It has been remarked over and over again, that the great achievem Sculpture, Painting, and Architecture, are easily accessible for st those who devote any attention to the Fine Arts; while the best produ of the men who laboured with the burin, the etching-needle, or the engraver's knife, are little known, except to the few wealthy an who can buy the rare examples of such work, or the specialists who fr the print-rooms of the Art Museums. The artistic interest of engrav nevertheless, not inferior to that of the pictures, statues, and buildings w by famous hands, and readily visible to almost all the world. They of same æsthetic gratifications, they exhibit the same developments of geni skill, and they furnish the same course of education in taste, as the monuments of the sister-arts. But their rarity and comparative inacces forbid most students to hope for even an occasional transitory glance a of the engraved designs made famous by the descriptions of Bartsch, Pass Ottley, and others.

The object of the present publication, undertaken by the author the Berlin Museum and executed at the Royal Press, is to supp deficiency which has so long been felt, by printing a series of reprodof the most excellent works of engraving by old masters; from the tandrea Mantegna to that of Earlom and Chodowiecki. Absolute t both in line and effect, has been achieved by the perfected methods of 1 science: for copper-engravings the heliographic process, and for woodci of zincography have been found completely adequate to produce such as were only distinguished by their newness from the best impressions original blocks and plates. With the signature of Jacques Spifame Bishop of Nevers in 1557, two years before he joined the Calvinists in Geneva, and nine years before he suffered death at their hands. A note on the fly-leaf states that the MS. belonged to M. de Chavannes in 1680, and to M. Ditau in 1730.

This fine specimen of calligraphy is probably English. It is in surprisingly fresh and excellent preservation.—The first page began originally with the word "electus" (in the preface), and the first words on page 8 are "hu xpi filii." (the beginning of the Gospel). Thus in the former instance the words "Marcus evangelista Dei" were omitted; and in the latter "Initium evangelii i". As in this last place there is no room left for any ornamental addition of the missing words, we can only conclude that in both places the scribe was following exactly an ancient and partly defective text.

The first gloss is by Bede, and states that "Marcum pene intactum majores nostri

Lower down, at the bottom of the gloss, the scribe's inscription gives the date of the MS. "Ego Leonardus de Groxis ciuis Mutine huius apparatum in has compilationes decretalium fideliter scripsi, in Christi nomine die Mercurii XII intrat. Iulio, et Millo CCXLI. . Friderico Imp. Romanorum."

Not only valuable as giving the date and place of the writing and the name of the scribe; but also remarkable for its five Miniatures, and the numerous grotesque figures of birds, very well drawn, that fill the lines of ornament at the beginning of each column almost throughout the book. The year 1241 was that of the death of Pope Gregory IX.

This MS. was certainly written in Italy, perhaps at Bologna. The scribe who wrote it in Italian style was Thomas Normannus, and either to him or to some other Frenchman are to be attributed the Miniatures which are thoroughly French in style but reveal somewhat of Italian character in the colouring.—The colophon is "Explicit apparatus Decretalium editus a bernardo . . Thoma normanno milleno scribitur anno Et ducenteno domini nouies quo; deno".

The miniatures in this volume (the first of which is wanting) are also fine French work, whether done in Italy or in France.

In black ink, we find 27 Jany. St. Julian Bishop of Le Mans. 11 May Mamertus Bp. of Orleans, 26 June Translation of St. Hilary, 7 Sept. St. Clodvald, 27 Oct. St. Fronto, 9 Nov. St. Maturin, 17 Dec. St. Lazarus, 18 St. Gatian.

The ink is so black and good that one hesitates to call the writing Italian; the paintings however are undoubtedly Italian, and belong to the first half of the fifteenth

The original MS is in the Escurial. It was translated into Castilian from Arabic sources in the years 1276—1279, by order of Alfonso the Wise, and contains a description of the virtues of Stones, of which 360 are treated. The writing and the miniatures are beautiful examples of thirteenth century art of very high order; and the text is a philological monument showing the Castilian language in its earliest polished state.—The MS. was in the sixteenth century in the possession of Diego de Mendoza, and after his death came into the hands of Philip II, who put it in the Escurial. The artistic reproduction was done by Don Antonio Selfa.

The three celebrated World Maps here reproduced are (1) THE HARLEIAN MAPPE-MONDE in the British Museum, to which the date of 1536 has been assigned, and which was probably done in the same place as 2 and 3. (2) THE JOMARD MAP, also called the Dauphin's Map, now in the Bibliotheca Lindesiana, drawn by Pierre Desceliers at Arques near Dieppe in 1546. (3) Descelier's second Mappemonde of 1550, now in the British Museum.

They are all valuable and important; and highly interesting in connection with Canada and the explorations of Cartier and Roberval, as well as with the vexed question of the Discovery of Australia. Each map is reproduced sectionally in 15 folio sheets, with a reduced entire facsimile on a sixteenth sheet which serves for a key map to the sections.

No. 2 has been given in Jomard's atlas, but on a very reduced scale only; and it may be said that all three works appear here for the first time in perfect reproduction,

This copy which is quite perfect, including the six very rare leaves in Greek at the beginning of Paul's Epistles, belonged about 1540 to Fra Girolamo Seripandi, afterwards Archbishop of Salerno, Cardinal, and Papal Legate at the Council of Trent (born 1493, died 1563). His inscription of ownership is written on the last page of Vol. I.

A BOOK OF SINGULAR RARITY. This was formerly Dunn Gardner's copy and was bought at his sale by Lord Ashburnham in 1854. Only a single copy has turned up in the meanwhile which passed at Lord Hampton's sale in 1881 into the possession of the present Lord Aldenham. Many collectors are on the look-out for Queen Elizabeth's first Common Prayer.

The first is written by the well-known Catholic archæologist, Mr. W. H. J. Weale, who, in his Bibliographia Liturgica, gives us a catalogue of all the Missals printed prior to the year 1531, a list of Liturgical printers and publishers, with the Missals issued by them, and a list of places in which Missals have been printed. Such a work must be of the greatest help and use to every Liturgical student, as it gives the name of every church, whether cathedral or collegiate, and of every religious Order, in the enjoyment of a special use, and a complete list of its printed Missals. The second work is also from the same pen, as is a Catalogue of Rare Manuscripts and Printed Books, chiefly Liturgical, exhibited at "The Historical Music Loan Exhibition, Albert Hall, London, in 1885."

	been printed since the year 1475 to the present century. It is not probable that there are no omissions, but we believe that they are few and far between. Mr. Weale has			
	also given the size of every edition, the number of the leaves, the name of the printer, the place and year of publication, the public libraries in which copies may be seen, and			

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the names of writers by whom they have been mentioned and described. With regard to this last detail the statement must be received with exceptions; nor would it be possible to mention all writers who may have referred to or spoken of every edition. The labour of preparing this catalogue must have been great and to most people wearisome in the extreme; we have said that it will be useful, yet scarcely think that the time and trouble will be repaid which must have been expended on it."—Academy, October 9th, 1886.

From the inscription on the title we see that the owner's initials were J. A. à S.: from another on the flyleaf we conjecture that he was a native or inhabitant of Berry. This binding is a very pretty example of Lyonnese decorative handwork.

We get the impression of a square border rounded at the corners, and receding into various curves at the sides, with a row of intertwisted quatrefoils down the middle, and at the heart of the large one in the centre a lozange from the points of which proceed graceful arabesque leafage and blossoms. But all the lines are in happy connexion and the whole pattern is a triumph of decorative art. We can see in it, however, the first signs of tendency towards the Eve style of geometrical adornment. The back is flat and unpanelled. Its whole surface is covered by a beautiful arabesque pattern of curving lines or branches, intertwining and festooned with azuréd leaves and fleurons. The edges are plain-gilt.—This binding was no doubt executed in Paris about 1560-70.

The book was probably bound for him when, in 1560, he married a daughter of the Medici, whose arms are impaled with his.

There is nothing amongst all the Grolier books more beautiful or in purer taste than these decorative sides. The back is perfect, stamped in each of the eight panels with a little branch of leaflets. There are three high bands, each bearing a horizontal gold line, and four small ones gilt with oblique strokes. edges of the book are plain-gilt; the edges of the cover gilt with sets of little curling tendrils divided by simple lines.

There are two bookplates of the Jobert library engraved in the seventeenth century. The first one is an escutcheon, below it the words Joherti insignia; the second is a head of Janus with a long inscription from which we glean that Janus Jobertus, Paris advocate, was the founder of the library, and that his grandson was then (about 1620) the possessor of it. The book was therefore in the possession of Jan Jobert about 1560. (Perhaps he had had it bound for him.) The learned Jesuit, Louis Jobert

(born 1637), was perhaps a member of the same family.

Hadrian Beverland's signature is on the title. Some MS. verses on the flyleaf are probably written by the hand of the first Jobert, making a New Year's gift of the book itself. They begin "Ce premier Jour de la nounelle annee." This must have been about 1580.

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The Swastika was probably the first sign to be made with a definite intention and a continuous or consecutive meaning, the knowledge of which passed from person to person, from tribe to tribe, from people to people, and from nation to nation, until, with possibly changed meanings it has finally circled the globe. An exceedingly interesting volume, at the end of which is a most useful bibliography on the subject.

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This is more the case in the English line than in the French, as it was necessary to represent the elder branch in the upper line, and the Emperors of Constantinople, the Seigneurs de Champignolles, the Seigneurs d'Arrablay and Taulay, and de la Terti Loupière, as they successively carried on this branch of the family until 1740, when it ended with Helène de Courtenay who married the Prince de Bauffremont.

The English branch is simpler, and therefore more space has been given to maternal ancestors—notably of course to the Redvers who were the first Earls of Devon, and to the Barons of Okehampton, whose last representative Hawisa, "Lady of Oke-hampton," brought that title to Sir Reginald Courtenay.

More lately the Powderham branch

occupied the second row of shields until they in their turn became the elder branch, by the death of Edward, Earl of Devon, who was so long a prisoner in the Tower.

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The appearance of this edition, first announced in 1882, was unavoidedly delayed by the deaths, successively, of Mr. ROBERT WARD, the printer, and Miss Isabella Bewick, Bewick's only surviving daughter. The original blocks were purchased by Mr. Ward's sons and successors, who have now completed the work. Paper expressly prepared for the reception of woodcuts was used; and all the modern improvements of typography have been enlisted in order to secure brilliant and effective impressions.
