CONSTITUTION

1. The Baptist State Convention shall be composed of three male representatives from each white Association in the State and one annual male representative appointed by the churches for every ten dollars contributed to its funds, and of such male life members as have been made so by the payment of thirty dollars at any one time to the Treasurer for the objects of the Convention. No church shall have more than ten representatives. No one shall be a member of the Convention who is not a member in good standing of a Baptist church in fellowship with us, and no other life member shall be made.

2. The primary objects of the Convention shall be to encourage and support Wake Forest College; to educate young men called of God to the ministry, and approved by the churches to which they belong; to encourage education among all the people of the State; to support the gospel in all the destitute sections of the State and of the Southern Baptist Convention; to send the gospel to the nations who have it not; to encourage the distribution and study of the Bible and a sound religious literature; to assist Baptist churches in the erection of suitable houses of worship; to encourage the proper care of indigent orphan children and destitute and aged ministers of the gospel, and to co-operate with the Southern Baptist Convention in all its departments of labor.

3. This Convention shall meet annually, on Tuesday after the first Sunday in December.

4. The officers of the Convention shall be a President, three Vice-Presidents, a Recording Secretary and an Assistant, a Corresponding Secretary, a Treasurer, an Auditor, and five Trustees, all of whom, except the Trustees (who shall serve during the pleasure of the Convention), shall be elected annually by direct ballot.

5. The President shall preside and enforce order in accordance with Dr. Kerfoot's Parliamentary Law. One of the Vice-Presidents shall preside in the absence of the President.

6. The Recording Secretary and his assistant shall record the proceedings, collect and preserve statistics of the denomination, and publish and distribute the Minutes.

7. The Treasurer shall receive all funds represented in the Convention; make public acknowledgment of the same each week through the *Biblical Recorder*; give his bond to the Trustees; forward, at least once a month, all contributions to their destination; at every meeting of the Convention make a full report of his receipts and disbursements, and, on retiring from his office, turn over to his successor all moneys, papers and books belonging thereto.

8. The Trustees shall secure and hold the title to any and all property belonging to, or which may be acquired by, the Convention and take a

sufficient bond of the Treasurer. The terms, conditions and amount of the bond shall be fixed by the Trustees, and in case the Treasurer shall refuse or neglect to give his bond within thirty days after his election, the Trustees shall have power to elect a Treasurer. They shall report annually to the Convention.

9. The Auditor shall, prior to each annual meeting of the Convention, examine carefully all the receipts, disbursements, vouchers, papers and books of the Treasurer, and his certificate to the facts in the case shall be attached to the Treasurer's report.

10. The Corresponding Secretary shall solicit contributions to the objects of the Convention, assist the Board of Missions and Sunday Schools in the employment and payment of missionaries, and labor to promote the cultivation and development of Christian benevolence.

11. The Education Board shall, so far as it may be able, assist promising and indigent young ministers seeking to prepare themselves for the more efficient preaching of the gospel.

12. The Board of Missions and Sunday Schools shall encourage the churches to give liberally to all objects of the Convention; so far as the means at its disposal will allow, supply all destitute portions of the State with faithful and efficient ministers of the gospel; give pecuniary aid, as far as can be secured, for building houses of worship at proper points in the State, and in cases where pecuniary aid can not be given, commend them to the beneficence of the churches; encourage the distribution and study of the Bible and a sound religious literature in the homes, in the churches and in the Sunday Schools; encourage Sunday School Conventions and Institutes; continue, and so far as it may be able and the growth of this work may require, enlarge the Baptist Book Store, and co-operate with the missionary and Sunday School work of the Southern Baptist Convention. The board shall appoint of their number a committee of seven, to whom shall be committed the Sunday School work, and the nomination for approval by the board of a Sunday School Secretary or secretaries to prosecute the work within the bounds of the Convention. The board shall also appoint three of their number who shall be the managers of the Baptist Book Store, and as may be necessary from time to time report its condition to the board.

13. The board shall be appointed annually, and report to each session of the Convention.

14. The Convention year shall close one week before the annual meeting of the body.

15. The Boards of the Convention shall fix the compensation of their respective officers, and that of the Treasurer and Corresponding Secretary of the Convention.

16. This Constitution may be changed or amended by two-thirds of the representatives in attendance at any annual session voting in the affirmative.

EIGHTIETH ANNUAL SESSION

HENDERSONVILLE, N. C., December 6, 1910.

The North Carolina Baptist State Convention met in its eightieth annual session with the Hendersonville Baptist Church. The sessions were held in the court-house in order to accommodate all the delegates and visitors.

The devotional exercises consisted of scripture reading by A. T. Robertson, of the Southern Baptist Theological Seminary, and prayer by R. J. Willingham, Corresponding Secretary of the Foreign Mission Board of the Southern Baptist Convention.

The introductory sermon was preached by J. J. Hall, pastor of the Fayetteville Baptist Church, from text, Romans 1:14, 15, 16—"I am debtor both to the Greeks and the Barbarians; both to the wise and to the unwise. So, as much as in me is, I am ready to preach the gospel to you that are at Rome also. For I am not ashamed of the gospel of Christ."

W. C. Dowd, President of the 1909 session, called the Convention to order.

K. W. Cawthon, pastor of the Hendersonville Baptist Church, introduced Hon. Charles French Toms and Hon. R. H. Staton, who delivered addresses of welcome. Response on the part of the Convention was made by Walter N. Johnson, of Wake Forest.

The President of the Convention appointed the following committee on enrollment: J. D. Bruner, G. E. Lineberrv.

W. A. Thomas, H. B. Moore, J. W. Noell. The committee reported 174 delegates present at this hour.

On motion of F. P. Hobgood, N. B. Broughton was instructed to cast the ballot of the Convention for W. C. Dowd for President.

On motion of W. N. Johnson, J. E. Ray was instructed to cast the ballot of the Convention for N. B. Broughton and Chas. E. Brewer as Secretaries.

By special request J. T. Henderson, General Secretary of the Laymen's Movement, addressed the Convention.

 WEDNESDAY—MORNING SESSION.

Devotional exercises were conducted by Chas. E. Maddry, of Statesville.

The President called the Convention to order. The proceedings of the Tuesday evening session were read and approved.

Livingston Johnson, Corresponding Secretary of the Convention, presented the following report of the Board of Missions and Sunday Schools:

REPORT OF BOARD OF MISSIONS AND SUNDAY SCHOOLS.

For the blessings that have come to us, we lift our hearts in grateful praise to Him who has "crowned the year with His goodness."

Eighty years ago the Convention was organized and a Board of

Managers, now known as the Board of Missions and Sunday Schools, was appointed. Those who were present at the organization have gone to their reward, but their works do follow them. Their faith in entering upon such a gigantic enterprise in that day of small things, and their wisdom in planning the work, grow more apparent with each passing year. They labored and we have entered into their labors; they sacrificed and we are enjoying the fruits of their sacrifice.

This is the year in which the Government takes its census in order to ascertain the growth of the Nation during the decade. It may not be amiss to glance back and see what progress we, as a denomination, have made since the last census report.

A DECADE OF GROWTH.

Ten years ago there were 166,098 white Baptists in North Carolina. The latest figures give us 219,465. Ten years ago Meredith College was one year old. Dr. Vann had just come to the presidency. There were at that time 227 pupils, four buildings, and a debt of \$43,000.00. Faircloth Hall has been erected, a general heating plant installed, the \$43,000.00 debt paid, bequests of \$54,000.00 accumulated, and an enrollment of 393.

Ten years ago Wake Forest College reported 289 students. There have been enrolled so far this year 375. During the decade just closing, two buildings have been erected, electric lights installed, a Medical Department established, and over \$100,000.00 added to the endowment.

The secondary schools in the State have been brought into a system, and an Educational Secretary employed.

Ten years ago there were 183 children at the Orphanage, and the receipts for current expenses were \$17,598.00. The Orphanage is now caring for 385 children, and the receipts for current expenses last year reached \$52,298.00. Seven buildings, not including two barns, have been erected, and waterworks, sewerage system, electric lights and laundry installed. The value of the plant, including invested funds, is \$240,000.00.

Three years ago the *North Carolina Baptist* was bought by the Biblical Recorder Company, and the stock of the *Recorder* has been more widely distributed, no one person owning more than \$2,000.00 of the \$20,000.00 stock. At the request of the stockholders of the *Recorder*, the Convention appointed seven brethren, who, with the seven directors of the Recorder Company, composed a Committee of Fourteen, to which committee was assigned the duty of selecting an editor. Thus the Convention, without assuming any financial responsibility, is given practical control of the paper. We now have one strong paper, with an opportunity of increasing its strength and efficiency as the years go by.

The following figures will give some idea of the work done by the missionaries of the Board during the past decade. Ten years ago there were seventy-five missionaries, this year there are a hundred and forty-eight. Since 1900, the missionaries have reported 18,868 baptisms and 11,368 have been received by letter, a total of 30,236. Two hundred and twenty-nine houses of worship have been finished and one hundred and forty-nine churches organized. The contributions to the objects of the Convention have reached \$63,299.92. For pastors' salary \$158,748.64 has been paid and \$171,497.84 has been raised for church building, making a total of \$330,246.48 for these two items, and a grand total of \$393,546.40 as the amount raised on mission fields during the last ten years. The Baptists of North Carolina have raised and expended for State Missions since 1900, \$314,147.61. We have gotten back all that we have expended and \$63,299.92 for the use of our money.

Let us turn to the work of the year which is just closing.

STATE MISSIONS.

We raised this year for State Missions \$41,428.46, as against \$39,327.95 last year, a gain of \$2,100.51. We have had on our roll this year 148 missionaries. The following table contains a summary of the year's work:

There were 110 more baptisms this year than last, and 267 more were received by letter. The financial showing is far better than that of last year. There were 41 houses of worship building last year and 68 this. The reports show 26 houses finished this year as against 22 last. The contributions last year were \$51,143.00, while this year they reached \$67,494.28.

CHURCH BUILDING FUND.

The Board recommended last year that all funds raised by the Woman's Missionary Societies for State Missions, or so much of this money as the Board deemed wise, should be used as a church building fund, provided the women, at their convention, should approve such action, which they cheerfully did. The Board set aside \$5,000.00 to aid weak mission points in building houses of worship, the appropriation of which was to be left to the Executive Committee. The Convention instructed the committee to pay whatever remained on the debt of the Farmville church after all that could be collected for that purpose should have been paid in. In addition to this, aid has been extended to Fremont, Middlesex, Trenton, Hayesville, St. Paul's, East Lumberton, and Asheboro. These are all important points and worthy of assistance. The small amount of aid extended these struggling churches, filled them with hope and courage, and caused them to make greater sacrifices in their efforts to complete their houses of worship.

We suggest that it be left to the discretion of the Executive Committee as to how much of the building fund shall be loaned and how much donated.

ASSISTANT TO THE CORRESPONDING SECRETARY.

At the last meeting of the Board a slight change was made in the work of Brother Bradshaw. He was made Assistant to the Corresponding Secretary, and was instructed to present to the churches and associations the missionary objects of the Convention. The report, which here follows, will show the character and results of his work:

REPORT FOR YEAR 1910.

Our work this year has been largely in Western North Carolina. In some respects the outlook for the Baptists was never brighter or more encouraging. Among the hopeful things we would note first, churches which have been doing nothing are showing signs of activity and progress. Second, the increase in their pledges to the objects of the Convention. Third, the number of laymen in attendance upon the associations. Men from the law offices, the farm, the store, the factories, came and "laid their splendid powers on the altar before the Lord."

MEETINGS.

Five months were given to this work. There were thirteen meetings held and two hundred and sixteen professions, and one hundred and sixty additions. Collected for State Missions, six hundred and seventy-two (\$672.24) dollars and twenty-four cents. Most of these meetings were held at weak churches and mission points; only three meetings with self-sustaining churches.

MISSION INSTITUTES.

A little more than one month was given to this work. In these institutes the subject of Missions is discussed, tracts distributed, and questions about the work are answered to the best ability of the leaders. Eleven associations were reached. The aim in planning these institutes is to reach as many people as possible.

From the 25th of July to the 20th of November has been given to visiting the associations.

WOMAN'S WORK.

The report of the Central Committee, which follows, shows the work of the women to be in excellent condition. The steady progress they make from year to year, without any spasmodic effort or high pressure methods, is a strong argument for a better financial system in our churches. No money spent in State Mission work this year, has brought better results than that contributed by the societies which was,

by the consent of the women, expended in church building. A study of the paragraph headed "Church Building Fund," will give some idea of what has been accomplished by the money contributed by the women to State Missions. Home and Foreign Missions, the Louisville Training School, and the Margaret Home, all receive contributions from these societies, and to each larger contributions have been made this year than ever before.

These women deserve, and should receive, the encouragement of the pastors, in the great work they are doing for the Lord.

With pleasure we give space for their excellent report.

REPORT OF THE CENTRAL COMMITTEE OF THE WOMAN'S MISSIONARY UNION OF NORTH CAROLINA.

The steady growth in the Woman's Missionary Union of North Carolina manifests itself in many ways. It is most gratifying to note this growth and to mention evidences of it and some causes for it:

Annual Meetings.—The enthusiastic and largely attended annual meetings of the Union are coming to mean more and more each year in advancing the work. Delegates who attend get a larger grasp of the meaning of missions, and many have gone home to show forth this inspiration in their own lives and in the work of their churches and associations.

Associational Work.—Marked development is shown in the associational work. In many associations, the women hold their meetings at a separate time and place from the regular associations. These meetings are planned with great care, and their results are felt in the renewed activity of the societies. Where no separate meeting could be arranged, through the considerate kindness of the men, special hours have been given to the women for meetings. The associational vice-presidents are untiring in their work, writing to the societies, visiting them, organizing new ones and strengthening the old.

Mission Conferences.—According to plans made at the annual meeting, the State was divided into five divisions, each composed of a number of associations. In three of these divisions mission conferences were held, three days being spent in most profitable discussions of plans for increasing the usefulness of the societies and the individual members.

Society Figures.—The enrollment of societies as reported at the annual meeting is as follows: Woman's Missionary Societies, 598; Young Woman's Auxiliaries, 143; Sunbeams, 346; Royal Ambassadors, 39; total, 1,126. In this is included 261 new societies organized during the year. The total amount of money reported was \$30,002.16.

Young Woman's Auxiliaries.—The work of the Young Woman's Auxiliaries has gone forward steadily. The amount contributed by them was \$3,372.85, the largest sum given in any one year. The value of young women as workers is being more and more felt and appreciated.

Sunbeams and Royal Ambassadors.—These two organizations for the children and the boys are showing fine advances. Their contributions were: Sunbeams, \$3,440.50; Royal Ambassadors, \$282.07. The training being given these young mission workers is already showing itself, and it is the earnest prayer of all leaders that these boys and girls may later become real factors in the Master's cause.

Office Work.—The resignation of Mrs. Hight C. Moore as Corresponding Secretary of the Union brought much regret to all who had been associated with her. She gave most valuable service to the societies and the Union through her faithful and steadfast work.

Co-operation.—By no means least among the agencies for furthering the work of missions through the Woman's Societies is the co-operation of the pastors. They have given most cordial aid in numberless cases. The secretaries and traveling representatives of our State boards and institutions have also afforded valuable assistance in encouraging woman's work as they have visited the associations, union meetings, etc.

It is with thanksgiving and praise that we record the growth of the past year, and it is our greatest desire that we may be more largely used of the Master in the years to come.

ASSOCIATIONAL EXECUTIVE COMMITTEES.

A very important part of our State Mission organization is the Associational Executive Committee. On this committee the Board must de-

pend, in large measure, for information about the fields and the men to occupy them. As their recommendations carry much weight, they indirectly administer upon a fund that is exceedingly sacred—sacred because of the sacrifices many make to give it, and because it is dedicated to the service of Almighty God. Trust funds are regarded as the most sacred of all funds, and State Mission money comes under that head. It is the Lord's money, entrusted to certain brethren, to be used in the Lord's work, where, in the judgment of those to whom it is entrusted, it will count for most. This places upon all who have anything to do with the disposition of this money, a fearful responsibility.

Some executive committees are exceedingly careful, conscientious and painstaking in their work, and the progress of our cause in associations having such committees, shows the value of the work they do. In other associations executive committees are very careless. They simply meet and pass upon the applications without thoroughly investigating the fields in order to assure themselves that the appropriations they recommend are wise. Sometimes sympathy for the preacher who is to occupy the field influences the executive committee as to its recommendations. No matter how deserving the preacher may be, if, for any reason, he is not the man for that particular field, it is not a wise use of the Lord's money to make an appropriation to him. Sometimes a point is weak and is not able to support a preacher without aid, and for that reason the Executive Committee recommends an appropriation. They should take under careful advisement, however, the future of that church, and unless they are convinced that the prospect is sufficient to justify the expenditure, they should not recommend it. Members of the executive committees should visit the mission points within the bounds of their respective associations during the year, advise with and encourage the missionaries and note the progress, or lack of progress, of the work on the several fields. In this way they can acquaint themselves with the mission fields and give direction to the work as they could not otherwise do.

SUNDAY SCHOOL DEPARTMENT.

The progress made by the Sunday School Department, under the leadership of Brother Middleton, is quite gratifying. His report shows excellent work along all lines. We wish to commend especially the "Teacher-Training Feature," the success of which has been exemplified in the institutes held during the year at several points in the State. Pastors with whose churches these institutes were held, speak in highest terms of the excellent work done, and Sunday School workers bear fine testimony to the practical benefits to be derived from the lectures and study courses given. We are firmly of the opinion that any church or group of churches that can arrange for one of these institutes, will find such a meeting very helpful.

We herewith submit the report of the Sunday School Committee:

REPORT OF SUNDAY SCHOOL COMMITTEE.

The year has been a good one in our Sunday School work. The Department is again self-supporting. Gains are found at nearly every point of the work.

By making comparison with 1905 the advancement is evident. In number of schools we have gained 40 per cent, in pupils enrolled 54 per cent, in perennial schools nearly 90 per cent, in contributions to Sunday School Missions over 100 per cent, and in benevolent contributions to Convention objects over 200 per cent.

FIELD WORK.

The Secretary is supposed to spend one-half the time among the churches, but has done field work during the past year more than this much. He has visited the sessions of 18 associations, has done work in 104 churches of 42 associations, and has spoken and conducted conferences 240 times. He has visited fewer churches than last year, but spoken more, as the larger part of his work was in training schools and institutes. He is trying to cover the whole convention territory.

OFFICE WORK.

For the first nine months of the year definite plans are laid for enlarging and improving our Sunday Schools. During the last three months nearly all office work is on the statistical tables.

General letters are sent to superintendents two to three times a year. During April and June special campaigns were conducted in organizing new Sunday Schools. The Baptist Sunday School Board at Nashville offered a quarter's literature free to all such schools. Under this plan nearly 100 new schools were organized and many unreported old schools were found.

The Rally Day program was again pressed, but not with such success as we ought to have on this important day.

GENERAL CONDITIONS AND NEEDS.

Besides the statistical reports the Secretary tries to get a general report of conditions, needs, etc. Such reports are just in from 36 associations. Improvement is reported in 26, no advancement in 7, retrogression in 1 and no report at this point in 2. The weak points were asked for. Twenty-one associations lay it on untrained and inefficient teachers, 16 on nonattendance and lack of interest of church members, 2 on pastors, 2 on poor organization, 3 on the parents. Of course, more than one weak place was mentioned in several reports. This gives a general index to conditions in all the associations, as these reports come from every section of the State.

FINANCES.

The year's work was planned by the State Board for a larger expenditure on printing and postage. This increase has been met, but there

has been a decline of \$200.65 as compared with last year. The Secretary felt a year ago that enough churches and Sunday Schools had been enlisted to support the work. During the whole year he made only one appeal through the columns of the *Recorder* for Sunday School Missions. It seems quite as many contributions have been made as last year, but some of the larger contributing churches have given less this year. It is desired to unite all our Sunday Schools in all associations on this fund.

STATISTICS.

Full data can be found in the general statistical tables. We are gaining steadily but not rapidly enough. We have gained 128 schools this year. Complete returns show 13,172 or more gained in enrollment. The number of perennial schools is steadily increasing. We now have over 115 branch or mission schools. We have about 214 churches without Sunday Schools. This list will be carefully made out and worked as soon as all associational reports are in.

TEACHER TRAINING.

The demand for trained officers and teachers is growing. To meet this demand is one of the largest tasks before Baptists. Our Secretary has pressed this work this year with some degree of success. A thousand or more are enrolled in our Sunday School Board's normal classes, or are studying the "Convention Normal Manual" privately. Classes have just been reported in eight Baptist schools and colleges with 288 enrolled in these classes. All these expect to receive diplomas during this year. Classes will be organized in four or more schools during the spring term, besides enlarged and new classes in schools named above. We ought to be able to award 350 diplomas by next June in these institutions alone. Training schools have been conducted in Dunn, Rolesville, Warrenton, Laurinburg, Burlington, and Raleigh in the lecture course. Nearly 700 workers were enrolled in these schools. Over 200 have received the Lecture Course Certificate. The same kind of work was done in five other institutes, but for a shorter time. There were two tours of institutes reaching 20 churches in 12 associations. All of this work will be pressed during next year.

THE STATE SUNDAY SCHOOL ASSEMBLY.

This work was undertaken for the first time. It was a training school for the whole State. A splendid faculty was secured. The attendance was small, but from a dozen or more associations. The interest was of the best. Barring the small attendance the meeting was entirely successful. The matter of perpetuating the work was fully discussed on the last day of the assembly. The following resolutions were unanimously adopted:

"Be it resolved, by the North Carolina Baptist Sunday School Assembly, in session at Wake Forest, August 12, 1910:

(1) That we urge the Baptist State Convention to authorize the State Mission Board, through its Sunday School Committee, to provide for an assembly of this sort during the summer of 1911.

(2) That the scope of the program be enlarged to include discussions of Sunday School work and other denominational activities.

(3) That the churches and Sunday Schools of the State be asked to add \$300 to their contributions for Sunday School Missions to assist in meeting the expenses of such assembly, that the State Mission Board be asked to supplement this amount as far as necessary, and that no membership fee be charged delegates attending the meeting."

We recommend that \$100 be appropriated from the regular Sunday School Mission fund and that the Secretary raise the balance needed as a special fund.

A POLICY FOR 1911.

We ought to begin the year with something definite in view. We offer the following for our Sunday School work next year:

1. Thoroughly organize the work in each association in conventions and institutes, co-operating closely with the State Sunday School Committee and Secretary.

2. Secure a "Standard of Excellence for Baptist Sunday Schools" from the Secretary and begin in each local school an effort to reach A1 in this standard.

3. Press the matter of teacher training in normal classes, institutes and training schools.

4. Have a State Sunday School assembly at such a point as the Sunday School Committee and Secretary may select.

5. Make July our rallying month for Sunday School Missions enlisting at least a thousand of our schools in this denominational enterprise.

6. Plan for reaching more of our church members by definite canvasses for those who do not attend.

FOREIGN MISSIONS.

We have gone forward some in our contributions to Foreign Missions. Last year the receipts for Foreign Missions were \$35,640.59, while this year's contributions reach \$38,882.08, a gain of \$3,241.49. These figures show some advancement, but we should do far more for this great object.

At the last meeting of the Southern Baptist Convention, \$600,000 was fixed as the amount to be raised for Foreign Missions. A Committee on Apportionment was appointed, consisting of two from each State. This Committee made a just and equitable distribution of this amount among the States, according to their best judgment, with the

lights before them. The amount which North Carolina is asked to raise is \$50,000. We regard this as a modest sum for the churches of our State to raise for such an important object.

(For a full report of the work of the Foreign Mission Board see Minutes of Southern Baptist Convention.)

HOME MISSIONS.

As immigration turns Southward the work of the Home Board becomes more important. The evangelization of the world depends largely upon the South, and, because of their great numbers, the responsibility rests upon the Baptists of the South as upon no other denomination. We must hold the South true to the faith, in order that we may give the truth to the world. The Home Mission Board is operating upon a basis of \$400,000 this year, of which amount North Carolina is asked to give \$26,000. We reported for Home Missions last year \$19,657.78, while the Treasurer's report shows \$21,766.07 as the amount we have contributed this year, a gain of \$2,108.29. If between now and the first of May we press Home Missions, we can easily reach the \$26,000 by the meeting of the Southern Baptist Convention. (For full report of the work of the Home Board, see Minutes of the Southern Baptist Convention.)

FINANCIAL.

The contributions of the denomination to all benevolent objects, as far as the information could be gathered, are as follows:

That we must adopt some better financial system is clear to all who have given the matter serious consideration. The old pledge system has served its day and should pass out. Under that system pledges were made by the delegates to the associations, and redeemed by a comparatively few members, in many of our churches, leaving a large number of our people untouched. We must devise some plan by which the individual can be reached. With this end in view, in the campaign of the associations this fall, the Corresponding Secretary has urged the churches to appoint mission committees, to which committees should be assigned the duty of making a canvass of the entire membership for the purpose of securing, if possible, a pledge from every member for

every object of the Convention, the same to be paid in weekly or monthly installments. The associations were advised to inaugurate Mission campaigns, to be conducted by the pastors and such laymen as are willing to enlist for the work. This is the plan suggested by the committee having in charge the Laymen's Movement. Many of the leading associations adopted these suggestions, and in some associations campaigns are already under way. Several churches have tried the "every member canvass" method and in every instance the results have been very gratifying.

We heartily recommend the following, as an improvement on the pledge system:

1. A Mission campaign in every association.
2. A Mission Committee or committees in every church whose duty it shall be—

(a) To solicit a pledge for every object of the Convention from every member of the church, the same to be paid weekly or monthly;

(b) To see that these pledges are paid, so far as possible, when due.

(c) To distribute tracts and other mission literature. Tracts can be had from the Corresponding Secretary.

3. The use of the collection envelopes. Churches which have preaching every Sunday will find the Duplex Envelope best. These can be secured at small cost from the Duplex Envelope Co., of Richmond, Va.

This plan is, of course, flexible, and it may be necessary to change it to suit local conditions. Some churches may find it better to use the budget plan, that is, to take the pledges for all the objects in a lump and assign to a judicious committee the distribution of the funds, giving to each object its proportionate part. Other churches may succeed better by having a committee for each object. These matters must be decided by the church in conference. The point we are urging is that some method be adopted by which a much larger percentage of our membership can be reached and enlisted.

EXPENSES.

The total expense of administration this year is \$6,150.35. This includes salaries of the Corresponding Secretary, Treasurer, Recording Secretaries, Auditor and two stenographers (one for the Mission Rooms and the other for the Woman's Central Committee), traveling expenses of the Corresponding Secretary, office rent, fuel, printing, and postage. The total expense is six per cent of the entire amount raised for Missions. The printing and distribution of the minutes, and the salaries of the Recording Secretaries do not legitimately belong to the expense of administration. If these items should be deducted, 5 1-3 per cent would cover all the other expense. Ten years ago it required 10 per cent to meet expenses. While our expenses are heavier now than then, the per cent is only a little over half as much. By enlarging our contributions we can reduce the per cent of expense.

BAPTIST BOOK STORE.

The Book Store has had a successful year; quite a good local trade has been built up, and a large mail order business has been established. Mr. W. O. Allen is the very efficient Manager, and the store, under his wise management, is gaining in prosperity year by year.

CONCLUSION.

The backward glance shows gratifying progress, but as we turn to the future, what vast possibilities stretch out before us! What a mighty host we have become, and what great things we can do in our Master's name if we consecrate our lives to His service! In the next quarter of a decade we should make as great advancement as we have made in the last decade, and at the end of the next ten years we should begin to talk in terms of millions. Dr. Gambrell says that the 300,000 Baptists of Texas, with the right direction of forces, with prayer and a holy purpose, could raise a round million for the general work next year. Surely the million-dollar mark ten years from now is not an unreasonable task for the Baptists of North Carolina to set before them. These words from Dr. Gambrell to the Baptists of Texas are applicable to North Carolina:

"One thing we must not fail in: we must get a fresh grip on God. If we lose sight of the Unseen, the Eternal, the weakness of unbelief will unravel all our strength and leave us helpless before our enemies. More than everything else now, we need eyes to see the promised land lying before us, and to hear the voice of our divine leader call to us: 'Go Forward!'"

W. R. Cullom read the following report of the Board of Education:

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF EDUCATION.

There are at present at Wake Forest seventy (70) men preparing for the work of the ministry, and four (4) preparing for the work of medical missions. Of this number, sixty (60) are receiving aid from the Board of Education—fifty-eight (58) ministers and two (2) medical missionaries. It will be seen by comparing this report with that of last year that the number is a little below that of a year ago. This should be a matter of deep concern to this Convention. With the number of churches multiplying at home and abroad, with the number of new fields that are everywhere calling for men, and with many of the churches doubling the amount of preaching that they require, this fall off in the number of men giving themselves to the ministry of the gospel should cause us to pause and give serious attention to the command of Jesus in Matt. 9:37, 38, viz., that we pray the Lord of the harvest to send forth laborers into His harvest.

It may be a matter of interest to this Convention to know something of the formative influences lying back of these men, especially in the matter of preparatory schools. Of these men, fourteen (14) come from Buie's Creek, eight (8) from Cary High School, six (6) from Mars Hill, five (5) from Leaksville-Spray, three (3) from Winterville, two (2) from Haywood Institute, one each from Salemburg, Murphy, Mandale, Wingate, Fairview, Sandy Creek, Wallburg, Globe Academy, Yadin Valley Institute, Owen and Pee Dee Institute; and seven from as many State and private high schools, and the others from denominational or State high schools outside the State.

FINANCES.

The income of the Board for the past year has been as follows:

It will be seen that the income of the Board has been larger this year than ever before. This is very gratifying to the Board, and should call forth gratitude to God from every member of this Convention. We attribute this increase in part at least to two special helps during the past year. One of these is the very valuable assistance given to the Board by its associate members in the respective associations, and the other is the timely and very gracious help rendered by the Sunday Schools in the special collection given to the work of the Board last spring. We very earnestly recommend that the assistance of these two agencies be solicited for the coming year.

IN MEMORIAM.

In the death of Bro. Jas. F. Slate, of Stokes County, during the year the Board has lost one of its most helpful benefactors. Before his death this beloved servant of God had established the Slate Loan Fund, and committed it to the Board of Education to administer for him. This fund is intended to aid young ministers who are pursuing their course of study at Wake Forest in times of special emergency. Its practical working has been demonstrated in a large number of cases already, and its real usefulness has just begun. To this fund Brother Slate gave \$1,000 before his death, and on the day of his death he told his children where he had placed another thousand dollars to be added to his former gift, making two thousand in all that he gave to it. And be it said to his children's credit, that not only was there not a single question raised about carrying out their father's wishes, but that they themselves are taking great interest in the practical working of

the fund. In just a few days after the father's death the whole thousand dollars was in the hands of the Secretary, in nice, clean currency. For this very gracious and generous act on the part of our beloved brother and his children this Convention should never cease to be grateful.

THANKS TO BRO. SPILMAN.

During the year the office of the Board has been furnished with one of the latest and most improved duplicating machines in the form of an up-to-date Writer Press. For this valuable addition to our equipment we are indebted to Rev. B. W. Spilman and something like a hundred and forty-nine others who furnished a dollar each of the amount necessary to purchase this machine. Bro. Spilman, in his own inimitable way, took the lead in giving and in collecting this money. To him and to each one who participated in this gracious act the Board would extend its most hearty thanks and its best wishes, begging that each one will remember the work of the Board at a throne of grace that more and more it may be an agency in God's hands for promoting the work of the kingdom.

CORRESPONDENCE WORK.

About one hundred copies of Dr. Jas. Denny's great book, *Jesus and the Gospel*, and about a hundred and fifty copies of Horace Bushnell's *The Character of Jesus* have been sent out through the Correspondence Department of this work. Our committee on this subject is going to urge our pastors to take up a careful and as comprehensive study of missions as possible during the next few months.

Looking back over the year as a whole we feel like saying hitherto the Lord hath led us. Let us renew our strength in Him for yet larger and better things in the year to come.

The following report of the Committee on Sunday Schools was presented:

REPORT ON SUNDAY SCHOOLS.

If growth and movement are indications of vitality, the Sunday School is assuredly a living institution. It is growing. It is growing in numbers. The world's Sunday School forces reach a total of twenty-eight millions. In the Baptist ranks of our own State we have attained the number of 165,000. While this achievement gives no cause for boasting, for our church membership is 220,223, it presents a condition that is hopeful and even promising.

The Sunday School is not only growing in numbers, but it is developing in efficiency. It is possessed of movement. Consider the emphasis that has in recent years been placed on the primary department. The work that is being done in the modern city Sunday School, in this

department of the work, will bear comparison with similar work done in the day schools by professional teachers.

Another phase of Sunday School work that is receiving much attention at the present time is the adult department. A persistent effort is being made to interest the grown folks in the Sunday School. It is meeting with gratifying success, largely through the introduction of the "organized class" idea. Enough has been accomplished already to warrant us in continuing the campaign to get the church interested in the Sunday School. Now this adult work is distinctly an American institution, and at the World's Sunday School Convention, held in Washington last May, the parade of adult Sunday School scholars was a revelation to the foreign delegates.

Yet another evidence of the movement that is at work in the Sunday School is seen in the present "Lesson" situation. The Sunday School atmosphere is well-nigh electrical. It is no exaggeration to say that it was charged with all sorts of potentialities at the close of Dr. Frost's deliverance at the last meeting of the Southern Baptist Convention.

Now, no lesson system is perfect; and the one prevailing at the present time may be incompetent or inadequate. It may need revision, amendment or decapitation. There are two factors in Sunday School work that are of supreme importance: one is the lesson, the other is the teacher. To effect improvement in either, or both, is clearly within the scope of the worker, but to impair the effectiveness of either, or both, would be a calamity. Whatever is done, therefore, in connection with the lesson, must needs be done at the expenditure of patient investigation, mature thought, and fervent prayer. Yet the statement is incontrovertible that the agitation for improvement in so fundamental a matter as the lesson itself betokens the fact that the Sunday School, as an institution, has gripped the spirit of our people as never before.

Whatever may be our opinion on the lesson situation, we are as one on the need for continual improvement in Sunday School methods, both in respect to teaching and to administration. Your committee, therefore, again urges the value of Teacher Training work, and respectfully suggests the importance of each Sunday School taking up such work, under the guidance of the experts of our Sunday School Board at Nashville, and furthermore, suggests the using of the superb literature emanating from our own Board.

Your committee would not close this report without calling the attention of the Convention to the steady increase in the Sunday School interest among our own people. We have in the Baptist Sunday Schools of North Carolina an enrollment of 165,000 scholars, which is an increase of 11,500. We have 1,790 Sunday Schools, which is an increase of 109. There are 1,050 "evergreen" Sunday Schools reported, and in many associations no report. These figures mean progress. In no fulsome praise do we say it, but because we believe it to be true, that this promising condition of the Sunday School work in our State is

largely due to the efforts of our beloved Sunday School Secretary, Bro. E. L. Middleton, whose labors have not been in vain in the Lord.

After discussion by E. L. Middleton, Sunday School Field Secretary for North Carolina, I. J. Van Ness, Editor of the Publications of the Sunday School Board of the Southern Baptist Convention, and B. W. Spilman, Field Secretary of the same board, the report was adopted.

The discussion included addresses by R. J. Willingham and T. B. Ray, of the Foreign Mission Board; G. W. Green, missionary in Canton, China; Calder T. Willingham, missionary to Japan; and a letter, read by L. Johnson, from Clarence H. Poe, Editor of the *Progressive Farmer*, now making a tour of the world.

WEDNESDAY—AFTERNOON SESSION.

The Convention reassembled with Vice-President McManaway presiding, and was led in prayer by J. T. Plott, of Hayesville.

Pastors recently assuming charge of pastorates within our bounds were given the hand of welcome as follows: W. R. L. Smith, of Chapel Hill; E. L. Wells, of Edenton; J. M. McManaway, of Waynesville; R. E. Peele, of Burgaw; J. G. Graham, of King's Mountain.

A. T. Robertson addressed the Convention in behalf of the Southern Baptist Theological Seminary. Pledges amounting to \$1,327 were made to aid young ministers at that institution.

The Secretaries were requested to suitably acknowledge the messages received from J. W. Lynch, of Durham, and the ministerial students in Crozer Seminary from North Carolina.

J. M. Arnette presented the report of the Ministers' Relief Board as follows:

REPORT OF THE BAPTIST MINISTERS' RELIEF BOARD.

Many of our preachers, once active in the Baptist ministry in North Carolina, by reason of age or affliction are not now able to measure up to the active service demanded by our churches. Quite a number of these are without adequate means of support. Sometimes, too, the widow of a deceased minister, one who has been a loyal helpmeet to her husband, sharing cheerfully in his toils and sacrifices, is left in needy circumstances.

The function of the Ministers' Relief Board is to meet the needs of such ministers and their widows as best it can with the funds supplied by the denomination. There are at present thirty-four beneficiaries. Five have been received on the Board this year and three have died.

We are glad to be able to report increasing liberality on the part of our churches toward this object. But we regret that nearly three-fifths of our churches give nothing to this worthy work. More than one-fourth of our associations do not contribute to this object, while a number of those contributing give almost nothing. Four of the associations not contributing to the work have beneficiaries on the Board. We do, therefore, earnestly recommend that some pastor or layman in each association see to it that the needs of these old preachers and their families be properly represented. We call attention also to the fact that the cost of living is increasing and the number of those needing and deserving our aid is increasing.

The Board, feeling the need of co-laborers and a more active sympathy, has decided to ask the Convention to appoint associate members in various parts of the State, who, in their respective sections, will carry in mind and heart, in a special way, the interests of this work.

We are glad also to report that the Christmas offering for this work, which was recommended by the Convention at Wilson and emphasized by the Convention at Wadesboro, is proving practical, growing in favor with our churches, and is very materially increasing the funds of this Board. We hope, however, that the Christmas offering this year may be much larger than heretofore and that many more of our churches may take a part in it. We feel that nothing more beautiful has been done by this Convention than to recommend that each church make a special offering for the aged ministers on the Sunday nearest Christmas on which the church may have services. We have felt able this year, for the first time, to send each beneficiary a small Christmas check. Envelopes for this offering will be supplied on application.

The Convention adjourned after singing "Amazing Grace, How Sweet the Sound," led by our venerable Brother F. M. Jordan, and prayer by J. J. Hall.

WEDNESDAY—EVENING SESSION.

The Convention joined in singing "How Firm a Foundation, Ye Saints of the Lord," and was led in prayer by E. E. Bomar, of Charlotte.

An invitation from Superintendent R. M. Ivins to visit the city graded schools was read and, by special action, appreciation was expressed for the same.

The Trustees of Meredith College made the following report:

REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES OF MEREDITH COLLEGE.

The return of this anniversary of our North Carolina Baptists finds your college for women still enjoying the favor of God. One of its most cheering features, to one who observes closely the inner life of the college, is the deepening and more pervasive spirit of consecration among its students. With no trace of cant and no suppression of the natural, buoyant joy of youth, there is still evident among our young women a healthful, vigorous, religious life; and this life does not manifest itself in occasional paroxysms, but seems to be the natural product of a deep seated and permanent principle. It appears not only in the general spirit of the students and in various forms of organization, but in practical personal service.

A series of sermons recently delivered in the chapel by Bro. W. L. Walker, one of the regular evangelists of our Home Board, were marked by the absence of emotional appeals and by a clear, forcible, and discriminating statement of the fundamental doctrines of grace. They resulted in several conversions, but they also gave our students better ideals of evangelistic sermons, and clearer conceptions of the principles of our faith.

It has also been our privilege this fall to enjoy the benefits of the Sunday School Teachers' Training School of our Board in Nashville. The lectures on primary work delivered in our chapel by Miss Williams, were heard by almost the whole school, while many had the opportunity of hearing most of the lectures at the First Church by Brethren Spillman, Leavell, Moore, and Middleton and Miss Williams, and some were permitted to attend the entire course.

We have enrolled to date 360 students, representing six States and 68 counties; and the health of the college has been almost perfect. Nor have any been called home since the session opened by sickness or death at home, a fact unprecedented, we believe, in the life of the college. One case of appendicitis has appeared, requiring the subject to go home for an operation, and another girl suffered a serious burn from the explosion of an alcohol lamp in her hand. Her condition is still serious, but is hopeful.

There have been few changes in the Faculty since our last report. The college Faculty is the same as that of last session, with the exceptions of Mr. Brown, who has been excused for a year of study in Europe; Miss Poteat, who has been excused for a rest during the fall term, on account of the exacting service occasioned by the long illness and subsequent death of her mother; Miss Morris, who filled the chair of Latin, in the absence of Miss Meserve, and who is now teaching in Vassar; and Miss Pettit, who conducted the Violin Department in the absence of Mr. Hagedorn. Mr. Hagedorn, after a year of study in Europe, resumes his position as Professor of Violin, and is acting Dean of the Music School in Mr. Brown's absence, while Mrs. Hagedorn is carrying the latter's classes. Miss Meserve has returned to her work

after a year of study in Chicago. Mr. Brown is expected to take his place in April. We have been fortunate in securing Miss Heslope Purefoy in the Art Department during Miss Poteat's temporary retirement.

Last spring important changes in our organization were suggested by our Faculty and authorized by the trustees, whereby all actual college work has been absolutely separated from that of the Academy, or Preparatory school. Under this plan, no college teacher now teaches any class in preparatory work, and no preparatory teacher can teach any college class. This plan, which became effective at our opening in September, provides a distinct college course, taught only by regular Professors, Assistant Professors, and Instructors, and a thoroughly organized Academy. The Academy furnishes instruction in the first eight grades, which are taught by three teachers. This department is run for the benefit of our people in Raleigh who prefer a private school for their children, and as a feeder to the Academy proper and the college. The High School department of the Academy employs five teachers for literary subjects and music, and the entire Academy is under the direction of Miss Lucy Dickinson, a graduate of Hollins Institute, with two years at Vassar. Miss Dickinson teaches high school English. The other new teacher added to the Academy Faculty since our last report is Miss Ethel May Carroll, who teaches History, Mathematics, and Pedagogy. After graduating at Meredith, Miss Carroll taught several years in our State high schools with flattering success. The High School work of the Academy is taught in the college buildings and offers excellent advantages for students who come to us inadequately prepared for college.

It may be added that this new arrangement, with some changes resulting therefrom, will make us eligible,*as we have reason to believe, for admission to Class A of the United States Government Report on Education, a distinction now enjoyed by only four women's colleges in the South.

The entrance requirements of half a year more of Latin and Mathematics became effective this fall.

In accordance with instructions given at your last session, our Trustees have made such preparation as they could to begin the campaign for endowment at this session of the Convention. Their purpose is to raise \$150,000 in all, \$100,000 of which is to be invested as an endowment fund, and \$50,000 is to be expended on permanent improvements. After considerable correspondence with the General Education Board, of New York, covering more than a year, and an interchange of visits between some officials of that Board and the President of the College, the Board has agreed to give the College \$50,000 on condition that we raise \$100,000 and pay off all outstanding obligations. At its session this (Wednesday) afternoon, our board agreed to accept the offer under the conditions named, and also voted that the Convention be requested to order the movement launched by the taking of subscriptions tonight. The limit set for closing up the work is December 1, 1913, and it is de-

sired that as far as practical subscriptions be made payable in three annual installments.

The terms offered by the General Education Board are unusually generous, since they allow \$1 for every \$2 raised by us; whereas they generally offer one for three or four, and in one instance for six. Moreover, the Board offers to remit its proportion quarterly each year on certified statements of cash raised by us; so that prompt and regular payments will add materially to the value of the gifts of our people.

In last year's report attention was called to the dangers threatening our denominational institutions from the trend of the State's educational policies, and the spirit manifested by certain large contributors to the promotion of education in this country. Since that report was presented nothing has occurred to allay the apprehensions there expressed, but on the other hand, the tendency in the other direction has become still more marked and alarming. And conditions have arisen which make it necessary that Meredith College at least be endowed without delay.

It was voted that the Trustees of Meredith College be authorized to begin a campaign for an endowment fund for that institution of \$150,000.

R. T. Vann and J. W. Bailey made addresses and pledges for the endowment of Meredith College were made amounting to \$26,566.

The Convention adjourned after prayer by A. A. Butler.

THURSDAY—MORNING SESSION.

Devotional services were conducted by Geo. C. Cates.

W. N. Johnson, for the Committee to Consider Ways and Means of Increasing Attendance on our Annual Meetings, presented a report, which was adopted, as follows:

We recommend that the work entrusted to this committee be referred to another committee, which shall report at the next Convention after having thoroughly studied the situation.

The President appointed the same committee for this work, namely, W. N. Johnson, F. P. Hobgood, J. E. Ray, T. W. Chambliss and C. L. Greaves.

The following were recognized and given fraternal greeting: H. L. Riley, of South Carolina; V. I. Masters, of the

Home Mission Board; J. E. McManaway, of South Carolina.

F. P. Hobgood, President of the Board of Trustees of the Thomasville Orphanage, presented the following report, which was ordered printed in the Minutes:

REPORT OF TRUSTEES OF THE THOMASVILLE BAPTIST ORPHANAGE.

At the twenty-fifth mile post, we look down the road over which we have come. Reverently we bow to Him who inspired and has guarded well this undertaking. What we are today is the result of the labors of God's people working with Him "to fill that which is behind the afflictions of Christ." Thousands of lives have gone into this enterprise, making it possible for us to stand today on this vantage ground. "Other men labored and we are entered into their labors." And yet these are but the beginnings of all that is to be. More than twelve hundred children have found homes within these walls, and only He who holds the future in His hands can read the report of the one hundredth annual meeting.

The year which has just closed has been successful financially. We have no debt. No high pressure has been used. Even our distresses have not been used for collection purposes. In the main, the health of our children has been good, about our average for several years. Our smallpox scare looked serious for a while, but the first cases were the last. Most of the cases were very slight. As was explained in the papers at the time, it was brought to us by allowing some children to visit relatives in the town. It transpired that there was a case concealed in the house unknown to the town authorities. We have decided that hereafter all children shall be vaccinated as they enter. One of the victims died, but smallpox can hardly be considered even a contributing cause, as he already had a worse disease and there was no hope of his recovery. We had one other death from pneumonia.

We are glad to report that the spirit and behaviour of the children have been above the average. This as a word of encouragement to them and to you. Pastor Crutchfield is doing effective work among them and we are seeing the fruits of his labors.

The average number of children for the year was three hundred and eighty-six. Twenty-seven were returned to mothers and other relatives, two accepted positions, three went to higher schools, and two died.

The work of the school has been improved by adding a ninth grade. Effort is also making not only for higher culture, but for better industrial training to meet the needs for practical life.

The farm is in better condition than ever before. Much of the land which is used in trucking has been drained by tiling according to the most improved methods. The crops were good, more vegetables than

usual were raised. More than sixteen hundred bushels of sweet potatoes were housed. The herd of cattle is much improved and is being tested periodically by the State Veterinarian as a guard against tuberculosis. Mr. Averitt, the farmer as well as treasurer, has a valuable assistant in Mr. B. F. Crutchfield, who has special charge of the dairy and trucking features of the farm.

The new industrial building is nearing completion. The building committee estimated that the plan adopted would make it cost about nine thousand dollars, but the cost will not be less. This is being provided for by private subscriptions. About seven thousand dollars have been subscribed so far. Like the Woman's Building, this will make room for another purpose. As soon as it is ready for use, *Charity and Children* will go over into the Mills Memorial Building, which has been used for a shoe shop and planing mill. This gives these enterprises breathing space. It gives *Charity and Children* a chance to do better work, and especially to take up job work, which it has never been able to do for lack of room and equipment. It will give the shoe shop room and light, and other and varied mechanical training can be given to the boys.

No marked improvements have been made in buildings. Many minor touches have been made which do not show on the outside. The old chapel has been turned into a very convenient cottage for the assistant farmer.

Attention needs to be called to the fact that we are crowding children in our buildings too much. They are not more crowded than they have been for years, but it is becoming evident to us that smaller numbers should be in a cottage. This was the original plan, and it was the right one. Our school building is too small. At its last meeting our Board urged the need of a church building or chapel that would meet the demand for preaching. This is sorely needed. We are happy to report that the West Chowan Association has plans on foot for the erection of a building to bear its name. We hear that others are thinking of erecting buildings. Several new buildings are needed to relieve the crowded condition of the houses already occupied, as well as to admit those knocking at our doors. As it is now, it is utterly impossible to care for all who are calling for help. Those who stand at the center of this work realize the need of enlarging this work, that new dormitories are needed badly; but they have also learned that large numbers unassimilated are in danger of becoming a mob, for the lack of equipment and facilities for system and organization. Much equipment has been added and now we can safely call for more cottages.

In the meantime we desire to sound a note of warning: Too many are seeking to cast their burdens on the Orphanage. Relatives, and even mothers, many of them, are too ready to unload their children on the Orphanage. If we are to undertake the care of all these, we will have on our hands a multitude of the shiftless and the incompetent, and instead of helping we may encourage them in their worthlessness. The

Orphanage was built and is supported for the orphaned, the really needy and dependent promising child. We appeal to the pastors and leaders to stand guard in their communities and see to it that the management is not imposed upon, that only the most needy and most deserving find their way to the Thomasville Baptist Orphanage.

The report of the Committee on the Orphanage was read as follows:

REPORT ON ORPHANAGE.

Our Orphanage is closing one of the best years in its history. It has grown in its hold upon the hearts of our people.

The Orphanage is no longer considered by our people a place where charity is dispensed, but is thought of as a home for the education and training of helpless orphans. In all of the industrial features work is made to contribute toward the education of the children, training mind and hand under the best possible moral conditions.

Through all the years a kind Providence seems to have guided in the selection of the men who have directed its affairs. Never was the Orphanage more fortunate than now in its management.

The farm is being improved, modern methods of work are being employed, affording valuable training for the boys and at the same time yielding some revenue for the support of the institution.

The industrial building is nearing completion. The object of this building is to provide training for boys who have a mechanical turn of mind. When this building is completed, the Mills Memorial Building, now used for other purposes, will be turned over to *Charity and Children*, and thus furnish ample facilities for the growing business of the paper.

NEEDED IMPROVEMENTS.

1. As each of the houses is at present overcrowded, the need for more dormitories is pressing. A large number of worthy applicants are denied admittance for lack of room.

2. The present school building is entirely inadequate to the best training of the children. There are but six rooms, one of them very small, only two of which are well suited for school work.

3. An assembly hall, affording opportunity for gathering the children together in the necessary public services of the institution, should be provided.

4. Plans ought to be made for providing a course in stenography for the girls and also for instruction in instrumental music.

THE ORPHANAGE FINANCES.

The present methods of raising money for current expenses can hardly be improved upon. Your committee would urge the formation of clubs of *Charity and Children* in those Sunday Schools not now taking the

paper, and that all Sunday Schools be urged to adopt the monthly collection plan. The Thanksgiving collection is growing steadily year by year and is vital to the support of the institution.

A form of bequest is published from week to week in the columns of *Charity and Children*. We would urge those who have been entrusted with the Lord's money to remember this institution in the distribution of their property.

The report was discussed by J. A. Campbell, M. L. Kesler, Jesse McCarter, N. B. Broughton, G. T. Lumpkin, R. E. Peele and Josiah Crudup, and adopted.

Chas. E. Maddry, for the Committee on State Missions, offered the following report:

REPORT ON STATE MISSIONS.

Eighty years ago the Baptist State Convention was organized. At the first session of the Convention a Board of Managers was appointed, which is now known as the Board of Missions. They began at once to plan for the evangelization of all North Carolina. An address prepared by Meredith was sent out to the Baptists of the State, and in that address it was declared that "all missions are substantially the same," and it was further declared that "the primary object of the Convention at the present is to repair the waste places in our own State." And during the eighty years, since the first organized effort was made to evangelize North Carolina, until this time, this object has ever been before the Baptists of this State. And our work today is "to repair the waste places in our own State. The fathers in the faith wrought wisely and well. They laid the foundations broad and deep for a mighty structure. It remains for us to build upon their foundation. Will we measure up to our obligations and opportunities? Will the present effort and outlay keep pace with the demands and the needs of the North Carolina which is now in the making?

In passing let us stress anew the motive of State Missions—of all missions—missions at home and abroad. Much will be said here today of the need and demands of the North Carolina that is to be. All these are high and worthy motives. But let us remember that the one supreme, lasting motive is the imperial command of Jesus Christ. Our Lord laid out the missionary program when He said: "Ye shall be witnesses unto me both in Jerusalem and in all Judea, in Samaria and to the uttermost part of the earth." This is our marching order, and this the order of the march, "beginning at Jerusalem," and we will be false to Him until we have fully obeyed the letter of this command. Before this command, all other motives, all sacrifices, all difficulties, all selfish desires must be put away, and we must begin here today, with a solemn, awful earnestness of purpose, to lay plans for the repairing of every

waste place in the State. And the time has come when we must plan in a large, constructive way for the carrying out of these plans.

Let us also note and emphasize another statement of Mr. Meredith. In the address issued after the Greenville Convention, he declared "that all missions are substantially the same." We need to reiterate that thought over and over today. Much harm has been done by over-stressing the divisions of the work—by stressing one phase of the work to the detriment of the other. We must have these different divisions and different agencies to successfully carry on the work. But let us urge this point: That the object in evangelizing North Carolina is that the kingdom of our Lord may be hastened throughout the whole world. We believe that State Missions is just the means to a larger end—not simply and only the saving of North Carolina, but the evangelization of the whole world. We are trying to "repair the waste places" here, that through the churches planted by our endeavors in these waste places, we may in the end send out the truth to the ends of the earth. In short, we are trying to take North Carolina for Christ, that we may be the better prepared and enabled to prosecute the work to the regions beyond. If your committee understands the missionary program, this is the ultimate aim of all our agencies and institutions. We built Wake Forest College as an evangelizing agency; we established Meredith College that we might better prepare our forces for the coming of the kingdom throughout the whole world. The *Biblical Recorder* was founded and is supported today for the same end. And this is the object and aim of our State Mission work, to save North Carolina and through North Carolina redeemed give the gospel to the whole world.

And we would insist upon this truth: If we are to prosecute the work abroad in a large, constructive, statesmanlike way, we must plant and establish here in the home land a strong base of supplies. It will be the sheerest folly to turn our attention exclusively to the mission to the distance, when our own State is lying in wickedness and sin. The reflex influence may quicken and inspire in a certain way and to a certain extent, but the reflex influence will never redeem North Carolina. There is the golden mean between the two extremes, and happy it will be for North Carolina Baptists if we can speedily find this golden mean.

Our work lies before us. The past, with its noble achievement, is forever secure. But for us, the problems and the perils of the future loom large and threatening. What North Carolina has accomplished in industrialism, is hardly a prophecy of what the future holds in store for her. We have just come out of the trials and shadows of the past, and the future is rosy with promise. We tremble as we contemplate the perils of the future. We should begin here today in humility and dedication of life to God, to do the mighty work whereunto we are called.

The past year has taught us some lessons. We have trusted to hap-

hazard and impulse in our work too long already. Your committee is of the opinion that the biggest work before this Convention, is to devise and put into execution some uniform financial plan or system whereby the masses of our people may be reached and enlisted in the general work of our denomination. We realize that our supreme weakness is in the lack of some systematic plan whereby all the churches may be reached. We have the numbers and the wealth. Our people are not poor. We believe, also, that if the matter were presented to the individual churches making up this Convention, and if some uniform, systematic financial plan were devised, that there would be a liberal and surprising response. We would deem it a wise expenditure of time and money, if this financial problem could be solved.

For eighty years we have been laying the foundation. Our work has been extensive—the proclamation of a saving gospel to all men. We have been so busy in trying to give North Carolina the gospel, that we have had little time for our own intensive growth and development. The time has now come when we must turn our attention within. If we can enlist all our people in the benevolent work of our denomination, we can easily raise a million dollars a year before the end of the next decade. To be sure, we must continue the work of extensive evangelization, but our biggest work now, as a denomination, is the enlistment of all our people in the internal and intensive work of our Convention.

Some steps should be taken today to save the Board from another year of uncertainty and apprehension, and our faithful Secretary from the mental anguish and nerve-racking experience of another high-pressure campaign.

In the words of the immortal Carey: "Let us expect great things from God, and attempt great things for God."

It was voted that this Convention call special attention to the financial plan proposed by the State Mission Board, and earnestly and affectionately urge our pastors and churches to give it trial. It was further voted that the Program Committee for next year provide for a half hour discussion of financial methods.

Rev. J. W. Moore, of the local Methodist Church, was given fraternal greeting.

The Convention adjourned with benediction by T. B. Justice.

THURSDAY—AFTERNOON SESSION.

A letter was read from Dr. W. A. Therrell recommending special prayer for the evangelization of the world.

A letter from the Woman's Christian Temperance Union was referred to the Committee on Temperance Resolutions.

J. J. Hall called attention to the meeting of the World's Alliance, and it was voted that the Board of Missions be authorized to appoint as delegates brethren that may attend.

J. S. Farmer read the report of the Committee to Nominate the Board of Missions and Sunday Schools, which was adopted. (See Boards of the Convention.)

The following resolution, offered by Josiah Crudup, was adopted:

Resolved. That we raise fifty thousand dollars for State Missions and Sunday Schools this coming conventional year, and that we hereby instruct our State Board of Missions and Sunday Schools to lay out our State Mission work on that basis.

J. H. Tucker, for the Committee on Place and Preachers for the next Convention, presented its report, which was adopted:

Your Committee on Place and Preachers report Brown Memorial, of Winston-Salem as the place of next Convention. Preacher, Rev. C. L. Greaves, of First Church of New Bern: alternate, Rev. W. R. L. Smith, of Chapel Hill.

The following resolution was presented by J. J. Hall and adopted:

Resolved. That we hear with pleasure of the increased patronage and efficiency of Oxford Seminary, which is now in the sixtieth year of a highly honorable and useful career.

L. Johnson presented the following, which was adopted:

We rejoice greatly in the success which has attended the efforts to raise our part of the six hundred thousand dollars permanent endowment of the Southern Baptist Theological Seminary, and heartily commend the work until it shall be completed, which the agents tell us will be done by May 1, 1911.

A resolution as follows was adopted:

WHEREAS, the First Baptist Church of New Bern, N. C., was denied the use of its house of worship from October 10, 1862 to May 10, 1865, by reason of its use and occupancy by the military authorities of the United States during the whole of that period; and

WHEREAS, the Court of Claims has investigated the matter and found the facts as above and has recommended to Congress the payment to the said church a fair rental for the period of its occupancy:

Resolved by the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina, assembled in its 80th annual session, that it is the sense of this Convention that the payment of this claim will be but a simple act of justice, the claim being thoroughly honest and equitable, and that this Convention petition the Congress to pass the bill introduced in the Senate by Hon. F. M. Simmons and in the House of Representatives by Hon. C. R. Thomas to carry out the recommendation of the Court of Claims in the said matter.

T. W. Chambliss, for the Committee to Nominate the Board of Education, made its report, which was adopted. (See Boards of the Convention.)

The report on the *Biblical Recorder* was presented.

REPORT ON BIBLICAL RECORDER.

Your committee congratulates the Convention upon the fact that the *Biblical Recorder* is set apart for separate consideration. As organ of the Convention, it has a peculiar and distinct work, not to be performed by any other publication; and this separate consideration should serve to make more emphatic the Convention's conceptions of the *Recorder's* peculiar work and mission.

As a newspaper the *Recorder* has the ordinary functions of a religious journal to perform—that of furnishing our Baptist people with edifying reading matter and news of the coming kingdom. It is performing this function admirably. Its readers can not but grow in grace. The homes into which it comes can not but be better for its coming.

But it is not simply as a religious newspaper that your committee would present the *Recorder* to this Convention. We wish to point out the features of its work and mission as organ. The *Recorder* has for nearly four score years been the organ of this Convention's work. That is to say, it is the connectional agency by means of which the full force of our denomination is brought to the support of our enterprises. Our institutions, our missionary work, our projects in the intense progress are thus kept before our people. This is indispensable to our denominational welfare.

Again, the *Recorder* as organ is the voice of defense for our institutions. If attacked, or if untoward policies are threatened by others,

by means of the *Biblical Recorder* our people are called to arms, and their will is declared. Without such a protective agency, we do not believe that our institutions would be safe.

It is likewise the voice of our moral and social ideals.

And, finally, the *Recorder* as organ voices those principles and doctrines which have identified our people as a peculiar people. Without such a means of common utterance, obviously our denominational integrity could not be maintained a decade.

The *Biblical Recorder*, then, is our great source of unity and intelligence, our voice of defense and of progress. In all its history—rich with the record of faithful service—it has never been more effectual, more prosperous, more faithful or more worthy than it now is. Editor Moore and Manager Farmer are doing magnificent work, and the Board of Directors with them deserve our most hearty thanks.

The circulation of the *Recorder* is growing. But there are many homes into which it should be put. We urge our pastors to make a point of discovering such homes and of endeavoring to put the *Recorder* into them. A thirty-day campaign to this end throughout our State would be as wise a thing as could be done. It should result in the addition of one thousand homes to the *Recorder* list: and we respectfully recommend that this Convention suggest to our churches that such a campaign be immediately undertaken.

S. F. Conrad presented the following report for the Committee on Temperance Resolutions, which, after discussion by S. F. Conrad and J. C. Midyett, was adopted.

We, the delegates to the eightieth annual Convention of the North Carolina Baptists, representing a constituency of two hundred and twenty thousand, do hereby reaffirm our faith in constitutional prohibition, and rejoice that in the recent election throughout the State the people gave no indication of a purpose to go back to the dispensary or the saloon.

As Baptists, ever jealous of the educational, moral and religious welfare of all the youth of the State, we deplore the fact that the Legislature has made legal the sale of near beer, and the consequent partial re-establishment of the saloon. We therefore petition the Legislature about to assemble to forbid the sale of near beer, or any similar drink that induces the use of intoxicants; we also call for a law that will prohibit the keeping for use of any intoxicating liquors by clubs, whether they be under business, fraternal or social names.

In view of the demoralization that is coming to large numbers of our youth and fellow-citizens because of the methods and practices made possible by intoxicants being shipped into the State from cities in Virginia and other States, we hereby strongly affirm our belief in the fundamental principle that the United States Government has no moral right, and therefore should not have the legal power, to allow any article to be carried into any State whose Legislature has forbidden the manufacture or sale of or giving away of said article, provided exception is made of liquors in transit to some other State or States, and provided further exception is made of liquors to be used in the State for medicinal, mechanical or scientific purposes, and as provided by the laws of the State.

We believe further that pardons should rarely if ever be granted to convicted violators of our liquor laws.

We also heartily commend to our people the work as being done by the Anti-saloon League and its field secretary, Rev. R. L. Davis, in

keeping before our people the work of suppressing the liquor traffic in all of its forms, and in opposing every effort to bring back into the State distilleries and the licensed saloon. We urge our people to extend to it their hearty co-operation and to be vigilant in opposing every encroachment of the organized liquor traffic to destroy prohibition in our State.

The Secretary of this Convention is hereby authorized and directed to send a copy of these resolutions, over his official signature, to the following parties: His Excellency, the Governor of North Carolina, and the remaining State officials; the members of both branches of the incoming Legislature; the President and the Vice-President of the United States; each member and member-elect of the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States.

The Trustees of Wake Forest College presented the following report, which was ordered printed in the minutes:

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF WAKE FOREST COLLEGE TO THE BAPTIST STATE CONVENTION, DECEMBER 8, 1910.

Under the Divine blessing, the work which this Convention begun at Wake Forest nearly seventy-seven years ago has been maintained during

the past year with good success. At a number of points distinct advance has been made, and the Board of Trustees are grateful to the Convention for the opportunity of presenting here the year's record.

Interest centers in the students of the college. A larger number have entered the present session than ever before, the total enrollment standing at this date at 375, of whom 67 are ministers and 3 medical missionaries. Their spirit and work as a body are fine. There has been less serious trouble with any of them than in many years past. The College Pastor reports that the religious tone of the institution is firm, and the various agencies which minister to the religious life of the students are doing excellent work. Dr. W. C. Tyree conducted a helpful series of meetings in the college, October 3 to October 14. Room was made in the daily schedule for two sermons a day, and the faculty did not consider that the proper work of the college was in any sense displaced or interfered with by that arrangement. Dr. Tyree preached with simplicity, earnestness and great power of direct appeal. The health of the students is cared for by two college physicians, with a well-equipped hospital in charge of a trained nurse, and by a gymnasium in which regular work is required of all students. The fall term has been remarkably free from serious illness.

The Convention will be pleased to know that at the last annual meeting of the board the salaries of the professors were increased and two chairs were added to the sixteen already established—a professorship of English Language and a professorship of Physiology. Dr. Edward Payson Morton, of the University of Indiana, was appointed to the English position for the present session, and Dr. W. T. Carstarphen, a Wake Forest graduate and practicing physician, was appointed to the position in the department of medicine. Besides the extension and improvement in the courses of these departments made possible by the strengthening of their faculties, a full year has been added in Latin, and a course in Engineering. In the catalogue issued in April last the faculty announced a general reorganization of the courses leading to the B.A. and B.S. degrees. The new plan of studies is believed to restrict the abuse of the elective system, bring the college course into closer relation with the life career, and import into the entire work of the student the interest and value of the life-career motive. The Wake Forest Law School is recognized as the largest and most successful in the State. The School of Medicine, giving only the first two years of the medical course, has, during the past year, been commended by the highest authority in that matter in a way greatly to gratify the friends of the institution. We report, moreover, important progress in the closer articulation of the college courses with those of the high schools and academies of the State. Meredith College and Wake Forest College agree upon practically identical entrance requirements.

The resources of the college have been notably enlarged since our last report to the Convention. Collections on the new endowment fund have progressed throughout the year. From December 1, 1909, to December

3, 1910, the aggregate, without the pro rata contribution of the General Education Board, \$21,526.88. When gift of the General Education Board is added, the amount becomes \$28,702.50. The panic of 1907 greatly enhanced the labor of rounding up the subscriptions to the \$150,000 endowment fund, and pushed the payment of the larger part of them down into 1910, and very many into the last month when payment could be made. And so it turns out that a large amount remains yet to be paid before December 31st. This great movement may still be carried forward to complete success, if all the friends of the college unite in practical consecration to this worthy end.

W. L. Poteat, President of Wake Forest College, addressed the Convention in behalf of that institution. On motion of G. T. Lumpkin, request was made for the publication of this address in the *Biblical Recorder*.

The following preamble and resolution were adopted:

WHEREAS, We learn that an effort will be made to have the next Legislature pass a bill providing for a large bond issue for the benefit of the State colleges; and

WHEREAS, We do not oppose a reasonable appropriation for the support of these institutions; but,

WHEREAS, They are now receiving liberal appropriations, amounting to one hundred and seventy-nine dollars per pupil, while the common schools receive but four dollars per pupil; and,

WHEREAS, The denominational colleges, which are educating twice as many young men and women as the State colleges, are forced to increase their endowments to meet the competition created by the present appropriations to the State colleges; and,

WHEREAS, The large appropriations to these State institutions, made possible by a bond issue, would seriously cripple our denominational colleges; therefore,

Resolved. That we, delegates to the Baptist State Convention, a body representing 224,000 Baptists, do most earnestly protest against any abnormally large appropriations such as would certainly follow a bond issue.

W. M. Vines presented the following report on Home Missions:

REPORT ON HOME MISSIONS.

The work of our Home Mission Board is fundamental. This statement will be fully sustained when we consider the following incontrovertible facts: The hope of the world is Christianity. "For there is

none other name under heaven given among men whereby we must be saved." The Foreign Mission enterprise is the divine method of giving Christianity to a lost and perishing world. The structure of Foreign Missions rests upon two mighty pillars—the salvation of America and the work of Home Missions. But in the last analysis the salvation of America rests upon the enterprise of Home Missions. These assertions are manifestly true, and if so, then the work of Home Missions is second to no other enterprise which should enlist the support of our churches.

Upon the Home Mission Board press some of the profoundest questions of our time for solution. The outlook of Home Missions is an outlook upon work that needs to be done, *and to be done immediately*, for if it is not done now it can never be done. No matter what direction the view, whether Panama, Cuba, Isle of Pines, the negro population, the foreign population, our cities, our farms and villages, our mountains, what is seen is a mighty work. The field of labor, instead of getting smaller, is growing larger. As our land grows in numbers, in wealth, in intelligence, the pressure of the work becomes the greater. More work needs to be done in our cities than ever before; more work among the mountain population, more work in the country and villages. *Four gigantic forces* are uniting to hinder, and if they themselves are not defeated and overthrown they will successfully resist the advancement and triumph of our cause in our great cities: the American saloon; the Roman Catholic Church; the invasion of foreign immigration; and perhaps greatest of all the indifference of evangelical Christians.

The divine program of missions, as announced by our Lord after His resurrection and before His ascension, was cosmopolitan. This scheme as outlined by the Saviour took in the entire world. The very nature of the case as well as His command and the example of the apostles, made this world vision include the lost who were near as well as those who were far away. To use His own sacred words: "All power is given unto Me in heaven and in earth." (Matt. 28:18.) "Go ye into all the world and preach the gospel to every creature" (Mark 16:15) "beginning at Jerusalem" (Luke 24:47) "and, lo, I am with you always, even unto the end of the age." Our Jerusalem and Judea and Samaria are in the United States. Out of about 90,000,000 population in the United States, there are only about 20,000,000 members of evangelical denominations, and of this number something over 5,000,000 are Baptists. Are we not too much neglecting our Jerusalem, Judea and Samaria? The situation in the South is more favorable, but even the South can not be claimed as a Christian country. Thirty-one per cent of the people of the South are members of evangelical churches, six per cent are members of the Roman Catholic Church, and sixty-three per cent are not members of any church. As long as fifty-eight persons out of every ninety in the United States are not church members, we can not

call this a Christian nation, and as long as sixty-three persons out of every one hundred in the South are not members of any church whatsoever, we can not say that the South is evangelized.

Have our churches the unselfish Christian love and consecration to take hold of the crying needs of the submerged and neglected on the one hand, and of the pleasure seekers and money-mad on the other? The world is asking whether we have a gospel that is strong enough to command the hearts and lives of sin-buffeted men, and bring the harmony of love where now abides the discord of hate and selfish greed. Alien immigrants flock to our shores at the rate of a million a year, and perhaps two millions more of our own people each year are uprooted from their environment and brought together in new relations in new towns, and on the frontier. In these people movements is at once a great problem and an unvoiced cry that ascends up before God for a gospel that will bring order out of chaos and replace the selfish hardness and barrenness of sin with good citizenship and brotherly love. The Christian denominations of America are awakening to the magnitude of these problems and others not here mentioned. They are turning with an encouraging unanimity to *Home Missions as the means whereby such problems must be solved*. Southern Baptists must take a large part in saving the lost of America. We hold a gospel in its purity. Since we have so much to give in making good Americans, while at the same time we make Christians, we are under deeper obligation to do large things. Because we are more numerous than any other Christian body in the South, our obligation is greater than any other. Here in America is being fought out the titanic struggle of the ages. Here sin in all its forms is gathering and correlating its forces for a terrific and final assault upon the Christian church. Verily, in the language of another, "Here beats the fevered heart of modern civilization, and he who wins that heart holds the key to the centuries." A brief reference to the glorious work of our Home Mission Board shows that during its history over 5,000 churches have been established other. Here in America is being fought out the titanic struggle of our missionaries have resulted in more than 300,000 additions to our churches. The board last year reported 27,426 baptisms and 52,910 additions to our churches through the labors of missionaries supported wholly or in part by it. God has blessed the labors of the missionaries of our Home Board to far larger fruitage than that shown by the reports of similar mission boards. *No mission board in the world has reported results one-half as large as these. No home mission board in America, so far as we can find, had results more than one-third as large, though several expended four times as much in the work.* Our people are becoming aroused to the large importance of Home Missions, and each year the Home Board receipts are larger. This year the Southern Baptist Convention is asking for \$400,000 to be raised for the work of the Home Board. Of this amount \$26,000 is apportioned to our State. Of this amount only \$2,237 had been given up to November 15th. We

ought to raise every cent of it and more. Our Home Board in all its departments of work deserves and should receive the hearty co-operation of all our churches. Let us unreservedly and enthusiastically support the Home Board as never before, with our sympathy, with our prayers, and with our money.

Your committee recommends:

1. That our pastors be requested to make an earnest effort at least once during the year to preach a special sermon on Home Missions, and the magnitude and importance of the problems involved.

2. That each of our churches during the year make at least one liberal offering for this work.

3. That a club of subscribers be raised in each church for the *Home Field*, the unusually attractive and illuminating monthly magazine of the Home Board.

4. That churches and pastors be encouraged to make a large use of the Home Board's informing tracts and sample copies of the *Home Field*, both of which are free for the asking.

After addresses by V. I. Masters and W. M. Vines, the report was adopted.

Request was made that the address of Bro. Vines be furnished for publication in the *Biblical Recorder*.

Dr. A. J. Vining, representing the Baptist World Alliance, delivered a thrilling address on "Religious Unrest in Europe." In connection with this address the following resolution was presented and adopted:

Resolved, That we express our hearty approval of the plan to establish and endow a European Baptist college at the earliest possible moment, and recommend that our churches arrange for and urge a collection for this noble enterprise within the next twelve months—and if possible before June 1, 1911, in an effort to raise \$25,000 as North Carolina's share of the amount required from the South. That our Board of Missions and Sunday Schools is hereby requested to devise such means as they may deem best for carrying this recommendation into effect.

It was voted that the work of the Convention be concluded Friday morning.

B. W. Spilman, for the Committee on the Baptist Young People's Union, presented the report as follows: .

REPORT OF COMMITTEE TO WHOM WAS REFERRED THE BAPTIST YOUNG PEOPLE'S UNION WORK.

We report as follows:

1. A State Baptist Young People's Union was organized in Durham, the convention being held with the Second Baptist Church, July 21-23.
2. The Sunday School Board of the Southern Baptist Convention very kindly gave to us the services of Brother Arthur Flake, its Field Secretary for Baptist Young People's Work east of the Mississippi River.
3. The State Union elected an Executive Committee, to whom the work was committed.
4. A Convention is to be held in Statesville, April 18-20, 1911.
5. Brother Flake is to take a tour of our State in the interest of Baptist Young People's Work during the coming spring.

FRIDAY—MORNING SESSION.

The Convention was led in its devotions by Burton A. Hall, of Texas.

The reading of the minutes was dispensed with.

The following resolution was heartily adopted:

Resolved, That the thanks of this Convention be most heartily extended to the Baptists of Hendersonville and to the friends of other denominations for their superb entertainment during this Convention; to the county officers for the use of the court-house for the meeting; and to the local and State papers for their excellent reports of the sessions.

It was voted that the Secretaries be instructed to issue a sufficient number of minutes of this Convention, and that the Secretaries of the Convention receive the usual compensation for their services.

The following resolutions were offered and adopted:

Resolved, 1, That a committee of three, consisting of F. P. Hobgood, C. E. Brewer and N. B. Broughton, be appointed who shall compose a Central Committee on the Laymen's Movement.

Resolved, 2, That this committee be given power to select seven others who with the Central Committee shall compose the General Committee on the Laymen's Movement.

Resolved, 3, That the Committee on Laymen's Movement shall cooperate with the Board of Missions and Sunday Schools, and the work of the committee, as all our mission work, shall be under the general direction of the Board of Missions and Sunday Schools.

F. P. Hobgood offered the following, which was adopted:

Resolved, That the Board of Missions, in co-operation with the Laymen's Missionary Committee, be instructed to call a Laymen's Convention, the place, time and program to be determined by them, representatives to go at their own charges.

F. P. Hobgood and J. H. Tucker made addresses on the Laymen's Movement.

The following report on Ministerial Education was presented and, after discussion by T. W. Chambliss and W. R. Cullom, was adopted:

REPORT ON MINISTERIAL EDUCATION.

This Convention recognizes the call to the ministry as the highest possible call from God to man, and we realize the urgent need today of God-called men to carry on the work of the kingdom. From the report of the Board of Education it appears that a smaller number of men were students for the ministry the past year in our college and seminary. The need is greater than ever before.

When men have been called of God to preach the gospel, it behooves them to achieve the highest possible equipment for service. The importance of the mission together with the demand of the time should lead us to insist upon training in both mind and method.

The demands upon the Board of Ministerial Education are greater than ever before because of the fact that the demands upon the preacher are greater. The improved educational conditions of our people call for a well-equipped minister, and in many instances the God-called men are men of meagre means, and it is our privilege as well as duty to aid them in acquiring the equipment necessary for the best work.

We suggest that the Convention recommend:

1. That our churches and Woman's Missionary Societies arrange for special services of prayer, pleading with God that He may call more men into the work.

2. That the Sunday Schools of the State continue to give one Sunday's contributions to the work of Ministerial Education—the Sunday to be designated by the Board.

3. That the Board of Education be requested to consider some plan for the employment of ministerial students in missionary and evangelistic service during the vacation period.

4. That the board be requested to arrange, as far as practicable, for its Corresponding Secretary to present the claims of the ministry before the students in our schools.

T. W. CHAMBLISS.

II. C. Moore presented the following report on Baptist Secondary Schools:

REPORT OF SECONDARY SCHOOL BOARD.

It gives us great pleasure to lay before the Convention the report of our Educational Secretary for the past year. We desire to emphasize the great importance of this department of our work; the energy, wisdom and efficiency of our secretary; the marked success which has already been achieved; and the opportunity, the need, and the outlook of our secondary schools.

We would with much gratification call attention to the funds that have been raised during the year for the equipment of these schools; the spiritual influence and power of these schools as shown in conversions, calls to ministry, and offers for the foreign field on the part of their students; the fact that our schools are proving a first-rate agency for the development of Christian workers in our churches; the co-operation of our educational forces and the masses of our people in building up this work; and the readiness of our people in every part of our State to be enlisted in behalf of our schools.

We would urge upon our churches the denominational value of our schools, the splendid returns from our investment in them, and the necessity of our united loyalty and liberality in order to their efficiency and to our denominational development. And to this end we bespeak for our secretary the continued hearty sympathy and co-operation of all our people in the prosecution of the great work committed to his hands.

We submit below Bro. Lineberry's report for the year.

HIGHT C. MOORE,

From the beginning of the Convention year until Christmas aid was given Wake Forest College in collecting endowment except three days, which were spent aiding Brother J. A. Campbell in raising \$4,000 for a dormitory at Buie's Creek.

January was spent in the interest of Boiling Springs High School. Their debt of \$16,951 had been apportioned out by the Kings Mountain and Sandy Run associations among their churches. Forty-five of these were visited and most of them accepted their apportionment and arranged to make payments.

Aid in collecting Wake Forest endowment was given in February.

In March \$6,650 was arranged for a new school building at Wingate.

A part of April and the first of May was spent in securing \$755 more on the Winterville High School debt, making up \$3,749.63 of the \$4,000 needed.

Beginning May 21st, two weeks time was given to Fruitland Institute, securing funds for the new dormitory for girls, which was built in the summer at a cost of about \$4,000. A large part of the funds, however, was arranged last year.

The Home Mission Board had offered Haywood Institute \$1,000 if they would raise \$1,000, for improving their school building. In a twelve-day canvass about \$600 was pledged.

Mars Hill had a debt of \$4,000, but by the wise planning of the principal and the ready assistance and liberal aid of the trustees, the entire amount was raised in cash and notes in one week.

A campaign was started in Yancey County to arrange for a debt of \$1,750 and \$750 for improvement, but it was such a busy season with the farmers that it was thought best to arrange at some more convenient time, so only a small amount was raised.

August and parts of September, October and November were given to Liberty-Piedmont Institute. Of their debt of \$14,000 about \$5,000 was arranged on condition that the entire amount be raised.

Fifteen associations were attended. Several of these united this year with the schools nearest them, others appointed committees pending action next year.

In our system of schools are three colleges: Wake Forest, Meredith, and Chowan, and thirteen academies: Boiling Springs, Dell, Fruitland Institute, Mars Hill, Haywood Institute, Liberty-Piedmont Institute, Mitchell, Murphy, Round Hill, Sylva, Winterville, Wingate, and Yancey. Invested in these is \$1,225,213.

South Fork Institute, with property valued at \$15,500, is under control of the denomination.

Oxford Seminary, Buie's Creek, Leaksville-Spray, and Salemberg are under private Baptist ownership. The property of these schools is valued at \$95,000.

During the year, \$17,426 has been paid on the indebtedness of our academies. There is still due \$51,453. Of this amount \$31,311.88 is secured by notes and subscriptions. We also have \$8,700 subscribed for new buildings and improvements.

Enrolled in our colleges and academies last year were 3,611 students. Of these, 135 were ministerial students and 22 expected to be missionaries.

Last year there were reported in our academies 142 conversions, 125 of whom were added to our churches. So far, during this session, 238 conversions and 190 accessions to our churches.

Wake Forest and Meredith Colleges are arranging uniform entrance requirements. We hope that our academies will adopt this year a uniform course of study to meet these requirements.

The remaining indebtedness on these institutions should be met as soon as possible, and new buildings promptly arranged for some and better equipments for all.

The sections visited have shown great interest in our work, and we hope soon to see every section of the State thoroughly enlisted in this important feature of our denominational work.

K. W. Cawthon, for the Committee on Woman's Work, reported as follows:

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON WOMAN'S WORK.

From the beginning of the new dispensation the hearts of women have responded to the calls of our Lord. They are always in the forefront of every good work. Woman's work includes not only the work they do locally in behalf of the different forms of missionary activity, but in the local work of the church they hold up the pastor's hands and engage in various forms of benevolence. We thank God for our Christian women. The various reports of the organized work of women throughout the State show that they continue to make progress. New societies are organized, and the efficiency of those already organized is constantly increased. Reports of the Woman's Central Committee, Young Women's Auxiliaries, Sunbeam Bands, and the Royal Ambassadors show that many are busy and successful in our Master's work. Those pastors are wise who encourage and help in every way these splendid organizations.

STATISTICAL SUMMARY

In making this summary of facts regarding the activities of our denomination, I wish to thank clerks, pastors, and others for their assistance. In handling the thousands of numbers, surely some errors have crept in, but I believe most of the statements are correct as far as information furnished would do this.

There are fewer approximations than last year, and of course this makes the tables more accurate. All understand that we use the associational minutes. The Associations meet in every month from May to December except in June. Of course the associational years ending at different times, it is impossible to make the amounts for any object agree with the receipts of Treasurer Durham.

AGGREGATES.

Of the 1,904 churches reported, membership is reported from 1,872, with a total membership of 221,518. This is a gain of only 3,551; but one error last year in one association makes the real gain 7,219. There are 32 churches not reporting membership. If they are average churches in membership, they have 3,776 members. We have, then, in the Convention 225,354 church members. Baptisms are reported from 1,297 churches. This is 149 fewer churches having baptisms than last year. It is a sad fact that 607 churches report no baptisms. There were 12,269 baptisms during last year. This is a loss of 483.

The contributions reported to the associations were as follows: State Missions, \$39,268.70; Home Missions, \$23,143.72; Foreign Missions, \$38,597.52; Sunday School Missions, \$2,001.87; Orphanage, \$36,406.30; Ministerial Education, \$5,999.63; Aged Ministers, \$4,849.11; total, \$150,250.11.

CONTRIBUTING AND NON-CONTRIBUTING CHURCHES.

In the following summary the first number is the churches contributing and the last those not contributing: To some object, 1,644—260; to State Missions, 1,428—476; to Home Missions, 1,272—632; to Foreign Missions, 1,380—524; to Sunday School Missions, 547—1,447; to Orphanage, 1,401—503; to Ministerial Education, 668—1,236; to Aged Ministers, 851—1,053.

Sunday School membership to church membership on 100 as a base—Piedmont, 124; Buncombe, 118. Per capita contributions—Roanoke, \$1.88; Central, \$1.47. Contributions to State Missions—Roanoke, \$3,306.84; West Chowan, \$2,499.35. Home Missions—West Chowan, \$1,765.38; Mt. Zion, \$1,313.46. Foreign Missions—Mt. Zion, \$2,524.22; West Chowan, \$2,412.87. Sunday School Missions—Mt. Zion, \$304.17; Neuse-Atlantic, \$153.58. Orphanage—Roanoke, \$3,136.16; West Chowan, \$3,030.17; Ministerial Education—Pilot Mountain, \$1,106.89; Mt. Zion, \$445.24. Ministerial Relief—King's Mountain, \$576.50; Mt. Zion, \$472.16. PER CAPITA CONTRIBUTIONS.

For all objects the per capita is 68 cents, a gain of 5 cents. Eleven associations gave over \$1.00 per member, as follows: Roanoke, \$1.88; Central, \$1.47; Buncombe, \$1.34; Neuse-Atlantic, \$1.32; Mecklenburg-Cabarrus, \$1.29; Mt. Zion, \$1.29; Piedmont, \$1.29; Raleigh, \$1.29; Robeson, \$1.29; Pee Dee, \$1.19; Pilot Mountain, \$1.03. From 75 cents to \$1.00, alphabetically, Beulah, 79 cents; Eastern, 81 cents; Flat River, 98 cents; Little River, 85 cents; South Yadkin, 94 cents; Wilmington, 89 cents; West Chowan, 88 cents.

OTHER AVERAGES.

Of the 1,872 churches reporting membership, the average is 118 members; of the 1,297 reporting baptisms, the average is nearly 10. The average members for one baptism is 18. Of the contributing churches, the average is as follows: State Missions, \$27.48; Home Missions, \$18.19; Foreign Missions, \$27.97; Sunday School Missions, \$4.38; Orphanage, \$25.98; Ministerial Education, \$8.98; Ministerial Relief, \$5.70; all objects, \$91.33.

SUNDAY SCHOOLS.

Many associations do not use regular denominational church letters, and in this way Sunday School reports are not complete. This year we have used in our Sunday School work over one thousand letters and return post cards. So our report is nearer accurate than ever before. We now have 1,809 schools, which is a gain of 128 this year. Of these 119 are branch or mission schools. This leaves 214 churches not reporting Sunday Schools. There are now 166,636 enrolled, including 13,059 officers and teachers. This is a gain of 13,172—more than double last year's gain. The ratio of Sunday School membership to church membership is 75 on 100 as a base. Twenty-seven associations equal or exceed this ratio. Five hundred and five churches have a larger Sunday School enrollment than church membership. This is true in the Buncombe, Mecklenburg-Cabarrus, Neuse-Atlantic, Piedmont, Raleigh, Roanoke and Stone Mountain Associations. The number of perennial schools is increasing, but there was no data on this point in twelve associations.

WOMAN'S WORK.

There are now 1,078 societies (including Woman's Missionary Societies, Young Women's Auxiliaries, Sunbeams, and Royal Ambassadors). These are in 49 associations, and in 43 associations there are vice-presidents to direct and advance the work. West Chowan leads with 75 societies; Robeson now counts 60, and Mt. Zion 53.

The contributions for 1909-1910 amounted to \$30,002.16. Mt. Zion leads with \$2,568.57; Central standing next with \$1,993.86. The following associations contributed more than \$1,000.00: Robeson, \$1,804.65; Piedmont, \$1,798.08; West Chowan, \$1,693.79; Buncombe, \$1,587.06; Mecklenburg-Cabarrus, \$1,464.56; Roanoke, \$1,433.97; Neuse-Atlantic, \$1,299.56; Raleigh, \$1,291.07; Chowan, \$1,237.50; South Fork, \$1,000.94.

BAPTIST SCHOOLS AND COLLEGES.

There are 23 colleges and schools in the Convention under denominational influence. Three secondary schools are closed. Thirteen under denominational control are open and three under private control are also open. The denomination owns and controls three colleges and one college is under private control. In these institutions under denominational control, last school year there were enrolled 3,237 pupils, with 67 male teachers and 89 female. The value of land, buildings, equipment, endowment, etc., is \$1,180,003.

GAINS.

During the last year we have gained as follows: Churches, 5; church members, 7,219; Sunday Schools, 128; Sunday School enrollment, 13,172; officers and teachers, 943; Woman's Societies, 97; contributing churches, 12; contributions to State Missions, \$3,195.80; Home Missions, \$2,110.50; Foreign Missions, \$1,328.85; Sunday School Missions, a gain in association reports and a loss with Treasurer Durham's report; Orphanage, \$3,817.96; Ministerial Education, \$1,335.37; Ministerial Relief, \$1,099.87; all objects, \$13,364.78.
