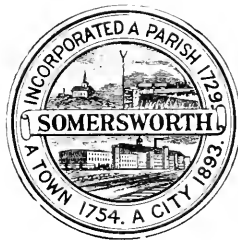

INAUGURAL ADDRESS.

To the Members of the City Council:

GENTLEMEN: For the third time, the honor of being mayor of the city of Somersworth has been conferred upon me. I realize the great responsibilities which accompany the office, and it is my sincere hope and purpose to be faithful to the duties intrusted to me. My purpose will be to give the citizens of Somersworth the best possible administration of public affairs. I shall make every effort to perform my duties in such a manner as best to advance and preserve the rights of all the citizens. I enter upon this term without prejudice against any man, fully determined that fairness shall be shown toward all.

Financially, our city stands well. During the past fiscal year the debt has been reduced \$9,000. Economy and discretion have been and will continue to be used in the expenditure of the city's money. I would ask your honorable body to make such appropriations as are necessary to the economical administration of the city's affairs.

HIGHWAYS.

Our highways are in fairly good condition. They should be the very best a city affords, a pride and ornament to a city. Good roads attract residents and contribute to industrial prosperity. Last year two miles of the state road were built, but the appropriations were inadequate for the completion of the remaining one-fourth of a mile. I consider it good policy for a city to build a road at the rate of fifty cents on the dollar, therefore I would earnestly recommend that an appropriation be made for the completion of the state road. In order to preserve the road, provision should be made for oiling it when needed. Market street is one of our principal thoroughfares, and to have it macadamized would add, in no small measure, to the progressive aspect of the city. Last year suitable sidewalks were built on Franklin, Main, High, Lincoln and Green streets. More are needed in other parts of the city. I would ask for an

appropriation of \$2,000 to build these sidewalks. The road roller has been repaired so often that it would be economy to buy a new one.

SCHOOLS.

The object of our schools is to prepare the child to master his present surroundings. With the aid of an efficient corps of teachers much has been accomplished. They are faithful, and possessed of a goodly amount of tact in dealing with the pupil. We have secured the services of a superintendent who has a thorough practical knowledge of the methods and principles of education. His good influence has already made itself evident. He has made many beneficial changes in the course of study.

Drawing has been added to the school curriculum. This is but the precursor of manual training, which has come to be recognized as an essential. No opportunity ought to be neglected for broadening the experience of the young, with the final purpose of leading to better citizenship. There is a great demand for skilled labor, and our schools must eventually meet the needs. Commercial geography and algebra have been introduced as studies in the ninth grade.

Unusually good work is done in our high school. It has been placed on the list approved by colleges. The equipments of the chemical and physical laboratories are insufficient for the requirements in the course of study. I would suggest that an appropriation be made for supplying the long-felt need.

Our buildings are in good sanitary condition, well ventilated, well lighted and clean. A few minor repairs were necessary during the past year. Gongs for fire alarm signals were put up in the buildings, and a well-regulated fire drill is in practice.

Since education has become a necessity for the doing of the world's work, it is wise to expend money for the fur-

therance of the excellent work accomplished in our city's schools.

FIRE DEPARTMENT.

The work of our fire department is commendable. We are fortunate in possessing such responsive, willing men to serve us when needed. Heretofore, our men have labored under a disadvantage, in not knowing the exact location of a fire, consequently a practical fire-alarm system has been installed and is at present in good working order. To perfect the system, a central fire station, with all suitable equipments, is essential. I ask your honorable body to consider the advisability of selecting a site on which to erect this station, and also placing in it necessary fire apparatus.

HEALTH.

The health department of a city is of prime importance. Laws made in reference to health should be conscientiously enforced to the letter ; too highly must we value the comforts and welfare of our community, than to be lax in compelling citizens to conform to the rules and regulations made. Frequent and more careful inspection would lead to better sanitary conditions of yards, cellars and sheds, and thus avoiding the many evils resulting from mere carelessness. I should strongly advise the collection of garbage and other refuse made the year round, instead of eight months in the year, as is the present custom. The garbage receptacles should be of metal, water tight, and covered. The advantage in using these metal cans is two-fold ; they are more durable than barrels or boxes, and the garbage will neither smell badly in warm weather, nor stick to the cans in cold weather. The garbage ought to be drained of all water and wrapped in paper before putting into the can. Garbage kept in this way is far from becoming a nuisance. This work should come under the supervision of the board of health.

LIBRARY.

It is gratifying to know that our library is becoming more attractive to the public by its possession of well-chosen books and periodicals. Great care is taken by the competent librarian in the selection of reading material. A boys' reading room has been fitted up, and is proving to be a success. It is well to cultivate the habit of reading good books, as this habit has oftentimes been the making of men. There is need of better heating facilities in our library. I would recommend that a steam-heating plant be placed in the building.

POLICE STATION.

According to my recommendations of last year, much improvement has been made in the prisoners' quarters. A cell has been suitably fitted up for tramps. The other cells were cemented and all made sanitary.

ELECTRIC LIGHTS.

One of the most important items in municipal responsibility is the lighting of a city. Good lights give a business-like appearance to a city. It is the general opinion of the citizens, that while our present system is good, yet an all-night light system would prove to be more satisfactory. There is a bill pending in the legislature, which, if it becomes a law, will empower us to build, equip and maintain our own lighting plant. Our present contract with the Twin State Gas and Electric Company does not expire for two years more, but I should recommend that we make arrangements with the company for all-night lighting for the remaining part of the contract. This all-night lighting service will be a protection against fire, breaking and entering, and will be appreciated generally by the public.

WATER WORKS.

The water works is under the management of an efficient board of commissioners and a superintendent. They

have now in use sand-washers, that have been in operation for the past three years, and are giving excellent satisfaction. At the last session of the legislature a bill was passed for the improvement of the condition of the Salmon Falls river, and we should see that they live up to the conditions of that bill, as a great deal of sediment is left upon the filter bed from the manufactories above us. The financial results of the past six years, from the water system, have been very satisfactory, averaging a balance of about \$2,300 per year. The entire plant, pumping station and filter bed, are in good condition.

CONCLUSION.

In conclusion, I shall always bear in mind that I have pledged myself to you to discharge my duties with a feeling of responsibility and trust. With a confidence in God for his guidance we enter upon our work. May we hope that at the end of our term we may have deserved the esteem of the city of Somersworth.

In Favor of Transferring from any Department that may have an Excess in Appropriation.

Resolved by the City Council of the City of Somersworth:

That the Finance Committee is hereby authorized to transfer from any department that may have an excess of appropriation, or from any money remaining in the treasury, not otherwise appropriated, and apply to such department as may have expended more than the appropriation.

In Favor of Borrowing Money in Anticipation of Taxes.

Resolved by the City Council of the City of Somersworth:

That the Committee on Finance be and hereby is authorized to borrow, in anticipation of taxes, for the City of Somersworth, in such amounts and at such times as may be deemed necessary to meet current expenses, at the lowest rate of interest obtainable, the sum of all amounts so borrowed not to exceed fifteen thousand dollars, and that the proper officers of the city be authorized to give the city's notes therefor.

Resolved: That the Committee on Printing be and hereby are authorized to have 500 copies of the City Report printed, for the fiscal year just closed.

Passed April 26, 1910.

In Favor of Amendment to Ordinances.

Be it Ordained by the City Council of the City of Somersworth:

That the ordinances of the City of Somersworth be and hereby are amended as follows :

“ Add to Section 1, Chapter 5, the following : The city clerk shall be allowed the sum of two hundred and fifty dollars (\$250) a year for an assistant.”

Resolved: That the Committee on Roads, Bridges and Drains be and hereby are authorized to purchase twenty-five galvanized cans, to be distributed in business sections of the city, for the collection of paper and waste.

In Favor of Changing some of the Street Lights in the City.

Resolved by the City Council of the City of Somersworth:

That the Committee on Street Lights be and hereby are authorized to make several changes on lights, which would be most beneficial to the city, namely, changing the Main street lights to swinging lights, from Fore street to Franklin street, also changing other lights that the committee see fit to change, and without any expense to said city, as contract reads.

Passed June 7, 1910.

In Favor of a Series of Band Concerts.

Resolved by the City Council of the City of Somersworth:

That the sum of three hundred dollars (\$300) be and

hereby is appropriated, from money in the hands of the treasurer not otherwise expended, for a series of public band concerts.

Passed June 7, 1910.

In Favor of the Installation of a Fire Alarm System.

Resolved by the City Council of the City of Somersworth:

That the Committee on Finance be and hereby are authorized to borrow for the City of Somersworth such sum as may be deemed necessary to pay for the installation of a fire alarm system, the sum so borrowed not to exceed twenty-five hundred dollars (\$2,500), and that the proper officers of the city be authorized to give the city's note therefor.

Passed June 7, 1910.

SOMERSWORTH, N. H., August 19, 1910.

Resolved: That His Honor, the Mayor, be and hereby is authorized to offer a reward of two hundred dollars (\$200) for the arrest of Nicholas Capsalis, alias Niclis Capsalacos, and that said sum be taken from moneys in the hands of the treasurer, not otherwise appropriated.

Passed August 19, 1910.

SOMERSWORTH, N. H., October 4, 1910.

Resolved: That the sum of five hundred dollars (\$500) be transferred from the liquor license fees account to the pauper account.

Passed October 4, 1910.

In Favor of Amendment to Ordinances.

Amendment to Section 4, Chapter X of the City Ordinances. "Strike out the words 'fifteen cents per hour' in the third line of said section, and insert in place thereof, 'one dollar and seventy-five cents per day of nine hours' labor,' so that the amended portion shall read to conform to the following :"

Be it Ordained by the City Council of the City of Somersworth:

Section 4. The assistant street commissioners and laborers employed by them, or by the street commissioner, shall receive the sum of one dollar and seventy-five cents per day, of nine hours' labor, while actually engaged in the service of the city.

REPORT OF THE CITY SOLICITOR.

*To His Honor, the Mayor, and the Honorable City Council
of the City of Somersworth:*

Herewith is submitted my report for the municipal year, ending March 31st, 1911.

Without question this has been one of the quietest years ever experienced in this branch of the city government. The money stringency which has held sway throughout the whole country has existed in our community during the last two or three years, and for this reason people have not had much money to spend for other than the necessities of life, so that a certain class who make a practice of drinking up all their spare change have not had much spare change to spend, and thus the number of drunks to appear in the police court has been very materially lessened, I should say, in comparison with other years.

A suit which was entered on the equity docket of the superior court of Strafford county, entitled, James H. Joyce v. the City of Somersworth and Charles P. Andrews, in the fall of 1907, still remains unsettled. This suit refers to fees earned by the police officers of Somersworth, before the grand jury and superior court.

The case of Richards & Company v. The City of Somersworth having been settled, there remain two other cases before the superior court in which the city is vitally interested, namely, two petitions for an abatement of taxes on the Central Park property brought by the Dover, Somersworth and Rochester Street Railway Company. These will doubtless be cleaned up in one way or the other at the next term of court.

During the last year there have been but few matters for the consideration of our probation officer in the juvenile department of police court, but admirable results have been

attained in those few, and as time goes on I am more impressed with the fact that young people are more often led to carry on better lives through this way of administering justice, than they would by letting them appear before the police court in the ordinary way of older persons charged with crime.

Most of our complaints against the young people are for playing ball in the streets, and acts of a like nature, all of which goes to show what a great need there is of public playgrounds for children of the city. Two playgrounds suitably located would do away with nine-tenths of the trouble which the police have with the younger element.

At this time I wish to thank all those who have been of aid to me in the carrying out of the duties of my office during the past year.

An examination of the librarian's report will disclose the fact that a wider field for usefulness of the library and its legitimate work has been discovered by the librarian, has been put in shape for cultivation, and that very important results have been obtained.

The scheme of placing books outside the library in a convenient place, such as the Blackwater school, has met with the warmest appreciation and should be carried forward as fast as the means for such work is given your trustees. The whole city bears its proportion of taxes which support the library, and every citizen should have the benefits of the library, and in the most convenient form and place.

The establishment of a boys' room in the Chandler building through the courtesy of the city council is an experiment which has shown that if the means can be found to carry on the work, will surely result in much benefit to the boys of our city. The work intended to be carried on there is essentially educational, but the plan is to present the work in such an attractive manner that it will seem more like play, be so suggestive in its character as to interest the boys in good books and tend to elevate their whole trend of thought.

When it is possible for the city to establish a reading-room, either in the Chandler building, or in some other building near the library, well lighted and well heated, the scope of the library will be greatly increased, and its important work be appreciated more completely.

As previously suggested, your trustees confidently expect that some time in the near future a sufficient appropriation will be made to place a steam-heating plant in the Chandler building, which will obviate the necessity for stoves in the library room, which now constitute a menace to the safety of the library from fire and do much damage to the books on account of the smoke and dust.

You will note that the appropriations for the past year

have been barely sufficient to carry on the library. The comparatively small amount expended for new books was all that could be spared. Twice as much money could have been well spent for new books and should have been spent, if the library is to be kept up to a fair degree of efficiency and interest.

We trust that you will look into the matter when the appropriations for the year 1911 are made, and if possible give us a larger special appropriation.

The year just ending has seen some progress and we

have been able to leave the beaten track at a few points. These departures into new fields have been possible because without much expense. Why a plan has not been thought of before is always a mystery when once its possibilities are seen. The need of books in the Blackwater district had never suggested itself or been suggested until one day a visit was made to the school and this opportunity seen. Since then, books selected by Miss Mullin have been sent there in lots of twenty-five, both for children and adults, as often as desired. It is reported that these are much appreciated, and we hope to do more for the residents of this district in the near future.

A large number of children come to the library each week, 8,278 books having been taken out by them this year. There is very little space allotted to their use, so when they have exchanged their books they stand around, because there is no place to sit, and soon go out on the street. This lack of room to make the children comfortable is a serious problem. Some advantage has been gained by opening the Boys' Reading Room. There seemed no remedy for this crowded condition until one day a trustee of the library suggested that the unused room over the library be taken for their use. At once we set about securing this. The city council granted us the use of the room, the trustees voted \$15 to be used in furnishing and running it, and the experiment of a Boys' Reading Room, open every evening, seven to half-past eight, Sundays, six to half-past eight, was started. The room was opened February 10 and has been open every evening since. Messrs. F. C. Pearson, Jr., V. D. Roberts, S. F. Stevens, F. K. Wentworth, L. J. Gaudreau, C. E. Winn, H. H. Wentworth, M. W. Wheeler, J. W. Fullerton, E. C. Andrews, F. S. Sutcliffe, J. B. Pugsley, P. O. Wentworth and R. Wentworth have been very glad to give their time to look after the room and entertain the boys in different ways. The encouragement received from their hearty co-operation has lightened the

burden and made this possible for the boys. The Philanthropic Department of the Woman's Club gave ten dollars to help this work. With this chairs were bought. Money, books, pictures, stereoscopes, and puzzles have been given by those interested in the boys. Each week two boys have volunteered to clean the room.

The attendance has ranged from thirty to seventy-two, with an average of forty-five. Most of the boys come to read and listen to the stories the men in charge tell to interest them in things outside their own range of knowledge. One evening three new patrols of the Boy Scouts of America were formed here. These facts show that there are boys who are glad to leave the streets and enjoy the privileges thus provided. There are yet many things to be considered ; this room is too far from the street and too far removed from the influence of the library. The freedom and isolation suggest more or less mischief that would not be thought of otherwise. While better than none, it is far from desirable from many points. There is a wide field of usefulness open right here. How shall we improve it ?

The teachers are co-operating with the library, and not only use it for themselves but recommend and encourage the children to do so. The use of reference books by the children has increased much in the last year, whole schools coming some evenings to look up a subject for the next day's work. In the grammar and upper primary grades 65% of the pupils use the library, according to a count recently made. There are over thirteen hundred children between the ages of six and sixteen in Somersworth who ought to be learning to use and enjoy the opportunities of the public library, and we have seating capacity for ten ! Will not the city council untie our hands and give us a chance to help these boys and girls, many of whom are working in the mills and shops and need the influence that the library can give?

Through the kind efforts of Mayor Dougherty a toilet

room has been placed in the library for the convenience of the workers.

We hope to be connected with the outside world by telephone before long. The librarian is often called at her home to answer questions, which it is impossible to do without consulting the material in the library. This shows the need of being in closer touch with our patrons, and in many ways it will add to our usefulness.

After nearly five years of conscientious service Miss May Smilie left us to go into her chosen work. She has been much missed, as she was always interested in the children and ready to help them with her sympathy and understanding of their needs. Miss French, Miss Hobbs, and Miss Griggs are due many thanks for their willing and tireless efforts to meet the demands made upon them. There are many trying situations, but they always face them smilingly. Mrs. Nancy Stevens has given one afternoon each week to keeping the registration in order, writing, and other clerical work. For the unfailing kindness and help of the trustees I am most grateful.

At the beginning of the year this department set out to put in the best repair possible, with such material as was available, all the streets of the city, and with constant care and labor has succeeded, in a large degree, in fulfilling its plans.

STREETS.

All streets have been kept clean, and also all highways of stone and other matter liable to impair good travelling, and have been put in good condition, and where grading was necessary, improvements have been made.

STATE HIGHWAY.

We have built about two miles of state road, which proves to be very satisfactory.

ROADS.

The outside district surveyors have continued in keeping each of their districts in the best of repair.

SEWERS.

All the sewers about the city have been cleaned out regularly, when needed, and kept in proper condition to secure good drainage.

CURBING.

We have laid the amount of sixteen hundred feet of cement curbing and expended nearly one-third of the side-

walk appropriation in this work alone, believing that in order to have good sidewalks we must have good foundations also. The curbing has been laid along the following streets: On the westerly side of Main street, from Washington street to the Great Falls Manufacturing Company's crossing; on the northerly side of Franklin street, from Main to Green street; on the northerly side of High street, from the High street bakery to the Baptist church parsonage; on the northerly side of Lincoln street, from Maple street to Joseph N. Morin's residence. We have also straightened out and put in new curbing on Green street from the Jeneau block to Fayette street, and have put in granite curbing from the Spring street crossing to the Lapointe block, on the easterly side of Main street, and have also strengthened the curbing on High street, from the bakery to the steam laundry.

SIDEWALKS.

The appropriation for this department being small each year, it is impossible to do the amount of work one desires. Our walks are in rather poor condition, and the only remedy I can see is to build a certain amount of walk each year on the streets most needed. Concrete walks have been laid on the following streets: Main, from Washington to the Great Falls Manufacturing Company's crossing; Franklin, from Main to Green street; Green, from the Jeneau block to Fayette street; High, from the Carrier block to the Baptist church parsonage; Lincoln, from Maple to Joseph N. Morin's residence. We have re-covered concrete walks on the following streets: On Grand, from Highland to Grove street, and about fifty feet on Grove street; on Green, from Franklin to Pine street; on Main, from Indigo Hill road to Walnut street.

BRIDGES.

All wooden bridges have been kept in as good repair

as possible, and the Eddy, Berwick, and the New Dam bridges have been painted.

RECOMMENDATIONS.

I would recommend that the laying of sidewalks be continued, and that such work be thoroughly and permanently done, and would also recommend that Market street be macadamized, and the repairing of other macadamized streets, also the purchasing of a new steam road roller, as the other one is unfit for use.

In closing, I desire to thank His Honor, the Mayor, and members of the city council, for their kindness and courtesy during the past year.

SIGNALS.

One stroke of the bell is the all-out signal.

2-2-2 strokes of the bell is for a brush fire, or a fire seen at a distance, where the department is needed.

One stroke of the bell is the engineer's test.

The above signals are given only by the chief engineer.

GENERAL RULES.

Firemen, as well as citizens, should familiarize themselves with the following rules for giving alarms of fire:

1. Never pull a box for a fire seen at a distance.
2. Never pull a box while the alarm bells are ringing, not until a box has completed its four rounds. Two boxes cannot operate together, and neither will work if two are pulled at the same time. Never pull two alarms or two boxes for the same fire.

3. To ring in an alarm, break the glass in the key-box and open the outside door with the key. Pull down the brass crank seen inside, till it stops, then let go. Then let the box alone. The clock will be seen or heard to be running, and the alarm will follow in half a minute or so. Close the door, but do not try to remove the key, as it is locked in a track lock and can only be removed by a release key, which is carried by each engineer, who will, as soon as convenient, release and return it. Remember that the firemen will come directly to the box which has been pulled, and be sure that some one stays at the box to direct them to the fire.
4. Never pull an alarm for a fire seen at a distance. Never touch a box except to give an alarm of fire. Give an alarm for no cause other than actual fire. Don't give an alarm for a chimney fire.

REPORT OF CHAIRMAN OF SCHOOL BOARD.

SOMERSWORTH, N. H., March 1, 1911.

To His Honor, the Mayor, and Members of the City Council:

Gentlemen : I herewith submit my report for the year ending February 28, 1911.

According to my recommendations of last year, the High school grounds have been made more attractive and dignified by suitable grading and well-kept lawns, and a curbing has been placed along the front of the school yard. It is necessary that the chemical and physical laboratories should be more fully equipped, as they are destitute of supplies.

The heating apparatus in the Chandler school building has been renovated, occasioning an expenditure of \$475. In the Burleigh school, the steam pipes were repaired and a radiator placed in the hall. Gongs for fire-alarm signals were installed in the Union and Burleigh schools.

For a more complete report, I refer you to the superintendent's report.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS.

To the Honorable School Committee of Somersworth:

Gentlemen: The school year is, by law, contained within the dates from September to September. Since the beginning of the present school year the special idea has been to unify the work of the grades, to establish a close relation between the different grades, and to encourage and develop an interest in the individual pupil. With these aims in mind your board has adopted an improved change in the High school course of study, has increased the length of the High school session to provide for individual work, has established a uniform course of study for the grades, has reintroduced drawing in the nine grades, and strengthened the ninth by the introduction of algebra and commercial geography for the second semester. These changes, with scientific management, tend to the introduction of those subjects, viz.: sewing and manual training, which will increase the efficiency of the schools and lead to a fully-developed system, as soon as teachers of our own city can be prepared to present them, without unduly increasing the cost of the education of the pupils to the taxpayers of Somersworth. All of these subjects are in line with the general trend of education.

Americans are as free in their right of censure as in any other of their freedoms. When but one-third of the children remain to the end of the elementary course, there is something the matter with the schools. When one-half of the men who are responsible for the business activities and are guiding the political part of the country affirm that children from the elementary schools are not able to do definite things required of the world's real affairs, there is something the matter with the schools. When work seeks workers, and young men and women are indifferent to it, or do not know how to do it, there is something the matter with the schools.

The length of the school period and the productive value of the citizen are closely related. Industrialism is the great basis of a nation's true strength and real culture. Knowing this, we have seen that there is not sufficient articulation between the educational and the industrial systems of the country. We have seen the indefinite expansion of instruction and the unlimited multiplication of appliances leading to literary and professional and managing occupations, without any real solicitude about the vital industrial foundations of the nation's happiness and power. A situation manifestly unjust to the greater number, even unjust to those for whom it has done the most, has resulted. Notwithstanding our boasted universalities of educational opportunity, there has grown up a condition in the educational system which overlooks the just rights of the wage-earning masses, and menaces the industrial efficiency and the material prosperity of the country.

Manual labor is not urged against technical labor, any more than intellectual is against manual labor. It is not said that one should remain in the "class" in which he was born, for we know nothing of classes in America, and we do not admit that any one in the country is ever born in a class. Work makes the worker. The willing workman, whatever his poverty or his work, is likely to be a better citizen and a better man than the willing idler, whatever his riches or his superficial accomplishments. It is not a matter of class at all, but of the adaptation of men and women in general to the work which they can do the best. This need not discourage those of exceptional gifts, for all experiments prove that the exceptional and great have at first been inured to the severe labor which was at hand, and that this very fact opened the door of opportunity, pointed the way to the thing which they could do best, and seasoned them for the doing of it. It is a matter of efficiency, and therefore of happiness and growth in occupation.

The schools must keep abreast now, and in the time to

come, as they have been doing in times past, with an actual outworking of our democracy; they must not be exclusive in any sense, but must be no less concerned about industry than about intellectual education. The best chance of everyone is through the thing he can do best, and while the schools are to inspire and encourage him, they may well be on their guard, lest, in the misguided enthusiasm of their own, they turn him from the work which is likely to be the best for him.

The early thought of the nation about education—the thought which our forefathers brought from over the sea—has completely changed. It is not something good which government is to encourage, but something vital which government must provide. The educational system is no longer a system which shall supply the elements of knowledge, or the primary instruments for gaining knowledge, but a system which is expected to supply all the knowledge which any son or daughter of the state has the preparation and the will to come and take. It no longer acts through schools alone, but through libraries, museums, clubs, lectures, publications, and all other instrumentalities which may possibly raise the intellectual plane.

One cannot go over the last twenty-five years of American educational progress without seeing many developments which are so substantial and decisive, and so completely accomplished that they have become permanent. That period has been marked by truly marvelous advances, not only in the professional, but in the common thought of the nation. It is not too much to say that no such educational advance has been made in all the other history of democratic government and of the English-speaking race.

So rapidly and confidently has universal education moved in this country and in our generation, that the outlines of the national educational system of the future begin to appear. In the last thirty or thirty-five years the system

of collegiate schools has advanced in numbers, in character, in attendance, in the multiplicity of offerings, and in the measure of public support and popular interest, to an extent which is alike surprising and gratifying to educationists. The college system is giving far more uplift and direction to all schools than the people realize. Any substantial uplift in a system of education must come from above. Any great improvement or advance in a class of schools must come from a class of schools higher up. This fact is now actually coming to be recognized by the lower schools themselves in America, and that, of itself, is giving unwonted trend and character to the national school system, but it necessarily follows that the factors which enter into the scheme and give turns to the plans of the upper schools exert a very strong influence of the kind of uplift, and the direction of the development, which those schools give to the middle and lower schools. The aggressive work of the universities, other than that which is in preparation for the learned professions, has come to be in the courses which are fundamental in administration, and in the most successful carrying on of the commercial activities and the construction and manufacturing industries.

There is a large demand for training in the chemistry which enters into the agricultural and manufacturing activities, in all lines of engineering, in the economics of productivities and trade, and in the technicalities of all the businesses which follow after them. The demand is the largest where the equipment and teaching are the best. Of course this all relates to and shapes the courses in the High school, and, in some measure, in the elementary school. It is one of the gratifying developments of recent years, in school administration, to notice that warmer friendships between schools of different grades, and between public and private schools, and between schools of one section and another exist. The policy of our schools should be one of cooperation, rather than competition.

No one can foresee the destiny of the republic, but that there is an educational purpose, a pervasive and ambitious spirit abroad in the land seems clear. It is the spirit of a mighty people gathered from the ends of the earth, enlightened by the world's experiences of a thousand years. Growing appreciation is giving greater heed to advance institutions and bringing them to the aid of all institutions, and therefore to the intellectual quickening of the entire country. Everything that the nation, the state, or the municipality can do to aid true learning, without any injustice, it ought to do, and the learning which aids doing, and the culture which is the product of labor are to be of the most worth.

Gentlemen of the Committee, we are, I believe, starting upon an educational revival in this community. By consistently following the plan already outlined, and by the adoption of such future ones as do not place a financial stress upon the people, you will have accomplished a result for your city which cannot be measured. I do not at this time ask for any additional income to our finances, except one, and that, in the nature of a request, to appropriate by the common council the sum of five hundred dollars (\$500) to be spent under your direction, for placing the physical and chemical laboratory of the High school, so far as the apparatus is concerned, upon a modern basis.

Gentlemen: In compliance with the city ordinances, your board of water commissioners herewith submit the following annual report for the year commencing March 1, 1910, and ending February 28, 1911.

Following the usual custom, the commissioners met at their office in the city building, June 16, 1910, and organized by electing Arthur J. Seavey, chairman, and Charles F. Crockett, clerk. John Parsons was elected superintendent of the water works; Albert A. Tapscott, engineer; and Charles Michel, assistant engineer at the pumping station.

PUMPING STATION.

The pumping station carries its usual amount of insurance. From constant use, the machinery requires some repairing each year. New grates have already been placed in the boiler, and eleven new tubes purchased for the same, also new plungers for the pumps.

FILTER BED.

The filter bed has had its usual cleanings; 400 cubic yards of sand has been replaced, as you will see by the superintendent's report.

Twelve new service pipes have been laid during the year, making a total of nine hundred and forty-two now in use.

The filter bed has been cleaned three times, and the screen well eight times. We have washed about 400 cubic yards of sand at the pumping station, which has been placed on the filter bed, and we believe it a great benefit to our water system.

At the last session of the Legislature, a bill was passed for the improvement of the condition of the Salmon Falls river, and we should see to it that they live up to the conditions of that bill, as a great deal of sediment is left upon the filter bed from manufactories above us.

STAND PIPE.

The stand pipe has been thoroughly overhauled and a few minor leaks repaired during the year.

HYDRANTS.

Every hydrant in the city has been tested and repairs made when necessary.

DISTRIBUTION PIPING.

Leak in 8-inch main, Back street ; leak in 10-inch main, Main street.

SERVICES.

Twelve new services have been laid during the year, making a total now in use of 942. Repairs have been made to many, owing to leaks, principally goose necks.
