

CONSTITUTION.

- 1. The Baptist State Convention of North Carolina shall be composed of three representatives from each white Association in the State, of annual representatives for every \$10 contributed to its funds, and of such life members as have been, or shall be made so by the payment of \$30 at any one time to the Treasurer. No one shall be a member of the Convention who is not a member, in good standing, of a Baptist Church.
- 2. The primary objects of the Convention shall be to educate young men called of God to the ministry and approved by the churches to which they belong; to support the gospel in destitute sections of the State; to assist Baptist Churches in the erection of suitable houses of worship; to encourage the study of the Bible in Sunday Schools; and to co-operate with the Southern Baptist Convention in all its departments of labor.
- 3. The President shall preside when present, and enforce order in accordance with Dr. Mell's Parliamentary Practice.
- 4. There shall be three Vice Presidents, one of whom shall preside in the absence of the President.
- 5. The Recording Secretary and his Assistant shall record the proceedings, publish the minutes, and collect and preserve correct statistics of the denomination.
- 6. The Treasurer shall receive all funds represented in the Convention, make public acknowledgment of the same every week, forward all contributions to their destination, and, at every meeting of the Convention, make a full report of his receipts and disbursements.
- 7. The Corresponding Secretary shall solicit contributions to the objects of the Convention, assist the Board in the employment and payment of Missionaries, and labor to pro-

mote the cultivation and developement of christian benevolence.

- 8. The Boards of the Convention shall be appointed annually.
- 9 The Education Board shall, so far as it may be able, assist promising and indigent young ministers seeking to prepare themselves for the more efficient preaching of the gospel.
- 10. The Mission Board shall, so far as the means at its disposal will allow, supply all destitute portions of the State with faithful and efficient ministers of the gospel; shall give pecuniary aid, so far as can be secured, for building houses of worship at proper points in the State, and in cases where pecuniary aid cannot be extended shall commend them to the beneficence of the churches. This Board shall co-operate with the Southern Baptist Convention in all the departments of its labor.
- 11. The Sunday School Board shall encourage the study of the Bible in our churches, and co-operate with the Sunday School Board of the Southern Baptist Convention.

The Baptist State Convention of North Carolina met in its Forty-Eighth Annual Session with the Church at Charlotte, at 11 o'clock A. M.

Pending the vote, a committee of three, consisting of Elds. UNDERWOOD, BOONE and Bro. N. B. BROUGHTON, were appointed to nominate the remaining officers of the Convention.

The tellers announced that Bro. W. A. Graham had received a majority of all the votes cast, and he was thereupon declared duly elected President.

On taking his seat, the President returned thanks for the honor conferred, and addressed the Convention in words appropriate to the occasion.

The following Finance Committee was announced by the Chair: T. L. Vail, E. Frost and J. G. Hill.

Visiting brethren were invited to seats. Elder F. M. Jordan and Bro. W. T. Jordan responded from the Western Convention; Elder J. F. B. Mays, corresponding messenger of the Baptist State Convention of Tennessee.

REPORT OF BOARD OF MISSIONS:

To the Baptist State Convention:

We submit this, our annual report, with feelings of profound thankfulness. In spite of the financial stringency of the times, we have been able to do a very considerable amount of work. The blessing of the Lord has rested on our efforts, and we are able to close up the year without debt and with a small balance in the Treasury, a thing almost unprecedented in our history.

ELD. J. B. RICHARDSON

Labored one quarter as Corresponding Secretary. Resigned Feb. 1st, 1878. He reports: Churches visited in five Associations 34, preached 37 sermons, 34 addresses, attended one mission meeting. Money raised for State Missions, \$96.24; Foreign Missions, \$6.31; Indian Missions, \$2.50. Traveled over 1,200 miles; expenses, \$35.46; salary, \$250.00.

NEWTON.

J. B. Richardson labored one-fourth of his time for 5 months as Missionary to Newton, Hickory, and points on the W. N. C. R. R. Weeks of labor 5; Sermons 27; Churches supplied 1; Out stations 3; Prayer meetings 7; Persons and families visited, 132; Baptized 1; Received by letter, 4. Sunday School at Hickory with 30 pupils. Salary \$200 per annum.

HAMILTON.

Elder J. D. Hufham has been preaching here once a month in connection with Elder A. McA. Pitman. Eleven members have been added to the church during the year, and the outlook at that point is in every way encouraging.

WILLIAMSTON.

Elder J. D. Hufham has been preaching at this place once a month. The task of completing a house of worship has engaged much attention and required much effort, but we are glad to say it is now ready for use; and we may hope for good results.

Bro. Hufham has only been in the employment of the Board for six months, but the results of his labors in that section are most gratifying. His salary is \$200 per annum.

POLKTON, ROCKINGHAM AND LAURINBURG.

Eld. N. B. Cobb, appointed at the last Convention, to labor at Polkton, Rockingham, Laurinburg and surrounding country; salary \$200 with what

he could raise on the field. He reports: received at Polkton by baptism about 28; in money \$5. Built house of worship (nearly finished) at Polkton, 66x36. Weekly prayer-meeting. Indications of revival throughout the field. Rev. A. E. Bennett has preached once a month besides contributing liberally. Have called Rev. Joel Bennett for next year; all have a mind to work.

Reckingham.—Received 18 members. Need a church and a young man in town to take charge and visit—Bro. Newberry is aiding him at Rockingham and has a regular appointment at Hamlet.

LAURINBURG.—Field very hopeful. A good Sunday School. Fifteen Baptists, persons of influence.

LILESVILLE.—Baptized 5, all of whom were Sunday School scholars.

Cartledge's Creek.—Baptized 3, all Sunday School pupils.

SARON.—Dedicated a new church at Saron, in Richmond county, 4th Sunday in June.

COOL SPRINGS.—Visited Cool Springs School House once, and steps were taken to organize a Sunday School, which is still kept up. Bro. B. Saunders, who is Missionary for the Anson Baptist Union, has baptized 8 there; most of whom are heads of families.

Very desirable to locate a young man at Rockingham, Laurinburg and Cartledge's Creek.

STATESVILLE.

Eld. J. B. Boone reports: Sermons, 70; Prayer meetings, 33; Number added by letter and experience, 7; Paid for support, \$91.16; Number families visited, 90; Paid on church house, \$600. Good Sunday School. Building now ready for the roof to go on, and roof is framed ready to go up. Hope to be able to continue to completion. Papers on field, 12 Recorders and 3 Religious Heralds.

SALISBURY.

Eld. J. B. Boone reports: Sermons, 42; Prayer meetings, 19; Families visited, 113; Paid for support, \$27.51; Number added, 3. No Sunday School because the owner of the Hall where worship is held objects to it. Number of papers 4. Paid for rent of Hall, \$12. Salary \$400.00, one-half paid by Board, other half by South Yadkin Association.

WINSTON.

The report of Eld. H. A. Brown shows that he has preached in Wiuston every Sabbath during the year, besides preaching on every third Sunday at a point 11 miles distant from Winston. Winston church has been improved by the addition of a baptistry. Library purchased for the Sunday School. The Sunday School is in a flourishing condition, and the congregations of the church are good; 39 persons have been added to the church during the year. Appropriation by the Board \$150. This place should have the services of a pastor all his time.

ELD. F. M. JORDAN

Labored in the employment of the Sunday School Board and Board of Missions jointly, for four months, and was paid by the two Boards the sum of \$333.33 and expenses, a portion of which was raised on the field—contributed by churches among whom he labored. His labors were greatly blessed at Wilson, and he reports forty-one added to the church as the result of his labors there. He was much encouraged also from results of his labors at LaGrange, Morehead City, Selma and Beaufort.

LIBERTY ASSOCIATION.

R. A. Moore labored half his time. Salary raised by the Association. He reports: Sermons, 173; Prayer meetings, 33; Persons and families visited, 562; Baptized, 12; Collected on salary, \$207.37; Paid on repairing church, \$90. Field very destitute, but his labors have met with unlooked for success. The outlook is promising.

SANDY CREEK ASSOCIATION.

Brethren J. S. Smith and Richard Moore were appointed in Sandy Creek Association; salary to be raised by said Association. Have had no report from these brethren.

MOUNT ZION ASSOCIATION.

Rev. Jesse Howell was employed by the Union Meeting of Mount Zion Association, at its last session, at a salary of \$365, to do mission work in the destitute section between Mount Zion and Flat River Associations. He has entered upon his labors with hopeful results.

Durham Church has been doing a fine mission work this year, and has spent upwards of \$500 in this department, notwithstanding their heavy outlay for their own church.

Several other Associations are doing mission work but we have not sufficient data to make an intelligent report as to their labors.

In addition to the above, the church debt at Morganton of \$185.93 has been paid since last Convention, which amount was raised by the efforts of Rev. R. H. Moody. Thus we see we are relieved of the Morganton debt, but I am sorry to report that we have no one laboring at that point. Bro. Moody paid over the above amount directly to the mortgages by my direction, which was receipted for as funds from the State Mission Board.

Since the above statement was made out there has been paid in and disbursed for the mission work in the Tar River Association the sum of \$105.00, and \$13.65 for the general mission work, thus making amount received in cash from all sources for State Missions and accounted for by our Board, the sum of \$1,900.78, leaving on hand \$28.65.

HONORABLE MENTION.

After the resignation of Bro. Richardson, the Board produced the services of Bro. John E. Ray, of Raleigh, to attend to the correspondence of the Board, for which services the Board paid him \$10 per month, of which amount Bro. Ray contributed \$2.00 per month. Our excellent Brother, John Armstrong, kindly gave the Board an office in connection with the Sunday School Board, in the rear of his bookstore, which has been neatly fitted up and used as the office of the Sunday School Board, and that of Missions.

Feeling that our Missionaries should be paid promptly, what we promised them, we borrowed money of the State National Bank and paid them quarterly, trusting that the brethren would come to our rescue before the Convention. Our report shows how nobly they have done. It is but just to our Bro. John G. Williams. President of the State National Bank, to say he charged us no interest on money borrowed.

THE FIELD

There are inviting fields open to us, and golden opportunities are within our reach. But time and opportunity are passing away, and there is need of increased earnestness if we would meet our obligations. There is urgent need of co-operation in this great work. It is impossible to carry on the enterprise as its magnitude and importance demand, without the united efforts of the whole denomination. We have been laboring to secure this union of effort, and not without a certain measure of success; but there still is much to be done in this direction.

There are three classes of Associations: 1. Those in which there is no destitute territory but such as can be reached by the pastors.

2. Those in which there is some destitution but not enough to require all the funds which could be raised by the churches.

3. Those in which there is destitution so extensive that it cannot be supplied without help from other Associations.

Now cannot these Associations be induced to work together with the

Convention as a common centre or vehicle of communication? If it can be done the most serious difficulty in our way will have been removed.

VOLUNTEER MISSIONARIES.

During the year Elders Gwaltney, Durham, Dixon, Pritchard, Howell, and others, tendered their services to the Board as missionaries, to labor without charge, at such points as might be designated. The labors of these brethren have been attended with the happiest results, and it is to be hoped that this method of evangelization may be used during the coming year more extensively than ever.

THE AGENCY.

We have carefully considered the expediency of appointing a paid agenct to canvass the churches, impart information and collect funds. We are of the opinion that the cause will be best advanced by adhering to the plan pursued during the year now closing. The cost of a canvassing agent is very heavy, and is attended with other disadvantages. The compensations in other respects are not sufficient to counterbalance these disadvantages; at least it seems so to us, though we leave the whole subject to be decided by your body.

FOREIGN MISSIONS.

It is a matter of profound congratulation that there seems to be an increased interest in this department of our labor on the part of our churches. The receipts have been \$3.699.79 for this year, as against \$2,817.26 for last year. This includes \$500, the quota of North Carolina for the chapel at Rome.

The Central Association has for several years been paying one-half of Bro. Yates's salary. At its last session the Raleigh Association assumed the remaining half.

There has been a steady growth of interest among the women of the State in the spread of the gospel among the heathen, and a corresponding increase of effort, as will appear from the report of the Central Committee:

REPORT OF THE CENTRAL COMMITTEE OF THE WOMEN'S MISSIONARY SOCIETIES.

Regarding the Baptist Women's Missionary Societies of the State as a constituent part of the work of the Convention, and, therefore, under the general direction of your Board, we submit our second annual report for the year ending November 1st, 1878:

Our Corresponding Secretary has written 200 letters to persons and churches in different parts of the State and has received 30 letters in reply.

She has distributed 300 mite boxes, and reports the following amounts received by the Treasurer-from the different societies at work:

When, on motion of Elder HUFHAM, so much of the report as relates to State Missions was made the special order at 10 o'clock on Friday morning.

On motion of Elder Cobb, a special committee of five, consisting of Elders N. B. Cobb, H. A. Brown, F. R. Underwood, Brethren C. M. Cooke and N. B. Broughton, were appointed to take into consideration that portion of the report relating to the Agency, and report to this body on Thursday evening at 3 o'clock.

The report lies on the table for the present.

The report on Education was submitted as follows:

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF EDUCATION.

One of the most important features in the work of the Board for the past year, has been the inauguration of the English and Bible Course for young ministers, as recommended by the Convention at its last session. The class for whom it is especially intended is made up of individuals whose early opportunities have been meagre, whose age and pecuniary circumstances do not admit of their taking an extensive collegiate course, and who, for these and other reasons, need such instruction as is contemplated in this course, rather than such as legitimately pertains to a Theological Seminary. It is made to extend over two years, and embraces English Grammar, Composition and Rhetoric, Arithmetic, general and Biblical Geography and History, Elements of Biblical Interpretation, Outlines of Systematic Theology, Preparation and Delivery of Sermons, and Evidences of Christianity.

A small class has been already formed, and, at the opening of the Spring Term, a goodly number are expected, whose purpose it is to enter upon this course, it having been impossible for them to begin earlier on account of engagements which expire only with the year.

Thirteen young brethren bave been assisted during the year. Their proficiency in study, their christian walk, and the evidences of their call to the ministry, all commend them to the affectionate esteem and generous sympathy of the christian public, and especially of their Baptist brethren.

The basis upon which persons are aided by the Board is, no doubt, generally understood. It may not, however, be amiss to state that no application is considered where the party is known to be able to meet his own expenses; and, in order that no mistake may be made at this point, every one applying is required to state in writing his pecuniary circumstances, both present and prospective. He must, moreover, give satisfactory evidence of his call to the ministry, and have, from his church, a license to preach, or a certificate of the same purport.

To the efficient services of their agent. Bro. L. R. Mills, is largely due the measure of success which has been attained by the Board. From the financial report it will be seen that he has received for his services and travelling expenses together, the sum of \$368.03. Taking into account his contributions to the Board, the agency has cost little more than \$250. This fact is deemed worthy of mention, as showing the rigid economy with which this interest is conducted. Were the agent differently situated, it would be impossible for the same amount of work to be done on the same terms.

*The hopeful view presented thus far must be regarded as only partially just. Compared with what we have had sometimes in the past to recognize as the situation, the present prospect is encouraging; but compared with what the Baptist hosts of North Carolina ought to be doing in this great cause, we feel that but little has been done.

We cannot refrain from expressing the hope that the brethren in attendance upon this session of the Convention will return to their homes determined to do more than they have ever done towards exciting in their churches and Associations, a deeper interest in this most important field of christian effort.

NIGHT SESSION.

The Convention assembled at 7 P. M.

Elder J. A. Mundy preached a most able and interesting sermon, from John xvii: 20: "Neither pray I for these alone; but for them also which shall believe on me through their word."

Adjourned with benediction.

SECOND DAY.

THURSDAY, Nov. 7th, 1878.

After the usual devotional exercises, conducted by Elder F. M. Jordan, the Convention was called to order by the President.

Roll of Associations called and additional delegates enrolled.

The following visiting brethren appeared and were welcomed to seats in the Convention:

Resolved 2d, That the Convention appoint two of our brethren to visit the next session of the Colored Baptist Convention, and convey to them the assurances of our willingness to aid them in their work.

On motion, Elder J. M. Bostick and Bro J. H. Huffman were added to the Board of Missions.

The committee to nominate the Sunday School Board reported through its chairman, Elder W. R. GWALTNEY, the following recommendations, which were approved by the Convention:

The report was adopted.

Dr. J. B. Jeter, D.D., editor of the Religious Herald, and Rev W. H. McIntosh, D.D., Corresponding Secretary of Home and Indian Mission Board of Southern Baptist Convention, were recognized and invited to seats on the floor of the Convention.

On motion of Dr. PRITCHARD, the rules for the order of business were changed so as to make the hour of adjournment 1 P. M., and the hour for reassembling 3 P. M., during the further sittings of the Convention.

A communication was received from the committee appointed by the Synod of the Presbyterian Church to this Convention touching a resolution of the Synod in relation to the violation of the Lord's Day by the Railroads, asking the Convention at what time it would be agreeable to receive them.

On motion, it was resolved that the Convention would receive the committee at 4 o'clock this afternoon.

Adjourned until 3 o'clock P. M.

AFTERNOON SESSION.

Convention called to order. Singing: "Nearer my God to thee." Prayer by Elder Boone.

The special hour having arrived, the following majority report was submitted:

Your committee, to whom was referred so much of the report of the Board of Missions as relates to the Agency, beg leave to submit:

That we concur in the opinion expressed by the Board that it will be inexpedient for this Convention to employ a Collecting Agent.

The following report of the Sunday School Board was read and made the special order for Friday at 3:30 P.M.:

REPORT OF THE SUNDAY SCHOOL BOARD.

To the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina:

In making this, our annual report to the Convention, we feel profoundly grateful to God for the interest that has been manifested throughout the length and breadth of our State in the Sunday School work. There has been very much hard and earnest work performed during the year that has just passed, and the Good Being has smiled on our labors, for never has there been more enthusiasm on the subject than now. All seem to have awakened to the importance of the early culture of the hearts as well as the minds of our little ones, and as a natural consequence the contributions to our Board have been liberal, not large sums from a few, but small contributions from the many.

OFFICE.

At the last Convention our office was in the Briggs building, second story, but our Brother Armstrong, of the Salisbury Street Baptist Church, offered us a room on the first floor in his bookstore, if we would fit up the same, free of rent, which we accepted. It is just opposite the State National Bank, on Fayetteville Street, and in connection with our office we have a Reading Room, and the following papers have been sent to us regularly free of charge: Biblical Recorder, Raleigh; Daily News, Raleigh; Daily Observer, Raleigh; N. C. Good Templar, Raleigh; Friend of Temperance. Raleigh; Morning Star, Wilmington; Free Lance, Oxford; Watchman, Boston; S. S. World and Child's World, Philadelphia; National S. S.

Teacher, Chicago; American S. S. Worker, Chicago; Mayfield's Happy Home, Memphis; Ford's Christian Repository, St. Louis; Scholar's Companion, Philadelphia, and some others.

After trying the office plan for two years, we unhesitatingly say we think it better than having a paid traveling agent, as we reach a larger number of schools, and hope we have benefited them, and we desire to establish a Baptist Headquarters in the city of Raleigh, and to keep a record of our denomination that will be convenient to all who may wish to know what we are doing.

CORRESPONDING SECRETARY.

We cannot thank our most efficient Corresponding Secretary, Bro. John E. Ray, too much for his earnest labors. He is peculiarly fitted for the work, and his heart is in it. We deem ourselves fortunate in securing his services.

THE LITTLE LEADER PLAN

Has been in successful operation for two years, and the Schools that have tried it say they know of no better plan to interest or secure more funds for our work than by it. To all who have not adopted it we say, "Try it."

STATE SUNDAY SCHOOL CONVENTION.

The Convention at Durham endorsed the call for a State Sunday School Convention, but, after consultation with many of the brethren, we deemed it wise not to hold one; but would recommend a biennial State Sunday School Convention.

NEW SCHOOLS ESTABLISHED.

There have been at least thirty-five NEW Schools established during the past year, in destitute sections and communities hitherto unacquainted with this glorious work of leading the children to Jesus.

Consideration of the Agency question was resumed, and remarks made by Elders Griffith and Dodson.

At this point the following resolution was offered by Eld. C. Durham:

Resolved, That the matter of the election of the Agent be referred to the Boards of this Convention.

Discussed by Elder Durham, Dr. Pritchard, brother Clements and Elder Eason.

Pending the further consideration, the Representatives of the Presbyterian Synod of North Carolina appeared, and through their chairman, Rev. Mr. HARDING, presented the following memorial to the Legislature, adopted at the last session of the Synod:

The Synod of the Presbyterian Church in North Carolina, in view of the fact that the railroads passing through our State, or operating in it, do habitually violate the sanctity of the Sabbath;—that the quiet of our towns and cities is disturbed and the feelings of our Christian people are shocked and outraged by the loading and unloading the cars and continual running of traius;—and also that many are kept from church by being thus employed and are compelled to either lose their place or dishonor the Lord's day. In view of all this the Synod does respectfully and earnestly petition the Legislature to pass some laws preventing the deplorable defiance of God's holy command. The Synod would respectfully call the attention of the Legislature to the fact that some other States have laws upon this subject, and that our own State has laws protecting the Sabbath in other respects.

The Synod carnestly entreat the Legislature to respect the wishes of the Christian people of this State, and to prevent by legislation this violation of the sanctity of the Lord's day. After an explanation of the matter by the Rev. Mr. HARDING and Gen. Young, of the committee, the following resolution was presented by Bro. C. M. Cooke:

Resolved, That we concur with the Synod of the Presbyterian Church in this State in the resolutions adopted at its last session on the subject of memorializing the next General Assembly of North Carolina to prevent, by suitable legislation, the violation of the Sabbath day by our Railroad corporations.

Resolved, That a committee of five be appointed, to make report to-morrow at 4½ o'clock, resolutions expressing our sentiments on this subject, and proposing a plan for carrying out the object of the 1st resolution.

The resolution was adopted.

The President appointed the following committee in accordance with the resolution: W. B. Clements, J. S. Bridges, E. W. Timberlake, Lawson Knott and L. C. Dunn.

The question of the Agency was resumed and discussed by Elder Boone and others.

On motion of Elder Purefox, the further consideration of the subject was postponed until immediately after the disposition of the report of State Missions.

On motion, the subject of Foreign Missions was made the special order for to-night.

Prayer by Rev. J. B. JETER.

The Convention adjourned to meet again at 7 P. M.

NIGHT SESSION.

The Convention was called to order by the President, who announced the special order to be the consideration of Foreign Missions, and introduced the Rev. J. B. Jeter, D.D., who discussed the question of Christian Missions.

He was followed by Rev. H. A. TUPPER, Corresponding Secretary of the Foreign Mission Board of the Southern Baptist Convention, who gave a most interesting account of the Chapel at Rome, with facts pertaining to its establishment, and the Foreign work generally.

On motion, it was resolved to take up a collection for Foreign Missions, which amounted, in pledges and cash, to \$240.59.

Elder J. B. Hartwell, returned Missionary from China, appeared and was welcomed to a seat in the Convention.

The Convention then adjourned, with benediction by Rev. Dr. Tupper.

THIRD DAY.

THURSDAY, Nov. 8th, 1878.

The Convention met at the regular hour and engaged in devotional exercises for half an hour, conducted by Elder F. R. Underwood.

Roll of Associations called and additional delegates enrolled.

The Committee appointed to name the Time and Place of next meeting made the following report:

We ask permission to report: We recommend that this whole matter be referred to the judgment of the Board of Missions.

Elder E. Dodson submitted the following report as the result of his work in the Home Mission field:

From November 1st, 1877, to October 31st, 1878, I have labored eleven (11) months, and raised about \$850.00 in cash and over that amount in pledges.

The committee to Nominate Preachers for the next session reported as follows

TO PREACH THE INTRODUCTORY SERMON.—Elder R. H. Griffith; Alternate, Elder F. H. Jones.

TO PREACH MISSIONARY SERMON.—Elder W. R. Gwaltney; Alternate, Elder W. B. Royall.

On motion, the names of Brethren N. B. Cobb and J. T. Webb were added to the Sunday School Board.

The hour for the special order having arrived, the-report of the Board of Missions was taken up and thoroughly discussed by Elder Durham, Cobb, Mills, Gwyn, Harrison, Dixon, Davis, Boothe, Wingate, Mays, Reinhardt, Jeter, Purefoy, Griffith, Hufham, Jordan, Pritchard, Boone and Jones.

Pending its further consideration, the Contention adjourned until 3 P. M.

AFTERNOON SESSION.

Convention called to order, and the song "Ninety and Nine" sung. Prayer by Elder Gwyn.

The President announced the hour for the special order had arrived, and Elder N. B. Cobb addressed the Convention and presented the claims of the Judson Baptist College.

The subject was further discussed by Elders Eason and Dodson.

On motion of Elder PureFox, the Convention resolved to

go into Mass Meeting on Saturday night on Wake Forest College.

The following report of Home Missions was submitted:

REPORT ON HOME MISSIONS.

This Board was organized in 1845, and since that period more than 35,000 souls have been converted through the preaching of its missionaries. The Southern Baptist Convention has been held with three churches raised by this Board, viz: The church in Jefferson, Texas; the church in St. Louis. and the Collisseum Place church, in New Orleans. The Board helped Leigh Street Church, in Richmond, Va., which is now a power in the land. In 1846, Texas had 400 Baptists. This year the Board employed missionaries for this State, which has, in 1878, over 60,000 Baptists, two Colleges and one University going up to be worth \$500,000.

Christ and His Apostles preached in towns. Of all Paul's Epistles directed to places, only one is directed to country churches—the Epistle to the Gallatians.

The Baptists have done much work in the country, but they have too much neglected the towns. This Board, while it cultivates the country, cultivates the towns. It has helped many towns in North Carolina and other Sonthern States.

Bro. Buckner and others have done a great work among the Indians, he having baptized over 3,000.

The Southern Baptist Convention in Nashville, Tenn., in 1878, recommended the formation of Women's Mission Societies for the Home Board in our State Conventions, Associations and churches.

Bro. A. J. Holt is laboring among the wild tribes, under appointment of the Board, assisted by Miss Griffin, who is commissioned to work among the females.

The Creek Indians are asking for a manual labor school for boys and girls, offering land for a farm, and to pay the board of the pupils, the Board to erect the building, enclose the farm and furnish the teachers.

The report and the subject of Home Missions generally was discussed by Dr. McIntosh, Corresponding Secretary of the Board of the Southern Baptist Convention.

A collection was taken up, and \$53.45 realized in cash and pledges.

The report was adopted.

Bro. W. B. CLEMENT, chairman of the committee appointed on the subject of the desecration of the Sabbath by railroad corporations, made a report.

The same was, after discussion by brethren Broughton, Mays, Royall, Whitfield, Clement, Purefox and Harrell, ordered to be recommitted.

At the request of Bro. Clement, he was relieved from further duty on the committee, and Bro. J. C. Turner substituted.

After prayer by Dr. McIntosh, the Convention adjourned until 7 P. M.

NIGHT SESSION.

The Convention was called to order, and prayer offered by Elder F. M. Jordan.

The President announced the special order to be a consideration of the condition of the Charlotte church, and the means of building another edifice on a new site.

The subject was thoroughly discussed by Elders Griffith, Purefoy, Whitfield, Pritchard, Hufham, and others.

A collection was taken up, and it was announced that \$919.50 had been raised in cash and pledges, besides material.

After singing the Doxology, the Convention adjourned to meet again at 9 to-morrow morning.

FOURTH DAY.

FRIDAY, November 9th, 1878.

The Convention met according to adjournment.

Devotional exercises for half an hour, conducted by Elder COVINGTON.

The committee on Periodicals submitted the following report:

REPORT ON PERIODICALS.

The best interests of our denomination cannot be subserved without a wholesome circulation of periodical literature.

Such a circulation divides itself into three departments. First, a medium of communication of general information, circulating such facts and disseminating such truths as are necessary to our whole people. It is also necessary that there should be a journal devoted to Foreign Missionary operations and facts. And finally, the peculiar nature of the Sunday School work makes it needful that we should have papers devoted especially to that work.

- 1. The first of these departments is supplied by the Biblical Recorder. In our judgment the Recorder comes nearer meeting the wants of the Baptists of North Carolina now than at any time during its history. We recognize in the selection of Dr. T. H. Pritchard as Cerresponding Editor, a valuable acquisition to the paper. And with the present corps and management we consider it pre-eminently the paper for the Baptists of North Carolina, and ought to be in the house of every Baptist in the State. Its circulation is a matter that largely affects every enterprise of the denomination. Wherever the paper is taken there is life and activity in our work. Wherever it is not taken there is nothing being done. We call the attention of the pastors to this point. If these things are so, it becomes a part of your work to give it a circulation. Every pastor in the State ought to be an agent for it.
- 2. The Foreign Mission Journal is the only paper devoted exclusively to Foreign Missions in the Southern Baptist Convention. We heartily commend this as worthy of your patronage. Yea more, we would say that it ought to be read by the Baptists of North Carolina.
- 3. In the Sunday School department we would commend to you Kind Words, published at Macon Ga., as peculiarly adapted to children. And the Baptist Teacher, published by the American Baptist Publication Society, for Teachers.

AFTERNOON SESSION.

Convention opened with prayer by Elder C. B. Justice. A communication was received and read from Laurinburg Church, which was referred to the Board of Missions. Bro. J. C. Turner, chairman of the committee, submitted the following report, which was adopted:

Your committee, to whom was referred the matter in regard to the violation of the Sabbath by the various Railroad Companies and employees of the same in our State, with the resolutions of the Presbyterian Synod of North Carolina, would respectfully report:

That we believe it to be a great sin thus to descerate that day which we are commanded to keep holy, and we are glad to know that our Presbyterian brethren are earnestly engaged to prevent said desceration;

That it is a cardinal principle of the Baptists of North Carolina to keep and preserve the sanctity of the Sabbath, and we are willing to lend our aid, in any lawful way, to put a stop to this great evil.

We, therefore, respectfully recommend that the Baptists of North Carolina do earnestly co-operate with their Presbyterian brethren in their endeavors to accomplish this end;

That Baptists-constituting a large part of the citizens of North Caro-

lina, and therefore largely interested and much concerned in everything which is for the good of society and the preservation of God's honor—do, in all portions of our beloved commonwealth, make vigorous efforts, in in every way lawful, to prevent the desceration of the Sabbath by these Railroad Companies. Elder Whitfield, Pastor of the Charlotte Church, announced the programme of religious exercises for to-morrow in the various churches of the city.

The subject of the Southern Baptist Theological Seminary was taken up and remarks made by Elder Griffith and Dr. Jeter.

Elder GWALTNEY submitted the following resolutions, which were adopted:

Resolved, That the Mission Board be requested to urge all the Associations connected with this body to report all their mission work to this Convention through our Mission Board, and that this shall entitle them to representation on the same basis as stated in the Constitution.

Resolved 2, That the Secretary of this body be requested to publish in our minutes a summary of the work done by the Western Baptist Convention.

The committee on Obituaries submitted the following:

ELDER SMITH FERGUSON died at his residence, in Caldwell county, in March of the present year. He was one of the pioneer preachers of Western North Carolina. In early life he was a soldier in the war of 1812. Afterwards he became a soldier of the cross, and for more than half a century he preached through the mountains salvation by grace. His early advantages were limited, but by hard study of the English Scriptures he made himself a workman approved of God. In the counties of Wilkes, Alexander, Caldwell, and others adjoining, he was for years without a peer

as a preacher. None have a more glorious record than he. He built up many churches in these counties, helped to ordain most of the preachers of the last generation, and baptized thousands of people. No man in Western North Carolina surpassed him in usefulness. But best of all, his Christian character was without reproach. For fifty years he lived without a stain upon his ministerial character, and died without an enemy. He lived to be nearly ninety years old, and then, his labor ended, he entered into rest. He was a great man, a useful man, a good man.

Philip Warlick, a Deacon of the church at Warlick's Chapel, Burke county, died at his home in December of last year, aged 84 years.

His life was spent in the quiet seclusion of his mountain home, and in the cultivation of his farm, but he filled a place in the sphere of our denominational activities which cannot easily be filled. He was one of the sturdy upright yeomen who make a State. His piety was of the sort which gives strength, beauty and influence to the church. He was the enlightener, earnest and liberal advocate of all the great enterprises of this Convention. He belongs to the long line of laymen, such as Robert Lawson and Charles W. Skinner, who have sustained and pushed forward all the work of the denomination in the State. Happy the country, happy the denomination unto which a host of such men is given.

Which were adopted.

Elder Cobb presented the following, which was adopted by the Convention:

Resolved, That this Convention, as a constituent member of the Southern Baptist Convention, is in hearty sympathy with the Home Mission Board of that body, and do most cordially commend this cause to our people as worthy of their confidence and support.

Resolved 2, That we concur with the Corresponding Secretary of the Home Mission Board in his desire to secure the services of Elder J. B. Hartwell as a Missionary to the Chinese in California, and pledge our contributions to this work should Bro. Hartwell accept an appointment.

The following resolution was unanimously adopted:

Resolved. That the thanks of this Convention are hereby tendered 1st. To the brethren and pastor of the Baptist church, and other brethren and citizens of Charlotte, for their hospitality extended to the present session.

2d. To Messrs Yates of the *Democrat*, and Jones of the *Observer*, for copies of their papers presented to the Convention, and especially to Mr. J. L. Chambers, reporter of the *Observer*, for his accurate reports of its proceedings.

3d. To the railroad companies, for the favorable rates of transportation allowed delegates to this body.

Prayer by Dr. J. B. Jeter. Convention adjourned till 7 P. M.

The Convention was called to order by Vice President N. B. Cobb.

The subject for consideration was announced to be Wake Forest College and its different branches of instruction.

The discussion was participated in by Elder Purefoy, Prof. Mills and Dr. Wingate.

After prayer by Dr. Mays, the Convention adjourned, to meet again after the religious exercises to morrow night.

"Forty-six years ago Elias Davis, of Robeson county, was appointed one of the first Missionaries of this Convention. He is now 82 years old, and is on a sick bed from which he will probably never arise. His faith is strong. I visited him just before coming to this Convention. His last words to me were: 'I am ready to go, and to pass away joyfully.' Let us pray.''
