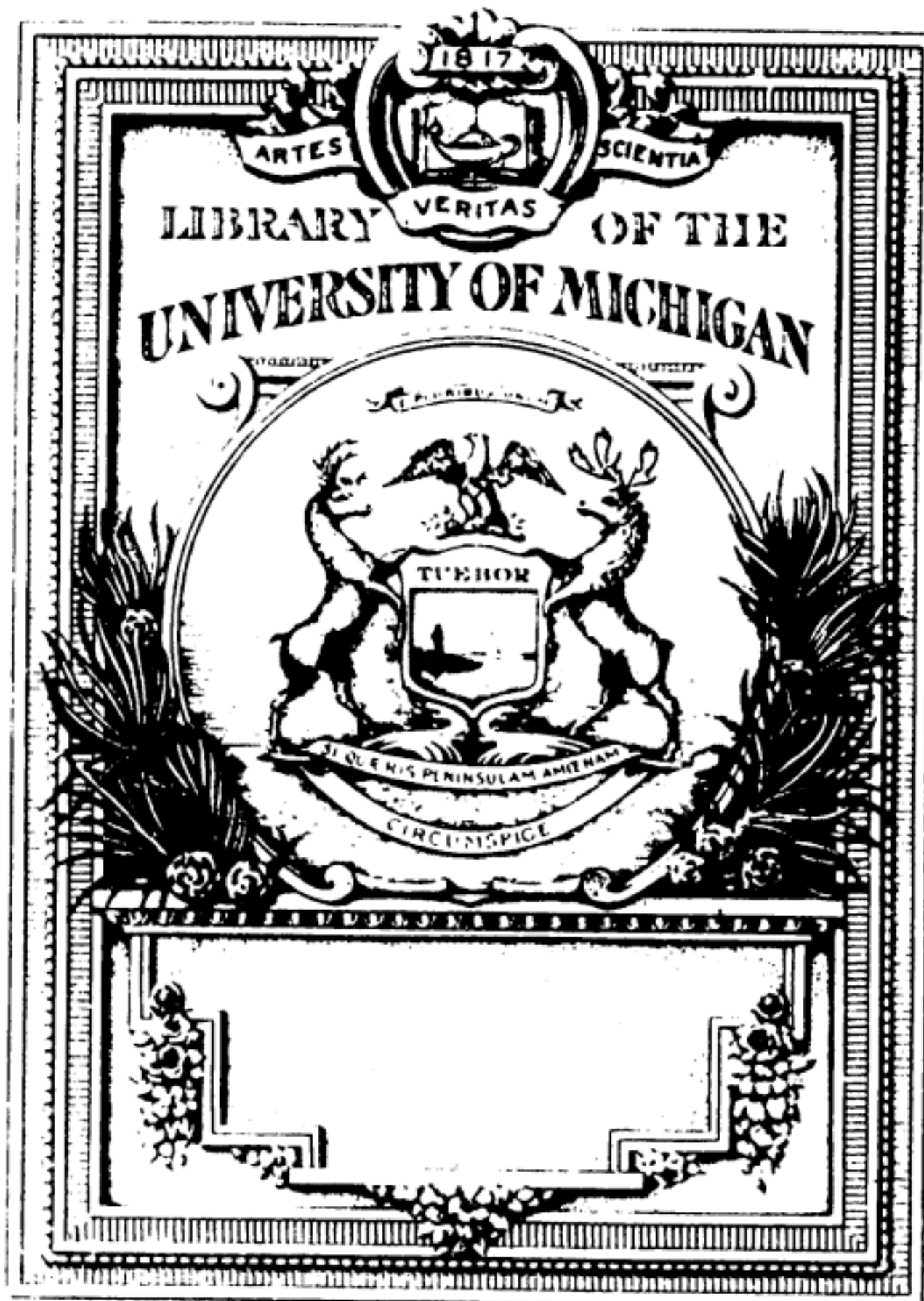

- Though this work deals largely with the History of the Eastern Province of the Colony of the Cape of Good Hope, it is essentially an account of all the chief matters which have made South African history. In the Eastern Province have happened all the Kaffir wars, the undue missionary interference in political matters, the causes of the racial feeling between British and Dutch—Slagter's Nek—the great trek which led ultimately to the establishment of Natal and the Transvaal, and therefore, indirectly, to the troubles of later times, which culminated in the late Anglo-Boer War.

| Craig, who had served with distinction in North America and the Netherlands, had, in conjunction with Major-General Alured Clarke, effected the capture of the colony of the Cape of Good Hope from the Dutch in 1795. MACARTNEY MSS.:

Lord Macartney, the son of a country gentleman of Lissanoure in the north of Ireland, without any family connections to help him in his career in the diplomatic world, rose to the highest offices by the brilliancy of his talents.

In 1796 he was appointed Governor and Captain-General of the Cape while recruiting his health in Italy. Mr. Dundas, the Secretary of State for the Colonies, realized the necessity for a strong man at the helm of the newly acquired colony. Owing to the state of his health, Macartney did not desire the office in question, and it was only at the earnest desire of King George III that he accepted it, on the condition that, should he be too ill to remain at the Cape, he could hand over his office to the next in command and return home, without waiting for the appointment of a successor. Except for the salaries of officials, over which he had no control, his administration at the Cape was economical and just, and this, combined with the sense of security which his presence gave, rapidly brought comparative prosperity to the new colony. He was a great believer in the possibility of the eventual amalgamation of the English and Dutch. He was of the opinion that the Colony should be administered by the East India Company and not by the Government. He thought that South Africa would be one of the best places in which to grow cotton, and in one of his letters he speaks of some which had been shown to an expert from India, who stated that it was the best he had ever seen.

Apparently nearly all the following items are in the handwriting of Acheson Maxwell, one of the private secretaries.

- 1413 BRISBANE (Sir Thos. McDougall), *Soldier, Astronomer, and 6th Governor of New South Wales, from 1821 to 1825*; Brisbane, the capital of Queensland, was named after him. A. L. s., $1\frac{1}{2}$ pp., 4to., from *Brisbane, Greenock, 21 Nov., 1810*, ordering astronomical and scientific books; also L. signed *5th Nov., 1844*, explaining his reasons for waiving his "claim to the bursary, until the year 1848," &c. He established at Paramatta an observatory, and published his "Brisbane Catalogue of Stars," and many other scientific works; in N.S. Wales he improved the condition of the convicts, substituting useful labour for the treadmill; President of the Royal Society, Edinburgh, on the death of Sir Walter Scott. 5 0 0
- 1414 COOK (Captain). A. L. s., 1 p., 4to., to Mr. Joseph Cockfield; offering to obtain permission for him to see the specimens of rare plants collected by Mr. (afterwards Sir Joseph) Banks and Dr. Solander during Cook's first voyage. Next door to Curtiss's Wine Vaults, Mile end, *10 Decr., 1771*.

A most important contribution to the study of Napoleon's military career. The Army of Warsaw was with Napoleon in his most famous campaigns, in the Peninsula, Italy, Germany and Russia. In the latter campaign it formed the 5th corps of the Emperor's army. During the campaign in France in 1814 the Polish troops were disseminated among the French corps, and therefore, being no longer a separate army, this history does not deal in detail with this phase of its existence.

By a clause of the Treaty of Paris in 1815, permission was granted to re-form the Army of Warsaw and to keep a standing army of Poles in Poland. Following the unsuccessful insurrection against Russian rule in 1830-31 this right was rescinded, and the army was incorporated in the Russian forces.

During the whole of its career the "Armée de Varsovie" covered itself with glory, a fitting tribute to which may be extracted from the Preface: "Nous avons cherché ainsi à rendre justice à l'armée du duché de Varsovie, dont la vaillance et le dévouement ont si souvent contribué au succès des armées françaises; à ces soldats qui ont prodigué leur sang à côté des troupes françaises, dont ils furent toujours et jusqu'à la fin les plus fidèles alliés."

The illustrations, which supplied the *motif* for the book, are very artistic and exact. They serve to illustrate the uniforms worn by the various regiments, the details for which were obtained by reference to a series of coloured drawings executed in 1810 by an officer in the "Armée de Varsovie," and also to the collection of military drawings conserved in the "*Bibliothèque polonaise de Paris.*"

The general effect of the book is very artistic. Handsomely printed on fine paper the work should form a welcome addition to any military library or Napoleon collection.
