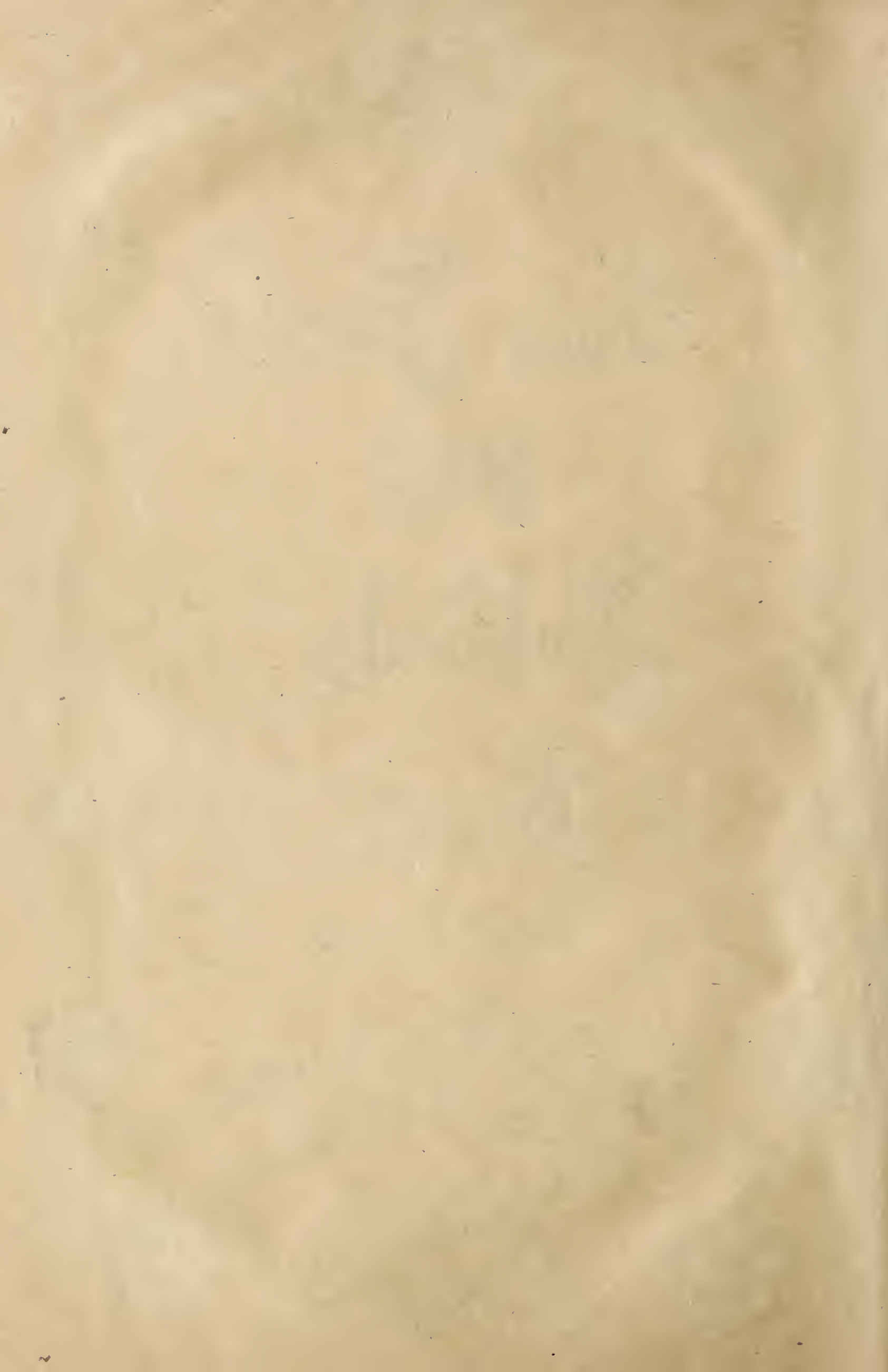

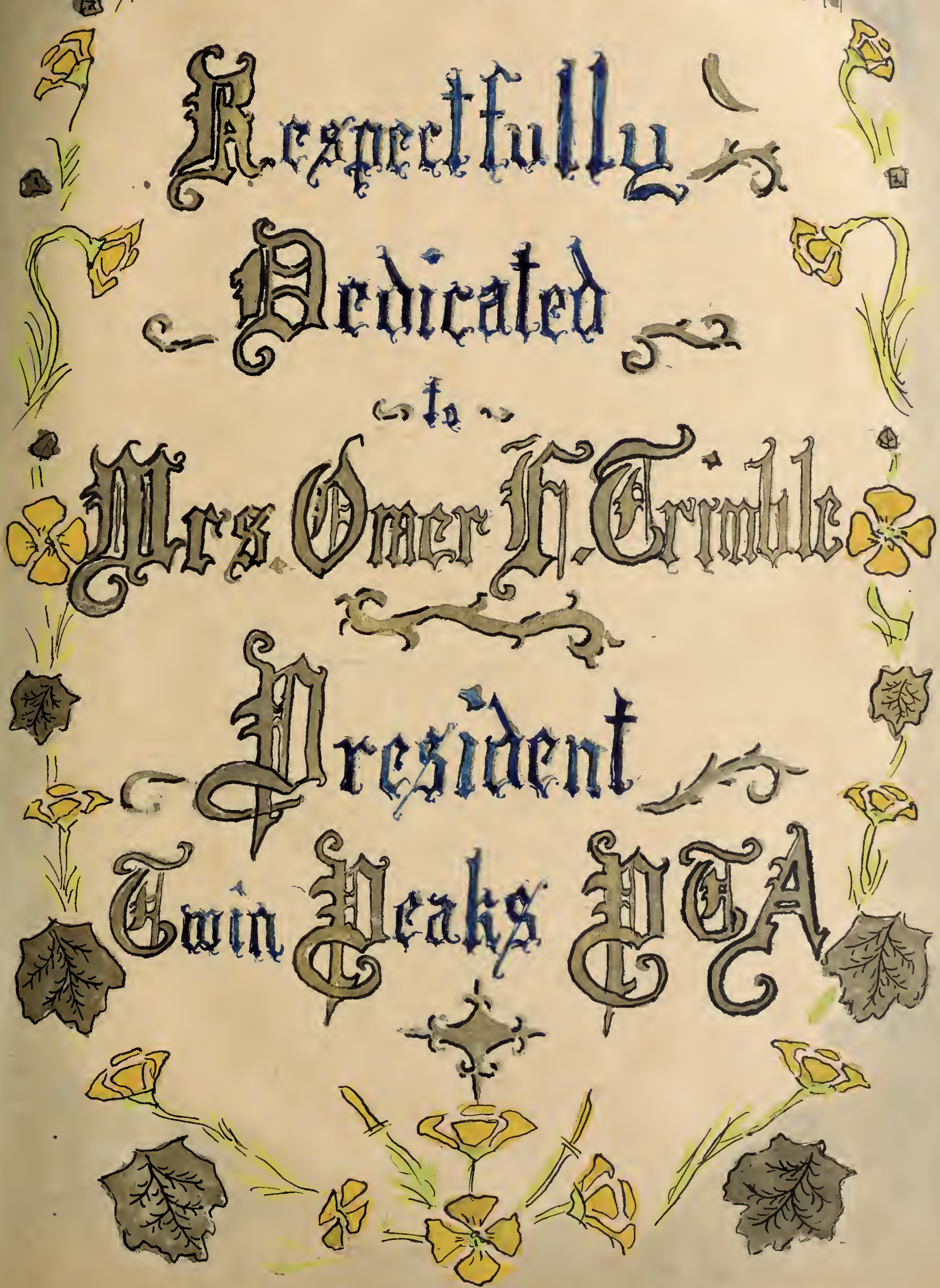

### **Children With Physical Defects Treated During Summer**

*This is the first of a series of articles by Mrs. Paul E. Springer, president of the Second District, California Congress of Parents and Teachers, about the year's work in Parent-Teacher circles.*

The 7-year-old boy, squirming restlessly at his school desk because he can't see or hear as well as his fellows, is apt to become a problem child. And that's one reason for the summer roundup.

The roundup is a national campaign to correct physical defects in young children before they first enter primary schools.

#### **PARTICIPATES IN WORK**

This year for the first time San Francisco parent-teacher organizations officially participated in the national campaign. Mrs. H. B. Swartz, Second district chairman, actively directed the work in cooperation with Dr. Joseph Marr Gwinn, superintendent of schools, and Drs. J. C. Geiger and Paul Barrett of the Board of Health.

Local physicians, volunteering their services, made a thorough checkup of 876 of these pre-school children and discovered many sorts of remediable defects, such as infected tonsils and adenoids, malnutrition, decaying teeth, skin diseases, lung and heart disorders and flat feet.

#### **SEEK TO CORRECT DEFECTS**

As a follow-up, committees are now trying to insure the correction of all these defects before school opens in August.

With the consent of parents, and in line with modern medical practice, 775 of these 876 youngsters were vaccinated and 725 immunized against diphtheria.

# ANSWERS GIVE ESTIMATES OF VALUES a

By MRS. JOS. E. MORCOMBE (Publicity chairman California Congress of Parents and Teachers.) "Why I Belong to a P. T. A." is one of the subjects for a 200 word article in the parent-teacher education course offered by the California Congress of Parents and Teachers. Excerpts from the papers of those recently completing the course in the Second District may be of interest to members who in all sincerity desire to answer this same question.

Mrs. Sue F. Johnson of Twin Peaks local wrote: a

"Classes in parent education have given me a lot to think about. What an enormous subject it is. But belonging has been so helpful and broadening. The mind is ever active with new thoughts for home-making and with solving the problems that come into every circle. . . . I enjoy the work, the personal contacts and doing for others, and am very grateful for the broader outlook which I have gained through parent-teacher work in understanding my fellow beings."

- 1 cup sugar
- 1/2 cup butter
- 2 egg yolks
- 3 egg whites
- 28 graham crackers
- 3 tablespoons flour
- 1 teaspoon baking powder
- 1 teaspoon vanilla

Cream butter and sugar, add egg yolks and beat well. Roll graham crackers into crumbs and add with milk and vanilla to batter; then fold in stiffly beaten egg whites. Lastly add sifted flour and baking powder. Bake in two layers in a moderate oven, 325° to 350°.

- 1 package dates, ground
- 1 cup finely chopped nuts
- 5 tablespoons powdered sugar

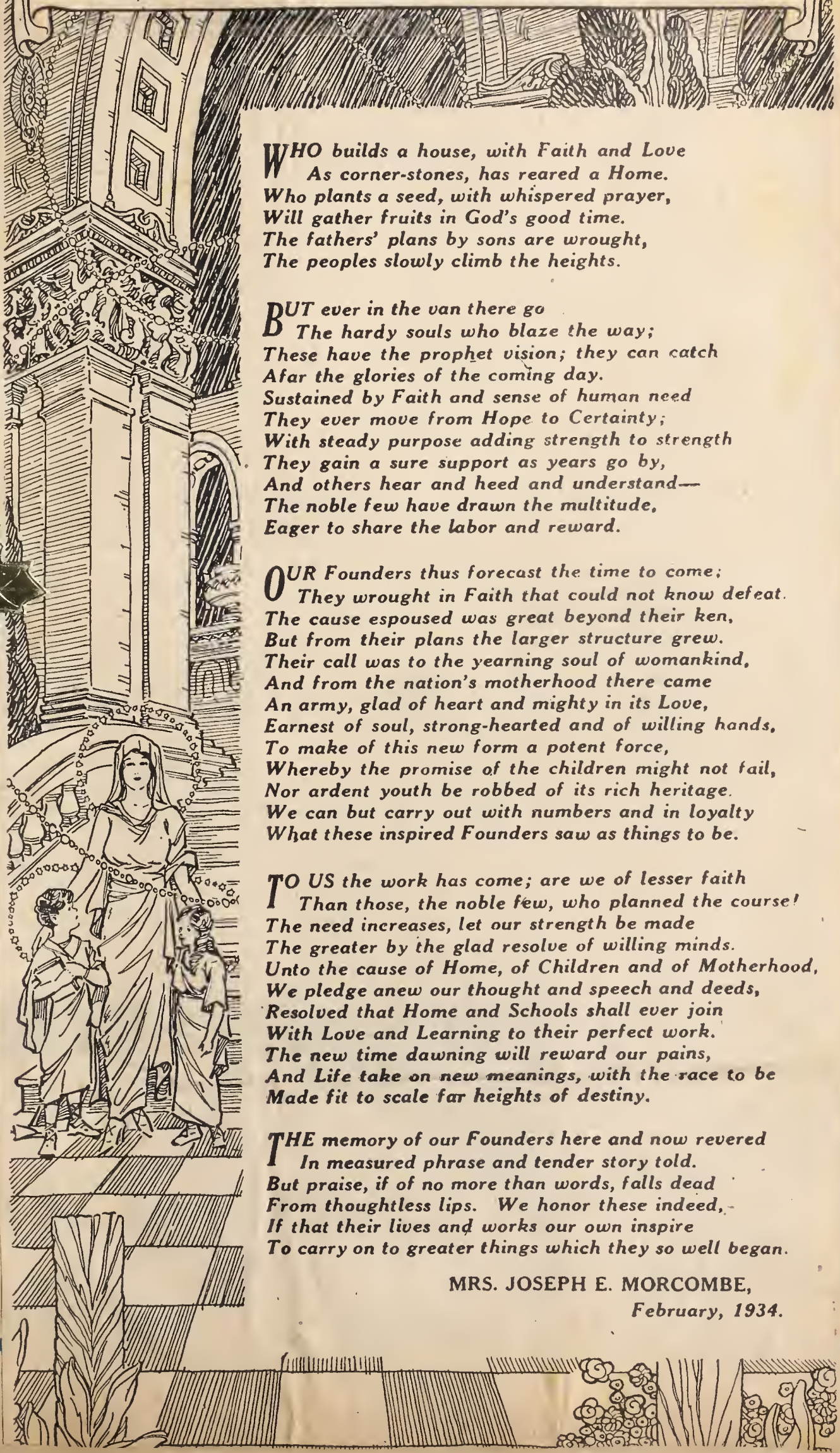






# Founders Day Tribute

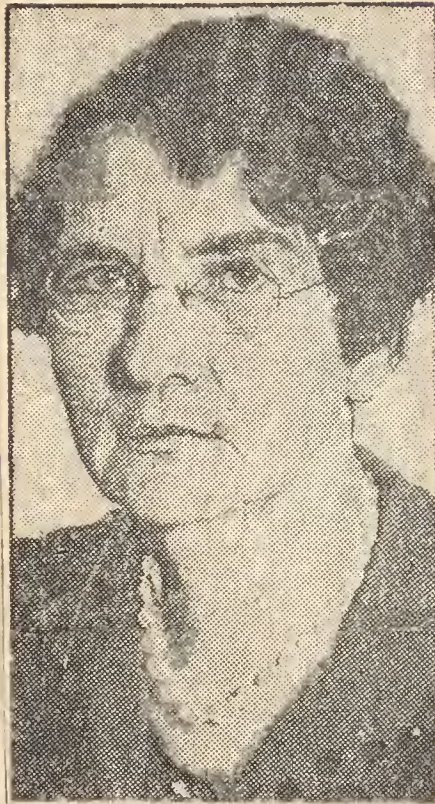

## P.-T. A. Makes Record In Publicity

Acknowledgement was made this week that the California Congress of Parents and Teachers has achieved a national record in its publicity department. This record lies in the organization of the department, according to Mrs. Joseph E. Morcombe, chairman, who will hold this same office in the State group during the next year, but who has completed her work as publicity chairman of the Second District P.-T. A. Mrs. H. E. Boomer will be her successor.

Mrs. Morcombe estimates that publicity given the California P.-T. A. in the daily, weekly and district papers this past year would be sufficient to make up a three-inch strip going around the entire world. But she also rates as playing a large part in her publicity campaign the tiny newsettes issued in the various school districts by the P.-T. A. units. Thirty-six such sheets have been issued monthly in this district. In addition there has been considerable poster work and announcement slides in moving picture theaters. The success of all this work has been due Mrs. Morcombe says to the staunch support of the unit publicity chairmen.

#### RECORDS PRESERVED

Records of the work of this department are preserved by clippings in publicity books gotten out by the State, districts and units. The Second District book is in preparation. Last year's book required five dollars' worth of paste and that much has already been used up in preparation of this year's edition.

The unit books have competed for local, State and national honors. Eight were chosen from the Second District for further rating preparatory to the selection of eight books to represent California at the national P.-T. A. convention. Two from the district won out—the Argonne and the Francis Scott Key with the Grattan tying with the latter, but final decision going to the Francis Scott Key because the Grattan once before had national honors.

#### BOUND AND INDEXED

These books all bound alike and carefully indexed contain complete records of the year's work of the units. It is Mrs. Morcombe's hope that some day there will be established in each public school a P.-T. A. room with its bookshelf having the record books on file as complete histories of P.-T. A. work.

Mrs. Morcombe has been chosen a vice president of the Second District P.-T. A., with her popularity promising support for higher office in the organization. To assist Mrs. Boomer during the coming two years will be Mrs. W. A. Stetter and Mrs. W. M. Hoffman, calendar chairman.

For four years Mrs. Joseph E. Morcombe has been posing other women before the camera and writing of their activities in Parent-Teacher Association fields.

Today, for the first time, the news camera was reversed and focused upon Mrs. Morcombe as she relinquishes her duties as chairman of publicity for Second district P.-T. A. to take up her new post of second vice president.

To Mrs. H. E. Boomer, who has been her aide for the past term, Mrs. Morcombe today turned over her files, admitting, as she did so, that she "just hated to give up the work even for a higher honor in the organization."

### BEGAN WITH APPLE

For newspaper and magazine publicity, particularly the type of parent-teacher material that she has been handling especially for The Call-Bulletin, is Mrs. Morcombe's vocation, avocation, and even her relaxation.

It all began with an apple, she confessed today.

"When I was a high school girl, back in Storm Lake, Iowa, I used to write school notes for the town paper," Mrs. Morcombe said. "Then, in college, working my way through, I still carried on college news, never thinking that I'd take up the work seriously after graduation.

"But in the office of the paper was a kindly compositor who used to give me an apple every time I brought in my copy and one day, when I was munching on the apple, he said, 'Why don't you learn to stick type yourself?'"

### PUT IT IN TYPE

"Stick type! It had a fascinating sound. I liked the idea. Into the office I went, writing the news and learning to put it into type. That was the beginning of my newspaper career."

A sudden shift of circumstances in Storm Lake newspaperdom threw Mrs. Morcombe into the editor's chair.

The editor shot the district attorney. Or was it the district attorney who shot the editor? Whichever it was, the paper was editorless, and the young compositor was called in from the "back office" and put in charge of the paper.

"In order to save the wages of a linotype operator," Mrs. Morcombe continued, "I learned to run the machine myself and when the owners of the paper gave me a contract to buy the paper for myself out of its earnings I was, in fact, a newspaper woman."

money will be spent for entirely to replace unsafe elementary

schools; not one cent will be spent for other purposes.

Second, now is the time to get the work done most economically, while construction costs are low and when San Francisco can take advantage of Federal aid as provided in the National Recovery Act signed by President Roosevelt last week.

Our city officials have received word from Washington that the school bonds come within the provisions of the act. This means that the government will purchase the entire issue at  $3\frac{1}{2}$  per cent interest, a saving eligible to receive an outright gift of \$900,000 from the government, amounting to 30 per cent of the cost of labor and material. Certainly this is a bargain, and it will be "good business" to take advantage of it, particularly as the schools in question will be replaced within a few years at any rate-event. We will actually be getting \$3,000,000 worth of schools for \$2,100,000.

Third, labor needs the work. It is better policy to replace firetrap schools now and to that extent lessen unemployment than to wait and do the work when normal business needs labor. The school replacement program will furnish immediate work and wages for 1500 men. All the money will be spent in San Francisco, and will stimulate the entire construction industry.

It would be absurd for San Francisco to let children go in daily danger when idle labor is desperate for the work.

To those who prefer the "Pay as you Go" plan instead of a bond issue to replace firetrap schools, I want to offer this explanation. Under normal conditions nearly everyone favors a "Pay as You Go" policy. But this is an EMERGENCY situation.

Safe schools must be provided. There is not one of us who will take the responsibility for another Fremont School fire or be willing to risk the life of even one child.



And to place \$3,000,000 in the tax rate for replacement now would mean an increase of 40 cents in the tax rate, an unbearable burden under present conditions when we are doing all we can to reduce taxes.

The only way to accomplish early replacement for the safety of the children now housed in fire hazard buildings is by the authorization of the proposed bond issue. Any other action would subject our children to continued danger from fire.

What happened to the ~~Fremont~~ Fremont school might happen any day to the other wooden schools, and is almost certain to happen to some of them if we do not replace them---if we do not vote the \$3,000,000 in school bonds which come before us on June 27.

Class B---8th grade, same conditions as class A.

Class C---6th grade, submitted by districts where conferences were conducted but where as yet classes and conferences in publicity are not an established institution and regarded as essential by officials.

Class D---8th grade, same conditions as class C.

Class E---High Schools and Junior High from everywhere.

Class F---6th grade, submitted by districts without organized classes or conferences.

Class G---8th grade, conditions same as Class F.

Special classes:-----A----Specials Schools  
B----Kindergarten  
C----Rural

Consult your rating sheet as to what class you were rated in.

If books in class A/B/C/D/E or Specials, rated high, they were then placed in a higher class, until if they continued rating high, they arrived in the Semi-Finals. The Semi-Finals this year had 18 entries--so if your book has a semi-final rating, you may indeed be proud.

After the Semi-final rating--a book was selected from each district which had books in the semi-finals--the best from that district being chosen.

The eight books chosen to represent the state at the National, are therefore NOT the eight best books ratings eight highest in the Semi-finals, but the highest from the districts appearing in the semi-finals--i.e. one district might have the eight best books in the semi-finals and if so chosen the state as a whole would not be represented. If your book was rated in the semi-finals, you can from the Rank tell how it compared with the other books in this class.

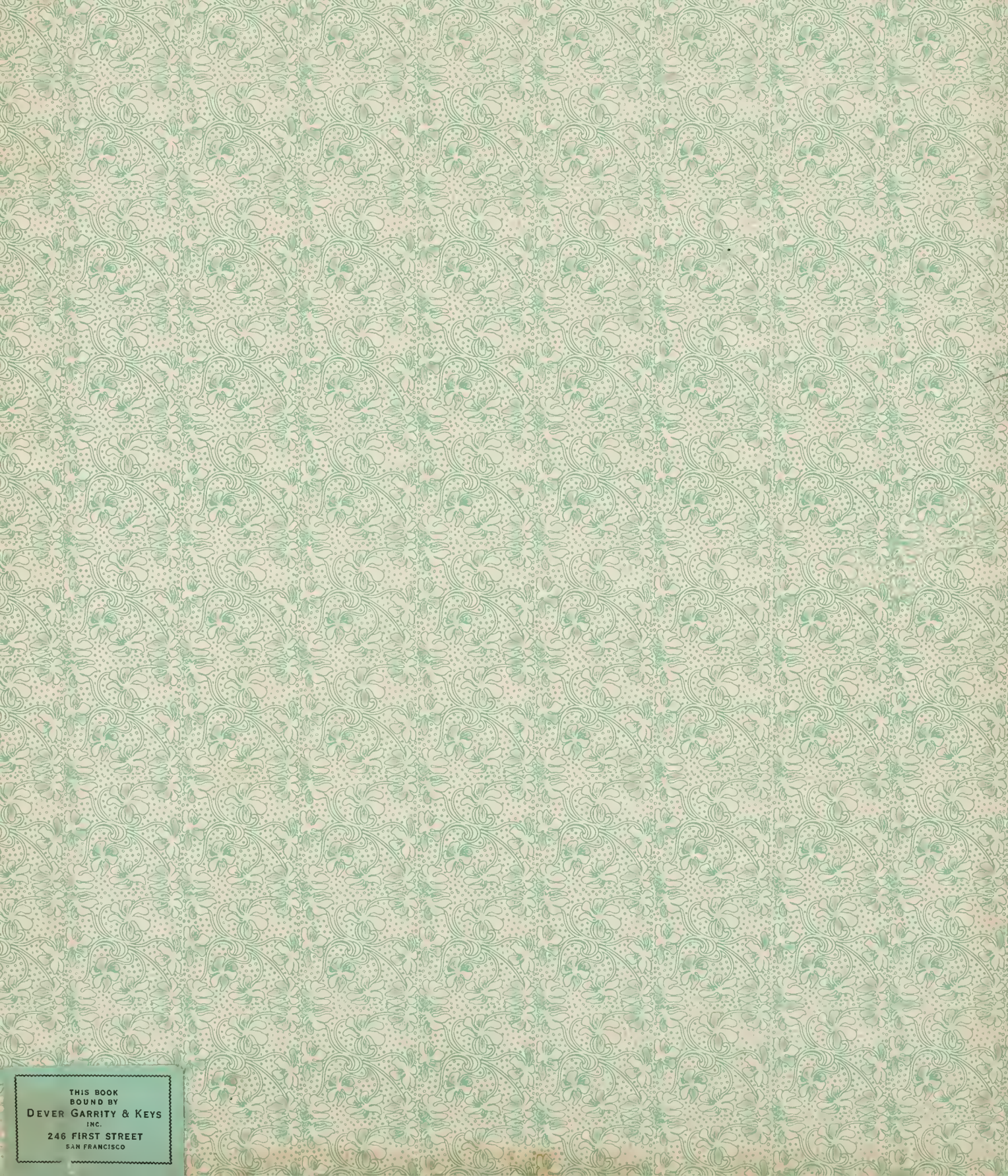
