

# History of the Somerville High School

How strange the first day of school eighty-three years ago would seem to us! At that time, sixty-three pupils were admitted to the school in comparison to the more than 2600 who now enter our high school daily.

On May 3, 1852, two teachers conducted the first session in Somerville Free High School. The headmaster then was Robert Bickford. His excellent record has been upheld by such men as Leonard Walker, Samuel Pike, Isaac Beals, Henry Babcock, George Baxter, Charles Whitcomb, John Avery, Harry Sears, and of course, our present headmaster, Albert Giroux,



Having outgrown its first building, in 1872, the school moved into the building later known as the Somerville Latin School. Because enrollment continued to increase rapidly, the Somerville English High School was built in 1895. When Mr. Baxter resigned, the two schools were united making one Somerville High School.

In 1912 the enrollment increased to approximately 2,000, and three years later Junior High Schools were built. Then the Senior High School was changed to a three year school.

A plan was adopted in 1927 for the enlargement and improvement of the school and for the addition of a gym. This work was completed in 1930 at an expenditure of \$1,000,000.

Since then our school has strived to maintain its high standard of "Honor and Progress." May it continue to do so in the future and hold the honored place it has attained.

Now we have graduated. Three years have passed. Years of happy moments that passed too quickly. Years replete with excitement, apprehension, happiness and friends. Years that have become part of us. Years which we know will never be forgotten.

The many thousands of accounts which were active during the past year in the School Savings System of Somerville, provided the members of the Bank Corps with a full volume of work. Since the clerical work connected with the deposits made in the School Bank in all the schools of the city is concentrated in the High School Bank, the Bank Corps has an exceptional opportunity to gain experience in practical work and give service at the same time.

The members of the Bank Corps, carefully chosen for their qualifications to engage in this important work, gave an excellent accounting of themselves by their efficient work in handling all the details. An idea of the magnitude of the work can be gained from the fact that, since the opening of the School Bank last year under our new system, 10,264 accounts have been opened throughout the city.

A sense of honor, as well as of pride in careful and accurate work, has characterized the Bank Corps.

With the help of faculty librarian Mr. Richard Obear, the twenty-two library assistants, consisting of eleven Sophomores, ten Juniors and one Senior, performed their tasks for the improvement of the library. These jobs included filing catalog cards, preparing new books for circulation, dating circulation cards, making out and delivering overdue book notices, and keeping circulation and attendance records. Their efficiency and willingness to cooperate made their help more pleasant and doubly useful.

When pupils discovered that the library was an excellent and a useful place in which to look up material for research and projects, the library became a popular place in which to spend study periods. Anyone needing help received it from willing hands.

Many of these pupils will probably go on to careers as librarians. The experience gained as a library assistant offers valuable training to the librarians of the future.




