CONSTITUTION.

1. The Baptist State Convention of North Carolina shall be composed of three representatives from each white association in the State, of one annual representative for every \$10 contributed to its funds, and of such life members as have been, or shall be made so by the payment of \$30 at any one time to the Treasurer.

2. The primary objects of the Convention shall be to educate young men called of God to the ministry and approved by the churches to which they belong, to support the gospel in destitute sections of the State, to assist Baptist churches in the erection of suitable houses of worship, to encourage the study of the Bible in Sunday Schools, and to co-operate with the Southern Baptist Convention in all its departments of labor.

3. The President shall preside when present, and enforce order in accordance with Dr. Mell's Parliamentary Practice.

4. There shall be three Vice Presidents, one of whom shall preside in the absence of the President.

5. The Recording Secretary and his Assistant shall record the proceedings, publish the minutes, and collect and preserve correct statistics of the denomination.

6. The Treasurer shall receive all funds represented in the Convention, make public acknowledgements of the same every week, forward all contributions to their proper destination, and at every meeting of the Convention, make a full report of his receipts and disbursements.

7. The Corresponding Secretary shall solicit contributions to the objects of the Convention, assist the Boards in the employment and payment of Missionaries, and labor to promote the cultivation and development of christian benevolence.

8. The Boards of the Convention shall be appointed annually.

9. The Education Board shall, so far as it may be able, assist promising and indigent young ministers seeking to prepare themselves for the more efficient preaching of the gospel.

10. The Mission Board shall, so far as the means at its disposal will allow, supply all the destitute portions of the State with faithful and efficient ministers of the gospel, and co-operate with the Foreign Mission Board of the Southern Baptist Convention in sending the gospel to all the nations of the earth.

11. The Church Extension Board shall seek necessary information. They shall give pecuniary aid for building churches as far as they can secure it, and recommend all others worthy of assistance to the beneficence of the churches.

12. The Sunday School Board shall encourage the study of the Bible in our churches, and co-operate with the Sunday School Board of the Southern Baptist Convention.

MORNING SESSION—FIRST DAY.

Wednesday, November 6th, 1872.

The N. C. Baptist State Convention assembled in its Forty-Second Annual Session, with the Baptist Church in Fayetteville, and was called to order by Elder W. T. Brooks, D. D. Opened by reading I Cor. 13th chapter, singing 730th Hymn, "Sow in the morn thy seed," &c., and prayer by Elder Wm. Brunt.

Elders R. R. Overby, T. W. Babb and C. T. Bailey were appointed tellers, and the Convention balloted for President.

When the vote was being counted, Elder Hiden suggested that the Convention should always seek to leave the people better than it found them. Many are thoughtless and heedless. Let us quietly and earnestly work as we have opportu-

nity. Ministers too often spend days and nights in families without the mention of the love of souls. We should make this session a blessing to all the people who entertain the delegates.

The tellers report the re-election of Elder W. T. Brooks, President.

Elder Brooks submitted a few remarks. He was forcibly impressed with the rapid flight of time. It seems but yesterday that we met in Charlotte. Now we meet in the good old honest town of Fayetteville, whose people open their hearts and houses to receive us. Let us seek to do these people good. I am glad, dear brethren, to meet you again. I came here 30 years ago as a reckless youth, I come now as a minister of the gospel. Let us seek to do the Lord's work faithfully. I thank you for your kindness and confidence. Help me in my arduous duties. May the Head of the Church guide our deliberations.

Elders Jordan, Durham and J. H. Mills were appointed to nominate the officers of the Convention.

The Committee retired to prepare their report and during their absence the Convention was addressed by Elders Wingate and Pritchard.

AFTERNOON SESSION—FIRST DAY.

WEDNESDAY, November 6th, 1872.

The Convention met at 3 o'clock, P. M. Prayer by Elder A. D. Blackwood.

Elder C. H. Toy, D. D., of Southern Baptist Theological Seminary, accepted invitation to a seat in the Convention.

Bro. J. H. Mills, by permission, made statements in regard to the difficulties of editing the *Biblical Recorder*, and suggests that the committee on Periodicals recommend another editor.

Dr. Pritchard read the following

REPORT ON MISSION.

We present our record of labor for the year with unfeigned thankfulness.

Forty-two years ago the Convention was organized as a missionary body. Through all these years the objects of its organization have been kept in view. The work of

STATE MISSIONS,

lying immediately about us and intrusted to us in a peculiar sense, has had a steady hold on the hearts of our people. The wisest and best men among us have been earnestly engaged in trying to devise and carry out plans for supplying the destitute portions of the State with preaching of the gospel. Their efforts have not been in vain. The strong churches in some of our largest towns were aided by your body in the time of their feebleness. Others have been planted by missionaries sustained by the Convention; and some of our most efficient Associations owe much of their present prosperity to the labors of men sent and sustained in the same way. In one county in which, about a quarter of a century ago, there was no Baptist church, one of your missionaries baptised a little band of believers and organized a church. Nine churches have sprung from that one; and the seeds then sown are now bearing fruit in the distant West. Within the period which has elapsed since the organization of the Convention, our growth as a denomination has been very rapid. That much of it is due under God, to the missionary labors of the Convention admits of no doubt. During the year now closing, we have been endeavoring to carry on the work begun by our fathers, and left as a sacred legacy to us; and it is a matter for thankfulness that some measure of the blessing which rested on their labors has been enjoyed by the brethren laboring under our direction in different parts of the State.

SYSTEMATISING.

In our report for 1871, we directed attention to the disadvantages arising from the plan of separate action pursued by many of our Associations. It multiplies machinery, divides, and therefore weakens our forces, and prevents the mutual assistance and co-operation, which are essential to the highest degree of efficiency in missionary labor. We have endeavored to simplify the work and to unite the denomination in its prosecution as

far as possible. After much and earnest thought, we have adopted the following plan:

To secure in each Association, which requires missionary labor, the appointment of an executive committee which selects and recommends the points to be occupied, with the men who are to occupy them and the salaries which they are to receive, and aid us in raising the funds which may be needed. This plan takes away the ground on which some of the Associations have heretofore declined to work through the Convention, inasmuch as it gives them a sufficient guaranty that their waste places will not be neglected, and that their funds will neither be misapplied nor expended contrary to their wishes; while, at the same time it brings them into union with sister Associations, and gives them the advantage of such aid as they may be able to bestow. This may not be the best plan, but it is the best that we have been able to devise. On it all the Associations in the State may be united in the work of Home Missions, and we can wait in hope till time and a closer acquaintance shall bring about such changes as may be desirable. On this plan all the Associations that have been visited by our Corresponding Secretary, east of the Blue Ridge, are now united.

LABORERS AND THEIR FIELDS.

Since our last report there have been thirty-eight Missionaries engaged in different parts of the State. They have labored in the Chowan, Pamlico, Tar River, Raleigh, Beulah, Liberty, Yadkin, Catawba, Brushy Mountain, King's Mountain, Cape Fear and Eastern Associations. They have been distributed as follows: One in Chowan, two in Pamlico, two in the Raleigh, one in the Tar River, eighteen in the Cape Fear, two in the Eastern, two in the Beulah, three in the Catawba, three in the King's Mountain and three in the Yadkin Associations. They have preached occasionally at Elizabeth City, Plymouth, Williamston, Tarboro, Weldon, Littleton, Company Shops, Greensboro, Winston, Salisbury, Statesville, Morganton, Hickory Station, Lincolnton, Jacksonville, Swansboro and other places. The points which have been occupied in country neighborhoods have been much more numerous, but we cannot specify them here as the missionaries will have occasion to speak of them during your session.

TOWN AND COUNTRY.

Most of the labor of the missionaries has been expended in country places. We have thought this to be right because ours is largely a rural population. The masses of the people live in the country and we must seek the greatest number. Still we have not neglected the towns and villages. The Apostles sought such places, and not without reason. They are centres of influence. Their population is constantly increased by immigration from the country districts, and when members of our churches or families settle in them, they should not be reduced to the alternative of

wandering off to other folds or denying themselves the pleasure and profit of attending public worship altogether. It is to be feared that this matter has not heretofore received such attention as its importance demands.

RESULTS.

A very cheering feature in the work of the last few years is the permanent shape it has assumed. At Elizabeth City the house of worship has been repaired and refitted at considerable expense. At Weldon and Littleton houses of worship are in progress. At Hickory Station a lot has been purchased and paid for and the frame of a house is ready to be raised. At Greensboro' a beautiful edifice, sufficiently capacious for the present wants of the church, has been completed, though a small debt is still on it. If your body should pay off that debt during your present session it would be a benefaction worthily bestowed on a feeble, struggling flock, and on one of your Missionaries who has labored right nobly and at a great cost to himself.

In the Yadkin Association more than one hundred persons have been baptized and one church has been organized. In the Beulah Association, at one of the stations occupied by Elder H. A. Brown, the brethren are preparing to build a neat and commodious house of worship and more than a hundred persons have made a profession of faith in meetings in which he has labored. In the Raleigh Association a church has been organized, the fruit of the labors of Elder J. H. Freeman. In the Catawba Association thirty-five persons have been baptized and a promising church has been organized under the ministrations of Elder G. J. Wilkie. In the Cape Fear Association six churches have been organized. In the Eastern Association under the labors of Elder B. G. Covington, two churches have been organized; and one hundred persons have been baptized by the missionaries at work within the limits of that body. In the King's Mountain Association the ministry of Elder G. M. Webb has been much blessed. He has baptized twelve persons in a very destitute neighborhood. At Winston, Elder F. M. Jordan has administered the ordinance of baptism several times during the year, and the little church organized by him last year, and reporting a membership of twenty one at your last session, now numbers fifty-one. At Morganton and Lincolnton Elders Moody and Cobb report good congregations and other encouraging indications. The brethren at these points desire to build houses of worship as soon as they receive assurances of aid from their sister churches sufficient to justify them in making a beginning.

These are some of the fruits which have been gathered during the year. It is our privilege to labor on in thankfulness and joy, even though we may not see anything resulting from our efforts, since we cannot toil in vain: much more than when God seems to set the seal of his favor on our humble endeavors to serve him.

FOREIGN MISSIONS.

While we have been very earnestly engaged in the prosecution of Home Missions, we have tried to present the claims of the heathen and of our brethren who are preaching to them. As will appear from the Treasurer's report the contributions for this object are larger in the aggregate than those for 1871. During the year, the Baptists of the South have been called on to raise \$40,000 for the building of a house of worship in Rome. At the Convention in Raleigh, last May, brethren pledged North Carolina for \$2,000. More than half of that sum has been raised already.

There are still due the missionaries about nine hundred dollars. Of this amount there is probably one half now in the Treasury. We hope that enough has been sent up by the churches to pay off all the indebtedness at this session of your body.

THE OUTLOOK.

It is matter for thankfulness that so much has been accomplished during the year in the department of State Missions, and especially that there seems to be a growing spirit of work among the churches. And yet when we contrast what has been done with our ability to do the great amount yet to be done, it is difficult to repress a feeling of sadness and humiliation. How small a part of the whole population of the State do we form? In many sections we are scarcely known as a denomination. Surely there is need of increased liberality and prayerful endeavor. So if we turn to the foreign field. It is gratifying to know that the churches are feeling a deeper interest in that great work, and that since our last report they have manifested a large liberality towards it. But how little are we doing, as compared with the transcendent importance of the enterprise, and with our ability to perform. With thankfulness for what has already been accomplished let us press forward to greater achievements in the future.

T. H. PRITCHARD, Chairman.

Dr. Tupper addressed the body. Jesus was the great apostle, missionary, once sent. If we follow him, we must be active in laboring for the salvation of men at home and abroad. Human philosophy cares nothing for the heathen. Christianity is full of sympathy for humanity. Men who love others most are the truest men. Paul forgot himself and rose above selfishness. The renewed heart wants to tell every sinner that Jesus died for sinners. This is the work of the true church. The church which does not this work is not a christian church. I have no christian life apart from this work. I joined the church to work for missions. I could not sleep, without giving myself to the Foreign Mission field, if God had not made it impossible. English guns opened China. Needle guns opened Italy.

Now we have five churches in Italy, at Tivoli, Bologna, Bari, Rome and Civita Vecchia. Bro. Yates says our success depends on the building of a house in Rome. If Baptists are not the children of God, they are in a worse condition than any other people. We cannot be kept together except by the power of divine grace. We propose to put a church under the shadow of the Vatican. Oncken requires all who join him in Germany to work for Christ. We have a handful of Baptists who are fighting against the powers of darkness, I ask you to help them, to be like Paul, like Christ. I plead for the Caucasian race to be used as a fulcrum for lifting up the other races of the earth. We must do our part. I am glad you have done so well. You must do better. Make a perpetual memorial by building and founding a permanent church in Rome. We build only as we have the means.

The report was made the special order for 10 A. M., to-morrow.

Elder Cobb read the report of the Sunday School Board.

Laid on the table till 2 P. M. to-morrow.

Prayer, Dr. Toy leading.

The Convention then adjourned till 7 o'clock, P. M.

WEDNESDAY, 7 o'clock, P. M.

The introductory sermon was preached by Elder J. C. Hiden, from Matt. 28:19: "Go ye, therefore, and teach all nations."

After the sermon, Elder H. A. Tupper, D. D., presented the claims of the Foreign Mission Board and received a contribution for the Roman Chapel.

Congregation dismissed with benediction.

SECOND DAY—MORNING SESSION.

THURSDAY, NOV. 7, 1872.

The Convention was opened by reading the 15th Chapter of Mark, singing 561st hymn, and prayer by Elder Newell.

The report of the Board of Missions being first in the order of business was re-read and discussed by Elders Pritchard and Hufham.

A division of the question was called for by Elder Hufham, and the call being sustained, a motion was made to adopt so much of the report as referred to State Missions.

Remarks were made by Elders F. M. Jordan, H. Lennon, Newell, Prichard, Overby, Hufham, Weaver, Moody, Kennedy, Durham and Cobb, showing that while the denomination had made rapid progress in the spirit and work of missions and there was a general readiness to hear the Gospel as proclaimed by our ministers and missionaries, there was still great destitution of Baptist preaching in some parts of the State.

Pending the discussion the Convention, adjourned. Prayer by Elder T. W. Babb.

AFTERNOON SESSION—SECOND DAY.

THURSDAY, Nov. 7, 1872.

Convention re-assembled at 4 o'clock, P. M., and was opened with prayer by Elder A. McDowell, D. D.

The Report of the Sabbath School Board, being the special order of business, was read by the Secretary, and on motion to adopt, was discussed by Elders Weaver and Toy and brethren John Kerr, J. M. Heck and J. B. Starke.

REPORT OF SUNDAY SCHOOL BOARD.

Notwithstanding the resolution passed at the last annual session of your body, "cordially inviting pastors of Baptist Churches and Sunday School Superintendents of this State to co-operate with and sustain the State Sunday School Board of this Convention in whatever way they may request," we have been unable to obtain the most meagre information in regard to the Sunday School work in many of the District Associations of the State, although we have made persistent efforts to do so.

Statistical reports have been received from only six of the twenty-four Baptist Associations East of the Blue Ridge Mountains which nominally co-operate with this Convention, viz: Brier Creek, Chowan, Flat River, Cape Fear, Cedar Creek and King's Mountain. These six Associations with an aggregate church membership of 28,000 report 126 Sunday Schools with an attendance of 7,400 officers, teachers and scholars. The same proportion for the other Associations would swell the number in the Baptist Sunday Schools of the State to something over 15,000. These figures show that there is still a great need of the work of our brethren in this department of Christian labor.

The Sunday Schools in the Baptist Churches of the State West of the Blue Ridge Mountains are nearly all organized on the union plan and are not therefore reported as Baptist schools.

S. S. BOARD.

During the year, Sunday School Conventions have been held within the bounds of the Cape Fear, Tar River, Central, Mt. Zion and perhaps other Associations, and a more lively interest has been created in the work of teaching the Bible to the children; but we have not been furnished with their proceedings, nor statistics.

S. S. MISSIONARIES.

Your Board have had under appointment two Sunday School missionaries, Rev. A. F. Redd and Rev. J. B. Starke, both students at Greenville Theological Seminary last term; Bro. Redd was sent to the Eastern portion of the State and labored six weeks in the Chowan Association when he was compelled to retire from the field on account of ill health. During the time he collected \$116 42 and delivered a number of Sunday addresses.

Bro. Starke organized four Sunday Schools, delivered 21 sermons, about 20 S. S. addresses and collected \$26 55.

But for the sickness of both of these brethren, which compelled them to abandon the field, your Board would have been able to make a fuller report of work done.

STATE S. S. MISSIONARY.

As soon as a sufficient amount can be raised in cash or reliable pledges to support a State S. S. Missionary we would recommend the appointment of one of our best brethren to this field.

We have not been able to do this before because of the want of co-operation on the part of the pastors and churches throughout the State.

We have endeavored to promote the organization of S. S. Missionary Societies to co-operate with the Board in giving the gospel to the children. A very few societies have been formed and are now co-operating with the Board and with the Sunday School Board of the Southern Baptist Convention. If all the Sunday Schools in the State would organize similar societies, we would have no difficulty in obtaining, from their monthly contributions of 5 cents a member, a sufficient amount to put not one, but several missionaries at work in destitute regions.

Our collections, as appear from the report of the Treasurer, have amounted to \$157 72. Our disbursements for salaries and traveling expenses of missionaries \$90 05. Balance in Treasury \$66 77.

A great work is yet to be done among the children of North Carolina, and it is the earnest desire of your board that a deeper interest may be awakened in the minds of our Baptist brethren on this important subject.

N. B. COBB, Chairman.

On motion of Elder Hiden, so much of the report as referred to the appointment of a State S. S. Missionary was referred to a Committee consisting of Elders J. C. Hiden and R. R. Overby and Bro. J. H. Mills.

On motion of Elder Hufham, the rules of order were suspended and, and an opportunity given to Elder C. H. Toy,

D. D., Professor of Greenville Theological Seminary to present the claims of the students fund of that Institution.

Dr. Toy said there were several reasons why the North Carolinians should feel a deep interest in the Southern Baptist Theological Seminary. The idea of establishing a Southern Seminary for the training of young ministers originated with a Baptist minister of North Carolina. The first President of the Board of Trustees was from North Carolina. A large number of the students there were from North Carolina; and many of the most efficient pastors of the State now, several of them members of this Convention, and the pastor of this church where the Convention is assembled, had received theological training in that institution. He explained the history and management of the fund for poor students and received contributions amounting to \$65 00 in cash and \$50 00 in pledges.

On motion the Convention adjourned. Prayer by Elder W. M. Kennedy.

EVENING SESSION—SECOND DAY.

THURSDAY, NOV. 7th, 7 o'clock P. M.

A mass meeting was held on the subject of Ministerial Education. Addresses were delivered by Elder C. H. Toy, D. D., and Elder C. T. Bailey.

Elders Bailey and T. W. Babb then took up a collection for the Wake Forest beneficiaries, amounting to about \$60 00.

THIRD DAY—MORNING SESSION.

FRIDAY, NOV. 8th, 1872.

Convention assembled at 9½ o'clock, A. M., the President in the Chair.

The President read a portion of Scripture.

Hymn: "I love Thy kingdom," &c.

Prayer by F. M. Jordan.

The Clerk read the proceedings of yesterday.

The entire report on Missions was adopted.

Elder Hiden read the Report of the Church Extension Board.

The report was laid on the table till this evening.

Prof. Royal read the following

REPORT ON EDUCATION:

The Board are gratified at being permitted to give an encouraging account of the interest committed to them during the past year. From seven beneficiaries reported at the last session of the Convention, the number has increased to thirteen, with a prospect of an additional increase during the scholastic year. Besides those receiving aid from the Board, there are several other young brethren at Wake Forest College who are studying with a view to the ministry, and are sustained by their churches, or Associations. A good spirit seems, for the most part, to prevail among them all, both as to their ultimate work and that which is preparatory to their entrance upon it; and there is reason to believe that the labor and expense involved in their mental training will prove not to have been in vain, but to have been the occasion of incalculable good.

It will be seen from the financial report, that the board has not been embarrassed in a pecuniary point of view. Every effort has been made to carry on the work with economy, and this, with the gratifying success attending the faithful labors of the Corresponding Secretary, has rendered it practicable to pay promptly all expenses. The funds now in hand are sufficient to meet liabilities for more than two months, and if the liberal spirit manifested by the friends of the cause during the year that is gone, continue to be maintained, expanding with the growing wants of the interest at stake, no fears need be entertained of the successful issue of another year's work.

In addition to the contributions of money and provisions mentioned in the financial report, there have been valuable donations of clothing which, though not serving to meet demands made upon the Board, are yet most gratefully acknowledged on behalf of the young brethren to whose wants they often so opportunely administer. Such donations have been regularly announced through the RECORDER.

On motion the rules were suspended and Elder Hufham offered the following resolutions on the

ENDOWMENT OF WAKE FOREST COLLEGE.

WHEREAS, The speedy endowment of our College is a matter of great importance to our denominational prosperity and the advancement of Christ's Kingdom, therefore

Resolved, That we will approve a vigorous effort of the Board of Trustees to collect the outstanding bonds as speedily as possible.

Resolved, That we will heartily endorse and co-operate in an effort on the part of the Board of Trustees to secure a cash endowment fund of one hundred thousand dollars during the next year.

Resolved, That in order to do this, it will be necessary to enlist the whole denomination in the enterprise; and that it will be expedient for the Board of Trustees to appoint a central committee to district the State and select canvassers for each district in aiding the general agent.

Elder Hiden addressed the body at length on the necessity of educating the ministers and laymen.

Hymn: "All hail the power," &c.

Dr. Pritchard followed on the necessity of endowments for colleges, and on the benefits of endowed institutions.

Hymns: "Jesus, lover of my soul," &c.

Bro. Kerr highly endorsed the speeches delivered, and briefly sketched the history of the Baptists, alluding to Wickliffe, Carey, Ryland, Judson, Rice and others.

He enlarged on Cornelius and his prayers and alms, and on the importance of contributing to the promotion of learning. Prayers should be followed by alms. Pride is always evil. Self-respect gives influence and the power of doing good. So we must support our schools and educate our people. You profess to teach the truth. Prepare to teach it efficiently.

Let us cultivate a moral independence. He cited the Virginia Baptists as worthy of emulation and urged the endowment of Wake Forest College.

Pending the discussion the Convention adjourned. Prayer by Elder Overby.

THIRD DAY—AFTERNOON SESSION.

FRIDAY, Nov. 8th, 1872.

Convention re-assembled at 3 o'clock. Prayer by Elder B. G. Covington.

By unanimous consent the Committee to nominate new boards reported: (See page 3.

The resolutions of Elder Hufham on the endowment of Wake Forest College, being before the house, were discussed at length by Elders Babb, McDowell, F. M. Jordan, Wingate, Stallings, Overby, Weaver, Newell and Parker, and by Brethren A. Betts and W. H. Avera, consuming the whole afternoon.

About sun down, the resolutions were unanimously adopted by a rising vote.

Convention then adjourned. Prayer by Elder J. N. Stallings.

FRIDAY, Nov. 8th. 7 o'clock, P. M.

Convention assembled. Prayer by Elder N. B. Cobb.

The report on Church Extension was taken from the table and discussed by Elders Hiden, Overby, Hufham and Richardson.

A collection was taken up for Greensboro' Church, amounting to \$87 cash, and \$35 in pledges.

Adjourned with benediction by Elder W. T. Walters, D. D.

FOURTH DAY—MORNING SESSION.

SATURDAY, Nov. 9th, 1872. 9½ A. M.

Convention assembled at the appointed hour.

The President read the Scriptures, the congregation united in singing the 722d Hymn and Elder W. T. Walters, D. D., led in prayer.

The proceedings of yesterday were read, and the report on Church Extension was discussed by Elders Walters, Hufham, Boone Hiden, Babb, Pritchard, Cobb and Stewart and by Bro. J. H. Mills.

On motion of Bro. Mills, the report was re-committed.

Elder J. S. Purefoy then read the

REPORT ON PERIODICALS.

Your Committee on Periodicals would respectfully recommend our State organ, the *Biblical Recorder* to the cordial support of our brethren and sisters of the State.

We rejoice in its efficiency and fidelity to our principles and practices, as we derive them from the Bible. The *Recorder* ought to be in every Baptist family in the state, and the editor deserves our hearty co-operation and support.

We would also recommend our Sunday School paper, *Kind Words*, published under the direction of the Southern Baptist Convention as a good paper for our Sunday Schools.

We also call attention to the *Home and Foreign Journal*, the organ of the Board of the Southern Baptist Convention as fully deserving the patronage of churches and pastors in North Carolina.

REMOVAL OF THEOLOGICAL SEMINARY.

WHEREAS, The calamities of war have rendered it necessary to remove our Theological Seminary from Greenville, S. C., to some more eligible locality, therefore

Resolved, That we approve of the action of the Trustees in locating the Seminary in Louisville, Ky.

Resolved, 2d, That in the opinion of this Convention the effort to raise \$500,000 as an endowment for the Seminary is wise.

Resolved, 3d, That we invite Dr. Boyce to visit this State and lay the claims of the Seminary before our people, and to feel assured that North Carolina will contribute her quota to the amount needed to place the Seminary upon an efficient and permanent basis.

Elder G. W. Newell offered a series of resolutions which were on motion of Elder J. L. Stewart, referred to the Committee on Church Extension.

The Treasurer of the Convention being detained at the hotel by sickness, Elder J. D. Hufham read his report as follows:

REVISION OF THE CONSTITUTION.

Resolved, That a Committee of three be appointed to prepare and report such a revision of our Constitution as will adapt it to the present arrangements and demands of our work.

R. R. Overby, W. T. Walters and J. H. Mills, appointed said Committee.

Elders Pritchard and Walters arose to make personal explanations and disclaimed any desire to wound the feelings of any brother.

Elder Weaver, by yermision, gave an account of Shaw Institute, and urged that young colored ministers be advised to attend.

Bro. J. H. Mills offered the following:

WHEREAS, Many congregations of our people have not yet enjoyed the privilege of contributing to the erection of a house of worship for our church in Rome, and whereas this privilege has been long desired and devoutly prayed for, and should be welcomed with grateful offerings, therefore

Resolved, That the Chairman of the Board of Missions and the Corresponding Secretary of this Convention be requested to prepare and send, to all the pastors of the State, a statement of facts in regard to the great providential opening of Italy, and invite their cooperation, so that all our

congregations may have the opportunity (which was denied to our fathers) of sending to the peoples which cluster around the Mediterranean, that gospel which alone can deliver them from their present gross delusions.

After remarks by Brethren Mills, Kerr, Pritchard, McDowell and Hufham, the resolution was adopted.

The Committee to whom was referred that portion of the report of the Sunday School Board relating to appointment of State Sunday School Missionary, reported adversely to the appointment of such an officer.

On motion of Elder Pritchard, the report was laid upon the table.

By permission, Elder E. L. Davis made statements in regard to the mission and Sunday School work in Pee Dee Association.

Convention adjourned for dinner, after prayer by Elder F. H. Ivey.

FOURTH DAY—AFTERNOON SESSION.

SATURDAY, NOV. 9th, 1872.

Convention opened with prayer by Elder H. McAlpine. The Report of the Sunday School Board was called from the table and after remarks, by Elders Cobb and Hiden, was adopted as first presented.

The Committee on Religions Exercises reported that Elder Stewart would preach in the Baptist Church this evening at 7 o'clock.

On motion of Elder Pritchard, Elder T. Stradly was permitted to present the claims of Asheville Church after sermon to-night.

By permission, Elder C. J. Nelson made an appeal for Williamston church.

The Committee on location of the next session of the Convention reported, recommending that the matter be referred

to the Board of Missions—that they select the place and publish it through the Biblical Recorder.

The report of the Committee on Church Extensions was taken from the table and adopted, as follows :

REPORT ON CHURCH EXTENSION.

The following named churches have joined the Church Extension Society, to-wit: First Church Wilmington, 94 members; High Point Church, 16; Mocksville Church, 12; Greensboro', 17; Holly Grove, 4; Charlotte, 16; Hertford, 12. The church in Greensboro applied for aid in the completion of their house of worship which application was endorsed and the church aided to the extent of their own contribution. The church at Mocksville applied for aid to build a house which has not yet been endorsed, but ought to be as the committee think, as soon as the success of the society will justify. Several applications for aid have been received from churches which have not yet joined the Society. The churches composing the Eastern, Pamlico, Chowan and Yadkin Associations and others have been furnished by mail with the circular and lists, prepared by the committee. Had those churches manifested a reasonable interprise, the committee would have felt encouraged to furnish the circular and lists to as many churches in the State as they could have learned the address of. Instead of 94, our church would have made the number 200, if the church, had generally taken hold of the matter. Receipts, \$62 75, Expenses \$27 25; In hand, \$35 50.

After the sermon of Elder Stewart on Saturday evening Elder T. Stradley presented the claims of Asheville church and received contributions amounting to \$75.

SUNDAY.

The Missionary Sermon was preached on Sunday at 11, A. M. by Elder W. M. Wingate, D. D., to an immense congregation in the Baptist Church.

Elder Levi Thorne preached in the Presbyterian Church, at 11 o'clock, A. M., and Elder T. W. Babb at 7 o'clock, P. M.

Elder T. H. Pritchard, D. D., preached in the Methodist church, at 11, A. M., and Elder R. R. Overby, at 7 P. M.

At 3 o'clock, P. M., a Sunday School Mass Meeting was held in the Baptist Church, which was addressed by brethren

J. H. Mills, F. P. Hobgood, John Kerr and Elder W. M. Wingate.

At 7 P. M., Elder A. McDowell, preached in the Baptist Church.

After the sermon Elder W. T. Brooks, D. D., very briefly alluded to the work of the present session, made a touching allusion to the labors of his predecessor in office, Elder James McDaniel, D. D., and conducted the closing exercises of the Forty Second session of the N. C. Baptist State Convention.

The Convention thus adjourned to meet on Wednesday before the second Sunday in November, 1873, at such place as may be designated by the Board of Missions.

It will be seen that only 26 out of 48 Associations reported their statistics for last year. The columns of Baptisms for 22 Associations is therefore left blank. Suppose these 22 to have baptized only one-half as many as the 26 who have sent me their minutes, this would swell the number of additions by baptism in the 48 Associations to 8,626.

If Clerks of Associations would send me two copies of their minutes as soon as published, they would greatly facilitate the compilation of these tables.

Practical Suggestions to Clerks of Associations.

In compiling your tables for your minutes you will greatly aid us if you will give in *separate* tables the Financial, Sunday School, and usual Church statistics of Additions, Diminutions, &c.

One page of the tables should contain the names and number of churches, when organized, Counties, Clerks and Post Offices, Additions by Baptism, Letter, Experience and restoration; Diminutions by Death, Letter, Exclusion and Erasure, and Total Membership opposite each Church, with the columns invariably summed up at the bottom.

A second page should contain a list of churches with their Pastors, their totals of membership, and Contributions to Minutes, to State Missions, Foreign Missions, S. Schools, Church Extension, Ministerial Education, Home Church Expenses, Pastor's Salary, Total—in separate columns and all added up at the bottom.

A third page should contain the S. School Statistics, viz: 1st, Name of School; 2d, Name and Post Office of Superintendent; 3d, Number of Officers and Teachers; 4th, Number of Scholars; 5th, Average Attendance of each in separate columns; 6th, Baptisms; 7th, *Kind Words* taken; 8th, Other S. S. Papers; 9th, Vols. in Library; 10th, School Expenses; 11th, Contributions to S. S. Board, and 12th, Contributions to other objects.

Many Churches will not report all these items in their letters at first and you will have to obtain much of the information from the delegates and by correspondence, but it will well pay you in the end, if, after several years you can get but half your blanks filled.

☞ Be sure to give on the title page the names of the Moderator, Clerk and Treasurer, *with their Post Offices*, and send two copies of the minutes as soon as they are issued to the Recording Secretary of the N. C. Baptist State Convention, two copies to the N. C. Baptist Historical Society at Wake Forest College, and two copies to B. Griffith, D. D., 530, Arch Street, Philadelphia.
