle, who controls between  $\frac{1}{3}$  and  $\frac{1}{2}$  of the world's infant formula market, is a Swiss-based corporation and therefore is immune from United States shareholder and congressional action, and;

WHEREAS direct appeals to Nestle to change its sales promotion of in-

fant formula in Third World nations have been generally futile, and those limited changes that have taken place to date have been primarily the result of pressure on the company by concerned consumers participating in the Nestle Boycott, and;

WHEREAS the Lutheran Church In America has recognized that "God calls the church in every time and place to proclaim righteousness, to struggle against injustice, and to care for creation" in its 1978 Human Rights Social Statement.

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the North Carolina Synod of the Lutheran Church In America encourage the members of its congregations to consider joining with the LCW, eight other synods, and many other church groups in refraining from purchasing products and services of the Nestle Company and its subsidiaries until such time that Nestle fully ends its unethical practices in infant formula promotion, including

- an end to distribution of free supplies to hospitals, clinics, and homes to newborns
- an end to the use of company "milk nurses"
- an end to promotion to the health professions and through health care institutions, and
- an end to direct promotion of formula to consumers and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that this convention direct its secretary to ask our N.C. Congressmen to communicate immediately to Richard S. Schweiker, Secretary of Health and Human Services, and Alexander M. Haig, Jr., Secretary of State, our desire to have the United States of America delegation to the World Health Organization now meeting in Geneva, Switzerland, vote in favor of the international code of marketing for formula promotion, and;

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that, should this international code be adopted by the World Health Organization, we request the Social Ministry Committee of the North Carolina Synod, and our synodical World Mission Committee as well as our synod's Lutheran World Relief/World Hunger Committee to communicate to the Division of Mission in North America and the Division for World Mission and Ecumenism to assist us in monitoring the corporations producing infant formula to see that they adhere to the code.

The Rev. John W. Cobb. D.D., moved that:

the first resolution be deleted.

The Rev. Richard B. Graf, Jr., made a motion that:

the business session be extended to 10:15 a.m.

The motion was ADOPTED.

The motion to amend by deleting the first resolve was DEFEATED.

A motion to consider the previous question was ADOPTED.

There was a call for division of the house. Bishop Misenheimer ruled that the original motion by Pastor Fink was **ADOPTED**.

### 5. PRESENTATION OF YOUTH CONVO.

Youth Convo reported to the convention using a skit and action songs.

### 6. ANNOUNCEMENTS

Several announcements were made including:

the result of the straw vote on Lutheran Unity: For 328; against 12; undecided 3.

the Ordination Service would be held, May 24, 1981 at Epiphany, Winston-Salem, 4 p.m.

### 7. REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE OF DISTRICT DEANS, re: attendance and excuses

The Rev. John Nagle, Dean of the Eastern District, presented the report on behalf of the Committee on Credentials and Enrollment. This 179th Synod Convention calls us together, June 3-6, to review our progress, to discuss issues, to make our plans for the future, for fellowship and worship, and this time to elect a new Bishop. This year's Convention theme, "Born Anew to a Living Hope", excites us with the opportunities that lie ahead for us as individuals and for the Lutheran Church in this decade. What happens these four convention days should send us home with a lively hope, with confidence and faith that our dreams and visions for our church will be realized.

For the last ten years, Lenoir-Rhyne College has been the home for our synod conventions. This campus offers us the opportunity to live together, to eat together, to work and worship together, and to enjoy being a part of the Lutheran family in North Carolina. It is with deep appreciation that we say "Thank you" to Dr. Albert Anderson, President of the College, and his staff for so willingly hosting this convention year after year and meeting our every need, and to Pastors Walter Hitchcock and Mark Menees of Mt. Olive, Hickory for being the host congregation this year. No one realizes "the behind the scenes work" coordinated by our co-hosts, the College and Mt. Olive Church to accommodate our requirements. Together we applaud you.

Others who must be recognized and appreciated for contributing to the success of our convention are the Executive Board's Sub-Committee on Conventions Chaired by Mrs. Opal Moretz, the Convention Co-ordinator, Pastor Leo Smith, the Synod Secretary, David Martin, and the entire church house staff including our secretaries, the five convention committees, the Convention Chaplain, Richard Perry, the organist and a host of other devoted workers.

Since this is the last time the five of us on the Bishop's staff, as it is now constituted, will appear together at a convention, I want to recognize each one for his special contribution to our teamwork to serve you. During these four years I have sung their praises and have declared this to be the best synod staff in the LCA. I want to applaud David Martin, Richard Little, Robert Shoffner, and James Chesky for their dedication to their assignments, for the expertise they render in their areas of concern, and for the personal support they have given me in my four years as Bishop. I am sure the whole church in North Carolina joins me in this applause. I want to include with them the rest of our team, the secretaries, bookkeeper, printer, and youth staffer at the church house. It has been great to have them all on the team with me.

Another member of the team I want to applaud is my wife, Margaret. Her willingness to sacrifice my presence at home and our time together over the years has enabled me to serve the synod as I have these 27 years. However, in her own right through her great interest in the work of the church, its pastors and their families, and its congregations, she has made her own contribution to the life of our synod. Her support and help has been one of my greatest assets.

This is the 26th report I have written for a convention bulletin in my years with the synod as Assistant to the President and Bishop. With that experience it should be easy, but it is always difficult to put into words the progress we've made and the challenges ahead. In an effort to do this I want to divide my report into five sections as follows: (1) Highlights of the past year (2) The 1982 Convention expectations (3) The reports from members of my staff (4) Our record of Official Acts (5) The 1980's and the Lutheran Church.

### HIGHLIGHTS OF THE PAST YEAR

A lot of good things have happened since our May 1981 Convention. It has been a banner year in many areas of our ministry as reports in this bulletin will show. While statistics on membership growth are not available at this writing, I hope that they will

give us encouraging gains to report as a result of our sharing the faith. I want to thank you and your congregations for what you are doing to make the Gospel happen here and everywhere. I like to think of our work together through the synod as a reaching out in love to put our arms around the neck of the world in the name of Jesus Christ. As you study this Bulletin of Reports, I hope that you will see yourself in all these ministries — on college and seminary campuses, in our homes for the elderly, our conference and camping facilities, our home and world mission fields, our group homes for children, feeding the hungry, baptizing the new believers, etc., etc. — because your prayers and gifts make all this possible. If you read the bulletin in this light, it will take on new meaning for you.

The staff and I, this year, have continued our emphasis on the pastoral aspect of this office. We try never to be too busy about things, projects, and programs to pay attention to the cries of our people, for people are our business, our ministry. In doing this we have had to leave other things undone that needed attention but we feel that our priorities are in the right order.

I would like to list here what I consider the top ten highlights of the year. They are positive and encouraging.

- A highly successful Conference and Camping Ministries Appeal which to date has brought congregational commitments to \$1,523,392.51 toward our \$1,600,000 challenge goal.
- Apportionment receipts made history by going over the two million dollar mark. It was 14 years ago, in 1967, that we gave more than one million dollars for the first time.
- The 1981 Convention discussion and the Executive Board's resolve to provide 100% of our LCA Apportionment by 1984 with recommendations to make this possible.
- 4. The Executive Board's establishment of a \$250,000 professorship from the Michael Peeler Fund Income for the Southern Seminary.
- 5. The ninth edition of the Carolinas' Evangelism Conference.
- 6. The great attendance and response for the 1982 District Church Days.
- 7. The great beginning of the Lutheran Family Services in North Carolina program directed by its new Board of Trustees.
- The Pastors' Convocation at Lutheridge featuring Dr. Joseph Sittler in September 1981.
- 9. The decline in conflict and crisis situations in congregations of our synod.
- Change of direction for the synod staff to give more time to direct services to
  pastors and congregations and less time to implementation of committee programs.

### **CONVENTION EXPECTATIONS FOR 1982**

The happenings of the past year will tend to shape what happens at this 179th Convention of Lutherans in North Carolina. But what happens at this convention, in many ways, will chart our course of action during the 1980's. I include the following among the most important items on the convention agenda.

- The opening Service of the Word led by the Synod Staff with the Bishop's sermon will set the tone for the convention.
- The balloting for the new Bishop will be followed with a great deal of excitement. Balloting begins Thursday evening and if five ballots are necessary, could continue through Saturday afternoon.
- 3. The Convention Chaplain, the Rev. Richard Perry, will bring timely messages and uplifting worship experiences each day.
- 4. The Rev. John L. Yost, Jr., D.D., has been appointed by the Executive Council to be our LCA representative. In two thirty minute segments he will thrill us with our mission together through Church Wide Agencies.
- Throughout the convention we will be voting on nominees to fill 28 positions on boards of the five institutions and the Executive Board of the Synod.

- "Applying our Theology to a Changing World" will be discussed in a special presentation by Dr. Larry Yoder on Friday morning. We want to make this a continuing emphasis in our church through the auxiliaries and District Church Days.
- 7. The election of a new editor of the *North Carolina Lutheran* due to the resignation for health reasons of Pastor John Wertz elected at the last convention for a three year term.
- 8. The recommendation from the Executive Board regarding 100% apportionment giving by the synod to the LCA. These items summarize the recommendation: to greatly increase the 1983 level one amount for Church Wide Agencies; to put the full apportionment for LCA in level one of the 1984 budget; to participate in the LCA wide intensified stewardship growth program.
- 9. A Board of Trustees for Outdoor Ministries rather than the present committee structure will be recommended to the convention.
- 10. A 1983 budget of \$2,894,812 will be recommended by the Executive Board on Friday morning. This is a 10% increase over the 1982 budget total.
- 11. The LCA representative will discuss with us the steps in the Lutheran Unity process and the recommendations to come before the LCA, ALC, and AELC Conventions this September on Saturday afternoon.
- 12. Memorials for the LCA 1982 Louisville Convention will be proposed.
- 13. Saturday evening will feature a banquet which you perhaps know more about than I do. I have been given a special invitation to attend. I look forward to seeing you there.
- 14. Again Youth Convo will add moments of inspiration to our convention with "song breaks" and their usual presentation Sunday morning.
- 15. Lively issues are always introduced from the floor.
- 16. Amendments to the Constitution and By-Laws will be fewer this year which will probably be welcomed by most delegates.
- The audio-visual reports from the Cabinets will provide information on and enthusiasm for our mission together.
- 18. New and senior pastors will be recognized.
- 19. A Service of Remembrance for those pastors who have died since the last convention will be held on Saturday afternoon conducted by the Chaplain.
- The convention closes with the Ordination Service featuring a processional in which all pastors will participate, ordination of perhaps six persons, the sermon by Dr. Michael McDaniel, and the Sacrament of Holy Communion.

### THE REPORTS OF THE SYNOD STAFF

I take a great deal of pride in presenting to you in this section, the reports of the members of the Bishop's staff. I am sure that all of us rejoice in the good leadership each has been able to provide in his areas of responsibility. I am proud of the contribution these men have made to this office and to the life of the synod all four years of this administration. I know that you will read their reports with interest and appreciation.

### DAVID L. MARTIN, MINISTER FOR PROFESSIONAL LEADERSHIP

This last year of ministry on Bishop Misenheimer's team has been exciting. It has not been an experience of coasting or letting go but rather an intensification of ministry. All areas of my work as Minister for Professional Leadership and Synod Secretary have been enfused with newness and clarity of vision. I would characterize ministry this year in two ways: persons and events. Congregational members and leaders, pastors, lay professionals and their spouses, committee members and committee chairpersons, synod personnel, staff and the Bishop make up that fellowship of persons in ministry in Christ. Meetings, conferences, workshops, retreats, counseling sessions and worship services have been the events in which God's grace has unfolded in our lives together. There have been definite feelings of ac-

complishment as well as urgency in developing our ministry further. Sure, there have been valleys of struggle and frustration in our work together but never outside of the knowledge of the grace of God to bring newness to life. The synod is moving into the 80s with purpose and direction. While particular clarity on issues is not always evident there is a boldness in Christ that he will provide the strength and vision for all of us.

My staff responsibilities are to relate to and support the Cabinet for Professional Leadership, the Committee for Professional Preparation, the Committee for Professional Leadership, the Campus Ministry Committee, and, the Committee on Historical Work. I am responsible for counseling to pastors, lay professionals and their families. Also, I function as Secretary of Synod, the Executive Board, and, District Deans; and Archivist for the synod. The Bishop assigns other responsibilities as needs arise. Increasingly, I am involved in congregational life and planning. The following is a summary of my work during the interim highlighting some of the persons and events in my ministry.

### PROFESSIONAL LEADERSHIP

The Cabinet for Professional Leadership chaired by the Rev. T. C. Plexico, exercised oversight of the Preparations and Service Committees. This year I worked with the Cabinet as it dealt with evaluation of the Chaplain in Residence program at Chapel Hill and making the decision that it be dropped. Also, the Cabinet prioritized the 1983 Professional Leadership budget proposals and planned the convention presentation.

Professional Preparation — One of my most demanding and rewarding tasks is to relate to the Professional Preparation Committee. The constant challenge of this committee is to develop persons to provide excellence in ministry in the church. It is exciting to see students interested in church vocations relate to this committee and to see their lives unfold in preparation for ministry. I have spent many hours with students struggling with vocational decisions. Hours were spent with the committee as we cared for and supported students in conversation, counseling, advice, and evaluation. The committee has had to make painful decisions and I have attempted to support them in the process. This year I have had four occasions to tell the preparation story to congregations. I have shared oversight of one internship. Four trips were made to Southern Seminary this year for internship evaluations, readiness for ministry evaluation, and rising internship interviews. A highlight for me has been the annual retreat for seminarians and their spouses at Lutheridge where we have had an opportunity to work with each student in a retreat setting, growing together theologically and spiritually and in fellowship with one another. Professor John Root was the presenter for the November 6-8 retreat.

Pastor Bill Milholland has unselfishly chaired this hardworking committee. His dedication to the task of coordinating such a mammoth responsibility is awesome. I am grateful for his leadership. The dedication of each member of the committee is commendable. Nine days of meetings, trips to the seminary, close contact with the students have characterized our work together this year. The agendas of this committee are crowded and rarely completed. The committee has dealt with issues such as second career candidates, homosexuality in the ministry, and, guidelines for an adequate preparation process. Also, the committee has been mindful of the need for more active recruitment for ministry. They have received encouragement from the Executive Board and the Bishop to develop this work further.

The synod, and indeed the church, is faced with rising costs in the preparation of students for ministry. While the synod can assist students financially to some extent, we encourage congregations to support their students in preparation for ministry. It has been a joy to see the Executive Board commit \$250,000 of Michael Peeler Funds over the coming years to endow a Michael Peeler Professorship at Southern Seminary, strengthening this essential institution.

**Professional Service** — Over the years, I have worked with this committee as it has wrestled with ways to develop support for pastors and lay professional leaders in their growth as persons and professionals. Under the untiring leadership of Chaplain David Franzen, this committee has worked in three major areas: compensation and support of professional leaders, concerns in ministry, and, lay professional leader-

ship concerns. The success of the 1981 Fall Convocation has been an inspiration to this committee and will serve as a pattern for the immediate future in offering growth opportunities to our pastors and lay professionals. The 1982 Fall Convocation, to be held at Lutheridge September 17-19 will have the Rev. Martin J. Heinecken as the key note speaker. He will focus on the theme of the convocation, "Applying Our Theology to a Changing World". I have worked with the committee in other events such as the annual convention dinner for lay professionals and the new professional leaders workshop. We have supported programs in first and third years in ministry. An exciting event for us this year has been the Parish Secretaries Seminar at the Sheraton Motor Inn in Charlotte on March 15-16. The event was presented by the Association of Larger Lutheran Churches with funds from Aid Association for Lutherans. I assisted in establishing and coordinating this pan-Lutheran event offered to secretaries from LCA, ALC, and, Missouri Synod congregations in North and South Carolina. 56 secretaries and 34 pastors were involved in the event.

The committee is constantly involved in study of adequate compensation for professional leaders. Along with recommendations on guidelines for adequate compensation for pastors, this year the committee will be introducing guidelines for adequate compensation of lay professional leaders. I have counseled with a number of congregations in regard to compensation of their professional leaders. It is rewarding to see how congregations are willing to take the guidelines seriously and respond to the needs of our professional leaders. The committee continues to work in the areas of Growth In Ministry, long tenured pastorate and concerns of older pastors.

The greatest joy for me this year, has been my work with this committee in developing a proposed Counseling and Referral Service for the synod's professional leaders and their families. Over the past ten years I have had a growing concern for adequate care and support of all of our professional leaders. No one person possesses the ability, the expertise, or availability to respond to all the needs of our professional leaderships. I have seen both my limitations and needs. The committee hopes to initiate the program of Counseling and Referral for our professional leaders this fall. Through centers and members of the American Association of Pastoral Counselors in the state, the synod will provide, by contract, counseling services for our pastors, lay professionals and their families who seek and need extended pastoral counseling and psychotherapy. The purpose is to provide qualified professional pastoral counseling services at a reduced cost. The program is designed to protect the anonymity of every person seeking help. The synod will share in the cost of counseling services. Conversations are now in progress to establish the system. It is important to emphasize that this program is not to detract or lessen pastoral concern by the Bishop and his staff in their shepherding and care of pastors and lay professional leaders, but to enhance and support that ministry with extended professional counseling services that are in a dimension of therapy beyond pastoral care.

Counseling — During the interim I have had 64 counseling sessions, 23 pastoral calls, and 9 career counseling sessions with pastors, lay professional leaders and their families. Professional leaders in the church are subject to the same trials and tribulations as the general population. The present political and economic realities have had an emotional impact on our professional leaders. Depression and "brown down" characterized many personal situations. Marital problems are much in evidence along with mid-life and other adult crises. Some leaders have come with problems in dealing with personal and professional relationships. Both the Bishop and I have been ready and willing to respond to the needs of our leaders. However many persons who are suffering personally will not seek help from the Bishop or his staff. It is my prayer that the Counseling and Referral Service will be another opportunity for pastors and lay professionals and their families to seek the help when they need it.

### HISTORICAL WORK/ARCHIVES

My work as Archivist and staff person to the Historical Work Committee has been a joy as the program continues to develop. While many people may not see the work of this committee and the archivist as critical to the synod's life, it surely is not the case. Today, as never before institutions are faced with the "paper war" of growing

floods of documents. Files are filled to overflowing in the synod headquarters and in many of our congregations. The management of records and the preservation of significant documents is necessary. The Committee on Historical Work and I have designed a major project in records management and the completion of the Archives holdings up through the present administration. The pressure to do so has come from various sources. First, the Conrad, Whittecar, and, Misenheimer files need to be arranged and described in the Archives in order to gain intellectual control over these holdings. Second, the task needs to be done now with the possibility of the creation of a new Lutheran church body in the mid to late 1980s. Third, a responsible records management program for current records is needed for this and succeeding administrations in order to deal with the volume of materials accumulated. At the March meeting, the Executive Board approved a two year project recommended by the Historical Work committee which would employ a full-time professional archivist for two years to accomplish the objectives of developing a records management program and bring the archives holdings up to date. It is hoped that by convention time the project will have begun.

Another exciting event in the synod's life in which I participated was the gift of the Bernard and Juanita Cruse Genealogical Collection to the synod archives. The collection is given in honor of Bernard Cruse and memory of Juanita Cruse by Mr. and Mrs. B. W. (Bill) Cruse, Jr. of Indian Trail. It is a significant addition to the synod archives in that it contains a comprehensive record of German Lutheran families in the Cabarrus and Rowan County areas. I, along with the other committee members, have been responsible for transporting the collection from Indian Trail to the Archives in Raleigh and on to the archives at the synod headquarters. The collection was appraised and will be processed in the coming months. The dedication of the Bernard and Juanita Cruse Collection will take place on May 30, 1982 at the Church House.

I assisted the committee in completing a filmstrip and cassette presentation entitled "Your Lutheran Heritage: Yours to Preserve" to be made available to congregations of the synod this spring. The purpose of the presentation is to assist congregations in establishing their own archives program. We express our thanks to Dr. Maurice Stirewalt and Dr. Robin Gatwood for their dedication in completing the project.

People are constantly visiting the archives. Mrs. Mae Blake and I have attempted to serve their needs. Dozens of letters of inquiry into the archives holdings have come to us. While we cannot do the research for visitors or inquirers we do attempt to give them adequate leads for research. A sizeable addition to the archives has been the inclusion of 5600 feet of microfilmed copy of 48 congregations' records filmed two years ago at Lenoir-Rhyne College and the Catawba County Courthouse.

Miss Sarah Walker has been a devoted chairperson of this committee and has been tireless in her work. The committee is made up of dedicated people who realize the importance of a vital program of archives. The committee is looking forward to the celebration of the synod's bi-centennial anniversary in the year 2003. There is a growing need for continued research into the history of the synod and we are just beginning to understand the richness of our heritage as North Carolina Lutherans.

### CAMPUS MINISTRY

Working with this committee under the able leadership of Dr. Francis Binkowski has been a continuing joy. Campus ministry is a growing and vital part of our synod's ministry. There has been growing concern in matters of faith and religion among students on our college and university campuses across the state. Our Campus Ministry programs have experienced more student involvement especially in our agencies at Raleigh, Durham, and Chapel Hill. This year the committee evaluated campus ministry in the North Carolina Synod as a response to an Executive Board request. The results affirmed both its strength and its value. I have been involved in all phases of the committee's work. In the fall I attended the budget agreement hearing for 1982 of the Southeastern Region of National Lutheran Campus Ministry. In the winter I was a part of a team created to perform a quadrennial evaluation of the Durham Area Campus Ministry Agency. The evaluation was one of the finest experiences I have had in campus ministry work. Also, I have been involved in planning for a joint North

Carolina/South Carolina Conference for contact pastors in covenant congregations to be held at Wingate College on September 20-21, 1982.

I express thanks to the Campus Ministry Committee for their dedication and hard work. I especially express my gratitude to the Rev. Robert G. Walker, Southeastern Regional Director for National Lutheran Campus Ministry for his vision for and commitment to campus ministry.

### DISTRICT CONGREGATIONAL AND OTHER INVOLVEMENTS

During the interim I led seven church council retreats, two ministry staff retreats, and one college student retreat. Other parish related events included two presentations to LCWs and 18 other events including installations, dedications, anniversaries, congregational and church council meetings, and presentations on the synod's work. Staff involvement in church council retreating has grown over the years. Because of the demand, the staff called on the services of Dr. Martin Saarinen, Director of Continuing Education at Southern Seminary to lead us in a two day retreat on designing and implementing council retreats.

District involvement this year included two meetings of the District Deans and attendance at eleven district meetings.

During the interim I attended various events including an Inclusive Leadership Conference, Carolinas' Evangelism Conference, a program of personal career evaluation, a workshop on training into the LCA's Support Systems Workshop, and a Preaching From Commitment Seminar.

During the interim I have had extensive involvement with the Executive Board Sub-Committee on Conventions ably led by Mrs. Opal Moretz. Convention planning is a year long process. It has been rewarding to work with Mt. Olive Lutheran Church, Hickory and Lenoir-Rhyne College in preparation for the 1982 Synod Convention.

### PERSONALLY SPEAKING

Being a member of the synod's staff ministry team has been a wonderful experience. Bishop Misenheimer and staff members James Chesky, Robert Shoffner and Richard Little have meant so much to me personally and professionally. Their love and support have been a joy to my life. I am grateful to David Castor and Richard Perry for their support as well. Mrs. Mae Blake and Mrs. Betty Munday, two of the Church House staff with whom I work most closely, have been very supportive and understanding. I am deeply grateful to them. I thank Caroline Hampton, Mildred Casper, Nancy Howard, Ann Leonard, and Julia Walters for their fine supporting work.

While I have given much to the work of the synod over the past nine and a half years, I have been given so much more. In beginning my work on the synod staff, I was inexperienced, overwhelmed, and uncertain. But over the years I have been nurtured by the hundreds of people, staff, executive board members, committee chairmen and members, pastors and lay professionals, students, and lay people who have been patient and loving. I cannot begin to thank all those who have had a part in this process. The joy of life is in the reality of Christ among us in our ministry together. Finally, I express love and gratitude to my wife Debbie and my daughter Suzanna for their love and understanding as I pursued Christ's calling to the work of the synod.

### ROBERT H. SHOFFNER, MINISTER FOR PARISH SERVICES

Pogo once said, "I always seem to be surrounded by insurmountable opportunities." Pogo, I know what you mean! Ministry in parish services with our congregations has certainly kept me surrounded with opportunities which at times seem insurmountable. However, such circumstances motivate me — especially when I can see a way to help an individual, group or entire congregation discover a more effective means of applying our theology in a changing world.

My role is largely that of a broker — helping congregations discover the best resource for applying the gospel in a given situation. When that happens, I sense fulfillment in my call to be Minister for Parish Services among you. That call compels me to help individuals, parish groups, and synod committees heed Paul's words to

the Romans (12:2 NEB), "Adapt yourselves no longer to the pattern of this present world, but let your minds be remade and your whole nature transformed. Then you will be able to discover the will of God, and to know what is good, acceptable and perfect."

Trying to fulfill this call among you has meant

- appreciating the gifts of Bishop Ernest Misenheimer, David Martin, James Chesky and Richard Little and enjoying the assimilation of those gifts for the ministry you entrust to us;
- learning to identify needs then determining ministry direction versus imposing direction on a committee or congregational group;
- realizing the great variety of ways the Holy Spirit calls, gathers, sanctifies, enlightens and sends the people in our Synod and the LCA;
- becoming a better listener and a more able consultant;
- spending more hours and moments away from my family than I would like;
- finding ways to organize my time so personal relaxation and enrichment can occur;
- developing a host of friends in our synod and the LCA with whom a network of mutual support in Christ has occurred;
- gaining a sincere appreciation for the ministry of administration in the church and recognizing the challenge to keep our Lord's ministry central in it and
- discovering the wealth of personal gifts for ministry which exists among you and often being frustrated at the inability to utilize more effectively these gifts.

This list could continue, but these are significant dimensions of my ministry in partnership with you. Please read the reports of Pastor David Lohr (Educational Ministry), Pastor Timothy Glenham (Youth Ministry), Pastor Robert Allen (Worship/Music), Pastor Don Michael (Parish Life and Ministry Development), and Pastor Glenn Boland (Cabinet for Parish Services) for detail description of the major ministries which are part of my responsibility. Bishop Misenheimer's report covers the administrative dimensions of my work.

### CABINET FOR PARISH SERVICES

How can committees more effectively deliver to congregations assistance needed and raise consciousness of ministry possibilities? How can this cabinet's committees better coordinate their services to congregations so parish leaders will gain (a) a stronger awareness of the inter-relatedness of learning, witness, service, worship and support, (b) a clearer sense of direction for ministry and (c) not be overwhelmed by the Cabinet committees' offerings? Answers to these questions still need to be formed if our committee and cabinet structure is to be an effective means of enhancing congregational ministries. The Cabinet continues to grapple with these issues. We also need to develop further our Lutheran Volunteer System for identifying persons who have ministry gifts to share beyond the congregation. We have a rich synod when you consider the variety of skills represented among our 81,000 members. Let's share the wealth more!

### **EDUCATIONAL MINISTRY**

Key foci of this ministry are to help congregations determine educational needs, choose appropriate resources and train leaders. Most of this assistance is offered through District Church Days and individual consultations. The Leadership Education and development (LEAD) emphasis has attracted few congregations although those participating have discovered great value in developing their own leadership training programs. Efforts to offer higher quality help to teachers and other parish education leaders is a priority of the committee. The Sunday Church School will also be emphasized in 1983-84 as we participate with the LCA in renewing the SCS and introducing an alternative curriculum. We still have only 32% of our baptized membership in SCS. Another concern is the need to help pastors and lay professionals renew their awareness of relevant educational ministry as a must in the parish if we are to help one another apply our theology in a changing world.

### YOUTH MINISTRY

Several efforts have strengthened youth ministry in our synod: increased leader-ship training opportunities, greater assistance for district programming; more extensive program helps for congregations and more leadership opportunities for youth. The Youth Staffer program has been strengthened through more direction and personal support for the staffer. A first in 1982-83 will be a second year of service by Barbara Herpich, our current staffer. Barbara's abilities and commitment to ministry deserve recognition and support.

How can we increase the sense of identity among our youth? A "Youth Ministry Emphasis Program" will provide an answer in 1982-83. The emphasis will offer synodical, district and parish programming focusing on World Hunger. Youth in our synod will work toward the cooperative accomplishment of a world hunger project. The committee needs, however, to continue to seek answers to the identity question as well as provide more programming which focuses on personal needs of youth and development of adult leaders.

### WORSHIP/MUSIC

Our need continues for growth in (a) appreciation of the tension between our Lutheran heritage in worship and the contemporary context in which that heritage is set; (b) awareness of the important role of worship in parish life and (c) willingness to be creative in use of *Lutheran Book of Worship* materials. One example of the committee's efforts to enhance this growth is the October 29-30, 1982 Convocation on Worship, Music and the Arts. The significant growth in our synod in the number of lay persons involved in planning and leading parish worship deserves mention. Many attribute this to the *Lutheran Book of Worship* emphasis on worship renewal. The new *Occasional Services* book should further enhance our parish worship life.

### PARISH LIFE AND MINISTRY DEVELOPMENT

This has been a year of adjustment for PLMD in our synod. The Synod Committee has developed new ways of introducing congregations to this resource. The emphasis has been placed on use of the short term PLMD approaches instead of the more comprehensive one. We can not neglect this valuable parish life and ministry resource, especially as congregations are forced to make crucial ministry direction decisions in light of changing membership and our rapidly changing world.

### MEDIA

The Media Center has been busier than ever this year as the number of resources has increased. Betty Munday has responded to congregational, committee and agency requests promptly and helpfully as Coordinator of the Center. Work continues in developing our video tape resources and making them more usable by congregations. The Executive Board will consider in September possible purchase of video-tape production equipment. A dream of mine has not been fulfilled this past year due to other demands — that is, developing for congregations special programs using media we already have. We are grateful for the special benevolent efforts of a few congregations and individuals recently in making purchase of new "Davey and Goliath" films possible. However, media accessions continue to depend on the budgets of our various committees.

### IN GRATITUDE

"Resource person" describes my role with the above committees. Those who direct the work deserve gratitude from us all: Rev. David Lohr (Education), Rev. Timothy Glenham (Youth), Rev. Robert Allen (Worship), Rev. Don Michael (PLMD), Rev. Glenn Boland (Cabinet). The excellent leadership of Rev. David Huddle and Rev. David Castor in Camp and Conference Ministries has meant that I only serve in a support role there. My abilities to serve these committees and be a partner on Bishop Misenheimer's staff have been greatly enhanced by the Church House Staff: Nancy Howard, Mildred Casper, Betty Munday, Caroline Hampton, Ann Leonard, Julia Walters and Mae Blake.

My chief expression of gratitude goes to Bishop Misenheimer and the Executive Board for extending me this call four years ago and for allowing me to fulfill it in my own way and with the help of God. I especially have a sincere appreciation for the

witness of commitment Bishop Misenheimer shares in our synod. Partnership in ministry with him, David, Jim and Dick has certainly been an experience of growth in faith and ministry for me. They have been a blessing in my life. I pray God will continue to help me share that blessing so others will be able "to discern the will of God, and to know what is good, acceptable and perfect." The Lord be with you!

### RICHARD C. LITTLE, MINISTER FOR OUTREACH

As we come to the conclusion of Bishop Misenheimer's term, I find myself reflecting on the last four years in the life of the synod. I feel God has been very much at work across the synod reconciling us to Himself and to each other. The spirit of unity and joy have been the banner of this administration, and under Bishop Misenheimer's able leadership we have all joined together "in the unity of the Spirit in the bond of peace" (Ephesians 4:3) to be the Body of Christ in the world.

Specifically in my area of responsibility, Outreach Ministries, my dream has been to hold up and expand our vision of ministry beyond ourselves into the world. We have a very able group of people who chair and serve on the various synod committees and boards that relate to Outreach Ministry. These committees include Evangelism, Social Mission, American Mission, World Mission, Lutheran World Relief/World Hunger, Justice and Social Change, and Environmental Concerns. The boards include North Carolina Lutheran Homes and Lutheran Family Services. It has been a real joy to work with all the talent represented on these committees and boards as we seek to do our Lord's ministry in this synod. (For more specific details, please see the reports of these committees and agencies in this Bulletin of Reports.)

The major thrust in Outreach Ministry continues to be the equipping of the saints in the local congregation. Evangelism Consultants and a Social Ministry Resource Network are major efforts to make regular and intimate contact with congregational leaders in Evangelism and Social Ministry. The purpose of these volunteer networks is to learn what is happening in Outreach Ministry in the congregations, to provide support and encouragement to the congregational committee, to expand the horizon of the committee's thinking and hold up possibilities for growth in ministry, and to inform the committee of resources that are available. This interaction has been designed to strengthen and unite us in our ministry together.

However, in these four years as the Minister for Outreach, I have had a concern that continues to gnaw at me. It seems that too often outreach and mission end up on the bottom of the congregation's priority list. I am much aware of the danger of broad, general statements and am therefore often hesitant to make them, but as I have had the occasion to talk with Evangelism and Social Ministry leaders across the synod, I can't help but conclude that more often than not our congregations are weak in witness and service ministries. There have been some significant strides and efforts to alter this (i.e., Word and Witness, Lutheran Minority Ministry, refugee resettlement, world hunger appeal), but it seems to me that these have only scratched the surface. Congregations continue to spend a disproportionate amount of time and energy on maintenance (of members, of buildings, of income, etc.). This is certainly an important facet of the church's life, but it seems that our ministries and our existence have become too much inward directed and too little outward directed.

Outreach is crucial at any time in the life of God's people, but it seems that we are entering a time when the mandate and imperative for outreach is even more evident. Through our government God is calling on the churches and the private sector to provide services; are we ready and able to respond in faithful service? The Moral Majority and other fundamental religious groups are blanketing the world via television and bicycles; are we being as effective in sharing our understanding of the Gospel? But it seems an even more basic question must be asked: are we even open to hearing this call? Do we see these to be concerns our church should address? Too often the question is "SHOULD we respond?" rather than "HOW will we respond?" We must first see witness and service as crucial functions of the church so that we can then determine the "how" and amass the resources (people, time, and money) to adequately meet the challenges facing our church in outreach ministries.

I feel we are moving forward albeit slowly. If nothing else, the times in which we live are forcing us to re-evaluate and re-think the role of Christ's church here in 20th

century America. I sense the church is at the dawn of a new age here in America. Our future as the bearer of God's Word depends on how we respond. Will we accept the challenges before us and rise to the opportunities placed in our laps, or will we retrench and "circle up" to protect and preserve what we have developed? It is my prayer that we will all be renewed and refreshed as this living Spirit flows anew in our midst and rejuvenates us to reach out in His Name!

In closing I would like to thank Ernest for the privilege of serving on his staff and for the opportunity to work with such competent people as Ernest, Dave, Bob, and Jim. It has also been a pleasure to work with all the talented volunteers who serve on the committees I mentioned above. I especially want to thank the committee chairpersons (Paul Conrad, Margy Robinson, Boyce Whitener, Vinnie Vierling, Don Deal and Ken Fink, David Sloop, and Al Mullen) for jobs well done. Finally my work would have been impossible without the skills and patience of my secretary, Mae Blake. She along with all the others on the support staff are the key to the communication link between the synod and the congregations. Whatever the future holds in store, I pray that God will use all 82,000 of us to mightily proclaim His good news in His world through our witness and service.

### JAMES A. CHESKY, MINISTER FOR RESOURCES

The year since last Synod Convention has been filled with many activities, a few frustrations, several challenges, rewarding experiences and signs of growth and encouragement. Being on synod staff has been all those things and more.

I will highlight the year in each of the areas in which I work,

STEWARDSHIP — My work with the Stewardship Committee has been enjoyable and I appreciate the support, work and leadership that the members of the committee have given to synodical stewardship efforts.

Each fall we conduct consultations with congregations as we strive to reach 100% of our apportionment, our "fair-share." Once again we had 70 congregations participate in this Partners in Ministry Emphasis. A number of the congregations, who already meet their fair-share, used this as an educational program on the ministries we do together. The process has helped most of the congregations grow in their understanding of and support for the wider ministries of which they are a part. Unfortunately a few congregations have not been able to set higher goals and to realize growth in their programs.

The Delegates to this convention are being asked to approve a Stewardship Emphasis which would begin with the 1983 Synod Convention. The Stewardship Committee has already begun planning for the emphasis. I hope that the emphasis will be approved so that all of our people can participate in a program that can help us see that Stewardship is the way we live and that our congregations have programs that take place throughout the **entire** year.

BUDGET CONTROL OFFICER — At last year's convention we had very good discussions about Synod's "fair-share" of the support for Church Wide Ministries. At that time it was not possible to change the proposal for 1982, however, the intent of the discussions was heard and action has been taken to implement a plan to become a Synod which sets the example of supporting all ministries with our "fair-share."

The Finance Sub-Committee of the Executive Board has taken the first step of increasing our support of Church Wide Agencies by \$111,950 in the proposed 1983 Program Budget of Synod. This amount is half of the increase we would need to make to meet the amount apportioned to Synod for 1983. The next step planned is to meet the amount to be apportioned to Synod in the year 1984.

The interest in becoming a 100% Synod and the growth shown in many of the congregations are encouraging signs that we are letting the Spirit lead us. There is ministry to be done and we are growing in our efforts to do it.

BUSINESS/OFFICE MANAGER — The efforts in this area of responsibility are always directed at being as efficient as possible. This year we had an unexpected ex-

pense with the air-conditioning system, resulting from a faulty condenser which damaged the compressor. As might be expected, the damages occurred at the hottest time of the year.

In an effort to become barrier free, we now have a ramp from the parking lot.

COMMUNICATIONS — I work with the Synod Communications Committee and the News Bureau. This year the Committee has had the responsibility of selecting a nominee for the position of Editor of the *N.C. Lutheran*. Pastor John Wertz has found it necessary for health reasons to resign as the Editor. We will miss his work.

MISCELLANEOUS — I also serve as the Synod Representative on the Finance Committee of the N.C. Council of Churches and as a member of the House of Delegates.

I have represented Bishop Misenheimer at various official functions such as installations, dedications and meetings.

I have had an increasing number of requests to speak on the subject of Stewardship at different functions.

I want to thank the Church House Staff, Ann, Betty, Caroline, Julia, Mae, Mildred and Nancy for their support and their good work. What they do makes my work easier.

I also want to thank Pastors Dick Little, David Martin and Bob Shoffner for their support and encouragement. Their sense of team work and their vision have helped me see where we are and where we are going.

I also want to thank Bishop Misenheimer for giving me the opportunity to be a part of his ministry — to be a member of his team. His leadership will always be appreciated.

### THE 1980'S AND THE LUTHERAN CHURCH

In my 27 years on the synod staff, since 1955, I have seen many changes in the N. C. Synod. We have come from a dwelling that housed our office space to a church house designed to be a synod headquarters building; from a synod president and secretary, one typewriter and a mimeograph, to a Bishop with four assistants, a staff of six secretaries and a bookkeeper and excellent office machines and equipment; from a few services for congregations and pastors to a multitude of requested offerings; from out of state ministries to children and the elderly to first class programs on our own territory; from 170 congregations to 209 with four additional under development; from 184 pastors to 314; from 60,823 baptized Lutherans to 82,398; from total expenditures by our churches of \$3,067,598 to \$16,141,528; from participation by a few lay people to an army of lay personnel in leadership roles; from committees and delegations coming to the synod office with problems and requests, to the Bishop and his staff giving on the spot consultation in the congregation. And the list could go on and on.

In spite of the dramatic changes of the past 27 years, I predict that the next 10 or 15 years will bring about even more changes and improvements in a growing church than the last 27. We will move from typewriters to word processors and computers; we will experience more membership growth; our offerings will show greater percentage increases to keep pace with inflation; the new church will provide a greater Lutheran influence — a more co-ordinated approach — and will offer a new concept

in whatever way congregations are grouped together to join hands in an extended ministry, whether those units be synod, district, cluster, or diocese; new ministries to meet the needs of our people; merger of smaller churches or multiple parishes to provide a full time ministry; an increase of congregational staff ministries with calls to specialized services; a greater involvement of lay people in ministry; compulsory continuing education for pastors; greater use of the communication media in the life of the church with video tape and cable TV offering unlimited possibilities; strides of progress in becoming a more inclusive church; from four women pastors serving in our N. C. churches to a much larger number by 1992; more clustering of congregations together to provide better quality community ministries; and many other changes that are beginning to be discussed in church circles, all designed to make the church more and more what God would have it to be.

God is ushering us into a new era in the life of His church in this decade of the eighties. The election of a new Bishop at the convention, the new Lutheran Church to come into being in 1988, the demands of our society to make the Gospel relevant to people where they are today, the changes of life styles are all indications of this new era. I like to call the decade of the eighties a time for greatness for the Lutheran Church. It is an exciting time to apply our faith to a changing world. Our challenges and opportunities are unparalleled in any other generation. What a responsibility the church has. What a difference each of us can make as we let God use us to equip our church for its mission in today's world.

### CONCLUSION

In 1978 you gave me the greatest honor, trust and responsibility that is in your power to bestow upon a pastor. Along with it you have given freely of your love, prayers and support. I have endeavored to perform the duties of this office to the best of the strength and ability that God has given me. Thanks to you, all the years in this service have been joyful and rewarding for Margaret and me. I have been most happy being your pastor. However, I am looking forward at age 67 to turn over this office with all of its joys and responsibilities to the one you elect as Bishop at this convention. At the same time, while turning over the office, the gavel, the mantle, and all that goes with it, I want to hold on to your love and care that we have shared together — no longer as Bishop but after September 1, 1982 as a retired pastor in this synod. These are among my most cherished possessions. I promise the new Bishop my full support and my prayers that God will give him strength and wisdom for the task. I am dedicated to making the transition from this administration to the next operate just as smoothly as possible.

It is with grateful appreciation to all of you for our partnership together over the years; with joyful review of accomplishment that this partnership has made to happen; and with confident faith in a great future God has for the Lutheran Church in North Carolina, that I submit this as my 1982 Convention report. The peace of the Lord be with you.

Meetings were held during the interim on June 10, 1981 and March 22, 1982. The following is a summary of the Dean's meetings.

### 1. Operational and Appointive Committees, recommendation on, action on

At the June meeting, the Deans fulfilled the requirements of the by-laws of the synod, Section V, Item A, paragraph 1 — Operational Committees, which states that up to ten members be appointed to each operational committee by the District Deans with the approval of the Executive Board. Appointments were made for terms expiring in 1984 and unfilled vacancies expiring in 1982 and 1983. Also, recommendations were made to the Bishop regarding appointments to other synodical committees.

### 2. 1981 Fall District Meetings, plans for

The Deans made plans at the June meeting for the 1981 Fall District Meetings. The agenda for the meeting included worship, elections of district officers, and the following presentations: the Bishop speaking on Stewardship, Lutheran Family Services in North Carolina, Camp and Conference Ministry Appeal, Refugee Resettlement, the synod's video tape equipment, energy conservation, and, introduction of the 1981-82 Youth Staffer.

### 3. 1982 Fall District Meetings, plans for

In March the Deans began planning for the 1982 Fall District Meetings. In regard to agenda for the meetings, the Deans decided that the meetings would begin at 10:30 a.m. with Holy Communion and that the new Bishop and his staff would have the opportunity to determine the rest of the agenda. The dates for the Fall District Meetings were set as follows:

At each meeting, Bishop Misenheimer reviewed with the Deans, lists of vacancies, resignations, and calls accepted within the districts. Particular situations were reviewed due to the unique circumstances so that the Deans would be mindful of the needs of the congregations.

### 6. Pastors, needs of, discussion on

The Bishop discussed with the Deans at each meeting the special needs of particular pastors across the districts. Ways of supporting these pastors were discussed in order that the Deans could assist the Bishop in responding to the needs.

### 7. Other matters

At the June meeting, the Deans Committee met with representatives of the Worship and Music Committee to explore possibilities for team building in planning district worship events. Also, the Deans discussed issues regarding support of pastors who need to take time off for professional reasons, and, strengthening communications between synod staff and the District Deans.

### Central District

The meeting of the Central District was held on October 21 at St. Paul's, Statesville. The dean, Pastor Floyd Bost, preached the sermon and the liturgist was Pastor Dale Pederson. Bishop Ernest Misenheimer was celebrant for the Holy Communion. Following the worship, new pastors of the district were introduced. ### Southwestern District

The other major district event since the last convention of synod was District Church Day held at Lutheran Chapel, Gastonia, February 14, 1982. After devotions by the dean, Bishop Misenheimer shared on the topic, "A Decade for Greatness". Pastors Dick Little and Cyrus Frazier followed with an explanation of Mission

Development Certificates. The group then divided for individual two-hour workshops for parish committee leaders, lay professionals, and pastors. Excellent resource persons and good attendance proved this a most valuable experience.

### Western District

The fall meeting of the Western District was held on October 29, 1981 at Calvary, Morganton. The meeting began with the Service of Holy Communion. Bishop Misenheimer met with the pastors and discussed over 20 concerns affecting pastors and/or the church.

Mae has served effectively as my secretary and Betty has done an excellent job as recording secretary to the Executive Board and the Convention. I thank Bishop Misenheimer for selecting me to be a member of this staff and I am indebted to Jim, Bob and Dick for their care and support over the years. Finally, none of my work would be possible without the fine efforts of pastors and congregations of the synod to whom I am most grateful.

### **STATISTICS**

Ministers — As of December 31, 1981, there are 302 pastors on the roll of synod. The breakdown is as follows: 189 parish pastors; 29 serving under call by the synod; 6 ministerial officers and staff, 4 mission developers, 17 administrators or faculty of educational or eleemosynary institutions or agencies; 10 serving under call by the LCA Executive Council including 1 full-time administrative staff official, 7 military chaplains, and 2 employees of federations of Lutheran churches; 61 retired pastors, 2 by reason of disability; 10 on status on leave from call and 3 applying for status as "on leave from call".

Observations on membership statistics — "We are a growing synod in members and strength!" It is a joy to see the membership statistics for 1981. We are growing in numbers of baptized persons up 317 from 1980. We had a drop of 41 persons the previous year. But even more important, we are growing in strength. Our communing/contributing membership is up 314 over 1980 to a figure of 47,312. This is significant in that we had experienced a loss of 114 communing/contributing members in the previous year. From where did these people come? The statistics demonstrate, with all gains and losses taken into account, 40% of the gain is by transfer from Lutheran congregations. However, 28% can be attributed to evangelism impact. Major gains were made in congregations of 500 members or less. The synod averages 395 baptized members and 226 communing/contributing members per congregation.

### **ARCHIVES**

The synod archives program continues to be a vital and lively part of the life of the North Carolina Synod. It is guided by the able leadership of the Committee for Historical Work. There is excitement in the archives program this year because of a number of important projects and developments.

Two year archives and records program — The Committee on Historical Work was granted \$40,000 from the Michael Peeler Fund Income over a two year period to employ a full-time archivist to complete work in the archives begun in the mid 70s, and, assist the synod in developing a records management program. This work is extremely critical considering the possibility of Lutheran union in the late 80s. The files of the administrations of presidents Conrad and Whittecar and Bishop Misenheimer need to be gleaned and processed into the holdings of the archives prior to merger. The Church House contains volumes of file materials and documents that need processing in order to make room for the new administration this year. Also, a program of records management for the synod administration will help in dealing with the

mass of materials generated annually. It is the hope of the committee that this ongoing concern for a sound archives program will encourage congregations and lay people to contribute to the archives and use it as a source of information.

Congregational archives program — This spring the committee completed work on the multi-media presentation "Your Lutheran Heritage — Yours to Preserve" for use by congregations in considering the development of a congregational archives program. This practical presentation assists congregations in understanding the need for a program in archives and a series of clear steps in creating one. Church councils, study groups, Sunday school classes, LCW groups, and other individuals may use this program. Please write: Mrs. Mae Blake, North Carolina Synod, LCA, P. O. Box 2049, Salisbury, NC 28144 for a copy of the presentation. Also, personal help in developing a congregational archives program is available through the Committee for Historical Work.

Juanita Boland and Bernard W. Cruse, Sr. Collection — Mr. Bernard W. Cruse, Jr. of Indian Trail, North Carolina has graciously deeded the Historical and Genealogical Collection of Juanita Boland and Bernard W. Cruse, Sr. to the North Carolina Synod Archives fulfilling the wishes of his parents. This is a significant collection representing over 70 years of research and collecting by the Cruses into the genealogies of families mostly in the Rowan and Cabarrus Counties area. The date of its dedication is May 30, 1982 at the Church House in Salisbury. During the coming months it will be assessioned into the Synod Archives to be made available for use by researchers and inquirers.

Continuing historical research — The committee is constantly concerned with the task of ongoing research into the history of the North Carolina Synod and the old Tennessee Synod now merged with the North Carolina Synod. Plans are being made to hold a conference on German Lutheran history in North Carolina for persons interested in pursuing this valuable research further. The conference which is being planned for the fall will be announced later this year.

For your information — The archives of the Church House in Salisbury is open 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. Monday through Friday except holidays. The archives are open to the public for persons to become familiar with the rich heritage of North Carolina Lutherans. Mrs. Mae Blake, archivist assistant and a full-time archivist to be employed sometime in the summer of 1982 will be glad to assist you in any way that they can. Four files are maintained for each congregation of the synod; the card index file, listing materials which are available; a constitutional file, containing a copy of each congregation's constitution and amendments; a correspondence file, which the Bishop of Synod maintains; and a historical data file containing histories, bulletins and newspaper clippings of events and functions in the life of each congregation. Each congregation is encouraged to keep this file up to date by sending copies of bulletins of historical occasions, yearbooks and newspaper clippings.

In the sure and certain hope of the resurrection, we lost from our midst 662 members of our congregations by death in 1981. Five pastors have died since the last convention: the Rev. David Frontis Johnson, D.D.; the Rev. Wayne Martell Daubenspeck; the Rev. Clarence Edward Norman; the Rev. Curtis Kerr Wise, Jr.; and, the Rev. John Luther Morgan, D.D. Biographical information on these pastors is located in the Proceedings, pp. 294-299.

### PROPOSED AMENDMENT TO THE CONSTITUTION

The following proposed amendment to the Constitution of the North Carolina Synod was PLACED ON NOTICE at the 1981 Convention for consideration at the 1982 Convention.

### Article Seven, Item 4, a

That Article Seven, Item 4 a, be amended by deleting all of "a" and in its

place insert the following:

 Lutheran Family Services of North Carolina, a corporation chartered by the State of North Carolina and related to the North Carolina Synod of the Lutheran Church in America.

### RECOMMENDATIONS

- 1. The two copies of the 1981 Proceedings of the North Carolina Synod held at Lenoir-Rhyne College, May 14-17, 1981 be approved as the official protocol of said Convention as certified by the Bishop and Secretary of the synod.
- 2. That memorial pages including pictures and biographic data of the Rev. David Frontis Johnson, D.D., the Rev. Wayne Martell Daubenspeck, the Rev. Clarence Edward Norman, the Rev. Curtis Kerr Wise, Jr., and the Rev. John Luther Morgan, D.D. be so designated in the 1982 Proceedings.
- 3. That the proposed amendment to Article Seven, Item 4, a, placed on notice at the 1981 Convention be considered.

# NORTH CAROLINA SYNOD OF THE LUTHERAN CHURCH IN AMERICA NOTE TO FINANCIAL STATEMENT December 31, 1981

Note 1 — Significant Accounting Policies

The North Carolina Synod of the Lutheran Church in America prepares its financial statement on the basis of cash receipts and disbursements; consequently, certain income is recognized when received rather than when earned and certain expenses when paid rather than when the obligation is incurred.

To insure observance of limitations and restrictions placed on the use of available funds an annual budget is prepared. Accounts are classified for accounting and reporting purposes into funds in accordance with activities and objectives of the Synod.

Expenditures for property and equipment are recorded in cash disbursements in the year payments are made. Physical properties are not capitalized and depreciation is not recorded.

### Michael Peeler Trust Fund

The Michael Peeler Trust Fund in 1981 enjoyed perhaps its best year thus far. As a result it was able to make available for Synod's use the amount of \$113,987.00, representing 80% of total income. The other 20% was returned to the corpus of the fund as Reserve for Capital Losses as authorized by the Executive Board of synod. As of December 31, 1981 the assets of the fund stood at \$1,521,691. This figure is likely to change appreciably, depending on fluctuations within the financial world as evidenced by market behavior in the early months of 1982.

The trustees have entered into a custodial arrangement with the trust department of Wachovia Bank to facilitate handling of transactions involving investments. This, we believe, will be in the best interests of the fund.

This year we welcome Mr. Elmer Allen, Jr. as trustee, appointed by synod's Executive Board and named secretary of the fund by the trustees.

### THE MICHAEL PEELER FUND Salisbury, North Carolina NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS December 31, 1981

Note 1 — Summary of Significant Accounting Policies Accrual Basis

The financial statements of The Michael Peeler Fund have been prepared on the accrual basis. The statement of current fund revenues, expenditures and other changes is a statement of financial activities of current funds related to the current reporting period. It does not purport the results of operations or the net income or loss for the period as would a statement of income or a statement of revenues and expenses.

Fund accounting — In order to ensure observance of limitations and restrictions placed on the use of the resources available to The Michael Peeler Trust, the accounts are maintained in accordance with the principles of "fund accounting". This is the procedure by which resources for various purposes are classified for accounting and reporting purposes into funds that are in accordance with objectives specified.

Note 2 — The Michael Peeler Fund originated under the terms of the will of the late J. M. Peeler, Salisbury, North Carolina, which stated ''I give and bequeath and advise to the North Carolina Lutheran Synod one-half of my estate, to be known as 'The Michael Peeler Fund' and the income therefrom is to be used by the synod each year wherever it is needed most for the advancement of the Kingdom of God''. The North Carolina Synod of the Lutheran Church in America received one-half of the estate assets on or about July 31, 1959 and the trust fund was established. On October 8, 1965 they received, also under the terms of the will, one-third of the remaining assets of the estate upon the death of his wife.

Note 3 — The Michael Peeler Fund is administered by a board of trustees presently consisting of Elmer L. Allen, Jr., Glenn E. Ketner and John W. Cobb.

The trustees, by approval of the Executive Committee of the North Carolina Synod of the Lutheran Church in America, have established a reserve for principal losses fund. In March, 1981 the Executive Board of the Lutheran Church in America directed that 80% of The Michael Peeler Fund be made available to the North Carolina Synod in 1981 with the remaining 20% to be reinvested in Corpus.

### Investment

The Investments Committee and Treasurer have worked together to wisely invest Synod funds in interest bearing deposits. The Committee is pleased to report that interest bearing deposits during 1981 earned a total of \$32,762.17 in support of Synod Ministries.

### G. BOARDS, COMMITTEES AND AUXILIARIES

Reports of the Rev. Richard J. Perry, Jr., Director of Minority Ministries; the Rev. David L. Castor, Director of Outdoor Ministries; and Youth Staffers Tim Paulson (before July 1981) and Barbara Herpich (after July 1981) were received quarterly through the report of the sub-committee on boards, committees and auxiliaries.

1. Justice and Social Change Consulting Committee, Minority Ministries Program, review of documents, action on (EBM, June 1981, p. 10)

At the June meeting the board approved documents containing the vision and goals of the Minority Ministries Program and job description of the Director of Minority Ministries program as submitted by the Consulting Committee on Justice and Social Change.

 Social Ministry Committee, re: proposal for developing synodical capability for providing local groups with assistance in elderly housing, action on (EBM, September 1978, p. 10; PRO 1980, p. 277; EBM, June 1980, p. 18; EBM, September 1980, p. 44; EBM, June 1981, p. 11)

Background: At the 1980 Synod Convention a resolution was adopted regarding synod's providing consultation services to local groups in developing housing for elderly persons not requiring institutional care. The matter was referred to the Executive Board. A response was made by the board, specifically to Charlotte area Lutherans, indicating that the appropriate synod staff person and committee would compile and make available a resource list for developing such a ministry; offering encouragement of such ventures but not becoming a partner, granting financial assistance or professional consultation services, and, making clear that all multiple congregational projects do take the approval of the Executive Board. At the September, 1980 meeting, it was reported that expertise in these matters may be forthcoming from the board of North Carolina Lutheran Homes, Inc. working with the synod's Social Ministry Committee.

At the June 1981 meeting, the board was informed that the Social Ministry Committee had compiled a report regarding the synod's capability for providing local groups with assistance in elderly housing. The board approved a motion requesting the North Carolina Lutheran Homes to provide the services of a housing consultant on the staff of North Carolina Lutheran Homes to give assistance to local Lutheran groups interested in housing for older adults, especially not using government funds.

3. North Carolina Lutheran Homes; Albemarle Unit, request for expansion of, action on (EBM, May 1981, p. 4; EBM, June 1981, p. 11)

At the May pre-convention meeting, the board received the request from the Board of Trustees of the North Carolina Lutheran Homes, Inc. requesting permission for expansion of the Albemarle Unit. The matter was postponed until the June meeting of the board. At the June meeting the board read a report from the Rev. Robert Q. Beard, Executive Director of North Carolina Lutheran Homes. He indicated that it was the intention of the trustees to complete the original plans for the

Albemarle Unit by adding a rest home wing. The board approved a motion that North Carolina Lutheran Homes, Inc. proceed with the expansion of the Albemarle Unit at such time as it becomes economically feasible to do so.

 Cabinet for Parish Services, re: "Applying Our Theology to a Changing World" theme; recommendations on, action on (EBM, June 1981, pp. 12-14; EBM, September 1981, pp. 8-9)

At the June meeting the board considered proposals from the Cabinet for Parish Services outlining the implementation of a special synodical emphasis entitled "Applying Our Theology to a Changing World." Cabinet chairperson, the Rev. Glenn A. Boland, and Task Force on Men and Women in Society, Chairperson, Betty Gamble spoke to the issue. The board approved only one of eight proposals: that a committee be appointed to develop plans for this synod-wide observance for presentation to the Bishop, Executive Board, District Deans and the sub-committee on conventions, and, that approval of the rest of the recommendations be contingent upon what develops following this action.

At the September meeting a report was submitted by a special Task Force on "Applying Our Theology to a Changing World" which the board approved as follows with the suggestion that minority representation be added to the task force:

Leaders of these groups and events will meet to present the theme and to explore how they may effectively use it from now through the 1983 Lenten Season. Meeting date: October 14, 1981, Haven Lutheran Church, Salisbury.

The task force proposed that each of the following groups or events use and develop this theme, "Applying Our Theology to a Changing World".

- a. LCW Convention "Personal Growth" is the LCW emphasis for this year, the LCW representative on the task force, thought that the LCW would welcome the theme and the opportunity of integrating the work of the synod and the LCW. Their program on this theme will be developed by them.
- b. 1982 Synod Convention The Synod Convention Committee embraces the theme and is working out its plans around it. It was proposed that the Synodical Worship and Music Committee develop a service to supply the churches for use on Synod Sunday following the same theme.
- c. LCM It was proposed to encourage the LCM to adopt this theme as well and to work with them on developing a plan for its use in their synod-wide meeting, April 16-18, 1982.
- d. Youth Rally It was proposed to present this theme to the committee in charge of this event scheduled for April 16-18, 1982, and to offer help in developing the theme for their use.
- e. 1982 Fall Convocation for Pastors and Lay Professionals It was suggested the focus of this event lead participants to look at their faith and how they relate that faith to the changes that are happening in their own personal lives. The rationale for this being that it is important that leaders in the Church "lead by example." Working through their own faith in their own lives will enhance their ability to lead their people to do the same.
- f. 1983 Church Days In lieu of the usual format, this time slot would be used to encourage every congregation in the synod (working through cabinets, committees, and District Deans) to participate in the "Shared Ministry Workshop", a part of the Growth in Ministry Program.

Note: The Shared Ministry Workshop is designed for Lutheran pastors and lay leaders from their congregations. It provides time for lay people together with their pastors to examine their congregation's present program and to plan for a shared ministry between pastor and congregation.

Each congregation's environment is unique, but one thing all congregations share is the challenge of living in a world of rapid change.

The question is not how to stop change but rather what resources are available to help people live effectively with that change.

One resource is the planning process — a process that helps persons make decisions and plan actions which not only can be responsive to future changes but can also affect those changes. The planning process calls for shared decision-making and open communication about goals, strategies, norms and need satisfaction. In the local congregation, this points to a shared ministry between pastor and congregation.

- g. 1983 Lenten Focus Working with the synod's Evangelism Committee, we propose that the 1983 Lenten/Easter Preaching Retreat adopt this focus as its theme for Lent, 1983, and select leader(s) who could develop this theme so that pastors could develop a six weeks series to be used either on Sunday mornings or at special Lenten services.
- h. **Evaluation** Each event would be evaluated as well as the total emphasis to determine (1) what happened, (2) was that what was intended, (3) was one theme effective. Workable, Confining?

To facilitate and coordinate the listed proposals, the task force would need to function throughout the entire program.

For a list of Task Force members refer to Section D, Committee Appointments.

 Social Ministry Committee, re: proposal to study need for care of younger disabled persons, action on (EBM, June 1981, pp. 14-15)

The board approved the request from the North Carolina Lutheran Homes that the synod's Social Ministry Committee assume the responsibility of conducting a study of the need for long term care facilities that are adequately equipped to serve physically incapacitated persons between the ages of 16 and 59 years who require more than normal custodial level of care which is provided by nursing homes for the aged. The matter was referred to the Social Ministry Committee.

 Camp Committee; 1982 rate schedule for Kure Beach and Agape Camp and Conference Retreat Center; request for ratification of, action on (EBM, September 1981, p. 7)

Upon the recommendation of the Camp Committee, the board ratified the 1982 rate schedule adopted by the Camp Committee for Kure Beach Retreat Center and Agape Camp and Conference Retreat Center.

7. Social Ministry Committee; restructuring, proposal of, action on (EBM, September 1981, pp. 7-8; EBM, December 1981, pp. 15-16; EBM, March 1982, pp. 9-10)

At the September meeting of the board, a proposal was received from the Social Ministry Committee recommending a restructuring of the social ministry program of the synod in that at the present time social ministry is being done by other committees, special task forces, specialized ministries and institutions besides the Social Ministry Committee which may or may not relate directly to the Social Ministry Committee. The report indicated that there was apparent overlapping, fragmentation, duplication or non-delivery of some vital services in the synod as a result of the number of entities providing services. The proposal outlined the philosophy and structure of the newly designed committee.

At the December meeting the board adopted a recommendation that the proposal for restructuring the Social Ministry Committee be referred to the subcommittee on boards, committees, and auxiliaries for study and that the subcommittee on long range planning be ready to get involved if a decision is made to restructure and if a staff person is required.

At the March meeting it was reported that the sub-committee on boards, committees and auxiliaries had studied this carefully and after considering various options made the following recommendations which the board approved: that a fourth cabinet, the Cabinet for Social Ministry, be established to include the following committees and agencies — Social Ministry, Justice and Social Change, Lutheran World Relief/World Hunger, Environmental Concerns, North Carolina Lutheran Homes and Lutheran Family Services in North Carolina; and, that the sub-committee on legal affairs prepare the necessary by-law amendment to effect the change, and, that the sub-committee on finance, property and personnel be authorized to make financial adjustments as needed.

The Executive Board makes the following recommendations to the convention:

- a. That a fourth cabinet, the Cabinet for Social Ministry, be established to include the following committees and agencies — Social Ministry, Justice and Social Change, Lutheran World Relief/World Hunger, Environmental Concerns, North Carolina Lutheran Homes and Lutheran Family Services in North Carolina
- b. That the By-Laws, Section P, item 1 be amended by deleting all of item 1 and inserting in its place the following:

    - There shall be four cabinets consisting of chairpersons of committees and one representative each of institutions as follows:

- c. That the By-Laws, Section P, item 3 be amended by deleting all of item 3 and inserting in its place the following:

The Cabinet for Parish Services shall maintain liaison with the Division for Parish Services, the Cabinet for Professional Leadership with the Division for Professional Leadership, the Cabinet for Mission with the Division for Mission in North America and the Division for World Missions and Ecumenism, and the Cabinet for Social Ministry with the Division for Mission in North America.
- 8. Lutheran Family Services in North Carolina, annual Christmas appeal, request for, action on (EBM, September 1981, p. 10)

The board approved a request from the Board of Trustees of Lutheran Family Services in North Carolina to conduct an annual Christmas appeal beginning December, 1981.

For information on policies regarding appeals of synod institutions refer to Section M, item 7.

9. Justice and Social Change Consulting Committee, Minority Ministries Program, evaluation of, information (EBM, September 1981, p. 11)

The board received as information a document entitled "Evaluation of the Minority Ministries Program" as submitted by the Task Force on Minority Ministries of the Justice and Social Change Consulting Committee.

# North Carolina Lutheran Homes, Inc., Synod-wide Capital Funds Appeal, request for, referral of (EBM, September 1981, p. 11)

The board received a request from the Board of Trustees of North Carolina Lutheran Homes, Inc. for permission to conduct a synod-wide capital funds appeal on behalf of the Homes in 1985 or as soon thereafter as synod polity would permit. The matter was referred to the sub-committee on finance, property and personnel.

11. Conference and Camping Ministries Appeal, progress report, information on (EBM, December 1981; EBM, March 1982)

At the December and March meetings of the board, reports were received on the progress of the Conference and Camping Ministry Appeal outlining plans for future development and containing financial statements. The reports were given by the Rev. George R. Whittecar, D.D., Progress Director for the appeal.

12. Secretary of Church, communication, re: Equal Rights Amendment, continued support of, action on (EBM, December 1981, p. 17)

The board received a communication from the Secretary of the Church, regarding the Executive Council's action urging that synods continue to support the ratification of the Equal Rights Amendment. The board adopted recommendations that Bishop Misenheimer again send a letter on behalf of the Executive Board to North Carolina legislators advising them of the synod's position on the Equal Rights Amendment; and, that the appropriate materials about the Equal Rights Amendment, made available through the Church's Division for Mission in North America, be distributed to pastors and congregations.

Cabinet for Parish Services, re: Lutheran Church Volunteer Network, development of, request for, action on (EBM, December 1981, p. 20; EBM, March 1982, p. 9)

The board approved a recommendation from the Cabinet for Parish Services that a Lutheran Church Volunteer Network be investigated and used. It would be developed so congregations and committees would have available a list of individuals who might be called on for specific needs in the synod. In March the board approved the establishment of the Lutheran Volunteer Network using current synodical files.

 Lutheran Church Women, NC Unit; LCW Sunday, request for, action on (EBM, December 1981, p. 20)

Upon a request from the North Carolina Unit of Lutheran Church Women, the board approved a recommendation declaring May 2, 1982 as Lutheran Church Women Sunday in the synod, and, that the first Sunday in May be observed annually as LCW Sunday.

15. Lenoir-Rhyne College, re: Lenoir-Rhyne College Sunday observance, request for, action on (EBM, December 1981, p. 21)

The board acted favorably on a request from Lenoir-Rhyne College declaring Sunday, April 25, 1982 as Lenoir-Rhyne College Sunday in the synod.

 Social Ministry Committee, re: Lutheran Children's Home of the South fund raising within synod, request, action on (EBM, December 1981, p. 21)

The board reviewed a request from the Social Ministry Committee that the board take some action regarding the matter of solicitation of funds from people in North Carolina by the Lutheran Children's Home of the South. In the discussion it was pointed out that there was an understanding that after Christmas, 1980, the Home would no longer solicit funds from North Carolina unless specific requests were made by individuals who wished to remain on the mailing list. The board approved a motion that the Bishop of the North Carolina Synod communicate with the Director of the home regarding the solicitation of funds from people in North Carolina by the Lutheran Children's Home of the South in Salem, Virginia.

17. American Mission Committee; Division for Mission in North America study group, request for action on (EBM, December 1981, p. 22)

Upon the request of the Appalachian Sub-committee of the American Missions

Committee, the board approved a recommendation that the Executive Board request of the Division for Mission in North America that a strategy study of the Appalachian area of North Carolina be made.

 Paul Milholland, request from, re: nuclear arms protest, action on (EBM, March 1982, pp. 7-8)

At the March meeting a letter received from Paul Milholland was read requesting the board to give him direction in regard to speaking to tax resistence as a route to take in opposing the nuclear armaments build-up in the United States. The board directed that the Secretary of Synod write to Mr. Milholland thanking him for his letter and sending him a copy of a proposed resolution regarding nuclear armaments from the Justice and Social Change Committee which would be presented to the 1982 Synod Convention, and, further suggested that Mr. Milholland should make his opinion on the subject known to a convention delegate who would be willing to express this opinion to the convention.

19. Conference and Camping Ministries Sunday, designation of, action on (EBM, March 1982, pp. 6-7)

Upon recommendation from the Progress Committee for Conference and Camping Ministries, the board designated the third Sunday in September in 1982 and 1983 as Conference and Camping Ministries Sunday.

20. Cabinet for Parish Services, Youth Staffer program 1982-83, action on (EBM, March 1982, p. 9)

The board was informed that the Cabinet for Parish Services and the Youth Ministry Committee requested that the Youth Staffer program be continued for 1982-83. Based upon the findings from a study made by the Youth Ministry Committee the board approved the Youth Staffer program for 1982-83 with the provision that an additional study be made by the Youth Ministry Committee by December 1982 to determine alternate uses of Youth Staffer funds and/or alternate uses of the Youth Staffer.

21. Cabinet for Parish Services, Lutheran Church Volunteer Network, Volunteer Recognition Sunday, designation of, action on (EBM, March 1982, p. 9)

Upon the request of the Cabinet for Parish Services, in developing a Lutheran Volunteer Network in the synod, the board approved the designation of Sunday, September 12, 1982 as Volunteer Recognition Sunday.

22. North Carolina Lutheran Men Home Mission Foundation, information (EBM, March 1982, p. 10)

The board received as information a report from the Home Mission Foundation of North Carolina Lutheran Men that second mortgage loans would be considered by the Foundation for North Carolina missions, and, the suggestion that a better system of communication be developed between Home Mission Foundation and the American Mission Committee of the synod.

23. Lutheran Family Services in N.C., Mother's Day and Christmas appeal, approval of (EBM, December 1980, p. 13; EBM, September 1981, p. 10)

It was reported at the March meeting that the board of Trustees of Lutheran Family Services in North Carolina needed certification of the ruling from the Executive Board in regard to special appeal dates for Lutheran Family Services, noting that in September 1981 the board approved their request to conduct an annual Christmas appeal beginning December 1981. The board approved the recommendation that in addition to the Christmas appeal date already approved that Lutheran Family Services be authorized to distribute envelopes and other materials for Christian Family Week 1982, and, that after that time envelopes be made available to congregations upon request for use at the discretion of the congregations.

 24. Historical Work Committee; re: pan-synodical memorial regarding churchwide records and archives program, action on (EBM, March 1982, pp. 10-11)

Upon the recommendation of the Historical Work Committee, the board approved for presentation to the synod in convention the following pan-synodical memorial regarding a church-wide records and archives program to be developed in plans for a new Lutheran body:

WHEREAS records management and archival work have been and are being done throughout the Lutheran Church in America by dedicated individuals in congregations, synods and churchwide agencies, and

WHEREAS records management and archival work are essential aspects of the church's ministry, and

WHEREAS records management and archival work are acknowledged as an integral part of good administrative practice, and especially important in light of the increasing volume of records being created and received at all levels of the church, and

WHEREAS records management and archival work despite all present efforts, are inadequate to protect and safeguard our heritage.

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the North Carolina Synod memorialize the Lutheran Church in America meeting in convention at Louisville, Kentucky to instruct the committee appointed to implement the Unity resolution to establish as a priority for the new church, an efficient records management and archives system that commits us:

- a. to excellence in this ministry;
- b. to study the role and authority of the Church Secretary as Archivist;
- c. to establish a Commission on Records Management and Archives;
- d. to appoint professionally trained archivists;
- e. to increase funding to appropriate system;
- f. to adopt a universal records management system;
- g. to prepare a definite statement on church records as church property.
- 25. N. C. Lutheran Homes, Board of Trustees, request from, re: designation of special Sunday, action on (EBM, March 1982)

The board received a communication from N. C. Lutheran Homes Board of Trustees requesting that the Executive Board approve the designation of one Sunday in the year as North Carolina Lutheran Homes Sunday. The board responded to the request by granting permission to the Homes to designate a Sunday in 1982 for promotional purposes only.

 N. C. Synod Calendar, designation of "Special Sundays", action on (EBM, March 1982, pp. 12-13)

The board acted, at the March meeting, to deal with the many requests for designating 'special Sundays' on the calendar of the North Carolina Synod. A board ruling was enacted as follows: that the sub-committee on long range planning study the problem of the multiplicity of ''Special Sundays'' and bring to the Executive Board several optional solutions that would serve the promotional needs of the institutions, auxiliaries, committees and agencies of the synod, and, meet the following guidelines: (a) that establishes a fair-minded way of determining which groups should receive preferential attention, and for what duration; (b) that will be coordinated with liturgical themes in the church year; (c) that will be coordinated with the Calendar of Emphasis in the LCA; (d) that keeps fund appeals to a minimum number for maximum effectiveness; and, (e) that allows flexibility for local parish scheduling; further, that from here on all requests for "Special Sundays" be tabled until the board has established a general policy.

### H. CONGREGATIONS AND MINISTERS

The Rev. Raymond A. Petrea, Call to Special Service: tent making ministry, action on (EBM, June 1980, p. 17; EBM, December 1980, p. 16; EBM, March 1981, p. 27; EBM, June 1981, pp. 7-8)

In June of 1980, a request was received from the Rev. Raymond A. Petrea for a renewal of his call to a tent-making ministry as a Campus Pastor at High Point College. The board submitted the request to a church wide panel, as is the procedure, for a review and recommendations. At the December meeting the board extended the terms of the call until the panel responded to the board's request. At the June 1981 meeting, the board received a report from the churchwide panel and denied

Pastor Petrea's request for an extension of the Call to Special Service as a tent making minister in Campus Ministry in light of the report of the churchwide panel recommending that the request be denied.

 Older and middle age pastors, 1981 Convention resolution, referral of, action on (PRO, 1981, p. 297; EBM, June 1981, p. 8; EBM, September 1981, pp. 13-15)

At the June meeting, the synod convention resolution regarding middle and older age pastors was referred to the sub-committee on congregations and ministers. In September the sub-committee presented a comprehensive report which was divided into: I. An analysis of the resolution, II. Statement of the present situation, and, III. Recommendations for improvement. Upon a motion, the board adopted the recommendation to approve the report and determine what actions should be taken by the board and/or appropriate committees of synod. The recommendations of the report are as follows with assignment of tasks to appropriate persons or committees:

a. The Executive Board and the Synod in general should support and commend Bishop Misenheimer in his continued effort to secure proper calls for all qualified pastors regardless of age and in his wise and just committee appointments which reflect the entire adult age span of the Church.

(This recommendation would be reported to the 1982 Synod Convention by a member of the Executive Board.)

b. The Executive Board, the Bishop, and the Synodical Staff should openly commend the Convention of Synod for the delegates' non-discriminatory actions in electing older and retired pastors and lay people to boards and as delegates to continue their confidence in the experience of older people.

(This recommendation would be reported to the 1982 Synod Convention by a member of the Executive Board.)

c. The District Deans, whenever opportunities arise, should make every effort to educate the leaders of the congregations in their districts to the strengths and values of an experienced pastor, to dissuade them from the false assumptions about middle aged and older pastors and to encourage them to consider pastors without regard to age.

(The Bishop would convey this recommendation to the District Deans.)

d. All pastors, but especially those who have been out of seminary fifteen years or more, should be appraised of the necessity of keeping themselves professionally attractive. While a pastor is deeply involved in the life of his/her parish and community, it is difficult to keep one's theological mind keen and one's spiritual life fresh. Continuing education opportunities and retreats are essential for a pastor if he/she is to grow in grace and in understanding faith in terms of daily life. Pastors should utilize opportunities for professional refreshment and keep their ministries vibrant.

(This recommendation would be referred to the Professional Service Committee.)

e. The appropriate committee of synod (perhaps the Professional Service Committee) should work diligently to educate congregations to the value of pastoral experience and to encourage pastors to keep themselves professionally attractive for congregations.

(This recommendation, along with the entire document, would be referred to the Professional Service Committee.)

f. All pastors are encouraged to take seriously the Bishop's invitation in the annual parochial report to indicate their interest in synodical appointments and/or calls and to indicate lay persons who should be considered for synodical appointments.

(This recommendation would be communicated to pastors by the Synod Staff.)

Executive Board members agreed that consideration should be given by the Professional Service Committee to the suggestion that a conference of older and

middle-aged pastors be planned. Sub-committee chairman Dan Brown and the sub-committee were commended for their report.

3. Parish Secretaries' Seminar for Lutherans in North and South Carolina, synod's participation in, request for, action on (EBM, June 1981, p. 8)

The board approved a request from Secretary Martin for the synod to participate in a pan-Lutheran Parish Secretaries' Seminar for Lutheran secretaries in North and South Carolina to be held at the Sheraton in Charlotte March 15-16, 1982. The seminar sponsored by the Association of Larger Lutheran Churches would be funded by a grant in aid from Aid Association for Lutherans and registration fees.

4. Pastors' Compensation for 1981, information on (EBM, June 1981, p. 9)

At the request of the sub-committee on congregations and ministers a chart was distributed to the board indicating the range of salaries of 167 congregations of the synod. No congregations or pastors were identified by name.

 The Rev. Harry L. Rau, Jr., Call to Special Service as part-time chaplain of the Salisbury Unit of the N. C. Lutheran Homes, clarification of, action on (EBM, June 1981, p. 9)

At the June meeting it was explained that an error had been made in granting a Call to Special Service to the Rev. Harry Rau, Jr. as part-time chaplain at the North Carolina Lutheran Homes' Salisbury Unit. The board of Trustees of the Homes had requested that Pastor Rau's call be for one year, but the Executive Board had approved a four year call. The board adopted the recommendation that the minutes of the Executive Board be corrected so as to conform to the request from the Board of Trustees of the North Carolina Lutheran Homes.

 1983 Ordination Service; St. Mark's, Asheville, invitation from, action on (EBM, September 1981, p. 13)

Upon receiving an invitation from St. Mark's, Asheville to hold the 1983 Ordination Service at their church, the board adopted the recommendation that the invitation from St. Mark's for the 1983 Ordination Service be received as information and tabled for future consideration, and, that the Secretary of Synod communicate this action to St. Mark's asking them to send a reminder letter in the late summer of 1982 in as much as a new bishop would be in office at that time.

1981 Executive Board Retreat Task Force, implementation of missions, concerns, referral of, information on (EBM, June 1981, p. 19; EBM, September 1981, p. 15)

As a result of the 1981 Executive Board retreat in January 1981 a retreat task force was appointed to deal with the information coming out of the retreat. The task force reported in June through the long range planning sub-committee. One of the goals referred to the sub-committee on congregations and ministers was Mission Concerns: Need for a clearer definition of synod's relationship and responsibility to congregations (and vice versa) and consideration of better ways of communicating this information. At the September meeting the sub-committee on congregations and ministers had no recommendation as there was uncertainty as to the need. Requesting the direction of the board, the sub-committee received suggestions for the synod staff regarding monthly mailings and newsletters and requested that an evaluation be made by the March 1982 meeting.

8. Professional Service Committee, LCA Guidelines for Professional Leaders Serving in Staff Ministries, request for study, recommendation on, action on (EBM, December 1981, p. 11; EBM, March 1982, p. 17)

At the December meeting the sub-committee on congregations and ministers reported that they reviewed the LCA Guidelines for Professional Leaders Serving in Staff Ministries in Congregations as requested by the Professional Service Committee. A motion was tabled requesting the Bishop with the Professional Service Committee to distribute the guidelines to all persons in synod serving in staff ministries in congregations. At the March meeting it was reported that it was not relevant to take the motion off the table in that the guidelines were distributed to all pastors in the LCA December 1981 AIM packet.

9. North Carolina Lutheran Homes; the Rev. Mark C. Johnson, administrator, request change of title, action on (EBM, December 1981, p. 12)

The board approved a request from the Board of Trustees of the North Carolina Lutheran Homes, Inc., that the Call to Special Service for the Rev. Mark C. Johnson be changed from ''administrator of the Albemarle Unit of the North Carolina Lutheran Homes'' to ''administrator for the North Carolina Lutheran Homes.''

10. Guidelines for supply pastors, re-evaluation of, request for, action on (EBM, December 1981, p. 13)

It was reported by the sub-committee on congregations and ministers that a group of retired pastors requested the board to reconsider the synod's guidelines for supply pastors relative to compensation. Upon the recommendation of the sub-committee the board adopted the recommendation that the fee for supply pastors should remain unchanged, with the exception that travel allowance be increased to 20 cents per mile, not to exceed \$30.00, effective January 1, 1982. The board requested that congregations be alerted to the amended guidelines, that the Bishop emphasize the guidelines in conversation with congregational committees, and, that the guidelines be publicized in the *North Carolina Lutheran*.

11. The Rev. Richard Lischer, transfer to LCA, and Call to Special Service, request for, actions on (EBM, March 1982, p. 16)

At the March meeting the board granted a request from the Professional Preparation Committee that the Rev. Richard Lischer, Ph.D. be transferred from the ministerial role of the Lutheran Church — Missouri Synod to the role of the Lutheran Church in America, and, that he be granted a Call to Special Service as Associate Professor of Homelitics at Duke Divinity School for the length of his contract which expires August 1985.

#### I. CONSTITUTIONS

 Congregational Constitutions, amendment to, action on (EBM, June 1981, p. 7; EBM, September 1981, pp. 11-12; EBM, December 1981, p. 10; EBM, March 1982, pp. 14-16)

Upon recommendation of the sub-committee on ministers and congregations, the board reviewed constitutions submitted by congregations and took the following actions:

- a) Holy Trinity, Gastonia the board approved their constitution as submitted.
- b) Concordia, China Grove the board approved their constitution as submitted.
- Shepherd of the Hills, Sylva the board approved their constitution as submitted.
- d) Resurrection, Kings Mountain the board approved their constitution as submitted with the notations that (1) the sentence structure of Article IV, Section 1 should be revised, and; (2) that Article XIII which provided for By-Laws and Amendments should be set into an authentic section of by-laws separate from the constitution.
- e) **Coble, Julian** the board approved their constitution as submitted.
- f) Grace, Bessemer City the board approved their constitution as submitted with the following editorial changes: (1) Article IX, Section 2, line 2, "In the event of . . .", delete "of", and (2) Article IX, Section 7, delete the provision of more than one treasurer in Sections 7 and 8.
- g) **Bethany**, **Hickory** the board approved their constitution as submitted.
- h) **St. Matthew, Kings Mountain** the board approved their constitution with the notation that Article VII, Section 4, be approved as submitted.
- i) Holy Comforter, Belmont the board approved their constitution as submitted.
- j) Ebenezer, China Grove the board approved their constitution as submitted.
- k) St. John, Salisbury the board approved their constitution as submitted.
- 1) Grace, Hendersonville the board approved their constitution as submitted.

- m) Salem, Salisbury the board approved their constitution as submitted with (1) the stipulation that the phrase "voting members" be substituted in appropriate places for "active confirmed members" as suggested in the model constitution; (2) that in Article IV, Section 2d, the sentence in brackets should be deleted, as voting members have already been defined; and, (3) that consideration be given to using Article IX of the Approved Constitution for Congregations in place of the present Article VIII pertaining to the responsibilities of the Church Council.
- n) Redeemer, Kannapolis the board approved their constitution as submitted.
- o) St. Enoch, Kannapolis the board approved their constitution with the following notations: (1) In Article IV, Section 2 d, in Article IX, Sections 1 and 7 and in Article XIV, Section 3, the term "active member" was used but not defined. It was suggested that the term "voting member" be used if that was what was meant by the use of "active". (2) In Article VII, Section 4, the term "member in good standing" was used. It was noted that "voting member" should be used if that was what was meant there.
- p) Good Shepherd, Brevard the board approved their constitution with the following communication relative to Article V, Section 2 d: It was noted that voting members were established as those who were at least 16 years of age. While this was acceptable the sub-committee urged that consideration be given to permitting all confirmed members who have "received Holy Communion and have made a contribution of record in the current or preceding year" to be voting members, inasmuch as this sometimes helps young people to feel a part of the church.
- q) New Covenant, High Point the board approved their consitution as submitted with the suggestion that for the sake of consistency that "the Pastor" be used in Article VI, Section 5, line 3 instead of "he".
- r) Nativity, Arden the board approved their constitution as submitted.
- Holy Communion, Dallas the board approved their constitution as submitted.
- t) St. Luke, LincoInton returned to the congregation because of changes in articles marked with asterisks, which were noted: (1) Article IV. Section 1 "and shall remain" from line 1 was deleted. (2) Article IV, Section 8 have deleted from "without consent of the synod" to the end of the section and instead added "then this congregation shall be recognized as the lawful congregation and shall continue in possession of all the property of the congregation." The congregation was asked to note Article XIII, Section 2 in the model constitution which defines asterisk marked sections, and to give the rationale for making the proposed changes to the synod. It was also noted that in Article IX, Section 4 that "and to the regular forwarding of benevolence monies to the synodical treasurer" was deleted. The sub-committee asked for the rationale in making that deletion.
- u) St. Philip, Raleigh the board approved their constitution as submitted.
- v) St. John, Statesville the board directed the Secretary of Synod to request an explanation of the need for such an addition as is proposed for Article IV, Section 8 and noted also that Article V, Sections 1 and 2 seemed to be in order as submitted and that no board approval was needed for By-Laws.

#### J. CONVENTIONS

 1981 Synod Convention, evaluation of, information on (EBM, June 1981, p. 22; EBM, September 1981, p. 20; EBM, December 1981, p. 30)

At three of the meetings of the board, the sub-committee on conventions led the board in the evaluation of the 1981 Synod Convention. Comments of board members were taken under consideration by the sub-committee in planning the 1982 convention. At the December meeting, the board was informed that the total disbursements for the 1981 Convention including the bulletin, proceedings, hosts expenses, travel and Committee on Nominations expenses were \$21,691.68. Also, it was reported that

\$1,522.46 was reimbursed from the host congregation to the synod resulting in a net cost to the synod of \$20,169.22 or \$2,830.78 under the \$23,000 budgeted for the convention.

- 2. 1982 Synod Convention, plans for, actions on (FRM June 1981, pp. 21-22; FRM September 1981, pp. 20-21; FR
  - (EBM, June 1981, pp. 21-22; EBM, September 1981, pp. 20-21; EBM, December 1981, pp. 30-35; EBM, March 1982, p. 14)
  - Dates and location at the June meeting, the board set the dates and location of the 1982 Synod Convention to be June 3-6 at Lenoir-Rhyne College.
  - Convention host at the June meeting the board approved the recommendation that Mt. Olive, Hickory be invited to host the convention. The invitation was accepted.
  - c. Convention theme and events the board approved the theme "Born Anew To a Living Hope" the LCA Biennial theme which would include emphasis on "Applying Our Theology in a Changing World" with a special presentation on the emphasis by the Rev. J. Larry Yoder, Ph.D. Other plans for the convention included additional time for the churchwide representative to speak on Lutheran Unity with ALC and AELC Church bodies, a special banquet on Saturday night honoring Bishop Misenheimer, a reception for candidates for ordination and the Service of Holy Communion and the Rite of Ordination on Sunday morning.
  - d. 1982 Ordination Rite as a result of a number of inquiries regarding the 1982 Ordination Service, a Task Force for Planning the 1982 Ordination Service had been appointed to study and make recommendations for future services. Upon their recommendation, the board adopted a motion that the 1982 Ordination Services be held in conjunction with the 1982 Synod Convention. At the September meeting it was reported that the senior seminarians requested that the Rev. Michael C. D. McDaniel, Ph.D., on the faculty of Lenoir-Rhyne College, be requested to preach at the service. Dr. McDaniel accepted the invitation. At the December meeting, the board approved the printing of a special bulletin for the Ordination Service.
  - e. Church-wide representative at the March meeting it was announced that the Rev. John Lewis Yost, Jr. of St. Matthew's, Charleston, SC, would be the churchwide representative.
  - f. Convention appointments at the September meeting the board requested that Leo Smith serve as convention coordinator. Mr. Paul Milholland would be the chairman of the Convention pages. At the March meeting, Bishop Misenheimer announced the appointment of the Rev. Richard J. Perry, Jr. as Convention Chaplain.
  - g. Convention costs it was reported in March that the costs for facilities at Lenoir-Rhyne College would be \$1,225.00, the cost for lodging would be \$12.75 and meals costs increase by 25 cents over 1981.
  - h. Convention program and order of business at the December meeting, the board approved a tentative program and order of business for the 1982 convention and makes the following recommendation to the convention:

That the program and order of business presented in the 1982 Bulletin of Reports, pp. 1-3 be adopted.

#### K. FINANCE

 Resident Chaplaincy program, Chapel Hill, request for grant, action on (EBM, June 1981, pp. 22-23)

A synod pastor who was considering the synod's Resident Chaplaincy Program at Chapel Hill for 1981-82 requested \$2,500 for 1981 and \$2,500 for 1982 to supplement the \$9,000 synod budget item for the program to aid in his financial support during the year. The supplemental grant was denied.

# 2. Bishop's Discretionary Fund, replenishment of, information on (EBM, March 1981, p. 21; EBM, June 1981, p. 23)

At the March meeting, the board approved a recommendation that convention offerings be designated for the Bishop's Discretionary Fund. In June it was reported \$1,201.60 was received in convention offerings and placed in the fund.

# 3. 1981 Ordination Service, offerings from, disbursal of, information on (EBM, June 1981, p. 23)

At the June meeting, it was reported that \$166.30 was received in offerings at the 1981 Ordination Service at Epiphany, Winston-Salem, and, that the amount was \$38.30 short of expenses incurred. The \$38.30 was taken from miscellaneous funds to cover the deficit.

# 4. Ecumenical Dialogue Event, request for grant, action on (EBM, June 1981, pp. 23-24)

The board denied a request from the Rev. Karl M. Park of Grace, Hendersonville for a grant in the amount of \$250.00 to support an ecumenical dialogue conference for the congregations in the Hendersonville area.

 Professional Preparation Committee, Seminarian loan requests, action on (EBM, June 1981, p. 24; EBM, September 1981, p. 24; EBM, December 1981, p. 30)

At the June and September meetings, the board approved requests made by the Professional Preparation Committee for loans to seminarians from the Seminarians' Revolving Loan Account as follows:

At the December meeting, the board approved two more requests for seminarians Grady Beaver and Paul Townsend and approved a motion that the \$1,485.50 balance in the Seminarians' Revolving Loan Account be made available to the Professional Preparation Committee to disburse as they deem best.

# 6. Synod mileage allowance rate, evaluation of, information on (EBM, June 1981, p. 24)

As the result of a request that an increase be made in the automobile mileage allowance for synod-related travel, the board evaluated the present rate and approved a recommendation that there be no change in the present rate.

 Congregational apportionment adjustments, requests for, action on (EBM, September 1981, pp. 17 and 19-20; EBM, December 1981, p. 26; EBM, March 1982, p. 20)

The board granted the following requests from congregations for adjustments in their apportionment:

- a. Christus Victor, Fayetteville 1981 apportionment adjusted based on adjustments in confirmed, communing/contributing membership.
- b. Holy Trinity, Chapel Hill 1981 apportionment adjustment reduced by \$536 due to adjustments in parochial statistics.
- c. St. Paul, Hamlet 1982 apportionment adjustment from \$6,254 to \$3,536.
- d. Christ, Winston-Salem apportionment adjustment from \$8,517 to \$3,500 due to adjustments in membership statistics and no consultation during pastoral vacancy.
- 8. Michael Peeler Fund, Lutheran Theological Southern Seminary Professorship, action on

(EBM, March 1981, p. 21; EBM, September 1981, pp. 18-19; EBM, December 1981, p. 26)

**Background** — at the March 1981 meeting of the board, a recommendation was approved that the Executive Board establish an endowment of \$250,000 from earnings of the Michael Peeler Fund with annual contributions to Lutheran Theological

Southern Seminary until the corpus of the fund is reached with details to be worked out and reported at a later meeting.

At the September meeting the board approved the following Memorandum of Agreement as submitted by the Seminary regarding the establishment of the Michael Peeler Professorship Fund.

#### MEMORANDUM OF AGREEMENT

- 1. The name of this Fund will be the "Michael Peeler Professorship Fund". hereafter called "The Fund". Designation of the chair for a specific field may be made by the Executive Board of the North Carolina Synod at any time before the Fund has been fully endowed.
- 2. The Fund will be constituted by annual contributions through the North Carolina Synod from earnings of the Michael Peeler Fund, until the total amount of contributions has reached \$250,000.
- 3. Income earned by annual contributions to the Fund is to be retained and added to the principal until the contributions total \$250,000. It is understood that the total amount of the Fund will then be in excess of \$250,000.
- 4. This Fund is to be a part of the permanent endowment of the Seminary or its successors, and may not be disbursed.
- 5. Income earned from The Fund when fully endowed will be used for the compensation of a faculty member to be designated by the Seminary Board of Trustees in accordance with any provisions made under paragraph 1 above.
- 6. In the event that income from The Fund in any year should exceed the amount required for the purpose under paragraph 5, the balance may be used as directed by the Seminary Board of Trustees.

The document was signed by officers of the synod and seminary. At the same meeting the board approved a recommendation establishing as a goal a minimum contribution of \$10,000 per year to the Michael Peeler Professorship Fund until the contributions total \$250,000, and, that this be accomplished as soon as possible.

At the December meeting the board approved a grant of \$30,000 in 1981 to be given to the seminary for funding of the Michael Peeler Professorship.

9. Loman Home, cost of care, regrant for additional funds, action on (EBM, September 1981, p. 19)

It was reported at the September meeting that additional funds were needed to pay increases in the cost of care for resident patients from North Carolina residing at the Loman Home in White Rock, South Carolina. The board approved a recommendation authorizing the Treasurer to shift Level II monies into Level I of the 1981 synod budget to complete this item in order to pay for the increase in the cost of care.

10. Cabinet for Missions, evaluation of sustentation program via American Missions Committee, report and recommendation on, action on

(EBM, March 1981, p. 24; EBM, December 1981, pp. 6-9)

The board requested at the March 1981 meeting that the Cabinet for Mission evaluate the synod sustentation program for congregations. In June a report including the evaluation and recommendations was received by the board through the Cabinet's American Mission Committee. The board amended and adopted the following "Guidelines for Sustentation":

WHEREAS the Sustentation Program of Synod should provide short-term assistance for the ministry of a congregation so as not to hinder but help that congregation's ministry, and;

WHEREAS the synod establishes a minimal level of support for a pastor serving a congregation under call, including salary, housing (free parsonage, house rent or cash allowance, together with utilities cost or allowances), professional expenses (including automobile or mileage, book allowance, etc.), and participation in the Ministers Pension and Death Benefit Plan and the Minister's Dependents Health Benefits Plan of the Church (Cf. Definition for Pastor's compensation and formula for determining Pastor's Base Salary. most recent Synod Proceedings) and:

WHEREAS each congregation shall be fully responsible for supporting its own pastor at a level no lower than the synodical minimum, and;

WHEREAS particular circumstances may prevent a congregation's ability to meet the recommended minimal level of support for a pastor;

BE IT HEREBY moved that a new set of guidelines for sustentation be adopted as follows:

# **GUIDELINES FOR SUSTENTATION**

- a. Application Procedure for Sustentation
  - Each church council needing subsidy to support its pastor at the minimal level approved by synod shall be expected to apply annually, with the approval of the congregation, to the Bishop of synod for such funds; demonstrating with such application evidence of need.
  - Where the church council does not make such application for subsidy to support its pastor at the minimal level approved by synod, the pastor may make such application to the Bishop of Synod for such funds after notification of this intent to the church council, demonstrating with such application, evidence of need.
- b. Responsibility of Congregation and or Pastor making application
  - Each congregation that received such subsidy shall be expected, as is every congregation in the synod, to carry the full amount of its annual apportionment in its budget.
  - 2) A congregation receiving subsidy shall have conducted a full scale Stewardship Every Member Response Program, including a determination of the congregation's potential, concerning the total work of the Church under the direction and with the approval of the synodical Committee on Stewardship, and shall be eligible only if such a program is conducted.
  - 3) Where the congregation does not make application for pastor's salary support and the pastor does so, he shall indicate such and shall promote a sound stewardship program in the congregation under the direction and with the approval of the synodical Committee on Stewardship, and shall be eligible only if such a program is conducted.
  - 4) A congregation entering or receiving sustentation shall engage in consultation with a person so designated by the Committee on American Missions each year that sustentation is requested.
- c. Responsibility of Synod
  - The Bishop of Synod, together with an advisory committee consisting of two ministers and three laymen (two of the five shall be members of the Executive Board of Synod, one shall be a member of the Committee on American Missions) shall receive salary subsidy applications and make recommendations relative to subsidies to the synod's Committee on American Missions for consideration and approval.
  - 2) The synod's subsidy to raise a pastor's base salary to meet the provisions for a pastor's minimum level of support (a) shall not exceed 25% of the pastor's minimum base salary and all of the fringe benefits, and (b) shall be placed on a declining scale not to exceed five years as determined by the Bishop and the advisory committee for sustentation upon approval of the Committee on American Missions.
  - 3) The Committee on American Missions, on approval of such subsidies, shall order payment of the same to the treasurers of the respective congregations in monthly installments.
  - 4) Reports of synod's action regarding all applications shall be made by the Committee on Sustentation.
  - 5) Consultation with church council and/or pastor shall be conducted by a person so designated by the Committee on American Missions for a congregation receiving sustentation.

- 6) Where a congregation does not comply with these guidelines and, can not or will not provide minimum level of support for pastor without the assistance of sustentation, they shall be requested by synod to consider one of the following options in order to sustain a ministry:
  - a. Part-time ministry
  - b. Long Range vice-pastor appointment
  - c. Multiple parish
  - d. Merger
  - e. Lay people

BE IT HEREBY RECOMMENDED that if or when guidelines as outlined above are adopted, there should follow (1) a suggested declining scale, (2) guidelines for stewardship assistance, and (3) guidelines for consultations with a congregation receiving sustentation.

11. Cabinet for Mission, Campus Ministry Program, evaluation of, information on (EBM, March 1981, p. 24; EBM, December 1981, p. 9)

The board received an evaluation of the synod's Campus Ministry Program as requested by the board at its March 1981 meeting. The Rev. Robert G. Walker, Southeastern Regional Director for Lutheran Campus Ministry presented the report on behalf of the Cabinet for Mission and the Campus Ministry Committee. The board received copies of the evaluation which indicated that the program was "vital, viable and on-going" and should have continued Executive Board and synod support.

12. Communications Committee, North Carolina Council of Churches T.V. Project, participation in, request for, action on

(EBM, December 1981, pp. 16-17)

The board received a presentation from the synod's Communications Committee regarding a pilot television program project sponsored by the North Carolina Council of Churches and directed by Creative Ministry Associates. A video-cassette demonstration of the magazine format type TV program was shown to indicate the style and theme of the project. It was reported that the Council of Churches was planning to produce a 30 minute program for commercial and cable TV companies at a cost of \$9,000 and that each member judicatory was being asked for a minimum contribution of \$500 each. The board adopted a recommendation that the synod support the pilot television project and that the required \$500 contribution be made for production costs.

13. 1981 Apportionment, letter from Bishop, authorization of, action on (EBM, June 1981, p. 26)

The board requested at the June meeting that Bishop Misenheimer write a letter to pastors and church councils urging them to support the increased interest in apportionment giving that was generated by discussion at the 1981 synod convention.

North Carolina Lutheran Homes, Inc.; Synod-wide Capital Funds Appeal, request for, action on

(EBM, September 1981, p. 11; EBM, December 1981, p. 24)

At the September meeting, the board received a request from the Board of Trustees of North Carolina Lutheran Homes for a synod-wide capital funds appeal on behalf of the Homes in 1985 or as soon thereafter as synod polity would permit. At the December meeting, the board responded to the Homes by indicating that it looked with favor on the request for the appeal but that a final decision would be made in 1983.

15. Michael Peeler Fund Income, grants for 1981, action on (EBM, December 1981, pp. 25-26)

The board approved the following grants and/or allocations of income from the earnings of the Michael Peeler Funds in 1981:

- a. Lutheran Family Services in North Carolina \$20,000 grant
- b. North Carolina Lutheran Homes \$20,000 grant
- Lutheran Theological Southern Seminary \$30,000 grant. Section K, item #8 for further information.

At the same meeting the board dealt with a request from the Conference and Camping Appeal for Peeler Funds by approving a recommendation that the \$9,000 loan from the Michael Peeler Fund income for Conference and Camping Ministries be forgiven, but since the campaign was currently underway that the request for \$10,000 grant each year for 1981, 1982 and 1983 not be made.

 American Missions Committee, Melanchthon Fund Income for 1982, request for, action on

(EBM, December 1981, p. 26)

Upon the request of the American Missions Committee, the board granted the following allocations from the Melanchthon Fund Income for 1982: Christ the King, Whiteville, \$7,000, and, New Covenant, High Point, \$5,000.

17. 1981 Synod Budget receipts, anticipated Level II funds, distribution of, action on

(EBM, December 1981, p. 25)

The board authorized the synod staff to distribute any Level II funds realized from the 1981 apportionment receipts.

18. Michael Peeler Fund, 1982 earnings, distribution of, action on (EBM, December 1981, p. 24)

The board approved a recommendation at the December meeting that 80% of the earnings of the Michael Peeler Fund be made available to the North Carolina Synod in 1982 with the remaining 20% to be reinvested in the corpus.

19. Cabinet for Professional Leadership; Chaplain's Residency Program at Chapel Hill, recommendations on, action on (EBM, March 1981, p. 24; EBM, December 1981, p. 27)

At the March 1981 meeting, the board requested that there be an evaluation of the Chaplain's Residency Program at Chapel Hill. The program was originally under the supervision of the Social Ministry Committee but was transferred by the Social Ministry Committee's request to the Cabinet for Professional Leadership in that the predominant value of the program was in training of ministers and not ministry to patients because of the low percentage of Lutheran patients at North Carolina Memorial Hospital in Chapel Hill.

The board received a report in December from the Cabinet for Professional Leadership which concluded that since the Clinical Pastoral Education program could not be justified as a good stewardship investment nor was it adequate to serve the synod's need in regard to counseling for pastoral/lay professionals and their families that the program should be discontinued. The board approved a recommendation from the Cabinet that the Chaplain's Residency CPE Program at Chapel Hill be discontinued and that the Professional Services Committee seek other ways to promote interest in Clinical Pastoral Education for ordained ministers.

 Professional Service Committee, Counseling and Referral Program for pastors/lay professionals and their families, proposal of and funding for, action on

(EBM, December 1981, pp. 27-28)

At the December meeting the board received recommendations from the Professional Service Committee requesting permission to establish a Counseling and Referral Program for North Carolina Synod pastors/lay professionals and their families. The board approved the following recommendation in regard to the establishment of the program:

\$5,000 per year be budgeted for the design and implementation of a contract between the synod and a pastoral counseling center in North Carolina to provide pastoral consultation, counseling and referral services to professional leaders of the synod. Such contract would prescribe a division of responsibility between the synod and the pastoral counseling center for making available these services.

The division of responsibility in such a contract would be:

The pastoral counseling center would (1) provide the listing and recruit-

ment of qualified counselors. (2) provide a monthly report and billing to the synod for services rendered which only lists those receiving counseling by an individual number. The names of those seeking counseling would not be divulged to the synod — thus maintaining a strict and trustworthy level of confidentiality; (3) receive calls for information and consultation, and assign counselors as appropriate to the needs of each professional leader; (4) handle all bookkeeping with regard to fees for pastoral counseling services rendered; (5) the pastoral counseling center would charge a flat hourly fee for all professional leaders.

The synod would: (1) be responsible for budgeting an annual line item of \$5,000 for these services; (2) commit itself to support pastors, lay professionals and their families within the limits of these budget commitments; (3) design a percentage of fee remuneration scale which may, or may not be based upon the professional leader's income; (4) provide all publicity/advocacy of this program to the professional leaders of synod. (5) provide an independent auditor who would audit the portion of the counseling center's books related to the synodical program.

In regard to funding of the program, the Board took the following actions: (1) the Executive Board designate \$6,000 for the Counseling and Referral Program in 1982, \$1,000 for a start up grant and \$5,000 for program funding with the understanding that continued program funding would be needed beyond that time, and, (2) that the \$9,000 designated in the budget as Project V-H #3, Chaplain's Residency Program, be dropped and that the new Counseling and Referral project in the amount of \$6,000 be added for 1982.

# 21. Professional Preparation Committee; re: Seminarians' Revolving Loan Fund, funds, request for, action on

(EBM, December 1981, p. 29)

At the December meeting the board received a request from the Professional Preparation Committee asking that any unspent funds from the committee's Project #3 "Student Loans and Insurance" in the 1981 budget be applied to the Seminarians' Revolving Loan Account. The board adopted a recommendation that if all of Level I budget funds are received 100% that any unspent funds from the budget of the Professional Preparation Committee for 1981 be applied to the Seminarians' Revolving Loan Account, but if the funds are not received 100% that the request be denied.

# 22. Synod Staff, 1982 Compensation for, action on (EBM, December 1981, ES)

At the Executive Session of the board, recommendations regarding synod staff compensation were adopted with the request that the actions be made available to the synod through the 1982 Convention Bulletin of Reports as follows:

That the salaries of the Bishop and staff members Martin, Chesky, Little and Shoffner for 1982 be based upon the synod's Guidelines for Adequate Compensation including housing allowance for pastors for 1982 as adopted by the 1981 Convention of synod, and, determined by the following categories: that the Bishop's compensation be determined from the \$100,000 and over category of current operating expense plus 1% for each year of experience up to 25 years; and, that the Bishop's staff's compensation be determined from the \$40,000 to \$60,000 category of current operating expense plus 1% for each year of experience up to 25 years.

Note: The Guidelines for Adequate Compensation for Pastors for 1982 is located on page 172 of the 1981 Proceedings.

Compensation for other synod personnel for 1982 was determined at the same session.

# Lutheran Theological Southern Seminary, capital funds appeal, request for action on

(EBM, March 1982, p. 18)

The board approved a request from the Lutheran Theological Southern Seminary to conduct a capital funds appeal in its five supporting synods for 1989, 1990 and 1991.

# 24. Executive Council, Board of American Missions Church Property Fund, request for special offering, information

(EBM, March 1982, p. 20)

At the March meeting the board received information that the Executive Council had been asked by Division for Missions in North America to authorize a special offering in LCA congregations both in August 1982 and February 1983 for the Board of American Missions Church Property Fund.

# 25. Historical Works Committee, full-time archivist for 1982-84, proposal for funding, action on

(EBM, March 1982, pp. 20-21)

The board adopted the following proposal from the Historical Works Committee to contract the services of a full-time archivist for a two-year period, 1982-1984:

Purpose: To place all North Carolina Synod records, current and archival, under the supervision of a professional archivist,

- Goals 1. For this person to act as a records management expert on all current records, preparing them for archival status and preparing for transition of the administration to the new bishop and, in short, establishing a permanent ongoing records management service.
  - 2. For this person to act as the professional archivist heading the North Carolina Synod Archives for a period of two years.

## Objectives -

- The management and arrangement of the Conrad, Whittecar and Misenheimer papers.
- 2. To work the Cruse Collection.
- 3. To continue accessioning material into our archives.
- 4. Completion of current but unfinished archival projects.
- 5. To interact with individual churches as they respond to our committee's impact on these churches about the need for local archives.
- To maintain records management of the current administrative staff now, next year, and the year after.
- To prepare as the needs become manifest and as the directions become known, for church merger.

Funding for the proposal was authorized by the board with a grant from the Michael Peeler Fund. \$30,000 of the 1982 income and \$10,000 of the 1983 income from the Michael Peeler Fund would be earmarked for the project, with \$20,000 to be expended each year.

# 26. Director of Outdoor Ministries, purchase of automobile, funding for, action on (EBM, March 1982, p. 22)

The Board authorized at the March meeting the purchase of a new automobile for the Director of Outdoor Ministries and that up to \$7,000 be spent after allowances and trade-in of the present automobile.

# 27. Bike-a-thon; Macedonia, Burlington; request from; action on (EBM, March 1982, p. 22)

A request was received from Macedonia, Burlington asking permission for them to solicit other congregations in the synod to participate in a Bike-a-thon to the 1982 Synod Convention to raise money for Love Compels Action/World Hunger. The board approved the Bike-a-thon and encouraged bikers' participation, but recommended that solicitation be held in the congregations of participating bikers only. It was stated by the board that this was a commendable local project.

- 28. 1983 Budget and Agreements with Church-wide Agencies, actions on (EBM, September 1981, p. 19; EBM, December 1981, p. 24; EBM, March 1982, pp. 18-19)
- a. **Budget proposal building process** From September 1981 forward, the subcommittee on finance, personnel and property led the board in consideration of a

synod budget proposal for 1983. In December the board received information from the Church's Executive Council that the synod's 1983 apportionment to church-wide agencies was set at \$1,213,900. Also, a figure of \$2,433,200 in anticipated income from apportionment for 1983 was projected, a 10% increase over 1982. During the months of December 1981 and January 1982, the committees and boards of the synod designed proposed project budgets for ministry in 1983. During the month of January the cabinets of the synod prioritized all project proposals for 1983 in their respective cabinet areas. On February 10, 1982, all committee chairmen and institutional leaders were invited to hearings with churchwide representatives for reports and dialogue for reaching agreements and a proposed 1983 budget proposal. At the March 11-12 board meeting, the sub-committee on finance, personnel and property submitted the first draft of a budget proposal for 1983 which was adopted by the board

- b. 1983 budget proposal Upon the recommendation of the sub-committee on finance, property and personnel at the March meeting, the board adopted the 1983 budget proposal. The board submits to the convention the following proposed program budget for 1983, including agreed upon figures for church-wide support, with the recommendation that:
  - the North Carolina Synod provide support for church-wide agencies in 1983 in the amount of \$1,101,950 plus one-half of all apportionment receipts over the Level I total of \$2,433,200 of the 1983 North Carolina Synod Program Budget.
  - 2) the following program budget for 1983 be adopted:

# L. LEGAL AFFAIRS

1. Holy Trinity, Reidsville, reversionary interest, temporary waiver of, ratification of, action on

(EBM, June 1981, p. 21)

At the June meeting, the Board ratified the action of the officers of synod granting a temporary waiver of the reversionary clause in the deed to the property of Holy Trinity, Reidsville so that the congregation could negotiate a loan on the church property.

Group Home for status offenders, Gaston County Churches, support by, approval of, action on

(EBM, June 1981, pp. 25-26)

The board approved the formation of the Group Home for Status offenders sponsored by a cluster group of Lutheran congregations in Gaston County and established through the auspices of Lutheran Family Services in North Carolina.

3. Approved Constitution for Congregations, proposed amendments to, official notification of, information on

(EBM, September 1981, pp. 27-28; EBM, December 1981, pp. 36-37; EBM, March 1982, pp. 24-25)

At the September, December and March meetings, it was reported that official notifications had been sent from the Secretary of the Church to the Bishop and Secretary of the Synod regarding proposed amendments to the Approved Constitution for Congregations to be acted upon by the 1982 Louisville Convention of the Church. The proposed amendments were reported to the board as information.

4. Congregations uniting in joint programs, approval of constitution and by-law requirements, study of, action on

(EBM, September 1981, p. 27)

The board, through its sub-committee on legal affairs studied the constitutional and by-law implications in regard to the approval process for congregations working together in clusters to sponsor programs such as group homes. The board adopted the following recommendations pertaining to congregations:

As required by Section 1, Item 2, (i) of the By-Laws of the Lutheran Church in America, any two or more congregations of the synod desiring to unite in a joint program or course of action of more than a temporary nature, shall first submit the proposed project to the Executive Board of Synod for its approval, and, that this requirement be brought to the attention of the congregations of the synod.

5. North Carolina Synod Constitution, amendments to, approval of, information on

(EBM, September 1981, p. 29)

It was reported at the September meeting of the board, that the Rev. Reuben Swanson, Secretary of the Church had sent an official notification that the Executive Council had found the amendments to the synod's constitution approved at the 1981 Convention to be satisfactory.

 1980 North Carolina Synod memorial, re: unemployment insurance for ministers, provisions for, Executive Council ruling, information on (1980 PRO pp. 275, 281 and 296; EBM, September 1980, p. 29)

At the September meeting it was reported that the response of the Executive Council of the Church to the memorial from the North Carolina Synod be that assistance to unemployed ordained ministers is a matter that can best be handled by an individual synod rather than by the church-at-large.

7. North Carolina Synod Constitution and By-Laws, updating and printing, action on

(EBM, September 1981, p. 30; EBM, December 1981, pp. 37-38)

At the September meeting it was noted that the Constitution and By-Laws of the Synod had not been updated since 1977 for distribution. As a result, the Secretary of Synod was instructed to investigate and secure estimates for the printing. At the

December meeting the board authorized the secretary to have printed 500 copies of the revised Constitution and By-Laws, by synod personnel, the cost to range from \$50 to \$200.

8. Membership on boards and committees re-election, eligibility for, ruling on, request for, action on

(EBM, December 1981, p. 35)

The board received a communication from the chairman of the Nominations Committee of the Lenoir-Rhyne College board requesting the Executive Board to rule regarding the definition of "full term of service on boards and committees." The board made the ruling that based upon the precedent approved by the Executive Board an unexpired term be considered a full term.

9. The Lamp, Gaston and Lincoln Counties organization of Lutheran congregations, approval of, request for, action on

(EBM, December 1981, p. 38)

At the December meeting the board approved a request for approval of an organization known as "The Lamp", organized as a support group by congregations in Gaston and Lincoln Counties to enrich the use of the *Lutheran Book of Worship* in the congregations in that area.

 10. N. C. Synod Constitution, proposed amendment, re: Lutheran Family Services in North Carolina, Article Seven, Item 4 a, action on (EBM, March 1982, p. 22)

In March the board adopted the recommendation of the sub-committee on legal affairs that the proposed amendment to Article Seven, Item 4 a of the Constitution of the North Carolina Synod placed on notice at the 1981 Convention of Synod be considered at the 1982 Convention. The amendment reads as follows:

That Article Seven, Item 4 a, be amended by deleting all of "a," and in its place insert the following:

- a. Lutheran Family Services in North Carolina, a corporation chartered by the State of North Carolina and related to the North Carolina Synod of the Lutheran Church in America.
- •11. Lutheran Outdoor Ministries, Inc., formation of, recommendation on, action on

(EBM, March 1980, p. 7; EBM, June 1981, p. 21; EBM, December 1981, p. 37; EBM, March 1982, pp. 22-23)

At the March 1980 meeting, the board received a request from the Camp Committee recommending that the sub-committee on legal affiars begin to study ways of implementing a Board of Trustees for Outdoor Ministries. In June, the board approved a recommendation that the sub-committee on legal affairs meet with the Camp Committee to study the request regarding the incorporating of the Outdoor Ministries program and report back to the board. At the December meeting copies of proposed articles of incorporation and by-laws for Lutheran Outdoor Ministries, Inc. were distributed for study and recommendation. At the March meeting the board approved recommendations, and, proposed amendments to the Constitution and By-Laws of Synod to be presented to the 1982 Synod Convention to effect the incorporation of

the outdoor ministries program. The recommendations are as follows:

- a. That the North Carolina Synod approve the formation of a new agency to be called Lutheran Outdoor Ministries, Inc., and authorize the Executive Board to approve the new agency's corporate charter and by-laws.
- b. That the North Carolina Synod elect the incumbent members of the Camp Committee to serve as the Board of Trustees of this new agency from the date of its incorporation until their successors are elected at the Synod Convention in 1983.
- c. Constitutional amendment, proposed That upon the approval by the Convention of the formation of a new agency to be called Lutheran Outdoor Ministries, Inc. the following proposed amendment to the constitution be placed on notice with the appropriate number of signatures:

"That Article Seven, Item 4 be amended by adding a new sub-section d, reading as follows:

d. Lutheran Outdoor Ministries, Inc., a corporation chartered by the State of North Carolina and related to the North Carolina Synod of the Lutheran Church in America.

d. By-Law amendments, proposed

That subject to the approval by the convention of the formation of a new agency to be called Lutheran Outdoor Ministries, Inc., the following proposed amendments to the By-Laws be placed on notice and recommended for approval (and adopted as Rules of Procedure) at the 1982 Convention:

- (1) That Item E of Section VI of the By-Laws, captioned "Camp Committee", be amended by deleting said item in its entirety and that the subsequent items be relettered accordingly.
- (2) That Section VII of the By-Laws be amended by adding a new Item F, to read as follows:

"F. Lutheran Outdoor Ministries, Inc.

- The Synod shall elect twelve persons, six of whom are ordained ministers and six of whom are lay persons, to the Board of Trustees of Lutheran Outdoor Ministries, Inc., for terms of three years, with the terms of four members expiring each year. The Bishop of the Synod or the Bishop's designated representative shall be a member in addition to the other elected members.
- All persons nominated must be voting members of congregations of the North Carolina Synod.
- The Executive Board shall elect persons to fill vacancies which might occur between conventions of the Synod. Election by the Executive Board shall be for the unexpired term.
- 4. The President of the Board of Trustees of Lutheran Outdoor Ministries, Inc., may suggest persons to fill interim vacancies for election by the Executive Board.
- 12. Approved Constitution for Synods, proposed amendments to, official notification of, information on

(EBM, September 1981, pp. 28-29; EBM, March 1982, p. 24)

At the September and March meetings the sub-committee reported to the board that official notification had been sent from the Secretary of the Church regarding proposed amendments to the Approved Constitution for Synods to be acted upon by the 1982 Louisville Convention of the Church. No actions were taken.

#### M. LONG RANGE PLANNING

 Committee on Communications, broadcast project, information on (EBM, December 1980, p. 23; EBM, March 1981, p. 5; EBM, June 1981, p. 16; EBM, December 1981, p. 22)

**Background** — At the December 1980 meeting, the board defeated a request from the Communications Committee to develop a cable TV project within synod. At the March 1981 meeting Pastor Paul Beatty responded to the board's action by offering a series of modified recommendations which the board approved. The essence of the modified recommendations were: that the synod accept the offer of the LCA Office of Communications to carry out a demonstration project in Cable TV programming in synod, that a questionnaire be used in preparation for the demonstration project, and, that a task force be appointed by the Bishop to assist in carrying out the project.

At the June 1981 meeting, it was reported to the board that there was a favorable response from congregations to the questionnaire and cover letter sent out by the task force relative to a broadcast demonstration project, and, that plans were being

made to determine the location of the project. In December it was reported that the demonstration project worked well with concentrated efforts in the Hickory area and that individual pastors were taking the initiative in follow-up in various sections of the state.

 2. 100% apportionment giving to churchwide agencies, plans for, recommendations on

(EBM, June 1981, pp. 16-17; EBM, September 1981, pp. 25-26; EBM, December 1981, pp. 18-19)

At the June meeting, the board received recommendations from the subcommittee on long range planning regarding a plan for the North Carolina Synod to become a 100% apportionment giving synod. The recommendations were deferred to the September meeting to give the board an opportunity to study the recommendations. At the September meeting, the recommendations were approved to be presented to the 1982 Convention for action. At the December meeting, the board received a response to the recommendations from the Stewardship Committee suggesting the rewording of one of the sections so that it would emphasize aspects of stewardship other than the giving of money. The board substituted the rewording as suggested and presents the following recommendations to the 1982 Convention with the recommendation:

that the North Carolina Synod adopt the following plans for becoming a 100% apportionment synod:

- That the North Carolina Synod agree that as soon as possible and feasible, the synod become a 100% full apportionment giving synod for churchwide agency support.
- that the synod begin now to consult with its committees, asking them to cut back in their expenditures wherever possible. Any actual "in hand" dollars gained from such a cut back in 1982 should be given to churchwide agencies over and above the amount the synod has agreed to contribute in apportionment during that same period of time, and.
  - b. that one-half of the difference between the churchwide agencies' requests for 1983 and the amount the synod would project to be its actual apportionment contribution (based on anticipated income) should be included in Level I of the 1983 budget, and the remainder of Level II, and,
  - c. that the full amount of churchwide agencies' apportionment request should be included in Level I of the 1984 budget, and every year thereafter.
- 3. 1981 Executive Board Retreat, report of Task Force on, recommendations on, action on

(EBM, March 1981, pp. 18-19; EBM, June 1981, pp. 17-20; EBM, September 1981, pp. 24-25)

Background — On January 2-3, 1981, the Executive Board held its second retreat at Agape Camp and Conference Retreat Center. At that retreat the board identified numerous needs within the synod but was not able to complete the task. A follow-up session was held before the regularly schedule meeting of the board on March 5, 1981, to pull together and deal with all of the needs. However, the issues were pulled together under six broad categories. As a result of not completing the task, the Bishop was requested to appoint a task force to review and condense the concerns and goals and prepare specific recommendations or statements of policy as deeded appropriate for consideration by the board at its June 1981, meeting.

In June the board received a report and recommendations from the Retreat Task Force with the recommendation of the sub-committee on long range planning that they be adopted. The report is as follows with actions taken by the board:

a. Goals re: Executive Board Leadership:

that the Task Force retain responsibility for the goals regarding Executive Board leadership.

- That the Executive Board ask the Bishop to appoint a Task Force of four, representing the synod staff and the Executive Board, to determine by the June 1981 Board meeting, a process and leadership for evaluating and clarifying the leadership role of the Executive Board in regard to the total ministry of the synod (Accomplished)
- 2. That the Executive Board, by the end of the September 1981 Board meeting, engage in this process.

Key questions regarding leadership are:

- (a) How should the Executive Board go about defining its leadership role in regard to pastor/congregation relations, synod committees and cabinets, synod convention, other boards and agencies, and congregational ministry.
- (2) Can and should the Executive Board exercise stronger leadership: — in view of the volunteer make up of the board, constitutional limitations, and, a desire to avoid hierarchy in synod.

# b. Goals re: Resources/Training

- That we provide training for selected staff and other Church House personnel in the use of the videotape equipment so that they are proficient in its use and have the capability of instructing congregation people in its use, such training to be completed in the next 3 months.
- That the staff evaluate the use of the videotape equipment over the next year with an eye toward planning future use throughout the synod.

# c. Goals re: Synod Planning

that Goal #1 and Goal #2 were adopted as follows:

- Goal #1: To use the zero-based programming concept in determining the annual program of the synod. "Zero-based programming" means that no activity, event, project, or expenditure (except those continuing because of previous binding synodical commitment or obligation) will be included unless upon review it annually justifies its need for inclusion.
- Goal #2: To develop a process by which the Executive Board can identify (not more than 5) goals for 1983 Synod program.

and that the following action steps be taken:

- That the Executive Board (or Synod) annually review and, if necessary, alter the 30 Long Range Goal statements.
- At the September (1981) meeting the Executive Board will identify (not more than five) goals for 1983, to be presented to the cabinets for guidance and direction in program planning for 1983, and,
- The cabinets and their committees will review, critique, and accept these goals as instructive for their programs on a zero-based programming concept, develop their programs for 1983. (October 1981)

# d. Goal re: Synod Staff and Bishop's letter

That the Executive Board call on committees to consider cutting back on programs and projects with one or two major emphases a year, beginning June 1, 1981.

#### Strategy:

- (1) Committees evaluate with the following criteria:
  - a. would it meet a real need in our congregations?
  - b. is this an annual event which cannot be eliminated?, and,
  - c. could this be offered less frequently (i.e., biennially)?

(2) Letter by Bishop to Committee Chairmen and Cabinet Chairmen

Goal: The Executive Board affirms the need for the synod staff to be more involved with pastors and people with encouragement to committees, task forces, etc. of the synod taking responsibility for the implementation of all programs and projects, beginning June 1, 1981.

Strategies included: Letter by Bishop to committee chairmen and cabinet chairmen, develop strategies

in staff meeting re: time priorities, and, report to synod as information upon Ex-

ecutive Board approval.

e. Goals re: Mission concerns

Need a clearer definition of synod's relationship and responsibility to congregations (and vice versa) and consideration of better ways of communicating this information.

That this goal be referred to the sub-committee on congregations and ministers.

f. Goal re: Leadership support

Aim: A better selection process of candidates for ordination

Goal #1: To require a career evaluation with personality profiling of every candidate who desires to enter the ordained ministry, prior to entrance into Seminary; and, thereby placing a greater responsibility on the Committee for Professional Preparation in the process of elimination of those candidates who do not have the gualifications.

That this goal was referred to the Committee on Professional Preparation.

4. 1981 Executive Board Retreat, Bishop's Task Force regarding Executive Board Leadership, report of, action on

(EBM, June 1981, pp. 17-18; EBM, September 1981, pp. 22-23)

A task force regarding Executive Board leadership was appointed by the Bishop to evaluate and clarify the leadership role of the board in regard to the total ministry of the synod. See item #3 above, Goal a. At the September meeting the report of the task force was received and recommendations were amended and adopted as follows:

- a. The Executive Board should consider having an orientation session for new board members so that they might better know what their responsibilities are and what will be expected of them as a board member. The appropriate time for this would be either prior to or at the time of the June meeting of the board.
- b. Through the appropriate channels of communication, the Bishop and the Executive Board should consider making it publicly known that Executive Board meetings are "open" to any member of the North Carolina Synod (except when Executive Session is called for). It should also be widely

known that anyone who wants to address the Executive Board, or who wants to call a matter to the Executive Board's attention (whether in person or in writing), certainly has the freedom to do so.

- c. The three synodical cabinets (i.e. Professional Leadership, Parish Services, Missions) should be expected to report at least annually to the board. Beginning with the September meeting of the board each cabinet could report... one in September, one in December, and one in March. The task force thought that it would be helpful if there were greater communication between the cabinets and the Executive Board.
- d. Members of cabinets, institutions, agencies, committees, etc. should be appraised of the fact that it would be good if they had the understanding that the Executive Board reserves the right/prerogative to approve or disapprove any matter that comes before the board for consideration and/or recommendation. It should be further understood that it is perfectly within the realm of Christian responsibility for an individual member of the board to vote his/her conscience on a given matter... even if that individual happens to be the only member of the board who holds that view.
- e. The task force feels that the Executive Board should always . . . and without question . . . make itself available to assist the Bishop in any way that he sees fit. This should be done collectively as a total board and individually as board members seek to serve the mission of the Church.
- f. It is recommended that the presiding officer call attention to the presence of Executive Board members at district meetings for the purpose of dialogue, and so as to heighten better communication and public relations within the synod.
- g. And, finally, it is the consensus of this task force that, since, the leader-ship role of the Executive Board (with respect to congregations, institutions, agencies, committees, pastors, etc.) is both clearly and currently being implemented appropriately, the next earliest point at which these concepts concerning the board's leadership role should be discussed/shared is immediately following the election of the next Bishop, and it should take place in dialogue with him/her.

# Chuch House, re: need for additional space, referral of, action on (EBM, June 1981, p. 20)

It was reported at the June meeting that the sub-committee on long range planning had discussed the need for additional space at the Church House. They referred the matter to the sub-committee on finance, personnel and property. See Section O, Item 4 for further information

# 6. 1983 Program Budget, priority planning for, action on (EBM, September 1981, p. 26)

The board adopted Stewardship as its #1 goal for the 1983 budget from the list of 30 synod goals as adopted by the convention in 1979 as the Synod Priorities Program. (See 1979 Proceeding, pp. 152-153). Also, the board approved a motion that the Executive Board ask synod committees to seek in every way possible to support the stewardship emphasis in their plans and programs.

# 7. Capital Funds Appeals, future requests for, action on (EBM, March 1982, p. 25)

At the March meeting the board adopted the policy that future requests for capital funds appeals should be proposed to and through the long range planning sub-committee of the Executive Board for consideration by the board.

# 8. Videotape equipment, purchase of, action on (EBM, March 1982, pp. 25-26)

The board authorized the synod staff individual responsible for supervision of the Heilig Media Center to pursue the purchase of video equipment for the synod and be given permission to contact certain prospective donors who would contribute the cost of this equipment.

9. Computer system for synod use, study of need, action on (EBM, March 1982, p. 26)

At the March meeting a recommendation was adopted that a study be made to determine if a computer or a computer system would be of value to the synod.

 N.C. Synod, future ministry of, information (EBM, March 1982, p. 26)

The board received as information a report from the long range planning subcommittee identifying possibilities for ministries to be considered by the synod in the future including expansion of the Church House facilities, more effective teacher training for Sunday Church School teachers, ministry to the poor, and return to a more structured Youth Ministry program such as Luther League.

#### N. PERSONNEL

 Church House Secretaries; Parish Secretaries' Seminar; funding for, action on

(EBM, June 1981, p. 25)

The board approved a grant of \$200 to be used for transportation expenses of Church House Secretaries for the Parish Secretaries' Seminar to be held in Charlotte, March 15-16, 1982, and, that the Bishop and his staff would decide who would attend the seminar.

2., Lay employees, employee's pension accumulation, agreements with the Board of Pensions, ratification of, action on (EBM, September 1981, p. 16)

At the September meeting, the board ratified the agreement with the Board of Pensions of the Lutheran Church in America to vest employees pension accumulations for lay employees who terminate after five years of service and elect to withdraw employee pension accumulations.

3. Ministers' Health Benefit Plan, Board of Pensions, funding for, action on (EBM, September 1981, p. 16)

The board was informed that the church's Board of Pensions was requiring employees to provide \$77 for the Pension Plan's member hospital coverage. The board approved a recommendation to make provision for health benefit coverage for those pastors on the synod staff covered by the Board of Pensions plan.

4. Personnel Practices Code, vacation days, amendment of, action on (EBM, December 1981, p. 23)

The board approved a recommendation amending the synod's personnel practices code for level III employees so that the day after Thanksgiving Day be added as a vacation day.

#### O. PROPERTY

1. Church House, insurance inspection, report from, information on (EBM, June 1981, p. 25)

It was reported that the Church House had been inspected by an insurance representative for underwriting purposes and that it was recommended that to insure reliability the fire extinguishers needed to be inspected annually and tagged accordingly. Extinguishers were checked in June.

 Church House, modification for physically handicapped persons, action on (EBM, December 1980, p. 26; EBM, March 1981, p. 24; EBM, June 1981, p. 24; EBM, September 1981, p. 16; EBM, December 1981, p. 23; EBM, March 1982)

In December of 1980 the sub-committee on finance, personnel and property reported that it was exploring the need for providing facilities at the Church House for physically handicapped persons. Between December 1980 and December 1981, the needs were evaluated, modifications to the facilities planned and bids let. At the December 1981 meeting the board approved motions accepting a bid of \$400 to construct a ramp outside the building for handicapped persons and repairing of the drive, and, allocating a maximum of \$200 to make the restroom in the Bishop's office

accessible for use by persons with physical handicaps. In March 1982 it was reported that the ramp and drive repairs had been completed.

3. Church House, air conditioning, repair of, information on (EBM, September 1981, p. 16)

It was reported that the air conditioning unit at the Church House was repaired at a cost of \$5,581 and that the funds were taken from the minor repairs reserve fund.

4. Church House, re: need for additional space, referral from long range planning sub-committee, action on

(EBM, September 1981, p. 17)

The board approved a recommendation that a survey be taken of the synod staff to determine the needs for additional space at the Church House and report back to the board, but that only the survey be taken and that it should apply to the present usage of the building, and, with the understanding that no funds be expended.

5. Campus Ministry Committee, synod property at UNC-Greensboro, recommendation to sell, action on

(EBM, March 1982, pp. 17-18)

At the March meeting the board approved a recommendation from the Campus Ministry Committee to sell synod property at UNC-Greensboro and for the funds realized from the sale to go back into campus ministry. The sub-committee on legal affairs would be available for any legal assistance required by the Campus Ministry Committee

#### P. OTHER ITEMS

1. Lutheran Church Women, North Carolina Unit, greetings from (EBM, December 1981, pp. 4-5)

At the December meeting Mrs. Sarah Ingle, President of the North Carolina Unit of Lutheran Church Women brought greetings to the board and explained the purpose of LCW, its program emphasis for 1982 and expressed the desire of LCW for continued support and cooperation from the board and the synod.

2. Church's Influence on Values and Moral Development, presentation of (EBM, December 1981, p. 16)

The board received a special report at the December meeting on "The Church's Influence on Values and Moral Development' presented by Professor Donald G. Hayes and retired Professor William C. Schwarzbek of Lenoir-Rhyne College. They reported on the results of a survey conceived and developed for use at the college to measure the retention of spiritual values and commitment of students during the four years of college. Also, they shared information on curriculum changes at the college as a result of the findings of the survey.

3. Recruitment of candidates for ordained ministry, recommendations on, action

(EBM, March 1982, pp. 26-27)

At the March meeting the board adopted the following proposal designed to give immediate attention to the declining enrollment of N. C. Synod students preparing for ordained ministry and to provide incentive for the recruitment and candidates for the ministry:

That the following recommendations be referred to the Professional Preparation Committee for study and implementation with assurance of the necessary fundina.

Recommendation: That the Bishop send a letter to all pastors of the North Carolina Synod urging their immediate attention to the declining enrollment of North Carolina Synod students at the seminary, and the need for their aggressive efforts to recruit from their parishes the most promising candidates for the pastoral ministry. In support of direct pastoral involvement in recruitment efforts, the pastors should be informed that their travel, room and board expenses incurred by pastors driving candidates to Seminary Days, April 16 and 17, 1982 will be reimbursed by the North Carolina Synod at the same rates provided members of the synod operational committees (15 cents per mile, breakfast, \$2.50; lunch, \$3.00; Dinner, \$4.00).

- (2) Recommendation: That up to \$5,000 be funded from various sources in the synod (e.g. Patterson Fund, Hines Fund) and that additional funds required up to a maximum of \$5,000 be funded from the Michael Peeler income for underwrting the above arrangement.
- (3) Recommendation: That for the balance of 1982, this reimbursement arrangement will apply to any trip taken by synod pastors to bring select candidates to the seminary for recruitment visits.
- (4) Recommendation: That the Committee on Professional Preparation will continue to monitor the program of reimbursement to determine if it should be extended beyond 1982.
- 4. Executive Board, meeting dates, setting of (EBM, March 1982)

The board approved the following meeting dates for spring of 1982: June 3, 1982, 3:00 p.m. pre-convention meeting at Lenoir-Rhyne College and June 23-24, 1982.

The following actions were taken by the Executive Board at its pre-convention meeting at 3:00 p.m. Thursday, June 3, 1982 and are reported here as information.

- 3. 1983 Congregational Apportionment Formula
  Upon the recommendation of the sub-committee on Finance, Personnel and Property, an apportionment formula for 1983 was approved for presentation to the convention as it appears in Supplement II of the Bulletin of Reports.
- 4. Historical Committee, re: pan-synodical memorial regarding church-wide records and archives program The board rescinded actions approving the proposed memorial resolution to

the Louisville Convention of the church (B.R. pp. 64-65) and substitutes the following sense motion with the recommendation that it be adopted:

WHEREAS records management and archival work have been and are being done throughout the Lutheran Church in America by dedicated individuals in congregations, synods and churchwide agencies, and

WHEREAS records management and archival work are essential aspects of the church's ministry, and

WHEREAS records management and archival work are acknowledged as an integral part of good administrative practice, and especially important in light of the increasing volume of records being created and received at all levels of the church, and

WHEREAS records management and archival work despite all present efforts, are inadequate to protect and safeguard our heritage,

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the North Carolina Synod inform the Lutheran Unity Committee, meeting in New York this month, that it is the sense of this convention that an efficient records management and archives system should be established as a priority for the new church, that commits us:

- a. to excellence in this ministry:
- b. to study the role and authority of the Church Secretary as Archivist;
- c. to establish a Commission on Records Management and Archives;
- d. to appoint professionally trained archivists;
- e. to increase funding to appropriate levels;
- f. to adopt a universal records management system;
- g. to prepare a definite statement on church records as church property.
- 5. Charles Heilig Multi-Media Center, gift for, information on

The board was informed that Mr. Charles S. Heilig of Salisbury, former Treasurer of Synod, gave a gift of \$10,000 to the synod's multi-media center with the understanding that income from the investment of these funds be used for current media materials.

6. Parish Life and Ministry Development

Upon the recommendation of the synod's Task Force on Parish Life and Ministry Development the board approved the following recommendations and by-law amendments to be presented and placed on notice at the convention:

a. That a Committee on Parish Life and Ministry Development be established

- b. That the By-Laws, Section VI other committees be amended by adding new Item Q Parish Life and Ministry Development
  - This committee shall be the advocacy group for the use of Parish Life and Ministry resources and programs in the synod in partnership with the Division for Parish Services of the church.
  - This committee shall also advocate and assist in the identification, recruitment, training and support of volunteers for ministry in congregations, the synod and church wide agencies.
- c. That the By-Laws, Section VI, new item R, Cabinets, be amended by inserting after Music and Worship the words, Parish Life and Ministry Development.

Section G, Boards, Committees and Auxiliaries, Item 27:

27. Stewardship Committee, synodwide stewardship program, request for, action on

(EBM, December 1981, pp. 18-19)

The board received and studied a recommendation from the Stewardship Committee requesting a major stewardship emphasis in the synod. The board approved the following recommendation and presents it to the convention with the recommendation that it be adopted:

that the synod's next Bishop and staff be asked to make a priority commitment to a synod-wide program involving all congregations emphasizing stewardship as a way of life and as an appropriate response of commitment to the Gospel of Jesus Christ beginning with the Synod Convention in 1983.

# Communications

The Communications Committee met four times, on May 14, September 19, and November 21, 1981 and March 27, 1982. Those items which should be brought to the attention of the convention are as follows:

Cable Television Demonstration Project. The Rev. Paul B. Beatty, Jr. chaired the task force which initiated this project. 75 synodical congregations expressed interest in the use of cable TV. The majority of these were centered in three areas: Charlotte, Hickory, Salisbury. Hickory was selected as the location for the project.

In Hickory six congregations and two individuals joined together to produce a local program titled, "Focus on the Family". It used a panel to discuss problems faced by the modern day family. Two examples were given in skit form. A live call-in format was attempted so that viewers could be involved. Due to inadequate cable facilities as well as an access problem, the program was given by purchasing air time over the Hickory broadcast station.

Form and content of the demonstration project were led by the Rev. Roy Lloyd of the LCA's Department of Press, Radio, and Television. He spent one week in Hickory helping to develop the project. During that week one-day satellite workshops were held in Charlotte and Salisbury. Help was also given local pastors in Hickory by providing a workshop on presenting television devotionals and another on further use of media.

Great possibilities are available in both Charlotte and Salisbury if congregations will take the initiative. Inquiries for more information should be directed to Pastors Beatty, Lloyd, or Ronald Fink.

The North Carolina Lutheran. Due to the illness of Editor John Wertz, the publication schedule became erratic. When recovery did not come as expected, the editor requested a six-month leave. This was granted by the Bishop who appointed Miss Elsie Hamilton as acting editor. At the end of his leave, Wertz resigned as editor. The committee has interviewed candidates for the position and has submitted a nomination to this convention.

The committee expresses its sincere thanks to John Wertz for his work on the *N.C. Lutheran*. He did a lot during his terms as editor to improve our synod publication. We are grateful. We also express our thanks to the Rev. Ray Petrea who put together an issue at the beginning of Wertz's illness. We are deeply indebted to Miss Hamilton for her fine efforts as acting editor. She has worked hard and has gotten us back on schedule. A thank you goes to Mrs. Frances Huddle for her excellent work as Business Manager.

In an effort to improve the *N. C. Lutheran* and to provide continuity in the event of the death or illness of either the editor or business manager, the committee took the following actions:

- \*set 1982 subscription rates at \$1.00 for the every-home-plan and \$1.75 for individuals:
- \*set up a two-year individual subscription rate of \$3.00; (subscriptions will no longer be accepted for more than two years at a time)
- \*established an active file from which nominees for editor and/or business manager might be drawn;
- \*now requires the designation of an assistant editor, approved by the committee, who knows the publication procedure;
- \*set honoria for the editor, business manager, and assistant editor for 1982;
- \*elected Petrea as assistant editor, serving with Miss Hamilton.

Convention News Bureau. Each year at the convention members of this committee man a news bureau which gets the events of the convention to the print and electronic media as quickly as possible. This is being done again this year. As a service to the delegates the bureau tries to publish a convention summary which delegates can take home with them. It will be ready following the closing session of synod.

#### Other items to note:

- \*The Communications Handbook prepared by this committee and presented to each congregation continues to be a vital tool. It is full of useful hints and helps. One suggestion in there which is worth very serious consideration is the establishment of a communications committee as a standing committee for your congregation.
- \*Promotional chairperson for *THE LUTHERAN* magazine is Mr. Jim Chesky. Contact him if you need help promoting subscriptions or need cost information.
- \*Articles which would be of interest to LCA readers should be sent to the LUTHERAN through the Rev. Paul Conrad, our synod correspondent.
- \*Our synod, upon recommendation from this committee, is participating with the other judicatories of the North Carolina Council of Churches to produce a pilot project of a video tape program to be made available to both broadcast and cable television. The NCCC has contracted with Creative Ministry Associates to produce the program which will feature N. C. Christians who are "living their faith". The program will use a media news magazine format.

#### NORTH CAROLINA LUTHERAN NOTE TO FINANCIAL STATEMENT December 31, 1981

Note 1 — Significant Accounting Policy

The North Carolina Lutheran prepares its financial statement on the basis of cash receipts and disbursements; consequently, certain revenue is recognized when received rather than when earned and certain expenses when paid rather than when the obligation is incurred.

# Historical Work

The Committee on Historical Work met three times during the past reporting year.

The committee's work has encompassed both tangible and intangible considerations, as well as the routine and the unanticipated. This report will highlight significant achievements in relation to the archives and in enhancing appreciation for and awareness of the historical legacies.

The Bernard W. and Juanita Boland Cruse Historical Collection has been presented to the archives by their son, Bernard W. Cruse, Jr. This collection including books, documents, photographs, and genealogical data relating in large part to the Lutheran History in Piedmont Carolina, adds a highly significant dimension to the holdings of the archives in both scope and content.

Microfilm copies of all congregational records which have been filmed by the North Carolina Division of Archives and History are now available in the synodical archives. These extensive holdings not only provide for researchers but represent hundreds of years of history as recorded by the lives of thousands of people. That these records are now protected from the ravages of time and the elements brings to the observer a profound sense of gratitude that these are preserved for the guidance of posterity. When church records are destroyed, there is no way that this information can be retrieved.

In response to the committee's budget request for the services of a professional archivist to accession the Cruse Collection and the official papers of the past three synodical presidents, the executive board granted funds for an archivist for a limited term.

The archives filmstrip presentation: "Your Lutheran Heritage: Yours to Preserve" is now available for loan to congregations. This multimedia production featuring North Carolina photographs with a taped narration is designed to provide an overview of the synodical archives and to give guidance to individual congregations in collecting and preserving their own heritage.

In anticipation of the observance of the 200th Synodical Anniversary in 2003, the committee is making plans for a fall conference (1982) for historians interested in German Lutheran history in the Southeast. The 1983 Martin Luther 500th Birthday Anniversary Observances will be a forthcoming consideration of the committee's future agenda.

The attached memorial relating to the implementing of records management and archives system was endorsed by the committee on March 6, 1982 and is recommended to the 1982 Synod Convention for consideration.

# Cabinet For Professional Leadership

One of the most sensitive and challenging mandates which the church assigns is the one given to the committees of this cabinet. That mandate in substance is the task of caring for the professional leadership of the church. Our committees and our valued institutions, Lenoir-Rhyne College and the Lutheran Theological Southern Seminary are dedicated to the effective implementation of this assignment.

The cabinet is composed of representatives from the Committee for Professional Preparation, the Committee for Professional Services, the Lutheran Theological Southern Seminary and Lenoir-Rhyne College. The college's specific concern in this area is continuing education. Working together with the Bishop's representative, Pastor David Martin, we seek to coordinate our efforts and to communicate our concern to the Synod.

As chairman of the cabinet it is my privilege to work with highly motivated, singularly talented individuals in the persons of Pastors David Franzen and William Milholland. And serving with them are dedicated members of great ability.

I have met with the committees as often as possible. I attended the seminarians' retreat at Camp Lutheridge, the synod-CWA budget consultation, portions of the examination of candidates for ordination, and the fall retreat led by Dr. Joseph Sitler.

The cabinet recommended the dissolvement of the Chapel Hill residency program. We have been involved, as were other cabinets, in budget prioritizing. And we worked closely to coordinate our efforts in the preparation of a cabinet presentation for the convention.

# **Professional Preparation**

This committee is charged with the responsibility of recruiting, evaluating, guiding, supporting, endorsing and examining candidates who express an interest in a church vocation. As soon as a person indicates an interest in a ministry through the church, this committee begins the process of giving direction to the candidate's growth and development. Our involvement with a candidate can continue over several years and we desire to meet with each one at least once during the year. There are 58 persons in various stages of their development who are presently registered with the committee.

In the last few years there have been fewer persons from the synod who are in the process of preparing themselves for service in the church. There is need for a

more concerted effort to recruit from congregations the most promising candidates for the parish ministry. Pastors are the primary persons who bring the Call to youth in their parishes. Potential candidates are more likely to visit the seminary if personally taken by their pastors. Cost of such a visit may make some ministers hesitate to take the trip. To ease this financial burden the Executive Board of synod has passed a resolution making funds available to help defray expenses. Reimbursement will be made at the same rate as that provided other committees (15 cents/mile, breakfast \$2.50, lunch \$3.00, dinner \$4.00). Requests for reimbursement may be made through the synod office.

At this convention the terms of service on this committee expire for five persons. The synod constitution limits to six years the time a person can serve on committees. Only a few people outside of this committee can fully appreciate the tremendous investment of time and talent, energy and emotion which members of the committee give. The synod will miss the contributions of the Rev. Charlie Hoyle, the Rev. Michael McDaniel, PhD, Dr. William Schwarzbek, the Rev. Hoyle Whiteside, DD, and the Rev. William F. Milholland. In addition, the committee will be without the expert counsel and guidance of the Rev. David Martin, of the synod staff, who is anticipating moving into other areas of ministry. It has been a real privilege for all of us to serve the church in this capacity and we thank you for the opportunity. Those remaining on the committee will very capably continue to nurture and guide promising candidates along the pathway to ministry in our church.

Some of the activities of this committee include:

- Registrations: Fifteen new candidates have been registered with the committee since the last meeting of synod. Inquiries have been received from fifteen others. One candidate transferred to the North Carolina Synod from the Central States Synod. One person is entering the second career program offered at Gettysburg Seminary. Two persons have been transferred from this synod to the Wisconsin and Rocky Mountain Synods.
- Examinations: Nine candidates were examined and upon completion of their academic work will be recommended for a call. One former LCA pastor, one ordained ALC pastor, and two ordained LCMS pastors appeared before the committee and were recommended for calls in this synod.
- Certifications: The following lay professional was certified: Edie Hockspeier as Director of Church Music, Level II.
- 4. **Financial Aid:** Fourteen requests for financial aid were received and granted which totalled \$17,500. The average grant was \$1,250, the minimum being \$500 and the maximum \$1500. Grants were made on the basis of need.

# **Professional Services**

The purpose and function of this committee is to provide professional and personal support for pastors and lay professionals (described collectively in this report as professional leaders) who are engaged in the ministry of this synod, or who are retired or disabled. In some important ways this committee's support also extends to the families of these professional leaders.

# 1. Committee Reorganization

At our first meeting of the year the committee re-examined its purpose and func-

tion, provided orientation for new members and re-organized itself for the tasks with which it is entrusted. Five task areas were identified that describe the main ways in which this committee works: 1. Lay professional concerns; 2. Salary and housing guideline support for professional leaders; 3. Concerns for learning and growth of professional leaders through continuing education, evaluation, consultation and counseling; 4. The committee organizational functions of project development, budget building, etc.; and 5. The variety of ways in which this committee explicitly supports, extends or coordinates with the Bishop and his staff the care and nurture of the synod's professional leaders. The committee members divided themselves into three working clusters, each specializing in one of the first three task areas described above. The remaining two task areas were addressed by the committee as a whole.

Cluster chairpersons are as follows:

Rev. John Merck — Concerns for Professional Leaders Carroll Robinson — Salary and Housing Guidelines Martha Yount — Lay Professional Concerns

Synod staff leadership and counsel is provided through the competent work of Reverend David L.Martin, Minister for Professional Leadership. Reverend Thurmond C. Plexico, Chairperson of the Cabinet for Professional Leadership, was also supportive of our work.

# 2. Lay Professional Concerns

Our committee supported and advocated the labors of the small, but important cadre of full-time lay professionals who work in our synod. We enlisted their valuable direction with the worship services at the Fall Convocation.

- A. A Church Secretary's Workshop in Charlotte on March 15-16, 1982 was sponsored on a pan-Lutheran basis by Aid Association for Lutherans. Our committee provided local leadership and publicity in making this event so well attended. It drew very positive ratings from the 56 secretaries and 34 pastors who attended, and it is hoped this workshop will become an annual event.
- B. A Luncheon for Lay Professionals at the 1981 synod convention was sponsored by this committee. We are hosting a similar event this year to honor and support the work of these people, and we are pleased to introduce the lay professionals in attendance to this synod in convention.
- C. Salary and Professional Mileage Compensation Guidelines were designed for certified lay professionals. They are described in recommendation #8 of this committee's report.

#### 3. Concerns for Professional Leaders

Again this year the largest number of issues were addressed by this cluster as it sought to work in a creative and effective manner with many professional learning and growth needs.

- A. The 1981 Fall Convocation for Professional Leaders was held in October at Lutheridge. Over 110 people attended this event which had as its theme "Our Pilgrimage as Ministers and Persons." Keynote speaker, Dr. Joseph Sittler, made eloquent and penetrating presentations on biblical interpretation, bio-ethical decision-making, and spirituality. Each participant attended one of five workshops offered: Spiritual Growth, Financial Management, Conflict Management, Support Systems, and Multiple Staff Ministry. Our committee was appreciative of the cooperation and rich contributions of the Worship and Music Committee who helped us design and implement worship events for the convocation.
- B. The 1982 Fall Convocation for Professional Leaders will be held at Lutheridge September 27-29. This year's keynote speaker will be Dr. Martin Heinecken, and he will address the convocation theme, "Applying Our Theology in a Changing World." Six workshops will be offered, and the faculty for this event will be superb. The concept of fall convocations enables us to provide high quality continuing education events in an attractive, attendable format which affords time for collegial support and recreation. It is hoped that the variety of workshop offerings will effectively address the various needs and interests of our professional leaders.

- C. The CPE Residency at N. C. Memorial Hospital in Chapel Hill became the responsibility of this committee during the past year. The transfer of responsibility from the Social Ministry Committee occurred amidst a reevaluation of the viability of this program. The quality of the CPE program itself was excellent, and this committee wishes to commend the Pastoral Care Department of N. C. Memorial Hospital for the competent and professional manner in which they provided education to our Lutheran residents. Program problems centered around the perennial difficulties in recruiting students from the clergy role of our synod. More specifically, the issues of financial stress and rapid mobility to Chapel Hill and then back into another pastoral call made this program prohibitive to many interested candidates. The committee could not justify spending more money on the education of one pastor per year, and pastors themselves made very large financial sacrifices to participate. The committee therefore decided to terminate the Lutheran CPE Residency position, and since no candidate for the 1981-82 year had been secured, the decision became effective immediately.
- D. A Pastoral Counseling Contract for professional leaders and their families has been authorized by the Executive Board, and it has given our committee the responsibility to design and implement a mutually acceptable contract. \$5600.00 has been authorized for the program in 1982. The program would provide partial remuneration for pastoral counseling services received by pastors, certified lay professionals and their families. Our committee is currently designing and negotiating a contract with a pastoral counseling center in the state which would function as the central referral and service center. In embarking upon this project we are following the precedent of a number of other synods and judicatories which already have successful programs of this nature to meet the needs of professional leaders. The hallmarks of this program will be very high standards of pastoral counseling expertise and complete confidentiality. Highest standards of pastoral counseling expertise can only be obtained from highly trained and credentialed people who do this work full-time. No personal knowledge or identification of those persons receiving counseling services will be divulged to the Bishop, his staff or to this committee. It is felt that this program will be an effective and responsible means of supporting our professional leaders as they experience the stresses and difficulties inherent both in their calling and in their own humanity.
- E. The New Professional Leaders Workshop was offered again this year for professional leaders who are called or employed for the first time in this synod. The workshop was well attended and highly rated by participants.
- F. The First Year in Ministry Program was jointly sponsored by Dr. Martin Saarinen of LTSS and the chairperson of this committee, and it was underwritten by Lutheran Brotherhood funds. The program includes a series of three workshops for recently ordained clergy which are held 6, 12 and 18 months after seminary graduation. The workshops provide a supportive and challenging context in which to explore and grapple with professional and personal issues that emerge as these people begin their ministry careers. Three workshops were held during this year, and all were well attended.
- G. Continuing Education Fund Grants have been available to professional leaders through this committee. Scholarships are available to those in need to support and affirm our leaders in their efforts to enhance and maintain competencies in ministry. These grants have been under utilized during the past year and it is hoped that more people who need this support will draw upon it.
- H. A Leadership Ministries Newsletter was published by this committee to disseminate information of relevance and support to pastors and lay professionals.
- I. The Options Program offered by the LCA for professional leaders was utilized by one person from our synod this year, and our committee provided needed financial support.
- J. Career Evaluation Services were provided again this year for those professional leaders who were experiencing important vocational issues. The services of the Career and Personal Counseling Service at Laurinburg were purchased on an as needed basis to provide vocational and aptitude evaluations that would enable the professional leader to make sound vocational decisions.

- K. Study of the By-Laws of the synod describing the functions and responsibilities of this committee was made. Recommendations 1 through 4 in this report are made to update or revise the By-Laws so as to more accurately describe the functions and responsibilities of this committee.
- L. **Growth in Ministry** workshop offerings continue to be an important mode of continuing education in the synod, and this committee has actively promoted their usage. Rev. Henry Lineberger has served as special resource person on Growth In Ministry in the synod, and led the Support Systems workshop on two occasions. Two Growth in Ministry workshops were implemented at the 1981 Fall Convocation and more such offerings are projected for 1983.

# 4. Salaries and Housing Guidelines

Each year the cluster of Salaries and Housing Guidelines has been a group our committee could count on for thorough and faithful work. This year was no exception. Again this year the guidelines they have developed are the result of research and careful study which will provide congregations and professional leaders with a benchmark from which to work as they seek to be faithful in the compensation they provide.

The report of the Salaries and Housing Guidelines cluster is found in recommendations 5 through 8 of this report. This year that report includes guidelines for compensation of certified lay professionals.

# 5. Committee Recommendations

The Professional Services Committee places on notice the following four proposed amendments to the By Laws:

# Recommendation 1:

that Item M.2.a. of Section VI of the By-Laws be amended by deleting (ministers'), and adding their so that this item would read:

M.2.a. To provide opportunities for orientation into synodical life for newly received ordained ministers, other professional leaders, and their spouses.

#### Recommendation 2:

that Item M.2.d. of Section VI of the By-Laws be amended by adding the plural suffix **s** to the word, leader, so that this item would read:

M.2.d. To evaluate and recommend programs of continuing education to the professional leaders of the synod.

# Recommendation 3:

that Item M.2.g. of Section VI of the By-Laws be amended by deleting (pulpit) and (professional), and adding **call** and **personnel** so that this item would read:

M.2.g. To conduct research each year to keep the professional leaders' salaries current and to provide such information as a resource to the Bishop of Synod, call and personnel committees, and church councils.

#### Recommendation 4:

that Section VI of the By-Laws be amended by adding the following new Item M.2.j. (new) that would read as follows:

M.2.j. To provided support for pastors, lay professionals and their families in seeking pastoral evaluation, consultation or psychotherapy on an individual, marital or family therapy basis from appropriately credentialed pastoral counselors engaged by the Synod.

# **Recommendation 5:**

The committee surveyed compensation guidelines of the South Carolina, Maryland, Florida, Virginia and Southeastern Synods — as well as other denominations in North Carolina — and recommend the following guidelines as adequate compensation of parish pastors.

This entry level salary should be increased at the rate of 1% for each year of experience up to twenty-five (25) years.

The committee suggests that where a congregation's current operating expense budget is less than \$30,000 that the congregation cannot adequately support full time professional leadership and should seek an alternative to full-time professional leadership.

Minimum salary for use of the sustentation committee or for use in special situations as determined by the American Missions Committee:

### Recommendation 7:

# Staff Ministry:

The guidelines as established in Recommendation #5 above should be used in determining adequate compensation for each pastor involved in staff ministry.

The lead pastor should be compensated at the appropriate guideline category. Other pastors in the staff ministry should be compensated **At No Less Than** the category shown in Recommendation #5 which equals 50% of the congregation's current operating budget. In recognition of the value of experience, the salary level shown in the guidelines in Recommendation #5 should be increased by 1% for each year of experience up to twenty-five (25) years.

For example, a congregation having a current operating expense budget of \$90,000 is involved in a staff ministry of two pastors. One pastor has 10 years experience and the other pastor has 3 years of experience. Each pastor in this team receives a housing allowance. The congregation can determine the **Minimum Adequate Compensation** for staff ministry by using the guidelines shown in recommendation #5 as follows:

#### Recommendation 8:

Level I full time, certified lay professional compensation should be equivalent to the tenure based salary - annualized to cover twelve (12) months - of a public school teacher with a Bachelors degree holding an A certificate.

Level II full time, certified lay professional compensation should be equivalent to the tenure based salary - annualized to cover twelve (12) months - of a public school teacher with a Masters degree holding an A certificate.

Level I and Level II full time, certified lay professionals should be reimbursed for required business mileage at the prevailing IRS rate allowed and should be given a minimum of two (2) weeks paid vacation.

# Report of Lutheran Theological Southern Seminary

Lutheran Theological Southern Seminary, in its 152nd year, continues preparing men and women for parish ministry in the Church. At this writing, the Seminary finds itelf in transition as it seeks to meet the challenges of a rapidly changing world and as it contemplates a change in leadership. After eleven years of growth and development under the excellent leadership of Dr. Hugh George Anderson, who resigned on December 31, 1981 to become president of Luther College, Decorah, Iowa, a search committee is busy seeking a new leader. In the meantime, the Seminary continues its task under its interim head, Dr. Mack C. Branham, Jr. and its fine faculty and staff.

In addition to the Presidential search, another concern of the Board of Trustees and the Seminary administration is securing adequate funding so that the Seminary can effectively do its job in these inflationary times. Under the direction of Dr. Curtis Derrick, Jr., Vice-president for Development, the Campaign for the H. George Anderson endowed professorship in church history has received pledges and contributions totaling \$230,000, more than two thirds of the \$300,000 goal. Pastors, lay persons, congregations and other institutions are encouraged to assist the Seminary in its efforts to reach the \$300,000,00 goal by the end of 1982.

A recent study which focused on the effects which inflation has had on Seminary operating expenses and synodical support indicates the necessity for exploring additional sources for financing theological education at the Seminary. Although the Synods have increased their support each year, these gifts have comprised a smaller share of the Seminary's total budget. In 1965, the supporting synods contributed 68.3% of the Seminary's total budget. Since that time the percentage has decreased to 59.1% in 1970, to 43.2% in 1975 and to 32.9% in 1980. Each year the Seminary must find additional funding from sources other than synodical apportionments in order to meet its budget. The Seminary's administration and Board of Trustees wanted to make you aware of this so that you could be supportive in encouraging friends to remember the Seminary in their giving and in their wills.

The faculty and staff are well equipped and are doing an excellent job. The physical plant at the Seminary is in very good repair and as adequate as it has ever been in its history.

This year adequate funds were received in the form of designated gifts and grants which enabled the Seminary to establish a program of study for Black bivocational pastors in South Carolina in the Georgetown, Greenwood, and Columbia areas. This program, administered by the Director of Continuing Education, has enabled Black bivocational pastors who are not seminary trained to study under the seminary faculty. Hopefully, adequate funding for this project can be obtained so that it can continue. Over fifty Black pastors are currently enrolled.

A loss during the year which all of us have felt most keenly was the death of our long-time seminary supporter and treasurer, Dr. Robert Darr. The Seminary's administration and Board of Trustees depended on Dr. Darr for advice and direction in financial affairs. His presence will be truly missed. In November the Board of Trustees selected Mr. Cletus Horne, President of the Federal Land Bank of Columbia and long time friend of Dr. Darr, to be the new Seminary Treasurer.

# Cabinet For Parish Services

The Cabinet for Parish Services is composed of the chairpersons of synodical operational committees that relate directly to congregations. In addition to these committees, the Director of Outdoor Ministries and the Executive Director of Lutheridge serve on this cabinet. The Reverend Robert H. Shoffner, Minister of Parish Services for the synod, also serves on this cabinet. His expertise and untiring efforts, have contributed significantly to the work of the cabinet.

Among the activities of this cabinet during 1981-82 were:

- In consultation with the task group on The Changing Role of Men and Women in Society, proposed to the Executive Board that a major emphasis in our synod for 1982-83 be "Applying Our Theology To A Changing World."
- Participate in the budget building process for the proposed budget. By action of the Executive Board, the cabinet was given a 7.5% increase in funds for 1983. The cabinet prioritized the budget requests of the various operational committees comprising the cabinets.
- At the direction of the Executive Board, conducted an evaluation of the Youth Staffer Program. The cabinet recommended the continuation of this program for 1982-83 and that alternatives be explored for accomplishing these program goals after 1983.
- 4. Recommended to the Executive Board that the Lutheran Church Volunteer Network be established in the synod and that a Sunday be set aside in the synod for the recognition of volunteers.
- 5. Produced and distributed to congregations a 1982 Planning Calendar listing all of the programs and events sponsored by the cabinet.
- 6. Served as a channel of communication between the LCA Division for Parish Services and synodical operational committees.
- 7. Planned and coordinated 1982 District Church Days.
- 8. Set up a plan to work with congregations under development in organizing their program and training their leadership.

and Conference Center will also begin major construction of much needed retreat cabins and an office/administrative building. In addition, a major change in operational procedure will be implemented if the Synod in Convention approves the "Incorporation" of "North Carolina Outdoor Ministries." This new "institution" will become the sixth which is supported by our Synod and will operate with a structure incorporating a Board of Trustees to carry on the operation, development, and business of this vital area of ministry.

# **Outdoor Ministries**

Outdoor Ministries experienced a record year in 1981 in attendance, with 4,999 camper days. Our goal was 4,600. The reservation and utilization for 1982 indicate this number will be larger. The Lutheran Men's Retreat Lodge hosted 67 groups for 1,683 camper days. The Kure Beach Center hosted 41 groups for 1,947 camper days. In 1981 Outdoor Ministries hosted 131 groups in retreat programs at Agape and Kure Beach. Our new slogan "Where good things happen" is our goal to provide to every congregation the best possible service and facilities. It is our intent that ministries programs become that Christian community in growth.

# Conference and Camping Ministry Appeal

On February 20, 1982, the appeal had reached \$1,520,000 in gifts and congregational intentions. This date represents 23% of the appeal time schedule and 24% of the stated intention. This fine record is made possible by the excellent effort of our congregations. To continue the cultivation and promotion of the Conference and Camping Ministries Appeal, the Executive Board has designated the third Sunday in September in both 1982 and 1983 as Conference and Camping Ministries Sundays.

We are happy to announce that several projects are underway as a result of appeal funds. A new dining shelter in the family campground is completed. Volunteer labor was utilized for 80% of the work. We wish to express our appreciation to the 25 scouts and scouters for their labor in this project. A road to the river is currently under development, as well as work on the riverfront program. This riverfront project is expected to be completed in September.

Our first priority with appeal funds will be the construction of the new Kure Beach Retreat Center. The plans call for the closing of the present unit on August 20, 1982, and removal of this building and the construction of the new unit will start in September and will be ready for use in June 1983.

# Lutheran Outdoor Ministries, Board of Trustees

The Camp Committee has recommended to the Executive Board that Lutheran Outdoor Ministries be incorporated and established with a Board of Trustees who will be elected by the convention of Synod. With the continual growth of programs and facilities in Outdoor Ministries this action is necessary for the better management of these services to the congregations.

# **Finances**

Outdoor Ministries operated ''in the black'' in 1981 — operating expenses not exceeding income. Both Agape Camp and Kure Beach ended the year with some cash reserves for emergency. The sinking fund for the maintenance of the Lutheran Men's Retreat Lodge has grown to \$4,500. \$1.50 of each lodging fee is placed in this sinking fund for future maintenance. A sinking fund for maintenance of the Kure

Beach unit was started January 1, 1982. Ten percent of all registration fees will be invested in a sinking fund for future needs of the new unit. During 1981 \$29,609.34 was received from the appeal.

We wish to express our appreciation to all individuals and congregations who have supported this ministry with their special gifts. This support is the needed help in the programs of Outdoor Ministries.

# AGAPE CAMP CONFERENCE AND RETREAT CENTER NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS December 31, 1981

#### NOTE 1 SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Agape Camp Conference and Retreat Center prepares its financial statements on the basis of cash receipts and disbursements; consequently, certain revenues are recognized when received rather than when earned and certain expenses are recognized when paid rather than when incurred.

Acquisition of equipment and improvements of property are expensed in the year of acquisition. Property which is used in operations is not considered property of the Retreat.

The Lodge Maintenance Sinking Fund represents a pro rata part of campers' fees allocated by the Retreat's committee for maintenance and abnormal replacements.

#### NOTE 2 ACCOUNT WITH LUTHERAN OUTDOOR MINJSTRIES

Synod's office of Lutheran Outdoor Ministries, Raleigh, N.C. maintains an account with Cash Reserve Management Inc. and a Trading account with E. F. Hutton & Company, Inc. Funds from Kure Beach Retreat Center's Holding Fund, Conference and Camping Ministries Appeal and Lutheran Men's

Lodge Sinking Fund are deposited or held in this fund to yield maximum interest. At December 31, 1981 the Lodge Maintenance Sinking Fund of Agape Camp Conference and Retreat Center had \$4,346 of its funds with this fund.

# Conference and Camping Ministries Appeal

The Conference and Camping Ministries Appeal is pleased to report that a real success is in the making. As of March 15, 1982, the response totalled \$1,523,407.51. This consisted of resolutions by 119 congregations to accept particular portions of the appeal goal as their share (called ''stated intentions''), contributions by other congregations, advance pledges, and gifts by individuals, the synod, and a foundation. This is less than five per cent short of the challenge goal of \$1,600,000 to be met by the end of 1983.

Resident direction by Charles F. Bartlett, representing the Lutheran Laymen's Movement Fund Raising Service, was continued until June 15, 1981. At that time the Campaign Policy committee gave way to a Progress committee consisting of Bishop Misenheimer, chairman; the Rev. Robert L. Troutman, the Rev. David L. Castor, Mrs. Ruth Fisher, the Rev. Boyce Whitener, Harold McKnight, Clarence Pugh, the Rev. J. White Iddings, and the Rev. George R. Whittecar. This committee has met quarterly since July. The committee requested the Rev. George R. Whittecar to assume the role of Progress Director, which he did on June 15, 1981. The appeal office was moved to space provided by Haven Church, Salisbury. A team of district and area leaders, most of whom had been active in the earlier stages of the appeal, was recruited to assist the Progress Director. The counsel of the L.L.M. is being continued through the pledge payment period.

The stated intentions of 119 congregations total \$1,217,049, which exceeds the basic goal of \$1,000,000. In addition, contributions have been received from 37 other congregations. No response has been recorded from 56 congregations, although several are currently taking steps to receive pledges and offerings and to formalize their intentions. A foundation has pledged \$200,000 for Lutheridge and the synod has contributed \$9,773 by forgiving a loan from the Michael Peeler fund that has been advanced for expenses of the appeal. Contributions by individuals on advanced pledges are credited to the congregations of the donors. Gifts designated for particular purposes within the scope of the appeal and memorial gifts are recorded separately.

During the promotional stage of the appeal, all expenses were managed by Lutheridge, Inc. An audit of such accounts from the beginning of the appeal to the close of 1981 is attached along with an audit of the Resident Director's petty cash fund through June 15, 1981. Attached also is an audit of the Progress Director's funds from June 15, 1981, to January 25, 1982, which covers year-end receipts and disbursements.

Reports on the use of funds remitted to Lutheridge and the Outdoor Ministries of the synod for purposes of the appeal will come from those agencies.

It is important that interest in the appeal and its purposes be maintained at a high level in all congregations through 1982 and 1983 so that our people will be encouraged to make their intended contributions during the designated pledge payment period.

Thanks are extended to all who participated in the promotional phase of the appeal and to all the congregations and individuals who have responded with resolutions of intent, pledges, and contributions.

# THE CONFERENCE AND CAMPING MINISTRIES APPEAL NORTH CAROLINA SYNOD OF THE LUTHERAN CHURCH IN AMERICA NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENT December 31, 1981

Note 1 — Accounting Policies

The Appeal's policy is to prepare its financial statement on a cash basis. Consequently, certain revenues are recognized when received rather than when earned and certain expenses are recognized when paid rather than when the obligation is incurred.

# **Educational Ministry**

According to the N. C. Synod By-Laws, Section V, D the Committee on Educational Ministry "shall work together with the Division for Parish Services and congregations of the synod to broaden the scope and improve the quality of Educational Ministry within the synod" and "shall stimulate and help congregations as they develop learning goals, particularly those related to the Christian home, the Vacation Church School, the Weekday Church School, the Sunday Church School, Confirmation Ministry, Children's activities, Special interest groups and kindergartens, and leadership development." The Committee on Educational Ministry has sought throughout the year to meet its purpose through programs designed to enhance learning across the synod in the congregations.

The Reverend Robert H. Shoffner, Minister for Parish Life, has provided excellent leadership to the committee through his planning skills and willingness to assume major responsibilities. His availability to all members of the committee at all levels of work is deeply appreciated. During the year the committee has been involved in the following areas of concern:

RESOURCE TEAMS: Fifteen team members were recruited for the year with six attending a training session conducted by DPS-LCA in Atlanta during the summer. Team efforts have been mostly working with cluster groups and doing individual consulting in congregations, mostly in the Northern and Central part of the state. Resource Team members have been trained to help congregations work on Educational Ministry concerns and have proven to be a valuable asset to congregations that have taken advantage of what they have to offer.

LEADERSHIP EDUCATION AND DEVELOPMENT: The Rev. Gary A. Perryman has been the synodical co-ordinator for the LEAD program in our synod. LEAD is a two year program designed to help congregations develop leadership in the area of Educational Ministry. Several clusters of congregations were held across the synod at which time the LEAD program was introduced. Seven congregations held subsequent meetings with Resource Team members to extend the LEAD concept in their programs.

CONFIRMATION MINISTRY: The Reverend John Misenheimer is the synodical coordinator for confirmation ministry. The Campfirmation program was extended in June to the campus of Lenoir-Rhyne College where 12 pastors and 85-90 youth with assistance from the Lutheridge staff carried out the program. We hope to be able to get Campfirmation clusters operational at Camp Agape and Kure Beach in years to come. All reports are that the confirmation material, CATECHETICS FOR TODAY, is being well received across the synod territory.

MULTI-MEDIA CENTER: Mrs. Dot Helms is the committee representative in charge of surveying resources available in our Multi-Media Center. The center is a library of materials, films, video tapes, filmstrips, records, etc. and is widely used by the congregations of the synod. Mrs. Betty Munday manages the center and we commend her for her excellent service. The Educational Ministry Committee continuously reviewing our media center needs and makes purchases and replacements whenever possible.

VACATION CHURCH SCHOOL: Mrs. Jo Ann Spees is the committee chairperson in charge of Vacation Church School. She had coordinated workshops throughout the synod in April for VCS leaders using the material "Because God Cares". Lining up these workshops has taken a good deal of effort and we express to Mrs. Spees our gratitude for the time and talent she has poured into this committee project.

TEACHING OUR THEOLOGY: Plans are being made by the committee to participate in the Fall Convocation for Pastors and Lay Professionals at Lutheridge on September 27-29. The Reverend Edwin L. Ricks from Division for Parish Services will lead the Educational Ministry portion of the conference. "Teaching our Theology" will consider the need to relate our theology to a changing world.

CHURCH DAYS: During the February Synod Church Days the Educational Ministry Committee offered two workshops in the districts. One was a basic workshop for new members on congregational EM Committees, and the second was an advanced workshop dealing with intergenerational learning.

Your Educational Ministry Committee is grateful for the many volunteers who have offered their time, talents, and services during the past year to the work of the committee. Doing Educational Ministry requires a goodly portion of each congregation's program, and the committee is ready and willing to be of assistance to congregations seeking assistance in this area. Again, we give special thanks to The Reverend Robert H. Shoffner who, through his *Parish Life Newsletter*, publicizes the work of the committee through the synod.

# Evangelism

The Operational Committee on Evangelism performs its ministry by involving itself in the numerous tasks of the Evangelical Outreach Emphasis. This emphasis is an integral part of the witness mission of the Lutheran Church in America. The following is a listing of the various events/activities that have been coordinated over the past twelve months:

Church Days — The committee sent representatives to the seven synodical districts to lead workshops and entertain ideas from individual congregations that could be shared throughout the synod. All were well-attended and received positive evaluations.

Carolinas Evangelism Conference — January 24-26, 1982, marked the ninth conference of its kind for Lutherans of the North and South Carolina Synods. Guest speaker and lecturer for the two-day event at St. Mark, Charlotte, was Dr. Foster McCurley, professor in Old Testament Studies, Lutheran Theological Seminary, Philadelphia.

Pastor As Witness — Provided motivational/inspirational events for pastors, with emphasis on applying our theology to a changing world. The Lenten-Easter Preaching Retreat is usually scheduled during January or February. The Preaching from Commitment event is a Fall program.

**Word & Witness** — A priority is to assist pastors and congregations in recruiting for this project and keep before the constituency the availability of scholarship aid. The only training session in our area this year will be at Southern Seminary, Columbia, S.C., June 15-23.

Abundant Life Missions — Members of the committee have conducted these programs in several congregations with materials provided by the Institute of Church Renewal in Atlanta.

Witness in Small Parishes — We feel committed to provide support, motivation and resources to smaller churches that seem to get overlooked with evangelism programs are mentioned. A special design for congregations like these is in the planning stages.

The following is a list of people who have been very helpful in implementing our evangelism efforts throughout the synod:

**Evangelism Consultants** — This is a network of 20 pastors and lay persons who have been trained to meet with certain congregational evangelism committees and/or church councils to give support and encourage outreach ministry. While what is being done has proven to be productive, we need more congregations to invite us if our commitment to this process is to prove mutually beneficial.

The Rev. Richard Perry — The Director of Minority Ministry works with our committee and has proven to be an effective catalyst and resource person. His expertise in working with minorities can enable every congregation the opportunity to develop an outreach and witness ministry to and with this virtually untapped population in our state.

The Rev. James R. Connelly, Jr. — Deployed Staff Person of the Division for Parish Services. Jim provides continued skilled guidance as we plan, execute, and evaluate our ministry. His contribution to our synod is immeasurable.

The Rev. Richard Little — Synodical Minister for Outreach is the staff person who relates directly to our committee. Dick is a splendid resource person and assists us as we carry out our goals, objectives and strategies. He has proven to be most cooperative and committed in his work with our committee.

# Parish Life and Ministry Task Force

The PLMD Task Force has continued to function as a separate entity in the N. C. Synod, and has worked in conjunction with other committees which are a part of the Cabinet For Parish Services. It is recognized that "PLMD is not for every congregation." However, during a ten year period, PLMD should be one option which is considered in making long range and short range plans.

The focus on the Task Force's work during the past year has been to emphasize the importance, and value of on-going ministry planning and evaluation utilizing the PLMD resources.

Two congregations, Advent, Charlotte, and New Jerusalem, Hickory, have begun their work with the customized PLMD program. Pastor Robert H. Shoffner is serving as Area Key Leader for Advent, and Pastor Don M. Michael is serving New Jerusalem as their resource person.

One of the multiple approaches to PLMD has been ordered by a number of congregations. St. James, Fayetteville, is using the "Move Ahead" resource and Our Saviour, Jacksonville, is using "Open To The Spirit."

Members of the Task Force have been trained, and resources are available to support congregations in their efforts to evaluate the various approaches to PLMD. They have also developed a resource to assist congregations in determining which PLMD program might be most beneficial for their ministry.

Letters have been sent to congregations which will observe a significant anniversary in 1982, including a copy of "Recovering Our Past — Discovering Our Future." Individual members of the Task Force have supported this initiative by contact with Pastors of these congregations.

The Task Force will continue to publicize the merits of PLMD programs to assist congregations in strengthening their ministry. Each pastor is encouraged to consider this excellent resource which is being used throughout the LCA with positive results in parish life and ministry.

Our sincere appreciation is expressed to Pastor Shoffner for his dedicated staff support, and for his advocacy of PLMD, as he has visited with congregations and talked with Pastors and members of the churches in the synod.

# Social Ministry

Social Ministry, as defined in the *Social Ministry Manual*, "... describes the way the Christian church expresses its commitment to Christ by sharing love and promoting justice to meet personal and social needs ... both within and outside the parish." Responsibility for providing direction, guidance, and resources to the congregations in the synod remains with the Social Ministry Committee.

The main vehicle through which this function is carried out continues to be the *Social Ministry Network*, consisting of three to five persons in each district. Two training workshops were held at Agape. The first, in the fall, was led by Mr. Russell Long and Ms. Sue Pursch from the Division of Parish Services, concentrating on communication skills and economic justice. The focus of the spring workshop was on how to help the congregations fill the pressing advocacy for justice role. These teams are available for consultation with individuals or congregations, ready to provide resource information or training.

The following institutions, committees and agencies, active in social ministry areas, are the responsibility of this committee:

# Research and Strategy Groups

Groups of persons, appointed because of interest and expertise, meet regularly to study, procure and disseminate information, and, in some cases, to take direct action in these areas:

- 1. Advocacy Mrs. Pat Bullard, Chairwoman; the Rev. Frank Perry, Mr. Robbie Robinson, Mrs. Lila Hill, Mrs. Norma Currie, Mrs. Juanita Bremer. The work of this committee this year has been mainly in support of specific issues as ERA and freedom of choice in abortion planning. The Chairwoman acted as consultant for planning the Spring Advocacy workshop for the Social Ministry Network.
- 2. **Criminal Justice** Mrs. Sue Kepley, Chairwoman; the Rev. Maurice Staley, Mrs. Kay Conrad, Mr. Phil Gerdes, Mrs. Irene Dukes, the Rev. Earlean Miller. Alternatives to imprisonment and disseminating information promoting February as Criminal Justice month have been main thrusts of this group.
  - 3. Disabled Persons Mrs. Claire Edwardson, Chairwoman; the Rev. Richard

Smyth, Mrs. Sally Sloop, Mrs. Mary Moretz, Ms. Melissa Anderson. Mrs. Edwardson served as a member of the Governor's Executive Council for the Year of the Disabled Person. Instrumental in organizing a meeting of religious groups involved in working with disabled persons in North Carolina, this group now meets regularly as a coordinating body at St. Paul's Lutheran Church in Durham. Access Sabbath Sunday was publicized as was the regular Mental Retardation Sunday. Materials on the subject have been placed in the Media Center and are available for congregational use.

- 4. Older Adults Mrs. Annie Ray Moore, Chairwoman; Mrs. Patty Scctten, Dr. J. Lewis Thornburg, Dr. David Keller, Mrs. Frank Jenkins, the Rev. Robert Beard. This group regularly reviews research materials, providing resources to congregations through the Outreach Ministries Newsletter. Manning and providing materials for a booth at the Synod Convention was a major effort this year. Mrs. Moore has maintained contact with governmental agencies and ecumenical groups concerned with aging through meetings held regularly, including the White House Conference on Aging.
- 5. **Peace and War** This group is in the process of being organized with the task of studying the ways in which the Church can fulfill its mission of peace and justice, including planned training of counselors to be available for draft counselling. Ms. Darlene Grega is acting coordinator.

#### Institutions

The evaluation of the following agencies providing health and welfare services is a responsibility of the Social Ministry Committee. Financial and program reports of their activities are available elsewhere in the Bulletin of Reports. Both agencies have full support and affirmation of this committee.

- 1. Lutheran Family Services in North Carolina Mr. Bill Brittain, Executive Director.
- 2. North Carolina Lutheran Homes, Inc. The Rev. Robert Q. Beard, Executive Director. At the recommendation of the Social Ministry Committee, a half-time position was added to the staff this year to act as consultant to local congregations considering housing in local communities for older adults.

At the request of the Board of the North Carolina Lutheran Homes, Inc. a committee was appointed to study the feasibility of an alternative care facility for disabled persons, ages 16-59. Chairing this committee is Mr. John Ketner. Serving with him are Mr. Lindsay Cox, Mrs. Claire Edwardson, Mr. John Yoder, Mr. Job Kistler, the Rev. Robert Beard, and the Rev. Richard Little.

#### Institutional Chaplaincy

The Rev. David Franzen continues to serve as chaplain at Duke Medical Center and the Veteran's Administration Hospital in Durham. Report of his activities is available elsewhere in the Bulletin of Reports.

#### Grants

Congregational grants for seed money for local social ministry projects were given to the following:

- 1. Holy Cross, Lincolnton: \$500.00 to LINC of Christian Ministries, a meals to the homebound program.
- 2. Christ the King, Cary; Holy Trinity, Raleigh; St. Philip's, Raleigh: \$500.00 to Pan Lutheran Ministries of Wake County for emergency shelter for families.

The Social Ministry Committee continues its charge of increasing areas of communication and cooperation with **other Lutheran** bodies, both in the synod and nationally. Supporting this purpose included participation in the following meetings and conferences: Corporate Social Ministry Conference, Milwaukee, sponsored by DMNA, Mrs. Robinson and the Rev. Richard Little attending; Area Resource Teams Public Policy Workshop sponsored by DPS, Mrs. Robinson, the Rev. Lewis Doggett, the Rev. Jeffrey Cloninger attending; Financial Resources for Social Ministry, Washington, D.C., sponsored by I.RC-W, the Rev. Richard Graf, attending; Region V, LC/USA, Atlanta, the Rev. Richard Little attending.

Participation in the activities of the North Carolina Council of Churches Commission of Christian Ministries keeps the committee involved in ecumenical concerns in

the synod. Mrs. Pat Bullard represents legislative concerns, Mrs. Sue Kepley represents Criminal Justice, Mrs. Barbara Frederick represents Migrant Ministry, and Mrs. Marguerite Robinson serves at-large.

Because the Social Ministry Committee in the Synod Constitution is given the charge of the development of programs and projects in social ministry and action, how this responsibility can best be accomplished through the present structure in the synod was a main study subject of the committee this year. A proposal for restructuring synodical social ministry activities was presented to the Executive Board for study in December.

The present political, economic, and social situation makes the need ever more pressing for the Church to fulfill its Gospel mission and become more involved in the study, service, and/or action areas which are social ministry. The committee is indeed grateful for all of the activities which are taking place as a means of responding to others' needs.

Much gratitude and appreciation to the Rev. Richard Little for his continued enthusiastic guidance, support, and labor on behalf of this Committee's activities.

# Institutional Chaplaincy: Duke University Medical Center, Veterans Administration Hospital Durham, North Carolina

Lutheran Chaplaincy has been a multi-faceted and challenging ministry during the past year. Duke Medical Center and the Veterans Administration Hospital in Durham compose a major medical referral center for this region of the United States. The medical-surgical needs and crises of Lutheran patients and families often draw them hundreds of miles from their homes, congregations and life-long support systems to receive the specialty care they require. As chaplain I have opportunity to function as people's pastor away from home — an extension of the ministry of Word and Sacrament which the Church provides. The North Carolina Synod is to be commended for its support of this ministry to persons in their hour of great need.

You as pastors and lay leaders of this synod can be of great help to me in my work. Indeed, I need your help. More Lutheran patients are admitted to these hospitals than I can possibly see. It is always incumbent upon me to exercise careful stewardship of my pastoral care time. So if you, or a member of your parish or family is being admitted to either Duke or the V. A. hospitals and you know there is need in this case for pastoral care **Please Write or Telephone Me.** Your personal referral will be very helpful and most appreciated.

If you should need to refer a patient to me, please communicate the following information to me or my secretary: The patient's name, address, date of admission, reason for admission, and the concerns or reasons for your referral. This information is most helpful to me in locating the patient and in gaining a quick appreciation for the person's pastoral needs.

Greatly appreciated are the referrals a number of you have made to me over the past years. I am also happy to consult with you when the patient or family seems to have important pastoral needs at the time of discharge from the hospital and the return home.

In addition to my pastoral care of patients and families at Duke and the V.A. Hospitals in Durham, I also provide a ministry of theological education through my supervision of pastors and seminarians in programs of Clinical Pastoral Education at

Duke Medical Center. Almost every year we have one or more Lutheran students enrolled in these educational programs. I also teach a course at Duke Divinity School entitled "Introduction to Pastoral Care in the Hospital Setting". Included in my work has been a modest amount of pastoral counseling, and through this avenue I have provided counseling for a number of Lutherans.

Another focus of my work has been of synodical scope. I report to — and have voice, but not vote in — the Social Ministry Committee of synod. During the past year I have served as chairperson of the Professional Services Committee of synod. Of particular interest and concern to me has been support and advocacy of the needs of pastors, lay professionals and their families. It has been exciting and enriching to initiate designs for the Fall Convocation, and the contract for partial synodical remuneration of Pastoral Counseling for professional leaders and their families. These activities are more fully described in the report of the Professional Services Committee. Occasional supply preaching, the leadership of a church council retreat at Camp Agape, and my consultant work as facilitator in the First Year in Ministry Program round out the description of my ministry activities on the synodical level.

In closing, I want to thank all of you in the North Carolina Synod for your support: both of me personally and of my ministry.

# Stewardship

In accordance with the N.C. Synod By-Laws, the Stewardship Committee "shall stress education and growth in Christian stewardship in every aspect of the Christian life, and shall endeavor to lead the congregation of the synod to higher levels of Christian service and giving." The Stewardship Committee has sought to meet its purpose by providing materials, training and other events and resource leaders to synod congregations.

On the financial side of stewardship, 1981 was a banner year. Apportionment receipts topped \$2,000,000 for the first time, and we experienced an increase to 150 in the member of congregations which met or exceeded their agreed upon 1981 goal. Support for the World Hunger Program went over \$100,000, while Designated Advance Gifts reached \$30,000. We rejoice in the spirit of our congregations that made this happen.

Specific activities of the Committee during 1981 included:

- Continued utilization of Mr. Tom O'Brien, DPS deployed staff in training, planning and presenting stewardship as a way of life.
- Conducted stewardship workshops at District Church Days with emphasis on the Biblical/theological approach to giving.
- Held the Partnership in Ministry Emphasis consultations with 70 congregations
  to show the ministry that is being accomplished throughout the LCA at home
  and abroad.
- 4. Worked with the Youth Ministry Committee to assist the Youth Staffer in developing concern for stewardship as a way of life in the youth program. Ms. Barbara Herpich has already taken hold of stewardship, emphasizing its meaning and application through presenting programs, writing in the Youth Newsletter in addition to working closely with the youth of two congregations in a pilot program.
- Provided Every Member Response (EMR) Growth training, both within the Committee and to others.
- Conducted a stewardship orientation workshop for new clergy.
- Through Mr. James Chesky, developed the comprehensive 1982 Synod Mission Profile.

8. Held separate stewardship retreats for pastors and laypersons.

We look to 1983 with hope and confidence that the giving of time, talents and treasures will further increase on the part of all congregations. The Stewardship Committee will be recommending that Stewardship Emphasis be a synod-wide program beginning with the 1983 Synod Convention, encouraging all congregations to promote year-round stewardship.

Our Committee expresses its deep appreciation for the continued good work of Mr. Jim Chesky and Mr. Tom O'Brien, and for the fine job Ms. Barbara Herpich has done in her first year. May the spirit of true stewardship be with us all and enable us to accomplish the tasks that God has given us.

# Worship and Music

There are many ways by which the Worship and Music Committee could function. It could be in a cold, calculated, constitutional way. That is, the committee could exist only to serve a constitutional purpose. Or, the committee could exist as the caretaker of a museum. In this function the committee would merely dust and polish the "things" of Lutheranism and jealously guard them from contamination and/or deterioration. Quite to the contrary, the Worship and Music Committee views its existence as one that grows out of a constitutional purpose but one which is fed on the theology of the Lutheran Church. The committee has increasingly sought to hold before the synod that because the enjoyment of God's presence in worship is the heartbeat of the Gospel and the genius of Lutheranism that we must assign the highest priority to the planning for and leading of meaningful worship.

During the course of the year, the Worship and Music Committee worked to identify and nuture the liturgical climate of the North Carolina Synod. It has been an issue of strong commitment that the committee, as planners of worship for large groups of North Carolina Lutherans with many persuasious and backgrounds, pursue and endorse a liturgical climate that is consistent not only with the canons of the church but also with the lifestyle of North American Lutheranism.

The first step in this venture was a conversation with Bishop Misenheimer. As the chief pastor of the synod, it was important to have his philosophy and understanding of worship integrated thoroughly into the stances of the committee and synod. The second step in this process came via a meeting with the Deans of the districts. This was a helpful exchange of ideas but inconclusive. The committee looks toward a more expanded interchange with the Deans and the Executive Board in the coming year by which a vital, meaningful statement can be developed which will serve as a guideline in the planning of worship.

1982 will bring to North Carolina a worship event unparalleled in recent years for its concentration on worship, music and the arts. Because of its significance, much of the year was devoted to the conceptualization and detailed planning for the event. Nationally-recognized leaders in the disciplines of worship have been sought to bring sound scholarship, enthusiastic challenge, and meaningful assistance to the convocation so that a wide range of needs can be met on the part of pastors and lay persons. The event will be held October 29 and 30 at Saint John's Lutheran Church, Salisbury.

The role of the Worship and Music Committee was again expanded as the Professional Leadership Committee sought assistance in the planning and conducting of worship experiences that were a part of the PLC's annual retreat. Detailed suggestions and designs were developed to compliment and undergird the retreat's purpose and theme, Our Pilgrimage as Ministers and Persons.

The North Carolina Synod was well-represented at national events and training workshops. The chairman and other committee members (Pastors Chris Bohr, Phil Squire, and Daniel Hannemann) attended the LCA's workshop on Holy Communion at Roanoke College in June.

The committee was a participant once again in District Church Days. This year's purpose, while the training and encouraging of musicians and worship leaders in the appreciation of the highest standards of Lutheran worship is always paramount, was to nurture a deeper understanding of and appreciation for the Lenten and Easter hymnody of the *LBW*. Goals were identified to be the developing of alternate ways of singing hymns differently, appreciating the difference in the moods of hymns, and sharing the story and anatomy (words, tune, harmony) of selected hymns.

House-keeping and/or annual events also claimed the attention of the committee. The 1983 budget proposal was developed for the Cabinet for Parish Services, opportunities in worship and music were identified for the 1982 Calendar of Events, and requests for assistance in the purchase of instruments and the employment of personnel were met.

The committee is prepared to assist the boards, organizations, districts, and congregations of the North Carolina Synod in any matters concerning worship, music, and the arts.

# Youth Ministry

The primary goal of the 1981-1982 Youth Ministry Committee was once again the advocacy of youth in the life of the Lutheran Church. The programs of the committee focused from the concerns that 1) youth be strengthened to be involved in the total ministry of the church, 2) youth and adults working with youth be equipped to lead, and 3) the awareness and identity of Lutheran youth be strengthened on the congregational, district, synodical, and church-wide levels. These four levels of ministry provide the structure from which the committee operates and presents this report.

CONGREGATIONAL LEVEL OF SUPPORT — Two six month planning calendars were sent to each congregation offering a step by step outline for planning youth ministry in relationship to all other ministries with a local congregation.

In response to a need expressed by many congregations for more program ideas, and to assist congregations in utilizing the planning calendar, a quarterly publication consisting of six program designs (two for each month based on a calendar suggestion) was mailed to all congregations.

District Church Days held in February provided two tracks. A basic track provided an open forum for participants to express and address specific concerns related to their congregation. The enrichment track heightened the awareness of stewardship amongst youth and offered a program that participants could utilize in their congregation.

A Youth Sunday Program Package was sent to each congregation offering an outline, sermon suggestions, hymn suggestions, and extra ideas for assisting congregations in planning an effective and exciting Youth Sunday Worship experience.

Youth Staffer, Barbara Herpich, worked extremely hard this year in making contact with congregations, raising concern for stewardship as a way of life, leading

retreats, assisting with programs, and consulting with youth leaders. The youth staffer has also worked intensely with two congregations in a pilot program designed to increase the awareness of youth in regards to stewardship. The youth staffer also publishes a monthly newsletter which provides a list of resources to use in the congregation.

Although the committee is prepared to assist, consult, and provide resource persons and material for youth ministry in the congregation, very few requests for such have been received.

DISTRICT LEVEL OF SUPPORT — For the third year an organized district structure has supported youth with events that bring youth together for worship, fellowship, growth, and recreation. In each of the seven districts a committee of youth and adults are elected to serve on a district council. A youth serves as the coordinator of the council assisted by an adult key advisor. Each council is trained to plan and implement district events. At the 1982 Winter/Spring district event, more than seven hundred youth from seventy-two congregations participated.

SYNODICAL LEVEL OF SUPPORT — Both small and large group activities and events have included or will include the following:

- Synod Convo '81 Thirty-two youth and adult leaders spent five days studying
  and becoming involved in the work of our synod through this annual event.
  Convention business, discussion with synod staff and leaders, worship, group
  building, service projects, and many fellowship opportunities made this experience an invaluable one for youth who attended.
- 2. Ind²-Bla-Whi This annual event, formerly supported by the Committee on Justice and Social Change has now become a program of the Youth Ministry Committee. Held during July at Kure Beach Retreat Center, twenty-four youth and adults were involved in exciting cross-cultural, inter-personal and work related experiences which focused on breaking down racial barriers and fostering a concern for inclusiveness in the church.
- Appalachian Workcamp Held during July in Banner Elk, eight youth spent a
  week helping disabled and elderly persons by working to better living conditions. These youth gained an appreciation of different lifestyles and experienced a Christian community where love was the dominant force and in which personal struggles and faith were shared.
- 4. Camp with the Mentally Handicapped Held in August at Camp Agape, this annual week long event provided the opportunity for twelve Lutheran youth to relate one-to-one with twelve developmentally handicapped persons from Murdoch Center, Butner as their vision of God's family was broadened and growth in ministry was experienced through involvement and reflection.
- 5. Nuts and Bolts Leadership Training Event One hundred and twenty youth and adult leaders spent a weekend in September at Camp Caraway developing leadership skills in youth ministry.
- 6. Synod-Wide Youth Gathering This weekend event is in the planning process at this writing. Projected for April 16 and 17 to be held in Salisbury, participants will be involved in total community events, workshops, recreation, worship, and fellowship as retreat leader, Robert Edwin, will address the theme "Born Anew To Be Good Stewards".

CHURCH-WIDE LEVEL OF SUPPORT — During July, 1981 more than four thousand youth from across the country gathered at Purdue University, West Lafayette, Indiana for the LCA JOY event. The Youth Ministry Committee chartered two buses that carried ninety youth from North Carolina. This event provided the opportunity to share their faith, identify with other Lutheran youth, and grow together through worship, learning, witness, service, and support. More than one hundred workshops offered new approaches for congregational youth ministry.

The next regional event sponsored by the North Carolina, South Carolina, Southeastern, and Florida synods will be held in 1983. The purpose of this event is to provide an opportunity for Lutheran youth from across the south to share together in fellowship, grow spiritually, and to develop a stronger sense of identity with other Lutheran youth.

The Committee on Youth Ministry extends its appreciation to the many competent and talented persons through the synod who have willingly shared in the leadership of congregational, district, synodical, and church-wide events. We are grateful, also, for the members of congregations who give support and encouragement to youth in their ministry. A special word of thanks to The Rev. Robert Shoffner, Minister for Parish Services, for his endless support, encouragement, dedication and leadership. Special appreciation is also expressed to Youth Staffer, Barbara Herpich for her partnership in furthering the ministry of our Lord for and with youth.

# Youth Staffer

As Youth Staffer this year I have worked at carrying out the purpose of emphasizing stewardship as a way of life to youth throughout North Carolina. My role has been to serve as a youth ministry consultant; provide resources, training and support for youth and adults in local congregations; and to develop in-depth programs in local congregations. I believe that through my ministry, which has taken on various forms, I have been able to minister to the needs of both youth and adults in North Carolina in the area of youth ministry.

I have had the opportunity to share with youth what stewardship as a way of life means by planning retreats, presenting programs, writing articles in my newsletter and developing a Youth Sunday Program. In each of these I tried to stress the importance of our call as Christians to be good stewards of all our gifts from God. I am also working with two congregations, A Mighty Fortress, Charlotte and First Lutheran, Lexington, in developing in-depth stewardship education programs with, by and for the youth of their congregations. These experiences have not only been a witness to youth and adults concerning the role youth should play in our congregations, but have also strengthened my faith.

Glancing over my calendar I find that I have had actual visits with 37 congregations this year. Other contacts have been made over the phone, through letters, at statewide events and in my newsletter. As mentioned before, some of these contacts were in educating youth as to what stewardship means for them as Christians, but I have also been involved in other aspects of youth ministry. Contacts have been made to consult with and help develop youth ministry programs in local congregations. I have also worked with congregations to plan retreats, worship services and in having fun!

My calendar also reflects the various committees and other activities I've been involved with. On the synodical level I was a part of various planning groups such as Spring Youth Rally, Convo, Appalachian Workcamp, District Church Days and Leadership Training Events.

This year the Synod Youth Ministry Committee did a survey of the Youth Staffer Program as well as youth ministry needs in North Carolina. As a result of this survey we, (myself and Bob Shoffner and the Youth Ministry Committee) have chosen to have an emphasis next year that will help to foster unity, teach, be a means of service and filter from the synod level to local congregations in all that we do. The theme is "Hope for the Hungry." In response to the survey the committee and Executive Board has chosen to continue the youth staffer program next year with an individual who will deal exclusively with Youth Ministry. I am excited and flattered to add that they have asked me to serve as the North Carolina Youth Staffer for '82-'83.

It is my hope that all of us can grow to appreciate and understand what Youth Ministry is. As full partners in the church, youth are to be a part of all five areas of involvement in the church: Fellowship, Witness, Worship, Service and Learning. Christ's ministry is inclusive of all ages, races and sexes. This is really what my purpose as a youth staffer has been, to share through my ministry what Christ has called us to be as his children. And yes, Youth Ministry is alive in North Carolina!

I wish to thank all of you, but especially Bob Shoffner and Frances Hampton for this opportunity to grow, share and learn more about what it means to be a Christian.

# Lutheridge

The calendar year, 1981, was the thirty-first year of ministry for and with the congregations and people of our constituent synods — North Carolina, South Carolina, and Southeastern. We are continually grateful for the support through generous benevolence to and genuine interest in our conference and camping ministries. In nearly every respect, it was a record setting year and we are happy to submit this report.

The Numbers. There are numerous categories of persons and groups who visit Lutheridge in time spans ranging from a few hours to a few weeks. Such variety presents difficulties in keeping meaningful records. Even so, the end of the year totals reveals these interesting numbers (percentage comparisons with 1980 are in parentheses):

- a total of 14,538 persons were involved in tabulated activities during the year (+9.5%),
- person-nights (an overnight stay by one person) totaled 31,844 (+5.8%), an average of 87 persons a day for each day in 1981,
- 4,076 persons were counted in 180 different retreat/conference groups, mostly in the spring, fall, and winter (-5.4% in persons and +17.6% in groups),
- 624 persons registered in Lutheridge sponsored non-summer events (+ 28.9%),
- resident campers (children and youth) in the summer tallied 2,343 camper weeks (+9.7%), the highest number of camper weeks in thirteen years,
- of the 2,343 camper weeks recorded, 777 or 33.2% were in the grades 3-5 age group, 1,065 or 45.4% in grades 6-8, 274 or 11.7% in grades 9-12, and 227 or 9.7% in sessions for persons who are mentally retarded,
- 296 campers, 27.5% of all grades 6-8 registrants, participated in eight different confirmation camps involving 51 congregations from five synods,
- 1,046 adults and their children (not campers) registered for summer conference and/or fellowship week events or for program leadership responsibilities (+4.7%),
- Lutheridge staff members provided a resident camping experience for a total
  of 110 campers (+120.0%) at three satellite locations: Rau-Wood Retreat
  Center, Nashville, TN (65); New Ebenezer Family Retreat and Conference
  Center, Rincon, GA (8); and Lenoir-Rhyne College, Hickory, NC (37 confirmation campers not counted above).

**Staff.** Mr. Herbert J. Volkert retired at the end of December from his position as Maintenance Manager. He was a member of the year round staff since April 1964. During those years, his employment was filled with hundreds of replaced light switches, unstopped plumbing fixtures, repaired screen doors and windows, neatly mown lawns, split firewood, and numerous other routine and emergency maintenance activities. Notwithstanding, "Mr. V" was never too busy to visit with camper or guest or staff member — often relating a joke or yarn in his unique style. The vacancy left by his retirement will be filled early in 1982.

At the end of the 1981 summer season, two other persons left the year round staff: (1) Mrs. Barbara J. Strickland, Food Service Manager, to self-employment and (2) Mr. Stephen D. Wright, Maintenance Assistant, to graduate studies at the University of South Carolina. Both of these vacancies will be filled as early as possible in 1982. In addition, it is anticipated that the position of Director of Development and Promotion, authorized by the Board of Trustees in 1980, will be filled in 1982 with the assistance of consulting services partially funded by a grant from Aid Association for Lutherans.

Mr. Larry W. Jones joined the year round staff on March 1 as registrar. He and his family moved from Bristol, TN. Throughout the year, there are six to eight residents of local communities who work as needed on the kitchen and housekeeping staffs. Their willingness to work irregular hours, mostly during weekends, enables Lutheridge to make these services available all year. The 1981 summer staff totaled 282 persons — 153 who were weekly program leaders and 129 who were employed staff (some full and some part summer).

Facilities. The maintenance, repair, and renovation of buildings as well as replacement of equipment and furnishings have always been high priority needs, but have often been delayed simply because funds have not been available. This situation of deferment is finally changing because of three recent sources of funds: (1) contributions at the rate of \$.50 per person per day from registration fees of campers, guests, and retreat/conference groups into a depreciation fund begun in 1980, (2) receipts from the South Carolina Synod Conference and Camping Ministries Appeal which continue to be remitted though the pledge period of the appeal ended in June, and (3) receipts from the North Carolina Synod Conference and Camping Ministries Appeal whose pledge period began in July and will continue for 30 months.

The most noticeable improvements in 1981 were the resurfacing of nearly one mile of street and three projects at Kohnjoy Inn: roof deck insulation, a new roof, and underground electric service. In addition, numerous routine maintenance and repair projects were completed. It is gratifying to note that the next four or five years will bring some additions and many improvements to the physical plant of Lutheridge, thus painting a far brighter property picture than has been possible for a long time.

Finances. For the seventh consecutive year, Lutheridge operated "in the black" during 1981 — operating expenses not exceeding income. This was due largely to record registration receipts and benevolence remittances. An interfund loan of \$19,300 was repaid by the close of the year, enabling Lutheridge to begin 1982 debt free. Even so, rapid increases in utility, food, and labor costs will continue to exert strong influences on budgetary trends and fee structures.

The funded depreciation budget item mentioned above continues to channel special income into areas of special needs in renewal and renovation of facilities. Transfers to this fund will continue at the \$.50 per person per day rate in 1982. In 1983, the rate will increase to \$.75 per person per day. The 1983 budget will initiate a new reserve fund for capital replacement.

Bequests totaling \$14,530 were received during the year from the estates of Wilhelmina Rock Harrison of Charlotte, NC; Maude R. Plonk of Hickory, NC; Elizabeth H. Miller of Charlotte, NC; and Rosa Lee Haltiwanger of Columbia, SC. At its November 1981 meeting, the Board of Trustees voted to add the entire amount to the Endowment Fund, a practice which has been followed with all unrestricted bequests since the fund was established in 1972.

At the end of 1981, Lutheridge had received \$158,676 from the South Carolina Synod Conference and Camping Ministries Appeal and \$91,913 from the North Carolina Synod Appeal. This totals \$250,589. Of this amount, \$74,677 had been spent for various projects. The remainder is invested as plans are made for other projects, some of them of major significance and cost. Proposed projects will be undertaken as priorities dictate and resources permit, given adjustments necessitated by seasonal and operating considerations. The funds already received as well as those anticipated will enable such capital expenditures to continue well into this decade.

**Conclusion.** A popular experience during the summer season was the viewing of a brief slide/music presentation showing Lutheridge scenes in the fall, winter, and

spring. Each viewing group marveled at the beauty of Lutheridge during the various seasons. Each group also noted that one vital element of Lutheridge was missing — people! Without people, all of the buildings, streets, furnishings, budgets, funds, and contributions remain just that. With people added these things become a ministry — a ministry of Christian community, of growth in faith, and of strengthening of commitment. To God give the glory for such a fine year! And join in prayer that it will be the foundation for greater ministry and service in the years ahead!

Acquisitions since January 1, 1972 are based on actual costs for purchased properties and on estimated valuations for donated properties.

In our opinion, subject to valuations of capital properties and related depreciation based on these appraised valuations as mentioned in the preceding paragraph, the aforementioned financial statements present fairly the financial position of Lutheridge, Inc. as of December 31, 1981, changes in fund balances, changes in financial position, and the support, revenue and expenses for the year then ended in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles applied on a basis consistent with that of the preceding year.

# LUTHERIDGE, INC. NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS December 31, 1981

# 1. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

The financial statements of Lutheridge, Inc. have been prepared on the accrual basis, whereby revenue is taken into income when earned and expenses are charged to operations as incurred. The significant accounting policies followed are described below to enhance the usefulness of the financial statements to the reader.

#### **Fund Accounting**

To ensure observance of limitations and restrictions placed on the use of resources available to the Corporation, the accounts of Lutheridge are maintained in accordance with the principles of fund accounting. This is the procedure by which resources for various purposes are classified or accounting and reporting purposes into funds established according to their nature and purposes. Separate accounts are maintained for each fund; however, in the accompanying financial statements, funds that have similar characteristics have been recorded and reported by fund group.

The assets, liabilities and fund balances of Lutheridge are reported in three self-balancing fund groups as follows:

Operating funds, which include unrestricted and restricted resources, represent the portion of expendable funds that is available for support of operations of the Corporation.

Endowment funds represent funds that are subject to restrictions of gift instruments or action of the Board of Trustees requiring in perpetuity that the principal be invested and the income only be used.

Plant funds represent resources restricted for capital property additions and funds expended for capital properties.

# Inventories

Inventories are valued at the lower of cost (first-in, first-out) or market. Costs are determined at invoice cost.

# **Capital Properties and Depreciation**

Uses of operating funds for capital properties additions are accounted for as transfers to plant funds.

Capital properties acquiried prior to 1972 are valued based on an independent appraiser's report for real

estate, kitchen and dining hall equipment and on estimated valuations as determined by the Executive Director for other equipment and furnishings. Acquisitions since January 1, 1972 are based on actual costs for purchased properties and on estimated valuations for donated properties.

Beginning in 1975, depreciation was computed on all depreciable capital properties. A reserve for depreciation was set up with the plant fund being charged with the annual depreciation. Depreciation is determined on the straight-line basis for all capital properties acquired since 1971 with the remaining useful life being used as a basis for depreciation on all assets acquired prior to 1972.

#### 2. Investment in Securities

Investments are presented in the financial statements at cost (fair market value at date of donation for donated investments).

Investments at cost and market value at December 31, 1981, are composed of the following:

# Cabinet For Mission

The purpose of this cabinet is to bring together various ones who are working in the broad field of the mission of THE CHURCH in its outreach in order that each may see what the other is doing and in order that there might be some coordination of efforts in ministry.

In addition, the purpose of this cabinet is to develop in the lives and ministry of the institutions and/or committees, which are represented by membership on this cabinet, a perspective of their institution or committee which shows them as being one part of the whole missionary thrust of The Church. The concern is that the various committees, agencies and institutions develop their programs and interests in view of others who also have specific concern in the broad range of The Church's outreach. The cabinet seeks to find the best method of approach which would allow it most effectively to achieve the objective in ministry given to it by the synod.

The cabinet seeks to discharge its duties faithfully. In so doing it has come together on a number of occasions during the past months to try to meet its responsibilities. On September 23, 1981 a general meeting of the cabinet was held at the Church House for the purpose of sharing activities in ministry engaged in by the respective committees and institutions represented on the cabinet. Coordination of ministry activity within the synod resulted from this meeting as well as suggestions for any new ministries that might be projected for the year 1983. On January 22, 1982 the cabinet came together again for the purpose of becoming involved in the synod's Budget Building Process as it relates to the 1983 synodical budget. Projects in ministry which are expected and/or being proposed by the institutions or committees for the year 1983 were revealed and were arranged in order of the cabinet's ranking of priority for purposes of recommendation to the synod's Committee on Budget and Finance as it prepared for the 1983 budget draft. Plans for the cabinet's presentation to the 1982 convention of synod were also made at this time. On February 10, 1982 members of the cabinet attended the Church Wide Agency Consultation and Budget Forum at the Church House.

Our basic concern as a cabinet is for The Church's outreach, particularly as it is "sent" into the world in a kind of institutionalized or organized manner as opposed, for example, to the outreach engaged in by a congregation or an individual Christian. It is the cabinet's responsibility to concern itself with MISSION as it occurs and is expressed beyond the confines of the local congregation. Consequently that cabinet attempts to coordinate, share in, enable, implement, plan, develop ministries, etc. that constitute the outreach of THE CHURCH beyond the congregational level as we know it.

### American Missions

#### MEETINGS

Four major meetings of the committee were held in January, May, September, and December. Some interim work was done by telephone and by mail. The annual travel meeting for May 1982 was focused in the Greensboro-Reidsville-Eden area.

#### II. RELATIONSHIPS

Few of us realized what a massive load Dr. David F. Johnson was bearing until his untimely death soon after synod last year. Dr. Johnson wore a multitude of hats, each of which entailed an almost full load. Field entrances, training of pastor-developers, purchase of parsonages and church sites, oversight of developing missions, and the pursuit of other potential fields, arranging for temporary meeting places, church building development and construction supervision, meeting with the American Mission Committee, LCUSA Consultations and Sub-Consultations, program support visitations to some 25 congregations of our synod, attending training sessions and board schools, LCA Conventions and synod meetings, as well as a multitude of tasks too numerous to mention. Dr. Johnson left for us, on the committee, a tremendous gap to be filled. The staff of DMNA and, especially, the Rev. Jackson Martin, have been of immense assistance in the vacancy. Various facets of our work are assumed by sub-committees:

- A. Sub-Committee on Appalachia. Chaired by the Rev. Cyrus Frazier. A comprehensive study of N. C. Appalachia is approved for the near future and DMNA asked for staff assistance.
- B. Sustentation. A study committee, chaired by the Rev. Timothy Glenham, researched and submitted to the Executive Board of Synod a complete overhaul of our sustentation procedures. This study was approved by the committee and individual members agreed to assume oversight of, at least, one sustentation congregation. Principally, this study provides closer supervision and contact between the American Missions Committee and the sustentation congregations. It requires those receiving these funds to do the following:
  - To conduct an annual EMR
  - 2. To determine the number of FIE's
  - 3. To work toward self support
  - 4. If in a five year period they are not yet ready for self-support, they will be guided through a process of considering alternate forms of ministry as: retired pastor, tanner's ministry (part-time), merger with a local parish, or a satellite of a nearby church.

This study was approved by the Executive Board and is now operable in our synod.

- C. Initial Equipment. Mr. Ralph Weddington, chairperson, coordinates gifts of congregations of equipment to new developing situations.
- D. Finance. Chaired by Mr. G. C. Miller, develops the American Missions portion of The Synodical Profile.
- E. Small Church. The Rev. Timothy Glenham, chairperson, assumes responsibility for special needs and problems in our infant congregations.

A Special Committee, coordinated by the Rev. Richard Little, convened representatives from the Home Mission Foundation, DMNA, LCA Office of Finance and Management, Synod, and American Missions, to study the priority lists for request for HMF funds in the two categories (Category "A" — first unit financing, Category "B" — second unit requests). This was a monumental effort and served to re-prioritize the needs for 1982, with the determination to meet annually to act upon the various recommendations of the American Missions Committee for these funds. Forms were sent to all congregations who

appeared on the initial priority list attempting to determine the status of their initial request. The much outdated document was updated for 1982.

The committee approves various appropriations of Melanchthon Funds, Efird Funds, and other resources made available to them.

#### III. DEVELOPMENT OF NEW FIELDS

Four fields are under development at this time:

Burnsville, Messiah of the Mountains (the Rev. Paul Rimmer, pastor/developer)

Raleigh-Urban, Hope (the Rev. Eugene Powell, pastor/developer)

Clemmons, King of Glory (the Rev. David McCleary, pastor/developer) Whiteville, Christ the King (the Rev. William Flowers, pastor/developer)

One of the greatest challenges to the church is that congregations, in the geographical area of a developing mission, do everything possible to support, encourage, and implement the work of our infant efforts.

We expect that in 1982 all systems will be "go" for the N. W. Raleigh Field. LC-USA clearance has been given for:

Greensboro, South of I-85

Cary (U.S. 64 and N.C. 55)

Eden

Wilmington (U.S. 17 North)

Let it be noted that input of local pastors, churches, Lutheran Ministerial Associations, and caring Lutherans, is necessary to create a viable outreach and locate new fields.

One re-location is on the front burner for 1982-83. St. Andrew, Concord, is to be further studied, clearance sought from all sources, and some sort of move to be made.

The fact that always plagues us is money. The inflationary "drying of funds" is a disastrous one. We, therefore, must find additional ways to lower costs of building, draw upon resources we share, and seek out ways to enter the fields when the time is right. Your suggestions and assistance will be especially welcomed by this committee.

St. Andrew's, New Bern, also anticipates self-support soon.

#### VII. DMNA AND HMF INVESTMENT IN NORTH CAROLINA

Approximately \$2,000,000 of DMNA Funds are invested in North Carolina congregations.

The Home Mission Foundation has loans of over \$1,000,000 to our N. C. Congregations. Our deep gratitude to Lutheran Men for their sponsorship and support of this great fund.

Approximately \$1,000,000 in commercial financing is involved in our developing congregations in addition to the above \$2,000,000. The picture becomes clear. We are, together, engaged in a big enterprise.

#### IX. CONCLUSION

While we diminished the size of our consultive membership on the committee, for cost reasons, we almost simultaneously impinged our members with a heavier load with sustentation consultations, and double-duty assignments. They are the most active and committed I have experienced in my some 10 years having served on this great front-line committee.

### World Mission Committee

The charter for the World Mission Committee is outlined in the By-Laws of the Constitution of Synod Section VI Paragraph F. To plan and conduct Synod-wide promotion of World Missions and to cooperate with the Division of World Mission and Ecumenism. To this end the Committee met and considered programs to comply with the charter.

Even though the Global Mission EVENT of July 1981 at Lenoir-Rhyne College was a joint venture with DWME, DMNA, and the five synods of the southeast, our Synod was considered the host synod and as such it was hoped we would provide in excess of 50% of the participants. Sorry to report we provided only 28%. Even so the EVENT was successful for those who attended. They had the chance to be with Bishop Crumley, the Executive Directors of the Divisions, Dr. Choong Chee Pang from Singapore, and many staffers and missionaries in a very relaxed situation.

In cooperation with DWME Office of Interpretation we had a Missionary-in-Residence, The Rev. David N. Eichner from Thailand, from September 1980 to July 1981. The Division paid his salary and provided for the family's lodging. During that period he gave 28 sermons, 18 talks and 87 slide presentations in 81 churches with 14

other congregations included. He talked to over 9,500 of our members. All this for the total cost to the Committee of \$28.18. Incidentally he spent a week with the students at the Southern Seminary. He has since accepted a call as pastor to St. James Lutheran Church in Reading, Pennsylvania.

Generally a significant part of this report has dealt with the Missionary Support Program through Designated Advanced Gifts of the LCA. In the past this information had been manually prepared and distributed by DWME. This year the information was put into a computer and there is where the data stayed. We do know there is participation in this program by some individuals and congregations for which we are thankful and only wish we could name you. To the other congregations join us and get to know at least one missionary and her/his work.

There are still two missionaries who entered the work from North Carolina. Interestingly both are serving in Japan. Miss Elizabeth Huddle — a long timer, and Miss Margaret (Peggy) Chandler — a short timer. When Peggy comes home next year, we will be back to one again. Now is the time to get a replacement for Peggy.

We lost one member of the Committee because Mr. George Frock had faithfully served his time. We thank him for his inputs to the Considerations and his willingness to accept tasks. We have one new member, Mrs. E. Ray Trexler, and we look forward to serving with her. We all appreciate Dick Little for his help and support.

# Campus Ministry

And best of all, we found that campus ministry doesn't always concentrate on the campus only, but directs the energies of the campus community outward to the surrounding community, helping others when help is needed.

We also found that the various institutions regard campus ministry as a very important part of the institution. We found that in times of crises, the institutions also turn to the campus ministers for help.

We found, basically, that the job we thought should be done, is being done. It's not being done perfectly. It's not all being done everywhere. There's still a long way to go; but it is being done. That's why we feel we had a good year. Now let's tell you where we're doing it.

In addition to this area of work, during the past year our committee has begun to look into the areas of land management and hazardous waste disposal and how these may affect our people in North Carolina. No directions or projects have been adopted yet, but we will keep the congregations and their leaders aware of any actions or projects when we decide if we can, will, or should do anything about these vital areas of concern.

Finally we are producing a new bulletin insert about the work of our committee and the on-going concern for the total care of God's earth. We will notify all of you when this is completed and ready for congregational distribution.

Your continuing prayers for our committee and for the very best care of God's Earth that we as humans can manage is always desired.

# Consulting Committee on Justice and Social Change

Our Lutheran tradition maintains that our Lord relates to us through the Law and the Gospel. The Consulting Committee on Justice and Social Change seeks to reflect this twofold relationship through its work. Our committee name indicates a heavy emphasis on aspects of the Law — encouraging persons, institutions and nations to seek justice and equity as our Lord wills it. In this respect our committee has attempted to be a prophetic voice for justice in our broken world. Our faithfulness to this task should stand in the light of your questions, constructive criticisms, prayers, and the biblical witness. Since the last convention we have in dialogue struggled with the following issues: the apparent failure of ERA in North Carolina; the renewal of the Voting Rights Act; independence for Namibia; the political Religious Right; our relationship to the local congregations. Open discussion did not lead us to recommend action on these matters.

In response to the Law we have been advocates for justice concerns of Native Americans in our state. Through the National Indian Lutheran Board and our Task Force on Native American Concerns, chaired by the Reverend Dennis Bolton, grants have been awarded to the following tribes: the Lumbee Regional Development Association for a community food and nutrition program; to Cumberland County Association for Indian people for community emergency needs in food, clothing, and fuel; to Metrolina Native American Association of Charlotte for senior services; to Guilford Native American Association of Greensboro for emergency needs; and to Waccamaw-Siouan Development Association of Bolton for a van to transport the elderly. Our work has taken a national scope through the election of Mrs. Judy Warner, a Lumbee Indian from Metrolina Native American Association, to the National Indian Lutheran Board. Presently, our task force is hoping to share in a coalition of North Carolina tribes seeking federal recognition.

Through our Task Force on Minority Ministry, chaired by Mrs. Josephine Conn, our work crosses over into the realm of the Gospel. The Task Force meets three times per year. Our desire to be God's inclusive church causes us to stand ready to work with congregations who have the opportunity of sharing the Gospel in and with minority communities. Since January 1980, the Reverend Richard Perry has served as Director of Lutheran Minority Ministry. We are delighted that Pastor Perry is here. His style of ministry, sensitivity to the needs of people, and vision of the church are valued qualities. Please read Pastor Perry's report printed elsewhere in this bulletin.

Where others work for justice and share the gospel, we have attempted to show support. We extend support by membership in the Lutheran Human Relations Association of America and in Project Equality. During the year our chairperson attended the National Lutheran Social Ministry Assembly in Cincinnati; a representative went to the Consultation on the issues of equality and justice for women and men in Dayton, Ohio.

As we faithfully seek to respond to God's Law in the security of the Gospel and to share the gospel in the midst of our communities, we are grateful for the synod's commitment to our work. We especially give thanks for the assistance of our Minister for Outreach, the Reverend Richard Little.

We present the following resolution to the convention for action.

- WHEREAS, our LCA statement on World Community (Adopted 1970) recognizes that the threat of nuclear weapons ". . . teaches that their continued development can only undermine security";
- WHEREAS, our national government is continuing to expand our arsenal of nuclear armaments in the belief that such expansion enhances our national security;
- WHEREAS, our present nuclear arsenal has the capacity of virtually eliminating human life:
- WHEREAS, the possibility of neither a limited nor a "Just War" is tenable where nuclear firepower is available;

#### BE IT THEREFORE RESOLVED.

That this convention authorize our Bishop to communicate to our North Carolina Congressmen our concern regarding the continued development of a nuclear arsenal and our desire for them to work for the reduction of the nuclear arsenals of the world's super powers; and

That our congregations and church councils observe July 4, 1982, as a day of prayer for peace; and

That we refer this resolution to the Executive Council of the Lutheran Church in America to encourage them to consider the development of study material to assist Christians in our response to the nuclear armaments buildup.

### Report of Lutheran Minority Ministries

"Perhaps the ultimate demand laid upon the human spirit is the responsibility to select where one bears witness to the Truth of his spirit. The final expression of the committed spirit is to affirm: I choose! and do abide."

(With Head And Heart, p. 155)

The late Rev. Dr. Howard Thurman, a world renowned theologian, offers words which have guided our work together. As your director, I have sought to stimulate the hearts and minds of people so they can choose where they will witness and abide by that decision.

I believe this is what Jesus Christ wants of us. Through our Baptism we can choose to witness in communities where people are racially and culturally different.

Through a variety of activities, we have presented the challenge to congregations. Our emphasis for the last year has been educational, motivational and climate building.

#### WORK WITH CONGREGATIONS

At the present time, there are four congregations relating to this ministry in an intentional manner. Redeemer, Charlotte; Incarnation, Charlotte; Macedonia, Burlington and Alamance, Alamance. Through activities like preaching, visiting during worship services and other events; participation in short-term classes in Sunday School and Vacation Church School; a retreat with confirmation youth; consultation at committee meetings, a book study during Lent and L.C.W. activities; we have assisted the processes for people to choose to **be** inclusive. I encourage you to be in touch with one or all of the congregations about their experience.

One of the popular misconceptions I've heard is I have the responsibility to bring in minorities to our congregations. I want to emphasize that each person in the congregation has a responsibility to be inclusive. Through your witness, God may lead minority people to consider your congregation as their home.

A beginning step is your invitation to preach, make a presentation about the ministry or consult with a group in the congregation. I appreciate the opportunity to dialogue with you about what can be accomplished through your congregation.

#### **GENERAL ACTIVITIES**

A host of opportunities have been presented for me to bear witness to the Truth of God's spirit. Through attendance at various synod committees (Justice and Social Change Committee, Evangelism Committee, American Missions Committee and the Ecumenical Relations Committee); attending the Executive Board Meetings; the

North Carolina Council of Churches Executive Board and House of Delegates; the Fall District Meetings; the District Church Days; L.C.W. Convention, newsletter and staff meetings; we have witnessed.

In November 1981, we sponsored an "Inclusive Leadership Conference," for Synod Leadership. The Rev. Dr. Albert Pero and the Rev. Dr. Massie Kennard served as principal speakers. A booklet of this conference has been developed and shared with the participants, the Executive Board and congregations we could work with on inclusiveness.

I have had the opportunity to witness through such events as the Global Mission Event by leading two workshops, and devotions; leading a workshop at the Martin Luther King, Jr. Convocation sponsored by Southern Seminary; leading a workshop at the Association of Black Lutherans Conference, and serving as principal speaker at the Virginia Synod Inclusive Ministry Workshops.

In order to continue growing, I have participated in several continuing education events related to conflict management. This is particularly important when we work with congregations. How people in congregations manage conflict certainly has a bearing on their decision to relate to racial/ethnic people in their community.

I continue serving on the Lutheran Human Relations Association of America Board of Directors as secretary.

#### THE FUTURE

I have great hopes for the future. I look forward to **your invitations** as we dialogue about how your congregation can be inclusive in its ministry.

God's strength has been given to us through Baptism. Certainly we can choose to follow his way, being open to what racial/ethnic **people** can share with us about life in Christ. Your invitation is a first step toward abiding with your decision to bear witness to God's truth.

#### CONCLUSION

I want to take this opportunity to express my gratitude to Bishop Misenheimer. He has been quite supportive as we work together. I have appreciated the opportunity to meet and work with this dedicated servant of God.

My appreciation extends to the synod staff and the church house secretarial staff. They have all assisted in a variety of ways.

I want to especially recognize the contributions of the Task Force on the Minority Ministries Program and the Consulting Committee on Justice and Social Change. Each member has provided support and direction for our work together. I'm appreciative of their commitment and faith.

I look forward to another year, where great opportunities await us as we choose to bear witness to God's spirit. Your **invitations** and prayers we welcome as we patiently work toward inclusiveness in God's Church.

One hundred sixty-three of our 209 (almost 78%) congregations presented the needs of our world's hungry people to their members and the people responded in Christian love. Thank you for your efforts in fund raising, education, and raising awareness.

Pastor Kenneth W. Fink and Mrs. Patty Scotten attended the second LCA World Hunger Appeal Conference in October 1981. Pastor Doug Kearney is monitoring the Infant Formula Controversy and will report to congregations through the World Hunger Newsletter. Darlene Grega continues the committee's contact with the North Carolina Council of Churches Hunger Group.

The World Hunger Newsletter was printed four times and continues to be one of the chief means of communication. Ideas, information, and illustrations are shared with congregations to encourage growth and response.

Many congregations have participated in local CROP walks. Monies can be contributed directly to Lutheran World Relief and used in hunger projects.

The committee sponsored a "Lifestyle Retreat" at Agape (November 6-8, 1981). The purpose of the retreat was "To expose people to Christian alternatives in lifestyle (food, fuel, natural resources, purchasing patterns and advertising) through experiential learning and living in a retreat setting under the revelation of God's word." Participant reaction was very positive. A reunion for participants was held on May 8 as a time for support and sharing.

Over eight tons (16,097 lbs.) of goods were shipped to Lutheran World Relief, free of charge, by Carolina Freight Carriers Corporation following the fall appeal.

### North Carolina Lutheran Homes, Inc.

The Board of Trustees met in regular quarterly sessions, including a 24-hour conference retreat at Lutheridge, and had one called meeting.

At the annual meeting June 9, 1981, former Board members Joe A. Moretz and Rev. John H. Sigmon were recognized for their long period of service to Lutheran Homes. Joe L. Bookout was elected Treasurer, succeeding Mr. Moretz. Other officers re-elected were Dr. Marshall E. Agner, President; Oren L. Cline, Vice-President; and Rev. Donald R. Safrit, Secretary.

As mentioned in previous reports, the decade of the 1970's was a time of expansion for North Carolina Lutheran Homes. The Albemarle Unit, completed in 1977 with 54 Skilled Nursing (SNF) beds, and the Salisbury Unit, completed in 1976 with 60 Skilled Nursing beds and 25 each of Rest Home (RH) and Intermediate Care (ICF) beds, plus 12 retirement living apartments, more than tripled the capacity of the Homes. During this period when attention was being focussed on details related to construction, too little emphasis was being placed on organizational structure, fiscal control, evaluation, and planning for future needs. Consequently, the Board has spent much time and effort the past three years in strengthening these vital areas.

Since the employment of Ronald L. Bowman as Fiscal Manager in May 1981, the financial operation of all three nursing home units has been unified and is in the process of being computerized through Unifour Medical Management of Hickory. The Fiscal Operations Office is now located at 2304 South Main Street in Salisbury. The telephone number is (704) 637-6188. Miss Rebecca Rhoney has been employed as Accounting Supervisor and at least two Unit staff positions are being eliminated. As a result of Mr. Bowman's work, auditing costs for FY81 were cut by \$9,000, and revamping of our insurance coverage has saved another \$4,000. Additional savings will result as this office continues to get better control of the total financial operation of North Carolina Lutheran Home. The improving financial picture of Lutheran Homes is reflected in decreasing deficits. In FY80, the operating deficit was \$270,052. By FY81, this deficit had been reduced to \$38,000 and, barring some unforeseen problems, the current fiscal year should see a "break-even" budget.

In a move to improve the Homes' spiritual ministry to residents and staff, the Board took action to eliminate the present practice of having part-time chaplains at each of the three Units. This will be replaced by one full-time trained institutional chaplain having responsibility for supervising and coordinating all chaplaincy functions at all Units. October 1, 1982 is the target date for implementation.

Because appropriate steps were not taken to maintain the momentum gained through the CONCERN capital funds appeal, financial contributions to Lutheran Homes have been adversely affected the last seven years. As a result of a study in 1977, the position of Resource Developer was created by the Board, but this was never implemented.

Upon the recommendation of the Personnel Committee in March of this year, the Board approved the establishment of a development office staffed by a full-time Resource Developer. This position should be filled by mid-summer.

The Board has acted to sell certain portions of the property at the Hickory Unit, including the ''staff house'' located several blocks away, a narrow lot on the opposite side of 21st Street, N.E., and some of the Springs Road frontage. This action came after more than two years of discussion, study, and evaluation to determine the best use of the real estate owned at the Hickory Unit.

Plans to add a 26-bed Rest Home wing to the existing Albemarle Unit are nearing completion. Projected cost of the expansion, including a crafts room and solarium and additional office space, is \$680,000. To do all of this will require raising \$200,000 in the Albemarle-Stanly County area. At this writing more than \$86,000 has been contributed or pledged. The Board has decreed that contracts may be awarded after a minimum of \$100,000 has been raised. It is hoped that this can be done in April or May. The fundraising effort has been conducted by an enthusiastic aggregation of volunteers headed by the Albemarle Development Group. Mrs. Annie Ruth Kelley is Coordinator, with James Morgan and Russell Helderman serving as vice chairmen. Others are: Charles Brown, Carl Hill, Leonard Mabry, Robert Mauney, Mrs. Nell Poplin, Edward Snyder, Jr., and Mrs. Martha Snyder. Mrs. Kathleen Neely and Pritchard Dennis have also served.

Following the transfer of Administrators Isaac Kuhn to Salisbury in May and Mark Johnson to Hickory in June, the Board employed James J. Hopke of Jamestown, New York, as Administrator of the Albemarle Unit. Mr. Hopke resigned in November in order to be nearer his family, and was succeeded in December by The Reverend J. Russell Myers, Jr. The new administrator has settled in very quickly and is giving strong, steady leadership to the Albemarle Unit.

The renovation project at the Hickory Unit is being completed on schedule in March, at a cost of approximately \$800,000. For the first time in its 20-year existence, this Unit will now have an indebtedness: a \$260,000 ten-year mortgage at 16 percent interest.

During the year, nine persons remembered Lutheran Homes in their wills. Previously mentioned was the life estate conveyed by Dr. and Mrs. Samuel W. Hahn of Leesville, South Carolina. This consisted of a one-fourth interest in a building in downtown Hickory. Both Dr. and Mrs. Hahn died last summer within several weeks of each other. Additional bequests came from:

Mrs. Elizabeth Hentz Miller — \$105,000 to the Salisbury Unit, plus one-tenth of her residual estate to the Salisbury Unit and one-tenth to the Hickory Unit (estimated by executors to be approximately \$40,000 each).

Miss Maude Olena Powlas — \$5,381.60 to the Salisbury Unit.

Miss Donor Moose — \$1,000 to the Albemarle Unit.

Miss Clara Stinson — \$2,154.32 to the Albemarle Unit, for capital expansion.

Mrs. Catherine Elizabeth Moretz Deaton, widow of Rev. W. A. Deaton — \$1,000 to the Hickory Unit.

Miss Annie Glass Roediger — amount undetermined, to North Carolina Lutheran Homes, Inc.

Mr. John J. Tracy — amount undetermined, to North Carolina Lutheran Homes, Inc.

Miss Callie Stinson Orr — amount undetermined, to Albemarle Unit for capital expansion.

Miss Ellen Naomi Cline — amount undetermined, to Hickory Unit.

Of the above, only the bequests of Misses Powles, Moose, and Stinson have been received as of this writing. The others are still in the process of being settled. Lutheran Homes is grateful to all of these persons who have so generously remembered this arm of the Church's ministry.

In September 1979, following a recommendation from its Long-Range Planning Committee, the Board of Trustees authorized a resolution concerning the development of facilities for older adults in the North Carolina Synod and sent copies to every congregation in the Synod. The theme of the resolution was that, in view of the rapidly growing elderly population, the need for the Church's ministry to this group will continue to increase for the next four decades, with the present Lutheran Homes Units being devoted more and more to the acutely ill elderly, leaving the need for sheltered living facilities partially unmet unless congregations can fill the gap at the local level. "Therefore, be it resolved, That the Board of Trustees of North Carolina Lutheran Homes, Incorporated, urge the constituent congregations of the North Carolina Synod of the Lutheran Church in America to seek solutions to elderly hous-

ing needs at the community level, particularly in regard to retirement and rest home accommodations, through individual sponsorship for group homes, apartment complexes, and similar type congregate housing suited for independent and sheltered living for older adults requiring this level of care." The resolution concluded by stating that Lutheran Homes welcomes the opportunity to work with constituent congregations in a consultant capacity in seeking to meet local housing needs. Since that time, two such projects have materialized. "Lutherhaus," a 50-apartment elderly housing complex in Hickory built with HUD Section 202 funds, was opened in July 1981. Costing \$1,331,000, the project is jointly co-sponsored by Bethany and St. Andrews Congregations and North Carolina Lutheran Homes. And on March 21, 1982, Macedonia Congregation in Burlington broke ground for a multi-million dollar Lutheran Retirement complex. To be known as "Twin Lakes Center," this ministry to older persons has been made possible by a member of Macedonia, Mr. Wade Coble, who left his estate to the congregation for this purpose. While there is no evidence of any direct relationship between the 1979 resolution and these new developments. they should be mentioned here as examples of the type ministry Lutheran Homes envisions.

- 6. In March of 1978, Dr. Samuel Waightstill Hahn and Doris Becker Hahn conveyed their right to and interest in a piece of property located in Hickory, North Carolina to the North Carolina Lutheran Homes, Inc. This conveyance was made subject to a life estate whereby the donors shall retain the right to the income from their interest in this property. The property has been recorded at \$11,050.00 which represents its fair market value as of the date of the gift. Mr. and Mrs. Hahn passed away in July 1981.
- 7. The mortgage fee was paid to Wachovia Mortgage Company to obtain permanent financing for the Salisbury Unit. This fee is being amortized over a 23 year period.
- 8. During 1977, the apartments located at the Salisbury Unit opened for occupancy. Each apartment resident was charged an initial fee of \$14,000.00 for one-bedroom apartments and \$18,000.00 for two-bedroom apartments. Upon withdrawal of a resident during the first year, the resident will be refunded 85% of the initial fee. In the case of death during the first year, 50% of the initial fee will be refunded to the resident's estate. After twelve months of residency, the fee is refundable on a declining equity of 10% per year. At September 30, 1981, \$96,500.00 of initial fees may be refundable, consequently, this amount is reported as deferred income.
  - In addition to the initial occupancy fee, the residents pay a monthly rental fee of \$295.00 for one-bedroom apartments and \$395.00 for two-bedroom apartments.
- The mortgage is payable to Western-Southern Life Insurance Company and is due monthly with interest at 8.35% per annum. The Health, Education, and Welfare Department, a governmental agency, shares in the interest of 3% leaving 5.35% payable by the North Carolina Lutheran Homes, Inc.
- The principal of the John A. Pless Memorial Endowment Fund consists solely of cash and is to remain intact. Income from the fund is to be used to subsidize the cost of care of any needy resident of the North Carolina Lutheran Homes. Inc.
- 11. The Judge Oscar Ogburn Efird Endowment Fund consists of cash and securities and is administered by the Trust Department of North Carolina National Bank in Charlotte, North Carolina on the cash basis. The cash basis of accounting is a departure from generally accepted accounting principles. The effect upon the financial statements of this departure is not considered material.
  - The principal of the Judge Oscar Ogburn Efird Endowment Fund is to remain intact and income from the fund is to be used for the benefit of the Albemarie Unit with first preference given to any member of the Efird family.
- 12. Contingencies Annie Glass Roediger died in February, 1981 bequeathing one half interest in property located in Winston-Salem, and cash. The land and building has been recorded at \$49,000 which represents its fair market value at the date of the gift. At September 30, 1981, the approximate balance of \$70,000.00 is contingent upon the settlement of the deceased's estate.
  - Elizabeth H. Miller died in June, 1981, bequeathing \$105,000.00 to the Salisbury Unit for apartments or expansion also one tenth of residue approximating \$40,000.00 with no designation. Another one tenth of residue was bequeathed to the Hickory Unit with no designation. Settlement of the deceased's estate is expected within the next twelve months.
- Contractual adjustment represents the difference between customary charges made to Medicaid and Medicare residents and the amount reimbursed by Medicaid and Medicare.

# Supplement to Report of North Carolina Lutheran Homes, Inc.

The position of Resource Developer was filled by the Board in May. A. Job Kistler, Assistant to the Executive Director for the past two years, has been appointed to the position. Ted W. Goins, Jr. who completed his training and received his Nursing Home Administrator's License in March, was appointed Assistant to the Executive Director.

The mortgage on the Hickory Unit, originally reported as \$260,000, apparently will be less than \$200,000, thanks to several bequests, continued contributions, and the availability of additional depreciation funds. The John J. Tracy bequest to the Hickory Unit was \$19,226.81 and a bequest from Mrs. Kathryn A. Frye, widow of Dr. Glenn Frye of Hickory, amounted to \$5,000.

Other bequests include a \$2,500 gift to the Salisbury Unit by Duke C. Trexler, Sr. of Orlando, Florida, and a \$5,000 gift from IIa C. Harward of Albemarle to the Albemarle Expansion Fund.

One correction to the initial report needs to be noted. In referring to sale of property at the Hickory Unit, the statement should read "all of the Springs Road frontage belonging to Lutheran Homes," instead of "some of the Springs Road frontage."

The campaign to raise money for the Albemarle Unit expansion project now reports local gifts and pledges in excess of \$106,000, making it possible to proceed with plans to receive bids on construction as soon as the State approves the architect's drawings — hopefully in June.

Permission to observe a Sunday in 1982 as "Lutheran Homes Sunday" in commemoration of our twentieth year of service has been granted by the Executive Board of Synod "for promotional purposes only." The date tentatively set is October 17, 1982. Additional information will be distributed during the summer.

Continued cuts in Medicaid are now a certainty. With more than half of Lutheran Homes' operating revenue coming from this source (governmental subsidy for indigent residents), congregations in the Synod and friends of this ministry to older persons must respond generously to make up the deficit created by these cuts.

# Lenoir-Rhyne College

As plans were made for Lenoir-Rhyne College Sunday last spring, College officials selected the theme, "Building." While that theme must be used with caution in a day of soaring costs, declining enrollments, and an uncertain future for student financial aid, it is still an appropriate description of the College during the past year.

The most obvious example of building at Lenoir-Rhyne has been work on the College's new academic complex. Ground was broken for the project in September of 1982, and construction of the first two buildings began shortly thereafter. Work also began at that time on renovation of the Rhyne Building. In February of this year additional construction crews began building the final phase of the project, and it is hoped that the complex will be completed early in 1983.

When the din of construction fades away and the complex is a reality, Lenoir-Rhyne will have new and renovated facilities greatly enhancing its academic program. The interior of Rhyne Building will be much more functional with wiring, lighting, and appropriate accessories which will enable faculty members to use audio visuals and other teaching tools with greater ease and effectiveness than is now possible. Additional remodeling coupled with the installation of an adequate heating and cooling system will produce an environment more conducive to the best in teaching and learning.

A new instructional building will adjoin the Rhyne, and the two structures will function as a single facility. The new building will include a specialized classroom for business, standard classrooms, seminar and conference rooms and faculty offices. It will be properly equipped for film and/or lecture presentations as well as television and drama productions. Its uses will be numerous as it provides the setting for visiting speakers, conferences, short courses, and auxiliary activities such as chapel services and forums.

The learning resource center will provide space to catalogue, store, maintain, and circulate all non-print learning resources. It will include facilities for TV production, a teaching/learning laboratory, and an audiometric testing center for the College's hearing impaired program. The academic computer and the education department's curriculum laboratory will be moved to the new building.

Wilkie Construction Company of Lenoir is serving as the general contractor for the first phase of the academic complex project with subcontractors Mecklenburg Plumbing Company of Charlotte, Ingold Company of Hickory, and Efficiency Electric Company of Hickory. They are working on the instructional building and the renovation of Rhyne at a cost of more than \$2 million. Guy Frye and Sons of Hickory is the general contractor for the learning resource center, and subcontractors are Ingold Company, Hickory Plumbing and Heating, and Caldwell Electric of Newton. Cost for that phase of the project will be nearly \$800,000.

With the completion of the academic complex it will be easy to forget the other types of "building" that occur at Lenoir-Rhyne on a regular basis, but they are just as important as the "bricks and mortar" projects.

One of the most critical tasks which the College now faces relates to the building of new sources for student financial aid. The future of such assistance from the federal government is highly uncertain, but it seems very likely that significant cutbacks will come. The gloomiest predictions forecast reductions of as much as 40 percent in important programs like Pell Grants and the complete elimination of other government assistance, most notably the guaranteed student loan program.

Those predictions are another blow to Lenoir-Rhyne's efforts to maintain its healthy enrollment of talented students. The College has been battling the declining pool of traditional prospective students for several years, and that problem will grow worse. The ravages of inflation and energy costs have also struck hard, forcing the College to regularly increase its charges. Adding significant reductions in student financial aid to these existing difficulties could be the proverbial "straw that broke the camel's back," but Lenoir-Rhyne is devoting much time and energy to avoiding a possible crisis.

The College has modified some of its plans for the near future in both admissions

and development, seeking to strengthen its program of student recruitment and develop new sources of financial aid for students. The success of such efforts during the next several years will determine, in large measure, the future of the College.

Despite College officials' concern over the enrollment and financial aid picture, there has been much good news on the campus during the past year.

Two reaccreditation teams visited the College during 1981-82, and both were favorably impressed with the areas which they studied. One of the teams was from the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools; the other from the National League for Nursing. Indications are that accreditation of the College and the nursing program will be renewed in the coming months.

The College's Lineberger Center for Cultural and Educational Renewal and its Broyhill Institute for Business Leadership continued to provide campus and community with outstanding seminars, programs, and other events. Among their contributions were an outstanding series of the Middle East and a look ahead at the country's economy.

The College's new graduate program awarded its first degrees in August, 1981, and the Tuesday and Thursday Evening College Program will realize its first graduate in August of this year.

ENROLLMENTS AND DEGREES. Registration for fall semester of 1982 was 1,424, up 38 from last year, and 87 graduate students.

The College awarded 274 bachelor's degrees and 34 master's degrees at its graduation exercises on May 3, and August 14, 1981. Preacher for the Baccalaureate sevice was the Rev. Jacob B. Golden, D.D. superintendent of Waynesville District, Methodist Church, Lake Junaluska, N.C. Graduation speaker was Mr. Howard E. Haugerud, vice president for federal relations for Dana Corporation in Washington, D.C. An honorary degree was presented to the Rev. Frank Caston Perry, pastor, Holy Trinity Lutheran Church, and chaplain to Lutheran students at UNC-Chapel Hill. Mr. Charles M. Snipes of Hickory was awarded the Trustee Award for his outstanding service to the College.

GOVERNING AND ADVISORY BOARDS. The Board of Trustees held regular meetings on November 20, 1981, and April 2, 1982, and conducted a two-day seminar in August, 1981, on campus. Four long-term members of the Board rotate off this year and are ineligible for re-election at this time. With gratitude and thanks for their services we acknowledge David W. Hoyle, Dallas, N.C.; The Rev. Dr. Albert H. Keck, Jr., Hickory; Mr. Jesse C. Sigmon, Jr., Newton; and Mr. Conrad B. Wessell, Jr., Goldsboro.

The Development Board met on October 10, 1981, and March 26, 1982. Reelected to three-year terms were John Allen, H. Jack Faw, Thomas Fee, Dr. Hilda Garrou, Thomas H. Kern, Helen S. Moretz, Margie S. Owsley, and A. L. Viles. New members elected for a three-year term are Allen W. Dawson, W. W. Eckard, Howard E. Holcomb, John Huie, and Walter P. Wagoner.

TRUSTEE NOMINATIONS. In accordance with Section VII, B, 2 of the Bylaws of the Synod, the Board of Trustees has placed in nomination: Mr. Boyd George and Mr. Albert Allran, for election to the Board of Trustees for three-year terms expiring in 1987. Mr. George is president of Merchants Distributing, Incorporated, in Hickory, and Mr. Allran is a textile consultant also from Hickory.

FINANCIAL REPORT. An audited financial statement for the fiscal year ending in 1982 is appended to this report.

#### LENOIR-RHYNE COLLEGE NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS May 31, 1981 and 1980

#### Note 1 — Summary of Significant Accounting Policies:

ACCRUAL BASIS — The financial statements of Lenoir-Rhyne College have been prepared on the accrual basis except for depreciation accounting as explained subsequently in this note. The statement of current funds revenues, expenditures and other changes is a statement of financial activities of current funds related to the current reporting period. It does not purport to present the results of operations nor the net income or loss for the period as would a statement of income or a statement of revenues and expenses.

To the extent that current funds are used to finance plant assets, the amounts so provided are accounted for as (1) expenditures, in the case of normal replacement of movable equipment and library books; (2) mandatory transfers, in the case of required provisions for debt amortization and interest and equipment renewal and replacement; and (3) as transfers of a nonmandatory nature in all other cases.

FUND ACCOUNTING — In order to ensure observance of limitations and restrictions placed on the use of the resources available to the College, the accounts of the College are maintained in accordance with the principles of "fund accounting." This is the procedure by which resources for various purposes are classified for accounting and reporting purposes into funds that are in accordance with activities or objectives specified. Separate accounts are maintained for each fund; however, in the accompanying financial statements, funds that have similar characteristics have been combined into groups. Accordingly, all financial transactions have been recorded and reported by fund group.

Within each fund group, fund balances restricted by outside sources are so indicated and are distinguished from unrestricted funds allocated to specific purposes by action of the Board of Trustees. Externally restricted funds may only be utilized in accordance with the purposes established by the source of such funds and are in contrast with unrestricted funds over which the Board of Trustees retains full control to use in achieving any of its institutional purposes.

Endowment funds are subject to the restrictions of gift instruments requiring in perpetuity that principal be invested and only income be utilized. Although quasi-endowment funds may be established by the Board of Trustees for the same purposes as endowment funds, any portion of quasi-endowment funds may be expended.

All gains and losses arising from the sale, collection or other disposition of investments and other noncash assets are accounted for in the fund which owned such assets. Ordinary income derived from investments, receivables and the like is accounted for in the fund owning such assets, except that income derived from investments of endowment and similar funds is accounted for in the fund to which it is restricted or, if unrestricted, as revenues in unrestricted current funds.

All other unrestricted revenue is accounted for in the unrestricted current fund. Restricted gifts, grants, appropriations, endowment income and other restricted resources are accounted for in the appropriate restricted funds. Restricted current funds are reported as revenues and expenditures when expended for current operating purposes.

INVESTMENTS — Investments, exclusive of physical plant, are valued at cost or at fair market value at date received for donated investments. The College receives all earnings of the Martin Luther Stevens Memorial Trust, the assets of which are not included with those of the College.

RECEIVABLES — Accounts, notes and pledges receivable are charged-off as they are deemed to be uncollectible. An allowance for uncollectible pledges of 25% of the uncollected pledges at the end of the fiscal period is reflected in the financial statements. The allowance is considered to be a best estimate based on historical loss. In addition, an allowance for doubtful NDSL loans has been established for the current year and is based on the historical default rate of the College.

INVENTORY VALUATION — Inventories are stated at the lower of cost (first-in, first-out method) or market. Market is considered as net realizable value.

PROPERTY AND PLANT — Property and plant are stated at appraised value for acquisitions prior to 1958 and at cost for all other acquisitions; deferred costs of proposed building projects are stated at cost and donated items are carried on the books at fair market value as of the date received. The College makes no provision for depreciation on campus improvements, buildings and equipment. Disposals normally are not removed from the accounts, except for material items.

AGENCY FUNDS — Effective with the year ended May 31, 1980, the College has elected to treat as current fund revenues and expenditures amounts received from federal and state agencies and designated for the benefit of specific students. In prior years, such funds were treated as agency funds.

#### Note 7 — Retirement Plans:

The College participates in Teachers' Insurance and Annuity Association Contributory Retirement Plan for professional, administrative and clerical personnel. The plan contains no provision for past service benefits and the College assumes no further liability beyond the periodic contributions for each participating employee. There are several small pension plans for ministers and nonacademic employees to which the College makes periodic contributions to the extent of any liability. Total pension expense amounted to \$161,550 in 1981 and \$139,354 in 1980.

#### Note 8 — Interfund Borrowings:

The liabilities created by interfund borrowings are payable within one year without interest.

#### Note 9 — Construction in Progress:

Contracts were let in 1977 for the construction of the Shuford Memorial Physical Education Center. Construction began in June 1977 and was completed during the year ended May 31, 1980. The total cost of completing the project was \$1,925,408.

#### Note 10 — Other Matters:

Quasi-endowment funds, by definition, are internally designated by the Board of Trustees, rather than externally restricted by the donor. Consequently, the Board has the right to decide at any time to expend the principal to help meet costs.

# Lutheran Family Services in North Carolina, Inc.

Our past year has been marked by tremendous growth opportunities. With our first full year of operation as a corporation independent of the Lutheran Children's Home of the South, we are pleased with the many opportunities our Lord has offered us.

#### The Board of Trustees

The Board of Trustees met in quarterly sessions. At the annual meeting in June the following officers were elected: President — Mr. Larry Parrish, Vice-President — The Rev. Glenn Boland, Secretary — Mrs. Jan Conrad and Treasurer — The Rev. Harry Robinson. The Board lost one member with the transfer to the Florida Synod of The Rev. Henry Lineberger. Mrs. Joan Lee, of High Point, was elected by the Executive Committee of Synod as a replacement.

#### The Program

The Program continued to expand with the opening of two additional group homes, additional foster homes in Mecklenburg County, additional foster homes for refugee children and a Day Treatment Center in Lee-Harnett counties.

One additional group home is located in Gastonia. It is a temporary home serving a maximum of five youth at any one time. The LCA congregations in Gaston County organized Lutheran Family Services Support Group of Gaston County, Inc. and purchased a home for Lutheran Family Services use. In recent action they purchased two additional acres of land for program use. In addition to purchasing the house and land, the congregations also painted and put the house in first-rate order. They are continuing to provide day-to-day support for the home.

Another temporary care home was opened in Sanford in Lee County. Our one LCA congregation in Lee County was very active in furnishing the home and they, too, provide day-to-day support for our staff and children.

The Mecklenburg foster care program has expanded and we presently have 26 children in care. Most of our families are from Lutheran congregations in the Mecklenburg area.

The Indochinese foster care program has expanded to include 26 youths in care. Two of our homes are provided by Lutheran pastors and wives, The Rev. and Mrs. David Conrad and The Rev. and Mrs. Clyde Haas. Four additional homes are needed to complete our goal of thirty.

We ventured into one new program area with the opening of a Day Treatment Center in Sanford. This center is funded through a contract with Lee-Harnett Mental Health Center and has a capacity of five youths.

Programs previously in operation continue to run smoothly. In addition to our two new homes, we continue to operate six homes in Charlotte, one in Shelby, one in Concord and one in Chapel Hill.

Our Family Counseling Center in the Triad Area continues to operate at full capacity Programs in counseling, education and enrichment are offered for a small fee and a sliding scale basis.

Refugee Resettlement continues to receive major emphasis in our overall program. Refugees were resettled from Indochina, Haiti, Cuba and Poland. Follow-up services were also provided for the hundreds of refugees previously resettled by our agency. One disturbing statistic has been the decline in sponsorships by Lutheran congregations. This we hope to strengthen in the coming year.

Family Enrichment events, the Single Again Weekend and the Single Parent-Child Weekend were again a vital part of our services.

In a final total, we served over a thousand individuals in our total program.

#### The Future

In recent Board of Trustee action we agreed to establish additional programs in the following areas: Guilford County, three group homes and three day treatment centers; Alamance-Caswell Counties, one group home; Lee-Harnett Counties, one additional group home. We are also in negotiation with a number of other counties for future program expansion.

#### The Staff

The Agency functions under the overall leadership of the Executive Director, Mr. Bill Brittain. Three Area Program Directors were employed in February: Mr. Robert Miller, Western Region Group Homes Director; Mr. Rip McAdams, Eastern Region Group Homes Director; Mrs. Sherrell Goolsby, Director of Family Support Services, including foster, family counseling and refugee resettlement. Individual Program Directors include Group Home Directors, Mr. Ronnie Long, Mecklenburg; Mr. Larry Paul, Cleveland; Mr. Glenn Smith, Gaston; Mr. Ken Golden, Cabarrus; Rev. David Hill, Orange and Rev. Dick Woodward, Lee. Mr. Arnold Gifford is Director of our Day Treatment Center. Mrs. Ginny Soberg-Rhyne is Director of Refugee Resettlement and the Unaccompanied Minors Program. Mrs. Lyn Strickland is Director of Triad Lutheran Center. In addition, our Finance Department is headed by Mrs. Betty Campbell, who is the Administrative Assistant to the Executive Director.

Future staffing plans call for a full time Business Manager and a Director of Public Relations.

Our God has been good to us. We have much to do.

June 30, 1981

#### NOTE 1 Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

The corporation's financial statements are prepared in accordance with the American Institute of Certified Public Accountants' Industry Audit Guide, Audits of Voluntary Health and Welfare Organizations.

#### Overview

Lutheran Family Services in North Carolina is a not-for-profit human service organization and is certified by the Division for Mission in North America, Lutheran Church in America, for inclusion under the blanket 501 (c) (3) tax exemption of the Lutheran Church in America. It follows the practice of accounting for and reporting on the use of resources by specific fund groups.

The assets, liabilities and fund balances are reported in two self balancing fund groups as follows:

Current fund-unrestricted, which has unrestricted resources, represents the portion of expendable funds that is available for general activities.

Building and equipment fund which represents resources restricted or expended for building and equipment acquisitions.

#### Buildings, equipment and depreciation

Building and equipment expenditures are capitalized at cost. Expenditures from the current fund — unrestricted for fixed assets are reflected as a transfer from current fund — unrestricted balance. Donated fixed assets are recorded and capitalized at market value. Depreciation of fixed assets is provided for by the straight line method over the estimated useful lives of the assets.

#### Pension Plan

The organization participates in the Lay Pension Plan of the Lutheran Church in America. Employer contributions amounted to \$4,913. The plan is a contributory retirement disability and survivor pension plan of the ''money purchase'' type.

#### NOTE 2 Separation and Incorporation

In accordance with a 1963 withdrawal agreement with the Virginia Synod of the Lutheran Church in America the North Carolina Synod of the Lutheran Church in America withdrew from ownership and sponsorship of the Lutheran Children's Home of the South as of December 31, 1980. Ownership of tangible and intangible assets of the North Carolina Family Services was assumed by Lutheran Family Services in North Carolina effective December 31, 1980. Assets net of liabilities acquired totaled \$119,636.

#### NOTE 3 Loans Payable

Loans payable of \$40,000 represent advances by the Lutheran Immigration and Refugee Services, Lutheran Council in the U.S.A., for the following programs:

Refugee Resettlement Program\$1	6,000
LCA Unaccompanied Minors Program\$2	4,000

#### NOTE 4 Note Payable

Funds advanced prior to January 1, 1981 to North Carolina Family Services, Lutheran Children's Home of the South was assumed as a liability by Lutheran Family Services in North Carolina when the North Carolina Synod withdrew from sponsorship of the Lutheran Children's Home of the South. The loan was to be evidenced by an unsecured note payable to Lutheran Children's Home of the South at 8% interest.

At June 30, 1981 the note had not been executed due to a clarification of the balance purported to be approximately \$41,226 rather than \$44,000. The balance of \$44,000 has been recorded as the audited balance as shown on the December 31, 1980 audit of the Lutheran Children's Home of the South.

#### North Carolina Lutheran Church Women

As the auxiliary of the church, Lutheran Church Women has been a partner in mission. We have reminded ourselves of the purpose of the auxiliary: to be a community of women, which in response to the Holy Spirit, engages in the mission of proclamation and reconciliation through its life and work and through the life and work of the Lutheran Church in America.

In order to equip women for greater participation in the life and work of the LCA, we have embarked on an expansive program of leadership training which reaches into every congregational organization. We have been excited about this program and have discovered that it has enabled us to have a two-way communication system. We not only talked, we listened. We received ideas and questions. We were afforded an opportunity to respond with explanations, information and suggestions. We expect this program to continue for at least one more year.

We were pleased and challenged when the Auxiliary extended an invitation to us to participate in a pilot project on inclusiveness. After careful deliberation, we accepted the challenge and have begun work that will form the focus of much of our work in the North Carolina Unit from this convention through to next year's convention. We will study inclusiveness and racism from a theological base and implement strategies to prepare us for developing a more inclusive organization.

The program structure of Lutheran Church Women is organized around six functions. We have worked in each of these areas. A brief outline of our activities in each area follows:

#### FUNCTION I — Spiritual Growth

Two Spiritual Renewal Retreats were held on September 11-12, 1981, one at Agape and one at Lutheridge. A total of 83 women, under the theme, "Time to Touch," spent the weekend studying, praying, laughing and sharing. Plans have been made for two weekend retreats during the fall of 1982 (September 10-12 at Agape and November 5-7 at Lutheridge) for intensive Bible study. This need was expressed by many of last fall's participants. In addition, a one-day retreat has been planned for September 18, 1982 at St. John's, Cabarrus County, as a model of how to organize a one-day event of intensive Bible study. Regular study of the Bible centered on using "Real People, A Real God", studies on some women of Israel and First Peter, as we attempted to clarify for ourselves how to be a witness in our daily life. Prayers at Pentecost celebrations were planned for many congregations using the material titled, "That They May Be One." The theme was unity, a fitting emphasis for this period when we are planning for a new church. Many congregational organizations planned presentations for LCW Sunday in the synod on May 2, 1982 to inform congregational members of the scope and program of the auxiliary.

#### FUNCTION II - Mission Education

Lutheran Church Women maintained a strong interest in the area of missions. Our participation in the Mailbox Missions project enabled us to communicate with those serving the church far from home. Mission Study programs helped us understand the global aspects of Christian mission as we tried not to limit our knowledge and vision to one area. Through monthly programs we learned that mission was a complex word and we sought to understand it. Growing out of this complexity was the commitment to provide for opportunities that will lead to a greater inclusiveness of the church and greater involvement throughout the formation of the new church.

#### FUNCTION III — Personal Growth and Relationships

A booklet was circulated to all congregational organizations offering ideas for developing support groups, prayer groups, reading lists and group exercises to help women relate to each other as they live their days in a changing world. Women were encouraged to support passage of the 27th Constitutional Amendment. Many opportunities were taken to affirm women as people of God.

# FUNCTION IV — The unit continued to assist women to act on behalf of others in securing equal opportunities and justice. A total of 870 people attended seven fall District Assembly Meetings with the theme, "Economic Justice — A Personal Responsibility." The Executive Board endorsed the Nestle boycott and launched a new effort to train individuals in teaching adults to read. In addition to materials that have been available for several years, LCW now has available "Emergency English for Refugees" and is prepared to work with individual congregations who have a need for this important service. The 1982 Unit Convention, held on May 28-30, also focused on economic justice with the theme: "Let Justice Roll Down Like Water." Major presenters were: The Rev. Franklin C. Fry, author, speaker and pastor; The Rev.

# Carolina. FUNCTION V — Ecumenical Relationships

The unit supported Church Women United and encouraged LCW members to be active participants in the organization. Members were also encouraged to plan events that would include members of the Lutheran Women's Missionary League and American Lutheran Church Women.

#### FUNCTION VI — Organizational Support and Renewal

Since August of 1981 two series of training workshops were held. Forty-three facilitators received twenty-four hours of training in leadership skills and began using those same skills in leadership training in the congregational organizations. More training of these facilitators is planned for late summer of 1982. In November 1981 six Presidents Retreats were held for 114 enthusiastic presidents representing their congregational organizations. In the spring seventeen Fellowships were held with the theme, "Rainbows and Promises." LCW supported Christian stewardship and encouraged its members to strive for deeper opportunities of service through giving. In 1981 the Unit sent 89.5% (\$95,568.59) of their \$122,836.76 receipts to the Auxiliary in support of the Auxiliary budget which included support of the LCA. Communication was of prime importance. During the last year monthly bulk mailings were sent to each congregational organization president in order that information could flow freely. Many presidents reacted with enthusiasm for this help. Other methods have included the magazine LUTHERAN WOMEN, the unit newsletter CARE-O-LINES, and a calendar of events HAPPENINGS.

During the preceding year we have attempted to increase our involvement in synodical events of common interest and concern. The Bishop has brought greetings to two board meetings in addition to his fine messages at our annual conventions. We have desired to develop liaisons be tween the activities of the Unit and those of the synod.

The Unit wants to thank Bishop Misenheimer for his support of our Unit and for his dedicated service that has helped us be informed members of the church and participants in Christ's mission in our world. We thank the members of his staff, the Synodical Executive Board, and the support staff at the Church House for their many

kindnesses and their support of our work and program. We thank all lay persons and clergy for their support. We pledge continued efforts to be that community of women who respond in joy to the leading of the Holy Spirit.

Lutheran Church Men experienced a very active schedule of events for the year 1981.

Five newsletters were published and mailed to over 500 persons. LCM participated in orientation for new pastors and their wives at a dinner at Haven, Salisbury.

The annual convention was held at Grace, Thomasville, on November 7 with Rev. David Castor as keynote speaker and Dr. Robert Stackel as banquet speaker.

1981 marked the retirement of Executive Director Walter Yount who gave sacrificial and vibrant leadership to our group for ten years.

# Proceedings of the 1982 Convention of the North Carolina Synod Lutheran Church in America

All meetings were held in the P. E. Monroe Auditorium, Lenoir-Rhyne College, Hickory, North Carolina.

#### FIRST MEETING

Thursday, June 3, 1982 - 7:00 p.m.

#### Opening Service of the Word

The North Carolina Synod of the Lutheran Church in America opened its Twenty-First Annual Convention (the one hundred and seventy-eighth convention of the North Carolina Synod and its predecessor bodies since the organization in 1803) on June 3, 1982, at 7:00 p.m. in the P. E. Monroe Auditorium at Lenoir-Rhyne College, Hickory, North Carolina, with the Service of the Word from the *Lutheran Book of Worship*. The Convention theme was "Born Anew to a Living Hope."

Participants in the service were: the Rev. Ernest L. Misenheimer, Jr., D.D., Bishop of the N.C. Synod, who served as the Presiding Minister and Homilist; the Rev. David L. Martin, the Rev. Robert H. Shoffner, the Rev. Richard C. Little and Mr. James A. Chesky, members of the N.C. Synod staff, who served as assisting ministers; Mr. Robert Smith, organist for the convention and the choirs of Mt. Olive, Hickory and Beth-Eden, Newton, under the direction of Mrs. Ada Smith. The service was planned by the synod's Committee on Worship and Music, the Rev. Robert E. Allen, chairman.

In his sermon Bishop Misenheimer shared his hopes for the decade of the eighties. He challenged the congregations of the Synod to recognize that the Lutheran Church in America was a global Church with each congregation representing the LCA in its own community with a definite mission. Bishop Misenheimer called for growth in the churches of the synod, encouraging them to "apply our theology to a changing world." He asked for growth in faith and in numbers to celebrate "what God has done" and to "speak boldly" for Christ and His ministry.

The offering was designated for the Bishop's discretionary fund.

#### SECOND MEETING

Thursday Evening, June 3, 1982 - 8:30 p.m.

**OPENING OF SYNOD** — Bishop Misenheimer declared the Convention of Synod to be in session.

- CALL TO ORDER Bishop Misenheimer called the convention to order and presided.
- COMMITTEE ON CREDENTIALS AND ENROLLMENT The Rev. Elvin L. Bumgarner, Jr., chairman of the committee, reported that 189 ordained ministers and 178 lay delegates were present. Bishop Misenheimer declared that a quorum was present and business could therefore be transacted.
- 3. CONVENTION PROGRAM Mrs. Opal Moretz, chairman of the Executive Board's Sub-Committee on Conventions, presented the proposed convention program with revisions on behalf of the Executive Board of the Synod.

Secretary Martin moved that: the agenda be adopted as revised.

The Rev. Richard B. Graf, Jr. moved the following amendment to the agenda:

That the following special order be included in the convention program: That should a second ballot for Bishop of the North Carolina Synod not result in an election, those persons whose names will appear on the third ballot be given up to five minutes each of convention time immediately prior to the calling for the third ballot to address the convention on the subject of the Office of Bishop of the Synod.

#### 5. Report of the Committee on Reference and Counsel

The Rev. Charles M. Zimmerman, Chairman, indicated the procedure for submitting resolutions to come before the convention.

#### 6. "Applying our Theology to a Changing World" — The Rev. Larry Yoder, Ph.D.

Dr. Yoder gave the keynote presentation for the convention on "Applying our Theology to a Changing World." He stated that only God was unchanging in a rapidly changing world and that Christians must search for truth to enable them to survive. He challenged them to "live a life of love" and to steer a clear theological course.

The Rev. J. Frank Davis made a motion:

that a transcript of the address delivered by Dr. Larry Yoder on "Applying our Theology to a Changing World" be made available to all those who may desire it.

The motion was ADOPTED.

#### 7. COMMITTEE ON REPORTS OF OFFICERS AND STAFF

The Rev. Gary A. Weant, chairman, presented the report and moved the recommendations as follows:

"The Committee on Reports of Officers and Staff met and reviewed the Report of the Bishop; the reports of Pastor David L. Martin, Minister for Professional Leadership and Secretary of the Synod; of Pastor Robert H. Shoffner, Minister for Parish Services; of Pastor Richard C. Little, Minister for Outreach; and of Mr. James A. Chesky, Minister for Resources and Treasurer of the Synod.

These reports provide an accurate and comprehensive survey of the ministries being embodied within our congregations and across the Synod. They also give testimony to God's redeeming presence within the lives and work of an extremely capable Bishop and synod staff.

In the Report of the Bishop, we applaud the emphasis on the pastoral aspect of this office and the effort of Bishop Misenheimer and his staff never to be so preoccupied with things, projects, and programs that they become insensitive to the cries of our people. We note with approval the spirit of teamwork and mutual support which this approach to ministry has fostered among us. Bishop Misenheimer's carefully outlined report in which he reviews highlights of the past year, 1982 expectations, and the record of official acts, provides a statement of our Synod's heritage, present status, and a vision for the future which is in keeping with the convention's theme, "Born Anew to a Living Hope." We concur that "God is ushering us into a new era in the life of His Church in the decade of the eighties" and that this time holds forth tremendous opportunities for challenge and promise. We express grateful appreciation to Bishop Misenheimer for his 27 years of service to the Synod and for the pastoral leadership he has provided by his example among us.

We note the leadership which David Martin has given as he related to and supported areas of Professional Leadership, Campus Ministry, and Historical Work. As Minister for Professional Leadership, David has worked to develop emotional and spiritual support systems for pastors and lay professionals. This also includes work with individuals struggling with vocational decisions as they plan for the ministry. Working for adequate compensation for lay professionals and pastors is still another dimension of his activity. New acquisitions in the Archives and a renewed use of these resources by our members have pointed to the significance of such historical work. Working with congregations and church councils has been yet another aspect of David's ministry. We are grateful for David Martin's never-failing readiness to participate with persons in such events as they seek to become instruments of mission. As secretary of the Synod, David's statistical report reveals an enormous volume of information which can be useful to many congregations. This convention marks the

tenth year of service to the North Carolina Synod. We commend David Martin for his efficient service in recording the actions of the Synod during this period.

Robert Shoffner has served the Synod faithfully as Minister for Parish Services. We cite his report and commend it to your reading. Under the leadership of Bob, we have seen significant accomplishments in the areas of Educational Ministry, Youth Ministry, Worship and Music, and Parish Life and Ministry Development. We also note with gratitude the fine work which has been done in the Cabinet for Parish Services and the Synod Media Center. We commend Bob Shoffner for his diligent and outstanding service to the Synod.

The Bulletin of Reports also contains detailed information regarding the activities and accomplishments of the various committees in Outreach Ministries. We note with gratitude the quality and development which can be seen in these areas of ministry. We commend Richard Little for his faithful and dedicated leadership. Certainly in these challenging times we recognize that there is an even greater need for each congregation to reach out in their community in both evangelism and social ministry. Moreover, as was cited in Richard's report, we need to give a higher priority to the needs of God's people.

Jim Chesky continues to serve the Synod as Stewardship Counselor, Budget Control Officer, Business Manager/Personnel Director, and Synod staff representative to the Communications Committee and News Bureau. The continued efforts by Jim and the Synod to cultivate a biblically sound and theologically healthy understanding of stewardship as well as a greater level of commitment to the wider ministry of the Church is commendable. We acknowledge Jim's faithful work and affirm that the treasurer's report represents a rigorous effort to maintain sound financial accountability.

These reports consistently provide for us an occasion for joining with the whole Church in prayers of thanksgiving to God for the unswerving dedication, theological fidelity, pastoral sensitivity, and professional competence exhibited by Bishop Misenheimer, his staff, and their secretaries. By virtue of God's abiding grace working through the lives of these people, the North Carolina Synod has been able to "walk together in mission" and thus reflect more clearly the conviction that the Church is indeed the Body of Christ!"

#### Recommendation No. 1 ADOPTED

Bishop Misenheimer presented members of his staff and expressed appreciation to each, noting their creativity and expertise, praising their work as a team and thanking them for their personal support. #### Recommendation No. 4: ADOPTED

That the proposed amendment to Article Seven, Item 4, a, of the Constitution of the North Carolina Synod placed on notice at the 1981 Convention be considered.

Secretary Martin **REFERRED** the proposed amendment to the Executive Board Report.

#### Recommendation No. 5: ADOPTED

Secretary David L. Martin referred the convention to his report, making observations on the membership statistics of the synod. He noted that the synod was growing in numbers, but more significantly was "growing in strength."

#### Recommendation No. 6: ADOPTED

James A. Chesky, Synod Treasurer, referred the convention to his report and commented briefly about its contents (BR pp. ). He expressed appreciation to the congregations for their support. Mr. Chesky also reported on behalf of the Trustees of the Michael Peeler Fund, the Investments Committee and the Audits Committee, referring the convention to their reports in the Bulletin of Reports.

The reports were **RECEIVED**.

- 8. Report of the Executive Board, continued (BR p. 156)
  - a. 100% Apportionment giving to churchwide agencies, recommendations on

The Rev. J. A. Harbinson, on behalf of the Executive Board, presented the following recommendation and moved:

that the North Carolina Synod adopt the following plans for becoming a 100% apportionment Synod:

- 1. That the North Carolina Synod agree that as soon as possible and feasible, the synod become a 100% full apportionment giving synod for churchwide agency support.
- 2. a. that the synod begin now to consult with its committees, asking them to cut back in their expenditures wherever possible. Any actual "in hand" dollars gained from such a cut-back in 1982 should be given to churchwide agencies over and above the amount the synod has agreed to contribute in apportionment during that same period of time, and,
- b. that one-half of the difference between the churchwide agencies' requests for 1983 and the amount the synod would project to be its actual apportionment contribution (based on anticipated income) should be included in Level I of the budget, and the remainder of Level II, and,
- c. that the full amount of churchwide agencies' apportionment request shall be included in Level I of the 1984 budget, and every year thereafter.

The motion was ADOPTED.

#### b. 1983 Budget Proposal (BR, pp. 150-152, 165)

Mr. Harry Arne, Chairman of the Finance Committee of the Executive Board, presented the board's recommendation regarding the 1983 program budget.

Secretary David Martin moved the following recommendation that:

the program budget for 1983 be adopted as printed in the Bulletin of Reports.

#### The motion was ADOPTED.

#### c. Churchwide agencies, agreement with

Secretary David Martin moved the following recommendation that:

the North Carolina Synod provide support for church-wide agencies in 1983 in the amount of \$1,101,950 plus one-half of all apportionment receipts over the Level I total of \$2,433,200 of the 1983 North Carolina Synod Program Budget.

#### The motion was ADOPTED.

#### d. 1983 Apportionment Formula for congregations

Mr. James A. Chesky presented the recommendation for the 1983 apportionment formula.

A motion was made that:

#### the 1983 Apportionment Formula be adopted as follows:

In calculating the 1983 Per Capita Apportionment that the 46 congregations with less than 100 Confirmed, Communing or Contributing (CCC) Members with a 6.85% of the Synod's CCC membership have that percentage reduced one-half to 3.43%, that the 20 congregations with 100-124 CCC's with 4.69% of the Synod's CCC's have that percentage reduced one-third to 3.13%, that the 13 congregations with 125-149 CCC's with 3.76% of the Synod's CCC's have that percentage reduced one-fourth to 2.81% and that the 99 congregations with 200 or more CCC's with 73.19% of the Synod's CCC's, have that percentage increased by 5.92% to 79.11%.

#### The motion was ADOPTED.

#### 9. Report of Committee on Ecumenical Affairs (BR, p. 170)

The Rev. Terry W. Agner, Chairman, presented the report of the committee and called attention to the forthcoming Lutheran Church in America recommendations on formal recognition of the Episcopal Church. He presented Dr. Charles Dickson, who in turn presented the Rev. Ronald H. Haines, Deputy to the Bishop of the Western North Carolina Diocese of the Episcopal Church. Father Haines brought greetings to the convention. Also the Rev. Randy Ferebee, pastor of St. Alban's Episcopal Church, Hickory, and Ecumenical Officer of the Western N. C. Diocese of the Episcopal Church, brought greetings.

Bishop Misenheimer stated that the reports of the N.C. Council of Churches, the N.C. Lutheran Church Women and N.C. Lutheran Men would be referred to the Committee on Reference and Counsel to be considered under Unfinished Business.

#### 10. Committee on Conduct of Elections

The Rev. John R. Jones, III, made announcements regarding election procedures.

#### Point of Personal Privilege —

The Rev. Ronald W. Fink requested that Chaplain Perry ask God's guidance in the synod elections and that the convention observe a period of silent prayer.

#### 12. SPECIAL ORDER — CLOSING DEVOTIONS 11:30 a.m.

Chaplain Richard J. Perry, Jr., used the Responsive Prayer II from *The Lutheran Book of Worship* in the closing devotions, basing his meditation on I Peter 1:3-10 and speaking on being "Born Anew for Suffering: A Christian experiencing inclusive ministry."

The convention was recessed.

#### **FOURTH MEETING**

Friday Afternoon, June 4, 1982 — 1:45 to 5:30 p.m.

- 1. Opening Prayer Chaplain Richard J. Perry, Jr. opened the meeting with prayer.
- Call to Order Bishop Misenheimer called the meeting to order and presided.
  - 3. Report of the Committee on Reference and Counsel

The Rev. Charles Zimmerman moved the following recommendations:

- 1) That we begin the afternoon session with the three items of Unfinished Business from the Third Meeting:
  - a. Greetings from the North Carolina Council of Churches
  - b. Greetings from the N.C. Unit of the Lutheran Church Women
  - c. Report of N.C. Lutheran Men
- 2) That the resolution on Namibia and the Resolution on the Voting Rights Act be considered with the report of the Committee on Justice and Social Change.

The motions were ADOPTED.

#### 4. Greetings from North Carolina Council of Churches

The Rev. Collins Kilburn, Executive Director of the North Carolina Council of Churches, greeted the convention and called attention to the defeat of the Equal Rights Amendment in North Carolina and to the movement for peace and nuclear disarmament. He expressed appreciation to the N.C. Synod for its support and paid tribute to Bishop Misenheimer and the synod's Committee on Ecumenical Affairs. The Rev. Karl M. Park of Grace, Hendersonville reported on LARC (Lutheran, Anglican, Roman Catholic) organization which was engaged in dialogue in his community.

#### 5. Lutheran Church Women, North Carolina Unit (BR, pp. 248-250)

Mrs. Sarah Ingle, President of the North Carolina Unit of Lutheran Church Women, highlighted the six functions of the LCW, especially noting their study on economics. She reported on the N.C. Unit Convention held May 23-30, 1982, at Lenoir-Rhyne College. She then introduced Mrs. Marie Mauney who presented and moved the following resolution on commercialism, adopted at the Convention of the North Carolina Unit of Lutheran Church Women, May 29, 1982:

#### Recommendation on Commercialism in the Church

WHEREAS, the North Carolina Unit of Lutheran Church Women in convention on May 29, 1982 adopted a resolution affirming its position in support of the 1964 Lutheran Church in America statement on commercialism, and

WHEREAS, commercialism, the selling of goods or services in the name of the church, vitiates the clear relationship between the giving of the Christian and the mission of the church and further weakens the life of the church and a true sense of stewardship.

#### BE IT THEREFORE RESOLVED:

That this convention of the North Carolina Synod of the Lutheran Church in America affirm its belief in the position reflected in the 1964 Lutheran Church in America statement, a position which opposes the use of commercialism, and,

That this convention affirm its commitment to emphasize the importance of direct giving as the Christian's real expression of stewardship, and,

That the Bishop of the Synod take steps to see that all congregations are again informed concerning the statement on commercialism, and that they are educated to dangers of the practice of commercialism and to the joy of giving as a direct response to God's goodness.

The motion was ADOPTED.

#### 6. Report of the North Carolina Lutheran Men (BR, p. 251)

Mr. Ed Martin, President of North Carolina Lutheran Men, called attention to their report and commented about programs and projects for the year. He recognized two of their members, the Rev. Walter N. Yount, D.D., immediate past Executive Director of the N.C. Lutheran Men, and Mr. Harold M. McKnight, D.D. He introduced the Rev. John W. Cobb, D.D., present Executive Director of Lutheran Men, who reported on achievements of the organization and presented Mr. David Beam, Treasurer, who told the convention of the work of the Home Mission Foundation with mission congregations in North Carolina. Mr. Carl Webb, Treasurer of the Loan and Gift Fund, announced gifts to be given to ordinands and new pastors for building their personal libraries.

## 7. PRESENTATION OF THE CHURCHWIDE AGENCIES REPRESENTATIVE, THE REV. JOHN L. YOST, JR., D.D.

The Rev. John L. Yost, Jr., D.D. brought greetings from LCA Bishop James R. Crumley, Jr., D.D. and from the LCA, and noted that the North Carolina Synod was well represented in LCA affairs by many of its members and by its benevolence contributions to the Church. He commented about imperative needs in the Church and emphasized that the Gospel of Jesus Christ was (1) Personal through evangelism and witness; (2) Wonderful through its growth in unity and ecumenism; and (3) Commanding for social services and justice.

**8. Convo Comments** — Bishop Misenheimer recognized representatives of Youth Convo who presented a musical tribute to the Bishop.

#### 1. Opening Prayers

Chaplain Richard J. Perry, Jr. led the convention in opening prayers.

Call to Order — Bishop Misenheimer called the meeting to order and presided.

#### 3. Report of the Committee on Reference and Counsel

The Rev. Charles Zimmerman, chairman, moved the rollowing recommendations that:

- a. the Cabinet for Parish Services be permitted to finish their report at the beginning of this session after the report of the Committee on Reference and Counsel. ADOPTED.
- b. the report of the Progress Committee on the Camping and Conference Ministries be considered under Unfinished Business. ADOPTED.
- c. N.C. Synod Constitution Article Two, Section III, proposed amendment of: the Proposed amendment of Article Two, Section III, paragraph 1 of the Constitution of the North Carolina Synod be placed on notice as follows:

That Article Two, Section III, re: Convention representation, paragraph 1, be amended by making the last sentence a new paragraph 2 and in its place in paragraph 1 adding the following sentence: "The lay officers of

the synod shall be counted as additional delegates from their respective congregations," so that the amendment would read:

- \*1. The voting body at conventions shall consist of delegates from each congregation and the ordained ministers on the clergy roll. The lay officers of synod shall be counted as additional delegates from their respective congregations.

Pastor Milholland presented the ordinands to the convention and Bishop Misenheimer congratulated each of them.

Dr. John W. Cobb, Executive Director of North Carolina Lutheran Men, presented to each ordinand a \$100 check to be used for building a personal library.

Chairman Milholland announced that since the last convention of synod two lay professionals had been certified:

Miss Edie Hockspeier, a member of First, Albemarle, certified as a Lay Professional, Level II, Director of Church Music, and Miss Linda Kay Kaelke, a member of First, Greensboro, certified as a Lay Professional, Level I, Director of Christian Education and Youth Ministry.

He stated that these two lay professionals would be recognized later in the meeting.

### COMMITTEE FOR PROFESSIONAL SERVICE — (BR, pp. 172-177)

M.2.a. To provide opportunities for orientation into synodical life for newly received ordained ministers, other professional leaders, and their spouses.

### Recommendation 2:

that Item M.2.d. of Section VI of the By-Laws be amended by adding the plural suffix S to the word, leader, so that this item would read:

M.2.d. To evaluate and recommend programs of continuing education to the professional leaders of the synod.

### Recommendation 3:

that Item M.2.g. of Section VI of the By-Laws be amended by deleting (pulpit) and (professional), and adding CALL and PERSONNEL so that this item would read:

M.2.g. To conduct research each year to keep the professional leaders' salaries current and to provide such information as a resource to the Bishop of Synod, call and personnel committees, and church councils.

### Recommendation 4

that Section VI of the By-Laws be amended by adding the following new Item M.2.j. (new) that would read as follows:

M.2.j. To provide support for pastors, lay professionals and their families in seeking pastoral evaluation, consultation or psychotherapy on an individual, marital or family therapy basis from appropriately credentialed pastoral counselors engaged by the Synod.

Pastor Franzen moved that the above By-Law amendments be PLACED ON NOTICE.

The Rev. Aaron Lippard gave information about the 1982 Fall Convocation for Pastors and Lay Professionals of the North Carolina Synod to be held at Lutheridge on September 27-29, 1982.

Mrs. Martha Yount presented the synod's Certified Lay Professionals to the convention and introduced the following who were certified during the past year:

### Salaries and Housing Guidelines

The Rev. David Franzen moved the following recommendations concerning compensation for pastors and lay professionals on behalf of the committee:

### Recommendation 1:

that the following table be approved as a guideline for base salary and housing in congregations with over 120 confirmed, communing, contributing members where no parsonage is provided:

The committee suggests that where a congregation's current operating expense budget is less than \$30,000 that the congregation cannot adequately support full-time professional leadership and should seek an alternative to full-time professional leadership.

The Rev. Frank Ebert moved that the recommendation be amended by deleting the paragraph "The committee suggests that where a congregation's current operating expense budget is less than \$30,000 that the congregation cannot adequately support full-time professional leadership and should seek an alternative to full-time professional leadership."

The motion to amend was ADOPTED.

The recommendation as amended was ADOPTED.

Recommendation 3: That the following be approved as a guideline:

Minimum salary for use of the sustentation committee or for use in special situations as determined by the American Missions Committee:

With housing allowance .... 17,600 With parsonage ..... 14,100

The motion was ADOPTED.

Recommendation 4: Staff Ministry: That the following be approved:

The guidelines as established in Recommendation 1 above should be used in determining adequate compensation for each pastor involved in staff ministry.

The lead pastor should be compensated at the appropriate guideline category. Other pastors in the staff ministry should be compensated AT NO LESS THAN the category shown in Recommendation 1 which equals 50% of the congregation's current operating budget. In recognition of the value of experience, the salary level shown in the guidelines in Recommendation 1 should be increased by 1% for each year of experience up to twenty-five (25) years.

The motion was ADOPTED.

Recommendation 5: That the following guidelines be approved:

Level I full time, certified lay professional compensation should be equivalent to the tenure based salary — annualized to cover twelve (12)

months — of a public school teacher with a Bachelors degree holding an A certificate.

Level II full time, certified professional compensation should be equivalent to the tenure based salary — annualized to cover twelve (12) months — of a public school teacher with a Masters degree holding an A certificate.

Level I and Level II full time, certified lay professionals should be reimbursed for required business mileage at the prevailing IRS rate allowed and should be given a minimum of two (2) weeks paid vacation.

The motion was ADOPTED.

7. Retired Pastors, compensation policy, recommendation on

The Rev. K. Y. Huddle moved the following recommendation:

WHEREAS retired pastors provide a valuable service to the congregations of the Synod in supplying worship leadership to vacant congregations, and

WHEREAS most of our retired pastors during years of service received minimum salaries and now live on fixed incomes that may not be adequate to meet their needs and depend on supply work to supplement their incomes, and

WHEREAS retired pastors must maintain vehicles adequately to travel to and from supply assignments, and

WHEREAS there is a growing concern among some retired pastors that compensation for both services rendered to congregations and travel expenses is not adequate

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED THAT:

- 1. The Committee for Professional Service study the present policies for compensation for supply services and travel expenses as soon as it is feasible, and make recommendations to the executive board regarding these policies to be effective for the remainder of 1982 and through the 1983 convention, and,
- 2. That the Professional Service Committee recommend to the 1983 Convention, and annually thereafter, a policy for minimum adequate compensation for supply work and travel expenses to be paid by congregations which must be honored by congregations requesting such services, and
- 3. That the Committee for Professional Service consider proposing a bylaw which would make this matter an annual responsibility of the Professional Service Committee.

The motion was ADOPTED.

### 6. Unfinished Business

(a) Parish Life and Ministry Development, By-Laws, Section VI, amendment of

The Rev. Don M. Michael moved on behalf of the Parish Life and Ministry Development Task Force:

- a. That a Committee on Parish Life and Ministry Development be established.
- b. That the By-laws, Section VI Other Committees, be amended by adding new Item Q Parish Life and Ministry Development
  - 1. This committee shall be the advocacy group for the use of Parish Life and Ministry resources and programs in the Synod in partnership with the Division for Parish Services of the church.
  - 2. This committee shall also advocate and assist in the identification, recruitment, training and support of volunteers for ministry in congregations, the Synod and Churchwide agencies.
- c. That the By-Laws, Section VI, new item R, Cabinets, be amended by

inserting after Music and Worship the words, Parish Life and Ministry Development.

The motion was ADOPTED.

The above By-Law amendment was PLACED ON NOTICE.

The motion was ADOPTED.

### 4. To Inform Potential Delegates, resolution on

that the convention receive as information and refer to congregations for study the Resolution to Inform Potential Delegates as follows:

### WHEREAS

The church derives its character and powers both from the sanction and representation of its congregations and ministers and from its inherent nature as an expression of the broader fellowship of the faithful, and

### WHEREAS:

The congregations retain authority except as otherwise delegated in the Constitution and By-Laws;

### BE IT RESOLVED:

- 1. that a description of service as a conventional delegate be announced at the annual meeting and in the annual yearbook, and at least twice within the congregation's newsletters, preceding the election of delegates by the church council.
- 2. If there are more responses than the permitted number of delegates, the church council's secret ballot will make the decision. There shall be a drawing in case of a tie.
- 3. If the convention agenda is available to congregations prior to the convention, at least 2 hours (perhaps Sunday School time) be spent in discussion of questions to come before the convention, in order to give the elected delegates congregational input.
- 4. The Sunday of the synodical convention be declared "Lay Sunday" so preparations may be made for the absence of pastors.
- 5. Delegates are to report on convention activities to their congregations on the following Sunday.
- 6. Facts, figures, and functions of the L.C.A. be publicized in the congregations continuously to stimulate interest and involvement in the mission of the Church. (This could best be accomplished by promotion of the church's publications, such as "The Lutheran.")
- 7. That special prayers be requested of all parishioners for all delegates and ministers who will make the decisions for the L.C.A.

The motion was ADOPTED.

### 5. Equal Rights Amendment, resolution on

That the convention receive without recommendation from the Committee on Reference and Counsel a resolution regarding the Equal Rights Amendment as follows:

WHEREAS, the Lutheran Church in America, the North Carolina Synod of the Lutheran Church in America, Lutheran Church Women, and the North Carolina Unit of the Lutheran Church Women have at various times since 1972 endorsed ratification of the Equal Rights Amendment to the Constitution of the United States; and

WHEREAS, word of these endorsements has been sent on several occasions to the Legislators in both the House and Senate of the North Carolina Legislature, as well as to the Governor, and

WHEREAS, the issue of the rights of all people under the law without regard to sex is an issue that will not go away, and

WHEREAS, the North Carolina Senate has chosen to evade the issue by a parliamentary device, so that full debate was denied, thus also denying one of the major reasons for the existence of the legislature;

### THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED THAT:

The North Carolina Synod of the Lutheran Church in America, in Convention in Hickory, NC, on Saturday, June 5, 1982, express its regret and disappointment that the State Senate has by its action chosen to endorse the continuation of sexually discriminatory laws that exist nationwide; and

### BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED THAT:

Word of this regret and disappointment be sent by Bishop Misenheimer to the Governor, the Lieutenant-Governor, and each member of the North Carolina State Senate.

The Rev. Richard B. Graf, Jr., moved

that the convention consider the Equal Rights Resolution, ADOPTED.

Pastor Graf made a motion that:

### the convention adopt the ERA Resolution.

A motion to consider the previous question was **DEFEATED**.

The Rev. Richard E. Boye requested a secret ballot to vote on whether or not to consider the previous question.

The vote to utilize the secret ballot was ADOPTED.

The concensus of the convention was in support of the procedure outlined by the Bishop to facilitate the secret ballot.

The resolution was ADOPTED, by a vote of 195 YES, 173 NO.

### 6. Peace, resolution on

That the convention refer the following Resolution on Peace to the Research and Strategy Task Force on Peace of the Social Ministry Committee for study:

WHEREAS leaders of nations in several areas of the world find it necessary to use force, threats of war, invasion, and sporadic retaliatory attacks.

WHEREAS representatives of the United States are often called on to be mediators.

WHEREAS as in the British-Argentine conflict it seems impossible for the United States to remain neutral.

### BE IT RESOLVED:

That the North Carolina Synod of LCA call on the leaders of our nation through our North Carolina Congressmen —

- 1. To use every peaceful means possible to end conflicts between nations of the world.
- 2. To re-direct our national priorities to encourage industries that are geared to production of life-giving systems rather than life-destroying systems.
- 3. To withhold aid, either in the form of military supplies, advice, or food, from countries engaged in military conquest; and

That this resolution be sent to the Senators and Representatives from North Carolina and a copy sent to the President of the United States.

The previous question was moved. ADOPTED.

The motion as recommended by the Committee on Reference and Counsel was ADOPTED.

Castor, Director of Outdoor Ministries, and the Rev. Robert L. Troutman, Executive Director of Lutheridge, reported on anticipated capital expansion and improvement at Kure Beach, Agape Camp and Conference Center, and Lutheridge.

### 6. Convo Comments

Convo youth provided a light drama regarding the Office of Bishop.

### 7. Presentation of the Churchwide Representative.

The Rev. John L. Yost, Jr., D.D. spoke on the subject of Lutheran Unity. He reminded the convention that the history of Lutherans is one of mergers. He pointed out that in unity Lutherans can make greater contributions and can have greater impact. He indicated that efforts toward unity would be put into action following an affirmative vote at the ALC, LCA, and AELC conventions in September and, if approved, the unity would be brought to fruition on January 1, 1988.

### 8. Report of Cabinet for Mission — (BR, pp. 210-247)

The Rev. James A. Harbinson, chairman of the Cabinet for Mission, referred the convention to the report of the Cabinet for Mission in the Bulletin of Reports. He highlighted his report with a slide presentation of the various ministries coming under his Cabinet. He introduced the chairpersons of the Cabinet for Mission committees which included the following committees and institutions:

WORLD MISSIONS (BR, p. 213) Mrs. Mary Emma Mauney, a member of the committee, reported on behalf of Mr. Vincent J. Vierling, chairman.

**ENVIRONMENTAL CONCERNS** (BR, p. 215) The Rev. Alfred Mullen, II, Chairman of the committee, commented on the committee's continuing emphasis on consultations with congregations on energy conservation.

**LUTHERAN WORLD RELIEF/WORLD HUNGER** (BR, p. 219) The Rev. Donald Deal, chairman, announced the World Hunger retreat to be held in 1983 and the Lifestyles Conference to be held September 10-12, 1982. The Rev. Kenneth W. Fink distributed the Nestle Boycott Update.

CAMPUS MINISTRY (BR, p. 214) Dr. Francis S. Binkowski, chairman of the committee and the Rev. Robert G. Walker, Southeastern Regional Director of National Lutheran Campus Ministry, spoke of the continuing development of campus ministry.

**AMERICAN MISSIONS** (BR, p. 211) The Rev. Boyce D. Whitener, chairman of the committee and Deployed Staff person in North and South Carolina for the DMNA reported on his new job description with the Division and new synod policies on the congregational sustentation program.

NORTH CAROLINA LUTHERAN HOMES (BR, p. 223) The Rev. Robert Q. Beard, executive Director of the Homes, reported the continuing development of the homes, especially with the anticipated expansion of the Albemarle Unit and introduced the Rev. J. Russell Myers, Jr., the new administrator of the Albemarle Unit; Ted W. Goins, Jr., Assistant to the Executive Director; and Ronald L. Bowman, Fiscal Manager for the Homes. Also, A. Job Kistler was recognized in his new position as Resource Developer for the Homes.

**LENOIR-RHYNE COLLEGE** (BR, p. 236) Dr. Albert Anderson, President of Lenoir-Rhyne College, presented the report speaking of the fiscal challenges facing small, private colleges.

**JUSTICE AND SOCIAL CHANGE** (BR, p. 216) The Rev. David A. Sloop, chairman of the committee, presented the report referring to resolutions from the committee to be presented at a later time.

LUTHERAN FAMILY SERVICES IN NORTH CAROLINA (BR, p. 244) Mr. Larry Parrish, Chairman of the Board of Trustees, presented the report. He introduced Mr. Bill Brittain, Executive Director, who spoke on continuing development of the Group Homes and the risks involved in this ministry. Mrs. Ginny Soberg-Rhyne, Director of Refugee Resettlement, presented to the convention Dr. August Bernthal, Chairman of the Lutheran Immigration and Refugee Service Standing Committee, and a former Vice-President of the Lutheran Church — Missouri Synod, who addressed the convention regarding the present refugee situation. On behalf of Lutheran Family Services, Chairman Parrish, presented a plaque to Bishop Misenheimer for his support of Lutheran Family Services.

The Rev. George Simmons moved: that the session be extended by 15 minutes to hear the comments of Dr. Bernthal.

The motion was ADOPTED.

### 11. Announcements and Closing Prayer

Bishop Misenheimer made announcements and Chaplain Richard J. Perry, Jr. led the convention in closing prayer.

The convention was recessed.

- 1. THE SERVICE OF REMEMBRANCE was led by Chaplain Richard J. Perry, Jr. In the prayers the convention remembered THE REV. DAVID F. JOHNSON, D.D.; THE REV. WAYNE MARTELL DAUBENSPECK; THE REV. CLARENCE E. NORMAN; THE REV. CURTIS K. WISE, JR; THE REV. JOHN L. MORGAN, D.D. and the 600 members of the North Carolina Synod who died. For biographical information on Pastors Johnson, Daubenspeck, Norman, Wise and Morgan, see 1982 PRO., pp. 294-299.
- 2. Call to Order Bishop Misenheimer called the convention to order and presided.
  - 3. Report of the Committee on Reference and Counsel

The Rev. Charles Zimmerman, chairman, presented the report including a letter of greetings from the Wisconsin-Upper Michigan Synod of the Lutheran Church in America meeting in convention June 3-5, 1982.

A motion was made that:

the Secretary of the N.C. Synod send greetings to the Ohio, Minnesota, and Wisconsin-Upper Michigan Synods; and to the American Lutheran Church meeting in convention at the same time as the N.C. Synod.

The motion was ADOPTED.

Chairman Zimmerman moved the following recommendations:

1. that the Report from the Committee on Justice and Social Change be heard under Unfinished Business in this session.

The motion was ADOPTED.

2. that the resolution on World Hunger be adopted as follows:

WHEREAS World Hunger is a continuing concern of our Synod and caring Christians everywhere, and

WHEREAS, being sensitive to this need three Pastors of the Synod, Charlie Hoyle, Fred Mitschke and David Sloop rode bicycles to this convention from Burlington, N.C., (a distance of 130 miles) to raise public consciousness to this need and encourage contributions to the Love Compels Action Appeal, and

WHEREAS, this effort deserves commendation beyond mere expressions of admiration and gratitude,

BE IT RESOLVED that persons attending this convention acknowledge the efforts of these pastors with an appropriate demonstration of appreciation and that they be encouraged to designate all, or at least a portion, of their reimbursement for travel for the L.C.A. World Hunger Appeal.

The resolution was ADOPTED.



THE REVEREND DAVID FRONTIS JOHNSON

The Reverend David Frontis Johnson, D.D., 64, died late Thursday evening, August 6, 1981 at Cabarrus County Memorial Hospital, Concord, North Carolina. He had been in rapidly declining health for the past few months. At the time of his death he was serving the Division for Mission in North America of the Lutheran Church in America as Regional Director serving North and South Carolina Synods of the Church. At the time of his death, the Johnsons were residing in Kannapolis, North Carolina.

The funeral service was held on Saturday, August 8, 1981 at 4:00 p.m. at Kimball Memorial Lutheran Church in Kannapolis where he was a member. The Rev. Ernest L. Misenheimer, D.D., Bishop of the North Carolina Synod of the Lutheran Church in America delivered the sermon; the Rev. Herman W. Cauble, D.D., Bishop of the South Carolina Synod of the Lutheran Church in America, and, the Rev. David R. Keck and the Rev. Palmer D. Clemmer, pastors of Kimball Memorial participated. Interment was held at Carolina Memorial Park in Concord, North Carolina. The graveside rites were conducted by the Rev. John M. Hawn, Dean of the Southern District.

Pastor Johnson was born on July 25, 1917, in Saluda County, South Carolina, the son of George Tolbert and Lida Mae (Denny) Johnson. He received his public schooling in the Columbia, South Carolina school system. Entering the University of South Carolina in Columbia, he graduated with an A.B. degree in 1938. Attending Lutheran Theological Southern Seminary in Columbia, South Carolina, he graduated with a B.D. degree in 1942. He received the honorary D.D. degree from Lenoir-Rhyne College in 1980. On August 16, 1942, Pastor Johnson married Eleanor Louise Weir of Columbia, South Carolina, the daughter of Charles David and Jessie Mae (Hedgepath) Weir of Columbia. The Johnsons have two sons: James David of Raleigh, North Carolina, and, John Foster of Boone, North Carolina.


Pastor Johnson was ordained into the Lutheran Ministry by the Evangelical Lutheran Synod of South Carolina on May 31, 1942 at Ebenezer Lutheran Church in Columbia, South Carolina, the Rev. Karl W. Kinard, D.D., President of the Synod presiding. Churches and positions served were: Gladesboro Parish, Hillsville, Virginia, 1942-47; St. Matthew's, Rowan County, North Carolina, 1947-52; Kure Memorial, Kure Beach, North Carolina, 1952-57; Kimball Memorial, Kannapolis, North Carolina, 1957-61; Mission Superintendent of the United Evangelical Synod of North Carolina, 1961-63; Regional Secretary of the Board of American Missions of the Lutheran Church in America, 1963-72; and, Regional Director of North and South Carolina of the Division for Mission in North America of the Lutheran Church in America, 1973 until his death.

During his ministry, Pastor Johnson served the church in numerous ways including service on the Rural Church Committee of the Virginia Synod, 1944-47; the Stewardship Committee of the North Carolina Synod, 1950-51; the Brotherhood

Award Committee of the Lutheran Brotherhood, 1956-60; a member of the Board of Trutees of the Loman Home in South Carolina, 1957-59; the Allocation Commission of the United Lutheran Church of America, 1959; the Mission Committee of the North Carolina Synod ULCA, 1960-62. He served as a member of the Commission on Town and Country and the Committee on Appalachia of the National Council of Church of Christ in the United States of America and an interdenominational Commission on Religion in Appalachia. He was a delegate to the Convention of the Lutheran Church in America in 1960 and 1962; served on the North Carolina Synod Committee on Architecture and Fine Arts, 1971-72 and the President's Task Force on the Priority Program beginning in 1970. For over nineteen yeas until his death he served as an LCA representative to the Region Five Consultation of the Lutheran Council in the USA. In his mission executive position he served as a building consultant for over 80 building programs, organized approximately 70 mission congregations, purchased approximately 70 church sites and 70 parsonages. From 1963-71 he served in the capacity as regional secretary for Southeastern Synod. In his work he was affectionately known as the man who wore three hats: building consultant, real estate broker and DMNA Regional Director. Part of his work was with the office of Administration and Finance of the church. Also, he served as chairman and member of the North Carolina and South Carolina Inner Faith Committees.

Pastor Johnson had contributed several feature stories in *The Lutheran* magazine, published several stories in "Deaf-Mute Publications" and was selected as one of the four Civitan lecturers for the East Coast Air Force Spiritual Life Conference in 1959. Pastor Johnson taught Deaf-Mute sign language classes and conducted public worship for the deaf in sign language during his ministry.

At the time of his death, Pastor Johnson was survived by his mother, Lida Mae Johnson/Plexico, his wife Eleanor; two sons, James and John and half brother, the Rev. T. C. Plexico of Concord.





The Reverend Wayne Martell Daubenspeck, 76, died on Wednesday morning, August 19, 1981. He suffered a heart attack and collapsed at his home and died at Cabarrus Memorial Hospital. He had been in declining health two months and had just returned home from a three week stay in Cabarrus Memorial Hospital the day prior to his heart attack. Pastor and Mrs. Daubenspeck were living in retirement in Kannapolis at the time of his death.

The funeral service for Pastor Daubenspeck was held Monday, August 24 at 11:00 a.m. at St. David's Lutheran Church, Kannapolis. Dr. Ernest L. Misenheimer, Bishop of the North Carolina Synod officiating, and, the Rev. Christine Bohr, pastor of St. David's and the Rev. George R. Whittecar, past President of the North Carolina Synod, assisted. Interment was held in National Cemetery in Salisbury with full-military rites.

Pastor Daubenspeck was born November 25, 1904, at Selinsgrove, Pennsylvania, the son of the Rev. Lloyd Mashine and Della A. (Burns) Daubenspeck. He received his public schooling in the Selinsgrove, Pennsylvania school system, graduating from Mifflinburg High School in 1923. Entering Susquehanna University at Selinsgrove that same year, he graduated with an A.B. degree in 1927; and a B.D. degree in 1930. On July 15, 1931, Pastor Daubenspeck married Ethel Mason of Meyersdale, Pennsylvania at Omaha, Nebraska (died December 17, 1973). They had three children: Richard Edward, Ruth Elizabeth, and Henry Mason.

Pastor Daubenspeck was ordained into the Gospel ministry in the Lutheran Church on May 15, 1930 by the Central Pennsylvania Synod at Berwick, Pennsylvania. He served the following churches: St. Mark, Oshkosh, Nebraska, 1930-35; St. David, Kannapolis, 1964-69. Chaplaincy Service: U.S. Army, Nebraska CCC, 1936-38; U.S. Penal System, Lewisburg, Pennsylvania, and Narcotics Prison at Ft. Leavenworth, Kansas, 1938-40; U.S. Army with service in Alaska and Europe, 1940-54, retiring from the reserves in 1964 as a Colonel; Service pastor, Lutheran Service Commission, in Japan and Korea, 1954-65. He chose the Kannapolis parish over opportunities in other states from California to Florida. He supplied various congregations 1970-78 and served as Chaplain, Veterans of Foreign Wars, 1967-76 and again in 1978.

Pastor Daubenspeck was honored and awarded the Army Bronze Star and seven service medals; Veterans of Foreign Wars — Six Community Service Awards; Lutheran Service Commission — Citation; National Lutheran Council — Citation; Pastor Emeritus, Parish of St. David, Kannapolis, North Carolina. He is listed in Who's Who in the South and Southwest; Personalities of the South; Two Thousand Men of Achievement; Men of Achievement; Community Leaders and Noteworthy Americans; Notable Americans of the Bicentennial Era; Life Sketches of Lutheran Ministers in North Carolina; and Dictionary of International Biography, Book of Honor.

At the time of his death, he was survived by his wife, Mrs. Christine Dunn Daubenspeck; two sons, Richard Daubenspeck of Annandale, Virginia and Henry Daubenspeck of London, England; a daughter, Mrs. Ruth Kistler of Vienna, Virginia; two step-sons, Joe Allman of Landis and Gary Allman of Gastonia; four grandchildren; three step-grandchildren.

### THE REVEREND CLARENCE EDWARD NORMAN


The Reverend Clarence Edward Norman, 89, died Wednesday afternoon, September 23, 1981, at the Salisbury Unit of the North Carolina Lutheran Homes where he had been a resident for three months. He had been in declining health for the past few years.

The funeral service for Pastor Norman was held Saturday, September 26, 1981 at 11:00 a.m. at Holy Trinity Lutheran Church, Raleigh, where he was a member. The Rev. Stephen P. Gerhard and the Rev. Deal R. Lingle, pastors at Holy Trinity, the Rev. John W. Cobb, D.D., retired, former pastor of Holy Trinity, and the Rev. David L. Martin, Secretary and Minister for Professional Leadership of the North Carolina Synod participated. Interment was held at Mount Lawn Cemetery, Raleigh immediately following the service.



Pastor Norman was born on March 12, 1892, at Prosperity, South Carolina, the son of Victor Louis and Nina Gustelle (Wheeler) Norman. He received his public school education in Charleston and Walhalla, South Carolina, and Concord, North Carolina. Entering the University of North Carolina in 1908, he graduated in 1912 with an A.B. degree. After teaching math for two years in public high school, he entered Lutheran Theological Southern Seminary graduating with a B.D. degree in 1917. He attended graduate school at the Kennedy School of Missions in Hartford, Connecticut, 1924. On June 20, 1917, Pastor Norman married Lottie Lee Wyse of Columbia, South Carolina, the daughter of Allen Melanchthon and Marilla Elizabeth (Riser) Wyse. The Normans had two children, Mrs. Rebecca Leager of Raleigh, North Carolina, and Mrs. Kathryn Howell of Athens, Georgia; five grandchildren and one great grandchild.

Pastor Norman was ordained into the Lutheran ministry by the Evangelical Lutheran Synod and Ministerium of North Carolina on May 13, 1917 at First Lutheran Church, Albemarle, North Carolina, the Rev. C. A. Brown, D.D., President presiding. He served as a Missionary in Juomomoto and Fukuoka, Japan for the General Council, 1917-18, and for the United Lutheran Church of America, 1918-33. During this missionary ministry he served as managing director of the Interdenominational Office of Newspaper and Correspondence Evangelism, Fukuoka, 1925-31; and Treasurer of the Japan Lutheran Mission for several years. Returning to the states in 1933, he served the rest of his active ministry in North Carolina: Holy Trinity, Raleigh, 1933-49 and as pastor to Lutheran students in Raleigh colleges. (Also supplied services to Lutherans in Goldsboro prior to the development of Good Shepherd); St. Luke, Monroe and Morning Star, Matthews, 1949-54; St. Luke, Monroe only, 1954-61. Retired, 1961 at Cary, North Carolina. Member and secretary, Board of Southern Seminary, 1938-47. Contributed sermon "The Secrets of Greatness" to "Victim or Victor?" (Lenten Sermons ULPH). In retirement he supplied churches from Mt. Holly to Atlantic Beach, Compiled, under direction and with cooperation of Committee on Historical Work, most of the sketches in "Life Sketches of Lutheran Ministers", N.C.-Tennessee Synods — 1773-1965.



THE REVEREND CURTIS KERR WISE, JR.

The Reverend Curtis Kerr Wise, Jr., 49, died Saturday morning, November 21, 1981 at the Salisbury Unit of the North Carolina Lutheran Homes. He had been in declining health for the past few years. At the time of his death Pastor Wise had been retired by reason of disability and his family was living in Concord.

The funeral service for Pastor Wise was held on Monday, November 23, 1981 at 11:00 a.m. at Mt. Olive Lutheran Church, Mt. Pleasant. The Reverend Ernest L. Misenheimer, D.D., Bishop of the North Carolina Synod of the Lutheran Church in America preached and presided. The Reverend Richard Dorton, Pastor of Mt. Olive Lutheran Church, Mt. Pleasant and the Reverend Donald Deal, Pastor of Holy Trinity Lutheran Church, Mt. Pleasant assisted. Interment was held in Oakwood Cemetery in Concord immediately following the service.

Pastor Wise was born on August 14, 1932 in Richland County, South Carolina, the son of the Reverend Curtis K. and Ruby Caroline (Ropp) Wise, Sr. He received his preparatory schooling in Columbia, South Carolina. Entering Newberry College in 1950, he was graduated from there in 1954 with a B.A. degree. He graduated from Lutheran Theological Southern Seminary with a B.D. degree in 1957. On April 25, 1959, Pastor Wise married Martha Ann Bost, the daughter of Buford Stephen and Mary (Ridenhour) Bost from Concord, North Carolina. The Wises have three children: Teresa Ann, Stephen Curtis, and Maria Elizabeth, all living at home.

Pastor Wise was ordained into the Gospel ministry on June 9, 1957 by the United Evangelical Lutheran Synod of North Carolina at St. Mark's Lutheran Church, Charlotte, North Carolina, the Rev. F. L. Conrad, D.D., President of the synod presiding. Pastor Wise served his entire ministry in North Carolina: Cold Water-St. Martin, Cabarrus County 1957-58; Amity, Iredell County 1959-63; Mt. Olive-St. Stephens, Cabarrus County 1963-68; Trinity, Vale 1968-72; Philadelphia, Dallas 1972-74; and, Mt. Gilead, Mt. Pleasant 1974 until his retirement in 1981.

Pastor Wise was active in community work during his ministry having served as a Chaplain to the Concord Optimist Club and holding numerous offices in both Lutheran and interdenominational ministerial associations.

At the time of his death, Pastor Wise was survived by his wife, Martha, three sisters, Mrs. Curtis Derrick of Columbia, SC; Mrs. Eugene Benbow of Raleigh, NC, and, Mrs. Theodore Thuesen of Hickory, NC; and, three children.

### THE REVEREND JOHN LUTHER MORGAN, D.D.

The Rev. John Luther Morgan, D.D., 97, died Tuesday evening, April 6, 1982, at the Salisbury Unit of the North Carolina Lutheran Homes. He had been in declining health for the past year. At the time of his death, he and Mrs. Morgan were residents of the Salisbury Home.

The funeral service for Pastor Morgan was held on Thursday, April 8, 1982 at 2:00 p.m. at St. Matthew's Lutheran Church, Rowan County. The Rev. Ernest L. Misenheimer, D.D., Bishop of the North Carolina Synod of the Lutheran Church in America presided. The Rev. David L. Martin, Minister for Professional Leadership and Secretary of the North Carolina Synod and the Rev. F. Curtis Morehead, Vice-pastor at St. Matthew's, Rowan County assisted. Interment was held at Rowan Memorial Park immediately following the service.



Pastor Morgan was born on April 3, 1885, in Rowan County, North Carolina, the son of Moses L. and Julia Ann Elizabeth "Betty" (nee Morgan) Morgan. He received his elementary schooling in Rowan County. Entering Lenoir College (now Lenoir-Rhyne), he graduated with an A.B. degree in 1913. That year he entered Lutheran Theological Southern Seminary, Columbia, South Carolina, graduating in 1916. From 1913-15 he pursued graduate study at the University of South Carolina in Columbia. In 1959 he received the honorary D.D. degree from Lenoir-Rhyne College, Hickory, North Carolina. On January 23, 1918, Pastor Morgan married Annie Louise Lowman of Batesburg, Lexington County, South Carolina. Dr. and Mrs. Morgan had four children: three sons, John L. Morgan, Jr. of Chapel Hill; Vc:gt F. Morgan of Burlington; and the Rev. Paul L. Morgan, D.D., Pastor of Christ Lutheran Church, Roanoke, Virginia; and, one daughter, Mrs. Miriam Elizabeth Deal, the wife of the Rev. Harold G. Deal, Pastor of Luther Place, Washington, D.C.

Pastor Morgan was ordained into the Gospel ministry on May 14, 1916 by the Evangelical Lutheran Synod and Ministerium of North Carolina at St. James Lutheran Church, Concord, North Carolina, the Rev. C. A. Brown, D.D., President of the Synod presiding. Dr. Morgan served all of his ministry in North Carolina: St. Michael, Troutman, Iredell County (merger with St. Martin, 1923, under the name Holy Trinity)-St. Paul, Amity, Iredell County Parish, 1916-27; Supplied, Lebanon, Rowan County, 1925; Holy Trinity, Charlotte, 1928-34; Faith, Faith, Rowan County, 1934-36; Frieden's-Sharon-Peace Parish, Gibsonville, 1936-43; Lutheran Chapel, Gastonia, 1943-47; Zion-New Bethel-Luther Parish, Richfield, 1947-53; Sardis, Catawba County, 1954-57; and first pastor, Our Saviour, Dallas, 1958-61 of which he was elected Pastor Emeritus in 1962. He and Mrs. Morgan retired in Richfield, North Carolina in 1961 residing there until they became residents at the Salisbury Unit of the North Carolina Lutheran Homes in 1978.

Pastor Morgan was affectionately entitled "The Builder" having been pastor and assisted in building of six church edifaces and three parsonages, worked on eight other churches and three parsonages, and, improved over 13 cemeteries.

During his ministry he served the synod as President of the Western Conference, a member of the Board of Trustees of Lenoir-Rhyne College, the synod's Ministerial Committee, the Examining Committee, the Board of Trustees of the North Carolina Lutheran Homes, and, Archivist of the synod.

At the time of his death Pastor Morgan was survived by his wife Louise, their four children, fourteen grandchildren, and, twelve great-grandchildren.

3. That the resolution on Refugee Resettlement be adopted as follows:

WHEREAS the government in Poland is oppressing people through imprisonment, persecution, and absence of basic levels of liberty forcing many Polish people to flee to Austria and seek refugee status,

WHEREAS our Lord has commissioned us to reach out to "the stranger in our midst" in providing shelter, clothing, food and care,

WHEREAS the Lutheran Church in America has committed itself through convention and urging of the Bishop of the Church to refugee ministry through congregational sponsorships.

WHEREAS Lutheran Family Services, Refugee Resettlement Program offers coordination services, support and expertise in a refugee ministry of hope,

BE IT RESOLVED that the North Carolina Synod of the Lutheran Church in America in convention ask its Social Ministry Committee to challenge each individual congregation in the synod to sponsor a Polish refugee family alone or with another congregation.

The resolution was ADOPTED.

4. that the resolution on Human Services be adopted as follows:

WHEREAS the Reagan Administration's proposed budget for fiscal year 1983 will reduce most forms of federal aid to needy Americans, especially

- 1. Those willing and able to work but unable to find jobs or to acquire training for more skilled jobs to support themselves and their dependents.
- 2. Those unable to work and needing governmental financial help to support themselves and their families.
- 3. The poorly housed, and
- 4. The medically deprived; and

WHEREAS if Congress agrees to the Administration's proposals, the Aid to Families with Dependent Children Program will be cut by \$2.2 billion, Job Training Programs by \$2.6 billion, Unemployment Compensation by over \$2 billion and the Medicaid Program by \$1.8 billion (IMPACT "Special 'Budget' Issues" paper, March, 1982); and WHEREAS the "New Federalism" of the present Administration will work only in so far as State and local communities act responsibly in allocating the block grants and mobilizing the private and volunteer sectors to respond to the needs of the local communities, and

WHEREAS the Lutheran Church in America has in its social statements declared that "justice requires that the state promote the general welfare, further the well being of every citizen, and secure equal opportunity for full development of all its citizens"... and ... "that the state provide means for self-fulfillment to those who cannot because of circumstances provide for themselves". (The Church and Social Welfare, adopted by the Fourth Biennial

Convention, June 19-27, 1968): and that.

"we approve of declarations . . . of public policy . . . which seek to eliminate the paradox of poverty in the midst of plenty and further seek to open to everyone opportunities for education and training, for work, and for living in decency and dignity".

(Poverty, adopted by the Third Biennial Convention, June, 1966);

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the North Carolina Synod in convention

 Call upon its pastors, congregations, and individual members to communicate immediately with their elected U.S. Senators and Representatives voicing their concern that adequate human services be maintained in the 1983 fiscal budget.

- 2. Directs its Bishop to communicate to the N.C. Congressional delegation this synod's support for the continuation of programs that provide adequate human services and assistance for its citizens who, because of circumstances often beyond their control, cannot provide for themselves.
- 3. Calls upon pastors, congregations, and individual members to be innovative and creative in our response to this call from God and from our government and to increase our efforts in our state and local communities to meet the needs of these citizens through church and community sponsored ministries that are in accord with the mission of the church.

Mr. Robert O. Klepfer, Jr. moved that the resolution be amended by deleting whereas 2, 3, and 4 and by deleting 1 and 2 of the resolves.

The Rev. T. C. Plexico moved that the proposed amendment be amended by deleting the phrase "Reagan Administration's" in the first sentence and by deleting the words "will reduce" also in the first sentence and inserting the words "may eliminate".

The motion to amend the amendment was **DEFEATED**.

The Rev. John Nagle moved all previous questions. ADOPTED.

The proposed amendment was **DEFEATED**.

The motion to adopt the resolution was **DEFEATED**.

The Rev. Timothy Sims moved that the previous resolution be restudied. The motion to restudy was **DEFEATED**.

- Dr. Yost responded to questions presented to him in writing by convention delegates, many of them relative to Lutheran Unity.
  - Dr. John W. Cobb moved a Sense Motion as follows:

that the North Carolina Synod of the Lutheran Church in America request the committee on Lutheran Unity to include in its planning for a new church provision for auxiliaries for men, women, and youth at each level of its organizational structure.

The motion was ADOPTED.

- 6. Report of the Executive Board, continued
  - a. Historical Works Committee, Records Management and Archives, sense motion

The Rev. John Nagle, member of the Executive Board, moved that the resolution on Records and Archives be sent as a sense motion to the Committee on Lutheran Unity of the LCA:

Whereas records management and archival work have been and are being done throughout the Lutheran Church in America by dedicated individuals in congregations, synods and churchwide agencies, and

Whereas records management and archival work are essential aspects of the church's ministry, and

Whereas records management and archival work are acknowledged as an integral part of good administrative practice, and especially important in light of the increasing volume of records being created and received at all levels of the church, and

Whereas records management and archival work despite all present efforts, are inadequate to protect and safeguard our heritage,

Therefore Be It Resolved that the North Carolina Synod inform the Lutheran Unity Committee, meeting in New York this month, that it is the sense of this Convention that an efficient records management and archives system should be established as a priority for the new church that commits us:

- a. to excellence in this ministry;
- b. to study the role and authority of the Church Secretary as Archivist;
- c. to establish a Commission on Records Management and Archives:
- d. to appoint professionally trained archivists;
- e. to increase funding to appropriate levels;
- f. to adopt a universal records management system;
- g. to prepare a definite statement on church records as church property. The motion was ADOPTED.
  - b. N.C. Synod Constitution, proposed amendment of, re: Lutheran Family Services in N.C.

Mr. William McCullough, on behalf of the Executive Board, presented the recommendation on Lutheran Family Services in North Carolina, which was placed on notice at the 1981 convention as follows:

That the proposed amendment to Article Seven, Item 4a, of the N.C. Synod Constitution be amended by deleting all of "a", and in its place insert the following:

a. Lutheran Family Services in North Carolina, a corporation chartered by the State of North Carolina and related to the North Carolina Synod of the Lutheran Church in America.

The motion was ADOPTED.

c. Lutheran Outdoor Ministries, Inc., recommendations on

Mr. Harry Faggart, on behalf of the Executive Board, presented the recommendation regarding the formation of Lutheran Outdoor Ministries, Inc. Secretary David Martin moved:

- a. That the North Carolina Synod approve the formation of a new agency to be called Lutheran Outdoor Ministries, Inc., and authorize the Executive Board to approve the new agency's corporate charter and by-laws.
- b. That the North Carolina Synod elect the incumbent members of the Camp Committee to serve as the Board of Trustees of this new agency from the date of its incorporation until their successors are elected at the Synod Convention in 1983.

The motion was ADOPTED.

d. N.C. Synod Constitution, proposed amendment to, Article Seven, Item 4, re: Lutheran Outdoor Ministries

The following proposed Constitutional amendment was PLACED ON NOTICE:

That upon the approval by the Convention of the formation of a new agency to be called Lutheran Outdoor Ministries, Inc. the following proposed amendment to the constitution be placed on notice with the appropriate number of signatures:

"That Article Seven, Item 4 be amended by adding a new sub-section d, reading as follows:

d. Lutheran Outdoor Ministries, Inc., a corporation chartered by the State of North Carolina and related to the North Carolina Synod of the Lutheran Church in America.

e. By-Laws, Section VI, Item E and F, proposed amendment to, re: Lutheran Outdoor Ministries

The following By-Law amendments were PLACED ON NOTICE:

That subject to the approval by the convention of the formation of a new agency to be called Lutheran Outdoor Ministries, Inc., the following proposed amendments to the By-laws be placed on notice and recommended for approval (and adopted as Rules of Procedure) at the 1982 Convention:

- (1) That Item E of Section VI of the By-Laws, captioned "Camp Committee", be amended by deleting said item in its entirety and that the subsequent items be relettered accordingly.
- (2) That Section VII of the By-Laws be amended by adding a new Item F, to read as follows:
  - "F. Lutheran Outdoor Ministries, Inc.
  - 1. The Synod shall elect twelve persons, six of whom are ordained ministers and six of whom are lay persons, to the Board of Trustees of Lutheran Outdoor Ministries,Inc., for terms of three years, with the terms of four members expiring each year. The Bishop of the Synod or the Bishop's designated representative shall be a member in addition to the other elected members.
  - 2. All persons nominated must be voting members of congregations of the North Carolina Synod.
  - 3. The Executive Board shall elect persons to fill vacancies which might occur between conventions of the Synod. Election by the Executive Board shall be for the unexpired term.
  - 4. The President of the Board of Trustees of Lutheran Outdoor Ministries, Inc., may suggest persons to fill interim vacancies for election by the Executive Board.
- f. By-Laws, Section VI, Item Q, 1a, proposed amendment of

The Rev. David L. Martin **PLACED ON NOTICE** the following amendment to the By-Laws:

that By-Law Section VI, Item Q, 1a, Cabinet for Parish Services be changed by deleting the word "Camp" and substituting the words "Lutheran Outdoor Ministries" so that it reads:

a. Cabinet for Parish Services

Evangelism Educational Ministry Social Ministry Stewardship Lutheran Outdoor Ministries

Lutheridge, Inc. **Youth Ministry** Worship and Music

g. Cabinet for Social Ministry, formation of; By-Law amendments, proposed amendments

The Rev. John Hawn, on behalf of the Executive Board, moved the recommendations regarding the formation of a Cabinet for Social Ministry as follows:

- a. That a fourth cabinet, the Cabinet for Social Ministry, be established to include the following committees and agencies — Social Ministry, Justice and Social Change, Lutheran World Relief/World Hunger, Environmental Concerns, North Carolina Lutheran Homes and Lutheran Family Services in North Carolina
- b. That the By-Laws, Section P, item 1 be amended by deleting all of item 1 and inserting in its place the following:

- 1. There shall be four cabinets consisting of chairpersons of committees and one representative each of institutions as follows:
  - a. Cabinet for Parish Services.

c. That the By-Laws, Section VI, Item P, 3 be amended by deleting all of item 3 and inserting in its place the following:

3. The Cabinet for Parish Services shall maintain liaison with the Division for Parish Services, the Cabinet for Professional Leadership with the Division for Professional Leadership, the Cabinet for Mission with the Division for Mission in North America and the Division for World Missions and Ecumenism, and the Cabinet for Social Ministry with the Division for Mission in North America.

The motion was ADOPTED.

7. Pastoral visits, priority of, resolution on

The Rev. Alfred L. Mullen, II, moved the following resolution:

WHEREAS in the goal setting procedure of several years ago involving laymen and pastors, there was a great concern for the increase of communication and personal contact between synodical staff and congregations, and

WHEREAS Bishop Misenheimer, as recently as a year ago, expressed concern to the Executive Board and the pastors of synod about the need for a study of the duties of Bishop so that more time could be allotted to pastoral care instead of house keeping and administration, and

WHEREAS all of us who are pastors know how often regular and routine visiting and contact with our people leads to the dealing with problems, healing of hurts and general strengthening of faith, and

WHEREAS all of us, pastors and laypersons, know that relationships are mostly built and sharing primarily accomplished by face to face contact, and

WHEREAS the Gospel is "the word became flesh and dwelt among us", Emmanuel, God with us, Christ a person in the world — not God-distant and on high administering from afar,

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the North Carolina Synod Convention go on record as requesting that the Bishop of the Synod elevate the duty listed as #3 in the Constitution

"visit the congregations of the synod and confer and advise with them concerning their spiritual and temporal welfare; and counsel with the ordained ministers as their pastor"

to his first priority;

THEREFORE BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the convention request that the Bishop and/or one of his assistants make a pastoral visit to each pastor and church council at least once every two years. This visit, which might well coincide with official duties, would be an opportunity to express his concern for their well being, share any concerns he wishes to bring from the synodical office, and to share in their concerns, needs, questions, joys, sorrows, etc.

The motion was ADOPTED.

### 8. Unfinished Business

a. Synodical Stewardship, priority of, resolution on

The Rev. Don Phillips presented the Stewardship Committee's synod-wide stewardship program and moved the following:

that the synod's next Bishop and staff be asked to make a priority commitment to a synod-wide program involving all congregations emphasizing stewardship as a way of life and as an appropriate response of commitment to the Gospel of Jesus Christ beginning with the Synod Convention in 1983.

The motion was ADOPTED.

b. Committee on Parish Life and Ministry Development, establishment of,

The Rev. Don M. Michael moved to amend the By-laws and establish a Committee on Parish Life and Ministry as follows:

- a. That a Committee on Parish Life and Ministry Development be established.
- b. That the By-Laws, Section VI other committees be amended by adding new Item Q Parish Life and Ministry Development
  - 1. This committee shall be the advocacy group for the use of Parish Life and Ministry resources and programs in the Synod in partnership with the Division for Parish Services of the church.
  - 2. This committee shall also advocate and assist in the identification, recruitment, training and support of volunteers for ministry in congregations, the Synod and Churchwide agencies.
- c. That the By-Laws, Section VI, new item R, Cabinets, be amended by inserting after Music and Worship the words, Parish Life and Ministry Development.

The motion was ADOPTED.

c. By-Laws, proposed amendment of, Section VI, Item M

The Rev. David M. Franzen presented the proposed amendments to the By-Laws and moved the following:

### Recommendation 1:

that Item M.2.a. of Section VI of the By-Laws be amended by deleting (ministers'), and adding THEIR so that this item would read:

M.2.a. To provide opportunities for orientation into synodical life for newly received ordained ministers, other professional leaders, and their spouses.

### Recommendation 2:

that Item M.2.d. of Section VI of the By-Laws be amended by adding the plural suffix S to the word, leader, so that this item would read:

M.2.d. To evaluate and recommend programs of continuing education to the professional leaders of the synod.

### Recommendation 3:

that Item M.2.g. of Section VI of the By-Laws be amended by deleting (pulpit) and (professional), and adding CALL and PERSONNEL so that this item would read:

M.2.g. To conduct research each year to keep the professional leaders' salaries current and to provide such information as a resource to the Bishop of Synod, call and personnel committees, and church councils.

### Recommendation 4

that Section VI of the By-Laws be amended by adding the following new Item M.2.j. (new) that would read as follows:

M.2.j. To provide support for pastors, lay professionals and their families in seeking pastoral evaluation, consultation or psychotherapy on an individual, marital or family therapy basis from appropriately credentialed pastoral counselors engaged by the Synod.

The motion was ADOPTED.

### d. Nuclear Armament, resolution on

The Rev. David A. Sloop presented, on behalf of the Committee on Justice and Social Change, the following resolution to the convention for action:

WHEREAS, our LCA statement of World Community (Adopted 1970) recognizes that the threat of nuclear weapons "... teaches that their continued development can only undermine security";

WHEREAS, our national government is continuing to expand our arsenal of nuclear armaments in the belief that such expansion enhances our national security:

WHEREAS, our present nuclear arsenal has the capacity of virtually eliminating human life;

WHEREAS, the possibility of neither a limited nor a "Just War" is tenable where nuclear firepower is available;

### BE IT THEREFORE RESOLVED.

That this convention authorize our Bishop to communicate to our North Carolina Congressmen our concern regarding the continued development of a nuclear arsenal and our desire for them to work for the reduction of the nuclear arsenals of the world's super powers; and

That our congregations and church councils observe July 4, 1982, as a day of prayer for peace; and

That we refer this resolution to the Executive Council of the Lutheran Church in America to encourage them to consider the development of study material to assist Christians in our response to the nuclear armaments buildup.

The Rev. C. Peter Setzer moved that the resolution be amended as follows:

that the 4th WHEREAS be deleted and

that it be replaced with the following:

WHEREAS a war cannot be considered 'just' where nuclear exchanges bring devastating destruction to civilian populations on both sides and threatens the existence of all life on the planet and

WHEREAS the effort to limit the war to minimal losses of life and property becomes extremely more difficult, if not impossible, once nuclear weapons are used"

that the following be added to the resolves:

"That the Justice and Social Change Committee, employing resources already available in our Synod and the North Carolina Council of Churches, assist the congregations of the Synod in boldly addressing this urgent moral issue."

The amendment was ADOPTED.

The motion as amended was ADOPTED and would read:

WHEREAS, our LCA statement of World Community (Adopted 1970) recognizes that the threat of nuclear weapons "... teaches that their continued development can only undermine security";

WHEREAS, our national government is continuing to expand our arsenal of nuclear armaments in the belief that such expansion enhances our national security;

WHEREAS, our present nuclear arsenal has the capacity of virtually eliminating human life;

WHEREAS, a war cannot be considered "just" where nuclear exchanges bring devastating destruction to civilian populations on both sides and threatens the existence of all life on the planet and

### e. Voting Rights Act, resolution on

The Rev. David A. Sloop moved the resolution on the Voting Rights Act as follows:

WHEREAS the Voting Rights Act of 1965, a major tool for securing civil rights for minority persons, will expire in August, 1982, unless it is approved again by the President and Congress; and

WHEREAS the Voting Rights Act has sharply increased registration and voting among minority groups, and

WHEREAS the Voting Rights Act has had a major impact on minority group communities by increasing their political participation; and

WHEREAS bilingual elections, including printed matter and oral assistance, have encouraged many non-English speaking U.S. citizens to vote; and afforded them their constitutionally guaranteed right to vote; and

WHEREAS if the protections of the Voting Rights Act are terminated or reduced in effectiveness through crippling amendments, there will be a few remedies for voting discrimination; and

WHEREAS the Voting Rights Act affects 40 counties in North Carolina; and

WHEREAS the Lutheran Church in America has taken a firm position against racial discrimination in "civil rights, including the right to vote ..." (statement on Race Relations, adopted by Second Biennial Convention, July 2-9, 1964);

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that we, the members of the North Carolina Synod of the Lutheran Church in America gathered in convention, June 3-6, 1982, urge North Carolina members of Congress to support the extension of the Voting Rights Act; and request the Executive Council of the LCA to urge President Reagan and members of Congress to do the same; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that individual members communicate to President Reagan and members of Congress their strong support of the extension of the Voting Rights Act.

The motion to consider the previous question was **DEFEATED**.

The Rev. Don M. Michael moved: that the session be extended by 15 minutes. There was a call for Division of the House. The standing vote was in favor of extending the session by 15 minutes. ADOPTED.

The Rev. Robert Q. Beard moved to amend as follows:

WHEREAS the Voting Rights Act of 1965 has demonstrated that such legislation can provide the Federal government with an effective instrument for protecting Constitutionally-guaranteed voting rights of minority citizens:

### THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED

that we, the members of the North Carolina Synod of the Lutheran Church in America, gathered in convention June 3-6, 1982, urge the President and Congress to enact a permanent Voting Rights Act which applies uniformly to all fifty States of the Union and which embodies enforcement provisions that conform to Constitutional principles; and further urge North Carolina members of Congress to support the enactment of such Voting Rights Acts.

A motion was made that:

the motion made by Pastor Beard be substituted for the main motion.

There was a call for Division of the House. The vote was 127 For; 75 Against. The motion to substitute Pastor Beard's motion for the original motion was **ADOPTED**.

The Rev. Kenneth W. Fink moved to amend the motion by Pastor Beard that:

the words, "we the members of" in the second paragraph be deleted from the resolution.

The motion by Pastor Fink to amend was ADOPTED.

Pastor Beard's motion as amended was **ADOPTED** by a vote of 107 For; 82 Against.

Pastor Thomas Weddington requested a quorum call. Bishop Misenheimer ruled that a quorum call was out of order.

The motion as substituted and amended was ADOPTED and would read as follows:

WHEREAS the Voting Rights Act of 1965 has demonstrated that such legislation can provide the Federal government with an effective instrument for protecting Constitutionally-guaranteed voting rights of minority citizens;

### THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED

that the North Carolina Synod of the Lutheran Church in America, gathered in convention June 3-6, 1982, urge the President and Congress to enact a permanent Voting Rights Act which applies uniformly to all fifty States of the Union and which embodies enforcement provisions that conform to Constitutional principles; and further urge North Carolina members of Congress to support the enactment of such Voting Rights Acts.

E. Monroe Auditorium; and to Lutheran Brotherhood for operating the Hospitality Suite throughout the Convention.
- 9) That we thank the participants in Youth Convo for their spirit of enthusiasm and celebration and their contributions to the life of this Convention.
- 10) That we give thanks to almighty God for having led us as a Convention to the election of the Rev. Michael C. D. McDaniel, Ph.D., to serve our synod as its Bishop for the next four years, and request the Chaplain to lead us in a prayer of thanksgiving at this time.
- 11) That we acknowledge with gratitude the faithful services in ministry of the Bishop's Staff, the Rev. David L. Martin, the Rev. Richard C. Little, the Rev. Robert H. Shoffner, and Mr. James A. Chesky, in their responsibilities to the various committees, task forces, congregational, pastors, and lay people in our Synod.
- 12) That we give thanks to almighty God for the diligent, patient, sound and faithful ministry of our retiring Bishop, the Rev. Ernest L. Misenheimer, Jr., D.D., who has given us strong leadership with his emphasis on partnership in ministry, evangelical outreach, the care and nurture of congregations and pastors, growth in giving, as well as a deepened sense of mission as a Synod and a Church; and that this resolution be adopted by rising and singing the doxology.

The motion was ADOPTED.

### 4. Report of the Committee on Unfinished BUSINESS

The Rev. Ronald O. Heinze, Chairman, presented the following items of unfinished business:

### 1) Namibia, resolution on

The Rev. Ronald Heinze moved the resolution as follows:

WHEREAS our sisters and brothers in Namibia are struggling for their freedom and independence from the oppression of South Africa rule, and WHEREAS we have become more aware of their struggle through Bishop Crumley's letters to all pastors, through the work of the Division for Mission in North America, and through *The Lutheran* magazine,

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that we, the North Carolina Synod of the Lutheran Church in America, communicate to the Bishops of the Lutheran Churches in Namibia our concern and support for them in their struggle for independence and our pledge to encourage our country to support the United Nations Security Council in its efforts to obtain a ceasefire, the withdrawal of South African troops, and a free elections in Namibia, and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that we express our appreciation to Bishop Crumley, the Division for Mission in North America, and *The Lutheran* for providing the leadership, resources, and information necessary for us to be aware of and to respond to the needs of our sisters and brothers in Namibia.

The motion was ADOPTED.

### 2. By-Laws, Section VI, Item Q,1, amendment of:

The Rev. David L. Martin moved the amendment regarding Outdoor Ministry as follows:

That the By-Laws, Section VI, item Q,1,a. be amended by deleting the word "Camp" and in its place inserting the words "Lutheran Outdoor Ministries" so that all of Section VI, item Q,1,a. would read:

"a. Cabinet for Parish Services
Evangelism
Educational Ministry
Social Ministry
Stewardship
Lutheran Outdoor Ministries
Lutheridge, Inc.
Youth Ministry
Worship and Music"

The motion was ADOPTED.

- By-Laws, Section VI, Item E, amendment of, re: Lutheran Outdoor Ministries
   Secretary David Martin moved the By-Laws amendment, which has been placed on notice, as follows:
  - (1) That Section VI, Item E of the By-Laws, captioned "Camp Committee", be amended by deleting said item in its entirety and that the subsequent items be relettered accordingly.
  - (2) That Section VII of the By-Laws be amended by adding a new Item F, to read as follows:
    - "F. Lutheran Outdoor Ministries, Inc.
    - 1. The Synod shall elect twelve persons, six of whom are ordained ministers and six of whom are lay persons, to the Board of Trustees of Lutheran Outdoor Ministries, Inc., for terms of three years, with the terms of four members expiring each year. The Bishop of the Synod or the Bishop's designated representative shall be a member in addition to the other elected members.
    - 2. All persons nominated must be voting members of congregations of the North Carolina Synod.
    - 3. The Executive Board shall elect persons to fill vacancies which might occur between conventions of the Synod. Election by the Executive Board shall be for the unexpired term.
    - 4. The President of the Board of Trustees of Lutheran Outdoor Ministries, Inc., may suggest persons to fill interim vacancies for election by the Executive Board.

The Rev. Ronald O. Heinze moved:

that the motion be amended to include the words "That this amendment to the By-Laws be effective when the new corporation becomes a legal entity."

The amendment was ADOPTED.

The motion as amended was ADOPTED.

Mr. David C. Clapp, delegate from Our Saviour, Jacksonville, moved: to reconsider the resolution on the Voting Rights Act. DEFEATED.

### 5. PRESENTATION OF YOUTH CONVO.

The youth of Convo made a presentation calling attention to the need to support the new Bishop and the youth of the Church.

### 6. The Report of the Committee on Credentials and Enrollment.

The Rev. Elvin Bumgarner, Chairman, presented the final report of the committee. He reported that the registration included 227 Pastors, 194 Lay Delegates, and 8 certified Lay Professionals.

The Rev. Charles M. Zimmerman challenged the results of the fifth ballot for

Bishop in that a total of 453 votes had been cast for Bishop on the fifth ballot, which was more than the reported 421 total pastors/delegates registration.

The Rev. Richard B. Graf, Jr., D.D. moved:

that the vote for Bishop be certified and results mailed to pastors and lay delegates.

The motion was ADOPTED.

Prior to the tenth meeting Bishop Misenheimer reported on behalf of the Committee on Credentials and Enrollment that an error had occurred in tabulating the final registration, by omitting the pastors/delegates registration from the Southern District. The official registration for the convention was as follows:

266 pastors, 231 lay delegates for a total of 497 pastors and lay delegates.

### 7. ANNOUNCEMENTS

Bishop Misenheimer made announcements and asked for final comments. It was suggested that spouses be allowed to sit with pastors in the closing service in the future.

The Rev. Frank Perry moved: for a recess. ADOPTED.

### 8. CLOSING PRAYERS

Chaplain Richard J. Perry, Jr., led the convention in prayer.

### TENTH MEETING

Sunday Morning, June 6, 1982 - 10:30 a.m.

The Service of Holy Communion with the Rite of Ordination was led by Bishop Ernest L. Misenheimer, Jr., D.D. He was assisted by the Rev. David L. Martin, Secretary of the North Carolina Synod, and the Rev. Richard J. Perry, Jr., Chaplain of the Convention. The music was led by the choir of St. James, Concord, and the organist, Mr. Robert Smith.

### DR. McDANIEL'S SERMON:


The Rev. Michael C. D. McDaniel, Ph.D., Bishop-Elect, was the preacher. Speaking on the text John 3:1-17, Dr. McDaniel challenged the ordinands to "teach and preach the Gospel", to trust explicitly in the "will and strength of God", and to "speak a good word for Christ" at every opportunity. ### Report of the Bishop

When hundreds of pastors and lay delegates converge upon Lenoir-Rhyne College in Hickory on May 26, 1983, they will be coming to celebrate the most exciting realities which this planet has ever known. Above all, the signs of God's grace continue to brighten this world: He is using His ministers to baptize children and adults, to commune the faithful, and to preach the Gospel! The Word is going forth, creating and renewing the Church! In response, people are gathering to worship, learning to care for each other better in every way, and sacrificing for the sake of the fellowship which God has established — fellowship with Himself, a fellowship which we want to share with all the world.

Because of this grace-given fellowship in faith, which our sacrificial giving supports, young and old are hearing the prophetic Word, learning the implications of God's Word for their lives in Church School classes and in counseling — learning to think about problems with the mind of Christ, in the light of the hope His promises inspire. New leaders are going forth and new congregations are being formed; the hungry are being fed, the needy clothed, some who are sick are being healed, and many victims of injustice are being helped. To God alone be all the glory! Thanks be to Him, that we are enabled to participate in the miracle of His grace — to ''Proclaim and Set Free!''

Because of the proclamation of the Gospel, people **are** set free from bondage to the law, sin, death, and hell, set free to be God's people, joyfully and courageously carrying out His gracious mission of love in the world. In North Carolina, we have been "walking together" as a synod for this purpose since 1803 — one hundred and eighty years. As Lutherans, we belong to a world-wide fellowship dedicated to this proclamation and liberation for more than 450 years — celebrating, this year, the 500th Birthday of Martin Luther. As Christians, nearly two thousand years of worship, learning, and action precede our appearance on earth, and we rejoice in this year of our Lord, 1983, that we also have been called, gathered, and enlightened by the Spirit of God to be part of God's purpose to bring His creation to fulfillment. God grant that we be found faithful in our calling!

As your newly-elected bishop, only six months of my first year in office have passed as I write this report; however, much work preceded the official date of my beginning. After the initial shock of the election, early June was filled with study and planning for the reorganization of the staff and the selection of new staff members — not to mention the enormous task of teaching Summer School and winding up my affairs at Lenoir-Rhyne at the same time. July found us attending our first conference of bishops, and spending much time in Salisbury learning many new details about the synod. August was dominated by moving all our earthly belongings from Hickory to Salisbury; but many other activities also filled the days and the nights.

My first day in office came on Monday, September 13, when we had returned from the exciting convention of the Lutheran Church in America in Louisville, Kentucky. What a whirlwind of activities characterized the first quarter-year! Highlights included a retreat for the new staff, designed to help us build a genuine working team; the annual Professional Leaders' Convocation at Lutheridge; the Installation of the Bishop and his staff on October 3 in St. John's, Salisbury; the Fall District Meetings, and the annual Retreat for Seminarians in October; the first Lutheran/Anglican Dialogue — and much, much more.

At those Fall District Meetings, pastors and lay delegates got their first good look at the new bishop and his staff. We described our role as one of bridge-building as we oversee the ministry of the Church in our synod. The four administrative assistants were introduced as symbolizing the distinctive marks of the church — One, Holy, Catholic, and Apostolic. Special signs of bridge-building were noted: the happily-anticipated merger which will bring us together with the ALC congregations in North Carolina; also, exciting new relations with the Episcopal Church. It was also noted that offerings are higher than ever before. Recalling the Seven Gifts of the Spirit (Whose flames adorn our new synod logo), members were challenged to work toward seven objectives in the coming year: (1) To help plan and carry out at least two worship services that will be unforgettable — making every experience of worship a top priority; (2) to learn to know at least two persons of different racial and cultural

backgrounds from your own, and share your congregational fellowship with them; (3) to develop friendships with and learn to understand the faith and life of at least two people of different denominations; (4) to bring at least two unchurched people into the congregation during the course of the year; (5) to increase the level of our giving by at least 2% of our income this year; (6) to become personally involved in at least two world-transforming concerns and activities, working actively to overcome some of the world's frightening problems; and, (7) to spend at least two hours each week, outside the worship service and the church school, in study and prayer in order to be more effective servants and witnesses. We renew these challenges, and urge you more than ever to make them your own.

The second quarter-year has been no less filled than the first! The highlights of this most recent period, clearly, has been the exhilarating experience of the seven Winter District Rallies. Hundreds (over two thousand!) of pastors and lay delegates responded to the call and attended these rallies, showing much enthusiasm for events exhibiting the characteristics of an "old-fashioned revival." The major emphasis for these rallies was the fulfillment of the mandate of the 1982 Synod Convention: to make a priority commitment to a synod-wide program involving all congregations, emphasizing stewardship as the Christian way of life.

"Parish Renewal" is the term (rather than "revival") for the new life which we pray that God's Holy Spirit will generate in our midst. Following the logical order of our theological understanding, the first step in Christian stewardship is worship, for in the sacramental and preached Word God gives us the faith which binds us to Him and one another in a mutually-supportive fellowship. This primary evidence that God is truly our God is demonstrated by a devotional life which clearly has three aspects; the actual experience of worship; the fellowship which is there created — relationships (bridges) between God and his people, and bridges between people; and self-sacrifice as we give of our time, talents, and treasures in thanksgiving for and support of this wonderful fellowship in time and eternity.

At the Rallies, an overview of this emphasis, with its Biblical and theological bases, was given, and a brief training was provided for a Spring Every-Member Visitation in every parish to enhance the quality of parish fellowship. At the convention in May, we will prepare for a Fall Every-Member Response activity to enable each person in synod to understand and participate in the local, synodical, and world ministry to which God has called us. Every pastor and delegate, plus the stewardship leaders in every parish, should be present on Saturday afternoon at the Convention, May 28, 1983

The sequence of Devotion (1983), Learning and Leadership Training (1984), Social Ministry and Action (1985), and Evangelism (1986) was developed from the concepts which I expressed during the brief talks which candidates gave in the course of the election at the last convention: our common vocation in the Priesthood of All Believers calls us to loving concern for one another (the pastoral aspect), clear-headed thinking centered on the Gospel (the theological aspect), and efficient action (the administrative aspect). It is the pastoral aspect of loving concern for one another in the fellowship of faith which is our focus in the first year of our stewardship emphasis on "Parish Renewal."

The primary duty of the pastors of the Church is to lead in worship. Worship is receiving God's Gift of Himself — i.e., we are made one with Him and one another in a fellowship which knows no restrictions. Such unity is the gift of Christ to those who belong to Him through participation in the sacraments — it is not something that we can achieve by the agreement of our minds or even by the common consent of our wills. What are the implications of this unity? We can mention only a few, for time and space would never permit an exhaustive recitation of the wonders of grace!

Certainly, the fellowship of our young people ought to be a primary concern. We hope that, in this year, we may bring about a renewal in our synodical life with regard to youth ministry. That our young people have few opportunities for fellowship and leadership training outside their parishes is a scandal which cannot be permitted to continue. Of equal urgency is the establishment of more units of Lutheran Church Men across the synod! Our heritage in this regard is noble, but we have become somehow indifferent to the many opportunities which the LCM can provide for enriching our lives.

The fellowship of pastors is also of primary concern. We have taken seriously the mandate of the synod to visit every parish at least once in each two-year period. At this writing, exactly six months have passed since I began my new work. My appointment books show that I have thus far personally visited 53 congregations — slightly more than one-fourth of our parishes, in spite of spending much time in learning my new job, attending endless meetings, grappling (unsuccessfully) with correspondence and other office tasks, and meeting with pastors and lay people at the Synod Office. That is very heartening, for it shows that I will certainly be able, personally, to visit every congregation at least once every two years. Furthermore, with our administrative assistants assigned in a pastoral capacity as liaisons with specific districts, each congregation can count upon a personal visit from me and/or one of the staff members more than once a year.

I have learned much, visiting, worshipping, and consulting with over 50 congregations! Most of all, I have learned very quickly to love this pastoral ministry to the synod, and to become completely convinced of the validity of the call which your election gave me. I like what I am called to do, and those who work with me are also happy in their work. Leaders should lead, and we are seeking to do just that, praying for ever-new insights in building up the Body of Christ, in training you up to full adulthood and maturity in the faith. What wonderful congregations we have in North Carolina! Each parish is unique, each one graced by special gifts of God. Although the work is tremendously demanding, I thank God for health and strength to know the joy of serving you.

At the convention, we will talk about other aspects of worship and fellowship, particularly racial inclusiveness. There must be no higher priority for us; for, if we do not take giant steps to make our congregations more colorful, more truly representative of God's marvelous variety in creation, we will forfeit our right to claim to be the Body of Christ in Whom God is reconciling the world to Himself. Partners in ministry! Let us work together toward creative and effective ways to awaken all to the joys of the Gospel which liberate us for fellowship with God and one another!

We will also celebrate a more inclusive fellowship at this convention with our Lutheran brothers and sisters in the American Lutheran Church, and with the Episcopal Church. Furthermore, we are inaugurating in the synod our exciting challenge to participate in the World Council of Churches' new confessional statement on "Baptism, Eucharist, and Ministry." Details on all these new and thrilling opportunities for more inclusive fellowship at the altar will have to await our coming together at Lenoir-Rhyne College in May.

Just because we say we belong to Christ does not automatically mean we belong to each other. Only when we are drawn together to worship Him will we, in that worship, finally learn to trust one another. The unifying power of God in Christ to reconcile differences, create harmony out of diversity, establish peace, and heal broken relationships — to that the church is called to testify and to bear witness. God's will in Christ is to bring oneness (wholeness) to broken people and to a broken world, and He can do it when we are truly devoted to Him. The ultimate goal of all our efforts for merger and unity is not merely the interconnection of a number of separate parts but the integration of all the parts into a whole.

Such unity must find its primary expression in the congregations, where God's people gather to worship and be nurtured in faith. But this worship and nurture will be a travesty, indeed, if we do not follow the promptings in our hearts which such worship gives to embrace the world with the love which has gripped us. Although evangelism and service are not the focus of our theme this year, any congregation whose members have been captivated by the Gospel can't help but manifest an aggressive concern to alleviate all forms of suffering and share with everyone the joy of belonging to the fellowship of faith. Having been united with God, we want to become more like Him in holiness — more like Him in dedicating ourselves to the salvation of the world.

That also means committing a significant portion of our income to Christ. For many of us, the tithe is the reasonable **beginning** point. **Do not fail to conduct an every-member visit in your congregation!** Every member has the right to know about the work of the church and to be challenged to deeper levels of commitment and involvement in the life and ministry of the Church. Be joyful and enthusiastic in these

matters: the Son of God gave up His life that we might have life. He — the fountain of all **life** — willingly **died** rather than to stop loving us. The result was that His divine life broke the power of death for Him and all creation. By giving **everything** away (as God, He alone could do that!), He was able to gain us — forever. So, we dare not fail to proclaim the message which truly sets free — that it is in giving that we, also, receive!

What will the future hold for us? As our LCA representative told his synod a few years ago, the forecasters who predicted what to expect in the 1970's missed 7 out of the 10 most important events or movements of that decade. There are no experts with regard to the future. What we do know is that God has in store for us many surprises!

Welcome, Bishop Sauer! Our LCA representative is Bishop of the Ohio Synod, and a long-time friend since seminary days. We are privileged to have this highly respected leader of the LCA as our spokesman this year for the life and work of the Lutheran Church in America.

We also rejoice to welcome the Rt. Rev. William G. Weinhauer, Bishop of the Diocese of Western North Carolina of the Episcopal Church, and leader of the Episcopal delegation in the Lutheran/Episcopal Dialogues in the United States. His friendship and eager spirit of cooperation is a joy and inspiration to us all!

Finally, a word of thanks — to the marvelous pastors of the North Carolina Synod for their warm, enthusiastic support and inspiring faithfulness in their daily tasks; to our predecessors in office who have been so wonderfully helpful, former bishops Conrad, Whittecar, and Misenheimer; to former staff members Martin and Shoffner; to the superb Executive Board of our Synod; to my beloved fellow-staff members, who are truly the joy and strength of my life; to the marvelous members of the synod office staff, for whom I cannot voice too high praise; to our special ministers, to the editor and staff of the North Carolina Lutheran, to the deans of the districts, to the chairmen and members of Boards, Committees, and Task Forces, to those very important partners in the institutions and agencies of the church — to all these, my deepest gratitude for their life and work; for all these, my thanks to God for the privilege of working among such dedicated, informed, and energetic witnesses to the Gospel.

Thanks, also, to all who are making the convention possible: Mrs. Opal Moretz and her committee, the various convention committees, the chaplain, and the college and congregational hosts and hostesses in Hickory! Finally, please allow me to give the last word of gratitude to my beloved wife. I am sure that Marjorie would have me tell you, also, how much you mean to her.

May our days in convention be graced with new and inspiring experiences of worship, fellowship, and support; and may God continue to bless the North Carolina Synod in its stewardship of the high calling to "Proclaim and Set Free!"

### Minister for Church in Society

Reported by THE REV. RICHARD C. LITTLE

This year has been marked by transition, and Jim Chesky and I have had a very unique perspective through it all. The sadness of saying "goodbye" to Bishop Misenheimer, Bob Shoffner, and David Martin was bearable only because we were able to say "welcome" to Bishop McDaniel, Richard Campbell, and Mark Menees. The transition has been smooth thanks to the efforts of those who were leaving and to the abilities of those who were called to serve in this ministry. It is humbling and awesome to feel the weight of the ministry of the Bishop's staff on the shoulders of three people, but the Holy Spirit gave us what we needed to carry on until the full staff was settled in.

I have appreciated the early efforts to build the new staff through extensive staff meetings and through two staff retreats. The time spent in these has paid off many times over. I feel we are jelling well and are making every effort to capitalize on our various strengths as we seek to use the gifts God has given us.

Although the program responsibilities (which I will discuss later) have not changed dramatically, I do feel my role as a Bishop's assistant has shifted somewhat in that I have now been asked to share more in the pastoral function of the Bishop's office. I personally welcome this change and am enjoying using my pastoral skills again as I relate to the congregations and pastors in the Central, Coastal, and Eastern Districts. Being assigned to specific districts helps me to be more intentional in planning visits and deciding where I should focus my efforts. The transition took much of September through December and allowed very little time for these visits. However, visits that have been made since the beginning of 1983 have given strong indication to us that this is a wise use of the Bishop's staff.

This shift means less staff time for synod programs. The committees, however, are sensitive to the importance of this shift in staff time and have been willing to assume more responsibility. This has certainly aided in this transition. Many thanks to all of them!

"Parish Renewal" is the emphasis we have chosen to address over these four years. The response at the District Rallies was very supportive and encouraging. It is exciting to feel the wind of the Spirit blowing across the synod in new ways. Hopefully each of us will open ourselves to the renewing power of God's Word and Sacraments and fellowship in His church.

As for program areas, I relate to two cabinets, the Cabinet for Missions and the Cabinet for Social Ministry. For specific reports, please see the section in this Bulletin of Reports where each cabinet and its committees give their detailed reports. Here I will only highlight some general items.

Cabinet for Missions — The Rev. Jay Harbinson has continued to give this cabinet able leadership. Members of this cabinet (American Missions, Campus Ministry, World Missions, and Lenoir-Rhyne College) had to redefine the cabinet's thrust since many of its previous members became a part of the newly created Cabinet for Social Ministry. This narrowing of its focus will enable the Cabinet for Mission to put more emphasis on mission in America and in the world.

Efforts to identify mission communicators in each congregation of the synod got off to a slow start, but some congregations even have mission committees who help interpret the world scene, who are available to give a helping hand to a nearby Pastor/Developer, and who keep the vision of mission before the congregation. I feel we've only scratched the surface of the potential here and hope that all of our congregations will take more seriously our call to be SALT, LIGHT, and LEAVEN in the world. The LCA's "Call to Global Mission" is an excellent resource that I commend to every congregation for reading and study.

Cabinet for Social Ministry — Frances Frock of Hickory was tapped to chair this new cabinet. This cabinet has matured fast and has shown many times over this year that the synod acted wisely when it established this fourth cabinet. Clearly those involved in this cabinet (Environmental Concerns, Justice and Social Change, Lutheran World Relief/World Hunger, Social Ministry, Lutheran Family Services in N.C., and N.C. Lutheran Homes) have similarities and overlapping concerns. A couple times, especially in the program budget building process, it was so obvious to all the members of the cabinet that there had been some duplication and some misplaced priorities due to the inability to see the total picture. As with the Cabinet for Mission, the Cabinet for Social Ministry has a precisely defined area of ministry.

Efforts on the part of some congregations across the synod to meet the needs of the poor, underprivileged and needy have been admirable. The time is right; the needs have never been so obvious in recent times. Emergency shelters, soup kitchens, half-way houses are only a sampling of what some of our congregations are doing. When seen in the broad scope, however, our strides are but small steps. Yet we rejoice and praise God for these small steps and at the same time pray for more courage, more power, more vision to venture forth into areas of even greater service.

In closing, I express my deep gratitude to God for the privilege of serving Him and His church in this ministry. It is a joy to serve as a part of Bishop McDaniel's staff and to share in ministry with Michael, Jim, Richard, Mark, Barbara, and all the support staff. I especially thank Mae for her diligent work as my personal secretary. I pray that God will continue to fill us with His Spirit and use us mightily in our ministry together as the North Carolina Synod.

## Minister for Leadership

To begin I would like to make a few general reflections. It would be an understatement to say that staff ministry is an unexpected place for me to be involved in ministry. The fact is, it is one of the last places I expected to be and represents a major change in the scope of my ministry and its direction. It has taken some adjustment to get used to the differing style of ministering here. The normal flow of the church year and the normal flow of the church week, with Sunday being so very central, is very important to me and I must confess that I do miss the regularity of preaching and sacramental life with one congregation. However, the opportunity to share those experiences with a larger area is also very exciting. I must say from the outset, that I have appreciated the very keen support that I have received personally from throughout the synod.

Ministry here is multi-faceted and has many levels. For some my function has meant the rendering of services, and for others it has become a deep interpersonal ministry. That work has included consultation with pastors, congregations, lay persons, synodical committees, as well as special services (installations and various speaking engagements). While we have entered into partnership with the very fine counselling services of the Presbyterian Family Life Center in Charlotte, there continues to be some counselling work done here by me.

A very exciting arena of this job has been the work and involvement with the national church. Included in that has been a variety of ecumenical work, workshops in-

cluding participation with the Division for Professional Leadership in many areas, and an opportunity to see The Lutheran Church in the various regions of the country.

As Minister for Leadership and Ecumenism and Assistant to the Bishop, I relate to the Cabinet for Professional Leadership, which includes the Committee for Professional Preparation and the Committee for Professional Services, the Stewardship Committee, and the Ecumenical Committee. My work also encompasses special responsibilities in the Southwestern and Western Districts of the Synod. I would like to summarize those areas.

### PROFESSIONAL LEADERSHIP

My work relating to Professional Leadership is in cooperation with the Cabinet and the two committees related to that Cabinet. Included here are some of the high-lights of work with those areas.

#### PROFESSIONAL PREPARATION

This is certainly one of the most demanding areas of responsibility in our synod, both for the committee and for the staff related to the committee. We presently find ourselves involved in five major meetings per year which generally run from two to three days. In a given year, the committee has oversight for approximately 60 persons who are either preparing for ordained ministry or as lay professionals within our synod. I relate to seminarians through a variety of ways, including the Readiness for Ministry Evaluation for first year seminarians and senior seminarians, involvement in the placement of seminarians for internship, financial aid counselling, counselling relating to academic and pastoral work, and personal follow up with students who have specific concerns. This work is particularly time consuming and involves a good bit of travel, however, I find it particularly rewarding, especially as I develop relationships with students, pastors, professors in seminaries, lay professionals throughout the church. Involved in this also is a good bit of time dealing with students who are inquiring about going to seminary.

Part of the work of the committee includes careful screening and interviewing of potential candidates in order to see what is best both for the person and the church. The committee seeks and endeavors to strongly support the professional development of each candidate to the best of his ability. Of course involved in this is a close relationship with the seminaries of the church. We presently have students from North Carolina Synod being educated for ministry at six seminaries throughout the country. One of the high points of the year for me personally, was the seminarian and spouses retreat held at Lutheridge in October with approximately 90% of our seminarians participating.

As we look to the future there are some issues which stand on the horizon. Included among these are the financing for theological education and this is especially true in the arena of interships. Also, financial aid for students who do not have the resources to support themselves throughout this process is a significant area of need. If the church is to continue to have strong professional leadership, it will have to address these issues in the near future.

#### PROFESSIONAL SERVICE

This half of the Cabinet for Professional Services provides those ordained and working as lay professionals with continuing support in a variety of areas. Of the areas in which I work, perhaps few are as diverse and offer as many opportunities for professional leaders as does this hard working group. During the past year, the committee worked to sponsor the New Professional Leaders Workshop in November of 1982 with twenty persons in attendance. The committee continues to seek to fund continuing education for professional leaders throughout our synod and it is our hope that congregations will see the importance of this and help provide funding through continuing education for its professional leaders. The committee also participates in hosting and aiding the First Year in Ministry Retreats through the Lutheran Theological Southern Seminary. With great thanks to Pastor David Martin and other members of the committee, the synod has contracted with the Presbyterian Family Life Center to provide high quality pastoral counselling for professional leaders and their families throughout the synod. In this same vein, we also provide career counselling service through the Laurinburg Center at St. Andrew's College in Laurinburg, NC.

One of the real joys of working with this committee is the work on Professional Leaders Convocation in the Fall. The 1982 Fall Convocation held at Lutheridge in September had the theme, "Applying our Theology to a Changing World." The Rev. Martin J. Heinecken was the keynoter and was well received. There were approximately 130 persons in attendance for that convocation. As we look forward to the convocation in 1983, we will again be hosting that at Lutheridge October 3-5 with Rev. Hugh George Anderson as our keynoter. Along with this there will be a number of small workshops for participants to choose to attend. We believe that our workshops and our convocation are a high level of continuing education and we look forward to continued high level participation from the professional leaders within our synod.

The Committee also works on the Compensation Guidelines for Clergy and this year is continuing that work by including in its guidelines lay professionals. It is our hope that we will be able to continue work in this area to provide services to congregations and to professional leaders in determining adequate salary packages.

Personally, I have been involved in working with the Lutheran Theological Southern Seminary in developing continuing education opportunities. I have also been involved in a retreat setting addressing the issue of Women in Ministry and where the future may be for that. Another area of personal satisfaction was the opportunity to share in a week long workshop on the new church and its ministry hosted by the Lutheran School of Theology in Chicago. I think it is safe to say that the future for professional leaders is both challenging, at times a bit scary, but always a joyful opportunity.

#### **ECUMENISM**

It has been a particularly enjoyable part of my work on staff in relating to a variety of ecumenical settings. During the Fall of 1982, the North Carolina Synod, along with the three Episcopal Dioceses of North Carolina met at Brown's Summitt for a two-day dialogue and retreat. A number of professional leaders from our synod participated in that and we look forward to another such setting in 1983 to see what joint work we may be able to share together. A second very exciting arena of work occurred for me when the North Carolina Synod of the Lutheran Church in America and the Roman Catholic Diocese of Charlotte, co-hosted the National Lutheran-Roman Catholic Dialogues, held at Sacred Heart College in Belmont. Along with this, we also set the agenda for a public forum of dialogue with the participants of that dialogue as well as a joint day for the clergy of the synod and the Roman Catholic Diocese.

With the LCA's Statement on Ecumenism we look forward to continuing new contacts, new learning experiences and new opportunities in the area of Ecumenism.

#### STEWARDSHIP

My work also includes staff relationship to the Stewardship Committee of the Synod. Throughout the year, the Stewardship Committee has sought to provide the Partnership in Ministry Emphasis which is a consultation with congregations about the ministry of the Synod as it is aided and provided through benevolent dollars for those congregations. In the Spring of 1982 the Stewardship Committee also participated in the District Church Days providing workshops for persons from Stewardship Committees in various congregations and the committee continues to provide congregations with aid in developing the Stewardship program and emphasis. Among those are opportunities to work on Every Member Visits, Every Member Response, and the Every Member Response Growth Workshops. With the parish renewal emphasis from the bishop, it is hoped that the committee will be able to aid congregations in continuing to look at Stewardship as a Way of Life and as a total response to the Gospel and the Committee will continue to work on specific ways that they can be of service to the congregations within the synod.

#### DISTRICT AND CONGREGATIONAL CONTACTS

It has been my privilege to participate with a large number of congregations across the synod during the past six months of my work here. These have included installations, opportunities for preaching, speaking engagements to several settings, and congregational meetings. I've also had an opportunity to meet with Councils and other committees in congregations throughout the synod. I must say that I am delighted with the warm receptions that I have received and with the eagerness

that congregations have shown in living out the ministry of the Gospel in their location.

In closing the report there are a number of people who helped make this ministry a little lighter, a little more joyful and who have been very supportive to me. Obviously included among those are the staff here. Bishop McDaniel, Jim Chesky, Richard Little and Richard Campbell, I am very thankful to them for the fine atmosphere they have created for our joint efforts together. I'm also thankful to Nancy Howard, my secretary, and to the other members of the support staff in the synod office. I would be negligent if I did not mention committee chairpeople, Bob Troutman, Brady Faggart, Terry Agner, and Don Phillips who work with the Committees I relate to. There are so many others who provide support, a word of encouragement, a kind word of criticism that I cannot name them all, but I am grateful to all who are seeking to make this ministry productive and helpful and truly a servant ministry for the church of our Lord.

I would like to say one word of gratefulness to the people of the North Carolina Synod who have been very receptive during these days of transition and who continue to seek to fulfill their calling as the people of God. As I go around the Synod and see that happening I am greatly heartened and deeply thankful.

## Minister for Operations and Support

Someone once said that "change is rest." If that is true, why am I so tired? This indeed has been a year of change. Dick Little and I have been the "transition team". The summer was marked with sadness as we saw the break up of Bishop Misenheimer's team and had to say "goodbye" to Bob Shoffner, then to David Martin and then at the last to the Bishop himself.

This has also been an exciting time due to the opportunity to be a part of a new beginning. The organization of the Bishop's staff has concentrated the administrative functions on my desk. Being Minister for Operations and Support includes being Statistician, Archivist, Office Manager, Budget Control Officer and News Bureau Director. I also work with the Worship and Music, Communications and Historical Works Committees of Synod.

I have enjoyed working with the Historical Works Committee as it seeks to keep our heritage before us and to preserve the present for the future. The Committee has begun the planning steps to publish a newer history of the pastors of Synod. The 500th Anniversary of Martin Luther's birth has caused the Committee to develop aids for congregations in their celebration of his birth. The Committee is also sponsoring a group of historians who are interested in preserving the history of the Lutheran Church in the southeastern United States. The group brings together people from North and South Carolina, Virginia, Georgia, and Tennessee.

The Worship Committee has been a leader in the planning and conducting of worship. Under the leadership of Robert Allen the finest example of a Service of Celebration was held at St. John's, Salisbury on October 3 for the installation of Bishop McDaniel. It was historic in that it was the first Lutheran Service with an Episcopal Bishop serving Holy Communion after the approval of interim sharing of the Eucharist at the national conventions. The committee also was responsible for the highly successful Convocation on Worship, Music and the Arts held last fall.

The Communications Committee has worked carefully with Elsie Hamilton, *North Carolina Lutheran* Editor, and Frances Huddle, the Business Manager, to enlarge the coverage of the *N.C. Lutheran* while holding expenses and subscription rates down. This year Frances Huddle has asked to be replaced as Business Manager and so the Convention will be asked to vote on a nominee. We will miss Frances' help and work for the *N.C. Lutheran*.

The yearly concern as Budget Control Officer and Business Manager has been to meet all the various needs of the ministries and proper operation of the Synod Office while keeping expenses within the budget and to a minimum. The cooperation of all the committees has been a great help in this effort.

Each year I work very closely with Finance Sub-Committee of Executive Board in the preparation of the financial proposals for Convention. That committee has worked carefully to fulfill the directives of the 1982 Convention concerning being 100% in support of the Churchwide Agencies. It is exciting to be a part of this effort and to realize that 1984 is the year that we will become 100%.

I cannot begin to list all the people whom I wish to thank for their guidance and support but I would like to single out Ann, Betty, Caroline, Julia, Mae, Mildred and Nancy for their work in this Partnership in Ministry. Thanks also to Bishop McDaniel for the opportunity to be a part of his staff. Thanks to Mark and both Richards for their enthusiasm and help. The support of Michael and his staff will always be remembered and treasured.

## Minister for Parish Life

"I believe in one, holy, catholic and apostolic church."

On September 16, 1982 at our team building retreat at Agape Camp Conference and Retreat Center, Bishop Michael C. D. McDaniel lifted up this first sentence from the Third Article of the Nicene Creed as that theological foundation upon which our team as bishop and staff would be built. Since that day, that theological understanding of what the church is in today's world, has been the basis for the work through which I and the other assistants to the Bishop of the North Carolina Synod have labored. It has been a broad and full ministry. It has been an exciting and challenging work in the name of our Lord Jesus Christ. In these few paragraphs I would share with you my impressions of that work during the first six months as a member of Bishop McDaniel's staff.

As the Executive Board called us and Bishop McDaniel installed each of us to this new ministry, he challenged each of us with one or two of the seven flames of renewal as we understand them in the Baptismal Prayer in the Lutheran Book of Worship. As Minister for Parish Life, my task has been to lift up for the Lutheran Church in America in North Carolina knowledge and fear of the Lord; i.e., nurture and growth in fellowship as we seek to understand who we are as God's people and what our mission is. The many pages of this Bulletin of Reports seek to describe that sense of mission and fellowship as we are the church in this place.

## PROGRAM RESPONSIBILITIES AND PARISH SERVICES

In these brief words of my report, I will not attempt to summarize for you the work of each of the synodical committees, boards, or agencies for which I have responsibility. As you look through the reports from the committees which make up the Cabinet for Parish Services, as you read the reports of the Board of Trustees of Lutheridge and Lutheran Outdoor Ministries, and as you note the report of the Committee of District Deans, you will review much of the day to day work in which I have been involved in this ministry. Permit me here to say, "Thank you!" And God's blessings upon each committee, chairperson, board leader and district dean with whom I have been privileged to work. As we have shared the task of ministry in our synod, it has been exciting to work with these people in the nurture and growth of an understanding within our congregations of being the people of God and working in the name of our Lord Jesus Christ.

## PASTORAL RESPONSIBILITIES

The second facet of my work as Assistant to the Bishop, and a new part of this ministry in the administration of Bishop McDaniel, has been to be his liaison to the congregations of the Northern and Southern districts. In this role it has been my joy to be available when pastors and congregations in these two areas have sought guidance, support or clarification as they have worked together in their various parish locations. It has also been my great joy and delight to initiate visits with pastors and congregational leaders. As I have begun to have these significant contacts with our parishes, I sense a vital spirit of cooperation and shared ministry among many of our professional and lay leaders in the church. It is good to sit and look at ministry from

their perspective; and then to share with them insights which we as a bishop and staff have to offer. I look forward in the coming months and years to visiting with every congregation in my specific area of responsibility.

## A PERSONAL WORD

Less than one year ago I was joyously laboring among God's people as a parish pastor. Into the midst of that joy and satisfaction, God chose to come with a call to a new ministry. As I accepted that call many stood by in love and support as I made the transition to this new work. This brief report would not be complete without words of appreciation to Bishop McDaniel, to Mark, Jim, and Dick as we have sought the direction that God would have us take in this ministry together. To Barbara Herpich, and to each of the secretaries and other support people within this office, I also extend my heartfelt thanks. Each of them has made this period of transition much easier. I also appreciate the support and understanding which the pastors and congregations of our synod have given each of us as we have begun this new work. Without it, the transition would have been more difficult, if not completely impossible. And finally, I thank God for the love and support of my wife and children as we have embarked on this new path in our lives.

## INTO THE FUTURE

During the last several weeks, as we have engaged in the Spring District Meetings, Parish Renewal has been the watch word of all that we have been about. As we have travelled from district to district sharing in exciting worship with members of our synod, it is evident that God's spirit is moving mightily among those whom He has called. This next year will present new and diverse challenges as we work to strengthen the lives of our congregations in the areas of worship, support and fellowship; and as we look to 1984 as a year of educational ministry emphasis. May God bless us and direct us as we seek new ways to confess His name and new avenues through which to mediate His love in our world. In the fifth chapter of second Corinthians, St. Paul writes, "therefore, if anyone is in Christ, he is a new creation; the old has passed away, behold, the new has come." Each day is a new creation. Each day God seeks, through the love of His Son, to challenge and renew each of us. Pray that we will continue to be open to that process of renewing, that in every way we may serve Him and proclaim the love which sustains us.

## District Deans

## Central District

The meeting of the Central District was held on October 25th at Union, Salisbury. It was opened with Holy Communion, Bishop McDaniel preacher and celebrant. The sermon challenged us to be creative sojourners and travellers in Christ's Mission. Clyde Haas, pastor at St. David's, Kannapolis, was welcomed to the district. Reports were heard on the LCA Convention, Conference and Camping Ministries, N.C. Lutheran Men, N.C. Lutheran Homes, and Lutheran Family Services. After lunch, Bishop McDaniel and his staff presented plans for their terms of office centered around the affirmation that the Church is One, Holy, Catholic and Apostolic.

The spring meeting was held at St. John's, Statesville on February 20th as a district rally. Bishop McDaniel led the worship and delivered the sermon. At the "roll call of congregations," all were represented but 5 from the district, with representatives from Christ, Elkin present at the rally. Representatives were challenged to encourage Parish Renewal through an Every Member Visit in the Spring to get to know more of our people and to really be the leaven which we are called to be.

## Southern District

## Southwestern District

Bishop McDaniel concluded the three-hour event by introducing new pastors into the Synod and district and sharing his enthusiasm and some specifics concerning the continuing prospects for greater ecumenical relations of the L.C.A. with other church bodies in America.

## Western District

He challenged the church to (1) an inclusive ministry — bring in two persons of color this year; (2) to worship — make it a very high priority; (3) to evangelize — to bring in at least two unchurched people this year; (4) to increase giving — the LCA says 1%, let's increase synod giving by 2%; (5) to bridge building through contacts with two other communions; (6) to advocacy — become personally involved in the world's transforming concerns.

The District Rally Day was hosted by St.Andrew, Hickory on February 26, 1983. Bishop McDaniel generated much enthusiasm among the nearly 300 district church leaders in attendance. Emphasizing stewardship as a way of life, the Bishop said the first step in Christian stewardship is worship which is followed by fellowship and giving. These are three aspects of devotion. To promote fellowship the synod congregations are encouraged to have a spring, April 17 or 24, every member visit. In the fall, November 9, congregational visits for financial commitments will be sought for the support of the church's ministry.

## Report of the Secretary

At the June, 1982 meeting of the Executive Board it was voted that the duties and responsibilities of Secretary of Synod be turned over to me upon David L. Martin's departure in July, 1982 for his call to the Division for Professional Leadership. I want to thank David for his work in completing the 1982 Proceedings of Synod as well as his support as I have worked to fill his shoes.

The many tasks of the Secretary include being Secretary to the Executive Board of Synod, publishing the Bulletin of Reports and Proceedings of Synod, being Secretary to the Committee of District Deans, being Statistician and Archivist and reporting official synodical activities.

#### STATISTICS

Annual parochial reports are received from each congregation. This year, three congregations did not provide reports. The lack of these reports somewhat clouds the statistics of the synod. The following summary of congregational reports for the year ending December 31, 1982 provides a fairly accurate picture for the year 1982:

Ministers — As of December 31, 1982 there are 306 pastors on the roll of synod. There are: 192 parish pastors; 9 serving under call by the synod; 5 officers and staff, 2 mission developers, 9 administrators or faculty of educational or eleemosynary institutions or agencies; 3 serving under call by the LCA Executive Council, 9 military chaplains, and 1 employee of federations of Lutheran Churches; 65 retired pastors, 7 on status on leave from call and 4 applying for status as "on leave from call".

#### **NECROLOGY**

In the sure and certain hope of the resurrection, we lost from our midst 642 members of our congregations by death in 1982. Four pastors have died since the last convention: the Rev. Valdis Mezezers, S.T.M., Th.D.; the Rev. Paul Leopold Miller; the Rev. Lethco C. Bumgarner and the Rev. Vernon Ardell Frick.

#### PROPOSED AMENDMENTS TO THE CONSTITUTION

The following proposed amendments to the Constitution of the North Carolina Synod were PLACED ON NOTICE at the 1982 Convention for consideration at the 1983 Convention.

- Article Seven, Item 4, d
   That Article Seven, Item 4 be amended by adding a new sub-section, reading as follows:
  - ''d. Lutheran Outdoor Ministries, Inc., a corporation chartered by the State of North Carolina and related to the North Carolina Synod of the Lutheran Church in America.''
- 2. Article Two, Section III, paragraph 1

That Article Two, Section III, paragraph 1 be amended by making the last sentence a new paragraph 2 and in its place in paragraph 1 adding the following sentence: "The lay officers of the synod shall be counted as additional delegates from their respective congregations." so that the amendment would read:

- "\*1. The voting body at conventions shall consist of delegates from each congregation and the ordained ministers on the clergy roll. Each congregation shall be entitled to at least one delegate. The lay officers of the Synod shall be counted as additional delegates from their respective congregations.
  - Congregations having more than 300 confirmed members shall be entitled to one additional delegate for each additional 300 confirmed members or fraction thereof.

#### RECOMMENDATIONS

- 1. The two copies of the 1982 Proceedings of the North Carolina Synod held at Lenoir-Rhyne College, June 3-6, 1982 be approved as the official protocol of said convention as certified by the Bishop and Secretary of the Synod.
- 2. That memorial pages including pictures and biographic data of the Rev. Valdis Mezezers, Th.D.; the Rev. Paul Leopold Miller; the Rev. Lethco C. Bumgarner and the Rev. Vernon Ardell Frick be so designated in the 1983 Proceedings.
- 3. That the proposed amendment to Article Seven, Item 4, d, placed on notice at the 1982 Convention be considered.
- 4. That the proposed amendment to Article Two, Section III, paragraph 1, placed on notice at the 1982 Convention be considered.

## Note 1 - Significant Accounting Policies

The North Carolina Synod of the Lutheran Church in America prepares its financial statement on the basis of cash receipts and disbursements; consequently, certain income is recognized when received rather than when earned and certain expenses when paid rather than when the obligation is incurred.

To insure observance of limitations and restrictions placed on the use of available funds an annual budget is prepared. Accounts are classified for accounting and reporting purposes into funds in accordance with activities and objectives of the Synod.

Expenditures for property and equipment are recorded as cash disbursements in the year payments are made. Physical properties are not capitalized and depreciation is not recorded.

## Michael Peeler Trust Fund

Once again in 1982 the Michael Peeler Trust Fund reports a very favorable year for its investments even though market conditions were uncertain, particularly the first half of the year. The Fund was able to make available for Synod's use a total of \$127,109 representing 80% of total income. The remaining 20% was returned to the corpus of the fund as "Reserve for Capital Losses" as authorized by the Executive Board. As of December 31, 1982 assets of the fund stood at \$1,590,350. The custodial arrangement with the trust department of Wachovia Bank, entered into in late 1981, has proved very beneficial and profitable in the efficient handling of the fund. The trustees would encourage other individuals and families to consider seriously the establishment of similar trusts for the continued support of the work of the Kingdom of Christ beyond the life of the donor.

## THE MICHAEL PEELER FUND NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS December 31, 1982

## Note 1 — Summary of Significant Accounting Policies Accrual Basis

The financial statements of The Michael Peeler Fund have been prepared on the accrual basis. The statement of current fund revenues, expenditures and other changes is a statement of financial activities of current funds related to the current reporting period. It does not purport to present the results of operations or the net income or loss for the period as would a statement of income or a statement of revenues and expenses.

Fund accounting — In order to ensure observance of limitations and restrictions placed on the use of the resources available to The Michael Peeler Trust, the accounts are maintained in accordance with the principles of "fund accounting". This is the procedure by which resources for various purposes are classified for accounting and reporting purposes into funds that are in accordance with objectives specified.

Note 2 — The Michael Peeler Fund originated under the terms of the will of the late J. M. Peeler, Salisbury, North Carolina, which stated "I give and bequeath and advise to the North Carolina Lutheran Synod one-half of my estate, to be known as "The Michael Peeler Fund" and the income therefrom is to be used by the Synod each year wherever it is needed most for the advancement of the Kingdom of God". The North Carolina Synod of the Lutheran Church in America received one-half of the estate assets on or about July 31, 1959 and the trust fund was established. On October 8, 1965 they received, also under the terms of the will, one-third of the remaining assets of the estate upon the death of his wife.

- Note 3 Securities are stated on the balance sheet at the values on date of transfer from the Trust of J. M. Peeler with subsequent acquisitions at cost. All assets are held and administered by the Trust Department of Wachovia Bank & Trust Company, NA, Charlotte, North Carolina under a custodianship agreement dated October 27, 1981.
- Note 4 The Michael Peeler Fund is administered by a board of trustees presently consisting of Elmer L. Allen, Jr., Glenn E. Ketner and John W. Cobb.

The trustees, by approval of the Executive Committee of the North Carolina Synod of the Lutheran Church in America, have established a reserve for principal losses fund.

In March 1981 the Executive Committee of the North Carolina Synod of the Lutheran Church in America directed that eighty percent of annual investment earnings of The Michael Peeler Fund be remitted to the North Carolina Synod currently and that twenty percent be retained in The Michael Peeler Fund in reserve for potential principal losses.

- 1. Approved the appointments to Synod Committees as recommended by Bishop Misenheimer. (EBM 6/82)
- Elected the Rev. John W. Cobb as Trustee for the Michael Peeler Fund, term expiring 1985. (EBM 6/82)
- 3. Amended the 1983 Synod Mission Profile to reflect a request for \$15,000 from DMNA for Lutheran Family Services in North Carolina to provide funding for a Public Relations Specialist. (EBM 6/82)
- 4. Approved the election by the Board of North Carolina Lutheran Men of Ed Martin to the Home Mission Foundation for a 12 year term expiring 1994. (EBM 6/82)
- 5. Elected Harry E. Faggart, Jr. to fill the unexpired term of Susan Ellington until the 1983 Convention. (EBM 6/82)
- 6. Elected Josephine Conn to fill the unexpired term of J. Daniel Brown, term expiring 1983. (EBM 6/82)
- 7. Elected the Rev. Robert G. Walker to fill the unexpired term of the Rev. Robert H. Shoffner on the Board of Trustees of Lutheran Theological Southern Seminary, term expiring 1984. (EBM 6/82)
- 8. Affirmed the formation of a State Planning Council for Social Ministry to involve Lutheran judicatories in North Carolina and directed the Bishop to appoint four representatives from the North Carolina Synod, LCA to serve on the Council. (EBM 9/82)
- 9. Approved the recommendation of the Committee on Justice and Social Change to place Lutheran Minority Ministries under the auspices of the American Missions Committee. (EBM 9/82)
- 10. Approved policy recommendations from the Professional Services Committee regarding compensation for supply pastors as follows: Honorarium of \$75-with \$25 for each service more than one and travel expenses of 20 cents per mile to a maximum of \$40; if adequately reimbursed a supply pastor should notify the synod and

11. The Executive Board approved the adoption of the Statement of Mutual Expectations of the North Carolina Synod and Lenoir-Rhyne College as revised November 2, 1982 as follows:

# STATEMENT OF MUTUAL EXPECTATIONS OF THE NORTH CAROLINA SYNOD AND LENOIR-RHYNE COLLEGE

(As Revised, November 2, 1982)

The church's involvement in higher education is vital to its own life and mission and provides a most effective arena for ministry to the world, and the culture of which the Church and College are a part. Therefore, the North Carolina Synod of the Lutheran Church in America and Lenoir-Rhyne College pledge their mutual support and acknowledge their interdependence in the cause of promoting Christian faith and life in the context of the educational enterprise. In so doing, both Synod and College reaffirm their fundamental commitment to Jesus Christ as Lord, and their desire to see Christian insights and perspectives reflected in all educational programs of the Church and its College.

A Statement of Mutual Acknowledgement of the Synod-College Relationship
The mission of the North Carolina Synod of the Lutheran Church in America is
to proclaim the Gospel through Word and Sacraments, to relate the Gospel to
human need in every situation, and to extend the ministry of the Gospel to all
the world.

In pursuit of its mission, the Synod assumes under one of its functions the sponsorship of Lenoir-Rhyne College. The sponsorship furthers this mission by providing the Synod with formal channels for relating the Gospel to and maintaining dialogue with the higher education community, extending the ministry of the Gospel to college students, and contributing to the enrichment of society by aiding in education for Christian leadership.

The mission of Lenoir-Rhyne College is to instruct students in the liberal arts, and selected pre-professional, professional, and graduate studies; and, to aid students in seeking wholeness of personality, true vocation, and the most useful service to God and the world.

In pursuit of its mission, the College assumes as one of its functions a responsible relationship with the North Carolina Synod of the Lutheran Church in America. The relationship furthers this mission by providing the College with a means for defining the theological foundations of its educational program, cultivating a supportive constituency, and maintaining its founding commitment to remain faithful to the Lutheran Church.

- II. Service and Support to be Provided Each to the Other
  - A. The Synod expects of the College:
    - (1) That Lenoir-Rhyne be an accredited four-year college that offers opportunities for personal growth and learning to qualified students, that maintains high standards of academic performance, and provides top-quality education in the liberal arts;
    - (2) That the administration, faculty, and staff be comprised of persons who are skilled in their respective areas of competence, highly motivated, of sound character, and who reflect in their personal lives the fruits of Christian faith:
    - (3) That the administrators, faculty, and staff make the growth of the students their primary concern, giving attention to the academic performance and the personal welfare of each;
    - (4) That the College enroll qualified students without regard to race, sex, or religion, while at the same time giving special encouragement to the enrollment of students from congregations in the Synod;
    - (5) That the College foster a sense of community among those engaged in the educational process, to the end that no person has reason to feel excluded from any desired dimension of community life;
    - (6) That the College reflect the spirit of Christ in all of its relationships,

- giving high visibility to the office of chaplain and maintaining a climate that undergirds persons in the Christian faith and supports the church and its programs:
- (7) That the College provide instruction in the primary documents of the Christian faith, in its history and teaching, and also in the comparative study of religions, and expect its students to acquire knowledge in these fields commensurate with the mastery expected in other fields of study;
- (8) That the College, by its example and through its instructional and cocurricular offerings, seek to enhance the social consciousness of the academic community;
- (9) That the college make available the use of its facilities and its administrative and instructional services to advance the mission of the church;
- (10) That the College prepare persons for professional leadership in the church and provide resources for continuing education for ordained and lay workers;
- (11) That the College strive to develop in its students the motivation to act as responsible members of society and the ability and will to use their talents and training to serve others as well as themselves.
- B. In addition, the College offers to the Synod:
  - Its continuing commitment to the Christian faith and its loyalty as an institution of the church;
  - (2) A means of implementation of the church's concern and society through the involvement of College personnel including students, faculty, and staff, in community services;
  - (3) Its prophetic voice as a commentary on the status of life in society and its concern and counsel for the quality of the life and programs of the church;
  - (4) An annual meeting with representatives of the College for the purpose of reviewing its expectations of the Synod.
- C. The College expects of the Synod:
  - That its congregations will support the recruitment efforts of the College among their youth;
  - (2) That its congregations will support the on-going program of the College through regular budgetary contributions and encourage their members to make special gifts for capital improvements, endowments and other funds;
  - (3) The election of trustees who are committed to the mission and welfare of the College;
  - (4) That its congregations will seek more effective ways to attract and to engage young people in examining, grounding, and embodying those traditional and contemporary values which are consistent with the Gospel of Reconciliation (II Corinthians 5:19);
  - (5) That the Synod assist the College in identifying the distinctive contributions that a college related to the Lutheran Church in America can make in the educational process.
- D. In addition, the Synod offers to the College:
  - (1) Identification as a college of the Synod, and, through the Synod, as a college of the Lutheran Church in America, with a supporting constituency in congregations in North Carolina:
  - (2) Its concern and supportive counsel which call attention to needful changes in the life and programs of the College;
  - (3) The use of synodical and congregational facilities for programs of the College.
  - (4) An annual meeting with representatives of the Synod, for the purpose of reviewing its expectations of the College.

III. Agreement on Regular Contract Between the Synod and the College

The constitution of the North Carolina Synod (Article VII, Section 3), provides that the Board of Trustees of Lenoir-Rhyne "shall report annually to the regular conventions" of the Synod. The College acknowledges the appropriateness of this and stands ready to provide such supplementary reports as may be desired.

The Synod and College recognize the continuing need for discovering new and more effective means of interaction and communication. These might include the interchange of materials and news releases, speakers and lecturers, performing groups and the joint sponsorship of projects of mutual interest.

This statement shall be reviewed by both the Synod and the College at fiveyear intervals. (EBM 12/82)

- 12. Approved the title of "Chapel Ministry" for the ministries at Burnsville and Whiteville since DMNA has turned over responsibility for these ministries to the Synod and therefore should not be called missions. (EBM 12/82)
- 13. The Executive Board approved the request from the North Carolina Lutheran Homes, Inc. for permission to proceed with the development of a master plan for overall use of the 30.99 acres of land in New Hanover County, recently donated for the purpose of erecting facilities for older adults. (EBM 12/82)
- 14. Elected Allan Holderman to the Board of Trustees of Lutheran Family Services, Inc. to fill the unexpired term of the Rev. John R. Jones, III, term expiring 1984. (EBM 3/83)
- 15. The Executive Board recommends to the 1983 North Carolina Synod Convention that permission be given to the Board of Trustees of North Carolina Lutheran Homes to conduct a synod-wide capital funds appeal during the three-year period, 1985-1987 for expansion of its facilities. (EBM 3/83)
- 16. Elected James A. Chesky to be Secretary of Synod to complete the term of David L. Martin expiring August 31, 1982. (EBM 6/82)
- 17. Elected James A. Chesky for a one year term as Secretary of Synod and a one year term as Treasurer of Synod, term beginning September 1, 1982. (EBM 9/82)
- 18. Appointed the Director of Minority Ministries an Ex Officio member of the Cabinet for Mission. (EBM 9/82)
- Directed that the Minutes of Executive meetings be provided to the chairmen of Boards, Cabinets and Committees of Synod. (EBM 6/82)
- 20. Approved providing time at the Executive Board meetings for reports from cabinets in the following rotation:

- 1. Approved Lenoir-Rhyne College, Hickory, as the location and May 26-29, 1983, as the dates for the 1983 Convention of the North Carolina Synod. (EBM 6/82)
- 2. Approved the 1983 Convention of the North Carolina Synod as the site for the 1983 Ordination Service. (EBM 9/82)
- 3. Adopted the procedure that the chair rule out of order any applause at the conclusion of controversial decisions made by the Convention, and follow the ruling with the explanation that Christians of good conscience can be on either side of an issue. (EBM 9/82)
- 4. Requested that St. Stephens Lutheran Church, Hickory, serve as host congregation. St. Stephens agreed to serve. (EBM 12/82)
  - 5. Appointed the Rev. W. Leo Smith Convention Coordinator. (EBM 12/82)

Determined that in 1982 the \$1,000 of financial support for the Seamen's Centers at Wilmington and Morehead City come out of the Evangelism Committee's budget and that, hereinafter, the Seamen's Centers be assigned to the American Missions Committee to become a line item in the budget, and that the Seamen's Centers be handled by the deployed staff person for DMNA. - 16. Reduced the 1983 apportionment for Bethphage, Lincolnton to \$15,596. (EBM 12/82)
- 17. Approved the purchase of a modular unit for use of the Burnsville Chapel Ministry to be placed on land owned by DMNA with monthly repayment of the Home Mission Foundation loan at 2% APR to be made by the Burnsville Chapel Ministry and postponed the similar arrangement for the Whiteville Chapel Ministry for study until the pre-convention meeting of the board. (EBM 3/83)
- 18. Approved the replacement of the badly deteriorated cooling tower on the synod office air conditioning system with an air cooled condenser, cost not to exceed \$17,518. (EBM 3/83)

- 20. Approved the disposal of items of surplus furniture (chairs and tables in the Media Center) and obsolete equipment no longer usable (typewriters and adding machines) from the inventory of the synod office. (EBM 3/83)
- 21. Approved the policy to have non-delegate members of the Bishop's Staff to attend LCA conventions at Synod expense. (EBM 9/82)
- 22. Directed that financial provisions be made for a caucus room at the 1984 LCA Convention for members of the North Carolina delegation. (EBM 9/82)

#### Legal

- 1. Ratified the action of the officers of the synod relinquishing claim the synod might have to the Emmanuel Church property on Main Street in High Point, in executing the release as requested by Emmanuel, High Point. (EBM 6/82)
- 2. Approved the contract, to be executed by the Bishop on behalf of the synod, drawn up between the synod and the Presbyterian Family Life Centers of Charlotte to provide counseling and referral services for pastors and lay professionals and their families. (EBM 6/82)

3. Received the information without action that the Management Committee of DMNA had transmitted to the Executive Council a concern of the Consulting Committee on Minority Group Interests that synods which had not deleted the following provision from their constitutions consider doing so:

"At least one third of the ministers and at least one third of the lay persons elected by this synod as delegates to each convention of the church shall not have been delegates to any previous conventions of the Lutheran Church in America."

The provision was deleted from the Approved Constitution for Synods in 1974 and according to the consulting committee the action was taken because of the feeling that there needs to be more delegates who had attended previous conventions of the church and who were more knowledgeable about the issues being considered by the convention. (EBM 6/82)

4. \*Recommends to the 1983 Convention of Synod the following amendments to the North Carolina Synod Constitution, as approved for the Approved Constitution for Synods by the 1982 LCA Convention, for consideration and action. (EBM 9/82):

ARTICLE TWO, SECTION IV, amendment of, new Item I (Absentee and proxy voting)

That Article Two, Section IV be amended by adding thereto a new Item 1, as follows:

 Proxy and absentee voting shall not be permitted in the transaction of any business of the synod.

ARTICLE THREE, SECTION II, 6, amendment of (corporate responsibilities of bishop)

That Article Three, Section II, 6 be amended as follows:

The bishop shall:

6. be the president of the corporation and be authorized and empowered, in the name of the synod, to sign deeds or other instruments of writing and to affix the seal of the synod when the execution of such documents is ordered by the synod, or required by its constitution, or becomes proper and necessary in carrying on the business of the corporation.

**ARTICLE NINE, SECTION III,** amendment of, new item 5 (congregation temporarily under synodical administration)

That Article Nine, Section III be amended by the addition of a new item 5 to read as follows:

5. The synod may temporarily assume administration of a congregation upon its request or with its concurrence.

ARTICLE TEN, SECTION II, Item 1, amendment of (congregations receiving financial assistance from DMNA)

That Article Ten, Section II, Item 1 of the Approved Constitution for synods be amended to read:

1. Each congregation shall consult the bishop of the synod before taking any steps leading to the extending of a call to a prospective pastor. If a congregation receives current financial assistance from the Division for Mission in North America of the Lutheran Church in America, consultation between that division and the bishop of the synod relative to any pastoral candidate and the amount of compensation shall precede consideration of same by the Church Council.

ARTICLE TWELVE, 8, amendment of (appeals to congregations)

That Article Twelve, 8, be amended to read as follows:

8. No appeal to congregations of this or any other synod of the Lutheran Church in America or other special appeal for the raising of funds shall be conducted by agencies related to or recognized by the synod without the consent of the convention or the Executive Board.

#### ARTICLE TWELVE, Item 10, amendment of (deletion of)

That Article Twelve, Item 10, which reads as follows:

All eligible permanent funds and long-term reserves of the synod may be invested in the Common Investing Fund of the Lutheran Church in America

(Note: The following item was referred back to Executive Council for exact wording):

ARTICLE TEN, SECTION II, Item 5, amendment of (performance of ministerial acts)

That Article Ten, Section II, Item 5 be amended to read as follows:

Item 5. No minister shall preach or perform any ministerial act within the parish of another except at the request or with the consent of the latter, nor shall a minister visit or perform ministerial acts in a vacant congregation except by invitation of its vice pastor.

Ordained ministers shall respect the integrity of the ministry of congregations which they do not serve and shall not exercise ministerial functions therein unless invited to do so by the pastor, or if there is no duly called pastor, then by the vice-pastor in consultation with the church council.

5. Directed the Secretary of Synod to inform the congregations of synod that the following amendments to the Approved Constitution for Congregations from the 1982 LCA Convention ought to impale related amendments in the congregational constitutions. (EBM 9/82):

ARTICLE V, SECTION 4, d, amendment of (removal from the roll)

That Article V, Section 4 be amended to read as follows:

Section 4. Responsibilities of the congregation for fostering faithful membership shall include:

\*d. continuing concern and conscientious pastoral care for members, in an effort to encourage fulfillment of their duties and responsibilities, when they do not partake of Holy Communion, support the church with their offerings, or appear to desire to participate in the life and worship of the congregation. When such members have failed to receive Holy Communion and to make a contribution of record for a period of two consecutive calendar years, they may be removed from the roll of members by the Church Council. This procedure will take place only when there is a pastor under call to serve this congregation or with the approval of the bishop of the synod and after such members have been counseled about the matter, if possible. Such persons who have been removed from the roll of members shall remain persons for whom the church has a continuing pastoral concern.

**ARTICLE V, SECTION 5, d, amendment of ("excommunication"** use of terminology)

That Article V. Section 5. d. be amended to read:

Section 5, d. excommunication, disciplinary action by the church council.

ARTICLE XII, SECTION 4, amendment of ("excommunication" use of terminology)

That Article XII, Section 4 be amended to read:

Section 4. Should the accused be found guilty by the vote of at least a majority two-thirds of the members of the church council and renewed admonition prove ineffectual, the council shall impose one of the following penalties: 1) censure before the council or the congregation; 2) suspension from stated privileges of membership until proof is given of sufficient repentance and amendment for a definite period of time; or 3) excommunication, termination of membership and denial of the sacrament of Holy Communion. A resolution of the council suspending or excommunicating terminating the membership of a member of this congregation shall be delivered to the person in writing.

ARTICLE XII, Section 5, amendment of ("excommunication" use of terminology)

That Article XII, Section 5, be amended to read:

Section 5. Acts of discipline may be considered and revoked by the church council upon receipt of (a) evidence that injustice has been done or (b) evidence of repentance and amendment.

ARTICLE VI, SECTION 2, amendment of (membership of ordained ministers)

That Article VI, Section 2 be amended to read as follows:

The pastor shall be a member of the Lutheran Church in America, or shall promptly apply to become a member thereof upon acceptance of the call of this congregation prior to consideration by the congregation, shall have been recommended for membership by the examining committee of the synod. Should the synod refuse reception, or upon being deposed from the office of the ministry, the pastor shall automatically cease to serve.

ARTICLE VI, \*SECTION 12, amendment of (appointment of vice-pastor during pastoral vacancy)

That Article VI, Section 12 be amended to read:

\* Section 12. During the period of service, a vice-pastor shall have the rights and duties of a regularly called pastor and may delegate the same in part to an interim supply pastor with the consent of the bishop of the synod and the congregation or church council. The vice-pastor and any ordained ministers providing assistance shall refrain from exerting influence in the selection of a pastor.

ARTICLE VI, SECTION 13, amendment of (compensation during disability)

That Article VI, Section 13 be amended by adding a new sentence at the end thereof as follows:

\* Section 13. This congregation shall make satisfactory settlement of all financial obligations to the former pastor before calling a successor. Upon receipt of certification from the Board of Pensions to the effect that the pastor is disabled, this congregation, for a period of ninety days beginning with the date of disability, shall continue payment of the pastor's salary and continue to provide the parsonage or housing allowance.

ARTICLE VII, SECTION 3, amendment of (written notice to members) and

**ARTICLE XIII, SECTION 3** 

That Article VII, Section 3 be amended by adding a new sentence at the end thereof;

And that Article XIII, Section 3 be amended by adding a new sentence to precede the last sentence thereof;

both sentences to read as follows:

Section 3. The posting of such notice in the regular mail, with the regular postage affixed or paid, sent to the last known address of such members shall be sufficient.

ARTICLE VII, amendment of, new section 6 (proxy and absentee voting)

That Article VII, Section 6 (new) read as follows:

Section 6. Proxy and absentee voting shall not be permitted in the transaction of any business of the congregation.

ARTICLE VIII, SECTION 3, amendment of (congregations receiving financial assistance from DMNA)

That Article VIII, Section 3 be amended to read:

Section 3. If this congregation receives current financial assistance from the Division for Mission in North America of the Lutheran Church in America, prior approval of that division must be secured of any pastoral candidate to be considered and of the amount of compensation to be offered. consultation between that division and the bishop of the synod

relative to any pastoral candidate and the amount of compensation shall precede consideration of the same by the church council.

ARTICLE VIII, SECTION 4, amendment of (election of church council members)

That Article VIII. Section 4 be amended to read as follows:

Elected members of the church council shall be chosen by ballot for terms of three years by a majority vote at the annual congregational meeting. Their tenure shall be so arranged that one-third of the terms expire annually. Such members shall be eligible to serve no more than two full terms consecutively. Vacancies occuring ad interim shall be filled by the church council, the appointee to serve until the next **annual** meeting of the congregation.

ARTICLE IX, amendment of new Section 6 (annual review of Parish Register)

That Article IX, Section 6 (new) read as follows:

Section 6. The church council shall provide for an annual review of the Parish Register.

and that the present Section 6 and subsequent Sections be renumbered accordingly.

**ARTICLE IX, amendment of, new Section 12** (congregation temporarily under synodical administration)

That Article IX be amended by the addition of a new Section 12 to read as follows:

Section 12. Upon its request or with its concurrence, this congregation may be placed temporarily under synodical administration.

ARTICLE XII, SECTION 4 ("excommunication" use of terminology)

That Article XII, Section 4 be amended to read:

Section 4. Should the accused be found guilty by the vote of at least *a majority* two-thirds of the members of the church council and renewed admonition prove ineffectual, the council shall impose one of the following penalties:

- (1) censure before the council or the congregation;
- (2) suspension from stated privileges of membership until proof is given of sufficient repentance and amendment for a definite period of time: or
- (3) excommunication. termination of membership and denial of the sacrament of Holy Communion. A resolution of the council suspending or excommuncating terminating the membership of a member of this congregation shall be delivered to the person in writing.

ARTICLE XII, SECTION 5 ("excommunication" use of terminology)

Section 5. Acts of discipline may be considered and revoked by the church council upon receipt of: (a) evidence that injustice has been done or (b) evidence of repentance and amendment.

ARTICLE XIII, SECTION 1, amendment of (adoption of by-laws)

That Article XIII. Section 1 be amended to read as follows:

By-laws The congregation may adopt by-laws which are not in conflict with this congregation. may be adopted or amended by the congregation by the procedure set forth in the first sentence of Section 3 of this Article. Such by-laws may be suspended or amended at any meeting of the congregation by a two-thirds vote of the members present and voting.

ARTICLE XIII, SECTION 2, amendment of (amendment process)

That Article XIII, Section 2 be amended to read as follows:

\* Section 2. The section of this constitution marked with an asterisk are mandatory for all congregations of the Lutheran Church in America. Whenever these sections are amended by the Executive Council and ratified by a convention of the church, the corresponding amendment

shall become effective in this constitution and shall be submitted to the congregation at its next annual meeting as information.

Said amendments shall be submitted in writing to all congregations prior to the convention of the Lutheran Church in America at which such amendments will be presented for ratification.

6. Authorized the transfer of all real property presently owned by the North Carolina Synod and utilized by Lutheran Outdoor Ministries, Inc. and that the officers of the synod execute the deed to such property to Lutheran Outdoor Ministries, Inc.

#### Long Range Planning

- 1. Approved the purchase of video-tape equipment with a \$5,000 grant from the Michael Peeler Fund income. Possible uses of the equipment are taping of special synodical events; diagnostic taping; taping workshops, etc. and taping of shows or programs for synod or district events. (EBM 6/82)
- 2. Due to the "multiplication of Special Sundays", approved the following statement:

As first priority, congregations of the synod are encouraged and expected to observe all "special Sundays" and/or causes that are traditionally determined by the Lutheran Church Year Liturgical Calendar and the LCA's Calendar of Emphasis.

Congregations of the synod are asked to observe any and all other "special Sundays" (such as N.C. Lutheran Homes Sunday, LCW Sunday, etc.), which may be so designated by the synod or its Executive Board, according to a schedule and degree of emphasis determined by the Church Council of a local congregation. Each council shall be expected to hold in proper perspective, not only the interests of the local parish, but also that of the synod and its ministry, as well as the ministry and interests of the Church-at-large.

All requests for a certain Sunday(s) to be designated as "special" (i.e. with the expectation that a specific emphasis will be placed that day on a certain cause, appeal, or program of ministry) are to be submitted to the synod, or its Executive Board for approval. In acting upon such a request the synod or its Executive Board shall, at that time, make its decision by taking into consideration the Liturgical Calendar, the LCA's Calendar of Emphasis, and, the synodical Calendar of Activities, and then determine the appropriateness of the request as well as its duration, and whether offerings may be received, should the request be approved.

(EBM 6/82)

3. In response to an offer from DMNA to help synod survey its performance of mission, Bishop McDaniel asked and the Executive Board approved conducting a "Synod Mission Audit" and appointing a committee to develop the issues to be dealt with in the process. The results of the Audit, held in March, 1983, are to be reported to the Executive Board as soon as possible. (EBM 9/82, 12/82, 3/83)

4. The 1982 Convention of Synod requested the new Bishop and his staff to emphasize stewardship throughout synod in 1983. This led to the development by Bishop McDaniel of a plan for "Parish Renewal". The plan which was endorsed by the Executive Board is as follows:

#### PARISH RENEWAL

The Constitution of the Lutheran Church in America states that "this church lives to be the instrument of the Holy Spirit in obedience to the commission of its Lord." The source of the church is nothing less than God Himself, for the grace given to us at the font, the pulpit, and the altar — the Word — is God's own self-giving, binding us to Himself that we might be free from the destructive idols which would otherwise destroy us.

Just as there are no restrictions of God's grace, there can be no restrictions surrounding the community of faith which that grace creates. This all-inclusive fellowship is centered upon its source — the worship in which God bestows His gifts. Worship is therefore both the origin and nurture of the church, first in order of both time and importance!

Those who are born anew and nurtured by preaching and the sacraments are those whom God has called. Their fellowship with Him and one another is the church, and the word which explains their bond is "faith". The word and faith constitute the Church, and it is in the gathered community of faith around the altar (= the Parish) that the Church exists.

Without primary attention to the Means of Grace and the fellowship of faith, nothing else can follow. But where such attention is given, the result is the "universal spiritual priesthood of all believers" — Christians whose devotion to their Lord is expressed not simply on their knees, but in every facet of life. Properly understood, the term "Stewardship" covers all this — Worship and Music, the fellowship groups in the church, property, finance, education, social ministry, and evangelism. To lift our vision to this broader meaning, we have chosen to speak, however, not of "Stewardship" but of that sweeping "renewal" which the Gospel brings to those who have encountered it.

In order that "Parish Renewal" might truly characterize our synod, the next four years might well stress (in 1983) Worship, Fellowship and Finance; (in 1984) Education; (in 1985) Social Ministry; and (in 1986) Evangelism. The following schedule is being prepared:

- January/February 1983. Church Council members, pastors, and all members
  of all congregatonal committees will attend the District Church Days. At these
  events (given over entirely to the presentation of the objectives of Parish
  Renewal), the Bishop will present Biblical and Theological bases, and motivation for involvement. The acquainted (and local causes).
- April 11, 1983. Deadline for response from all congregations indicating their participation in the emphasis in all its aspects. (At March meetings of church councils, congregations will be committed to the emphasis.)
- May, 1983. At the annual convention, the Bishop will lead the entire convention through a study of LCA stewardship materials, interpret local, synodical, and world-wide ministries, and train delegates to equip their congregations for the Every-Member-Visitation in the fall.
- October, 1983. Fall District Meetings will be entirely devoted to a review of congregational progress. Sessions will be held in the evening, involving all members of each congregation's EMV team. The Bishop will instruct those present in carrying out the 1983 EMR.
- Sunday, November 13, 1983 (the 24th, and next-to-last, Sunday after Pentecost) will be EMR Sunday throughout the synod. (Note: there will be no

more apportionment consultations in congregations. Each congregation will either accept or reject its fair share apportionment.)

 January/February, 1984. At the District Church Days (which will be devoted to parish education), there will be a report and evaluation of the 1983 emphasis and its results, with guidance for year-round stewardship planning as a normal procedure.

In the implementation of the "COMMITMENT" emphasis, the Bishop will serve as the coordinator, assisted by his staff and the members of the synodical cabinets, especially the stewardship committee. Inasmuch as the 1982 Synod Convention mandated the leadership of the synod, and unanimously mandated the emphasis on stewardship, it is anticipated that the above agenda will find hearty cooperation on the part of all concerned. It will be noted that all training will take place at district and synodical events which are already scheduled. Thus, there will be **no cost** to the synod beyond the cost of materials and communication.

There is much work ahead for all of us. The District Deans, in particular, will be asked to keep a closer watch on congregations, especially with regard to their participation in Parish Renewal. (EBM 12/82)

The remaining 10% of the budget (\$321,000) will be apportioned on the basis of current expenses.

The Executive Board recommends that

In calculating the 1984 Per Capita Apportionment that the 51 congregations with less than 100 Confirmed, Communing or that the 12 congregations with 100-124 CCC's with 2.75% of the Synod's CCC's have that percentage reduced one-third to Contributing (CCC) Members with 7.61% of the Synod's CCC Membership have that percentage reduced one-half to 3.81%, 1.84%, that the 17 congregations with 125-149 CCC's with 4.99% of the Synod's CCC's have that percentage reduced onefourth to 3.75%, that the 31 congregations with 200-249 CCC's with 14.9% of the Synod's CCC's have that percentage increased by 1% to 15.9% and that the 73 congregations with 250 or more CCC's with 60.46% of the Synod's CCC's have that percentage increased by 4.95% to 65.41%.

# **Communications**

The Communications Committee has met three times: August 28, 1982, and January 8, and March 26, 1983. The following important actions and comments are reported to the convention:

Church Days Presentation (Spring, 1983). The committee had planned to make a presentation at each district church day. The presentation was to have dealt with the preparation and publishing of congregational newsletters, offering helps in that area. Briefer comments were to be provided for public relations, media use, bulletin format, and topics raised in the session. The change in the format of the spring church days negated this activity. As an alternative, the committee plans to put the newsletter helps on video tape to be made available through the Media Center. Tape format will be of the type usable on home video player systems making the tape accessible to almost all synod congregations.

North Carolina Lutheran. In an effort to continue improving the North Carolina Lutheran, to make it more cost effective, and to expand circulation, the committee made the following decisions:

- \* established guidelines for the position of assistant editor. These enable the assistant editor to serve as acting editor in the event of the incapacity or disability of the editor.
- \* made the move to expand coverage by publishing eight-page issues in 1983. This costs only 25 cents more per subscription over the amount needed to cover actual costs for four-page issues.
- \* set 1983 subscription rates at \$2.00 for the every-active-home plan and \$2.75 for individual (or \$5.00 for a two-year individual subscription). It is hoped and expected that these same rates can be held for 1984.
- \* initiated the shared-cost plan of offering two-pages of coverage to synod institutions and agencies at cost. This provided an economical way for these institutions/agencies to have larger coverage and at the same time increased revenue for the NC Lutheran.
- \* in an effort to increase congregational subscriptions for 1984, the NC Lutheran has offered to church councils of congregations not on the every-home-plan at the EHP rate for the remainder of 1983. This is a one-time promotional offer not to be repeated next year.
- \* changed printers in March, resulting in reduced publication costs.

We express our thanks to Miss Elsie Hamilton, editor, for her fine work. We have received many compliments about the NC Lutheran. We appreciate the contributions made by Ray Petrea and Betty Hardin who have served and are serving respectively as assistant editors.

Special thanks go to Mrs. Frances Huddle, our retiring business manager. She has taken her work seriously and been dedicated to it. The NC Lutheran has benefited from her service. This convention is to elect her replacement. The committee has reviewed many applications in the process of making its nomination to you. Qualified and capable leadership has been our uppermost consideration since the business manager is the one who deals directly with our synod congregations, our printer, and our mailer.

Convention News Bureau. The members of the committee staff a news bureau during the convention. News from the convention is given several times daily to print and electronic media, especially to the media of a delegate's hometown. As in previous years, the news bureau will provide a convention summary for delegates to take home.

**Other.** We congratulate Paul Conrad for the extensive coverage of the N.C. Synod in the *Lutheran* magazine. He serves us well as synod correspondent. The *Lutheran* coverage of the people of our synod far out-stripped that of any other synod. Thank you, Paul.

## Committee on Historical Work

The Committee on Historical Work met three times during the past reporting year.

The Cruse Historical Collection was dedicated on May 30, 1982 with appropriate services in the Church House at Salisbury. Approximately one hundred persons attended the ceremony and reception.

Sponsored by the Historical Committee, the first meeting of people interested in Lutheran History of the Southeast was held in St. John's, Salisbury on October 9, 1982. Fifteen people from five states gathered for the consultation with the leadership of Dr. M. Luther Stirewalt, Jr. The second meeting was held on March 12, 1983. The committee will continue to work with this group in promoting the formation of a well-founded organization to promote the study of Lutheran history in the Southeast.

Plans are being formulated to encourage congregations to participate in the 1983 Martin Luther 500th Birthday Observances. A special mailing of resource materials will be sent to each congregation later this year. Announcements of anniversary events will be forthcoming.

The Rev. Gene Bost and the Rev. Woodrow Frick are serving as a sub-committee to work on up-dated materials for a revision of the book, "Biographical Sketches of N.C. Lutheran Ministers." The committee is planning for the revised publication in 1985

Jo Mims, Archivist, was employed October 1, 1982 for a two year period. Her responsibilities consist of the development of an office records management system, work with papers of previous bishops of synod, and to access the Cruse Collection which is to be kept intact and not to be absorbed into the Archives as a whole.

The filmstrip presentation: Your Lutheran "Heritage: Yours to Preserve" is available for loan to congregations. "Guidelines for Congregational Archives Committee" is being compiled and will be available to interested persons.

The committee continues to be concerned with the microfilming of congregational records and will work with local congregations in securing these services. The congregational appointment of a continuing historical committee would be a positive step in the preservation of records and artifacts.

Awareness of and appreciation for the Lutheran heritage in North Carolina can best be strengthened by the active participation in the preservation of the records that portray this history.

# Cabinet for Professional Leadership

The capable leadership and in-depth experienced membership of the committees in this cabinet make my responsibility in reporting to the convention an easy task. The wide range of concerns and activities covered in their reports bespeak the primary concerns of the cabinet — to guarantee the support of the Church to our people preparing for professional leadership and to continue to ensure this same kind of support for them once their preparatory academic efforts are completed.

In my capacity as chairman I have attended as many of the scheduled committee meetings as possible and have worked in a special session with chairmen Brady Faggart and Bob Troutman to prepare the convocation presentation. I participated in the Synod-CWA budget consultation in preparation for 1984.

The seminarians' retreat at Camp Lutheridge last fall was a highlight experience of the year — meticulously prepared and administered. The fall retreat, with lectures by Dr. Martin Heinecken, was intellectually stimulating and spiritually strengthening.

Careful and prayerful study of the two reports which follow will prepare the delegates and pastors for real involvement in the cabinet convocation at the 1983 Convention.

### Professional Service Committee

The Professional Service Committee organized its work during the past year around three major areas of concern for the synod's professional leaders. These are:

- Education, chaired by Rev. John Merck
- Compensation and Lay Professional Concerns, chaired by Rev. William Ketchie
- Ministry Concerns, chaired by Rev. David Nelson

As the following reports and recommendations indicate, the committee identified several critical issues which must be addressed by the synod, the bishop, and the congregations. First in importance is the issue of FINANCIAL SUPPORT FOR PROFESSIONAL LEADERS. A survey made in 1982 reveals that, even with the modest level of minimum compensation, many of our ministers receive less than the synod's guideline amount. The committee considers this to be a very serious problem, not only for the professional leaders and congregations involved, but for the entire synod. Both morale and mobility are influenced when ministers and lay professional leaders receive inadequate financial support. If congregations are unable to provide a minimum level of support, it may indicate the need for other ways of providing ministry, such as mergers, multiple parishes, or part-time service.

A second issue is the failure of some professional leaders to engage in CON-TINUING EDUCATION experiences. The fall Convocation at Lutheridge offers outstanding educational events and leaders. Southern Seminary continues to provide events of superior quality. College and community events are offered throughout the synod. Yet some professional leaders participated in no continuing education events last year. Congregational leaders should encourage ministers and lay professional leaders to continue learning and skill development, and should assist with both money and time for participation.

A third issue relates to those congregations which employ LAY PROFESSIONAL LEADERS. The committee is aware that some of these staff persons have no job agreement or contract specifying the terms and conditions of employment. Both the individual and the congregation may suffer when expectations and understandings are not provided in a written agreement. The committee has developed a suggested model for congregational use, and will provide copies upon request.

A fourth issue concerns the NEWLY ORDAINED PASTOR. The newly ordained pastor needs to feel a part of the Church. To simply place a pastor after ordination in a church is not enough. A follow-through of contact and concern is necessary. A

climate for caring with a specific "Care Partner" might be a possible solution. Such things as a one-to-one relationship for support, a listening ear, and a sense of peership with a fellow pastor helps to define a "Care Partner's" role. It may be that the Deans can serve as the coordinator or the facilitator of this kind of linkage for newly ordained pastors.

A fifth area is SUPPORTIVE CONCERNS for the parish pastor. A first focal point is evaluation. How can the parish pastor become comfortable with the Congregation's expectations, long range goals, and vice versa? How can there be a meeting of the minds with an effort to have a good marriage between pastor and congregation? It is important that the concept of evaluation to be properly defined, for the meaning of evaluation is to "add value to" something. There is caution that it not be seen as a critical and threatening experience.

A second focal point is conflict management. While this is a traumatic concern for any pastor or congregation, it does not have to be destructive experience. Growth, insight, and support can be gained by all concerned. One of our goals is to help develop a mechanism for resolution of conflicts and a climate for airing feelings and concerns before a major conflict has developed.

The following reports and recommendations indicate the scope of the committee's work.

- 1. The Fall Convocation for Pastors and Lay Professionals was held October 27-29 at Lutheridge. Attendance at this event surpassed previous years. Dr. Martin J. Heinecken presented five stimulating keynote addresses on the theme, "Applying Our Theology to a Changing World." Participants were also engaged in one of six workshops: De-Stressing the Professional Leader, Financial Life Planning, In Good Spirits, Professional Leadership and Personal Identity, Stewardship as a Way of Life and Teaching Our Theology. Meaningful devotional experiences were led by the chaplain throughout the event.
- 2. The 1983 Fall Convocation for Pastors and Lay Professionals will be held October 3-5 at Lutheridge. The keynote speaker will be Dr. H. George Anderson. Dr. Anderson will be addressing the theme, "Shaping Our Emerging Church." Six workshops related to personal, professional and congregational concerns will be conducted by a superb staff. The committee believes this to be another highlight experience for growth in ministry.
- 3. The Concerns for Professional Leaders Sub-Committee was involved in the development of the Counseling and Referral Program, a program of pastoral evaluation, consultation and counseling for recognized Lutheran pastors and lay professional leaders and their families of the North Carolina Synod. The program provides opportunities for help for emotional, family, marital, spiritual and vocational problems utilizing certified marriage and family therapists. As determined by the Center's staff, referrals may be made to certified clinical psychologists, psychiatrists and physicians. The program provides for a screening and selection process of counselors and therapists engaged by the program that gives assurance they are qualified professionally, and sensitive to the religious and spiritual dimensions of church professionals. This program is administered in strict confidentiality with no names or confidential reports being submitted to executives or representatives of the Lutheran Church in America and its North Carolina Synod. This program is made available by a contractual agreement between the Presbyterian Family Life Center, Inc., of Charlotte, N.C., and the North Carolina Synod, L.C.A.
- 4. Continuing Education Fund Grants have been available to professional leaders through this committee. Scholarships are available to those in need to support and affirm our leaders in their efforts to enhance and maintain competencies in ministry.
- 5. Congregational Mutual Ministry Committees are strongly recommended by this committee for each congregation. Basically these are separate committees within each congregation which seek to strengthen the ministry shared by all the baptized people of God, whether lay persons or pastors or professional lay leaders, by such means as: developing open communication concerning attitudes and conditions within the congregation; being a "listening post" for the pastor or lay professional leader; leading in appraisal of the ministry of the pastor, lay professional leader, and congregation; and identifying continuing education goals. Assistance in

developing such committees is available either through this committee or through the Division for Professional Leadership.

- 6. Guidelines for Lay Professional Compensation. In 1982 the synod adopted a guideline for compensation of certified lay professionals (1982 Proceedings, p. 177). We have received requests for actual dollar amounts in reference to compensation of public school teachers. For 1983 the minimum compensation for a Level I Lay Professional (Bachelor's degree) would be \$15,612. For a Level II Lay Professional (Master's degree), it would be \$17,076, based on N.C. state compensation figures.
- 7. Results of Compensation Survey. In late 1982 we requested information on ministers' compensation as compared to the guidelines adopted by the synod at the 1982 convention (1982 Proceedings, p. 176). Our purpose was to determine whether the recommended guidelines were realistic. Seventy responses were received, of which seven had incomplete data. From the 63 valid responses, the following information was secured:

More than guideline compensation\* plus 1% per year for experience = 6.3%Guideline compensation plus 1% per year for experience = 1.5%Guideline compensation without experience addition = 11.1%Within \$500 of guideline compensation = 7.9%= 11.1%\$501 to \$1000 below guideline compensation \$1001 to \$1500 below guideline compensation = 11.1%= 4.7% \$1501 to \$2000 below guideline compensation More than \$2000 below guideline compensation = 34.9%Ministers receiving minimum of \$15,200 = 11.1%

\*Guideline compensation is based on congregation's current operating expense. Based on our analysis of this data we are proposing the guidelines listed below in Recommendation 2. The entry level is raised by \$800 or 5.2%. The experience factor is changed from 1% per year to 1% for each five years of experience.

8. **Supply Services + Travel Expenses.** The 1982 Synod Convention referred to this committee a resolution on policies for supply services and travel expenses (1982 Proceedings, p. 287). The response of the committee to parts 1 and 2 of the resolution is Recommendation 1 below. The committee will respond to part 3 of the resolution at the 1984 convention of the synod.

- The minimum and entry level salaries are to be increased by an additional one percent (1%) for every five years of experience in the ministry of the pastor.
- Where a housing and utility allowance is given it should be figured at no less than an additional thirty percent (30%) of the salary.

#### **EXAMPLES**

- A. (A pastor with 17 years of experience serving a mission congregation.)
  The minimum salary is \$15,000. To this you add 3% or \$450 for his/her years of experience. The total comes to \$15,450 for this pastor if a parsonage and utilities are being provided by the congregation. A housing and utility allowance would be no less than 30% of the \$15,000 or \$4,500. With a housing and utility allowance the pastor's salary would equal \$19,950. (\$15,000 + \$450 + \$4,500)
- B. (A pastor with 7 years in the ministry serving a congregation with a budgeted current operating expense of \$52,000.)

  The entry level salary would be \$20,000. He would receive an additional 1% of the \$20,000 for his/her years experience which would come to an additional \$200. If a housing and utility allowance were given, then this would come to an additional 30% of the \$20,000 or a total of \$6,000. The pastor's salary would be \$20,200 with a parsonage and utilities provided or \$26,200 with a housing and utility allowance.
- C. (A pastor with 24 years in the ministry serving a congregation with a budgeted current operating expense of \$92,000.)

  The entry level salary would be \$25,000 plus an additional 4% added because of his/her years of experience. Four percent of \$25,000 equals \$1,000. If he/she gets a housing and utility allowance, then you add 30% of \$25,000 or a total of \$7,500. The pastor's total salary would be \$26,000 with a parsonage and utilities provided or \$33,500 with a housing and utility allowance.

# Report of Lutheran Theological Southern Seminary

Lutheran Theological Southern Seminary in its 153rd year found itself in the midst of transition. Much of the year was involved in the search for a new president. The face of the board saw the greatest change in its recent history. New members, elected from the supporting Synods, resulted in almost one-third turnover in Board membership.

On November 4th the Board, upon the nomination of the Search Committee, elected Dr. Mack Carison Branham, Jr., President. We express deep appreciation for the long, faithful effort of this Committee of Bishop Herman W. Cauble, Chairman; Dr. Joseph Ridenhour, Bishop Virgil Moyer, Dr. Scott Hendrix and Mr. George Onstad. Dr. Branham's inauguration was held at Ebenezer Lutheran Church, Columbia, S.C., on January 28, 1983. The Rev. Dr. James Crumley, Jr., Bishop of the Lutheran Church in America, was the speaker.

An orientation session for the new board members was held prior to the Fall meeting on November 3, 1982. A workshop retreat has been scheduled for August 23-26 for the entire board and others to update future planning and direction for the Seminary.

The Seminary, like so many other institutions, is feeling the pressure of the tight economy. We have been able to stay "in the black" over the past several years by cutting costs and careful planning. Inflation, especially rising energy costs, is making it increasingly difficult to keep a balanced budget. New levels of support must be reached by our supporting synods, alumni and interested friends if we are to adequately meet our future needs.

The Seminary had a 12 percent increase in enrollment over 1981-82. Our student body has become more inclusive in recent years. This year women make up 12 percent of the student body; Blacks, 7 percent; and Asians, 2 percent. Only one Hispanic is enrolled for 1982-83.

After three years of study and evaluation, the Board of Trustees, upon the recommendation of the faculty, authorized the new curriculum which was implemented with the Fall semester. The faculty, in consultation with the Academic Affairs Committee of the Board of Trustees, continues to evaluate and to make needed adjustments based on the needs of the Church and students.

During the past year, the Seminary Board of Trustees, administration, faculty and staff have been involved in a self-study process in preparation for re-accreditation with the Association of Theological Schools and for accreditation with the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools. The accreditation team, composed of representatives from both accreditation agencies, is scheduled to visit the campus during the last week of April.

# Cabinet for Parish Services

The Cabinet is composed of the chairpersons of Educational Ministry, Worship and Music, Youth Ministry, Stewardship, Evangelism, Parish Life and Ministry Development, along with the Executive Director and representatives of Lutheridge and Outdoor Ministry. The Rev. Richard R. Campbell, Minister for Parish Life for the North Carolina Synod, also serves on this cabinet.

The cabinet seeks to coordinate the efforts of our committees so that duplication of tasks might be averted. In doing so, committees become aware of each other's tasks and programs, areas of common concern are shared, goal setting and overall planning for cabinet sponsored events can take place. In consultation with the synod's financial officer and under the mandate to remain at the same level as 1983, we prioritized the cabinet's budget requests from the various committees.

Our major project this year has been the effort to make the cabinet a more effec-

tive entity by setting specific goals for its future. Planning is underway to make the Cabinet for Parish Services the tool and the clearing house for meeting the parish needs of our synod.

# Lutheran Outdoor Ministries, Inc.

1982 has been an excellent year for Lutheran Outdoor Ministries. In every aspect these are fruitful and joyous times in this ministry of the church. As we evaluate the programs, finances and facilities we are happy to report that 1982 was a record year. We hosted 5,116 camper days last year. We are "The Church Without Walls"; serving the needs of congregations in the conference and camping ministry. We wish to share some of the exciting things that happened last year and events for this year.

- Utilization of our facilities was up 3% over 1981 even though Kure Beach Retreat Center was closed August 15. We hosted 142 groups for 5,116 camper days a record year for Lutheran Outdoor Ministries. Currently we are turning away as many reservations as we are taking because space is not available. Reservations should be made six months in advance.
- 2. As of December 31, 1982, Lutheran Outdoor Ministries had received \$161,388.72 from the Conference and Camping Ministries Appeal. Of this amount — \$71,687.75 had been spent at Kure Beach and \$12,616.92 at Agape Camp. We wish to express our appreciation to all individuals and congregations who have supported this ministry with their special gifts.
- Appeal Funds have been used at Agape Camp to construct a dining shelter, for development of the river front, and for a road to the river. Additional development at Agape, if funds are available, will include a retreat cabin, activities building, swimming pool and shelter.
- The Lutheran Men's Retreat Lodge hosted 74 groups in 1982 a record number. To help maintain this unit a daily portion of each person's registration fee is placed in a sinking fund for future repairs. On December 31, 1982 this fund totalled \$8.278.78.
- 5. The Dedication and Opening of the new Kure Beach Retreat Center will be held on Monday, June 13, 1983 at 3:00 p.m. The new center will contain three buildings connected by decks. A single story building will serve as assembly-dining and include a kitchen and kitchenette. Two 2-story buildings will be provided for living and sleeping quarters; one unit with motel type room and one with dormitory rooms. The ocean front center will be of brick for low maintenance and is designed for up to 46 persons in a group or for two smaller groups with separate dining and kitchen facilities.
  - This unit is Programmatically designed for various utilization. It will host up to 46 youths or 30 adults, or 12 couples, or eight families. Each level contains two motel rooms and four dormitory rooms. Cost of the center, including paved parking, solar hot water, air-conditioning, and carpet is \$275,000.00. The furnishings will be an additional \$25,000.
- Reservations for the new Kure Beach Retreat Center will be received on February 1, 1983. Fall date may be made any time after February 1, 1983. Rates for the new will be based on per person per room. The week of July 24-31 is designated as Small Group Week. Reservations should be made by calling Mr. & Mrs. Kenneth Deal, Managers — Phone No. (919) 458-8723.
  - Additional informations will be provided when reservations are made.
- The Convention Synod approved the formation of a new corporation LUTHERAN OUTDOOR MINISTRIES. Since that time many changes have taken

place, including new office at 975 Walnut Street — Suite 313, Cary, N.C. 27511. Phone No. (919) 469-3118.

Please note these changes so we can better serve you in Outdoor Ministries.

- 8. The Conference and Camping Ministries Appeal is on the way to a successful campaign 98% of our challenge goal has been reached and 42% of commitments has been paid. We encourage every congregation to join the family and help support this program. Our construction is ahead of our income. In opening the Kure Beach Retreat Center in June 1983, it will be necessary for us to borrow \$60,000. We hope you will help and reduce this amount.
- 9. A new program for volunteers at Agape Camp has been established by Lutheran Outdoor Ministries. The Agape Club is an informal association of persons interested in supporting and participating in the development of Outdoor Ministries. It has been established to facilitate the involvement and recognition of those persons who devote their time, talent and treasure to the fulfillment of the Church's mission in Outdoor Ministries. The first Agape Club Fellowship dinner will be held October 22, 1983 at the Agape Camp.

We express our sincere appreciation to you, the Camp Committee, the Board of Trustees of Lutheran Outdoor Ministries, to the Executive Board of Synod, to the Bishop and his staff, to our total synod and congregations, to Mr. Paul Briggs, Architect, and to our current staff and the many volunteers who labored together to make this ministry possible. As we continue into the future the demands will increase for more and new programs. The challenge stands before us and with God's help and guidance let us continue in this ministry of the Church.

# Conference and Camping Ministries Appeal

The Conference and Camping Ministries Appeal is now in its third and final year. Authorized by the synod in 1979 for the years 1981-83, to gather funds to upgrade the physical facilities at Lutheridge and the Agape and Kure Beach retreat centers, the appeal has received strong support throughout the synod. By February 15, 1983, contributions totaled \$744,280 and there were \$834,305 in open pledges or stated intentions by congregations, which together totaled 98.3 percent of the \$1,600,000 challenge goal.

The total amount to be realized from the appeal will depend on the way the congregations fulfill their stated intentions. Most of the 125 congregations that declared their stated intentions to contribute certain amounts are meeting such assumed obligations in orderly manners and predictably will be able to complete their contributions as scheduled.

However, there are some that apparently made their intentions in good faith but with poor planning, and so are falling behind schedule. By the end of June 1983, 80 percent of a congregation's stated intention should have been contributed if the congregation is on schedule.

In addition to the congregations that have made stated intentions, there are approximately 40 congregations that have made contributions, some of them monthly. Such contributions constitute a significant portion of the total receipts. A few congregations have made no contributions at all.

The Progress Director receives all funds for the appeal either by transfer from the Treasurer of the Synod or directly from the donors. He then pays expenses for the appeal, forwards all funds designated for specific purposes, and divides the rest, 55 percent to Lutheridge and 45 percent to Lutheran Outdoor Ministries.

The Progress Committee has met periodically to review the appeal and to give

guidance to the Progress Director. The Lutheran Laymen's Movement Fund Raising Service has been represented at most meetings of the Progress Committee and continues to give oversight to the appeal.

It is important that interest in the appeal and its purposes be maintained at a high level through the remainder of 1983 so that our people will be encouraged to fulfill their stated intentions. As this is done, we will rejoice in the fulfillment of a most important project.

# **Educational Ministry Committee**

According to the N.C. Synod By-Laws, Section V, D the Committee on Educational Ministry "shall work together with the Division of Parish Services and congregations of the synod to broaden the scope and improve the quality of Educational Ministry within the synod" and "shall stimulate and help congregations as they develop learning goals, particularly those related to the Christian home, and Vacation Church School, the Weekday Church School, the Sunday Church School, Confirmation Ministry, Children's activities, Special interest groups and kindergartens, and leadership development." The Committee on Educational Ministry has sought throughout the year to meet its purpose through programs designed to enhance learning across the synod in the congregations.

The Reverend Richard R. Campbell, Minister for Parish Life, was welcomed as the staff person for our committee. We have benefited from his leadership and look forward to his involvement in the committee's work in the years to come.

EDUCATIONAL MINISTRY RESOURCE TEAMS: Mrs. Marie Mauney has served the committee with excellence in her role as EMRT co-ordinator over the past year. Three teams of five members each were trained and put to work in the districts of the synod. The teams have been involved in over 45 workshops, consultations and banquets; served over 35 congregations; and worked with over 282 educational leaders in the congregations of the synod. Personal contacts have been made by team members with congregations and fliers and brochures have been sent to congregations. Resource Team members have been trained to help congregations work on Educational Minstry concerns and have proven to be a valuable asset to congregations that have taken advantage of what they have to offer.

CONFIRMATION MINISTRY: "Catechetics for Today" is being used widely across the synod. More and more congregations are becoming involved in the "Campfirmation" program at Lutheridge and Lenoir-Rhyne. We look forward to expanding the Campfirmation program to our Camp Agape and Kure Beach retreat centers in the not too distant future.

MULTI-MEDIA CENTER: Mrs. Dot Helms is the committee representative in charge of surveying resources available in our Multi-Media Center. The center is a library of materials, films, video tapes, filmstrips, records, etc. and is widely used by the congregations of the synod. Mrs. Betty Munday manages the center and we commend her for her excellent service. The Educational Ministry Committee continuously reviewing our media center needs and makes purchases and replacements whenever possible.

VACATION CHURCH SCHOOL: No training for workshops in Vacation Church School were offered this year to synods across the LCA. Similarly, no workshops were held in the synod this year. Fewer congregations are sending VCS directors and teachers for training since more and more educators are finding that they can deal easily with the VCS materials without special training.

THE PASTOR AS TEACHER: "The Pastor As Teacher" was offered at the fall convocation for pastors and lay professionals at Lutheridge. Dr. Dick Evenson led the workshop which was well received.

During 1984 the N.C. Synod will be given a year long emphasis to the importance of Sunday Church School and other aspects of educational ministry. During the fall of 1984 the LCA will be coming out with an "alternate material" designed to replace the "parish education" materials that came out in the 1960's. This new "alternate material" and the currently available "educational ministry" material will be available to congregations from the LCA. Among other things the new "alternate material" will seek to make the scriptures more visible, be adaptable for smaller classes, and be built around teams, and incorporate into the year more "intergenerational" or "all-school" events.

Your Educational Ministry Committee is grateful for the response we have received from congregations and individuals during the past year. Educational Ministry in its various forms and settings is part of the central focus in the life of the congregations, and we are grateful for the many teachers in our congregations who are dedicated to their calling to proclaim Christ in an educational setting. Again, we thank the Reverend Richard Campbell for his leadership and guidance throughout the year.

# **Evangelism Committee**

The Operational Committee on Evangelism concentrated its efforts this year in two areas: 1) Spiritual growth of pastors and lay persons and 2) providing enthusiastic, spirit-filled Evangelism Consultants to assist congregations in spreading the Good News about Jesus Christ. The ways in which we pursued these goals are outlined below:

- 1) Evangelism Consultants In order to increase the effectiveness of our E.O. Consultants we a) recruited new consultants to balance each district, b) trained these consultants both intellectually and spiritually, c) targeted specific congregations to engage in a series of 3 to 4 consultations. We remain convinced that consulting with individual congregations holds the best opportunity for our committee to truly assist congregations in experiencing and sharing the love of Jesus Christ.
- 2) Pastor as Witness A Lenten-Easter Preaching event was held January 3-5, 1983. Using as a basis "applying our theology to a changing world," Dr. Richard Thulin, professor of homiletics at Gettysburg Seminary, directed participants through a study of the Gospel lessons for Lent-Easter 1983. A Preaching from Commitment Workshop is scheduled for Spring 1984.
- 3) Witness in Small Parish A large percentage of synod congregations have less than 250 baptized members. A group of pastors and lay members from 14 of these parishes will participate in a "Witness in the Small Parish" conference, September 23-24, 1983 at Camp Agape.
- 4) Word and Witness Our efforts to encourage congregations to participate in the Word and Witness Bible Study program were directed primarily through the E.O. Consultants. We also provided assistance in obtaining scholarships. Six congregations utilized Word and Witness for the first time.
- Carolina's Evangelism Conference The North Carolina Synod will again participate in the planning of the 1984 conference, January 29-31. This is the only such conference currently held in the LCA.
- 6) Abundant Life Missions We expanded our efforts to encourage the use of Abundant Life Missions as a means of spiritual renewal. We publicized articles

in the *N.C. Lutheran* and *The Lutheran* magazines. Several congregations experienced successful weekends. The ultimate impact seems to depend upon the pastors/congregations efforts to follow through with what is begun during the weekend.

- 7) The Rev. James R. Connelly, Jr. Deployed Staff Person of the Division for Parish Services has contributed to our committee by giving skilled, creative, loving guidance. His experience is a tremendous help and his dedication to the tasks at hand is appreciated by all committee members.
- 8) The Rev. Richard Campbell Synodical Minister for Parish Life is the bishop's staff person who relates directly to our committee. Richard's enthusiasm and zestful love for God and people impregnates the committee and creates an appropriate climate for our work. Add to this his hard work and knowledge and you see why Richard is such an important part of our team.

Finally, I want to thank all those listed below on the committee for their time and support. Gaining your friendship has made the job of coordinating our synodical evangelism program a pleasure and an experience I will never forget.

# Parish Life and Ministry Development Committee

PLMD's first year as a committee of synod has proven to be an exciting year. The new committee spent much time looking at the history of PLMD; what its purpose is; its history in our synod; where we are at present; and planning for the future.

We realize that PLMD is a resource to assist parishes in evaluating and developing their life and ministry as they understand their mission as a baptized people of God. The different approaches now available — Customized PLMD; Developing a Ministry Profile; Move Ahead: Open to the Spirit; Recovering our Past — Discovering our Future; and Renewing — God's People in Mission — each is directed toward specific parish situations with different objectives and benefits. Every congregation could benefit from one of the approaches now available.

Our major emphasis of the year was on the new approach — Renewing — God's People in Mission — since we had asked to be one of the first-round synods to use the program. A training event was planned and held for selected pastors and parishes at Camp Agape on January 27-28. Seventeen pastors attended the training event, and they were eager to use this new approach in their parishes. Renewing — God's People in Mission proves to be a most beneficial tool in the parishes of our synod.

The committee has decided to do the foot-work in promoting PLMD by having each committee member responsible for his district. We are also looking at the possibility of using the Lutheran Church Volunteer Network in the synod.

The PLMD committee is planning another "Renewing" training event and followup event in November. All pastors will be invited to participate in this event. The committee is being trained by Rev. Jim Connelly in presenting the PLMD resources to pastors and parishes in our synod.

We look forward to another very active and meaningful year as we continue to help parishes to better understand and implement their ministries as God's people.

# Cabinet for Social Ministry

The Cabinet for Social Ministry is in its first year of existence, having been formed after action of the North Carolina Synod in convention in 1982. A study had shown that social ministry in the synod was being done by the Social Ministry Committee, other committees, special task forces, specialized ministries, and institutions. Thus, there was apparent overlapping, fragmentation, duplication of effort, and even non-delivery of some vital services. The following groups were assigned to this Cabinet: Environmental Concerns Committee, Justice and Social Change Committee, Lutheran Family Services, Lutheran World Relief/World Hunger Committee, North Carolina Lutheran Homes, and Social Ministry Committee. This Cabinet maintains liaison with the Division for Mission in North America of the Lutheran Church in America.

Three meetings of the Cabinet were held in the 1982-83 year. The major concerns of the organizational meeting held in September were determining the functions of the Cabinet, sharing and getting to know the activities of each group represented, and in general going over and hoping to solve some of the problems that led to the formation of the Cabinet. The Rev. Richard Little, Minister for Church and Society on Bishop McDaniel's staff, serves with this Cabinet and he helped with necessary direction in the discussions. The focus of the second meeting in January was to work through the budget process for all groups. This, too, helped us to share programs and to see that overlapping still exists. The convention forum was planned at the third meeting in the spring.

As the Cabinet moves into its second year, we are looking forward to having a consultant from the DMNA meet with us to help us look at the whole picture of social ministry in the synod. We hope to be able to see how we can co-ordinate the work of all groups so as to solve some of the problems. This process would also lead to more realistic budgeting. We are excited about the potential for the Cabinet for Social Ministry in the years to come.

# Social Ministry Committee

To promote social ministry as a basic function of each congregation, whether it be in the area of study, service, or action is the goal of the Social Ministry Committee. This purpose is pursued through the efforts of many persons: the Area Resource Network, the Research and Strategy groups, Institutions and Agencies, and special task forces along with this committee. Special groups and activities follow:

#### Area Resource Network:

Three to five persons in each district, led by a Social Ministry Committee member from that district, compose this network whose purpose is to provide a liaison between the congregations and the synod. Acting as consultants to congregations interested in any area of social ministry, these persons may also keep congregations aware of appropriate advocacy needs. This year workshops for congregational Social Ministry Committees were held in the Western, Eastern, Northern, and Central Districts. A retreat was held at Camp Agape for training and sharing in the fall. It is the hope of the committee that this network will grow stronger through continued use by pastors, Church Councils, Social Ministry Committees, and individual members.

#### Research and Strategy Groups:

These groups are appointed to study, direct attention to, and provide resources for special areas of social ministry. Members are chosen because of their special in-

terest and/or expertise in the subject area. Continuing evaluation determines the length of time the groups function. This year, the Advocacy, Biomedical Ethics, and Criminal Justice groups were discontinued. However, the following resource persons are still active and available for congregational consultation: Advocacy, Pat Bullard; Criminal Justice, Sue Kepley; and Biomedical Ethics, Larry Yoder.

Research and Strategy Groups are:

- 1. Alcohol and Drug Abuse, chaired by the Rev. Charlie Hoyle is our newest Research and Strategy Group. The members are: the Rev. Lew Doggett, the Rev. Richard Kuehn, the Rev. Richard Roth, the Rev. Carl Ritchie, the Rev. Earlean Miller, and Mr. Henry Carlson. This group was formed in response to the resolution passed by the LCA convention to study the issues, problems, and prevention of alcohol and other drug abuse. A synod resolution written by this group and co-sponsored by them and this committee appears in the supplement to the Bulletin of Reports. Workshops on alcoholism and drug abuse and the role of the church are being planned.
- 2. Disabled Persons, with Ms. Melissa Anderson as chairperson, and the Rev. Richard Smyth, Mrs. Mary Moretz, and Mrs. Linda Wiedey as members, has been given the charge of researching and making suggestions as to how congregations can be helped by the synod in cases in which permanently handicapped citizens remain at home and need full-time care. Other activities this year have been an inservice training program for pastors and lay leaders at Lenoir-Rhyne College, a one-day workshop in Salisbury, and a bulletin insert for Mental Retardation Sunday.
- 3. Older Adults, chaired by Mrs. Annie Ray Moore. Members are: the Rev. Edward Orinson, Mrs. Marjoire Abernathy, Mrs. Elaine Dorton, and Miss Judith Lund. This group is compiling results of a questionnaire sent to each congregation in March to determine needs and direction in which the group should proceed.
- 4. Peace, chaired by Darlene Grega, has as its members: the Rev. Richard Duncan, the Rev. William King, the Rev. Dean Lingle, the Rev. Larry Hartsell, Mr. Don Moose, the Rev. Gary Weant, the Rev. Edwin Wicks, Ms. Lucy Wicks. This group has as its purpose to enable congregations to create a climate conducive to studying the theological and ethical issues concerning peace. An educational packet is being distributed to North Carolina Synod congregations. A resolution to be presented at Synod Convention concerning study of the resolution regarding peace and nuclear arms passed at the LCA convention will be available in the supplement to this Bulletin of Reports. The Social Ministry Committee affirmatively supports this resolution.

#### Institutions:

Evaluation of synodically-owned agencies and institutions doing health and welfare services remains a responsibility of this committee. Representation of Lutheran Family Services in North Carolina and North Carolina Lutheran Homes, Inc. at committee meetings, the exchange of minutes of Board meetings, and participation in the Social Ministry Cabinet provide an on-going evaluation process. The reports of these agencies are available elsewhere in this Bulletin of Reports.

The task force appointed by this committee to study the feasibility of an alternative care facility for disabled persons, ages 16-59 met three times and submitted a report, approved by the committee and forwarded to the Executive Board, stating the need for such a facility, to be constructed in cooperation with other church bodies as a part of a presently existing structure. Action on this recommendation has been delayed indefinitely due to cost. Mr. John Ketner chaired this committee. Members were: Mr. Lindsay Cox, Mrs. Claire Edwardson, Mr. John Yoder, Mr. Job Kistler, the Rev. Robert Beard, and the Rev. Richard Little.

Several committee members participated in the Cycle II evaluation of the North Carolina Lutheran Homes conducted by Lutheran Social Services System this year.

#### Institutional Chaplaincy:

The Rev. David Franzen continues to serve as chaplain at Duke Medical Center and the Veteran's Administration Hospital in Durham. His chaplaincy work is under the supervision of the Social Ministry Committee through an advisory committee chaired by the Rev. Richard Graf. A report of the chaplain's activities appears elsewhere in this Bulletin of Reports.

#### **Grants and Donations:**

Grants to congregations providing seed money for social ministry activities in congregations and communities were made to the following:

1. Haven, Salisbury: \$500.00 to SOAR, a day care center for older adults.

The following donations were made:

- 1. Land Stewardship Council of North Carolina \$500.00
- Religious Coalition for Abortion Rights \$500.00

The committee also approved the funding requests to DMNA, channeled through the American Missions Committee, of Pan-Lutheran Ministries of Wake County, and the Food Bank of NW North Carolina.

#### Pan-Lutheran Planning Council of North Carolina:

Through the efforts of the Rev. Richard Little with committee support, this council was formed this year. The purpose of the group, made up of representatives from LCA, ALC, and LC-MS is to consider coordination of future social ministry activities in the state, following up on the recommendations of the Sunbelt Mobilization Committee.

#### Other Activities:

- 1. Region V LC/USA The Rev. Richard Little continues to represent the synod at social ministry consultation meetings held in Atlanta.
- 2. North Carolina Council of Churches Commission on Social Ministries The committee continues to be involved in ecumenical concerns through representation on this Committee by Margy Robinson and Pat Bullard serving-at-large, Sue Kepley representing Criminal Justice concerns, and Susan O'Connor serving on the Migrant Ministry Committee.
- 3. The Social Ministry Committee purchased, at the recommendation of the synodical LCW Board, a set of **Systematic Training for Effective Parenting** materials, available for loan from the synod library.
- 4. The Cabinet for Social Ministry, formed this year as a result of this committee's efforts to coordinate social ministry activities at the synod level, is reported elsewhere in this Bulletin of Reports. The Social Ministry Committee supports the following resolutions reported by other member committees of that Cabinet: Justice and Social Change Alternatives to Incarceration; Hunger Food Tax Repeal.
- 5. The committee is represented on the synod's Family Life Council by Margy Robinson. Referred from the Council, the whole topic of human sexuality and how the church should respond in areas of general sex education, response to problems as child abuse, spouse abuse, abortion, homosexuality, etc. is being considered by the Social Ministry, Educational Ministry, and Youth Ministry Committees.

The acceleration of social ministry activities through congregations in the synod this year have been an admirable response to Christ's gospel mission in the light of the economic and social changes presently taking place in our communities. It is our hope that this committee can continue to respond, coordinate, and provide resources and help congregations meet the needs of all people. It is our joy that we have the guidance and strong support of the Rev. Richard Little, who continues to inspire us and to provide liaison between all of the committees doing social ministry at the synod level.

# Institutional Chaplaincy: Duke University Medical Center, Veterans Administration Hospital, Durham, North Carolina

Lutheran Chaplaincy has been a multi-faceted and challenging ministry during the past year. Duke Medical Center and the Veterans Administration Hospital in Durham compose a major medical referral center for this region of the United States. The medical-surgical needs and crises of Lutheran patients and families often draw them hundreds of miles from their homes, congregations and life-long support systems to receive the specialty care they require. As chaplain I have opportunity to function as people's pastor away from home — an extension of the ministry of Word and Sacrament which the Church provides. The North Carolina Synod is to be commended for its support of this ministry to persons in their hour of great need.

You as pastors and lay leaders of this synod can be of great help to me in my work. Indeed, I need your help. More Lutheran patients are admitted to these hospitals than I can possibly see. It is always incumbent upon me to exercise careful stewardship of my pastoral care time. So if you, or a member of your parish or family is being admitted to either Duke or the V.A. hospitals and you know there is need in this case for pastoral care PLEASE WRITE OR TELEPHONE ME. Your personal referral will be very helpful and most appreciated.

If you should need to refer a patient to me, please communicate the following information to me or my secretary: The patient's name, address, date of admission, reason for admission, and the concerns or reasons for your referral. This information is most helpful to me in locating the patient and in gaining a quick appreciation for the person's pastoral needs.

Greatly appreciated are the referrals a number of you have made to me over the past years. I am also happy to consult with you when the patient or family seems to have important pastoral needs at the time of discharge from the hospital and the return home.

In addition to my pastoral care of patients and families at Duke and the V.A. Hospitals in Durham, I also provide a ministry of theological education through my supervision of pastors and seminarians in programs of Clinical Pastoral Education at Duke Medical Center. Almost every year we have one or more Lutheran students enrolled in these educational programs. I also teach a course at Duke Divinity School entitled "Introduction to Pastoral Care in the Hospital setting". Included in my work has been a modest amount of pastoral counseling, and through this avenue I have provided counseling for a number of Lutherans.

Another focus of my work has been a synodical scope. I report to — and have voice, but no vote in — the Social Ministry Committee of synod. During the past year I have served my sixth year on the Professional Services Committee of synod. Of particular interest and concern to me has been support and advocacy of the needs of pastors, lay professionals and their families. It has been exciting and enriching to initiate designs for the Fall Convocation, and the contract for partial synodical remuneration of Pastoral Counseling for professional leaders and their families. Occasional supply preaching and my consultant work as facilitator in the First Year in Ministry Program round out the description of my ministry activities on the synodical level.

In closing, I want to thank all of you in the North Carolina Synod for your support: both of me personally and of my ministry.

# Worship and Music

Understanding that worship is the exciting, compelling drama in which God meets, corrects, blesses, instructs, and strengthens His children, the Worship and Music Committee has worked to set before the synod the highest standards of worship practice. Within recent years increased requests have been made through which the committee has assisted in designing services that reflect the glorious truths of sacred scripture, Lutheran theology, and meaningful liturgy. The committee's purpose is not to become an entity within the synod insisting on a narrow, restricted form of worship. Instead, it seeks to work harmoniously and cooperatively in consort with the Bishop, Deans, Districts, and any and all organizations to enable the synod to tap the glorious heritage of the church at worship by which the people of God are led to renewal.

The unquestionable highlight of the committee's year was the Convocation for Worship, Music and the Arts held in October at Saint John's Church, Salisbury. Two years in the making, the Convocation attracted Lutherans from across the southeast to an experience rich in worship, learning and inspiration. It is particularly noteworthy that The Reverend Dr. Gene Brand, Secretary for Worship, Department of Studies, Lutheran World Federation, Geneva, Switzerland, and The Reverend S. Anita Stauffer, Editor for Worship Resources, Division of Parish Services of the LCA, were keynote speakers. Other outstanding, national worship leaders were also present. But we were gladdest that the average person came to sharpen skills, develop competencies, to grow in the capacity for worship leadership, and to be exposed to new and different ways of challenging the local parish to grow.

For the last several years the committee has worked cooperatively with the Professional Leadership Committee to plan the worship aspect of the annual fall convocation. This is a significant undertaking, and we were especially pleased to provide a powerful, creative thrust to the fall event. What is done through this experience not only feeds the attendees with a specific theme but also offers worship opportunities which complement and extend the convocation's theme. Clearly this is a remarkable way in which the committee is able to make an impact in a meaningful and desirable way.

Local parish concerns are always important to the committee. During the year parishes bring to the committee a wide variety of what they identify as their unique problems. In the end, these concerns are not so much unique as they are expected. However, through these needs the committee has been able to assist in the selection of an organ, the expansion of a parish music program, evaluating staff needs to strengthen music education, the organization and development of an Altar Guild, and many other aspects of need. These are but some of the varied areas addressed by the committee in the past year.

A monumental project of the committee is the planning for and development of the services which are a part of the synod convention. Because each year brings a different convention theme, the world is at a different point in time, the Bishop and the Executive Board have new perspectives and priorities, it is not a simplistic thing to bring together the enormous worship events that are a part of our coming together in such large numbers. The committee takes the responsibility of providing for the convention worship very seriously.

As a participant in the District Church Days, the Committee led a workshop on Lenten and Easter music. The workshop's emphasis was to stress the immediate availability of music resources for these two seasons of the church year that are within the LBW. Extensive handouts were made available to share the wealth of music that is literally at our fingertips.

# Youth Ministry Committee

"Hope for the Hungry" was the 1982-83 emphasis of youth ministry in the North Carolina Synod. The purpose of the emphasis was to involve synod youth and adults in studying, sharing, and celebrating together their oneness in Christ, in response to the needs of the hungry. Features of the emphasis included congregational teams, a guidebook, an emphasis project of raising funds for the Queen Louise Home for Children, district gatherings, monthly programs, worship experiences, an emphasis related workcamp, and area hunger retreats. The emphasis increased the visibility of youth in ministry and strengthened the identity of youth in the total ministry of the church as youth became more actively involved in education, worship, witness, service and support. Although the rewards of such an emphasis can not be measured, the Youth Ministry Committee took action to offer a synod-wide youth emphasis every other year. Youth Staffer, Barbara Herpich, is to be commended for her dedication and leadership related to the emphasis.

In addition to extraordinary efforts to carry out the emphasis, the Youth Ministry Committee, in accordance with the North Carolina Synod By-Laws, worked diligently to "supervise, promote, correlate the youth work of the synod" by offering four levels of support. These four levels of support have become the structure by which the committee operates.

CONGREGATIONAL LEVEL OF SUPPORT — Two six month planning calendars were sent to each congregation offering a step by step outline for planning youth ministry in relationship to all other ministries within a congregation.

In assisting congregations with program ideas as well as to assist youth leaders in utilizing the planning calendar, a quarterly publication consisting of six programs (two for each month based on a calendar suggestion) was mailed to all congregations.

A Youth Sunday Program Packet was sent to each congregation offering an outline, sermon suggestions, hymns, and ideas related to the emphasis to be adapted by youth in planning an effective and exciting Youth Sunday Worship experience.

Two Youth Ministry Resource Trunks consisting of group builders, ice breakers, games, programs, resource materials, etc. were made available to congregations through the Multi-Media Center.

Youth Staffer, Barbara Herpich, deepened the relationship she has shared with youth in the synod over the past two years as she continued to make contacts with congregations, lead retreats, assist with programs, and consult with youth leaders. The youth staffer also published a monthly newsletter which kept congregations informed as to resources, upcoming events, and helpful answers to many questions related to youth ministry in the congregation.

Although the committee is prepared to assist, consult, and provide resource persons and material for youth ministry in the congregation, very few requests for such have been received.

DISTRICT LEVEL OF SUPPORT — For the fourth year an organized district structure has supported youth with events that bring youth together for worship, fellowship, growth, and recreation. In each of the seven districts a committee of youth and adults are elected to serve on a district council. A youth serves as the chairperson of the council assisted by an adult key advisor. Each council is trained to plan and implement district events. Each year attendance at the district events has increased. At the 1982 Fall event, more than eight hundred youth participated in the kick off for "Hope for the Hungry". In the January/February event more than three hundred youth participated in district "starvathons".

SYNODICAL LEVEL OF SUPPORT — Both small and large group activities and events have included or will include the following:

1. Synod Convo '82 — Twenty five youth and adult leaders spent five days studying and becoming involved in the work of the synod through this annual event. Convention business, discussion with synod staff and leaders, worship, group building, service projects, and many fellowship opportunities made this experience an invaluable one for participating youth. The decline in participation from previous years

resulted in convention dates conflicting with exam week and graduation for many of the North Carolina schools.

- Ind²-Bla-Whi This annual event, held during June at Kure Beach, offered twenty youth a most unique experience of cross-cultural, inter-personal and work related experiences which focused on breaking down racial barriers and fostering a concern for inclusiveness in the church.
- 3. Appalachian Workcamp Held during July in Banner Elk, eleven youth and three adults spent a week helping disabled and elderly persons by working to better living conditions. Participants gained an appreciation of different lifestyles and experienced a Christian community where love was the dominant force and in which personal struggles and faith were shared.
- 4. Camp with the Mentally Handicapped Held in August at Camp Agape, this annual week long event provided the opportunity for thirteen youth to relate one-to-one with developmentally handicapped persons from Murdoch Center, Butner as their vision of God's family was broadened and growth in ministry was experienced through involvement and reflection.
- 5. Nuts and Bolts Leadership Training To better equip youth leaders (adults and youth) with the basics of youth ministry philosophies, leadership skills, and resources, this leadership development retreat was offered during September at Camp Caraway, Asheboro with approximately eighty-five participants.
- 6. The Carpenters Bench This leadership training retreat scheduled to be held at Lenoir-Rhyne College in August to better equip youth leaders who had the basics but who wished to develop new skills and build on the basics had to be cancelled due to lack of registrations.
- 7. Synod-Wide Youth Gathering This event, scheduled for one day, April 16, at Reynolds Auditorium, Winston-Salem will bring youth together in celebration of their oneness in Christ through a shared ministry as exemplified in "Hope for the Hungry". This event has been planned but is yet to take place at the time of this writing.
- 8. Emphasis Workcamp In relationship with the "Hope for the Hungry" project, a workcamp is planned for July 5-12 at the Queen Louise Home for Children in the Virgin Islands. Youth will work on a garden/orchard project and conduct a summer Bible School for the residents. Although the cost will be approximately \$500, congregations are encouraged to offer financial assistance for youth interested in attending. Registration will be limited to twelve youth from the synod.

CHURCH-WIDE LEVEL OF SUPPORT — Jon Hoyle and Barbara Herpich represented the Youth Ministry Committee at the LCA/UN-Washington Seminar related to world hunger housed in New York and Washington, D.C. Doug Smith and Mary Frances Boland represented the committee at the LCA/Cultural Awareness Seminar in Miami, Florida related to economic justice. These persons are available upon request to share their experience with congregations in the synod.

The Southeastern Regional Youth Gathering "Free To Be" will be held in Nashville, Tennessee at Vanderbilt University August 2-5. The purpose of this event is to provide an opportunity for Lutheran youth from across the south to share together in fellowship, spiritual growth, and to develop a stronger sense of identity with other Lutheran youth. The Youth Ministry Committee has been responsible for the publicity material of the event. Buses will be chartered by the committee to transport youth to the event from the synod.

The next LCA-Convo will be held in 1984 in Toranto, Canada. North Carolina has been allocated eleven spaces for youth to attend. This will be coordinated by the committee's Synod Catalyst and Resource Person (SCARP).

The next LCA Youth Gathering will be held in 1985 at Purdue University, West Lafayette, Indiana.

In addition to levels of support, the Youth Ministry Committee has taken action to study alternatives of the Youth Staffer Program and to study and make a recommendation by December, 1983 related to a new organizational structure for the youth ministry of the North Carolina Synod.

The Youth Ministry Committee extends appreciation to the many competent and talented persons through the synod who have willingly shared in the leadership of

congregational, district, synodical, and church-wide youth activities. A wealth of gratitude is extended to the members of congregations who have graciously supported and encouraged youth to be actively involved in the life of the church. Words do not adequately convey the deep appreciation the committee wishes to extend to Barbara Herpich for her two years of commitment, support, encouragement, dedication and leadership that she has contributed to Youth Ministry. Her enthusiasm, excitement, creativeness, and work with and for the youth of the synod will be missed greatly as she leaves the staffer position in August.

# Youth Staffer Report

This year the Synod Youth Ministry Committee undertook some new, innovative ideas and made them fly thanks to the work of many and the receptiveness of the synod. One of the new ideas was to keep the Youth Staffer for a second year. I hope I am correct in saying that we have all benefited from the experience of my remaining as North Carolina's Youth Staffer. Another first was to have a Youth Ministry Emphasis.

My ministry in North Carolina has been two-fold this year. The job description set before me included a continuing relationship with local congregations, as well as coordinating the Youth Ministry Emphasis. A special emphasis was for me to visit with at least 10 congregations this year, along with others that had not had a youth staffer in the last 2-3 years. I am pleased to say this goal has been exceeded. As a second year staffer I also had the opportunity to return to some congregations I had visited my first year. That was exciting because ground had already been broken on which to grow and expand.

The other apsect of my work which has taken me out into the synod as well as behind my desk is the director of the "Hope for the Hungry" Youth Ministry Emphasis. This was a new, exciting venture in youth ministry. We entered into the '82-'83 emphasis with high hopes and some fears. Now as it draws to a close, I believe it can be said that it was a successful new approach for us in North Carolina. Not everyone chose to be involved in an official capacity, but since many of the programs of the committee were built into the emphasis (ie, Fall District Events, Spring Youth Rally, Workcamp at the Queen Louise Home) everyone did have the opportunity to benefit from the emphasis. The extras or additional events which tied into the emphasis, such as the Area Fast-athons, the Queen Louise Home Project, monthly programs and quarterly UPDATE were all well received. An undertaking such as the emphasis is exciting and rewarding as well as a lot of work. Because of this the Synod Youth Ministry Committee has chosen to have an emphasis every other year, the next being '84-'85.

Reflecting on my year, many other events and contacts come to mind. I've met with various planning groups such as Convo and The Leadership Training Event. Congregations continued to call upon me in stewardship and world hunger as well as consultations in youth ministry programming and training. I also had the opportunity to attend the UN-Washington Seminar on World Hunger and Economic Justice, a Serendipity Workshop and a Clowning Workshop, all of which brought about growth for my personal life and ministry as a youth staffer.

I cannot close without sharing some of my beliefs and feelings concerning youth ministry both in the present and future in North Carolina. I am very committed to the

concept of youth ministry; youth and adults sharing together in the ministry of God's Kingdom, which includes Fellowship, Worship, Witness, Service and Learning. In my travels I have seen congregations and individuals who are also committed to youth ministry, but there are also those that put youth in a separate corner of the church. Haven't we come farther than that? Aren't we all a part of God's family today? We all must continue to grow in our understanding of what the priesthood of all believers means so that all ages, races and sexes are looked upon as having an equal and special gift to offer. It is yet to be seen whether or not the North Carolina Synod will develop a "structure" or "organization" but no matter what happens, remember — youth ministry means youth having the opportunity to live out their faith in their congregation, community and world, not separate, but alongside other Christians.

Thanks seems like such an overused word to say to some mighty special people I have grown to love and respect. The Synod Staff and secretaries, especially Dick Campbell, the Youth Ministry Committee and my contact person, Linda Kaelke have all been special joys that God has brought to me to help me grow and serve Him. God be with you all!

#### Lutheridge

Exciting is the word for conditions at Lutheridge at the end of 1982 and the beginning of 1983. In every aspect — program, facilities, staff, finances — the present and future is bright and promising. To report everything in detail is a temptation. But in the interest of brevity (something for which Synod secretaries are earnestly pleading), we will share only ten of the more exciting items from the current Lutheridge scene.

- The two biggest annual statistics for 1982 showed slight changes from the record breaking year of 1981: (a) a total of 14,456 persons were involved in tabulated activities during the year (-82 persons or -0.56%) and (b) personnights (an overnight stay by one person) totaled 32,547, up 703 person-nights or 2.21% from 1981.
- Resident camping programs in the summer of 1982 declined by 16 camper weeks or 0.65% from 1981. The 2437 camper weeks were the second highest in fourteen years. Camper week differences by categories were: grades 3-5, -66; grades 6-8, +25; grades 9-12, -8; mentally retarded persons, +5; and satellite camps, +28.
- The growingest and braggingest" statistic in 1982 was the increase of persons registered in Lutheridge non-summer events: +444 registrants or 71.15%, a total of 1068 persons.
- 4. As of December 31, 1982, Lutheridge had received \$169,822.64 from the South Carolina Synod Conference and Camping Ministries Appeal and \$314,701.69 from the North Carolina Synod Appeal. Direct gifts and interest income added \$39,604.06. This totals \$524,128.39. Of this amount, \$521,544.22 had been spent on various projects.
- One major project was completed in 1982 as a result of the Conference and Camping Ministries Appeals. The lounge and lower level of Efird Hall were renovated, refurnished, and provided a new heating system. The office area was remodeled in 1975.
- 6. Two major projects were begun in the Fall of 1982, both being funded by Appeal receipts: (a) Lineberger Dining Hall is receiving a completely rebuilt and mostly re-equipped kitchen plus other improvements and (b) Thornburg Hall is being expanded with lounge/meeting rooms on each floor, heated with a system which utilizes the swimming pool's solar collectors as a primary heat source, redecorated throughout, and partially refurnished. Current plans are to return to food service in Lineberger Dining Hall on March 1 and to open Thornburg Hall to guests on April 1.

- Two persons joined the year round staff in 1982: (a) Mr. Jonathan W. Frock became Maintenance Manager on March 1 and (b) Miss Leanne R. Carpenter became Food Service Manager on May 1. She resigned this position on December 31 for a teaching position in McDowell County. Mr. F. J. "Don" Benoway of Sarasota, Florida, will become Food Service Manager in April 1983.
- 8. The planned addition to the year round staff of a Director of Development and Promotion moved a step further to fruition with the engagement late in 1982 of Mr. W. R. Cumerford as a consultant to the Board of Trustees and staff during the process. He has assisted in developing a timetable which projects receiving applications and interviewing applicants during February, March, and April 1983 with employment prior to or early in the Summer season.
- 9. 1982 was another good year financially. At the time of this writing, unaudited figures show operating budget receipts increased 8.51% from 1981. Expenditures increased 13.28%. Benevolence receipts from supporting synods increased 10.67%. Receipts from registrations increased 13.45%. Complete financial statements and accountants' report are provided to supporting synods' offices annually and are also available for inspection at our office.
- 10. The maintenance, repair, and replacement of Lutheridge buildings and equipment has been of great concern over the past ten years. Anyone reading these annual reports has been reminded of this. Happily, we can now report this situation is much improved. Certainly the Conference and Camping Ministries Appeals have helped "turn the corner." To help maintain this trend when Appeal funds are exhausted, the Board of Trustees began in 1980 setting aside a daily portion of each person's registration fee for this purpose. The amount began at \$.50 per person per day. In 1983, the rate has grown to \$1.25. This action plus other budget adjustments have allowed operating budget figures for capital improvements, repair, and maintenance to more than double in five years.

A complete report cannot be made in only ten items, but in the interest of time and space we'll stop at that number. There's much more to tell. Please ask if you need or desire additional information. The Board of Trustees and staff are willing to meet with you — synods, congregations, groups, or individuals — to tell our exciting story. Just ask! We welcome the challenge of a strong, growing camp and conference ministry in the future. And we anticipate with gratitude the continuing support of our constituency in spirit and interest and prayer. Thank you!

#### Cabinet For Mission

The purpose of this cabinet is to bring together various ones who are working in the broad field of the mission of THE CHURCH in its outreach in order that each may see what the other is doing and in order that there might be some coordination of efforts in ministry.

In addition, the purpose of this cabinet is to develop in the lives and ministry of the institutions and/or committees, which are represented by membership on this cabinet, a perspective of their institution or committee which shows them as being one part of the whole missionary thrust of THE CHURCH. The concern is that the various committees, agencies and institutions develop their programs and interests in view of others who also have specific concern in the broad range of THE CHURCH'S outreach. The cabinet seeks to find the best method of approach which would allow it most effectively to achieve the objective in ministry given to it by the synod.

The cabinet seeks to discharge its duties faithfully. In so doing it has come

together on a number of occasions during the past months to try to meet its responsibilities. On September 22, 1982 a general meeting of the cabinet was held at the Church House for the purpose of sharing activities in ministry engaged in by the respective committees and institutions represented on the cabinet. Coordination of ministry activity within the synod resulted from this meeting as well as suggestions for any new ministries that might be projected.

Members of the cabinet participated in the New Professional Leaders Workshop held at the Church House on November 16, 1982. On January 13, 1983 the cabinet came together again for the purpose of becoming involved in the synod's Budget Building process as it relates to the 1984 synodical budget. Projects in ministry which are expected and/or being proposed by the institutions or committees for the year 1984 were considered in order of the cabinet's ranking of priority for purposes of recommendation to the synod's Committee on Budget and Finance as it prepared for the final 1984 budget draft. Plans for the cabinet's presentation to the 1983 convention of synod were also made at that time. On February 15, 1983 members of the cabinet attended the Church Wide Agency Consultation and Budget Forum at the Church House.

Our basic concern as a cabinet is for The Church's outreach, particularly as we are "sent" into the world in a kind of institutionalized or organized manner as opposed, for example, to the outreach engaged in by a congregation or an individual Christian. It is the cabinet's responsibility to concern itself with MISSION as it occurs and is expressed beyond the confines of the local congregation. Consequently, this cabinet attempts to coordinate, share in, enable, implement, plan, develop ministries, etc., that constitute the outreach of THE CHURCH beyond the congregational level as we know it.

#### American Missions

#### I. MEETINGS

Three full committee meetings were held in May, September, and December of 1982. Interval activities were carried out by telephone, by mail, and with visits to congregations by committee members as required. The annual travel meeting in 1983 involved visits by the committee in the Raleigh-Greensboro area in April.

#### II. RELATIONSHIPS

The committee works in close cooperation with the Division for Mission in North America, LCA, largely through its Department for Church Extension. This involves:

 Reviewing data on new fields, and recommending fields to DMNA for the beginning of new congregations in suburbia, town and country, and urban.

- Reviewing annually the Ministry Profile of each DMNA related congregation, with the direction of DMNA Regional Director Boyce D. Whitener, and approving Program Support for these congregations.
- Offering support and assistance in every way possible to the developing fields and younger congregations of the synod.
- Working with DMNA Church Building Consultant David A. Opgrand, Southeast Region, and Real Estate Representative Fred Wohlin, Jr., Department of Asset Management, LCA, in church building construction and acquisition of property in North Carolina.

The committee acts through SUB COMMITTEES in the following areas:

- A. INITIAL EQUIPMENT, chaired by Mr. Ralph Weddington, coordinates gifts of equipment to new developing situations.
- B. FINANCE, chaired by Mr. G. C. Miller, develops the American Missions part of the Synod Mission Profile and is concerned with other matters of finance.
- C. SMALL CHURCH, chaired by The Rev. Dean Lingle, has a special concern about the problems facing the younger and smaller churches and the way in which we can offer them more effective support.
- D. APPALACHIAN SUB-COMMITTEE, chaired by The Rev. Robert Young, meets regularly and works closely with The Rev. Carroll L. Wessinger, DMNA Mission Consultant. An intern program for the Boone-Blowing Rock area has been in operation since 1977, and the committee continues to support CORA, RAM, and other special area ministries. A comprehensive development of Mission Strategy in Appalachia is to be undertaken this year with DMNA staff assistance and support.

By action of the Executive Board, MINORITY MINISTRIES has been placed under the umbrella of American Missions to appear in the Synod Mission Profile in 1984. But we are aleady working with The Rev. Richard Perry, Director of Minority Ministries, and offering him every support in this special ministry.

The committee advises and makes recommendations to the Home Mission Foundation relating to loans and adjustment of loans.

The committee receives requests for subsidies to pastor's salaries under the SUSTENTATION PROGRAM to bring them up to the minimum salary set by synod, and, upon approval, authorizes payments to the congregations involved. In late summer a member of the committee is assigned to visit and confer with the church council of each congregation requesting aid under this program to review the congregation's situation and to encourage self support as soon as possible.

The committee acts to approve appropriations from the Melancthon Fund, the Efird Memorial Fund, and other sources made available to them.

At Burnsville and Whiteville the calls that had been extended to DMNA to pastor/developers have both expired, and in spite of diligent efforts by the pastors involved and the faithful core of people with whom they ministered, the organization of a congregation has not been accomplished at either place. It has become necessary to "gear down" our ministry in each of these places, and the continuation of work there becomes a responsibility of the synod. DMNA is providing temporary aid to sustain a part-time ministry to the people in these two fields, and we are looking at all possible ways of continuing a "Chapel Ministry" at each place in the immediate future with the hope that at some time in the future we can yet effect an organization. Faithful work by pastor/developers in each of these places has resulted in the gathering of a loyal group at each place and we are determined not to abandon them. The Home Mission Foundation has approved our recommendation that modular buildings be funded through HMF loans to provide worship/fellowship facilities at these two places, and we expect to proceed in this direction.

#### III. DEVELOPMENT OF NEW FIELDS

In addition to Burnsville and Whiteville, there are three fields under development at this time:

Raleigh, Hope (The Rev. Connie Williams, interim part-time pastor)

Clemmons, King of Glory (The Rev. David McCleary, pastor/developer) Raleigh, Good Shepherd (The Rev. David Sloop, pastor/developer) Two other fields are being looked at as potential entries for 1983-84.

#### V. NEW CONSTRUCTION

Our Savior, Jacksonville — Some structural problems are being corrected along with a project of renovation.

Morning Star, Matthews — A projected addition to their facilities is designed to help them reach out and accommodate the expansion in Mecklenburg County in their direction.

#### VI. CONTINUING DEVELOPMENT

St. Andrews, Concord, has been considering relocation for some time. At this writing, it is proposed that this be a pilot project in which St. Andrews, LCA, and ALC jointly start a new church in Cabarrus County west of Concord.

The need for refinancing existing loans has become a necessity in some of our mission churches to facilitate debt service problems. The following congregations had existing mortgages refinanced in 1982 or are in the process thereof:

Prince of Peace, Kinston Resurrection, Greensboro Living Word, Laurinburg

Congratulations to St. Andrews, New Bern! This congregation has become self-supporting as of the end of 1982!

#### VII. DMNA AND HMF INVESTMENT IN NORTH CAROLINA

Total Capital Funds that DMNA has invested in North Carolina as of November, 1982, is \$1,036,613. Total Program Grant invested in N.C. in 1982 according to schedule was \$95.059.

The Home Mission Foundation has loans of over \$1,000,000 to our North Carolina Congregations.

Approximately \$1,000,000 in commercial financing is involved in our developing congregations in addition to the above \$2,000,000 plus! So, we see that the total picture becomes quite extensive!

#### **Campus Ministry**

God's Word is being proclaimed and celebrated on the campuses of the colleges and universities in North Carolina. Students, faculty, and administrators are involved in worship, Bible study, discussion groups, service projects, fellowship, witnessing, and pastoral care. The gospel sets us free to be the people of God in our search for truth in higher education.

We ask for your support in our campus ministries. Please do not take for granted that our pastors and congregations know your students. Securing the names of Lutheran students becomes harder and harder each year and is impossible in some institutions. So, send your lists of students to our pastors and congregations or the Campus Ministry Committee at the synod house. Encourage your students to seek out our pastors and congregations in their various settings.

Our special thanks to our campus pastors and workers — Darlene Grega in Durham, Thom Nelson in Raleigh, and Larry Hartsell in Chapel Hill. Our thanks to the pastors and congregations who serve as contact pastors and covenant congregations in our synod. Your ministries are appreciated by all. Our thanks to Pastors Robert Walker and Richard Little for their guidance in our committee work. And a special word of thanks to committee members who are no longer serving — Dr. Francis Binkowski, Dr. Marvin Eargle, and Pastor Graham Nahouse.

#### **Environmental Concerns Committee**

In 1982 the Environmental Concerns Committee continued to try to lift up the care of "God's" earth. Though still concerned about congregations making their buildings as energy efficient as possible and still offering help in this area, the committee began to explore other issues and avenues of service. One new way we have sought to serve is by lending our support to existing groups that are working for care of our environment. One church related group that we have supported is the Raleigh based Land Stewardship Council of N.C. We are presently encouraging congregations to use their study course called "Stewardship of the land in N.C." This is an excellent resource for groups in Sunday School or other study situations to explore what they can do in N.C. to help care for God's world. (The cost is a minimal \$2.00/copy.) Another group we have sought to support is a state agency called the Coastal Area Management Agency (CAMA) which is working for orderly and planned coastal development with an eye toward protecting natural resources and the environment.

Besides these things we developed a bulletin insert for Environmental Concerns Month (used by many churches in 1982, but still available in 1983); we are presently working on an insert on home conservation for 1983 (which will be completed by convention time); and we took a new look at nuclear power by visiting McGuire Nuclear Station.

Lastly, we continue to welcome any input by members of the N.C. Synod — lay and clerical — as to how we can better serve your needs.

# Consulting Committee on Justice and Social Change

The Consulting Committee on Justice and Social Change seeks to address pressing social issues as they arise. This 'address' often involves study and reflection, recommendation for action, placing information before the synod, and advocating that our synod in convention adopt positions on social issues. This is a humbling responsibility in that we must select among numerous justice issues those we seek to address.

Over this past synodical year our committee has undergone a significant transition. The program on Lutheran Minority Ministry mandated by the synod in its 1978 convention has been administered by our committee since then. However, at the recommendation of the Task Force on Minority Ministry, chaired by Jo Conn, and with the mutual consent of our committee and the American Missions Committee, and with the approval of the executive board, Lutheran Minority Ministry was placed under the American Missions Committee effective January 1983. Ministry with minority persons as with all outreach of this nature is properly understood as mission work. Though we will miss our close working relationship with this program and its director, Pastor Richard Perry, we supported and helped to initiate this decision.

Realizing that Lutheran Minority Ministry is a comprehensive program encouraging congregational and synodical mission to all minority persons, we decided to place our Native American Task Force under Lutheran Minority Ministry. This also became effective January, 1983. Chaired by Pastor Dennis Bolton, the Native American Task Force will now work under Lutheran Minority Ministry. We will also miss our close contact with Pastor Bolton and his task force.

Another important change affecting our committee was the formation of a Social Ministry Cabinet mandated by the 1982 synodical convention. Already this cabinet has afforded significant dialogue among committees and agencies doing social ministry. Hopefully, we will more effectively coordinate our mission because of this cabinet.

The 1982 synodical convention passed a resolution on nuclear armaments calling on our committee "employing resources already available in our Synod and the North Carolina Council of Churches, assist the congregations of the Synod in boldly addressing this urgent moral issue." The implementation of this resolution is through the Social Ministry Committee's Resource and Strategy Group on Peace. Pastor Larry Hartzell of our committee serves on that group and our committee allocated funding to help them carry forth this work.

We have chosen to monitor developments in racially torn Southern Africa. Pastor Doug Kearney seeks to provide that monitor. Though not definite, we are hoping to make available to our churches a resource person from Namibia or South Africa who presently resides in America.

We have decided to follow developments in the North Carolina legislative debate over alternatives to the incarceration of certain non-violent offenders. Kitty Huffman seeks to keep up with these developments. We have sent a resolution advocating alternatives to incarceration to our executive board.

During this year we formed a sub-committee on Women and Men chaired by Bet-

ty Gamble. This group seeks to lift up concern for equal treatment of the sexes to leadership of synodical committees, boards and agencies.

We have continued to support those working beyond our synod who advocate social justice. This year we made a financial contribution to the Lutheran Human Relations Association of America and requested that synodical leadership receive their publication, The Vanguard. We are also sending representatives to the Human Relations Institute held in late July, 1983.

We are eager to hear from your concerns and questions. Members of our committee will be part of the Social Ministry Cabinet forum held during this convention.

#### Report of Lutheran Minority Ministry

Nehemiah says: "Come, let us **build** the walls of Jerusalem, that we may no longer suffer disgrace" . . . And they said, "Let us rise up and build" (Nehemiah 2:17b, 18b). St. Paul writes "Since you are eager for manifestations of the Spirit, strive to excel in building up the church" (2 Corinthians 14:12b). The words of Nehemiah and St. Paul reflect, I think, what we have been doing together — building.

A theme for our work together, in the next two years, will be "Building Bridges". What follows are the various activities I have been doing as we seek to build bridges so God's church can grow in Spirit and Truth.

#### WORK WITH CONGREGATIONS

An important aspect of Lutheran Minority Ministry is our work with congregations. It is through congregations that the vision of building bridges with a variety of people can happen.

I have had an on-going contact with the following congregations: Redeemer, Charlotte; St. Andrew's, Hickory; St. Thomas, Charlotte; St. Paul's, Durham; Macedonia, Burlington; Emmanuel, LincoInton; Hope, Raleigh; St. Mark, Charlotte; Haven, Salisbury; Incarnation, Charlotte; St. Mark, Lumberton; Holy Trinity, Charlotte; Prince of Peace, Greensboro; Holy Trinity, Chaplel Hill; St. Luke's, Charlotte; Living Savior, Pineville; and First, Albemarle. Through worship attendance, preaching, various meetings, vacation church school, L.C.W., L.C.M., and youth; we have been building bridges.

An exciting aspect over the last year has been first-time contacts with the following congregations: Holy Trinity, Raleigh; St. Timothy, Havelock; Holy Trinity, Gastonia; St. Andrew's, Hickory; Philadelphia, Dallas; Cedar Grove, Vale; First, Greensboro; Lutheran Chapel, Gastonia; St. Stephen's, Hickory; and Christ, Winston-Salem. Our relationship has been established through attendance at worship, presentations in Vacation Church School, and Sunday School, Lutheran Men, Church Council, visits with the pastor, and preaching. Even as I write this report (February 18, 1983) four requests have been made in three days. It's exciting, therefore, to know some people and congregations want to build bridges.

In order to adequately interpret the work of Lutheran Minority Ministry, newsletters have been provided and vignettes written for congregational newsletters. We have provided a suggested guideline for congregations to celebrate the birthdate of The Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. A program resource for young people, "Do You See What I see" was written and distributed throughout the synod.

The proposal for Lutheran Minority Ministry indicates that by the third year the majority of the director's time be spent developing programs within receptive congregations. I am happy to say the following was accomplished last year: (1) a retreat for pastors titled "Enhancing Multi-racial/Ethnic Concerns Through The Office Of

The Pastor''; (2) a retreat for laypersons who desire to work with Lutheran Minority Ministry in their districts; (3) a cluster event for congregations in the greater Charlotte-Mecklenburg area titled "Building Bridges For Multi-Cultural Contact and Ministry", (4) a vacation church school program for a congregation in the Western District. As **needs are known and invitations** forthcoming, we will be glad to work with you on specific programs.

With the world ever changing it's important to grow spiritually and in skills. I have had an opportunity to participate in four Continuing Education events. These included L.S.T.C. Pastors' Convocation which focused on Economics; The Black Experience Workshop sponsored by the UNC-Chapel Hill School of Social Work; the L.C.A. Coalition Directors' Retreat sponsored by the Division For Mission in North America; and 'The New Church and Its Ministry' sponsored by L.S.T.C. In addition, I attend clergy group meetings which build collegiality and support.

I want to encourage each delegate and pastor to prayerfully consider extending an **invitation** for us to dialogue about inclusive ministry in the next year.

#### **ADDITIONAL SYNOD ACTIVITIES**

Of necessary importance is participation in a number of meetings. Bridges continue to be built through attendance at various meetings (Task Force for Lutheran Minority Ministry, Cabinet For Missions, Justice and Social Change, and Ecumenical Relations); Fall District meetings; monthly synod staff meetings; New Professional Leaders conference; North Carolina Council of Churches Executive Board and House of Delegates; consultant to the North Carolina unit of Lutheran Church Women and its Inclusive Ministry Task Force; the Lutheran-Episcopal dialogue (from which an invitation to preach was extended); synod Executive Board meetings; Church-Wide Agencies Budget Forum, and Region 5 Lutheran Council USA Ethnic and Special Ministries meeting.

#### **NON-SYNODICAL ACTIVITIES**

There have been a number of invitations from other synods in the area of inclusive ministry. In the last year, I served as a workshop leader for the South Carolina Synod youth convention; led a "free university" at the Global Mission Event; led a session at a forum at the Eastern Urban Pastors' Conference; spoke at a forum at Lutheran Theological Southern Seminary; attended the Martin Luther King, Jr. Convocation; and served as guest preacher and retreat leader for Grace Lutheran Church, Philadelphia, Pennsylvania.

As a consequence of some fine work by Lutheran pastors and congregations, I have been the guest speaker for the Gaston County Human Relations Commission Celebration and May Fellowship Day speaker in Salisbury. I continue to participate in various organizations relative to human relations concerns and racial/ethnic concerns.

#### **TASK FORCE**

The Task Force for Lutheran Minority Ministry, chaired by Mrs. Josephine Conn, has done a marvelous job guiding, supporting, challenging, and holding the director accountable. Harold Stitt, Maxine Amos, Darrell Norris, Sally Eckard, Dennis Bolton, and David Y. P. Chou, all stand ready to assist you and your congregation. I applaud their faith, commitment, and diligence.

The Task Force has been re-located, through Executive Board action, with the American Missions Committee. The Native American Task Force has also joined with Lutheran Minority Ministry. Any concerns relative to Native Americans can be directed to The Reverend Dennis Bolton.

#### THE FUTURE

Building Bridges. An exciting theme for our work. What will I be doing in the next two years? At the February 1983 Task Force meeting and the March, 1983 Executive Board meeting, I shared the following objectives:

- Developing a Black Lutheran calendar;
- 2). Planning a cluster event for congregations in the Charlotte-Mecklenburg area;
- Through a retreat, training laypeople to advocate for Lutheran Minority Ministry in their districts;

- 4). Visiting congregations with racial/ethnic members;
- 5). Making presentations/preaching as invited;
- 6). Attending monthly staff meetings, quarterly Executive Board meetings, Cabinet For Missions, and Task Force meetings;
- 7). Serving on Executive Board of the North Carolina Council of Churches;
- 8). Writing two articles on Black Lutheran contributions in North Carolina:
- 9). Visiting pastors/congregations which could be involved in inclusive ministry:
- 10). Maintaining regular contact with Task Force members;
- 11). Writing an annual report for synod;
- 12). Participating in three continuing education events;
- 13). Taking twenty-two days vacation:
- 14). Completing service on the Board of Directors of LHRAA;
- Monitoring synod growth relative to "Goals and Plans For Ministry Among Minority Persons, 1978-1984".
- 16). Working with a representative group of people from Hickory and Lenoir-Rhyne College.

I am certainly open to any suggestions and ideas you may have as we build bridges for multi-racial/ethnic ministry.

#### CONCLUSION

"... Strive to excel in building up the church" says St. Paul. This certainly is our vision as we work together. When we come to **know** the vast contributions of the various people in our communities, incorporating them into the total life of the congregation; we are "building up the church".

Finally, I want to express what a joy it has been to work with Bishop Michael Mc-Daniel and the synod staff. Deep appreciation and gratitude are extended to the Church house staff. They have been helpful in a number of ways. I greatly appreciate the guidance and support of the Regional Director, the Reverend Boyce Whitener and the Reverend John Mauney, chairman of the American Missions Committee.

I look forward to your **prayers** and **invitations** as we "build up the Church" through educational and action programs. God Bless each one of you so you can be a blessing to others.

LCW World Hunger Appeal in 1982.

The World Hunger Newsletter was published four times during the year. It is one of our main methods for sharing information.

Pastor Kenneth W. Fink, chairperson for hunger concerns, attended a meeting of the Consulting Committee for the LCA World Hunger Appeal on January 31, 1983, as

a resource person.

The committee has provided membership in Bread for the World for six synod pastors. This membership is for one year and will be a source of information and motivation for those pastors.

Support and resources were provided to the Youth Committee emphasis, Hope for the Hungry.

#### LIFESTYLE RETREAT

A second lifestyle retreat was held September 10-12 at Lutheridge. The purpose of the retreat was, "To expose people to Christian alternatives in lifestyle (food, fuel, natural resources, purchasing patterns and advertising) through experiential learning and living in a retreat setting under the revelation of God's word." This experience has proved to be so positive that the two retreat groups continue to hold reunions for support and sharing.

#### U.N./WASHINGTON SEMINAR

In cooperation with the Youth Committee, 2 persons were selected to attend the U.N./Washington Seminar. This is a learning experience into government operation, advocacy, and local projects to combat hunger.

#### LUTHERIDGE WORLD HUNGER WEEK

The committee continued to plan for the Lutheridge World Hunger Week, July 17-23, 1983. This event is an opportunity to look at hunger at many angles. It will seek to make participants aware of some causes and solutions of the world hunger tragedy. Workshops, resources, fellowship with concerned persons, practical suggestions and much more will be a part of this experience. The event is being planned in cooperation with the Virginia, South Carolina, Southeastern, and Florida hunger committees.

#### NESTLE BOYCOTT UPDATE

At the 1981 convention, this committee was mandated to monitor the progress of the infant formula companies in complying with the 1981 World Health Organization (WHO) infant marketing code.

Since that time, Nestle Corporation, the target of an international boycott because of its unethical marketing practices, appointed a committee headed by former senator Edmund Muskie to monitor Nestle's compliance with the WHO code. Recently the committee praised Nestle for its efforts to comply with the code and noted that its recommendations were substantially carried out by Nestle.

Boycott leaders not only question Nestle's compliance, but also the objectivity of the Muskie committee. Reports that tell of marketing abuses by Nestle representatives in the Third World continue. The Infant Formula Action Coalition claims to have collected complaints of more than 30 Nestle violations from eight nations.

Some positive changes have occurred. The United Methodist Infant Formula Task Force has urged the church not to participate in the boycott since Nestle has "moved toward compliance."

Carolyn Kilday summarizes the stance of Lutheran Church Women: "There are signs of hope in the fact that Nestle is making some moves which may be seen as favorable to support of the WHO code but there is yet no evidence that Nestle actually is or will be in compliance with the code. Therefore, the Nestle [boycott] remains in effect."

Pastor Doug Kearney will continue to monitor the controversy.

#### CLOTHING APPEAL

The fall appeal for clothing netted 31,992 pounds of goods which were delivered, free of charge, to the New Windsor, MD, warehouse by Carolina Freight Carriers.

#### REPEAL OF THE N.C. STATE SALES TAX ON FOOD

We present the following recommendation encouraging the repeal of the North Carolina state sales tax on food which is endorsed by the Lutheran World Relief/World Hunger Committee and is recommended to the 1983 synod convention for consideration.

Whereas the church has been given a special calling from Christ to minister to the poor and the hungry (Matthew 25);

Whereas this ministry is not only to feed the hungry but also to remove economic injustices which help create and perpetuate the problem:

Whereas the North Carolina Sales Tax on food places an unfair burden on lower income families that pay a higher percentage of their income on food tax;

Whereas in times of economic stress this tax becomes even more oppressive;

Whereas food is a necessity and not a luxury; and

Whereas 3/3 of the people in the United States of America do not pay sales tax on food;

Therefore be it resolved that the North Carolina Synod of the Lutheran Church in America supports the removal of the state sales tax on food in four stages by reducing the tax on food one percent each year for three successive years at the state level and repealing the one percent local option on food the fourth; and

That individuals in congregations be urged to write their legislators affirming this resolution and calling for the repeal of an unfair tax.

#### North Carolina Lutheran Homes, Inc.

#### **ACHIEVING A BALANCED BUDGET**

Every year since the second unit was opened at Albemarle in 1971, Lutheran Homes has operated with an annual budget deficit. With the opening of the Salisbury Unit in 1976, the annual deficits increased sharply. By Fiscal Year 1980, the total annual deficit had reached \$270,052, with nearly \$150,000 incurred by the Salisbury Unit alone.

In May 1981 the office of Fiscal Manager was established with the appointment of Ronald L. Bowman, and Administrator Isaac F. Kuhn, who had been at Hickory for 16 years, was transferred to the Salisbury Unit. By the end of FY81, the annual deficit had been reduced to \$39,996, and by the end of the past fiscal year (September 1982) Lutheran Homes had achieved a balanced budget.

This has been accomplished by applying fiscal controls and requiring additional accountability, by implementing sound management principles, and by trimming excess staff where indicated. In addition to achieving a balanced budget last year, the operating budgets of the three Homes Units and the Corporate office for the current year (FY83) has increased only 1.5% over FY82. Lower interest rates from investments, uncertainty about new Medicaid rates, mortgages at two of the Units, and moving to uniform charges at all three Homes required an average increase of \$2 per day per resident/patient. Sources of revenue are: residents who can pay their own cost of care; Medicaid (government subsidy for indigent patients); synod apportionment; earnings from investments; contributions from individuals and congregations; and when necessary, bequests. Total operating budget for the current year is \$4,397,819. Total number of staff employed by the three Homes varies slightly but averages approximately 250; corporate staff consists of 7.5 persons.

#### BEQUESTS

The bequest of Annie Glass Roediger of Winston-Salem, reported last year, has been settled for \$130,000 in cash along with half interest in the "Revco" building in the downtown area (conservatively estimated at \$45,000). This bequest is undesignated.

Also announced last year was the bequest of Elizabeth H. Miller of Charlotte, consisting of \$105,000 to the Salisbury Unit for retirement living facilities, plus 10% of her residual estate to Salisbury for the same purpose, and 10% of the residuary to the Hickory Unit. To date, \$38,000 representing partial payment of the residuary has been received by each of the two Units, and the \$105,000 is being held in trust by Wachovia Bank pending completion of plans for the retirement village at Salisbury.

Joe A. Moretz, long-time member of the Board of Trustees and Treasurer, left \$10,000 to the Hickory Unit. Mr. Moretz's estate is still in the process of being settled.

Lutheran Homes is grateful to these benefactors who have remembered our

Synod's ministry to older adults with gifts of money and property. Plans are underway to establish an endowment structure utilizing undesignated gifts to provide additional income to be used for operating expenses of the Homes. In the past, it has been necessary to use such gifts for capital expansion and to fund annual operating deficits. It will be to the advantage of Lutheran Homes, and more gratifying to our benefactors, if their bequests can be preserved as living memorials to assure perpetual income for the Homes' use in future generations.

#### GIFT OF LAND FOR WILMINGTON SITE

On September 20, 1982 Mrs. Abba Lossen Crumpler of Wilmington and her niece, Mrs. Abba Mae McFarland of San Diego, California, gave to Lutheran Homes 30.9 acres of land having approximately 400 feet of frontage on the Intracoastal Waterway. Valued at \$350,000, this is the largest single gift ever received by Lutheran Homes. The land and location make it well suited for both retirement living and nursing home facilities. One condition of the gift is that facilities must be constructed on the site within five years from the date of conveyance of the property.

A master plan for total utilization of this site is being prepared, at an estimated cost of \$60,000. A development group to assist in planning and in raising funds has been organized by Dr. C. D. Gurganus, former member of the Board of Trustees, and the two area pastors, Dr. Marion Starr of St. Paul's and Pastor Harold McSwain of St. Matthew's. First meeting of the full group, along with management and members of the Board of Trustees, is set for March 4, 1983. Enthusiasm among Wilmington area Lutherans is strong.

#### CAPITAL FUNDS APPEAL

Last year the Board of Trustees renewed its long-standing request that the Executive Board of Synod grant permission to conduct a synod-wide capital funds appeal "in 1985 or as soon thereafter as possible." At this writing, the request is still being considered by a committee, but it is hoped that an affirmative decision will have been made prior to the 1983 Convention of Synod. Time is growing short for the extensive preliminary planning necessary for a successful campaign if it is to be conducted in 1985.

One need is for an increase in the number of nursing home beds. While only 5% of our population is in nursing institutions, the older adult population (person over 60) is the fastest-growing segment of our society. In the decade of the sixties, in North Carolina the older adults grew three times faster than the state's population as a whole; in the decade of the seventies, that increase almost quadrupled. Today, 13% of our citizens are older adults; in 35 years, the number will represent 22%. It is projected that, by the end of this century, 3,000 additional beds will be required in North Carolina. Even if our synod's membership remains static for the next 20 years, Lutherans' needs for nursing home beds will have doubled by then. We now have 244 beds; the proposed capital funds drive would help add approximately 135 more at existing sites, plus the fourth one to be established at Wilmington.

A second need is for expansion of the Homes' support components: a chapel and crafts wing at Hickory and the addition of a craft and solarium wing and office space at Albemarle. These were all included in the recent renovation and expansion plans at Hickory and Albemarle, but had to be abandoned due to insufficient funds. The primary emphasis at Salisbury in the immediate future will be retirement living facilities.

The Long-Range Planning Committee is recommending the following proposal for presentation to the Executive Board of Synod:

The amount designated for Wilmington represents only about one-third of the total cost of the proposed nursing unit. The remainder would be mortgaged, just as was done at the Salisbury Unit.

While retirement living facilities are a possibility at all four sites, it is not planned as part of the capital appeal because retirement living should be entirely self-supporting.

#### PERSONNEL

No major shifts in top management have occurred in the past year. Effective February 1, 1983, Ted Goins, Jr., was appointed interim Resource Developer, replacing A. Job Kistler, and Karen Kluttz was moved to Administrative Assistant, also on an interim basis.

The Homes units have experienced their normal low turnover rate. Some supervisory level changes have taken place, most of them as a result of resignations. As usual, the larger turnovers have been with the lower echelons, especially among aides and orderlies. Good staff at this level are difficult to find and keep, and though they constitute the lower-salaried group, good aides and orderlies are crucial to quality care of residents because they are the ones on the "firing line".

The new chaplaincy program was started January 1, 1983 with the Reverend David P. Nelson assuming the full-time post as chaplain to all three Homes units. His major responsibilities include counselling to residents, particularly those in Skilled and Intermediate Care, and coordinating worship services with area pastors on a volunteer basis. The part-time chaplains at Hickory and Albemarle, Dr. Walter T. Nau and The Reverend C. Lee Shipton, have provided vitally-needed assistance during the transition period.

#### HICKORY UNIT - Administrator Mark C. Johnson

The \$800,000 renovation and expansion project at the Hickory Home was completed in the spring of 1982. Emphasis was on renovation, as the 20-year-old institution required a number of improvements to enable it to meet current nursing home codes and regulations. Kitchen, dining room, and laundry were expanded, additional office space was provided, and eight private rooms were completed. This is the first time the Hickory home has had private rooms in the Skilled Nursing Care unit.

To pay for this project, it was necessary to take a mortgage of \$163,000 at 16% interest. Since then, the mortgage has been reduced to nearly half the original amount by applying several bequests designated to the Hickory Unit.

Also for the first time, the site has been attractively landscaped, adding much to the operance of our oldest Home.

Now under consideration is the installation of a modern call-bell system to replace the present obsolete one. To place a new system throughout the entire building, cost will be approximately \$45,000.

#### ALBEMARLE UNIT — Administrator D. Russell Myers, Jr.

On August 5, 1982 bids were received for a 26-bed Rest Home addition, craft and solarium rooms, and office expansion at Albemarle. Because the lowest bid was over \$200,000 more than anticipated, it was necessary to abandon plans for the craft and solarium and office, and cut the six private rooms from the Rest Home wing. The twenty-bed addition is nearing completion. Barring any major setbacks, completion should be in the early summer of 1983. There will be ten double-occupancy rooms. Four will have bath and toilet facilities, while the remaining six will have toilet facilities only, with two central baths. All rooms will have independent storage and privacy screens.

A sitting room opening on a courtyard will be available for residents' pleasure. There will be a Nurses' Station with lounge and storage areas, also in the new wing. Staff and current residents are planning for the admission of new residents.

#### SALISBURY UNIT — Administrator Isaac F. Kuhn

A computerized energy management system was installed at mid-year and has functioned very well. One side benefit was the discovery that Duke Power Company's meter was over-charging the Unit, and a settlement was made by the Company.

Some statistics at Salisbury, which are typical of all three units, are:

#### Lutheran Family Services in North Carolina, Inc.

This past year has again been marked by growth and expansion. With a growing reputation as an agency willing to work with difficult populations with a fair degree of success we have been called upon to expand our services during a time of social service cutbacks.

#### The Board of Trustees

The Board of Trustees met in quarterly sessions. At the annual meeting in June the following officers were elected: Rev. A. Glenn Boland, President; Dr. Wanda Karriker, Vice President; Dr. Harry Robinson, Jr., Treasurer; and Mrs. Jan Conrad, Secretary.

#### The Program

The program continued to expand with the addition of eleven group homes for children, four day treatment centers for emotionally disturbed adolescents, fifteen foster care homes and the resettlement of 200 Cambodians in the Kymer Cluster in Guilford County.

With these expansions we have a total of twenty-two group homes for children, five day treatment centers, seventy-five youth in foster care, resettlement of over 200 refugees, one family counseling center and a Synod-wide program of retreats for separated and divorced persons and single parents and children.

With all programs in place we have a daily child care capacity of two hundred thirty-five children and youth. This number makes us the second largest private agency in the state.

#### Support

We have continued to have outstanding support and involvement from our Lutheran congregations. Most of our foster parents are Lutherans. Our group homes, refugee resettlement programs and family counseling center couldn't function without the backing from our Lutheran support groups. Involvement has ranged from purchasing homes, painting rooms, giving furniture, sponsoring refugees, making birthday cakes to giving donations.

#### The Staff

This agency functions under the overall leadership of the Executive Director, Mr. Bill Brittain. Other staff are Rip McAdams, Director, Group Homes and Day Treatment; Sherrell Goolsby, Director, Family Support Services; Rev. David Hill, Director, Public Relations; David Koch, Business Manager; Dr. Frank Kuhn, Director, Willie M. Treatment Program, Mecklenburg County; Ginny Soberg-Rhyne, Director, Refugee Resettlement; Lyn Strickland, Director, Triad Lutheran Center; Sam Parker and Glenn Smith, Regional Directors.

#### LUTHERAN FAMILY SERVICES IN NORTH CAROLINA NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS June 30, 1982

#### NOTE 1 Summary of Significant Accounting Policies:

The Corporation's financial statements are prepared in accordance with the American Institute of Certified Public Accountants' Industry Audit Guide, Audits of Voluntary Health and Welfare Organizations.

#### Overview

Lutheran Family Services in North Carolina is a not-for-profit human service organization and is certified by the Division for Mission in North America, Lutheran Church in America, for inclusion under the blanket 501 (c) (3) tax exemption of the Lutheran Church in America. It follows the practice of accounting for and reporting on the use of resources by specific fund groups.

The assets, liabilities and fund balances are reported in two self balancing fund groups as follows:

Current fund-unrestricted, which has unrestricted resources, represents the portion of expendable funds that is available for general activities.

Building and equipment fund which represents resources restricted or expended for building and equipment acquisitions.

#### **Buildings, Equipment and Depreciation**

Building and equipment expenditures are capitalized at cost. Expenditures from the current fund — unrestricted for fixed assets are reflected as a transfer from current fund — unrestricted balance. Donated fixed assets are recorded and capitalized at market value. Depreciation of fixed assets is provided for by the straight-line method under the accelerated cost recovery system (Internal Revenue Code Section 168(b) (3)).

#### Pension Plan

The organization participates in the Lay Pension Plan of the Lutheran Church in America. Employer contributions amounted to \$11.639. The plan is a contributory retirement disability and survivor pension plan of the "money purchase" type.

#### NOTE 2 Separation and Incorporation

In accordance with a 1963 withdrawal agreement with the Virginia Synod of the Lutheran Church in America, the North Carolina Synod of the Lutheran Church in America withdrew from ownership and sponsorship of the Lutheran Children's Home of the South as of December 31, 1980. Ownership of tangible and intangible assets of the North Carolina Family Services was assumed by Lutheran Family Services in North Carolina effective December 31, 1980. Assets net of liabilities acquired totaled \$119.636.

#### NOTE 3 Loans and Notes Payable

(a) Loans payable of \$46,000 represent advances by the Lutheran Immigration and Refugee Services, Lutheran Council in the U.S.A. for the following programs:

Refugee Resettlement Program	\$22,000
LCA Unaccompanied Minors Program	\$24,000

(b) Promissory note dated May 25, 1982 payable to William E. Donovan and wife for \$10,000 as part of purchase of Sanford. North Carolina residence. This note is secured by a purchase money deed of trust on the property and provides for:

Payments to be made in monthly installments of \$222.45 each including interest at 12% per annum for a period of 60 months with each monthly payment being applied to interest and principal until note is paid in full. Unpaid principal balance at June 30, 1982 was \$9,878.

(c) Note dated June 23, 1981 payable to Xerox Corporation for \$3,295 for purchase of Xerox 2600 copier. Xerox Corporation reserves a purchase money security interest in the equipment until the unpaid balance is paid in full. The installment purchase agreement provides for 60 consecutive equal monthly installments of \$90.06 with finance charges accumulating at 21.5% per annum. Unpaid principal balance at June 30, 1982 was \$2,920.

#### NOTE 4 Mortgage Payable

Assumption of \$53,925 note due First Federal Savings & Loan Association, Sanford, North Carolina as part of a purchase agreement of Sanford, North Carolina residence from William E. Donovan and wife. This note is secured by a deed of trust and provides for: Payments to be made in monthly installments of \$711.53 each including interest at 15.5% per annum for a period of 302 months with each monthly payment being applied to interest and principal until note is paid in full. Unpaid principal balance at June 30, 1982 was \$53,925.

#### NOTE 5 Contingent Liability

Funds advanced prior to January 1, 1981 to North Carolina Family Services, Lutheran Children's Home of the South was assumed as a liability by Lutheran Family Services in North Carolina when the North Carolina Synod withdrew from sponsorship of the Lutheran Children's Home of the South. The Ioan was to be evidenced by an unsecured note payable to Lutheran Children's Home of the South at 8% interest.

At June 30, 1981 the note had not been executed due to a clarification of the balance purported to be approximately \$41,226 rather than \$44,000. The balance of \$44,000 was recorded as the audited balance as shown on the December 31, 1980 audit of the Lutheran Children's Home of the South.

Correspondence dated February 19, 1982 from Lutheran Children's Home of the South indicates that a negotiated settlement amount of \$41,000 had been reached by representatives of both parties subject to ratification by the Board of Trustees of Lutheran Family Services in North Carolina. This action was unanimously ratified by Lutheran Family Services in North Carolina Board meeting of April 26, 1982.

In June 1982, a check for \$41,000 was mailed to Lutheran Children's Home of the South along with a release in full satisfaction and discharge of all claims of Children's Home against Family Services growing out of the separation of the functions of the two organizations. As of the date of this report, the signed release has not been returned.

#### **ACCOUNTANTS' REPORT ON OTHER FINANCIAL INFORMATION**

Our examination of the basic financial statements presented in the preceding section of the report was made for the purpose of forming an opinion on such financial statements taken as a whole. The accompanying information shown hereinafter is presented for purposes of additional analysis and is not a required part of the basic financial statements. Such information has been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the examination of the basic financial statements and, in our opinion, is fairly stated in all material aspects in relation to the basic financial statements taken as a whole.

#### N.C. Unit, Lutheran Church Women

During 1982-83, the 9,224 members in 204 congregational organizations comprising the North Carolina Unit of Lutheran Church Women worked together to fulfill the purpose of proclamation and reconciliation.

With a program structure based on six functions or areas of responsibility, work has been carried on throughout the Unit. Goals, formulated from Auxiliary aims and emphases and adopted by the Unit in convention, were assigned by the Executive Board to various committees to be accomplished.

A special pilot project on inclusiveness touched every area of work. We have studied inclusiveness and racism from a theological perspective and implemented strategies leading to becoming more inclusive.

#### **FUNCTION I, SPIRITUAL GROWTH**

Three spiritual growth retreats focusing on inclusiveness were held during 1982. These were at Camp Agape, September 10-12, with the Rev. Beth Kearney as leader; Lutheridge, November 5-7, the Rev. Virginia Mothershed, leader; and a one day drive-in retreat at St. John's, Concord, with the Rev. Ted W. Goins and Dr. Leonard Bolick as leaders. A total of 137 women participated. Plans have been made for two overnight retreats in the fall of 1983, at Lutheridge and Agape, and one day retreats in five districts in October. Regular Bible study was provided through use of "Studies in the Book of Proverbs." Cluster Bible studies on inclusiveness were held throughout the Unit January-March, providing every LCW member with an opportunity to personally explore Biblical injunctions in this area. LCW Sunday was observed in many congregations on May 1 with LCW members participating in the service of worship and informing the congregation of the purpose and program of LCW.

#### **FUNCTION II, Mission Education**

Through monthly programs, Mailbox Mission, mission studies, and special emphases, understanding and action in this area were promoted. In keeping with our commitment to work toward becoming more inclusive, certainly a major accomplishment this year was the preparation and distribution to all congregational organizations of "A Birthday Celebration for Martin Luther King, Jr." This is designed for use each year. Another contribution in this area was a temple talk, "God's Arithmetic," prepared for congregational organization usage. Attention was called to service in global mission through distribution of opportunities and training requirements.

#### FUNCTION III, Personal Growth and Relationships

Upon request of LCW, the program STEP (Systematic Training for Effective Parenting) was added to the Synod media center. A program on family life for congregational use during Family Week in May or any other time was prepared and distributed to congregational organizations. LCW is proud to have participated in the ERA rally in Raleigh last June, although efforts did not have the desired result.

#### **FUNCTION IV, Justice and Outreach**

LCW continues to support the Nestle boycott, despite reports that the company has complied with requests to meet certain standards. LCW members were encouraged to participate in local volunteer services. A survey was completed of types of volunteer work LCW members are engaged in, and results indicate a wide variety of services already being provided. The Task Force on Juvenile Justice was reorganized, and involvement here is expected to increase. Literacy work continues. Renewed efforts are planned, possibly concentrating on that portion of the teenage school population who are far below grade level in reading.

#### FUNCTION V. Ecumenical Relations

Supporting Church Women United is an important part of our involvement in ecumenism. Through offerings and active participation, LCW individual members contribute in a cooperative manner. Congregational organizations were encouraged to invite women of other Lutheran bodies and Episcopal women to join

with them for meetings and fellowship, an especially timely endeavor at this time. Representatives of LCW attended various functions of other Lutheran bodies and Episcopal women.

#### FUNCTION VI. Organizational Support and Renewal

Seven fall district meetings with the theme of inclusiveness ("Lord, Open My Heart'') attracted 901 women. Evaluation of this event, as with all those having to do with inclusiveness, indicates a receptiveness to learn and put into practice actions leading to becoming more inclusive. The focus of the annual convention being held June 3-5, 1983, at Lenoir-Rhyne is also inclusiveness, "Unity in Christ Jesus." Major presenters are the Rev. Paul A. Hagedorn, pastor of St. Matthew's-Trinity Lutheran Parish, Hoboken, N.J., and Fern Lee Hagedorn, Assistant Director for Interpretation, Division for Mission in North America. Emphasis on leadership training continued with a training session for LMD facilitators and board members at Lenoir-Rhyne in the summer. Facilitators continue leadership training events with their assigned congregational organizations. Leadership training was also provided at every board meeting, at committee day on "Super Saturday," and at convention. The annual overnight retreats for local LCW presidents were held in each district. Leaders other than presidents were also offered opportunities for training in fall and winter workshops. Fifteen spring fellowships with the theme "Many Peoples - Many Gifts" occurred across the Unit. In light of the resolution calling attention to the LCA policy on commercialism and LCW's financial policy at the 1982 convention, efforts were made through facilitators and printed materials to educate members to better stewardship practices. Contacts with congregational organizations are maintained through monthly bulk mailings from the president and executive board, the unit's newsletter, CARE-O-LINES, LUTHERAN WOMEN, and district assembly chairpersons' letters. A history of Lutheran women's work in N.C. is being prepared and will be published in 1986. Our unit responded generously to God through offerings. More than \$110,000 was received through offerings and disbursed. A total of \$94,029,42 was sent to the Auxiliary in support of its program, which includes a gift of \$1,000,000 to the LCA. The president and fourteen delegates will be attending the triennial convention of the Auxiliary in St. Paul August 18-22, 1983.

On behalf of all LCW members of the N.C. Unit of LCW, the officers and Executive Board thank the Synod, Bishop McDaniel, his staff, the Synod Executive Board, support personnel at the Church House, and all clergy and lay persons in N.C. who have given us assistance and encouragement as we work to fulfill our mission. We dedicate ourselves to continue striving to be a community of women, in response to the Holy Spirit, engaged in proclamation and reconciliation.

#### North Carolina Lutheran Men

The year 1982 marked the sixtieth year of activity for North Carolina Lutheran Men and its predecessor organization, The Brotherhood.

Four regular meetings were held by the Executive Committee, plus one meeting at the state convention.

Ninety-two persons attended the annual spring Retreat for Lutheran Men and their wives at Lutheridge April 16, 17 and 18. Dr. Robert J. Marshall, Professor at Southern Seminary and former President of the Lutheran Church in America, led the retreat on "Biblical Perspectives on Christian Unity."

The annual dinner for Mission Pastors was again hosted by NCLM and was held Friday evening during synod at St. Luke's, Conover, the Reverend Garold Carter, pastor. Approximately seventy-five were in attendance. Also, on Synod Sunday, June 6, eighteen congregations were furnished speakers from our "Speakers Bureau".

The annual convention of NCLM was held at Bethlehem, Hickory, November 6. Keynote speaker for Rev. Richard Boye of St. Mark's, Charlotte with Dr. Larry Yoder of Lenoir-Rhyne College as banquet speaker.

The recently inaugurated Life and Memorial Membership plan for the Loan and Gift Fund has been well-received. During 1982 fourteen Memorial Memberships and eleven honorary Life Memberships were received.

One loan was made by the Home Mission Foundation — to Resurrection, Greensboro, in the amount of \$50,000 for refinancing purposes. Several other loans to Mission congregations are pending.

In all a total of \$19,068 was received for Camp Agape including \$8,024 in matching funds from Lutheran Brotherhood Insurance Co. At the same time \$19,650 was added to the Loan and Gift Fund.

The Retreat Lodge project was completed as of Mach 31, 1983.

Three newsletters and numerous other materials, including suggested programs for local units, were mailed to all congregations of synod.

A total of eighty-four units were chartered in 1982. It is known that many other men's groups are meeting regularly in congregations even though not actively affiliated officially with the synodical NCLM.

There is a spirit of renewed enthusiasm among our men. Let's foster it!

#### Stewardship Committee

Since the 1982 Convention of the NC Synod, the Stewardship Committee has been working toward the year-long emphasis mandated by the convention. This emphasis has taken shape as part of the Bishop's Program of ''Parish Renewal'', and the Stewardship Committee has worked to support the work of our Bishop and staff, as well as to offer specific support to congregations in implementing Parish Renewal or their regular Stewardship Programs.

Partnership in Ministry Emphasis (PIME) was again offered in 1982 to those congregations wishing to have a consultation on apportioned benevolence. PIME was limited to those congregations already in the program in 1982 and will be changed in 1983 to eliminate the negotiation of apportionment by this committee. This will allow the Stewardship Committee to be more sensitive to the needs of congregational programs without having to be cast in what can seem to be an adversary role. Benevolence giving is the concern of all, and while this committee is happy to support full partnership of congregations and synod through shared ministry and generous giving, we hope to be seen by congregations as persons who can assist

them in helping persons respond to the Gospel instead of "tax collectors" who are interested only in extracting a sum of money. PIME will be offered in a redesigned plan to encourage partnership and interpret the work of the synod and church-wide agencies in order to help congregations share ministry more fully.

The Synod Stewardship Committee also participates in the training of new professional leaders at the annual workshop, and provides consultants to congregations wishing to develop or improve their year-round stewardship programs.

I wish to thank all the members of the committee for their work during the past year. Special thanks are in order to Bishop McDaniel and staff members Mark Menees and Jim Chesky who have been invaluable in their leadership and support. Mr. Tom O'Brien with the LCA Division for Parish Services has given us much guidance and has provided the vision for many of our current projects.

It is our prayer that the same Lord who has blessed us so generously with time and talent and money will give us the wisdom and the will to use these gifts wisely. If the members of this committee can be of assistance to you, please call. Your servants for Christ's sake.

#### Lenoir-Rhyne College

After some 18 months of heavy construction, contractors' crews and their equipment began to leave the Lenoir-Rhyne College campus early this year as work was completed on the institution's academic complex. The exodus continued through the spring, but most of the new facilities were in full use with the opening of second semester and the entire complex was ready for a gala dedication weekend, March 25-27.

While a number of special events were concentrated into that three-day period, the dedication activities actually began several days earlier with the installation of the Reverend Dr. Donald R. Just as Chaplain of the College. Dr. Just arrived on campus in January, succeeding the Rev. Dr. J. Larry Yoder who had served Synod and College admirably in that post since 1977.

Dr. Yoder resigned the chaplaincy when he assumed additional teaching duties at Lenoir-Rhyne following the election of the Rev. Michael C. D. McDaniel as Bishop of the Synod during its last convention in June of 1982. A search committee worked some five months before recommending Dr. Just to the Executive Board of Synod at its December meeting in Salisbury. The board extended a call to Dr. Just after that session.

Dr. Just was pastoring two Lutheran congregations in Wisconsin at the time of his call to Lenoir-Rhyne. He had previously led parishes in California and British Columbia, as well as serving as a chaplain in the U.S. Army and on the faculty and staff of Concordia College in Milwaukee, Wisconsin.

The new Lenoir-Rhyne chaplain is 42 years old and a native of North Dakota. He earned a bachelor's degree at Concordia College in Moorhead, Minn. in 1961, and a theology degree four years later from Concordia Theological Seminary in Springfield, III. He also holds a master's from North Carolina State University in Raleigh and a doctorate from the Claremont School of Theology in Claremont, California.

Dr. Just entered his work at Lenoir-Rhyne with enthusiasm and had begun to establish himself on campus by the time of his installation. Members of the campus

community have responded favorably to his leadership, and College officials are excited about his pastoral and counseling skills.

The dedication event also included formal ceremonies on March 26, which involved Bishop McDaniel, and a Festival of Learning that afternoon showcasing campus facilities and personnel. The following day began with a worship service at St. Andrew's Lutheran Church adjacent to the campus; an open house was held in the afternoon; and the dedication weekend closed with a concert by the College's A Cappella Choir.

A dream that began more than 10 years ago and that was given its first boost toward reality through the Forward Together Campaign in congregations of the N.C. Synod reached fruition with those formal dedication activities.

The buildings will reach full flower, however, only as they serve the College and Church in helping to provide excellent instruction within the context of the Christian faith. There has been much activity in terms of the academic program during the past year as well.

Two new majors have been added to the College curriculum, and at the time of this writing an additional two were awaiting approval by the Board of Trustees.

The two majors already functioning are communications and international business, the latter one of the few programs of its type in the nation. Awaiting approval (at spring Trustee meeting) are two additions to the already strong computer science program — a bachelor of science degree in computer science for students who wish to continue their educations in graduate school and/or enter careers as systems programmers or problem-solving consultants, and a bachelor of arts degree for more specific training in programming.

The international business major combines course work in business, economics and a modern language (French, German, or Spanish). The requirements compare favorably with several graduate programs which have been studied by College officials, and career opportunities for graduates in this field are growing rapidly.

Communications is another joint offering, combining courses from the departments of English and Art and Theatre Arts. It gives students a firm foundation in the liberal arts, as well as training in the basic skills necessary for careers in print of electronic media.

The major is also significant in that it is making good use of the new academic complex facilities. Television studios, a graphics laboratory and darkrooms in the learning resource center are important to students and faculty members in this program.

Lenoir-Rhyne has a proud history in the field of computer science, having pioneered a free access system for its academic computer more than ten years ago. It was the first such system among colleges and universities in North Carolina, and now more than 30 terminals are open to the less than 1,300 students on campus.

The College also committed to an on-line system some time ago, a direction which many other computer systems are now taking. A mathematics major with a concentration in computer science has been available to Lenoir-Rhyne students for a number of years, and the expanded program, if approved, should offer even more opportunities.

Certainly, the support of the North Carolina Synod has been vital to the growth that Lenoir-Rhyne has experienced during the last year. Lutheran students continue to enroll at the College, College and Church officials work hand-in-hand on many projects, and gift support grows.

The work underway by the Church Task Force of the College's Institutional Advancement Council is most encouraging and is designed to strengthen the communication between the College and the church. The Task Force is chaired by Charles Mauney of Kings Mountain and has a representative from each district. Currently, they are identifying a "college contact" within each congregation to assist the pastor in the promotion of Lenoir-Rhyne.

Student aid remains a top priority at Lenoir-Rhyne as the College faces the double-edged sword of rising costs and declining enrollments that are affecting institutions of higher education throughout the land. Progress has been made in this area over the past 12 months with several new scholarship funds endowed and an

"Adopt-a-Student" program under consideration in a number of congregations across the Synod.

Higher Education Sunday on April 17 was once again supported well by the congregations of the North Carolina Synod.

Total gift support for all purposes during the last calendar year exceeded \$1.5 million, representing the third highest total in Lenoir-Rhyne history. The College expresses its sincere appreciation to persons throughout the Synod for their role in this significant achievement.

ENROLLMENTS AND DEGREES: Registration for fall semester of 1983 was 1,382, down 42 from 1st year, and 56 graduate students.

The College awarded 247 bachelor's degrees and 22 master's degrees at its graduation exercises on May 9, and August 13, 1982. Preacher for the Baccalaureate service was the Rev. James R. Stephenson, pastor, Holy Trinity Lutheran Church, Hickory, N.C. The graduation speaker was the Honorable James B. Hunt, Jr., Governor of the State of North Carolina. A Trustee Award was presented to Sanford L. Steelman, Sr. and honorary degrees were awarded to James B. Hunt, Jr., Harold Francis McKnight of Charlotte, N.C., the Rev. Harry Hoover Robinson, Jr., Durham, N.C. and the Rev. Walter Nicholas Yount, Salisbury, N.C. Dr. Michael McDaniel was speaker for summer graduation.

GOVERNING AND ADVISORY BOARDS: The Board of Trustees held regular meetings on November 19, 1982 and March 25, 1983, and conducted a two-day seminar in August, 1982, on campus. Three members of the Board rotate off this year and are ineligible for re-election at this time. With gratitude and thanks for their services we acknowledge the Rev. David R. Keck, Kannapolis, N.C., Mr. Walter S. Lineberger, Belmont, N.C. and the Rev. James R. Stephenson, Hickory.

The Development Board met on October 2, 1982, and March 25, 1983. Re-elected to three-year terms were John H. Allen, H. Jack Faw, Thomas Fee, Dr. Hilda Garrou, Thomas W. Kern, Helen Schlegel Moretz, Margie Shuford Owsley, and A. L. Viles. New members elected for a three-year term were W. W. Eckard, Allen W. Dawson, Walter Wagoner, John Huie, and Howard Holcomb.

TRUSTEE NOMINATIONS: In accordance with Section VII, B, 2 of the Bylaws of the Synod, the Board of Trustees has placed in nomination: Mrs. Peggy W. Goodman, a photographer from Hickory, N.C., and Mr. William Patterson, an attorney from Atlanta, Georgia, for three-year terms expiring in 1986.

FINANCIAL REPORT: An audited financial statement for the fiscal year ending in 1982 is appended to this report.

# STATEMENT OF MUTUAL EXPECTATIONS OF THE NORTH CAROLINA SYNOD AND LENGIR-RHYNE COLLEGE

(As Revised, November 2, 1982)

The church's involvement in higher education is vital to its own life and mission and provides a most effective arena for ministry to the world, and the culture of which the Church and College are a part. Therefore, the North Carolina Synod of the Lutheran Church in America and Lenoir-Rhyne College pledge their mutual support and acknowledge their interdependence in the cause of promoting Christian faith and life in the context of the educational enterprise. In so doing, both Synod and College reaffirm their fundamental commitment to Jesus Christ as Lord, and their desire to see Christian insights and perspectives reflected in all educational programs of the Church and its College.

I. A Statement of Mutual Acknowledgement of the Synod-College Relationship
The mission of the North Carolina Synod of the Lutheran Church in America is to

proclaim the Gospel through Word and Sacraments, to relate the Gospel to human need in every situation, and to extend the ministry of the Gospel to all the world.

In pursuit of its mission, the Synod assumes under one of its funcitons the sponsorship of Lenoir-Rhyne College. The sponsorship furthers this mission by providing the Synod with formal channels for relating the Gospel to and maintaining dialog with the higher education community, extending the ministry of the Gospel to college students, and contributing to the enrichment of society by aiding in education for Christian leadership.

The mission of Lenoir-Rhyne College is to instruct students in the liberal arts, and selected pre-professional, professional, and graduate studies; and, to aid students in seeking wholeness of personality, true vocation, and the most useful service to God and the world.

In pursuit of its mission, the College assumes as one of its functions a responsible relationship with the North Carolina Synod of the Lutheran Church in America. The relationship furthers this mission by providing the College with a means for defining the theological foundations of its educational program, cultivating a supportive constituency, and maintaining its founding commitment to remain faithful to the Lutheran Church.

- II. Service and Support to be Provided Each to the Other
  - A. The Synod expects of the College:
    - (1) That Lenoir-Rhyne be an accredited four-year college that offers opportunities for personal growth and learning to qualified students, that maintains high standards of academic performance, and provides topquality education in the liberal arts;
    - (2) That the administration, faculty, and staff be comprised of persons who are skilled in their respective areas of competence, highly motivated, of sound character, and who reflect in their personal lives the fruits of Christian faith;
    - (3) That the administrators, faculty, and staff make the growth of the students their primary concern, giving attention to the academic performance and the personal welfare of each;
    - (4) That the College enroll qualified students without regard to race, sex, or religion, while at the same time giving special encouragement to the enrollment of students from congregations in the Synod;
    - (5) That the college foster a sense of community among those engaged in the educational process, to the end that no person has reason to feel excluded from any desired dimension of community life;
    - (6) That the College reflect the spirit of Christ in all of its relationships, giving high visibility to the office of chaplain and maintaining a climate that undergirds persons in the Christian faith and supports the church and its programs.
    - (7) That the College provide instruction in the primary documents of the Christian faith, in its history and teaching, and also in the comparative study of religions, and expect its students to acquire knowledge in these fields commensurate with the mastery expected in other fields of study;
    - (8) That the College, by its example and through its instructional and cocurricular offerings, seek to enhance the social consciousness of the academic community;
    - (9) That the College make available the use of its facilities and its administrative and instructional services to advance the mission of the church;
    - (10) That the College prepare persons for professional leadership in the church and provide resources for continuing education for ordained and lay workers;
    - (11) That the College strive to develop in its students the motivation to act as responsible members of society and the ability and will to use their talents and training to serve others as well as themselves.

- B. In addition, the College offers to the Synod:
  - Its continuing commitment to the Christian faith and its loyalty as an institution of the church;
  - (2) A means of implementation of the church's concern and society through the involvement of College personnel including students, faculty, and staff, in community services;
  - (3) Its prophetic voice as a commentary on the status of life in society and its concern and counsel for the quality of the life and programs of the church:
  - (4) An annual meeting with representatives of the College for the purpose of reviewing its expectations of the Synod.
- C. The College expects of the Synod:
  - (1) That its congregations will support the recruitment efforts of the College among their youth;
  - (2) That its congregations will support the on-going program of the College through regular budgetary contributions and encourage their members to make special gifts for capital improvements, endowments and other funds;
  - (3) The election of trustees who are committed to the mission and welfare of the College;
  - (4) That its congregations will seek more effective ways to attract and to engage young people in examining, grounding, and embodying those traditional and contemporary values which are consistent with the Gospel of Reconciliation (II Corinthians 5:19);
  - (5) That the Synod assist the College in identifying the distinctive contributions that a college related to the Lutheran Church in America can make in the educational process.
- D. In addition, the Synod offers to the College:
  - Identification as a college of the Synod, and, through the Synod, as a college of the Lutheran Church in America, with a supporting constituency in congregations in North Carolina;
  - (2) Its concern and supportive counsel which call attention to needful changes in the life and programs of the College;
  - (3) The use of synodical and congregational facilities for programs of the College.
  - (4) An annual meeting with representatives of the Synod for the purpose of reviewing its expectations of the College.

#### III. Agreement on Regular Contact Between the Synod and the College

The constitution of the North Carolina Synod (Article VII, Section 3), provides that the Board of Trustees of Lenoir-Rhyne College "shall report annually to the regular conventions" of the Synod. The College acknowledges the appropriateness of this and stands ready to provide such supplementary reports as may be desired.

The Synod and College recognize the continuing need for discovering new and more effective means of interaction and communication. These might include the interchange of materials and news releases, speakers and lecturers, performing groups and the joint sponsorship of projects of mutual interest.

This statement shall be reviewed by both the Synod and the College at five-year intervals.

# LENOIR-RHYNE COLLEGE NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS For the Years Ended May 31, 1982 and 1981

#### 1. SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Accrual Basis — The financial statements of Lenoir-Rhyne College have been prepared on the accrual basis except for depreciation accounting as explained subsequently in this note. The statement of current funds revenues, expenditures and other changes is a statement of financial activities of current funds related to the current reporting period. It does not purport to present the results of operations nor the net income or loss for the period as would a statement of income or a statement of revenues and expenses.

To the extent that current funds are used to finance plant assets, the amounts so provided are accounted for as (1) expenditures, in the case of normal replacement of movable equipment and library books; (2) mandatory transfers, in the case of required provisions for debt amortization and interest and equipment renewal and replacement; and (3) as transfers of a mandatory nature in all other cases.

Fund Accounting — In order to ensure observance of limitations and restrictions placed on the use of the resources available to the College, the accounts of the College are maintained in accordance with the principles of "fund accounting". This is the procedure by which resources for various purposes are classified for accounting and reporting purposes into funds that are in accordance with activities or objectives specified. Separate accounts are maintained for each fund; however, in the accompanying financial statements, funds that have similar characteristics have been combined into groups. Accordingly, all financial transactions have been recorded and reported by fund group.

Within each fund group, fund balances restricted by outside sources are so indicated and are distinguished from unrestricted funds allocated to specific purposes by action of the Board of Trustees. Externally restricted funds may be utilized only in accordance with the purposes established by the source of such funds and are in contrast with unrestricted funds over which the Board of Trustees retains full control to use in achieving any of its institutional purposes.

Endowment funds are subject to the restrictions of gift instruments requiring in perpetuity that principal be invested and only income be utilized. Although quasi-endowment funds may be established by the Board of Trustees for the same purposes as endowment funds, any portion of quasi-endowment funds may be expended.

All gains and losses arising from the sale, collection or other disposition of investments and other noncash assets are accounted for in the fund which owned such assets. Ordinary income derived from investments, receivables and the like is accounted for in the fund owning such assets, except that income derived from investments of endowment and similar funds is accounted for in the fund to which it is restricted, or, if unrestricted, as revenues in unrestricted current funds.

All other unrestricted revenue is accounted for in the unrestricted current fund. Restricted gifts, grants, appropriations, endowment income and other restricted resources are accounted for in the appropriate restricted funds. Restricted current funds are reported as revenues and expenditures when expended for current operating purposes.

Financial Statement Presentation — Financial statements for 1981 have been reclassified, where applicable, to conform to financial statement presentation used in 1982, except for expenditures of the summer school program, which are included in academic support for the current year whereas they are allocated to other functional expenditure categories in the prior year. This has no material effect on financial statement presentation and comparability between 1982 and 1981.

**Investments** — Investments exclusive of physical plant, are valued at cost or at fair market value at date received for donated investments. The College receives all earnings of the Martin Luther Stevens Memorial Trust, the assets of which are not included with those of the College.

**Receivables** — The college provides an allowance for doubtful accounts equal to estimated collection losses. Estimated losses are based on experience together with a review of existing receivables.

Inventory Valuation — Inventories are stated at lower of cost (first-in, first-out method) or market. Market is considered as net realizable value.

**Physical Plant and Equipment** — Physical plant and equipment are stated at cost at date of acquisition or fair value at date of donation in the case of gifts, except for acquisitions prior to 1958 which are stated at appraised value. Depreciation on physical plant and equipment is not recorded.

Vacation Pay — In 1982 the College fully adopted the provisions of Statement 43 of the Financial Accounting Standards Board which sets forth the criteria for accounting for compensated absences. In accordance with the pronouncement the college is accruing vacation pay as earned. Previously, vacation pay was charged to operations when paid. The effects of this change were immaterial to both the current and prior years' financial statements.

Agency Funds — Effective with the year ended May 31, 1980, the College elected to treat as current fund revenues and expenditures amounts received from federal and state agencies and designated for the benefit of specified students. The amount of such funds was \$493,800 and \$440,275 in 1982 and 1981, respectively.

#### RETIREMENT PLANS

The College participates in Teachers' Insurance and Annuity Association Contributory Retirement Plan for professional, administrative and clerical personnel. The Plan contains no provision for past service benefits and the College assumes no further liability beyond the periodic contributions for each participating employee. There are several small pension plans for ministers and nonacademic employees to which the College makes periodic contributions to the extent of any liability. Total retirement plan expense amounted to \$191,182 in 1982 and \$161,550 in 1981.

#### 8. INTERFUND BORROWINGS

All interfund borrowings due to unrestricted funds from plant funds are payable within one year without in-

#### 9. EXPANSION PROJECT

As of May 31, 1982 contracts have been let for the construction of an addition to the Rudisill Library and the renovation and expansion of the Rhyne Building which will be financed by available resources. #### 10. OTHER MATTERS

At May 31, 1982 the College had approximately \$500,000 of pledges receivable due which were not recorded in the financial statements since the ultimate realization of these amounts was contingent upon meeting certain stipulations of the pledge agreements, which had not been fully satisfied at that time. Subsequent to May 31, 1982 all of the requirements of these pledges were satisfied, and the College anticipates recording these pledges as revenue during the year ending May 31, 1983.

#### Minority Ministry Task Force

The Task Force has increased in membership to include a multi-racial, multi-ethnic group. We are grateful for these women and men who meet quarterly to set direction and give support to the work of this ministry.

In 1982 we were placed with the American Missions Committee.

Our goal now is to include material and workshop experiences for people in Worship, Christian Education, Youth and Social Ministry.

The Task Force on Native American concerns has been placed with the Minority Ministry Program. This will provide a greater opportunity to extend our hands as we are building bridges with Native American Tribes in North Carolina.

Let's tear down all the walls that divide us, for in Christ all the walls come down and our hands can now reach for each other.

#### **Professional Preparation**

This committee has the responsibility of recruiting, evaluating, guiding, supporting, endorsing and examining candidates who express an interest in a church vocation. This may mean going toward ordained ministry or seeking to serve the church as a lay professional leader in an area of specialty. When a person begins to show interest in a ministry of the church this committee begins the process of giving that candidate direction, support and oversight. It is our hope in the process of several years with the candidate that we will be able to look at the areas of academic development, inter-personal relationships, and spiritual growth and development. It is also our hope that we meet at least once during every school year with each of the candidates in preparation. Presently there are approximately 41 persons actually enrolled in one of the seminaries of the church in pursuit of a Master of Divinity Degree or a Master of Arts in Religion. There are 56 persons in various stages of development who are presently registered with the committee.

We have seen an increased number of persons from within the Synod who are showing interest in the process of preparing themselves for some form of ministry. One of the interesting trends that seems to be coming is the enrollment of persons for seminary studies who are 30-35 years of age and have spent time in other arenas of work. Along with this we of course have those persons who continue their education right from college into seminary and/or graduate school. As always, the committee welcomes mature and promising persons to test out the possibility of full time church work.

Some of the activities of this committee include:

1. Registrations: Fifteen new candidates have been registered with the commit-

- tee since the last meeting of Synod. Among these were also some inquiries from persons whose nominations and backgrounds were other than Lutheran.
- Examinations: Nine senior seminarians were examined and upon completion of their academic work will be recommended for a call.
- Certifications: The following persons were certified as Lay Professionals during the year of 1982-83: Jill Mason Riley as Parish Worker/Christian Educator.
- 4. Financial Aid: Twenty-four requests for financial aid were received and granted during the year which totaled approximately \$33,650. The average grant was about \$1600, with the minimum being \$300 and the maximum grant \$1,800. These grants are given on the basis of need.
- 5. One other policy which will become effective for the 1984-85 academic year is that the committee will require each candidate to take a portion of the graduate record exam. This will not be used by the committee to determine an academic cut-off, but merely will be used as an attempt to gain some information and knowledge about the student's abilities and aptitudes and academic work. This will allow us to make better use of our available money in the area of testing and psychological work which in the past has also been used to look at academic ability. We feel that this is a better stewardship of our resources and will be a beneficial experience for both the student and the committee.

#### Report of World Mission Committee NORTH CAROLINA SYNOD LCA

It is the duty of this committee:

- A. To promote World Missions among the congregations of the Synod.
- B. To cooperate with the Division of World Missions and Ecumenism (DWME) of the LCA.

We have met twice with exceptionally good attendance and have acted on the following:

- Promoted the Global Mission EVENT at Wittenberg University. Fourteen North Carolinians attended. We encourage attendance at the next EVENT at Gettysburg College July 7, 8, 9, and 10.
- 2. Provided a new film "What In The World" to the synod Media Library. This film was produced by the World Council of Churches and describes the work of the Council.
- 3. Sent to each congregation a copy of "LCA World" a publication of DWME. If the name of the Mission Communicator was available, it was sent to that person, otherwise it was sent to the Pastor.
- 4. Preparing a program suitable for use with auxiliaries, Sunday Church Schooladults and upper grades on "Call to Global Mission". This is a statement prepared by DWME.
- 5. Studying the advisability of preparing children's sermons on Missions. These then would be sent to each congregation for their use.
- 6. Cooperating with the World Mission Committee of the S.C. Synod to arrange a visit of Former Bishop A. G. Fjellman and his wife to Lenoir-Rhyne College, Lutheran Theological Southern Seminary and Newberry College. He was Bishop of the Pacific Northwest Synod and will be the 1984 Mission Interpretor for DWME. He will come at very little expense to the schools.
- Encourage every congregation to appoint a Mission Communicator and send that person's name to the Synod office. It is suggested the information relative to missions in the AIM package be given to the communicator. Also it is suggested the congregation subscribe to the "World Encounter" for the communicator. One way to use the communicator is to let that person give a "Temple Talk" occasionally.

Sadly, North Carolina has only one missionary, Miss Elizabeth Huddle, who is still in Japan. Our other missionary, Miss Peggy Chandler recently completed her term in Japan and is hoping to go to the Lutheran Theological Southern Seminary. At least those congregations who can, could get in on the action by supporting a missionary through DAG. Some already have.

The members of the committee appreciate the support and encouragement of the Rev. Richard Little as their staff associate.

# OPERATING FUND NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS December 31, 1982

#### NOTE 1 SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

The financial statements are prepared on the basis of cash receipts and disbursements; consequently, certain revenues are recognized when received rather than when earned and certain expenses are recognized when paid rather than when incurred.

Acquisition of equipment and improvements of property are expensed in the year of acquisition. Property which is used in operations is not considered property of the Retreat.

The Lodge Maintenence Sinking Fund represents a prorata part of campers' fees allocated by the Retreat's committee for maintenance and abnormal replacements.

#### NOTE 2 ACCOUNT WITH LUTHERAN OUTDOOR MINISTRIES

During 1981, Synod's office of Lutheran Outdoor Ministries, Raleigh, North Carolina maintained an account with Cash Reserve Management, Inc., and a Trading account with E. F. Hutton & Company, Inc. Funds from Kure Beach Retreat Center's Holding Fund, Conference and Camping Ministries Appeal and Lutheran Men's Lodge Sinking Fund were deposited or held in this fund to yield maximum interest. At December 31, 1981 the Lodge Maintenance Sinking Fund of Agape Camp Conference and Retreat Center had \$4,346 of its funds with this fund. During 1982, these funds were separated and invested in stock and a savings account in the name of Lodge Maintenance Sinking Fund as shown on the Balance Sheet at December 31, 1982.

#### NOTE 3 INCORPORATION OF LUTHERAN OUTDOOR MINISTRIES

Effective October 1, 1982, Synod's office of Lutheran Outdoor Ministries began operation as a separate corporate entity named Lutheran Outdoor Ministries, Incorporated. The corporation will be responsible for the planning, coordination, development and operation of outdoor ministries, camps and camping programs, conference and retreat facilities and programs, and such other programs and services as approved by its Board of Trustees. The statements of support, revenue and expenses as found on page 5 have been separated to properly reflect the portion of revenue and expense for the year which was administered by the Synod's office of Lutheran Outdoor Ministries, and the portion administered by Lutheran Outdoor Ministries, Incorporated. Administrative costs of the corporation are reflected in a separate statement on page 6.

#### NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS December 31, 1982

#### 1. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

The financial statements of Lutheridge, Inc. have been prepared on the accrual basis, whereby revenue is taken into income when earned and expenses are charged to operations as incurred. The significant accounting policies followed are described below to enhance the usefulness of the financial statements to the reader.

#### **Fund Accounting**

To ensure observance of limitations and restrictions placed on the use of resources available to the Corporation, the accounts of Lutheridge, Inc. are maintained in accordance with the principles of fund accounting. This is the procedure by which resources for various purposes are classified for accounting and reporting purposes into funds established according to their nature and purposes. Separate accounts are maintained for each fund; however, in the accompanying financial statements, funds that have similar characteristics have been recorded and reported by fund group.

The assets, liabilities and fund balances of Lutheridge, Inc. are reported in three self-balancing fund groups as follows:

Operating funds, which include unrestricted and restricted resources, represent the portion of expendable funds that is available for support of operations of the Corporation.

Endowment funds represent funds that are subject to restrictions of gift instruments or action of the Board of Trustees requiring in perpetuity that the principal be invested and the income only be used.

Plant funds represent resources restricted for capital property additions and funds expended for capital properties.

#### Inventories

Inventories are valued at the lower of cost (first-in, first-out) or market. Costs are determined at invoice cost.

#### Capital Properties and Depreciation

Uses of operating funds for capital properties additions are accounted for as transfers to plant funds.

Capital properties acquired prior to 1972 are value based on an independent appraiser's report for real estate, kitchen and dining hall equipment and on estimated valuations as determined by the Executive Director for other equipment and furnishings. Acquisitions since January 1, 1972 are based on actual costs for purchased properties and on estimated valuations for donated properties.

Beginning in 1975, depreciation was computed on all depreciable capital properties. A reserve for depreciation was set up with the plant fund being charged with the annual depreciation. Depreciation is determined on the straight-line basis for all capital properties acquired since 1971 with the remaining useful life being used as a basis for depreciation on all assets acquired prior to 1972.

#### 2. Investment in Securities

Investments are presented in the financial statements at cost (fair market value at date of donation for donated investments).

8. REPORT OF THE EXECUTIVE BOARD (BR pp. 130-131)

a. N.C. Synod Constitution, amendment of

On behalf of the Executive Board Mrs. Martha Yount recommended that the following amendments to the North Carolina Synod Constitution, as approved for the Approved Constitution for Synods by the 1982 LCA Convention BE PLACED ON NOTICE for consideration and action by the Synod Convention:

ARTICLE TWO, SECTION IV, amendment of, new Item I

(Absentee and proxy voting)

That Article Two, Section IV be amended by adding thereto a new Item 1, as follows:

1. Proxy and absentee voting shall not be permitted in the transaction of any business of the synod.

ARTICLE THREE, SECTION II, 6, amendment of

(corporate responsibilities of bishop)

That Article Three, Section II, 6 be amended as follows:

The bishop shall:

6. be the president of the corporation and be authorized and empowered, in the name of the synod, to sign deeds or other instruments of writing and to affix the seal of the synod when the execution of such documents is ordered by the synod, or required by its constitution, or becomes proper and necessary in carrying on the business of the corporation.

ARTICLE NINE, SECTION III, amendment of, new item 6

(congregation temporarily under synodical administration)

That Article Nine, Section III be amended by the addition of a new item 6 to read as follows:

6. The synod may temporarily assume administration of a congregation upon its request or with its concurrence.

ARTICLE TEN, SECTION II, Item 1, amendment of

(congregations receiving financial assistance from DMNA).

That Article Ten, Section II, Item 1 of the Approved Constitution for synods be amended to read:

1. Each congregation shall consult the bishop of the synod before taking any steps leading to the extending of a call to a prospective pastor. If a congregation receives current financial assistance from the Division for Mission in North America of the Lutheran Church in America, consultation between that division and the bishop of the synod relative to any pastoral candidate and the amount of compensation shall precede consideration of same by the Church Council.

ARTICLE TWELVE, 8, amendment of

(appeals to congregations)

That Article Twelve, 8, be amended as follows:

8. No appeal to congregations of this or any other synod of the Lutheran Church in America or other special appeal for the raising of funds shall be conducted by agencies related to or recognized by the synod without the consent of the convention or the Executive Board.

ARTICLE TWELVE, Item 10, amendment of

(deletion of)

That Article Twelve, Item 10 which reads as follows:

All eligible permanent funds and long-term reserves of the synod may be invested in the Common Investing Fund of the Lutheran Church in America. be deleted

ARTICLE TEN, SECTION II, Item 5, amendment of

(performance of ministerial acts)

That Article Ten, Section II, Item 5 be amended to read as follows:

Item 5. Ordained ministers shall respect the integrity of the ministry of congregations which they do not serve and shall not exercise ministerial functions therein unless invited to do so by the pastor, or if there is no duly called pastor, then by the vice-pastor in consultation with the Church Council.

The proposed Constitutional Amendments were PLACED ON NOTICE.

### 9. REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON NOMINATIONS (BR, pp. 233-255)

The Rev. C. Ross Ritchie, Jr., S.T.M., D.D., chairman of the committee, presented the report. He referred the convention to the Bulletin of Reports and made corrections to the information recorded there. He explained procedures for nominations from the floor and other details of the nominations process.

The Rev. David R. Keck moved that the nominations procedures become the rules of procedure for the Convention.

The motion was ADOPTED.

### THE EVENING PRAYER WITH THE SERVICE OF REMEMBRANCE

The Evening Prayer from the *Lutheran Book of Worship* was led by Bishop Michael C. D. McDaniel, who served as the Presiding Minister. Bishop William G. Weinhauer, Bishop of the Diocese of Western North Carolina of the Episcopal Church, was the Homilist. The assisting ministers were The Rev. Richard R. Campbell and The Rev. Richard C. Little, members of Bishop McDaniel's staff. Mr. Tim Warren, organist, and the choir of Mt. Zion American Lutheran Church, Hickory, led the music. In the prayers the convention remembered THE REV. VALDIS MEZEZERS, S.T.M.. TH.D.; THE REV. PAUL LEOPOLD MILLER; THE REV. LETHCO C. BUMGARNER; THE REV. VERNON ARDELL FRICK and the 642 members of the North Carolina Synod who died during the year. The service was planned by the synod's Committee on Worship and Music, the Rev. Robert E. Allen, chairman.

In his sermon Bishop Weinhauer brought greetings from the Diocese of Western North Carolina of the Episcopal Church. He expressed the hope that his opportunity to participate in the Synod's Worship Service was a symbol of a closer relationship between Lutherans and Episcopalians. His message proclaimed that the mission of the church was to live out the Gospel through apostolic action, noting that the fire of Pentecost flows from the love of God and that love is at the heart of all service. He expressed the prayer that "the Christ in me be able to meet the Christ in you" to more fully become servants of love in the world.

The offering was designated for the Bishop's discretionary fund.



THE REVEREND VALDIS MEZEZERS, S.T.M., TH.D.

The Reverend Valdis Mezezers, S.T.M., Th.D., 73, died on Sunday afternoon, June 6, 1982 at Memorial Hospital in Charlotte, North Carolina. Dr. Mezezers had been in declining health for the past few months. He was serving as Interim Pastor at St. Luke's Lutheran Church, Lincolnton.

The funeral service was held on Wednesday, June 9, 1982 at 7:00 p.m. at St. Luke's Lutheran Church, Lincoln County. The Rev. Ernest L. Misenheimer, D.D., Bishop of the North Carolina Synod of the Lutheran Church in America, preached. The Rev. Curtis A. Paul, Director of Learning Resources at Lenoir-Rhyne College presided assisted by the Rev. Edwin A. Cook, pastor of Antioch Lutheran Church, Dallas, North Carolina. Interment was held at the St. Luke's Cemetery immediately following the service.

Dr. Mezezers was born on January 24, 1910 in Riga, Latvia (Northern Europe) the son of Janis Stelmachers and Emilia Bartuseviz Mezezers. Educated: Gymnasium Jelgava, Latvia, 1936; University of Riga, 1940; and receiving a Licentiate of Theology at the same institution in 1943; graduate study, Johns Hopkins University, Temple University, Philadelphia, S.T.M. 1961, also doctoral studies to 1966. In 1974 he received the Th.D. degree from Bearean Christian Seminary, Wichita, Kansas. Married Erika Albina at Riga, June 23, 1940.

Pastor Mezezers was ordained in 1940 by the Archbishop of the Latvian Lutheran Church. He served churches in Latvia from 1941-44. He came to this country from Germany in 1949. He served the following churches in the United States: Emmanual-Stoney Creek, and Magothy-Chelsea Community, Maryland, and, evening services at the Latvian church group, Baltimore, Maryland 1950-58; Latvian, Applebachsville, 1949-50; Tuckerton Parish, Pennsylvania, 1958-60; St. Paul, Sassamansville, Pennsylvania, 1960-65; and, Antioch, Dallas from 1965 until his retirement in 1975. In retirement he served St. Luke's, Lincolnton as Interim Pastor from 1975 until his death.

He served as professor (Religion, History) Displaced Persons Junior College, Wuerzburg, Germany, 1945-49 (under U.S. Military Government). His literary works include: In Latvian: Editor, publisher, literary-religious monthly "The Way," 1945-48, sponsored by U.S. Military Government in Germany; several hymns in Latvian Church Hymnal; three plays — "The Hour of Sunrise," "When the Apple Tree was Blooming," and "The People of the Farm,"; two volumes of poems; in English: Sermon "God and Man," 1956; Sermons and Meditations, "The Great Life," 1957; "Jesus' Concept of Wealth and Poverty," 1961 (Temple University; "The Herrnhuterian Pietism in the Baltic," published dissertations 1975 "Christopher Publishing House."

He is survived by his wife, Erika. Memorials may be given to St. Luke's Lutheran Church, Lincoln County.



THE REVEREND PAUL LEOPOLD MILLER

The Rev. Paul Leopold Miller, 87, died September 23, 1982, at the Salisbury Unit of the North Carolina Lutheran Homes, after a short illness.

#### 4. Report of Committees on Reference and Counsel

The Rev. John R. Nagle, Chairman, indicated the procedure for submitting resolutions to come before the convention. He moved the following recommendations:

- 1. That the report of the Committee on District Deans be heard at this Third Session, immediately following the Bishop's Keynote Address.
- 2. That a resolution titled "Withdrawing Support and Cooperation from the Religious Coalition for Abortion Rights" be distributed to the convention when printed, and that it be discussed at the Sixth Session, Saturday morning, immediately following the Report of the Committee on Reference and Counsel.
- 3. That greetings be sent by the Secretary of Synod to those other synods in session at this time, the Indiana-Kentucky Synod, the South Carolina Synod and the Virginia Synod.

The motion was ADOPTED.

#### 5. COMMITTEE ON REPORTS OF OFFICERS AND STAFF

The Rev. George L. Simmons, chairman, presented the report and moved the recommendations as follows:

"The Committee on Reports of Officers and Staff met and reviewed the Reports of the Bishop, the Secretary, the Treasurer, and the Staff.

We begin our report by commending Bishop Ernest L. Misenheimer, Jr. for his last months of service to our synod as bishop. We appreciate the way he carried out his duties, prepared for the transition and handed over the office to Bishop Michael C. D. McDaniel.

We also note his concern in missions — of our call to be salt, light and leaven in the world.

We thank him for his involvement in the lives of seminarians and pastors. "d. Lutheran Outdoor Ministries, Inc., a corporation chartered by the State of North Carolina and related to the North Carolina Synod of the Lutheran Church in America.'

The motion was ADOPTED.

#### Recommendation No. 5:

That we approve Recommendation (4) of the Secretary's Report (BR p. 101): That the proposed amendment to Article Two, Section III, paragraph 1, placed on notice at the 1982 Convention be considered.

Article Two, Section III, paragraph 1

That Article Two, Section III, paragraph 1 be amended by making the last two sentences a new paragraph 2 and in its place in paragraph 1 adding the following sentence: "The lay officers of the synod shall be counted as additional delegates from their respective congregations." so that the amendment would read:

- "1. The voting body at conventions shall consist of delegates from each congregation and the ordained ministers on that clergy roll. Each congregation shall be entitled to at least one delegate. The lay officers of the Synod shall be counted as additional delegates from their respective congregations.
- 2. Congregations having more than 300 confirmed members shall be entitled to one additional delegate for each additional 300 confirmed members or fraction thereof."

#### 6. KEYNOTE ADDRESS — Bishop Michael C. D. McDaniel, Ph.D., D.D.

The Rev. J. Larry Yoder, Ph.D., introduced Bishop McDaniel who gave the keynote address for the convention. Bishop McDaniel emphasized Luther's doctrine of grace through faith. Encouraging the use of faith in the grace of God, he charged the church to "proclaim" the Gospel and "set free" the world from the chains of sin. He stated that mankind is at the dawn of a new day in the Church as evidenced by our ecumenical actions. In closing he prayed for a new day to come quickly when the power of the Gospel would overcome the differences between various doctrines.

  - d. North Carolina Synod Constitution, proposed amendment of

On behalf of the Executive Board the Rev. John Nagle moved the following recommendation:

that the 1983 Convention of Synod adopt the following amendments to the

North Carolina Synod Constitution, as approved for the Approved Constitution for Synods by the 1982 LCA Convention:

ARTICLE TWO, SECTION IV, amendment of, new Item I (absentee and proxy voting)

That Article Two, Section IV be amended by adding thereto a new Item 1, as follows:

1. Proxy and absentee voting shall not be permitted in the transaction of any business of the synod.

ARTICLE THREE, SECTION II, 6, amendment of

(corporate responsibilities of bishop)

That Article Three, Section II, 6 be amended as follows:

The bishop shall:

6. be the president of the corporation and be authorized and empowered, in the name of the synod, to sign deeds or other instruments of writing and to affix the seal of the synod when the execution of such documents is ordered by the synod, or required by its constitution, or becomes proper and necessary in carrying on the business of the corporation.

ARTICLE NINE, SECTION III, amendment of, new item 5

(congregation temporarily under synodical administration)

That Article Nine, Section III be amended by the addition of a new item 6 to read as follows:

6. The synod may temporarily assume administration of a congregation upon its request or with its concurrence.

ARTICLE TEN. SECTION II. Item 1, amendment of

(congregations receiving financial assistance from DMNA).

That Article Ten, Section II, Item 1 of the Approved Constitution for synods be amended to read:

1. Each congregation shall consult the bishop of the synod before taking any steps leading to the extending of a call to a prospective pastor. If a congregation receives current financial assistance from the Division for Mission in North America of the Lutheran Church in America, consultation between that division and the bishop of the synod relative to any pastoral candidate and the amount of compensation shall precede consideration of same by the Church Council.

ARTICLE TWELVE, 8, amendment of

(appeals to congregations)

That Article Twelve, 8, be amended to read as follows:

8. No appeal to congregations of this or any other synod of the Lutheran Church in America or other special appeal for the raising of funds shall be conducted by agencies related to or recognized by the synod without the consent of the convention or the Executive Board.

ARTICLE TWELVE, Item 10, amendment of

(deletion of)

That Article Twelve, Item 10, which reads as follows:

All eligible permanent funds and long-term reserves of the synod may be invested in the Common Investing Fund of the Lutheran Church in America. be deleted

(Note: The following item was referred back to Executive Council for exact wording):

ARTICLE TEN, SECTION II, Item 5, amendment of

(performance of ministerial acts)

That Article Ten. Section II. Item 5 be amended to read as follows:

Item 5. Ordained ministers shall respect the integrity of the ministry of congregations which they do not serve and shall not exercise ministerial functions therein unless invited to do so by the pastor, or if there is no duly called pastor, then by the vice-pastor in consultation with the Church Council.

The motion was ADOPTED.

Pastor Nagle moved:

That the proposed amendment to Article Seven, Item 4, d, of the Constitution of the North Carolina Synod placed on notice at the 1982 Convention be adopted:

1. Article Seven, Item 4, d

That Article Seven, Item 4 be amended by adding a new sub-section, reading as follows:

"d. Lutheran Outdoor Ministries, Inc., a corporation chartered by the State of North Carolina and related to the North Carolina Synod of the Lutheran Church in America."

That the proposed amendment to Article Two, Section III, paragraph 1, placed on notice at the 1982 Convention be adopted:

Article Two, Section III, paragraph 1

That Article Two, Section III, paragraph 1 be amended by making the last sentence a new paragraph 2 and in its place in paragraph 1 adding the following sentence: "The lay officers of the synod shall be counted as additional delegates from their respective congregations." so that the amendment would read:

\*"1. The voting body at conventions shall consist of delegates from each congregation and the ordained ministers on that clergy roll. Each congregation shall be entitled to at least one delegate. The lay officers of the Synod shall be counted as additional delegates from their respective congregations.

2. Congregations having more than 300 confirmed members shall be entitled to one additional delegate for each additional 300 confirmed mem-

bers or fraction thereof."

The motion was ADOPTED.

 Resolution withdrawing support and cooperation from the Religious Coalition for Abortion Rights

On behalf of the sponsors of the resolution, The Rev. John Nagle moved without recommendation the following resolution:

WHEREAS, "We believe, teach and confess that the prophetic and apostolic writings of the Old and New Testaments are the only rule and norm according to which doctrines and teachers alike must be appraised and judged, as it is written in Psalms 119:105, 'Thy word is a lamp to my feet and a light to my path.' " (The Book of Concord at p. 464).

WHEREAS, Holy Scripture reveals that human life is a gift of God and that unborn human beings from the time of conception are in living relationship with God. (Luke 1:41-44; Galatians 1:15; Psalms 139:13-16; Jeremiah 1:5)

WHEREAS, we believe, teach and confess that the imperatives of the Fifth Commandment include the prohibition not only of murder "but also of everything that may lead to murder;" that we should harm no one by our hand or deed or by using our voice to advocate or advise harming anyone; that "we should neither use nor sanction any means or methods whereby anyone may be harmed"; that we should not fail "to prevent, protect and save" our neighbor "from suffering bodily harm or injury"; that God calls us to offer counsel and aid to those "in need and in peril of body and life". (Large Catechism, The Book of Concord at pages 390 and 391).

WHEREAS, we believe and teach that: "Christian stewardship of life, however, mandates treasuring and preserving the life which God has given, be it our own life or the life of some other person. This view is supported by the affirmation that meaning and hope are possible in all of life's situations, even those involving great suffering. To depart from this view by performing active euthanasia, thereby deliberately destroying life created in the image of God is contrary to Christian conscience." (LCA Social Statements, "Death and Dying," adopted by 11th Biennial Convention, Sept. 3-10, 1982.)

WHEREAS, in 1973, a divided Supreme Court in Roe v. Wade and Doe v. Bolton, legalized abortion upon request at any time up to the moment of birth by giving legal sanction to abortions based solely upon factors such as the gender of the unborn child, the income of the parents, the age of the mother, the number of children in

the family, whether the child, for whatever reason, is wanted and whether the pregnancy is distressful, for whatever reason, to the mother.

WHEREAS, over ten million unborn human lives have been killed by abortion since January 22, 1973, when the decision in *Roe v. Wade* was announced.

WHEREAS, in 1982 alone, there were  $1\frac{1}{2}$  million unborn human lives killed by abortion in the United States, including over 30,000 in North Carolina.

WHEREAS, although there may be disagreement among Lutheran Christians as to the limitations properly imposed on access to abortions, the unrestricted access to abortion on request now sanctioned as law by the Supreme Court is contrary to faithful stewardship of life and our beliefs, teachings and confessions.

WHEREAS, we have taught that "to destroy any human life, even unborn, is a great crime"; ("Luther's Catechism With An Explanation by Joseph Stump" at p. 61).

WHEREAS, the testimony of Helmut Thielicke is that: "Once impregnation has taken place, it is no longer a question of whether the parents concerned have the responsibility for a possible parenthood; they have already become parents;" (Quoted in "Abortion Yes or No?")

WHEREAS, the testimony of Dietrich Bonhoeffer is that: "Destruction of the embryo in the mother's womb is a violation of the right to live which God has bestowed upon the nascent life. To raise the question whether we are here concerned already with a human being or not is merely to confuse the issue. The simple fact is that God certainly intended to create a human being and that this nascent human being has been deliberately deprived of his life. And that is nothing but murder. A great many different motives may lead to an action of this kind; indeed in cases where it is an act of despair, performed in circumstances of extreme human or economic destitution and misery, the guilt may often lie rather with the community than with the individual. Precisely in this connection money may conceal many a wanton deed, while the poor man's more reluctant lapse may far more easily be disclosed. All these considerations must, no doubt, have a quite decisive influence on our personal and pastoral attitude towards the person concerned, but they cannot in any way alter the fact of murder." (Ethics, pp. 175-176).

WHEREAS, in 1979 this Synod affirmed a common position and agreed to cooperate with the Religious Coalition for Abortion Rights. (Resolution on Abortion Rights, N.C. Synod of LCA, June 7-10, 1979.)

WHEREAS, the positions taken and publications endorsed, sponsored and distributed by the Religious Coalition for Abortion Rights (RCAR) are not now consistent with our beliefs, teachings and confessions in that, among others:

- (a) The Religious Coalition for Abortion Rights is opposed to any limitation on or modification of current abortion law and supports an unrestricted access to legal abortion on request; ("Abortion: Shall We Return To Absolutism?" p. A-2; "Abortion and Religious Freedom"; "Abortion: Why religious organizations in the United States want to keep it legal").
- (b) RCAR distributes material which characterizes abortion as a form of birth control and asserts that: "It will do no good to argue that it is possible to affirm the sanctity of life in the presence of even the most miserable circumstances of poverty and overcrowding, famine and disease. That is romantic sentimentality;" ("Abortion: Shall We Return to Absolutism?" at pp. 5 and 10).
- (c) RCAR distributed material which supports abortion as a responsible choice, for: (1) "a middle-aged woman who has already raised a family and is now devoting herself to creative new pursuits which are inconsistent with trying to raise still another child"; and abortion (2) for "a suburban couple with two children who would rather adopt a third." (Ibid. at p. 16).

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the N.C. Synod of the Lutheran Church in America

(a) believes abortion on request is contrary to the beliefs, teachings and confessions of our Church and Holy Scripture, in which our beliefs, teachings and confessions are rooted, and therefore is opposed to the current American

abortion law which in effect permits no limitation on a mother's access to abortion on request;

- (b) affirms our belief that the value and worth of human life is not based upon a person's mental or physical capacity, health or "wantedness";
- (c) withdraws its support and cooperation from and rescinds its statement of common position with the Religious Coalition for Abortion Rights;
- (d) calls upon each congregation in the Synod and each member thereof for renewed care and concern for all handicapped children and their families and to support legislation and social programs that seek to protect and serve those suffering physical or mental handicaps;
- (e) urges the 1984 LCA Convention to withdraw its support and cooperation from the Religious Coalition for Abortion Rights.
- (f) requests that Synod Staff cause notice of this action to be distributed to all congregations of the Synod.

The Rev. Frank C. Perry, D.D. moved that this resolution be referred to the Executive Board for study.

The motion was ADOPTED.

#### 6. Conference and Camping Ministries Appeal, report of (BR pp. 149-150)

The Rev. Ernest L. Misenheimer, Jr., D.D., Chairman of the Progress Committee of the Conference and Camping Ministries Appeal, presented The Rev. George R. Whittecar, D.D., Progress Director, who reported on the current status of the appeal. Mrs. Ruth Fisher, member of the Progress Committee, commented on the importance of the success of the Appeal, stating that "the way we train today will determine what is the Church of tomorrow."

The Rev. David L. Castor, Director of Lutheran Outdoor Ministries, and the Rev. Robert L. Troutman, D.D., Executive Director of Lutheridge, presented slides showing outdoor ministry at Lutheridge, Kure Beach Retreat Center and Agape Conference and Camping Retreat Center.

Point of Personal Privilege: The Rev. Richard C. Little moved:

that Mr. Robert Klepfer, First Lutheran Church, Greensboro, be given five minutes to address the convention regarding the Abortion Resolution, which he authored.

The motion was ADOPTED.

Mr. Klepfer stated his position on the resolution. His comments were received as information.

#### PRESENTATION OF THE LCA REPRESENTATIVE, THE REV. KENNETH H. SAUER, D.D.

Bishop Kenneth Sauer addressed the convention and introduced Mrs. Kay Conrad, member of the commission on the Formation of a New Lutheran Church, who gave a report on the work of that Commission to date. Bishop Sauer and Mrs. Conrad answered questions regarding the work of the Commission.

#### 8. Report on the Committee on Conduct of Elections

The Rev. Clarence E. Sifford, Jr., chairman, reported the results of the first ballot for Board members and LCA Delegates. Bishop McDaniel declared elected those persons who received the necessary votes for election.

#### 1. Compensation Guidelines for Supply Pastors

that congregations provide \$75.00 plus 20 cents per mile travel and an additional \$25.00 for each additional service as adequate compensation for a supply pastor.

that all supply pastors not reimbursed adequately report this to the synod office immediately. The synod office will then send a letter notifying the congregation that adequate compensation has not yet been made.

The motion was ADOPTED.

#### 2. Compensation Guidelines for Parish Pastors

The minimum and entry level salaries are to be increased by an additional one percent (1%) for every five years of experience in the ministry of the pastor.

Where a housing and utility allowance is given it should be figured at no less than an additional thirty percent (30%) of the salary.

#### 3. 1984 Budget Proposal (BR, p. 129)

Mr. Harry Arne, Chairman of the Finance Committee of the Executive Board, presented the board's recommendation regarding the 1984 program budget.

The Rev. Ronald O. Heinze moved the following recommendation:

that the program budget for 1984 be adopted as printed in the Bulletin of Reports and its supplement.

The motion was ADOPTED.

#### 10. 1984 Apportionment Formula for congregations (BR p. 138)

Mr. Harry Arne presented the recommendation for the 1983 apportionment formula.

The Rev. Ronald O. Heinze moved:

that the 1984 Apportionment Formula be adopted as follows:

In calculating the 1984 Per Capita Apportionment that the 51 congregations with less than 100 Confirmed, Communing or Contributing (CCC) Members with a 7.61% of the Synod's CCC membership have that percentage reduced one-half to 3.81%, that the 12 congregations with 100-124 CCC's with 2.75% of the Synod's CCC's have that percentage reduced one-third to 1.84%, that the 17 congregations with 125-149 CCC's with 4.99% of the Synod's CCC's have that percentage reduced one-fourth to 3.75%, that the 31 congregations with 200-249 CCC's with 14.9% of the Synod's CCC's have that percentage increased by 1% to 15.9%, and that the 73 congregations with 250 or more CCC's with 60.46% of the Synod's CCC's, have that percentage increased by 4.95% to 65.41%.

The motion was ADOPTED.

#### 11. Special Order — Worship 11:30 a.m.

Chaplain Charles M. Zimmerman led the convention in worship using the Responsive Prayer I from *The Lutheran Book of Worship*. In his homily he reminded us of the foolishness of God in loving us and challenged us to accept the divine possibilities of our baptism.

The convention was recessed.

  - 2. Call to Order Bishop McDaniel called the meeting to order and presided.
- 3. Announcements Bishop McDaniel made announcements regarding convention procedures.

#### 4. Report of Committee on Reference and Counsel

The Rev. John R. Nagle, Chairman, moved the following recommendations:

1. that two resolutions on "Alternatives to Corporal Punishment" and "World

Hunger" be considered with the other resolutions during the period scheduled for Unfinished Business in the Seventh Session.

The motion was ADOPTED.

2. that the Rev. Richard R. Campbell be recognized to present a resolution at the end of the Youth Convo presentation at the Ninth Session, Sunday morning.

The motion was ADOPTED.

- 5. Report of the Executive Board, continued
  - f. North Carolina Lutheran Homes, Capital Funds Appeal, action on (BR, p. 127)

On behalf of the Executive Board, Mrs. Catherine Norris presented the recommendation from the Board of Trustees of the North Carolina Lutheran Homes.

The Rev. Harold L. McSwain moved the recommendation:

That permission be given to the Board of Trustees of North Carolina Lutheran Homes to conduct a synod-wide capital funds appeal during the three-year period, 1985-87 for expansion of its facilities.

The Rev. Robert Q. Beard, Executive Director of North Carolina Lutheran Homes, explained the need for the proposed expansion, and told how the need could be realized.

The motion was ADOPTED.

#### 6. PARISH RENEWAL

Bishop McDaniel addressed the convention concerning Parish Renewal. The Rev. Mark W. Menees, Minister for Leadership on the Bishop's Staff, and the Rev. Donald M. Phillips, pastor of Lutheran Chapel, China Grove, provided ideas for improved stewardship and showed a slide presentation using Pastor Phillips' congregation as a model. Mr. Jim Mees, delegate from St. Matthew, Wilmington, presented slides showing his congregation's response to a well-planned stewardship emphasis. Bishop McDaniel challenged the congregations to strive for a two percent (2%) increase in giving in order to continue the North Carolina Synod's role as a pacemaker synod and in order to "proclaim through giving."

#### 7. Report of the Committee on Minutes and Unfinished Business

The Rev. Ronald O. Heinze, Chairman, listed the following items as unfinished business:

- a) From the Executive Board Report:
  - 1) Peace In A Nuclear Age Resolution
  - 2) Alcohol and Drug Abuse Resolution
- 3) LWR/World Hunger Food Tax Resolutionb) Alternatives to Corporal Punishment Resolution

#### 8. Report of the Executive Board, continued

g. Peace In A Nuclear Age, resolution on.

The Rev. John M. Hawn spoke on behalf of the Executive Board. He referred the convention to the resolution on "Peace In A Nuclear Age" printed in the Supplement to the Bulletin of Reports. Pastor Hawn asked the convention to allow Miss Darlene Grega, Chairman of the Research and Strategy Group on Peace, to speak. Miss Grega presented a proposed addition to the resolution:

that the following sentence be added as the second resolve of the resolution:

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that we encourage the members of our congregation to engage in intercessory prayer for our leaders and the leaders of all nations that they may be supported by the Spirit of God as they struggle to develop policies that will be more conducive to a lasting peace."

Pastor Hawn made a motion that:

the convention adopt the following resolution as proposed and revised.

WHEREAS the Lutheran Chuch in America in its 1982 biennial convention adopted the following resolution:

#### "WAR AND PEACE IN A NUCLEAR AGE

#### Preamble

The fear and anxiety of our society faces each day in the shadow of nuclear arms call the contemporary Christian to a crisis of conscience in dealing with issues of war and peace. The urgent nature of the nuclear arms race hastens our desire for the church to articulate its witness in a world filled with conflict.

The level of concern expressed by synods of the Lutheran Church in America for the growing nuclear arms race and complexity of the issue challenge this church to do more than consider a statement in support of one of many current nuclear disarmament and/or freeze proposals. As responsible Christians, we are committed to well-informed action toward justice and peace and

- 1. THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that it is the sense of delegates to the 1982 convention of the church to declare our support for a multilateral, verifiable freeze of the testing, production, stockpiling, and deployment of nuclear weapons and delivery systems as a step toward the eventual elimination of nuclear weapons and to work actively to achieve such a goal; and
  - 2. BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Lutheran Church in America
  - a. urge its congregations and their members to be diligent in praying for:
  - world peace and all who work for peace,
  - justice and all who suffer from oppression and deprivation.
  - the leaders of all nations involved in negotiations for world peace;
- b. declare its abhorrence of the current development and stockpiling of increasingly destructive nuclear, biological, and chemical weapons by the United States, the Union of Soviet Socialist Republics, and other countries, and the resulting diversion of resources from human needs;
- c. urge the leaders of the United States and the Union of Soviet Socialist Republics to accept the moral responsibility to initiate steps toward the reduction and eventual elimination of nuclear weapons and to consider taking reasonable and appropriate risks in the search for greater trust and understanding among nations;
- d. affirm negotiations toward arms reduction and urge leaders of all nations to build a climate of peace and cooperation among nations;
- e. support and encourage church members in individual participation in the informed public debate as a proper expression of commitment and responsibility in the stewardship of God's creation."

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the North Carolina Synod in convention affirm this action of the Lutheran Church in America in Convention.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that we encourage the members of our congregations to engage in intercessory prayer for our leaders and the leaders of all nations that they may be supported by the Spirit of God as they struggle to develop policies that will be more conducive to a lasting peace, and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that each congregation of the North Carolina Synod provide an opportunity for education, discussions, and forums related to this issue, and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the North Carolina Synod set aside Sunday, July 3, 1983, as "Peace Concerns Sunday", on which North Carolina Synod congregations are encouraged to address peace issues through worship and education.

The Rev. George R. Whittecar made a motion that:

the paragraph reading "Therefore Be It Resolved that the North Carolina Synod in convention affirm this action of the Lutheran Church in America in convention" be deleted.

Discussion ensued. A motion to call for the question was **ADOPTED** and discussion ceased.

Dr. Whittecar's motion to amend was ADOPTED.

Mr. Bill Shell, St. Paul's, Wilmington, proposed an amendment to the resolution:

THEREFORE be it resolved that, consistent with the maintenance of essential equivalent and overall nuclear capability at present and in the future, both qualitatively and quantitatively, the strategic arms reduction talks between

the United States and the Soviet Union should have the following objectives: (1) pursuing the objective of negotiating an immediate, mutual and verifiable freeze on the testing, production and further deployment of those enumerated weapons and weapon systems as set forth in Section 2 which follows: (2) deciding when and how to achieve a mutual verifiable freeze on the testing, production and further deployment of nuclear warheads, missiles and other delivery systems, and systems which would threaten the viability of sea-based nuclear deterrent forces and to include all air defense systems designed to stop nuclear bombers, and (3) proceeding from this mutual and verifiable freeze, pursuing a substantial, equitable, and verifiable reduction in such weapons and systems as described hereinabove through numerical ceilings, annual percentages, or any other equally effective and verifiable means of strengthening strategic stability, with such reduction to be achieved within a reasonable, specified period of time as determined by the negotiations, PROVIDED THAT (a) any item both sides do not agree to freeze would not be frozen, (b) until such time as the final instrument embodying the objective set forth in Section 1 hereinabove has been fully ratified by both the Soviet Union and the United States, nothing in this resolution shall be construed to seek to prevent whatever modernization and deployment of weapons of the United States as may be required to maintain the credibility of the nuclear deterrent of the United States, and (c) in all negotiations pursuant to this resolution the United States shall make every effort to insure that any agreement reached shall provide for full compliance by all parties with pre-existing international treaties, obligations and commitments.

Done this 28th day of May, 1983 at the annual convention of the North Carolina Synod of the Lutheran Church in America, at Hickory, North Carolina.

The Rev. Ronald O. Heinze moved that the entire resolution as printed, revised and amended be referred to the Ninth Session under Unfinished Business.

The motion was ADOPTED.

#### h. Alcohol and Drug Abuse, resolution on, action on

On behalf of the Executive Board, The Rev. R. Harold Terry moved the following resolution:

#### Whereas:

The Lutheran Church in America through its Division for Mission in North America had deemed the problem of alcoholism to be worthy of the church's concern and action; and

#### Whoreas

Alcoholism is a treatable illness; and

#### Whereas:

We the members of the North Carolina Synod of the Lutheran Church in America gathered in Convention deem the disease of alcoholism worthy of our concern and action to assist the pastors and congregations and individual members therein in ministering to alcoholics, those suffering from alcohol or other drug problems, and members of related families:

#### I. Therefore be it resolved that:

Congregations which decide to permit the use of alcoholic beverages at certain predetermined events use the following suggestions as responsible guidelines for the serving and use of alcoholic beverages at church functions or on church property:

- A. Any beverage which contains alcohol should always be clearly identified as such.
- B. Whenever alcohol is served in any form, alternative non-alcoholic beverages should also be offered, especially for those who plan to drive.
- C. Although beverages and other foods containing alcohol may be offered, together with non-alcoholic alternatives, the alcoholic beverages or foods should not be promoted in such a way as to imply that partaking of them is any kind of social requirement.

- D. Care should be taken to insure that responsible persons are in control of the serving of alcoholic beverages.
- E. Intoxication should be discouraged. If it occurs, the intoxicated person should not be allowed to drive. Alternative transportation or lodging should be provided.
- F. All applicable federal, state and local laws and ordinances, including those governing the serving of alcoholic beverages to minors, must be observed.
- II. And Be it Further Resolved That:
  - A. Congregations be encouraged to assist Alcoholics Anonymous, Al-Anon and Alateen Groups by making facilities available to them.
  - B. Congregations make alcoholism information and alcohol and drug information available to their members.
- III. And Be It Further Resolved:
  - A. Individual members of congregations be encouraged to follow the same guidelines suggested for congregational use in Resolution I.
  - B. All church members be urged to cooperate with the following programs: Industrial alcoholism programs in private industries and governmental agencies; national, state and local programs to reduce the tragedies which result from driving under the influence of alcohol or other drugs,
- IV. And Be It Further Resolved That:
  - A. Clergy and church councils be urged to establish educational programs to increase their general knowledge of alcohol and alcoholism, and to identify local resources available to alcoholics, people having alcohol or other drug problems, their families, employers and friends.
  - B. Clergy and church councils be urged to provide ongoing educational opportunities for their members, including the booklet, "Alcohol and Other Chemical Dependency" by Cedric W. Tilberg. (Available from the Division for Mission in North America, Lutheran Church in America; 231 Madison Ave., New York, NY 10016. Cost \$2.00.)
  - C. Synod-wide training be provided for church professionals in the area of alcohol use, alcohol problems and alcoholism.
- V. And Be It Further Resolved That:

The clergy of the North Carolina Synod be urged to take advantage of the many training opportunities available to them and to become acquainted with local recovery groups such as Alcoholics Anonymous, Al-Anon, and Alateen with the goal of becoming knowledgeable of the recovery process

VI. And Be It Finally Resolved That:

In the event that alcoholism or any personal problem (such as marital, family, emotional, legal, financial, or physical) affects the performance of church professionals or other families that this synod adopt the following program designed to assist those affected in their recovery:

- A. Self-referral is recommended, either to local programs or to a resource person designated by the Bishop. If a person chooses to use the synod's designated resource person, no personal information will be made available to the Bishop or to future call committees, nor will such information become a part of the person's personnel record. Anonymity and confidentiality shall be maintained.
- B. If the Bishop sees that a church professional's performance or behavior is deteriorating, the Bishop shall document specific incidences, and approach the church professional in a feeling of Christian concern without accusation. After this conference the Bishop may recommend that the church professional have a conference

with the designated resource person to assess the situation and to recommend treatment and/or referral if warranted. It shall not be the role of the Bishop to diagnose a problem, but to deal with the church professional's performance and behavior. If the designated resource person determines that referral is warranted, he/she shall monitor the church professional's progress. Participation in the program will in no way affect adversely the church professional's professional future.

- C. In the event that the Bishop refers a church professional and the professional refuses to complete the treatment plan prescribed by the designated resource person, then the Bishop will be informed in writing of such refusal. A copy shall go to the referee.
- D. The purpose of this program is to aid church professionals and their families whose performance and/or relationships are deteriorating because of unresolved personal problems or from the progression of a physical or emotional illness.
- E. The recommended and approved alcoholism recovery program shall include: Phase 1:
  - a. Detoxification if warranted.
  - b. Complete physical examination by a competent physician. Interview and evaluation by a competent alcoholism treatment professional.
  - c. Following the evaluations, a primary treatment plan shall be developed by the physician and alcoholism treatment professional in cooperation with the church professional seeking treatment and his/her family.
  - d. The primary treatment plan will often include completion of a residential treatment program at a center competent in the area of treating chemical dependency.
  - e. Every effort shall be made to include the family in an appropriate treatment modality such as Al-Anon, Alateen, individual or group therapy.

#### Phase 2:

For two years following the primary treatment phase, the following steps should be required.

- a. Meeting or contact with the designated resource person of the synod on a regular basis.
- b. Weekly attendance at local AA, therapy groups, and/or individual counseling sessions.
- c. Continued strong encouragement for the family to be involved on a weekly basis in Al-Anon, Alateen, or other group or individual therapy.

Discussion ensued.

The Rev. Charlie Hoyle and Mr. Henry Carlson, Mental Health Counselor from Davidson County, spoke to the resolution.

The Rev. Hoyle Whiteside moved the previous question.

The motion was ADOPTED.

The Rev. Thomas G. Weddington moved that Item IV of the resolution become Item I and that Item I become Item IV.

The motion was ADOPTED.

Mr. Craig Abee, Holy Trinity, Hickory, moved to amend the resolution:

that the phrase "for children, youth and adults" be added to new Item I, A so that it would read: "A. Clergy and church councils be urged to establish educational programs for children, youth and adults to increase their general knowledge of alcohol and alcoholism, and to identify local resources available to alcoholics, people having alcohol or other drug problems, their families, employers and friends."

The motion to amend was ADOPTED.

#### 6. Report of the Committee on Credentials and Enrollment

The Rev. Lester O. Roof, Jr., Chairman, presented the final report of the committee. He reported that the registration included 271 Pastors, 279 Lay Delegates, 8 certified Lay Professionals, and 179 registered visitors, total registration 737.

#### 7. Report of the Committee on Unfinished Business

The Rev. Ronald O. Heinze, Chairman of the Committee, reported on the items of unfinished business from the Executive Board:

- b) Resolution on Peace in a Nuclear Age

He also asked for consideration of the resolution on Alternatives to Corporal Punishment.

#### 8. Report of the Executive Board, continued

#### i. Food Tax, resolution on

On behalf of the Executive Board, H. D. Fry, Jr., moved the following resolution:

Whereas the church has been given a special calling from Christ to minister to the poor and the hungry (Matthew 25);

Whereas this ministry is not only to feed the hungry but also to remove economic injustices which help create and perpetuate the problem;

Whereas the North Carolina Sales Tax on food places an unfair burden on lower income families that pay a higher percentage of their income on food tax;

Whereas in times of economic stress this tax becomes even more oppressive; Whereas food is a necessity and not a luxury;

Whereas  $\frac{2}{3}$  of the people in the United States of America do not pay sales tax on food:

Therefore be it resolved that the North Carolina Synod of the Lutheran Church in America supports the removal of the state sales tax on food in four stages by reducing the tax on food one percent each year for three successive years at the state level and repealing the one percent local option on food the fourth.

That individuals in congregations be urged to write their legislators affirming this resolution and calling for the repeal of an unfair tax.

Discussion ensued.

The Rev. Clyde Haas moved the previous question.

The motion to cease debate was ADOPTED.

There was a call for division of the house. The vote was: yes-164, no-153.

The resolution was ADOPTED.

#### i. Alternatives to Incarceration, resolution on

The Rev. Ronald O. Heinze moved the following resolution as proposed by the Committee on Justice and Social Change:

WHEREAS THE LCA Social Statement "In Pursuit of Justice and Dignity: Society, The Offender, and Systems of Correction" adopted at the Sixth Biennial Convention, Dallas, June 30-July 6, 1972, recognizes that "the correctional system should be viewed as a continuous process with the emphasis on treatment in the community and incarceration reserved for control of offenders who are judged dangerous or violent;" and

WHEREAS the House of Delegates of the North Carolina Council of Churches adopted on October 21, 1982, a policy statement calling for the development and utilization of alternatives to imprisonment for certain convicted criminal offenders; and

WHEREAS the N.C. Citizens Commission of Alternatives to Incarceration in its Fall, 1982 report records that N.C. has one of the highest incarceration rates in the country; since 1970, the N.C. prison population has grown from 9,603 to 16,900, an increase of 76 percent; the prison system is operating at 14 percent above operating capacity with projections even higher for the future; 76 percent of all admissions to the prison system in 1980 were for non-violent offenses; and

WHEREAS the incarceration of offenders most often produces social deviants rather than rehabilitated citizens;

#### BE IT THEREFORE RESOLVED

THAT THE Executive Board authorize our Bishop to communicate to our N.C. State Legislators our support for legislation and judicially mandated alternatives to incarceration for most non-violent offenders in order to ease prison crowding and to enhance rehabilitation; and

That our synodical social ministry network be kept abreast of legislative debate over alternatives to incarceration and relay these developments to pastors and congregational social ministry committees; and

That, since community based alternatives to incarceration need public awareness and volunteer service to succeed, we urge our churches to be ready to help through encouraging their members to become volunteers and by opening their facilities for use as needed; and

That this action by the Executive Board be reaffirmed by the N.C. Synod at its 1983 Convention.

That this action be communicated to the North Carolina Citizens Commission of Alternatives to Incarceration.

Mr. Bob Klepfer moved that the resolution be amended by removing the words "providing for" in the first resolve, and replacing them with the words "with the appropriation of state funds necessary to provide".

The motion to amend was ADOPTED.

The Rev. Harold McSwain moved the previous question.

The motion to cease debate was ADOPTED.

The motion as amended was ADOPTED.

#### j. Resolution on Alternatives to Corporal Punishment, action on

The Rev. John Nagle, Chairman of the Committee on Reference and Counsel, presented and moved the following resolution:

Whereas over 60,000 children in North Carolina were documented to have been corporally punished in 1982; and

Whereas psychologists indicate that corporal punishment suppresses (rather than changes) unacceptable behavior and makes the recipient of said corporal punishment only more aggressive; and

Whereas male blacks, Hispanics and poor children are corporally punished at a ratio of 6-1 over white children, and

Whereas it has been proven that children who are corporally abused, in turn abuse their own children; and

Whereas the Governor's Council on Child Advocacy has recommended that legislation be adopted to remove corporal punishment from public schools; and

Whereas New Jersey, Maine and Vermont have not permitted corporal punishment in the schools for 100 years; and

Whereas only English-speaking countries of this world condone corporal punishment as a means to change and/or correct unacceptable behavior; and Whereas Ireland last year abolished corporal punishment in their schools and

England and Australia have legislation pending to abolish corporal punishment; and

Whereas the binding law of North Carolina is an 1812 statute stating (in essence) that in order for a teacher to be charged with child abuse for severely corporally punishing a child in school, he/she must have inflicted permanent bodily injury; and

Whereas North Carolina law supersedes the rights of parents and forbids them from withdrawing from teachers the right for said teachers to corporally punish their children;

#### THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED

That the North Carolina Synod of the Lutheran Church in America support the adoption of legislation providing for mandated alternatives to corporal punishment in schools in order to teach children by example that there are better ways to solve problems than by the deliberate infliction of pain; and

That the cabinet for Social Ministry keep abreast of legislative developments relative to alternatives to corporal punishment and work to increase the awareness among Lutherans in North Carolina by relaying these developments to pastors and congregational Social Ministry Committees; and

That, since alternatives to corporal punishment need public awareness and volunteer service to succeed, we urge our churches to help through encouraging their members to become leaders and volunteers in the movement to abolish corporal punishment in North Carolina schools; and

That this action be communicated to the Governor's Council on Child Advocacy, the Social Concerns Agency of the Lutheran Church in America and that a report be given at the 1984 North Carolina Convention on development of concern for and response to this issue.

Mrs. Marlene Gaspersohn, St. James, Fayetteville, spoke to the motion.

Mr. Morris Keeter, Holy Trinity, Gastonia, moved to amend the resolution by adding the words "including a report on the actual vote count" to the last paragraph so that the sentence would read: "That this action, including a report on the actual count, be communicated to the Governor's Council . . ."

The motion to amend was ADOPTED. 185 for, 87 against.

The Rev. Ronald O. Heinze moved that debate cease after hearing one more argument each from the opposing sides.

The motion was ADOPTED.

The resolution as amended was **DEFEATED**. The vote was 121 for, 196 against.

The Rev. Ronald Heinze moved that the session be extended for one-half hour, and that the Worship Service begin at 11:00 a.m.

#### 9. Resolution from LWR/World Hunger, action on

Whereas, the Lord has called upon His followers to love and to care for the hungry, our neighbors, (Luke 10 and Matthew 25);

Whereas, we have seen that the needs of hungry people are all too real and desperate (I John);

Whereas, weather conditions and war continue to create adverse conditions and suffering:

Whereas, four persons have journeyed approximately 1600 miles to this convention on bicycles as a way to emphasize and publicize the plight of hungry people and the LCA World Hunger Appeal; and

Whereas, October 16, 1983 will be observed as World Food Day:

THEREFORE, be it resolved

That the North Carolina Synod meeting in convention acknowledge the efforts of Charlie Hoyle, Gary Haddock, Don Newton, and Paul Merck, and

That the congregations of the North Carolina Synod be encouraged to designate October 16, 1983 as a time to emphasize and to receive offerings for the LCA World Hunger appeal.

The motion was ADOPTED.

#### 10. Report of the Executive Board, continued

k. Resolution on Peace in a Nuclear Age, action on

The following resolution was recalled for debate and action:

WHEREAS the Lutheran Church in America in its 1982 biennial convention adopted the following resolution:

#### WAR AND PEACE IN A NUCLEAR AGE

Preamble

The fear and anxiety our society faces each day in the shadow of nuclear arms call the contemporary Christian to a crisis of conscience in dealing with issues of war and peace. The urgent nature of the nuclear arms race hastens our desire for the church to articulate its witness in a world filled with conflict.

The level of concern expressed by synods of the Lutheran Church in America for the growing nuclear arms race and complexity of the issue challenge this church to do more than consider a statement in support of one of many current nuclear disarmament and/or freeze proposals. As responsible Christians, we are committed to well-informed action toward justice and peace and

- 1. THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that it is the sense of delegates to the 1982 convention of the church to declare our support for a multilateral, verifiable freeze of the testing, production, stockpiling, and deployment of nuclear weapons and delivery systems as a step toward the eventual elimination of nuclear weapons and to work actively to achieve such a goal; and
  - 2. BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Lutheran Church in America
  - a. urge its congregations and their members to be diligent in praying for:
  - world peace and all who work for peace.
  - iustice and all who suffer from oppression and deprivation.
  - the leaders of all nations involved in negotiations for world peace:
- b. declare its abhorrence of the current development and stockpiling of increasingly destructive nuclear, biological, and chemical weapons by the United States, the Union of Soviet Socialist Republics, and other countries, and the resulting diversion of resources from human needs;
- c. urge the leaders of the United States and the Union of Soviet Socialist Republics to accept the moral responsibility to initiate steps toward the reduction and eventual elimination of nuclear weapons and to consider taking reasonable and appropriate risks in the search for greater trust and understanding among nations;
- d. affirm negotiations toward arms reduction and urge leaders of all nations to build a climate of peace and cooperation among nations;
- e. support and encourage church members in individual participation in the informed public debate as a proper expression of commitment and responsibility in the stewardship of God's creation.

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that we encourage the members of our congregations to engage in intercessory prayer for our leaders and the leaders of all nations that they may be supported by the Spirit of God as they struggle to develop policies that will be more conducive to a lasting peace, and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that each congregation of the North Carolina Synod provide an opportunity for education, discussions, and forums related to this issue, and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the North Carolina Synod set aside Sunday, July 3, 1983, as "Peace Concerns Sunday", on which North Carolina Synod congregations are encouraged to address peace issues through worship and education.

Amendment proposed by Mr. Bill Shell, St. Paul's, Wilmington, (Pro. Session Seven pp. 287-288)

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that, consistent with the maintenance of essential equivalent and overall nuclear capability at present and in the future, both qualitatively and quantitatively, the strategic arms reduction talks between the United States and the Soviet Union should have the following objectives: (1) pursuing the objective of negotiating an immediate, mutual and verifiable freeze on the testing, production and further deployment of those enumerated weapons and weapon systems as set forth in Section 2 which follows: (2) deciding when and how to achieve a mutual verifiable freeze on the testing, production and further deployment of nuclear warheads, missiles and other delivery systems, and systems which would threaten the viability of sea-based nuclear deterrent forces and to include all air defense systems designed to stop nuclear bombers, and (3) proceeding from this mutual and verifiable freeze, pursuing a substantial, equitable, and verifiable reduction in such weapons and systems as described hereinabove through numerical ceilings, annual percentages, or any other equally effective and verifiable means of strengthening strategic stability, with such reduction to be achieved within a reasonable, specified period of time as determined by the negotiations. PROVIDED THAT (a) any item both sides do not agree to freeze would not be frozen, (b) until such time as final instrument embodying the objective set forth in Section 1 hereinabove has been fully ratified by both the Soviet Union and the United States, nothing in this resolution shall be construed to seek to prevent whatever modernization and deployment of weapons of the United States as may be required to maintain the credibility of the nuclear deterrent of the United States, and (c) in all negotiations pursuant to this resolution the United States shall make every effort to insure that any agreement reached shall provide for full compliance by all parties with pre-existing international treaties, obligations and commitment.

Done this 28th day of May, 1983 at the annual convention of the North Carolina Synod of the Lutheran Church in America, at Hickory, North Carolina.

The Rev. Robert Q. Beard moved a substitute amendment:

that the amendment proposed by Mr. Shell be deleted.

that the following be added before the first resolve:

Whereas the North Carolina Synod is concerned that definitive steps be taken toward control of Nuclear arms.

that the word "frozen" in resolve (3) (a) be deleted, and

that the word "implemented" be inserted in its place.

that the following be added at the end of the resolution:

Be it further resolved that this action taken by the NC Synod in convention, May 29, 1983, be conveyed to the congressional delegation of North Carolina, to LCA Bishop James Crumley, to President Ronald Reagan, and to the Communist Party Chairman Yuri Andropov.

The Rev. John Nagle moved the previous question and all previous questions before the convention.

The motion to cease debate and consider the previous questions was ADOPTED.

The amendment proposed by the Rev. Robert Q. Beard was **DEFEATED**.

The amendment proposed by Bill Shell was DEFEATED.

The motion to approve the original resolution as amended by Dr. Whittecar was ADOPTED.

The Rev. Ronald O. Heinze reported that all unfinished business was complete.

#### 11. Presentation by Youth Convo and Resolution honoring Youth Staffer

The delegates to Youth Convo presented a skit showing how young people can effectively serve the Church.

The Rev. Richard R. Campbell of the Bishop's Staff presented and moved the following resolution:

WHEREAS GOD HAS RICHLY BLESSED US DURING THE LAST TWO YEARS THROUGH THE PERSON AND MINISTRY OF YOUTH STAFFER BARBARA HERPICH: AND

WHEREAS UNDER HER DIRECTION AND ENTHUSIASTIC LEADERSHIP THE YOUTH AND ADULTS OF THE N.C. SYNOD HAVE GROWN IN THEIR VISION OF MUTUAL MINISTRY: AND

WHEREAS HER LIFE AMONG US HAS BEEN A HIGH EXAMPLE OF THE STEWARDSHIP OF ALL OF GOD'S GIFTS FOR LIFE IN HIS SERVICE:

BE IT THEREFORE RESOLVED THAT THE N.C. SYNOD IN CONVENTION GIVE THANKS TO GOD FOR BARBARA'S PRESENCE AND WORK WITH US, PRAY FOR HIS CONTINUED BLESSING UPON HER AS SHE MOVES TOWARD NEW HORIZONS OF CHRISTIAN SERVICE AND EXPRESS APPRECIATION TO HER BY RISING IN GRATITUDE, LOVE AND THANKSGIVING.

The convention approved the resolution by a standing ovation.

#### 12. Announcements and Prayer

Bishop McDaniel made announcements, stating that the date of the 1984 Synod Convention would be held at Lenoir-Rhyne College, May 24-27, 1984, and recessed the convention. Chaplain Charles Zimmerman closed the session with prayer.

#### TENTH SESSION

Sunday Morning, May 29, 1983 - 11:00 a.m.

The Service of Holy Communion with the Rite of Ordination was led by Bishop Michael C. D. McDaniel, presiding minister. He was assisted by Mr. James Chesky, Secretary of the North Carolina Synod, and the Rev. Charles M. Zimmerman, Chaplain of the Convention. The music was led by the choir composed of members of Hickory area churches, and the organist, Mr. Tim Warren. The worship service was developed by the Worship and Music Committee of the Synod, the Rev. Robert E. Allen. Chairman.

The preacher was the Rev. David L. Martin, Associate Director, Leadership Resources, Division for Professional Leadership of the Lutheran Church in America and former Secretary of the North Carolina Synod. Pastor Martin challenged the ordinands to "embody ministry — to be a strong model of servanthood and leadership in which the power of Christ is made manifest . . . — and to give, to feed, to serve . . . to share the burden of others and risk . . . new possibilities in Christ."

#### **CLOSING OF SYNOD:**

Bishop McDaniel closed the Annual Convention of the North Carolina Synod of the Lutheran Church in America at 1:00 p.m.

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
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
