



Although they are issued at very low prices, in nearly every case below the cost of production, these handbooks have very great value, and have been written by writers who are recognised as expert authorities.



VERY RARE. 'Barnes is best known by his Parthenophil and Parthenope Sonnettes, Madrigals Elegies, and Odes; a work which gives him a claim to high rank among the minor Elizabethans as a sonnetteer and lyrist. It now exists only in a unique copy (in the Duke of Devonshire's Library).

The word Pope, wherever it occurs, is run through with a pen, and there are some marginal notes in contemporary handwriting. 'This is usually called the St. Alban's Chronicle, as it was first printed there in 1483. It is an enlargement of Caxton's Chronicle which was first printed in 1480. The Description of Britain at the end is by Caxton, printed with his Chronicle of 1480, and sometimes found separate. Curio, persecuted by the Vatican for supporting Luther, took refuge finally in Basle, where he died in 1569.

EXTREMELY RARE; the first edition in English of the famous medieval adaptation of the fables of Bidpai. The Hope-Edwardes copy sold for £325 in 1901. It is generally supposed to have been printed, if not translated, by John Rastell, but the type has a foreign appearance and the spelling of some words is peculiar, so it was most probably printed abroad, perhaps in Paris. Hazlitt suggested Thielman Kerver as the printer.

This amusing work comprises 122 Dialogues, the 'moral' of each preceded with a metrical couplet, and the subject illustrated with a curious woodcut. It is the first English book in which we find the use of those characteristic couplets appended as morals at the end of the apologues, which sink into the popular memory more deeply than the tales themselves.

VERY RARE and curious. Sir Walter Scott, in writing of this famous work, says 'Franck's contests with the salmon [he was the first to describe salmon-fishing in Scotland] are painted to the life, and his directions to anglers in that noble branch of the art, which exceeds all other uses of the angling rod as much as for hunting exceeds hare hunting, are generally given with great judgment.' He also compares his euphuistic style with that of Urquhart's translation of Rabelais.

The work is also of interest on account of the vituperative spleen with which Franck attacks Walton. He refers to him as a 'scribling Putationer,' and 'deficient in Practicks, and indigent in the lineal and plain Tracts of Experience; yet so fortified with Confidence and Ignorance, enough I declare to make an Artist blush, if only but to hear them [*i.e.* Walton & Cotton] assert, that from one River in a Nation, all the rest may be nationally understood: which preposterous impertinent Opinion, if I should not publickly oppose, it would seem to confirm and assign me a Confederate with the Rout and Rabble so ignorantly opinionated.'

The Posies was the first authorized edition of Gascoigne's works, a collected volume of his verse having been published without his permission under the title of A hundreth Sundrie Flowres in 1572 (though undated). The Steele Glas . . . with The Complainte of Phylomene (the separate title to the latter piece is dated 1576) is absolutely the first edition. Prefixed to it are commendatory verses by 'Walter Rawely of the middle Temple'; which are the earliest from his pen to appear in print. 'It was indeed the fruit of much conference among the bishops; but the singular thing about it was the preface, which was really a petition from the divines who drew it up to Henry to revise and correct it and then suffer it to be printed. The king, however, kept it for six months, and then authorised its publication, declaring he had not had time to examine it as requested, but trusted to the divines that it was sound and scriptural.'-Prof. James Gairdner.

It might be thought that the Pia et Catholica Christiani Hominis Institutio, printed by Berthelet in 1544, was a Latin translation of this book; but that is, in fact, translated from the Necessary Doctrine and Erudition for any christen man, which Berthelet printed in 1543.



John Laski, or à Lasco (1499-1560), was a famous Polish reformer. He claimed descent from Henry de Lacy, third Earl of Lincoln. Mr. W. A. J. Archbold writes : 'In September 1550 Laski visited Bucer at Cambridge, and had a long discussion on religious matters. They differed on the question of the Real Presence. This was probably translated from the French version of Claude Gruget. It was dedicated to John Fortescue, keeper of the great wardrobe and afterwards Chancellor of the Exchequer. His arms are on the reverse of the title.

'It is one of the most interesting of the books of the Shakesperian period and contains many curious histories. Among them is the story of Tamerlane, dramatized by Marlowe.'

From the Gordonstoun library, with signature of Sir Robert Gordon on title. He seems to have paid five shillings for it. Previously it had been in the possession of members of the Fotherby family, to one of whom it was given by William Hall. This was apparently Charles Fotherby, who presented it to his brother Martin (Bishop of Salisbury in 1618). Later owners were T. B. B. Barrett of Lee Priory, George Smith, and William Maskell.



A proof of Morgan's portrait, which forms a portion of the engraved title, is added. This proof was evidently taken before the author's name was engraved in the blank space below the portrait. Morgan has written in this very place: 'me jure tenet Sylvanus Morgan Londinensis.'


Many old Latin, Spanish, French, Italian and German documents are printed, together with the English translation, in double columns.

In May 1655, Cromwell sent the author to the Duke of Savoy to intercede on behalf of the Waldenses. While residing at Geneva, he was advised by Thurloe to collect information in order to compile a history of the Waldenses.

The sensational engravings caused the book to act 'like Fox's Book of Martyrs.' An extremely adulatory dedication, addressed to Cromwell, is prefixed to the volume. Hollis's Memoirs records that this dedicatory epistle was always withdrawn by Morland from any copies that came in his way.

[Worms?, about 1526] FIRST EDITION; OF EXTREME BARITY. It is a most bitter satire upon the Romish priesthood, especially Cardinal Wolsey, who had all copies he could obtain destroyed. Tyndale in his Parable of the Wycked Mammon states that it was printed at Worms. It was reprinted at Wesel in 1546, but the passage, commencing on  $c_6$ , referring to the divorce of Henry VIII and mentioning the Princess Mary, is omitted; and throughout the dialogue there is no mention of the Cardinal, the matter being altered to a general reference to the vices of the bishops, the wit and poignancy of the first edition being thus frequently lost, though the bitterness of the satire is little moderated.

In Cologne and in Worms, in 1525 and 1526, Roy worked with Tyndale in the production of the English Testament. Then they parted : Roy went to Strassburg, and there with the assistance of Jerome Barlow, produced this *Rede me and be not* wrothe in which Cardinal Wolsey and others are fiercely abused for their opposition to the spreading of Gospel light in England. There is praise given to 'Strasburgh that noble towne | A cyte of most famous renowne | Wheare the gospell is frely preached.' An attentive study of this curious book of verse will give a vivid picture of the state of things in England at the time. His remarks on Cochlæus are of the most bitter kind, that scholar having been the denouncer to Wolsey of the secret Bible-work going on in Cologne and Worms between Tyndale and Roy.

Books containing doctrine contrary to that authorised by the King since 1540 are forbidden. All songs, interludes of plays contrary to such doctrine, are disallowed, and notes in Bibles and phrases in Prayer Books are to be erased. No public reading of the Bible or teaching religion, except under proper authority, is to be allowed, save by noblemen and other specified persons. Merchants may read the Bible privately, as may a nobleman or gentle woman, but women generally and the working classes are forbidden to do so.

The earliest mention in literature of Shakespeare by name is in the first edition of the above book, while the verse dialogue between W. S. and H. W. is supposed by some to be connected with Shakespeare's Sonnets. The excessive rarity of the earlier editions of the book is shown by Sir Sidney Lee's article in the *Dictionary of National Biography*, where it is stated that the only known copies are: first edition, 1594, two perfect and one imperfect copy; second and third editions none at all; fourth edition, 1605, one copy; and fifth edition, one in the British Museum, then believed to be unique. Sir Sidney Lee however does not mention that the copy in the British Museum is imperfect. Besides the perfect copy now offered there is another, which realised £74. recently at auction.






