Laboratories are open daily, 8:00-6:00 (Sat., 8:00-1:00.) Instruction given Mon., Th., 2:00-5:30, and Fri., Sat., 9:00-12:30 only. Students must register with the instructor for definite hours covering at least

two-thirds of the assignment within these limits, and must secure a desk. The number of desks is limited, and registration is incomplete until the desk is secured.

5 Courses 20, 21, and 22 constitute three quarters' work, and may be begun any quarter. Any one of these courses may be taken as Mj or as a DM. The same principles apply to Courses 25, 26, and 27.

Note.—Laboratory fees are due in addition to the tuition fees for all laboratory courses in the Department of Chemistry, as follows: M courses, \$2.50; Mj or DM courses, \$5.00; DMj courses, \$10.00.

EXPLANATIONS AND NOTES

I. MATRICULATION AND REGISTRATION.

1. **Time of Registration.**
 - a) *Students in residence* during the Spring Quarter will register for the Summer and Autumn Quarters beginning Tuesday, June 4, 1901.
 - b) Students entering the University *for the first time*, or resuming work after an absence of a quarter, will register for the Summer Quarter on or before Wednesday, June 19, and for the Autumn Quarter on or before Tuesday, October 1, 1901.
2. **Order of Registration.**—The usual registration cards will be filled with names of departments and numbers of courses selected, and will be left with the clerk of the dean with whom registration is effected.
3. **Changes in Registration.**—Registration being once effected, change of the same is permitted only 1) with the consent of the Dean, and 2) on payment of a fee of *one dollar* for each instance of change. (See II, No. 4.)
4. **Abbreviations.**—The following abbreviations are used
 - a) **For Buildings:**
 - A = Anatomy Building.
 - B = Botany Building.
 - C = Cobb Lecture Hall.
 - G = Gymnasium Building.
 - H = Haskell Museum.
 - K = Kent Chemical Laboratory.

 - W = Walker Museum.
 - Y = Yerkes Observatory.
 - Z = Zoölogy Building.
 - b) **For Rooms:** A, B, C, and D refer to the floors in Cobb Lecture Hall, beginning with the ground floor as A. The rooms are numbered, *e. g.*, C 2 D = Cobb Hall, Room No. 2, 4th floor.
5. **Required Physical Culture.**—Juniors are required to take continuous work in Physical Culture, and will register each quarter for a course in that department. Seniors elect courses in Physical Culture during at least four quarters, and will *in no case omit to register* for a course in that department except after securing the written approval of the Director of Physical Culture, and presenting the same to the Dean at the time of registration.
6. **Military Science and Tactics.**—Students may register for Military Science in lieu of required work in the Department of Physical Culture.
7. **Required Elocution.**—All Juniors upon completing the first Major in required English will register for Elocution during the next two successive quarters.
8. **Other Required Subjects.**—For all other required courses see the CIRCULAR OF INFORMATION of the Colleges.

II. FEES.

ALL FEES ARE PAYABLE TO THE REGISTRAR, COBB LECTURE HALL, ROOM A 1.

SPECIAL NOTICE.—*All tuition and laboratory fees are due and payable on or before the first day of EACH QUARTER.*

1. **Matriculation Fee.**—The Matriculation fee is \$5.00.
2. **Tuition Fee.**—
 - a) The Tuition fee is \$40.00 (including the library and incidental fee, \$5.00) for regular work (3 Majors or their equivalent); there is no reduction for those taking only 2 Majors.
 - b) A reduction is made in case of students taking only 1 Major (or equivalent), one half the full tuition fee being charged.
 - c) Undergraduate (including Unclassified) students taking more than 3 Majors, will be charged (in addition to the regular tuition fee), at the rate of \$15.00 for each additional Major.
3. **Fee for Late Registration.**—An extra fee of \$5.00 will be charged all students who fail to register *within the appointed registration periods*, as announced above, or who fail to pay *all* University bills before the close of the *fifth* day of the quarter.
4. **Fee for Change of Registration.**—The fee for a change of registration is one dollar. The student in such case will present to the Registrar a permit from his dean.
5. **Laboratory Fee.**—
 - a) A Laboratory fee of \$5.00 will be charged for each Major course in Chemistry, and \$2.50 for each Major course in each of the Biological Departments (XXII-XXVII). Ten dollars (\$10.00) is the maximum charge for Laboratory work in any one department. (M and DMj courses will be charged in proportion.)
 - b) In addition to the regular Laboratory fee, students will procure a coupon ticket, entitling them to \$5.00 worth of Laboratory material. Unused portions will be redeemed.
6. **Room Rents, varying from \$20 to \$57 per quarter, are payable not later than the fifth day of each quarter.**

By the munificence of Mr. John D. Rockefeller, Divinity Halls, accommodating 140 students, have been erected upon the University grounds in which furnished rooms are rented to students regularly matriculated in the *Divinity* School at from \$8.00 to \$12.00 a quarter, this charge being intended to cover the expense of heat, light, and care of room. Applications for rooms should be sent to the Registrar of the University.
7. **Divinity Scholarships and Fellowships.**—Through the coöperation of the University, the Baptist Theological Union, and the Northwestern Baptist Education Society, the Graduate Divinity School is able to offer to approved applicants Annual Scholarships varying from \$105.00 to \$255.00 a year (\$35.00 to \$85.00 a quarter), and to a limited number of students Fellowships of \$420.00 a year.

To applicants whose credentials are satisfactory, these Scholarships and Fellowships will be assigned before the student comes to the University. Students who desire to receive such aid are advised to make application in advance. Address, The University of Chicago, Chicago, Ill.

EXPLANATIONS AND NOTES

I. MATRICULATION AND REGISTRATION.

1. Time of Registration.
 - a) *Students in residence* during the Autumn Quarter will register for the Winter Quarter beginning Tuesday, December 11, 1900.
 - b) Students entering the University for the first time, or resuming work after an absence of a quarter, will register for the Winter Quarter on or before Wednesday, January 2, 1901.
2. Order of Registration. — The usual registration cards will be filled with names of departments and numbers of courses selected, and will be left with the clerk of the dean with whom registration is effected.
3. Changes in Registration.—Registration being once effected, change of the same is permitted only 1) with the consent of the Dean, and 2) on payment of a fee of *one dollar* for each instance of change. (See II, No. 4.)
4. Abbreviations. — The following abbreviations are used
 - a) For Buildings:
 - A = Anatomy Building.
 - B = Botany Building.
 - C = Cobb Lecture Hall.
 - G = Gymnasium Building.
 - H = Haskell Museum.
 - K = Kent Chemical Laboratory.
 - Kl = Kelly Hall.
 - P = Physiology Building.
 - R = Ryerson Physical Laboratory.
 - W = Walker Museum.
 - Y = Yerkes Observatory.
 - Z = Zoölogy Building.
 - b) For Rooms: A, B, C, and D refer to the floors in Cobb Lecture Hall, beginning with the ground floor as A. The rooms are numbered, *e. g.*, C 2 D = Cobb Hall, Room No. 2, 4th floor.
5. Required Physical Culture. — Juniors are required to take continuous work in Physical Culture, and will register each quarter for a course in that department. Seniors elect courses in Physical Culture during at least four quarters, and will *in no case omit to register* for a course in that department except after securing the written approval of the Director of Physical Culture, and presenting the same to the Dean at the time of registration.
6. Military Science and Tactics. — Students may register for Military Science in lieu of required work in the Department of Physical Culture.
7. Required Elocution. — All Juniors upon completing the first Major in required English will register for Elocution during the next two successive quarters.
8. Other Required Subjects. — For all other required courses see the CIRCULAR OF INFORMATION of the Colleges.

II. FEES.

ALL FEES ARE PAYABLE TO THE REGISTRAR, COBB LECTURE HALL, ROOM A 1.

SPECIAL NOTICE.—All tuition and laboratory fees are due and payable on or before the first day of EACH QUARTER.

1. Matriculation Fee.—The Matriculation fee is \$5.00.
2. Tuition Fee.—
 - a) The Tuition fee is \$40.00 (including the library and incidental fee, \$5.00) for regular work (3 Majors or their equivalent); there is no reduction for those taking only 2 Majors.
 - b) A reduction is made in case of students taking only 1 Major (or equivalent), one half the full tuition fee being charged.
 - c) Undergraduate (including Unclassified) students taking more than 3 Majors, will be charged (in addition to the regular tuition fee), at the rate of \$15.00 for each additional Major.
3. Fee for Late Registration.—An extra fee of \$5.00 will be charged all students who fail to register within the appointed registration periods, as announced above, or who fail to pay *all* University bills before the close of the *fifth* day of the quarter.
4. Fee for Change of Registration.—The fee for a change of registration is one dollar. The student in such case will present to the Registrar a permit from his dean.
5. Laboratory Fee.—
 - a) A Laboratory fee of \$5.00 will be charged for each Major course in Chemistry, and \$2.50 for each Major course in each of the Biological Departments (XXII–XXVII). Ten dollars (\$10.00) is the maximum charge for Laboratory work in any one department. (M and DMj courses will be charged in proportion.)
 - b) In addition to the regular Laboratory fee, students will procure a coupon ticket, entitling them to \$5.00 worth of Laboratory material. Unused portions will be redeemed.
6. Room Rents, varying from \$20 to \$57 per quarter, are payable not later than the *fifth* day of each quarter.

By the munificence of Mr. John D. Rockefeller, Divinity Halls, accommodating 140 students, have been erected upon the University grounds in which furnished rooms are rented to students regularly matriculated in the *Divinity* School at from \$8.00 to \$12.00 a quarter, this charge being intended to cover the expense of heat, light, and care of room. Applications for rooms should be sent to the Registrar of the University.
7. Divinity Scholarships and Fellowships.—Through the coöperation of the University, the Baptist Theological Union, and the Northwestern Baptist Education Society, the Graduate Divinity School is able to offer to approved applicants Annual Scholarships varying from \$105.00 to \$255.00 a year (\$35.00 to \$85.00 a quarter), and to a limited number of students Fellowships of \$420.00 a year.

To applicants whose credentials are satisfactory, these Scholarships and Fellowships will be assigned before the student comes to the University. Students who desire to receive such aid are advised to make application in advance. Address, The University of Chicago, Chicago, Ill.
