

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

Included with this supplement is an annual report on the partially self-liquidating dormitory at Eastern, Lincoln-Douglas Halls. We are particularly pleased to call the attention of the Finance Committee of the Board to the net profit of \$42,305.05

on June 30, 1955, as compared with \$22,909.31 for the previous fiscal year.

VIII. STUDENT LIFE

Late in the college year 1954-55, the Sigma Kappa, national social sorority, established a colony among the women students at Eastern. This group will bring to four the number of national sororities.

IX. MISCELLANEOUS

A. Prospective Enrollment for 1955-56

As of July 7, Eastern has issued 314 permits to register to prospective freshmen and transfer students. One year ago this number was 270, and two years ago 143. This prospective enrollment is a 16.29% increase over one year ago.

Registration in September 1954 produced 767 new students (freshmen and transfers) and 753 upper classmen. Preregistration (May 1955) gave 1117 upper classmen for next year (569 sophomores, 337 juniors and 211 seniors). This 1117 will probably drop 10% to roughly 1,000 when college opens in September, but even then will be roughly a 250 increase over one year ago. The heavy sophomore enrollment is causing many classes to be completely or even over-registered for next year. The college registrar estimates an enrollment of 1850 for next year.

I ATTENDANCE

A. Complete data on enrollments in the 1955 summer sessions are not as yet available. However, it is a pleasure to report that a total of 1359 students have registered for the eight weeks session on the campus. This is an increase of 20.9% over the comparable figure for the 1954 summer session. A complete analysis of 1955 summer enrollments will be presented in the next report to the Board.

B. As of July 2, permits issued to new students for the opening of the fall semester are 26% ahead of those issued on the corresponding date in 1954.

V. THE CURRICULUM

As a result of more than two years of concentrated study of the curriculum, the faculty Curriculum Committee at its meeting on May 26, 1955 passed a motion recommending to the Acting President, "that he consider making available an adequate staff (including at least one full-time person) to study, to formulate, and to present an acceptable plan for curriculum reorganization by the end of the 1955-1956 school year in order to publish it in the 1957 catalog." The committee further stated that, "it is the consensus of the committee that a group comparable to that which studied curriculum reorganization at Iowa State Teachers College be set up (it included one full-time and eight half-time persons), and furnished with adequate clerical staff; that the work be started this summer, if possible, but not later than September 1955; and that the possibility of a full-time off-campus director be considered, if it is thought desirable."

On February 14, 1955, we presented to the Board, "A Report to the Teachers College Board on Some Aspects of the Educational Program," devoting about one-third to curriculum problems. In that report it is indicated that "one of the problems in curriculum work is the amount of time involved for the persons assuming leadership. Most of the work now being done

represents an addition to the regular teaching load. Some other universities have found it necessary to release at least one person from routine teaching in order to carry through a curriculum revision project effectively. This procedure is strongly recommended. It is difficult to follow in a period of rapid student growth unless there is some expansion in staff. However, it must be pointed out that curriculum improvement may be the most important responsibility any faculty has."

It is now recommended that authorization be given for the appointment of a full-time faculty member and not more than two half-time faculty members to assume leadership as outlined in the suggestion of the Curriculum Committee, and that necessary substitutes be appointed to teach classes left without instructors during the 1955-1956 school year.

VI. BUILDINGS AND GROUNDS

A. Naming of New Classroom Building

It is recommended that the new classroom building be named Schroeder Hall in honor of H. H. Schroeder, a member of our faculty from 1913 to 1943. Mr. Schroeder was Dean of the University from 1928 until his retirement in 1943. He was recognized by our faculty as an outstanding scholar and teacher. He served as Acting President of the University at two different times. This recommendation is supported by the University Committee on Campus Planning, Building Construction and Utilization, and by the University Council. We are making the request at this time in order that the architects may include the name of the building in their plans.

B. Progress on Walker Hall

On June 23 a meeting with the architects and contractors for Walker Hall was held. It was pointed out that the University will require the use of all student bedrooms, house directors' suites, kitchen, and dining room by September 11. Consequently, the work in these areas shall take precedence over that in other parts of the building, and if any work is unfinished by the above mentioned date, it shall be in the lobby, recreation rooms, lounge, and "common" rooms on the first floor.

As of June 30, the architects report that Walker Hall is approximately 75% completed.

On July 6, a second meeting was held to check on progress and make necessary revisions in work schedule.

C. Progress on Student Union Building

As of June 30 the architects report that the Union Building is 15% completed.

VII. AUXILIARY ENTERPRISES

No report.

VIII. STUDENT LIFE

- A. As a joint project, the Women's League and the University Club contributed \$553.06 to place the clock bell from Old Main in a prominent location on the campus. The bell is attractively placed on the campus and appropriately marked. It was rung to open the commencement exercised on June 11.
- B. As of July 2, permits issued to new students for the opening of the fall semester are 26% ahead of those issued on the corresponding date in 1954.

IX. MISCELLANEOUS

A. Food Service Employees

- 1. With the opening of Walker Hall in September the Food Service will be serving over 3500 meals per day, in addition to the operation of The Cage. The possible opening of the Student Union Building by early 1957 will increase the demands upon the service. It is recommended that effective September 1, 1955, there be established the position of Assistant Director of Food Service. The creation and filling of this position at an early date will improve the quality of our food service through better supervision of employees.
- 2. To staff the Food Service facilities of Walker Hall, it is recommended that there be created effective September 1, 1955, the following positions:
 - (1) Food Production Manager
 - (2) Four Cooks
 - (3) Three Cook's Helpers

B. Purchases

1. Through the cooperation of the Central Office the 1946 Buick owned by them was transferred to I.S.N.U. to be used as a trade-in on the purchase of a new Plymouth Plaza 6, 2-Door Club Sedan. Bids were taken, as listed below, and submitted to the Advisory Committee for approval, since this purchase was to be made from 68th Biennium funds. Approval was given by all members of the Advisory Committee and the purchase order was issued to the low bidder, C. W. Frey and Sons of Bloomington, Illinois.

2. Student Union Building

After the last meeting of the Teachers College Board, Mr. Summers, Mr. Walker and Mr. Ropp met with the architects in an attempt to solve the water problem which has developed at the Student Union building. Recommendations were made and the architects secured proposals covering the drainage and tile work required. The bids listed below were received and the three members of the Board were contacted by phone and by letter in order that the work that had to be done in the street could be done between the close of the regular session and the opening of the summer session. The committee approved the acceptance of the low bid of the S. E. McDaniel Company for laying the 12" tile in the parking area parallel to the street. Also approved was the purchase of all tile for the entire project from commodity funds remaining in our last biennial appropriation. The work that was approved by the committee has been completed and the tile for the balance of the project is on hand at the campus. Bids received for the work are as follows:

The award for the work chargeable against the Student Union contingency fund was made to the S. E. McDaniel Company, Decatur, Illinois, in the amount of \$1,097.00. This figure was arrived at by McDaniel's first proposal of \$1,959.00 less \$862.00 representing the cost of the tile furnished by the University which is applicable to this portion of the work. An order in the amount of \$2,662.00 was issued and is payable from commodities, and general revenue is to cover the cost of all tile cast iron piping needed for the entire project. Consideration will be needed for the balance of the project which consists of laying of tile on University premises surrounding the Student Union building and including downspout pick-ups from Milner Library and intercepters for campus drainage. This work would amount to \$1,800.00 and decision should be made as to whether or not the entire work should be charged to the Student Union project.

VI. BUILDING AND GROUNDS

A. As authorized by the Board at the May 15-16, 1955 meeting, plans and specifications for the rehabilitation and remodeling of twenty rooms in the Administration Building, which will be vacated by the science departments, were issued to contractors, and the bids for same were opened July 6.

Ostrom and Maguire Construction Company, Galesburg, was the low bidder on this project for the sum of \$74,833. This includes the movable metal partitions which were added to the base bid of \$68,800. The only other bidder was the Neil Hummel Construction Company, Bushnell, whose bid was \$86,800. George F. Vail and Sons, Macomb, and the Ronald Allen Construction Company, Macomb, submitted No Bid. It is recommended that the contract be awarded to Ostrom and Maguire. This was approved by Mr. Dunbar, chairman of Western's Advisory Committee, on July 6.

This project will be paid from funds appropriated by Senate Bill 763, 69th General Assembly.

B. Science Building Equipment

The Board members may be interested to learn that the movable equipment suppliers for the new Science Building met all schedules. The LaPine Company, who held the two large contracts totaling over \$50,000, have delivered everything and have been paid. The same is true of Schaar and Company and Educational Aids. All the orders have been completed; none was placed where there was any question of delivery in the 68th biennium.

Because Neptune Hall is still under construction, and therefore has not been accepted by the Teachers College Board, it was impossible for us to use our own labor to unload furniture and equipment as delivered to the Hall. According to Union rules, we were forced to use laborers employed by Engineering Construction Corporation on the job to do this work. Since no advance notice was given, our Director of Business Services, Mr. Dorland, was forced to make a decision upon the arrival of the first load of furniture.

To date we have spent \$1,261.79 for this service and will probably be required to expend approximately another \$250.00 to com-

plete the job. This expense will be included as additional cost of original equipment.

Since this was an emergency and in view of the fact that everything possible is being done to complete the dormitory by June 28, we trust you will confirm the action taken by Mr. Dorland in this matter.

5. Amount of <u>Use and Occupancy</u> (based upon estimate furnished by the Division of Business Services) \$90,000.00.

The Use and Occupancy Insurance will be written in one policy and will be handled by the Johnson Insurance Agency. (Similar policies are now written by the Ragsdale Insurance Agency on Gilbert Hall, Adams and Williston by the Wm. F. Wiltberger Company.) The premiums on these policies are small ranging from less than \$50,00 per year to approximately \$115.00 per year. It is the plan to rotate these policies, as they fall due among the several agencies, instead of attempting to divide them into several very small units.

Student Union Building

- a. Insurance on the Student Union Building will be written on the Completed Value Form 17C Builders' Risk on an annual basis. (Possession is expected September 1, 1955. The Builders' Risk Insurance is to be cancelled at the time of possession and incorporated into the Neptune Hall policies on a pro-rata basis. This will be accomplished by endorsements attached to the Neptune Hall policies.)
- b. Amount of Builders' Risk Coverage (based upon Architect's estimate) \$67,000.00.
- c. This insurance is to be written in one policy by the Ragsdale Insurance Agency.
- d. Existing insurance on the present building (\$25,000.00) (fire and estended coverage) and contents thereof (\$5,000.00) (fire and extended coverage) will remain outstanding until it expires on July 1, 1956. At that time this insurance will also be transferred to the Neptune Hall policies by endorsement.

Existing fire and extended coverage policies written on the College Cafeteria Building and Contents thereof in the total amount of \$37,000.00 will expire on November 4, 1957. At expiration, this insurance will also be transferred to the Neptune Hall policies by endorsement.

E. Other Contract Bids

Our English Department next year must have more office space to make room for two additional staff members. In order to provide this additional space we wish to remove the present counter and temporary partitions and install metal and glass partitionettes. Our carpenters and painters can do practically all of the labor but we will need to purchase the partitionettes (trade name) which will cost \$1,285.00 f.o.b. DeKalb. We wish your permission to make this purchase.

Stanley Knetsch of Knetsch and Associates informed us that they ran into quicksand in laying the sewer pipe line which will necessitate the changing from clay pipe to castiron pipe, the cost of which will be approximately \$1,000.00.

Sufficient funds have been released and encumbered for the appropriation of \$130,000.00, S. B. 617, to cover the costs of the above described additions to Contract No. 68 -52. It is our recommendation that approval be given to proceed with these additions at a total cost of \$7,576.06.

Proposed Additions to Contract No. 68-50 G.R.-Middle States Cons. Co.

The above referenced contract is substantially complete as of this date. However, there are several items of work which should be completed for which no provision was made in the original contract.

There are six fire hydrants on the old 4" watermain which were to have been left for watering the grounds. However, it now appears the old line will be valved out of service as rapidly as possible so these hydrants will not be of any service. In addition while the hydrants have been painted green, the Fire Chief of the City Fire Department requests that they be removed as he feels a mistake could be made and valuable time lost in case of fire.

Also, the present system for watering the football field is connected to an old 4" main and when this main is disconnected the system will have to be reconnected to the new mains. It would, therefore, be desirable to have this connection made now. The contractor has agreed to the following prices for this work, the work to be done under the same conditions as the present contract.

Sufficient funds have been released and encumbered from the appropriation of \$130,000.00, S. B. 617, to cover the costs of the proposed additions to Contract No 68 -50 G.R., Middle States Construction Company. It is our recommendation that authorization be given to proceed with these additions at a total cost of \$1,569.50.

WARDROBES - NEPTUNE AND ADAMS HALLS

As you know the Teachers College Board has given its approval to purchase additional furniture for Adams, Neptune and Gilbert Halls so as to accommodate additional students. Beds, mattresses and springs have all been ordered for Neptune and Adams. We still must purchase additional wardrobes for these units. The selection of a proper type wardrobe that will have to be more or less temporary presented a rather difficult problem. We wish to use a wardrobe that will, to a reasonable degree, match the permanent furniture and at the same time be sufficiently economical that it may be discarded after a period of five or six years.

After considering several sources of supply and types of wardrobes, the Phoenix Chair Company of Sheboygan, Wisconsin have offered to construct, especially for our use, a very suitable wardrobe that will match our permanent furniture in both Neptune and Adams Halls. You may recall that Phoenix is supplying the furniture for Neptune Hall. This particular wardrobe is a model sold through one of the large mail order houses, therefore, it must be purchased through a dealer under a special trade name.

Rochelle's, Inc., of Chicago have agreed to handle the deal at a cost of \$0.50 per unit. The factory price is \$41.00 making the total cost to the college of \$41.50.

We wish your approval to purchase 190 wardrobe units at a cost of \$41.50 each divided as follows:-

The above wardrobes will be paid for either from the Construction Fund or the Accumulative Reserve or a combination of the two.

Improvements to Water & Sewer System - Williston Hall

We are in receipt of a "Report on Proposed Plumbing Repairs and Revisions to Williston Hall," prepared by Stanley W. Knetsch and Associates, suggesting procedures for repairing and altering the

same. The Engineer's report definitely outlines the condition of the existing Water and Sewer System and gives us estimates covering the costs of the proposed improvements.

- a. A balance of \$10,137.72 remains unreleased in the \$130,000.00 appropriation (S.B. 617, 68th Biennium) to cover the cost of "Improvements to Water Distribution Systems, Sanitary Sewers and Storm Sewers -- Northern Illinois State Teachers College. May we have your approval to request the Governor to release immediately the \$10,137.72 balance to cover the cost of the improvement as outlined in the Engineer's Report and to request that the balance be encumbered up to \$9,943.75 which is the Engineer's estimate of the total cost.
- b. May we also have your approval to employ a local Plumbing Contractor to do the exploratory work as recommended by the Engineer, the same to be submitted to the Board for their action at the July 18th meeting.

It was necessary for Mr. Dorland, our Director of Business Services, to authorize an order for a 39" x 14" x 9" telephone terminal box to be installed in connection with the telephone system in Neptune Hall. The equipment was not covered by the general contract but was required to be installed before the telephone service installation could be completed. The cost will be approximately \$60.00. To keep our records clear will you please approve this expenditure? The cost will be charged to the Construction Fund, 1953 Bond Issue.

Telephone Outlet - Student Union Building

We find it will be necessary to install one telephone outlet in the new office of the Student Union Building which is now being remodeled. The amount of this installation, \$26.50, will be an addition to the G & G Electric Company Contract. May we have your approval to have this additional work done, the cost of which will be paid from Construction Fund, 1953 Bond Issue.

Supplement to July, 1955 Teachers College Board Report

1. Proposed Establishment of Central Baking Facilities. (Approved by Advisory Committee 7-6-55)

In view of the fact that it is anticipated that our enrollment for the coming academic year will jump from 2,500 to 3,000 students and that our dormitory population will jump from a present 750 students to 1,400 students, it is desirable to provide for an expansion in our college baking facilities.

While each of our dormitory kitchens is presently equipped with some of the equipment needed for this purpose, it has proved costly and impractical to do the necessary baking in such a decentralized manner. A recent survey of our food operation, conducted by the consulting firm of Horwath & Horwath, recommends that for the sake of economy, quality, and production control, we establish a central bake shop on our campus. The survey points out, furthermore, that there is now available in the Williston Hall basement an area which would be well-suited for this purpose.

The advantages of having our own bakery are as follows:

1. Equipment and Work Area

Since the food service equipment and layout, particularly the oven space and related work areas, available in Gilbert and Neptune Halls are designed for a population of 374 students in each of these dormitories, they will be inadequate to handle the 484 students who will be housed in these dormitories in September. Our experience at Gilbert Hall during the past three years has shown that the oven space in the ranges allotted to the cooks for the everyday roasting and baking needs is insufficient even for 374. As a result they have frequently had to use the baker's oven for cooking and roasting purposes. If given the <u>full time</u> use of this oven, there would then be adequate capacity to take care of the anticipated 484 students. Without this oven, however, it would be necessary to buy additional roasting ovens if our quality of food and the present variety of menus served is to be maintained.

As is pointed out in the Horwath & Horwath survey, 11 out of 17 pieces of equipment required for the establishment of a central bake shop are already available on the campus. The only two (2) major pieces of additional equipment that would

have to be bought would be one (1) Middleby-Marshall Oven at an installed cost of \$3,280.00, and a Groen Tilting 40 gallon Steam Kettle at a cost of \$546.00. It would also be desirable to include a donut fryer at a total cost of \$580.00 which would easily pay for itself over a period of several years.

Centralizing of baking facilities would not only increase baking efficiency, but would also greatly increase the production capacity of the equipment used. This becomes clear when one remembers that it takes a lot of work space to spread out the necessary bake pans or pie tins needed to feed 1,400 students. With the central bake shop, it would be possible to bake not only for the dormitory students, but for the rest of the college population as well.

2. Personnel

It is expected that the establishment of central baking facilities on the campus would result in a payroll saving of \$1,100.00 per year. At present the baker in Gilbert Hall does all the baking for the three existing dormitories; in other words he now bakes for 750 students. His pots and pans are washed by the Gilbert Hall kitchen laborer. The salary of the baker, plus one-half of the salary of the kitchen laborer now comes to \$417.50 per month. This means that the labor cost for bakers and baker's helpers in Gilbert and Neptune Halls, under the present system would come to \$10,000 per year. On the other hand it would be possible to staff a central bake shop with one Head Baker (annual salary - \$3,800), one Second Baker (annual salary - \$2,700), and one Kitchen Laborer (annual salary - \$2,400). This would make a combined labor cost of \$8,900.00 or \$1,100.00 annual labor cost savings, with greatly increased production efficiency.

3. Food Cost

While it is impossible to predict exactly the amount of savings that would be possible due to the purchasing of baking materials in large quantities, it seems reasonable to expect that such savings over a period of several years would be considerable.

4. Quality Control

With the establishment of a central bake shop, the control over the quality of baked items and the enforcement of standardized receipes by the Director of Food Services and the college dietitian becomes greatly simplified. Furthermore, a central bake shop will make it possible for the N.I.S.C. Cafeteria and for the College Union Building to feature home-made bakery products instead of the commercial pies and cakes that they have been buying up to the present time. This, too, will greatly improve the quality of bakery products in those units.

5. Location

While the basement area recommended for the central shop is far from perfect for such use, it will be adequate to take care of our needs for the immediate future. It is particularly suita-

ble since it already contains a partly-used walk-in refrigerator and also since it is centrally located, so that proper supervision can be easily given by food supervisory personnel.
The cost of converting this area into a bake shop is comparatively small, since the only major job will be to remove
a 14-foot plaster-board wall. If the college should ever build
a central commissary (which would presumably include meat
processing and baking facilities), then all the equipment could
be transferred from the Williston Hall basement without great
difficulty.

For the above reasons, authorization is requested to install a central bake shop in the Williston Hall basement as indicated. This work should be done between the periods of August 15 to September 15, in conjunction with a necessary drain replacement project. (See July board report Page 81.)

Funds are available from Cash balance in Series 50 and 53.

2. Additional Kitchen and Dining Room Supplies for Extra Students in Residences.

We request permission to purchase the additional kitchen and dining room supplies needed to take care of the extra 110 students to be housed in Gilbert and Neptune Halls, and extra 80 students to be housed in Adams Hall. This includes dishes, silverware, trays, glasses, pots and pans, and other kitchen utensils. It is anticipated that, barring any price change, orders would be placed with the low bidder for each item as determined recently in making similar purchases for Neptune Hall.

(All with Advisory Committee approval.)

Funds are available from Construction funds in the case of Neptune Hall. For Adams and Gilbert funds are available from Cash balance in Series 50.

The regularly scheduled meeting of the Teachers College Board and the college presidents convened at 9:00 A.M. (D.S.T.), Monday, July 18, 1955, in the Art Gallery of the Library Building on the

campus of Northern Illinois State College, DeKalb, Illinois. Lewis M. Walker, Chairman of the Board, presided.

Chairman Walker presented the following tribute to the late Dr. William C. Reavis:

"To paraphrase an old, old song and in keeping with our Christian religion, 'When the roll was called up yonder,' --- Claude Reavis answered. I don't think it is particularly important to us the date of his birth or where he was born, but it is important to us that he became a member of the Board in 1949 and he gave to us, out of his rich experience, a splendid and everlasting contribution.

"In his youth, he had an accident which caused a shriveled arm. Because of this injury, his family took him out of farming and sent him to college. It is strange how an accident in youth gave to the field of education one of the finest minds this country has ever produced. Those who went to the Memorial Services in Chicago listened to some eloquent remarks on his efforts in the University of Chicago. Our hearts were warmed, and we reflected with considerable interest on the fact he brought to us most of the printed policies and procedures that we now enjoy and by which we work.

"I shall never forget the day when Noble Puffer, Reavis, and I sat on one side of the table, the Department of Finance on the other, and Governor Stevenson at the end of the table; and Claude

Reavis promoted the salary schedule, argued it out, and Governor Stevenson accepted. We were there from nine in the morning until nine at night. On the way back to the hotel, Dr. Reavis said to me, 'We may have a harder time defending this schedule with the colleges than we did in getting it adopted.' The schedule has stood, and on every occasion he has defended it and we have helped him. The teachers of our colleges should hold the memory of Claude Reavis very kindly in their minds and their hearts for his contribution to them as a member of this Board.

"Dr. Reavis was big. He towered, not only towered physically but in academic circles. Wherever he went, whenever he spoke, his word was accepted as the law. His counsel was sought, and his judgment was respected in the field of education. He was tolerant and always kind with the untrained.

"When it came time to find a place for him to rest, I was reminded of that passage of the scripture: 'Abraham lived to a ripe, old age, and they carried him back to his people'; and so, the stalwarts of every walk of life, from then to now, on occasion, have been carried back to their people, and they buried him in the church lot of his family in southern Indiana. I cannot help saying the esteem in which he was held by every member of this Board approached affection, and any one of us can exclaim with the poet, as we meet here this morning, 'Oh! for the touch of the vanished hand and the sound of the voice that is still.'"

Mr. Stipes moved that a copy of the foregoing remarks made by Chairman Walker be sent to all members of the academic staff of all of the colleges under the jurisdiction of the Teachers College Board. The motion was seconded by Dr. Nickell, and upon roll call by Dr. Browne, the motion was unanimously carried.

The first matter of business before the Board was the approval of the minutes of the meeting of May 16, 1955. Attention was called that the following should be added to the end of Line 4, Page 9, of said minutes:

"and such funds have been released by the Governor."

There being no further corrections to said minutes, Mr. Houle moved that the minutes of the meeting of May 16, 1955 be approved as corrected. The motion was seconded by Mrs. Madlener, roll was called, and the vote was as follows:

Chairman Walter then welcomed Mr. Reed to the Board. (Mr. Reed was appointed by Governor Stratton to succeed the late Dr.

Reavis.) Chairman Walker stated, "Mr. Reed comes from Crane High School in Chicago where he has taught and lived for a long period of time. He is a graduate of Illinois State Normal University. We don't assume for a minute that you will take Dr. Reavis' place on the Board. You will take your place on the Board as Mr. Reed, and Dr. Reavis will live always for the things he has done for us. We are delighted to have you here and hope you will enjoy it."

Mr. Reed stated, "No one can take Dr. Reavis' place, but I sincerely hope I may make some small place for myself and am very happy to be here."

REPORTS OF OFFICERS OF THE BOARD

Chairman Walker reported that he had asked Dr. Browne to prepare the following resolution relative to Dr. Reavis' service to the Board and the teachers colleges of Illinois:

WHEREAS, the Teachers College Board of Illinois is entrusted by law with the management and control of four distinguished institutions of higher education, and

WHEREAS, Dr. William Claude Reavis was for more than six years a member of that Board, having been appointed twice by Governor Adlai E. Stevenson and once by Governor William G. Stratton, and

WHEREAS, during the years of his service he was a loyal, devoted member, regular in attendance at Board meetings, wise and reasonable in the consideration of Board business, and supremely well-fitted by his distinctive training and experience to exercise leadership in the Board on educational matters, and

WHEREAS, each of the colleges, and in fact, each individual faculty member of the colleges, present and future, has been and will be benefited by his guidance in matters concerned with academic freedom and adequate academic salaries.

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Teachers College Board of Illinois express its deep regret at the loss of Dr. Reavis, a loss which is both personal to the Board members and a professional one to teacher education, and

That the Board re-affirm its devotion to the principles of good academic practice which Dr. Reavis so ably advocated and personified, and

That this resolution be recorded in the minutes of the Teachers College Board and a copy sent to Mrs. Reavis.

Dr. Nickell moved the adoption of the foregoing resolution relative to Dr. Reavis' service to the Board and the teachers colleges of Illinois. The motion was seconded by Mr. Watson, and unanimously carried.

Mr. Stipes suggested that a copy of the foregoing resolution be sent each member of the academic staff at each of the four state teachers colleges. The Board concurred in Mr. Stipes' suggestion.

Chairman Walker next reported that, on behalf of the Board's appreciation of his services to the Board, Dr. Browne had sent Mr. Lanphier a gift. Chairman Walker stated that Mr. Lanphier wished to have him extend to the Board his thanks for their gift.

Dr. Browne presented his <u>Report No. 36</u> as Executive Officer which consisted of four parts; namely. <u>Part I. Automobile Reports; Part II. Out-of-State Travel; Part III. Legislation; and Part IV. Miscellaneous.</u>

Regarding Part I. of his report, Dr. Browne stated this is the first report of this kind made to the Board and was done at the request of the Board. Dr. Browne presented an itemized report on the use of each automobile at each of the colleges.

Part II. of Dr. Browne's report gave an itemized report covering out-of-state travel authorizations for the fiscal year 1954-1955 and also showed the trend for the past four years in out-of-state travel authorizations which revealed a decline during the past year. Chairman Walker stated that, in his opinion, out-of-state travel authorizations should be watched, and just because there is money available in the budget does not mean it should be spent.

Dr. Browne reported that Part III. and Part IV. were presented for the information of the Board only.

For the information of the presidents and business managers, Mr. Stipes called attention to House Bill No. 790 (which has been signed by Governor Stratton), which is an improvement in the act covering the University Retirement System, stating that the colleges may now employ people over fifty-eight years of age and they will not be required to participate in the Retirement System.

Dr. Browne also submitted a report, prepared by Mr. Samoore, which showed the trend of the internal budgets for 1955-1956.

Mr. Hollingsworth recommended that Dr. Browne's expenses for attending the meeting of the Mid-West Regional Conference on Higher Education, to be held at Mackinac Island, Michigan, July 25-27, be authorized. The Board concurred in Mr. Hollingsworth's recommendation.

Dr. Buzzard presented his quarterly report, together with supplement, on Eastern Illinois State College with the following requests:

On Page 29, change salary of Christina Bond from \$220 to \$222 and from \$2640 to \$2664.

Dr. Larsen reported on the progress of Walker Hall. Dr. Larsen stated that the University will require the use of Walker Hall by September 11, and there will be at least one stairwell open by then; but if things continue as expected, the building should be completed by that date and all stairwells open.

Mr. Dunbar suggested that Mr. Dunn investigate the fire regulations in regard to the stairwells for Walker Hall. The Board concurred in Mr. Dunbar's suggestion.

Mr. Hollingsworth stated that, in the event Walker Hall is not completed by September 11, necessary steps should be taken to allow the building to be occupied before completion. The Board instructed Mr. Dunn to take the necessary steps regarding this matter.

Regarding Dr. Larsen's request for consideration of a preliminary study for the erection of an additional men's residence hall on the bond revenue basis, the Board recommended this matter be discussed with the Finance Committee.

Considerable discussion was held on Dr. Larsen's request for the purchase of material for bedspreads and drapes for Walker Hall. The Board recommended that bids be received for the making of the bedspreads and drapes based on the bidder supplying the material as specified by the University.

In his quarterly report, Dr. Larsen also requested the Board's consideration for the balance of the drainage and tile work project at the Student Union Building, which will consist of laying of tile on University premises surrounding the Student Union Building and including downspout pick-ups from Milner Library and intercepters for campus drainage. Dr. Larsen stated the project would cost approximately \$1,800 and requested the Board's decision as to whether or not the tile work should be charged to the Student Union project. Mr. Stipes, Chairman of the Finance Committee, reported that the Finance Committee had studied this matter and recommended the following method of paying for this project:

\$1,500 - Contractual Services, General Revenue - 69th biennium \$1,310 - Contingencies - Series 1955 bond issue

The Board concurred in the Finance Committee's recommendation.

Dr. Larsen reported that, in his supplement report, a request was made for the employment of Mr. Akihiko Yokosawa, as Assistant Professor of Physical Science. Dr. Larsen stated that Mr. Yokosawa is not a United States citizen and asked if the Board had any policy regarding the employing of a non-citizen of the United States. The Board recommended that discussion on this matter be referred to the Council of Presidents for their recommendation to the Board.

Mr. Hollingsworth moved the acceptance of the quarterly report, together with supplement, on Illinois State Normal University as presented and corrected by Dr. Larsen with the following exceptions:

- 1. No action on request for consideration of a preliminary study for erection of an additional men's residence hall as Board referred this to Finance Committee.

this Board that said fiscal agents be employed as heretofore on all such projects and that they be compensated on the following basis:

> First \$250,000 bonds - 2% Next \$500,00 bonds - 1-3/4% All over \$750,000 bonds - 1-1/2%

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that this Board shall furnish and compensate attorneys for any necessary legal work at the local site of the project and that said fiscal agents, because of the reduced schedule of fees above set out, shall no longer be bound to pay for any such local legal services, and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that this arrangement with said fiscal agents is, at the pleasure of this Board, subject to termination at any time, but that any project once commenced with the aid of said fiscal agents shall be completed with them except that by mutual agreement any project may be abandoned without any liability on this Board for any expense to said fiscal agents.

Northern Illinois State College

- 5. Approval of an addition to the Tea Room rehabilitation project consisting of an opening and sliding panel for access to the dishwasher, at a cost not to exceed \$200.

6. The Teachers College Board accept Neptune Hall officially when the architects, Schaeffer and Wilson, accept the building from the contractors.

The regularly scheduled meeting of the Teachers College Board and the college presidents convened at 9:00 A.M. (D.S.T.), Monday, August 15, 1955, in the Board Room of the Administration Building on the campus of Illinois State Normal University, Normal, Illinois. Lewis M. Walker, Chairman of the Board, presided.

Chairman Walker called the meeting to order, roll was called, and the following members voted present:

"Dr. Larsen stated the project would cost approximately \$2,810 and requested the Board's decision as to whether or not the tile work should be charged to the Student Union project. Mr. Stipes, Chairman of the Finance Committee, reported that the Finance Committee had studied this matter and recommended the following method of paying for this project:

- \$1,500 Contractual Services, General Revenue 69th Biennium
- \$1,310 Contingencies Series 1955 bond issue."

On Page 21, first paragraph, second line, delete \$350,000 bond revenue."

On Page 21, first paragraph, fourth line, insert the following after the word "College":

"to cost \$1,300,000, of which \$350,000 would come from the State appropriation and the balance from revenue bonds,"

On Page 21, second paragraph, delete "\$350,000" which appears in the second line and delete "(on the bond revenue plan") from the third line.

On Page 27, second paragraph, change all references to the "power house" to read "pump house."

REPORTS OF OFFICERS OF THE BOARD

Chairman Walker stated:

"I find no pleasure in the responsibility that rests upon me in the next few minutes. I do not minimize the repercussions which will spread over this campus when I tell you what I am about to announce nor the responsibility which rests upon this Board in the near future. I shall read to you the resignation of our beloved president, Dr. Fairchild:

'August 10, 1955

'Teachers College Board State of Illinois

'Dear Mrs. Madlener and Gentlemen:

'After thirty-two years' service in teacher education, most of it in administration and the last twenty-two years here, as President of Illinois State Normal University, and because of my long period of illness and subsequent disability, I hereby tender to you my resignation as President of Illinois State Normal University to become effective on the first day of September following my sixty-eighth birthday (September 1, 1958), or in the alternative, at the termination of my present disability, whichever occurs first. I am quite concerned that your Board have an opportunity to select a good successor so that the work of the University may continue on the present high level that I believe it has operated on during the past years. I am also quite concerned that your Board confer with the Board of the University Retirement System of Illinois to determine that all records are in proper shape so that I may look forward to receiving the maximum benefits available to myself and Mrs. Fairchild as a result of my long service as President of the University.

'I trust that this is in accord with the apparent thinking of at least some of the members of the Board and I do wish to express my appreciation for all the kindness that has been shown to me on many occasions by individuals and by the Board as a whole. I sincerely trust that teacher education in Illinois may go forward in such manner that the State of Illinois and Illinois State Normal University will hold a very prominent place in the nation in this very important work.

"We have invited as many of the Faculty Council as were on the campus to be here this morning to hear this resignation read and also to say to them that, while no plans are going to be made today, the University Council will not be forgotten in the matter of choosing a successor. What the procedure may be will be worked out later, and you will be notified in due time.

"This brings to a conclusion the work of a very successful educator, not only on this campus but in the field of teacher education everywhere. He made no apologies to any one for heading a college dedicated to teacher education He worked, with an eye single to a given objective -- teacher education. This school, one of the oldest, if not the oldest of its kind west of the Alleghenies, has held a good name.

"His tenure of service has been long and quite complete and very successful. While he was here through these years, he developed the curriculum and facilities for special education and worked his heart out in developing and promoting both. Insofar as we know, it is one of the finest buildings and best curriculum to be had anywhere in that field.

"He gave his all, you might say, to the program of furthering the new Student Union Building. He has stood before this Board more times than once furthering that program with a determination peculiar unto himself. He bided his time waiting until he could get enough money for the building which he thought would meet the needs of the school. He was not satisfied with a modest Student Union Building. He wanted a building large enough to equal the needs.

"His contributions have been so varied and wide, in many capacities, that I will not try to name them, but I will just mention one. That was during the war when he gave part of this university to the Navy V-12 unit.

"Someone has said 'that a university is but the lengthened shadow of a great man.' Perhaps so! If that is true, his shadow will be long, enduring, enviable, and precious in the field of education and to this university. Only the resolute of purpose and the sturdy of endurance can reach the summit; multitudes may swarm over the plains with warm and rich impulses, but they climb the lesser slopes. But when one gets above the timer line, he must sacrifice all easy going and put behind him the lesser good for the greater reward.

"Dr. Fairchild was a perfect host. Many, many times have we sat in Fell Hall, and other places on this campus and elsewhere, where he presided, and everything was planned and completed in perfect taste. At his side stood a very gracious and charming hostess who held her share of the responsibility in all capacities. Not only that, but Mrs. Fairchild has showered her affection upon him during this long illness which has all but claimed him.

"I could not if I would, close my remarks without mentioning a very devoted and loyal person to Dr. Fairchild in Mrs. King who didn't know there was a clock where there was work to be done. Many times, late at night, she worked at his letters and other pa-

pers that they might be completed. The only measure we have for such devotion is money, and it is a poor measuring stick.

"And then too, I would like to say that this Board is most appreciative not only on this occasion but on one other when Dr. Fairchild was ill when Dr. Larsen stepped into the gap and took over as president. He has done a splendid job during this last illness particularly. Before, it was six months; this time it has been more than twelve. With all of his efforts, we have been pleased, and thank him, sincerely."

Mr. Reed moved that the foregoing remarks, made by Chairman Walker concerning Dr. Fairchild, be recorded in the minutes and a copy of said remarks be sent to all employees of Illinois State Normal University and Dr. and Mrs. Fairchild. The motion was seconded by Mr. Watson, and upon roll call by Mr. Stipes, Vice-Chairman, the motion was unanimously carried.

Mr. Stipes moved that Dr. Fairchild's resignation as President of Illinois State Normal University be accepted, subject to the review and approval of the University Retirement System, with the Board's firm acknowledgment of the debt owed to him by teacher education for his many years of distinguished leadership. The motion was seconded by Mr. Ropp, roll was called, and the vote was as follows:

Mr. Dunn stated, "In my spending time in visiting with Dr. Fairchild, I wanted the Board to know that he was very appreciative of everything that had transpired between him and the Board. He spoke very feelingly of the close relations with the individual members of the Board, and, in particular, he said that he would never forget the cooperation that he had had from Mr. Walker as Chairman of the Board and as a Board member prior to becoming Chairman. He and members of the Board, and sometimes Mr. Walker, did not agree, but these disagreements were usually straightened out through consideration on both sides and he very deeply appreciated the grand treatment he has had from this Board."

Dr. Browne presented his <u>Report No. 37</u> which was devoted to considerations concerning higher education and a summarization of some of the considerations that are most frequently discussed and studied at various meetings.

Mr. Stipes commended Dr. Browne on his report and stated that "the main thing is getting reports like this one publicized so the public will realize the situation as it will be in the near future regarding the increase in enrollments at all schools. Our colleges should furnish educational opportunities for all who apply up to the

limit of the living facilities in which the colleges are located. If the schools should run into difficulties of an inadequate number of faculty members, the college administration should meet with its respective Advisory Committee on the possibility of hiring additional faculty on the basis of part-time employment."

Dr. Nickell stated that at some schools, where they are curtailed with large enrollments, they are using two, and possibly three, shifts. He further stated that "it is going to be most difficult to secure sufficient appropriations for expansion in college classrooms; and if we can take care of housing and eating facilities for the students, we will be doing well." Dr. Nickell suggested the presidents think about how they might absorb this increase in enrollment if they have sufficient housing and eating facilities.

Dr. Browne reported on the matter of the Board employing an architectural assistant. Dr. Browne recommended the employment of Kenneth J. Thelen as architectural assistant, beginning September 1, 1955, at a salary of \$650 a month; Mr. Thelen would work out of the Central Office of the Board from September 1, 1955 to January 1, 1956 and go to all of the colleges to enable him to make recommendations to the Board on the rehabilitation needs of each college; after January 1, 1956, Mr. Thelen would be assigned to Northern Illinois State College to inspect the three buildings to be constructed there and at that time his salary would be paid from the appropriations for the construction of those buildings.

Mr. Summers moved that Kenneth J. Thelen be employed as architectural assistant, as recommended by Dr. Browne, beginning September 1, 1955, at a salary of \$650 a month. The motion was seconded by Mr. Ropp, roll was called, and the vote was as follows:

Dr. Browne next reported that the Board has been insistent that, whenever possible, competitive bids be obtained on all purchases for the colleges and acceptance of the low bid is made unless there is good reason to vary from this practice. Dr. Browne stated that one of the Advisory Committees has suggested that a similar practice be followed in the employing of non-academic people and this Advisory Committee requested he present the following recommendation regarding this matter:

"In the hiring of people to fill new non-academic positions, the administration should inform the Advisory Committee of the vacancy and date examination for said vacancy is to be given; then the administration would notify Advisory Committee the scores of the three (3) highest applicants, and unless there is good reason to the contrary, the adminis-

tration should recommend the employment of the individual with the highest score. Actual employment should wait Board or Advisory Committee approval.

The Board discussed the foregoing recommendation as presented by Dr. Browne, but no action was taken at this time.

NEW BUSINESS

At this time, Dr. Nickell stated that he is quite distressed by high school science teachers' lack of knowledge concerning nuclear science. He stated it is vital to State Civil Defense that the people become basically informed on such matters as "fall-outs" from nuclear blasts; in order to do this, it will become necessary to get some of this basic knowledge to our high school science teachers. He went on to say that the University of Illinois, together with his office, is working on a program concerning this matter, and a Statewide meeting of science educators from all colleges will be held soon to discuss this situation and develop a program of teacher education on nuclear science to be given those high school science teachers who are interested. Dr. Nickell urged the presidents of the four State teachers colleges to get behind this proposed program for the security of our own people so, in the event a nuclear bomb is dropped, the people will be informed on how to take care of themselves.

Monroe (substitute), resigned, at a salary of \$5,220 for nine months, with guarantee of summer duty in 1956 if services satisfactory. Dr. Leipholz has taught at Waldorf College, Forest City, Iowa, five years, and for the last two years has been in the Port Huron, Michigan, junior college. He is an Army Air Force veteran of 3 years service, 1941-44.
- 6. Verne E. Stockman, A.B., Michigan State College, 1932; A.M., same, 1940; Ed.D., same, 1952, as substitute Associate Professor for two years, 1955-57, for Dr. Arthur F. Byrnes on leave, at a salary of \$5,400 for nine months, with duty beginning August 15, 1955 while Dr. Byrnes is still in Charleston. (Rate of \$600 per month.)

On Page 2, under the heading II. FACULTY, E. New Faculty, delete Item 3.

On Page 3, under the heading III. CLASSIFIED EMPLOYEES, B. New Positions, delete Item 1.

On Page 4, delete entire section on VI. BUILDINGS AND GROUNDS.

Dr. Buzzard also requested that the recommendation on the purchase of 106 units (desk and chair) of Junior High School furniture be as follows:

Dr. Buzzard next distributed tabulations on various bids received and asked that the following recommendations be included as a part of his informal report:

For the information of the Board, Dr. Holmes distributed a plat showing the proposed land acquisition area for Northern Illinois State College. Mr. Stipes stated the administration should try to acquire as much land as possible with the money that is available for land acquisition at Northern. A discussion was held on the possibility of acquiring other pieces of property in the same area as what is proposed being acquired. Mr. Stipes recommended the administration investigate the possibility of purchasing the corner property at the northeast corner of Lucinda Avenue and Glidden Road and the one acre of land lying north of this corner property.

REPORTS OF COMMITTEES

Mr. Summers, Chairman of the Building Committee, reported the Building Committee had met and studied requests from each of the colleges, and the Building Committee recommended the following:

Eastern Illinois State College

1. Authorize the purchase of three houses on the site designated for the new laboratory school and to authorize Mr. Dunn, legal counsel, to certify the proper legal procedure; also to arrange for the removal of the houses on a bid basis.

Illinois State Normal University

- 1. A contract be awarded the LaRue Construction Company, the low bidder, to remove ten (10) houses on the site designated for the new laboratory school. All buildings are to be removed by the LaRue Construction Company at no cost to the State.
- 2. The Board approve the following additions to the Student Union Building now under construction:
 - a. One toilet room near the dining rooms at a cost of \$956.
 - b. One lavatory in the main kitchen and one lavatory in the snack bar kitchen, as recommended by the Board of Health, at an estimated cost of \$393.
 - c. A contract be awarded the American Foundry and Furnace Company, the low bidder, in the amount of \$5,535, for addition of Item H-5 in the original specifications refrigeration piping.
- 3. Acceptance of the recommendation of the architects, Lundeen and Hilfinger, to use incandescent rather than fluorescent lighting in the proposed laboratory school.
- 4. That October 11, 1955 be set as the tentative date for receiving bids at Normal on the proposed laboratory school.
- 5. Acceptance of two recommendations from the architects, Schaeffer and Wilson, concerning Walker Hall, as follows:
 - a. That the permit for occupancy and use of the building, as prepared by the architects and approved by Mr. Dunn, legal counsel, be approved by the Board.

- b. That the Board reduce from 15% to 7-1/2% the retainage fee, as of October 1, 1955, which applies to contractors since the building is virtually completed.
- 6. Purchase of insurance for Walker Hall as needed for the protection of the building, including public and other liabilities.

Western Illinois State College

1. The Teachers College Board accept the Science Building officially and that final payments be made on all outstanding contracts when the supervising architects, Hewitt and Bastian, accept the building from the contractors.

Northern Illinois State College

- 1. The Raymond Concrete Pile Company of Chicago be employed to make test borings for the new classroom building at Northern on the basis of the bid submitted to the Board under date of August 12, 1955, which specified a lump sum bid of \$440. Also that the Raymond Concrete Pile Company should be retained to make necessary borings for the Field House and that Mr. Jorj O. Osterberg be retained as a soil mechanics engineer to supervise and assist with the soil survey needed before work begins on the Field House. The estimated cost of Mr. Osterberg's services and the cost of borings should not exceed \$1,050.
- 2. Approval of the preliminary and design drawings for the proposed new classroom building and that the architects, Perkins and Will, be instructed to proceed with working drawings at once.
- 3. Awarding of contract to the Eric Bolander Construction Company, low bidder, for site development of Neptune Hall, at a cost not to exceed \$25,000, including plans and specifications.
- 4. Dr. Browne and the administration at Northern be instructed to negotiate a contract with Gilbert Johnson, architect, for supervision of the construction of the laboratory school, and to report details of the agreement at the September meeting of the Board.
- 5. Advisory Committee of Northern be given power to act on the awarding of contracts on bids to be received soon for the sewer repair project of Williston Hall, not to exceed \$9,943.75.

Following some discussion, Mr. Summers moved the acceptance of the foregoing recommendations of the Building Committee on all of the colleges. The motion was seconded by Mr. Stipes, roll was called, and the vote was as follows:

Dr. Browne also read a letter from Lucile Morgan Dyson thanking the Board for their letter to her father, Dr. Walter P. Morgan.

NEW BUSINESS

Mr. Dunn reported he had examined the contract between Hewitt and Bastian and the Teachers College Board covering architectural services for the proposed dormitory, cafeteria, and student center building at Western Illinois State College and recommended its approval by the Board and that the Chairman and the Secretary be authorized to sign said contract.

Mr. Dunn next reported he had examined two contracts between Perkins and Will and the Teachers College Board covering architectural services for (1) the proposed Field House at Northern Illinois State College and (2) the proposed classroom building at Northern Illinois State College. Mr. Dunn stated he found these two contracts in order but suggested the following be added to Section 11. of both contracts with Perkins and Will:

"Copies furnished the Owner may be used by the Owner in connection with maintenance, repair or future alteration without special consent of Architect."

Following some discussion, Dr. Nickell moved the approval of the contract between Hewitt and Bastian and the Teachers College Board, covering architectural services for the proposed dormitory, cafe-

teria, and student center building at Western Illinois State College, and that the Chairman and the Secretary be authorized to sign said contract; and also the approval of the contracts between Perkins and Will and the Teachers College Board, covering architectural services for the proposed Field House at Northern Illinois State College and the proposed classroom building at Northern Illinois State College, subject to the correction of Section 11. of said contracts as suggested by Mr. Dunn, and that the Chairman and the Secretary be authorized to sign said contracts. (D.S.T.), Monday, September 19, 1955, in the Social Room of the Laboratory School, on the campus of Western Illinois State College, Macomb, Illinois. Lewis M. The first matter of business before the Board was the approval of the minutes of the meeting of August 15, 1955. There being no corrections to said minutes, Mr. Summers moved that the minutes of the meeting of August 15, 1955 be approved as submitted. The motion was seconded by Mrs. Madlener, roll was called, and the vote was as follows:

REPORTS OF OFFICERS OF THE BOARD

Chairman Walker reported that Mr. Dunn and he had prepared the following resolution for the consideration of the Board:

WHEREAS, R. W. Fairchild delivered his resignation as President of Illinois State Normal University to this Teachers College Board of the State of Illinois on Monday, the 15th day of August, 1955, therefore,

BE IT RESOLVED that it is necessary to the best interest of said University that a new president of said University be selected, and,

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the election of a new president is the ultimate responsibility of the Teachers College Board and that the final evaluation and consideration of individuals for such office shall be conducted by the Board acting as a Committee of the whole, and,

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that there is hereby created a screening committee of five Board members, namely: Vernon L. Nickell, Clarence Ropp, William Reed, R. A. Stipes, Jr., J. A. Houle, Jr., to interview and evaluate individuals under consideration by the Board and that after its deliberation the Committee report to the Board with comments on not less than three individuals, and,

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that to insure participation by the faculty in the evaluation of individuals under consideration by the Board the names of all persons submitted to the Board shall be referred by the Board through its Chairman to a Faculty Committee which is hereby created. The Faculty Committee shall consist of five members four of whom shall be selected by the faculty not later than October 15, 1955. The fifth member of the Faculty Committee shall be the permanent chairman of the Faculty Committee until a president is selected by the Board and this fifth member shall be the present chairman of the Faculty Council. One of each of the four members of the committee to be selected shall be selected from the faculty members classified as Professors, Associate Professors, Assistant Professors, and Instructors.

Upon request of either the Faculty Committee or the Board Committee a joint meeting or joint meetings of the two Committees may be held. Richard G. Browne, Executive Officer of the Teachers College Board, is hereby designated to serve as Secretary for the Faculty Committee and as Secretary for the

Board Committee, and as Secretary for the joint Committees, if joint sessions are held.

The Faculty Committee shall consider all names submitted by the Chairman of the Board for evaluation and shall report to the Board its conclusions as to the administrative, educational, scholarship and other qualifications of each individual submitted for evaluation, and,

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that any person may submit to the Board the name of any individual or individuals believed to be qualified for president.

Following considerable discussion, Mr. Hollingsworth moved the approval of the foregoing resolution regarding the selecting of a new president for Illinois State Normal University. The motion was seconded by Mr. Dunbar, and unanimously carried.

Chairman Walker then requested that the five Board members appointed as a screening committee in the foregoing resolution elect their own chairman; and being an ex-officio member of this Committee, Chairman Walker requested he be notified of any and all meetings of the screening committee or of a joint meeting of the two committees formed by this resolution.

Mr. Stipes inquired if the present Board policy that "preferably the president should not be chosen from the local staff" still applies or if this policy should be rescinded.

Chairman Walker stated this policy will remain in effect unless someone requests it be changed. There being no requests to change this policy, Chairman Walker stated it will stand as at present.

Dr. Nickell suggested that the members of the newly appointed screening committee meet before the end of the day and elect its chairman. The other members of this committee concurred in Dr. Nickell's suggestion.

Dr. Browne presented his Report No. 38 as Executive Officer which consisted of two parts; namely, Part I. Bond Revenue Projects and Part II. Schedule For New Buildings.

Dr. Browne next distributed printed copies of the resolution which was unanimously adopted by the Board in memory of Dr. Reavis and thanked Illinois State Normal University for printing these copies.

Dr. Browne next reported that he had written thank-you letters to many of the legislators who were particularly helpful to the teachers colleges during the last general assembly, and he read some of the replies he had received to these thank-you letters.

Dr. Browne next reported that Mr. Thelen has been to two of the colleges, studying their rehabilitation needs, and stated Mr. Thelen will, undoubtedly, present his report on the rehabilitation needs of the colleges well in advance of the January meeting.

INFORMAL REPORTS OF PRESIDENTS

In addition to the presentation of the informal reports, and on the request of Dr. Nickell, each of the presidents reported on the enrollment trends at his respective college. Dr. Buzzard reported that, as of Friday, September 16, there were officially enrolled 1,909 day students; this 1,909 is against 1,605 total day students of a year ago, or a gain of 304 students. Dr. Larsen reported that, as of Saturday, September 17, there were 3,013 students enrolled (200 of these attending evening classes and the balance-being day students); this is an increase of 15.4% over last year's enrollment. Dr. Beu reported 2,044 full-time students on campus; this is against 1,653 full-time students of a year ago, or a gain of 391 students. Dr. Holmes reported that at Northern there are 2,700 day students registered; this is against 2,569 day students of a year ago, and it is estimated the total on-campus students will reach 3,150.

Mr. Stipes called attention that the enrollment figures given by the presidents for the coming year is 1,700 higher than the estimated enrollment for 1956.

Eastern Illinois State College

Dr. Buzzard presented his informal report on Eastern Illinois State College and asked that Item G, Page 4, under the heading III. CLASSIFIED EMPLOYEES, be deleted.

Dr. Larsen next reported on the progress of Walker Hall, stating that it should be completed about the middle of October.

Dr. Larsen next presented the following resolution for the consideration of the Board:

WHEREAS, Illinois State Normal University Campus with all of the buildings is and are located within the corporate limits of the Town of Normal, McLean County, Illinois, and,

WHEREAS, the Town of Normal maintains and operates a municipal water system which furnishes all of the water used for domestic, sanitary and fire protection purposes within the said Town of Normal and particularly on and about the campus and buildings of said University, and,

WHEREAS the said Town of Normal is now engaged in making certain improvements to its said water system among which there is included an overhead water storage tank of 500,000 gallon capacity, and,

WHEREAS the engineers for said Town have recommended that the construction site for said tank be located on a parcel of real estate which forms a part of the land owned by this Board and is a part of the land used by said University for its department of agriculture, and,

WHEREAS, the Town of Normal has made application to this Board for a long term Lease on the proposed location for said water storage tank, and,

WHEREAS this Board considers that the construction of said overhead water storage tank on said proposed construction site will greatly increase the efficiency of the Town of Normal fire department in its fire protection possibilities not only for the Town generally, but also for all buildings of said University all of which are located in relatively close proximity to the proposed construction site for said water storage tank, and,

WHEREAS, a form of proposed written Lease to be executed between the said Town of Normal and this Teachers College Board has been presented to this Board for approval in words and figures as follow:

LEASE

THIS INDENTURE made this ______ day of ______, 1955 between THE TEACHERS COLLEGE BOARD OF THE STATE OF ILLINOIS, of the First Part, and TOWN OF NORMAL of McLean County, Illinois, of the Second Part.

WITNESSETH, that the said Teachers College Board for the consideration hereinafter expressed hath demised, granted and leased, and by these presents doth hereby demise, grant and lease unto the said Town of Normal, the following described tract of land located in the Northwest Quarter of Section 28, Township 24 North, Range 2 East of the Third Prin-

cipal Meridian, McLean County, Illinois, namely:

Beginning at a point on the west line of Main Street in the Town of Normal, Illinois, 60 feet North of the intersection of the North line of Willow Street if extended West to the West line of Main Street, thence West 180 feet parallel with the North line of Willow Street if extended West, thence North 140 feet parallel with the West line of Main Street, thence East 180 feet parallel with the said North line of Willow Street if extended West, to the West line of Main Street, thence South 140 feet along the West line of Main Street to the point of beginning, together with all the privileges and appurtenances hereinafter set forth: TO HAVE AND TO HOLD the above described premises for and during the term of from the 15th day of September 1955 and terminating on the 15th day of September ____ for the purpose of erecting and constructing thereon and thereafter operating and maintaining thereon an all welded overhead, elevated steel water storage tank of 500,000 gallon capacity of double ellipsoidal design on a three panel and post welded cylindrical column, steel tower of such height to elevate the high water line 115 feet above the top of the foundations which will be at an approximate elevation of 810 feet and overflow to be at elevation 925 feet, to be used by said Town for water storage purposes only and for no other purpose.

The said Town shall construct a chair link type fence on said tract to enclose the above described tract and shall be responsible for maintaining the ground so included inside said fencing in a neat and clean manner and shall remove therefrom all tools, equipment and materials whenever construction or any necessary repair or maintenance operation may be concluded. In the event the said Town deems it necessary to construct any additional accessory in connection with its said water system at any time during the life of this Lease said Town may do so but in such event any such additional accessory will be included within the above described area.

The said Town shall maintain the ground within said area and all improvements thereon, including the fence, to be constructed by the Town under the terms of said Lease, in a clean and neat condition and shall keep said improvements clean and painted.

The Town shall at all times carry casualty insurance coverage and pay the premiums for same and deposit a duplicate policy or certificate of same with the Teachers College Board so as to protect, save and keep harmless the said Teachers College Board, its successor and assigns against any damage by reason of the construction, maintenance, repair, alteration and/or operation of said improvement or future installations in said area, to any individual or individuals or the public at large whether such damage might result from act of said Town or any of its employees or agents or from Act of God to the following extent:

PERSONAL INJURY

Limit of Liability per person \$ 200,000.00 Limit of Liability per accident 1,000,000.00

PROPERTY DAMAGE

Limit of Liability per accident \$ 100,000.00 Limit of Liability in the aggregate 1,000,000.00

In the event the said Town should for a period of two years fail to pay the rental herein provided for or in the event said Town for a period of two years fails to use said structure for water storage purposes or in the event said premises are ever used by said Town for any purpose not consistent with the purposes above recited, then this Lease shall be void. In the event said Town should fail to maintain the area within the fenced portion in a clean and neat manner, then the University Agricultural Department shall have the right of entry to said fenced area for the purpose of cleaning same.

The Town agrees to at all times keep any structures erected by it on any portion of the above tract well painted and neat so as to present a good appearance and to include in a legend to be kept painted on said tank which reads "HOME OF ILLINOIS STATE NOR-MAL UNIVERSITY" in lettering readable from highways.

In the event the Town should at any time fail or refuse to keep said grounds in a neat and clean condition, or should fial or refuse to pay premiums for such insurance policies or should fail or refuse to do any of the things required of the Town under the terms of this Lease, the Teachers College Board may proceed to enter said premises and do and pay for having said work done and pay such premiums and may either recover the cost of same from said Town by action at law or in equity, or may deduct the cost thereof from water bills owing by Normal University to said Town until any such expense, cost or loss is wholly satisfied.

In the event any improvements constructed on said tract by the Town are ever damaged by fire, windstorm or other cause the Town agrees that same will be promptly repaired and in the event of destruction of any of such proposed improvements, or in the event of forfeiture of its rights under the terms of this Lease or upon termination of this Lease the Town will upon written demand of the Teachers College Board remove said improvements from said premises and leave said premises in good, clean condition without cost to the Teachers College Board and will thereupon deliver up peaceable possession of said premises to Teachers College Board.

And the said Town of Normal doth covenant and agree to pay to the said Teachers College Board the sum of Ten Dollars (\$10.00) on the Fifteenth day of October of each and every year from date during the continuance of this Lease.

The said Party of the Second Part further agrees that it will not under-let, sub-let or allow any other person or persons to occupy said above lease premises without first obtaining the written consent of said Party of the First Part.

IN WITNESS WHEREOF, the said Parties have to this and three other instruments of the same tenor and date interchangeably set their hands and seals the day and year first above written.

Mr. Dunn stated he had examined this resolution and lease, and they meet with his approval.

Chairman Walker requested that when any of the colleges present purchases for the approval of the Board that they be presented on the basis of bids. He further stated that it is very important in all matters where State money is involved that bids be received on all items to be purchased, thereby giving "this Board assurance that it has not willfully made a mistake."

Mr. Stipes, Chairman of the Advisory Committee at Northern, reported that over \$9,000 of the \$130,000 appropriation to Northern for replacements and additions to water and sewer systems (68th biennium) will lapse. He also stated that even with the lapsing of money in this appropriation more work was done with the money than was originally contemplated.

Mr. Stipes next reported on the proposed land acquisition at Northern, stating that the Advisory Committee of Northern recommended immediate steps be taken by Mr. Dunn in negotiating for the purchase of the Minnie Listie property (approximately 73 acres) and the two lots that lie to the north and the three lots that lie to the west of the pump house which is located on the north side of the street running in front of Neptune Hall. Mr. Stipes further stated the Advisory Committee would like to have appraisals on certain other property, north and east of Neptune Hall, and recommended that before authorizing Mr. Dunn to negotiate on the purchase of land other than the seventy-three (73) acres and five (5)

lots before mentioned appraisals be received on other pieces of property and presented to the Board to enable them to determine the best possible use of the appropriation for land acquisition at Northern.

Mr. Dunn presented the following resolution which he had prepared regarding the land acquisition at Northern of the seventythree (73) acres and the five (5) lots as recommended by the Advisory Committee at Northern:

WHEREAS additional land is needed for the use and occupancy of Northern Illinois State College at DeKalb, Illinois, and

WHEREAS this Board has caused inquiry to be made and has studied the future needs of said school for additional land and has ascertained that said school needs and this Board should acquire certain tracts of land known as the Listie property and the Backlund property, NOW THEREFORE,

BE IT RESOLVED by the Teachers College Board of the State of Illinois in regular session assembled that it is necessary that this Board acquire for Northern Illinois State College at DeKalb, Illinois the following described tracts of land:

TRACT 1: The West Half of the Southwest Quarter of Section 15, Township 40 North, Range 4 East of the 3rd P.M. excepting therefrom the following described premises, to-wit: Commencing at the Southeast corner of the West Half of the Southwest Quarter of said Section 15, thence North along the East line of the West Half of the Southwest Quarter of said Section 15, 375 feet, thence West parallel to the South line of Section 15, 175 feet, thence South parallel to the East line of the West Half of the Southwest Quarter of said Section 15, 200 feet, thence West parallel to the South line of said Section 15 to a point 264.0 feet East of the West line of the Southwest Quarter (measured perpendicular to said West line), then North parallel to the West line of the Southwest Quarter of said Section 15, 155 feet, thence Westerly parallel to the South line of said Section 15, 264.0 feet, thence Southerly along the West line of the Southwest Quarter of said Section 15, 330 feet to the Southwest corner thereof; thence Easterly along the Southerly line of said Section 15 to the place of beginning; also excepting therefrom the following described premises, to-wit: Commencing at a point on the Quarter Section line 375 feet North of the Southeast corner of the Southwest Quarter of the Southwest Quarter of said Section, running thence Northerly along said Quarter Section line 2246 feet, thence Westerly along a line parallel to the Southerly section line a distance of 30 feet, thence Southerly along a line parallel to said Quarter Section line a distance of 2246 feet, thence Easterly along a line parallel to the Southerly Section line a distance of 30 feet to the point of beginning, situated in DeKalb County, Illinois;

TRACT 2: On the West side of Russell Road described as follows: A part of the Southwest Quarter of the Southwest Quarter of Section 15, Township 40 North, Range 4 East of the 3rd P.M.

described as follows: Beginning on the East line thereof 175 feet North of the Southeast corner, thence North 100 feet on said East line, thence West 175 feet parallel to the South line of said Section 15, thence South and parallel to said East line 100 feet, thence East 175 feet to the place of beginning, situated in the County of DeKalb and State of Illinois (excepting the East 30 feet off said tract).

TRACT 3: Along the West side of Russell Road described as follows: A part of the Southwest Quarter of the Southwest Quarter of Section 15, Township 40 North, Range 4 East of the Third P.M. beginning on the East line thereof 275 feet North of the Southeast corner, thence North 100 feet on said East line, thence West 175 feet parallel to the South line of said Section 15, thence South and parallel to said East line 100 feet, thence East 175 feet to the place of beginning, in the County of DeKalb, and State of Illinois;

TRACT 4: Lot 1 in Block 1 of Westwood Knolls Subdivision, located in the Southwest Quarter of Section 15, Township 40 North, Range 4 East of the 3rd P.M. in DeKalb County, Illinois, according to Plat thereof recorded in the Recorder's Office of said County in Book G of Plats Page 174 as Doc. No. 244179.

No. 244179.

TRACT 6: Lot 3 in Block 1 of Westwood Knolls Subdivision, located in the Southwest Quarter of Section 15, Township 40 North, Range 4 East of the Third P.M. in DeKalb County, Illinois, according to Plat thereof recorded in the Recorder's Office of said County in Book G of Plats, Page 174 as Doc. No. 244179.

BE FURTHER RESOLVED that Richard F. Dunn, Attorney for this Board, be and he is hereby authorized and directed to have the aforesaid tracts appraised and to negotiate with the owners for the purchase thereof, and if necessary to institute condemnation proceedings under the Eminent Domain Statute of the State of Illinois and under the authority of the Teachers College Board to acquire for this Board for said College the above described tracts of land.

REPORTS OF COMMITTEES

Mr. Stipes, Board representative on the University Retirement Board, reported that Dr. Fairchild's disability status and retirement have been reviewed and passed on favorably by the University Retirement System.

Mr. Stipes, Chairman of the Finance Committee, reported on a new method of financing dormitories with federal money. Mr. Stipes recommended that the Board instruct Mr. Summers, Dr. Browne, Mr. Samoore and himself to meet with representatives of the Home and Finance Agency in Chicago to investigate dormitory financing through this agency. The Board concurred in Mr. Stipes' recommendation.

Mr. Summers, Chairman of the Building Committee, reported that the Building Committee had met and studied requests from each of the colleges, and the Building Committee recommended the following:

Eastern Illinois State College

- 1. The architectural firm of Childs and Smith, of Chicago, be retained to perform the following services in connection with the new Laboratory school soon to be built under approved alternate plans to hold cost within \$1,500,000 appropriation: supervision of construction, which would include furnishing a resident architect; final plans and specifications; completion of plans and supervision of utilities to be connected to the building; planning, drawing and supervision of site development and sewer system, all of said work to be performed on a cost plus basis, no part of it or the total to exceed the percentage limits fixed by law as adopted by this Board. And further, that Childs and Smith be instructed to proceed at once with final plans with the hope that these plans may go out for bid in October and contracts awarded in November.
- 2. The Committee received a report by Dr. Buzzard, stating that negotiations for three houses adjacent to the site of the proposed laboratory school are proceeding and that final arrangements for purchase of these properties by the Board probably can be made at the October meeting. (Presented for the information of the Board only.)

Illinois State Normal University

 After hearing a report by the architects, Lundeen and Hilfinger, of Bloomington, concerning progress of plans for the new laboratory school, the Committee recommended that an alternate

deadline of October 17 be provided in addition to the present target date of October 11 for taking bids on the general and mechanical work connected with this building.

- 2. The Committee received a report from the architects, Lundeen and Hilfinger, stating that final plans for the new classroom building can be released for bids on October 15 and contracts awarded on November 15. (For the information of the Board only.)
- 3. The architects, Lundeen and Hilfinger, be authorized to advertise for bids on kitchen equipment needed for the new student union building on either October 11 or October 17, at an hour of the day to be established by the architects.

Northern Illinois State College

- 1. The Committee received a report that plans for the new laboratory school have been delayed thirty (30) days in the office of the Division of Architecture and Engineering, and that hence plans cannot be ready to be released for bids until at least November 1. (For the information of the Board only.)
- 2. Employment of Gilbert A. Johnson, architect, of Rockford, to perform the following services in connection with the new laboratory school, at a rate of eight-tenths of one per cent of the total actual cost: advertising for bids; investigation of bidders, checking of shop drawings, consultations with resident supervisors, and other necessary services exclusive of resident service.

Western Illinois State College

1. The Coggeshall Construction Company, of Macomb be granted a contract to repair blacktop roadways on the campus, said work not to exceed a cost of \$1,694. (To be paid from surplus money remaining after construction of Seal Hall, Series 1954 bond issue.)

amount of money expended was increased less than 2%.

She taught one year at Ridgeville, Indiana, and has done substitute teaching in the Euclid, Ohio, public schools and at the Western Illinois State College. Her salary is \$200.00 per month.

Salaries approved by the Board for a faculty assistant in the Department of English and one in the Department of Physical Education for Men are not being spent this semester because properly qualified people did not apply.

Industrial Arts - George Sullivan is faculty assistant, so the graduate assistant stipend was not used. Department of Speech has loaned a sum for the first semester only to the Business Education Department - Mr. Jerome Rooke.

October 24, 1955

The regularly scheduled meeting of the Teachers College Board and the college presidents convened at 9:00 A.M. (D.S.T.), Monday, October 24, 1955, in the office of the late Governor Lowden on Sinnissippi Farm, the home of Mrs. Harriet Lowden Madlener. Lewis M. Walker, Chairman of the Board, presided.

Teachers College Board - Central Office

The first matter of business before the Board was the approval of the minutes of the meeting of September 19, 1955. Mr. Watson pointed out that, on Page 13, third line of the first paragraph, the words "as proposed" should be inserted after "bunk house." There being no further corrections to said minutes, it was unanimously agreed that the minutes of the meeting of September 19, 1955 be approved as corrected.

REPORTS OF OFFICERS OF THE BOARD

Chairman Walker reported that Dr. Fairchild had written expressing his appreciation to the Board for their action in naming

the Special Education Building at Illinois State Normal University in his honor.

Chairman Walker next reported that after the last meeting the Board committee appointed as a screening committee in the selection of a new president for Illinois State Normal University met and elected him as Chairman of this committee. Chairman Walker also stated that this committee has met once and plans to meet again on the first Sunday in November; he also reported that the faculty at Illinois State Normal University had selected the following people to serve on the Faculty Committee, which was created by the Board in connection with the selection of a president for Illinois State Normal University;

Dr. Browne presented his Report No. 39, as Executive Officer, which consisted of two parts; namely, Part I. Financial Summary for the 68th Biennium and Part II. Fall Term Enrollments, 1939-55.

Concerning Part I., Dr. Browne pointed out there were no deficiency or supplemental appropriations either for operating expenses or for capital outlay; there were no reappropriations for capital improvements made by the 69th General Assembly; there was a total of \$535,848.67 lapsed in General Revenue appropriations; expenditures out of Income Fund-Educational Operations totaled \$223,230.55 less than the amounts appropriated; and finally, the bond revenue projects showed improved financial operations during the past year. Part I. gave detailed tabulations showing an analysis of receipts, appropriations, expenditures, and funds lapsed for General Revenue and Income Fund-Educational Operations for each school and the Central Office and also an analysis of operations on revenue bond projects at each school.

Part II. of Report No. 39 consisted of a table showing fall term enrollments of resident college students for each college from 1939-55. Dr. Browne reported there are now 10,572 full and part-time students enrolled in college courses on the campuses of the four State teachers colleges.

Chairman Walker complimented Dr. Browne on this very detailed report.

Eastern Illinois State College

Dr. Buzzard presented his quarterly report, together with supplement, on Eastern Illinois State College and requested deletion of the following items:

The Teachers College Board, at its regular meeting on November 21, 1955, was informed of the death of the mother of President Leslie A. Holmes of Northern Illinois State College. The members of the Board wish to express their deep sympathy to President and Mrs. Holmes and the other members of the family. All the members of the Board, and others connected with the teachers colleges, will try by their thoughts and concern to ease the strain of these days.

Chairman Walker next reported that Dr. Maurice Weed, head of the Department of Music at Northern Illinois State College, had been honored recently by having his symphony composition win first place in a symphony composition contest sponsored by the National Symphony Orchestra of Washington, D.C. The Board commended Dr. Weed for his work in connection with this honor bestowed upon him.

Chairman Walker next reported that Dr. Fairchild is still in the hospital in Peoria undergoing treatment.

Chairman Walker next reported that the committees named to choose a president for Illinois State Normal University have met twice and another meeting is scheduled for Sunday, December 4. Chairman Walker stated that the committees are moving slowly but effectively.

Dr. Browne presented his Report No. 40, as Executive Officer, which covered items primarily for the information of the Board. Considerable discussion was held on the first item in Dr. Browne's report which dealt with the Exemption of Staff Members From Fees. At the September 19, 1955 Board meeting, the Board approved a request from Dr. Buzzard to adopt an exemption of course fees for three people at Eastern Illinois State College on the plan used currently by the University of Illinois (Page 24, 1955-56 Bulletin, University of Illinois.)

Mr. Summers recommended that the policy of exemption of staff members from fees stand as approved at the September 19, 1955 Board meeting for Eastern Illinois State College but this matter be referred to the Council of Presidents for discussion and their recommendation before any Board action is taken in allowing this policy at the other colleges. The Board concurred in Mr. Summers recommendation.

Chairman Walker suggested that the presidents incorporate all matters in the summary of their reports to the Board that they wish action on.

Referring to the Auxiliary Enterprise Operations at the colleges, Chairman Walker stated that it would be helpful if each president would report periodically to the Board on the results of these operations, if it is not too much trouble, particularly where food is served.

Dr. Browne next read correspondence he had received from Dr. Holmes regarding a request from the three divisions of the faculty of Northern Illinois State College for the re-instatement of the following sentences to Paragraph 7, Page 15, of the GOVERNING POLICIES (by Board action on May 17, 1954, these sentences were deleted):

"No suggestion adopted by such faculty organization should be arbitrarily over-ruled by the president. If the president does not concur in the faculty action, he should so advise the organization in writing, briefly stating his reasons. If the organization still wishes to press its suggestion, it should notify the Chairman of the Board and the president, and the Board should then decide the matter after a full hearing."

Considerable discussion was held regarding the above request from the three divisions of the faculty of Northern Illinois State College. Mr. Ropp moved that the language of the present policy be left as it is. The motion was seconded by Mr. Dunbar, and unanimously carried.

Chairman Walker commended the Building Committee for the fine work they have done in the studying of plans and specifications of the proposed new buildings for the teachers colleges, enabling the various architects to place these plans and specifications out for bids as fast as they have.

Dr. Larsen reported that work on the Laboratory School at Illinois State Normal University has been begun. In connection with this new building, Dr. Larsen also reported that a question has been raised regarding the expenditure of money in case any emergency should arise as it did when the general contractors ran into water while excavating for the basement of the Student Union Building at Illinois State Normal University. The Board recommended that anything along this line be delegated to the Advisory Committee with power to act.

Dr. Larsen next reported, as far as construction is concerned, the Student Union Building will be completed by July 1, 1956.

Dr. Larsen also reported that construction on the new Classroom Building will not start until the first of April, 1956, or even later, because of the delay in obtaining steel, but it is expected the building will be completed by August, 1957.

Mr. Stipes, Chairman of the Finance Committee, reported that the Finance Committee, together with Dr. Browne, had met with the Budgetary Commission and told them of various things the Board has done and of matters they contemplate for the future.

Mr. Dunbar spoke on this meeting with the Budgetary Commission, stating that Mr. Stipes called the Commission's attention to the increase in enrollment at all of the teachers colleges and he explained to them the building program of the colleges. Mr. Dunbar further stated that in all respects the Commission was very interested and they complimented the Board on the fine work it is doing and were very glad to be briefed on things that are planned for the future of the teachers colleges.

Mr. Houle, Chairman of the Special Committee to Study Public Relations Activities, reported that the Committee has appointed Mr. Stanley Elam, Director of Public Relations at Eastern Illinois State College, effective as of January 1, 1956, to handle Board publicity and publicity covering all of the colleges as authorized by the Board at the October meeting.

NEW BUSINESS

Dr. Browne reported that the January meeting is scheduled for January 16, 1956 in Springfield and recommended that the date of this meeting not be changed but that it be held in Chicago instead. The Board concurred in Dr. Browne's recommendation.

There being no further business to come before the Board at this time, Chairman Walker adjourned the meeting until the next regularly scheduled meeting on January 16, 1956, in Chicago, Illinois.

Northern Illinois State College

Mr. Dunn reported that, regarding the land acquistions for Northern Illinois State College, he has had conferences with the owners of these properties but no definite agreements have been reached as yet.

Since the parking of automobiles at all of the colleges is a trouble-some situation, Mr. Dunn stated he has been giving serious thought to a method to overcome this situation. Mr. Dunn suggested that a bill be introduced to the legislature which would authorize the Board to establish parking areas and to regulate the same, making it possible to assign parking spaces to certain individuals and an area for the use of guests of the college and to provide for general parking areas but if anyone parking in an area not assigned to him then there could be a minimum charge of \$5.00 and the right to have the car towed away, with the tow charge plus the \$5.00 being made a lien against the car.

Considerable discussion was held on Mr. Dunn's suggestion regarding the parking situation at the colleges. Chairman Walker recommended that Mr. Dunn pursue this matter further and report to the Board at a later date. The Board concurred in Chairman Walker's recommendation.

There being no further business to come before the Board at this time, Chairman Walker adjourned the meeting until the next regularly scheduled meeting on January 16, 1956, in Chicago, Illinois.

Significant in the above data is the fact that the sophomore class has increased 14.5 percent over that of 1954 and the junior class has increased 43.3 percent over that of 1954. This latter figure reflects the increased size if the freshman class entering in September 1953 and the fact that once past the freshman year students tend to remain until they graduate.

Freshman and senior classes have also increased (8.2 percent for freshmen; 4.1 percent for seniors), but to a lesser extent than the other classes. The large increase in the senior class will come next year (1956-1957). The problem of adequate faculty and classroom space will be a critical one next year.

2. Enrollment by Counties

The University continues to attract students from all over the state. There are students registered from 92 of the 102 counties this year. Those counties with 25 or more students registered in September 1955, together with the number of students from each, are listed:

3. Enrollment - Past, Present, and Future

The prediction of college enrollment is a difficult task since many factors are involved. The number of people of college age, the attractiveness of the college program, the extent to which students remain in college, the degree of success of college graduates, and the ability to provide adequate staff and housing are all important factors. Forecasts are dangerous, but the Teachers College Board must be aware of enrollment trends in order to plan for the growth of teacher education in Illinois.

For this reason we summarize what has been happening to enrollments at Illinois State Normal University since 1952 and
give some indication of what may be expected through 1961.
The data are based upon the prediction of college age students
in Illinois made by the American Association of Collegiate
Registrars and Admissions Officers in January 1954. The
charts indicate campus enrollments exclusive of University laboratory schools. We believe these estimates are conservative
and may well indicate minimum expectations. There is every
reason to think that the University will continue to attract capable students in ever increasing numbers. The problem of
providing adequate housing and staff will continue to be critical.

A study of the data presented above reveals a further reduction over 1954 in the number of classes with small enrollments. The number with enrollments under 5 has been reduced 24.1 percent, that of classes between 5 and 9 has been reduced 36.3 percent. The number of undergraduate classes with enrollments under 10 has been reduced from 109 to 73, a reduction of 33.0 percent.

Of the 73 classes with enrollments under 10, 44 are senior college level. These advanced courses obviously attract persons in specialized fields, but are important for them in preparation for teaching in these fields. Only 11.3 percent of all undergraduate courses offered this year have enrollments under 10.

That the average class size has been increasing during the past four years is readily discernible in the table which follows. Average class size has increased from 18.5 to 25.0 during this period. This is an increase of 35.1 percent.

The average size of graduate classes has increased from 6.3 to 8.4 since 1954, an increase of 33.3 percent. Since 1952 the average graduate class has increased 78.8 percent.

V. THE CURRICULUM

Approval of the following graduate courses is requested upon the recommendation of the Graduate Council. This request was presented to the Graduate Committee of the Board on November 11, 1955.

1. Department of Education and Psychology

a. Workshop in Education 300 2-6 semester hours

Designed for experienced professional workers in the field of education. Emphasis given to serving superin-

tendents, principals, supervisors, and teachers who are presently responsible for some aspect of curriculum study and/or program improvement in their schools. Primary concern with the analysis and solution of practical and onthe-job educational problems. Procedure: exact statement of problems for study; critical examination of the literature on research and existing practice in the problem to be followed by reports, discussion, and conclusions. Prerequisite: Teaching experience.

b. Philosophy of Education 410

3 semester hours

An examination of the social forces and schools of philosophical thought which have contributed to education and which are influencing current educational practices. Designed to help students achieve a functional educational philosophy applicable in their teaching situations.

- 2. Department of Health and Physical Education for Women
 - a. Problems in Dance 310

2 semester hours

Current problems in the teaching of dance on all levels, in the administration of dance curricula, in the planning and direction of dance recitals and demonstrations, in the organization and supervision of dance clubs and extra-curricular activities.

- 3. Department of Industrial Arts
 - a. Philosophy of the Practical Arts and Vocational Education 441

3 semester hours

A study of the philosophy and principals upon which the practical arts and vocational education are based. The course is intended to serve administrators and teachers, especially teachers of practical arts and vocational subjects.

- 4. Department of Mathematics
 - a. Teaching of Junior High School Mathematics 302

2 semester hours

Significant problems, points of view, and trends in teaching of junior high school mathematics. Investigation of research and reports related to organization, content, and techniques in this field. Opportunity for study of particular problems of individual interest.

b. Fundamental Concepts of Geometry 312 3 semester hours

A postulational development of projective geometry which leads to the definition of a geometry as a set of elements together with certain transformations. Discovering how Euclidean plane geometry is related to and often a special case of many other geometries. Prerequisite: Calculus 115 or concurrent registration.

c. Fundamental Concepts of Algebra 315 3 semester hours
Relating to elementary mathematics the fundamental concepts of higher mathematics (algebra and analysis).
Topics include a logical development of the real and complex number systems, metrices, determinants, function theory, and modern algebra. Prerequisite: Calculus 115 or concurrent registration.

d. Advanced Calculus 335

3 semester hours

This course is designed to be of special interest to first field students in physical science as well as students in mathematics. A standard course in advanced calculus including infinite series, multiple integrals, line integrals, vector analysis, and other related topics. Prerequisite: Calculus 116.

5. Department of Music

a. Orchestration 317

3 semester hours

Arranging for larger ensembles and for full band and orchestra; study of important works from viewpoint of instrumental techniques.

6. Department of Speech

a. Survey of Classical Rhetoric 326 3 semester hours Study of the ancient rhetoricians from Corax to Quintilian, with special emphasis upon the works of Aristotle and Cicero. Prerequisite: Speech 227.

VI. BUILDINGS AND GROUNDS

- 1. Student Union Building
 - a. On December 31, the building is nearly enclosed except for glass in certain areas. As of this date, approximately 52 percent of the work has been completed.
- 2. Laboratory School Building
 - a. Work has been progressing steadily except for a few days of inclement weather. Excavations have been continued, some footings have been poured, and formwork for walls is going up. Auditorium addition drawings are being developed in more detail.

3. Classroom Building

a. Critical material, especially steel, has a delivery date of about seven months. It has seemed wise therefore not to break ground until spring. However, shop drawings are being delivered to the architects regularly for checking so progress is being made even though not on the site.

IX. MISCELLANEOUS

1. Student Union Forward Movement

As we enter the final twelve months of the Student Union Campaign the total amount of cash and pledges stands at \$145,070.07, a figure that represents 96.6 percent of the established goal of \$150.000. The campaign started in May 1954 and was designed to be completed by January 1, 1957, a period of thirty-two months. During the remaining twelve months, it will be necessary to secure an average of \$411 per month in order to complete the campaign on schedule.

The giving to the Student Union Fund in Bloomington-Normal exceeded our expectations in a campaign of this type. At home the giving exceeded the \$94,250 goal by \$14,100.

It has been in the alumni phase of the campaign that we have had the greatest difficulty. Before the campaign started we anticipated that 1,060 alumni would make contributions out of a total list of about 11,000 (outside McLean County). To date, we have received gifts from 1,109 which indicates that our compilations regarding numbers were accurate.

We have been wrong in our estimates of the sizes of the average alumni gift. While we had hoped for 403 gifts of \$60 and 172 of from \$100 up, we actually received 1,109 gifts from alumni that averaged \$33.11 each. It is possible that the rather low average salary of teachers in this state is the reason for these lowered average gifts.

At the present time we have every reason to be confident that the goal of \$150,000 will be reached by the time the Centennial Year opens.

Recommendation:

The Centennial Committee met to evaluate the bids and representative samples of publications submitted by the bidders. Following much discussion, it was agreed that, since the Centennial History is a project undertaken only once in one hundred years, it should be a publication of highest quality and that therefore the selection of the deluxe edition should be recommended.

Since the sale of 500 copies of the book at \$4.00 each will

produce \$2000.00, and since it is expected that more than this number will be sold, it is recommended that the bid of the R.R.Donnelley and Sons Company of Chicago for the deluxe edition be accepted. The amount authorized in the Centennial Budget is \$6000.00 which is therefore the amount of the authorization requested. The remaining \$1380.00 for 2000 copies, or \$2588.3 for 3000 copies is to be paid from advance or post publication sales.

The remainder will come from reserve set aside for 1955-56 and contingency fund (\$45,000). Total estimate of funds required for six teachers plus two approved previously is \$45,000.

B. Change in Degree

Miss Olive L. Fite, assistant professor of English, has completed the requirements for the Ph.D. degree at North-western University and will be granted the degree of the June commencement.

C. Appointments

Two elective courses were dropped from the winter term program. Mrs. Morrow's salary was increased to \$250 per month effective December 1, 1955.

VIII. STUDENT LIFE

- A. Two meetings have been held during the 1955-56 academic year by the campus leaders group and the administrative officers of the college. Several good suggestions concerning the administration of the college have come from the students as a result of these meetings.
- B. Western's basketball team participated in the eight-team N.A.I.A. invitational tournament held in Omaha, Nebraska, December 28-30. Western won the tournament.
- C. The Western choir presented a Christmas concert on Wednesday evening, December 14. Open to the student body and public, this program was exceptionally well-attended.
- D. Western was represented by Mr. D. L. Bailey and five students at the National Rural Youth Conference which was

held at Jackson's Mill, West Virginia, during the fall quarter.

E. Eleven Members of Western's gymnastics team and their coach, Mr. Robert Clow, attended the Sarasota (Florida) Gymnastics Clinic, December 25 to January 1. Events of the week included clinics on methods and techniques of gymnastics, exhibitions, two meets, and appearances on TV shows. Glen Wilson, a Western student, participated in the North-South All Star Meet and placed third on trampoline. Six Western students participated in the National Night of Stars Exhibition.

IX. MISCELLANEOUS

A. Rebuilding of concert grand piano

We have had since 1944 a concert grand piano, which was a used piano when purchased, that is used for recitals and musical programs, both professional and nonprofessional. Mr. Wanninger and Dr. Julstrom of our music department have been requesting for the past two years that the piano either be repaird or traded in, as it is in a very poor state of repair. We asked Lyon and Healy Company, Chicago, to make a survey which they have done.

A new Steinway concert grand with accelerated action and diaphragmatic sounding board costs \$6,555 less 10%, or \$5,900. They would allow us \$1,500 on our old piano which would make a net price of \$4,400 for a new piano.

Lyon and Healy Company can repair our present piano for \$1,135.

We recommend that the piano be rebuilt. The head of the music department has investigated this matter and has found that a rebuilt piano is almost as good as a new one and would serve our purposes very well. The cost of the repairs will be paid from contractual services.

REPORT OF THE NORTHERN ILLINOIS STATE COLLEGE

January 16, 1956

I. STUDENTS

No report.

II. FACULTY

Resignation

Dr. Carl Proehl, assistant director, student teaching, effective November 30, 1955 in order to accept a position as Educational Officer with the United States Naval School at Pensacola, Florida. This is a position which is similar to that of an academic dean in a college.

Leave of Absence Because of Illness

Mr. James Meldrum, assistant professor, Department of Social Science, beginning December 26, 1955 because of illness.

Return From Leave of Absence

Mr. James Meldrum, assistant professor, Department of Social Science, has been on leave of absence because of illness since December 26, 1955. At the time he left his teaching duties, his doctor could not give us assurance when he could return, so we employed Dr. Danton Sailor to take his place for the remainder of the college year. Mr. Meldrum now finds that he will be able to resume his work beginning February 1, 1956. Since the enrollment in social science classes is large, it is fortunate that we will have Mr. Meldrum in addition to Dr. Sailor for the second semester.

Replacements

Dr. Danton Sailor, assistant professor, Department of Social Science, replacing Mr. James Meldrum for the first semester at a salary of \$520 per month beginning November 28, 1955 and for the remainder of the college year. Dr. Sailor earned all three degrees at the University of Illinois, has taught at Wayne University, Detroit, at the University of Illinois, and at Illinois State Normal University. This is a temporary appointment and has been approved by the Advisory Committee.

Dr. George D. Weigel, associate professor, Department of Education, replacing Dr. Thomas Ringness who resigned in August, at a salary of \$600 per month beginning February 1. Dr. Weigel has his bachelor's degree from Oakland City College, Indiana, his master's degree from Indiana University and his doctorate from Western Reserve University. He has had successful teaching experience at Indiana University and comes to Northern from a position at Western Reserve University, Cleveland, Ohio.

Permission to Add Staff Member for the Second Semester

We should like to have permission to employ an additional staff member in the Department of Business Education beginning with the second semester, 1956, on a temporary basis. The over-load in this department is so great that it is necessary to add a number of classes. Dr. Browne concurs in this recommendation.

New Appointment

Mr. Carl Bobbish, instructor, Department of Music, at a salary of \$440 per month beginning November 7 on a temporary basis for the remainder of the college year to teach the overflow classes in piano. Mr. Bobbish has his bachelor's and master's degrees from the Oberlin Conservatory of Music at Oberlin, Ohio and comes to Northern from a teaching position at the Detroit Conservatory of Music. This position has been previously approved by the Advisory Committee.

Changes in the Payroll - Previously Approved by the Advisory Committee

Mr. William Davis who is employed on a co-operative arrangement with the DeKalb Public Schools as band instructor at the McMurry Laboratory School, from one afternoon per week to two afternoons per week beginning November 1 at a salary of \$545 additional for nine months, making a total salary for Mr. Davis for this college year of \$968.85.

Mrs. Frances McGirr, substitute teacher at McMurry Laboratory School, at \$12 per day from November 14 through November 23 because of illness of the first grade teacher, Miss Margaret Steil. Mrs. McGirr has her bachelor's degree from Northern and has had three years' teaching experience.

Tentative Arrangement for Student Health Service - Previously Approved by the Advisory Committee

Because of the very heavy load in the Health Service, we should like to try on a temporary basis beginning with the final week in November, the employment of local physicians from the county medical society to work a two-hour period a day for four days during the college week. These doctors receive a rate of payment of \$10 per hour with the total not to exceed \$2,000 for the year.

Change of Status

Mr. Gwynn Greene, assistant professor, Department of Education on a nine-months basis, to coordinator, student teaching, on a twelve months basis at his regular salary of \$560 per month, replacing Dr. Carl Proehl who resigned. Mr. Greene will begin his duties on February 1. He plans to complete the work for his doctor's degree by the end of this academic year.

V. THE CURRICULUM

Offerings in the Graduate School

The material on changes in offerings in the graduate school was considered at the November board meeting by the Curriculum Committee of the Board. The changes suggested as a result of the meeting of the committee have been incorporated in the revised material which we are sending to the Curriculum Committee for its approval. We hope the Board will concur with the recommendations of the committee as to courses and staff.

Extension Center for Graduate Credit

We should like to have approval to use Freeport as a center in which graduate courses may be offered. Both administrators and teachers feel the need for graduate courses in this area. The junior high school is new and the senior high school contains modern classrooms. The library facilities are excellent. Since these schools are strategically located to serve not only the local people but also many from near-by communities, the need for graduate courses has been evident for several years.

VI. BUILDINGS AND GROUNDS

Grounds

New Land

We have received the very gratifying information to the effect that Mr. Baumgartner has signed the necessary papers to sell 131.1 acres of land at the appraisal price. The speed at which this transaction has taken place was only possible through the cooperation of Mr. Baumgartner's attorney, Mr. Dunn, attorney for the Board, and the great interest the State Teachers College Board had in obtaining the land for the college. We now are able to start planning for the best use of this new land.

It will be necessary to have an accurate survey of the land obtained from Mr. Baumgartner. We have received the following proposal from Mr. Knetsch of the S. W. KNETSCH & ASSOCIATES, which reads as follows:

- "For drafting and calculating time, including the delivery of certified plat of survey, ink on linen \$ 4 per hour
- "In connection with the above survey, Knetsch & Associates will furnish and set concrete monuments 5" in diameter by 30" long, at any property corners designated by the college, for an additional cost of \$7.50 per monument."

Because of the irregularity of this property, it will be necessary to set 14 monuments at a cost of \$105. The total cost of the survey will not exceed \$458 and the monuments at \$7.50 each (\$105) will bring the total to \$563.00. We should like to recommend that the Board accept the Knetsch proposal for a survey and monuments not to exceed a total of \$563.00, to be paid from the appropriation for land.

Grounds

Mr. A. W. Jackson, whose property the Board took formal action to acquire for the college, has now decided that the appraisal value of \$26,000 is not sufficient. I have asked Mr. Dunn if he would proceed with condemnation action.

Stream Between Normal Road and Castle Drive

As fast as the winter weather permits, we are clearing the valley of the stream that flows between Normal Road and Cas-

tle Drive, looking forward to the time when the channel itself can be cleared and straightened, thus ultimately improving drainage in the area of our west campus.

Parking

A parking lot to hold 125 cars has been completed on the west campus one block west of the library. The men in charge of the grounds levelled the area and gravelled it. This gives us a place to park cars that is satisfactory excepting in wet weather. When the gravel has settled, we may have it oiled. The new lot does not solve the parking problem, but it helps.

Channel of the Kishwaukee River

For several years, the city has been considering the possibility of straightening the channel of the Kishwaukee River which would involve our campus in the over-all project. Federal engineers have been working on this project which if approved, might involve minor changes and in widening of the Kishwaukee River where it flows through the campus.

Buildings

As this board report is being written, we are looking forward to the opening of bids for the three new buildings, the dates of which are as follows:

Laboratory School - Friday, January 6 at 2:00 p.m. Classroom Building - Thursday, February 2 at 2:00 p.m. Field House - Thursday, February 16 at 2:00 p.m.

We hope that as many members of the Board will be present as possible. All bids will be opened here at Northern.

VII. AUXILIARY ENTERPRISES

VIII. STUDENT LIFE

We should like to report that a group of students led by the Veterans Club, has begun a campaign which at this time seems highly successful, to raise funds for a campus flag pole.

Ice Skating -- Whenever weather permits, many of our students enjoy the use of the college lagoon for skating. This year the weather, being unusually cold, has given them a great opportunity to indulge in this sport. I have heard a number of students express their appreciation for the use of this recreational facility that was made possible several years ago by the purchase of an ice planer.

IX. MISCELLANEOUS

Furniture - Student Union Building

Approval was given at the August meeting of the Teachers College Board, page 8, for the Advisory Committee of Northern to be empowered to approve the purchase of furniture

and equipment for the new dining room in the Student Union Building, total cost not to exceed \$3,500. However, in view of the fact that considerable time has elapsed because of the difficulty of locating the type of furniture that would meet our needs, we are asking the Board's authorization to purchase the necessary furniture. We have received bids from nine companies, covering 34 tables and 144 chairs, net prices f.o.b. DeKalb, as follows:

Signal Honor to Dr. Maurice Weed and Northern

In October, 1955, Dr. Maurice Weed, head of the Department of Music, was notified that he was one of three in the United States whose symphony would be played in Washington, D.C. Following the contest, Dr. Weed was notified that he had won first prize of \$2,000. Northern feels very proud of Dr. Weed and feels that through him, the college has achieved real distinction in the field of music. The contest was sponsored by the Lincoln Therese Filene Foundation to promote American Music. Judges were from Yale University, Philadelphia Conservatory of Music, and the Eastman School of Music. The members of the Board commended Dr. Weed for his work.

Rock River Methodist Conference

The college has made arrangements with the Rock River Division of the Methodist Church which requested permission to hold its conference on the campus June 21 to June 25, 1956. All the regulations will be followed according to cost of rooms and food, with allowance for a reasonable profit for the college for the use of its facilities.

North Central Committee to Re-visit Northern

A committee of two, appointed by the North Central Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools, will visit Northern on January 12 and 13.

TEPS Conference - June 28-July 2, 1955

At the meeting of the Board, we plan to give to each board member, a copy of "Teacher Education: The Decade Ahead," and the DeKalb conference report as well as a copy of the "Companion Volume to Teacher Education: The Decade Ahead," a report of the clinic sessions of the DeKalb conference.

REPORTS OF OFFICERS OF THE BOARD

Chairman Walker reported he had received a letter from Dr. Fairchild, written while he was at home during the holidays. He stated that Dr. Fairchild plans to return to the hospital in Peoria for continuation of treatments.

Chairman Walker next read a letter he had received from Professor William S. Gray, College of Education, University of Chicago, regarding a proposed campaign for contributions for the establishment of a William Claude Reavis Professorship in Educational Administration at the University. Following some discussion, Chairman Walker stated that, as far as the Board is concerned, this is an individual matter and recommended that each member who cares to contribute to this do so direct; as for contributions from faculty members of the four teachers colleges, he recommended that the presidents decide what method they wish to follow in the solicitation of funds and contact Professor Gray personally on this matter. The Board concurred in Chairman Walker's recommendations. The Board also instructed Dr. Browne to write Professor Gray, telling him of the Board's decision regarding members of the Board and the college faculties regarding contributions to establish a professorship in honor of Dr. Reavis.

Chairman Walker next reported he had received a letter from Mrs. Erma S. Andres, daughter of the late H. H. Schroeder, expressing the gratitude of the Schroeder family to the Teachers College Board for the honor bestowed on their father in the naming of the new classroom building at Illinois State Normal University "SCHROEDER HALL."

Chairman Walker next reported that the committees named to choose a president for Illinois State Normal University are still holding meetings and interviewing candidates, and another meeting is scheduled for January 29 at Illinois State Normal University.

Dr. Browne presented his Report No. 41, as Executive Officer, which consisted of four parts; namely, Part I. Rehabilitation and Modernization; Part II. Foundations at the Four Colleges; Part III. Expenditures for Personal Services; and Part IV. Miscellaneous.

Little time was given to Part I. of his report as Dr. Browne stated the Building Committee would report on this later in the day.

Part II. of Dr. Browne's report was a brief summary of the Foundations at each of the four colleges, said Foundations being non-profit organizations for charitable and educational purposes, authorized to hold and administer gifts of money and property.

Dr. Browne presented a brief report on the operation of each foundation and stated that if any Board member would wish further data on these foundations the Central Office would be glad to furnish it as copies of all audits are now on file.

Regarding Part III. of his report, Dr. Browne stated he chose to report on this since it is the largest part of the appropriation and needs to be watched more carefully. In connection with this appropriation, Dr. Browne presented a projection for the coming fiscal year which indicated all of the colleges will remain well within their appropriations for personal services.

Part IV. of Dr. Browne's report covered miscellaneous items, and he requested that Item 3. be deleted. Dr. Browne recommended Board approval of the following which appears in Part IV. of his report:

As of February 1, 1956, Miss Denysia Bastas be granted permanent status and that her salary be increased to \$300 a month.

In addition to his written report, Dr. Browne reported that the Council of Presidents had met on January 9, 1956, and he presented various matters they had agreed upon covering student dormitory contracts, out-of-state tuition fees, hospital affiliation, fees for part-time students, and exemption of staff members from fees. Regarding the exemption of staff members from fees, Dr. Browne reported the Council of Presidents recommended that Eastern Illinois State College continue the exemption that was authorized by the Board last September throughout the present academic year but that beginning September 1, 1955 none of the colleges would provide exemption of staff members from fees. Dr. Browne requested Board approval of the foregoing recommendation of the Council of Presidents regarding the exemption of staff members from fees.

Dr. Browne next reported that the February meeting is scheduled for February 20, in Chicago, Illinois, and he suggested that the meeting be held at Illinois State Normal University instead. Since the dedication of Walker Hall is scheduled for the evening of February 23, Dr. Larsen suggested that the February meeting be held on that date thus enabling those Board members who wish to attend the dedication ceremony.

Mr. Watson moved the approval of the following:

- 1. Miss Denysia Bastas be granted permanent status and her salary be increased to \$300 a month, beginning February 1, 1956.
- 2. Exemption of staff members from fees be continued at Eastern Illinois State College, as authorized by the Board in September, 1955, throughout the present academic year, but that beginning September 1, 1956, none of the colleges would provide exemption of staff members from fees.
- 3. The date and place of the next meeting of the Board be

Belshe, Chairman of the Curriculum Committee at Illinois State Normal University.

Dr. Belshe thanked the Board for the opportunity of making his presentation. He explained in detail the function of the Curriculum Committee, outlining problems it has solved and those problems that remain to be solved in reorganizing the curriculum of teacher education. Dr. Belshe's presentation was followed by an open discussion regarding some of the basic problems to be solved in the curriculum of teacher education.

Chairman Walker expressed his appreciation to Dr. Belshe, in which the other Board members joined, for his presentation and the time spent in preparing to bring this before the Board.

Chairman Walker then introduced to the Board his son-in-law, Lt. Col. Marvin Stanford, of Alexandria, Virginia.

REPORTS OF OFFICERS OF THE BOARD

Dr. Browne presented his Report No. 42 as Executive Officer, which dealth with the subject "Some Questions For Teacher Education in Illinois."

Dr. Browne stated that in seeking to plan for the next fifteen years (when college enrollments are predicted to show vast increases) he has found it necessary to ask many questions regarding the securing of adequate physical plants, the securing of sufficient number of qualified faculty members for the colleges, and the improvement of the quality of education in the colleges to prepare better teachers.

Dr. Browne further stated that the answers are not known to many of the questions presented in his report, but he feels they need to be asked and the various alternative solutions explored.

Such salary adjustments should, of course, be limited to the provisions of the schedule.

d. Policy on use of the option to permit sabbatical leave to be used for one-half year at full pay.

- c. The president shall have full discretion in selecting the semester, term, or portion of the year of such leave so as to promote the best interests of the college.
- d. No faculty member shall receive more than two such leaves."

Browne, Executive Officer of the Teachers College Board, is hereby designated to serve as Secretary for the Faculty Committee and as Secretary for the Board Committee, and as Secretary for the Joint Committees, if joint sessions are held.

The Faculty Committee shall consider all names submitted by the Chairman of the Board for evaluation and shall report to the Board its conclusions as to the administrative, educational, scholarship and other qualifications of each individual submitted for evaluation, and,

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that any person may submit to the Board the name of any individual or individuals believed to be qualified for president.

Mr. Stipes stated that the May 21, 1956 meeting of the Board is scheduled to be held at Eastern Illinois State College. Since the fiscal agents are preparing to have bond bids opened on that date for the proposed student center, cafeteria, and dormitory building at Western Illinois State College, Mr. Stipes recommended that arrangements be made whereby the morning session of the Board meeting would be held at Eastern Illinois State College and following luncheon the Board would reconvene at the U. S. Grant Hotel, in Mattoon, Illinois, where the opening of bond bids would be held. The Board concurred in Mr. Stipes' recommendation.

In accordance with the resolution adopted September 19, 1955, regarding the selecting of a new president for Illinois State Normal University, the Board and Faculty screening committees were to interview and evaluate individuals under consideration by the Board, and after deliberation, these two committees were to report to the Board with comments on not less than three individuals; then the final evaluation and consideration of the individuals submitted by these two screening committees would be conducted by the Board acting as a Committee of the whole.

The Faculty screening committee of Illinois State Normal University and the Board screening committee then presented their recommendations to the Board, which was acting as a Committee of the whole. In all the discussions, there was a complete agreement that Illinois State Normal University would continue to be in the foreseeable future an institution devoted to teacher education and that it would seek to uphold its position as a national leader among the single-purpose teachers colleges of the country. All of the candidates recommended to the Board were informed of this policy and agreed with it fully.

Following a thorough evaluation and consideration of the recommendations submitted by the Board and Faculty screening committees, Dr. Nickell moved that a unanimous ballot be cast for Dr. Robert G. Bone for president of Illinois State Normal University, at a yearly salary of \$13,000, and that Dr. Bone offically take over the duties of president of Illinois State Normal University not later than September 1, 1956. The motion was seconded by Mr. Houle, roll was called, and the vote was as follows:

The motion was seconded by Mr. Ropp, and unanimously carried.

V. THE CURRICULUM

At its regular meeting on February 14, the faculty approved the following programs:

- 1. A second teaching field in the area of General Science.

 This is a cooperative program of the departments of Biological Science, Geography, and Physical Science.
- 2. A comprehensive teaching field in English-Journalism. This program will better prepare teachers to direct high school student publications.
- 3. A curriculum for the preparation of teachers for the junior high school grades. This program makes it possible for

those interested in teaching those of early adolescent years to prepare specifically for that field. The program emphasizes preparation of the so-called "home-room teacher." Emphasis is on English, Science, and Social Science, with some opportunity for specialization in one or more of these areas.

VI. BUILDINGS AND GROUNDS

1. Student Union Building

Plastering has been going on at a rapid rate and it is anticipated that millwork and interior finish can be started on the third floor within the next two weeks. Most of the heavy mechanical equipment is installed and a portion of the kitchen equipment is on the site. It is estimated that the building is approximately 75 percent complete.

2. Elementary-Junior High School Building

Practically all underground foundations, walls, and the major portion of mechanical work underground has been completed. Part of the footings for the auditorium addition are installed and face brick work has started. A considerable amount of material is on the site. The building is estimated to be approximately 15 percent complete.

3. Schroeder Hall

The site is being cleared and contractors are moving in. No actual work will be started, however, for a month or six weeks.

I. STUDENTS - Explanatory Note on Size of Classes Which Follow

Excluding registrations for private lessons in music for independent study on the graduate level, and for student teaching, the number of classes under 10 shows an appreciable decline over the number a year ago. This decline should continue as enrollment increases.

The classes listed on the following pages with enrollments under 10 were necessary to enable majors to meet their needs and to complete a program of classes. Classes numbered "400" under the caption "undergraduate and graduate" also involve graduate students who need these courses to complete sequences in their programs. There are a few exceptions, as follows:

Business Education 213 is the third and most advanced course in shorthand. It is required of majors in secretarial training.

Education 481 and 485 are courses offered for nine weeks to dovetail with the nine weeks' student teaching program for high school teachers. Some departments do not have a special methods course and do not have nine weeks' courses. It was necessary to schedule these courses to enable these students to make a schedule. They are being brought into balance and will grow. For example, there are two sections of 485 this semester with 28 and 33 enrolled in them.

Fine Arts 331 is a ceramics class which is limited by the number of potters' wheels and work spaces. Fine Arts 430 and 431 are advanced painting courses in which much individual instruction is necessary.

Home Economics 251 is required of all majors. The laboratory accommodates no more than 18 but 24 students had to have the course. Home Economics 444 is limited by the accommodations in the Home Management House.

Physical Education 105 is a course of adapted activities for students in poor or who have physical handicaps.

REPORTS OF OFFICERS OF THE BOARD

Chairman Walker reported that Mr. Stanley Elam, who is the Board's publicity appointee, Mr. O T. Banton of the Lindsay-Schaub newspapers, and Miss Ruth Dunbar of the Sun Times were present representing newspaper coverage of this meeting.

Chairman Walker next reported that the faculty at Eastern Illinois State College had selected the following people to serve on the Faculty Screening Committee, which was created by the Board, in connection with the selection of a president for Eastern Illinois State College:

Chairman Walker stated that both the Faculty and Board Screening Committees had held a joint meeting on April 8, 1956, and another meeting has been scheduled for April 22, 1956. Chairman Walker further stated that the Board Screening Committee did not submit a single name to the Faculty Screening Committee so they will be starting the selection of a president for Eastern from "scratch"; also all credentials of applicants for the presidency at Illinois State Normal University have been returned so the only thing remaining from that selection which can now be used is the background of experience.

Dr. Browne presented his Report No. 44 as Executive Officer which consisted of four parts; namely, Part I. Placements of 1955 Graduates; Part II. Contractors' Guarantees; Part III. Site Conditions Encountered in Construction; and Part IV. Central Office Staff for 1956-1957.

In Part I. of his report, Dr. Browne presented a comparison of the number of degrees granted with the number of teachers placed

in all four colleges from 1952 through 1955. He stated that the record for placement of teachers in 1955 is the best of the past four years.

Regarding Part II., Dr. Browne stated that, at the request of the Board at its meeting in January, he had investigated this matter, together with Mr. Dunn. He reported that as a result of this investigation the Central Office has already put into effect the strengthening of the performance bonds which the contractors are required to carry.

Dr. Browne next reported that Part III, was also being presented by Board request. He stated that there is some doublt as to the wisdom of spending money on soil borings except where new areas are being first used for construction.

Under the control of this Board are the four teachers colleges of the State of Illinois: Northern Illinois State College, DeKalb; Illinois State Normal University, Normal; Western Illinois State College, Macomb; and Eastern Illinois State College, Charleston.

Legal Authority:- These bonds will be issued by The Teachers College Board of the State of Illinois for Northern Illinois State College at DeKalb, Illinois, pursuant to the provisions of an act authorizing the Board to build and equip field houses, residence halls, student union buildings and other structures with the proceeds of bonds payable from the revenues thereof (Sections 59a to 59e, Chapter 127, Illinois Revised Statutes 1955), approved by the General Assembly of the State of Illinois; and pursuant to a resolution to be adopted by the Board.

Northern Illinois State College, with an enrollment of over 3,000, is the largest of the four Illinois State Teachers Colleges. It is located about 60 miles west of Chicago at DeKalb, Illinois, a city of approximately 10,000 population, not including college students. Established in 1895, it is accredited by the North Central Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools and by the American Association of Colleges for Teachers Education. The College faculty has over 170 members and fixed assets are valued in excess of

\$10 million with capital appropriations on hand for adding \$3.1 million during the current 1955-57 biennium. The campus presently consists of over 200 acres, and the College has contracted for the purchase of an additional 131 acres for which a separate state appropriation has been made.

No tuition is charged students attending the College. Fees are charged to cover registration, activities and student union, which presently total \$50.50 per student per regular semester or \$101 for a full academic year. Summer session fees amount to \$25.25.

Purpose of Bond Issue: The proceeds from the sale of these \$400,000 bonds, together with a state appropriation of \$950,000, are to be used to finance the construction of a new physical education building (field house) on the campus. The architect's estimated cost of the project and the source of funds are shown below:

Notes: - (a) Based on bids received 2/29/56. Contracts will be covered by performance bonds. Completion date is scheduled for 12/31/56. (b) This appropriation has been made by the state legislature specifically for this project.

Description of Project: - The new physical education building (field house) is to consist primarily of a large multi-purpose room 312 feet long by 170 feet wide with a removable basketball floor and transportable bleacher seating to accommodate 5,000 persons. Other facilities and space include locker rooms to accommodate 1,400 students, 2 classrooms, a handball court, several large storage areas, a track gallery and offices.

Security: - These bonds will be secured by a closed first lien on the net operating revenues of the new physical education building (field house). The Board covenants to continuously operate and manage the building; to adopt rules and regulations designed to assure the maximum use of the building; and to charge and collect rates, fees and charges, including student fees, for the use of the building adequate to meet the requirements of the bond resolution which are summarized below.

In addition to serving as the center for indoor extracurricular athletic and large social activities, the building will be used for the curricular physical education program of the College. It is in connection with this regular curricular use that there is expected to be incurred the building's major operating and maintenance expense which will be paid from the College's general operating funds derived almost entirely from state appropriation. In the bond resolution the Board covenants:

That it will not permit any free use of the building except for curricular activities of the College, and then only to the extent

(a) that there are available from sources other than student fees and other charges for the use of the building (i.e. from the College's general operating funds) funds fully sufficient to pay the operation and maintenance expense of the project for such use and (b) that the availability of the project for revenue producing activities is adequate to provide revenues fully sufficient to meet the requirements of the bond resolution.

The gross income and revenues derived from the student fees and charges collected for the use of the building shall, within 3 days after receipt thereof, be paid to the Treasurer of the State of Illinois and shall be credited by him to special accounts in the order shown below:

- 1. Monthly, to the Operation and Maintenance Account, only such an amount of money as is needed, if any, to meet a deficiency from funds derived from other sources (i.e. from the College's general operating funds) for payment of operating and maintenance expense for such month.
- 2. Monthly, to the Bond Account, beginning 4/1/57, 1/6th of the interest then next due and, beginning 4/1/58, 1/12th of the principal then next due on these bonds.
- 3. Semiannually beginning 10/10/57, to the Bond Reserve Account, \$2,000 until \$20,000 has been accumulated.
- 4. Semiannually beginning 10/10/57, to the Depreciation Account, \$2,000 to establish and maintain this account at \$20,000. (Depreciation funds may be used, if necessary, for the payment of principal or interest on these bonds.)
- 5. All funds remaining unallocated on June 30th in each year, after all the above deposits have been made, shall be deemed surplus revenues, and may be used by The Teachers College Board for any lawful purpose.

Student Fees and Charges: The Teachers College Board has established the initial field house student fee at \$4.50 per student per semester and \$2.25 per student per summer session, effective at the beginning of the September 1956 semester. The student fee will be increased from the initial \$4.50-\$2.25 level at any time necessary to provide revenues sufficient to meet the requirements of the bond resolution. Other rates and charges for specific use of and service by the building shall be established from time to time by the Business Manager of Northern Illinois State College, provided that such rates and charges shall be sufficient at all times to produce gross revenues equal to at least the direct operating expenses of such uses and services.

Estimated Revenues: The basic source of revenue for the payment of debt service on these bonds will be student fees. The following schedule shows that a student fee of only \$4.50 per student per semester and \$2.25 per student per summer session will provide adequate coverage of debt service:

Future Enrollment:- A detailed study of college enrollments, prepared in 1951 by the Bureau of Institutional Research of the University of Illinois, indicates that, based on records of actual births through 1949 (the most recent year available at the time the study was made), total college enrollments in Illinois will steadily increase from the current year through 1967-68, the last year on which births through 1949 determine such college enrollments. Based on these percentage increases, applied to Northern's 1955 full time fall enrollment of 2,760, it can be expected that future enrollment will increase to an estimated 4,339 by 1967-68 (57.2% increase).

Present Outstanding Debt at Northern Illinois State College:-

Series 1950 Student Residence Halls Revenue Bonds -- \$1,070,000 Series 1953 Building Revenue Bonds -- 1,500,000

These issues are payable solely from the net operating revenues of residence halls, dining halls and the student union building.

Debt History: The Teachers College Board of the State of Illinois has, since 1947 when enabling legislation was passed, issued revenue bonds to finance nine projects at the colleges under its control. In each case the Board has required that the facilities, as soon as built, be operated in such a way as to produce revenues substantially in excess of all requirements including those for various reserves.

Three of these nine bond issues have been for facilities at Northern Illinois State College. The first was payable from revenues of the student union building and the dining hall and has been fully retired substantially in advance of maturity from funds on hand.

The second issue at Northern was the Series 1950 Student Residence Halls Revenue issue in the amount of \$1,350,000, issued to finance the construction of Gilbert Hall and to improve Adams and Williston Halls, and secured by revenues derived from the operation of these three dormitories. Below are shown operating data relative to said bond issue:

Neptune Hall, the principal source of revenue, was first opened for occupancy in the fall semester of 1955 so operating data for a full year are not yet available. RESOLUTION creating an issue of \$400,000 Physical Education Building Revenue Bonds, Series 1956, of The Teachers College Board of the State of Illinois for Northern Illinois State College at DeKalb, Illinois, and providing for the security and delivery of said bonds.

WHEREAS, The Teachers College Board of the State of Illinois for Northern Illinois State College at DeKalb, Illinois (hereinafter designated the "Teachers College Board"), upon due consideration and investigation does now find and determine that it is necessary and essential for the proper conduct, management and operation, and in furtherance and for the benefit of The Northern Illinois State College at DeKalb, Illinois, to acquire, construct, equip and furnish a physical education building on the campus of said College, to be used and held for use as a fieldhouse and indoor stadium for said College, to include a large multi-purpose room, locker rooms, track gallery, indoor courts with a removable basketball floor, bleachers to accommodate approximately 5,000 persons, with classrooms for physical education and offices, and all necessary equipment and appurtenances therefor (hereinafter designated the "project"); and

WHEREAS, this Teachers College Board has heretofore approved plans and specifications for the construction of the project, completely equipped and furnished, at a cost estimate of

\$1,350,000; and

WHEREAS, the General Assembly of the State of Illinois by Senate Bill No. 763, approved July 1, 1955, has appropriated the sum of \$950,000 for part of the cost of constructing the project (together with funds to be secured from other sources) and it is determined necessary to raise the sum of \$400,000 by an issue of revenue bonds to complete the construction of the project; and

WHEREAS, this Teachers College Board is authorized, under the laws of the State of Illinois thereunto enabling, to issue revenue bonds to secure funds to pay in part the cost of constructing the project and the income, revenue and receipts to be derived from the use and operation of the project are determined adequate to pay such bonds so to be issued:

NOW, THEREFORE, Be It and It Is Hereby Resolved by The Teachers College Board of the State of Illinois for Northern Illinois State College at DeKalb, Illinois, as follows:

Section 1. That there be constructed a physical education building for Northern Illinois State College at DeKalb, Illinois, on the campus of said College as described in the preambles of this resolution, and it is hereby declared that all recitals of fact contained in said preambles hereto are true, correct and complete.

Section 2. That for the purpose of raising the sum of \$400,000, which is determined necessary to pay a part of the cost of constructing the project, completely equipped and furnished, as recited in the preambles hereto, there is hereby authorized an issue of negotiable coupon revenue bonds of said Teachers College Board for said College in the principal sum of \$400,000.

Said bonds shall be designated "Physical Education Building Revenue Bonds, Series 1956," of The Teachers College Board of the State of Illinois for Northern Illinois State College at DeKalb, Illinois, shall bear date of April 1, 1956, be of \$1,000 denomination and numbered from 1 through 400, and shall mature serially, subject to the right of prior redemption as hereinafter mentioned, on April 1 in each of the years and in amounts and bearing interest as follows:

The Teachers College Board reserves the right to call for redemption prior to maturity the bonds of said issue maturing on April 1 in each of the years 1965 through 1993, as a whole or in part in their inverse numerical order prior to their maturity on April 1, 1964, or on any interest payment date thereafter at a price of par, unpaid accrued interest to the date of redemption, and a premium in accordance with the following schedule:

- At 3 1/2% of the principal amount thereof if redeemed on April 1, 1964, or on any interest payment date thereafter up to and including October 1, 1968;
- At 2 1/2% of the principal amount thereof if redeemed on April 1, 1969, or on any interest payment date thereafter up to and including October 1, 1973;
- At 1 1/2% of the principal amount thereof if redeemed on April 1, 1974, or on any interest payment date thereafter up to and including October 1, 1978; and
- At 1/2% of the principal amount thereof if redeemed on April 1, 1979, or on any interest payment date thereafter up to and including October 1, 1983.

Notice of redemption of any or all of said bonds shall be given by publication at least once not less than thirty (30) days prior to the date of redemption in one financial newspaper published and of general circulation in the City of Chicago, Illinois, and such notice of redemption shall designate the date and place of redemption, the numbers and aggregate principal amount of bonds called for redemption, the place of redemption, which shall be the paying agent as expressed in said bonds, and shall state that the bonds so specified will be redeemed at a price of par, unpaid accrued interest to the date of redemption, plus the applicable redemption premium, and from and after the designated redemption date interest on all of said bonds so called for redemption shall cease.

Section 3. The said bonds shall be executed for and on behalf of Northern Illinois State College at DeKalb, Illinois, by the Chairman of the Teachers College Board, and attested by the Secretary thereof under the seal of said Board, and shall be countersigned by the Treasurer of the State of Illinois, and the interest coupons attached to said bonds evidencing the rates of interest hereinabove specified shall be executed by the facsimile signatures of said officials who by the execution of said bonds shall adopt as and for their own proper signatures their respective facsimile signatures appearing on said coupons.

The said bonds and coupons shall be payable to bearer provided, however, that such bonds may be subject to registration as to principal only at any time prior to maturity in the name of the holder thereof on the books of the Secretary of The Teachers College Board, such registration to be noted on the reverse side of the bonds by the Secretary and thereafter the principal of such bonds shall be payable only to the registered holder, his legal representatives or assigns. Such registered bond shall be transferred to another registered holder or back to bearer only upon presentation to said Secretary with a legal assignment duly acknowledged or approved. Registration of any of such bonds shall not affect the negotiability of the coupons thereto attached, but such coupons shall be transferable by delivery merely.

Interest accruing on this bond on and prior to the maturity date hereof shall be payable upon presentation and surrender of the interest coupons hereto attached as they subsequently become due, but no interest shall accrue on this bond after the maturity hereof, unless this bond be presented for payment at maturity and be not then paid.

- At 2 1/2% of the principal amount thereof if redeemed on April 1, 1969, or on any interest payment date thereafter up to and including October 1, 1973;

This bond is one of an authorized issue of \$400,000 bonds, all of like date, tenor and effect (except as to number, rate of interest, maturity, and provision for redemption prior to maturity) authorized by The Teachers College Board for Northern Illinois State College at DeKalb, Illinois, to pay in part, together with other funds to be made available therefor from an appropriation by the General Assembly of the State of Illinois under Senate Bill No. 763, approved July 1, 1955, the cost of the construction of a physical education building, completely equipped and furnished, on the campus of said College under and pursuant to the provisions of a resolution adopted by the Teachers College Board on the 16th day of April, 1956, and of Sections 59a through 59e of Chapter 127, Illinois Revised Statutes, 1955, and all other laws thereunto enabling; and this bond, and the issue of which it is one, is payable as to both principal and interest solely from and secured by a pledge of and a first lien on the net revenues derived from the operation of said physical education building so to be constructed as provided in said resolution.

This bond shall not be deemed to be an indebtedness of the State of Illinois or of The Teachers College Board or of the

Northern Illinois State College at DeKalb, Illinois.

It is hereby certified and recited that in issuing this bond and the series of which it is a part, The Teahhers College Board has covenanted and agreed in the resolution authorizing this bond to operate, use and maintain continuously said physical education building at all times in an efficient and economical manner; and to charge and collect for the use thereof fees and charges to pay all reasonable operating and maintenance expenses as provided in said resolution, and to pay when due the principal of and interest on this bond and the series of which it is one, and to maintain the Bond Reserve Account and the Depreciation Account created by said resolution in amounts fully sufficient therefor.

Section 5. Each of the \$400,000 principal amounts of bonds herein authorized is payable from and secured by a first lien on and pledge of the net revenues of the project. As used herein the term "net revenues" shall mean that part of the gross revenues remaining after payment of that portion of the reasonable and necessary cost of currently maintaining, repairing, insuring and operating the project as may be required to make up any deficiency

therefor from other funds made and to be made available for that purpose as provided herein.

None of the \$400,000 aggregate principal amount of bonds herein authorized shall be entitled to priority of one over the other in the application of the net revenues of the project, regardless of the fact of differences in the date of maturity of said bonds or the date and terms and conditions of the prior redemption and payment thereof, or for any reason whatsoever, but all of the bonds of said total authorized issue of \$400,000 principal amount are coequal as to lien and share ratably without preference, priority, or distinction as to the source or method of payment and security therefor.

So long as any of the bonds herein authorized shall remain outstanding and unpaid, the Teachers College Board covenants and agrees with all holders thereof that no additional obligations will be incurred or issued payable from the net revenues of the project which will be senior to or on a parity with the pledges made and liens created securing the bonds herein authorized and, further, that the said Board will not sell or otherwise dispose of, or mortgage, lease, or otherwise encumber the project, or any substantial portion thereof, or the income and revenues derived or to be derived from any portion thereof, until all of the bonds herein authorized shall have been fully paid in accordance with their terms.

Section 6. That for the purpose of accounting for the funds that are pledged to the payment of the bonds under the terms of this resolution and so long as any of said bonds herein authorized are outstanding, the project for the purpose of this resolution shall be operated and maintained on a fiscal year basis beginning on July 1 and ending on June 30 of each succeeding year.

All income, revenue and receipts derived from the continued operation and use of the project and all funds received from any other source or sources applicable thereto, shall be faithfully applied to the prompt and punctual payment of the maturing principal of and interest on the bonds authorized hereunder according to their terms and to create and maintain a reasonable reserve for such payment; to pay such portion of the reasonable and necessary expenses of operating, maintaining, repairing, and insuring the project as may be necessary to meet any deficiency therefor from other funds made and to be made available for that purpose; and to the creation of an adequate depreciation reserve, according to the terms of this resolution.

Section 7. That from and after the date of completion of the project or not later than September 1, 1956, whichever date is the first to occur, the gross income and revenues derived from the fees and charges collected from the continued use and operation of the project shall, within three (3) days after receipt thereof be paid to the Treasurer of the State of Illinois and shall be set aside by him in a special fund hereby created to be known as "The Teachers College Board Revenue Fund of 1956 for Northern

Illinois State College at DeKalb, Illinois," (hereinafter referred to as the "Revenue Fund") and said fund shall be used and held for use in accordance with the following requirements:

1. If on the first day of any calendar month the Teachers College Board shall find there is a deficiency from funds derived from other sources available for that purpose to pay the reasonable costs of operating and maintaining the project for such calendar month, there shall then be transferred by said Treasurer from the Revenue Fund to a separate and special account designated as "Operation and Maintenance Account, Northern Illinois State College Physical Education Building Revenue Bonds, Series 1956," only such a sum of money as shall be determined necessary to meet such deficiency and as shall be directed to be so transferred, by order of the Teachers College Board, and such expenses of operation and maintenance shall include adequate provision for insurance, the costs necessary to develop the maximum use of the services and facilities rendered and afforded by the project, and any fees due the paying agent of the bonds herein authorized. If in any month for any reason there shall not be available an amount equal to the amount required for the payment of the expenses hereinabove referred to, then an amount of revenue equal to any such deficiency shall be added to the amount of revenue otherwise required to be paid into the said Operation and Maintenance Account in the next succeeding calendar month or months and shall be paid with the payment then to be made.

Said Board covenants and agrees with the holders of the bonds herein authorized that said Board will maintain, preserve and keep the project in good repair, working order and condition so that it will at all times be available for maximum use and occupancy and that said Board will at all times continuously operate and manage said project in an efficient manner and at reasonable cost.

2. On the first day of each month after making the transfer, if any, required as hereinabove provided in paragraph 1 of this section, said Treasurer shall transfer on his books from said Revenue Fund to a special account designated "Bond Account, Northern Illinois State College Physical Education Building Revenue Bonds, Series 1956," commencing April 1, 1957, an amount of money equal to one-sixth (1/6th) of the interest then next due and commencing April 1, 1958 an amount of money equal to one-twelfth (1/12th) of the principal next due on the bonds herein authorized, and said Treasurer is hereby authorized and directed, without any further order of the Teachers College Board, to remit on or before the fifteenth day prior to the first day of April and the first day of October in each year to The Northern Trust Company, Chicago, Illinois, the amount on said respective dates. All moneys credited to and deposited in said Account shall be used solely and only for the payment of said bonds and the interest thereon as the same become due, or for the payment of said bonds as are called for redemption prior to maturity as in this resolution provided. Treasurer shall make no further remittances to said bank after there shall have been on deposit in said Account therein a suffi-

cient amount to pay all of the bonds then outstanding, and all of the interest thereon to maturity, or to the date upon which such outstanding bonds may then have been called for redemption, including the amount, if any, of redemption premium to be payable as specified in the terms of this resolution.

- 3. On or before the tenth day of April and the tenth day of October of each fiscal year, beginning October 10, 1957, and after making the deposits provided for in paragraphs (1) and (2) above, and subject to all provisions therein specified for the maintenance of said deposits, respectively, the said Treasurer shall credit from the balance of said Revenue Fund to a separate and special account hereby created and designated as the "Bond Reserve Account, Northern Illinois State College at DeKalb, Illinois, Physical Education Building Revenue Bonds, Series 1956," the sum of \$2,000 until such time as there has been accumulated in said Bond Reserve Account the sum of \$20,000, at which figure the Bond Reserve Account shall thereafter be continuously maintained until the moneys in the Bond Account and the Bond Reserve Account are equal to the interest and principal requirements on all bonds authorized hereunder then outstanding and unpaid. moneys in said Bond Reserve Account shall be used by said Treasurer and held for use solely and to the extent necessary for the payment from time to time of the principal of or interest on the said bonds authorized hereunder as to which there would be a default if the money in said Account were not so used, provided that all money in said Account, in excess of the said sum of \$20,000, at the end of any one fiscal year shall be used to retire as many of the bonds authorized hereunder as can be redeemed therewith, either through the purchase thereof on the open market or through the redemption of said bonds on the next succeeding interest payment date, but no bonds shall be purchased hereunder for retirement at a price greater than that at which the said bonds may be so called for prior redemption, and all bonds so purchased or redeemed shall be cancelled by the Treasurer. moneys accumulated in said Bond Reserve Account may be invested and reinvested by the Treasurer of the State of Illinois without further authorization by the Teachers College Board in direct obligations of the United States of America, or securities fully guaranteed by the United States of America maturing not more than ten (10) years from the date on which each investment is made.
- 4. On or before the tenth day of April and the tenth day of October in each fiscal year, beginning October 10, 1957, after making the monthly deposits provided for in paragraphs (1), (2) and (3) hereinabove, and so long as said Accounts contain funds sufficient to meet the requirements specified in said paragraphs (1), (2) and (3) as aforesaid, the Treasurer shall credit on his books from the balance in said Revenue Fund to a separate and special account hereby created to be designated "Depreciation Account, Northern Illinois State College at DeKalb, Illinois, Physical Education Building Revenue Bonds, Series 1956," the sum of \$2,000 until there shall have been accumulated in said Deprecia-

tion Account the sum of \$20,000, at which figure the Depreciation Account shall thereafter be maintained by subsequent deposits from said Revenue fund, subject to the limitations hereinabove provided. The funds in said Depreciation Account shall be used solely and only for the purpose of paying the cost of any extraordinary repairs, upkeep and replacements in, on or about the project, and only to the extent funds for that purpose available from other sources are insufficient therefor; except that the funds held in said Account, to the extent necessary to prevent or remedy a default in the payment of the interest on or principal of the bonds herein authorized, shall be used and held for use for that purpose and shall be transferred to the Bond Account, hereinabove described, and whenever such a transfer is made the amount so transferred shall be added to the next deposit to be made and thereafter, until full reimbursement to said Depreciation Account has been made. Funds accumulated in said Depreciation Account may be invested and reinvested by the Treasurer of the State of Illinois in direct obligations of the United States of America, or securities fully guaranteed by the United States of America maturing not more than one year from the date on which each investment is made.

- 5. If in any month the net revenues of the project are insufficient to meet the amount of deposits required to be made into the Bond Account, the Depreciation Account, and the Bond Reserve Account as herein specified, any such deficiency shall be made up from the first revenues thereafter received and available for such deposits under the terms of this resolution and the deposit of any such sum or sums into said Bond Account, said Depreciation Account, and said Bond Reserve Account as may be necessary to make up any such deficiency shall be in addition to the then current monthly deposits herein specified to be made.
- 6. All deposits hereinabove required to be made into the Bond Account and the Bond Reserve Account shall not be diminished by reason of any sums deposited into each of said Accounts from any other source or sources, it being the intent hereof that any sums so deposited from any other source or sources shall be held in said Bond Account and in said Bond Reserve Account as a further reserve for the prompt and punctual payment of the principal of and interest on the bonds herein authorized.
- 7. All funds remaining in the Revenue Fund at the end of any fiscal year, after all deposits as hereinabove specified have been made, and after due provision has been made for maintaining the Bond Account, the Depreciation Account, and the Bond Reserve Account, as hereinabove specified, shall be deemed surplus revenues, and shall be transferred to the Bond Reserve Account for the redemption or purchase of said bonds as therein provided, or may be used for any lawful purpose, as the Teachers College Board by resolution shall direct.

Section 8. That the Teachers College Board acting under and by authority of the aforesaid Act, hereby expressly covenants and agrees with the holders of the bonds herein authorized to be issued as follows:

- 1. That it will at all times charge and collect rates, fees and charges, including student fees, for the use of the project adequate to meet all the requirements of this bond resolution.
- 2. Notwithstanding any other facilities which now, or, at any time hereafter, may be available for students and faculty of the Northern Illinois State College at DeKalb, Illinois, that it will require and will adopt rules and regulations designed to assure the maximum use of the said project until all of the bonds herein authorized have been paid fully as to both principal and interest, and it is further covenanted and agreed that the fees, admissions, rentals, and other charges from students, faculty members and others using or being served by, or having the right to use or having the right to be served by, said project, shall be so fixed and revised from time to time, and shall be so collected that the proceeds thereof shall be sufficient at all times to provide funds sufficient to meet the Bond Account requirements for the principal of and interest on the bonds authorized hereunder, including all requirements for a reserve for the payment or redemption of said bonds as hereinabove specified, promptly as and when the same become due, payable, or subject to prior redemption; to make the payments required in the Depreciation Account hereinabove specified; and to pay that portion of the reasonable cost of maintaining, operating, repairing, and insuring the project that is not covered from other funds made and to be made available for that purpose.
- 3. That it will keep the project, including furnishings and equipment, in good usable condition and continuously insured against loss or damage by fire and lightning, the perils included under the extended coverage endorsement, and steam boiler explosion if steam boilers are installed in the project, in an amount not less than the full insurable value of said project or the amount of outstanding bonds, whichever is less. All moneys collected on account of loss or damage covered by any such policy or policies of insurance shall be held in trust and shall be used only for reconstruction, replacement or repairs. In the event said funds are insufficient to restore said project to its former condition, then said funds shall be paid into the Bond Account, and held for the benefit of the bondholders as their interests may ap-Said Board agrees, further, to carry adequate insurance against the loss of use and occupancy of said project from the perils of fire and lightning, the perils included under the extended coverage endorsement and from steam boiler explosion if steam boilers are installed therein, and from any or all risks or from any cause whatsoever, in an amount not less than \$20,000, provided, however, that said amount may be reduced by whatever funds are on hand in the Bond Reserve Account. Any sum received from any such use and occupancy insurance, after deducting necessary operation and maintenance charges under economical management during the period of such loss of use and occupancy, shall be paid into the aforesaid Bond Account. All of said insurance shall be carried in a responsible insurance company or companies authorized to do business in the State of Illinois, and the cost thereof shall be deemed to be a maintenance and operation cost.

- 4. That it will keep proper books of records and accounts separate and apart from all other records and accounts in which complete and correct entries shall be made of all transactions relating to the cost of constructing, equipping, furnishing and improving the aforesaid project; the expenditures for maintaining, operating and repairing the project, and all revenues collected therefrom which said records shall be kept and shall be available for the information of all persons interested; and will furnish to the original purchaser of said bonds, on the written request therefor, not more than thirty (30) days after the close of each calendar month, complete operating and income statements of the project, in reasonable detail, covering such monthly period; and agrees also to furnish to the original purchaser of said bonds and to any holder of any of said bonds, on the written request therefor, not more than sixty (60) days after the close of each fiscal year, a complete financial statement in reasonable detail, covering such fiscal year, signed by the Secretary and certified by independent auditors, who shall be certified public accountants.
- 5. That it will not permit any free use of the project except for curricular activities of said College, and then only to the extent (a) that there are available, from sources other than student fees and other charges for the use of the project, funds fully sufficient to pay the operation and maintenance expense of the project for such use and (b) that the availability of the project for revenue producing activities is adequate to provide revenues fully sufficient to meet the requirements of this resolution.
- 6. That it will not issue any additional bonds or incur any other indebtedness, payable from any revenues of the project unless the pledge of such revenues shall be made junior and subordinate in all respects to the pledge of revenues under this resolution for payment of the bonds authorized to be issued hereunder, including the Bond Reserve Account, as provided by subsection (3) of Section 7 of this resolution.
- 7. That it will faithfully and punctually perform all of the duties and obligations with reference to the project, as required by the provisions of this resolution and the statutes under which the said bonds are issued, including the construction, equipment, furnishing, and improvement thereof, and the operation and maintenance thereof as herein provided; the making and collecting of reasonable and sufficient fees and charges for the use thereof; the segregation of the income and revenues therefrom to the respective accounts created under the provisions of this resolution, and the proper application of said accounts.
- Section 9. Any holder of any bond or bonds issued hereunder, or of any coupons representing interest accrued thereon, may either by proper court action or in law or in equity compel said Teachers College Board to perform all duties imposed upon it under the provisions of this resolution and under the provisions of the statute hereinabove referred to authorizing the issuance of the bonds as herein provided, including the making and collecting of sufficient rates, charges and fees for the use of the project,

and the performance of any and all covenants made by said Board in and by this resolution.

Section 10. That the proceeds derived from the issuance and sale of said bonds hereby provided for shall be applied as follows:

- 1. The entire proceeds derived from the sale of said bonds to the purchaser thereof shall be deposited immediately with the Treasurer of the State of Illinois pursuant to the terms of the Act hereinabove referred to authorizing the issuance of said bonds.
- 2. It shall be the duty of the Treasurer of the State of Illinois to set aside the amount of accrued interest received at the sale and delivery of said bonds to said purchaser in the Bond Account hereinabove provided for, together with the sum of \$15,200.00 received as principal from the proceeds of the sale of said bonds, being an amount estimated necessary to pay interest on said bonds during the period of construction, which sums shall be used solely for the purpose of paying the interest due on said bonds, and is hereby dedicated and made available for that purpose.
- 3. That the proceeds received as principal from the sale of said bonds, after deduction made of the sum specified to pay interest on said bonds during the period of construction, together with the sum of \$950,000 as may be from time to time made available by the State of Illinois under the terms of Senate Bill No. 763, approved July 1, 1955, to said Teachers College Board, shall be set aside in a separate and special account by said Treasurer, to be designated "Building Construction Account of 1956 for Northern Illinois State College at DeKalb, Illinois," and shall be applied to the cost of acquiring, constructing, equipping, furnishing and improving the project, all as hereinabove described; provided, however, that any surplus remaining in such Account upon completion of the construction, equipment, furnishing and improving of said project shall be transferred and credited to the "Bond Reserve Account, Northern Illinois State College at DeKalb, Illinois, Physical Education Building Revenue Bonds, Series 1956," as hereinabove provided for.

Section 11. That the provisions of this resolution shall constitute a contract between The Teachers College Board for Northern Illinois State College at DeKalb, Illinois, and the holders of the bonds herein authorized to be issued, and each of them, and the said Board hereby pledges its good faith to the performance of each and every covenant hereof.

Section 12. If any section, subsection, paragraph, sentence, clause or phrase of this resolution or of the bonds or interest coupons herein prescribed shall either be held to be unconstitutional or otherwise invalid by any court of competent jurisdiction, such decision shall not affect the validity of the remaining portions of this resolution, but this resolution shall be construed and enforced as if such illegal or invalid provision shall not have been contained therein.

Section 13. That the Chairman and Secretary of said Board and the Treasurer of the State of Illinois shall be and they are hereby fully authorized and directed to do all things which may be necessary to effect the preparation, execution and delivery of the bonds herein authorized to be issued to the purchaser thereof, namely, White, Weld & Company, of Chicago, Illinois, at a price heretofore agreed upon, the same being not less than par and accrued interest to date of delivery, all in accordance with their proposal for the purchase thereof, which is hereby accepted and approved.

Section 14. That this resolution shall be in full force and effect immediately upon its passage.

RESOLUTION establishing charges and fees for the use of and for the service supplied by the Physical Education Building to be constructed on the campus of Northern Illinois State College at DeKalb, Illinois

WHEREAS, The Teachers College Board of the State of Illinois,

has heretofore by resolution duly adopted on April 16, 1956, provided for the construction of a physical education building on the campus of Northern Illinois State College at DeKalb, Illinois, and the issuance of \$400,000 Physical Education Building Revenue Bonds to defray part of the cost of such construction pursuant to and in compliance with the provisions of Sections 59a through 59e of Chapter 127 of the Illinois Revised Statutes, 1955; and

WHEREAS, Pursuant to the terms of the Act above referred to and said resolution heretofore passed authorizing such construction and the issuance of said bonds, it is necessary that The Teachers College Board establish fees and charges for the use of such building;

NOW, THEREFORE, Be It Resolved by The Teachers College Board of the State of Illinois, as follows:

Section 1. That there shall be and there is hereby established commencing September 1, 1956, fees and charges for the use of and for the service supplied by a physical education building to be constructed on the campus of Northern Illinois State College at DeKalb, Illinois, as follows:

Student Fees

\$4.50 per full time student per regular semester 2.25 per full time student per summer session

Other rates and charges for specific use of and services supplies by said building shall be set from time to time by the Business Manager of Northern Illinois State College at DeKalb, Illinois; provided that such rates and charges shall be sufficient at all times to produce gross revenues not less than the direct operating expenses incurred in connection with such use and service.

Section 2. Said fees, rates and charges shall be payable in advance.

Section 3. It is hereby made a duty of the Business Manager of Northern Illinois State College at DeKalb, Illinois, to collect all monies due under the provisions hereof.

Section 4. All revenues and monies derived from the operation of said physical education building shall be held by the Business Manager separately and apart from all other funds of the College and all of said sums shall be delivered to the Treasurer of the State of Illinois not more than three days after receipt of the same.

Section 5. Before the Business Manager shall enter upon his duties with respect to the collection of fees, rates and charges and before he shall receive any funds derived from the operation of the physical education building, he shall be required to post a corporate surety bond in an amount equal to the amount likely to come into his hands at any time, which bond shall be approved by The Teachers College Board, and filed with the Secretary of said Board, and shall be conditioned upon his faithful performance of

his duties as required under this resolution and his accounting for all monies coming into his hands.

BE IT RESOLVED by The Teachers College Board of the State of Illinois that the Treasurer of the State of Illinois be authorized and directed to execute a corporate surety bond in the amount of \$20,000 to protect the "The Teachers College Board Revenue Fund of 1956, for Northern Illinois State College at DeKalb, Illinois," provided for in the resolution authorizing the issue of \$400,000 Physical Education Building Revenue Bonds, Series 1956, adopted by this Board on April 16, 1956, payment for the premiums of said surety bond to be payable from the "Operation and Maintenance Account, Northern Illinois State College at DeKalb, Illinois, Physical Education Building Revenue Bonds, Series 1956" of said Fund.

STORM DRAINAGE RIGHT

KNOW ALL MEN BY THESE PRESENT:

That the Grantor, The Teachers College Board of Illinois, acting in accordance with a resolution properly made and passed at the regular meeting of said Board held on May 21, 1956 and in consideration of the sum of One Dollar (\$1.00) in hand paid by the City of DeKalb, Illinois, a municipal corporation organized and existing under the laws of the State of Illinois (receipt of which is hereby acknowledged) and of the covenants to be kept and performed by the Grantee herein, does hereby give and grant to the said City of DeKalb, its successors and assigns, hereinafter referred to as the Grantee, the right to lay, maintain, operate and remove underground storm sewers, with the necessary appurtenances; with the right of access to the same for the maintenance, repair and operation thereof, including the right to clear and keep cleared such obstruction from the surface and subsurface as may be necessary for the installation and maintenance of such facilities, in, upon and across that part of the Northwest One Quarter of Section 22,

Township 40 North, Range 4 East of the Third Principal Meridian, described as follows:

A strip of land adjacent to and Westerly of the present Westerly line of Carroll Avenue in the City of DeKalb, Illinois, which is 30 feet in width (as measured at right angles from said Westerly line of Carroll Avenue) and bounded on the North by the South line of Lucinda Avenue and on the South by the North line of Joseph F. Glidden's Subdivision.

Also a strip of land which is 60 feet in width, so situated that 30 feet thereof lies on either side of a line formed by the Westerly extension of the centerline of College Avenue in the City of DeKalb; said strip of land to extend from the present Westerly line of Carroll Avenue to the open drainage ditch approximately 350 feet West thereof,

under the following terms and conditions:

Grantee shall also pay reasonable damages for all injury caused to crops, real and/or personal property upon said premises in the building, constructing, installing and maintaining of said storm sewer.

Grantee herein agrees, at its own expense and at no expense whatsoever to the Grantor or his tenant, to repair or replace all fences which may be damaged by the installation, maintenance or operation of said storm sewer.

Grantee herein agrees to replace in a good and workmanlike manner and with substantial supports, all tile cut in the construction, operation and maintenance of said storm sewers.

At this time, Chairman Walker turned the meeting over to Dr. Buzzard.

Dr. Buzzard reviewed his years with the Illinois teaching system, particularly during the past twenty-three years as President of Eastern Illinois State College and the progress that has been made in the college during that period. Dr. Buzzard stated many people think the biggest thing he has done as President is the securing of buildings, but he feels it is the building of a faculty of such acceptable quality that has given Eastern an academic flavor that is highly desirable.

Dr. Buzzard remarked that, in his opinion, an institution should build for the future and not live in the past; so in looking ahead, Dr. Buzzard called attention to areas the Board should consider, such as a two-year vocational program (similar to the program in operation at Southern Illinois University); an assistant to the president to help relieve some of the load in administrative and business duties; and a program of student counselling if we are to expect the young people to build the character that is necessary. Dr. Buzzard also stated the colleges still have difficulty in hiring new faculty and salary raises of \$500 to \$600 a year are needed to get top quality faculty members.

Dr. Buzzard further stated he thought there should be a "super board" for the six State supported colleges and universities in Illinois, together with another separate Board for each institution, as well as one salary schedule for academic people in the State colleges and universities, which would result in unified action throughout the State and alleviate discrepancies in salary scales and other areas.

In closing, Dr. Buzzard stated he will always be grateful for the support of the Teachers College Board and will treasure his acquaintance with all of the members.

NEW BUSINESS

Mr. Dunn reported that, in keeping with certain provisions of the Illinois Bar Association, it is now necessary for the Board to employ and pay Chapman and Cutler directly in connection with their handling of legal opinions of bond issues; previously, Barcus,

Kindred and Company and J. T. Swartz and Company, fiscal agents, handled this matter, paying the fees of Chapman and Cutler from the fiscal agents' fee they received from each bond issue. Mr. Dunn stated he had received a statement from Chapman and Cutler, in the amount of \$812.50, covering their services in connection with the sale of \$400,000 Physical Education Building Revenue Bonds, Series 1956, for Northern Illinois State College, and recommended the Board approve and authorize the payment of this statement from Chapman and Cutler.

Following some discussion, Mr. Stipes moved that the statement from Chapman and Cutler, in the amount of \$812.50, covering their services in connection with the sale of \$400,000 Physical Education Building Revenue Bonds, Series 1956, for Northern Illinois State College, be approved and the administration at Northern be authorized to process this statement for payment direct to Chapman and Cutler; said amount of \$812.50 to be deducted from the amount of \$7,625 which the Board authorized the State Treasurer to pay to Barcus, Kindred and Company and J. T. Swartz and Company, jointly as fiscal agents, at the Board meeting on April 16, 1956, making the amount now due said fiscal agents \$6,812.50. Swartz and Company, our fiscal agents, be authorized to prepare prospectus in connection with this project; and when the Board meets at DeKalb in July the Building Committee, together with Dr. Holmes, discuss the possible location on the campus of these dormitories. Mr. Summers then distributed copies of a report from Childs and Smith, architects, which stated the construction of this building is far behind the schedule. Mr. Summers introduced Mr. William Hansen, resident supervisor for Childs and Smith on this project, who spoke on this progress report which also listed three possible solutions of action the Board might take to remedy this matter. Mr. Summers next presented Mr. Hart and Mr. Reilly, the general contractors for the laboratory school building. Mr. Reilly spoke to the Board, stating that it seems the only solution is for their firm to increase their man power on this project.

Following an open discussion between the Board and the general contractors, Mr. Hollingsworth moved that the Building Committee should be given a weekly progress report by Mr. Hansen, of the architectural firm of Childs and Smith, and at the end of two weeks if, in the opinion of the Building Committee and the architects, reasonable progress has not been made on this project

by Hart and Reilly, the general contractors, the Building Committee be empowered to call this matter to the attention of the Chairman relative to the calling of a special Board meeting so definite action can be taken to correct this situation. President Fairchild's funeral was a week ago last Saturday, at which time Dr. Buzzard represented the presidents of the colleges and spoke eloquently, kindly, and very sympathetically to the family and the friends who were there on that occasion. It was well attended, and I am sure the service was conducted in good taste as you would expect it to be. So far as the Board is concerned, I sat there feeling the Board had really done its part in helping a man who had been ill so long and rendered such wonderful service to a cause to which he dedicated himself. We have a letter from Mrs. Fairchild which says, 'My sons and I wish to thank the members of the Teachers College Board for the beautiful floral bouquet sent to Mr. Fairchild's service. We also appreciate the many fine things you did for him in the past two years of his service and in his whole term of office. He appreciated the many fine friends he had among the Board members.' For me to add anything more would be a repetition of things said many times concerning Dr. Fairchild."

Dr. Browne presented his Report No. 46 as Executive Officer which dealt with "Internal Budgets for 1956-57." Since there was nothing controversial, Mrs. Madlener moved the acceptance of the informal report on Northern Illinois State College as presented by Dr. Holmes. The motion was seconded by Mr. Watson, roll was called, and the vote was as follows:

Dr. Holmes distributed, for the information of the Board, a report on the present status of faculty housing at Northern Illinois State College, said report being prepared in the hope of contributing to future solutions.

Mr. Stipes stated that Dr. Holmes had reported to the Finance Committee regarding some sewage work the City of DeKalb is preparing to do. Dr. Holmes had received, from the Sanitary District of the City of DeKalb, a suggested method of payment for this work which was based on the anticipated growth of both Northern Illinois State College and the City of DeKalb. Mr. Stipes further stated that, after studying this matter, the Finance Committee suggested Dr. Holmes report to the Sanitary District of the City of DeKalb that, being a State institution, Northern Illinois State College can only make payments for such work on the metered water basis. (This was presented by Mr. Stipes for the information of the Board only, and no action was requested.)

At the March 19, 1956 meeting, Dr. Holmes reported that the Veterans' Club at Northern Illinois State College had raised \$1,100 to purchase and erect a flagpole on the campus at Northern. At this time, Dr. Holmes distributed photographs of this flagpole and scenes of the dedication ceremony.

Mr. Stipes moved that the Board instruct Dr. Browne to write the Veterans' Club at Northern Illinois State College commending the Club for their efforts and generosity in obtaining this flagpole for the campus at Northern. The motion was seconded by Mrs. Madlener, and unanimously carried.

At this time, Chairman Walker presented for discussion the subject of long-range campus planning, stating it might be desirable to have plats drawn of the college campuses showing a long-range view of the use of the land which in turn would enable the Board to move intelligently and conservatively in the use of land.

An open discussion followed on this matter of long-range campus planning. Mr. Hollingsworth stated he too had been giving considerable thought to this idea with the possibility of a projection of land use, on a ten-year plan; he further stated that it might be well to include in the budgets for the next biennium a similar amount for contractual services for all four of the colleges for this specific purpose. Mr. Stipes stated he thought this should be done at all four of the colleges and that an outsider, with considerable experience in college planning, be included in whatever group would make this study. (No action was taken on this matter as it was presented at this time for discussion and future thought only.)

REPORTS OF COMMITTEES

Mr. Stipes, Chairman of the Finance Committee, reported that the Finance Committee had examined the internal budgets for all of the colleges and complimented the presidents and the business managers on the year after year improvement in the preparation of the budgets which are becoming more uniform thus making them easier to study.

Mr. Stipes reported that the Finance Committee recommended the acceptance of the internal budgets of all of the colleges as presented to the Finance Committee and corrected and also including the following additions for Illinois State Normal University:

\$600 to the equipment budget for Health and Physical Education - Men for bleachers, and

\$3,000 to the equipment budget for the University High School for lockers;

these increases might necessitate a transfer from the Contingency Fund - Income Fund Educational Operations to the Equipment Fund - Income Fund Educational Operations.

Following some discussion, Mr. Stipes moved the acceptance of the foregoing recommendation of the Finance Committee regarding the acceptance of the internal budgets for all of the colleges. The motion was seconded by Mr. Houle, roll was called, and the vote was as follows:

Mr. Stipes, Chairman of the Finance Committee, stated that the Committee feels the colleges will be able to operate very well on present budgets for the balance of the biennium and there should be no need for any deficiency appropriations.

Mr. Stipes, Chairman of the Finance Committee, next reported that the Finance Committee had discussed and recommended that, in the quarterly reports of the presidents due each year in April which recommend salary changes and personnel reappointments, those individuals who were employed at mid-term be included in this report but clearly identified as being mid-year appointments with a notation that contracts for re-employment will not be offered said mid-year appointees until after the following June meeting of the Board. Following considerable discussion, the Board concurred in the foregoing recommendation of the Finance Committee regarding the reappointment of mid-year appointees.

Mr. Stipes, Chairman of the Finance Committee, next reported that the Finance Committee recommended that each person em-

ployed by the four colleges and the Central Office of the Teachers College Board, for either an academic or a non-academic regular position (excluding student help or a part-time position), must have completed a physical examination, the results of which are to be on file at the employing college or Board office, before the new employee receives first payroll warrant in compensation for work done; this is regardless of whether or not the individual intends to participate in the University Retirement System; and also that Section 18 of the "Practices of the Teachers College Board" be amended to incorporate this policy.

Following considerable discussion, Mr. Stipes moved the adoption of the foregoing recommendations of the Finance Committee to amend Section 18 of the "Practices of the Teachers College Board" to incorporate above outlined policy regarding physical examination by all new regular employees. The motion was seconded by Mr. Dunbar, roll was called, and the vote was as follows:

Since this report showed the architects' estimated cost of construction to be much greater than anticipated by the Building Committee, Mr. Summers reported no recommendations would be made concerning the preliminary plans for these buildings until a financing report had been received from the fiscal agents.

Mr. Summers, Chairman of the Building Committee, next reported that the Building Committee had received another report from Lundeen and Hilfinger, architects, regarding the site of the proposed dormitory, student center, and cafeteria buildings at Eastern Illinois State College which showed soil conditions of a questionable nature and a recommendation from the architects that more extensive test borings be made by a professional organization specializing in this type of work. The Building Committee recommended that the Board authorize Lundeen and Hilfinger to contract with the Raymond Concrete Pile Company to take ample soil samples from the site of these proposed buildings at Eastern and to have these samples analyzed by experts from the staff of the University of Illinois, the cost of this work to be included as an addition to the architects' fees on this project.

Following some discussion, Mr. Summers moved the acceptance of the foregoing recommendation of the Building Committee regarding more extensive soil tests of the site of the proposed

new dormitory, student center, and cafeteria buildings at Eastern Illinois State College. The motion was seconded by Mr. Houle, roll was called, and the vote was as follows:

The reports received from Mr. Hansen showed some increase in the progress of work by Hart and Reilly since the May Board meeting, but the Building Committee recommended that the Board instruct Dr. Browne to write Hart and Reilly, general contractors, on behalf of the Board, urging them to further increase their efforts on the laboratory school building at Eastern Illinois State College in order to put construction on or ahead of the working schedule submitted by Childs and Smith, architects.

Following but little discussion, Mr. Summers moved the acceptance of the foregoing recommendation of the Building Committee. The motion was seconded by Mr. Houle, and unanimously carried.

Mr. Watson presented a request from Perkins and Will, architechts, regarding the official name of the new laboratory school building at Northern Illinois State College to enable them to proceed with the preparation of the plaque for this building. Mr. Watson stated this matter had not as yet been discussed by either Northern's Advisory Committee nor the Building Committee. Mr. Hollingsworth recommended action on the naming of the new laboratory school building at Northern Illinois State College be deferred until a later meeting and, in the future, all matters regarding the naming of buildings at the colleges should be presented to the Board as a recommendation of the Building Committee. The

Board concurred in Mr. Hollingsworth's recommendations.

The next matter on the agenda was concerned with the construction of a residence hall and student center building at Western Illinois State College.

Under the control of this Board are the four teachers colleges of the State of Illinois: Western Illinois State College, Macomb; Northern Illinois State College, DeKalb; Illinois State Normal University, Normal; and Eastern Illinois State College, Charleston.

Western Illinois State College, a State supported institution founded in 1899, is located at Macomb (1950 population - 10,592), about 60 miles southwest of Peoria and 85 miles south of the tricities, Rock Island, Davenport, and Moline. The College conducts both an undergraduate and graduate school and awards degrees of both Bachelor and Master of Science in Education. It is accredited by the North Central Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools and by the American Association of Colleges for Teacher Education. The College enrollment for the fall quarter of 1955 was 2,196. It has a faculty and administrative staff of 153 and 93 non-academic employees.

The College has a teachers training school with an enrollment of 555 students for the fall quarter of 1955 (in addition to College enrollment) which provides practice teaching from kindergarten through high school. The College is a member of the Inter-State Collegiate Athletic Conference which includes the four Illinois State Teachers Colleges, Southern Illinois University, and two Michigan Teachers Colleges. The campus consists of 320 acres, including the College farm and golf course, with buildings and equipment valued at over \$9-1/2 million.

No tuition is charged students attending the College, but there is in effect the following schedule of fees:

The fees for each summer session are one-half of the amounts shown above.

Purpose of Bond Issue: - The proceeds from the sale of these \$1,150,000 bonds, together with a State appropriation of \$350,000 and cash collected to date from student center fees, are to be used to finance the construction of a combined Student Residence Hall and Student Center Building. The architect's estimated cost for the project and the sources of funds are shown below:

Notes: - (a) Based on firm bids received 5/8/56. Contracts will be covered by performance bonds. Construction is scheduled to permit occupancy by fall quarter 1957. (b) This appropriation has been made specifically for the residence hall portion of this project. (c) Derived from \$4 per quarter student fees collected during 1955-56 academic year. Additional proceeds of such fees collected between now and the time building is completed will be used for recreational equipment and furnishings in excess of the basic allowance for such items provided for in the cost estimate shown above.

Description of the Buildings:- The project consists of two 4-story residence halls (with capacities of 128 and 178; total - 306) joined by a connecting 2-story student center. The student center will include kitchen facilities and a dining hall in which the regular meals for the occupants of the adjoining residence halls will be served. Removable partitions will permit expansion of the dining hall to accommodate 700 diners, and in addition the student center will include a snack bar with a seating capacity of over 100. The student center will also contain a large lounge, game and reading rooms, and offices for student activities' headquarters. The entire project is to be of masonry construction with brick exterior.

Legal Authority:- These bonds will be issued by The Teachers College Board of the State of Illinois for Western Illinois State College at Macomb, Illinois, pursuant to the provisions of an act authorizing the Board to build and equip field houses, residence halls, student union buildings and other structures with the proceeds of bonds payable from the revenues thereof (Sections 59a to

59e, Chapter 127, Illinois Revised Statutes 1955), approved by the General Assembly of the State of Illinois; and pursuant to a resolution to be adopted by the Board.

Security: - These bonds will constitute a closed first lien on the net revenues to be derived from the operation of the residence halls and student center building to be constructed with their proceeds. The Teachers College Board will covenant to require, and to adopt rules and regulations designed to assure, the maximum use of the project, subject only to the requirements of the presently outstanding revenue bonds which provide for prior occupancy of two existing residence halls (Seal Hall and Grote Hall) with a combined capacity of 389; to fix, revise and collect fees and charges, including student fees, to provide funds sufficient at all times to pay the reasonable cost of operating and maintaining the project, to pay principal and interest on these bonds when due, to provide and maintain a bond reserve account of \$60,000 and to provide and maintain a depreciation account of \$60,000.

Future Enrollment: - A detailed study of college enrollments, prepared in 1951 by the Bureau of Institutional Research of the University of Illinois, indicates that, based on records of actual births through 1949 (the most recent year available at the time the study was made), total college enrollments in Illinois will steadily increase from the current year through 1967-68, the last year for which births through 1949 affect college enrollments. There is shown below the enrollment which can be expected in future years at Western Illinois State College, derived by applying to the actual 1955-56 Western enrollment the percentage increase indicated by the statewide enrollment study referred to above. The additional student housing to be provided by these bonds, and the new science building completed in late 1955 which added approximately 25% to the College's instructional space, can be expected to accelerate this growth.

Housing:- The new residence halls for 128 men and 178 women which constitute part of this project must, under the terms of the resolution authorizing these bonds, be filled before any others except Seal Hall (204 men) and Grote Hall (185 women), existing residence halls whose revenues are pledged to outstanding bonds. The combined capacity of these four halls (695 students) constitutes only 41.6% of the number of students requiring housing as shown below:

Project Revenues: - Although the student center will be available to the entire student body with resultant revenues from operation of the snack bar, banquet room and other recreational facilities, no attempt has been made to estimate these miscellaneous revenues. There is shown below the estimate of annual net revenues of the project based only on the gross to be derived from board and room charges made to the occupants of the 306-capacity residence hall for only the 36 week regular session.

Additional direct expenses incurred in providing banquets, dances and other recreational activities will be covered by special charges made therefor.

Fees and Charges: - The initial schedule of fees and charges for the project, set by resolution of The Teachers College Board, is as follows:

Charges for food service (other than regular meals for residence hall occupants) and other services rendered in the student center building shall be adequate to provide gross revenues equal to not less than 110% of the direct operating expenses incurred in providing such services.

Debt History: The Teachers College Board of the State of Illinois has, since 1947 when enabling legislation was first passed, issued revenue bonds to finance ten projects at the colleges under its control. In each case the Board has required that the facilities, as soon as built, be operated in such a way as to produce revenues substantially in excess of all requirements including those for various reserves. Two of these ten bond issues have been for facilities at Western Illinois State College.

1950 Stadium Revenue Bonds: - The first issue of bonds for

Western Illinois State College was the 1950 issue of Stadium Revenue Bonds in the amount of \$130,000. Shown below are earnings of the stadium:

The \$32,311 surplus is 29.2% higher than the \$25,000 required by the terms of the bond resolution for reserve accumulation and advance bond retirement. As of 4/1/56, only 6 years after issuance of these 30-year serial bonds, all bonds of the last four maturities (totaling \$27,000) had been retired in advance of maturity.

1954 Student Residence Halls Bonds: The second issue of bonds for Western Illinois State College was the 1954 issue of \$550,000 Student Residence Halls Revenue Bonds issued for the purpose of constructing a new men's residence hall (capacity - 204 students), and improving the women's residence hall (capacity - 185 students), and secured by the room rental revenues of these two halls. The new men's residence hall commenced partial operations in November of 1954 (only 7 months after bond issuance and 8 months earlier than expected) and began full operation in March 1955. RESOLUTION creating an issue of \$1,150,000 Residence Hall and Student Center Revenue Bonds, Series 1956, of The Teachers College Board of the State of Illinois for Western Illinois State College at Macomb, Illinois, and providing for the security and delivery of said bonds.

WHEREAS, The Teachers College Board of the State of Illinois for Western Illinois State College at Macomb, Illinois (hereinafter designated the "Teachers College Board"), upon due consideration and investigation does now find and determine that it is necessary and essential for the proper conduct, management and operation,

and in furtherance and for the benefit of The Western Illinois State College at Macomb, Illinois, to acquire, construct, equip and furnish a dormitory and student union center on the campus of said College, to include dining facilities, snack bar, recreation rooms, meeting rooms, lounges and offices, and all necessary equipment and appurtenances therefor (hereinafter designated the "project"); and

WHEREAS, this Teachers College Board has heretofore approved plans and specifications for the construction of the project, completely equipped and furnished, at a cost estimate of \$1,522,675; and

WHEREAS, the General Assembly of the State of Illinois by Senate Bill No. 763, approved July 1, 1955, has appropriated the sum of \$350,000 for part of the cost of constructing the project, and said Board has available the sum of \$22,675 derived from other sources to apply on such construction cost so that it is necessary to raise the sum of \$1,150,000 by an issue of revenue bonds to complete the construction of the project; and

WHEREAS, this Teachers College Board is authorized, under the laws of the State of Illinois thereunto enabling, to issue revenue bonds to secure funds to pay in part the cost of constructing the project and the income, revenue and receipts to be derived from the use and operation of the project are determined adequate to pay such bonds so to be issued:

NOW, THEREFORE, Be It and It Is Hereby Resolved by The Teachers College Board of the State of Illinois for Western Illinois State College at Macomb, Illinois, as follows:

Section 1. That there be constructed a dormitory and student union center for Western Illinois State College at Macomb, Illinois, on the campus of said College as described in the preambles of this resolution, and it is hereby declared that all recitals of fact contained in said preambles hereto are true, correct and complete.

Section 2. That for the purpose of raising the sum of \$1,150,000, which is determined necessary to pay a part of the cost of constructing the project, completely equipped and furnished, as recited in the preambles hereto, there is hereby authorized an issue of negotiable coupon revenue bonds of said Teachers College Board for said College in the principal sum of \$1,150,000.

Said bonds shall be designated "Residence Hall and Student Center Revenue Bonds, Series 1956," of The Teachers College Board of the State of Illinois for Western Illinois State College at Macomb, Illinois, shall bear date of July 1, 1956, be of \$1,000 denomination and numbered from 1 through 1150, and shall mature serially, subject to the right of prior redemption as hereinafter mentioned, on April 1 in each of the years and in amounts and bearing interest as follows:

The Teachers College Board reserves the right to call for redemption prior to maturity the bonds of said issue maturing on April 1 in each of the years 1965 through 1996, as a whole or in part in their inverse numerical order prior to their maturity on April 1, 1964, or on any interest payment date thereafter at a price of par, unpaid accrued interest to the date of redemption, and a premium in accordance with the following schedule:

- At 3-1/2% of the principal amount thereof if redeemed on April 1, 1964, or on any interest payment date thereafter up to and including October 1, 1968;
- At 2-1/2% of the principal amount thereof if redeemed on April 1, 1969, or on any interest payment date thereafter up to and including October 1, 1973;
- At 1-1/2% of the principal amount thereof if redeemed on April 1, 1974, or on any interest payment date thereafter up to and including October 1, 1978; and
- At 1/2% of the principal amount thereof if redeemed on April 1, 1979, or on any interest payment date thereafter.

Notice of redemption of any or all of said bonds shall be given by publication at least once not less than thirty (30) days prior to the date of redemption in one financial newspaper published and of general circulation in the City of Chicago, Illinois, and such notice of redemption shall designate the date and place of redemption, the numbers and aggregate principal amount of bonds called for redemption, the place of redemption, which shall be the paying agent as expressed in said bonds, and shall state that the bonds so specified will be redeemed at a price of par, unpaid accrued interest to the date of redemption, plus the applicable redemption

premium, and from and after the designated redemption date interest on all of said bonds so called for redemption shall cease.

Section 3. The said bonds shall be executed for and on behalf of Western Illinois State College at Macomb, Illinois, by the Chairman of the Teachers College Board, and attested by the Secretary thereof under the seal of said Board, and shall-be countersigned by the Treasurer of the State of Illinois, and the interest coupons attached to said bonds evidencing the rates of interest hereinabove specified shall be executed by the facsimile signatures of said officials who by the execution of said bonds shall adopt as and for their own proper signatures their respective facsimile signatures appearing on said coupons.

The said bonds and coupons shall be payable to bearer provided, however, that such bonds may be subject to registration as to principal only at any time prior to maturity in the name of the holder thereof on the books of the Secretary of The Teachers College Board, such registration to be noted on the reverse side of the bonds by the Secretary and thereafter the principal of such bonds shall be payable only to the registered holder, his legal representatives or assigns. Such registered bond shall be transferred to another registered holder or back to bearer only upon presentation to said Secretary with a legal assignment duly acknowledged or approved. Registration of any of such bonds shall not affect the negotiability of the coupons thereto attached, but such coupons shall be transferable by delivery merely.

on the first days of April and October in each year until the principal hereof shall be paid. Interest accruing on this bond on and prior to the maturity date hereof shall be payable upon presentation and surrender of the interest coupons hereto attached as they subsequently become due, but no interest shall accrue on this bond after the maturity hereof, unless this bond be presented for payment at maturity and be not then paid.

Both principal hereof and interest hereon are hereby made payable in lawful money of the United States of America at The First National Bank of Chicago, Chicago, Illinois.

The Teachers College Board reserves the right to call for redemption prior to maturity the bonds of said issue maturing on April 1 in each of the years 1965 through 1996, as a whole or in part in their inverse numerical order prior to their maturity on April 1, 1964, or on any interest payment date thereafter at a price of par, unpaid accrued interest to the date of redemption, and a premium in accordance with the following schedule:

- At 3-1/2% of the principal amount thereof if redeemed on April 1, 1964, or on any interest payment date thereafter up to and including October 1, 1968;
- At 2-1/2% of the principal amount thereof if redeemed on April 1, 1969, or on any interest payment date thereafter up to and including October 1, 1973;
- At 1-1/2% of the principal amount thereof if redeemed on April 1, 1974, or on any interest payment date thereafter up to and including October 1, 1978; and
- At 1/2% of the principal amount thereof if redeemed on April 1, 1979, or on any interest payment date thereafter.

Notice of redemption of any or all of said bonds shall be given by publication at least once not less than thirty (30) days prior to the date of redemption in one financial newspaper published and of general circulation in the City of Chicago, Illinois, and such notice of redemption shall designate the date and place of redemption, the numbers and aggregate principal amount of bonds called for redemption, the place of redemption, which shall be the paying agent as expressed in this bond, and shall state that the bonds so specified will be redeemed at a price of par, unpaid accrued interest to the date of redemption, plus the applicable redemption premium, and from and after the designated redemption date interest on all of said bonds so called for redemption shall cease.

This bond is one of an authorized issue of \$1,150,000 bonds, all of like date, tenor and effect (except as to number, rate of interest, maturity, and provision for redemption prior to maturity) authorized by The Teachers College Board for Western Illinois State College at Macomb, Illinois, to pay in part, together with other funds to be made available therefor from cash on hand and from an appropriation by the General Assembly of the State of

Illinois under Senate Bill No. 763, approved July 1, 1955, the cost of the construction of a dormitory and student union center, completely equipped and furnished, on the campus of said College under and pursuant to the provisions of a resolution adopted by The Teachers College Board on the 25th day of June, 1956, and of Sections 59a through 59e of Chapter 127, Illinois Revised Statutes, 1955, and all other laws thereunto enabling; and this bond, and the issue of which it is one, is payable as to both principal and interest solely from and secured by a pledge of and a first lien on the net revenues derived from the operation of said dormitory and student union center so to be constructed as provided in said resolution.

This bond shall not be deemed to be an indebtedness of the State of Illinois or of The Teachers College Board or of the Western Illinois State College at Macomb, Illinois.

It is hereby certified and recited that in issuing this bond and the series of which it is a part, The Teachers College Board has covenanted and agreed in the resolution authorizing this bond to operate, use and maintain continuously said dormitory and student union center at all times in an efficient and economical manner; and to charge and collect for the use thereof fees and charges to pay all reasonable operating and maintenance expenses as provided in said resolution, and to pay when due the principal of and interest on this bond and the series of which it is one, and to maintain the Bond Reserve Account and the Depreciation Account created by said resolution in amounts fully sufficient therefor.

This bond may be registered as to principal in the name of the holder on the books of The Teachers College Board in the office of the Secretary of said Board, such registration to be evidenced by notation of said Secretary on the back hereof, after which no transfer hereof shall be valid unless made on said books and similarly noted hereon, but it may be discharged from such registration by being transferred to bearer, after which it shall be transferred by delivery, but it may be again registered as before. The registration of this bond shall not restrict the negotiability of the coupons by delivery merely.

It is hereby certified and recited and declared that all acts, conditions and things required to exist, to happen and to be performed, precedent to and in the issuance of this bond, have existed, have happened and have been performed in due form, time and manner as required by law, and that the amount of this bond, together with all other bonds of this issue of which this is one, does not exceed any limit prescribed by the Constitution or the Statutes of the State of Illinois.

IN WITNESS WHEREOF, The Teachers College Board of the State of Illinois for Western Illinois State College at Macomb, Illinois, has caused this bond to be signed by its Chairman, attested by its Secretary under the seal thereof, and countersigned by the Treasurer of the State of Illinois, and has caused the interest coupons hereto attached to be executed by the facsimile

Section 5. There are hereby irrevocably pledged to the prompt and punctual payment of the principal of and interest on the \$1,150,000 principal amount of bonds herein authorized all of the net revenues to be derived from the operation of the project, and each of the \$1,150,000 principal amount of bonds herein authorized is payable from and secured by a first lien on and pledge of the net revenues of the project. As used herein the term "net revenues" shall mean that part of the gross revenues remaining after payment of the reasonable and necessary cost of currently maintaining, repairing, insuring and operating the project.

None of the \$1,150,000 aggregate principal amount of bonds herein authorized shall be entitled to priority of one over the other in the application of the net revenues of the project, regardless of the fact of differences in the date of maturity of said bonds or the date and terms and conditions of the prior redemption and payment thereof, or for any reason whatsoever, but all of the bonds of said total authorized issue of \$1,150,000 principal amount are co-equal as to lien and share ratably without preference, priority, or distinction as to the source or method of payment and security therefor.

So long as any of the bonds herein authorized shall remain outstanding and unpaid, the Teachers College Board covenants and agrees with all holders thereof that no additional obligations will be incurred or issued payable from the net revenues of the project which will be senior to or on a parity with the pledges made and liens created securing the bonds herein authorized and, further, that the said Board will not sell or otherwise dispose of, or mortgage, lease, or otherwise encumber the project, or any substantial portion thereof, or the income and revenues derived or to be derived from any portion thereof, until all of the bonds herein authorized shall have been fully paid in accordance with their terms.

Section 6. That for the purpose of accounting for the funds that are pledged to the payment of the bonds under the terms of this resolution and so long as any of said bonds herein authorized are outstanding, the project for the purpose of this resolution shall be operated and maintained on a fiscal year basis beginning on July 1 and ending on June 30 of each succeeding year.

All income, revenue and receipts derived from the continued operation and use of the project and all funds received from any other source or sources applicable thereto, shall be faithfully applied to the prompt and punctual payment of the maturing princi-

pal of and interest on the bonds authorized hereunder according to their terms and to create and maintain a reasonable reserve for such payment; to pay the reasonable and necessary expenses of operating, maintaining, repairing and insuring the project; and to the creation of an adequate depreciation reserve, according to the terms of this resolution.

- Section 7. That from and after the date of completion of the project, or any portion or unit thereof, the gross income and revenues derived from the fees and charges collected from the continued use and operation of the project shall, within three (3) days after receipt thereof be paid to the Treasurer of the State of Illinois and shall be set aside by him in a special fund hereby created to be known as "The Teachers College Board Revenue Fund of 1956 for Western Illinois State College at Macomb, Illinois," (hereinafter referred to as the "Revenue Fund") and said fund shall be used and held for use in accordance with the following requirements:
- 1. On the first day of each calendar month there shall be transferred by said Treasurer from the Revenue Fund to a separate and special account designated as "Operation and Maintenance Account, Western Illinois State College Residence Hall and Student Center Revenue Bonds, Series 1956," such a sum of money as shall be necessary to pay the estimated expenses of the operation and maintenance of the project under efficient and economical management, which shall include adequate provision for insurance, ordinary maintenance and repair (but excluding all charges for depreciation and all general administrative expenses of Western Illinois State College), and any fees due the paying agent of the bonds herein authorized. If in any month for any reason there shall not be available an amount equal to the amount required for the payment of the expenses hereinabove referred to, then an amount of revenue equal to any such deficiency shall be added to the amount of revenue otherwise required to be paid into the said Operation and Maintenance Account in the next succeeding calendar month of months and shall be paid with the payment then to be made.

Said Board covenants and agrees with the holders of the bonds herein authorized that said Board will maintain, preserve and keep the project in good repair, working order and condition so that it will at all times be available for maximum use and occupancy and that said Board will at all times continuously operate and manage said project in an efficient manner and at reasonable cost.

2. On the first day of each month after making the transfer required as hereinabove provided in paragraph 1 of this section, said Treasurer shall transfer on his books from said Revenue Fund to a special account designated "Bond Account, Western Illinois State College Residence Hall and Student Center Revenue Bonds, Series 1956," commencing October 1, 1957, an amount of money equal to one-sixth (1/6th) of the interest then next due and commencing April 1, 1958, an amount of money equal to one-twelfth (1/12th) of the principal next due on the bonds herein

authorized, and said Treasurer is hereby authorized and directed, without any further order of the Teachers College Board, to remit on or before the fifteenth day prior to the first day of April and the first day of October in each year to The First National Bank of Chicago, Chicago, Illinois, the amount due on said respective dates. All moneys credited to and deposited in said Account shall be used solely and only for the payment of said bonds and the interest thereon as the same become due, or for the payment of said bonds as are called for redemption prior to maturity as in this resolution provided. Said Treasurer shall make no further remittances to said bank after there shall have been on deposit in said Account therein a sufficient amount to pay all of the bonds then outstanding, and all of the interest thereon to maturity, or to the date upon which such outstanding bonds may then have been called for redemption, including the amount, if any, of redemption premium to be payable as specified in the terms of this resolution.

3. On or before the tenth day of April and the tenth day of October of each fiscal year, beginning October 10, 1957, and after making the deposits provided for in paragraphs (1) and (2) above, and subject to all provisions therein specified for the maintenance of said deposits, respectively, the said Treasurer shall credit from the balance of said Revenue Fund to a separate and special account hereby created and designated as the "Bond Reserve Account, Western Illinois State College at Macomb, Illinois, Residence Hall and Student Center Revenue Bonds, Series 1956," the sum of \$4,000 until such time as there has been accumulated in said Bond Reserve Account the sum of \$60,000, at which figure the Bond Reserve Account shall thereafter be continuously maintained until the moneys in the Bond Account and the Bond Reserve Account are equal to the interest and principal requirements on all bonds authorized hereunder then outstanding and unpaid. moneys in said Bond Reserve Account shall be used by said Treasurer and held for use solely and to the extent necessary for the payment from time to time of the principal of or interest on the said bonds authorized hereunder as to which there would be a default if the money in said Account were not so used, provided that all money in said Account, in excess of the said sum of \$60,000, at the end of any one fiscal year shall be used to retire as many of the bonds authorized hereunder as can be redeemed therewith, either through the purchase thereof on the open market or through the redemption of said bonds on the next succeeding interest payment date, but no bonds shall be purchased hereunder for retirement at a price greater than that at which the said bonds may be so called for prior redemption, and all bonds so purchased or redeemed shall be cancelled by the Treasurer. The moneys accumulated in said Bond Reserve Account may be invested and reinvested by the Treasurer of the State of Illinois without further authorization by the Teachers College Board in direct obligations of the United States of America, or securities fully guaranteed by the United States of America maturing not more than ten (10) years from the date on which each investment is made.

- 4. On or before the tenth day of April and the tenth day of October in each fiscal year, beginning October 10, 1957, after making the monthly deposits provided for in paragraphs (1), (2) and (3) hereinabove, and so long as said Accounts contain funds sufficient to meet the requirements specified in said paragraphs (1), (2) and (3) as aforesaid, the Treasurer shall credit on his books from the balance in said Revenue Fund to a separate and special account hereby created to be designated "Depreciation Account, Western Illinois State College at Macomb, Illinois, Residence Hall and Student Center Revenue Bonds, Series 1956," the sum of \$4,000 until there shall have been accumulated in said Depreciation Account the sum of \$60,000, at which figure the Depreciation Account shall thereafter be maintained by subsequent deposits from said Revenue Fund, subject to the limitations hereinabove provided. The funds in said Depreciation Account shall be used solely and only for the purpose of paying the cost of any extraordinary repairs, upkeep and replacements in, on or about the project, and only to the extent funds for that purpose available from other sources are insufficient therefor; except that the funds held in said Account, to the extent necessary to prevent or remedy a default in the payment of the interest on or principal of the bonds herein authorized, shall be used and held for use for that purpose and shall be transferred to the Bond Account, hereinabove described, and whenever such a transfer is made the amount so transferred shall be added to the next deposit to be made and thereafter, until full reimbursement to said Depreciation Account has been made. Funds accumulated in said Depreciation Account may be invested and reinvested by the Treasurer of the State of Illinois in direct obligations of the United States of America, or securities fully guaranteed by the United States of America maturing not more than one year from the date on which each investment is made.
- 5. If in any month the net revenues of the project are insufficient to meet the amount of deposits required to be made into the Bond Account, the Depreciation Account, and the Bond Reserve Account as herein specified, any such deficiency shall be made up from the first revenues thereafter received and available for such deposits under the terms of this resolution and the deposit of any such sum or sums into said Bond Account, said Depreciation Account, and said Bond Reserve Account as may be necessary to make up any such deficiency shall be in addition to the then current monthly deposits herein specified to be made.
- 6. All deposits hereinabove required to be made into the Bond Account and the Bond Reserve Account shall not be diminished by reason of any sums deposited into each of said Accounts from any other source or sources, it being the intent hereof that any sums so deposited from any other source or sources shall be held in said Bond Account and in said Bond Reserve Account as a further reserve for the prompt and punctual payment of the principal of and interest on the bonds herein authorized.
- 7. All funds remaining in the Revenue Fund at the end of any fiscal year, after all deposits as hereinabove specified have been

made, and after due provision has been made for maintaining the Bond Account, the Depreciation Account, and the Bond Reserve Account, as hereinabove specified, shall be deemed surplus revenues, and shall be transferred to the Bond Reserve Account for the redemption or purchase of said bonds as therein provided, or may be used for any lawful purpose, as the Teachers College Board by resolution shall direct.

- Section 8. That the Teachers College Board acting under and by authority of the aforesaid Act, hereby expressly covenants and agrees with the holders of the bonds herein authorized to be issued as follows:
- 1. That it will at all times charge and collect rates, fees and charges, including student fees, for the use of the project adequate to meet all the requirements of this bond resolution, and that it will not permit any free use of the project.
- 2. Notwithstanding any other facilities which now, or, at any time hereafter, may be available for students and faculty of the Western Illinois State College at Macomb, Illinois (subject only to the covenants and agreements made by said Board in its Resolution adopted March 22, 1954, authorizing the issue of \$550,000 Student Residence Hall Revenue Bonds, Series of 1954), that it will require and will adopt rules and regulations designed to assure the maximum use of the said project until all of the bonds herein authorized have been paid fully as to both principal and interest, and it is further covenanted and agreed that the fees, admissions, rentals, and other charges from students, faculty members and others using or being served by, or having the right to use or having the right to be served by, said project, shall be so fixed and revised from time to time, and shall be so collected that the proceeds therefor shall be sufficient at all times to provide funds sufficient to meet the Bond Account requirements for the principal of and interest on the bonds authorized hereunder, including all requirements for a reserve for the payment or redemption of said bonds as hereinabove specified, promptly as and when the same become due, payable, or subject to prior redemption; to make the payments required in the Depreciation Account hereinabove specified; and to pay the reasonable cost of maintaining, operating, repairing, and insuring the project.
- 3. That it will keep the project, including furnishings and equipment, in good usable condition and continuously insured against loss or damage by fire and lightning, the perils included under the extended coverage endorsement, and steam boiler explosion if steam boilers are installed in the project, in an amount not less than the full insurable value of said project or the amount of outstanding bonds, whichever is less. All moneys collected on account of loss or damage covered by any such policy or policies of insurance shall be held in trust and shall be used only for reconstruction, replacement or repairs. In the event said funds are insufficient to restore said project to its former condition, then said funds shall be paid into the Bond Account, and held for the benefit of the bondholders as their interests may ap-

- pear. Said Board agrees, further, to carry adequate insurance against the loss of use and occupancy of said project from the perils of fire and lightning, the perils included under the extended coverage endorsement and from steam boiler explosion if steam boilers are installed therein, and from any or all risks or from any cause whatsoever, in an amount not less than \$60,000, provided, however, that said amount may be reduced by whatever funds are on hand in the Bond Reserve Account. Any sum received from any such use and occupancy insurance, after deducting necessary operation and maintenance charges under economical management during the period of such loss of use and occupancy, shall be paid into the aforesaid Bond Account. All of said insurance shall be carried in a responsible insurance company or companies authorized to do business in the State of Illinois, and the cost thereof shall be deemed to be a maintenance and operation cost.
- 4. That it will keep proper books of records and accounts separate and apart from all other records and accounts in which complete and correct entries shall be made of all transactions relating to the cost of constructing, equipping, furnishing and improving the aforesaid project; the expenditures for maintaining, operating and repairing the project, and all revenues collected therefrom which said records shall be kept and shall be available for the information of all persons interested; and will furnish to the original purchaser of said bonds, on the written request therefor, not more than thirty (30) days after the close of each calendar month, complete operating and income statements of the project, in reasonable detail, covering such monthly period; and agrees also to furnish to the original purchaser of said bonds and to any holder of any of said bonds, on the written request therefor, not more than sixty (60) days after the close of each fiscal year, a complete financial statement in reasonable detail, covering such fiscal year, signed by the Secretary and certified by independent auditors, who shall be certified public accountants.
- 5. That it will not issue any additional bonds or incur any other indebtedness, payable from any revenues of the project unless the pledge of such revenues shall be made junior and subordinate in all respects to the pledge of revenues under this resolution for the payment of the bonds authorized to be issued hereunder, including the sum to be maintained in the Bond Reserve Account, as provided by paragraph (3) of Section 7 of this resolution.
- 6. That it will faithfully and punctually perform all of the duties and obligations with reference to the project, as required by the provisions of this resolution and the statutes under which the said bonds are issued, including the construction, equipment, furnishing, and improvement thereof, and the operation and maintenance thereof as herein provided; the making and collecting of reasonable and sufficient fees and charges for the use thereof; the segregation of the income and revenues therefrom to the respective accounts created under the provisions of this resolution, and the

proper application of said accounts.

Section 9. Any holder of any bond or bonds issued hereunder, or of any coupons representing interest accrued thereon, may either by proper court action or in law or in equity compel said Teachers College Board to perform all duties imposed upon it under the provisions of this resolution and under the provisions of the statute hereinabove referred to authorizing the issuance of the bonds as herein provided, including the making and collecting of sufficient rates, charges and fees for the use of the project, and the performance of any and all covenants made by said Board in and by this resolution.

Section 10. That the proceeds derived from the issuance and sale of said bonds hereby provided for shall be applied as follows:

- 1. The entire proceeds derived from the sale of said bonds to the purchaser thereof shall be deposited immediately with the Treasurer of the State of Illinois pursuant to the terms of the Act hereinabove referred to authorizing the issuance of said bonds.
- 2. It shall be the duty of the Treasurer of the State of Illinois to set aside the amount of accrued interest received at the sale and delivery of said bonds to said purchaser in the Bond Account hereinabove provided for, together with the sum of \$55,704.00 received as principal from the proceeds of the sale of said bonds, being an amount estimated necessary to pay interest on said bonds during the period of construction, which sums shall be used solely for the purpose of paying the interest due on said bonds, and is hereby dedicated and made available for that purpose.
- 3. That the proceeds received as principal from the sale of said bonds (after deduction made of the sum specified to pay interest on said bonds during the period of construction), together with cash on hand in the amount of \$22,675 and the sum of \$350,000 as may be from time to time made available by the State of Illinois under the terms of Senate Bill No. 763, approved July 1, 1955, to said Teachers College Board, shall be set aside in a separate and special account by said Treasurer, to be designated "Building Construction Account of 1956 for Western Illinois State College at Macomb, Illinois," and shall be applied to the cost of acquiring, constructing, equipping, furnishing and improving the project, all as hereinbefore described; provided, however, that any surplus remaining in such Account upon completion of the construction, equipment, furnishing and improving of said project shall be transferred and credited to the Bond Reserve Account, as provided in paragraph (3) of Section 7 hereof.

Section 11. That the provisions of this resolution shall constitute a contract between The Teachers College Board for Western Illinois State College at Macomb, Illinois, and the holders of the bonds herein authorized to be issued, and each of them, and the said Board hereby pledges its good faith to the performance of each and every covenant hereof.

Section 12. If any section, subsection, paragraph, sentence, clause or phrase of this resolution or of the bonds or interest coupons herein prescribed shall either be held to be unconstitutional or otherwise invalid by any court of competent jurisdiction, such decision shall not affect the validity of the remaining portions of this resolution, but this resolution shall be construed and enforced as if such illegal or invalid provision shall not have been contained therein.

Section 13. That the Chairman and Secretary of said Board and the Treasurer of the State of Illinois shall be and they are hereby fully authorized and directed to do all things which may be necessary to effect the preparation, execution and delivery of the bonds herein authorized to be issued to the purchasers thereof, namely, White, Weld & Co., William Blair & Company, and Julien Collins & Company, of Chicago, Illinois, at a price heretofore agreed upon, the same being not less than par and accrued interest to date of delivery, all in accordance with their proposal for the purchase thereof, which is hereby accepted and approved.

Section 14. That this resolution shall be in full force and effect immediately upon its passage.

RESOLUTION establishing charges and fees for the use of and for the service supplied by the residence hall and student center to be constructed on the campus of Western Illinois State College at Macomb, Illinois

WHEREAS, The Teachers College Board of the State of Illinois, has heretofore by resolution duly adopted on June 25, 1956, provided for the construction of a residence hall and student center on the campus of Western Illinois State College at Macomb, Illinois, and the issuance of \$1,150,000 Residence Hall and Student Center Revenue Bonds to defray part of the cost of such construction pursuant to and in compliance with the provisions of Sections 59a through 59e of Chapter 127 of the Illinois Revised Statutes, 1955; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to the terms of the Act above referred to and said resolution heretofore passed authorizing such construction and the issuance of said bonds, it is necessary that The Teachers College Board establish fees and charges for the use of such building;

NOW, THEREFORE, Be It Resolved by The Teachers College Board of the State of Illinois, as follows:

Section 1. That there shall be and there are hereby established fees and charges for the use of and for the service supplied by said residence hall and student center as follows:

Room and Board for Occupants of said Residence Hall

\$15.00 per person per week.

For Use of Student Center

- \$4.00 per full time student per quarter for 3 regular quarters.
- \$2.00 per full time student per summer session.

For Incidental Food and Other Services

Charges for food served other than regular meels served residence hall occupants and charges for other services rendered by the Student center shall be set from time to time by the Business Manager of Western Illinois State College and shall be sufficient at all times to produce gross revenues not less than 110% of the direct operating expenses incurred in providing such service.

Section 2. Said charges for the residence hall shall be payable not less than one week in advance. Fees for the use of the student center shall be payable in advance at the time the student registers at the College. Charges for incidental food and other services, shall be payable at the time such food is served or other service is rendered.

Section 3. It is hereby made a duty of the Business Manager of Western Illinois State College to collect all monies due under the provisions hereof.

Section 4. All revenues and monies derived from the operation of said residence hall and student center shall be held by the Business Manager separately and apart from all other funds of the College and all of said sums shall be delivered to the Treasurer of the State of Illinois not more than three days after receipt of the same.

Section 5. Before the Business Manager shall enter upon his duties with respect to the collection of charges and fees and before he shall receive any funds derived from the operation of said residence hall and student center, he shall be required to post a corporate surety bond in an amount equal to the amount likely to come into his hands at any time, which bond shall be approved by The Teachers College Board, and filed with the Secretary of said Board, and shall be conditioned upon his faithful performance of his duties as required under this resolution and his accounting for all monies coming into his hands.
