FIFTY-SIXTH ANNUAL SESSION

OF THE

BAPTIST STATE CONVENTION.

WILMINGTON. N. C., Nov. 17th, 1886.

The Baptist State Convention met this day at 10 o'clock A. M., in the First Baptist church in Wilmington. After singing "Jesus, lover of my soul," Elder C. T. BAILEY, of Raleigh, the President of the last session, called the Convention to order, and invited Elder C. DURHAM, of Durham, to conduct devotional exercises. Elder DURHAM read II Cor. 5, and led in prayer. "How tedious and tasteless the hours," was then sung by the Convention.

The following were appointed a committee on Credentials: Elder A. D. HUNTER, Brethren J. G. MORGAN, R. A. WOMACK, A. W. EARLY and R. A. SPAINHOUR, who subsequently reported two hundred and four delegates present.

Elders H. A. BROWN, A. W. PRICE, J. B. HARRELL and Bro. F. P. HOBGOOD were appointed tellers for the election of President, who reported no election. The same tellers were continued and on the second ballot, Elder C. T. BAI-LEV, editor of the *Biblical Recorder*, was re-elected President.

Pending the ballot for President, on motion of Bro. J. M. HECK, a committee, consisting of Elders N. B. COBE, J. B. RICHARDSON, W. M. KENNEDY, Brethren W. A. GRAHAM and L. L. POLK were appointed to nominate the remaining officers, who reported as follows:

FIRST VICE-PRESIDENT-Elder C. E. Taylor. SECOND VICE-PRESIDENT-J. W. Gore. THIRD VICE-PRESIDENT-J. B. Holman. TREASURER-F. H. Briggs. RECORDING SECRETARIES-N. B. Broughton and G. W. Greene. CORRESPONDING SECRETARY-John E. Ray. AUDITOR-W. N. JONES. AUDITOR S. S. SUPPLY STORE-John T. Pullen. While the tellers were counting the second ballot, devotional exercises were led by Elder R. T. VANN, and Elders J. W. PERRY and I. T. TICHENOR led in prayer.

Elder T. H. PRITCHARD, pastor of the First Baptist Church, then delivered an address welcoming the Convention to the city and to the homes of the people, and giving some interesting incidents about the history of the Convention.

Elder J. L. WHITE, pastor of the First Baptist Church in Raleigh, replied in behalf of the President of the Convention.

Elder N. B. COBB, in behalf of several brethren, presented to the President a gavel made partly of an elm shading the old church in Greenville, N. C., where the Convention was organized, and partly of mountain laurel from Ashe county, which was accepted by the President.

On motion of Bro. N. B. BROUGHTON, the following hours of meeting were fixed :

Meet at 9:30 A. M.; adjourn at 2 P. M. Meet at 7:30 P. M.; adjourn at pleasure.

On motion of Elder WHITFIELD, the pastors and deacons of the two Baptist churches of the city were appointed a committee on public worship.

The following visitors were recognized: Elder I. T. TICH-ENOR, of Atlanta, Corresponding Secretary of Home Mission Board of the Southern Baptist Convention; Elder O. P. MEEKS, of New York; Elder J. B. BOONE, President of Western Baptist Convention and President of Judson College; Elder T. P. LIDE, JR., and Bro. W. H. DANIELS, of South Carolina Baptist State Convention.

Bro. JOHN E. RAY, Corresponding Secretary, then read the report of the Board of Missions, as follows:

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF MISSIONS.

To the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina :

It is a very pleasant task to be permitted to chronicle such glorious results as have accompanied the efforts of God's people for the extension of His kingdom. This has been a remarkable year, as is attested by the history of the dealings of divine Providence with His servants in all departments of work. At home and abroad, in our State and elsewhere, the richest tokens of the presence and power of the Holy Spirit have been manifest, and untold blessings have accompanied the preaching of the Word everywhere.

STATE MISSIONS.

The progress in this department of the cause of Christ has been marvellous. A larger number of missionaries have been sent out than at any time since our Convention was organized, and the fruits of their labors have been far greater than ever before. Some of the most difficult fields in the State are yielding in their opposition to the cause of truth, and some sections which had been regarded by some as almost discouraging have received the messengers of peace, and rich harvests have been gathered.

The blessings shared by the missionaries have been vouchsafed likewise to the pastors who have labored so faithfully for the Master, and the most cheering news has come up to us from every part of North Carolina. Protracted meetings have been held in nearly all the churches, and, what is still better, revivals of pure religion have attended these meetings, until, from the best information which is at hand, nearly or quite *twelve thousand* souls have been "buried with Christ by baptism." And the net gain in the white Baptist churches of the State must be at least *eight thousand* ! Behold what great things the Lord has done for us.

Hyde county, without a Baptist church or Baptist minister, is still appealing to us, and there are the most gracious opportunities for the success of our Redeemer's cause there, as well as in most of the other destitute sections of our Commonwealth. There were never brighter prospects before us for occupying the old Pamlico region, the beautiful valley of the Catawba, and the other neglected portions of the State. These fields, which are "white unto the harvest," are urging your Board to give them the glad news of salvation. The men, too, can be had; but we lack the funds. Will the Baptist hosts represented by this Convention furnish the means?

A SUGGESTION.

Your Board would suggest that this Convention make some arrangements by which the missionaries can be more promptly paid their dues at the end of each quarter. Some of them have undergone the most trying ordeals this year, because the Board was not able to make payments when they became due.

The ministerial students in their labors during their vacation met with very gratifying success. As will be seen from the tabulated reports, twenty of them have reported to your Board an aggregate of 62 protracted meetings held, 595 sermons preached, witnessed 717 professions of faith, and 220 baptisms.

CONCLUSION.

The blessings which Almighty God has bestowed upon us in every part of the territory of this Convention this year surpass anything of the kind we have ever witnessed. More Associations co-operating in the work of the Board, more new churches and Sunday Schools organized, more houses of worship erected, more funds contributed to every object of benificence claiming the attention of our Baptist brotherhood, more wanderers from our Father's house reclaimed, more joy in heaven over lost souls led to Jesus.

Only one matter of regret have we to mention—the lack of funds to pay the missionaries their dues promptly. But when we consider the stringency of the times, and the further fact that we have raised \$2,000 more for State Missions this year than last, we may congratulate ourselves upon having to report no debt.

Your Board would ask advice. There are several new and most inviting fields heretofore unoccupied by us, and in some instances having no preaching of any kind, which are rapidly opening to us and urging us to give them the gospel of peace. In some of these places people who belong to other donominations, and others who do not profess faith at all, have agreed to make liberal subscriptions toward the support of a Baptist minister. One of our missionaries was recently told that, if he would go over into Hyde county he could organize a Baptist church with a hundred members in one week. What shall we do? With ten thousand dollars a year for the next ten years, we believe that, with God's favors, such as have attended our efforts this year, we can plant a Baptist church in every neighborhood in North Carolina. The "fields are white unto the harvest," and men are standing, with their sickles in hand, ready for the reaping. Shall we go forward and send them? What is the answer of the ninety-seven thousand Baptists of this Convention?

WOMAN'S WORK.

The Board of Missions at its regular meeting in January last appointed a Central Committee for Woman's Work in North Carolina, whose earnest labors have been richly rewarded, as will be seen from their report accompanying this:

REPORT OF THE CENTRAL COMMITTEE OF THE WOMAN'S MISSION SOCIETIES TO THE STATE BOARD OF MISSIONS, NOVEMBER 13, 1886.

The Central Committee was appointed by the State Board of Missions the 1st of January, 1886, and held their first meeting January 20th. There were at that time 41 Woman's Mission Societies in the State, 69 others have been organized since, making a total of 114.

During the year the Central Committee has written 754 letters, 18 postal cards, and published and distributed 3,780 leaflets; also sending out 150 copies of the *Foreign Mission Journal*, 50 of the *Mission Worker*, and 30 of the *Heathen Helper*.

Our expenses have been \$75.95. The Societies have contributed since the 1st of January, \$1,010.95. As directed by them \$654.17 was appropriated to the Foreign Mission work, \$115.33 to the Home Mission work, \$172,20 to State Missions, \$55.00 to Education, and \$14.25 to Church Extension.

FOREIGN MISSIONS.

BY THEO. WHITFIELD, D. D.

Since your last meeting our beloved young brethren, D. W. Herring and R. T. Bryan, with their wives, have entered upon their labors in China. They sailed in December. Bro. Herring located at Shanghai, and Bro. Bryan at Chinkiang. They arrived none too soon, for Bro. Hunnex and the venerable Dr. Yates were quite worn down, and have already been compelled to retire awhile for rest. Our young brethren write encouragingly. Of course they can do little until the language is learned.

Besides these, the Board has sent as reinforcements, two ministers, with their wives, and one unmarried lady to Brazil; Mrs. David to Africa; one minister, with his wife, and one unmarried minister to Mexico.

These thirteen new laborers add their appeal to that of those before them in the foreign work, for your prayers and contributions.

The whole force now employed by the Board is twenty-eight ministers, thirty ladies and fifty-five native assistants. According to the last report of the Board, its receipts from the churches were \$\$3,404.31; and we are sorry to add, there was a deficit in its treasury. The membership in the Missions was 1,398, and the baptisms for one year 169.

From Mexico Bro. Powell writes: "The work everywhere was never so encouraging. Our great need is ministers and houses of worship. God has truly blessed His servants here. If the Board will only increase our working force constantly we will take Mexico for Christ and His truth in a few years."

From Brazil Bro. Bagby writes: "The field is full of promise." And Bro. Daniel writes: "Bro. Taylor and his noble wife are the most earnest missionaries I ever saw. They scarcely cease from labor long enough to eat and sleep." From Rome Bro. Eager writes: "We need the sympathy and prayers of our brethren at home; we need funds to enable as to occupy new and inviting fields."

From China Bro. Graves writes: "For what God has enabled us to accomplish, we bless His name, and look hopefully for greater results in the future."

SOME THINGS ENCOURAGING.

The last annual report of the Foreign Mission Board showed the largest sum ever contributed by North Carolina Baptists to Foreign Missions, \$6,021.57. The report of your Treasurer will show that he has received \$5,734.45, while \$547.75 have been sent to Dr. Tupper direct, making \$6,282.20. This is \$964.27 more than the Baptists of the State ever gave for Foreign Missions any one year.

The number of contributing churches within your bounds is increasing. Last year they numbered four hundred and sixty in twenty-eight Associations.

A Central Committee for Ladies' Missionary Societies has been organized and has, through its energetic officers, increased the interest in Foreign Missions.

North Carolina Baptists have now *three ministers* preaching the gospel to the heathen. Heretofore they have had but one.

But has our progress been comparable to our means, or to the magnitude of the work?

In eighteen of our leading Associations the number of contributing churches increased in four years from 1881 only sixty-nine. Last year four hundred and one churches of this Convention gave *nothing*, while those contributing averaged only seven and one-half cents per member.

With nearly half our churches giving nothing, and the contributions of the rest so small are we not chargeable as a people with indifference to foreign Missions ?

There are one thousand millions of heathen and Mohammedans without the gospel. They die thirty millions a year; and their number increases two millions a year. What are we doing in comparison with these tremendous facts.

If ever it can be our duty to turn our attention to foreign Missions, it is our duty *now*. Almost one-sixth of our population are Baptist Church members. In our Convention are three hundred and forty ministers in charge, and nine hundred and eighty-seven churches. No State or country is more thoroughly Baptist. Surely, if any people should turn to the heathen "we more."

It is a foreign missionary era. The christian hosts of America are moving in the work. Their tramp is heavier every year. One thousand and seventy-nine ordained American missionaries are at the gates of heathenism. Can we doubt that God is calling and the Spirit leading to this great enterprise? We are sending very few men and giving very little to it.

WHAT DO WE NEED?

Ist. We need to raise our contributions to eight thousand dollars, the sum asked of us by the Foreign Mission Board, and the very least that can be considered our proportion of the sum absolutely necessary to support our present force.

2d. We need more sympathy for the hundreds of millions of people who are sinking into eternal woe without hearing of a Saviour.

3d. We need a more obedient regard for the Lord's command, that His people shall make disciples of all the nations.

HOME MISSIONS.

BY REV. A. G. M'MANAWAY.

The following statistics are taken from a circular recently issued by the Home Mission Board:

WHAT WAS DONE.

It supported 255 missionaries, who preached in 649 places more than 21,000 sermons to about 100,000 people. They baptized 4,812 believers; received by letter 2,344 others; making addition of 6,156 persons. They had 326 Sunday schools, in which were 12,500 teachers and pupils. They constituted 70 new churches, and built 49 houses of worship.

For the present year the Board must have funds to support an equal number of missionaries, and build an equal number of houses of worship, and \$8,500 to meet the deficiency of last year.

For its new work, it needs for Cuban Missions \$5,000 and for work among the colored people \$5,000 more.

We are glad to note an increased interest among the Baptists of North Carolina in the work of this Board. Nearly twice as much money has been contributed to this Board, and acknowledged by our Treasurer within the last six months as during the same period of last year. If the brethren and sisters who have been appointed by the Associations to represent Home Missions in their respective churches do their whole duty, we shall send Dr. Tichenor \$3,000 by April 1st, 1887.

The hour for adjournment having arrived, the time was extended long enough for a vote, and the Convention adjourned with benediction by Elder J. W. PERRV.

NIGHT SESSION.

The services were introduced by singing "All hail the power of Jesus' name." Elder WHITFIELD read Ephesians 3, and Elder COBB led in prayer. "Over the stars there is rest," was then sung.

The minutes of yesterday were read and approved.

The special order was postponed until 10:30.

Elder C. E. TAYLOR read the following resolutions from the Committee on General Education, which were adopted :

WHEREAS, One of the primary objects of this Convention is "to encourage education among all the people of our State,"

Resolved, That a committee of three be appointed annually to report at the next session following, the names, localities, number of teachers and scholars, and general condition of the schools, academies and colleges under Baptist control within the limits of this Convention.

2. That it is recommended to the several Associations of the State to afford an opportunity for the discussion of general education.

3. That the pastors of the State be requested to preach annually on the duty of parents to educate their children.

C. E. TAYLOR, Chairman.

The President appointed as committee called for in first resolution, Brethren C. E. TAVLOR, J. W. GORE, E. G. HAR-RELL.

Elder WHITFIELD offered the following resolution, which was adopted :

Resolved, That the appointment by the Board of Missions of a Central Committee for Woman's Work in North Carolina, meets the approval of this Convention, and the work of that committee during the past year is gratifying in the highest degree.

REPORT OF TRUSTEES OF THE CONVENTION.

The Treasurer, according to the requirements of the Constitution, has given his bond in the sum of \$10,000 for the faithful performance of his duties as such officer. C. DURHAM,

Bro. BROUGHTON read the report of the Sunday School Board, as follows:

REPORT OF THE SUNDAY SCHOOL BOARD.

To the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina :

The interest in the Sunday School work is upon the increase. Year by year the followers of Jesus Christ are coming more and more to see its importance, and are beginning to realize the fact that God has assigned "to every man his work." We only wish that all Christians would rightly appreciate the powerful influence of the Scriptures, if properly taught, upon the hearts and minds of the people. Then we might hope to see an interesting and flourishing Sunday School in every neighborhood in North Carolina.

More of the churches are striving to keep up their schools during the whole year than formerly. At an Association which the Corresponding Secretary recently attended, he found that out of sixteen schools reported, *thirteen* were kept up during the entire year. This is indeed encouraging. But if many of the churches in the State wish to follow this example, it will be necessary for them to pay more attention to two things:

t. The comfortable condition of their houses of worship. Without a good stove and warm house, it is difficult, if not wrong, to keep the scholars in attendance.

2. The necessary appliances for studying and teaching the Book are by no means of less importance. Every Sunday School should be supplied with a sufficient number of copies of God's Word, good song books and lesson helps. These can be obtained best and cheapest from

OUR SUNDAY SCHOOL SUPPLY STORE,

at Raleigh, which is the property of this Convention, and which has already blessed hundreds of poor Sunday Schools by its donations and aid of various kinds. The patronage has been very greatly increased during the year, and yet there are many schools and churches which do not purchase from this convenient source, forgetting that every order sent to the Supply Store is adding something to the treasury of the Baptist State Convention, and thus enabling us to help indigent Sunday Schools and organize new ones.

The Supply Store has extended its aid this year much more widely than heretofore. Its expenses have been considerably increased, too, from the fact that the Corresponding Secretary was compelled to be absent from the office most of the year, which necessitated the employment of an assistant nearly the whole time, and likewise made traveling expenses larger. And yet the finances are in a good condition. It is to be deeply regretted, however, that the churches and Sunday Schools throughout the State have ceased to make contributions to this cause. Our Supply Store should not be left to pay all its expenses and then do all the *beneficence* in this department of our work.

SUNDAY SCHOOL INSTITUTES.

Your Corresponding Secretary, during the spring and summer, conducted a number of Sunday School Institutes at convenient points in different parts of the State, which seemed to be productive of no little good.

RECOMMENDATIONS.

I. Your Board would suggest the great importance of holding a Baptist State Sunday School Convention, at least biennially.

2. We would also urge the pastors and Sunday School Superintendents to take regular collections in their churches and Sunday Schools for the beneficence to be extended by the Board.

3. There is a growing demand for colportage work, and we should be glad to see some arrangements made to prosecute it.

Addresses were then made by Elder C. E. TAYLOR, President of Wake Forest College, J. W. GORE, Professor in the University at Chapel Hill, Elder THOS. DIXON, Jr,, pastor of Baptist Church in Goldsboro.

President TAVLOR then asked for subscriptions for the needed building, and the following were obtained :

SATURDAY, Nov. 20, 1886.

The President called the body to order, and asked Elder E. S. ALDERMAN, of Chapel Hill, to conduct devotional exercises, who read Isaiah 55, and led in prayer.

The question recurring on the resolutions of Elder T. H. PRITCHARD, which were pending at the adjournment yesterday, they were withdrawn, and the following, offered by Elder DURHAM, were adopted :

WHEREAS, Thomas Meredith spent his life from early manhood within the bounds of our State; and whereas, he was one of the founders and steadfast supporters of this body; and whereas, it is largely due to his sagacity in founding the *Biblical Recorder*, and his zeal, courage and ability in advocating the principles which characterize us as a people that we are indebted for our prosperity; therefore,

Resolved. That we would rejoice to know that a suitable memoir of him had been prepared.

Resolved, That it would give us pleasure to know that Elder Thomas H. Pritchard had undertaken to prepare such a memoir.

Elder STRICKLAND offered the following report on Periodicals, which was made the special order for 12 o'clock to-day:

REPORT ON PERIODICALS.

This Convention is to be congratulated, first, that we have but one Baptist newspaper; secondly, that it is so good. In the *Biblical Recorder* we have a periodical that we may most cheerfully commend to our people, feeling that when inducing them to subscribe for it we are conferring on them a real benefit. "We rejoice to know that it is in profoundest sympathy with all our great denominational issues, and is doing its utmost to advance these causes. The *Recorder* is just the paper we need, cheap enough for all ; it furnishes pabulum suitable for all classes; is conducted on common sense principles; bold in exposure of error, ready in defence of truth; safe in all its doctrinal utterances; eminently devout in tone; a most valuable coadjutor of the pastor and Sunday school teacher; a most welcome visitor in every family. Pastors who duly appreciate this, and extend its circulation, are but facilitating both their pulpit and pastoral work and aiding in the progress of educational, mission and orphanage enterprises. Let pastors then resolve to put the *Recorder* into every household in their congregations.

We also commend *The Wake Forest Student*, published through students at Wake Forest as worthy the support of those who love pure literature.

The Foreign Mission Journal, published at Richmond, gives us at small cost full and accurate information on all our Foreign Mission work.

Kind Words, published at Atlanta, Ga., the paper of our Southern Baptist Convention, is well adapted to the work of the Sunday schools.

We also commend *The Young Reaper* and the other publications of the American Baptist Publication Society at Philadelphia.

The hour for the special order having arrived, Col. SUGG, of Greenville, N. C., was introduced and addressed the Convention concerning the Baptist church in Greenville.

Elder DURHAM offered a resolution which, after amendment and remarks, was adopted, as follows:

Resolved. That the debt on the Greenville church be referred to a special committee with instructions and authority to borrow, if necessary, the money and pay the debt.

The President announced the following as the committee : Elder C. DURHAM, Brethren J. M. HECK, NOAH BIGGS.

The Secretary read the report of the Board of Education, which, after remarks by Elder THOS. HUME, A. D. HUN-TER, R. T. VANN, H. W. BATTLE, J. M. MCMANNAWAY, was adopted, as follows:

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF EDUCATION.

During the past year your Board has aided, for longer or shorter periods, forty-two young ministers, all of Wake Forest College. Nine others are paying their own expenses there. Of the beneficiaries thirteen were received this fall. Some twenty others, endorsed by their pastors and churches, we were compelled to decline to avoid an oppressive debt. While the calls for aid have so largely increased, our receipts have fallen four hundred dollars below those of last year. And yet, at the earnest request of churches and Associations, we

have continued to assume the care of thirty-three young brethren for the present session.

We are compelled to report a debt of nearly three hundred (300) dollars. We would earnestly urge the churches to enlarge their contributions to this work, that we may be enabled not only to cancel this debt, but also to welcome to the advantages of our College every needy young Baptist minister who may appeal to us for aid. Elder N. B. COBB read the report on Obituaries, which was adopted, as follows :

REPORT ON OBITUARIES.

Since the last session of this body the following brethren in the ministry have passed from their work on earth to their reward in heaven, viz: Elders N. A. Purefoy of Wake Forest, Daniel Wester of Franklin, R. A. Patterson of Orange, Jordan H. Cobb of Robeson.

Elder Purefoy belonged to a family of Baptist ministers well known in North Carolina. He was the son of Elder John Purefoy, who was a prominent minister in the Raleigh Association, and who raised three sons, all of whom became prominent ministers of the gospel in North Carolina. He was born in the county of Wake, graduated at Columbian College, and was pastor a short time at Fayetteville, Tarboro and Greenville. Most of his ministerial work was however spent with country churches in the Tar River Association, where he was honored and loved for his unostentatious piety, his liberal advocacy of every good work, his amiable deportment, and his happy domestic relations. He was in his 76th year at the time of his death.

Elder Daniel Wester was an aged minister of the Tar River Association, a man without education, except in the Bible, but an earnest advocate of all the enterprises of this Convention. He entered the ministry late in life, was a quaint but very interesting speaker, and is held in grateful remembrance by all who knew him.

Elder R. A. Patterson had been for years a prominent figure in the Mt. Zion Association. Without early advantages, he rose gradually from humble poverty to competency, was an earnest advocate of missions, and scrupulously devoted one-tenth of his income to the cause of Christ. He did much mission work in the bounds of the Sandy Creek and Mt. Zion Associations, and his labors were greatly blessed in protracted meetings and mission stations.

Elder Jordan II. Cobb was a minister who spent most of his time in the Cape Fear and Cedar Creek Associations. Educated in English only, he was, in hi younger days, an interesting and effective speaker. He was a fast friend of the Baptist State Convention, and an advocate of all its enterprises from the very beginning of his ministry. For the past seven or eight years his age had prevented his assuming the pastoral care of churches.

Biographical sketches of all these brethren have appeared already in the *Bib-lical Recorder*.

Mitchell, said committee to be located in the city of Wilmington, and whose duty it shall be to consider all applications for help to aid in building houses of worship, and who shall consider the location, plans and cost of the buildings and decide upon the manner and extent of aid that shall be rendered.

CONSTITUTION.

MEMBERS.

ARTICLE I. The Society shall consist of the corporators named in the act of Assembly chartering it, and such other persons as may be elected at any meeting. The members shall be of two classes: First, *Honorary*, who may be elected on account of their reputation or the knowledge of a special interest in historical subjects. Secondly, *Regular* members who shall pay *one dollar* annually to defray the expenses and promote the objects of the Society; *Provided*, That a single payment of *ten dollars* shall be accepted in lieu of the annual payment of one dollar, making one a life member.

OFFICERS.

ART. II. The officers of this Society shall be a President, three Vice-Presidents, a Treasurer and a Secretary, who shall be elected at each annual meeting, and hold office until a new election.

EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE.

ART. III. An Executive Committee of five, any three of whom shall be a quorum to transact business, shall be chosen annually and hold office until a new election. They shall hold and manage the property of the Society, provide a suitable place for preserving books, manuscripts and other memorials that may be collected, and do what may be necessary to carry out the objects of the Society as specified in the act of incorporation. The officers of the Society shall be *ex-officio* members of the Executive Committee.

DEPOSITORY.

ART. IV. The books, manuscripts and other memorials that may be collected shall be deposited, if satisfactory arrangements can be made, in some room at Wake Forest College.

AMENDMENTS.

ART. V. Amendments in this Constitution may be made only at an annual meeting, and by a vote of two-thirds of the members present.

BY-LAWS.

I. There shall be, annually, a meeting of the Society in connection with the meeting of the Baptist State Convention.

2. Other meetings may be called by the President, by and with the advice and consent of the Executive Committee.

3. At the annual meeting an address shall be made by some person appointed to perform that duty.

4. The Treasurer and the Executive Committee shall report at every annual meeting.

CONSTITUTION.

I. NAME.

The name of this organization shall be "THE NORTH CAROLINA BAPTIST MINISTERS' AID ASSOCIATION," located at Raleigh, N. C.

II. OBJECT.

Its object shall"be to provide a fund for the assistance of the families of deceased members and other indigent and worthy Baptist Ministers and their widows and orphans.

III. OFFICERS,

Its officers shall consist of a President, a Secretary, a Treasurer, Auditor and a Board of five Trustees, chosen annually from its members.

IV. MEMBERS.

Any white Baptist Minister in North Carolina, who is in the work of the ministry, may become a member by paying one dollar and signing the constitution.

A membership fee of one dollar shall also be paid annually, and shall become due on the first day of November,

V. ASSESSMENTS.

On receiving notice of the death of a member, properly certified, and on application from his family for the benefits provided for in this Constitution, the Secretary shall immediately notify the Trustees, and if the application is approved by them shall notify the surviving members, and shall, until the number of members reaches two hundred, make an assessment upon each one of five dollars.

When the number of members exceeds two hundred such assessment shall be made as would secure, if paid, one thousand dollars.

On receiving the above named notice from the Secretary each member shall make known the facts to his church or churches and give them au opportunity to contribute to this fund, and shall, with his own dues, forward at once whatever is collected to the Secretary, The total sum received by the Secretary shall be paid to the family of the

The total sum received by the Secretary shall be paid to the family of the deceased brother, provided that the amount shall not be more than two thousand dollars in any one case. The overplus, if any, shall be given to indigent

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and deserving Baptist ministers and their families. Whenever the Secretary shall receive information of the indigent condition of any worthy white Baptist minister in North Carolina, or the family of such person, he shall at once notify the Trustees, and on application from them shall notify the members of the Association and ask them for a collection for said object.

VI. DELINQUENTS.

If any member neglect to pay the annual fee thirty days beyond November Ist of each year, or the assessment within thirty days after receiving notice from the Secretary, such neglect shall terminate his membership, and forfeit to the delinquent's family, in case of his death before the fee and assessment are paid, any and all benefits provided by this Association.

The lapsed membership may be renewed by the payment of *all delinquencies*, said payments to be accompanied by the delinquent's affirmation that he is in his usual health. After three years a delinquent may re-enter the Association on the same terms as a new member, or he may re-enter by unanimous consent at any annual meeting.

VII. ANNUAL MEETING.

An annual meeting shall be held in connection with our Baptist State Convention, at which others shall be elected, the annual reports of the Secretary and Treasurer and Trustees presented, and any other business transacted. This Constitution may be changed at any annual meeting by a two-thirds vote.

Constitution of the North Carolina Baptist State Convention.

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I. The Baptist State Convention shall be composed of three male representatives from each white Association in the State in fellowship with us, one convenmale representative appointed by the churches for every \$10 contributed to its funds, provided that no church shall have more than 10 representatives, and of such male life members as have been made so by the payment of \$30 at any one time to the Treasurer for the objects of the Convention. No one shall be a member of the Convention who is not a member in good standing of a Baptist church in fellowship with us, and no other life members shall be made. -

2. The primary objects of the Convention shall be to encourage and support Wake Forest College ; to educate young men called of God to the ministry and approved by the churches to which they belong ; to encourage education among all the people of the State ; to support the gospel in all destitute sections of the State and of the Southern Baptist Convention ; to send the gospel to the nations that have n not ; to encourage the distribution and study of the Bible and a sound religious literature ; to assist Baptist churches in the erection of suitable houses of worship ; to encourage the proper care of indigent orphan children and destitute and aged ministers of the gospel, and to co-operate with the Southern Baptist Convention in all its departments of labor 3. The Convention shall meet annually, on Wednesday after the second

3. The Convention shall meet annually, on Wednesday after the second Sabbath in November, at 10 o'clock A. M. +

a Recording Secretary and an Assistant, a Corresponding Secretary, a Treasurer, an Auditor, and five Trustees, all of whom except the Trustees, who shall serve during the pleasure of the Convention, shall be elected annually

5. The President shall preside and enforce order in accordance with Dr. Mell's Parliamentary Practice. One of the Vice-Presidents shall preside in the absence of the President.

6. The Recording Secretary and his Assistant shall record the proceedings, collect and preserve statistics of the denomination, and publish and distribute the minutes.

7. The Treasurer shall receive all funds represented in the Convention; make public acknowledgment of the same each week through the BIBLICAL RECORDER; give his bond to the Trustees; forward at least once a month all contributions to their destination; at every meeting of the Convention make a full report of his receipts and disbursements; and on retiring from his office turn over to his successor all moneys, papers and books belonging thereto.

8. The Trustees shall secure and hold the title to any and all property belonging to, or which may be acquired by the Convention, and take a suffy cient bond of the Treasurer. The terms, conditions and amount of the bond (3) shy that fif any puoved property and the Commentary shall be fixed by the Trustees, and in case the Treasurer shall refuse or neglect to give his bond within thirty days after his election, the Trustees shall have power to elect a Treasurer(5) They shall report annually to the Convention.

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9. The Auditor shall, prlor to each annual meeting of the Convention, examine carefully all the receipts, disbursements, vouchers, papers and books of the Treasurer, and his certificate to the facts in the case shall be attached to the Treasurer's report.

10. The Corresponding Secretary shall solicit contributions to the objects of the Convention, assist the Board of Missions in the employment and payment of Missionaries, and labor to promote the cultivation and development of γ -Christian benevolence.

11. The Education Board shall, so far as it may be able, assist promising and indigent young ministers seeking to prepare themselves for the more efficient preaching of the gospel.

12. The Board of Missions shall encourage the churches to give liberally to all the objects of the Convention; so far as the means at its disposal will & allow, supply all destitute portions of the State with faithful and efficient Ministers of the Gospel; give pecuniary aid, so far as can be secured, for building houses of worship at proper points in the State, and in cases where pecuniary aid cannot be given, commend them to the beneficence of the churches; and co-operate with the Southern Baptist Convention in all the departments of its labor.

departments of its labor. 13. The Sunday School Board shall encourage the distribution and study of the Bible and a sound religious literature in the homes, in the churches, and in the Sunday Schools; encourage Sunday School Conventions and Institutes; continue, and, so far as it may be able and the growth of this work shall require, enlarge the Sunday School Supply Store, and co-operate with the Sunday School work of the Southern Baptist Convention.

14. There shall be an Auditor of the Sunday School Supply Store, who, prior to each annual meeting of the Convention, shall examine carefully all the receipts, disbursements and expenditures, vouchers, papers, books and stock on hand, and his certificate to the facts in the case shall be attached to the report on the Supply Store.

15. The Boards shall be appointed annually and report to each session of the Convention. of the Same

16. The Conventioual year shall close one week before the annual meeting of the body.

17. The Boards of the Convention shall fix the compensation of their respective officers, and that of the Treasurer and Corresponding Secretary of the Convention.

18. This Constitution may be changed or amended at any annual session by two-thirds of the representatives present voting in the affirmative.

As will be seen from the above, only 37 of the 84 Associations—less than half—have reported the number of baptisms for the year. If we may estimate the total number from the figures reported, we must conclude that more than *twenty thousand* have been baptized into our churches this year.

The same might be said of the number of Sunday schools, as only 29 of the Associations have reported their schools, and 55 have given no reports.



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
